

The present watch offers an opportunity to acquire a well-preserved vintage *Universal* Compur from the 1940s. Its sharp case and beautifully aged dial with numerals in the Art Deco stylle are a rare find amongst watches from this period.

Universal Genève produced the Tri-Compax from the 1940s through the 1960s. The Tri-Compax watches came in a variety of sizes and styles. The present watch has a very charming aesthetic featuring a silvered dial, blued steel hands and a tachymeter scale to the outside of the dial calibrated for miles. The Arabic numerals offer a vintage style and furthermore the 14k gold case and movement that is stamped *UOW* indicates it was made especially for the American market.

Recent years have seen an explosion in interest in vintage chronographs made by *Universal Genève* and for good reason due to the high-quality nature of their watches. The present example is highly attractive, cased in 18k pink gold and with the retailer signature to the dial, dedicated to Cartier. The Universal extract confirms that this watch was originally sold to Cartier. Universal watches featuring this retailer signature are exceedingly rare and sought by collectors.

The present watch is a rare oversized Compax Chronograph with an "albino" silver dial that is preserved in excellent condition. These watches are extremely popular with collectors due to their size and sporty aesthetic.

This attractive "panda" (white dial with black registers) chronograph is appealing because of its style aesthetics, that are associated with vintage chronographs such as the *Rolex* Daytona. The Tri-Compax model notably had three sets of

complications: 1. a chronograph including minute and hour register; 2. a complete calendar showing day, date, month; and 3. the moon phase. These three complications are why it received the "Tri" designation before "Compax".

This "panda" Tri-Compax was famously worn by Eric Clapton during his time playing guitar with the band Cream. There are a number of photographs of him wearing it while performing. The opposite version of this watch, the "inverse panda" Tri-Compax, is now sometimes called the "Evil Clapton" as a result of its black dial with white registers and red accents. These watches are similar to the simple chronograph version, the "panda" version of which is known as the "Nina Rindt" after the wife of the late Formula One driver Jochen Rindt, and the "inverse panda" version that is known as the "Evil Nina".

The present watch is in remarkable and outstanding condition, with what appears to be an unpolished case. It is likely to be one of the finest examples of an "Eric Clapton" Tri-Compax in existence. Interest in 1960s-era *Universal Genève* chronographs continues to grow at exponential rates and the present watch is likely to give its next owner great pleasure.

The El Primero model was first released in 1969. It was one of the first automatic chronograph movements ever produced. The present watch is in extremely crisp, possibly unpolished, condition. It is likely one of the finest examples of the reference G381 in existence.

The reference A386 due to its legendary movement, iconic and unique dial design, and amazing case design, could certainly be considered one of the most iconic and important chronographs ever made. Interest in the A386 continues to grow as collectors place it among the most iconic vintage sport chronograph designs of the 1950s to 1970s.

Only in production for a very short time and with so many rare attributes the present watch is certainly one of the more important and rare vintage steel Zenith wristwatches ever to be offered at auction. The large 38mm. diameter steel case with stepped bezel captures the eye and the imagination, while the original and unrestored silver dial features a subtle blue

telemeter scale along the outside edge that harmonizes with the striking blued steel hands.

However what makes this watch an even greater rarity is the unusual form of chronograph mechanism equipped with two column wheels. The mechanism can be considered a transitional system between the single-button chronograph and the fully developed two-button chronograph. Of course, visually this watch appears to have a standard two-button chronograph, however, in fact the button at 2 o'clock performs the start, stop and return-to-zero functions in the same manner as a single-button chronograph while the button at 4 o'clock allows the chronograph hand to be stopped and restarted during operation without it having to return to zero. This is achieved by a second column wheel mounted on the frontplate beneath the dial.

Cairelli retailer in Rome is a name synonymous with Italian military watches. Even before Zenith, in the 1950s, Cairelli had been placing orders to Universal for pilot's timepieces. Those watches used a movement manufacture by Martel Watch, a company Zenith bought in 1959. Consequently, in the 1960s Cairelli turned to Zenith to ensure consistency of the supply. Two models are known to have been made, for a total of 2500 watches. One version was for civilian use, such as the present watch. The military version features either the engraving "AMI" (Areonautica Militare Italian: Italian Air Force) or "MM" (Marina Militare: Navy) followed by the inventory number.

The Heuer Carrera is an iconic design that more and more people are growing to appreciate as a classic over time. The present watch is part of a rare family of Carrera Datos. These Carreras included a date window, which was a useful and important innovation at the time. The addition of the date to the movement made it thicker than its Valjoux 72 and 92 competitors, so Heuer created a case back that was deeper to accommodate the movement. The result is a Carrera that is a bit thicker, but that wears beautifully on the wrist.

The present watch is a beautifully-preserved example of the reference 3147S ("S" for "silver" dial).

The Heuer Carrera is an iconic design that more and more people appreciate as a classic over time. in recent years, people have begun to seek out the rare versions with black dials, across references. That is certainly the case for the Carrera Dato reference 3147N, second generation.

Powered by a Landeron 189 movement, these Carrera Datos were the first chronographs to incorporate a date, which was a useful and important innovation at the time. The addition of the date to the movement made it thicker than its Valjoux 72 and 92 competitors, so Heuer created a case back that was deeper to accommodate the movement. The result is a Carrera that is a bit thicker, but that wears beautifully on the wrist.

The present watch is a striking and beautifully preserved example of the reference 3147N (N for "noir" or black dial).

To the best of our knowledge, the present watch is the finest and most complete example of an early *Heuer* Carrera in the world

Not only is the watch preserved in mint condition with minimal wear to the unpolished case, but it includes a stunning box with CARRERA printed on the inside, something never previously seen to the market, and it is accompanied by its original receipt and a booklet specifically on how to use the reference 3647S.

According to the receipt, the watch was purchased new in February 1965 from the Würzburg Area US Military Base Exchange by a Captain in the US Army 3rd Infantry. It is clear he wore it only a small number of times and that it was primarily preserved in its box. The purchase price was \$37.50

Furthermore, the watch includes a large serial number engraved between lugs at 6 o'clock. Only the earliest Carreras have these large serial numbers and they are coveted by Carrera collectors.

Between the condition of the watch, the possibly unique Carrera box, purchase receipt and US Army provenance, it is truly a museum-worthy Carrera the likes of which may never be seen again.

The present watch is a rare 1940s military chronograph which is furthermore offered in excellent overall condition. The spiral tachymeter on the dial makes it extremely appealing visually. Furthermore, it appears to have a Portuguese hallmark on the top left lug. To the best of our knowledge, a watch with this exact style of dial has not appeared to the market. Overall, it is an extremely rare and attractive *Heuer* chronograph.

Heuer introduced its tide indication chronographs beginning in the 1950s, marketed under the names "Mareographe" and "Seafarer". Around 1970, Heuer began producing Solunagraph chronographs for Orvis, a retailer of fishing equipment. The present example offers an attractive dark grey dial which compliments the blue and white subsidiary dials, set within a well-preserved steel case.

Heuer introduced the Seafarer in the early 1950s and the present example is one of the first of many versions that were produced. The earliest models can be distinguished by their oversized registers. The syringe-style hands are unique to the early model, as well. The register at 9 o'clock displays a colorful tide disc inside an 180 degree aperture. The chronograph minute recorder at 9 o'clock has two blue segments. The hands are very different too, with pin like ends that are not seen on later models. In addition the caliber was a modified version of Valjoux 71.

The present example is a very rare opportunity for a collector to own the famous Seafarer, the earliest version that was ever made that is furthermore aged in a most pleasing way, reflecting the life the watch has lived in Brazil since its original purchase by a gentleman in New York in the early 1950s. The watch is now property of the grandchild of the original owner and has been worn no more than a few times over the past 25 years, with it residing in a safe place ever since.

Beginning in the 1940s, *Heuer* began making watches branded for sale by *Abercrombie & Fitch* in New York. At that time, *Abercrombie & Fitch* was an elite outfitter of sporting goods. Two of the proprietary models *Heuer* produced for *Abercrombie & Fitch* were the Solunar and the Seafarer,

which tracked the tide and time that fish and animals were most active based on the solunar theory. The solunar theory posited that the movement of animals and fish was affected by the location of the Moon. The Seafarer incorporated a chronograph.

The Abercrombie & Fitch Seafarer is a watch that continues to increase in interest and desirability with collectors around the world. The present watch is the last version of the Seaferer ever made. Dating to the 1970s, the Seafarer reference 2446C was housed in a large 40mm case and had a dark grey metallic dial.

The present Seafarer is fresh to market and has a beautiful and even patina. The bezel has faded to a beautiful grey color that complements the metallic grey dial perfectly. It is a beautiful example of a late Seafarer.

The vintage Heuer Skipper series of watches is have grown immensely in popularity the last few years. This interest could perhaps be attributed to a few things: 1, the beauty and visual interest of having a three-color minute register for counting down the minutes to a boat race; 2. the appealing lifestyle behind the purpose for these watches; and 3. the

increase in scholarship about these watches, particularly their rarity, through efforts such as the Skipper-dedicated website heuerchrono.com.

The present watch is the second model of Skipper made by Heuer: the reference 7764. It was an adaptation of the Heuer Autavia reference 7763 that added the large red-white-blue register to the dial and changed the chronograph configuration to jumping every 30 seconds instead of every minute to account for a 15-minute countdown for a yacht race. The Valjoux 7730 movement inside would otherwise have a minute register demarcated for 30 minutes.

This watch is an attractive example of the Heuer Skipper reference 7764 with a beautiful patina, perfect for someone to wear while on their yacht or someone sitting behind their desk at work dreaming of being on a yacht.

The Heuer Monza was created to celebrate Niki Lauda's first Formula One world championship title with Ferrari in 1976. Heuer was the official teamkeep for the Ferrari team from 1971 to 1979 and Jack Heuer presented the team with these watches to celebrate their victory. Notably, these watches featured a PVD-coated cushion case like those from the 1970s automatic Carreras, black dial with red accents as well as outer pulsometer and tachymeter tracks, and caliber 15 movement.

The name Monza was selected in honor of the famous track in Italy. Heuer at that time was using famous racetrack and race names as the basis for new model names. The Monza has become more well-known recently as TAG Heuer introduced a popular re-edition of the Monza in 2016.

The present watch is in all-original condition with beautiful patina to the case. With interest in vintage Autavias, Carreras, and Monacos rising, the Monza may be an astute choice for someone looking for an important vintage *Heuer* chronograph that is not as appreciated or valued as other models.

Perhaps to the surprise of many, even the most astute, collectors, one of the rarest *Heuer* chronographs in the world is the *Heuer* "Boxing" reference 510.547. Only two are known to the market. Shown in a 1986 TAG *Heuer* catalog from the very earliest days after the purchase of *Heuer* by "Technique d'Avant Garde" or "TAG" for short, the reference 510.547 was designed to time a boxing match.

a black background while the one minute pause between each round is in green. It furthermore features a PVD finish to the case, giving an overall striking look to the watch. Inside the watch is the well-regarded and reliable *Lemania* 5100 automatic chronograph movement. The watch is preserved in spectacular original condition.

Furthermore, the watch includes a rare Ring-Master stopwatch set. The Ring-Master includes a series of rings for placing on the stopwatch in order to time different activities, including boxing.

While Heuer and TAG Heuer has had a long association with motorsports, most do not know Heuer's connection with boxing. Recently, TAG Heuer introduced the Carrera Caliber 5 "Ring Master' Special Edition Tribute to Muhammad Ali watch that has an outer track based on this watch and stopwatch set.

The *Heuer* Boxing is absolutely one of the rarest *Heuer* chronographs in the world and an important part of the company's history.

Near the top of the list for the most valuable vintage Heuer chronographs models is the legendary Heuer "Dark Lord" Monaco reference 74033N. While the Monaco is now one of the more well-known Heuer designs, at its inception in 1969, its sales lagged its Carrera and Autavia peers despite being worn by Steve McQueen in the movie "Le Mans".

According to Jack Heuer, the CEO and an owner of Heuer at that time, Jack saw King Juan Carlos I of Spain wearing an Audemars Piguet Royal Oak that had been treated with PVD and found the look so striking that after the meeting he seemingly had the idea of doing something similar with the Monaco. This vision became realized in the reference 74033N, made in only a small number of examples and never appearing in a catalog.

The Heuer "Bundeswehr" was made from the 1960s through circa 1980. It was made for the German Air Force (part of the German armed forces or "Bundeswehr" hence the nickname) and a version was also used by the Norwegian Air Force (called the "Luftforswaret").

This model was made for military and civilian use and the main difference between the two are the military markings on the case back and a red "3 H" on the dial, which highlights the use of tritium lume on the dial and in the hands. This specific model was made for the German military. These "Bundeswehr" watches are very functional with an easy-to-read dial, long-stem pushers and crown (so the wearer can set the time and activate the chronograph with gloves easily), and rotating bezel with minute demarcations. The large size and military connection make this watch increasingly prized by collectors.

The present watch is a wonderful example of the most desirable version of the Bundeswehr. The luminous material on the dial and in the central hands has turned a beautiful warm tan and the dial has the large 3 H symbol most prized by collectors of these watches. It is not common to have an opportunity to buy a *Heuer* Bundeswehr in this condition or configuration.

The present watch is a very rare and unusual *Lemania* chronograph, perhaps made as a prototype for the famous *Heuer* Aeronautica Militare Italiana (AMI), or Italian Air Force, reference 510.543, which is often called part of the *Lemania* 1000 series.

There is some speculation as to what LMC on the dial means and it may be the abbreviation for "Leon Military Chronographs S.A.", a company supposedly linked to *Lemania* and perhaps seeking to get the contract for the Italian Air Force. The logo is similar to the AMI logo, but slightly different, perhaps as part of a pitch.

Furthermore, the watch features the NATO issue number engraving on the back and "A.M.I.", suggesting it was produced to specification for use by the Italian Air Force.

The watch features the robust *Lemania* 5100 movement that was so appreciated by the famous chronograph expert Chuck Maddox and that is widely admired for its robust and accurate performance.

The Speedmaster reference 2998 was the successor of the original Speedmaster: the reference 2915. The reference 2995-5 was produced for only one year, 1962, and has movement numbers between 18'419'xxx - 18'645'xxx. The present watch features an attractive dial with Alpha hands and nicely aged luminous material. The aged bezel adds a vintage charm, now a slate grey color which compliments the steel case.

The reference ST105.012 came out in early 1964 with a new shape of case in order to protect the pushers and the crown of the Speedmaster. With this reference, OMEGA decided to change the signature on the dial with the "Professional" inscription, visible from the start of its production, the first quarter of 1964.

The present watch stands out due to its very attractive slate grey dial. The color is a warm tone of grey, it is subtle yet distinctive when worn on the wrist. The dial harmonizes with the faded bezel as well as the steel case. The overall look created is monochromatic, a modern edge for a vintage timepiece.

Produced during the Art Deco period, it is amazing that this timepiece looks so modern by today's fashions. Its silvered dial, platinum hour markers and beautifully executed platinum case offer a monochromatic aesthetic which is notably very much in line with the trend of the moment. Its vintage appeal comes in the form of its Caliber 17" minute repeating mechanism which was a specialty for Patek Philippe. When the slide in the band is engaged, the watch chimes the hours, quarters and the minutes with great tone and clarity. Secondly its monogrammed case back offers us a meaningful look into the past. Noted on the Extract from the Archives, it is likely that this watch left the factory in 1927 engraved and initialed at the request of its original owner. Due to the costly fee for a pocket watch of such fine nature, it is likely that the original owner was of particular interest, even more likely by the notable engraving of a crown above the initials.

The dial was supplied by the renowned Stern Frères, the plate with hand-made engravings, enameling and numerals.

Lucien Bonparte, Prince of Canino Charles IV of Spain Christie's Geneva 12 November 1986, lot 324 According to the Archives of *Breguet*, the present watch with engine-turned enamelled case, case no. 1292 by Tavernier, was sold to Lucien Bonaparte on 17 Brumaire An 9 (8 November 1800) for the amount of 1,400 Francs.

When Lucien Bonaparte ordered this watch, Abraham-Louis *Breguet* was unquestionably the best watchmaker in the world, counting members of the world's most prestigious Royal and Noble families amongst his faithful clientele, notably the Bonaparte's, an extraordinary example of loyalty to *Breguet's* watches. Indeed, beginning with Napoleon in 1798, followed by Josephine in 1798 and 1800, Louis and Lucien Bonaparte in 1800 and 1801, Joseph Bonaparte in 1800 and Leclerc, Pauline's husband in 1798 and 1801, the Bonaparte's purchased an impressive number of 19 watches and clocks from the master until 1801.

Lucien Bonaparte, the younger brother of Napoleon Bonaparte, was sent in November 1800 by the latter as ambassador to the court of Charles IV of Spain where his diplomatic talents won over the Bourbon royal family. The present watch certainly also played an important role: collected by Lucien from *Breguet* only days prior to his departure to Spain he presented it to King Charles IV, whose arms it bears, as an ambassadorial gift.

Lucien's assignment as ambassador was a somewhat unexpected decision made by Napoleon possibly get his brother out of his way: the discovery of a subversive pamphlet probably written by Lucien had led to a breach between the two. It can be assumed that his sudden departure to

Spain didn't allow *Breguet* the necessary time for adding the enameled coat-of-arms and the diamond-setting on the bow required to render it a present worthy for a King. Not mentioned in the archives master's archives, these adornments were most certainly added in Spain.

Consigned by an important private collector this "petite souscription à tact" represents the exceptionally scarce opportunity to acquire one of the *Breguet*'s "Royal" watches, embodying historical provenance, highest craftsmanship and superb decoration, categories in which Abraham-Louis *Breguet* has always been foremost.

Lucien Bonaparte, 1st Prince of Canino and Musignano (born Luciano Buonaparte, 21 May 1775 - 29 June 1840)

Lucien was a younger brother of Joseph and Napoleon Bonaparte, and an older brother of Elisa, Louis, Pauline, Caroline and Jérôme Bonaparte. He was Napoleon's most eloquent brother, and the only one unwilling to subordinate himself to Napoleon. Politically ambitious, Lucien played an indispensable role in the latter's rise to power.

Charles IV (Spanish: Carlos Antonio Pascual Francisco Javier Juan Nepomuceno José Januario Serafín Diego) 11 November 1748 - 20 January 1819, King of Spain from 14 December 1788 until his abdication on 19 March 1808

Charles was the second son of Charles III and his wife, Maria Amalia of Saxony. He was born in Naples while his father was King of Naples and Sicily. In Naples and Sicily, Charles was referred to as the Prince of Taranto. He was also called EI Cazador (meaning "the Hunter"), due to his fondness for sport and hunting, and considered by many to have been amiable. Charles IV married his first cousin Maria Louisa, the daughter of Philip, Duke of Parma, in 1765. The couple had fourteen children.


Montre à tact

Breguet introduced the à tact watch, one of his most elegant and novel inventions, at the French Industrial Exhibition which opened in Paris on 17th September 1798. Like all his watches it was made in several variations, its name is derived from the system used to read the time. The position of the arrow on the exterior of the case corresponds to the position of the watch's hour hand and is felt manually by the user in relation to the hour touch pieces in the case band. The idea was that the time could be read simply by touching the watch whilst in the pocket, useful in situations where for reasons of discretion it would be inappropriate to look at one's watch or make a repeating watch strike. Indeed, the 7th Duke of Wellington suggested to George Daniels that à tact watches were worn by fashionable young men who wished to know the time without the embarrassment of their host knowing their anxiety.

The movements of the à tact watches are essentially souscription movements which underwent the same progression of development over the same period of time. These exclusive watches were quite costly, priced between 1,000 and 2,000 francs.

The Rolex Cosmograph Daytona is among the most appreciated and recognized chronograph models by any manufacturer. Beginning at the end of the 1960s, *Rolex* began producing the references 6262 and 6264. This new generation of Daytonas featured on the 6262 a metal bezel, and on the 6264 a black plastic bezel. They also featured the 727 caliber, a modified version of the Valjoux movement used on all of *Rolex's* manually wound production until 1987, when it was replaced by a modified *Zenith* El Primero movement.

The "Blue" Daytona dials are found on late reference 6239 and early reference 6262 such as the present watch. Originally, the designation of "Daytona" on the dial was white when it left the factory but a flaw in the paint pigmentation may have caused a color change over time to the very attractive light blue we see here. Rolex Daytona models had been in production for twenty years until the firm produced the reference 16520 in 1988 with an automatic movement. The movement in this new self-winding Daytona was based on the Zenith Caliber 400 which was a celebrated movement and the industry's only self-winding chronograph movement that met Rolex's high quality standards. Although it was a movement that met standards, Rolex decided to improve on it and modified the caliber to its own specification including a new larger escapement, freely sprung balance and balance spring with Breguet overcoil

(which was a more costly configuration that lead to higher accuracy). The balance oscillation rate was reduced allowing for a less frequent watch service and the date function was eliminated. Retaining just 50% of the *Zenith* movement, the final result was the caliber 4030 which was used in modern Daytonas until 2000, at which time *Rolex* introduced the reference 116520 with the new and fully in-house caliber 4130.

The 16520 models had dials which went under a transformation due to oxidation where the chapter rings around the subsidiary dials changed color from white to a shade of brown. These Compax Marrone or Brown Compax models, as they are nicknamed, occurred on watches that were produced in the 1990's, and watches that have the upside down 6 digit on the 12 hour register. Color-change or "tropical" dials are extremely sought after as they are usually attributed to small production runs. Once the firm realized that the dials would change color, it was seen as a defect and consequently the material used was changed in hopes of finding a solution. Pieces with a small production are rare and those with a colorchange dial are even rarer making the present Brown Compax a very special timepiece.

Underline dials are a very rare and their origins are somewhat of a mystery. The first appearance of the underline is in the early 1960s on a number of Rolex models, not only the Daytona. It is accepted that that underline indicates the presence of tritium rather than radium on the dial, and it is considered one of the most appealing feature to have on a *Rolex* timepiece. The reason for its presence is still debated. Obviously, at this point in time it has no links whatsoever with radium or tritium: both compounds having been superseded by Luminova in 1998. The most probable explanation for it is that it is the result of a batch of dials with a printing mistake which eluded Rolex quality controls and surfaced to the market. Alternatively it has been hypothesized that the line served as an alignment guide for the lines of text, or that it might be an aesthetic detail tested on very few dials. While the origin of this dial might be shrouded in mystery, on the contrary the rarity, appeal and collectability it grants to this timepiece are clear without the trace of a doubt.



With a winding crown to the base, this miniature "mystery" clock is an example of *Cartier's* smallest mechanisms that they ever made. It is more common to come across "mystery" clocks which house two glass prisms inside which are larger but this example is delightfully attractive as being a miniature 1 inch tall version. The idea was invented by Gaston Cusin in 1937 and this is possibly one of the very first of its kind to be made, housing a caliber 402 at just 15mm wide.

The legendary relationship between Maurice Coüet (1885-1963) and Louis Cartier at the beginning of the 20th century completed *Cartier's* reign as the leading firm for jewelled objects. Inspired by popular 19th century French magician and illusionist Jean Eugène Robert-Houdin, Coüet blended exquisite craftsmanship, elegant design and the most technologically advanced mechanisms, resulting in works that continue to entertain and fascinate the observer with their illusion and beauty. Best-known for his 'pendules mystérieuses' or 'mystery clocks', the young clockmaker astonished the industry by exploiting the use of illusion. First seen with the 'Model A' in 1913, and manufactured exclusively by the Paris branch, the mechanism of mystery clocks is hidden in the frame.

When one looks at the present clock, it is indeed another illusion created by *Cartier*. Set atop two prisms, the dial is reversed when out of its case. However, when placed atop the prisms, they act like a mirror image and thus it creates a dial that seems to float it its case.

Cartier perpetuated the illusion by fiercely guarding the secret behind these masterpieces, even at the expense of their own sales staff. As Hans Nadelhoffer states in his book Cartier: Jewelers Extraordinary, "It was not simply a matter of the name; the 'mystery clock' contained a secret that was supposed to never be revealed. Over-inquisitive salesmen at the Rue de la Paix, who tried to force explanations from the craftsmen, were rebuffed. The wonder clocks guarded their secret like the Sphinx, and Cartier's protected them from the eyes of prying admirers."

These elegant clocks been the gifts of choice to notables including Queen Mary, who received one in 1924, and Joseph Stalin, who was presented with one by General Charles de Gaulle in 1945. Mystery clocks are considered by many to be one of the House of *Cartier's* greatest achievements.

Mystery clocks are described and illustrated in *Cartier: Jewelers Extraordinary* by Hans Nadelhoffer, pp. 250 - 254 and in *The Cartier Collection - Timepieces*, Editions Flammarion, pp. 196 - 221.

Extremely rare and attractive, this well preserved *Cartier* desk clock is a highly unusual timepiece which is thought of as a prized possession amongst aficionados of fine *Cartier* clocks. In two parts, the solid onyx ball sits atop its jade base. The red enamel bezel and triangular-shaped diamond-set accents are in harmony with the coral and diamond-set corners of the base and together they sit in proportion with elegance.

Made most likely in the Coüet workshop, the clock is masterfully manufactured in true *Cartier* style. There is no key for setting and no crown to turn, rather the clock is wound and set through lifting and turning the entire bezel clockwise. This is the second generation of the *Cartier* Sphere Clocks, the first was wound by turning the bezel as well, but had to be set by turning the bezel at the same time as pressing a small pin in the back. The second generation, the present clock, took the pin away and this design called for a complicated mechanism to allow the setting by pulling out the bezel.

On further inspection, the clock is even more delightfully surprising. The movement is stamped "Zenith" in addition to "European Watch and Clock Co.". Only very select and special Cartier clocks have movements which were commissioned to be made by Zenith and are double signed, the present example falling into that very select group. Furthermore, the present clock is offered in excellent overall condition and is an incredible example of Cartier style during the Art Deco period. A similar clock, also with a Zenith movement is in the Cartier collection, inventory number CDS 05 A26.

This fine and unusual *Cartier* desk clock is mesmerizing with its multitude of materials blended together to create a mystical scene at its center. Although the different shades of mother-of-pearl create light and dark shadows, the overall landscape suggests a night scene where the diamonds light up the sky like stars and the blossoms of the trees hang low, encompassing the three figures that stand below them. The scene and its execution can be said to follow the style of Makowski, a Russian painter who worked in France and was associated with the School of Paris at this time. The case was likely produced in the Coüet workshop, and the rock crystal was likely supplied by Fourrier.

With a backwind and set movement the clock is easily adjusted. On closer inspection, however, what is most special about the movement is that it is also stamped "Longines," in addition to the plaque that reads "European Watch & Clock Co. Inc.", in typical Cartier style. During this period, Cartier commissioned Longines to produce a small series of movements which Cartier only housed in a very select group of their most special clocks such as, for example, the Sun-and-Moon or Comet clocks. This clock was chosen as one of the special few which have a Longines movement. Together with its incredible case one can say the present lot is extremely rare and sought-after, especially in its remarkable overall condition.

The present *Cartier* clock is admired for its brilliantly colored mother-of-pearl dial in different shades. The colors permeate and reach each corner of the 18k gold bezel, depicting a hunting scene with two men, one on horseback, both engaging in activity with a bow and spear. The great perspective is achieved by the elaborately decorated clothing of gold, enamel and hardstone, set against rolling hills that seem to extend far out into the horizon. The detail is astonishing even down to the blades of green grass in the forefront, a mark of excellence by the celebrated French manufacturer *Cartier*, and from the workshop of Maurice Coüet, the most famous of *Cartier's* clock workshops. The case back is made of Ebonite, a material that resembles black onyx. *Cartier* used this material in some of the most important of his clocks including the most expensive he ever sold, the so called Roosevelt Victory Clock.



The present clock should be admired for its extremely complicated combination of a special 8-day mechanism where the alarm hand's tip is inserted between the alarm wheel teeth and driven in an unconventional method. The case is fairly typical for Cartier in this period, sometimes seen with an agate or enameled base as is the case here. The bezel in white enamel half-pearl style decoration was also vey common for Cartier at the time and this clock represents their unique style at this moment in history. It is notable that Cartier have produced some quarter repeaters with alarms in their large carriage clocks but there may be only one or two others with the minute repeater and alarm, a highly complicated movement. In addition, this clock is in remarkably good condition, the purple enamel is wonderfully preserved and its color is deep and rich. When one listens to the chime it is clear and with great tone and clarity, the sounds that can be expected from such a masterful timepiece from the renowned watch and clock maker Cartier at the turn of the Century.

With is modernist design, this large desk clock is striking upon first glance. One notices the ribbed silver exterior, lapis lazuli pyramid studs and the gold panels to each side. What is not immediately apparent is that the entire front portion lifts up with a lip to its edge to reveal a fairly deep cigar or cigarette box. The large and somewhat eccentric luminous numerals offer an added level of interest. Furthermore, the case is stamped, Cartier, France. This impressive Cartier clock amazes upon first glance. Its highly unusual design can be attributed to a London case maker who produced this inspiring design most likely for a special Cartier exhibition in the late 1950s. The base is stamped "Cartier London, Designed by R. Emmerson", and the English hallmarks further adds to its heritage. The thirty-two sided clock has baguette and round diamond numerals as well as diamonds to each corner of its case combining a total of 30 diamonds at 3.08 carats.

The present clock was created by Rupert Emmerson who made only two or three of these between 1958 and 1960. His claim to fame comes from designing the extremely popular "Crash Watch" in 1966. Trained at the Chiswick Art School, he worked on insignia and medals for De Gaulle's Victory parade through the streets of Paris in 1944. His work is exhibited at the British Museum and he is credited as being one of the designers responsible for lifting *Cartier* London from an average foreign branch to one of the most important London jewelry enterprises. To add to the desirability of this clock, the mark *JC* can be seen stamped to the base for Jacques Cartier,

Some of the most unusual and charismatic Autavias from the 1970s known to the market are those that were issued to the Kenyan Air Force, such as the present Autavia reference 11630. The *Heuer* chronographs issued to the Kenyan Air Force continue to hold many mysteries and pique interest for *Heuer* collectors. There is a word that can quicken the pulse of any *Heuer* collector: CHRONOMATIC. This awe-inspiring word is found on the earliest automatic Autavias, Carreras, and Monacos, with only a handful known to the market. "Chronomatic" represents so much more than just the "earliest" - it represents the boldness of the designs and colors, in the case of these early Autavias the large text as well as large plots of paint by the hour markers, and it also represents the boldness of a dream to make the world's first automatic chronograph.

This dream would end up taking the form of "Project 99", which brought together *Heuer*, Breitling, Hamilton/Buren and Dubois-Depraz to join forces in seeking to develop the world's first automatic chronograph in a race against Zenith and Seiko, with the introduction of three different automatic chronograph calibers in 1969.

The present *Heuer* "Jo Siffert" Autavia is an extremely early example of an automatic Autavia with the iconic "Jo Siffert" color scheme from the legendary Swiss racecar driver. For even the most advanced experts on *Heuer* chronographs, this watch may be a surprising discovery. One of the earliest automatic Autavias by serial number, it is a missing link bridging the divide between the Chronomatic Autavias and the standard production "Mark 2" Autavias that followed. We could therefore perhaps call it a "Mark 1.5" Autavia. The present watch features large and distinctive red plots at the hour markers in addition to a white central second hand. To the best of our knowledge, only one other Autavia in this "missing link" Mark 1.5 format with large red plots has ever come to the market. Furthermore, it matches three early advertisements for the automatic Autavias showing the same watch.

Furthermore, the serial places it contemporaneous with many Chronomatic Sifferts identified to the market. Its early serial shows that there was a change in dials from the "Chronomatic" dials to those with "Automatic Chronograph" early on for the reference 1163MH. This perhaps explain why there are so few Chronomatic Autavia reference 1163MH (black dial) examples, such as the preceding lot, because of this early change in dials. Jack Heuer has explained that American customers were confused by the word "Chronomatic", so that was changed to "Automatic Chronograph" so there could be no possible failure of understanding the selling point of the watch.

According to the consignor who is the original owner: "In the summer of 1969, my parents took three of my siblings and me on a three-week tour of Europe. While in Geneva, Switzerland, my parents took us to a fine jewelry shop where my father said to my brother and me that we may pick out any watch under the equivalent of \$300.00. I was 14 at the time. While my brother picked out a steel Rolex, the salesman excitedly told me that *Heuer* had just come out with the first automatic chronograph and proceeded to sell me that watch. This was in the last week of June or first few days of July as we were at the American Embassy in Geneva for the Fourth of July. In 1972, the watch stopped working and my father took it into

Levinson's Jewelers in Chicago, Illinois where they replaced the Caliber 11 movement with the improved and upgraded Caliber 12. The new Caliber 12 movement and watch has not been serviced or cleaned since then. This watch was rarely worn and I kept it in a safety deposit box, which explains its exceptional condition."

If the gentleman's recollection regarding the timing of purchase is correct, this would make it the first automatic Autavia known to have been purchased to the market. Another early Chronomatic Autavia reference 1163T that was sold at auction in 2010 had papers from August 1969.

The present watch features the original bracelet made by *Gay Frères* with the exclusive 1/69 date code found in only a very few cases on the very earliest automatic Autavias. Furthermore, the engraving on the case back starting with "C" reflects that the watch was originally sold in Switzerland through the distributor Cuanillon, reflecting the story of its purchase in Switzerland by the consignor who is the original owner.

This Autavia is a notable discovery as a "missing link" in the earliest range of Automatic Autavias and an important watch in the history of Heuer chronographs.

The Heuer "Orange Boy" Autavia reference 1163 is known in only a small number of examples, perhaps less than 20 total, to the market. The bright orange pops against the black dial background and makes it a watch highly-appreciated by collectors. The Autavia, the true representative of *Heuer's* sporting heritage, was released in 1962. It was the first new model launched under the guidance of the firm's new CEO Jack Heuer, the name a combination of its target markets, the manufacture of timekeeping devices for motorsports and the production of cockpit instruments for military and civil aviation: AUTomotive and AVIAtion. Its solid construction, excellent legibility and the rotating bezel made it the perfect chronograph for pilots, divers and other military personnel. The present reference 113.603 is from the very last vintage Autavia series launched in 1985.

The present watch is one of only a small number of silver Autavia dials known to the *Heuer* collecting community. In fact, less than 10 of these Autavia SN dials are known, including one that remains preserved in the collection of *TAG Heuer*.

Hunted with extreme interest by collectors and considered by some to be the most beautiful *Heuer* dials ever made, the exact story of the origin of these silver Autavia dials is unknown and has generated significant interest from experts and collectors.

In fact, the silver Autavia dial owned by *TAG Heuer* generated tremendous excitement when revealed to a group of devoted *Heuer* collectors in 2013.

It is understood that on most, if not all, of the Autavia SN models known to the market, the dials were added after the watches left Heuer headquarters. That is the case with this watch. The dial was placed inside a beautiful crisp, unpolished original example of a 2446C. The 2446C is a large "compressor" case reference and combined with the striking silver dial, it conveys remarkable beauty and aesthetic power. It is also powered by the legendary Valioux 72 movement.

The Autavia SN models are certainly among the most attractive *Heuer* chronographs and desired models from the 1960s and 1970s. In fact, these dials have served as the inspiration for the newly-introduced Autavia Jack Heuer 85th Birthday Special Edition to be released this fall.

This is notably only the second time one of these SN dials has come up for auction, with the previous model selling for \$37,500 at Christie's in December 2015 in New York and not as in as nice of condition as this watch.



Appreciation for Monkeys goes back to Biblical times where they were admired for their entertaining qualities. King Salomon enjoyed them and, as the First Book of Kings reported (10:22), "Once every three years the fleet of ships of Tarshish used to come [to Israel] bringing gold, silver, ivory, apes, and peacocks." In Western art, a monkey became a symbol of playfulness with elements of silliness as exhibited, for instance, by Jean Baptiste Chardin at the Salon du Louvre in 1740 in a form of a painting of a monkey painting a painting.

It appears that the first Monkey automata were created during the Renaissance. In Louis XV inventory there is a description of a clock "on a tortoiseshell base, possibly Renaissance, with an automat monkey and a 24-hour movement" (Archives nationales O1 3622, as reported by Jean-Dominique Augarde). In 1785 Marie Antoinette was presented with a Monkey Trio Automaton, one monkey playing on a violin, two on violencellos.

Eighty years later, in 1862, Alexandre Nicholas Théroude of Paris went further designing a monkey "nodding his head to the bow movement, moving his jaws, and drawing a bow

across the violin" (French patent No. 55,760). In the 1855 Paris Exhibition Théodore's marvels became the star attractions, including a monkey playing a violin. The 1871 London Exhibition report was even more flattering; "The king of toys was, as always, our compatriot M. A. Théroude. ... This was the most well-known place in the whole Exhibition, and the curious people carefully collected the announcement of the hours when the birds would sing, the monkey played the violin, and so on."

During that time, in the 1870s, Théodore's younger colleague, Jean Marie Phalibois, another ingenious Parisian automata maker, whose automaton "The Conversation on the Rooftop" was a sensation at the Paris Exposition of 1878, made a monkey to Théroude's design with modified details employing easier to handle threads instead of wires. The details of our automaton are so characteristic to Phalibois' that there is little doubt that the Monkey is his creation, possibly one of a few presented at the 1878 Paris Exhibition. Extremely rare, ingeniously constructed, it mesmerizes an observer not only by the music but by uncanny mimics resembling more, as the Paris judges suggested, *tableau animé* than an automaton.

Alexandre Nicholas Théroude (1807-1892)

He came to Paris in 1823, at the age of sixteen. In 1832 he married and used his wife's dowry of 18,000 francs to establish a toy making business. In 1840 he declared bankruptcy which, ironically, was responsible for his future success. The bankruptcy terms called for him to pay 20 cents on a dollar (franc) during the next five years. To avoid painful experiences

with small toys he abandoned making such and began making large automata which became so successful that by 1845 he paid almost the entire debt and moved to a larger facility. During the 1449 Paris Industrial Exhibition he was already established as "one of our foremost mechanical toy makers with no competition in foreign countries".

Jean Marie Phalibois (1835-1900) was Théroude's natural successor who, alongside pieces designed by older colleague, expended the line for life-size automata, as for example, life-size lady playing on lyre (formerly in New York, International Doll Library Foundation). His most unusual automaton, "The Conversation on the Rooftop" showing cats walking over roof tiles, chimney pipes turning around, a student singing to a young lady while another with a guitar climbs to reach her from the other side, was not only a hit at the 1878 Paris Exposition but a clear testimony of his remarkable talent in designing and making automata. His very successful business was carried over by his son Edouart Henri well into the 20th century.

Vincenti & Cie.

The company was established by a Corsican, Jean Vincenti, in 1823 in Montbéliard, eastern France, almost at the border with Switzerland, where Vincenti's ancestors had settled already in 1791. The company specialized in manufacturing clock movements, by a force of 30 to 40 workers, using machines of their own invention. The company consistently made high quality movements as evidenced by awarded medals in 1834, 1839, 1844, and 1855 Paris Universal Expositions.

An autonomous quartz clock completed by *Patek Philippe* in 1956, measuring over four feet high and two feet wide, was considered one of the decade's monumental achievements in the electronic timekeeping. By the 1960s, miniaturization became the new 'space race' of the horological world. In the early 1960s, the Chonotome, Ref. 1000E, was the next groundbreaking release in the development of miniaturized electronic clocks. In 1964, the Chronotome retailed for \$1,350 and was considered the most cutting edge timekeeping technology available.

The first Patek Philippe Chronotome prototype that left the factory was a special three timezone clock made for President John F. Kennedy in 1963. The special clock was made by Patek to accurately and simultaneously present the time in Moscow, Washington, and Berlin.

The presently offered clock is believed to be part of this first series of *Patek Philippe* prototype clocks from the early 1960s. It features an early movement number for this series (734) and a special location plaque of HELVETIA representing the time of Switzerland. As with many early electronic clocks, not all movement numbers were accounted for internally with *Patek Philippe* and consequently no *Patek Philippe* archive can be issued.

Rolex designed the Milgauss model for use in areas of high electromagnetic fields found in laboratories and electroengineering. One of the most distinctive of all Rolex 'Sports' models, the 1019 was the last 'tool' watch designed for

a specific activity to be made by the renowned firm. In production from 1966 to 1990, the model was only available in stainless steel. Its name is derived from the Greek "Mil" for thousand and "Gauss", the unit to measure magnetism. A normal watch movement can withstand up to 70-90 Gauss whereas the Milgauss keeps its incredible precision in a magnetic field up to 1000 Gauss.

Most examples of the reference 1019 feature silver dials, such as the present example. The probability of finding such a well-preserved Milguass reference 1019 is quite rare and they are highly desired by astute collectors around the world.

The engraved screw back reads; *Monroe A. Holmes*. Based on our research, Monroe A. Holmes was a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine in Oregon. He assisted with notable research on rabies and served as the State Public Health Veterinarian of Oregon.

At the beginning of the 1960s, watchmakers, realizing that public awareness (and regulations worldwide) were against the radioactive radium, switched the luminous material radium to the much less radioactive tritium. It is conceivable that there was some confusion on how to convey to the consumer the fact that the dial had tritium rather than radium. Eventually the market at large settled for the well-known "T Swiss T" designation (and its variations). The present watch is possibly a model which was in the transitional stage between the different references to luminous material on the dial. 

The original guarantee which accompanies the watch is stamped by Madrid retailer Union Relojera Suiza in 1976 and is also accompanied by a note from the same retailer in 1993, which further confirms the present watch.

Known amongst *Rolex* collectors as the 'Bombay', the reference 6290 has a very attractive case design with its fluted lugs that curve so elegantly from the circular case. The case design is exceedingly rare, although it is the exquisite blue enamel dial that allows this watch to be one of the few *Rolex* wristwatches with enamel dial that has come to market in recent history.

The dial is nothing short of stunning, especially set with faceted gold applied hour markers, which glisten in the light against the royal blue enamel. The champagne chapter ring which surrounds the edge is laid with gilt dot minute markers which adds a further element of sophistication. The deep blue color seems to change in the light, sometimes a bolder hue than others which is simply mesmerizing.

This Rolex reference 8171 is one of the most notable examples in stainless steel to ever come to market. Affectionately nicknamed the "Padellone" or "large frying pan" due to its large size for the time. The present example is extraordinarily special because of the color that the aging process has developed on the once silvered dial. Watches are called 'tropical' when the dial color changes due to the effects of time and wear, and

the color produced is always unique to the watch as no two watches can age in exactly the same way. In this case, the dial has aged to a warm cream, almost light yellow tone and its remarkably attractive and unique. Furthermore the case is in excellent condition with very minor wear. Still retaining the original Rolex buckle, this watch is a beautiful specimen and is admired for its unmistaken charisma. The watch was purchased by the present owner's father in 1958 to celebrate the occasion of his son's birth. It is one of the few, if not the only, reference 8171 in steel to retain its original guarantee.

Reference 8171

Rolex has produced only two different models of wristwatches with complete calendar and moon phase, references 8171 and 6062. Both models are automatic, however reference 8171 has a snap-on case back, while reference 6062 is fitted with a water-resistant-type screw-down case back and thus carries the designation "Oyster" on the dial. Reference 8171 is 38mm in diameter, which was remarkably large for the era, whereas reference 6062 is 36mm in diameter. Reference 8171 was made in a very small series between 1949 and 1952, mostly in yellow gold, with examples in pink gold or in stainless steel far more uncommon.

The Turn-O-Graph model was released at the Basel Fair in 1953, the same year that the present example dates to. The model was fitted with a rotating bezel with five-minute divisions and dot markings, and was referred to as a "time-recording-rim" by *Rolex*. This model was designed to be used as a simplified chronograph, for timing events up to an hour, and was promoted as being able to calculate the "Timing of a transatlantic telephone call, the rate of a machine, a patient's pulse, the speed of a train, or the development of a film". Preceding the Submariner, the Turn-O-Graph has similar features in a smaller case.

The present watch stands out as one of the first of this model and also for its beautifully aged "waffle" dial that has changed color from black to reveal a golden brown hue, showcasing the gilt dial beneath. Similar to other examples of 1950s *Rolex* sports watches, this watch has lume on the 6 o'clock marker which is a slightly lighter color, theorized by some so that the wearer could quickly identify the 6 o'clock marker versus the rest of the dial for faster telling of the time. With excellent original examples of early Submariners reaching into the six figures USD in price, Turn-O-Graph reference 6202 examples, such as the present watch, remain relatively undervalued. They are important to the history of *Rolex* sports watches.

The Rolex Submariner reference 5512 is considered an icon in the Submariner family. Along with the reference 5513, these models were a design improvement from their predecessors by adding "crown guards" to help prevent the stem and crown from being damaged by being hit directly against a hard object.

This example impresses with its rare and sought-after "Tulip," or "Tulipino," coronet to the dial. The shape of the *Rolex* crown, which resembles that of the tulip flower, is very rare and found only on very early 5512 models. Secondly, the dial has aged and taken on a new and very appealing color. It has changed from black to a deep and rich brown or tobacco color which offers an attractive and honest vintage aesthetic. Lastly, but no less impressive, this watch is retailed by the famous Venezuelan retailer Serpico Y Laino whose signature graces the dial in a silvered print in opposition to the gilt printing of the remaining text





Launched in 1967, the celebrated Sea-Dweller reference 1665 was the first wristwatch designed for use in saturation diving, fitted with a *Rolex* patent valve in the band and guaranteed waterproof to 610 meters depth. The valve was first developed on the Submariner model and allows helium and other gases to escape, enabling the watch to stand compression.

The present watch is an example of the "Mark III" series of the Double Red Sea-Dweller dial, in production between around 1970 to 1973. Mark III dials are distinguished by a number of details: the "double red" designation is written directly on the dial, without a white background print, and appears darker than that found on Mark II dials. The "SUBMARINER 2000" designation presents smaller fonts than the "SEA-DWELLER" designation. The five tips and the oval at the base of the *Rolex* crown are clearly defined. The overall impression of the fonts is thinner and less distinct than on the earlier versions.

With the beginning of transatlantic jet flights in 1956, travelers appreciated the fact journey times were reduced from 13 hours to 7, however they suffered from new phenomena, jet lag. Early airlines like Pan American worried about the possible effects of jet lag on their pilots and after research, the management advised them to keep on home time while overseas. Because crews needed to know the local and their home time, Pan Am and *Rolex* worked together to create a timepiece with an additional hour hand. The model was named GMT-Master after the world's standard time, Greenwich Mean Time. The watch further impresses with its attractive "tropical" dial.

The present GMT-Master reference 1675 is an exceedingly rare example featuring the United Arab Emirates (UAE) crest and the Arabic text translated as "Ministry of Defense". The present watch was presented as a gift by the then-Minister of Defense to an American friend working in Dubai. Noteworthy on the dial

is the "Quraysh Hawk", printed in different 'padded layers' that create a tri-dimensional effect. At the center of the hawk, the symbol of the United Arab Emirates, is a polychrome enamel Dhow or Arabian sailboat, which is replaced today by the UAE federation flao.

In 1968, Raymond Trahan moved from southern Louisiana and began working in the oil industry during the initial rise in Dubai. He was a superintendent for J Ray McDermott and helped start the 100 acre operation on Dubai Creek in 1970. When he arrived in Dubai, the city was not the sprawling city as it is today. There was little there at the time and it was the oil industry that provided the initial jumpstart financially that the people of Dubai needed. Raymond Trahan was an important part to completing some of the largest oil platform constructions in the region during that decade. He met Sheikh Mohammed in the mid 70's and the two quickly became fond of each other, largely due to their shared interest in skeet shooting. In 1978 Raymond was invited to a skeet shooting competition with the royal family of Dubai. As an award for winning the competition, he was gifted this Rolex GMT 1675 watch by Sheikh Mohammed himself. The watch has been cherished by Raymond and he wore it until he passed away at the age of 79 in August 2016.

Looking at this example one is mesmerized by the so-called "tropical" dial. When this phenomenon occurs, the originally black dial changes with time to a different color, which can be any shade from dark chocolate to a light brown. In this case the dial has indeed changed to a deep chocolate color which goes in perfect accord with the ivory/cream color of the lumes, both those on the dials and those in the bezel. The watch further impresses with the nearly flawless bakelite bezel and its deep burgundy red and navy blue coloration. Due the extended use of GMT watches on intercontinental flights, such a watch needed to have characteristics which would not interfere with airplane navigation, for example an antireflective bezel, to eliminate the risk of glaring. Thus the bakelite bezel was later traded in for a metal one as bakelite was found to be very brittle and prone to cracking.

On December 3, 1967, Dr. Barnard performed the world's first human to human heart transplant on his patient, Mr. Louis Washkansky, in Cape Town, South Africa, the operation lasted approximately 6 hours. Washkansky survived the operation and lived for 18 days. Barnard was celebrated around the world for his accomplishment and gifts such as the present watch were offered to him in tremendous gratitude for his successful medical achievement. The watch is engraved on the back with his name, the date as well the person who gave it to him and a message in Italian congratulating him on his accomplishment.

This watch is a dream in the collecting community. The Peseux 260 is generally considered one of the finest time-only chronometer movements of the 20th century, performing admirably in the timing competitions throughout Switzerland. While rare in any wristwatch, those Peseux 260s that have surfaced over the years have typically been found in watches created by LeRoy, DuBois, Beba, and other similar makers. Kari Voutilainen also acquired a limited number of these movements to power a limited run of modern masterojeces.

For many years the "Breguet Peseux 260" was hardly more than a rumor - a "grail" that could only be seen in grainy scans on the Internet. It was eventually confirmed that during the 1950s, a time period during which *Breguet* was not creating many watches of any type, *Breguet* released a limited number of time-only watches powered by this legendary movement. In recent years a few have finally surfaced.

One of the most legendary and rare dive watches ever made, the *Vulcain* Cricket Nautical is a watch that is relatively unknown to the collecting community because so few examples exist. A rough count of known early versions conducted over the last five years suggests that less than 20 total are known to the market.

The watch was developed and designed by Hannes Keller, Arthur Droz, and Max-Yves Brandly. Keller was a record-setting diver and the man who developed the concept of using a combination of gases (beyond just oxygen) in their tanks to help divers reach new deoths and stay underwater longer.

The watch was designed with incorporated dive tables and an alarm function. Remarkably, it was also the deepest-rated watch of its time, with a 300-meter depth rating versus the 200-meter depth rating of some of its Rolex counterparts. The alarm was also used for reminding divers of their time to begin returning to the surface and also was described in advertising as a way for divers to communicate with each other while underwater.

This version features the earlier case made by Piquerez with flowing lugs as was introduced in 1961. Later research suggests that in 1962 the case was updated by Piquerez to have beveled lugs and that case was identical in shape to the one used by *Jaeger-LeCoultre* for their Polaris diver introduced commercially in 1965 with a 200-meter depth rating.

In the world of historic dive watches, this could be considered an epic and exceptional piece.

Felix Baumgartner was born in Switzerland, in Schaffhausen, in 1975 and is a third generation watchmaker. Before he could even tell time, Felix Baumgartner would spend much of his spare time in his father's clock-restoration atelier, which

adjourned his bedroom, watching him and assisting him with various elementary tasks. He attended the watchmaking school in Solothurn and in 1995, towards the end of his final year at school, he declined his father's invitation to work in the family clock-restoration atelier and answered an advertisement placed by independent watchmaker Svend Andersen, and went to Geneva to work with him. Andersen was one of the founders, in 1985, of the AHCI, Académie Horlogére des Créateurs Indépendants, or the Horology Academy of Independent Watchmakers and a major figure in promoting the need for manual and artistic watch-making where craftsmanship still occupies an important place. Baumgartner held the job for nearly three years, during which time he gained valuable experience. During the same period, Baumgartner started to develop an idea for a no-hands, minimalist, modern wristwatch that indicated the time by means of rotating hour numerals. In 1997, Thomas, Felix Baumgartner's elder brother, also a watchmaker, was joined by their friend Martin Frei to create the "101" and founded the Urwerk Genéve company. In 1997, with Anderson's support, the trio presented their creation at the AHCI exhibition stand at Baselworld exhibition as AHCI candidate members the UR-101 and the UR-102. Instant fame did not come their way as the production of the 101 never got beyond 10 to 15 watches per year. It was in 2003 that the Baumgartners and Frei would finally launch the watch that would become the face of Urwerk - the UR-103 which was an instant hit with its movement of rotating "satellites"

and ultra-zany design inspired by the TV series Star Trek and aerospace designs by the Russians and American in the 1960's and 1970's. 2005 was another milestone for Felix Baumgartner who was chosen to create *Harry Winston's* Opus 5. This nomination not only gave his watches credibility among collectors, Opus 5 also cemented his reputation as one of the most forward-thinking and avant-garde watchmakers and designers of his generation.

Felix Baumgartner met Maximilian Büsser in 2003 at the Baselworld exhibition while showing his new *Urwerk* UR-103. Büsser in searching for a creator for the Opus V, once again wanted to alternate a "crazy" Opus model with the more traditional Opus 4 by Christophe Claret and was attracted by the freshness of Baumgartner's vision. Further discussions followed in Geneva and by the middle of 2003, Busser decided that *Urwerk* had all the qualities he was looking for, which

was the ability to incorporate new technological and aesthetic ideas to create a watch that represents the time in which it is made. In 2005, Felix Baumgartner created the Opus V which was based on the satellite concept of rotating hours of the UR-103, however, Baumgartner pushed the boundaries further by inventing a new time display system which had never been seen before. Taking the principle of the satellite indication and the retrograde minute hand, the watch's off- centered display is made of three small cubes, each with four numbers that are arranged like satellites in a three-dimensional rotating system that turn and revolve to show the current hour, with the retrograde minute hand moving over a 120 degree counter

Opus V wristwatches were released in the limited edition of 100 examples in pink gold or platinum, some of which are set in diamonds. The Opus V was to be the last collection of the Opus series under the management of Maximilian Busser who left Harry Winston in 2005 to launch his own watch brand MB&F.

Making its debut at Basel in 1951, the Jaeger-LeCoultre Memovox was created to meet the popular demand for a wristwatch with alarm complication. It was in some ways a response to the popularity of the Vulcain Cricket that was introduced in 1947. Jaeger-LeCoultre made many advancements for the Memovox from 1951 to the present. One of the most notable was the introduction of the caliber K815 automatic Memovox movement in 1956 – the first automatic alarm movement introduced.

Another notable advancement was the creation of a Memovox for use in diving in the 1960s, called the Polaris. Jaeger-LeCoultre produced only 1,714 examples of the Polaris reference E859 from approximately 1965 to 1970. The present watch comes from the second series of the reference E859, with larger luminous plots on the dial for easier legibility underwater than the first series from circa 1965. It is preserved in unpolished and original condition with a beautiful dial. It features one replaced crown, but is otherwise entirely original.

One of the great movements for those passionate about horology the last two decades has been the support of the so-called "independents" - independent watchmakers designing watches by themselves or with very small teams under them, Christian Klings is one of the more under-the-radar independents, having produced only approximately 20 watches in his career spanning two decades, all working on his own, from scratch. For those few connoisseurs fortunate enough to know his work. Klings is given great respect for his designs, talent and workmanship. His timepieces are on par with some of the most famous and respected independent watchmakers working today, with an incredible attention to detail in all parts of the timepiece. The difference is that it is virtually impossible to obtain a Klings timepiece, as the few watches he produces tend to be spoken for immediately. Many experts believe that Klings is one of the most talented watchmakers alive today, even if he is not as well known as other "independents".

Klings works by himself in Wechselburg, Germany, a small town an hour away from Dresden. He does not employ any apprentices or anyone else in his shop - each of his watches is made entirely by his own two hands using traditional methods and tools, many of which he has built for his own use. He creates everything from the dial, to the crown, to the case to the complications by himself, which is traditional watchmaking at its truest and highest level. Even more remarkable is the fact that Christian has managed to create a number of highly-complicated timepieces, some of which are powered by hand-made tourbillons never before seen in a wristwatch.

This is a unique commission piece that took *Klings* approximately 18 months to complete. Consistent with *Klings'* watchmaking ethos, this watch was designed entirely by hand drawings, with no use of CAD-CAM or any other software, helping to explain how natural the proportions bear more resemblance to vintage watches of the past. The beautiful gold case has tear drop lugs evoking great watches made by Patek Philippe, Vacheron Constantin and Audemars Piquet in the 1940s.

Christian deployed a unique (and proprietary) methodology for creating the dark blue guilloche dial, giving it a look all its own. The watch also features a stunning hand-made moon phase complication with large gold moon surrounded by stars, as well as power reserve set against the backdrop of a gold guilloche pattern. The silvered hour track has black radially-placed Roman numbers while the gold Breguet-style hands contrast against the blue and silver dial beautifully. Christian, as part of the commission, also created a quick-set function for the moon phase located at the 7:00 position.

To the best of our knowledge, this is the first time that a *Christian Klings* has come up for public auction. Christie's is very excited to be able to offer this special and unique commission.

THE RM056 PROTOTYPE

As with most successful artisans of their craft, the dream of becoming a master in their desired field often begins at a young age. This was certainly the case with luxury Swiss watchmaker, *Richard Mille*, who has been able to dream, design and execute timepieces that allude to his childhood passions and the typical interests of young men; engines, mechanics and power! When one looks at the designs of his watches, they are not only seeing a watch, they are transported to a world of exploded views which get right to the heart of the timepiece itself.

The RM056 was designed with this in mind. The idea behind this masterpiece was to create a watch that allowed its wearer to view the entire skeletonized movement through a full sapphire case. One can see inside the watch to its complex mechanics from all angles. And it is indeed the full sapphire case that is possibly the hardest material to navigate. Sapphire is composed of crystals of aluminum oxide which is very difficult to manipulate from the solid blocks that were used into the smooth and fluid curves we see here. In fact, it takes nearly 800 grueling hours between the cutting and the polishing of the synthetic sapphire. After years of research to test the material, the result is a particularly scratch resistant watch with a hardness of 1,800 Vickers, and undoubtedly an extremely impressive modern aesthetic that is water resistant to 50 meters.

The present watch was produced as a prototype, a watch which has been manufactured preceding the normal production run. Although only five examples were ever made of the first edition of the RM056, it is unknown how many prototypes were made. The case back boasts the designation. 'Prototype', and No. 2.

Colonel John Jacob Astor IV (July 13th, 1864 - April 15, 1912)

The Astor family is regarded as one of the most prominent in business, society and politics in the United States during the 19th and 20th centuries. Born in 1864, John Jacob Astor IV was the youngest of five children and the only son of William Backhouse Astor Jr., a prominent businessman, collector and horsebreeder. Born into the Astor family of leading men, which began with his grandfather, JJ Astor as he is fondly remembered continued the well-respected family name and became one of the wealthiest men in history, making his fortunes in real estate and investments before joining the Spanish-American war. While there, he was commissioned as a lieutenant colonel in the US volunteers. He was also an inventor, patenting a bicycle break, a road improver, and helped to develop a turbine engine. He was also an author, writing science fiction novels about life on other planets. Perhaps in one of the most tragic occurrences of the early 20th century, JJ Astor was among those who did not survive the sinking of the Titanic, fatally one of the 1,514 victims that perished on that fateful day. Although his life was cut short at the young age of 47, he was a man of many accomplishments and is often remembered as one who contributed to American society and welfare

One of the reasons for boarding the RMS Titanic was that his wife, Madeleine, who was pregnant at the time, would have their baby boy on the shores of New York as she had wished. Remarkably Madeleine survived the tragedy along with her baby, John Jacob "Jakey" Astor VI who was born four months later.

John Jacob "Jakey" Astor VI (August 14, 1912 - June 26, 1992)

Known as the 'Titanic Baby', John Jacob Astor VI followed in his father's footsteps and that of the Astor family to becoming a successful businessman and wealthy American socialite. The present watch, dated to 1942, was a gift from JJ Astor VI to a friend, Lieutenant Colonel H.T. Blair, suggesting that he was 30 years old at the time.

Surfacing to market from the descendants of the original owner, the provenance of this lot is nothing short of astounding, offering a window in to high society American life in the 19th and 20th centuries. To add to its strong American heritage, the movement of the watch is stamped *VXN*, the American import stamp for *Jaeger-LeCoultre*, perfectly matching the tachymeter gradation set for miles.

Furthermore, this watch seems to combine four great luxury watch names: Cartier (on the dial), LeCoultre (the American market name for Jaeger-LeCoultre, which is found on the inside of the case back as well as the movement), Universal Genève (that provided the movement caliber and may have produced the watch for LeCoultre), and Vacheron Constantin (whose VXN import code is correct as it was in partnership with Jaeger-LeCoultre at that time.

Leslie Townes (Bob) Hope (May 29, 1903 - July 27, 2003)

Born in London, England, Bob Hope immigrated to the U.S. with his parents at the age of 5. A comedian and a dancer on stage for some years, he went seamlessly from Broadway into television and film. His first film appearance was in "The Big Broadcast of 1938," where he sand "Thanks for the Memory,"

which soon became his signature tune. He partnered with Bing Crosby and Dorothy Lamour and appeared in the "Road to..." comedies in the 40s and early 50s as well as many others well into the 70s. His long career was celebrated by many, especially during World War II and the Korean and Vietnam wars where he spent much of his time entertaining the troops. The DVD which accompanies this lot shows Bob Hope on battleships and battlefields, as part of his lifelong dedication to America's soldiers. Bob spent nearly half of his Christmases travelling to sometimes dangerous terrain, including USO tours to Alaska, Taiwan, Vietnam and more, all with the sole purpose to offer laughter to those thousands of servicemen and women who were so far from home. For these activities and for his continued contributions he was given a special Academy Award on five occasions.

The Los Angeles Sanatorium began in 1913 with a group of volunteers to house those affected by Tuberculosis, which at one time was was affecting thousands of people in the United States. The Sanatorium was opened to shelter those who were thought of as incurable. In the 1940s, the sanatorium changed its name to "The City of Hope," and began to focus on Cancer and other diseases. It is likely that Bob Hope entertained those who resided there, offering laughter as the best medicine. Just as the American troops saw Bob Hope as a savior from their everyday lives at war, so did the LA Sanatorium Committee and offered the present watch as a gift to their ray of hope in a time of uncertainty.




Alan Walbridge Ladd (September 3, 1913 - January 29, 1964)

Born in Arkansas, an actor and a television producer, Alan Ladd is most known for his film success in the 1940s and 1950s. Nicknamed 'Tiny,' because of his small frame, initially he was not seen as possessing the right look for film and so began to worked hard at radio. There, he met and eventually married the love of his life, his second wife, former actress and talent scout, Sue Carol. It can be suggested that up until this point, his life had been quite a struggle both personally and professionally. It was at this moment, however, upon meeting Sue that things began to take shape. In the spring of 1939 after a string of small parts in low brow movies, he auditioned for 'This Gun for Hire,' where he was critically acclaimed as playing the role of hitman Raven. Other successful movies include Westerns such as, 'Shane,' The Glass Key,' and 'The Blue Dahlia.' Ironically, given his slow start in movies, he was one of the few male actors to grace the cover of film magazines.

The present watch was a gift from his adoring wife, Sue, which alludes to his strong and fun-loving sense of character. The case back is engraved;

William Ralph (Bill) Blass (Jun 22, 1922 - Jun 12, 2002)

From the early age of 17, Bill Blass was already an American lcon. His good looks and charm were a starting block as he moved from Indiana to the bright lights of New York. Determined to build a successful fashion brand, he is now regarded as an enduring symbol of American taste and style. His clothes were designed in a classic American way, seen as the standard of upper-class American cool that other designers looked up to and took influence from. Fashion designers and beacons of the time were greatly influenced by his talent and his unapologetic 'can do' attitude, notably Cary Grant, Slim Keith, Nancy Reagan, Diana Vreeland, who in turn offered an influence to him, that of American life and glamour.

Bill Blass was the recipient of numerous industry and public service awards and was a trustee of the New York Public Library. The present Audemars Piguet watch was offered to the designer as a gift in 1976 for his "Designs Consistenly Displaying High Quality and Wide Versatilty," It is likely that Audemars Piguet was a sponsor of this awards ceremony. The book which accompanies this lot is his memoire which was begun in 2000 and completed shortly before his death in 2002.



According to the Archives of OMEGA, the caliber 19.4 T2 was produced in October 1940 and sent on the United Kingdom market. The watch's provenance suggests it was formerly owned by the Duke of Windsor and was left to Wallis Simpson upon his death and later passed on to the current owner along with another wristwatch that had a royal crest that appears to have been the Duke of Windsor's watch.

Perhaps one of the most famous love stories of our time was the one that saw a King of the United Kingdom and the Dominions of the British Empire, and Emperor of India abdicate in order to marry a divorced American woman who was in the midst of her second divorce. King Edward VIII assumed the throne in January 1936 and abdicated in December 1936 after it became clear that the proposed marriage to Wallis Simpson would cause a constitution crisis due to the certain resignation of the Prime Minister and the opposition of the Church of England if he went ahead with the marriage. King Edward VIII then assumed the title of the Duke of Windsor and his love story to Wallis Simpson was of great fascination to the world, particularly the United States. The Duke of Windsor was appointed Governor of the Bahamas in 1940 and it is possible this watch was purchased by him and sent to him from the United Kingdom early during his governorship. Wallis Simpson was born in the resort town of Blue Ridge Summit, Pennsylvania and lived a extraordinary life that represents the crossroads of American and British history.



THE TEKTITE MISSIONS

For decades, humanity worked to find ways to operate deeper and for longer periods of time in the depths of the ocean. During the early 1960s, the first undersea labs were made as part of the Conshelf experiments under the leadership of Jacques Cousteau to test the limits of working beneath the sea for long periods of time. The early success of the Conshelf program quickly attracted the attention of NASA as the space race made it critical for scientists to understand the effects of people living in a closed habitat within a hostile environment.

As the first nationally funded scientists-in-the sea program, the TEKTITE habitat was built through the combined efforts of NASA, General Electric and the US Navy. The Tektite habitat was placed in Great Lameshur Bay in St. John in the US Virgin Islands. Four aquanauts, as they were known, spent 60 days non-stop underwater within the habitat and established a new world record for a saturation dive. From February 15 until April 15, 1969, the TEKTITE I program, managed by the US Navy, studied the behaviors of the small crew, extend the capabilities to do work on the bottom of the ocean, and studied the long-term effects of a nitrogen-oxygen environment. The

first aquanauts for the Tektite lab were: Richard Waller, John VanDerwalker, Conrad Mahnken and Edward Clifton.

The TEKTITE II project was coordinated by the the US Department of the Interior in May 1970. The team was notably all women for this set of missions and included Sylvia Earle, the famous American marine biologist and explorer. The main focus of these missions was marine ecology.

The TEKTITE habitat consisted of 2 white cylinders, 20 feet tall and a square like container below with rods to retain the lab from floating up. There were four rooms inside the habitat, the wet room, the equipment room, crew room and the bridge.

Scientist John VanDerwalker served on both TEKTITE missions, as an aquanaut-scientist in TEKTITE 1 and as the scientific coordinator for TEKTITE II. The following lots from Mr. VanDerwalker include two watches, a Rolex and a Certina, that he wore during the missions and important historical ephemera around the TEKTITE program.

The present watch belonged to Mr. Dudley Williston, a prominent businessman from Indianapolis. Without great sight, Mr. Williston relied heavily on the minute repeater to tell the time through its chiming of the hours, quarter hours and minutes respectively. The asymmetrical design of the watch featuring the 12 o'clock indication and winding crown to the upper right corner and repeating slide in the band allow the easy reading of time and activating of the repeater while wearing the watch.

Passing the watch from generation to generation, Mr. Williston left the watch to his daughter who gave it to her husband Joseph W. Barr, Secretary of the Treasury under President Lyndon B. Johnson. He wore it through his entire career as a prominent banker and cabinet member before leaving it to his grandson. Notably, Mr. Joseph W. Barr's signature is seen to the bottom right hand corner of 1 dollar bills at the time.

The Kress family was a prominent American family who are known to have created fortunes from their 'five and dime' store chains. The chains operated in the first half early 20th century across hundreds of cities and towns in America and traded under the name S. H. Kress & Co., for Samuel Henry Kress, the oldest son. The stores were recognizable as of their ornamented architecture to the façade, a characteristic design that was well known at the time. Kress was thought to envision his stores as works of art, to be enjoyed by the public from the outside as well as what they offered to customers on the inside.

With his fortune, Kress amassed one of the most significant collections of Italian Renaissance and European artwork assembled in the 20th century. In the 1950s and 1960s, a foundation established by Kress would donate hundreds of works of art from the Kress collection to many important regional art museums in the United States.

Reference 1578 was launched in 1943 and produced until the mid 1960s. General Motors gave these reference 1578GM watches to only 20 of their Overseas Office executives.

From electric cars to heavy-duty full-size trucks, General Motors provides a range of vehicles including big name brands such as Chevrolet, Buick, and Cadillac. Since their beginnings in the late 19th century, they have grown to become the most widely recognized motor distributor in the world.

The present watch belonged to Mr. K. P. Smith, who worked during GM's crucial decades, a total of 30 years for long service to the company. The case back of the watch reads:

GMC, GMOO, K.P. SMITH, 1934-1964

GMOO refers to the General Motors Overseas Office, which during the mid-20th century was a crucial element of the company as they began to work more with international brands such as with UK brand Vauxhall and German brand Opel. In addition, leading up to World War II, General Motors produced vast quantities of armaments, vehicles, and aircraft for the Allied war effort, helping to cultivate their multinational interests. Mr. K. P. Smith worked with GMOO which allowed him to travel to Egypt, Cuba and Washington D.C. At a significant time in the brand's history, the original owner of the present watch would have witnessed the rise of this great American corporation and his watch is a symbol of great achievement and long-standing commitment.

We get the opportunity to see and handle thousands of watches per year at Christie's and only a very small number inspire the kind of awe that we felt when we first saw a photograph of the present watch: the extremely rare Autavia with Indianapolis Motor Speedway Logo on the dial. That awe was felt even more intensely when we first had the opportunity to see the watch and examine the mint condition of the case and dial.

Only a small number of *Heuer* chronographs are known to feature logos on the dial, and those fortunate to have the Indianapolis Motor Speedway logo are arguably the most desired by collectors. And of the Indy models, the Autavia with

all-silver dial, is certainly the most prized. In fact, only two were known to the market prior to this one: one at the *TAG Heuer* Museum and one in the collection of an important American collector of *Heuer* chronographs. Additionally, a dial like that one found on the present was sold on eBay approximately two years ago and is in a private collection.

The present watch has a serial number close to the one owned by an important American collector. That watch was purchased from the original owner who received it as a gift from Tony Hulman, the owner of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway at that time. It seems possible that Tony ordered a few of these Autavias and Carreras with the Indy logo as gifts for business associates and friends.

These Indy Autavias have an interesting quirk in that the tip of the central minute hand does not reach the outer minute and track, but that was a quirk in the dial design and perhaps was not caught at the time of production. The "albino" all-silver dial is a striking and eye-catching design unusual compared to the contrasting dials found on the other 1960s Autavias. The effect is not dissimilar to the unusual feeling from seeing a steel Rolex Daytona reference 6263 with albino all-silver dial, of which only four are known.

The present watch is completely fresh to market and previously unknown to *Heuer* collectors. It is hard to imagine a more museum-worthy *Heuer* Autavia and exciting discovery for *Heuer* collectors.

The present stopwatch set is among the most interesting and important to ever come to market. To the best of our knowledge, these are the only two *Heuer* stopwatches to feature the legendary Indianapolis Motor Speedway logo on the dial. One can only speculate, particularly given the sticker on the back allowing for the calculation of speed, that these may have been in fact used at the track back in the 1960s.

You can practically smell the petroleum fumes when holding them and chills can run down your spine imagining these being used to time some of the greatest drivers of all-time.

This set was previously part of the Crown & Caliber *Heuer* 100 auction and prior to that was owned by an important American collector of *Heuer* chronographs.

Milton Holbrook Sanford (August 29, 1813 - August 3, 1883)

A prominent and wealthy American businessman, Mr. Milton Holbrook Sanford was an owner/breeder of Thoroughbred racehorses who made fortunes enough to become his towns greatest benefactor, that of Medway, Massachusetts, in the late 19th century. After the death of his father at just 17 years of age, he was thrown into the cares of business and large responsibility, and in turn was able to become very successful and accumulate substantial properties. Although he was known to throw elaborate dinner parties for his friends and partners, he was also known as a man with a big heart who sought to do much for his native village to help it beautify and prosper.

The split-seconds chronograph is able to time events that begin but do not end together. It is very probable that Mr. Sanford regularly used the present watch to time the horse races that he attended, beginning the chronograph by pressing the bow at the start of the race and activating the split while timing two horses, for example, who were not travelling at the same speed. At the end of the last observed event both hands can be stopped and returned to zero, ready for the next race. This timepiece represents a period where, unlike today, complicated pocket watches were heavily relied upon for their accuracy to time important sports events.

The present watch, dating to the early 20th century and engraved; *US GOVERNMENT PROPERTY, U.S.A.S.*, was no doubt used in a multitude of important timed events that relied on the accuracy and dependability of a *Patek Philippe* split-seconds chronograph. Manufactured in 1908 and as the Extract confirms, sold in 1918, it is likely that this watch was used specifically during and after World War 1.

The United States Air Service was the aviator branch of the U.S. Army and was established by President Woodrow Wilson in 1918. This Patek Philippe was delivered to a U.S.A.S. in the first year of its existence, most likely as part of an initial order for the new unit.

During World War I, the U.S.A.S. was credited with destroying 76 enemy balloons and over 756 enemy aircraft.

The present Cartier coin watch was completed in July, 1926. At the time, making a movement to fit a coin, remarkably thin of 1.55 mm thick, was an achievement costing about three times more what a regular movement would cost. In addition, the movement is of the highest quality with 18 red ruby jewels, adjusted to cold, heat, isochronism, and five positions.

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One of those names that perhaps transcends the game of baseball, George Herman "Babe" Ruth is perhaps the most famous player in the history of American professional baseball. Garnering such nicknames as "The Great Bambino", "The Sultan of Swat", "The Colossus of Clout", and "The King Of Crash", Babe Ruth played 22 seasons in Major League Baseball for the Boston Red Sox, New York Yankees, and Boston Braves. Ruth set and held the career home run record with 714 home runs upon his retirement in 1935 that was not surpassed until Henry "Hank" Aaron surpassed him in 1974. Truly a larger than life personality and player, baseball items associated with Babe Ruth are some of the most collected memorabilia in the world.

Babe, while enjoying success and acclaim in the sports arena, was also known to also enjoy the city nightlife. From a young age he was caught trouble making, wandering the yards and taunting police officers. It is no wonder then that during the 1920s and 30s in the age of prohibition, gangsters and mobs,

that Babe, now a celebrity and hero, liked to walk on the wild side. It is sure that Babe struck friendships with many known and sometimes feared personalities of the time, one which was New York gangster Ellsworth Raymond Johnson, also known as "Bumpy" Johnson. Bumpy was an American mob boss and bootlegger in the New York City's Harlem. The main Harlem associate of the Genovese crime family, his life has inspired films such as American Gangster, 2007.

A gift from Babe to Bumpy likely for Christmas, the present watch is a symbol of a friendship; The inside case back reads;



Joseph Paul "Joe" DiMaggio is one of the most legendary players to put on the Yankee pinstripes. Nicknamed "Joltin' Joe" and "The Yankee Clipper", DiMaggio was one of the most incredible hitters in baseball history. 

It was a mystery that perplexed collectors of Patek Philippe watches for many years: What was the origin of these gold Patek Philippe reference 2526 and 2552 watches with "Do Unto Others As You Would Have Them Do Unto You" on the dial in a semi-circle around the hour markers to the subsidiary seconds dial? It was after some discovery, that it was determined these "Golden Rule" watches were likely all ordered by then-Senator Lyndon Baines Johnson as expensive gifts, likely all through Tiffany & Co., in the 1950s. At least one was given to Senator George Smathers of Florida in 1956 while it is likely that others were gifts to other elected officials and campaign supporters of then-Senator Johnson.

Two of these watches are in the LBJ Museum, while a number have come to market and auction over the years. Given the high cost of these watches, one must believe that they were gifts for very important persons. Previously, auction houses have called these watches with these dials "Masonic" Pateks, which could be somewhat correct as LBJ was initiated as a Mason in 1937, although it is understood that he did not pursue it after that time.

Lyndon Baines Johnson (August 27, 1908 - January 22, 1973)

The 36th President of the United States from 1963-1969, Lyndon Baines Johnson (or LBJ) succeeded President John F. Kennedy in November, 1963, following his tragic assassination. Before he assumed a presidential position, LBJ's rise to the White House was a series of successful electoral positions for which he is known to have preceded with a strong and persistent personality.

The present watch was offered to then-Senator Johnson as Guest of Honor by McDowell County Democratic Committee on October 18, 1958, held in West Virginia.

It is clear that Johnson valued this timepiece, wearing it extensively as he rose to leadership and eventual presidential nomination throughout his most influential years. The present booklet to accompany this lot offers a series of photographic events which show LBJ wearing the timepiece during the campaign trail of the Democratic elections of 1960. Although unsuccessful in this particular election, he was then chosen by Senator John F. Kennedy to be his running mate for the United States Presidency. They went on to win a close election over the Republican ticket of Richard Nixon and Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., and Johnson was sworn in as Vice President on January 20, 1961.

With its eccentric asymmetrical case design and interesting arrow-shaped numerals, the watch was perfectly suited to his 'straight-shooter' moniker, and is a true collector's item for watch collectors and American history enthusiasts alike.

A portion of the proceeds of the sale of this Cartier and painting will be donated to the National Endowment for the Arts.



THE JACQUELINE KENNEDY ONASSIS CARTIER TANK AND '50 MILE WALK' PAINTING

Jackie's Cartier Tank and her "50 Mile Hike" painting : Two Gifts of Friendship

Originally gifted to Jackie from her brother-in-law Prince Stanislaw "Stas" Radziwill in 1963, this *Cartier* Tank was worn by the former First Lady and style icon for decades and it can be seen on her wrist in many now iconic photos.

The Cartier tank features the engraving: "Stas to Jackie 23 Feb. 63 2:05 am to 9:35 pm." The times refer to the start and stop times of the famous 50 Mile Hike (described in detail below) that was completed in Palm Beach in 1963. This Cartier Tank is one of the most important historic artifacts to surface in recent years from the golden era of the Kennedy Presidency. Complete with a black Cartier lizard strap, Jackie's preferred strap choice for this watch, this Cartier tank is preserved in remarkable condition with its original dial and well-preserved case featuring the engraving.

After Jackie received the watch from Radziwill, she created an original painting honoring the momentous occasion of the hike with the dedication "February 23, 1963 2:05 am to 9:35 pm / Jackie to Stas with love and admiration". Stas Radziwill and Chuck Spalding, featured in the painting, were the walking partners that President Kennedy and Jackie watched as they accomplished the task in 19 hours and 30 minutes. Originally between JFK and his inner circle, the 50-mile hike became a fad in the US in early 1963 and thousands of Americans took on the mentally and physically grueling challenge of walking this long distance.

Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis (1929-1994)

Born Jaqueline Lee Bouvier in Southampton, NY, she married future US President John F. Kennedy in 1953. Known for her elegance and sophistication, 'Jackie' as she was known by her friends and the public, was a name synonymous with style and highly respected for her work to restore the White House and rebuild its collections. Fluent in multiple languages, and highly educated, Jackie was also an accomplished artist and fully illustrated the book *One Special Summer* written with her sister Lee (Bouvier) Radziwill outlining their first trip to Europe together in 1951. After President Kennedy's assassination, she moved to New York City and worked as a book editor for over 20 years. Recognized as one of the most popular First Ladies in American history, she is remembered for her lifelong commitment to the arts and preservation.

Prince Stanislaw Albrecht "Stas" Radziwiłł (1914-1976)

'Stas', as he was known by friends and family, was born into an old European family rich in history. During the 15th and 16th centuries, the Radziwill dynasty controlled a significant portion of modern day Poland, Belarus, and Lithuania. By the early

20th century, a large portion of the Radziwill holdings were lost and when Nazi Germany invaded Poland. In 1939, Stas was forced to flee to Switzerland with nothing but the clothes on his back. In 1959, Prince Radziwill married Lee Bouvier (born 1933) and became part of the inner circle of American politics and society. During JFK's campaign for the 1960 election, Stas's relentless campaigning was pivotal in the close election as Stas helped rally the Polish American vote. During this era, the Kennedy and Radziwill families were inseparable and often vacationed together in Palm Beach and in Cape Cod. Jackie referred to Stas as a devoted friend and once wrote "if it hadn't been for him, Jack would not have won". President Kennedy often joked "That's Stas – our secret weapon."

THE 50 Mile Hike

President Kennedy publicly asked the American people to accept the mentally and physically grueling challenge of walking this long distance. His inner circle of family and friends were some of the first attempt the hike and his close friends Stas Radziwill and Chuck Spalding, featured in Jackie's painting, were among the first to accept the call to action.

President Kennedy learned that over half of the men reporting to the draft boards in World War II and the Korean War were deemed physically unfit for service. He also discovered that there was a 1908 Executive Order from President Theodore Roosevelt that all Marines should be able to accomplish a 50 mile in under 20 hours and be able to sprint the final 200 yards as a proof of fitness.

Robert Kennedy was the first to accept his brother's challenge and completed the 50 Mile hike in 17 hours and 50 minutes on February 9, 1963. Amazingly, he accomplished the hike wearing oxford dress shoes in freezing cold weather, many of the miles of the hike accompanied by his dog Brumus.

Two weeks later, the Kennedy Family was in Palm Beach and the hike was all the rage across the US as Americans accepted the challenge. On the cover of the February issue of *Life Magazine*, the text boldly stated: *THE BIG WALK Marines do it. Bobby Kennedy does it. 10-years olds do it. Can YOU do 50 miles?* It was during this Palm Beach trip that the Kennedy's persuaded some more participants to talk part in the 50 Mile hike.

In the following excerpt, reprinted with permission from Mrs. Kennedy and Me by Clint Hill and Lisa McCubbin (Gallery/Simon and Schuster, 2012), the story of the hike is told firsthand by Clint Hill, Jackie's Secret Service Agent.

THE FIFTY MILE HIKE by Clint Hill, Jackie Kennedy's Secret Service Agent

I was sitting on the bed in boxers and a t-shirt when the White House phone rang. "Oh, Mr. Hill," the breathy familiar voice (Jackie) said, "the president and I would like you to do something for us." I looked at my watch. It was eight o'clock. What could they possibly need me to do? I didn't have a good feeling about this. The previous month, President Kennedy had unwittingly started a fad that had by this time spread from coast-to-coast, and of which I was about to become a spontaneous participant. It all began when the president came upon a 1908 executive order in which President Theodore Roosevelt set forth rules for Marine officers to be able to complete a 50-mile hike. President Kennedy sent a memo to Marine Corps Commandant David Shoup suggesting that a similar 50-mile challenge would be a good test to see how the present-day officers could perform the task.

I didn't have workout clothes. The most comfortable things I had with me were a pair of casual slacks and a sweatshirt. There was no choice. I got dressed, jumped in my car, and headed over there. I contacted the Army Sergeant who was assigned to me to drive Mrs. Kennedy, and told him I needed him, the station wagon, and a big cooler with ice. Our station wagon had radio equipment so I could stay in touch with Palm Beach base and the Secret Service Command Post, and I figured the ice would come in handy one way or another. I soon found out that Prince Radziwill and Chuck Spalding had been practicing for this hike for months. They had the best hiking boots money could buy. I also learned this whole escapade was the result of a bet. The president had challenged his buddies that they were not in good enough physical shape to do what Americans were doing all across the country. Me? I had only my Florsheims and my pride to do better than they

When we got together around eleven-thirty. I also learned there would be a few important observers on this adventure: Professional photographer Mark Shaw, who had been with Life magazine, would be photographing the hike for posterity: and New York City doctor Max Jacobson and a Navy Medical Corpsman from the White House physician's office would be on hand for medical assistance. The newly completed Sunshine State Parkway was a north-south highway that ran from Miami to Fort Pierce along the east side of Florida. It was not yet fully operational, which made it an ideal place to walk and not worry too much about traffic. So there we were, Prince "Stash" Radziwill, Chuck Spalding, and me, with our entourage, at midnight on the Sunshine State Parkway. We were all competitive, and knowing the Attorney General had finished in seventeen hours, we were determined to beat his time. Fortunately the weather cooperated with comfortable cool air as we began the walk. After a few miles, we all realized we were working up quite an appetite.

"Can you have some food sent out to us, Clint?" Stash asked.

"Sure," I said. "What do you want?"

"We need some protein," Chuck said. "How about some steaks?"

Steaks?

"Come morning a glass of champagne with some orange juice would be nice." added Stash.

This was obviously not your average 50-mile hike. So, periodically, we would stop for a short rest, a cigarette—the three of us were all smokers—and I would radio back to the house and request certain things be sent out to us.


Steaks, orange juice, bottled water, champagne. When I asked, people responded. Everyone seemed to be in on this little jaunt and was eager to help.

We walked through the night, and shortly after the sun came up, Paul Landis brought Mrs. Kennedy and her sister Lee out to see how we were doing. They walked with us for a while verbally challenging Stash and Chuck Spalding to go faster. I was determined to stay ahead of the pack, and that just led to more jokes, more laughter. Mrs. Kennedy thought Mark Shaw should appear in a photo, so she ran ahead of us with one of his cameras and clicked a few shots.

After about thirty minutes, they got back into their car to return to Palm Beach."We'll be back to check on you!" Mrs. Kennedy called out. "Don't give up!" Every so often we would stop to eat, relieve ourselves, and rest. Chuck and the prince had come prepared with fold out mats to spread out on the grass, and a few hours later, they happened to be resting when Mrs. Kennedy and Lee returned, along with President Kennedy.

Everybody was in good spirits, and the visit by the President gave us all renewed determination to finish what we had started.

Throughout the journey, I would radio back to the command post to advise of our progress. Somewhere around the 45-mile point, President and Mrs. Kennedy returned again to encourage us. Finally, at about eight o'clock on the evening of February 23, we reached the fifty-mile point, and I breathed a sigh of relief. The adrenaline that had been flowing for the past twenty hours now stopped and I could feel the effects.



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
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
