THE HAREWOOD RUM

SOLD ON BEHALF OF LORD HAREWOOD'S CHARITABLE SETTLEMENT, TO BENEFIT THE GERALDINE CONNOR FOUNDATION

The story of the Harewood Rum begins in 1711, when Henry Lascelles, aged just 21, travelled from Yorkshire to the West Indies to pursue the family business of sugar, cotton, tobacco and rum. This was a time when great fortunes were being made by many of Britain's great institutions - the Church, the Royal Family, banks, artistic and educational establishments – as well as individual families, all of it on the backs of the African slave labour that made the sugar trade so profitable. We now see the business he was in as an abhorrent one, but Henry was clearly a dynamic and sophisticated entrepRenéur and within two decades he had become one of the richest men in England. In 1738 he and his oldest son Edwin (born in Barbados, educated at Cambridge and recently returned from his Grand Tour of Europe) acquired the estates of Harewood and Gawthorpe and in 1759 Edwin laid the foundation stone for "the new house at Gawthorpe", Harewood House. Henry was dead by then, killed by his own hand for reasons that are still a mystery. Edwin's relations with his long-suffering steward Samuel Popplewell were often volatile - Edwin was clearly a hard taskmaster with a keen eye on his budget – but, perhaps for that reason, Popplewell's record keeping was always exemplary, not just of the bills for the high value commissions of paintings and furniture (Harewood was the great Thomas Chippendale's biggest commission) but of everyday purchases of food, drink and other household supplies. Popplewell's successors were just as immaculate and the very first record of the Harewood Rum (described as Cane Spirit) is in a cellar book entry dated July 1805 which lists "226 bottles, dark and light 1780" stored in two bins in the cool, damp, vaulted cellars of Harewood House, Bin 9 for the dark, Bin 12 for the light.


The bulk of the Lascelles' West Indian property in 1780 was in Barbados, including the estates that now belong to probably the best-known Bajan rum producer Mount Gay, and it is highly likely the Harewood Rum came from that island. The cellar records show large quantities of fine wines and spirits bought and consumed at that time and subsequently. Harewood House, like most other country houses, entertained lavishly and frequently, but surprisingly the rum was consumed quite sparingly: just one or two bottles a year, with the exception of one day in December 1805 when a startling eight bottles were drunk. By the start of the 20th century the rum seems to have been more or less forgotten, a drink that had gone out of fashion, the bottles still stored under the same bin numbers, but hidden away on a high shelf at the back of the cellar.

That is where they were discovered by chance in 2011 by Mark Lascelles and Andy Langshaw, both wine trade professionals, while conducting an inventory of the cellar, the bottles almost invisible by now under a thick black coating of cobwebs and mould. At first they had no idea what they had found, but, after much speculation and research, they discovered this entry in the 1969 cellar book:

Bin 9: Dark Rum, 28 bottles

Bin 12: Light Rum, 31 bottles

Both the location and the number of bottles matched and Mark and Andy realised they had stumbled on possibly the oldest rum in the world. Sample bottles were painstakingly cleaned and their



contents tested, which established that the two styles are markedly different in colour and taste. Christies were consulted as to their commercial value and, after making a careful photographic record of the untouched bins, the bottles were painstakingly removed from their ancient cocoons of cobwebs and mould and taken on their first journey in more than two hundred years, from the cellars of Harewood House to the sales rooms of Christies in London. The short original corks (branded Oldfield's of York) under the remains of heavy wax capsules, although still mostly sealing the bottles effectively, were deemed too fragile for possible future shipment and so each bottle now has a new tapered cork and plain re-waxed capsule, although a good deal of the original protective cellar mould has been left adhered to the bottles. Each bottle is packed in a plain wooden case with a neck label stating 'The Harewood Rum - 1780. Removed from the cellars of Harewood House, Leeds' and a stopper cork for future re-sealing. Alcoholic content of each bottle may vary as samples taken for analysis at Campden BRI gave an average of 69.38% for the Light and 57.76% for the Dark. From the original remaining stock of 59 bottles, over half were rejected for sale because of failed corks or very low levels resulting in only 28 bottles being considered suitable for recorking and sale at Christie's

A very few bottles will remain in the Harewood House archive. The proceeds from this sale of this unique and historic spirit will once again benefit the Geraldine Connor Foundation, established to continue an inspirational teacher's work with disenfranchised young people in the performing arts. Born in Britain, raised in Trinidad, Geraldine was a major figure in Yorkshire's West Indian community, heavily involved in Carnival and the Steel Band movement, and creator of the legendary and spectacular piece of musical theatre, Carnival Messiah, last performed at Harewood in 2007, the Bicentenary of the Abolition of the Slave Trade. OLD NAVY RUM

The association of rum with the Royal Navy began in 1655 when the British fleet captured the island of Jamaica. With the availability of domestically produced rum, the British changed the daily ration of liquor given to seamen from French brandy to rum. While the ration was originally given neat, or mixed with lime juice, the practice of watering down the rum began around 1740. To help minimize the effect of the alcohol on his sailors, Admiral Edward Vernon directed that the rum ration be watered down before being issued, a mixture which became known as 'grog'. While it is widely believed that the term grog was coined at this time in honour of the cloak Admiral Vernon wore in rough weather, the term has been demonstrated to predate his famous orders, with probable origins in the West Indies, perhaps of African etymology.

The Royal Navy continued to give its sailors a daily rum ration, known as a "tot," until the practice was abolished after July 31, 1970. Today the rum ration is still issued on special occasions by H.M. Queen Elizabeth II. Recently, such occasions have been Royal marriages and birthdays, or other special anniversaries. "Splice the main brace", in the days of the daily ration, meant double rations that day.

Tasting note. What a blockbuster effort! Atypically powerful, one day, the 2009 Haut-Brion may be considered to be the 21st century version of the 1959. It is an extraordinarily complex, concentrated effort made from a blend of 46% Merlot, 40% Cabernet Sauvignon and 14% Cabernet Franc with the highest alcohol ever achieved at this estate, 14.3%. Even richer than the perfect 1989, with similar technical numbers although slightly higher extract and alcohol, it offers up a sensational perfume of subtle burning embers, unsmoked cigar tobacco, charcoal, black raspberries, wet gravel, plums, figs and blueberries. There is so much going on in the aromatics that one almost hesitates to stop smelling it. However, when it hits the palate, it is hardly a letdown. This unctuously textured, full-bodied 2009 possesses low acidity along with stunning extract and remarkable clarity for a wine with a pH close to 4.0. The good news is that there are 10,500 cases of the 2009, one of the most compelling examples of Haut-Brion ever made. It requires a decade of cellaring and should last a half century or more. Readers who have loved the complexity of Haut-Brion should be prepared for a bigger, richer, more massive wine, but one that does not lose any of its prodigious aromatic attractions. 



Tasting note. Last year I gave the 2009 Hermitage Cuvée Cathelin a three-digit rating, but it was nice to be able to re-taste it since it is largely impossible to find in the marketplace. Essentially 100% fruit from Les Bessards, this Cuvée is only made in vintages where it will not compromise the integrity and quality of their standard Hermitage (although there is nothing standard about it). The Cuvée Cathelin sees more oak than its sibling, enjoys 50-75 years of aging potential, and boasts over-the-top blackberry and cassis fruit notes intertwined with pen ink, spring flower, graphite and subtle vanillin characteristics. It is a brilliant wine that almost defies description given its ethereal complexity allied to massive weight, power and richness. Yet, it never comes across as heavy or overlyextracted. Afternoon Session at 2.30pm A SUPERB RANGE OF CHATEAUX DOISY DUBROCA AND CLIMENS SHIPPED DIRECTLY FROM THE PROPERTY

Château Doisy Dubroca has been sold this year to neighbour Denis Dubourdieu and will henceforth be incorporated into the wine of Château Doisy Daene. So, from the 2015 vintage, production of Château Doisy Dubroca ceases altogether.

In addition, there are almost no known bottles in the market, making this offer of former owner Lucien Lurton's decade of stock a unique final opportunity for Sauternes lovers and collectors to acquire some older vintages before the wines become totally extinct.

The notes of our several tastings of the vintages offered (see below) only confirm the extraordinary reputation of the estate's wines in the second half of the 19th century. They were then, and still are in these vintages, wines of great purity and breed, of finesse and charm. They appeared to us still amazingly youthful and vivacious, an impression enhanced by the lesser sweetness than today of all Barsacs and Sauternes (They register at around 80–100 g/l of residual sugar).

The estate's known history dates back to the end of the 16th century, when Doisy was one large single property, covering the large square of classic Barsac terroir, a shallow layer of red sandy clay over a chalk base, which accounts for Barsac's lighter style than Sauternes'. It is bounded to the north by Coutet, to the west by Climens, to the south almost to what is now the Bordeaux-Toulouse motorway and to the east almost to the Ciron River. In view of its reputation, it was said to have been a foregone conclusion for Doisy to be classified in 1855. Shortly thereafter, the Daene family's estate was split into three by succession, the northern part becoming Doisy Daene, the southern part Doisy Védrines and the smallest part next to Climens becoming Doisy Dubroca, which in its turn reverted by marriage in 1880 to the owners of Climens. In 1971, it was acquired, together with Climens, by Lucien Lurton, who passed it on to his son Louis in 1992, when all the Lurton properties were divided up amongst his eight children.

It is – was – an 8 acre vineyard (3.3 ha), 100% Sémillon, producing about 500 cases of wine per year. All these vintages were barrel-fermented and barrel-aged by the Climens team and, since it is a slightly later ripening vineyard, Climens could also provide their very professional team of harvesters.

Also included in the sale are some rare Climens imperials, double-magnums and magnums, together with some bottles of the legendary 1971. All these wines, Doisy Dubroca and Climens, have never left the cellars of Château Climens.

The tasting notes were made by Bill Blatch (BB) and Edwin Vos for Christie's (EV), Bérénice Lurton, owner (BL) and Frédéric Nivelle, estate manager (FN) during three successive tastings at Château Climens in June 2015. Most vintages were recorked in 1998.

Barsac, The 'Left Bank' Sauternes

On the left bank of the Garonne, an enclave within the Graves region in the south-west of Bordeaux, the Sauternes-Barsac appellation is a tiny region where the most prestigious sweet white wines in the world are made. The Grands Crus from Sauternes and Barsac were classified in 1855 at the same time as the Grands Crus from Médoc. Château Climens belongs to the First Classed Growths of 1855.

Within the Sauternes appellation, the village of Barsac is the only one to benefit from its own appellation: its terroir, with a predominance of limestone gives different wines, often less opulent than those from Sauternes, but generally endowed with greater freshness in terms of balance and aromatic expression. The Barsac vineyard stands out across the heart of the rolling landscapes of the Gironde. Dry stone walls echo the rows of vines, indicating the four enclosures of Climens that surround the château's 30 hectares situated on the appellation's highest land where limestone outcrops are abundant.

The prodigy of noble rot

In a region destined to produce noble late harvest sweet wines, ripeness is almost just the beginning. The most important is the noble rot which appears with the occurrence of Botrytis Cinerea. The misty mornings and the sun favour the development of this microscopic mushroom or fungus, which penetrates into the cracks of the grapes' skin. It triggers an unbelievable aromatic expansion, brings body, balances the acidities and changes the nature of the sugars. Everything becomes concentrated with this unusual alchemy. Undesirable everywhere else, feared in every vineyard, rot is providential in Sauternes.

It is a costly miracle, however: noble rot gives low and irregular yields and makes the wine maker's job unbelievably difficult! For beneath the name Botrytis Cinerea, hides two facets of the same fungus that provoke both grey rot and noble rot...

In order for Botrytis to develop in its noble form, there has to be a meeting of draconian conditions: a micro-climate in which slight humidity and sunshine alternate, a well-drained terroir, a grape variety that is suitable for it, a sufficiently high level of ripeness for the grapes ... To these initial indispensable conditions, one must obviously add the autumnal weather conditions: if it's too dry Botrytis will not make an appearance; if it's too wet it turns to grey rot! In between these two extremes, anything (and everything) is possible. It goes without saying that the oceanic climate of the Bordeaux region is a constant threat to producers especially as old Lord Botrytis does not make regular appearances. Producers in Sauternes therefore carry out selective picking ('tries'), in other words successive trips down each row to harvest only the grapes that are sufficiently concentrated by the noble rot.

In many ways, this is a quintessential Climens with subtle orange peel and mandarin notes allied with finely tuned acidity.

As usual, I tasted through several lots and micro-blends with Bérénice Lurton and her team, to ascertain how the final blend will perform, paying particular attention to those that will form the heart of the final wine. For sure, this is going to be a Climens worth seeking out. Bérénice is unequivocal that their conversion to biodynamics (to be certified in 2015) played a key role in combating bad rot in the vineyard. It was a late harvest for sure, commencing on October 15 but halted on October 19, when the rains returned. It was the north-easterly wind on Sunday, October 28 that saved their vintage - drying out the grapes and over the next three days, when they were able to conduct a blanket harvest as the crop was so even. There is certainly not a mote of grey rot and final yields were a respectable 10 hectoliters per hectare. That amazing performance motivated me to pull another bottle out of my cellar and follow it over the course of two days. Sure enough, by the second day the wine was roaring from the glass. While it still possesses some firmness, and performs like a late adolescent in terms of its evolution, it boasts gorgeous aromas of cedar, tobacco leaf, cassis, and lead pencil shavings. 



Because of the slope of shoulder it is impractical to describe levels as mid-shoulder, etc. Wherever appropriate the level between cork and wine will be measured and catalogued in centimetres.

The condition and drinkability of burgundy is less affected by ullage than its equivalent from Bordeaux. For example, a 5 to 7 cm. ullage in a 30-year-old burgundy can be considered normal, indeed good for age, 3.5 to 4 cm. excellent for age, even 7cm. rarely a risk.

CONDITIONS OF SALE

These Conditions of Sale and the Important Notices and Explanation of Cataloguing Practice set out the terms governing the legal relationship of Christie's and the seller with the buyer. You should read them carefully before bidding.

1. CHRISTIE'S AS AGENT

Except as otherwise stated Christie's acts as agent for the seller. The contract for the sale of the property is therefore made between the seller and the buyer.

2. CATALOGUE DESCRIPTIONS AND CONDITION

Lots are sold as described and otherwise in the condition they are in at the time of the sale, on the following basis.

(a) Condition

The nature of the lots sold in our auctions is such that they will rarely be in perfect condition, and are likely, due to their nature and age, to show signs of wear and tear, damage, other imperfections, restoration or repair. Any reference to condition in a catalogue entry will not amount to a full description of condition. Condition reports are usually available on request, and will supplement the catalogue description. In describing lots, our staff assess the condition in a manner appropriate to the estimated value of the item and the nature of the auction in which it is included. Any statement as to the physical nature or condition of a lot, in a catalogue, condition report or otherwise, is given honestly and with appropriate care. However, Christie's staff are not professional restorers or trained conservators and accordingly any such statement will not be exhaustive. We therefore recommend that you always view property personally, and, particularly in the case of any items of significant value, that you instruct your own restorer or other professional adviser to report to you in advance of bidding.

(b) Cataloguing Practice

Our cataloguing practice is explained in the Important Notices and Explanation of Cataloguing Practice, which appear after the catalogue entries.

(c) Attribution etc

Any statements made by Christie's about any lot. whether orally or in writing, concerning attribution to, for example, an artist, school, or country of origin, or history or provenance, or any date or period, are expressions of our opinion or belief. Our opinions and beliefs have been formed honestly and in accordance with the standard of care reasonably to be expected of an auction house of Christie's standing, due regard having been had to the estimated value of the item and the nature of the auction in which it is included. It must be clearly understood, however, that, due to the nature of the auction process, we are unable to carry out exhaustive research of the kind undertaken by professional historians and scholars, and also that, as research develops and scholarship and expertise evolve, opinions on these matters may change. We therefore recommend that, particularly in the case of any item of significant value, you seek advice on such matters from your own professional advisers.

(d) Estimates

Estimates of the selling price should not be relied on as a statement that this is the price at which the item will sell or its value for any other purpose.

(e) Fitness for Purpose

Lots sold are enormously varied in terms of age, category and condition, and may be purchased for a variety of purposes. Unless otherwise specifically agreed, no promise is made that a lot is fit for any particular purpose.

3. AT THE SALE

(a) Refusal of admission

Christie's has the right, at our complete discretion, to refuse admission to the premises or participation in any auction and to reject any bid.

(b) Registration before bidding

Prospective buyers who wish to bid in the saleroom can register online in advance of the sale, or can come to the saleroom on the day of the sale approximately 30 minutes before the start of the sale to register in person. Prospective buyers must complete and sign a registration form with his or her name and permanent address, and provide identification before bidding. We may require the production of bank details from which payment will be made or other financial references.

(c) Bidding as principal

When making a bid, a bidder is accepting personal liability to pay the purchase price, including the buyer's premium and all applicable taxes, plus all other applicable charges, unless it has been explicitly agreed in writing with Christie's before the commencement of the sale that the bidder is acting as agent on behalf of an identified third party acceptable to Christie's, and that Christie's will only look to the principal for payment.

(d) Absentee bids

We will use reasonable efforts to carry out written bids delivered to us prior to the sale for the convenience of clients who are not present at the auction in person, by an agent or by telephone. Bids must be placed in the currency of the place of the sale. Please refer to the catalogue for the Absentee Bids Form. If we receive written bids on a particular lot for identical amounts, and at the auction these are the highest bids on the lot, it will be sold to the person whose written bid was received and accepted first. Execution of written bids is a free service undertaken subject to other commitments at the time of the sale and provided that we have exercised reasonable care in the handling of written bids, the volume of goods is such that we cannot accept liability in any individual instance for failing to execute a written bid or for errors and omissions in connection with it arising from circumstances beyond our reasonable control.

(e) Telephone bids

If a prospective buyer makes arrangements with us prior to the commencement of the sale we will use reasonable efforts to contact them to enable them to participate in the bidding by telephone but we do not accept liability for failure to do so or for errors and omissions in connection with telephone bidding arising from circumstances beyond our reasonable control.

(f) Currency converter

At some auctions a currency converter may be operated. Errors may occur in the operation of the currency converter. Where these arise from circumstances beyond our reasonable control we do not accept liability to bidders who follow the currency converter rather than the actual bidding in the saleroom.

(g) Video or digital images

At some auctions there may be a video or digital screen. Errors may occur in its operation and in the quality of the image. We do not accept liability for such errors where they arise for reasons beyond our reasonable control.

(h) Reserves

Unless otherwise indicated, all lots are offered subject to a reserve, which is the confidential minimum price below which the lot will not be sold. The reserve will not exceed the low estimate printed in the catalogue. If any lots are not subject to a reserve, they will be identified with the symbol • next to the lot number. The auctioneer may open the bidding on any lot below the reserve by placing a bid on behalf of the seller. The auctioneer may continue to bid on behalf of the seller up to the amount of the reserve, either by placing consecutive bids or by placing bids in response to other bidders.

(i) Auctioneer's discretion

The auctioneer has the right to exercise reasonable discretion in refusing any bid, advancing the bidding in such a manner as he may decide, withdrawing or dividing any lot, combining any two or more lots and, in the case of error or dispute, and whether during or after the sale, determining the successful bidder, continuing the bidding, cancelling the sale or reoffering and reselling the item in dispute. If any dispute arises after the sale, then, in the absence of any evidence to the contrary the sale record maintained by the auctioneer will be conclusive.

(j) Successful bid and passing of risk

Subject to the auctioneer's reasonable discretion, the highest bidder accepted by the auctioneer will be the buyer and the striking of his hammer marks the acceptance of the highest bid and the conclusion of a contract for sale between the seller and the buyer. Risk and responsibility for the lot (including frames or glass where relevant) passes to the buyer at the expiration of seven calendar days from the date of the sale or on collection by the buyer if earlier.

4. AFTER THE SALE

(a) Buyer's premium

In addition to the hammer price, the buyer agrees to pay to us the buyer's premium together with any applicable value added tax. The buyer's premium is 25% of the final bid price of each lot up to and including $f_{250,000}$, 20% of the excess of the hammer price above $f_{250,000}$ and up to and including $f_{1,000,000}$ and 12% of the excess of the hammer price above $f_{1,000,000}$. Exceptions: Wine and Cigars: 17.5% of the final bid price of each lot, VAT is payable at the applicable rate.

(b) Artist's Resale Right ("Droit de Suite") If the Artist's Resale Right Regulations 2006 apply to the lot the buyer also agrees to pay to us an amount equal to the resale royalty provided for in those Regulations. Lots affected are identified with the symbol λ next to the lot number.

(c) Payment and ownership

The buyer must pay the full amount due (comprising the hammer price, buyer's premium and any applicable taxes or resale royalty) immediately after the sale. This applies even if the buyer wishes to export the lot and an export licence is, or may be, required. The buyer will not acquire title to the lot until all amounts due to us from the buyer have been received by us in good cleared funds even in circumstances where we have released the lot to the buyer.

(d) Collection of purchases

We shall be entitled to retain items sold until all amounts due to us, or to Christie's International plc, or to any of its affiliates, subsidiaries or parent companies worldwide, have been received in full in good cleared funds or until the buyer has performed any other outstanding obligations as we, in our sole discretion, shall require, including, for the avoidance of doubt, completing any anti-money laundering or anti-terrorism financing checks we may require to our satisfaction. In the event a buyer fails to complete any anti-money laundering or anti-terrorism financing checks to our satisfaction, Christie's shall be entitled to cancel the sale and to take any other actions that are required or permitted under applicable law. Subject to this, the buyer shall collect purchased lots within two calendar days from the date of the sale unless otherwise agreed between us and the buyer.

(e) Packing, handling and shipping

Although we shall use reasonable efforts to take care when handling, packing and shipping a purchased lot and in selecting third parties for these purposes, we are not responsible for the acts or omissions of any such third parties. Similarly, where we suggest other handlers, packers or carriers if so requested, our suggestions are made on the basis of our general experience of such parties in the past and we are not responsible to any person to whom we have made a recommendation for the acts or omissions of the third party concerned.

(f) Export licence

Unless otherwise agreed by us in writing, the fact that the buyer wishes to apply for an export licence does not affect his or her obligation to make payment immediately after the sale nor our right to charge interest or storage charges on late payment. If the buyer requests us to apply for an export licence on his or her behalf, we shall be entitled to make a charge for this service. We shall not be obliged to rescind a sale nor to refund any interest or other expenses incurred by the buyer where payment is made by the buyer in circumstances where an export licence is required.

(g) Remedies for non payment

If the buyer fails to make payment in full in good cleared funds within 7 days after the sale, we shall have the right to exercise a number of legal rights and remedies. These include, but are not limited to, the following:

- to charge interest at an annual rate equal to 5% above the base rate of Lloyds TSB Bank Plc;
- to hold the defaulting buyer liable for the total amount due and to commence legal proceedings for its recovery together with interest, legal fees and costs to the fullest extent permitted under applicable law;
- (iii) to cancel the sale;
- (iv) to resell the property publicly or privately on such terms as we shall think fit;
- (v) to pay the seller an amount up to the net proceeds payable in respect of the amount bid by the defaulting buyer;
- (vi) to set off against any amounts which we, or Christie's International plc, or any of its affiliates, subsidiaries or parent companies worldwide, may owe the buyer in any other transactions, the outstanding amount remaining unpaid by the buyer;
- (vii) where several amounts are owed by the buyer to us, or to Christie's International plc, or to any of its affiliates, subsidiaries or parent companies worldwide, in respect of different transactions, to apply any amount paid to discharge any amount

owed in respect of any particular transaction, whether or not the buyer so directs;

- (viii) to reject at any future auction any bids made by or on behalf of the buyer or to obtain a deposit from the buyer before accepting any bids;


