Surgeon Clement Bancks: H.Mate 13th June 1800, served as Assistant Surgeon in the Royal Regiment of Malta from 16th April 1805; Surgeon Royal Regiment of Malta 5th June 1806; Half Pay 25th May 1814; Full Pay with the 69th Foot (Exchanged) 19th January 1815: Staff 7th September 1815. Employed in the Army Medical Board Office. Prisoner of War in France. He died in London on the 16th October 1816.

Corporal Henry Russell joined the 18th Foot and in 1853 transfers to the 52nd Foot in June 1853, was at sea between July to October 1853, October to December 1853 Poonah, January to March 1854 Umballa. He died on the 23rd October 1857.

Major General John Moore Gurnell Tongue was born on the 23rd June 1839 and joined the 24th Regiment without purchase on the 24th February 1857, aged 17 years 8 months. He embarked for India on the 6th May 1857 after less than 3 months, where he was to serve for the next four years. During this period he was promoted to Lieutenant on the 16th April 1858 and was involved in the pursuit of rebels under Tantiu Tope. He returned to England on the 27th July 1861 and spent the next five years at the Home Depot. He was appointed Instructor of Musketry 1st Class on the 15th February 1862 and was promoted to Captain in his regiment on the 29th August 1866. A month later he embarked for Malta for a short stay of approx 3 months returning to England again on the 27th Jan 1867. A period of 3 years as a Musketry Instructor on the staff at Fleetwood followed from 1st April 1867 until 31 March 1870.

He was then appointed to Captain musketry instructor at the Small Arms School at Hythe followed from the 1st Jan 1871 until the 29th September 1871. On the 30th Sept 1871 a posting to Gibraltar was ordered and he remained there until 31st March 1872. During this period he held the appointment of D.A.A.G. Musketry Gibraltar from 18th October 1871 to 27 Feb 1877.

At this time the Battalion was sent in the Kaffir War of 1878 where he saw active service on the Intaba Ka Ndoda, and was mentioned in Lord Chelmsfords despatch of Friday May 17th 1878. Early in 1879 with Colonel Glyn he was with the ill fated column which advanced into Zululand by the Rorkes's Rift station. Early on the 22nd Jan he was with the force which led by Lord Chelmsford, advanced further into Zululand, and later that same day returned to the camp at Isandhiwana to find it overrun. His promotion to Major was from that day due to the automatic procedure following on the deaths of his fellow officers. It was Major Tongue that recognised the body of Captain Younghusband on the battlefield.

Major Tongue was transferred to the 2nd Battalion and was with the reformed force which was part of General Newdigate's Division during the second invasion of Zululand. He was one of a relatively small number of the regiment to be present at the Battle of Ulundi in June 1879. In the following year as Bt Lt.Colonel Tongue he commanded the colour party which was received by Queen Victoria in July on the visit to Osborne where the Queen received the colours which had been rescued from the battlefield at Isandhlwana by Lieutenants Melville and Coghill at the cost of their lives. During this ceremony the Queen decorated the colour with a wreath of immortelles.

He was promoted to Lt Col in the South Wales Borderers on 1st July 1881 and placed on Half Pay on 31st Jan 1885. Then followed almost 5 years as Commandant of the School of Musketry at Hythe. Colonel (Army) 29 Nov 1885: Substantive Colonel 19 Sept 1890; Colonel on Staff (Barbados) 19.9.1890, with local rank of Major General. He died in Barbados.

Private Henry Lodge enlisted into the 80th Regiment at Bishop's Stortford on the 23rd March 1872, aged 20 and 10 months. He was killed in action at Intombi River on the 12th March 1879.

He was one of 30 casualties of the action, who's name is commemorated at Lichfield Cathedral.

Lieutenant Colonel Seaward Longhurst was Regimental Veterinary Officer, Royal Horse Artillery and Royal Field Artillery from the 14th June 1873 until gazetted into the 1st King's Dragoon Guards at Manchester 1877. He served at Aldershot and then in the Zulu War when the regiment served two years in South Africa, during which period he purchased "remount" horses throughout the Transvaal for Cavalry. He also served with the regiment in India for six years, when he judged at the large periodical Horse Fairs.

He received the Gold Medal for the best practical essay on "South African Horses", awarded by Colonel P.Reddy V.C. Indian Staff Corps.

He was appointed Staff Veterinary Officer at Shorncliffe, 1886, including veterinary charge of Dover, held appointment 1887-1890. He was posted to the 10th Hussars at York, 1890, also served with Regiment at the Curragh, Dublin, and Cahir.

Appointed Professor of the Army Veterinary School, and Director of the Army and Navy Vaccine Institute, Aldershot, 1893-1898, when he officiated as Principal Veterinary Officer there.

Employed on "Remount Duty" in England, Scotland and Wales during the South African War when he passed about 12,000 horses for Cavalry and R.H.A. He was appointed Principal Veterinary Officer in Ireland for two years 1900-02. He was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel for special services rendered during the last South African War.

On the 1st March 1911 appointed Inspector of the Board of Agriculture for the purposes of the Diseases of Animals Act 1910 and Order thereunder: appointment ceased on "mobilisation"; then employed on Remount Duty in Aldershot Town and District North of it. Inspected at Hull for exportation, about 14,000 horses per annum, for 4 years.

Appointed as Assistant Director Veterinary Services 4th September, 1914. Responsible for the inspection, at Liverpool, of over 93,000 horses and mules from N.America, and Argentina. Served in Liverpool 3rd February 1915 to 30th April 1916.

He was discharged at his own request on the 20th September 1887, having served 18 years and 59 days.

Chief Constable Edward Williams was a native of Bethesda, he joined the Police in 1895. He spent two years serving with the Metropolitan Police from 1896-98. During this time he was awarded the Royal Humane Society's testimonial for saving a girl from drowning in the River Thames. He rejoined the Caernarvonshire Constbulary and became a Sergeant in 1905 and a Superintendent in 1912. He served as Chief Constable between 1923 and 1939. He introduced a photographic department in 1937 which aided fingerprints, where previously they were sent to Scotland Yard or had outside photographers brought in. He retired from the force in July 1939.

The lot comes with a copy of The History of the Caernarvonshire Constabulary 1856-1950 by J.Owain Jones, where he is mentioned several times and includes a photograph in the book of him in ceremonial uniform wearing medals.

He was Promoted to Paymaster with Seniority from 11.11.1851. Appointed to Clerk to HMS Styx as of 17th October 1851, entitled to South Africa 1853 as a Passes Clerk aboard Styx. Appointed to HMS Arab on 20th August 1853.

Henry Roofe was born in Colchester, Essex. He served aboard HMS Agamemnon was a Landsman from the 21st September 1807 until 29th January 1807 and was ship's paybook number SB266. and is noted as DSQ on the 29th January 1907 to the Argonaut Hospital Ship at Chatham. He also serves on HMS Elizabeth from the 13th February 1807 until 7th August 1809. He also served as an Ordinary Seaman on Leander.



NAVAL GENERAL SERVICE MEDAL 1793-1840,

three bars, 4 Novr 1805, Basque Roads 1809, Gaieta 24 July 1815 (S.Wriford, Midshipman.). Toned, extremely fine. (1)

Commander Samuel Wriford entered the Navy on the 1st March 1797 as a First Class Volunteer on board the Royal Sovereign, where he continued to serve as Midshipman and Master's Mate until April 1802. He was for close to the next six years employed under the late Sir.J.J.Strachan on the Mediterranean Home and Halifax stations, in the Donegal, Renown, Caesar, Triumph and Caesar again. In the Donegal he assisted on the 25th November 1804 at the capture, near Cadiz of the Spanish frigate Amfitrite; and on removing from the Renown to the Caesar he fought on the 4th November 1805 in the action which rendered prize to the British the four French shipsof-the-line that had escaped from the battle of Trafalgar under the Rear-Admiral Dumanoir Le Pelley. On the 22nd November (the date of his first commission) he was appointed Flag-Lieutenant to Sir R.J.Strachan. In that capacity he continued to officiate until October 1808; in the course of which month he became Senior of the Caesar, then bearing the flag of Hon. Robert Stopford; under whom (previously to witnessing the attack made by Lord Cochrane upon the French shipping in Basque Roads) we find him present on 24th Feb 1809, at the destruction, beneath the powerful batteries of Sable d'Olonne, of the 40 gun frigates Italienne, Calypso and Cybele. He subsequently accompanied the expedition to the Walcheren, and was for some time stationed on the coast of Portugal under the command of Captain W.Granger. From the 17th June 1811-26th July 1812 and from 23 Nov 1812 until 22 Aug 1814, and from 7 Feb 1815 until a few weeks after his promotion to the rank of Commander, which took place 10 Oct following, he was employed in succession, on the Home and Mediterranean stations, as First-Lieutenant, in the Pompee, Pembroke

and Malta. He beheld, in the Pembroke, the destruction of a convoy under the guns of Porto Maurizio and the fall of Genoa; and he cooperated, in the Malta, in the reduction of Gaeta. His last appointments were: 5th September 1843 and 22 May 1845 to the San Josef and Caledonia, both at Devonport, where he remained until December 1846.

Commander Wriford married in June 1822 to Mary, second daughter of the late Mr.P.Goodman Glubb of Liskeard, Cornwall.

On another occasion, after driving down one hostile aeroplane, he fired at another, which dived and collided with a third. This last one fell vertically."

In recognition of gallantry in escaping from captivity whilst a Prisoner of War.

Captain Alan John Bott was born at Stoke-on-Trent on the 14th January 1893, prior to WW1 he worked as journalist and just after the outbreak of the war, served as "special correspondent" of the Daily Chronicle, based in Basle, Switzerland. He reported on the British air raid on the Zeppelin factory at Friedrichshafen on 21 November 1914, and travelled to the Swiss town of Romanshorn, on the opposite side of Lake Constance, to observe the German response, on one occasion going out into the middle of the lake on a boat to gain a closer look.

He returned to England in early 1915, and after training in the Inns of Court Officers' Training Corps he was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant (on probation) in the Royal Garrison Artillery on 22 July 1915. He was transferred to the Royal Flying Corps with the rank of Lieutenant on 1 September 1916, being appointed a Flying Officer (Observer) on 26 September.

He was posted to No. 70 Squadron RFC, flying as observer/gunner in a Sopwith 11/2 Strutter with pilot Second Lieutenant Awdry Vaucour. On 24 August 1916 Bott and Vaucour were shot up and forced to land by Leopold Reimann of Jasta 1, but went on to claim three Fokker E fighter aircraft in September. On one flight, he put out an in-flight fire with his gloves, he was awarded his first Military Cross partly for this

Bott then trained as a pilot, being appointed a Flying)fficer on 1 June 1917. Posted to No. 111 Squadron RFC stationed in the Sinai Desert, he was appointed a Flight Commander with the acting rank of Captain on 22 December. Flying the Nieuport 23 bis No. B3995 he destroved two enemy reconnaissance aircraft on 14 and 15 April 1918, but on 22 April he was shot down and taken prisoner by the Turks. Taken to Constantinople by train, Bott, accompanied by Captain Thomas W. White of the Australian Flying Corps, who had been captured in November 1915, escaped and travelled by ship to Odessa, Ukraine, then to Varna, Bulgaria, and overland to Salonika, Greece, arriving there just as the armistice was declared. He was later awarded a Bar to his Military Cross "In recognition of gallantry in escaping from captivity". Bott left the RAF after the war, being transferred to the unemployed list on 18 February 1919.

Bott had written his first book An Airman's Outings, an account of the life of a British flying officer, while still serving in No. 70 Squadron in 1916. It had been published in 1917 under the pseudonym "Contact", and republished in the USA as The Flying Ace and Cavalry of the Clouds. He followed it up with Eastern Nights and Flights, published in 1920, an account of his capture, imprisonment and subsequent escape. Between 1920 and 1926 he returned to journalism, as a special correspondent and as a drama critic for various newspapers.

Bott also retained his interest in flying, being granted a commission as a class "A" flying officer (on probation) in the Reserve of Air Force Officers on 22 May 1923. He was transferred to class "C" on 7 October 1924, and relinquished his commission on completion of service on 22 May 1926. On 3 June 1928 he received Royal Aero Club Aviator's Certificate No. 8309 on the DH.60 Moth at the Hampshire

Bott served as the editor of The Graphic, a weekly illustrated newspaper, from 1926 until 1932, while gradually moving into publishing, being a founder member of The Book Society in 1929, The Reprint Society in 1939, Pan Books in 1944, Avalon Press in 1945, and The Folio Society, with Charles Ede, in 1947.

He died in hospital in Westminster, London, on 17 September 1952.

His Medal Index Card confirms his award of the pair only and issued by the Air Ministry in 1923. He lived at 79 Covingham Road, Hampstead, London, at the time.

A collection of seven hardbound handwritten logs/letter books which represent a comprehensive record of correspondence sent and received by him during his time in the Royal Navy. The major details transcripted in the footnote below. The medal remains in extremely fine condition the outer band having moved over time from the centre, the silver-gilt trophy has the majority of the original gilding still remaining, the logs have been preserved remarkably well and virtually all writing remains readble. The seven logs/letter books comprise seven hardbound volumes of hand written duplicate correspondence that was sent or received by Graves during his time in the Royal Navy, certain parts are fairly standard as one would expect of his position and level of responsibility. However certain aspects are incredibly detailed, the cataloguer has extracted information relating to his service in North America as well as his experiences before and after the action on the 1st June 1794.

LOG 1:

Dating from March 1780 to August 1782, he is serving as Admiral of the Blue, correspondence includes Line of Battle to The Hon Wm. Cornwallis Captain of H.M. ship Canada, dated 24th July 1782.

LOG 2:

Correspondence dating from 21st March 1780 where he is aboard H.M.S. London, at Spithead, Causand Bay, Thanckes near Plymouth, by June 1781 he is off Sandy Hook and Staten Island. On the 4th July 1781 he receives a letter from Vice Admiral Arbuthnot relinquishing the command of His Majesy's Squadron in North America into his hands, furthermore a P.S. states "a Cartel is just arrived from the Havanah in 15 days with the first part of the Garrison of Pensacola; the enclosed paper is all the news come to my hands".

13th July 1781 "Sir. Comdr Affleck has acquainted me this moment of a considerable force of French and Rebel ships in the Sound as high as Huntingdon yesterday morning and that much firing had been heard since then. You will therefore the first moment that wind and tides will admit proceed up the harbour into the East River - taking the Savage Sloop along with you and follow the directions of Commodore Affleck for opposing the Endeavour of the Enemy.- so soon as ship service is over you will use your best endeavour to rejoin me here.

Correspondence on the 19th July 1781 makes comment of a letter from Captain Deans "The assembling of an Army upon the White Plains; the attempt of the Enemy upon Lloyds Neck in the Sound, and the operations in the Chesasapeak, will come more correct and with greater propriety from Head Quarters.-

The Squadron has been kept constantly before the Hook to second any Army operations which the General had to suggest, it will not be prudent to keep them much longer in so exposed a situation as the time approaches which will make it necessary to attend to the appearance of Squadrons, which the Hurricane season may occasion to defront from the West Indies - I shall put them into safety the moment the Army detachment have done moving upon the Coast-"

Letter dated 20th August 1781: London at Sandy Hook:

"Sir My last dispatches acquainted the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty of the arrival of the Hornet Sloop after an eight weeks passage from England. Immediately on the 21st July I proceeded with the squadron into Boston Bay, to be in the way of intercepting the supplies from France to North America.

The intense fogs which prevailed without intermission as we approached to Saint Georges Bank, deprived us of all possibility of seeing, and soon convinced me how much the squadron would be exposed to accidents, and that the fog guns necessary to keep the ships from separating, would give notice of our situation. I therefore after having made cape Ann, determined to withdraw, and we returned to Sandy Hook the 18th August. We retook a brig being one of the convoy from England bound to Halifax, and burnt three small vessels of little consequence.

The Royal Oak from Halifax joined the squadron, parted again in the fog and has since returned to this place. She had taken soon after leaving Halifax, the Aurora Boston privateer carrying eighteen guns and

The cruizers before the Delawar have been more successful, by taking the Bellisarius and Turnbull the former of 20 guns, 150 the latter of 32 guns and 190 men, and two small vessels of a convoy which were in motion for the West Indies, and had been forced to push back into the Delawar by the vigilance of the Medea and the Amphitrite.- The York privateers have been successful in taking more of the convoy.-The Swift brigantine Captain Richard Graves of 14 guns and 60 men on board, coming with dispatches from the Cheasapeak proved so leaky that in order to bail at the Hatchways, they had taken their lumber and stores upon deck; in so distrustful a situation they found themselves attacked by the Holker privateer carrying 10 guns and full of men. It was impossible to stand a cannonade; they therefore with great spirit boarded the enemy twice, but the privateer having greatly the advantage in sailing disentangled and made away leaving their enemy to pump and bail or drown, fortunately she arrived and was hauled on shore. She had two men killed and two wounded.-The Swallow sloop Captain Wills with dispatches from Sir George Rodney, being sent after the squadron into Boston bay on her return with a privateer brig of 14 guns her prize in company, and was attacked the 16 instant by four rebel privateers and pushed on shore upon Long Island, 11 leagues to the Eastward of this. Captain Wills burnt his prize, but could not get all his people on shore in time to burn the Swallow. The privateers pillaged her. If she is not bulged we shall endeavour to get her off otherwise we shall set the wreck on fire. The dispatches were destroyed which has prevented my inclosing the plan of Old Point Comfort.- etc.



The remaining correspondence comes from North River, Sandy Hook, Antiqua, Jamaica and eventually Plymouth in October 1782.

LOG 3: This covers correspondence dating from June 1786 until March 1788. This comprises of letters sent to him covering all areas of naval administration, and copies of correspondence sent by him.

LOG 4: This particular log has a section at the front as an Index with sections covering: Admiralty Leave, Appointments, Courts Martial, Deserters. This dates from June 1786 until June 1789. He serves aboard H.M.S.Powerful in Bamoze, then on to H.M.S. Hero and Impregnable. The correspondence is of standard naval administration and day to day workings.

LOGS 5 and 6: These cover correspondence from June 1790 until February 1794, he serves aboard Cambridge and Impregnable throughout much of this time.

LOG 7: This covers correspondence from June 1790. By late 1793 he is serving aboard H.M.S. Royal Sovereign at Spithead, and correspondence on the 20th April 1794 from Admiral Earl Howe has ordered him to proceed to St. Helens on Tuesday next with the Van Squadron of the Fleet.

His letter dated 20th April 1794 states that:

"The Admiral Earl Howe having directed me to proceed to St. Helens with the Van Squadron of the Fleet, on Tuesday next. You are to hold your ship in readiness to Unmoor and proceed, when the signal is made, for that purpose, on board the Royal Sovereign".

This letter sent to the Captains of Caesar, Bellerophon, Marlborough, Audacious, Impregnable, Culloden, Russell, Sovereign, Defence, Tremendous, and Niger.

On the First June 1794 he wrote to 1st Lieut Mackellar of the Royal Sovereign as follows:

"You are hereby required and directed to go on board the French Man of War captured by the Royal Sovereign, with a Master's Mate, a Midshipman and Fifty Seaman, a Sergeant, Corporal and 16 Marines which with 40 Seamen, you will receive from the Niger and six Seamen from the Charon Hospital ship, you will use the utmost expedition in getting her refitted and when the Fleet makes sail, the Niger has orders to take the Prize in Tow. You will keep one Hundred and Fifty French Prisoners on board, taking care to throw over board, all the small arms, Swords, Pistols, Poleaxes, Pikes and Bayonets, except such as are necessary for your own Defence, and otherwise secure the Prisoners. Given under my Mark, being disabled in my Right Hand, this 1st June 1794 on board H.M. Ship Royal Sovereign at Sea T.G.".

On the Second June 1794 he wrote to the Commanding Officer aboard H.M.Ship Montagu as follows:

"It is the Commander in Chief's Direction that you do as soon as possible send a Lieutenant, a Master's Mate, a Midshipman, and Fifty Seamen onboard the America Captured French Ship of War and take out of her; and receive onboard the Montagu 200 Prisoners, and having so done, you are to take the Prize in Tow, and be ready to proceed with the Fleet".

The next letter whilst not dated was sent to the Captains of the Sovereign, Impregnable, Marlborough, Orion, Tremendous, Montagu, Gibraltar, Alfred and Culloden.

"In pursuance of directions from the Admiral Earl Howe, Commander in Chief etc. You are hereby required and directed to use the utmost exertions in getting the Damages repaired which His Majesty's ship under your Command may have sustained in the late action; and also to get her refitted and otherwise put into a condition for service with all possible dispatch. And I desire to recommend it to you, that whenever


there shall happen any other stop or Delay to her Equipment, that the cause thereof be traced to its source by yourself; and upon its not being forthwith removed, then to acquaint me with the circumstances, that such further application may be made as shall be deemed necessary. You are to report to me when she shall be ready again for service".

His next and final two letters in this log were to Captain Henry Nicholls of the Royal Sovereign, informing him of his leave from Duty for the recovery of his wounds and requiring the use of the Surgeon Mr Alexander Young to attend to him. The final letter orders him to return to Spithead as guickly as possible and to receive further orders from Admiral Earl Howe.

Thomas Graves, 1st Baron Graves KB (23 October 1725 – 9 February 1802) was a British Admiral and colonial official. He was the second son of Rear-Admiral Thomas Graves of Thanckes in Cornwall.

In the first year of the Seven Years' War, Graves failed to confront a French ship which gave challenge. He was tried by court-martial for not engaging his ship, and reprimanded. Graves became Commodore-Governor of Newfoundland in 1761 and given the duty of convoying the seasonal fishing fleet from England to the island. In 1762 he learned that French ships had captured St. John's, Newfoundland. Graves, Admiral Alexander Colville and Colonel William Amherst retook the port city.

With the end of the Seven Years' War, Labrador came under his responsibility as French fishing fleets returned to the French Shore and St. Pierre and Miguelon. Graves strictly enforced the treaties to the extent that the French government protested. Graves' governorship ended in 1764. He returned to active service during the American War of Independence and became commander-in-chief of the North American Squadron in 1781 when Mariot Arbuthnot returned home.

During the American War of Independence, his fleet was defeated by the Comte de Grasse in the Battle of the Chesapeake at the mouth of Chesapeake Bay on 5 September 1781 leading to the surrender of Lord Cornwallis at Yorktown. In September 1782, a fleet under his command was caught in a violent storm off the banks of Newfoundland. The captured French ships, Ville de Paris (110 guns) and HMS Glorieux (74 guns) and the British ships HMS Ramillies (74 guns) and HMS Centaur (74 guns) foundered, along with other merchant ships, with the loss of 3,500 lives. In 1786 he became Commander-in-Chief, Plymouth.

With the French Revolutionary Wars, Graves was second in command to Admiral Richard Howe at the British victory over the French at the Battle of the Glorious First of June 1794. Graves became a full Admiral and was awarded an Irish peerage as Baron Graves, of Gravesend in the County of Londonderry. He died in February 1802, aged 76, and was succeeded in the Barony by his son Thomas.

A total of seven Naval Large Gold Medals were awarded for the First of June 1794 to Graves and the following Officers:

Admiral R.E.Howe, Queen Charlotte Vice Admiral Sir A.Hood K.B., Royal George Rear Admiral G.Bowyer, Barfleur Rear Admiral A.Gardner, Queen Rear Admiral T.Paisley, Bellerophon Captain of the Fleet Sir R. Curtis Kt, Queen Charlotte

A further fifteen Naval Small Gold Medals were also awarded for the same action.

The Glorious First of June (also known in France as the Bataille du 13 prairial an 2 or Combat de Prairial) of 1794 was the first and largest fleet action of the naval conflict between Great Britain and the First French Republic during the French Revolutionary Wars.

The action was the culmination of a campaign that had criss-crossed the Bay of Biscay over the previous month in which both sides had captured numerous merchant ships and minor warships and had engaged in two partial, but inconclusive, fleet actions. The British Channel Fleet under Admiral Lord Howe attempted to prevent the passage of a vital French grain convoy from the United States, which was protected by the French Atlantic Fleet, commanded by Rear-Admiral Villaret-Joyeuse. The two forces clashed in the Atlantic Ocean, some 400 nautical miles (700 km) west of the French island of Ushant on 1 June 1794.

During the battle, Howe defied naval convention by ordering his fleet to turn towards the French and for each of his vessels to rake and engage their immediate opponent. This unexpected order was not understood by all of his captains, and as a result his attack was more piecemeal than he intended. Nevertheless, his ships inflicted a severe tactical defeat on the French fleet. In the aftermath of the battle both fleets were left shattered; in no condition for further combat, Howe and Villaret returned to their home ports. Despite losing seven of his ships of the line, Villaret had bought enough time for the French grain convoy to reach safety unimpeded by Howe's fleet, securing a strategic success. However, he was also forced to withdraw his battle fleet back to port, leaving the British free to conduct a campaign of blockade for the remainder of the war. In the immediate aftermath both sides claimed victory and the outcome of the battle was seized upon by the press of both nations as a demonstration of the prowess and bravery of their respective Navies.

The Glorious First of June demonstrated a number of the major problems inherent in the French and British navies at the start of the Revolutionary Wars. Both Admirals were faced with disobedience from their Captains, along with ill-discipline and poor training among their shorthanded crews, and they failed to control their fleets effectively during the height of the combat.

Dame Anne Marion Warburton was educated at Barnard College, Columbia University, and Somerville College, Oxford. She worked at the London office of the Economic Cooperation Administration 1949-52, at the NATO Secretariat, then located in Paris, 1952-54, and for Lazard Brothers in London, 1955-57.

In 1958 she entered the Diplomatic Service in Branch A (the senior branch) and after two years at the Foreign Office was posted to the UK Mission to the United Nations at New York 1959-62; during this time she was promoted to First Secretary. She served at the British embassy at Bonn 1962-65, then in the newly created Diplomatic Service Administration Office in London 1965-67. She then moved back to the Foreign Office – which became the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) in 1968 - until 1970 when she was posted as Counsellor to the UK's Geneva Mission to the United Nations. After a further period at the FCO as head of the Guidance and Information Policy department, 1975-76, she was appointed British Ambassador to Denmark in April 1976 and remained there until 1983.

Warburton was the first female British ambassador. Although Barbara Salt had been appointed ambassador-designate to Israel in 1962, she was unable to proceed to Tel Aviv due to serious illness, so did not take up the post.

After leaving Denmark, Warburton was ambassador and UK permanent representative to the United Nations and other international organisations in Geneva, 1983-85. She was deputy leader of the UK delegation to the third UN World Conference on Women at Nairobi in July 1985, which closed the United Nations Decade for Women. She retired from the Diplomatic Service and was president of Lucy Cavendish College, Cambridge, 1985-94, Concurrently she was a member of the Equal Opportunities Commission 1986-88, of the Committee on Standards in Public Life 1994-97, and of the Council of the University of East Anglia.

Warburton led a European Community investigative mission into the treatment of Muslim women in the former Yugoslavia, which reported in January 1993.

She died on the 4th June 2015.

Colonel William Thomas Budgen was born on the 11th June 1839, believed to be on the Bahama Islands. He was the son of Major-General Budgen Royal Engineers and Mrs Budgen (nee F.C.Maule). He joined the Royal Artillery in 1856, and served in the Burma Campaign of 1885-87, commanding the Royal Artillery through most of it and was created a Companion of the Distinguished Service Order in November 1887. He commanded the Royal Artillery, Karachi, Sind, India, 1887-89; Brigadier-General commanding Bombay District, India 1889-1894. He died on the 28th February 1894 at Mentone, France on his way home from India of pneumonia, after influenza.

The lot includes: Letter for Gentleman Cadet dated 3rd August 1853; Warrant for Second Lieutenant dated 18.7.1856; Warrant for Second Captain dated 6th July1867; Warrant for Adjutant dated 13th June 1870; Warrant for Major dated 20th August 1875. Warrant for the D.S.O., and other correspondence including an extract from the Bombay Gazette dated 25th January 1894, as follows:

"From to-morrow General T.Budgen D.S.O., who has been in command of the Bombay District during the last five years, and rendered distinguished service to the State while in charge of the office, retires on a well-earned pension. He entered the Army as a subaltern in the Royal Artillery on the 21st June 1856, and has had a varied experience of foreign service, including Halifax (Nova Scotia), Ceylon, Hong Kong, Burma, as well as in all the three Presidencies of India, making up a period of thirty-eight years' service. He was in Halifax in 1862-63; in Madras in 1866-67; in the Straits, Ceylon, and Hong Kong in 1868-77; in the North-West and Central Provinces in 1878-83: and in India and Burma from 1885 till now. On the 26th January 1889, he was selected to the command of the Bombay District by his Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught when



Commander-in-Chief of the Bombay Army; and it may be said without exaggeration that General Budgen has done full credit to his Royal Highness's choice by the capable way in which he has discharged the duties of his responsible office. Previous to this, he was in command of the siege train during the Irrawady Expedition, resulting in the taking of Mandalay. General Budgen continued to serve in Upper Burma in command of the Royal Artillery as acting Colonel-on-the-Staff, Royal Artillery, from November 1885 to March 1887. For his services in this campaign he was twice mentioned in the despatches and was raised to the Distinguished Service Order in addition to receiving the war medal and two clasps (sic). After the Burmese Expedition, General Budgen was appointed to the command of the Dalhousie Depot from March to October, 1887, and commanded the Royal Artillery in the Sind District from October, 1887, to January 1889, when he was selected for the Bombay Brigade. The whole of the harbour defences of Bombay were practically commenced and completed during his command. He had to press forward for their completion, and it is owing to his persistent efforts that they have been brought up to their present state of efficiency in all details. It was also owing to General Budgen's persistent advocacy of the scheme of building the new barracks at Colaba that the money was allotted by Government for their construction. General Budgen was always in sympathy with and in every way encouraged the volunteer movement in this city, and during his tenure of command great strides have been made towards bringing the corps into an efficient state. He pressed for the formation of the Bombay Volunteer Artillery, and obtained the sanction of Government to heavy guns being placed at the disposal of the Officer Commanding, one at the Town Hall and the other at the Byculla headquarters, for the instruction of the men of the corps, in which he has always taken as warm an interest as in the Volunteer Corps. General Budgen is held in universal esteem both by the officers and men under his command. He has always had at heart the interest of the latter, and did everything in his power for their comfort. During the recent riots, General Budgen commanded at the Pydhownee head-quarters, and his services during that time of trouble have earned the recognition of Government. In the social life of the city, General and Mrs Budgen have been conspicuous for their courtesy and geniality, and their hospitality during the last five years will be missed by all ranks of the community. General Budgen makes over charge of his office to-morrow to Colonel Scott, of the 5th Native Infantry, until the arrival, on the 29th inst., of General Gatacre, who has been appointed to the command of the Bombay District. Last night General Budgen was entertained by the officers of the North Lancashire Regiment at Colaba. This evening

he will be entertained by the Volunteer Rifles at the Espanade Hotel; and to-morrow night he will be entertained at dinner by the District Staff at the Royal Yacht Club. These social fuctions, it need hardly be remarked, bear silent testimony to the worth of the departing General, and the great esteem in which he has been held amongst us.

Second Lieutenant 23.12.1898; Lieutenant 16.2.1901; Captain 5.7.1904; Adjutant R.A. 25.4.1907 to 25.5.1911; Major 30.10.1914. Served in South Africa from 1900-1902. In WW1 served in the Dardanelles Sulva Bay Oct-Nov 1915 and on the Suez Canal 15 Dec 1915 until March 1916. Served in France April 1916 until November 1918; Bt Lt.Col 1.1.1919.

James Percy Tufnell Burchell was born in London on the 9th May 1898 and was educated at Wellington College, Berkshire, his qualifications in foreign languages were French and German. He was first Commissioned into the Welsh Guards on the 13th October 1916, and was first of all posted to the Household Battalion where he qualified as a Signals Officer on the 18th May 1917. He attended the London District School of Signalling in January 1917 and in February 1917 attended the Dunstable School of Signalling.

On the 19th May Lieutenant Burchell was posted to France, from the time of his arrival he become employed with the B.E.F. Section where he remained until joining the 1st Signals Battalion Welsh Guards on the 21 March 1918.

Lieutenant Burchell remained with the Battalion until the 13 May 1918 when he was attached to Headquarters 3rd Guards Brigade for duties with the Army Signals Service.

He was awarded the Military Cross of conspicuous gallantry & devotion to duty on the 5th and 6th November 1918, at and around Arnfroipret. As Brigade Signals Officer he maintained communications with the Battalions throughout. The enemy continuously shelled the roads down which his main line of communications ran, and although they were frequently broken by shellfire, he immediately got them re-laid and restored.

On the October 1919 Lieutenant Burchell returned to the United Kingdom and was demobilized on the 11th November 1919. Between the wars he was employed by the Tax Commissioners and become Assistant Clerk to Commissioners for Taxes, Holborn. He also become a Fellow of the Society of the Antiquarian of London.

On the 1st February 1935 he was enrolled as a Member of the Officers Emergency Reserve, 4 years later, on the 18th September 1939 he was granted an Emergency Commission back in the Welsh Guards to be Second Lieutenant and posted to the Training Battalion. A few days later he received the rank of Lieutenant and in December 1939 received the rank of Captain.

He remained with the Training Battalion and was stationed at Sandown Park, Esher throughout the Second World War. He retired as an Acting Major on the 7th July 1945.

Sergeant Barker was in command of a Sub-section patrol consisting of nine Marines and an Iban tracker. In the area of Rawang on 29th February 1952 while searching through a swamp, signs of bandit activity were found. The sub-section followed the bandit trail towards a rubber plantation which was heavily overgrown. As the leading two marines entered the rubber from the swamp, the whole patrol was heavily engaged by fire from bandits in concealed positions on higher ground in the undergrowth of the rubber. The range was about 60 yards, and the majority of the patrol was still in the swamp immersed up to their thighs and unable to see the enemy.

Sergeant Barker with great presence of mind led the rest of his subsection out of the swamp to the left pinning the enemy down by his own fire and by grenades fired by the EY rifleman. He then sited his Bren gun on the left flank and assaulted the enemy position with the sub-section from a position further round on the left flank.

The action was completely successful. Sergeant Barker by his quick thinking, magnificent example and inspiring leadership turned what was a dangerous ambush into a total victory. All five well-armed bandits who had achieved surprise and had the advantage of ground were killed and eight weapons and documents were recovered. Sergeant Barker himself engaged and killed with his own gun the left hand bandit who had been giving the most trouble firing with a carbine. Throughout the action he had complete control of the situation and never for a moment was he at a loss. His encouragement to his men, many of whom were under fire for the first time, and his personal leadership was such that this victory was achieved at the small cost of only two minor injuries to his own men.

A total of eleven M.M.s were awarded to the Royal Marines for Malaya.

£10,000 - 15,000 €13,000 - 19,000 Edward Whymper (27 April 1840 - 16 September 1911) was an English mountaineer, explorer, illustrator, and author best known for the first ascent of the Matterhorn in 1865; four members of his party were killed during the descent. Whymper also made important first ascents on the Mont Blanc massif and in the Pennine Alps, South America, and the Canadian Rockies. His exploration of Greenland contributed an important advance to Arctic exploration. Whymper wrote several books on mountaineering, including Scrambles Amongst the Alps.

Edward Whymper was born in London, England on 27 April 1840 to the artist and wood engraver Josiah Wood Whymper and Elizabeth Claridge. He was the second of eleven children, his older brother being the artist and explorer Frederick Whymper. He was trained to be a wood-engraver at an early age. In 1860, he made extensive forays into the central and western Alps to produce a series of commissioned alpine scenery drawings. Among the objects of this tour was the illustration of an unsuccessful attempt made by Professor Bonney's party to ascend Mont Pelyoux, at that time believed to be the highest peak of the Dauphiné Alps.

In 1861, Whymper successfully completed the ascent of Mont Pelvoux, the first of a series of expeditions that threw much light on the topography of an area at that time very imperfectly mapped. From the summit of Mont Pelvoux, Whymper discovered that it was overtopped by a neighbouring peak, subsequently named the Barre des Écrins, which, before the annexation of Savoy added Mont Blanc to the possessions of France, was the highest point in the French Alps. Whymper climbed the Barre des Écrins in 1864 with Horace Walker, A. W. Moore and guides Christian Almer senior and junior.

The years 1861 to 1865 were filled with a number of new expeditions in the Mont Blanc massif and the Pennine Alps, among them the first ascents of the Aiguille d'Argentière and Mont Dolent in 1864, and the Aiguille Verte, the Grand Cornier and Pointe Whymper on the Grandes Jorasses in 1865. That year he also made the first crossing of the Moming Pass. According to his own words, his only failure was on the west ridge of the Dent d'Hérens in 1863. As a result of his Alpine experience he designed a tent that came to be known as the "Whymper tent" and tents based on his design were still being manufactured 100 years later,

Professor John Tyndall and Whymper emulated each other in determined attempts to reach the summit of the Matterhorn by the south-western, or Italian, ridge. In 1865, Whymper, who had failed eight times already, attempted unsuccessfully to climb a couloir on the south-east face with Michel Croz. After Croz left for a prior engagement with Charles Hudson, Whymper was unable to secure the services of Val Tournanche guide Jean Antoine Carrel, and instead planned to try the eastern face with Lord Francis Douglas and the two Zermatt guides, Peter Taugwalder father and son.

Whymper was convinced that the Matterhorn's precipitous appearance when viewed from Zermatt was an optical illusion, and that the dip of the strata, which on the Italian side formed a continuous series of overhangs, should make the opposite side a natural staircase. This party of four was joined by Hudson and Croz, and the inexperienced Douglas Hadow. Their attempt by what is now the normal route, the Hörnli ridge, met with success on 14 July 1865, only days before an Italian party. On the descent, Hadow slipped and fell onto Croz, dislodging him and dragging Douglas and Hudson to their deaths; the rope parted, saving the other three.

A controversy ensued as to whether the rope had actually been cut, but a formal investigation could not find any proof. The account of his attempts on the Matterhorn occupies the greater part of his book, Scrambles amongst the Alps (1871), in which the illustrations are engraved by Whymper himself. The accident haunted Whymper:

"Every night, do you understand, I see my comrades of the Matterhorn slipping on their backs, their arms outstretched, one after the other, in perfect order at equal distances—Croz the guide, first, then Hadow, then Hudson, and lastly Douglas. Yes, I shall always see them ..."

Whymper's 1865 campaign had been planned to test his route-finding skills in preparation for an expedition to Greenland in 1867. The exploration in Greenland resulted in an important collection of fossil plants, which were described by Professor Heer and deposited in the British Museum. Whymper's report was published in the report of the British Association of 1869. Though hampered by a lack of supplies and an epidemic among the local people, he proved that the interior could be explored by the use of suitably constructed sledges, and thus contributed an important advance to Arctic exploration.

Another expedition in 1872 was devoted to a survey of the coastline.

Whymper next organized an expedition to Ecuador, designed primarily to collect data for the study of altitude sickness and the effect of reduced pressure on the human body. His chief guide was Jean-Antoine Carrel, who later died from exhaustion on the Matterhorn after bringing his employers into safety through a snowstorm.

During 1880, Whymper made two ascents of Chimborazo (6,267m), claiming the first ascent; Alexander von Humboldt famously ascended this volcano in 1802. He spent a night on the summit of Cotopaxi and made first ascents of half a dozen other great peaks. In 1892, he published the results of his journey in a volume entitled Travels amongst the Great Andes of the Equator.

His observations on altitude sickness led him to conclude that it was caused by a reduction in atmospheric pressure, which lessens the value of inhaled air, and by expansion of the air or gas within the body, causing pressure upon the internal organs. The effects produced by gas expansion may be temporary and dissipate when equilibrium has been restored between the internal and external pressure. The publication of his work was recognized on the part of the Royal Geographical Society by the award of the Patron's medal.

His experiences in South America having convinced him of certain serious errors in the readings of aneroid barometers at high altitudes, he published a work entitled How to Use the Aneroid Barometer and succeeded in introducing important improvements in their construction. He afterwards published two guide books to Zermatt and Chamonix.

While in Ecuador, Whymper made a collection of amphibians and reptiles that he handed over to George Albert Boulenger at the British Museum. The collection received some praise from Boulenger, who said that "though containing no striking novelties", the collection was "interesting on account of the care bestowed by its collector in recording the exact locality from which every specimen was obtained". Boulenger described four new species from the materials, three of them named after Whymper: snake Coronella Whymperi (now a junior synonym of Saphenophis boursieri) and frogs Prostherapis Whymperi, Phryniscus elegans, and Hylodes Whymperi (now a junior synonym of Pristimantis curtipes).

In the early 1900s, Whymper visited the Canadian Rockies several times and made arrangements with the Canadian Pacific Railway (CPR) to promote the Canadian Rockies and the railway in his talks in Europe and Asia. In exchange, the CPR agreed to pay transportation costs for himself and his four guides. In 1901, Whymper and his four guides (J. Bossoney, C. Kaufmann, C. Klucker, J. Pollinger) made the first ascents of Mount Whymper and Stanley Peak in the Vermilion Pass area of the Canadian Rockies.

Confusingly, his brother Frederick also has a mountain in British Columbia named after him, from his days as artist illustrator with the Robert Brown's Vancouver Island Exploring Expedition in 1864.

When not climbing, Whymper pursued his profession as an engraver of illustrations for books and periodicals. Among the books he illustrated was his fellow-mountaineer Florence Crauford Grove's The Frosty Caucasus (1875) Whymper also illustrated and engraved John Tyndall's "Hours of Exercise in The Alps" (1871). He illustrated books for Isabella L. Bird and was noted as being the designer of the Henrietta Amelia Bird memorial clock tower in Tobermory, Isle of Mull, Scotland. It was built in 1905, funded by Isabella Bird (Mrs. Bishop) in memory of her

On 25 April 1906, Whymper married Edith Mary Lewin (born 1883) at Emmanuel Church in Forest Gate, London. The service was presided over by Canon J. M'Cormick, who had assisted the mountaineer after the Matterhorn accident. The marriage produced one daughter, Ethel. The couple were separated in 1910. Edith remarried in 1913 and died the following year from complications of pregnancy.

Shortly after returning to Chamonix from another climb in the Alps, Whymper became ill, locked himself in his room at the Grand Hotel Couttet, and refused all medical treatment. Whymper died alone on 16 September 1911, at the age of 71. A funeral was held four days later. He is buried in the English cemetery in Chamonix, France.

Such bids are made at your own risk and we cannot accept liability for our failure to receive and/or place any such bids.  $\it Lots$ which are lying under Bond and those liable to $\it VAT$ may not be available for immediate collection.

Examining the wines

It is occasionally possible to provide a pre-Sale tasting for larger parcels (as defined below). This is generally limited to more recent and everyday drinking wines. Please contact the department for details.

It is not our policy to inspect every unopened case. In the case of wines older than 20 years the boxes will usually have been opened and levels and appearance noted in the *Catalogue* where necessary. You should make proper allowance for variations in ullage levels and conditions of corks, capsules and labels.

Corks and Ullages

Ullage refers to the space between the base of the cork and the wine. Ullage levels for Bordeaux shaped bottles are only normally noted when below the neck and for Burgundy, Alsace, German and Cognac shaped bottles when greater than 4 centimetres (cm). Acceptable ullage levels increase with age; generally acceptable levels are as follows:

Under 15 years old – into neck or less than 4cm 15 to 30 years old – top shoulder (ts) or up to 5cm Over 30 years old – high shoulder (hs) or up to 6cm

It should be noted that ullages may change between publication of the *Catalogue* and the *Sale* and that corks may fail as a result of transporting the wine. We will only accept responsibility for *Descriptions* of condition at the time of publication of the *Catalogue* and cannot accept responsibility for any loss resulting from failure of corks either before or after this point.

Options to buy parcels

A parcel is a number of *Lots* of identical size of the same wine, bottle size and *Description*. The *Buyer* of any of these *Lots* has the option to accept some or all of the remaining *Lots* in the parcel at the same price, although such options will be at the *Auctioneer's* sole discretion.  - 3 in any circumstances where the Seller is liable to you in respect of the Lot, or any act, omission, statement, or representation in respect of it, or this agreement or its performance, and whether in damages, for an indemnity or contribution or for a restitutionary remedy or in any way whatsoever, the Seller's liability will be limited to payment of a sum which will not exceed by way of maximum the amount of the Purchase Price of the Lot irrespective in any case of the nature, volume or source of any loss or damage alleged to be suffered or sum claimed as due, and irrespective of whether the liability arises from any negligence, other tort, breach of contract, statutory duty, bailee's duty, restitutionary claim or otherwise.

Any such waiver will not affect the Seller's ability subsequently to enforce any right arising under the Contract for Sale.
- 10.3 If either party to the Contract for Sale is prevented from performing that party's respective obligations under the Contract for Sale by circumstances beyond its reasonable control or if performance of its obligations would by reason of such circumstances give rise to a significantly increased financial cost to it, that party will not, for so long as such circumstances prevail, be required to perform such obligations. This paragraph does not apply to the obligations imposed on you by paragraph 6.
- 10.4 Any notice or other communication to be given under the Contract for Sale must be in writing and may be delivered by hand or sent by first class post or air mail or fax transmission, if to the Seller, addressed c/o Bonhams at its address or fax number in the Catalogue (marked for the attention of the Company Secretary), and if to you to the address or fax number of the Buyer given in the Bidding Form (unless notice of any change of address is given in writing). It is the responsibility of the sender of the notice or communication to ensure that it is received in a legible form within any applicable time period.

- 10.11 Save as expressly provided in paragraph 10.12 nothing in the Contract for Sale confers (or purports to confer) on any person who is not a party to the Contract for Sale any benefit conferred by, or the right to enforce any term of, the Contract for Sale.

10.12 Where the Contract for Sale confers an immunity from, and/or an exclusion or restriction of, the responsibility and/or liability of the Seller, it will also operate in favour and for the benefit of Bonhams, Bonhams' holding company and the subsidiaries of such holding company and the successors and assigns of Bonhams and of such companies and of any officer, employee and agent of Bonhams and such companies, each of whom will be entitled to rely on the relevant immunity and/or exclusion and/or restriction within and for the purposes of Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999, which enables the benefit of a contract to be extended to a person who is not a party to the contract, and generally at law.

11 GOVERNING LAW

All transactions to which the Contract for Sale applies and all connected matters will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of that part of the United Kingdom where the Sale takes place and the Seller and you each submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of that part of the United Kingdom, save that the Seller may bring proceedings against you in any other court of competent jurisdiction to the extent permitted by the laws of the relevant jurisdiction. Bonhams has a complaints procedure in place.

Where words and phrases which are defined in the List of Definitions are used in this agreement, they are printed in italics. Reference is made in this agreement to information printed in the Notice to Bidders, printed in the Catalogue for the Sale, and where such information is referred to it is incorporated into this agreement.
- 1.3 Except as specified in paragraph 4 of the Notice to Bidders the Contract for Sale of the Lot between you and the Seller is made on the fall of the Auctioneer's hammer in respect of the Lot, when it is knocked down to you. At that moment a separate contract is also made between you and Bonhams on the terms in this Buyer's Agreement.
- 1.4 We act as agents for the Seller and are not answerable or personally responsible to you for any breach of contract or other default by the Seller, unless Bonhams sells the Lot as principal.
- 1.5 Our personal obligations to you are governed by this agreement and we agree, subject to the terms below, to the following obligations:

- 1.6 We do not make or give and do not agree to make or give any contractual promise, undertaking, obligation, Guarantee, warranty, representation of fact in relation to any Description of the Lot or any Estimate in relation to it, nor of the accuracy or completeness of any Description or Estimate which may have been made by us or on our behalf or by or on behalf of the Seller (whether made orally or in writing, including in the Catalogue or on Bonhams' Website, or by conduct, or otherwise), and whether made before or after this agreement or prior to or during the Sale. No such Description or Estimate is incorporated into this agreement between you and us. Any such Description or Estimate, if made by us or on our behalf, was (unless Bonhams itself sells the Lot as principal) made as agent on behalf of the

2 PERFORMANCE OF THE CONTRACT FOR SALE

You undertake to us personally that you will observe and comply with all your obligations and undertakings to the Seller under the Contract for Sale in respect of the Lot.

3 PAYMENT

- 3.1 Unless agreed in writing between you and us or as otherwise set out in the Notice to Bidders, you must pay to us by not later than 4.30pm on the second working day following the Sale:

- 3.1.2 a *Buyer's Premium* in accordance with the rates set out in the *Notice to Bidders* on each lot, and

3.7 Where a number of Lots have been knocked down to you, any monies we receive from you will be applied firstly pro-rata to pay the Purchase Price of each Lot and secondly pro-rata to pay all amounts due to Bonhams.

4 COLLECTION OF THE LOT

- 4.1 Subject to any power of the Seller or us to refuse to release the Lot to you, once you have paid to us, in cleared funds, everything due to the Seller and to us, we will release the Lot to you or as you may direct us in writing. The Lot will only be released on production of a buyer collection document, obtained from our cashier's office.
- 4.2 You must collect and remove the Lot at your own expense by the date and time specified in the Notice to Bidders, or if no date is specified, by 4.30pm on the seventh day after the Sale.
- 4.3 For the period referred to in paragraph 4.2, the Lot can be collected from the address referred to in the Notice to Bidders for collection on the days and times specified in the Notice to Bidders. Thereafter, the Lot may be removed elsewhere for storage and you must enquire from us as to when and where you can collect it, although this information will usually be set out in the Notice to Bidders.
- 4.4 If you have not collected the Lot by the date specified in the Notice to Bidders, you authorise us, acting as your agent and on your behalf, to enter into a contract (the "5torage Contract") with the Storage Contractor for the storage of the Lot on the then current standard terms and conditions agreed between Bonhams and the Storage Contractor (copies of which are available on request). If the Lot is stored at our premises storage fees at our current daily rates (currently a minimum of £3 plus VAT per Lot per day) will be payable from the expiry of the period referred to in paragraph 4.2. These storage fees form part of our Expenses.
- 4.5 Until you have paid the Purchase Price and any Expenses in full the Lot will either be held by us as agent on behalf of the Seller or held by the Storage Contractor as agent on behalf of the Seller and ourselves on the terms contained in the Storage Contract.
- 4.6 You undertake to comply with the terms of any Storage Contract and in particular to pay the charges (and all costs of moving the Lot into storage) due under any Storage Contract. You acknowledge and agree that you will not be able to collect the Lot from the Storage Contractor's premises until you have paid the Purchase Price, any Expenses and all charges due under the Storage Contract.
- 4.7 You will be wholly responsible for packing, handling and transport of the Lot on collection and for complying with all import or export regulations in connection with the Lot.
- 4.8 You will be wholly responsible for any removal, storage, or other charges for any Lot not removed in accordance with paragraph 4.2, payable at our current rates, and any Expenses we incur (including any charges due under the Storage Contract), all of which must be paid by you on demand and in any event before any collection of the Lot by you or on your behalf.

5 STORING THE LOT

We agree to store the Lot until the earlier of your removal of the Lot or until the time and date set out in the Notice to Bidders, on the Sale Information Page or at the back of the catalogue (or if no date is specified, by 4.30pm on the seventh day after the Sale) and, subject to paragraphs 6 and 10, to be responsible as bailee to you for damage to or the loss or destruction of the Lot (notwithstanding that it is not your property before payment of the Purchase Price). If you do not collect the Lot before the time and date set out in the Notice to Bidders (or if no date is specified, by 4.30pm on the seventh day after the Sale) we may remove the Lot to another location, the details of which will usually be set out in the relevant section of the Catalogue. If you have not paid for the Lot in accordance with paragraph 3, and the Lot is moved to any third party's premises, the Lot will be held by such third party strictly to Bonhams' order and we will retain our lien over the Lot until we have been paid in full in accordance with

6 RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE LOT

- 6.1 Only on the payment of the *Purchase Price* to us will title in the *Lot* pass to you. However under the *Contract for Sale*, the risk in the *Lot* passed to you when it was knocked down to you.
- 6.2 You are advised to obtain insurance in respect of the Lot as soon as possible after the Sale.

7 FAILURE TO PAY OR TO REMOVE THE LOT AND PART PAYMENTS

- 7.1 If all sums payable to us are not so paid in full at the time they are due and/or the Lot is not removed in accordance with this agreement, we will without further notice to you be entitled to exercise one or more of the following rights (without prejudice to any rights we may exercise on behalf of the Seller):
- 7.1.1 to terminate this agreement immediately for your breach of contract;
- 7.1.2 to retain possession of the Lot;
- 7.1.3 to remove, and/or store the Lot at your expense;
- 7.1.4 to take legal proceedings against you for payment of any sums payable to us by you (including the Purchase Price) and/or damages for breach of contract;
- 7.1.5 to be paid interest on any monies due to us (after as well as before judgement or order) at the annual rate of 5% per annum above the base lending rate of National Westminster Bank Plc from time to time to be calculated on a daily basis from the date upon which such monies become payable until the date of actual payment;
- 7.1.6 to repossess the Lot (or any part thereof) which has not become your property, and for this purpose (unless you buy the Lot as a Consumer) you hereby grant an irrevocable licence to us, by ourselves, our servants or agents, to enter upon all or any of your premises (with or without vehicles) during normal business hours to take possession of any Lot or part thereof;
- 7.1.7 to sell the Lot Without Reserve by auction, private treaty or any other means on giving you three months' written notice of our intention to do so:
- 7.1.8 to retain possession of any of your other property in our possession for any purpose (including, without limitation, other goods sold to you or with us for Sale) until all sums due to us have been paid in full:

- 7.1.9 to apply any monies received from you for any purpose whether at the time of your default or at any time thereafter in payment or part payment of any sums due to us by you under this agreement;
- 7.1.10 on three months' written notice to sell, Without Reserve, any of your other property in our possession or under our control for any purpose (including other goods sold to you or with us for Sale) and to apply any monies due to you as a result of such Sale in payment or part payment of any amounts owed to us:
- 7.1.11 refuse to allow you to register for a future Sale or to reject a bid from you at any future Sale or to require you to pay a deposit before any bid is accepted by us at any future Sale in which case we will be entitled to apply such deposit in payment or part payment, as the case may be, of the Purchase Price of any Lot of which you are the Buyer.
- 7.2 You agree to indemnify us against all legal and other costs, all losses and all other Expenses (whether or not court proceedings will have been issued) incurred by us as a result of our taking steps under this paragraph 7 on a full indemnity basis together with interest thereon (after as well as before judgement or order) at the rate specified in paragraph 7.1.5 from the date upon which we become liable to pay the same until payment by you.
- 7.3 If you pay us only part of the sums due to us such payment shall be applied firstly to the Purchase Price of the Lot (or where you have purchased more than one Lot pro-rata towards the Purchase Price of each Lot) and secondly to the Buyer's Premium (or where you have purchased more than one Lot pro-rata to the Buyer's Premium on each Lot) and thirdly to any other sums due to us.
- 7.4 We will account to you in respect of any balance we hold remaining from any monies received by us in respect of any Sale of the Lot under our rights under this paragraph 7 after the payment of all sums due to us and/or the Seller within 28 days of receipt by us of all such sums paid to us.

8 CLAIMS BY OTHER PERSONS IN RESPECT OF THE LOT

- 8.1 Whenever it becomes apparent to us that the Lot is the subject of a claim by someone other than you and other than the Seller (or that such a claim can reasonably be expected to be made), we may, at our absolute discretion, deal with the Lot in any manner which appears to us to recognise the legitimate interests of ourselves and the other parties involved and lawfully to protect our position and our legitimate interests. Without prejudice to the generality of the discretion and by way of example, we may:
- 8.1.1 retain the *Lot* to investigate any question raised or reasonably expected by us to be raised in relation to the *Lot*; and/or
- 8.1.2 deliver the Lot to a person other than you; and/or
- 8.1.3 commence interpleader proceedings or seek any other order of any court, mediator, arbitrator or government body; and/or
- 8.1.4 require an indemnity and/or security from you in return for pursuing a course of action agreed to by you.
- 8.2 The discretion referred to in paragraph 8.1:

- 8.2.1 may be exercised at any time during which we have actual or constructive possession of the Lot, or at any time after such possession, where the cessation of such possession has occurred by reason of any decision, order or ruling of any court, mediator, arbitrator or government body; and
- 8.2.2 will not be exercised unless we believe that there exists a serious prospect of a good arguable case in favour of the claim.

9 FORGERIES

- 9.1 We undertake a personal responsibility for any Forgery in accordance with the terms of this paragraph 9.
- 9.2 Paragraph 9 applies only if:
- 9.2.1 your name appears as the named person to whom the original invoice was made out by us in respect of the Lot and that invoice has been paid; and
- 9.2.2 you notify us in writing as soon as reasonably practicable after you have become aware that the Lot is or may be a Forgery, and in any event within one year after the Sale, that the Lot is a Forgery; and
- 9.2.3 within one month after such notification has been given, you return the Lot to us in the same condition as it was at the time of the Sale, accompanied by written evidence that the Lot is a Forgery and details of the Sale and Lot number sufficient to identify the
- 9.3 Paragraph 9 will not apply in respect of a Forgery if:
- 9.3.1 the Entry in relation to the Lot contained in the Catalogue reflected the then accepted general opinion of scholars and experts or fairly indicated that there was a conflict of such opinion or reflected the then current opinion of an expert acknowledged to be a leading expert in the relevant field; or
- 9.3.2 it can be established that the Lot is a Forgery only by means of a process not generally accepted for use until after the date on which the Catalogue was published or by means of a process which it was unreasonable in all the circumstances for us to have employed.
- 9.4 You authorise us to carry out such processes and tests on the Lot as we in our absolute discretion consider necessary to satisfy ourselves that the Lot is or is not a Forgery.
- 9.5 If we are satisfied that a Lot is a Forgery we will (as principal) purchase the Lot from you and you will transfer the title to the Lot in question to us, with full title guarantee, free from any liens, charges, encumbrances and adverse claims, in accordance with the provisions of Sections 12(1) and 12(2) of the Sale of Goods Act 1979 and we will pay to you an amount equal to the sum of the Purchase Price, Buyer's Premium, VAT and Expenses paid by you in respect of the Lot.
- 9.6 The benefit of paragraph 9 is personal to, and incapable of assignment by, you.
- If you sell or otherwise dispose of your interest in the Lot, all rights and benefits under this paragraph will cease.
- 9.8 Paragraph 9 does not apply to a Lot made up of or including a Chinese painting or Chinese paintings, a motor vehicle or motor vehicles, a Stamp or Stamps or a Book or Books.

10 OUR LIABILITY

- 10.1 We will not be liable whether in negligence, other tort, breach of contract or statutory duty or in restitution or under the Misrepresentation Act 1967 or in any other way for lack of conformity with or any inaccuracy, error, misdescription or omission in any Description of the Lot or any Entry or Estimate in respect of it, made by us or on our behalf or by or on behalf of the Seller (whether made in writing, including in the Catalogue, or on the Bonhams' Website, or orally, or by conduct or otherwise) and whether made before or after this agreement or prior to or during the Sale.
- 10.2 Our duty to you while the Lot is at your risk and/or your property and in our custody and/or control is to exercise reasonable care in relation to it, but we will not be responsible for damage to the Lot or to other persons or things caused by:
- 10.2.1 handling the Lot if it was affected at the time of Sale to you by woodworm and any damage is caused as a result of it being affected by woodworm; or
- 10.2.2 changes in atmospheric pressure; nor will we be liable for:
- 10.2.3 damage to tension stringed musical instruments; or
- 10.2.4 damage to gilded picture frames, plaster picture frames or picture frame glass; and if the Lot is or becomes dangerous, we may dispose of it without notice to you in advance in any manner we think fit and we will be under no liability to you for doing so.
- 10.3.1 We will not be liable to you for any loss of Business, Business profits, revenue or income or for loss of Business reputation or for disruption to Business or wasted time on the part of the Buyer's management or staff or, if you are buying the Lot in the course of a Business, for any indirect losses or consequential damages of any kind, irrespective in any case of the nature, volume or source of the loss or damage alleged to be suffered, and irrespective of whether the said loss or damage is caused by or claimed in respect of any negligence, other tort, breach of contract, statutory duty, bailee's duty, a restitutionary claim or otherwise.
- 10.3.2 Unless you buy the Lot as a Consumer, in any circumstances where we are liable to you in respect of a Lot, or any act, omission, statement, representation in respect of it, or this agreement or its performance, and whether in damages, for an indemnity or contribution or for a restitutionary remedy or in any way whatsoever, our liability will be limited to payment of a sum which will not exceed by way of maximum the amount of the Purchase Price of the Lot plus Buver's Premium (less any sum you may be entitled to recover from the Seller) irrespective in any case of the nature, volume or source of any loss or damage alleged to be suffered or sum claimed as due, and irrespective of whether the liability arises from negligence, other tort, breach of contract, statutory duty, bailee's duty, a restitutionary claim or otherwise.

You may wish to protect yourself against loss by obtaining insurance.

Nothing set out above will be construed as excluding or restricting (whether directly or indirectly) any person's liability or excluding or restricting any person's rights or remedies in respect of (i) fraud, or (ii) death or personal injury caused by our negligence (or any person under our control or for whom we are legally responsible), or (iii) acts or omissions for which we are liable under the Occupiers Liability Act 1957, or (iv) any other liability to the extent the same may not be excluded or restricted as a matter of law, or (v) under our undertaking in paragraph 9 of these conditions.

11 MISCELLANEOUS

- 11.1 You may not assign either the benefit or burden of this agreement.
- 11.2 Our failure or delay in enforcing or exercising any power or right under this agreement will not operate or be deemed to operate as a waiver of our rights under it except to the extent of any express waiver given to you in writing. Any such waiver will not affect our ability subsequently to enforce any right arising under this agreement.
- 11.3 If either party to this agreement is prevented from performing that party's respective obligations under this agreement by circumstances beyond its reasonable control or if performance of its obligations would by reason of such circumstances give rise to a significantly increased financial cost to it, that party will not, for so long as such circumstances prevail, be required to perform such obligations. This paragraph does not apply to the obligations imposed on you by paragraph 3.
- 11.4 Any notice or other communication to be given under this agreement must be in writing and may be delivered by hand or sent by first class post or air mail or fax transmission (if to Bonhams marked for the attention of the Company Secretary), to the address or fax number of the relevant party given in the Contract Form (unless notice of any change of address is given in writing). It is the responsibility of the sender of the notice or communication to ensure that it is received in a legible form within any applicable time period.
- 11.5 If any term or any part of any term of this agreement is held to be unenforceable or invalid, such unenforceability or invalidity will not affect the enforceability and validity of the remaing terms or the remainder of the relevant term.
- 11.6 References in this agreement to Bonhams will, where appropriate, include reference to Bonhams' officers, employees and agents.
- 11.7 The headings used in this agreement are for convenience only and will not affect its interpretation.
- 11.8 In this agreement "including" means "including, without limitation".
- 11.9 References to the singular will include reference to the plural (and vice versa) and reference to any one gender will include reference to the other genders.
- 11.10 Reference to a numbered paragraph is to a paragraph of this agreement.
- 11.11 Save as expressly provided in paragraph 11.12 nothing in this agreement confers (or purports to confer) on any person who is not a party to this agreement any benefit conferred by, or the right to enforce any term of, this agreement.
- 1.12 Where this agreement confers an immunity from, and/or an exclusion or restriction of, the responsibility and/or liability of Bonhams, it will also operate in favour and for the benefit of Bonhams' holding company and the subsidiaries of such holding company and the successors and assigns of Bonhams and of such companies and of any officer, employee and agent of Bonhams and such companies, each of whom will be entitled to rely on the relevant immunity and/or exclusion and/or restriction within and for the purposes of Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999, which enables the benefit of a contract to be extended to a person who is not a party to the contract, and generally at law.

12 GOVERNING LAW

All transactions to which this agreement applies and all connected matters will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of that part of the United Kingdom where the Sale takes (or is to take) place and we and you each submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of that part of the United Kingdom, save that we may bring proceedings against you in any other court of competent jurisdiction to the extent permitted by the laws of the relevant jurisdiction. Bonhams has a complaints procedure in place.

DATA PROTECTION - USE OF YOUR INFORMATION

Where we obtain any personal information about you, we shall only use it in accordance with the terms of our Privacy Policy (subject to any additional specific consent(s) you may have given at the time your information was disclosed). A copy of our Privacy Policy can be found on our Website www. bonhams.com or requested by post from Customer Services Department, 101 New Bond Street, London W1S 1SR, United Kingdom or by email from info@bonhams.com.

APPENDIX 3

DEFINITIONS AND GLOSSARY

Where these Definitions and Glossary are incorporated, the following words and phrases used have (unless the context otherwise requires) the meanings given to them below. The Glossary is to assist you to understand words and phrases which have a specific legal meaning with which you may not be familiar.

LIST OF DEFINITIONS

- "Additional Premium" a premium, calculated in accordance with the Notice to Bidders, to cover Bonhams' Expenses relating to the payment of royalties under the Artists Resale Right Regulations 2006 which is payable by the Buyer to Bonhams on any Lot marked [AR] which sells for a Hammer Price which together with the Buyer's Premium (but excluding any VAT) equals or exceeds 1000 euros (converted into the currency of the Sale using the European Central Bank Reference rate prevailing on the date of the Sale).
- "Auctioneer" the representative of Bonhams conducting the Sale.
- "Bidder" a person who has completed a Bidding Form.
- "Bidding Form" our Bidding Registration Form, our Absentee Bidding Form or our Telephone Bidding Form.
- "Bonhams" Bonhams 1793 Limited or its successors or assigns. Bonhams is also referred to in the Buyer's Agreement, the Conditions of Business and the Notice to Bidders by the words "we", "us" and "our".
- "Book" a printed Book offered for Sale at a specialist Book Sale.
- "Business" includes any trade, Business and profession.
- "Buyer" the person to whom a Lot is knocked down by the Auctioneer. The Buyer is also referred to in the Contract for Sale and the Buyer's Agreement by the words "you" and "your".
- **"Buyer's Agreement"** the contract entered into by *Bonhams* with the *Buyer* (see Appendix 2 in the *Catalogue*).
- **"Buyer's Premium"** the sum calculated on the *Hammer Price* at the rates stated in the *Notice to Bidders*.
- "Catalogue" the Catalogue relating to the relevant Sale, including any representation of the Catalogue published on our Website
- "Commission" the Commission payable by the Seller to Bonhams calculated at the rates stated in the Contract Form.
- "Condition Report" a report on the physical condition of a *Lot* provided to a *Bidder* or potential *Bidder* by *Bonhams* on behalf of *the Seller*.
- "Conditions of Sale" the Notice to Bidders, Contract for Sale, Buyer's Agreement and Definitions and Glossary.
- "Consignment Fee" a fee payable to Bonhams by the Seller calculated at rates set out in the Conditions of Business.
- "Consumer" a natural person who is acting for the relevant purpose outside his trade, *Business* or profession.
- "Contract Form" the Contract Form, or vehicle Entry form, as applicable, signed by or on behalf of the Seller listing the Lots to be offered for Sale by Bonhams.

"Contract for Sale" the Sale contract entered into by the Seller with the Buyer (see Appendix 1 in the Catalogue).

"Contractual Description" the only Description of the Lot (being that part of the Entry about the Lot in the Catalogue which is in bold letters, any photograph (except for the colour) and the contents of any Condition Report) to which the Seller undertakes in the Contract of Sale the Lot corresponds.

"Description" any statement or representation in any way descriptive of the *Lot*, including any statement or representation relating to its authorship, attribution, condition, provenance, authenticity, style, period, age, suitability, quality, origin, value, estimated selling price (including the *Hammer Price*)

"Entry" a written statement in the *Catalogue* identifying the *Lot* and its *Lot* number which may contain a *Description* and illustration(s) relating to the *Lot*.

"Estimate" a statement of our opinion of the range within which the hammer is likely to fall.

"Expenses" charges and Expenses paid or payable by Bonhams in respect of the Lot including legal Expenses, banking charges and Expenses incurred as a result of an electronic transfer of money, charges and Expenses for loss and damage cover, insurance, Catalogue and other reproductions and illustrations, any customs duties, advertising, packing or shipping costs, reproductions rights' fees, taxes, levies, costs of testing, searches or enquiries, preparation of the Lot for Sale, storage charges, removal charges, removal charges or costs of collection from the Seller as the Seller's agents or from a defaulting Buyer, plus VAT if applicable.

"Forgery" an imitation intended by the maker or any other person to deceive as to authorship, attribution, origin, authenticity, style, date, age, period, provenance, culture, source or composition, which at the date of the Sale had a value materially less than it would have had if the Lot had not been such an imitation, and which is not stated to be such an imitation in any description of the Lot. A Lot will not be a Forgery by reason of any damage to, and/or restoration and/or modification work (including repainting or over painting) having been carried out on the Lot, where that damage, restoration or modification work (as the case may be) does not substantially affect the identity of the Lot as one conforming to the Description of the Lot.

"Guarantee" the obligation undertaken personally by Bonhams to the Buyer in respect of any Forgery and, in the case of specialist Stamp Sales and/or specialist Book Sales, a Lot made up of a Stamp or Stamps or a Book or Books as set out in the Buyer's Agreement.

"Hammer Price" the price in the currency in which the Sale is conducted at which a Lot is knocked down by the Auctioneer. "Loss and Damage Warranty" means the warranty described in paragraph 8.2 of the Conditions of Business.

"Loss and Damage Warranty Fee" means the fee described in paragraph 8.2.3 of the Conditions of Business.

"Lot" any item consigned to Bonhams with a view to its Sale at auction or by private treaty (and reference to any Lot will include, unless the context otherwise requires, reference to individual items comprised in a group of two or more items offered for Sale as one Lot).

"Motoring Catalogue Fee" a fee payable by the Seller to Bonhams in consideration of the additional work undertaken by Bonhams in respect of the cataloguing of motor vehicles and in respect of the promotion of Sales of motor vehicles.

"New Bond Street" means Bonhams' saleroom at 101 New Bond Street, London W1S 1SR.

"Notional Charges" the amount of Commission and VAT which would have been payable if the Lot had been sold at the Notional Price.

"Notional Fee" the sum on which the Consignment Fee payable to Bonhams by the Seller is based and which is calculated according to the formula set out in the Conditions of Business

"Notional Price" the latest in time of the average of the high and low Estimates given by us to you or stated in the Catalogue or, if no such Estimates have been given or stated, the Reserve applicable to the Lot.

"Notice to Bidders" the notice printed at the back or front of our Catalogues.

"Purchase Price" the aggregate of the Hammer Price and VAT on the Hammer Price (where applicable), the Buyer's Premium and VAT on the Buyer's Premium and any Expenses.

"Reserve" the minimum price at which a *Lot* may be sold (whether at auction or by private treaty).

"Sale" the auction Sale at which a Lot is to be offered for Sale by Rophams

"Sale Proceeds" the net amount due to the Seller from the Sale of a Lot, being the Hammer Price less the Commission, any VAT chargeable thereon, Expenses and any other amount due to us in whatever capacity and howsoever arising.

"Seller" the person who offers the Lot for Sale named on the Contract Form. Where the person so named identifies on the form another person as acting as his agent, or where the person named on the Contract Form acts as an agent for a principal (whether such agency is disclosed to Bonhams or not), "Seller" includes both the agent and the principal who shall be jointly and severally liable as such. The Seller is also referred to in the Conditions of Business by the words "you" and "your".

"Specialist Examination" a visual examination of a *Lot* by a specialist on the *Lot*.

"Stamp" means a postage Stamp offered for Sale at a Specialist Stamp Sale.

"Standard Examination" a visual examination of a *Lot* by a non-specialist member of *Bonhams'* staff.

"Storage Contract" means the contract described in paragraph 8.3.3 of the Conditions of Business or paragraph 4.4 of the *Buyer's Agreement* (as appropriate).

"Storage Contractor" means the company identified as such in the *Catalogue*.

"Terrorism" means any act or threatened act of terrorism, whether any person is acting alone or on behalf of or in connection with any organisation(s) and/or government(s), committed for political, religious or ideological or similar purposes including, but not limited to, the intention to influence any government and/or put the public or any section of the public into fear.

"Trust Account" the bank account of Bonhams into which all sums received in respect of the Purchase Price of any Lot will be paid, such account to be a distinct and separate account to Bonhams' normal business bank account.

"VAT" value added tax at the prevailing rate at the date of the Sale in the United Kingdom.

"Website" Bonhams Website at www.bonhams.com
"Withdrawal Notice" the Seller's written notice to Bonhams
revoking Bonhams' instructions to sell a Lot.

"Without Reserve" where there is no minimum price at which a *Lot* may be sold (whether at auction or by private treaty).

GLOSSARY

The following expressions have specific legal meanings with which you may not be familiar. The following glossary is intended to give you an understanding of those expressions but is not intended to limit their legal meanings:

"artist's resale right": the right of the creator of a work of art to receive a payment on Sales of that work subsequent to the original Sale of that work by the creator of it as set out in the Artists Resale Right Regulations 2006.

"bailee": a person to whom goods are entrusted.
"indemnity": an obligation to put the person who has the benefit of the indemnity in the same position in which he would have been, had the circumstances giving rise to the indemnity not arisen and the expression "indemnify" is construed accordinaly.

"interpleader proceedings": proceedings in the Courts to determine ownership or rights over a *Lot*.

"knocked down": when a *Lot* is sold to a *Bidder,* indicated by the fall of the hammer at the *Sale.*

"lien": a right for the person who has possession of the ${\it Lot}$ to retain possession of it.

"risk": the possibility that a Lot may be lost, damaged, destroyed, stolen, or deteriorate in condition or value. "title": the legal and equitable right to the ownership of a Lot.

"tort": a legal wrong done to someone to whom the wrong doer has a duty of care.

SALE OF GOODS ACT 1979

The following is an extract from the Sale of Goods Act 1979:

"Section 12 Implied terms about title, etc

- (1) In a contract of sale, other than one to which subsection (3) below applies, there is an implied term on the part of the seller that in the case of a sale he has a right to sell the goods, and in the case of an agreement to sell he will have such a right at the time when the property is to pass.
- (2) In a contract of sale, other than one to which subsection (3) below applies, there is also an implied term that-
 - (a) the goods are free, and will remain free until the time when the property is to pass, from any charge or encumbrance not disclosed or known to the buyer before the contract is made, and
 - (b) the buyer will enjoy quiet possession of the goods except in so far as it may be disturbed by the owner or other person entitled to the benefit of any charge or encumbrance so disclosed or known.
- (3) This subsection applies to a contract of sale in the case of which there appears from the contract or is to be inferred from its circumstances an intention that the seller should transfer only such title as he or a third person may have.
- (4) In a contract to which subsection (3) above applies there is an implied term that all charges or encumbrances known to the seller and not known to the buyer have been disclosed to the buyer before the contract is made.
- (5) In a contract to which subsection (3) above applies there is also an implied term that none of the following will disturb the buyer's quiet possession of the goods, namely:
 - (a) the seller;
 - in a case where the parties to the contract intend that the seller should transfer only such title as a third person may have, that person;
 - (c) anyone claiming through or under the seller or that third person otherwise than under a charge or encumbrance disclosed or known to the buyer before the contract is made.
- (5A) As regards England and Wales and Northern Ireland, the term implied by subsection (1) above is a condition and the terms implied by subsections (2), (4) and (5) above are warranties."
