"One interesting thing that happened during my school days was that around 1947 or 1948, when I was 15, I made my first professional contribution to the family watchmaking business. One day my father came home from work and said that Walter Haynes, who was then the president of upmarket sporting outfitters Abercrombie & Fitch in New York, had asked him to create a watch which could display the time of tides. Funnily enough, some years earlier my father had thought it would be useful to have a watch that showed the phases of the moon because while mushroom hunting he had observed that morels seemed to spring up in greater numbers during a waxing moon. But a watch that could display the time of tides really stumped him. He had not seen the sea for quite a few years and was not at all familiar with the subject of tides. He scratched his head and admitted he had no idea how to do it. I told my father that my physics teacher at school, Dr. Heinz Schilt, was a genius and I was sure he would be able to find a solution. Indeed he could and he performed all the calculations for the wheels and cogs needed for a watch to predict high tides at

a given location. Thanks to him and my intermediation we were able to create our first tide watch, the "Solunar", and later the "Mareograph-Seafarer". This was my very first involvement with the creation of a watch."

The *Heuer* Solunar was an important watch in the history of both the company that would become *TAG Heuer* and for a young Jack Heuer, then only a 15-year-old. Abercrombie & Fitch requested Charles-Edouard Heuer create a wristwatch that would track tides to assist sportsmen, particularly those hunters and fishermen who subscribed to the solunar theory that the behavior of animals and fish was affected by movement the moon, similar to how tides were affected by the location of the moon.

In 1949, *Heuer* introduced the product of the collaboration between Charles-Edouard Heuer, Jack Heuer, and Dr. Heinz Schilt (Jack's physics teacher): the Solunar, which displayed the time and tide. Shortly thereafter, *Heuer* introduced the *Abercrombie & Fitch* Seafarer and the *Heuer* Mareograph, which added a chronograph. These watches were sold in various iterations at Abercrombie & Fitch stores in the United States through the 1970s. Most of the Solunar watches initially simply featured "*Heuer*" on the dial, but two examples are known to the market that are co-branded with "*Abercrombie & Fitch Co*" in an arc above the Heuer shield.

The present Solunar watch is original condition with charismatic patina to the dial and hands. Offered without reserve, it is a remarkable piece for a collector of important, unusual, and rare vintage watches.

Beginning in the 1940s, *Heuer* began making watches branded for sale by *Abercrombie & Fitch* in New York. At that time, *Abercrombie & Fitch* was an elite outfitter of sporting goods. Two of the proprietary models *Heuer* produced for *Abercrombie & Fitch* were the Solunar and the Seafarer, which tracked the tide and time that fish and animals were most active based on the solunar theory. The solunar theory posited that the movement of animals and fish was affected by the location of the Moon. The Seafarer incorporated a chronograph.

This Seafarer reference 2443 is one of a small number known with this dial configuration and is arguably the finest example known to the market. It features an unpolished case and all the original and highly unusual blue luminous material both in triangular plots on the tan dial and in the hands. Often, the blue lume has fallen out of the hands on these watches and has been relumed with non-matching green or tan lume. The overall interplay of colors, including the gilt Arabic and dot numerals as well as the green and yellow accents, make this a vibrant and exceptional watch. Additionally, the reference 2443 wears large both because of its size and also because of the 20mm width between its lugs.

The present watch is fresh to market and was purchased by the present owner approximately a decade ago from an estate sale.

Strap/Buckle: Associated leather strap, associated stainless steel buckle \$15,000-25,000 This Seafarer reference 2447 was made by *Heuer* for *Abercrombie & Fitch*, an elite outfitter of sporting goods at that time. It is an extremely rare version in the iconic Carrera reference 2447 case made in the mid-to-late 1960s and represents an elegant evolution of the Seafarer model.

In 1949, *Heuer* introduced the Solunar and Seafarer. Both could be set to track the tide and time that fish and animals were most active based on the solunar theory, which posited that the movement of animals and fish was affected by the location of the Moon. The Seafarer incorporated a chronograph.

Only a very small number of Seafarers in Carrera cases are known to the market and they are highly prized. The sky blue accents give this watch a sporty and distinctive look while the round pushers and dauphine hands give it a classic chronograph style. Finding an original example of this watch in unpolished condition is extraordinarily difficult, and a dream for collectors of rare sports chronographs.

Vintage *Heuer* chronographs from the 1930s through 1950s have been gaining in interest with collectors the last few years, particularly those with gilt black dials in large cases with pump pushers, such as the present example. Watches in this configuration with Valjoux 71 movements were often marketed for military use. The present watch is unusual as it is signed *Casa Masson* in the hour register, indicating it was sold by the famed Brazilian retailer in Rio de Janeiro. A small number of other *Heuer* chronographs from the 1940s through 1960s are known to the market with the *Casa Masson* retail signature. For collectors of large and rare chronographs with black dials, the present watch is a remarkable opportunity.

Heuer Carrera watches from the 1960s have become an iconic chronograph model due to their clean dial design and architecturally-inspired cases. The flared flat lugs of the Carrera case were completely novel at the time and Carrera watches with the same style of angled lugs remain a cornerstone of *TAG Heuer's* product line today.

The present watch is a remarkable and beautiful example with a rare "inverse panda" dial and tachymeter track suggesting it was designed and marketed for use by a race car driver. James Hunt wore a similar watch except with three registers rather than two registers.

The dial remains in excellent condition and it notably includes its original *Gay Frères* double grain-of-rice bracelet. To find a Carrera in this original and unpolished condition with beautiful inverse dial and with this bracelet is truly rare.

The present watch is one of a small number of automatic Carreras made in yellow gold. It is estimated that only 150 automatic Carreras were made in gold and they are closely associated with drivers for the Ferrari Formula One team. Every Ferrari driver from 1971 to 1979 is said to have received one of the gold Carrera chronographs in addition other Formula One drivers who were brand ambassadors of *Heuer* at that time.

The present watch is notable for its crisp case and with its dial, hands, and tachymeter ring in excellent condition. It is certainly worthy of being called a "grail" for *Heuer* chronograph collectors and motorsport enthusiasts.

"In the autumn of 1961 I decided with my production team to create a new "Autavia" as a wrist chronograph. Until then we had never added a turning bezel to one of our wrist chronographs. We therefore designed this new "Autavia" to have a turning black bezel with a choice of division markers. A bezel with 60 separate one-minute divisions, for example, would allow the wearer to set a marker for a defined interval of less than one hour; a 12-hour division would allow the time in another time zone to be displayed; and divisions of 1/100th of a minute would be useful for time study purposes... Looking back I can say that the "Autavia" wrist chronograph was the first real wristwatch product I personally

2915-1. Double Swiss Underline. Say these phrases to a passionate sports chronograph enthusiast and they will immediately know what you are talking about, the very beginnings of the two of the most highly regarded chronographs models, the *OMEGA* Speedmaster and the *Rolex* Daytona, that began in 1957 and 1963 respectively and still exist to this day. Both of these watches were created with motorsports in mind, and have gone on to become cornerstones of two of the most prolific companies in watchmaking, helping them weather storms over half a century and evolving into two of the most recognizable and iconic timepieces ever created. But there is a watch with an even closer connection to the world of unadulterated excitement, speed, and the playboys that should be held in at least as high regard as these two familiar faces of the world, and will inevitably find its place in the core of the line-up of one of the most storied manufactures for years to come when it is reintroduced next year: the *Heuer* Autavia.

A portmanteau of the two disciplines it was aimed to encompass, that of the automobile and aviation, the Autavia was born in 1933 as a dashboard timer. It was superseded by the Auto-Rallye with a big central minute hand to make it incredibly legible, which then evolve into the Monte Carlo with digital hour recording. With the success of the Monte Carlo, the original Autavia dashboard timer was discontinued, leaving an abandoned catchy name. Jack Heuer and the design team in fall 1961 went to the drawing board to create one of the the first *Heuer* chronographs with a name and the first with a rotating bezel, allowing for a 60-minute timer, a rudimentary second time

zone or a decimal scale. Launched in 1962, two variants were available, both manual wind: the reference 2446 for the three register version powered by the legendary Valjoux 72 movement as used in a certain Rolex Daytona, and the reference 3646 for the two register version powered by the Valjoux 92.

The earliest and most desirable examples are referred to by collectors as the "First Execution" and the dials of these models are distinguished by their large white sub-dials contrasting against black dials and painted radium hour markers to make the time as visible as possible at night. Due to the aging process, the luminous material no longer glows for extended periods and will generally have aged to tone ranging from soft caramel to burnt orange. The hands came in a variety of styles starting with hands entirely covered in radium, referred to as 'all lume', to a triangle-shaped insert of luminous material, and lastly a simple stick down the middle of the hand. These watches were introduced at a time of transition and at least two "First Execution" Autavia dials are known with the "T" signature above "SWISS" denoting tritium lume, while most have radium lume. All of these early Autavia watches have unsigned crowns and pushers that are slightly smaller than later generations.

While later examples made their way on to the wrists of such great drivers as Jochen Rindt, Mario Andretti, Jo Siffert, and Derek Bell, it is the First Execution Autavia that shows the origins of this iconic model.

It is an immense pleasure to bring to market what is one of the finest examples known, which has never been offered at auction before, and was previously unknown to the market. Exhibiting exceptionally sharp case edges, beautifully aged original radium luminous material to the dial, hands, and bezel, a radiant unmarked dial, and exceptionally clean movement, the watch presented here displays near perfect all over patina. It is an example that upon examination can take the breath away from the most astute collectors of important chronographs.

The present watch represents an opportunity to own a defining example in the history of sports chronographs in the year prior to the model seeing its glorious return.

Heuer "Jochen Rindt" Autavia

This third execution three-register Autavia chronograph has garnered the nickname the "Jochen Rindt Autavia" as the legendary Formula One driver wore a similar reference 2446 while racing in the 1960s until his untimely death in 1970.

The combination of features that this watch possesses, including the Valjoux 72 movement and the "inverse panda" dial made by Singer make this watch somewhat similar to 1960s Rolex Daytona models, and it is thus no surprise that these have risen significantly in value and interest the past two years.

The present watch offers collectors a rare opportunity to buy a stunning "Jochen Rindt Autavia."

This *Heuer* "Orange Boy" Autavia is a collector's dream for its rarity, condition, and the completeness of the original set. The watch is in seemingly unworn condition with the original sticker on the case back, the original *Gay Frères* bracelet with correct endlinks, the *Heuer* red racing box, the warranty booklet, sleeve, and *Heuer* envelope for sending in part of the warranty booklet for registration.

The "Orange Boy" is known in a small number of examples, perhaps less than 20 total, to the market. The orange on the dial and in the hands is reminiscent of the orange used by Gulf Oil in the 1970s and the watch also occasionally receives the nickname the "Gulf" as a result.

It is hard to imagine that a more perfectly original and "New Old Stock" "Orange Boy" Autavia exists in the world, so it absolutely is a special opportunity for collectors of rare and important chronographs.

It is easy to overlook the fact that the majority of mechanical watches are a series of components that originated outside of the factory doors of the name on their dial, coming instead from specialist suppliers focusing in those particular areas dotted all over Switzerland. Although there are many famous names for movements and cases, when it comes to dials there is one name that many collectors know and hold in the high regard: Singer.

While many suppliers would be content to produce items to specification as required, Singer built up relationships with brands such as *Rolex, Omega*, and *Universal Genève*, that it would produces designs and samples for these great watchmakers to review and refine as they saw fit. This represents an incredible honor and showcases the level of trust that the manufacturers had for Singer, as there is no other component that is more of the "face" of the watch, than the dial itself.

A small number of these configurations made their way into mass production and have become familiar to all collectors, but it is these pre-production, prototype dials that provide a fascinating and rare insight to how new ideas were tested and evolved over time. In recent years, some of these test dials have surfaced in the finest collections around the world. Most of them were made for Rolex and a fine selection are shown in *Ultimate Rolex Daytona* by Pucci Papaleo, but it is exceptionally difficult to find one bearing another maker's name. The watch offered here is one of these truly rare examples produced by Singer for *Heuer* in the early 1970s, exhibiting the same brushed silvered finish that appears on the dial of references 1563 and 11630 in 1972, but with a number of unique features not seen anywhere else. The most prominent is attractive multi-colored outer scales of charcoal grey, blue, and red, for both pulsations (graduated for 15 heartbeats) and units per hour, with delicate serifs to the text and numbers exhibiting the fine work of the dial marker. When the dial is examined with a loupe it is clear that no luminous material has even been applied to the hour markers leaving a vacant step at the tip, showing its pre-production nature.

Given the nature of this dial, featuring a pulsations track or "pulsometer", one may speculate that *Heuer* was examining whether the Autavia could be marketed to doctors. It seemingly did not gain their interest and the present watch and dial remains the only known Autavia with a pulsometer in the world.

It is when we look closer that we notice something additionally unusual: in place of the usual 30 minute counter we see it is calibrated to record for 45 minutes. With no movement configured for 45 minute and 12 hour recording it would seem that a dial printing pad destined for another maker was used.

Representing an exceptionally rare opportunity to own an important piece of history of *Heuer* and its Autavia, an iconic model from one of the most storied sports chronograph manufacturers, it will no doubt take pride of place with an exceptionally astute collector.

In 1972, *Heuer* collaborated with the Brown & Williamson Tobacco Company to produce a version of their Autavia chronograph, which could be purchased for \$88 versus the standard retail price \$200 when the end of a carton of their Viceroy cigarettes was sent to their headquarters.

While many examples of the Viceroy Autavia were produced, due to their affordable nature the majority have not been maintained in the best of condition. The example offered here today is exceptionally rare due to its razor sharp case, while wearing a few scratches that indicate it has been worn. The movement shows no signs of servicing and it is believed that the case back had never been opened until the review by Christie's, backed up by the fact that the original rubber gasket was in place which had turned to a sticky mush as sometimes happens with seals from this period. But what perhaps makes it most exceptional is that it comes complete with the original *Heuer* box, numbered *Heuer* swing tag, and *Heuer* guarantee booklet confirming sale by Viceroy, Louisville, Kentucky on December 18, 1972, less than two weeks before the promotion ended. Only a few are known to the market with the original guarantee booklet noting the Viceroy sale, making this an exceptionally special piece.

Interest and excitement about vintage *Eberhard* chronographs has continued to grow at a rapid pace. The enchantingly large cases and beautiful dials allow a spectrum of collectors to appreciate them. The histories of them are also appealing to collectors, as it is easy to imagine Italian race car drivers wearing and using them in the 1930s and 1940s.

The present watch has an extremely beautiful and rare black glossy dial. Finding these watches in this condition with this style of dial is extremely difficult and a rare opportunity for a discerning collector.

According to the Archives of *OMEGA SA*, the present watch was produced August 7, 1964 and delivered to the Peruvian Air Forces (Fuerza Aérea del Perú or "FAP").

This watch is one of the exceedingly rare "Flightmaster" models made for the Peruvian Air Force, reference CK 2914, better known as "Railmaster", was launched in 1957 and designed for professionals working near magnetic fields. Following the request of the Peruvian Airforce, the designation on watches ordered for their members was changed to "Flightmaster".

Formally established since 1950, the FAP ordered a variety of instruments from commercial manufacturers, including wristwatches. The very first official supplier was *OMEGA* starting in 1958. The watches available to the members of the Air Force were featured in the FAP catalogue of "functional watches for aviation".

The present watch is a reference ST 135.004(-63 S.C.) produced in 1964 and represents a late-production example of a Flightmaster.



The present Aero-Compax is a remarkable and rare example featuring a water-resistant screw-down case back. Very few examples are known to the market. One is depicted in a print advertisement from circa 1947. The Aero-Compax was marketed to pilots who wanted to mark a specific time. The top register had an hour and minute hand that could be adjusted by a crown on the left side of the case. It was often used to mark the time of departure for a plane or the time something should occur. It was a feature particularly useful before the introduction of the Vulcain Cricket in 1947 that allowed for someone to



have a wristwatch with a loud alarm.

For collectors of *Universal Genève* chronographs, those in oversized 46mm cases, designed for pilots and race car drivers, are considered grail pieces. However, when stating this, most collectors would associate those 46mm chronographs with cases featuring sharper, faceted lugs rather than the present watch with a more traditional flowing-lug shape from the 1930s. That is quite simply because of the rarity of these pieces. based on our research, only a few examples, perhaps three of these oversized *Universal Geneve* Compax chronographs with this early-style case are known to survive.

The present watch features a charismatic and elegant non-luminous dial in original condition. The outer tachymeter track is in blue and features notably large numerals, no doubt for easier for those using it timing racing speeds, the telemeter track just inside it is in red, while the time and chronograph printing is in black with thin numerals in a style somewhat reminiscent of Art Deco. The register and thin, straight central hands are blued steel and match the overall elegance of the dial.

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The present Compax model was clearly part of *Universal Genève's* response to other popular chronographs during the 1960s such as the *OMEGA* Speedmaster and *Rolex* Daytona.

This attractive "inverse panda" (black dial with white or silver registers) chronograph is appealing because of its style aesthetics, that are associated with vintage chronographs such as the *Rolex* Daytona. What makes it particularly interesting is that this took the famous Tri-Compax model and placed it in a more rugged and sports-oriented case. These three complications are why it received the "Tri" designation before "Compax".

One of the most incredible things in the world of vintage sport watch collecting is somehow finding a legendary watch in truly "New Old Stock" condition, such as the present *Blancpain* Aqua-Lung. There is absolutely not a single scratch between the lugs showing the placement or removal of a spring bar.

Today, the term "New Old Stock" is frequently used in a careless manner, but it is absolutely appropriate to use when describing this watch. Its survival in this condition can only be described as miraculous.

The beautiful glossy dial features the traditional 12-3-6-9 Aqua-Lung layout from the 1950s. It shows the honest patina from a watch that has sat untouched for decades with radium on the dial and in the hands.

Vintage *Blancpain* dive watches are continuing to gain value and a following due to their incredible history as among the first and best dive watches as well as their strong history connection to elite members of the French and U.S. military. It is hard to imagine a more perfect example of an Aqua-Lung on the planet.

Current research shows that this model of Aqua-Lung first appears in a US Divers catalog from 1958. It was made exclusively for the American market and notably had a guaranteed depth rating of 300 meters or 1000 feet, which was deeper than comparable Fifty Fathoms models from that time. The American actor Lloyd Bridges famously wore this model on the cover of the February 1962 issue of "Skin Diver" magazine. Bridges had gained notoriety in the diving community for playing the main actor, a former U.S. Navy frogman, in the television show "Sea Hunt" that aired from 1958 to 1961.

The 1958 Geophysic Chronometer must be considered amongst the most important models in the history of *Jaeger-LeCoultre*, representing the manufacturer's values of precision, robustness and aesthetic purity. Made at a time of fundamental scientific and political developments, it was directly involved in this historical context.

To match the watch model that would resist any type of challenge, especially from the standpoint of water-resistance, antimagnetism, adjustment, etc., the name Geophysic Chronometer was suggested, also as the model perfectly met the criteria and values of the International Geophysical Year (IGY).

The International Geophysical Year, a particularly significant scientific event, was organized on the initiative of the United States and took place at the high point of solar activity, from July 1, 1957 to December 31, 1958. It was also the first year of the Space Age, with the launch of the first artificial satellite, Sputnik 1, on October 5, 1957.

The models were fitted with Jaeger-LeCoultre's first chronometer movements developed in 1957, new water-resistant cases with soft iron domes to protect the movement from magnetic field influence up to 600 gauss, hence meeting the needs of research scientists who could be working on polar bases, in laboratories or inside submarines. The origin of this watchmaking project was the call for "resistance to any type of challenge". Consequently, the cases were able to withstand magnetic fields, given that magnetism was also one of the scientists' main areas of study. Precision, guaranteed in mechanical watchmaking by the term 'chronometer', is another crucial necessity as every science requires exact measurements.

The Geophysic was recently revived by *Jaeger-LeCoultre* and that has played a role in creating a new appreciation for the original examples, such as the present watch, which remains in beautiful condition and is a watch that manages to blend elegance and formality with a robust design and one of the finest movements ever made by *Jaeger-LeCoultre*.



THE POPE PIUS IX JUBILEE PATEK PHILIPPE

Important watches have been made for royalty since the dawn of portable mechanical timekeeping in the 17th century and hundreds of spectacular examples have been made for the kings and queens that have shaped our world for hundreds of years. However, very few of these luxury objects were made for Popes and even fewer *Patek Philippe* watches have made their way to the inner chambers of the Vatican.

This is why this seemingly humble pocket watch, made for Pope Pius IX, may be one of the most important watches to have surfaced in recent history. It is a watch of rich history, humble in spirit, extravagant in its execution, and may very well be the last time that a *Patek Philippe* from a Pope will ever be offered on the market. Furthermore, Pope Pius IX was beatified in 2000 by Pope John Paul II and is recognized for his spiritual life as well as his historic importance as the longest reigning Pope in history.

The cuvette reveals that the PIO IX PP HELVETI CATHOLICI D.D. and 1877 in Roman numerals. The P.P. indicates Pastor Pastorum, literally Shepherd of Shepherds or Pope, and it translates from Latin "The Swiss Catholics gave the watch" to Pius IX. This group of Catholics belonged to the Piusverein, also known as the Pius Association, which was named after Pope Pius IX, a social organization formed in 1848 to defend Catholic interests throughout Europe. It is very likely that Antoine Norbert de Patek was affiliated with this organization during his time in Geneva. This watch was given to Pius IX in honor of his golden Episcopal Jubilee as followers around the world visited the Pope to honor him. The engraving of the Papal coat of arms is confirmed on the Extract from the Archives.

Born Giovanni Maria Mastai Ferretti in Senigallia, Italy on May 13, 1792, the future Pope was born to a noble family and was ordained as a priest by age 27 in 1819, named a Bishop in 1831, and Cardinal in 1840. In 1846, at the age of 48, he was elected Pope, the leader of the Catholic Church. In 1869, he organized the first Vatican Council, Vatican I, and redefined the Church's position on faith.

The provenance of this watch is as follows:

Presented to Pope Pius IX by the Swiss branch of the Catholic organization Piusverein in 1877. Subsequently: after Pope Pius IX's death in 1878, Pope Leo XIII gave the watch to Cardinal Francesco Salesio della Volpe, who was "Camerlengo" (Papal Chamberlain) of the Holy Roman Church. Cardinal Francesco Salesio della Volpe gave the watch to his cousin, Count Giuseppe Ginnasi Poggiolini di Imola. Count

Giuseppe Ginnasi Poggiolini di Imola gave the watch to his daughter, Countess Nadia Ginnasi Poggiolini, the mother of the individual who sold this watch at Antiquorum May 10, 2009 in Geneva, lot 318. This watch was offered for auction again on May 9, 2014 at Antiquorum NY, lot 32.

For images and information regarding the *Patek Philippe* quarter repeating watch made for Pope Pius IX, see Timepieces for Royalty 1850-1910, p. 50-53. This watch, No. 27'033, is presently *Patek Philippe* Museum Inventory No. P-736. It bears Pius IX's coat of arms executed in enamel.

To the best of our knowledge, this watch is one of only two comparable silver "St. George" watches known to exist to date. Its rarity is further enhanced by the sweep center seconds, a feature not often seen in pocket watches of this period.

The present watch is a fine example of one of Patek Philippe's repoussé watches, dial and signature style and font used for the PP & Co. GENEVE and the oxidized case made to render it the appearance of an 18th century watch. These cases were often designed by Georges Hantz, director of the Decorative Arts Museum in Geneva and renowned for his chased and engraved watch cases and moulds for embossing cases and stamping coins or medals.

A nearly identical watch numbered 68'484, two numbers preceding the present watch, sold on 11 May 1884, also with silver case featuring "St. George Scene" and sweep centre seconds, is illustrated in *Patek Philippe Pocket* Watches by Martin Huber & Alan Banbery, p. 125, pl. 49 a & b.

St. George, patron of England and legendary slayer of the Dragon, was an early Christian who was martyred under the rule of the Roman Emperor Diocletian in A.D. 303.

The banner of St. George, the red cross of a martyr on a white background, was adopted for the uniform of English soldiers possibly in the reign of Richard the First, and later became the flag of England and the White Ensign of the Royal Navy.

The back of the present watch depicts the St. George talisman, showing St. George on horseback, thrusting his lance at a dragon and the inscription "S. GEORGIUS EQUITUM PATRONUS" (St. George, protector of knights) on one side. The reverse shows a ship in full sail on a rough sea and Christ asleep on the deck with two terrified apostles, a wind blows through a small cloud into the sail and the inscription "IN TEMPESTATE SECURITAS" (protection in the storm).

At the end of the 19th Century it was not uncommon that *Patek Philippe* would produce the movements for their watches and the movements would be sold, as in this case, to American retailers to be cased domestically.

There were two watch case companies who used the name *American Watch Case Co. (AWCCo.)*, one, a U.S. company operating in New York City and the second was the American Watch Case Co., Toronto, Ontario, Canada. The present watch case was cased in New York and then sold at a New York retailer, *Marsch & Hoffman*. To the best of our knowledge the present watch has never before been offered in public.

The presently offered watch features the Latin motto SPECTEMUR AGENDO meaning *Let us be judged by our acts*.

The purity and clarity of this repeater is second to none and the enamel dial and case construction allow the movement to strike the hours today as well as it struck 143 years ago when it was originally made.

The present single-button chronograph reference 28D1 pocket watch in a Staybrite steel case with silvered and non-luminous sector dial could be considered one of the most beautiful *Rolex* watches ever to be made. It is a watch of the highest quality and overall charisma. The red tachymeter track as well as dark silver minute track and registers provide visual interest against the silver dial. This watch recently emerged to the market from the family of the original owner, who clearly took good care of it. Research shows one example of this watch known to the market with the same configuration of dial and it is in case 25'684, just four prior to this watch. The value, quality, and beauty of this *Rolex* chronograph is certainly worthy enough to make a collector exclusively of wristwatches decide to purchase pocket watch to add his or her collection.

On first glance, this watch is immediately attractive. The case presents astounding crispness, extremely unusual for a piece of this age. Additionally, the dial is superb with untouched scales which shine in the deep pitch black gloss dial. The style is a remarkable *trait d'union* between the minimalistic, nearly military style of timepieces realized from the 1940s onward, and earlier art deco pieces: the dial, featuring simple gilt baton numerals and the sought-after railway divisions, is reminiscent of the former style; the case, with the playful cylindrical decorations to the size of the bow and unusual spherical crown is an obvious nod to the latter.

The Coca-Cola company has enjoyed tremendous success since its introduction in the late 19th century. Its brand name and logo are unmistakable and globally recognized as one of the most influential of all time. This watch sits proudly as it offers not one but two important signatures to its dial, the traditional signature found on many pocket watch dials of its maker, *Rolex*, but also the Coca-Cola logo in its well known elaborate font is seen underneath. Two prominent signatures are easily visible and identifiable.

The 1940s were tough years for Coca-Cola. The war had just begun and men were sent off to fight, the survival rate for companies was declining and the leading competitor Pepsi was hot on their heels. As the advertisement to accompany this lot shows, Coca-Cola were trying to promoting the idea that the famous drink can be enjoyed in America, within a happy family who understand quality, which led to its very famous slogan, "It's the real thing." Despite the hardships set against them, Coca-Cola struggled and strived to remain relevant and over the many decades that followed it is clear to see that they are a company who are nothing short of iconic.

To the back of this pocket watch reads; *PIGGY MOORE, 25 YEARS SERVICE, THE COCA COLA CO.*

The watch was a gift to an executive of Coca-Cola for his contribution to the company's success.

Made for *Galt & Bro*, the leading *Patek Philippe* retailer in Washington D.C. in the late 19th and early 20th century, this fine watch features an 18 ligne movement with center seconds, an unusual and lavish feature at the time.

At the time of the original purchase of this watch, U.S. President Benjamin Harrison (1833-1901) is known to have been a client of Galt & Bro. as well as most American Presidents until the store closed in 2001. The first watch Abraham Lincoln ever owned was said to have been serviced in their workshop in 1861 and Edith Galt, the manager of the store as of 1908, married President Woodrow Wilson in 1915.

This watch's history is inextricably tied to Washington, D.C. and remains an important reminder to the connections between *Patek Philippe* and its US retailers in the late 19th century.

During the first years of the 20th century, *Patek Philippe* sold hundreds of movements and dials to *Tiffany & Co.* to be cased in the United States. It was the perfect symbiotic relationship – *Tiffany & Co.* was able to promote their name, much more impactful in the early era in the American market than any Swiss brand, and *Patek Philippe* was able to sell product. This relationship was driven by Alfred G. Stein, a gentleman who left his job at *Tiffany & Co* in 1889 to operate the exclusive *Patek Philippe* in the US. He was so successful in importing *Patek Philippe* Board of Directors in 1901 and effectively became the only American to ever have a partial ownership of *Patek Philippe*.

The 'custom invoice' watch, as this style was called, was made for *Tiffany & Co.* in 1902 and exported to Alfred Stein to sell to *Tiffany & Co.* It is equal in every way to a *Patek Philippe* triple signed *Patek Philippe* of the era.

The presently offered example features a large 18" minute repeating split seconds chronograph combining two of the most difficult complications from the horological world.

Interestingly, this case bears silver hallmarks that indicate it was made for the German market.

This is an amazing watch on many levels. First, the case of this watch is finished in silver niello with an attractive design preserved in near perfect condition. Next, the case is constructed with pink gold hinges and a pink gold pendant lip, an elegant and function flourish in design. Furthermore, the cuvette is signed Patenaude Bro's, Nelson, B.C.

The town of Nelson, British Columbia was a Canadian boomtown in the 1880s and attracted treasure hunters from around the world.

Joseph Ovile Patenaude (1871-1956) was born in Quebec started his watchmaking career at the Canadian jeweller Henry Birks and Sons in 1871. He also studied optometry and became an optometrist and qualified watchmaker. Seeking fortune, he joined the gold and silver rush and went to the Klondike eventually settling in Nelson, B.C. He joined forces with his brother Dosithe Patinaude to create "J.O. Patenaude: Optician and Watchmaker" that quickly evolved into "Patenaude Brothers" as the store grew and started selling diamonds as well as eyeglasses and watches.

The discovery of a previously unknown, unique, specially commissioned *Patek Philippe* Grand Complication watch is today an almost unheard of landmark event, creating a frisson of excitement amongst both watch collectors and those who pursue the very best world-class works of art.

Coming for the first time ever to the market and originally made to the order of Carrie Belle Carter Allen of Louisiana for her husband Dr. Ethan Allen, very few watches of this importance have such a fully-known history and provenance while even fewer were tailor-made to the buyer's specifications or so completely personalized. As such, it joins the ranks of the legendary *Patek Philippe* watches made in the early 20th century for the great American millionaire industrialists including James Ward Packard and Henry Graves Jr. Not only is the present watch one of *Patek Philippe*'s most extraordinary technical triumphs, it is also very early in the production of the company's Grand Complication watches, furthermore it is the only known *Patek Philippe* watch with these complications to have a full hunter case.

The year 1904 was a very significant one in the Southern U.S.. It was the year of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition in Forest Park – the "St. Louis World's


Fair" which lasted from 30th April until 1st December 1904. Patek Philippe were exhibitors and also participated on the jury. It was in all probability at the St. Louis fair that Mrs. Allen commissioned this watch directly from Patek Philippe. The rare opportunity of coming face to face with the company's representatives from Switzerland would certainly account for the sheer uniqueness and number of bespoke elements created for this watch, all adding to what was already one of the most complicated and expensive watches that Patek Philippe had made up to that date. Interestingly, one of the inspectors at the St. Louis World's fair, one George T. Cram, owned a Patek Philippe hunter case minute repeater watch with "letter" dial spelling his name in place of numerals. That watch, no. 80764 was made in 1893 and originally ordered from jewellers Merrick, Walsh & Phelps, St. Louis, Missouri. In fact of the four other known Patek Philippe watches with "letter" dials, two were ordered from Merrick, Walsh & Phelps in St. Louis. The other, also a hunter case minute repeater was made for a Richard Lewis. It is therefore more than likely that Mrs. Allen was aware of at least one of the other two special named dial Patek Philippe watches residing in St. Louis which might well have inspired her to order her own far more spectacular and exceptional dial spelling her own name.





To the best of our knowledge there are only five known watches made by *Patek Philippe* where the dials have letters instead of numerals. They are either by or attributable to Pierre Reymond, one of the best dial makers of his time in Switzerland whom *Patek Philippe* commissioned to make the dials of some of their most outstanding watches. The five known examples of *Patek Philippe* watches with named dials are as follows:

Between 1889 with the patent of the perpetual calendar mechanism and 1904, Patek Philippe patented many mechanisms used in its watch movements. This was an extremely important period in the company's history when its reputation as the maker of the finest, most complicated, functional and attractive watches in the world was becoming firmly established. Their early mastery of the "Grand Complication" is exemplified by the present watch. Made in 1904, it sits amongst some other very distinguished pieces made in the same year, in fact the movement no. 125'006 is only three numbers away from watch no. 125'009 - James Ward Packard's very first Grand Complication watch. Patek Philippe's production of Grand Complication watches began in 1895 and continues to the present day. Between 1895 and 1904 when this watch was made, approximately twelve such watches were produced or completed, on average only one or two per year. 1904 was evidently a very good year for sales because including the present watch a total of six Grand Complication watches were made or sold, as expected, the clients who bought them were some of America's richest.

The present exceptional Grand Complication watch has some artistically unique and technically advanced features:

Hunter case – to the best of our knowledge, this is the only watch with these particular horological complications to be fitted with a hunter case. The Extract from the *Patek Philippe* Archives specifically mentions the hunter case and describes it as "Louis XVI style" one of the most expensive styles. The interior of the front cover is adorned with an engraved portrait of Carrie Belle Allen herself. This kind of highly detailed, almost photographic style of engraving is called "taille douce".

Dial – The totally unique specially commissioned hand-made enamel dial is a true masterpiece of the enamellist's art. Confirmed by the Extract from the Archives, as "enamel dial, hour markers in capital letters". Very few makers were skilled enough to make a dial of such complexity and artistry. This one-off work of art is most likely to be the work of Pierre Reymond who was responsible for many of *Patek Philippe*'s finest and most complicated dials. The numerals spelling the name **C. B. C. ALLEN** are furthermore very cleverly and beautifully designed as "roots", thought to represent the cinchona root in reference to Dr. Aller's work as herbalist and practitioner of homeopathy. Another interesting feature of the dial is that the days of the week are in Latin. This may have had some personal significance for the Allens and to the best of our knowledge is unique on a *Patek Philippe* watch.

Movement – Most of *Patek Philippe's* highly complicated movements and special projects were constructed using ebauches supplied by the legendary maker Victorin Piguet & Cie. The present watch is highly unusual and possibly unique in having the name of the owner engraved upon the movement itself in addition to the *Patek Philippe* signature. The balance wheel and escapement is very highly finished with gold and platinum adjustment screws.

Dr. Ethan George Allen (September 19th, 1856–October 21st, 1914)

Mrs. Carrie Belle Carter Allen

(September 20th, 1868-February 24th, 1945)

A man of his own principles, Dr. Ethan George Allen broke boundaries into a world that ultimately formed the future for alternative medicine. At the early age of 35 when he graduated from Pulte Medical College, Cincinnati, Ohio, he soon established his own medical practice in Shreveport, Louisiana, a Homeopathic center which specialized in chronic disease. At the time, still considered a taboo form of therapy, Dr. Allen forged his own path to treat his patients the way he believed would be the most effective, although once shunned, has in fact been globally adopted today.

The founder of Homeopathy, Samuel Hahnemann (1755-1843), grew up in Germany and during his research as a physician he made an important discovery. Doses of the Cinchona plant was found to produce symptoms of fever (malaria) but to a mild degree. This led to his published ideas that if a patient had an illness then it could be cured by giving a dose of medicine that bases itself on a 'like cures like' principle. It is thought that Cinchona was the trigger medicine, or breakthrough medicine for the foundation of homeopathy. In America, Homeopathic remedies first began in Cincinnati by a student of Samuel Hahnemann in 1839 and was it met with severe ridicule but later expanded to different states and schools as it became more popular.

It is quite remarkable to what lengths the physicians in Homeopathy, such as Dr. Allen, would go to in order to prove their commitment to these other forms of treatment. Despite the many constraints at the time, Dr. Allen, like his fellow physicians in the field, was a man who believed in the 'other', he thought outside of the box and wanted to make a substantial and lasting difference to the world of medicine and beyond.






A few years after establishing his medical practice, Dr. Allen met Miss Carrie Belle Carter. The two wed in November of 1894 at the residence of her father, Judge L. E. Carter of Shreveport. When looking at the present watch, we can see how deep their affection was for one another. The watch was given as a gift from wife to husband, a commemoration of a life of achievement together in work as well as romantic alliance. Now called by her married name, Mrs. Carrie Belle Carter Allen, she was able to offer this watch to her husband with her portrait to the inside, her name to the movement and her name to the dial which is spelled out in numerals that resemble the very root of his life's work – the roots of the Cinchona plant. It is clear the two were joined together by the common drive of deep devotion, a devotion to helping others and of course a devotion to each other.

Dr. Allen and his wife didn't stop there, their interests expanded to include owning a popular jewelry store on Texas Street, the Carter-Allen Jewelry Company, seen pictured. Remarkably, the watch offered here is accompanied by an original Carter-Allen Jewelry Company pouch, though faded over 100 years, still retaining the logo to the front.

Christie's is proud to offer the present watch as a one-of-a kind discovery for the history of two creative individuals at the turn of the century America, for the history of *Patek Philippe*, and indeed for the history of unique horological masterpieces.

The present pocket watch was manufactured for the Brazilian firm of *Gondolo & Labouriau*, *Patek Philippe*'s chosen retailer in Rio de Janeiro from 1872 until 1927. Due to the enormous success of Patek Philippe timepieces amongst the firm's clients in Brazil, the Swiss manufacture started designing watches especially for Gondolo & Labouriau, with specific mechanical and aesthetical characteristics.

To encourage the sale of Chronometro Gondolo watches by members of its buyer's club, the retailer invented a brilliant marketing scheme which

consisted of lottery draws. Each member of the club had committed to buying a *Patek Philippe* Pocket watch and made a 10 Franc payment every week for 79 weeks until the watch was paid for in full. Gondolo would then hold 79 consecutive weekly lottery draws in which the winners would be released from their payment responsibilities. This process enabled the first weekly winner to receive a *Patek Philippe* for free; the second would receive it after his first payment of 10 Francs and so on. At the end of the lotteries, the remaining members would pay full price for their watches. The lottery system assured each participant would eventually acquire a Chronometro Gondolo for a reasonable amount, and also allowed members of the buyers club to circumvent the Brazilian ban on gambling.

During this collaboration, the Brazilian retailer sold nearly a third of *Patek Philippe's* total production. Even though the retailer Gondolo & Labouriau is now a distant memory, the name within the watch community has lived on and timepieces bearing the retailer's signature represent some of the most coveted *Patek Philippe* watches ever made.

This particular watch is exceptional for its unusual cushion shape, oversized Breguet numerals, and two-tone case with hand-engraved foliate design.

The color of the enamel with the presently offered watch is darker than most other white enamels from *Patek Philippe* from this era. The Tiffany & Co. 605 HU World Time Dress Watch, One of Two Known to Have Been Made For Tiffany & Co.

Accompanied by a *Patek Philippe* Extract from the Archives confirming production of the present watch in 1951 and its subsequent sale on August 5th, 1959.

Patek Philippe's World-Time 605 HU was in production from the early 1940s until the early 1960s. Louis Cottier (1894-1966), the inventor of the world time mechanism used in this watch, made his first 17" world time pocket watch movement for Patek Philippe in 1937 and subsequently delivered 95 pieces in total until 1964. It is believed that the majority were made in yellow gold with approximately a quarter of the production in pink gold. Due to the design of this watch, the case is integrated into the mechanism to allow for the adjustment of 'home time'. As a result Cottier was personally involved in the finishing of each individual timepiece, even after it was cased, to ensure that the world time mechanism worked flawlessly.

Officially designated the *World Time Dress Watch* by *Patek Philippe*, the 605HU was made with different style dials during its production. Silvered

dials, pink dials, and enamel dials were produced and the Cottier hands of the watches all feature unique variations such as bisected circles, circles, and 'lys' hands such as the presently offered watch.

This example which was made for the American market with its *HOX* stamp on the movement is a lovely example and all the more desirable with the venerable *Tiffany & Co.* signature preserved in near mint untouched condition. The movement is in exceptional condition and examination of the case suggests it looks as if the case was rarely opened to inspect the beauty movement.

The presently offered watch, exceptionally rare and in unrivaled condition, offers the collector the opportunity to own of the most important complications ever offered by *Patek Philippe*.

The present watch, distinguished by its fine condition and freshness to market from the original family, is believed to be from a small series of 200 open face dress watches, ref. 600/1, and 150 wristwatches, ref. 2481, made beginning in 1953 to special order in memory of King Abdul Aziz al Saud who had passed away the same year. The watches were all fitted with ivory-colored enamel dials with ruby-set numerals bearing the King's portrait and given as gifts to dignitaries or friends of His Majesty.

Abdul Aziz Al Saud, King (Malik) of Saudi Arabia (1876-1953), was the first monarch of The Third Saudi State known as Saudi Arabia.

Within this special order series, the dial is purposefully not signed Patek Philippe and only bears the miniature enamel of His Majesty. The outside case backs are signed Patek Philippe with the Calatrava logo since it was not considered appropriate the King would share the dial with the maker's name. These watches were ordered by Patek Philippe's Saudi agent, Abdul Rahman Serour of Red Sea Trading on behalf of the royal family.

Reference 600 was launched in 1957 and was made in different versions:

- ref. 600 with standard metal dial

- ref. 600/1, the present reference, with enamel dial

It is interesting to note that the cases of these two references are of different thicknesses. Ref. 600 measures 4.8 mm. compared to 5.8 mm. for ref. 600/1, caused by the applied ruby-set numerals and the enamel dial that is thicker than the standard metal one.

The present "ricochet" watch is furthermore in overall excellent condition with beautiful enamel roman numerals and textured gold dial.

Hand-made by Gilbert Albert for *Patek Philippe*, these asymmetrical watches represents the cutting edge of watch design and were as 'shockingly' beautiful in the 1960s as they are today.

THE JOHN F. KENNEDY COIN WATCH

This watch is part of a small series of gold coin watches, given reference numbers in the 800 series, using the US\$5 (Ref. 800), US\$10 (Ref. 801), US\$20 (Ref. 802 & 803), CHF100 (Ref. 804), Pesos 50 (Ref. 805) and others. The earliest coin watches were made in the late 1920s and production of this novelty form of watch continued until the 1980s. The coin was sliced and cut to perfectly accommodate a hinged inner case containing the dial and caliber 175 movement.

The presently offered coin watch was made by *Patek Philippe* using an 18k yellow gold coin with the profile of John F. Kennedy. Unlike all other coin watches by *Patek Philippe*, this coin was not originally legal tender. In fact, it was made by the Swiss company Argor as a commemorative coin. As part of a special edition, perhaps by custom order, *Patek Philippe* used the Argor coin to produce this fine coin watch.

Only one other JFK coin watch has been discovered to date and was sold at Antiquorum in NY March 23, 2005, lot 228. Interesting this other watch bears the case number 2'700'465, only three digits away from the presently offered 2'700'468.

Offered in near mint condition and fresh to market, this JFK coin watch is offered in the same condition as when it was originally sold in December of 1979. The deep relief of the portrait and fineness of the design is the result of the work of Argor, a company based in Chiasso, Switzerland that is known for its commemorative coin minting.

Early Rolex chronographs are finally getting the global recognition and acclaim that they deserve by collectors for their quality, rarity, and aesthetic appeal. Among early Rolex chronographs, the reference 2021 remains incredibly rare, particularly in original condition. The reference 2021 features a hinged case back and only a small number have ever come to market.

The present watch recently emerged to the market from an English estate and is remarkable for its condition, seemingly unpolished and all-original on its very early stretch rivet bracelet, likely original to the watch and also for the remarkable fact that the dial appears to be original yet does not have Rolex printed on it. The multi-scale dial with Breguet numerals has aged evenly and matches one other known example of the reference 2021 that does have "ROLEX" printed below 12 o'clock.

One can only speculate that the original owner, undoubtedly a gentleman to have ordered it in 18k gold on a bracelet at that time, did not want to have a brand name on the dial, perhaps for aesthetic reasons or because he found it distracting while using the chronograph. Very few early Rolex watches did not have that text printed on the dials. A small number of reference 2021 examples have come to market in the distant past with reprinted and refinished dials, luminous and black, so one can also wonder whether any of those did not say *Rolex* on the dial and had the dials reprinted for the purpose of appealing to collectors not aware that the dials were not original.

The present watch presents a special opportunity for collectors of rare and special Rolex chronographs to obtain a possibly unique watch in spectacular original condition on an extremely rare and early stretch rivet bracelet. Wearing this large chronograph on this original bracelet is an absolute joy today just as it must have been for the original owner.

One of the great joys of working with Christie's Watch Department is to open one's email each day with the opportunity to see interesting, fresh-to-market, and important horological discoveries, such as was the case with the present *Rolex* reference 6036. Consigned by the descendant of the original owner, this reference 6036 features a number of previously unseen dial traits for a *Rolex* complete calendar chronograph, including the small seconds, minutes, and hour registers shared by examples of the *Rolex* reference 6234, inset circular gold hour markers, and a central red telemeter track. The back of the dial properly shows the Stern Frères dial serial number and star symbol. The telemeter track was printed off-center, presumably to accommodate for the month and day apertures on the top half of the dial.

The watch was originally owned by Leonard Shapiro, a noted and respected New York jeweler specializing in making jewelry out of gold and platinum. In particular, he was acclaimed for his use of the lost wax casting process to make jewelry. According to the consignor, Mr. Shapiro made a brooch and matching ring for Pope Paul VI in the late 1960s and a necklace for Francis Joseph Cardinal Spellman, the Archbishop of New York from 1939 to 1967. Mr. Shapiro wore this watch throughout his life prior to his passing, and has the associated signs of service and repair.

Unfortunately, further details and documents do not survive with the watch, and one can only speculate that the watch may have been specially produced by *Rolex* for Mr. Shapiro, perhaps with the gold markers representing Mr. Shapiro's excellent approach to gold casting.

For collectors of complicated *Rolex* watches, it is an interesting discovery and perhaps a unique opportunity to find a reference 6036 with this amazing configuration.

The present *Rolex* reference 6239 is an exceptionally charismatic example with the registers turning a slightly "brown" or "tropical" shade that perfectly complements the silver sunburst dial. The present watch would be a beautiful and well-preserved Daytona for anyone ranging from a beginning to a seasoned collector.

The very first model of the celebrated Daytona series was the reference 6239. It was the firm's first chronograph with the tachymeter scale on the bezel, whereas previous models, such as the reference 6238, had the scale printed on the dial. Another notable difference was that the subsidiary dials were printed in a different color than the main dial for better readability. Early models featured only the designation Cosmograph on the dial, and Daytona was added on later series to mark *Rolex's* sponsorship of the renowned NASCAR stock car race.

The present *Rolex* Daytona reference 6262 has a striking black dial and silvery-white registers that contrast beautifully against the shiny steel bezel. Reference 6262, along with the reference 6264, was produced from the end of the 1960s through approximately 1972. The present reference 6262 is made especially striking for the way in which the registers have turned to a stunning "tropical" brown color. The Turn-O-Graph model was released at the Basel Fair in 1953. The model was fitted with a rotating bezel with five-minute divisions and dot markings, and was referred to as a "time-recording-rim" by *Rolex*. This model was designed to be used as a simplified chronograph, for timing events up to an hour, and was promoted as being able to calculate the "Timing of a transatlantic telephone call, the rate of a machine, a patient's pulse, the speed of a train, or the development of a film". Preceding the Submariner, the Turn-O-Graph has similar features in a smaller case.

The present watch stands out for its beautifully aged dial that has changed color from black to reveal a golden brown hue, revealing the gilt dial beneath the black coating that was originally there. The luminous numerals and hands have turned to a warm cream color to host an honest vintage aesthetic. Similar to other examples of 1950s *Rolex* sports watches, this watch has lume that on the 6 o'clock marker is a slightly lighter color, theorized by some so that the wearer could quickly identify the 6 o'clock marker versus the rest of the dial for faster telling of the time.

With excellent original examples of early Submariners reaching into the six figures USD in price, Turn-O-Graph reference 6202 examples, such as the present watch, remain relatively undervalued. They are important to the history of Rolex sports watches

Both *Tudor* Oyster-Prince Submariner "no crown guard" references 7922 and 7924 were launched in 1958, shortly after the celebrated and better known *Rolex* reference 6538. Whereas reference 7922 was waterresistant to 110 m, (330ft), and fitted with the smaller crown, reference 7924, such as the present watch, was equipped with a larger case and crown in order to withstand water pressure to 220 m. (660 ft). As reliable as their "sisters" signed Rolex, but available at a lower price, the *Tudor* diver's watches were the brand of choice of many Armed Forces, particularly certain units of the French and the U.S. Navy. The present watch is fitted with the celebrated "Auto-Prince" caliber 390, a 17 jewels movement developed by *Rolex* in the 1950s for *Tudor*.

For collectors of rare vintage sports watches, one of the greatest joys is seeing a fresh-to-market that has somehow miraculously survived in original condition without having been exposed to a polishing wheel and the replacement of parts that so often accompanied routine servicing.

This *Tudor* Submariner reference 7924 made by *Rolex*, and the little brother of the legendary "Big Crown" Submariners, stands on its own for the remarkable and charismatic condition of the case, dial, and hands. It was sleeping for many years until recently and shows a faint burn mark on the dial where the hour hand with radium luminous material rested.

The dial has aged to a beautiful brownish-black depending on the angle of light you view it and there are few words to describe the feeling you get when you first have the opportunity to see it in-person and try it on your wrist. It is undoubtedly one of the finest and most charismatic examples of *Tudor* "Big Crown" Submariner in the world.

The watch also features the popular black lacquer dial, which is also referred to as black gloss dial. The dial has nicely aged and shows a light grainy surface giving character to the watch. It is interesting to note that the present watch features the first version of pointed crown guards, which adds tremendously to the overall attraction of this reference to many collectors.

Reference 5513 was launched in 1962 and depth rated to 200 meters (660 feet), fitted with the 8 mm. crown and pointed crown guards. For other examples of reference 5513 with underline dial see Rolex Submariner Story by Franca & Guido Mondani, Lele Ravagnani, Guido Mondani Editore, pp. 58 & 59.



The present watch is a remarkable piece of *Rolex* history and U.S. military history. It is "fresh-to-market" and consigned by a gentleman who purchased the watch directly from Captain Barry Nelson Kaye. The watch, a tropical gilt Submariner reference 5512 with four-line dial and pointed crown guards, is as historic is as remarkable as its original owner.

Captain Kaye led a distinguished career in the United States Navy from 1963 to 1994. During circa 1968-1969, Kaye was working under Captain Bill Searle, the Supervisor of Salvage and Diving (SUPSALV) within the Naval Ship Systems Command. During that time, Kaye was given the task of developing a specification with the engineering department for a suitable dive watch that, according to a letter from Captain Kaye, could be used:

"By the many types of specialties we had in the service such as harbor clearance, ship repair divers and UDT which later became known as the SEALS. Among the sample watches we surveyed were *ROLEX AND BULOVA*. The engineering directorate was headed by Mr. Fielding Belt. I believe a generic *BULOVA* watch was selected primarily due to the cost. People working on this project were told to retain the samples as the factories did not want them returned. I retained a *ROLEX.*"



Captain Kaye went on to wear the watch daily for the next forty years. Included with the watch are a copy of his letter describing his career and how he got the watch, a copy of his memoir "Haze Grey and Underway: A Memoir of United States Naval Surface Ship Operations during the Vietnam War 1965 to 1975" that is now part of the official records of the United States Navy (including a photo of him wearing the watch on page 90), and a series of original photographs showing Captain Kaye wearing the watch with dates and places described on the back of them.

It is remarkable how this Submariner went from official United States Navy testing to accompany a sailor through the rest of his career around the world. This is a rare opportunity to purchase rare Rolex sports watch with notable and important provenance.

The reference 5512 featured a chronometer-rated movement and text on the dial noting that designation whereas the reference 5513 was not rated as a chronometer.



Patek Philippe 5131 with -014 Dial

Dubbed the "Putin Patek", this late series reference 5131 represents the most recent evolution of the 5131 and the dial layout represents some significant recent geo-political shifts. Russian President Vladimir Putin signed into law October 6, 2014 at 02:00 the new time standard effectively making Moscow one hour closer to Europe and adding an extra time zone to Russia. Abolishing daylight savings time, Putin's decision put Russia into a 'permanent winter' in respect to time zones. Effectively, this law also made all *Patek Philippe* 5131 examples made up until 2014 obsolete in terms of time zone accuracy. *Patek Philippe* quietly and quickly updated the 5131 dials from the old (-010 dial code) to the new (-014) dial code. The main differences between the dials

being Dubai replaced by Moscow, Moscow replaced with Riyadh, and Caracas replaced by La Paz. For an example of the previously offered -010 dial city ring, please see the previously offered lot.

The yellow gold version of reference 5131 was launched in 2008, followed by white gold in 2009 and pink gold in 2014. The dial of the present yellow gold example represents the Americas, Europe and Africa, the white gold version shows Europe, Africa, Asia, and Oceania, the dial of the pink gold version shows Asia, Oceania and the Americas.

Reference 5131 is the successor of reference 5130 and shows three notable differences: use of a distinguishable cloissonné enamel dial, the names of the 24 cities are displayed in Italic type, and the signature *Patek Philippe* and company location Genève are engraved on the bezel. Only two or three enamellists are able to produce these rare dials for *Patek Philippe*.

Reference 5131 is equipped with the ultra-thin automatic caliber 240 HU (HU for "Heure Universelle". It features a 22k gold micro-rotor recessed in the back plate.

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

The present timepiece is distinguished by its first series dial, finely preserved with no cracks or hairlines whatsoever, and a movement that was recently cleaned and overhauled by *Patek Philippe* in 2015.

Dials for 2526 went through a simplification process over the years. At the very beginning, we find enamel dials with flared holes for the numerals, like the one mounted on the present timepiece. Such construction methodology is enormously complex, requiring 26 holes for the numerals (2 holes for each numeral, 4 holes for the double numeral at 12), plus two holes for the hands and subsidiary seconds. Given the highly complicated construction methodology, soon a new series was launched: the dial is still enamel, but with

only two flared holes for the hands and the subsidiary seconds. The indexes are instead secured with glue. Finally, the last evolution presents metal dials.

Among the plethora of different variations, black 2526 dials are the most appreciated because of the incredible rarity and unsurpassed appeal of the iconic black dial. The ultimate echelon of collectability for this reference, consequently, is embodied in this watch: a black enamel first series dial, easily distinguished by glimpsing the flared holes under the numerals.

As this watch was manufactured after first series dials were no longer made, it is likely that the original buyer specially requested a black dial to be placed on this watch. Since the archive states the original dial color of the watch is not mentioned in the records, it is likely that this watch sold in 1964 was 'born' with this black dial from an early batch of dials from the mid-1950s as *Patek Philippe* often filled special requests in this era. The fact remains that this dial is in exceptional condition and is exceptionally rare, a dial and reference coveted by collectors from around the world.

First series dials are distinguished by the fact that the numerals are not glued to the enamel, as seen with second series dials. Rather, the enamel presents flared holes in correspondence of every numeral through which the feet of the numeral are positioned before being soldered to the back of the dial. While guaranteeing maximum durability, this solution is extremely costly, as a high number of dials do not survive through the manufacturing process due to the many flared holes. This is why this methodology was abandoned in favor of a simpler one (and, later, an even simpler one when the dial becomes metal rather than enamel in the third series). Such a manufacturing procedure is proof of the nearly unreasonably high quality standards *Patek Philippe* maintained for their production over its entire existence.

The reference 570 is one of the most appreciated and well known vintage watches by *Patek Philippe*. Introduced in 1938, it larger scaled version of the reference 96. It remained in production until 1972. With a 35.5 mm. diameter, it was quite a large watch for the time, but it is the perfect size for the modern wrist. Furthermore, the flat bezel gives the watch an overall large profile when worn on the wrist in particular with the bold 20 mm lug gauge for the strap.

The presently offered 570G is in a near perfect case with crisp hallmarks and no signs of polishing. The dial is wonderfully preserved with raised hard enamel and exquisite raised pearl minute markers. In 1972, Audemars Piguet introduced the Royal Oak model in stainless steel. Designed by Gerald Genta, the watch featured an octagonal screwed bezel that was initially inspired by a ship's porthole. According to the Archives of *Audemars Piguet*, the present watch was sold in 1949 in New York.

The present reference 5504, produced in the late 1940s, offers an exceedingly rare opportunity to own a watch that supersedes many other vintage examples. According to the *Audemars Piguet* archives, only 20 examples were ever produced and only 13 in yellow gold such as the present example.

One of the most special and intriguing qualities of the reference 5504 is the caliber 9/10RSQ. Initially, it was based on the Cal. 9/10RS of which almost 3000 examples were produced, although it had been modified from time-only and allowed a full calendar and at the same time, full splendor. It is thought that only 68 examples of the updated caliber have ever been made. This rare and technically advanced movement can be found in only four distinct models; 5504, 5513, 5514, 8515. Produced from 1945 - 1967, its charm also encompasses a sign of the times, a mid-century evolution for *Audemars Piguet*.

The caliber can be found in both round and square cases, the present watch belonging to the former which offers a wonderfully harmonious dial configuration. The circular date wheel fits with the perfectly sized applied Arabic numerals which lay toward the outer circumference. The hour and minute hands are thin, as well as the date hand, the lugs are long and slender, the case itself is large but not cumbersome with a moderately sized bezel. When one looks at this watch, its features are undoubtedly vintage inspired as well as wonderfully balanced. The present watch is endearing in so many ways, it will no doubt offer many years of inspiration and joy to the successful bidder.

According to the Archives of Vacheron Constantin, the present watch was completed in July, 1971, and is one of only three examples ever produced.

It is a mystery that puzzled Vacheron Constantin and watch collectors for half a decade: What is the story behind the Vacheron Constantin watch with Apollo 14 insignia on the dial that is shown in a photograph found in the archives of Vacheron Constantin? After years of search, Christie's is proud to offer a watch that has been the subject of serious inquiry and curiosity: the Vacheron Constantin "Apollo 14 for Edgar Mitchell" reference 6351.

Painted in miniature on the dial is the insignia of Apollo 14 featuring the last names of the crew: Alan Shepard, Jr., commander; Stuart Roosa, command module pilot; and Edgar Mitchell, lunar module pilot. The insignia includes their names on the border surrounding a representation of Earth and the Moon, with a gold star approaching the Moon from Earth. This star symbol, which has a three-pronged trail similar to a comet, lives on today as the symbol of the United States National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) astronaut corps. Astronauts who have not yet flown in space wear silver pins while those who have flown in space wear gold pins.

Inside is the ultrathin caliber 1003, which was introduced by Vacheron Constantin in 1955 and was the world's thinnest hand-wound mechanical wristwatch movement for over 50 years. The caliber 1003 is still used by Vacheron Constantin today and is considered one of the company's most iconic, innovative, and important movements.

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The box and engraved inscription on the case back tells the rest of the story, although we unfortunately do not possess all the details regarding the presentation of the watch. Inside the Vacheron Constantin box, it states:

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Lunar Module Pilot APOLLO

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Edgar D. MITCHI

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"In the name of some Geneva citizens for Edgar D. MITCHELL Lunar Module Pilot APOLLO 14"

On the outside of the case back of the watch is engraved: 5.2.71 PRESENCE AMERICAINE SUR LA LUNE LUNAR MODULE PILOT APOLLO 14 EDGAR D. MITCHELL AVEC L'ADMIRATION DE CITOYENS DE GENEVE"



The exact circumstances of how and why Edgar Mitchell received this gift are not specifically known. Recently, the same *Vacheron Constantin* reference 6351 with Apollo 14 dial and matching engraving on the back made for Alan Shepard was revealed to the world. That one had case serial 451'041, which is two before the present Mitchell watch with case serial 451'043. It, therefore, seems possible that case serial 451'042 may have been the watch presented to Stuart Roosa.

Swiss citizens have frequently given distinguished visitors with *Vacheron Constantin* wristwatches. A group of Swiss citizens presented world leader attendees of the 1955 Geneva Summit, including President Dwight Eisenhower of the United States and Prime Minister Edgar Faure of France, with gold *Vacheron Constantin* watches.

Furthermore, Mitchell brought a Swiss flag with him on the Apollo 14 mission and Mitchell seems to have had a long affinity for Switzerland. Mitchell later presented a major speech to the Rotary International Convention in Lausanne, Switzerland in 1973 and he last visited Switzerland in July 2014 when he gave speeches in Bern and Geneva.

The present owner received this watch along with a number of other notable items from a family member of Edgar Mitchell. The watch has remained in its original box for decades since the present owner received it.

For collectors of *Vacheron Constantin* watches and space-related horology, this watch can certainly be considered a tremendous discovery worthy of great excitement.

Edgar Dean Mitchell

Astronaut Edgar "Ed" Mitchell was born in September 1930 in Hereford, Texas. With a keen interest in science and engineering, he went on to receive a bachelor's degree in industrial management from Carnegie Mellon University in 1952. Shortly thereafter, Mitchell joined the United States Navy and became a naval aviator, eventually reaching the rank of Captain. During his time on active duty Mitchell earned a bachelor's degree in aeronautics before earning of a Doctor of Science degree in aeronautics and astronautics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1964.

In 1966, Captain Mitchell was selected as an astronaut and seconded from the Navy to NASA. He was part of the support crew for Apollo 9 before serving as backup Lunar Module pilot for Apollo 10. He then served as Lunar Module Pilot for Apollo 14.

Mitchell's time in space had a profound effect on his worldview. Mitchell was quoted as saying about the experience of seeing Earth from the Moon, "You develop an instant global consciousness, a people orientation, an intense dissatisfaction with the state of the world, and a compulsion to do something about it. From out there on the moon, international politics looks so petty. You want to grab a politician by the scruff of the neck and drag him a quarter of a million miles out and say, 'Look at that, you son of a bitch.'"

Mitchell received a number of awards and honors, including the Presidential Medal of Freedom, Navy Distinguished Service Medal, NASA, Distinguished Service Medal, and induction into the International Space Hall of Fame and United States Astronaut Hall of Fame. He also received four honorary doctorates.

Mitchell passed away on February 4, 2016.

Apollo 14

Apollo 14 was the third mission to land on the Moon and the eighth manned mission in the Apollo program of the United States. The mission launched January 31, 1971. Alan Shepard and Edgar Mitchell landed on the Moon on February 5 while Stuart Roosa remained in the Command Module in lunar orbit. Shepard and Mitchell spend over 33 hours on the Moon with over 9 hours of total time of "extravehicular activity" (EVA) outside of the lunar module, colloquially known as "moon walks". They collected over 94 pounds of Moon rocks and conducted several experiments. Notably, Shepard hit two golf balls on the lunar surface while Mitchell threw a lunar scoop handle like a javelin.

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One notable legacy of Apollo 14 were the approximately 500 hundred seeds brought along on the mission by Stuart Roosa and later planted around the United States, including at the White House, as well as in Brazil and Italy. They are known as "Moon trees" and live on as a legacy of Apollo 14.

This Wittnauer eight day movement is minute repeating and finished to the highest standards. Completely solid 18k gold, with the exception of the watch movement, the massive gold case reverberates the repeating sound on demand from a slide on the side of the case. This presentation timepiece was presented to Dr. Lauro Severiano Muller from the Pan American Society of the United States to celebrate the friendship between the people of Brazil and the people of the United States.





Dr. Lauro Severiano Müller

Visionary, politician, diplomat, Dr. Lauro Severiano Müller (1863-1926) was a Brazilian politician best known for being responsible for transitioning the province of Santa Catarina to a state of Brazil. After being the President of Santa Catarina, he served as a federal deputy, senator, and member of the Brazilian Academy of Letters.

During an official visit to the United States as the Brazilian Minister of Affairs in 1913, he was presented this commemorative timepiece from the Pan American Society and given an

honorary doctorate from Harvard University. Interestingly, he was also later given the title of an honorary samurai during a state visit to Japan. He died in Rio de Janeiro in 1926 and is remembered for his important public works and diplomatic worldview.

The Pan American Society was established in 1910 in New York City to promote brotherhood among all American nations, in particular between the people of the United States and Central and South America. Founded by Elihu Root (1845-1937), the 38th United States Secretary of State, the Pan American Society welcomed Dr. Müller to New York City and presented him this lavish gift from *Tiffany & Co.*

Wittnauer, officially founded in 1885, has one of the most fascinating histories of all watch companies and represents the first major watch company to have a woman as CEO and the first watchmaking company to open production in Puerto Rico. After the death of her three brothers, the family business passed to Martha Wittnauer who moved from homemaker to CEO of *Wittnauer* from 1916 until 1936. She was running the company four years before she had the right to vote... During this time, Martha became the first woman to be elected to the Horological Society of America and forged a partnership that lasted from the 1920 through the 1950s, the relationship as a supplier to *Tiffany & Co.*

Running a watch business has many things in common with homemaking. The same principles underlay both - harmony. Given good crafstman, and encourage them to cooperate and the outcome is sure to be harmonious." Martha Wittnauer, 1920



Patek Philippe launched the solar-powered dome clock in the mid-20th century. They boast lavish and uniquely decorated cases featuring engravings of varying pattern or cloisonné enamel scenes. Still in production today, most likely due to their continued popularity, they were made in three series;

First series: Produced in the 1950s and 1960s with a mechanical 17"'250 E pocket watch movement powered through the solar panel in the dome, The large solar panel supplies power to the cylindrical storage device which then transmits energy to wind the movement. The beauty of this patented mechanism allowing the clock to be functional in the dark. At the time, this patented technique was seen as revolutionary, *Patek Philippe* were seen as being able to "master the energy of light."

Second series, and the present clock, beginning in 1970, dome clocks were produced with Quartz movement with a smaller solar panel that seemed to have a higher position on the dome, becoming even smaller in the 1990s.

Third series: The only dome series with cell battery movement. This has a smaller solar panel or no solar panel seen from 2007 onwards.



Elisabeth Perusset Lagger Cloisonné Enamel

This timepiece was decorated by Elisabeth Perusset Lagger, a celebrated artist excelling in fine cloisonné enameling. Her work is predominantly known on *Patek Philippe* Dome clocks, the curved panels and dome presenting an extraordinary challenge mastered by only the most skillful artists. Towards the end of the 1940's, the Swiss watchmaking industry revived the technique of cloisonné enamel which had been used since the Byzantine period. This technique uses fine bands (filaments) of gold to outline the design subject, which are then soldered to the surface of a plate. The empty spaces are then filled with ground enamel and fired multiple times at varying temperatures between 700 and 900 degrees centigrade to achieve different colors. *Patek Philippe*'s enamellers can take up to one year to complete such a dome clock and less than a handful can be complete each year at their workshops. The



artistry had been perfected over the decades and the artists could eventually miniaturize it to be made on wristwatches seen only from 1949 at Basel.

The present clock, however, can be seen as even more impressive than most in its technique. The colors are extremely vibrant for the 70s, echoing those made earlier in the 50s. In the light, the orange of the sky has a gold/copper hue which is so radiant. Notably, black enamel is extremely hard to do in a faded sense but here it seems effortlessly applied, seen in the clouds, in the sails of the boats and also in the bricks of the castle.

L'Aventure de la Voile

Due to each clock being unique, demanding the skill and precision of the artists hand, most were commissioned by their owners to represent certain stories or favorite motifs. The present clock represents a unique story of its own, a tale of adventures on the seas where one can witness many exciting and often unexpected encounters. Perhaps this clock was commissioned by the original owner to remember a past trip, perhaps it came to him in a dream, perhaps he/she always longed for an adventure such as this. Whatever the reason, its tale is evoked with high precision. A detailed description below;

Left panel: A boat with flags, at a blue and green sea with fish and curled gold waves, Poseidon (mythological Greek god of the sea), and a tall castle

Central panel: Two boats further in the distance on rougher seas, larger and lower grey clouds casting shadow

Right panel: A larger boat, anchor, brighter green seas

Dome: A large deep red image that could possibly represent the sun, but also a compass. Also seen are sails of a boat, bags and barrels of booty, possible treasure or reward, a manuscript and scroll, possibly a map

A n interesting and notable feature of this clock is its dome, not only because of what it represents but also because of its texture. The dome is slightly uneven and seems to evoke the high and low tides of the ocean. Through the tale, technique, tone and texture we are willingly swept away to another world and able to enjoy a time that we may never have had the pleasure to experience before. This is the ultimate success for an artwork of this nature.

To the best of our knowledge the present clock has never before been offered in public.

This dial on this watch reveals the signature of *Breguet* however it is important to note that this watch was most certainly not produced by the master Abraham-Louis Breguet (1747-1823). However, the watch may have been produced in his lifetime and represents the celebrity of *Breguet's* name during the early 19th century, a status that his name keeps today almost 200 years after his passing.

During the 19th century, numerous dials on watches were signed *Breguet* by unscrupulous watch sellers capitalizing on the importance of his name. However, many of these watches were of high quality even though the names of their actual makers are lost to history. The presently offered watch contains a fusee chain movement repeating movement with virgule escapement and it is also housed in a exquisite case hand engraved with the charming scene from the Aesop's Fable, the 'Goose that Laid the Golden Eggs'. It is a cautionary tale of the couple portrayed on this watch that killed their precious goose assuming they could find more gold inside her... only to learn that she was just like any other goose once dead. The moral is that 'Greed loses all by striking to gain'.

Originally given as a gift for Christmas in the 1880s, the present watch is distinguished by its minute repeating movement of very small size, particularly complex and challenging to manufacture. Of the finest quality it epitomizes *Tiffany & Co.*'s Swiss production of the late 19th century.

The celebrated house of *Tiffany & Co.*, founded by Charles Lewis Tiffany (1812-1902), opened it's first store in New York in 1837. Ten years later, his catalogue incorporated French watches and clocks.

By 1874 *Tiffany* & Co. had become a veritable Swiss watchmaker, producing timepieces by the lake in Geneva at 10 Grand Quai, today *Patek Philippe's* prestigious Salon on the renamed Rue du Rhône. In that same year, Charles Tiffany opened an ultra-modern factory on Place Cornavin and shortly after, his company was acknowledged as the leading watch and clock retailer in the US, alongside its substantial jewelry business.

This pink gold watch is an unusual example of *Patek Philippe's* production of complicated timepieces, distinguished by the absence of any other complication such as repeating and/or chronograph normally found in the firm's perpetual calendar watches. It is furthermore preserved in very good, original overall condition.

When *Patek Philippe* first started making perpetual calendar watches in 1868, the earliest examples were made with hunter cases in tune with the fashion of the era. By the 1870s on, the majority were cased as open face. The presently offered hunter case watch made in 1882 was most likely special order by or for 'WG', the name of the original owner currently lost in time. The dial is also enameled with the movement number on the dial, a tradition that started in the 1870s and indicated a piece of the highest caliber of *Patek Philippe*'s manufacture.

The 'Harvard' Winthrop Patek Philippe Five Minute Repeater

The coat of arms found on the case back of this watch is that of the Winthrop family, the political dynasty dating back to the first Governor of the Massachusetts, John Winthrop (1588-1649). The crest features the Latin motto "Spes Vincit Thronum" which translates to "Hope Conquers the Throne" and can be seen on the Winthrop family tombstone in Boston, Massachusetts. This watch possibly belonged to Thomas Lindall Winthrop (1834-1920), a direct descendant of John Winthrop who is also buried in the same tomb. The Winthrop name lives at the John Winthrop House at Harvard University where the crest continues to be flown on a flag, easily identifiable with the lion on shield with three red chevrons in the background.

The case of this watch, also bearing the same number 112'178, features a hidden hinge. Hidden hinges on a watch are the ultimate expression of the highest level of the craftsmanship in the casemakers' art.

The fascinating American provenance combined with a rare complication make this watch a fine addition to a collection in need of *Patek Philippe* repeater with a rich story to tell.

Patek Philippe Two-Train Trip Repeater

Made in 1903, three years after the introduction of Patek Philippe's first trip minute repeating movements, this early example of such complex timepiece is preserved in fine original condition.

Its 17" Patek Philippe movement features the rare and desirable tandem wound two-train mechanism, one for the going and one for the repeating work. Traditionally, the repeating mechanism of a watch is activated by pushing a slide in the case band, thus winding and releasing it at the same time. The advantages of this system are the clean lines of the case, the enhanced dust resistance and most importantly permitting the owner the activation of the repeat train many times at will from only one winding. Both the going and striking train are wound by the crown with a two-train trip repeater. The repeater is triggered by a simple push down on the crown.

This 'custom invoice' watch was made for *Tiffany & Co.* in 1903 and exported to Tiffany & Co. for retail. Interesting Tiffany & Co. 'upgraded' the simple enamel dial supplied with the movement from Patek Philippe with the 18k gold hand engraved dial seen with the presently offer watch. Tiffany & Co. spared no expense in the production of this watch and cased it with a double hiddenhinge, the pinnacle of casemaking from the era.

Patek Philippe's superior quality watches, such as the present example, are distinguished by an *Extra* quality movement and hidden hinges to the case. The rare feature of a solid gold dial furthermore enhances the appeal of this minute repeating watch.

Hidden Hinges

Hidden hinges on a watch are the ultimate expression of the highest level of the craftsmanship in the art of casemaking. It is form of subtlety that silently 'screams' mastery and is rarely seen on any watch, and only seen in the highest quality watches ever made. Henry Graves, Jr., the ultimate collector, personally requested the great majority of his pocket watches to be made with hidden hinges and at least 9 of his watches were made with this casemaker 'complication'.

A "Grand Complication" is considered the pinnacle of traditional watchmaking. The combination of minute repeating, split-seconds chronograph, and a perpetual calendar with moon phases is considered the classic 'triple crown' of watchmaking and *Patek Philippe's* executions of these masterpieces of micromechanics from the early 20th century are considered to be among the best ever made.

It is believed that approximately 70 triple complication, splitseconds watches have appeared in public since the first was identified around 1874 and production 'increased' in the early part of the 20th century to one or two pieces per year. During this era in *Patek Philippe's* history, the American market represented over half of *Patek Philippe's* business and affluent titans of industry pushed *Patek Philippe* to produce some of the most complicated watches ever made. The grand complication was the watch of choice for the most discerning and most affluent in the world. The presently offered watch was made in 1911 and delivered to the client in the United States ahead of Christmas 1919, almost 97 years ago today.

The condition of this example is exceptionally notable considering its age. The case back and cuvette hinges are extremely tight indicating that this watch has been opened very few times in its lifetime. In fact a recent service by *Patek Philippe* in Geneva represents one of the handful of times the watch was ever opened. During this service, *Patek Philippe* fully cleaned and overhauled the movement so it now repeats loudly and clearly as it did on the day it first left the factory in 1911. The dial remains untouched and in impeccable condition and the case remains so pristine that even the sharpness of the *Patek Philippe* marks can be seen on the pendant.

Tiffany & Co. utilized numerous suppliers for watch movements during the 20th century including Agassiz Watch Company. This watch, circa 1916, is a simple time only classic open face watch well preserved for its 100 year history

On close inspection of the present timepiece, especially to the movement, it was apparent that the caliber is signed *LeCoultre*. Found under the hammer of the repeater, this was an important discovery in determining that Girard-Perregaux and Jaeger-LeCoultre worked in collaboration to produce this impressive timepiece. It was a common practice, at the time, that the so called' Etablissement' bought movements from movement makers. *LeCoultre* was the biggest movement maker at the time supplying Patek Philippe, Vacheron Constantin, Audemars Piguet (who also made their own movements), Girard-Perregaux, Cartier and many others.

Exceptionally detailed, the crispness and detail can be seen and felt with respect to the traditional engraving technique now mostly lost in the modern world. Furthermore, the guilloche case back is covered in a royal blue enamel highlighting three Fleur-de-Lis. The crafts of enameling, diamond setting, engraving and of course watchmaking can all be seen with this small wonder.

This particular examples is signed Merrick, Walsh & Phelps, one of the most important and prominent 19th century retail partners of *Patek Philippe*. This retailer shared a business relationship with *Patek Philippe* from 1855 until 1901 when the St. Louis retailer was closed.

The English translation of "fleur-de-lis" (sometimes spelled "fleur-de-lys") is "flower of the lily." This symbol, depicting a stylized lily or lotus flower, has many meanings. Traditionally, it has been used to represent French heraldry, and in that sense it is said to signify perfection, light, and life. An emblem much used in jewelry design and ornamentation, and here in watchmaking, it's meaning is elevated as we see the symbol adorned with diamonds set against vibrant blue guilloche enamel. The American Yin and Yang

The variety of watches that *Tiffany & Co.* retailed in the 19th and 20th century is massive in scope. Working with numerous suppliers, manufacturers, and designers, the famous retailer was able to produce watches of seemingly endless designs for multiple demographics. With watches such as the presently offered lot, one can see the attention to detail placed in a simple pendant watch from 1910. Looking under a loupe, this watch reveals itself as a masterpiece of multiple crafts, the goldsmith, the jeweler and the enamellist. Three dimensional in it presence, the watch shows mastery of numerous enameling techniques including miniature enameling and cloisonné enameling. Furthermore the beauty of the engraving and jewel and gold smiths work cannot be overstated in particular with the pendant and the setting of the stones. The balance of the design, balance of craftsmanship, and balance between the Swiss and American workmanship make this watch a masterpiece of early 20th century watchmaking.

The present pendant watch is a highly attractive example of Art Nouveau style, featuring a mythical creature, the chimera. According to Greek mythology, the chimera was a fire-breathing creature, described as having the head of a lion with the head of a goat arising from its back, and a tail that ends in a snake's head. The earliest surviving reference of the chimera is by Homer, in the Iliad.

Given that Art Nouveau designs were dominated by themes such as plants and nature, the feminine form, and floral motifs, it is no wonder that such a creature from mythology was chosen to be depicted on the present watch. Many of the Greek gods, goddesses, and mythological creatures have influence over nature and natural occurrences. On the present watch, the chimera's head is depicted open, ready to breathe fire, with decorative scrolls indicative of what is to come.

Starting in the mid-19th century, early in its history, *Patek Philippe* competed to make the smallest watches ever made and its most miniscule example had a diameter of only 9.023 mm (4 lignes) and was exhibited at the London World Exhibition in 1851 (see *Patek Philippe Pocketwatches* by M. Huber & A. Banbery, p. 106, pl. 13). The second smallest example featuring a keyless 5 lignes cylinder movement was manufactured in 1893 and numbered 97'332. The possibly third smallest example with a keyless 6 lignes lever movement no. 97'364, manufactured in 1893, was sold at Christie's on 18 May 2004 for SFr. 59,750 (lot 87).

The presently offered watch is 24 mm (9 lignes) and was among the smallest pocket watches made by *Patek Philippe* in the early 20th century. Identical in every watch to a seemingly massive regular size pocket watches, these micro-mechanical wonders were considered functional novelties at the time and used by both men and women.

Gérald Genta is truly one of the greatest watch designers of all time. Without a doubt, his immense talent has left an enduring mark in the history of watchmaking. Genta is the creative genius behind the designs of some of the most legendary watches of the century - the *Audemars Piguet* Royal Oak, the *IWC* Ingenieur, the *OMEGA* Constellation & Seamaster and of course the *Patek Philippe* Nautilus. For his own eponymous line, Genta was remembered as the world record holder for consecutive years in the mid-1990s for creating

the world's most complicated watch, his masterpiece the "Grande Sonnerie". On a more whimsical note, Genta created a limited edition of Disney wristwatches featuring Mickey Mouse, Minnie Mouse, Donald Duck, Scrooge and Goofy. Genta's designs transcend time and fashion and remain to this day icons of high horology of the 20th and 21st centuries.

To combine a minute repeater and perpetual calendar within a 34mm case is an astounding accomplishment for horology and here Gérald Genta has been able to do so with complete elegance and sophistication. One is able to see the finely engraved complicated movement through the sapphire crystal case back which also houses a pierced and engraved rotor with the initials GG. Beyond the movement, the case is 18k white gold but instead of the more usual shiny white gold metal that we see on most watches, this one has a brushed finish which gives the watch a more sporty look, allowing the wearer to use it comfortably for more than one occasion. In addition, the dial is superbly arranged so that the four subsidiary dials are readable but also that the striking mother-of-pearl dial shines brightly through. The baguette-cut diamonds to the bezel add an attractive quality making this watch a very well-rounded timepiece that should be admired for its many levels of horological as well as aesthetic achievement. This watch is a triumph of design and technology and, with movement number 13000 and No. 1 engraved on the caseband, is very likely the very first of this important series made by Mr. Genta.

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The reference 570 is one of the most appreciated and well-known vintage watches by *Patek Philippe*. Introduced in 1938, it is the "bigger brother" of reference 96. It remained in production until 1972. With a 35.5 mm. diameter, it was quite a large watch for the time, but it is the perfect size for the modern wrist. Furthermore, the flat bezel gives the watch an overall large profile when worn on the wrist in particular with the bold 20 mm lug gauge for the strap.

This particular example features an evenly aged dial with beautifully raised enamel. The two-tone dial has a minute track that elegantly surrounds the dial giving a very three dimensional look as the dial. Only 40 570s in rose gold with the 12-120 caliber have been discovered to date.

The André Zibach Reference 1582: The Prototype Gyromax Balance

The presently offered watch was the personal watch once belonging to André Zibach, the inventor of the Gyromax balance and celebrated regulator from *Patek Philippe* in the mid-20th century. It features a presentation engraving to Zibach celebrating his first 25 years of service at *Patek Philippe*. This watch was presented to Zibach from *Patek Philippe* management, possibly by Henri Stern himself.

While the archive states the watch was born with a standard lever escapement when made in 1947, the watch was soon fitted with an early version of the Gyromax balance believed to be the very first Gyromax prototype ever made by Zibach himself. The balance bridge and balance wheel were most likely modified by Zibach for proof of concept that his new balance worked accurately. Soon after, Swiss Patent No. 261.431 of 15th May 1949 and No. 280.067 of 31st December 1951 officially protected the Gyromax balance and to this day, the Gyromax is used on almost all *Patek Philippe* watches.

This watch is considered one of the most important pieces in *Patek Philippe's* modern history by many collectors and historians. It encompasses all the innovation, tradition, and beauty of all things *Patek Philippe*, not to mention being a prototype belonging to one the most important mechanical geniuses of the 20th century.



André Zibach worked for *Patek Philippe* as a watchmaker upon completion of his diploma at the Geneva Watchmaking School. As a celebrated adjuster of chronometers, he won numerous awards from the Kew and Geneva Observatories starting in 1929 with a record for a pocket chronometer and another notable record in "single movements, wrist chronometers" in 1948.

Between 1950 and 1952, Zibach collaborated with watchmaker Eric Jaccard to construct a tonneau-shaped wristwatch movement with lever escapement, the Caliber 34S. This was the first of many watches he worked on that would take part in the Geneva Observatory chronometer timing competitions. By 1956, Zibach was appointed Technical Vice-Manager at *Patek Philippe*, and worked on a team that invented and improved the Gyromax balance. In the book Practical Watch Adjusting by Donald DeCarle, the author writes, "Mr. Zibach, the successful timer and adjuster, late of *Patek Philippe*, Geneva, has invented a Glucydur balance which has decided advantages, and known as the Gyromax balance. The advantages are two-fold; firstly, all the weight, in addition to the weight of the balance itself, is concentrated on the rim of the balance and not partly on the rim and partly on the screws normally screwed into the side of the balance. Secondly, and the most important, the effective weight of the screws."

Zibach was also responsible for preparing and regulating chronometer watches for observatory trials, one of the most difficult tasks in the fields of watchmaking. During his tenure at *Patek Philippe*, Mr. Zibach regulated the movement of the celebrated J.B. Champion watch, certified by the Geneva Observatory, sold at Christie's Geneva in November 2012 for a record CHF 3,779,000.

The adjusters, or regleurs, earned celebrity status within the chronometric timing era of the mid 20th century. A brand's reputation was put on the line based on the success of their individual regleur's performance. As the

'Olympics' of the watchmaking world, the superheroes of the time for the regluers, and Zibach was one of the best.

In an article from the Swiss Journal of Horology in 1950, where Zibach was highlighted, it was written:

"From every point of view, each of the manufactures of precision timekeepers hopes that his adjuster will obtain at least one record per yer, but it is impossible for all the adjusters to live up to this desire. However, each of them will try his best, not only will he put all he knows into the adjustment of his timekeepers, but he will follow them day by day with anxiety and attention, happy to lose sleep if there is any variation of rate for which he can find no explanation. Is it surprising that adjusters who deal with Observatory work sometimes suffer from nervous exhaustion and become cantankerous and crusty, finally becoming disgusted with their profession?"

Zibach lived in a world of life or death based on precision adjustment. Not only did he succeeded in his work, winning multiple competitions, he excelled.

However, Zibach also knew how to think outside the box and he took his theoretical knowledge and brought it to a new level with the development of the Gyromax balance. The adjuster knows all the variations that effect the timing keeping of a watch including the effects of "shocks, changes in position, variations of temperature and barometric pressure, clearance of the balance spring at the curb pins, defects of poise of the balance and spring, the effects of the maintaining impulse, and friction, etc." Zibach was a master of variables and his personal watch encompasses his personal spirit of watchmaking, the drive of *Patek Philippe* to remain number one, and the soul of watchmaking in its unending drive to make the perfect mechanical timepiece.

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This reference 1415 is from the third series of the celebrated model showing the names of 41 world locations as opposed to 28 of the earlier version. Furthermore, it utilizes the desirable 'globe' hour hand. Recently serviced by Patek Philippe in Geneva, this watch is offered in exceptional condition.

Reference 1415 was introduced in 1939 and remained in production until around 1954, its movement based on the well-established Patek Philippe inhouse caliber 12-120.

Some 115 movements were upgraded for this model with the ingenious, patented world time mechanism invented by Louis Cottier, the celebrated Geneva watchmaker. Reference 1415 HU (for Heure Universelle or World Time) was available in yellow or pink gold. Approximately 32 examples were made in pink gold and the majority in yellow gold. Only one example in platinum is known to date.

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Until 1948, reference 1415 HU was only available with the classic metal dial, either silvered or more exclusively rose. During the very last years of production, an exceedingly small series was fitted with a cloisonné enamel dial.

The hand-engraved bezels show international cities around the world. Whereas earlier examples of reference 1415 HU list only 28 cities, the later generation lists 41 locations.

A cornerstone of any *Patek Philippe* collection, the reference 130 perfectly captures the spirit of the golden age of watchmaking: the dial is very legible and clean, but still with scales and graduations, as opposed to the minimalist trends of the 1960s and 1970s. The case is in typical Calatrava style, similar to pieces like the immortal reference 96. The lines and gently downturned lugs strike the perfect balance between elegance, voluptuousness and masculinity.

Made in 1939, this fresh to market watch represents an early pre-WWII reference 130 with a case made by Emile Vichet (key mark 9). The attractive PATEK PHILIPPE & CIE long signature and applied roman and baton numerals further make this watch an attractive example. It has French outside and inside hallmarks, further stamped on the inside case FAB. SUISSE.

This well preserved example of the iconic reference 1463 exhibits all the fine qualities one could hope for in this model. This "second series" reference 1463 was sold in 1949 in the midst of the second series production which ran from 1945 and finished 1961.

The case of this water-resistant 1463 was made by Taubert (formerly Freres Borgel) and was considered a sports watch in its day for its water and dust resistant case combined with a chronograph. A soft-iron dust cap also protects the movement.

This fine watch can be considered a great rarity both for its condition, originality, and beauty in design, a true vintage wearable work of art.







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A total of only 281 examples were produced in total. The model was later replaced by the reference 2499, and has inspired the design for subsequent perpetual calendar chronographs.

As the first perpetual chronograph to be made in series by any maker, the reference 1518 quickly attracted the attention of royalty and the privileged, including King Farouk of Egypt, the King of Jordan, and of course Henry Graves, Jr., arguably the greatest watch collector of the 20th century. Interesting, approximately half of all reference 1518s were sold to America during its short production run and watches, and examples such as the presently offered watch, were bought by Americans who wanted to buy the best that money could buy.

The 1518 was a design first, setting the template for all of its 'descendants' with its basic layout — apertures at 12, two subsidiary dials at 9 and 3, and a moonphase at 6.

Its square push buttons, attractive mid-century aesthetic, and beautiful raised enamel dial tachymeter make this watch the timepiece of choice for experienced collectors today.

The present watch is a fine example of the reference 1518, having recently been serviced by *Patek Philippe* Geneva in 2013. The service papers indicate the lugs were restored by *Patek Philippe* in their workshops by the special request of the family of the original owner of this watch. The original dial was untouched during the service and is one of the most beautiful 1518 dials known to exist in terms of condition revealing the beauty of its raised enamel signature and warm patina developed over its 66 year history.

It is interesting to note that the movement bears the stamp *HOX*, which confirms that the watch was made for the American market, and was imported by the Henri Stern Watch Agency, the American representative for *Patek Philippe*.

The inside of the case back is stamped Poinçon de Maître key 9, which is also known as a Collective Responsibility Mark. This stamp indicates the case was made by Emile Vichet S.A. in Geneva, a firm known for crafting cases for numerous complicated *Patek Philippe* watches.

The reference 1518 is now a treasured and collectible timepiece, seen by many *Patek Philippe* connoisseurs as the crown jewel of their collection.



In 1951, Patek Philippe launched reference 2497 and its water-resistant counterpart, reference 2438/1, the firm's only vintage perpetual calendar wristwatch made in series with a screw back. It was the first and only sweep seconds perpetual calendar available at the time. Not until the introduction of the reference 5050 in 1993 did this combination appear back on the market. A combined total of only 179 examples of these two models were produced, the majority cased in yellow gold. It is believed that approximately 115 of these watches were cased as reference 2438/1 is generally divided into two different series and is only known to have been made in yellow and pink gold.

- the first with applied Arabic numerals and dauphine hands

- the second series, such as the present watch, with applied baton numerals and dauphine hands

The presently offered watch features several distinguishing characteristics that make this watch a trophy for any watch collection. First and foremost, the dial is a specimen example with no visible blemishes and the batons showing the slightest signs of patina that warm the rich tones of the evenly aged dial.

The luminescent hands, an upgrade most likely requested at the time of its original purchase in 1958, add to the dial an overall sporting appeal of the this now classic design.

The case retains its original contours and ridges of each of the lugs are pleasingly preserved in their original state. The hallmark on the lug is so crisp one can see the G under Helvetia. Finally the screw-back opens to reveal the exceptional caliber 27 SC in equally well preserved condition.

A 2438/1 represents a celebrated reference, now 58 years old, that can be worn and enjoyed for its large size and vintage appeal with modern design aesthetic.

The present Patek Philippe reference 2582 is one of the rarest and largest vintage "time-only" watches ever made by the company. The movement is the caliber 27 SC featuring 18 jewels, a Gyromax balance, and a gold rotor on the ball-bearing system.

The two-piece case with snap case back is the star of the show of this watch. Made by the legendary Geneva firm Markowsky, who made some of the most dynamic cases for Patek Philippe, they are believed to have produced less than 50 total cases in pink and yellow gold, from which only approximately five, all in yellow gold, have surfaced to the market.

Combining the rarity of the watch with its magnificent condition makes this an exciting opportunity for those ranging from beginner to advanced watch collectors to add an important, rare, and exciting Patek Philippe to their collection.

The 2508 was Patek Philippe's first foray into waterproof case designs for noncomplicated wristwatches. Previously, the only waterproof wristwatch was the reference 1463 chronograph and the 2508 design borrows heavily from its 1463 inspiration in terms of case design. The downturned lugs, perfectly proportioned dial, and screw-back case profile produce a masculine and most pleasing aesthetic.

Inside the 2508 beats the legendary 27SC, covered by a metal dust cap to keep moisture and magnetism outside of the precious movement - a trait found predominantly in "tool" watches, making this reference an unusual offering in *Patek Philippe's* lineage.

The dial of the presently offered 2508 has remained completely unaltered over the last half-century, with a hard enamel signature and pronounced definition of all letters and accents. The dial itself retains a beautiful cream color, hardly aged over time, without a solitary blemish to be seen. Accenting this dial are facetted gold baton markers.

The case remains unpolished and the hallmarks are as pronounced as the most discerning collector could demand. This 2508 is in "like new" condition, despite leaving the manufacture in 1961.

Furthermore, the case back retains its original *Patek Philippe* 'Water-proof' sticker placed by the manufacture to remind the retailer and end consumer at point of sale of this wonderful selling point. In addition, this original and exceptionally rare *Patek Philippe* red box accompanies this trophy 2508. The period certificate of origin is enclosed in an envelope marked with the movement number.

The reference 3415 was made beginning in 1958 and discontinued in 1960. This short production run makes for one of the rarest of all *Patek Philippe* automatic watches. In fact, approximately 300 were made in yellow gold and only 40 in this reference were made in pink gold. Made with the celebrated caliber 12-600, the same movement used on the reference 2526, the reference also shares the coveted double PP crown.

The movement and case numbers indicate that this may be possibly be the first or second example of a 3415R ever produced.

With dials by Stern Frères, and a case by A. Wenger (Geneva Key mark 1) this watch also features a screw-down two piece water-resistant type case.

The condition of this watch is impressive as the case appears to be untouched by time. The sharp lugs, the original crown, and the perfect dial all add up to make a watch that belongs on the wrist of someone who can treasure this beauty for now and for future generations.

Gilbert Albert

Gilbert Albert was born in Geneva in 1930, and studied Jewellery and Design at Geneva's Ecole des Arts Industriels. After completing his studies, he joined *Patek Philippe* as designer and head of the workshop. During the seven years he spent with the manufacturer, he created some of the firm's most daring designs, most notably the asymmetrical models from the "Ricochet" series.

Gilbert Albert was greatly inspired by modern art, in particular works by Brancusi and Mondrian. His unusual yet timeless designs are considered as cutting-edge and unconventional today as they were when first produced 50 years ago. His designs were awarded the prestigious "Oscar" award at the Diamonds International Awards ten times - three for *Patek Philippe*, two for *OMEGA* and five under his own name.

In 1962, he opened his own workshop in Geneva, specializing in the design and manufacture of unique jewels and objects. Albert's work was exhibited around the world, and in 1991 was the first living artist since 1917 to be invited to show his creations in the Moscow Kremlin.

The Asymmetricals

The most well-known of Gilbert Albert's designs for *Patek Philippe* are the references 3412, 3413, 3422, and 3424. These models rarely come up for auction, and the present example presents a rare opportunity for the *Patek Philippe* connoisseur to acquire one of Gilbert Albert's most celebrated designs. The rarity of this highly attractive specimen is further enhanced by the retailer's stamp on the back of the case - "S" for *Serpico Y Laino*, the Venezuelan jeweller who sold high-end watches by *Patek Philippe* and *Rolex*.

The present watch is the fifth known reference 3422 to come on the auction market, and the only known example retailed by *Serpico Y Laino*. The combination of the champagne dial with beautifully raised hard black enamel sector lines, the crisp hallmark in the band revealing it has not been subject to careless polishing, and last but not least, the crisp retailer's stamp on the case back make the present watch an elegant addition to a discerning collection.


Presented at Baselworld in 2010, the present watch is a very rare example of *Patek Philippe's Native Indians of the Great Plains*. Here we see one of the four dials introduced in this series where the subject is always depicted on horseback in a vibrant cloisonné enamel setting. The scene prominently describes vast landscape, clear blue skies with EMAIL (enamel), and even hands shaped like feathers, which all come together to illustrate great adventure in the open plains.

The dial is miniature work of art and made with the cloisonné method in a mosaic of interwoven colors that bring contrast, definition, and a sense of reality to the subject and his surroundings.

The four scenes of this Native American series were referenced -57,-58, -59, and -60 within *Patek Philippe*. This watch represents -57, the first of the series.

With 2 arrows in his quiver, and 5 feathers on his head, the rider has a smile on his face, a small yet important detail that can only be clearly seen under a loupe.

To the best of our knowledge the present watch has never before been offered in public.

For collectors of *Rolex* watches, those featuring star markers on the dial are in a league of their own in terms of rarity, desirability, and value. The present watch is remarkable as it is the first square square Bubbleback known to the market with star markers, which are located at the three o'clock and six o'clock positions. They were perhaps added to the dial to highlight the fact the watch is an Officially Certified Chronometer.

The watch recently came to the market from the original owner, who purchased it at the retailer Lefèvre in Charleroi, Belgium. Amazingly, the watch retains its original box and inside is the original retailer sticker. The watch remains in unpolished condition with the serial number and *Rolex* coronet crisply engraved on the case back. Furthermore, it retains what appears to be its original crystal and the straight lugs and curved edges of the case offer a textbook and clear case of how the watch appeared as new. The dial has honest and even patina reflecting the age of the watch and the fact it does not have a water-resistant Oyster case.

The present watch, the *Rolex* Stelline Square Bubbleback, is a remarkable opportunity for a discerning collector to get a possibly unique piece from the crowned manufacturer.

In production on from 1945 to 1949, reference 4467 represents the beginning of one of the most recognized names in modern horology: the *Rolex* Datejust. An exceedingly rare timepiece, the first 100 examples were available only through a coupon found on the Genève newspaper "Tribune de Genève". It was only available in 18k gold with Jubilee bracelet, to emphasize its exclusivity, and it was the first watch entirely made by *Rolex*, including case and bracelet. Technical necessities dictated by the presence of the rotor commanded quite a large case design for the time, which grants to the piece a gratifying thickness, measuring 14mm in height.

This larger version of the famous "Bubbleback" was fitted with the new caliber A.296, originally used in reference 5026, the large "Bubbleback". The "Jubilee Datejust" reference 4467 was initially only available in 18K gold. It featured a finely milled bezel, a gold-bordered date window and alternating red/black date numerals, a small "bubble back" crown and a prominently domed back.

The three-body case of the model, also known as the "Overtone" or "Big Egg", was soon replaced by a two-body case, still retaining the protruding case back, the milled bezel and alternating colors for the date, under the banner of the reference 6105. The only obvious change was the winding crown, replaced against a larger version when Rolex increased the water resistance from 60 to 165 feet.

While most of the rare reference 4467 watches feature tan dials, the present watch features a charismatic and original gilt black dial. It is a remarkable find for an astute collector.

Launched in 1950, reference 6062 is seen as a pinnacle for a savvy *Rolex* connoisseur since it combines key elements a demanding watch collector could expect: a sporty yet distinguished look, a complicated movement with full calendar and moon phases indication housed in the purist of all Oyster designs. Together with reference 8171, it is one of only two *Rolex* models to show the date, the day, the month and the moon phase. It was also the first Rolex watches ever to be fitted with the so-called Super-Oyster Crown.

Reference 6062 was made in very few examples, available in yellow gold, pink gold or stainless steel. To further enhance the model's individuality and exclusivity, a variety of dial designs were available - the rarest, however, featured star-shaped numerals and those so blessed with those dial configurations have earned the name "Stelline."

The present watch is a highly-charismatic example that has a dial that seems to have been reprinted and relumed by *Rolex* a number of years ago. One of the things collectors note on these restored dials are how the "7" numerals on the outer date track are not printed with three lines as on those found on original examples, but instead simply two lines.

With original examples reaching stratospheric values, the present watch offers a more accessible opportunity for a Rolex collector to have the joy of owning and even wearing a legendary "Stelline".

The present *Rolex* reference 8171 is preserved in beautiful condition, with its original luminous dial and a full gold case in a warm pinkish color that seems likely unpolished with full and crisp visible hallmarks. The patina and color of the dial matches the pink hue of the gold case beautifully, while the alpha hands and baton markers provide the watch with a sporty look. The watch is a charismatic and sporty take on one of the most desirable and complicated *Rolex* watches ever made.

Rolex has produced only two different models of wristwatches with complete calendar and moon phase, references 8171 and 6062. Both models are automatic, however reference 8171 has a snap-on case back, while reference 6062 is fitted with a water-resistant-type screw-down case back and thus carries the designation "Oyster" on the dial. Reference 8171 is 38mm in diameter, which was remarkably large for the era, whereas reference 6062 is 36mm in diameter. Reference 8171 was made in a very small series between 1949 and 1952, mostly in yellow gold, with examples in pink gold or in stainless steel far more uncommon.

The present Rolex Explorer reference 1016 is one of the earliest examples of the reference known to the market and is preserved in incredible condition. The dial retains the original gloss and the luminous material on the dial and in the hands has aged to a beautiful warm tone. Furthermore, the case appears to be unpolished and it retains what appears to be its original bracelet with the same general wear matching the case. Particularly remarkable is the fact that the watch retains its original chronometer certificate, which is an extreme rarity for early Explorers.

This watch features a dial with the "Officially Certified Chronometer" text found on late examples of the predecessor reference 6610. It appears that the 596'000 range was a period of transition and some watches are known with this earlier reference 6610 dial configuration while others add "Superlative" to the dial and have a slightly different Rolex coronet.

This example of the 1016 is made more special by the fact it holds a serial number that is just 216 before the personal Explorer reference 1016 owned and worn by Ian Fleming, the creator of James Bond. Fleming's watch, with a serial number believed to be 596'851, was researched and shared with the public by the James Bond watches expert Dell Deaton. Deaton proposed that Fleming's early Explorer reference 1016 was, in fact, the inspiration for the watch described as used by Bond in Fleming's original stories.

Few examples of the reference 1016 are known to the market in this 596'000 range of serial numbers, particularly in this condition with the original chronometer certificate. It is a rare and special opportunity for an astute collector.

The present GMT-Master reference 1675 is an exceedingly rare example featuring the United Arab Emirates (UAE) crest and the Arabic text translated as "Ministry of Defense". Earlier GMT-Master examples had the signature of His Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum.

The present watch is an extremely rare variation featuring an extremely rare "radial dial" configuration where the markers are placed closer to the center of the dial and the bottom of the crest touching the 6 o'clock rectangle lume plot.

Noteworthy on the dial is the "Quraysh Hawk", printed in different 'padded layers' that create a tri-dimensional effect. At the center of the hawk, the symbol of the United Arab Emirates, is a polychrome enamel Dhow or Arabian sailboat, which is replaced today by the UAE federation flag.

Its original dial stands out by the even cream-colored tritium luminous material on the hour markers and in the hands, all enhanced by the very crisp "Quraysh Hawk" crest placed close to the center post and "Ministry of Defense" text in Arabic. The case is amazingly preserved in original and unpolished condition with full beveled edges to the lugs. Furthermore, the "Pepsi" red and blue bezel insert with bold gold numerals has faded uniformly and beautifully.

Of superb overall appeal and rarity, the present reference 1675 is a rare find for the aficionado of rare and military *Rolex* sports watches, particularly in this original condition and with spectacular radial dial configuration.

It features a creamy dial with red minute track as seen on the preceding "Paul Newman" reference 6239 examples, whereas the "Paul Newman" reference 6262 typically has a white minute track. The movement also appears to be an earlier version than typically found on the reference 6262.

Reference 6262, along with the reference 6264, was produced from the end of the 1960s through 1972. The model was produced in stainless steel and both 14k and 18k gold, and the 6262 featured a metal bezel with engraved tachometer scale, while the 6264 featured a bezel with black plastic insert and printed tachometer scale. Fresh to the market from the original owner the present watch features a so-called exotic, or tropical dial, later called a Paul Newman dial, after the actor was photographed wearing a *Rolex* watch in a publicity shoot for the film *Winning*. It features a rare variation of *Rolex* Cosmograph text found only on a small number of reference 6262 examples. Furthermore, it has the original guarantee, literature and box. It is safe to say that it is one of the finest "Paul Newman" models in the world.

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The panorama of manually-wound *Rolex* Daytona chronographs encompasses seven different models, plus two bejeweled models made in extremely small numbers. Among the non-bejeweled timepieces, only three models truly qualify as having an Oyster case (indeed, while these three models bear the Oyster designation on the dial, the others do not). A true Oyster case is defined by the screw-down case back, screw down crown and screw down chronograph pushers, thus ensuring increased water resistance. Reference 6265 is indeed one of these highly sought-after models. Together with its sister reference 6263 (the difference being the black-insert bezel rather than the metal one), the reference 6265 is the final evolution of manually wound Daytona. It is defined, beyond its metal insert and screwdown pushers, by the caliber 727 (evolved from caliber 722-1).

Reference 6265, together with its sister reference 6263 with black acrylic bezel, is the final evolution of the manually-wound Daytona Cosmograph. Both feature the "Oyster" designation as a result of their screw-down chronograph pushers first found on the reference 6240. These screw-down pushers are more water-resistant than the pump pushers found on the Daytona references 6239, 6241, 6262, and 6264. The Daytona reference 6265 differentiates itself from previous iterations mainly for the 727 caliber, instead of the calibers 72B, 722 and 722-1 found in earlier references. The reference 6263 and 6265 were in production to around 1987.

The present watch is a well-preserved example of a "Big Red" Daytona reference 6265. On these examples that have received the nickname "Big Red", "DAYTONA" is placed above the 6 o'clock register in red. They are highly desired by collectors.

The Tudor guarantee also features his bold signature on the reverse side.

Mr. Trapattoni earned the nickname "Trap" or "II Trap" and is considered by many to be the most successful club coach in the history of the Italian league "Serie A".

The *Rolex* Sky-Dweller model is a very unusual and attractive dual-time wristwatch with its red triangle indicating the home time while its conventional hands can be set to local time, a second time zone. The twelve windows to the dial above each Arabic numeral indicated the month. The crown is used to wind the watch and set home and local time. The desired function is selected by rotating the bezel.

With its large and heavy case, the present watch further stands out due to its engraved case back, showcasing the Khanjar emblem that is the national emblem of Oman. Timepieces made for the Sultanate of Oman have grown in the hearts and minds of collectors thanks to their rarity, customization and royal connection, and are now extremely collectible pieces.

The *Patek Philippe* reference 3970 perpetual calendar chronograph is considered a modern classic. The third iteration of the celebrated perpetual chronograph line of timepieces from *Patek Philippe*, the 3970 is the heir to the 2499, with which it shares the unmistakable case construction characterized by its sculpted lugs. Also, the 3970 replaces the Valjoux caliber of its predecessors with a Lemania caliber.

Beyond being aesthetically pleasing, the new indicators are extremely practical: the 24-hour indication allows the wearer to avoid setting the calendar when the time is around midnight and the calendar gear train is working, which would damage the movement. The leap-year indicator is invaluable when setting the perpetual calendar. Another practical addition is the push-piece for setting the month — previously one could only proceed one day at a time.

The 3970 represents the first 'production era' perpetual chronograph from *Patek Philippe*, and the fact that significant numbers of this reference were made relative to the 1518 and 2499 makes the 3970 more accessible in terms of price point and of exceptional value.

This particular example has a well preserved platinum case with crisp outside hallmarks on two of the lugs, a screw down sapphire case back, and a black dial with diamond hour markers, all confirmed on the archive.





Patek Philippe introduced a world time wristwatch in the 1930s with the reference 1415. These early world time wristwatches featured the names of international cities engraved on the bezel. The reference 5110 is a modern version of its legendary predecessors. It features a central guilloche dial and outer ring with the international city names giving it a dynamic and modern look.

The present fresh to market example is a rare and most likely unique model of the reference 5110 featuring Jerusalem on the dial in black. The Extract confirms the city of Jerusalem was added by special request. In order to accommodate this special request, Cairo was removed from the dial.

Another interesting variant with this possibly unique example is that the capital of Bangladesh was spelled in French as 'DACCA' on all normal production 5110s. This example has the city spelled correctly in English as 'DHAKA'.

Limited editions of 5110s are known to have been made for Bogata, Doha, Singapore, Munster, and Taipei. This Jerusalem example appears to be a oneoff special request rather than a limited edition.

found in watchmaker workshops, with the large minute hand taking up visual importance. This allowed the watchmakers to regulate the watches they were building against the time displayed on the central regulator, hence the name. The regulator dial allows for more accuracy than a normal watch because it has a non-coaxial hour and minute hands, which means that the hour and minute hands do not share the central pinion position on the dial, but are independently placed.

The presently offered example is fresh to market, sealed, and asnew. This coveted reference is a desirable landmark watch to own in any *Patek Philippe* collection.

Made and sold in 1996, this watch appears near mint and complete 20 years after it first left the factory. This watch is accompanied by service papers showing its movement was cleaned and overhauled in 2006 by *Patek Philippe*.

The Donzé Enamel Dial

A close inspection of the dial reveals that the under 6 o'clock the Swiss has a triangle, or delta, on each side in black enamel. It is known that 3939 enamel dials from this period were made by Donzé Cadrans S.A. in Le Locle, Switzerland. The surprising element of this dial is that it is believed that Donzé placed the 'Delta' triangles on the dial as a sort of secret signature of his work, D for Delta for Donzé. These marks are easily mistaken for the APRIOR, or sigma marks, seen on dials made with gold elements. Interestingly, the 3939 dials were made with gold base plates but did not have the APRIOR mark. Master Enameller Francis Donzé started his family company in 1972 and his niche business soon became a supplier of enamel dials to many of the most important watchmaking companies in the world, in particular *Patek Philippe*. In 1987, Mr. Donzé retired and his family continued the business of traditional enamel dial making. In 2012, Ulysse Nardin acquired Donzé Cadrans.

With a case made by Ateliers Reunis (Geneva Key 28), the watch is a masterpiece of late 20th century watchmaking combining traditional case and dial making techniques with the complications of a minute repeater and a tourbillon. The sound that this 33 mm makes is much richer and louder than almost any modern wristwatch repeater, perhaps due to the reverberation of the sound from the enamel dial.

The minute repeater was believed to have been invented in the mid-1680s by Englishman Daniel Quare. Before the days of electricity, it allowed the wearer to tell the time in the dark. In this age of technology, minute repeaters still involve an exacting level of craftsmanship. It is often said that the maker of a minute repeater requires the ear of a musician and the hand of a surgeon.

Patek Philippe introduced the reference 3939 in 1993 in yellow, white and pink gold models. A platinum version was released the following year and discontinued in 2011. This complicated timepiece is exemplary of the master craftsmanship of *Patek Philippe*, not only because it consists of a total of 336 parts but it also houses both minute repeating and tourbillon functions within a small case, classified by the calibre RTO 27 PS.

Approximately 75 examples of the 3939 were made in yellow gold during its production from 1992-2009.

One of the most elegant and subtle of the *Patek Philippe* grand complication timepieces, reference 3939 unites the sonorous charms of a two-gong minute repeater with the gravity-defying precision of a tourbillon escapement. In keeping with its eternal style, reference 3939 ignores the contemporary trend for larger dials, measuring 33 mm. in diameter, an achievement for such a technically sophisticated timepiece. This is also one of the very few *Patek Philippe* references to feature an enamel dial with with Breguet-style numerals.

40 YEARS OF THE PATEK PHILIPPE NAUTILUS: 1976-2016

Forty years ago Patek Philippe launched a steel sports wristwatch that was to become pivotal to the company's ongoing image and success. The *Nautilus* is now one of the most desired and recognizable watches in the world and Christie's is very pleased to celebrate this important milestone in the history of an undisputed legend by offering a selection of 40 examples of the Nautilus over four auctions in four international locations.

In a time where large steel sports watches are now commonplace, it is hard for us today to comprehend quite how startlingly different the *Nautilus* reference 3700/1 was in 1976 for Patek Philippe and the global watch market. Water resistant to 120 meters, it was given the reference 3700/1 and christened "*Nautilus*" in honour of transcending the passage of time and the vagaries of fashion. Genta, whose magnificent oeuvre of watch design spanned more than 50 years, designed not one, but two watches that can be said without exaggeration to have changed the world of wristwatches forever. Designs with a clarity of form and function so breathtakingly bold and deceptively simple that they became enduring successes, paving the way for sports watch design as we know it today. Indeed, both the *Nautilus* and the equally iconic Audemars Piguet *Royal Oak* designed in 1972 embody so intrinsically the DNA of their respective manufacturers that they continue to be instantly recognizable even to the layman.

Captain Nemo's submersible craft from Jules Verne's novel *Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea*. In advertising literature of the time, the new model was billed "one of the world's costliest watches is made of steel", a radical statement that questioned the very nature of what constituted the value of a watch. No longer did a luxury watch have to be made of precious metal; its value could be judged by other factors - workmanship, style, fitness for purpose and brand association. The unusually large 42 millimeter case quickly gained the nickname "Jumbo".

The Nautilus was created by perhaps the greatest wristwatch designer of the 20th century—Gérald Genta. Few designers in any field are fortunate enough to conceive an enduring global product even once in their careers that captures not only the zeitgeist of its own time but perpetuates through the decades nearly unchanged,

Stemming from a single moment of inspired genius by Gérald Genta, the original design of Patek Philippe's Nautilus was notable for its immediacy. In 1974, galvanized by the eventual success of Audemars Piguet's Royal Oak, Patek Philippe had decided to develop a new and exclusive sports watch in an attempt to revitalize the brand and compete with both AP and to a lesser extent Rolex who had always dominated the tool watch market. While attending the Basel watch fair of that year Gérald Genta was sitting alone in the restaurant of a hotel at the same time as a group of people from Patek Philippe were also dining. Later Gérald recalled that he asked the waiter to "bring me a piece of paper and a pencil, I want to design something." He sketched the Nautilus there and then in almost its final form in only five minutes. The design was in fact based on the shape of a porthole of a transatlantic liner with wide bezel and "ears" at each side evoking the



large hinges of those watertight windows. For this new form of case, Patek Philippe patented their ingenious new system of water-resistance whereby the more external pressure is exerted on the case the more watertight it becomes. The patent was submitted on 23 April 1976 under the name of Philippe Stern, Genève.

Patek Philippe's *Nautilus* is imbued with practicality, luxury, ruggedness, elegance, technical know-how but above all that indefinable quality—style. In the words of Patek Philippe "Nautilus will accompany you when you dive to 396 feet. Or when the occasion is formal or festive. Or when you set out to slay dragons in the boardroom. Nautilus and its owner are meant to be inseparable for life". Subtle updating over the years and new models added to the range ensure that the Nautilus remains as fresh and contemporary today as it was forty years ago.

THE DASH TO DASH

This early example of a stainless steel 3700/1 is a specimen example of this coveted reference featuring the earliest known dial variant – the dash to dash. It features minute markers that are dashes rather than the more regularly seen round dot minute markers. Preserved with the period correct *Patek Philippe* font and Swiss double APRIOR marks under 6 o'clock, this watch presents the opportunity to own an early example of this landmark reference. Notably, the dial remains in excellent condition while most other early "dashed" examples have wear and peeling to the top coat of varnish on the dial.

Fresh to the market and accompanied by its original cork box, this watch has some of the earliest movement and case numbers known within all reference 3700/1As that have surfaced from the time it left the factory just under 40 years ago.

The 3700/1A was equipped with the caliber 28-255 C based on a *Jaeger-LeCoultre* ébauche, one of the best thin automatic movements available at that time and finished in-house by *Patek Philippe*. The cases were manufactured by Favre-Perret.

As presented in period advertisements from the late 1970s, the 3700/1A was not made from simple steel but rather nickel-chrome-molybdenum steel, an alloy that was considered the highest standard at the time. It was made to withstand extreme temperatures and pressure, and known for its resistance to corrosion. Used extensively in the construction of tanks during World War II, this type of alloy was not only protective but relatively light compared to 'regular' steel.

As a consequence of the high-end production value of this watch in the late 1970s, the price was significant when it was first released. In 1977, the original retail price for this time-only watch was \$3,100. It was a bold price and a bold design for the time — by comparison, a *Patek Philippe* mechanical wristwatch in 18k-gold with an 18k-gold mesh bracelet retailed for just under \$4,000, and a steel Rolex Daytona chronograph retailed for just under \$1,000.

Consigned by the original owner, this 3700/1A *Tiffany & Co.* was bought on March 30, 1981 from *Tiffany & Co.* in New York City. The owner recalls buying this watch hours after the news broke that Ronald Reagan was shot in an attempted assassination. While the news traveled around the world, the original purchaser walked into *Tiffany & Co.* notably hushed and empty on that historic day, and quietly traded his two-tone *Rolex* Datejust plus \$500 to become the new owner of this 3700/1A. Seeing a Nautilus in San Juan for the first time during a cruise the week before, the buyer was inspired to find this watch in New York City after his vacation. Learning from a *Tiffany* salesperson that the Nautilus was a hard to sell due to its large size, this watch remained in the store's inventory for four years before the gentleman made the deal to acquire the watch.

The case of this watch confirmed by the Extract to have been replaced by *Patek Philippe* and most likely this was done before it was sent to *Tiffany & Co.* in 1977. The period correct case numbered 536'419 on the watch is confirmed on the Extract from the Archives.

Cared for and worn for almost 40 years, this watch remained with the original owner until this important anniversary year and now a new owner has the opportunity to wear and enjoy this Nautilus.

A close inspection of the dial reveals the original tritium lume beautifully aged, the *Patek Philippe* signature perfectly period correct for 1977, and the same font that can be seen on original period *Tiffany & Co.* Nautilus advertisements. The ad presented on this page reveals that both style fonts were used making it very likely that this retailer signature is original to this dial. The SWISS signature with double APRIOR further suggests that this dial has not been modified from the day it left *Tiffany & Co.* in 1977.

A similar 3700/1A with the same *Tiffany & Co.* font signature was sold at Antiquorum Geneva, May 13, 2007, lot 670. This watch was movement no. 1'305'263 and case No. 536'423. Also made in 1977 and sold to *Tiffany & Co.*, this watch featured a case number only 4 numbers away from the presently offered lot with case number 536'419.

APRIOR

From 1971 until 1995, all watches made in Switzerland with gold applied markers or gold dial plates were required to have the 'APRIOR' (often called 'sigma', after the Greek letter) logo marked on the dial. With Nautilus watches from this period, the APRIOR mark can be seen on each side of the 'SWISS' under the 6 o'clock baton. This was due to the fact that the hour-marker batons of the watches were made from white gold rather than steel. APRIOR stands for *Association pour la Promotion Industrielle de l'Or.* From today's perspective, it's rather ironic that this association is 'promoted' on the dial of such an iconic steel reference.

THE JOYERIA RICCIARDI NAUTILUS

When a fresh to market mint and complete example of a watch comes to auction for the first time, collectors take note. When a Nautilus meets these stringent requirements, the market becomes truly excited and Christie's is honored to offer this pristine reference 3700/1A to celebrate the anniversary of this landmark reference.

The presently offered Nautilus is not only one of the most complete examples of an early 3700/1A to surface, it is also arguably one of the most mint examples to surface in recent years. Fully complete from the 1970s with its original cork box, product literature, and Certificate of Origin from *Patek Philippe*, this watch offers the collector the chance to own a superlative example of this important reference. Thanks to the protection offered by the

case and its gaskets, this dial is beautifully preserved in its original state, featuring the Swiss double APRIOR signature, and the original tritium lume is evenly aged to a warm autumn hue.

Imagine walking into *Joyeria Ricciardi* in Buenos Aires, Argentina in early 1981 and buying a steel Nautilus from the celebrated South American jeweler. You receive the cork box, the retailer fills out and stamps the certificate, and you become the new owner of a beautiful new Nautilus. This 3700/1A remains exactly as it was presented to the original buyer at that time with all of its accessories. Due to this watches elevated condition relative to its peers, this watch has been dubbed the 'Ricciardi Nautilus' and will hopefully be treasured and enjoyed for many more years. Notably, the watch features the engraved inventory numbers used by Riccardi on the outside of the case band.

In a world in which large steel sports watches have become commonplace, it's hard to comprehend how groundbreaking the Nautilus 3700/1 was when it launched in the 1976.

Now considered iconic and an integral part of *Patek Philippe's* identity, at the time it was a huge risk for the company to produce a watch so different from anything it had done before. An oversized and expensive steel mechanical automatic in a world in which ultra-thin gold-bracelet quartz watches were the envy of the disco generation, the Nautilus made a statement that was heard around the world. Notably, they were so unusual that it took years after production until one found an owner.

Reference 3700/11AJ was first introduced in 1980. The estimated total production of this model in the steel and gold two-tone variation is estimated at only 200 examples and is believed to be rarer than its two-toned predecessor, the 3700/1AJ, where approximately 600 examples were produced. Within the reference 3800 family numerous dial options were offered, including jeweled dials, black, white and gilt dials, as well as versions with various forms of baton markers and roman numerals. However the presently offered watch features a dial with two unique variations. First it is slate-grey without the traditional ridges seen on most Nautilus watches and has an attractive gun-metal matte finish. Next it has white painted Arabic numerals that give the dial an overall Art Deco and bold appearance. 

3 IF YOU FAIL TO PROVIDE THE RIGHT DOCUMENTS

If in our opinion you do not satisfy our bidder identification and registration procedures including, but not limited to completing any anti-money laundering and/or anti-terrorism financing checks we may require to our satisfaction, we may refuse to register you to bid, and if you make a successful bid, we may cancel the contract for sale between you and the seller.

2 TRANSFERRING OWNERSHIP TO YOU

2 EXPORT AND IMPORT
