

The Chronometre De Bord is one of *Omega's* most legendary movements. It triumphed in many chronometer competitions and it is reported that only a small number of these movements were produced in various iterations. This is an extremely rare display version and is a remarkable find for *Omega* collectors.

According to the Archives of *Omega* the present watch was manufactured in 1940.

Even the most cursory of glances to this watch will immediately reveal its absolutely stunning condition: the case presents astounding crispness, extremely unusual for a piece of this age. Additionally, the dial is superb with untouched scales which shine in the deep pitch black gloss dial. The style is a remarkable *trait d'union* between the minimalistic, nearly military style of timepieces realized from the 1940s onward, and earlier art deco pieces: the dial, featuring simple gilt baton numerals and the sought-after railway divisions, is reminiscent of the former style; the case, with the playful cylindrical decorations to the size of the bow and unusual spherical crown is an obvious nod to the latter.

This is a nearly unique occasion for the connoisseur of fine vintage timepieces to acquire an unusual and very close to new old stock condition example of early *Omega* production.

Rolex, as well as *Patek Philippe,* entrusted *Inducta* to make movements for their display clocks. The movement of this clock is based on 1967 Swiss patent for Master/Slave clock mechanism granted to Daniel Bischoff and Bernhard Schneiter. These clocks rarely appear on the market as they are reserved for large *Rolex* retailers for their showrooms and for special clients such as, for instance, John F. Kennedy Airport which has a few of them. Due to their rarity, there are many imitations on the market with simple Kienzle movements. The authentic examples, such as the present lot with complicated *Inducta* movements, are increasingly hard to discover.

The present wall clock was part of a series distributed to the most distinguished *Patek Philippe* retailers as marketing support for the launch. Offered in remarkable condition with its original packaging, this timepiece is an exceptional opportunity for the *Patek Philippe* collector to own what is, literally, the "greatest" world-time watch.

Charles-Henri Vaucher (born c. 1793 Couvet, Neuchâtel , d. ?), played an significant role in the establishment of Chinese market watches made in Fleurier. Around 1820 he moved to London to open a branch which also supplied watches to the celebrated William Ilbery whose son or nephew did a watchmaker apprenticeship in Fleurier. William Ilbery was the fiancée of Vaucher's daughter Anna-Suzanne who tragically passed away in 1845. An avid businessman, Vaucher lived half the year in London and took care of a number of other commerce such as tools, iron and importation of textile. In 1834 he wrote as justification for a delay in the delivery of 18 pairs of watches ordered by Ilbery "From time immemorial we cannot remember having experienced business doing so well".



In 1838 Vaucher sent a number of watches, some enamelled, to Canton. This attracted the attention of Louis Bovet who mentioned them in a letter to his uncle Edouard (see *La Montre Chinoise* by Alfred Chapuis, p. 140).

The Vaucher watchmakers of Fleurier

The Vaucher families were decisive in the introduction and development of Fleurier's watch industry, specializing in the manufacture of pocketwatches. In 1750, 28 different Vaucher families were living in Fleurier and although sharing a common ancestor, the members did not consider themselves as closely related. The difference between the families was marked by adding a wedding name or location such as "Vaucher sur-les-Moulins", "Vaucher du Guilleri", "Vaucher-de-la-Croix" or "Vaucher-Ferrier".

Watches with lavishly decorated cases especially made for aristocratic customers and engraved with Vaucher signature are important witnesses for the work of these gifted watchmakers and highlights in museums, private collections and at public auctions.

The present carp-shaped watch is an unusual example of a form watch, highly fashionable in China in the 19th and early 20th centuries. Other animal-shaped watches are illustrated in *The Chinese Watch* by Alfred Chapuis, chapter "Jewelled Watches", p. 231–233.

A long tradition of Asian carp exists in Chinese culture and literature. A popular lyric circulating as early as 2000 years ago in the late Han period includes an anecdote which relates how a man far away from home sent back to his wife a pair of carp, in which, when the wife opened the fish to cook, she found a silk strip that carried a love note of just two lines: "Eat well to keep fit" (first line) and "Missing you and forget me not" (second line).

Made by the renowned firm Ed. Koehn in Geneva, often signing their watches "H.R. Ekegren".

H.R. EKEGREN. A FINE 18K GOLD MINUTE REPEATING OPENFACE Henri Robert Ekegren (1823-1896) was a renowned Danish watch, clock and chronometer maker and watchmaker to the King of Denmark. He worked for Urban Jürgensen, Henry Golay, Joseph-Thaddeus Winnerl and Adolph Lange before setting up his own business in Geneva. In 1857, Ekegren founded together with Ferdinand Westermann a factory specializing in the production of chronometers which was sold to Edouard Koehn in 1891.

> Edouard Koehn or Ed. Koehn (1839-1908) started his horological career in the workshops of Patek Philippe as a watchmaker. In 1891 Koehn took over H.R. Ekegren, keeping the company's name and the founder as chief engineer until the latter's death in 1896. The firm, as of 1908 managed by Koehn's son Edouard, specialized in the production of flat or extra flat watches and complications and the improvement of the retrograde display mechanism. It appears that the company was dissolved in the mid-1930s.

James Emmett Caldwell (1813-1881) began his career as an apprentice to a silversmith in Philadelphia. In the early 1830s, he opened his own watch and jewelery shop which became known as J.E. Caldwell & Company in 1848. The company retailed watches made by the most celebrated manufacturers, notably Ekegren, Patek Philippe and Vacheron Constantin.

THE MAURICE & MURIEL FULTON COLLECTION

Christie's is honored to present the Maurice and Muriel Fulton Collection for sale through a series of auctions spanning Old Master Paintings, Impressionist and Modern Art, Latin American Art and Post War and Contemporary Art.

Working closely with some of the most respected art dealers of the day, most importantly famed Chicago dealer B.C. Holland, the Fulton's acquired extraordinary modern works by Henry Moore, Barbara Hepworth, Fernand Léger, Alexander Calder, Jean Dubuffet and Sol Lewitt to name a few. The Fulton collection holds one of the most important and bold cubist paintings by Jean Metzinger to come to market in recent years and is the centerpiece of their important collection of Impressionist and Modern Art.

Maurice and Muriel met and fell in love while both students at the University of

Chicago in 1938. Maurice joined the Navy after graduation and was stationed in the South and Central Pacific and received the Presidential Unit Citation for "outstanding heroism". He and Muriel married while he was on leave from the war in 1944 after an engagement on the University of Chicago campus at the spot where they first met—the spot where a plaque now sits to commemorate their great love story.

The Fultons were generous with their time and philanthropic with organizations they held close to their hearts, becoming vital supporters of the Art Institute of Chicago (where a gallery is named in their honor), Boca Raton Museum of Art, Morikami Museum, Chicago Botanic Garden, The Ravinia Music Festival and their beloved alma mater The University of Chicago where a lecture series on the History of Law is named in their honor.



7.46 movement was invoiced on 10 July 1916 to Krammer, at the time the firm's agent in Egypt.

Scarab-form watches made by *Longines* are exceedingly rare. The appeal of the present, highly attractive example is further enhanced by its very good overall condition and the presence of the matching chain.

Beetle or scarab-form watches were very fashionable in China in the 19th and early 20th centuries. A scarab-watch signed *Vacheron Constantin* is illustrated in *The Chinese Watch* by Alfred Chapuis, chapter "Jewelled Watches", p. 233, pl. 218. Two scarab-watches are described and illustrated in *Timepieces*, The Forbidden City Publishing House, pp. 282 & 283. The tome comprises a selection of timepieces in Beijing's Palace Museum which owns one of the largest collections of mechanical timepieces of the 18th, 19th and early 20th centuries in the world, comprising over 1,000 pieces. The collection contains both Chinese and foreign-made watches, clocks and automatons. Chinese exhibits came from the Palace's own workshops, Guangzhou (Canton) and Suzhou (Suchow). Watches made abroad include manufacturers from Britain, France, Switzerland, the United States and Japan.

The present watch is an important early version with rhodium-plated brass movement. Later and to the present day, the movement was made of gold. Collectors have begun to focus their attention on these earlier brass movements.

The Chronomètre à Résonance model was launched in 2000. It is the only wristwatch in the world based on resonance, a natural physical phenomenon. The two balances are synchronized by means of the resonance effect and naturally beat alternately. The negative effects of wrist and body movements are hence considerably reduced.

François-Paul Journe was born in Marseille in 1957. He graduated from the Paris School of Watchmaking in 1976 and immediately joined forces with his uncle, a noted restorer of antique timepieces. Before creating his own complete line of wristwatches, Journe restored some of the world's most important historical timepieces, devised and built unique pocket watches to order and designed and made complications for prestigious watch brands.

In 1996, Journe established a workshop in Geneva, designing and making watch mechanisms for other brands. Three years later, in 1999, he launched his own watches under the label "F.P.Journe Invenit et Fecit".

The Tourbillon Souverain, another of *F.P.Journe*'s horological masterworks, is distinguished by its complications combining a one minute tourbillon with a remontoir. The remontoir provides a constant force to the balance, hence maintaining an equal rate of force whether the watch is fully wound or not and increasing precision. In the second generation of the Tourbillon Souverain watches, such as the present lot, *F.P.Journe* added a dead beat second indication.


F. P. Journe introduced the Chronomètre Bleu Byblos Model in 2014, in a limited number of only 99 examples. Made to commemorate the opening of the brand's 10th boutique-shop in Beirut, this unique timepiece was named after the city of Byblos, located on the Lebanese coast a few kilometers North of Beirut. Byblos was the cradle of Euro-Mediterranean civilization, being the worlds oldest Phoenician port and one of the most important commercial and cultural platforms of the region.

The present watch is made of tantalum, a rare but hard metal which is difficult to work with and sparsely used in horology, however it is used frequently in the medical field as it is extremely resistant to corrosion and wear. Adding to its allure, the visible 18k pink gold mechanical movement follows the traditional configuration of precision watches, with two barrels operating in parallel to provide uniform power, and represents the sun of the Orient set in a Mediterranean blue sky.

F. P. Journe collectors responded with great excitement upon the introduction of this reference.

The present timepiece is one of the earliest representative of the iconic 1675 GMT-Master model. An evolution of reference 6542, the main difference with its predecessor consists in the presence of the crown guard. Very early examples, such as the present watch, feature a pointed crown guard, markedly different from the later ones. These pointed crown guards were allegedly designed to make this feature as unobtrusive as possible. Furthermore, the dial presents the attractive gloss/gilt combination, as expected in these early specimens. The glossy black dial, likely a service replacement, has wonderfully tropicalized to an intense tobacco hue perfectly harmonizing with the luminous material, which also tropicalized to a similar tone. The small arrow tip of the 24 hours hand was the standard for early 1675. It was soon changed to the big arrow tip in an effort to improve legibility, and many of the original small arrow tips were exchanged for the later version during service. Thankfully, this is not the case with this attractive timepiece.



The present example is a representative of the second series 1675. Characterized by big arrow tipped red 24 hours hand and black matte dial, these modifications were introduced to improve contrast and consequently readability. The transition between gloss dial and small arrow tip and the configuration here exemplified happens around the end of the 1960s and the very early 1970s. The present watch is stamped to the inside of the case back IV.68, and thus is among the earliest second series 1675. Another noteworthy feature is the black bezel, available on request and introduced around the same time as the inception of the second series. Furthermore, the white on black calibration of the bezel provides optimal contrast and readability.



The present GMT-Master reference 1675 is an exceedingly rare example featuring the United Arab Emirates (UAE) crest and the Arabic text translated as "Ministry of Defense". Earlier GMT-Master examples had the signature of His Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum and frequently had rare all-blue bezel inserts.

Noteworthy on the dial is the "Quraysh Hawk", printed in different 'padded layers' that create a tri-dimensional effect. At the center of the hawk, the symbol of the United Arab Emirates, is a polychrome enamel Dhow or Arabian sailboat, which is replaced today by the UAE federation flag. Its original dial stands out by the evenly discolored luminous material to numerals and hands, displaying a most charismatic cream-colored tone, all enhanced by the very crisp "Quraysh Hawk" crest and "Ministry of Defense" text in Arabic. The case is likewise preserved in very good overall condition and full case proportions.

The present watch was presented by the UAE government to the consignor, a gentleman from England, for his work leading an irrigation project. He received the watch in the original and extremely rare green *Rolex* box with UAE crest and with product literature, but, of course, without the original bill of sale since it was a gift.

The gentleman went on to wear the watch for some years and claims to have never had it serviced. Indeed, there are no service marks on the inside of the case back. Likewise, the watch has a small bit of metal on the bracelet, perhaps the result of metal falling on the watch while welding.

Of superb overall appeal and rarity, the present reference 1675 is a rare find for the aficionado of rare and military Rolex sports watches, particularly in this condition directly from the original owner and with the accompanying *Rolex* box with UAE crest.

The present example is one of the earliest specimens of the iconic reference 1655: its case back indicates it was manufactured in the second quarter of 1971, and indeed 1971 is the year this model was launched.

Reference 1655, aka "Explorer II" and "Steve McQueen" is one of the most unusual and experimental watches made by *Rolex*. No photographs exist of McQueen wearing the watch and collectors speculate the McQueen nickname was given to increase interest in the model. True to its philosophy of developing tool watches for the most varied situations (from the diver's Submariner, to the advanced physics researchers' Milgauss, passing by the pilot's GMT), the present watch was developed for spelunkers (cave explorers). It features 24 hours indication, in order for the wearer to accurately pinpoint the day/night cycle (which is not so easy in the perpetual darkness of caves), abundant luminous markers and a brightly colored 24 hours hand to allow for optimal readability in the dark.



The GMT-Master model was developed in association with Pan Am Airlines to allow pilots to track time in two time zones: local and home. This was because physicians at Pan Am suggested that keeping track of the home time might mitigate the effects of jet lag. Thus, this model was born as an absolute tool watch, furthermore responding to a specific need. Its success, however, soon prompted *Rolex* to realize examples in precious metal and later on even brought forth bejeweled examples of the model.

The present timepiece is a representative of this "luxury evolution" of the line. It features the sought-after "nipple dial", the nickname deriving from the shape of the dot numerals. The deep gold hue of the case and bracelet is masterfully reprised by the gilt designation of the dial and bezel, and the midnight black dial is mirrored in the black bezel insert. This alternation of deep dark tones and warm hues impart to the timepiece a remarkable aesthetic appeal and perfect legibility. The presence of the Jubilee bracelet further amplifies the appeal of the timepiece and, thanks to the links, the watch conveys a markedly sophisticated and vintage aesthetic.

The present *Rolex* reference 6100 – "Les Armoiries" [or "The Arms" as in coat of arms] – is an extraordinary and important example of a *Rolex* with cloisonné enamel dial.

Vintage watches with cloisonné enamel dials, particularly from *Patek Philippe* and *Rolex*, are recognized as some of the rarest, most valuable and most desirable watches ever made. Products of laborious artistic endeavor, one collector has noted that on a per millimeter basis, *Rolex* and *Patek Philippe* watches with cloisonné enamel dials can be more valuable than the most valuable paintings. Indeed, in May 2014 Christie's sold a *Rolex* with cloisonné enamel dial for the equivalent of \$1,242,000.

The records of the legendary dial makers Stern Frères show under the record 3769 that this dial, with serial number 103[star]679 on the back of the dial, was made by the equally legendary Marguerite Koch. Mrs. Koch was known for producing some of the most important and valuable enamel dials that exist for Patek Philippe, Vacheron Constantin and Rolex, including the aforementioned Rolex sold by Christie's in 2014 for over the equivalent of \$1.2 million as well as another Rolex with an enamel dial that sold at auction this year for over the equivalent of \$1.2 million. The star on the back of the dial is the symbol used by Stern Frères, while the 103 was used by Stern Frères to denote dials made by Rolex while the 679 was the record of the specific dial.

Of additional interest to collectors is that we have discovered a record of the original artwork from the records of Stern Frères that was made in advance of the creation of the dial. It is easy to see the intense thought and effort that went into the design of this masterpiece.

The production of such dials was extremely costly as they had to be individually made by Stern Frères. Koch created the outline of the desired motif by arranging thin gold wires (called "cloisons" in French) on a dial. These partitions were filled with small quantities of enamel powder in the desired color and then the dial was fired in an oven at varying temperatures starting around 1000 degrees Celsius causing the powder to melt. This process was repeated for each color. Sometimes individual colors were fired two or three times to create the appropriate color and visual depth. The other side of the dial has what is called "counter enamel" that was needed to prevent the gold dial plate from losing its shape during this process. The dial can be warped without this "counter enamel" and it is for this reason that the back of the dial has a greenish enamel coating. Finally, once the multiple rounds of enamel firing were complete, the dial was hand-polished as needed.

According to heraldic blazon, the coat of arms on this watch is: *Gules (red), a chevron between in chief two mullets [stars] each of five points or [gold] and in base a fleur-de-lis argent [silver]. The shield is surmounted by a helmet, mantled gules [red] and or [gold].* Based on our research, it is likely that the coat of arms is an artistic creation.

In the present watch, the enamel of the helmet is brilliantly deep and rich, in an almost jade-like color. It stands in stark contrast to the rich colors of the enamel as well as the gold stars and fleur-de-lis that is likely made out of platinum, white gold or silver.

The rich and unusual matte black enamel is a slightly imperfect circle, showing that imperfection can be beautiful and visually compelling in its own way. The stunning gold around the outer edge of the dial with gorgeous faceted gold hour and pearl-like minute markers harmonizes with the gold case, offering the watch incredible visual interest and power compared with other many other enamel dials from Stern Frères.

The present watch comes directly from the grandson of the original owner, an astute art and antiques collector from Latin America who purchased it while visiting Geneva in circa 1952. The watch has been a treasure within the family to the present day, passed from father to son to son, and has never been publicly seen or offered for sale since its original purchase. Furthermore, the dial shows no signs of restoration on either side and the faceted markers appear to have never been removed.

"Les Armoiries" is a fresh-to-market watch with a powerful and visually-compelling enamel dial in a traditional *Rolex* Oyster case. It is undoubtedly one of the most exciting and important discoveries of a *Rolex* with cloisonné enamel dial in years.

Reference 6105 is not only among the rarely seen vintage models by *Rolex*, but furthermore among the most wearable and eye-pleasing ones thanks to its generous proportions (indeed the Italian nickname Ovettone denotes it is the large version of the ovetto/bubble back) and the contemporary looking Oyster case. The present watch offers a remarkable story, unearthed in the original papers that accompany this lot. It is evident that a Reverend Stenton Cardley purchased the watch from *Patek Philippe* and ordered it to be sent to London on August 22nd, 1877. In addition, the original certificate is dated August 21st, 1877, and the Extract from the

Archives records the date of sale on August 20th, 1877. Looking through the three documents and the sequencing of dates allows one to see that it is very likely that the watch was specifically made for this English gentleman, where the motto seen on the case back of the watch reveals a possible character trait.

The motto seen on the case is inscribed, *Non Nobis Solum*, Latin for "Not for Ourselves Alone." An interesting clue as to the beliefs of the original owner of this watch reveals he was likely a man devout to the good of humanity.

Offered fresh to market, it is extremely rare to find a pink gold watch with original invoice, certificate and box.



Accompanied by a *Patek Philippe* Extract from the Archives confirming production of the present quarter repeating watch with independent seconds and engraved initials *GC* to the case back in 1869 and its subsequent sale on September 2nd 1871. Further accompanied by a *Patek Philippe* Certificate of Origin and Warranty dated 1871, a *Patek Philippe* Geneva original letter dated 21 January 1955, addressed to Mr. George Crompton, Jr., stating that the watch was sold on 2 September 1871 to Mr. Geo Crompton for the price of CHF 1,900, "a price very high for the time but the piece is a complicated watch". It is moreover mentioned that it was engraved with the initials of Mr. Crompton's grandfather, G.C., and bought in the firm's retail store in Geneva. Furthermore, the present watch is accompanied by the original *Patek Philippe* presentation box with engraved plaque reading: *George Crompton*.

The short length of gold chain accompanying the watch with two attachments, a gilt medal related to the 1928 Olympic Games, the second gilt medal with books and an oil lamp in high relief, the back engraved *Chancellor Beacher Gold Medal Sir George Crompton K J Cmrd., L.H.D. For His Scientific Inventive Mind.*







George Crompton (1829 - 1886)

The present watch stands out amongst others for its strong historical provenance. Accompanied by an original letter dated January 21st 1955, to Mr. George Crompton, Jr., *Patek Philippe* stated that this watch belonged to Mr. Crompton Jr.'s grandfather, also named George Crompton, an American inventor who is most credited with the creation of the Crompton Loom.

Originally hailing form Lancashire, England, George Crompton was born in March 1829. Son of William Crompton, the family migrated to the United States when George was nine years old. Crompton Loom Works was a successful manufacturing business based in Worcester, Massachusetts, that provided uniforms and materials such as blankets for the U. S. Army and the Civil War effort. The Crompton Loom was an invention that George's father William first invented, and this no doubt paved the way for his son to follow in his footsteps.

In 1857, George introduced a loom that built upon his father's already hugely successful machine. This new loom was complicated but required half as much labor to operate and could reach high speeds of up to eighty-five picks per minute. So successful, it won medals at the Paris Exposition in 1867 as well as gaining popularity from the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition of 1876. The impact of the Loom in the textile industry was so large-scale that Mr. Crompton was inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame in 2007. Mr. Crompton was also to founder and president of Crompton Carpet Company and served on the board of directors of Worcester Gas Light Company, Worcester National Bank and Hartford Steam Boiler Insurance Company.

Due to the letter that accompanies this lot, we are able to determine that Mr. George Crompton was 42 years of age when he purchased the present watch in 1871 for 1,900 Swiss Francs. Purchased in the *Patek Philippe* salon in Geneva, the letter states that the price was, "very high for that time."

Independent Dead Center Seconds

Patek Philippe's independent dead center seconds are exceedingly rare and particularly when featuring the additional complication of a repeating mechanism. The present example is one of only two known featuring this complication and to best of our knowledge this watch has never before been offered in public. This predecessor of the chronograph is furthermore preserved in very good, original overall condition.

The independent dead seconds mechanism requires two going trains, one for the movement and one for the sweep center seconds hand, allowing it to be stopped without stopping the main train in order not to interfere with the accuracy of timekeeping. The invention of this mechanism is attributed to Moise Pouzait, Geneva 1776.

Adrien Philippe's independent dead seconds mechanism (Swiss patent No. 1017 of 23 May 1889, illustrated and described in *Patek Philippe Pocket Watches* by Martin Huber & Alan Banbery, p. 53) varies completely from Pouzait's design. Moving the seconds train over the center bridge created more space, thus allowing a larger balance resulting in better timekeeping.

Independent seconds watch no. 80'048 dating circa 1888-1889 is illustrated and described *in Patek Philippe Museum - Patek Philippe Watches - Volume* I, p. 263, Inv. P-626. It features the same two-train movement as the present watch and is described as probably being one of the earliest examples of such an independent seconds watch with two simultaneously wound barrels, rendering the present watch even rarer. Numbered 27'447 and made in 1869, it precedes watch no. 80'048 and the patent, delivered in May 1889, by an impressive twenty years.

This piece has been made in our workshops in 1869, and sold in 1871 (on September 2) to Mr. Geo Crompton, for the price of sw.Wr. 1.900.-. As you can see, this price was very high, for that time, but the piece is a complicated watch, repeater, exactly as you descrive it. On the back, the initials of your grandfather are engraved : G.C. This watch was bought in our retail store, in Geneva.

We are sure your watch will still give you complete satisfaction, and we kindly advise you to get it cleaned and oiled every 2 years,(if it is running all the time), by a very good and skilled watchmaker.

This is because these references are collectively known as "Comet" by the collectors' community. The elaborate lugs' shape is a precursor to the fancy cases which will characterized later productions, especially during the 1950s and 60s. It is probable that such an avant-garde design did not agree with the general mood of war-times, and this would explain the incredibly rarefied output and equally short production span.

A further layer of technical appeal is given by the fact that this is one of the very few references to feature applied gold markers overlapping the hard enamel scaled. The obvious complexity of applying the markers without compromising the enamel integrity explains why this methodology was so rarely used.

As the sticker to the case back suggests, this watch was fully serviced by *Patek Philippe*, which brought this Comet back to its former glory.

Starting from the mid-1940s, more voluptuous and elaborated case designs made their way into *Patek Philippe* collections, and it is during these years some of the most iconic and refined cases were developed. We are talking of landmark models such as reference 2442, the Marilyn, reference 2441, the Tour Eiffel, and reference 1593, the Hourglass, here exemplified by one of its most rare and elegant configurations: the "cocktail" version in platinum with diamond-set hour markers.

The case realized by shape cases specialist Markowsky (case maker number 8, in a key as all Geneva based case makers), this model, in production from 1944 to 1967, is distinguished by the gentle curves of its sides and overall domed looks. A peculiar alchemy of curved and straight lines, the reference is considered a landmark in the realm of shape watches, and a staple of any serious *Patek Philippe* collection. The image had circulated among elite watch experts for many years, with corresponding speculation of who might have ordered the watch and where it may have resided.

The watch is fresh to market and was, according to the consignor, a gift presented by Emir Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa I of Bahrain to an American advisor, businessman and close friend, a gentleman

that had a legendary career in the Middle East spanning decades. The gentleman is still living and thrilled to learn of the importance of the watch. He wore it only a few times in his life, and as a result, the watch is preserved in mint and original condition.

It was the consignor's understanding that the pearls are natural seed pearls harvested from off the coast of Bahrain and it was a moment of great joy when the Extract from the Archives arrived stating that this watch had "pearl hour markers". In fact, our research suggests this is the first *Patek Philippe* to come to the market with original pearl hour markers and it is unknown to us if others were made and where they may reside.

The watch has remarkable architecture to account for the natural seed pearl hour markers. Beyond the fact that the hour and minute hands are on a post much higher than on other watches so that they can clear the natural seed pearl hour markers, the bezel seems to be much taller than on other examples of the reference 2573. The steep bezel combined with the domed crystal provides remarkable viewing of the pearl hour markers from a side angle and gives the watch incredible visual interest. Natural pearls have long been a source of national pride and commerce for Bahrain. In fact, natural pearls are such an important part of Bahraini culture that the government makes it illegal to import or sell cultured pearls in the country.

According to a 2010 article in the Wall Street Journal by Katherine Bergen: "The allure of the pearl has captivated the Queen of Sheba, Elizabeth I and Catherine the Great, all of whom are said to have worn Bahraini pearls. Their fabulous luster is to do with the combination of the sea's freshwater springs that give the island kingdom its name - Bahrain means 'two seas' in Arabic and its warm, shallow, highly saline water. Whatever rare alchemy creates these lustrous objects, then as now Bahraini pearls are widely believed to be the best in the world. Legend recounts that almost 5,000 years ago, Gilgamesh, the epic hero, landed here in search of paradise, where he is said to have found the flower of eternity, the pearl, along the shores of ancient Dilmun, now modern Bahrain. An Assyrian inscription from around 2,000 B.C. mentions 'fish eyes,' or pearls, from Dilmun, and Tylos, the classical name for Bahrain, was stated by Roman naturalist Pliny to be 'famous for the vast number of its pearls.""

The Pearl of Bahrain is simply more than an interesting and unusual watch, but due to its royal provenance, architectural design, aesthetic power, and mint condition, it is quite simply one of the most exciting and important time-only *Patek Philippe* wristwatches to ever come to market.

The Behbehani Family: Patek Philippe's Door to the Kingdom of Bahrain

The Behbehani family consists of 5 brothers who founded various distribution companies in the mid-1930's. Beginning in general trading, business soon diversified for the family to include insurance, tourism, and real estate, automotive and luxury with new ventures and interests continuing to evolve until today. One of the first retailers of fine watches in the Middle East, the family is well respected, known to have begun with humble beginnings but striving through changing times to build a financially sound empire that continuously values integrity, quality and service.

The Behbehani family was at the time of the delivery of the watch the sole distributor of Patek Philippe in Kuwait as well as in the Kingdom of Bahrain through their retail operations.

Special thanks to the family for assistance in researching this timepiece, and in particular Abbas Behbehani who is an imminent and passionate Middle Eastern watch collector.

Reference 2497 is without a doubt among the rarest, most attractive and important vintage complicated wristwatch models by Patek Philippe. It was in production from 1951 to 1964, and over these 14 years a meager 115 pieces were made in total. This means an incredibly low output of roughly 8 watches per year. It is powered by the 27SC Q movement, a perpetual calendar upgrade (Q stands for Quantième Perpétuel) of the best manually wound center seconds movement of the time: 27 SC (SC for Second au Centre). As a matter of fact, a specific movement number range was reserved for these movements: from 888'000 to 888'178. This means a total of 179 movements, 115 of them used for reference 2497 and the rest for its waterproof sister model, reference 2438/1. The movement number 888'020 identifies this movement as the 21st made in the series: a very early one. This detail is perfectly matched by the case design.

The case of this reference is a virtual carbon copy of the case of reference 2499, without of course the chronograph pushers. As with reference 2499, the case design presents an evolution over time. The majority of these watches are cased in a Wenger case, featuring a domed case back and slightly downturned lugs. Very early examples, however, are cased in a Vichet case (case maker number 9), distinguished by markedly downturned lugs and a flat case back. The present timepiece is a representative of this rare and early variation of the model. This alone would have collectors' heads turn, but the present timepiece furthermore presents a very distinguished provenance.

The *HOX* stamp on the movement identifies a watch imported and sold in the US by the Henri Stern Agency, *Patek Philippe* importer at the time. This is expected, considered the nationality of the first owner of this timepiece, R. I. Dickey, whose name is engraved on the case back under the logo of the company Mr. Dickey was working for when he received the watch: Forest Oil Company.

R. I. DICKEY

Born on October 6th, 1907 in Merrimac, Massachusetts, Mr. Robert I. Dickey was among the most successful field geologists of the past century. After graduating from John Hopkins University in 1932, he obtained a Master's Degree in 1933 at Washington University. He was pursuing his doctorate when, forced by his financial situation, he accepted an offer from Coastal Oil Finding Company of Houston in June 1934, and then moved on to Stanolind Oil & Gas Company in November 1934. His nearly preternatural ability to find oil fields propelled his career and in just two years he was appointed assistant to the district geologist, a position he held until 1939, when he was approached by Forest Oil Company. The years he spent with FOC, between 1939 and 1955, are remembered as the most prolific for the company in terms of oil wells found. Given the engraving design incorporating the FOC logo, the present timepiece must have been offered by the company to Mr. Dickey in recognition of his work. In 1955, Mr. Dickey was hired by Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company as VP of Exploration. Also in this case, a steady stream of oil and gas fields' discoveries marked his years of service with the company until his retirement in 1973. During Mr. Dickey's retirement, he and his wife travelled extensively in Europe, Africa and Asia. R. I. Dickey passed away on February 13th, 1991.

The Nautilus is possibly the most recognizable wristwatch made by *Patek Philippe*. Inspired by the shape of a ship's portholes, it was designed by *Gérald Genta* as *Patek Philippe's* answer to *Audemars Piguet's* enormously successful Royal Oak, ironically also a *Gérald Genta* design. Originally marketed as the most exclusive steel sports watch one could own, it continues to be extremely popular due to its large, flat and simple aesthetic.

The present watch is known as the 'Jumbo' Nautilus as of large case dimensions. The reference 3700 was produced from 1976 to at least 1998 with the steel versions only available until circa 1987.

Fresh to market, the present specimen has to be considered a particularly exciting find because of the wealth of documents which accompanies the watch. Not only does it come with the simple Original Certificate and limited edition box, but also with an incredibly detailed plethora of extras which allows us to follow the full history of this watch. Its story begins with the invitation (and handwritten note) to the watch presentation event in New York on November 27th 2001. Obviously, the recipient was enthusiastic of the timepiece and placed an order even before the official presentation to *Tiffany's* boutique in Chicago, on November 15th, as proven by the invoice slips. The timepiece was subsequently sent to the client's address in Wisconsin on November 21st 2001. At the same time, two letters stating the value were issued for insurance purposes. It is doubtless that the present timepiece is the most complete example of this reference to ever appear on the market.

The present *Cartier* wristwatch is of the highest importance, quality and rarity. It features an exceptional twin-barrel movement with two mainsprings that could store enough energy for the watch to run continuously for eight straight days.

With the advent of automatic wristwatches in the 1930s and 1940s, the cost of producing special movements seen here came to be unnecessarily costly for *Cartier* and as a consequence they were produced in an extremely low quantity. It is thought that less that ten of these 8-day *Cartier* Tanks were put into production. Its rarity is further enhanced by its marvelous capability.

To fit the larger and rectangular twin-barrel movement, the case of these *Cartier* watches had to be in the "Tank Allongée" style. As a result, the watch is adapted and sized to more modern tastes. In fact, some believe these 8-day *Cartier* Tanks are among the most elegant *Cartier* wristwatches ever made.

Remarkably, only two other 8-day *Cartier* Tanks have been seen at auction. The first sold in 1989 and again in 1996 while Christie's sold the second in 2006 for 138,000 CHF and again in 2009 for 99,000 CHF. That example is now owned by one of the world's most discerning collectors.

The present watch has an unusual luminous dial and luminous-filled blued hands, giving the watch a more sporting and adventurous look.

The Oval Maxi models made by *Audemars Piguet* for the American market differ slightly from the Oval Maxi examples made by *Jaeger-LeCoultre* for the London market. In particular, the American models are wider and, in general, are of greater interest to collectors.





Hunted with extreme interest by collectors and considered by some to be the most beautiful *Heuer* dials ever made, the exact story of the origin of these silver Autavia dials is unknown and has generated significant interest from experts and collectors. According to the archives of *Universal Genève*, this Uni-Compax was manufactured between 1963 and 1965. Accompanied by a copy of an original *Universal Genève* advertisement from the 1960s detailing this reference.

Among the most aesthetically momentous and sought-after vintage chronographs by Universal Genève, the present timepiece is an example of a rare "Big Eye" Uni-Compax. The name stems from the larger 30 minutes register subsidiary dial. The alternation of the silvered and black finish of the dial, together with the red crosshairs present on the main dial as well as on the subsidiary dials, grant the timepiece an appeal and modernity rarely seen on vintage chronographs. The generous 37mm. diameter further boosts the wrist presence of this watch. With approximately 10 of these known, the condition and unpolished case make this a remarkable find. It is interesting to note the HOX stamp on the movement, denoting a watch originally imported and sold in the USA. The connoisseur will immediately notice this code is the same as the one found in Patek Philippe timepieces. This is because of the Henri Stern Watch Agency, Patek Philippe import agency for the United States and for a time was also in charge of the US importation of Universal Genève timepieces.

According to the archives of *Universal Genève*, the present watch was manufactured in 1966. Accompanied by a *Universal Genève* Certificate of Guarantee dated December 17th 1968, product literature, *Universal Genève* presentation box, original strap and tie-tag.

This attractive "panda" dial chronograph is both appealing because of its vintage style aesthetics which are associated with 1960s chronographs, but also because this reference was famously worn by model and wife of the late racing driver Jochen Rindt. Known as the "Nina Rindt" by avid collectors after the fashion muse who wore this model repeatedly, it is also known to be a direct concurrent of the Rolex Daytona. Furthermore, this desired timepiece is seldom discovered in such wonderfully preserved condition with box and papers.

The present watch has spent most of its life in the original box and was likely worn only a handful of occasions, if not less. Essentially New Old Stock, of further interest is the fact that everything from the signed crystal to the crown appears to be original.

The present watch is from the earlier series of Nina Rindt models, noted by the applied steel "u" logo on the dial and tapered luminous-filled register hands. The later version of the Nina Rindt featured a painted "u" in box logo and non-tapered luminous-filled register hands. The luminous-filled register hands were a remarkable innovation that allowed for the wearer to time things with the chronograph at night or in low light which was a function impossible for chronographs from other major chronographs of the era.

Accompanied by a *Longines* Extract from the Archives confirming that the present *Longines* Weems second-setting wristwatch in stainless steel with caliber 37.9 movement was invoiced on 21 June 1940 to the company *Longines-Wittnauer*, which was at that time the firm's agent for the USA.

Among *Longines* military watches, the 47mm Weems models issued to pilots in the Imperial Japanese Navy Air Service have occupied a mythical place. Only a handful are known to survive, and it can be speculated that most were likely lost in combat. The watches featured a Japanese engraving on the back including the number of the pilot. The present watch was issued to 862. The top line reads "air soldier" or "sky warrior" while the bottom line reads "number 8 6 2 issue." Other examples have also been found in the 800 range and it is thought that they may have been issued to a specific squadron.

An unsolved mystery is why all of the handful of issued watches were originally sent to New York. It is certainly possible that orders may have been made by the Japanese embassy in Washington, DC, but how they exactly migrated from the United States to Japan before the attack on Pearl Harbor is unclear.

The present watch has remarkable provenance. The watch was given by a Japanese pilot to an American who served as a translator for the U.S. Navy during World War II. During the post-war occupation, the American translator helped to set up a local newspaper in Okinawa. As a sign of appreciation for his service to the community and as a heartfelt token of friendship, the Japanese pilot presented him with his *Longines* watch. The American translator, who later advised the United States Congress on related issues, proceeded to put the watch in a prominent place on his desk and never wore it. It sat in that place of honor for approximately 70 years to the present day.

The watch is in remarkable condition. The 47mm case appears to be unpolished and the center rotating disc has developed an aged parchment-like patina. The dial has cracked by 9 o'clock, but that is perhaps forgivable given that the watch likely saw combat during World War II. ATENT

For collectors of *Longines* watches and military watches, the present watch is an extraordinary and important discovery.

Unknown from literature, diving watches made by *Breguet* are doubtlessly amongst the scarcest models ever produced by the celebrated house. The present example is part of an exceedingly small series of such diver's watches produced by *Breguet* in the mid-1960s, the exact number unknown but believed to be less than 60 and with varying dial styles.

In fact, only three of these vintage diving watches made by *Breguet* are known to the market. In May, Christie's sold one in Geneva with luminous Arabic numerals on the dial for the equivalent of \$100,886.

The watch offered here for sale impresses for a diver's watch with an unusually powerful yet minimalist design. The slender black bakelite bezel features subtle five minute divisions and the dial bearing only the signature "*Breguet*". Of strongest visual interest are the incredibly large circular lume plots, which no doubt were designed for easier reading of the time underwater, in dark places or at night.

The comparatively thin screw back case is likely to be waterresistant to at least 100 meters, standard at the time of its production. It is fitted with a robust automatic movement caliber 1581 by A. Schild, one of the first ébauche makers founded in Grenchen, Switzerland, in 1896. The firm specialized in the production of high quality ébauches with all parts being interchangeable for which it won a gold medal at the Swiss National Exhibition in Berne in 1914. A. Schild supplied ébauches to several renowned watch manufacturers in Switzerland.

Preserved in very good, original overall condition, fresh to the market and of extraordinary rarity, the present "montre plongeur" is a trophy for the collector of unusual sport's watches.

We are indebted to Mr. Emmanuel Breguet for his valuable assistance in researching the present timepiece.

The present watch is distinguished by its large bevels and seemingly unpolished case. It is the understanding of the consignor that the watch was originally purchased to be used for diving and water activities, which is why the case may have developed a slight shine. Vintage *Rolex* watches worn repeatedly in saltwater can often develop a shiny patina.

The bezel insert was likely swapped only a few years after the watch was purchased, perhaps so the original owner could read the time easier in the water and with the visual impact of the red triangle.

It is remarkable to find a vintage *Rolex* dive watch from the 1950s with this charisma in this seemingly-unpolished condition.



This watch is an example of the Mark II double red Seadweller. The presence of its original Guarantee and box, and a remarkably untouched case is a rare instance for a vintage watch in any case, but even more so for tool watches that were subject to intense use and wear.

Rolex, especially in the 1960s and 1970s, was a company with a strong drive to experiment. All the models (from the Sea-dweller, to the Submariner, to the Daytona) produced over these years are in continuous evolution. This is a result of the undeniable effort of the company to offer not only the most accurate, but also the most legible and eye pleasing tool watches of the time. For example, Mark II double red Sea-Dweller dials are distinguished by the bigger font of Sea-Dweller compared to Submariner 2000. An extremely small detail, but one that was obviously purposefully engineered, possibly as the result of the growing attention the public was reserving for this model, and thus the need of highlighting the Sea-dweller designation in order to make it more obvious and avoid confusion with the other diver's watch made by Rolex in those years, eg. the Submariner. However, this is an era when production was not yet fully realized and thus small imperfections are to be expected. In the case of Mark II dials, this is reflected in the Rolex crown at 12, which is presents a characteristically small, nearly non-existent hole at the base and the spikes not yet well defined.



The submariner reference 1680 is without a doubt one of the most iconic diver's watch models of all times. The model was released in 1969, and remained in production until the early 1980s. As with all *Rolex* models from the mid-20th century, it features an evolution over time, mainly noticeable in its dial design. Early models are distinguished by the red Submariner designation, and are consequently known as "Red Submariners". The aesthetic appeal of this note of color on the dial combined with the historical interest of being the early version of this model resulted in very high popularity of this variation among *Rolex* Collectors. Red Submariners show an evolution as well and are classified in "Marks", defined by some detail of the dial. The present watch features a Mark VI dial.

Mark VI dials are found on watches bearing case number from around 3 to 4 million. The defining characteristics of this iteration are the vibrant red submariner designation printed directly on the black dial, feet first depth designation with closed 6, and a markedly round rather than flat S of Submariner. Furthermore, this example of Red Submariner shines for the impeccable quality of its dial, without a scratch or fading, and with the luminous material of both hands and dial absolutely original and untouched. Originally developed together with COMEX (Compagnie Maritime d'Expertise) as a modification of the Submariner, the Sea-Dweller is distinguished by the gas escape valve in the band, which allows builtup gas to escape from the inside of the watch during decompression. Without it, the internal pressure would threaten to pop the crystal off the watch.

The DRSD variation is distinguished by the "Sea-Dweller" and "Submariner 2000" designations printed in red. Beyond the rarity of this configuration. It should be noted that the red designations increase the overall aesthetic momentum of the timepiece.

DRSD dials present an evolution over time. The present example belongs to the Mark IV series, distinguished by the bigger font of the "Sea-Dweller" designation compared to that of the "Submariner 2000" designation, nearly perfect alignment of the D of Sea-Dweller with the first R of "Submariner 2000", and a relatively large *Rolex* crown at 12 with well-defined spikes. A further layer of appeal is given by the serial case number engraved to the inside of the case back. This is a detail not found on all DRSD: some lack the case number on the case back completely, some bear only the last three digits, and few feature the full serial, such as the present watch.

The plethora of original documents accompanying the timepiece further boosts the appeal of this rare and charming diver's watch.



A regatta timer is used by the skipper of a yacht to determine when their vessel can cross the starting line. The countdown is usually under ten minutes, allowing the boats to prepare for the race ahead by tacking back and forth at the starting line. Having a precise timer at this point is essential as not be be penalized by crossing the staring line preemptively. The Yacht-Master II has a flyback regatta timer that allows the wearer to time the countdown for a chosen period of up to ten minutes. In addition, the countdown can be adjusted while in use so that it can be as accurate as possible in accordance to the audible signals given at the start of race. The blue "Command Bezel," as named by Rolex, can be turned to set the countdown timer and the re-set button allows the seconds hand to fly back to zero and the minute hand to fly to the nearest minute, allowing for incredible precision.

With a strong nautical feel, the present watch stands out because of its bright blue bezel, red countdown hand and large white dial. Furthermore, this special limited edition timepiece celebrates 100 years of The Panama Canal, a 77 kilometer ship canal which connects the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, first used in 1914.







From a design perspective, the hundreds of hand drawn watch designs seen within the registers' pages show watches made for a wide variety of watch and jewelry companies, notably including Rolex, Cartier, and Omega. The designs are mostly for ladies' wristwatches and the majority for the celebrated houses Boucheron and Mauboussin.

Reference 4313 was launched in the late 1940s and is characterized by the large teardrop-shaped lugs mounted onto the bezel, a feature found exclusively in this unusual model. The watch offered here for sale stands out further by the unusual choice of a stainless steel and pink gold case, a combination scarcely used for chronographs made by the celebrated house. The atypical dial is distinguished by the omission of any of the technical scales (tachymeter, telemeter or pulsometer) that one would usually expect on this reference. Consequently the entire layout could be modified, moving the numerals further to the edge and hence increasing the readability. Interestingly due to the different dial proportions, the watch, already one of *Rolex's* largest 1940s chronographs, appears even larger.

Amazingly, the distinguishing feature of this watch, the teardrop lugs, still retain their original sculpted appearance further enhancing the enticing aesthetic of this mid 20th century *Rolex* chronograph. The dial appears to have been reprinted long ago and according to the consignor it sat in a safety deposit box for approximately 50 years to the present day.

The *Rolex* Cosmograph Daytona is among the most appreciated and recognized chronograph models by any manufacturer. When it comes fitted with the rare so-called Paul Newman dial, its rarity, aesthetic appeal and collectability are profoundly increased. This dial, distinguished by the three dimensional construction – with sunken subsidiary dials and sunken outer chapter ring – was an alternative dial offered to clients at the time. Ironically, this variation was not appreciated by the market at the time of its production. It took decades for collectors to prize this "exotic" dial variation. Paul Newman himself wore a reference 6239 with this dial, supposedly a gift from his wife.

The present example is an early version of the Paul Newman dial, correct for the 1.8 million case number of this timepiece. It is distinguished by the T Swiss T designation presenting taller letters in the center and shorter at the ends.

In production for a very short time between the end of the 1960s and the beginning of the 1970s, reference 6262 is one of the rarest manually wound Daytona references. It is defined by its metal bezel, pump chronograph buttons (as opposed to the screw down version of its sister reference 6265) and the celebrated caliber 727, the final evolution of this family of movements: *Rolex* exchanged the manually wound caliber with an automatic version in the late 1980s.

The present example of this rare timepiece is distinguished by the presence of the iconic and desirable Paul Newman dial. Distinguished by a completely different design of the subdials, with square markers, and, most importantly, by the outer track in opposite color than the rest of the dial (black on white dial, in this case), the Paul Newman dial is not only extremely attractive, but recognizable and rare. Furthermore, it is very complex from a technical point of view: the three subdials and outer track are carved into the dial plate. This highly complicated manufacturing process arms the dial with a subtle depth and dimensionality which transforms the overall looks of the timepiece.

The present watch comes directly from the original owner, who purchased the watch new to aid him in his work as a videographer. He relied on the chronograph function for timing segments. Of particular curiosity is the earlier bezel calibrated to a maximum of 300 units.

Reference 6263, together with its sister reference with metal bezel 6265, is the final evolution of the manually wound Daytona Cosmograph. In production from the late 1960s to around 1987, for a few years it coexisted with reference 6264 (and 6262, with metal bezel), which lack however the screw down chronograph pushers, and for this reason were soon discontinued. 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

The panorama of manually-wound Rolex Daytona Chronographs encompasses 7 different models, plus two bejeweled models made in extremely small numbers. Among the non-bejeweled timepieces, only three models truly qualify as Oyster case (indeed, while these three models bear the Oyster designation on the dial, the others do not). A true Oyster case is defined by the screw back, screw down crown and screw down chronograph pushers, thus ensuring increased water resistance. Reference 6265 is indeed one of these highly sought-after models. Together with its sister reference 6263 (the difference being the black-insert bezel rather than the metal one), reference 6265 is the final evolution of manually wound Daytona. It is defined, beyond its metal insert and screw down

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pushers, by the caliber 727 (evolved from caliber 722-1).

The present example is an exceedingly attractive specimen of this landmark reference. Not only it is offered in pristine condition, but it furthermore features the signature of prominent retailer *Tiffany & Co.* on the dial. A cornerstone of a serious *Rolex* collection, reference 6265 is distinguished by its metal bezel with tachymeter scale, screw down chronograph buttons and caliber 727. The present example is the most lavish iteration of this model: in 18k gold with gold bracelet. The bracelet itself is the rare version with riveted links and endlinks stamped 71, considered by the *Rolex* collecting community a collectible on its own. The alternation between the central polished link and outer brushed links adds flair and movement to the ensemble. A layer of historical appeal is given to this watch by its 9.6 million case back, denoting the production year 1987: this is one of the very last manually wound Daytona (of all references) to ever be manufactured. Indeed 1987 is the year the manually wound Daytonas were discontinued in favor of the automatic versions.

The layer of oxidation noticeable between the chronograph pushers and crown, and also on some details of the bracelet, is the telltale mark of a watch which spent most of its life in a safety deposit box. Another testament to the care the present timepiece has seen throughout its life is the presence and extreme crispness of all the three stamps under the lugs. As it often happens with Rolex, the case back bears a different reference number than the case: 6263. This is because the specifications of the case back for the two references are exactly the same, and thus the company was inclined to mount whatever case back was available during final assembly. The stamp *CRS* stands for the case maker Charles-René Spielmann.

Among the most rare and attractive variations of the legendary Paul Newman dial, the so-called "Panda" version is distinguished by its striking color scheme. Like the Asian bear it is named after, the only colors present on this dial are white (background) and black (registers and outer track). It is speculated that this "toneddown" version was designed to boost the sales of the Exotic (as Rolex used to call Paul Newman dials at the time). In fact, Paul Newman dials were not appreciated at the time of their commercialization: the public deemed them too unusual and eccentric, and this is the reason behind their scarcity. The Panda variation exchanges the red fifth of a second divisions for white ones, making the overall look of the dial more elegant and less flamboyant. As this design was soon discontinued (it can be found on

serial numbers between circa 2.2 and circa 3 million), it is a safe assumption that the effort did not succeed. As a matter of fact, Paul Newman dials in their entirety will go out of production just a little while later (the last ones can be found on serial numbers around 3.2 million).

The present owner purchased the watch approximately 15 years ago and wore it sparingly. He had the watch serviced by *Rolex* in 2008 and has not worn it since then.

GIRARD-PERREGAUX

There are few names within the elite of Swiss "Haute Horlogerie" as rich in history and evocative as *Girard-Perregaux*. The activities of the Firm go as far back as 1791, giving it more than two centuries of heritage that forms the foundation of what the Swiss Manufacture located in La Chaux-de-Fonds, is today.

Constant Girard-Perregaux, who gave his name to the Manufacture, started to use Tourbillons in his watches from 1860. He focused on those elements ignored by his contemporaries: the structure of the movement, and the shape of its parts. In his hands, the movement was no longer just the technical part of the watch, but an integral part of the design.

The three arrow-shaped parallel bridges made of gold, which have meanwhile become the true signature of Girard-Perregaux appeared for the first time in a watch in 1889, combined with a Tourbillon. Hence the name, Three Gold Bridges. Constant Girard-Perregaux presented his masterpiece, The Esmeralda which won the Gold medal at the most prestigious Universal Genève exhibition of the 19th century: Paris, for which the Eiffel Tower was built.

In 1991, the year of Girard-Perregaux's bi-centenary, the Manufactory's first wristwatch version of the Tourbillon with Three Gold Bridges was presented at the European Watch Fair in Basel. Both press and connoisseurs hailed it as a major achievement.

According to the Archives of *Audemars Piguet*, the present watch was manufactured in 1937 and sold to *Bittmann*, St. Moritz.

According to the Archives of *Audemars Piguet*, the present watch with movement serial number 42'875 began production as the final watch in their Register for 1936, was completed in 1937 and then sold to *Bittmann*, a retailer in St. Moritz, Switzerland, in 1937. According to the *Audemars Piguet* Register of Completed Watches this watch had a cadran émail blanc (white enamel dial), chiffres radium (radium numbers), pour Miles Anglais (for English miles), Spires au centre (spiral in the center) and Aiguilles radium (radium hands) with Signature *Audemars Piguet*. Furthermore, the *Audemars Piguet* Register of Completed Watches states that it was one of only the chronographs in steel in their registry for 1936 and one of only five chronographs in steel sold in 1937.

In the world of vintage watches, astute collectors realize the absolute rarity and importance of *Audemars Piguet* chronographs. *Audemars Piguet* made approximately 300 chronographs between 1930 and 1950, an absolute small fraction of the chronographs made by other important vintage watch manufacturers during that period.

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The present watch is only the second Audemars Piguet chronograph in a case made solely of stainless steel to surface to the market in recent years, and the first with two pushers. The other example is a monopusher chronograph with a non-luminous white enamel dial in the collection of Audemars Piguet.

The charisma of the dial on the present watch is beyond spectacular. The bright white enamel dial appears to have no cracks or damage and is furthermore augmented by the stunning spiral or "snail ring" tachymeter scale in red in the center and extremely unusual quarter-mile outer track in red on the outer edge. It is quite possible that the watch was originally ordered for a horse race enthusiast or race car driver. The present watch is one of only a very few Audemars Piguet chronographs with spiral or "snail ring" tachymeter scale to ever emerge to the market in recent years. If

> that was not enough, it features large Arabic numerals of luminous radium material that together with ornate cathedral hands of radium provide a striking and completely unique look. The luminous material reads strongly on a Geiger counter, suggesting it is original radium and unaltered in any way, without loss of material on the dial or in the hands.

The case is spectacular both for its architecture and for its condition. Despite its 32.5mm diameter

excluding crown, the watch wears extremely well thanks to the dimensionality of the case and the 19mm width between the lugs. The watch is distinctly Audemars Piguet in design. Furthermore, the crown and stunning olive-shaped pushers are of extreme appeal to collectors of vintage chronographs.

Considering the criteria that many vintage watch collectors seek including maker, complications, case material, condition, rarity, originality, provenance and aesthetic charisma, this Audemars Piguet chronograph is a thrillingly important discovery, and would be a worthy and significant addition to any collection.

According to the archives of *Audemars Piguet* the present watch with movement serial 73'013 and caliber 13VZSSQP was part of the reference 5516 and was made in 1957 and sold in 1963.

In the world of vintage watches superlatives are frequently overused, which can leave one wanting for words to exist that are more powerful than "most important" and "best" when it comes to watches such as the present Audemars Piguet reference 5516 perpetual calendar. This watch is arguably the most important reference ever made by Audemars Piguet, had one of the most important innovations for a perpetual calendar wristwatch, is one of the finest representations of traditional Vallée de Joux wristwatchmaking, is arguably in the finest condition of the six reference 5516 examples known to the market out of nine made, and is

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one of the most beautiful and well-balanced wristwatches ever made.

The present watch comes to Christie's from a private and respected American family. According to the consignor, the watch was likely worn on only a few occasions and spent most of the last 50+ years in its red *Audemars Piguet & Co.* presentation box.



Perpetual calendar watches were made popular by military officials during World War One. These were, however, unique piece pocket watches. It took a decade for the first perpetual calendar wristwatch to be developed, a unique creation by Patek Philippe, and then sixteen more years for the first serially produced perpetual calendar wristwatch to see the light of day, the Patek Philippe reference 1518. Although breakthroughs in horological development, these early perpetual calendar wristwatches lacked a fundamental indication, which was present in their earlier pocket watch counterparts: the leap year cycle. Setting the correct date involved a lengthy procedure of reaching February 28th with the correctors, then having to manually advance the hands to see if they would move to February 29th, thus indicating the watch is in the leap year, or not, in which case again the correctors would be used to go through one more year and again repeat the procedure on the next February 28th.

In fact, the first serially produced perpetual calendar wristwatch with leap year indication was developed by *Audemars Piguet* in the late 1950s: the legendary reference 5516, here represented in one of the most pristine example of this model. Reference 5516 was realized in an extremely limited series of 9 examples starting from 1955, all being sold

between 1963 and 1969. The first three examples displayed the moon phases at 12 o'clock, and the leap year cycle, with the full indication of the 48 months at 6 o'clock. The last six specimens, realized from 1957 such as the present watch held the opposite design: moon phases at 6 and leap year indication at 12. Furthermore, most of these last pieces feature a much cleaner leap year subsidiary register, without the detailed indication of the month, resulting in much more refined aesthetic. Undeniably, this timepiece is a supremely attractive, balanced and legible watch: the three subsidiary dials and leap year indication are perfectly aligned with the four cardinal points of the dial, and the other date track is tangent to the subdials at 9, 12 and 3. The entirety of the scales and designations are engraved and hard enameled, thus practically eternal. Furthermore, there is absolutely no sign of cosmetic intervention on the dial, which arrived to us perfectly intact in all of its details, including commas and accents, which are easily lost even with gentle washing.

The case is no less impressive than the dial: unpolished, it fully retains the satin finish to the sides of the lugs, extremely sharp edges, and absolutely untouched hallmarks. The diameter of 36.5mm is generous for the times, and it grants a remarkable wrist presence to the watch, also in virtue of the angular bands and stepped bezel, precursors to a trend typical of the 1960s and 1970s, characterized by angular cases with sharp edges.

Reference 5516 is furthermore distinguished by the fact it is one of the last timepieces ever to be realized with the historical "établissage" system. Typical of 19th century watchmaking and gradually abandoned during the 20th century, this methodology consists in delegating the production of the watch components to a myriad of tiny and highly specialized companies, each with a specific niche: screws, dials, springs, case components, jewels and so on. This made sense in the early days of watchmaking with limited technology available and high precision standards of the components involved led to the rise of specialized companies, as it would be impossible for one manufacturer to achieve state of the art results in each and every component. Thus, the brand acted as an orchestra director, providing detailed specifications to the various suppliers and then assembling the pieces in house.

The nine examples of reference 5516 are indeed realized with this system. The movement blanks were realized by Valjoux; the underdial work (cadrature) was made by independent artisan Alfred Aubert; the screws, pallets, jewels, gears etc. by a



multitude of specialized businesses located in Vallée de Joux, and the case maker for this masterpiece is, as denoted by the stamp to the case back, Eggly & Cie from Geneva Canton (case maker number 23, inscribed in a key).

The first series of the reference 5516 featured an aperture for the the moon phases at 12 o'clock and was produced in 1955 in three examples with movement serial numbers 66'135, 66'136 and 66'137. Christie's sold the watch with movement serial number 66'137 in November 2008 for the equivalent of \$314,461. That watch along with the other first series reference 5516 is in what is recognized as the most important private collection of vintage *Audemars Piguet* wristwatches.

The present watch is part of the second series of the reference 5516, which featured an aperture for the moon phases at 6 o'clock and was produced in six examples in 1957 with movement serial numbers 73'011, 73'012, 73'013, 73'014, 73'015 and 73'016. Each watch has a hand-engraved dial filled with enamel and each is unique.

73'011: This watch resides in the collection of *Audemars Piguet*. It features a similar dial layout to 73'013, with some minor differences.

73'012: This watch is in a private collection of vintage *Audemars Piguet* wristwatches along with the two known first series reference 5516 examples. It is notable for its display of months in the leap year indicator register.

73'013: The present watch. A close analysis of a photograph from the Archives of *Audemars Piguet* shows that it is the present watch, notably due to the slightly lower location of "SUN" in the day of the week register and the smaller "o" to the left of the second register.

73'014 and 73'015: The location of both of these watches is unknown to the market. Based on ongoing research, it is believed that one is signed Cartier and the other has French abbreviations for days of the week.

73'016: This watch resides in the collection of *Audemars Piguet*. It notably has a *Tiffany & Co.* retailer signature on the dial.

Considering its astounding rarity, historical importance, aesthetic appeal, groundbreaking movement, incredible condition and heritage production methodology, the present timepiece fully deserves a place among the most important and remarkable wristwatches ever manufactured and offered in public.



The Jules Audemars Equation of Time was introduced into the market in 2000. This complicated wristwatch incorporates a perpetual calendar with leap year indicator, mechanically tracks the time of sunrise and sunset for the designated city (indicated on the recessed inner ring following its owner's request) and accurately shows the difference between mean solar time and sidereal time. The Equation of Time and its 423 components is another example for *Audemars Piguet's* dedication to the art of fine watchmaking.

The equation of time is the difference between true solar time and mean time. True solar time, given by sundials, varies from day to day because of the Earth's elliptical orbit, and according to the longitude of the point of observation. Mean time, given by watches, ignores these variations and for every day of the year mathematically divides time into equal hours.

One of the technical attractions is the dead beat second complication. Instead of continuously sweeping, the second hand stops at each seconds mark before jumping to the next one, performing exactly like the hands of an analogue quartz watch.

Another interesting feature is the high efficiency of the movement. The energy is transmitted directly from the escapement to the balance instead of going through the lever, only absorbing fifty percent of the energy in comparison to a standard lever escapement that absorbs seventy percent of the energy. Reference 5131

Reference 5131 was launched in 2008 in yellow gold, 2009 in white gold and 2014 in pink gold. The present watch in white gold represents Europe, Africa, Asia, and Oceania whereas the yellow gold version represents Americas, Europe, and Africa and the pink gold version represents Asia, Oceania and the Americas.

Reference 5131 is the successor of reference 5130 and shows three notable differences: use of a distinguishable closionné enamel dial, the names of the 24 cities are displayed in Italic type and the signature *Patek Philippe* and company location *Genève* are engraved on the bezel. Only two or three enamel artists are able to produce these rare dials and together they can only deliver 30-40 dials of each color every year. In 2012 a special and unique reference 5131 was produced with a view of the Geneva lake, and in 2014 limited editions were produced for much celebrated the *Patek Philippe* 175th Anniversary.

A modern world time wristwatch, the mechanism used harks back to the 1930s when talented Geneva watchmaker Louis Cottier devised it and offered his invention to *Patek Philippe*. Cottier's ingenuity resulted in the company's now classic references 1415 HU and 2523. In 1959, *Patek Philippe* obtained a patent for Cottier's device (Swiss Patent No. 340 191). The company further developed the movement, introducing calibre 240 HU in 1999.

The extract for this single button chronograph fully confirms all the details one would want to see with a dial from this period: most notably the tachymeter scale calibrated for one mile and silvered dial with Breguet numerals in yellow gold. Additionally the US import mark PXP is on the balance cock confirming this watch was made for the US market in the late 1930s. Less than 16 single-button 130s are known to have been made by Patek Philippe and the presently offered watch is one of two examples known to have a Breguet dial, the other example Movement No. 860094 with a gilt metric Breguet dial, and this lot being Movement No. 860096 with a silvered Breguet dial calibrated for miles. As the only

known single button *Patek Philippe* Ref. 130 with a silvered Breguet dial, the presently lot is as important for its technical rarity as it is for its historical importance.

The ébauche for this unusual watch was commissioned by *Patek Philippe* and made by Victorin Piguet & Co. of Le Sentier. During the 1920s the company made most of the ébauches for complicated movements, including single button and split seconds chronographs, mainly for prestigious firms like *Patek Philippe*.

The single button chronograph mechanism is considered to be amongst the most complex and sophisticated marvels of time measurement. Whereas the more commonly found operates the chronograph functions (start - stop - reset) through two buttons in the band, the single button chronograph controls all of these functions through the crown. It is believed that *Patek Philippe* produced single button chronograph wristwatches only between the mid-1920s and the late 1930s, housed in the typical 1920s tonneau cases or in the well-known "Officier" style cases, featuring either wire or screw lugs. In mid-1930s, Patek *Philippe* modernized these chronographs by finishing them in the celebrated reference 130 case with snap on back, the firm's first chronograph model which was given a reference number. Under this reference Patek Philippe produced a diversity of models such as the traditional chronograph but also the more exotic single button chronographs. Both types were available with different precious metal as well as stainless steel cases, as popular today as they were when first introduced into the market.

This 130 Single-Button Chronograph was first offered at Christie's in Geneva on November 13 2001 and sold for 405,750 Swiss francs.









General Henry H. Arnold

Born in Gladwyne, Pennsylvania, on June 25th, 1886, Henry Arnold became one of the greatest military figures and aviation pioneers ever known. Affectionately named "Hap" by his friends and colleagues, his career began when he attended the U.S. Military Academy in 1907 and from this point onwards he created history and was regarded so highly that in his retirement he was granted permanent five-star rank as general of the Air Force: an achievement no other had been so privileged to receive before.

Perhaps the most significant of Arnold's achievements in the field of aviation was becoming Commander of Army Air Forces in 1942, and leading during World War II. During this time he grew the American air army officers significantly from approximately 20,000 men to over 2,000,000 with approximately 4,000 planes increasing to 75,000 under his leadership.

Another hugely significant milestone in Arnold's career was being taught to fly by the legendary Wright Brothers, who are credited with inventing and building the first successful airplane which flew for the first time in 1903. It is known that since Arnold was instructed by the most attributed duo in aviation at that time for a period of a few months, that this prompted him to go on to teach others as he did at the Signal Corps aviation school in Maryland. It is interesting to note that initially Arnold was known to have a fear of flying, a fear he not only overcame but managed to cast aside in favor of following his destiny for greatness.

Other notable successes include establishing a new altitude by piloting a Burgess-Wright airplane to 6,540 feet in 1912, being the first military aviator to use radio to report observations, and taking part in maneuvers that continuously set world records across many planes.

Retiring from service in 1946, his remarkable life achievements include three Distinguished Service crosses, the Distinguished Flying Cross, and Air Medal from many countries including Morocco, Yugoslavia, Mexico and France amongst others. Not only a world recognized aviator but also a writer, Arnold wrote a number of books to create interest in youngsters about the field of flying, and also wrote a post-World War II autobiography. Henry H. Arnold died at his ranch home in California on January 15th, 1950.



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The present lot should not only be celebrated for its handsome looks and technical advances, but also because it belonged to a man who dedicated more than 42 years to serving his country, and a man happy to do so. It was his constant smile which is where his nickname "Hap" is thought to have originated from: a pleasant addition to the momentous history of this important watch.

Even among experienced collectors, reference 591 is one of the least known chronograph models of *Patek Philippe's* production. In fact, research indicates that less than 30 examples of this reference have survived to date, either cased in yellow or pink gold. This exceedingly small production renders it rarer than any other chronograph model of the same period. Furthermore, to the best of our knowledge this watch has never before been offered in public.

Reference 591, launched in 1938, differs from all other *Patek Philippe* chronographs by its generous yet subtle case proportions. Its cylindrical body highlighted by a stepped bezel is crowned with four "beanshaped" lugs with straight sides. Consequently this reference responds particularly badly to insensible polishing as it quickly loses the angle to the bezel and the edges to the lugs. This example however has a near mint case that barely shows its 73 year old age, best exemplified by the crisp untouched gold hallmark on the 11 o'clock lug. Furthermore, the 'silvery rose dial' confirmed on the archive of this watch makes this example of this incredibly rare reference all the more desirable.

This Reference 1463 was originally sold by the American retailer *Brock & Company* in Beverly Hills, California in late 1949 for a retail price of \$425. The dial of this watch features *HOX* on the balance bridge confirming it was imported by Henri Stern Agency (*Patek Philippe* USA) and has a one mile tachometer dial and exquisite Breguet numerals very much catering to the American taste of the era.

Considered one the most beautiful chronographs of the mid-20th century, Reference 1463 is *Patek Philippe's* only vintage chronograph model with screw back case and round pushers. Even though the notion of "sports watch" is probably an invention of the late 20th century, there is certainly some explanation if one associates the stainless steel version of reference 1463 to this term. In fact, for over half a century there has not been any other model by *Patek Philippe* better exemplifying the needs of a modern, self-confident, booming society which is enjoying outdoor activities and in particular sport during spare time. As a matter of fact, whereas the chronograph movement responds to the sportsman's needs, the beautifully sculpted water-resistant case protects it from humidity and dust.

The overall look of this beautiful timepiece is enhanced by the eye-catching dial with beautifully raised hard enamel signatures and scales, displaying an attractive aging patina as the connoisseur would expect. The fact that only approximately ten other 1463s are known with this exact dial configuration obviously adds enormously to its appeal and collectability.

The present timepiece was first offered at Christie's on May

18th 1998 and sold for 80,500 Swiss francs.

To the best of our knowledge this watch has never before been offered in public.

Produced from 1949 to 1985, the total output for reference 2499 is 349 examples. This means an incredibly low annual production of some 9 pieces a year. Such limited availability, combined with the incredibly good looks of the reference, made this model incredibly desirable at the time of its commercialization, frustrating countless *Patek Philippe* clients around the world. With its discontinuation, it became an absolute classic of watch collecting.

The reference 2499 is the heir to reference 1518, the first serially produced perpetual calendar chronograph of all time. As a matter of fact, even during production of reference 2499 *Patek Philippe* was the only manufacturer to feature this set of complication in series.

The technical complexity of the timepiece marries the perpetual calendar and the chronograph, two of the most useful complications in horology, thus combining traits to the allure of being one of the most refined and difficult-to-obtain watches of all time.

The aesthetic impact of the timepiece stems from a multiplicity of factors: mainly the generous 37.5 mm diameter, absolutely oversized at the time of its first inception, but totally in line with today's standards, and its iconic lugs, defined by the carved groove to the upper outer edges. While it would seem a trivial detail, the impact on the timepiece is gargantuan, transfiguring the overall look with a mixture of stately importance and subtly playful exuberance.

Reference 2499 is classified in four distinct series:

First series: with square chronograph pushers and dial with railway minute divisions

Second series: with round pushers and dial with railway minute divisions

Third series: with round pushers and without railway minute divisions (such as the present timepiece)

Fourth series: like the third series, but with sapphire crystal instead of plastic

An instant classic by definition, reference 5970 is the heir to reference 3970. In production from 2004 to 2010, it has been replaced by reference 5270. The third (out of five, at the moment) member of the *Patek Philippe* perpetual chronograph family, one of the most revered lineages among the company's contemporary and historical production, the model is

a mesmerizing "trait d'union" between modern watchmaking and historical heritage. The dial is obviously inspired by 1940s pieces, with its unmistakable railway minute divisions combined with Arabic five minute divisions, and the outer tachymeter scale.

The case design is more modern, with a generous 40 mm. diameter and sculpted lugs, more than worthy successors to the iconic fluted lugs of previous reference 3970, and of

course incepted with the even earlier reference 2499. The movement is based on a Lémania ébauche, heavily modified and finished by *Patek Philippe*. This reference is the last perpetual chronograph by *Patek Philippe* powered by a modified Lémania movement: the historical partnership between the companies ended in 2010, with reference 5270 sporting an "in-house" movement.

The model immediately enjoyed popularity amongst collectors and was available in white gold or pink gold only until 2007 when the production of these two versions ceased. Reference 5970 in yellow gold was in production only in 2008. In 2008, the model was made exclusively in platinum.

A BEFORE THE SALE 1 DESCRIPTION OF LOTS

- (a) Certain words used in the catalogue description have special meanings. You can find details of these on the page headed "Important Notices and Explanation of Cataloguing Practice" which forms part of these terms. You can find a key to the Symbols found next to certain catalogue entries under the section of the catalogue called "Symbols Used in this Catalogue".
- (b) Our description of any lot in the catalogue, any condition report and any other statement made by us (whether orally or in writing) about any lot, including about its nature or condition, arist, period, materials, approximate dimensions, or provenance are our opinion and not to be relied upon as a statement of fact. We do not carry out in-depth research of the sort carried out by professional historians and scholars. All dimensions and weights are approximate only.

2 OUR RESPONSIBILITY FOR OUR DESCRIPTION OF LOTS

We do not provide any guarantee in relation to the nature of a lot apart from our **authenticity warranty** contained in paragraph E2 and to the extent provided in paragraph I below.

3 CONDITION

- (a) The condition of lots sold in our auctions can vary widely due to factors such as age, previous damage, restoration, repair and wear and tear. Their nature means that they will rarely be in perfect condition. Lots are sold "as is," in the condition they are in at the time of the sale, without any representation or warranty or assumption of liability of any kind as to condition by Christie's or by the seller.

The Story

In 2007, Robert Greubel, Stephen Forsey and Philippe Dufour, all three of whom are members of the Time Aeon Foundation, reached an alarming conclusion: due to increasing mechanisation and a massive recourse to automation in the world of watchmaking, an entire heritage of ancestral procedures and techniques was on the verge of disappearing. They therefore decided to act by combining their efforts to select a pupil and then transmit their expertise to him. This chosen pupil should put the techniques learned into practice by creating a timepiece by hand using traditional tools, such as the uprighting tool, the hand-mandrel lathe and the topping tool. In turn, the pupil shall transmit these skills to future generations thus safeguarding from oblivion a certain form of watchmaking excellence.

They chose Michel Boulanger, a French watchmaking teacher at the Diderot vocational training college in Paris. The "Le Garde Temps – Naissance d'une Montre" project that started in 2009, was officially launched at the prestigious Salon International de la Haute Horlogerie (SIHH) held in January 2012 in Geneva. Every month Michel, the teacher-turned-pupil, travelled to La Chauxde-Fonds to build up a store of knowledge from Robert Greubel, Stephen Forsey, Philippe Dufour and from various other specialists practising at the Greubel Forsey Atelier. Thanks to the regular round-trips between Switzerland and his workshop in the Beauce region to the south-west of Paris, and working within the framework of a six-year project, Boulanger embarked upon the creation of an exceptional timepiece. This was to be a circular wristwatch, of extremely pure design, driven by a manually wound movement with three-hands time display and equipped with a tourbillon mechanism following in the great tradition of 19th century watchmakers, particularly Jacques-Frédéric Houriet and Abraham-Louis Breguet. So as to showcase the tourbillon mechanism, the structure of this timepiece features an off-centre dial displaying the hours and minutes. The different finishes applied to each component are of vital importance, even if they are not ultimately visible, in that they epitomise the concept of outstanding handmade craftsmanship that is at the heart of the "Le Garde Temps – Naissance d'une Montre" project.



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
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
