Colonel Sir William Everett was born on the 20th April 1844, he was the son of Thomas Ellis Everett, rector of Theddingworth, Leicestershire, and Gertrude Louisa, daughter of Joshua Walker, formerly MP for Aldborough. After a term in 1856 at Marlborough College, he entered Sandhurst, and was commissioned as Ensign in the 26th Cameronians regiment on 28 June 1864. In August he was transferred to the 33rd regiment; he was promoted Lieutenant in January 1867, and made Adjutant in November 1868. An excellent draughtsman, from 1870 to 1878 he was instructor in military drawing at the Royal Military Academy, Woolwich. In 1870 he married Marie Georgina, daughter of Pietro Quartano di Calogeras of Corfu. They had no children. He passed Staff College in 1878.

In 1879 he was employed on the Turco-Bulgarian boundary commission under Sir Edward Bruce Hamley, and in July was appointed viceconsul at Erzurum. In July 1880 he served on a Turco-Persian frontier commission. During the 1881 famine he was active at Erzurum in administering Lady Strangford's relief fund. From September 1882 until the end of 1887 he was consul in Kurdistan. A Roman Catholic Armenian attempted to assassinate him in April 1884, and severely injured him. He was made CMG on 6 August 1886.

From January 1888 until September 1892 Everett was professor of military topography at the Staff College. He left his regiment, in which he had become Major, in July 1881, for an unattached Lieutenant-Colonelcy. He was employed in the intelligence division of the War Office as Assistant Adjutant-General, with the rank of colonel, from June 1893 to March 1901. From 1895 to 1900 he worked on commissions on west African frontiers, and was made KCMG in June 1898. He was in charge of the intelligence division during 1899 (a time of exceptional stress). Sir William retired on 20 April 1901 and died at Interlaken of heart failure on 9 August 1908. He was buried at Dunsfold, near Godalming, survived by his wife.

On 3rd September 1944, Squadtron Leader Craig was detailed to mark a target at Vehlo Airfield and to act as Master Bomber. On his marking run, at the opening phase of the attack, the aircraft received a direct hit by predicted heavy flak which damaged the starboard fuel system causing a serious petrol leak and defective engines. Disregarding this he pressed home his attack and accurately marked the target.

Despite the fact that fuel was leaking into the fuselage causing considerable discomfort, Squadron Leader Craig continued giving his instructions until, when the position became acute, he handed over to his deputy. By this time it was found that the fuel system was damaged to such an extent that the starboard engines could not be run from the port tanks. The aircraft at this time was at 5000 feet and he decided that the only way to bring his damaged aircraft safely back on the two remaining engines was at very low engine conditions which would probably mean loss of height.

He decided to set course for an emergency landing field in this country involving a long sea crossing during which time height was gradually lost and to maintain the aircraft in the air all moveable and jettisonable equipment was thrown overboard. By supreme efforts Squadron Leader Craig, although in an extremely low height over the sea, completed his hazardous flight by making a safe landing with his wheels down. It was found on inspection after landing that sufficient fuel for only a few more minutes flying remained.

This action is typical of the spirit consistently displayed by this gallant Officer, whose example, at all times, has been outstanding and who has, throughout his operational tour in this Squadron, given distinguished service.

This officer has proved himself to be an outstanding Captain of aircraft. He has been employed in the capacity of Master Bomber and Deputy Master Bomber on 30 occasions, by day and night.

On all raids that this officer has controlled, which have varied between such heavily defended targets as Kiel and tactical targets in support of the Army, he has shown outstanding fearlessness, coolness and judgement. Every attack he has contolled has been highly successful and the success of these operations, often in difficult circumstances, can be attributed in no mean way to Squadron Leader Craig's masterly handling of all situations.

He has, by disregard to personal danger, carried out his own marking with accuracy and precision and he has carried out all his instructions with the utmost sincerity, having one thing in mind at all times - to ensure that the raid should be, at all costs, a success.

Throughout his tour he has displayed exceptional keeness whilst his good judgment and outstandingly ability have contributed in a large measure to the success of many important missions in which he has taken part.

Wing Commander Allan John Laird Craig was born on the 9th May 1922 at Leighton Buzzard. He was educated at Pulford Boys Elementary and Cedar Secondary Schools, Leighton Buzzard. He enlisted into the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve in 1940 as a Leading Aircraftsman.

He is granted a commission as a Pilot Officer on probation in the General Duties Branch of the RAFVR in 1941. He begins his Pilot Training with No.1 EFTS on the 11th March 1941 and has his first solo on the 24th March. He begins training on Oxfords on the 23rd May. He eventually becomes an Instructor on Oxfords. In November 1942 he begins flying Mitchells with No.111 OTU, this continues throughout 1943 where he carries out Instruction on Mitchells. He has three flights on a Liberator in July 1943 with several more in August and September, by the end of September he has flown just over 1195 hours. In December 1943 he transfers to No.14 OTU for conversion to Wellingtons, he carries out High Level Bombing practice and Cine gun flights. He then moves on to Hudsons and has two 'Ops' in February 1944, this follows with an Op to France on the 3rd March on board a Halifax and one as a Pilot on a Hudson, again to France on the 6th March.

He is stationed to R.A.F. Warboys and begins conversion to Lancasters, once conversion is complete he transfers to No.7 Squadron and for April 1944 has Ops to Lille (9th), Laom (10th), Aachen (11th), Cologne (20th), Tergnier (21st), Dusseldorf (22nd), Essen (26th). With D-Day approaching May is another busy month with Ops to Chambly (1st), Mantes (6th), Duisburg (21st), Dortmund (22nd), Aachen (24th), Rennes Airfield (27th).

In June 1944 still with No.7 Squadron he has Ops to Calais (3rd), on the 5th he is First Marker on Franceville-Merville (Target-Coastal Guns on D-Day Beach), on the 7th his Op is to Massy-Palaiseus for Visual Marking, on the 8th his Op is to Fougeres and importantly he is Deputy Master Bomber. The 10th again sees him as Deputy Master Bomber on an Op to Dreux, he retains this role for an attack to Amiens on the 12th. On the 14th June he has an Op to Le Havre and his logbook denotes him as Master Bomber it also notes (59 out of 60 ships in this target were sunk). On the 16th his Op is on Remescure (Pas de Calais Tactical Target). A further Op was planned for the 21st but the logbook notes (M.Bomber had to cancel raid - Low Stratus covered target). He returns to the role of Master Bomber on an Op to Corbonne (Flying Bomb Target) on the 23rd. On the 25th he performs the same Op and status to Goron Flos.

His July Ops as Master Bomber were equally as busy as June and starts on the 6th with an attack on the Flying bomb sight at Foret du Cooe, Flying Bomb supply base at Thiverny (12th) (Deputy), Railway Marshalling Yards at Chalons-Sur-Marne (15th), Cagney (Deputy) close support to Caen troops (18th), Keil (23rd), Stuttgart (24th), Stuttgart (28th) he was attacked by a Ju.88 50 miles from target, shot it down and evaded four others and logbook notes arrived 4 mins late with no damage sustained, West of Villers Bocage (30th) attack was made at 2.000ft.

August 1944 saw Ops to Acquet (1st), Foret-de-Nieppe (3rd), Pauillac Oil Refinery (4th), Battle Area (not noted) (6th), Battle Area South of Caen (7th), Foret-de-Mormal (9th), Mortrichard Oil and Explosive store east of Paris (12th), Battle Area North of Falaise (14th), Volkel Airfield (Holland) (15th), Kiel (16th) (Bombsight Rear Turret and Y u/s), Bremen (18th), Stettin (29th) (Deputy).

September 1944 saw Ops to Lumbres (1st), Velno (3rd) came back on two port engines and landed at Woodbridge with 15 mins left, Le Havre (5th) Army support, Emden (6th), Le Havre (9th), Le Havre (10th) twice, Kamen Oil Refinery & Storage between Dortmund and Munster (11th), Frankfurt (12th), Kiel (14th), Boulogne Army Support (17th), Calais Army Support (20th, 25th, 26th, 27th, 28th).

October 1944 saw Ops to Saarbrucken (5th), Schloven Buer Oil Refinery (6th), Emmerich (7th), this being his final Op.

He returns to flying again in April 1945 with a variety of tasks including Exodus Operation (P.O.W.), Manna Exercise. In July he flies to Sao Paulo, Rio and South Africa. His worldwide flying continues in August to Nassau, Washington, New York and Montreal.

He flies in the Fly-Past over London for Victory Day on the 8th June 1946, and is involved in a Fly Past in New York on the 18th July and spends most of August in the U.S.A. as part of a Goodwill Tour. He pilots Air Chief Marshall Sir Keith Park on several occasions on an Anson in Argentina and Uruguay. In June 1948 he is posted to 236 O.C.U. Kinloss and carries out various instruction etc. In June 1953 he has his first flight on a Meteor VII, and on the 18th January 1954 has a flight on a prototype Vulcan flying out of Woodford. He flies in a Canberra in February 1955 with his last flight being on the 7th, his total hours flown being just short of 2400 hours.

Wing Commander Craig retires as Wing Commander on the 11th April 1956, aged 33. He died on the 9th June 1971 aged 48 of a heart attack following being hospitalised briefly with Double Pneumonia in a Leicester Clinic. He is buried in the graveyard of St.Luke's Church, adjacent to his then family residence Gaddesby Hall.

One night in November 1944, Wing Commander Whetham piloted an aircraft in an attack on Dusseldorf. Almost immediately after taking off, the port outer engine failed. Despite the loss of engine power this officer continued to the target. When approaching the Ruhr defences extremely accurate anti-aircraft fire was encountered. The aircraft was hit. Considerable structural damage was sustained and a large amount of oxygen was lost. Nevertheless, Wing Commander Whetham executed an excellent bombing run and afterwards flew the aircraft safely back to base. This officer has completed a large number of sorties against strongly defended targets. He has displayed high qualities of skill and leadership and throughout his devotion to duty has been unfailing.

D.F.C. London Gazette 15.9.1944.

Wing Commander Whetham has proved himself to be an outstandingly successful operational Captain. His attacks have been pressed home in spite of heavy opposition, whilst engaged in a most vital role. At all times he has displayed great tenacity and determination to achieve his objective. Wing Commander Whetham has set a fine example to his Crew by his skill, courage and coolness in action. His cheerfulness and enthusiasm to proceed on operations against the enemy on every possible occasion is a great encouragement to the Flight he commands. In recognition of this Officer's devotion to duty at all times, he is recommended for a non-immediate award of the Distinguished Flying Cross.

A.F.C. London Gazette 2.6.1943.

This officer has been in command of a flight for over 2 years, during which time he has flown on several long distance flights including a number to Iceland. He has always shown the greatest keenness for his work, setting a fine example by consistent devotion to duty, often in difficult circumstances. To his untiring efforts must be attributed a large share of the squadron's success.

Norway, Freedom Medal. London Gazette 9.7.1946.

Wing Commander L.M.S.Whetham begins his flight training in May 1933 and has his first solo on the 12th September.

At the outbreak of WW2 he is with 271 Squadron flying Harrow's and then on to Bombay's flying passengers and freight. Throughout June 1940 he flies to Le Mans, Caen, Nantes and Jersey. In August still serving with 271 Squadron based at Doncaster still flying Bombay's he is involved at Ringway with Dummy drops and this continues throughout August. From September 1940 until Mid 1943 he flies predominantly Harrow's in a combination of roles that include delivery of kit, men and Air Tests.

He has his first flight in a Halifax with 35 Squadron and his first Op is on the 27th September 1943 to Hannover as Blind Marker, this follows with his second two days later to Bochum. He has two Ops in October to Kassel and Frankfurt both as Blind Marker. He Converts to Pilot on Halifaxes in October 1943 with 1652 Conversion Unit. He is

back on Ops in December 1943 with a trip to Frankfurt on the 20th as 'Supporter' and again on the 29th to Belin. In January he carries out four further Ops to Berlin (2), Magdeburg and Heligoland. February sees four further Ops to Berlin, Stuttgart, Schweinfurt and Flugsburg. In March he transfers to Lancasters and has two Ops to Frankfurt and one to Berlin. His 18th Op in April is to Cologne followed by one on Acheres (Paris) Marshalliing Yard on the 30th. He qualifies for his Path Finder Force Badge on the 26th April.

In May he carries out six Ops on targets in France including Boulogne and Bourg Leopold (Panzer Depot) and one on Dortmund. On the 5th June he attacks the Maisy Gun Battery with further raids to Rennes, Massy Palaisseau, Arras and Courbonne. On the 25th June he attacks Montorqueil (Buzz Bomb Site).

In July 1944 his 33rd Op is on the 4th to Villneuve St.George, followed by one on the 7th to Caen, his loobook denotes 'Tactical target, Tank concentration', on the 11th he attacks Gabennes (Buzz Bomb) 'Leader Formation on Oboe Mosquito'. His other Ops for July include Les Landes, Wesseling Fuel Plant, Wizernes (Buzz Bomb), Stuttgart (2). August 1944 sees continued attacks to help the invasion with Ops to Acquet, a Tactical Target South East of Caen noted in his log book as having Troop and Machine gun concentration, Douai, Russelsheim Opel Works, and Stettin. In September his Ops are Havre, Frankfurt and Calais. His 50th Op is to Saarbrucken, followed by Cologne, West Kapelle and a return to Cologne. November 1944 sees his two final Ops to Oberhausen on the 1st November and his 55th Op on the 2nd November to Dusseldorf.

He does not fly again until March 1945 and is Second Pilot aboardFiester's, Dakota and Sunderland. After a short stint with 178 and 70 Squadrons he transfers to the Aden Communications Unit flying Wellingtons. In February 1955 he has his first experience of flying a jet aircraft as a Second Pilot on a Provost going solo after 1 hour and 35 minutes experience. In April 1955 he is with No.12 F.T.S. at Weston Zoyland and begins flying on Meteor 7's and Meteor 4's at one stage climbing to 40,000ft. Throughout 1956 he has some flights on Chipmunks, no flying in 1957 except as a Passenger. In September and October of 1958 he goes on a No.8 Jet Familiarisation Course at R.A.F. Manby flying Meteor 7's and Meteor 8's. He is retired on the 6th July 1959. His logbook shows 2795 hours of flying.

This officer has at all times proved himself to be a cool, trustworthy, and most courageous leader. During the Libyan campaign Winter 1941/42 he has controlled his guns wherever they have seen action. He beat off a German tank attack at a range of only four hundred yards over open sights at Libyan Omar in Nov '41. On another occasion he stayed in his O.P., sending back the most valuable information, in spite of enemy troops having penetrated between him and his guns. Throughout the advance, and subsequent withdrawal from Benghasi in Jan/Feb 42, he displayed at all times a most high standard of courage, coolness and leadership, and by his cheerful determination he brought back all his guns and vehicles, inflicting heavy damage on the enemy.

Bar to the M.C. London Gazette 26.11.1942.

For outstanding coolness, courage and resource in extricating his troop under heavy fire and when surrounded by the enemy at night, and in unknown country. On the night 14/15th June 1942, 151 Bde., 50 (TT) Div. were trying to break through the enemy and withdraw from the Gazala position. This operation was being carried out at night. Capt. Gillespie's troop was with one of three columns. The first line of enemy was penetrated successfully. The loaders were then held up by the German forces. Flares were fired over our columns, and heavy fire was opened on them from three sides by every kind of gun and small arms. Some vehicles from another unit cut in to Capt. Gillespie's column behind the first gun. Of these vehicles two went into slit trenches, and Capt. Gillespie and his remaining two guns and other vehicles were separated from the rest of the column. The enemy fire was intense, and smoke and dust in the dark caused the greatest confusion. Capt. Gillespie showed the greatest coolness and on foot went round his remaining vehicles. Three had received direct hits. Capt. Gillespie re-distributed his personnel and successfully led his troops out of this critical situation. On two occasions the vehicle, in which he was travelling himself, was struck by shell and Anti Tank fire. In spite of this he continued to redistribute his personnel as each vehicle casualty occured, and eventually extricated extricated his remaining vehicles and men beyond the enemy who had been encircling them. From this point he brought them in to safety by a long but more secure route and eventually reached the boundary wire with both guns. It resounds greatly to Capt. Gillespie's credit, that only one officer and two other ranks were found to be missing on his arrival at the wire. During the whole experience, his demeanour and example were such that his men were in excellent heart, and their confidence in him was complete and their obedience unhesitating.

Captain Godfrey Curtis Gillespie was killed in action on the 10th May 1943, aged 30, whilst serving with the 64 Medium Regiment, Royal Artillery. He was the son of Henry Shaw Gillespie and Eva Gillespie of 407 Woolton Road, Gateacre, Liverpool. He is remembered in the Massicault War Cemetery.

This Officer has completed a large number (30) of dangerous Operational Flights in the course of which he has displayed outstanding navigational ability. He has taken part in air raids, many of which have been successfully accomplished in spite of the intense opposition from enemy aircraft and ground based opposition, particularly encountered over such objectives as Berlin, Munich, Duisberg, Dusseldorf, Genova, and Milan (the last two raids being carried out without any cover in daylight). On one occasion the rear of the aircraft was completely shot away by anti-aircraft fire, and the aircraft alighted, the rear gunner was killed. No harrassing experience however has diminished his enthusiasm for operational duties. A further two occasions arose when the aircraft was safely brought home on only 3 engines. Flying Officer Cramp is the younger son of Councillor and Mrs T.E.Cramp of Bramhall, Cheshire. He is married and has a baby boy who is two weeks old.

Flight Lieutenant Cramp begins his training on the 5th September 1941 and carries out training as a Navigator, Bomb Aimer and Gunnery Practise. His first Op is on 22.10.1942 with 9 Squadron flying Lancasters from R.A.F. Waddington, his second Op is to Milan in daylight for a total of 10:30 flight time. This followed with further Ops over Italy including Genoa (2) and Turin. In December he went to Mannheim, Turin, Duisberg and Munich. His log book notes the Op to Duisberg on 8.1.1943 has the 'Rear Gunner Killed'. In February he has seven Ops which include Cologne and St.Nazaire, March has a further five Ops and raids include Essen and Berlin. In April he has Ops to Essen, Kiel and Duisberg and May five more to Dortmund (2), Pilsen, and Dusseldorf the latter being his 31st Op.

He transfers to No.17 O.T.U. at Silverstone and then in February 1944 to the Central Navigation School at Shawbury, his last flight is on the 11th October 1944 out of Husbands Bosworth on a Wellington as Screen Navigational Cross Country, he had amassed over 579 flying hours.

Bonhams undertakes no obligation to you to examine, investigate or carry out any tests, either in sufficient depth or at all, on each Lot to establish the accuracy or otherwise of any Descriptions or opinions given by Bonhams, or by any person on Bonhams' behalf, whether in the Catalogue or elsewhere.

You should not suppose that such examinations, investigations or tests have occurred.

Bonhams does not make or agree to make any representation of fact, and undertakes no obligation or duty (whether in contract or tort) in respect of the accuracy or completeness of any statement or representation made by Bonhams or on Bonhams' behalf which is in any way descriptive of any Lot or as to the anticipated or likely selling price of any Lot. Alterations

Condition of Firearms

Comment in this Catalogue is restricted, in general, to exceptional condition and to those defects that might affect the immediate safety of a firearm in normal use. An intending Bidder unable to make technical examinations and assessments is recommended to seek advice from a gunmaker or from a modern firearms specialist. It is not our policy to inspect every unopened case. In the case of wines older than 20 years the boxes will usually have been opened and levels and appearance noted in the *Catalogue* where necessary. You should make proper allowance for variations in ullage levels and conditions of corks, capsules and labels.

Corks and Ullages

Ullage refers to the space between the base of the cork and the wine. Ullage levels for Bordeaux shaped bottles are only normally noted when below the neck and for Burgundy, Alsace, German and Cognac shaped bottles when greater than 4 centimetres (cm). Acceptable ullage levels increase with age; generally acceptable levels are as follows:

Under 15 years old – into neck or less than 4cm 15 to 30 years old – top shoulder (ts) or up to 5cm Over 30 years old – high shoulder (hs) or up to 6cm

It should be noted that ullages may change between publication of the *Catalogue* and the *Sale* and that corks may fail as a result of transporting the wine. We will only accept responsibility for *Descriptions* of condition at the time of publication of the *Catalogue* and cannot accept responsibility for any loss resulting from failure of corks either before or after this point.

Options to buy parcels

Reference is made in this agreement to information printed in the Notice to Bidders, printed in the Catalogue for the Sale, and where such information is referred to it is incorporated into this agreement.
- 1.3 Except as specified in paragraph 4 of the Notice to Bidders the Contract for Sale of the Lot between you and the Seller is made on the fall of the Auctioneer's hammer in respect of the Lot, when it is knocked down to you. At that moment a separate contract is also made between you and Bonhams on the terms in this Buyer's Agreement.
- 1.4 We act as agents for the Seller and are not answerable or personally responsible to you for any breach of contract or other default by the Seller, unless Bonhams sells the Lot as principal.
- 1.5 Our personal obligations to you are governed by this agreement and we agree, subject to the terms below, to the following obligations:
- 1.5.1 we will, until the date and time specified in the Notice to Bidders or otherwise notified to you, store the Lot in accordance with paragraph 5;

- 1.5.2 subject to any power of the Seller or us to refuse to release the Lot to you, we will release the Lot to you in accordance with paragraph 4 once you have paid to us, in cleared funds, everything due to us and the Seller:
- 1.5.3 we will provide guarantees in the terms set out in paragraphs 9 and 10.
- 1.6 We do not make or give and do not agree to make or give any contractual promise, undertaking, obligation, Guarantee, warranty, representation of fact in relation to any Description of the Lot or any Estimate in relation to it, nor of the accuracy or completeness of any Description or Estimate which may have been made by us or on our behalf or by or on behalf of the Seller (whether made orally or in writing, including in the Catalogue or on Bonhams' Website, or by conduct, or otherwise), and whether made before or after this agreement or prior to or during the Sale. No such Description or Estimate is incorporated into this agreement between you and us. Any such Description or Estimate, if made by us or on our behalf, was (unless Bonhams itself sells the Lot as principal) made as agent on behalf of the

2 PERFORMANCE OF THE CONTRACT FOR SALE

You undertake to us personally that you will observe and comply with all your obligations and undertakings to the Seller under the Contract for Sale in respect of the Lot.

3 PAYMENT

- 3.1 Unless agreed in writing between you and us or as otherwise set out in the Notice to Bidders, you must pay to us by not later than 4.30pm on the second working day following the Sale:
- 3.1.1 the Purchase Price for the Lot;
- 3.1.2 a *Buyer's Premium* in accordance with the rates set out in the *Notice to Bidders* on each lot, and
- 3.1.3 if the Lot is marked [AF], an Additional Premium which is calculated and payable in accordance with the Notice to Bidders together with VAT on that sum if applicable so that all sums due to us are cleared funds by the seventh working day after the Sale.
- 3.2 You must also pay us on demand any Expenses payable pursuant to this agreement.
- 3.3 All payments to us must be made in the currency in which the Sale was conducted, using, unless otherwise agreed by us in writing, one of the methods of payment set out in the Notice to Bidders. Our invoices will only be addressed to the registered Bidder unless the Bidder is acting as an agent for a named principal and we have approved that arrangement, in which case we will address the invoice to the principal.
- 3.4 Unless otherwise stated in this agreement all sums payable to us will be subject to VAT at the appropriate rate and VAT will be payable by you on all such sums.
- 3.5 We may deduct and retain for our own benefit from the monies paid by you to us the Buyer's Premium, the Commission payable by the Seller in respect of the Lot, any Expenses and VAT and any interest earned and/or incurred until payment to the Seller.
- 3.6 Time will be of the essence in relation to any payment payable to us. If you do not pay the *Purchase Price*, or any other sum due to us in accordance with this paragraph 3, we will have the rights set out in paragraph 7 below.

3.7 Where a number of Lots have been knocked down to you, any monies we receive from you will be applied firstly pro-rata to pay the Purchase Price of each Lot and secondly pro-rata to pay all amounts due to Bonhams.

4 COLLECTION OF THE LOT

- 4.1 Subject to any power of the Seller or us to refuse to release the Lot to you, once you have paid to us, in cleared funds, everything due to the Seller and to us, we will release the Lot to you or as you may direct us in writing. The Lot will only be released on production of a buyer collection document, obtained from our cashier's office.
- 4.2 You must collect and remove the Lot at your own expense by the date and time specified in the Notice to Bidders, or if no date is specified, by 4.30pm on the seventh day after the Sale.
- 4.3 For the period referred to in paragraph 4.2, the Lot can be collected from the address referred to in the Notice to Bidders for collection on the days and times specified in the Notice to Bidders. Thereafter, the Lot may be removed elsewhere for storage and you must enquire from us as to when and where you can collect it, although this information will usually be set out in the Notice to Bidders.
- 4.4 If you have not collected the Lot by the date specified in the Notice to Bidders, you authorise us, acting as your agent and on your behalf, to enter into a contract (the "5torage Contract") with the Storage Contractor for the storage of the Lot on the then current standard terms and conditions agreed between Bonhams and the Storage Contractor (copies of which are available on request). If the Lot is stored at our premises storage fees at our current daily rates (currently a minimum of £3 plus VAT per Lot per day) will be payable from the expiry of the period referred to in paragraph 4.2. These storage fees form part of our Expenses.
- 4.5 Until you have paid the Purchase Price and any Expenses in full the Lot will either be held by us as agent on behalf of the Seller or held by the Storage Contractor as agent on behalf of the Seller and ourselves on the terms contained in the Storage Contract.
- 4.6 You undertake to comply with the terms of any Storage Contract and in particular to pay the charges (and all costs of moving the Lot into storage) due under any Storage Contract. You acknowledge and agree that you will not be able to collect the Lot from the Storage Contractor's premises until you have paid the Purchase Price, any Expenses and all charges due under the Storage Contract.
- 4.7 You will be wholly responsible for packing, handling and transport of the Lot on collection and for complying with all import or export regulations in connection with the Lot.
- 4.8 You will be wholly responsible for any removal, storage, or other charges for any Lot not removed in accordance with paragraph 4.2, payable at our current rates, and any Expenses we incur (including any charges due under the Storage Contract), all of which must be paid by you on demand and in any event before any collection of the Lot by you or on your behalf.

5 STORING THE LOT

We agree to store the Lot until the earlier of your removal of the Lot or until the time and date set out in the Notice to Bidders, on the Sale Information Page or at the back of the catalogue (or if no date is specified, by 4.30pm on the seventh day after the Sale) and, subject to paragraphs 6 and 10, to be responsible as bailee to you for damage to or the loss or destruction of the Lot (notwithstanding that it is not your property before payment of the Purchase Price). If you do not collect the Lot before the time and date set out in the Notice to Bidders (or if no date is specified, by 4.30pm on the seventh day after the Sale) we may remove the Lot to another location, the details of which will usually be set out in the relevant section of the Catalogue. If you have not paid for the Lot in accordance with paragraph 3, and the Lot is moved to any third party's premises, the Lot will be held by such third party strictly to Bonhams' order and we will retain our lien over the Lot until we have been paid in full in accordance with

6 RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE LOT

- 6.1 Only on the payment of the *Purchase Price* to us will title in the *Lot* pass to you. However under the *Contract for Sale*, the risk in the *Lot* passed to you when it was knocked down to you.
- 6.2 You are advised to obtain insurance in respect of the Lot as soon as possible after the Sale.

7 FAILURE TO PAY OR TO REMOVE THE LOT AND PART PAYMENTS

- 7.1 If all sums payable to us are not so paid in full at the time they are due and/or the Lot is not removed in accordance with this agreement, we will without further notice to you be entitled to exercise one or more of the following rights (without prejudice to any rights we may exercise on behalf of the Seller):
- 7.1.1 to terminate this agreement immediately for your breach of contract;
- 7.1.2 to retain possession of the Lot;
- 7.1.3 to remove, and/or store the Lot at your expense;
- 7.1.4 to take legal proceedings against you for payment of any sums payable to us by you (including the Purchase Price) and/or damages for breach of contract;
- 7.1.5 to be paid interest on any monies due to us (after as well as before judgement or order) at the annual rate of 5% per annum above the base lending rate of National Westminster Bank Plc from time to time to be calculated on a daily basis from the date upon which such monies become payable until the date of actual payment;
- 7.1.6 to repossess the Lot (or any part thereof) which has not become your property, and for this purpose (unless you buy the Lot as a Consumer) you hereby grant an irrevocable licence to us, by ourselves, our servants or agents, to enter upon all or any of your premises (with or without vehicles) during normal business hours to take possession of any Lot or part thereof;
- 7.1.7 to sell the Lot Without Reserve by auction, private treaty or any other means on giving you three months' written notice of our intention to do so:
- 7.1.8 to retain possession of any of your other property in our possession for any purpose (including, without limitation, other goods sold to you or with us for Sale) until all sums due to us have been paid in full:

- 7.1.9 to apply any monies received from you for any purpose whether at the time of your default or at any time thereafter in payment or part payment of any sums due to us by you under this agreement;
- 7.1.10 on three months' written notice to sell, Without Reserve, any of your other property in our possession or under our control for any purpose (including other goods sold to you or with us for Sale) and to apply any monies due to you as a result of such Sale in payment or part payment of any amounts owed to us:
- 7.1.11 refuse to allow you to register for a future Sale or to reject a bid from you at any future Sale or to require you to pay a deposit before any bid is accepted by us at any future Sale in which case we will be entitled to apply such deposit in payment or part payment, as the case may be, of the Purchase Price of any Lot of which you are the Buyer.
- 7.2 You agree to indemnify us against all legal and other costs, all losses and all other Expenses (whether or not court proceedings will have been issued) incurred by us as a result of our taking steps under this paragraph 7 on a full indemnity basis together with interest thereon (after as well as before judgement or order) at the rate specified in paragraph 7.1.5 from the date upon which we become liable to pay the same until payment by you.
- 7.3 If you pay us only part of the sums due to us such payment shall be applied firstly to the Purchase Price of the Lot (or where you have purchased more than one Lot pro-rata towards the Purchase Price of each Lot) and secondly to the Buyer's Premium (or where you have purchased more than one Lot pro-rata to the Buyer's Premium on each Lot) and thirdly to any other sums due to us.
- 7.4 We will account to you in respect of any balance we hold remaining from any monies received by us in respect of any Sale of the Lot under our rights under this paragraph 7 after the payment of all sums due to us and/or the Seller within 28 days of receipt by us of all such sums paid to us.

8 CLAIMS BY OTHER PERSONS IN RESPECT OF THE LOT

- 8.1 Whenever it becomes apparent to us that the Lot is the subject of a claim by someone other than you and other than the Seller (or that such a claim can reasonably be expected to be made), we may, at our absolute discretion, deal with the Lot in any manner which appears to us to recognise the legitimate interests of ourselves and the other parties involved and lawfully to protect our position and our legitimate interests. Without prejudice to the generality of the discretion and by way of example, we may:
- 8.1.1 retain the *Lot* to investigate any question raised or reasonably expected by us to be raised in relation to the *Lot*; and/or
- 8.1.2 deliver the Lot to a person other than you; and/or
- 8.1.3 commence interpleader proceedings or seek any other order of any court, mediator, arbitrator or government body; and/or
- 8.1.4 require an indemnity and/or security from you in return for pursuing a course of action agreed to by you.
- 8.2 The discretion referred to in paragraph 8.1:

- 8.2.1 may be exercised at any time during which we have actual or constructive possession of the Lot, or at any time after such possession, where the cessation of such possession has occurred by reason of any decision, order or ruling of any court, mediator, arbitrator or government body; and
- 8.2.2 will not be exercised unless we believe that there exists a serious prospect of a good arguable case in favour of the claim.

9 FORGERIES

- 9.1 We undertake a personal responsibility for any Forgery in accordance with the terms of this paragraph 9.
- 9.2 Paragraph 9 applies only if:
- 9.2.1 your name appears as the named person to whom the original invoice was made out by us in respect of the Lot and that invoice has been paid; and
- 9.2.2 you notify us in writing as soon as reasonably practicable after you have become aware that the Lot is or may be a Forgery, and in any event within one year after the Sale, that the Lot is a Forgery; and
- 9.2.3 within one month after such notification has been given, you return the Lot to us in the same condition as it was at the time of the Sale, accompanied by written evidence that the Lot is a Forgery and details of the Sale and Lot number sufficient to identify the
- 9.3 Paragraph 9 will not apply in respect of a Forgery if:
- 9.3.1 the Entry in relation to the Lot contained in the Catalogue reflected the then accepted general opinion of scholars and experts or fairly indicated that there was a conflict of such opinion or reflected the then current opinion of an expert acknowledged to be a leading expert in the relevant field; or
- 9.3.2 it can be established that the Lot is a Forgery only by means of a process not generally accepted for use until after the date on which the Catalogue was published or by means of a process which it was unreasonable in all the circumstances for us to have employed
- 9.4 You authorise us to carry out such processes and tests on the Lot as we in our absolute discretion consider necessary to satisfy ourselves that the Lot is or is not a Forgery.
- 9.5 If we are satisfied that a Lot is a Forgery we will (as principal) purchase the Lot from you and you will transfer the title to the Lot in question to us, with full title guarantee, free from any liens, charges, encumbrances and adverse claims, in accordance with the provisions of Sections 12(1) and 12(2) of the Sale of Goods Act 1979 and we will pay to you an amount equal to the sum of the Purchase Price, Buyer's Premium, VAT and Expenses paid by you in respect of the Lot.
- 9.6 The benefit of paragraph 9 is personal to, and incapable of assignment by, you.
- 9.7 If you sell or otherwise dispose of your interest in the Lot, all rights and benefits under this paragraph will cease.
- 9.8 Paragraph 9 does not apply to a Lot made up of or including a Chinese painting or Chinese paintings, a motor vehicle or motor vehicles, a Stamp or Stamps or a Book or Books.

10 OUR LIABILITY

- 10.1 We will not be liable whether in negligence, other tort, breach of contract or statutory duty or in restitution or under the Misrepresentation Act 1967 or in any other way for lack of conformity with or any inaccuracy, error, misdescription or omission in any Description of the Lot or any Entry or Estimate in respect of it, made by us or on our behalf or by or on behalf of the Seller (whether made in writing, including in the Catalogue, or on the Bonhams' Website, or orally, or by conduct or otherwise) and whether made before or after this agreement or prior to or during the Sale.
- 10.2 Our duty to you while the Lot is at your risk and/or your property and in our custody and/or control is to exercise reasonable care in relation to it, but we will not be responsible for damage to the Lot or to other persons or things caused by:
- 10.2.1 handling the Lot if it was affected at the time of Sale to you by woodworm and any damage is caused as a result of it being affected by woodworm; or
- 10.2.2 changes in atmospheric pressure; nor will we be liable for:
- 10.2.3 damage to tension stringed musical instruments; or
- 10.2.4 damage to gilded picture frames, plaster picture frames or picture frame glass; and if the Lot is or becomes dangerous, we may dispose of it without notice to you in advance in any manner we think fit and we will be under no liability to you for doing so.
- 10.3.1 We will not be liable to you for any loss of Business, Business profits, revenue or income or for loss of Business reputation or for disruption to Business or wasted time on the part of the Buyer's management or staff or, if you are buying the Lot in the course of a Business, for any indirect losses or consequential damages of any kind, irrespective in any case of the nature, volume or source of the loss or damage alleged to be suffered, and irrespective of whether the said loss or damage is caused by or claimed in respect of any negligence, other tort, breach of contract, statutory duty, bailee's duty, a restitutionary claim or otherwise.
- 10.3.2 Unless you buy the Lot as a Consumer, in any circumstances where we are liable to you in respect of a Lot, or any act, omission, statement, representation in respect of it, or this agreement or its performance, and whether in damages, for an indemnity or contribution or for a restitutionary remedy or in any way whatsoever, our liability will be limited to payment of a sum which will not exceed by way of maximum the amount of the Purchase Price of the Lot plus Buver's Premium (less any sum you may be entitled to recover from the Seller) irrespective in any case of the nature, volume or source of any loss or damage alleged to be suffered or sum claimed as due, and irrespective of whether the liability arises from negligence, other tort, breach of contract, statutory duty, bailee's duty, a restitutionary claim or otherwise.

You may wish to protect yourself against loss by obtaining insurance.

10.4 Nothing set out above will be construed as excluding or restricting (whether directly or indirectly) any person's liability or excluding or restricting any person's rights or remedies in respect of (i) fraud, or (ii) death or personal injury caused by our negligence (or any person under our control or for whom we are legally responsible), or (iii) acts or omissions for which we are liable under the Occupiers Liability Act 1957, or (iv) any other liability to the extent the same may not be excluded or restricted as a matter of law, or (v) under our undertaking in paragraph 9 of these conditions.

11 MISCELLANEOUS

- 11.1 You may not assign either the benefit or burden of this agreement.
- 11.2 Our failure or delay in enforcing or exercising any power or right under this agreement will not operate or be deemed to operate as a waiver of our rights under it except to the extent of any express waiver given to you in writing. Any such waiver will not affect our ability subsequently to enforce any right arising under this agreement.
- 11.3 If either party to this agreement is prevented from performing that party's respective obligations under this agreement by circumstances beyond its reasonable control or if performance of its obligations would by reason of such circumstances give rise to a significantly increased financial cost to it, that party will not, for so long as such circumstances prevail, be required to perform such obligations. This paragraph does not apply to the obligations imposed on you by paragraph 3.
- 11.4 Any notice or other communication to be given under this agreement must be in writing and may be delivered by hand or sent by first class post or air mail or fax transmission (if to Bonhams marked for the attention of the Company Secretary), to the address or fax number of the relevant party given in the Contract Form (unless notice of any change of address is given in writing). It is the responsibility of the sender of the notice or communication to ensure that it is received in a legible form within any applicable time period.
- 11.5 If any term or any part of any term of this agreement is held to be unenforceable or invalid, such unenforceability or invalidity will not affect the enforceability and validity of the remaining terms or the remainder of the relevant term.
- 11.6 References in this agreement to Bonhams will, where appropriate, include reference to Bonhams' officers, employees and agents.
- 11.7 The headings used in this agreement are for convenience only and will not affect its interpretation.
- 11.8 In this agreement "including" means "including, without limitation".
- 11.9 References to the singular will include reference to the plural (and vice versa) and reference to any one gender will include reference to the other genders.
- 11.10 Reference to a numbered paragraph is to a paragraph of this agreement.
- 11.11 Save as expressly provided in paragraph 11.12 nothing in this agreement confers (or purports to confer) on any person who is not a party to this agreement any benefit conferred by, or the right to enforce any term of, this agreement.
- 1.12 Where this agreement confers an immunity from, and/or an exclusion or restriction of, the responsibility and/or liability of Bonhams, it will also operate in favour and for the benefit of Bonhams' holding company and the subsidiaries of such holding company and the successors and assigns of Bonhams and of such companies and of any officer, employee and agent of Bonhams and such companies, each of whom will be entitled to rely on the relevant immunity and/or exclusion and/or restriction within and for the purposes of Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999, which enables the benefit of a contract to be extended to a person who is not a party to the contract, and generally at law.

12 GOVERNING LAW

All transactions to which this agreement applies and all connected matters will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of that part of the United Kingdom where the Sale takes (or is to take) place and we and you each submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of that part of the United Kingdom, save that we may bring proceedings against you in any other court of competent jurisdiction to the extent permitted by the laws of the relevant jurisdiction. Bonhams has a complaints procedure in place.

DATA PROTECTION - USE OF YOUR INFORMATION

Where we obtain any personal information about you, we shall only use it in accordance with the terms of our Privacy Policy (subject to any additional specific consent(s) you may have given at the time your information was disclosed). A copy of our Privacy Policy can be found on our Website www. bonhams.com or requested by post from Customer Services Department, 101 New Bond Street, London W1S 1SR, United Kingdom or by email from info@bonhams.com.

APPENDIX 3

DEFINITIONS AND GLOSSARY

Where these Definitions and Glossary are incorporated, the following words and phrases used have (unless the context otherwise requires) the meanings given to them below. The Glossary is to assist you to understand words and phrases which have a specific legal meaning with which you may not be familiar.

LIST OF DEFINITIONS

- "Additional Premium" a premium, calculated in accordance with the Notice to Bidders, to cover Bonhams' Expenses relating to the payment of royalties under the Artists Resale Right Regulations 2006 which is payable by the Buyer to Bonhams on any Lot marked [AR] which sells for a Hammer Price which together with the Buyer's Premium (but excluding any VAT) equals or exceeds 1000 euros (converted into the currency of the Sale using the European Central Bank Reference rate prevailing on the date of the Sale).
- "Auctioneer" the representative of Bonhams conducting the Sale.
- "Bidder" a person who has completed a Bidding Form.
- "Bidding Form" our Bidding Registration Form, our Absentee Bidding Form or our Telephone Bidding Form.
- "Bonhams" Bonhams 1793 Limited or its successors or assigns. Bonhams is also referred to in the Buyer's Agreement, the Conditions of Business and the Notice to Bidders by the words "we", "us" and "our".
- "Book" a printed Book offered for Sale at a specialist Book Sale.
- "Business" includes any trade, Business and profession.
- "Buyer" the person to whom a Lot is knocked down by the Auctioneer. The Buyer is also referred to in the Contract for Sale and the Buyer's Agreement by the words "you" and "your".
- "Buyer's Agreement" the contract entered into by Bonhams with the Buyer (see Appendix 2 in the Catalogue).
- **"Buyer's Premium"** the sum calculated on the *Hammer Price* at the rates stated in the *Notice to Bidders*.
- "Catalogue" the Catalogue relating to the relevant Sale, including any representation of the Catalogue published on our Website
- "Commission" the Commission payable by the Seller to Bonhams calculated at the rates stated in the Contract Form.
- "Condition Report" a report on the physical condition of a *Lot* provided to a *Bidder* or potential *Bidder* by *Bonhams* on behalf of *the Seller*.
- "Conditions of Sale" the Notice to Bidders, Contract for Sale, Buyer's Agreement and Definitions and Glossary.
- "Consignment Fee" a fee payable to Bonhams by the Seller calculated at rates set out in the Conditions of Business.
- **"Consumer"** a natural person who is acting for the relevant purpose outside his trade, *Business* or profession.
- "Contract Form" the Contract Form, or vehicle Entry form, as applicable, signed by or on behalf of the Seller listing the Lots to be offered for Sale by Bonhams.

"Contract for Sale" the Sale contract entered into by the Seller with the Buyer (see Appendix 1 in the Catalogue).

"Contractual Description" the only Description of the Lot (being that part of the Entry about the Lot in the Catalogue which is in bold letters, any photograph (except for the colour) and the contents of any Condition Report) to which the Seller undertakes in the Contract of Sale the Lot corresponds.

"Description" any statement or representation in any way descriptive of the *Lot*, including any statement or representation relating to its authorship, attribution, condition, provenance, authenticity, style, period, age, suitability, quality, origin, value, estimated selling price (including the *Hammer Price*)

"Entry" a written statement in the *Catalogue* identifying the *Lot* and its *Lot* number which may contain a *Description* and illustration(s) relating to the *Lot*.

"Estimate" a statement of our opinion of the range within which the hammer is likely to fall.

"Expenses" charges and Expenses paid or payable by Bonhams in respect of the Lot including legal Expenses, banking charges and Expenses incurred as a result of an electronic transfer of money, charges and Expenses for loss and damage cover, insurance, Catalogue and other reproductions and illustrations, any customs duties, advertising, packing or shipping costs, reproductions rights' fees, taxes, levies, costs of testing, searches or enquiries, preparation of the Lot for Sale, storage charges, removal charges, removal charges or costs of collection from the Seller as the Seller's agents or from a defaulting Buyer, plus VAT if applicable.

"Forgery" an imitation intended by the maker or any other person to deceive as to authorship, attribution, origin, authenticity, style, date, age, period, provenance, culture, source or composition, which at the date of the Sale had a value materially less than it would have had if the Lot had not been such an imitation, and which is not stated to be such an imitation in any description of the Lot. A Lot will not be a Forgery by reason of any damage to, and/or restoration and/or modification work (including repainting or over painting) having been carried out on the Lot, where that damage, restoration or modification work (as the case may be) does not substantially affect the identity of the Lot as one conforming to the Description of the Lot.

"Guarantee" the obligation undertaken personally by Bonhams to the Buyer in respect of any Forgery and, in the case of specialist Stamp Sales and/or specialist Book Sales, a Lot made up of a Stamp or Stamps or a Book or Books as set out in the Buyer's Agreement.

"Hammer Price" the price in the currency in which the Sale is conducted at which a Lot is knocked down by the Auctioneer. "Loss and Damage Warranty" means the warranty described in paragraph 8.2 of the Conditions of Business.

"Loss and Damage Warranty Fee" means the fee described in paragraph 8.2.3 of the Conditions of Business.

"Lot" any item consigned to Bonhams with a view to its Sale at auction or by private treaty (and reference to any Lot will include, unless the context otherwise requires, reference to individual items comprised in a group of two or more items offered for Sale as one Lot).

"Motoring Catalogue Fee" a fee payable by the Seller to Bonhams in consideration of the additional work undertaken by Bonhams in respect of the cataloguing of motor vehicles and in respect of the promotion of Sales of motor vehicles.

"New Bond Street" means Bonhams' saleroom at 101 New Bond Street, London W1S 1SR.

"Notional Charges" the amount of Commission and VAT which would have been payable if the Lot had been sold at the Notional Price.

"Notional Fee" the sum on which the Consignment Fee payable to Bonhams by the Seller is based and which is calculated according to the formula set out in the Conditions of Business

"Notional Price" the latest in time of the average of the high and low *Estimates* given by us to you or stated in the *Catalogue* or, if no such *Estimates* have been given or stated, the *Reserve* applicable to the *Lot*.

"Notice to Bidders" the notice printed at the back or front of our Catalogues.

"Purchase Price" the aggregate of the Hammer Price and VAT on the Hammer Price (where applicable), the Buyer's Premium and VAT on the Buyer's Premium and any Expenses.

"Reserve" the minimum price at which a *Lot* may be sold (whether at auction or by private treaty).

"Sale" the auction Sale at which a Lot is to be offered for Sale by Rophams

"Sale Proceeds" the net amount due to the Seller from the Sale of a Lot, being the Hammer Price less the Commission, any VAT chargeable thereon, Expenses and any other amount due to us in whatever capacity and howsoever arising.

"Seller" the person who offers the Lot for Sale named on the Contract Form. Where the person so named identifies on the form another person as acting as his agent, or where the person named on the Contract Form acts as an agent for a principal (whether such agency is disclosed to Bonhams or not), "Seller" includes both the agent and the principal who shall be jointly and severally liable as such. "Standard Examination" a visual examination of a *Lot* by a non-specialist member of *Bonhams'* staff.

"Storage Contract" means the contract described in paragraph 8.3.3 of the Conditions of Business or paragraph 4.4 of the *Buver's Agreement* (as appropriate).

"Storage Contractor" means the company identified as such in the *Catalogue*.

"Terrorism" means any act or threatened act of terrorism, whether any person is acting alone or on behalf of or in connection with any organisation(s) and/or government(s), committed for political, religious or ideological or similar purposes including, but not limited to, the intention to influence any government and/or put the public or any section of the public into fear.

"Trust Account" the bank account of Bonhams into which all sums received in respect of the Purchase Price of any Lot will be paid, such account to be a distinct and separate account to Bonhams' normal business bank account.

"VAT" value added tax at the prevailing rate at the date of the Sale in the United Kingdom.

"Website" Bonhams Website at www.bonhams.com
"Withdrawal Notice" the Seller's written notice to Bonhams
revoking Bonhams' instructions to sell a Lot.

"Without Reserve" where there is no minimum price at which a *Lot* may be sold (whether at auction or by private treaty).

GLOSSARY

The following expressions have specific legal meanings with which you may not be familiar. The following glossary is intended to give you an understanding of those expressions but is not intended to limit their legal meanings:

"artist's resale right": the right of the creator of a work of art to receive a payment on Sales of that work subsequent to the original Sale of that work by the creator of it as set out in the Artists Resale Right Regulations 2006.

"bailee": a person to whom goods are entrusted.
"indemnity": an obligation to put the person who has the
benefit of the indemnity in the same position in which he would
have been, had the circumstances giving rise to the indemnity
not arisen and the expression "indemnify" is construed
accordinaly.

"interpleader proceedings": proceedings in the Courts to determine ownership or rights over a *Lot*.

"knocked down": when a *Lot* is sold to a *Bidder,* indicated by the fall of the hammer at the *Sale.*

"lien": a right for the person who has possession of the ${\it Lot}$ to retain possession of it.

"risk": the possibility that a Lot may be lost, damaged, destroyed, stolen, or deteriorate in condition or value. "title": the legal and equitable right to the ownership of a Lot.

"tort": a legal wrong done to someone to whom the wrong doer has a duty of care.

SALE OF GOODS ACT 1979

The following is an extract from the Sale of Goods Act 1979:

"Section 12 Implied terms about title, etc

- (1) In a contract of sale, other than one to which subsection (3) below applies, there is an implied term on the part of the seller that in the case of a sale he has a right to sell the goods, and in the case of an agreement to sell he will have such a right at the time when the property is to pass.
- (2) In a contract of sale, other than one to which subsection(3) below applies, there is also an implied term that-
 - (a) the goods are free, and will remain free until the time when the property is to pass, from any charge or encumbrance not disclosed or known to the buyer before the contract is made, and
 - (b) the buyer will enjoy quiet possession of the goods except in so far as it may be disturbed by the owner or other person entitled to the benefit of any charge or encumbrance so disclosed or known.
- (3) This subsection applies to a contract of sale in the case of which there appears from the contract or is to be inferred from its circumstances an intention that the seller should transfer only such title as he or a third person may have.
- (4) In a contract to which subsection (3) above applies there is an implied term that all charges or encumbrances known to the seller and not known to the buyer have been disclosed to the buyer before the contract is made.
- (5) In a contract to which subsection (3) above applies there is also an implied term that none of the following will disturb the buyer's quiet possession of the goods, namely:
 - (a) the seller;
 - in a case where the parties to the contract intend that the seller should transfer only such title as a third person may have, that person;
 - (c) anyone claiming through or under the seller or that third person otherwise than under a charge or encumbrance disclosed or known to the buyer before the contract is made.
- (5A) As regards England and Wales and Northern Ireland, the term implied by subsection (1) above is a condition and the terms implied by subsections (2), (4) and (5) above are warranties."
