DIRECTOR'S FOREWORD

As the long, hot summer comes to an end we are pleased to direct your attention to the offerings in our September 21 Fine Books and Manuscripts auction. Coming on the heels of our Exploration and Travel sale on the 20th, the auction represents the second of two days of stellar offerings by the Bonhams Book Department.

The sale opens with a small but solid section of Early Printed Books and Manuscripts, highlighted by an intriguing rarity—an Autograph Letter Signed of Benvenuto Cellini. The addressee is a priest who, according to Cellini's autobiography, tried to poison the artist following a business transaction; this heated and threatening letter pertains to the purchase of a farm. The following section of Art, Illustration, and Plate Books includes a copy of Elliot's elephant folio Birds of North America and Henry Sander's gorgeous monograph on orchids, among other natural history offerings. The section also includes the work of Western artist Charles Marion Russell, comprising two original illustrations and a signed photograph.

An especially strong Literature section includes several landmark works of poetry. Among these is a very fine copy of one of the high spots-often cited as the starting point - of American literature, a first edition of Walt Whitman's Leaves of Grass (1855). Published by the author using type that he himself helped to set, this copy is in the original green cloth binding and features contemporary provenance. Among the other books of poems are a first edition of Eliot's The Waste Land (1922); a first edition of Keats' first book, Poems (1817); and the scarce first edition, printed in Italy, of Shelley's Adonais, his elegy on the death of Keats. Making the section even more robust are a bright first edition in the original cloth of Dickens' Great Expectations; an uncut first edition of Johnson's Dictionary: and a lengthy Jack London letter written from the south seas, on the economics of writing books, boxing with sailors, and adventuring through Central America.

The Americana section includes several items of great importance, including a letter by the patriot and Bunker Hill martyr Joseph Warren, written just wo weeks before Bunker Hill to the New York Congress, begging them to send gunpowder. Also of note are a rare broadside signed by Thomas Jefferson, being the controversial Fugitive

Slave Act of 1793; the first complete and official notice of the Louisiana Purchase; the famed John Reed map of Philadelphia, printed on the eve of the Revolution; several rare Revolutionary War newspapers; and an Autograph Letter of George Washington. Another great rarity is a manuscript Civil War map of Jedidiah Hotchkiss, the chief Confederate mapmaker. Americana is followed by a fortyplus lot session of California Gold Rush material.

Lot 1143 is a major archive central to the trial of the 19th century- the so-called "Dreyfus Affair," in which a Jewish French Army officer was wrongfully accused and convicted of espionage, a gross miscarriage of justice which captured the world's attention. The archive is comprised of a letter from the young officer himself. Alfred Dreyfus, written from a prison way-station just after his conviction, proclaiming his innocence and asking to be sent to a remote desert island; an Autograph Manuscript Signed of Émile Zola, one of the foremost public critics of the trial, being the second in a series of three essays on the Affair, which culminated with Zola's daring the French Government to bring him to trial and the subsequent exposure in court of crucial details suppressed in the Dreyfus trial; and finally an Autograph Letter Signed of Ferdinand Esterhazy-the Hungarian officer who actually committed the crime of which Drevfus was convicted possibly written to his legal counsel, and relating to his own trial and information he wishes to make public.

Continuing with important French history, among the most curious manuscripts to have crossed our block is the four page autobiographical working manuscript from Clisson et Eugénie, Napoleon Bonaparte's only work of fiction, extensively revised and corrected in Napoleon's hand. The auction will be held in our Madison Avenue sale room in New York, with a full public preview at our San Francisco galleries to be held September 9-11. We hope to see you at one or other of the locations. Please don't hesitate to reach out to any member of the department with questions.

CELLINI TO HIS BUSINESS ASSOCIATE AND WOULD BE ASSASSIN. In part II, chapters CII-CX of the Vita, Cellini describes his dealings with "a certain rascal from Vecchio called Piermaria d'Anterigoli and surnamed Lo Sbietta" and "his brother Ser Filippo," which entailed the purchase of a farm from the brothers for the term of his natural life, their subsequent attempt to poison Cellini at a dinner, and, after Cellini's unlikely survival, their failure to honor the terms of the sale and the ensuing arbitration. Cellini complains bitterly of his treatment by the brothers, laments the loss of several pieces of business as well as a year of his life spent recovering, but ends the account by noting that nevertheless "in the December of 1566 following, I made another blunder. I bought half of the farm Del Poggio from them, or rather from Sbietta, for two hundred crowns … I did this for the best; but I should have to dilate too long upon the topic were I to enter into all the rascalities they practiced on me. Therefore, I refer my cause entirely to God, knowing that He hath ever defended me from those who sought to do me mischief" (Vita part II, CX).

The present, heated letter to Filippo regards the completion of this latter transaction. Cellini informs Filippo that a reply to his most recent inquiry has already been sent, demands the return of a sum of money, and threatens to expose the brothers' rascality. Letters in the hand of Cellini are very rare on the market, with only the present example and one other recorded in the auction records of ABPC and RareBookHub in the last fifty years. **\$40,000 - 60,000**

It is the dictionary itself which justifies Noah Webster's statement that 'Johnson's writings had, in philology, the effect which Newton's discoveries had in mathematics'. Johnson introduced into English lexicography principles which had already been accepted in Europe but were quite novel in mid-eighteenth-century England. He codified the spelling of English words; he gave full and lucid definitions of their meanings (often entertainingly coloured by his High Church and Tory propensities); and he adduced extensive and apt illustrations from a wide range of authoritative writers ... but despite the progress made during the past two centuries in historical and comparative philology, Johnson's book may still be consulted for instruction as well as pleasure" (PMM). Indeed, the labor and genius of Johnson's production still awes us today. 

A fantastic London letter, full of braggadocio and commenting without sentimentality on the economics of authorship, written to London's good friend, the Englishman, writer and socialist Herman "Jim" Whitaker (1867-1919). Written from the tramp steamer *Tymeric* just off of Pitcairn Island, the letter reads, in part:

Your dandy long letter of February 14th., came to hand shortly before we left Australia & I can't begin to tell you how I appreciated it. You & George [Sterling] are my best correspondents. It is only from the letters of you two that I get a good idea of how the world wags at home. I thought this was a good chance to get experience on board a tramp steamer, so started home the long way around. Shall run up to Quito, see a bull-fight, look around, and hurry along home.... Gee! that's a crackerjack- "The Planter," 168000 words! I swear, Jim, you're making a mistake. Your stuff is all readable, ever[y] line of it, & 168,000 words for \$1.08 (department store) is too full a measure. You ought to have dropped that into two books. They would have earned you at least twice as much, and you would have felt that you had done twice as much. Look at me: Call of the Wild 30,000 The Game 15,000 Before Adam 40,000 White Fang 70,000 no collection of short stories more than 50,000 "Adventure" 70,000

I was running over my stuff yesterday not yet published in book-form. To show you that I, too, have not been idle, I found that when I had completed present short story & written one more short story that I shall have 9 books to be published. Most of them are collections, & one of them is "Martin Eden" which doesn't go on the market till this fall. All told, 28 books, but they are not 168,000-word books. You'd better reform, Jim, & give less generous measure to your public. I agree with you heartily about [Sinclair] Lewis in all you say. Two things he lacks: (1) imagination in style; (2) biology in its relation to sociology....

I'm boxing every day with the three mates of the Tymeric. Black eyes & bloody noses all the time. We're going at it hard, I can tell you. I took the third clean off his feet yesterday with a left hook. All I can say, despite two game thumbs and a dozen face-bruises, that I am the least marked up of any of them. They are all husky young English fellows and they [are] not afraid of taking punishment— nor are they afraid to give it. There isn't a muscle in my body that isn't aching and sore...."



FIRST EDITION, FIRST STATE BINDING, VERY FINE COPY WITH EARLY PROVENANCE. The printing and binding of the first edition of *Leaves of Grass* is fabled in poetic history. It was self-published by Whitman and the type partially hand-set by the poet himself for printing in the Brooklyn Heights shop of Andrew Rome (assisted by his brother, Tom). In all, 795 copies were produced, of which only the first and most expensive were bound in cloth with gilt-rules, all edges gilt and marbled endpapers, as here. As production continued and Whitman's money ran tight, the bindings became progressively less elaborate. Arguably, as the hand-set type jostled and occasionally fell off the hand-inked, iron-bed press, each copy is unique. The present copy has none of the slipped type as noted in *BAL*, but does have Whitman's stop-press correction to reset a whole line: "And the day and night are for you and me and all."

The three arrived in New Orleans in January of 1836 and soon solicited loans of \$250,000 before heading to Washington to plead their cause before Congress.

In order to raise loans, the commissioners used Texas' vast lands as collateral. The present document guarantees Robert Triplett's investment, giving him the opportunity to buy land in Texas at 50 cents an acre.







A rare and interesting pamphlet proposing a way to use the labor of the freed negro slaves from the South, even as the Civil War waged on to its conclusion. It is written in the form of a letter to the Secretary of the Treasury, suggesting that in view of the abolition of slavery (in January 1863), there be set up a cotton project in the abandoned lands lying on the Mississippi, under the supervision of a Govt Agent, to extend from New Orleans northwards through the rebel states.

The unknown author proposed that they find 100 white loyal citizens and giving each 10 negroes as workers, to be paid \$5 a month. The project was to cover 3,000 acres as a start and to grow as fast as it could, the population of loyal citizens and negro workers to be overseen by a supervising Govt Agent, and doctors and schools be made available to the workforce. This was seen as a way of using the labor of the many freed negroes, who were to be considered as a ward of the Government, who would look after them. It appears that only one copy is known among US institutional libraries, namely at the Huntington (352491). **\$1,000 - 1,500**



RARE CONFEDERATE MANUSCRIPT MAP MADE UNDER THE DIRECTION OF AND APPROVED BY JEDEDIAH HOTCHKISS, topographical engineer of the Second Corps, Army of Northern Virginia—the most celebrated Confederate mapmaker. The highly detailed regional map of Virginia was made in the final days of the Battle of Spotsylvania, which lasted from May 8 through May 21 and resulted in more casualties than any other battle in Grant's Overland Campaign. In his journal entry for May 19th, the day he examined and initialed the present map, Hotchkiss wrote "I spent most of the day in camp copying maps; had all at work copying reductions of portions of Va." (Make Me a Map of the Valley p 205). The map includes portions of Henrico, Hanover, and Caroline counties, with the Confederate capital of Richmond at its southernmost point, and would have been useful to commanders in the immediate aftermath of Spotsylvania — the north-central portion of the map includes the region around Hanover Junction, where the Battle of North Anna began on May 23, just four days after the map was drawn.

A New Yorker by birth, Hotchkiss established himself as a schoolmaster in Virginia in the late 1840s, in his spare time working as a mining geologist and training himself as a cartographer. At the outbreak of Civil War he offered his services as mapmaker to the Confederate forces, and eventually became attached to General Stonewall Jackson. Hotchkiss' detailed maps of the Shenandoah Valley—made under Jackson's orders—were the first such maps of the area created, and were instrumental to Jackson's victories in the Valley Campaign of 1862. Hotchkiss continued to make maps for the duration of the war, often working directly for Robert E. Lee, and most of the Confederate maps included in the U.S. War Department's official record of the war were Hotchkiss maps.

Most Hotchkiss maps have long since found their way into institutional collections, and examples on the market are very rare: we find only one other war-date map attributed to Hotchkiss at auction in the last forty years. **\$8,000 - 12,000**



JEFFERSON SIGNS THE 1793 FUGITIVE SLAVE ACT.

During the Constitutional Convention, the founding fathers struggled mightily over the issue of slavery, leading to the famous "three-fifths" compromise, among others. The Constitution also held that free states cannot protect escaped slaves (Article IV, Section 2), and that instead they must be "delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due." In practice, however, there was no mechanism to enforce this provision until Congress passed the Fugitive Slave Act of 1793, making it Federal crime to assist an escaping slave and establishing the method by which escaped slaves could be seized and returned to their owners.

The Fugitive Slave Act of 1793 was extremely unpopular in Northern states, which actively resisted its enforcement and passed measures to combat it known as "personal liberty laws." These laws mandated a jury trial before slaves could be returned, or forbade the use of local jails to hold fugitives. In response, Congress passed a second Fugitive Slave Act in 1850, a more draconian version of the 1793 act, which, among other things, penalized officials who did not arrest an alleged runaway slave, and required officials to arrest anyone suspected of being a runaway slave. \$50,000 - 80,000







Convinced his family had been deprived of land that was theirs by right of being a "first purchaser," John Reed, a young merchant in Philadelphia before the Revolution, created this map and accompanying book to press his case. Reed's argument was that each original purchaser of a lot in the original township of Philadelphia was also given an additional plot of land outside the city, called a "liberty," given freely to be used as farm or recreational land. Feeling that Penn had in fact reneged on the original offers and sold it to others, Reed carefully combed through the city records to produce this map which records who the original owners and "those who took up the land."

The resulting map and book, both printed in 1774, did not help Reed win his case, but do provide a detailed look at the city of Philadelphia on the eve of the Revolution. Reed's map records the holdings and plots the locations of each of William Penn's first purchasers, including that region north of the city. FRONT-PAGE PRINTING OF THE ARTICLES OF CONFEDERATION, A COPY OWNED BY AMERICAN REVOLUTIONARY WAR GENERAL, LORD STIRLING. The Articles of Confederation take up the entire front page and are printed in full, continuing through the first column of the second page.

Officially the "Articles of Confederation and perpetual Union between the States...," this document served as the first constitution of the United States of America. The Second Continental Congress approved the text in late 1777 and the present issue was published by order of the General Assembly of New Jersey for consideration and ratification. North Carolina had ratified on April 5, 1778 but New Jersey did not ratify until November 19, 1778. Maryland was the 13th to ratify in February, 1781. This issue is of particular note as it was owned by Lord Stirling, Brigadier General and one of George Washington's most trusted subordinates. Stirling was headquartered at Valley Forge, PA until early 1778 and a few months after the date of this paper would participate in the Battle of Monmouth.

Revolutionary War newspapers with both such important content and provenance are extremely rare. As implied by the contemporary docketing, Lord Stirling must have made a special effort to preserve this particular paper while campaigning. **\$7,000 - 10,000**

AMERICA'S FIRST MAJOR NAVAL VICTORY: JOHN PAUL JONES' FAMOUS TRIUMPH OVER THE SERAPIS. This is the battle in which Jones is thought to have uttered the words, "I have not yet begun to fight" in reply to a premature demand for surrender from the Captain of the H.M.S. Serapis.

Contrary to this, however, the detailed report on p 2 specifies that when the British Captain called to Jones to strike his colors, "The intrepid American answered, 'Sink me if you can. If I must go to the Devil, I had rather strike to him than to you."

This is an early paper to begin the fear-mongering that helped Jones' name go down in history. It refers to the flight of citizens of Scarborough because Jones was cannonading the city and spreading so "universal a terror." Also that he fought in the Battle of Flamborough Head "in sailer's frock and trousers, with a large girdle round his waste, in which twelve pistols, and a large cutlass in his hand. The sailors say they saw him blow out the brains of seventeen of his men, for abandoning their posts.'

The first paper has a nearly full-column report of the discovery of Arnold's connivance to deliver West Point in exchange for British gold, a "hasty report ... of this tragical affair." Arnold fled without his wife and infant son and later wrote to Washington to claim his wife's and other of his friends' ignorance of the doubledealing. The coverage of the plot's discovery is sensational, steeped in shock and outrage: in part, "About the time of his Excellency's [George Washington's] arrival at the fort, a most horrid plot was discovered, the infamous General Arnold at the head of it; who, it is supposed, has been corrupted by the influence of British GOLD, having agreed to deliver up the fort at West-Point, and gave it to a spy, Major John Andre ... Arnold hearing of General Washington's approach, seemed greatly confused, called for his horse, and rode immediately to the landing, where he ordered a barge to set off with him, who carried him on board the Vulture, where he now remains: 'Tis said he sent a letter to General Washington, to assure him, that neither his wife nor Aids, were in the secret of his nefarious conduct." That is the emotional letter which is printed in the second paper. Despite Arnold's protestations and his wife's well-known hysterics at Washington's approach, later evidence strongly suggests it was Arnold's young and ambitious wife who egged him on. \$5,000 - 7,000

The reaction was swift and intense, and "no taxation without representation" became a rallying cry for independence. Just a year later, the act was repealed, and the Governor of Connecticut convened a committee to compose a letter of thanks to the King for having done so. 

TWO WEEKS BEFORE HIS MARTYRDOM AT THE BATTLE OF BUNKER HILL, WARREN WRITES TO THE NEW YORK CONGRESS TO BEG FOR GUNPOWDER. This letter is nearly identical to one sent the same day to the Continental Congress except a few lines, e.g. the ardent appeal to the "common cause" and an anticipation to the objection that the New Yorkers have not enough gunpowder themselves. This is easily among the most emotive and momentous Bunker Hill letters in private hands. The patriots are desperate for supplies to keep their cause alive and urging extreme secrecy if anything can be sent. The Congress of New York replied on June 8 that they were very sorry, had thought Massachusetts was wellsupplied, could procure nothing and recommended applying to Philadelphia instead. Just a few days after this letter was received in Cambridge, the Massachusetts command commissioned Warren as a major general and decided to launch the preemptive attack on General Gage's forces that was the Battle of Bunker Hill. Joseph Warren fell at that Battle and his corpse was notoriously abused, ensuring his status as martyr. This letter is signed by Artemas Ward, Joseph Warren and Moses Gill, but it was Joseph Warren among these men who was known for his incendiary rhetoric and we suspect him of being the principal author. *Provenance:* Sotheby's New York, May 22, 1990, lot 124.

Single issues or runs of the Olio are exceeding scarce on the market, and among institutional holdings only the run at the AAS equals the present collection.

The Congressional act creating Washington D.C. was passed in 1790, the city surveyed in 1791-92, and the first session of Congress held there in November 1800, less than two years before the first number of the Olio appeared. In his proposal for the paper Parks declared that the paper would be "unequivocally Federal!" (Early American Newspapers); in his address to the readers on page 5 of the first number, he further writes that the editors "promise what they ought and will adhere to-a strict regard to truth. Persuaded that the People of America want only correct information to produce an uniformity of sentiment; believing the principles to which they avow themselves friendly can stand the test of truth, they cannot desire its suppression; nay, they look forward to that period when experience shall decide the present confliction in political opinion, as the jubilee of federalism." January of 1780 was a bitter month for Washington in camp at Morristown. The winter was fierce and supplies were dwindling. Reluctant to seize property from civilians, Washington exhausted every other option to stretch his thin supplies, including, as we see in this letter, encouraging his generals to discharge any soldier whose term of service has expired. In full:

"As it will contribute in some degree to relieve our distress on the subject of provisions, I am to desire that you will discharge all the men in the Brigade under your command whose enlistments & terms of service will clearly expire by the last of this month. In conducting the matter you will be pleased to call on the commanding officers of regiments to prevent discharges of any not coming within the above description."

While Washington's belt-tightening is admirable, he was ultimately forced to require that the colony of New Jersey provide supplies, preferably voluntarily, but by force if necessary. He needn't have worried: the people of New Jersey oversubscribed their portion. **\$5,000 - 7,000**



Peter Zenger's trial on charges of libel and his successful defense by Andrew Hamilton were key to the concept of freedom of speech in America. He reports on his July 1848 visit of San Francisco: "On landing in San Francisco, I must confess, I was somewhat disappointed in the appearance of the town. As a city, it did not fill up that 'beau ideal' which I had pictured in my imagination" (p 74). After a trip to Stockton, a few weeks visit to the mines, of which Damon complains about the language and drinking habits of the miners, and to Sacramento, he returns to San Francisco several weeks later to find the city already much expanded: "The city had nearly doubled during the month I was absent in the interior. Stores and dwelling-houses had gone up in every part of the town. During the month of July, many thousands of emigrants had arrived" (p 90). As the object was their sale, all were more or less highly colored, and occasional flashes of intelligence veiled the poverty of their limitations ... This modest little pamphlet seems a characteristic piece of argonaut swagger and excitement. The printer had actually to set his type amidst the rolling ocean waves, suffering the swaying of the ship to occasionally scatter the contents of his composing stick to the floor. The present copy is all that he printed from departure to the arrival of the *Henry Lee* in Rio at the end of April, 1849. In Rio he met E.A. Upton and made this presentation. The recipient was almost undoubtedly Eugene Allen Upton, a fellow 49'er and printer aboard another ship (the *San Francisco Directory* of 1867 records his residence and occupation). As the voyage continued, Hall continued to print and the final work contained 88 pages.

The authorship of this journal is generally ascribed to the printer, J. Linville Hall. However, Vail cites an article in the June 2, 1849 *Supplement* to the *Hartford Courant* which implies that the author was George G. Webster, a Hartford lawyer and shipmate. Vail concludes, "It seems probable that the printed account was based on Webster's day-by-day *Journal* with additions by the printer, the Captain and others." 
EMIGRANTS. Second edition, published the year after the first. No copies of the first edition appear in Americana Exchange or ABPC. Schmölder traversed North America from 1843-46 before returning to his native Germany to publish the present guidebook. The first volume deals in large part with California. "Schmölder believed that the West offered the best opportunities for the German emigrants, and for this reason, his publication influenced the German gold seeker" (Kurutz).

Sources vary as to which maps and plates belong with which edition. Wagner-Camp assigns the maps in volume 1 to the second edition, while Howes assigns them to the first edition and notes that they are usually lacking in the second. Howes also notes that the map in vol 2 is usually replaced by a view of St. Louis, as in this copy. The map present in this copy is "Die vereinigten Staaten von Nord-Amerika und Mexico," and properly belongs with volume 1, but in this copy is bound with volume 2. 
JOHN SUTTER'S ACCOUNT TO FREMONT FOR THE USE OF SUTTER'S FORT (FORT SACRAMENTO) DURING THE ANNEXATION OF CALIFORNIA. This is a very important letter written less than a year before the discovery of gold at Sutter's mill, directly relating to the American occupation of California, and furthermore referencing the Donner tragedy.

In part: "Dear Sir, / By Capt Kern who leaves today for Monterey I take the liberty of sending you the annexed a/c against the U.S. Fort for rent of Fort Sacramento and dwelling houses for use of the families of the U.S. Volunteers. I bring it up to the time of the receipt of the letter of Capt J.B. Hull, ordering the discharge of the Garrison although the Soldiers have been in active service under Capt Kern and Lieut. Woodworth U.S.N. some one month & half since and in fact the Garrison was not discharged untill the 18th of April and the dwellings are still occupied by the Volunteer and emigrant families. Can I ask you to use y[our] influence to have the a/c [?] or do me the favour of informing me to whom to apply for the adjustment of said a/c.

I take the liberty of writing you on the subject as you are the only officer of the Govt

that knows anything about the value of the place...." John C. Fremont first saw Sutter's Fort in 1844 on his first expedition to California. Against the advice of the Washoe Indians he crossed the Sierras at Carson's pass in midwinter and the party arrived at Sutter's in March of 1844 and spent a month recuperating. He was there again towards the end of 1845 and stayed another month. When Fremont next returned it was mid-July in 1846. He raised the American flag and renamed the adobe structure "Fort Sacramento," leaving Edward Kern in command. By the time Sutter apologetically presents this bill, California was firmly in American hands. The "emigrant families" to which Sutter refers are some remnants of the Donner party who had been stranded near Truckee during the preceding winter. The rescue expeditions were taking place from Sutter's fort as this letter was written, and the last survivor reached there on April 29.



1143 THE DREYFUS AFFAIR & ÉMILE ZOLA. A GROUP OF LETTERS AND MANUSCRIPTS CENTRAL TO THE TRIAL OF THE 19TH CENTURY.

The Dreyfus Affair, the sordid tale of espionage and its cover up that fascinated France and the world at the end of the 19th century, was in many ways the culmination of renewed and growing nationalism and anti-Semitic sentiment in France in the aftermath of the Franco-Prussian war of 1870. It still stands as a fascinating cultural moment, an epic battle of good versus evil, the ultimate triumph of truth and fairness over corruption and prejudice. Alfred Dreyfus was born in Alsace, lived through the area's annexation by Germany, and grew up to pursue a career in the military, where he won a coveted appointment to the French War College. After graduating near the top of his class, he was appointed as a trainee at Army Headquarters. In the early 1890s, however, Headquarters was a bastion of right-wing antisemitism, and Dreyfus soon found himself the victim of prejudice, as when an officer unjustly inserted a negative report in his file and that of another young Jewish officer. In October of 1894, Dreyfus was accused of espionage and arrested based on a single piece of evidence: a bordereau, or note, discovered by a French operative working as a cleaning lady in the German Embassy, listing the specs of the newest French artillery piece, the Modèle 1890 120-mm Baguet howitzer. Officially, Drevfus was targeted because he was an artillery officer, and because his handwriting was similar to that in the bordereau, thin evidence indeed. Though many were thrilled to be able to railroad a Jewish officer, upon reflection, cooler heads in the military realized that conviction in open court would be difficult. A retraction, however, would cause even bigger headaches, as no one wanted to be seen defending or covering up for a Jewish officer. Dreyfus was thus hurriedly tried and convicted, the prosecutors preparing a "secret dossier" that was illegally submitted to the tribunal which Dreyfus was not allowed to see or respond to. Worse, prosecutors knew who the real spy was: they had already identified the handwriting of the bordereau as that of Hungarian officer Major Ferdinand Walsin Esterhazy, a dissolute gambler with chronic money troubles who had likely sold secrets as a way to generate cash.

After his conviction, Dreyfus was packed off to Devil's Island, where he languished for four years in solitude, seeking solace from literature and letters, and occasionally pleading his cause with French officials. Dreyfus' brother Matthieu lobbied hard for an investigation into the case, and soon the Dreyfus Affair became a *cause célèbre* of the French and Jewish intelligentsia. As the chorus of complaint grew louder, Esterhazy demanded a court martial. This trial, also conducted in secrecy, fascinated the country, and the Major's acquittal inspired Émile Zola to write his famous condemnation of the trial and the French Military, *J'Accuse*, published on January 13, 1898.

In *J'Accuse*, Zola baited the French government into charging him with criminal libel, and at his own trial, many of the details that had been hidden during the Dreyfus and Esterhazy trials were presented. Zola was eventually convicted, fled the country, and remained abroad until a later, more liberal government pardoned him. Meanwhile, Dreyfus was plucked from Devil's Island and returned to France for a new trial, in which, oddly, he was convicted again, but immediately pardoned. In the coming years he was reinstated in the military, and eventually was awarded the Légion d'honneur.

This remarkable lot contains material from the major players in the Dreyfus affair: Dreyfus himself, Émile Zola, and the spy Esterhazy, as follows:

DREYFUS, ALFRED. 1859-1935. Autograph Letter Signed ("A Dreyfus") in French, 3 pp recto and verso, 8vo (conjoining leaves), Dépôt de Saint-Martin-de-Ré, February 14, 1895, to the Minister of Colonies in Paris, on printed stationery, with integral address leaf, repair at left quadrants of address leaf not affecting text on verso, paper repair to left margin of p 2, overall toning and creasing.

DREYFUS PROCLAIMS HIS INNOCENCE, REQUESTS TO BE SENT AWAY TO A REMOTE DESERT ISLAND. Dreyfus's closed court trial took place December 19-22, 1894. In spite of his vigorous defense, he was convicted and quickly shipped off to Saint-Martin-de-Ré in the Charente Maritime district, where felons were housed before being shipped off to penal colonies. In this poignant letter, Dreyfus writes to the Minister of Colonies (which would have been the recently appointed Émile Chautemps), not only asking for justice, but also desiring to be taken far away from the madness and public attention that had attended his arrest and trial. In part, translated: "I have been condemned for a crime the most infamous that a soldier can commit and I am innocent. / Only the grace that I have solicited, and failing that, I still solicit, would be justice. I ask that one carry out the investigations in order to unmask the monster who is doubly a criminal: who is traitor to his country and who allows his horrible crime to be blamed on an innocent man ... While waiting for those investigations to succeed and my conviction is that they will succeed, because in a country like France basic noble ideas of justice and truth will prevail, an innocent cannot pay indefinitely for a culprit-send me to whatever desert island, but spare the innocent one who suffers martyrdom, horrible moral torture which I see as my lot. I do not deserve it. It does not matter what dungeon, Mister Minister, but spare me the sight of all human beings who see me as a traitor, for a Traitor I am not."

ZOLA'S MANUSCRIPT OF "LETTRE À LA FRANCE," THE ESSAY JUST PRECEDING "J'ACCUSE." At the time of the Dreyfus Affair, Émile Zola was the most famous novelist in France, perhaps the world, and a pioneer of the Naturalism school of literature that emphasized observation and the scientific method in the service of fiction. He was successful and comfortable, but still enough of a radical to be outraged at the injustice suffered by Dreyfus, and what the systemic corruption in government and the military meant for France at large. The essay "J'Accuse" is the most famous of Zola's writings on the Dreyfus Affair, but it is actually the third of three pivotal essays he wrote during late 1897-early 1898. The first, *Lettre à la jeunesse*, was published in 1897; the second piece in the trilogy, "Lettre à la France," published January 6, 1896, is the manuscript offered here. In this piece, written as the Esterhazy trial got underway, Zola argues forcefully against the closed proceedings, and the need for transparency. A week later, after Esterhazy's acquittal, he would publish "J'Accuse," an open letter to the French President, in which he famously dared officials to charge him with criminal libel.

Though the real villains of the Dreyfus Affair are the cowardly military officials who railroaded an innocent man, the actual spy was Hungarian officer Major Esterhazy. After evidence of his guilt became public, Esterhazy himself demanded a court martial, which again was held in closed court, and was acquitted, a verdict which set off riots in Paris and inspired Zola's "J'Accuse."

Esterhazy writes from London not long after he fled France in the wake of his fellow conspirator Colonel Henry's arrest and suicide. His correspondent is possibly his legal counsel or someone who is otherwise involved in helping rehabilitate his image, given the way Esterhazy describes and spins the evidence in his case. OF course, Esterhazy continues to maintain his innocence in these pages, even though two months earlier he had admitted to writing the bordereau to a French newspaper. (He claimed it had been done as part of a counter-espionage plot with the knowledge and permission of his superiors.) In a post-script to the letter, he continues to spin his alibis: "Despite the efforts of the Dreyfusards, I believe that one begins to discover the Russian connection, that is the key point of the question ... I will possibly have some serious things to say during the course of the debates.... In the memorandum, Esterhazy gives the "History of the petit bleu," the telegram sent to Esterhazy by the German military attache, which enabled Picquart to identify Esterhazy as the author of the bordereau. In this document he outlines his own alibi, explains the history of the bordereau, explains his connections to the German Embassy and the knowledge of the same by French military officials, followed by a listing of the individual pieces of evidence. \$700,000 - 1,000,000

Einstein writes to his friend Dr. Isidore Held (1876-1947) to arrange an upcoming meeting in the city and to discuss the situation of the German physician Rudolf Ehrmann, at one time Einstein's personal physician. Einstein encloses a letter from Ehrmann (not present) which he characterizes as "short and imprecise," and complains that one cannot see "whether friendly efforts have been unsuccessful, and if so, why the consul saw fit to refuse granting a non-quota visa." He goes on to mention confusion over why "in his letter to Dr. Libman, he wrote that he received a permit for one years' residence in England. But he mentioned nothing of this in his letter to me." Einstein and Held were ultimately successful in helping Ehrmann and his family obtain visas, and they arrived in the United States later that same year.

An Austrian by birth and a physician at Beth Israel Hospital in New York, Held (1876-1947) became friends with Einstein through their efforts to help doctors and other members of the scientific community to emigrate from Nazi Germany and occupied territories. **\$3,000 - 5,000**

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

Einstein writes to his friend Dr. Isidore Held to thank him for sending a "*little book*" apparently about the creation of the United Nations, which had been formulated at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference the previous year and which would officially come into existence in October 1945. Einstein writes that he finds the unidentified book "*not bad, but under the current circumstances psychologically unsuccessful. If indeed in the current climate the chances for the creation of an effective supranational authority are slight, it nevertheless seems to me rather noxious to act journalistically in favor of paralyzing this effort; because if one stops mid-way, then for sure the next world war is assured. This is the case even more so now that modern technical developments bring about increased preventive warfare, in that the surprise attack is exceptionally superior to defense*" (translation).



FINE AUTOBIOGRAPHICAL WORKING MANUSCRIPT FROM CLISSON ET EUGENIE, NAPOLEON'S ONLY WORK OF FICTION, extensively revised and corrected in Napoleon's hand. A large portion of the remaining manuscript is in the Polish National Archives; it was published in 1929 by Simon Askenazy who assumed this missing section was lost. Martin Bresaluer, citing the character of the handwriting, dates this manuscript to between 1785 and 1789 (as does Frederick Masson) but other scholarship on the theme of the novel as a whole puts it around 1795. Sir Christopher Frayling in his notes to the English translation published in 1972 draws a parallel between *Clisson et Eugenie* and Rousseau's *Nouvelle Heloise*.

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Napoleon's resemblance to his hero Clisson is clear. Clisson is a young officer devoted to glory and, after a great victory, temporarily at loose ends. He is both prickly and precipitous: a self-described misanthrope of extreme talent. The episodes described in this manuscript are critical, taking us through his initial attraction to the vivacious Amélie, his antipathy turned to sudden love for Eugénie, their fusing of hearts, marriage, birth of children, and the beginnings of discontent. In part, in translation: "In his new life with Eugénie, Clisson had certainly avenged the injustice of men. Indeed, he barely thought of it any more; it seemed to him like a dream. The world, the people around them, their neighbors had completely forgotten what Clisson had once been. Eugénie and Clisson lived a secluded life, delighting in love, nature, and rustic simplicity. Some thought them mad, others misanthropic, only the poor appreciated and blessed them, which consoled them from the disdain of fools ... Clisson forgot about war and despised his former life when he had lived without Eugénie, without drawing every breath for her. He gave himself up to love and renounced all thought of glory."

The likeliest direct inspiration for *Clisson et Eugénie* is Napoleon's relationship with Eugénie Désirée Clary to whom he was engaged before meeting the older widow Joséphine de Beauharnais. Reading *Clisson et Eugénie* presents one of history's great hypotheticals: What course would Napoleon's life have taken had he honored his more innocent passion for Eugénie?





FIRST EDITION. The 230 letters that Peter the Great, Tsar of All the Russias, wrote to Count Boris Petrovich Sheremetev (1652–1719) from December 5, 1700 to October 9, 1718 were collected by the latter's son, Count Petr Borisovich Sheremetev. Count Boris Sheremetev was commander of the Russian armies in the Great Northern War (1700-1721) during which St. Petersburg was founded from land seized from Sweden. Although he led the Russian Army to the victory over the Swedes at the Battle of Poltava in 1707, the count was never that close with the monarch. For example, when the Russian forces were sorely defeated at Lewenhaupt, the Tsar angrily chastised his commander about his "inadequate training of the dragoons about which I have spoken many times." But he had a change of heart a few days later and wrote Field Marshall Sheremetev; "Do not be sad about the misfortune you have had, for constant success has brought many people to ruin. Forget it, and try to encourage your men." Count Petr built the magnificent palace at Kuskovo, the summer country house and estate of the Sheremetev family. He served Catherine the Great as a senator and the first elected Marshal of the Nobility. He also wrote Zapiska Puteshestviya Grafa Borisa Petrovicha Sheremeteva [Description of the Voyages of Count Boris Petrovich Sheremetev] (1773) about his travels to Cracow, Vienna, Venice, Rome and Malta. \$5,000 - 7,000

FRONT-PAGE NEWS OF THE STORMING OF THE BASTILLE. In part, "In the evening a detachment [of the populace] with two pieces of cannon went to the Bastile, to demand the ammunition deposited there. A flag of truce had been sent before them, which was answered from within: But nevertheless the Governor (the Marguis de Launay) ordered the guard to fire, and several were killed. The populace, enraged at this proceeding, rushed forward to the assault, when the Governor agreed to admit a certain number, on condition that they should not commit any violence. A detachment of about 40 accordingly passed the drawbridge, which was instantly drawn up, and the whole party massacred. This breach of faith, aggravated by so glaring an instance of inhumanity, naturally excited a spirit of revenge and tumult not to be appeased...." The Bastille was accordingly stormed, the Marquis de Launay sentenced and beheaded, his head paraded around on a pike, and four or five prisoners found in the Bastille freed.

If all fees, commissions, premiums, bid price and other sums due to us from the purchaser are not paid promptly as provided in these Conditions of Sale, we reserve the right to impose a finance charge equal to 1.5% per month on all amounts due to us beginning on the 31st day following the sale until payment is received, in addition to other remedies available to us by law.

3. We reserve the right to withdraw any property and to divide and combine lots at any time before such property's auction. Unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale, all bids are per lot as numbered in the catalog and no lots shall be divided or combined for sale.

4. We reserve the right to reject a bid from any bidder, to split any bidding increment, and to advance the bidding in any manner the auctioneer may decide. In the event of any dispute between bidders, or in the event the auctioneer doubts the validity of any bid, the auctioneer shall have sole and final discretion either to determine the successful bidder or to re-offer and resell the article in dispute. No employee or agent of Bonhams is authorized to make on our behalf or on that of the consignor any representation or warranty, oral or written, with respect to any property.

8. All purchased property shall be removed from the premises at which the sale is conducted by the date(s) and time(s) set forth in the "Buyer's Guide" portion of the catalog. If not so removed, daily storage fees will be payable to us by the purchaser as set forth therein. We reserve the right to transfer property not so removed to an offsite warehouse at the purchaser's risk and expense, as set forth in more detail in the "Buyer's Guide." Accounts must be settled in full before property will be released. Packing and handling of purchased lots are the responsibility of the purchaser. Such arbitrator shall be a retired judge or an attorney familiar with commercial law and trained in or qualified by experience in handling arbitrations. Such arbitrator shall make all appropriate disclosures required by law. The arbitrator shall be drawn from a panel of a national arbitration service agreed to by the parties, and shall be selected as follows: (i) If the national arbitration service has specific rules or procedures, those rules or procedures shall be followed; (ii) If the national arbitration service does not have rules or procedures for the selection of an arbitrator, the arbitrator shall be an individual jointly agreed to by the parties. If the parties cannot agree on a national arbitration service, the arbitration shall be conducted by the American Arbitration Association, and the arbitrator shall be selected in accordance with the Rules of the American Arbitration Association. The arbitrator's award shall be in writing and shall set forth findings of fact and legal conclusions.

(c) Unless otherwise agreed to by the parties or provided by the published rules of the national arbitration service:

(i) the arbitration shall occur within 60 days following the selection of the arbitrator;

(ii) the arbitration shall be conducted in the designated location, as follows: (A) in any case in which the subject auction by Bonhams took place or was scheduled to take place in the State of New York or Connecticut or the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, the arbitration shall take place in New York City, New York; (B) in all other cases, the arbitration shall take place in the city of San Francisco, California; and

(iii) discovery and the procedure for the arbitration shall be as follows:

(A) All arbitration proceedings shall be confidential;

(B) The parties shall submit written briefs to the arbitrator no later than 15 days before the arbitration commences;

(C) Discovery, if any, shall be limited as follows: (I) Requests for no more than 10 categories of documents, to be provided to the requesting party within 14 days of written request therefor; (II) No more than two (2) depositions per party, provided however, the deposition(s) are to be completed within one (1) day; (III) Compliance with the above shall be enforced by the arbitrator in accordance with California law;

(D) Each party shall have no longer than eight (8) hours to present its position. The entire hearing before the arbitrator shall not take longer than three (3) consecutive days;

(E) The award shall be made in writing no more than 30 days following the end of the proceeding. Judgment upon the award rendered by the arbitrator may be entered by any court having jurisdiction thereof.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, and except as required by applicable arbitration rules, each party shall bear its own attorneys' fees and costs in connection with the proceedings and shall share equally the fees and expenses of the arbitrator.

Previews

Auction previews are your chance to inspect each lot prior to the auction. 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
