



\$3,700-4,700 €3,100-3,900 This pretty Art Deco clock in the Chinese style is a classic of the period with bold geometric shapes in striking and contrasting colours. It is furthermore fully signed by the prestigious maker Gübelin of Lucerne.

Gübelin was founded as a watchmaking business by Jakob Josef Mauritz Breitschmid in 1854. The firm subsequently flourished under the direction of his son-in-law Jakob Eduard Gübelin, as the town of Lucerne became a tourist centre. The company moved to larger premises at Schweizer Hofquai in 1903. Following the appointment of his son, Eduard Moritz Gübelin, as director in 1919 the firm also began to make jewellery and started to produce small numbers of high quality clocks.

This interesting model was produced in the first quarter of the 20th century and appears in contemporary Omega advertisements of the period. This type of watch was specially made without a crystal and with a tactile display. The enamel dial with hours marked by dots in relief and poire hands that are sturdy enough to allow the time to be read by touch.

This very elegant and unusual watch is from the Art Deco Lépine range, the case is made from Staybrite steel, a steel alloy containing 0.2% carbon, 18% chromium and 8% nickel. It polishes to a particularly fine finish and was often used for making watch cases in the 1930s. The two-tone silvered dial of the present watch has, unusually, the subsidiary seconds in the 12 oʻclock position and is confirmed by the Extract from the Archives. The bow and winding crown are also reversed to the 6 oʻclock position, this configuration makes the watch more practical to use in the field. Omega steel pocket watches were advertised in the 1930s as being for sportsmen and men of action being described as a "bright, sparkling, Steel Companion".



The present watch, never offered in public before, is a highly attractive example of the reference 425 in platinum with diamond-set dial confirmed by the Extract from the Archives.

Manufacture of reference 425 was launched in 1934 and remained in production until 1960 when it was replaced by the slightly larger reference 2461. Together with the legendary Calatrava reference 96 it was one of Patek Philippe's most popular wristwatches, its typical Art Deco architectural design serving as inspiration for the firm's other rectangular models of the time. It was fitted with the celebrated rectangular-shaped calibre 9-90, Patek Philippe's finest non-circular movement of the period.

Reference 2496 was introduced into the market in 1951 and made in different case materials with different dial versions. It was also available with the more common, smooth case or with the "Clous de Paris" decoration, such as the present watch.

According to the Collectors Index, the present watch is the first example of a reference 1446 with black dial, confirmed by the Extract from the Archives, to appear in public to date. It is furthermore fresh to the market.

Very rare and unusual, only few examples of the reference 1446 are known publically at all. The flat-sided case with unusual straight lugs with horizontal bar are the hallmarks of this reference. The present watch is particularly impressive with black dial and yellow gold indexes which are confirmed by the Extract from the Archives.





Lots 8 - 10: The Property of a Private European Collector

Consigned by a private collector the following three lots are a highly attractive selection of Patek Philippe's ref. 1593 variants in pink gold, yellow gold and platinum.

Reference 1593 was launched in 1944 and is known among collectors as the "hour glass" model due to its streamlined form with the concave and curved sides. A formidable reminder of times past, this classic watch was available until around 1967.

Reference 1491, launched in 1940, is a perfect example of Patek Philippe's continuous search for new and avant-garde innovations, whether in the movement of their watches, or, as in this instance, in the design. The unusual lugs of this model are premonition of a new era of watchmaking design that will fully dawn from the sixties on with unusual case shapes, stepped bezels and fancy lugs. It is remarkable how Patek Philippe anticipated the trend by two decades.


Preserved in excellent overall condition, this rare minute repeating split seconds chronograph was presented to the American baseball player and manager Dave "Beauty" Bancroft in 1925 during his time as manager of the Boston Braves.

David James "Beauty" Bancroft (1891-1972)

Played in Major League baseball for the Philadelphia Phillies, New York Giants, Boston Braves and the Brooklyn Robins between 1915 and 1930.

He played in minor league baseball from 1909 until 1914 when he was bought by the Phillies. After playing for the Giants through the 1923 season he became player-manager of the Braves, a role that lasted for four years.

Considered an excellent defensive shortstop and a smart ball player, Bancroft was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame by the Veterans Committee in 1971.

Very few Patek Philippe watches are designated "Extra" and even fewer "Extra Special", the present watch is one of those rarified pieces. Only superb watches of the highest chronometer standard were inscribed this way. The movement with ébauche probably by LeCoultre & Cie and Victorin Piguet & Cie was made specifically with the aim of achieving the highest precision possible, hence the use of a Guillaume balance with gold and platinum timing and temperature adjustment screws. Furthermore, this watch was personally adjusted by the master régleur C. Batifolier who was famous for his many successes at the observatory chronometer trials. No less than eight lever chronometers in the collection of the Patek Philippe Museum in Geneva are Observatory prizewinning watches adjusted by Batifolier. The régleurs or adjusters were the highest paid workers in the watch industry because success in Observatory trials directly conferred reputation and prestige on the brand and therefore greater commercial success.

According to the Patek Philippe Extract from the Archives, the present watch was awarded special mention during the chronometer pocket watch contests in 1913 and 1914. Furthermore, the registers of the Geneva Observatory confirm that this watch obtained 3rd Prize at the chronometer contest of 1915 with 751 points out of a total of 1000. The chronometer no. 162'767, the present watch, was rated 27th out of the 89 watches tested.

Patek Philippe movements when destined for participation in Observatory Timing Contests were, like the present watch, engraved with the movement number twice. The inscription "Extra Special" on the bridge of the movement refers to the very high finishing of all the parts of the movement and the use of the Guillaume balance with gold and platinum screws and diamond endstone.


It is most unusual for such a highly-finished precision watch by Patek Philippe to bear only the name of the retailer on the dial. However, Bailey, Banks and Biddle of Philadelphia were rather an important agent of Patek Philippe, by the 1880s the company was second only to Tiffany & Co. in the U.S. The original buyer of the present watch, Daniel Holsman, a public figure in Philadelphia, perhaps requested a watch that was a proven precision timekeeper, what better than a Patek Philippe prize-winning Observatory chronometer.

Daniel Holsman of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, is mentioned in the *Journal of the Senate* on 18th January 1881 upon his appointment as a Public Notary.

Never offered in public before, the present watch may well be the best preserved and most complete Patek Philippe minute repeating precision watch ever to be offered at auction. Its condition is without exaggeration, simply extraordinary. A watch made in 1882 that is virtually "as new" with utterly crisp case, dial and movement. This, coupled with the survival not only of the original box and fittings but the original Certificates and a fascinating full description of the watch sent to and approved by the named and illustrious client adds up to a collector's dream piece, an almost unheard of discovery.

It was ordered from Patek Philippe in Geneva by the Portuguese Consul in Nice, Fernand Lagarrigue in 1882 when it is recorded that he paid a deposit of 500 Francs on 14 December. The watch was completed and delivered on 14th August 1883 as confirmed by the Extract from the Archives, however, Monsieur Lagarrigue was given credit, his final payment to be made "4 Semaines après réception de la montre", which indeed was on 14 September 1883 as confirmed by the Certificate of Origin and sales receipt. The total price of the watch was 1'800 Francs plus 20 Francs for the repair of another watch at 5 Francs and the setting of a ring at 15 Francs.

Fernand Lagarrigue was evidently a highly particular client of Patek Philippe and required his watch to be fully personalized as much as possible. The amount of specific detail and attention given to him by the company during the period from initial order to delivery shows the level of client service that has built Patek Philippe's formidable reputation to this day. The original sales receipt naturally records the watch in full detail and also confirms the engraving of the case on both sides with the initials "FL", the wooden box with key and the Bulletin d'Observatoire stated as 1st Class.

It is highly unusual for a watch with any complication such as minute repeating to be sent for an Observatory trial for which very high standards of precision are required. Due to additional complications, the actions of the complications themselves can have an adverse effect on the watch's timekeeping abilities. Therefore, it can be said that a watch with complications such as minute repeating having successfully passed an Observatory trial is even more remarkable.



The ébauche of the present watch was almost certainly supplied by Victorin Piguet, the movement was regulated for chronometer trial at the Observatory of Geneva in 1883 by the régleur Monsieur A. Hoffer. The watch was entered into the pocket chronometer "Category A" and tested between the 15 April and 30 May 1883 following which it was awarded chronometer certification. In the 19th and early 20th centuries, the régleurs or adjusters were the "stars" of the watchmaking industry when the quest for precision was an overriding priority for the manufacturers. Success in Observatory trials directly conferred reputation and prestige on the brand and therefore greater commercial success. Patek Philippe, as expected, employed some of the very best régleurs including Charles Batifolier, Jules Golay-Audemars and François Modoux, all of whom had near celebrity status in the watchmaking world.

A most fascinating document included with the present watch is the two-page hand-written client proposal sent by Patek Philippe in Geneva to Monsieur le Commandeur Fernand Lagarrigue, Consul de Portugal at 54 Rue Gioffredo in Nice on 24 January 1883. This document describes the present watch in extreme detail, its technical features, all accessories to be included, expected date of completion and agreed price.

This minute repeating watch of rare certified chronometer standard complete with so much original documentation and in wonderful condition can truly be described as remarkable.

Well preserved and consigned by a private collector, this handsome quarter repeating calendar watch is signed by the founders of Omega – Louis Brandt Frère. Watches bearing the firm's punch mark "LBF" are rare and the present watch is particularly appealing being large size and pink gold. In addition to quarter repeating the watch displays date, days of the week and month calendar and the monthly lunar cycle. The chronograph function for timing events is calibrated for 300 units.

A very attractive and impressive example of late 19th century Swiss watchmaking.

Louis Brandt & Frère

In 1848, in La Chaux-de-Fonds, Louis Brandt, watchmaker, started his own manufacture. I 1880 a new manufacture was established in Bienne called Louis Brandt & Fils when eldest son Louis-Paul joined the business. Within ten years, the manufacture had become the largest in Switzerland. From 1891 the company was renamed Louis Brandt & Frère when both Louis-Paul and younger brother César joined the business. At that time, the Brandt brothers introduced new production techniques, mechanization and automation, transforming the small-series manufacture of watches into industrial-scale production. In 1894 they changed their name to Omega, named after their first watch. This name also conveyed quality because Omega is the last letter of the Greek alphabet and means "perfection".

Preserved in excellent condition, this highly complicated, unusual and large gold Grand and Petite Sonnerie clockwatch exemplifies the height of luxury watchmaking in the late 19th century.

The firm of Le Roy were famed for supplying some of the very best complicated watches, the present watch with a total of nine complications is no exception. In addition, it is constructed with several special features: the arrangement of the subsidiary dials is particularly unusual and differs from the "standard" layout with the seconds and moon phases at 3 o'clock instead of the usual 6 o'clock and months with leap-year indication at 9 o'clock instead of the usual 12 o'clock. More significantly, this arrangement in turn requires the movement itself to be of a different construction and was therefore far more costly to produce. The threequarter plate matte gilt movement engraved "Part English & Swiss" is certainly in the "English style", it was probably made by Louis Audemars in Le Brassus and finished by the firm of Nicole Nielsen & Co. in London who did occasionally inscribe their movements in this way. The escapement is the classic English lateral lever with diamond endstone rather than the Swiss straight line lever. In addition to the perpetual calendar, the present watch has Grande and Petite Sonnerie striking, one of the most difficult complications for the watchmaker to construct. The grand strike whereby both the hours and the quarter hours are struck every quarter and small strike whereby only the quarter hours are struck, with the hours only struck onthe hour can be selected as required as well as a silent mode. To audibly know the time to the nearest minute, the repeating mechanism can be activated by the trip-slide in the band with the lightest of touch. The substantial gold case neatly and ingeniously disguises the levers and adjusters for the striking and calendars beneath the hinged front cover. When released by depressing the crown, the cover opens to access the setting levers and reveals a second glazed bezel protecting the dial.

Since the 17th century, the ancient firm of Le Roy has been one of the great names of French watchmaking having been watchmakers to the Dukes of Chartres and Bourbon and then Watchmaker to the King and the Duke of Orléans. Until 1989 when Patek Philippe made the Calibre 89, it held the distinction of having made the world's most complicated watch, the "Leroy 01" finished in 1904.

By the 1850s the company had no less than fifty employees and in 1854 the first Le Roy boutique in London was opened under the name "Le Roy & Sons" at 296 Regent Street. The success of the first boutique was followed by the opening of a second outlet at 57 New Bond Street where the present watch was sold. In 1863 Queen Victoria granted Le Roy & Sons the much sought-after Royal Warrant, authorising the firm to use the coveted title "Watchmakers to the Queen" – a great honour for a French company, Le Roy was in fact the only active foreign House to have earned the title. Within a few years, the Emperor of Brazil and Her Majesty Queen Isabella II of Spain would grant the company the same honour. in 1889, the company's name was changed to "Leroy & Co, formerly The House of Le Roy & Sons".

Originally manufactured as a jump hour pocket watch in the 1920's, the present timepiece was converted to a very elegant pocket watch in 1939 upon the owner request. The dial and the pendant were changed to an up-to date design.

Converting a watch to a more contemporary appearance was a quite common thing to do in the early 20's Century. The original owner of the present piece presented his request to his local retailer (Hausmann & Co) who got in touch with the manufacture to proceed to the modification on the watch.

Hausmann & Co.

Hausmann & Co. was founded in Rome in 1794 by Ernst Hausmann, a young German clockmaker and his friend and partner Hermann Frielingsdorf. The firm is still residing in the same premises in Rome's historical centre and represents the world's most prestigious watch and clock manufacturers.

According to the Archives of *Audemars Piguet*, the present watch was manufactured in 1948 and sold in 1950.

Fresh to the market this example of the reference 5504 offers an exceedingly rare opportunity to own one of the most attractive vintage watches ever made by Audemars Piguet. Well preserved, the dial of the timepiece was professionally restored in the 1980s, most likely during a servicing at Audemars Piguet.

According to their Archives, only 20 examples of the reference 5504 were ever produced. Of these 20 pieces, the present watch is only the seventh to be offered at auction in the last 20 years and the ninth publically known example.

One of the most special and intriguing qualities of the reference 5504 is the caliber 9/10RSQ. Initially, it was based on the Cal. 9/10RS which was modified from time-only and allowed a full calendar and at the same time, full splendour. It is thought that only 68 examples of the updated caliber movement have ever been made. This rare and technically advanced movement can be found in only four distinct models; 5504, 5513, 5514 & 5515. Produced from 1945 - 1967, its charm also encompasses a sign of the times, a mid-century evolution for *Audemars Piguet*.

The caliber can be found in both round and square cases, the present watch belonging to the former which offers a wonderfully harmonious dial configuration. The circular date wheel fits with the perfectly sized applied Arabic numerals which lay toward the outer circumference. The hour and minute hands are thin, as well as the date hand, the lugs are long and slender, the case itself is large but not cumbersome with a moderately sized bezel. When one looks at this watch, its features are wonderfully balanced, endearing in so many ways, it will no doubt offer many years of inspiration and joy to the successful bidder.



The combination of the dial's rarity, the beautiful condition of the watch and the fresh provenance render this piece one of the most appealing and collectorworthy "time only" Omega wristwatches.





OMEGA Ref. OJ 2516 Cloisonné Enamel Dial

Between 1946 and 1956, Omega produced an extremely small series of wristwatches fitted with cloisonné enamel dials, the total output representing only an infinitely small fraction of the regular production numbers. Often made upon special request and featuring family coats of arms and unique designs, many of these rare timepieces are only known from archival images of the dial manufacturers.

To date, the following five wristwatches fitted with a cloisonné dial of this pattern have appeared in public:

- movement no. 11'667'950, case no. 11'161'199, Ref. 2659
- movement no. 11'690'647, case no. 10'886'457, Ref 2686
- movement no. 11'950'627, case no. 10'940'597, Ref. 2516: the watch offered here for sale movement and case numbers unknown - Ref. OT 2482, illustrated in: Omega Watches, John

- movement and case numbers unknown - Ref. OT 2482, illustrated in: Omega - A Journey

In common with other cloisonné dials made for both Omega and Rolex, these dials were not used for a specific watch reference. The present watch is the only known Omega reference OJ 2516 to be fitted with this cloisonné dial design, it is probable that it was made especially with the Hong Kong market in mind where it was delivered on 18th June 1951.

It is interesting to note that this cloisonné pattern was one of three motifs chosen for the limited edition collection "1894" produced in 1994 to commemorate the centenary of Omega.

Watches embellished with a cloisonné enamel dial are amongst the rarest models made by any manufacturer. The production of these solid gold dials was and still is extremely costly as they have to be individually made by a skilled craftsman and not on a production line. The artist creates the outline of the desired motif by arranging thin gold wires on a dial. These partitions, called "cloisonné" in French, are filled with small quantities of enamel powder in the desired colour. The dial is then fired in an oven at around 1000 degrees Celsius causing the powder to melt. Finally it is hand-polished until obtaining a perfectly flat surface. Hand-made by celebrated enamel artists, these dials must be regarded as unique works of art in their own right.

The most luxurious version of the now iconic Omega Central Tourbillon 2002 with full heavy 18K gold bracelet, the present watch is to the best of our knowledge only the second example with gold bracelet to be offered at auction.

First launched in 1994 with the caliber 1170 movement, the Omega Central Tourbillon was the first of its kind with automatic winding. For the first time, the tourbillon was placed at the centre of the watch, a visually stunning and ingenious creation. The further challenge of the placement of the hands was solved equally ingeniously in the form of two sapphire crystal discs each etched with a hand and rotating around the centre in a similar way to a mystery watch. In 2002, the new version was presented with improved caliber 2600 chronometer movement. Each watch was tested at the Contrôle Officiel Suisse des Chronomètres and issued with a Chronometer Certificate to confirm its high precision. Available in 18K yellow gold, pink gold, white gold and platinum, only the yellow gold version was available with gold bracelet.



According to the Archives of Girard-Perregaux, the present watch was sold in 2007 with the actual black matte dial added by special request of the owner, rendering it possibly a unique piece.

The heart is a miniature carillon with a keyboard of 20 blades and a drum set with 150 hand-assembled pins. While turning the drum lifts the keyboard keys to play a complete melody.

Two small lever in the band of the case allow to choose between two melodies: Mozart's "A Little Night Music" or Tchaikovsky's "No Great Love". A second lever with three positions disconnects the sound or activates the melody to play upon demand or on every hour.

Opera Three represents the manufacturers' savoir-faire in terms of musical watches, starting at the beginning of the 19th century with the celebrated Genevan watchmaker Jean-François Bautte, associated to the origins of Girard-Perregaux.

Only the most talented watchmakers master the development of the miniature mechanism, devoting months to crafting these unique pieces, from the machining of the components to the final control, via bevelling of the parts, polishing, movement decoration, assembly, mounting the dial and hands and then fitting the case.

Consigned by an important private collector and fresh to the market the present "C1 Quantum Gravity Tourbillon" is preserved in like new overall condition. It is no. 5 of the exceedingly small series of only 10 examples of this model launched in 2009. To date, only one other C1 Quantum Gravity Tourbillon has been offered at public auction.

The C1 Quantum Gravity Tourbillon features an aerial bi-axial tourbillon, vertical power reserve and individualist seconds and defies all theories. It combines a cylindrical piston, a vertical back-and-forth movement and liquid, three essential elements combined to create this astounding equation involving mechanics and chemistry.

A mobile glass column located between 12 and 1 o'clock serves as power reserve, indicated by a green phosphorescent liquid.

The tourbillon, literally suspended from cables, rotates in a multi-dimensional manner on two axes – the main one being vertical. Its structure has adopted the rigid and light elevation of cable-stayed bridges: one arm, extended from cables measuring just 2/10th of a mm-wide and fastened to the plate, maintains the carriage vertically and thus reinforces the impression of an independent arrangement. The suspension mechanism is supported by an elastomeric self-tensing system, which enables the cable/arm hinge to be precisely adjusted and the dilatation effects, compensated.

Set at 2 o'clock position of the case and concealed entirely, the imposing time-setting key can be ejected from its armour by simply pressing on the push button.

Just underneath the seconds: engraved in luminescent orange against a black aluminum roll, visible through a window whose cut echoes the push button of the crown. A lateral sapphire crystal reveals the rotating orange blades of the seconds wheel.

The officer-style case back appears as an air-lock, revealing the movement's geometric circuit composed of 511 parts, the right-angled skeletonized bridges, the gear-trains that transmit energy to the tourbillon carriage and the cable adjustment. The finishing touches highlight an industrial design that is both methodical and futuristic: a black aluminum plate against anthracite aluminum bridges, rubies against polished steel screws. They embody the spirit of a watch made with high-tech materials, glass, emptiness and coloured luminescent materials.

The iconic futuristic form of its streamlined case houses an innovation orbital satellite complication with time indicated by the orbiting hour satellites as they pass the arc of the minutes. The slanting sides of the hour satellites ensure an unencumbered view of the time without turning the wrist. Bold SuperLumiNova provides excellent visibility by both day and night. High-tech grade 2 titanium is used extensively throughout the satellite complication. The grade 5 titanium Control Board on the back of the 103 was inspired by vintage marine chronometers which placed their more rarely used functional indications on the back of the timepiece. The

Control Board is URWERK's contemporary interpretation of classical horology and houses: the Chrono Meter with its dual 15 minute and seconds dial for maximum precision when setting of time; the 43 hour Power Reserve indicator; and the Fine Tuning screw which allows the user the possibility of adjusting the watch's timing +/- 30 seconds per day.

URWERK was born following a meeting in 1995 between two brothers, Felix and Thomas Baumgartner, both gifted watchmakers, and friend Martin Frei, a talented artist and designer. While searching for a name to formalize their new collaboration, two principle references soon became apparent:

UR: the city of Ur was the very place where our perception of time was moulded over 6000 years ago by the moving shadows cast by the obelisks of Ur. These giant sundials unveiled the mysteries of the earth's movement through space. The Sumerians, the people of Ur, declared that the passage of these shadows through the course of one year should be partitioned into 12 units, thus laying the foundation for a system of timekeeping which has endured to this day.

WERK: in German, 'Werk' means to work, create, evolve, shape, forge and to arouse emotions.

URWERK SA was launched in 1997 with one overriding aim: to follow nobody but to create their own path in pushing the boundaries of haute horlogerie ever further.



Launched at the 2015 Salon International de la Haute Horlogerie in Geneva, the Galet Traveller World is distinguished by its striking cloisonné enamel dial depicting the map of the world.

Watches embellished with a cloisonné enamel dial are exceedingly rare. The production of these dials is extremely costly as they have to be individually made by a skilled craftsman and not on a production line. The artist creates the outline of the desired motif by arranging thin gold wires on the dial. These partitions, called "cloisonné" in French, are filled with small quantities of enamel powder in the desired colour. The dial is then fired in an oven at a temperature between 800 and 1200 degrees Celsius, causing the powder to melt. Finally it is hand-polished until a perfectly flat surface is obtained. The colours on the present dial range from a deep blue for the oceans to a green for the plains, verging towards yellow for areas of higher altitude, as shown on most maps.

The sapphire crystal display case back of the Galet Traveller World reveals the complex calibre LF230.01 self-winding chronometer movement certified by the Besançon Observatory in France, featuring a solid gold micro-rotor with a "silent block" shock-absorbing system. The ultimate in precision is provided by the natural escapement with double direct impulse directly on the balance from a self-lubricating silicon pallet lever. LF230.01 was designed to adapt to the dual-time adjustment mechanism, requiring two years of development for the integration of each component within the overall construction of the base calibre.

Made in an exceedingly small series only, the Galet Traveller World is a true representative of Laurent Ferrier's horological values: simplicity, precision and pure, uncluttered beauty.





The case shoulders are set with twenty round white diamonds to give just the right sparkling accent drawing the eye and leading it to the beautifully crafted gold bracelet, each link set with a marquise-shaped lapis lazuli stone between. The fully signed Patek Philippe clasp blends so perfectly with the bracelet that it becomes almost invisible when being worn. To complete the ensemble is a ring echoing and naturally complementing the design of the watch.

This highly unusual and elegant novel suite comprises 17 sapphires with a total weight of approx. 2.79 cts, 16 diamonds of approx. 1.65 cts and 15 emeralds of approx 1.97 cts.

It was made for the "Montres & Bijoux" exhibition taking place from 9 September to 1 October 1961 at Geneva's celebrated Rath Museum. This exhibition was established in 1959 to award the most innovative creation in the watchmaking and jewellery industry of Geneva. The present "parure" signed Patek Philippe is a typical Gilbert Albert design from the period. According to the famous Geneva jeweller, it was designed to contest the

traditional way of producing jewellery with the help of a polishing machine. This very unusual and contemporary design deliberately reminds us of unpolished gold nuggets or rocky ground evoking the beauty of native gold. It was very innovative at the time and reveals the resolutely modern and visionary attitude resulting from the inventive collaboration between Patek Philippe and Gilbert Albert.



Gilbert Albert

Gilbert Albert was born in Geneva in 1930. After studying Jewellery and Designing at Geneva's Ecole des Arts Industriels, he joined Patek Philippe as designer and head of the workshop. During the seven years with the celebrated manufacturer, he created the firm's most daring designs, most notably the asymmetrical models from the famous "Ricochet" series. Gilbert Albert took his inspiration from his passion for modern art, notably works by Brancusi and Mondrian, his daring and unconventional case designs are considered as cutting-edge today as they were 50 years ago.

His outstanding creations gained the prestigious 'Oscar' award at the Diamonds International Awards no less than ten times, three for Patek Philippe, two for Omega and five times under his own name. In 1962 he opened his own workshop in Geneva, specializing in the design and manufacture of unique jewels and objects. Gilbert Albert handles material in a supreme manner, shaping precious metal and mixing rare stones in an unconventional blend made of dreams, delicacy and magic.

Over the years, Albert's work has been exhibited around the world from London to Tokyo, Johannesburg to New York. In 1991 he was the first living artist since 1917 to be invited to show his creations in the Moscow Kremlin. Every year, Gilbert Albert launches new creations such as "Scarabées et Bijoux", "Les Bijoux de la Nature", "Météorites et Bijoux", "Les Joyaux de la Mer", "Les Porcelaines de la Nature", "Les Uniques", "Les Joyaux Coralliens", the shapes combined with the materials used paying tribute to his genius.

Fresh to the market, only approximately three other examples of the 3800/1 with this dial configuration are presently known publically. The present watch was however originally fitted with the classic black matter ribbed Nautilus dial as stated on the Extract from the Archives. That dial was most likely changed during a service at the request of the then owner and replaced with the present much more easily readable and very rare type of Nautilus dial. In this instance, the changed dial can be considered an enhancement and is a great rarity in its own right.

Within the reference 3800 family numerous dial options were offered, including jeweled dials, black, white and gilt dials, as well as versions with various forms of baton markers and Roman numerals. The present dial has two highly unusual variations from the standard: firstly, it is slate-grey without the traditional ridges seen on most Nautilus watches and has an attractive gun-metal satiné finish. Secondly, it has white painted Arabic numerals that give the dial an overall Art Deco and bold appearance. Overall, the aesthetic of the watch is completely changed from a typical 3800/1 and this Nautilus comes to life as something quite unusual for the collector.

Arguably the most stunning tropical dial Nautilus to be offered at auction to date, the dial has aged so uniformly over the last forty years that it now has a most exceptional patina. This so-called "cosmic" effect is regarded by collectors as one of the ultimate trophies of the iconic reference 3700/1.

The present watch, never offered in public before, is a superb early example of the classic reference 3700/1 "Jumbo" from the second year of Nautilus production 1977. Rarely does such a perfectly tropicalized example from the early years of production come to the market. Furthermore, as confirmed by the Extract from the Archives, it is fitted with an original caliber 28-255 C movement manufactured in 1973, thus pre-dating the Nautilus model itself, launched in 1976. This phenomenon occurs very occasionally in the reference 3700/1 and 3700/11 as Patek Philippe filtered in the existing stock of caliber 28-255 C movements from the first batches made in 1972 and 1973.

This fine and early version of the "Jumbo" with equally iconic cork Nautilus box is a must-have for the serious Nautilus collector.

Caliber 28-255 C

Generally agreed to be one of the great watch calibers, it was based on the original Jaeger-LeCoultre caliber 920 of 1967 and regarded as one of the most beautiful and refined automatic movements ever produced. Crucially it is also very thin at only 3.15 mm., therefore highly appropriate for the slim and elegant *Nautilus*. The development of the caliber 920 was partly jointly financed by Patek Philippe, Audemars Piguet and Vacheron Constantin. Audemars Piguet fitted their version, now the revered caliber 2120 into the *Royal Oak*, a further shared familial link with the *Nautilus*. Vacheron Constantin's version became their caliber 1120.

The caliber is 12.5 lignes and has 36 jewels and 19,800 vibrations. It is supplied with the shock-protected free-sprung Gyromax balance with eight rotatable weights allowing rate adjustment without the need for a conventional regulator index. The winding rotor is formed from a beryllium ring with 21K gold rim, this clever design with four additional ruby rollers to support the rotor around its periphery allows the thinness of the movement to remain uncompromised.

The Dials of Nautilus reference 3700/1

Created by Stern Frères, the distinctive striped dials of the *Nautilus* were entirely hand-made – each line recess is engraved separately. To achieve the aptly named "gray depth of ocean" colour specified by Patek Philippe the dials were painted alternately black and blue several times and then covered with a protective "Zapon" varnish. Early examples often display a degradation of the varnish so that depending on how a watch has been stored over the years, an individual dial may have tropicalized more towards either blue, gray, chestnut or green.

The indexes and hands are made of gold (sometimes erroneously called "steel" on some Extracts from the archives) and filled with luminescent material. The Patek Philippe signature and the outer minute divisions were painted. Below the 6 o'clock index is the word "Swiss" flanked on each side by the "Aprior" mark of two sigma symbols. The Aprior mark was conferred by the "Association pour la Promotion Industrielle de l'Or" on dials made of solid gold or at least with solid gold indexes.

The Nautilus Waterproof Case Ref. 3700/1

The case patent design of original *Nautilus*, reference 3700/1 was registered on 23rd April 1976. Made for Patek Philippe by Favre-Perret SA, Le Crét du Locle, from 1976 until 1981 when production was transferred to Patek's own Ateliers Reunis workshops. It comprises two parts, the main body and the bezel, at each side is an "ear" which couples with a corresponding flange, the two parts are secured by lateral screws. A rubber seal sits between the bezel and case body and is thus compressed when subject to water pressure forming a perfect watertight seal. The reference 3700/1 was made in stainless steel, steel and gold, 18K yellow gold, 18K white gold and platinum.

Not seen on the market in almost twenty years, the present watch is an excellent example of the reference 3448 from the last of the four generations of the model. A noteworthy feature is the sapphire crystal, which was only available from 1978 until the end of production. In addition, the fourth generation dial is distinguished by the "Aprior" mark appearing either side of the word "Swiss" at 6 o'clock and the minute divisions are painted batons, perfectly complementing the gold baton hour markers.

Reference 3448

Reference 3448 is one of Patek Philippe's best known perpetual calendar models and also one of the most easily recognizable thanks to its angular, architecturally designed case made by Antoine Gerlach. The model was introduced in 1962 and was at the time the first self-winding perpetual calendar wristwatch. It is thought that a total of only 586 examples were made, the majority in yellow gold cases. Few watches were cased in white gold and only two examples in platinum are known to date.

The movement is the celebrated caliber 27-460 that was upgraded and renamed caliber 27-460 Q with a perpetual calendar mechanism fitted on the movement plate underneath the dial. The caliber 27-460 Q is amongst the most sophisticated and lavish automatic movements ever made.

Reference 3448 is illustrated in *Patek Philippe Wristwatches* by Martin Huber & Alan Banbery, second edition, p. 288, and in *Ore d'Oro* by Jader Barracca, Giampiero Negretti and Franco Nencini, p. 45.

The Donzé Enamel Dial

A close inspection of the dial reveals that the under 6 o'clock the Swiss has a triangle, or delta, on each side in black enamel. It is known that 3939 enamel dials from this period were made by Donzé Cadrans S.A. in Le Locle, Switzerland. The surprising element of this dial is that it is believed that Donzé placed the 'Delta' triangles on the dial as a sort of secret signature of his work, D for Delta for Donzé. These marks are easily mistaken for the APRIOR, or sigma marks, seen on dials made with gold elements. Interestingly, the 3939 dials were made with gold base plates but did not have the APRIOR mark.

Master Enameller Francis Donzé started his family company in 1972 and his niche business soon became a supplier of enamel dials to many of the most important watchmaking companies in the world, in particular *Patek Philippe*. In 1987, Mr. Donzé retired and his family continued the business of traditional enamel dial making. In 2012, Ulysse Nardin acquired Donzé Cadrans.

The minute repeater was believed to have been invented in the mid-1680s by an Englishman called Daniel Quare. Before the days of electricity, it allowed the wearer to tell the time in the dark. In this age of technology, minute repeaters still involve an exacting level of craftsmanship. It is often said that the maker of a minute repeater requires the ear of a musician and the hand of a surgeon.

One of the most elegant and understated grand complication timepieces of recent time, reference 3939 unites the sonorous charms of a two-gong minute repeater with the gravity-defying precision of a tourbillon escapement. In keeping with its eternal style, reference 3939 ignores the contemporary trend for larger cases, measuring 33 mm. in diameter, an achievement for such a technically sophisticated timepiece.

Launched in 1993 and produced until 2009, the reference is one of the very few Patek Philippe references to feature an enamel dial with Breguet numerals. Crafted in 1993, the present watch is part of the early timepieces to be delivered by the manufacture and has been cherished since then by an important private collector. Preserved in excellent overall condition with a case displaying clear hallmarks and no apparent signs of polishing, the mechanism of the timepiece provides a beautiful, clear and distinctive tone, particular to minute repeaters of the period.

Consigned by an important private collector and still originally sealed in its Patek Philippe transparent protective plastic bag, this reference 6102P represents the rare opportunity to acquire one of Patek Philippe's most exceptional astronomical "Grand Complication" timepieces.

Only four other examples of this exclusive model have appeared in public to date, underlining its extreme rarity.

Reference 6102P

Launched in 2012, ref. 6102P is the upgraded version of the "Celestial" ref. 5102, now with the addition of a date indication on the outer rim of the dial and a redesigned case. The "Celestial" is one of the most important horological complications ever developed, permanently showing the heavenly canopy of the northern hemisphere, rotating to emulate the apparent angular motion of the stars and moon as well as the progression of the phases of the moon. Hours and minutes are indicated by two pierced white hands.

A delicate elliptical contour on the inside of the glass frames the portion of the sky visible from all cities sharing the latitude of Geneva. To determine the highest possible accurateness for the astronomical displays, the engineers of Patek Philippe researched 25 trillion (25,000,000,000,000) ratio combinations, underlining the enormous horological challenge the model represents.

The highly sophisticated automatic movement calibre 240 LU CL C consists of 315 individual parts, meticulously hand-finished in the workshops of Patek Philippe. Three sapphire crystal discs are used to simulate the orbit of the moon and the passage of the stars, hence rendering it a remarkable sense of depth.

The transparent dial reveals the impressive cosmos of this Grand Complication, combining a minute repeating mechanism, a perpetual calendar, a retrograde date and moon phase indication. The week days, month and leap year displays are shown in white on an ingenious system of three sapphire crystal discs rotating over black windows in the background. The current date is indicated with a retrograde hand on the outer black ring. A small hand and two round silhouettes show the moon phase with high precision.

The sides of the case and the lugs are embellished with pierced floral decorated inlays, the same decoration can be found on the micro-rotor and on the repeating slide and is also represented in the shape of the pierced hands.

The sapphire crystal case back reveals the sophisticated R 27 PS QR LU calibre and its staggering 517 parts, the decorated 22K mini-rotor, Patek Philippe's large Gyromax balance, the two hammers and the gongs of the minute repeating mechanism.

The present elegant platinum dress watch is a unique opportunity to acquire a time piece that belonged to the prodigious and highly esteemed French dramatist Sachy Guitry who strongly influenced the theatrical and arts world through his brilliant career.

According to the archives of Vacheron Constantin the movement of this watch was manufactured in 1926 and sold to France, most probably to be cased by a famous French jeweler such as Verger Frères, a very common procedure at the time. These relationships have led to some very delicate and remarkable pieces of art, perfectly representing the Art deco period, such as the present watch.

Sacha Guitry

Sacha Guitry was born in 1885 in Saint Petersburg, Russia. He was the son of the successful French actor Lucien Guitry, who embarked his son to make a stage debut in his company at the age of 5. This first experiment, combined with the love his father devoted to theatre, could have broaden the little boy's mind to the arts field as Sacha soon abandoned his formal education to get involved in a playwriting and acting career.

It is difficult to draw an absolute distinction between his work as an actor and as a playwright, for his art was always to some extent in the nature of brilliant improvisation. His output was enormous: he had over 90 plays produced out of 130 that he wrote, including a number of serious plays for his father to act in. He wrote, directed, and acted in many motion pictures, of which the best known was perhaps *Roman d'un tricheur* (1936 *Confessions of a Cheat*in English). This films is inspired by a book he wrote himself in 1935: *Mémoires d'un tricheur*. He was made commander of the Legion of Honour in 1936 and elected to the Académie Goncourt in 1939.

In 1953, he made his last stage appearance in Paris in *Palsambleu* and continued to make films until 1957. Guitry died in Paris at the age of seventy-two. Twelve thousand people filed past his coffin, and he was buried, like his father, in the Cimetière de Montmartre in Paris.

We can certainly affirm that Sacha Guitry was very intense and passionate about his writing and it is probably with the same emotion and praise that he was carefully collecting rare and exceptional art pieces such as this stylish platinum and diamond-set dress watch which is an admirable example of the Art Deco era.



The present very finely constructed and elegant Art Deco watch is distinguished by the exceedingly rare combination of a two-tone gld case and a ruby pointer, all confirmed by the Extract from the Archives. It is fitted with the "Chronoscope" system of jumping hours and wandering minutes patented by the Swiss watchmaker Robert Cart around 1925 under Swiss patent number 130191.

The "Chronoscope" watch was particularly popular as of the the mid-1920s, the design suiting the Art Deco period perfectly with its avant-garde look, the traditional hour and minute hands pared down to bold geometric shapes. The system was used in watches by several renowned companies such as Vacheron & Constantin, Cartier, Gübelin and Breguet.

The expression "Chronoscope" is derived from the Greek "chronos" for time and "scope" for range, sector and stands for an instrument for accurate measurements of small intervals of time.

Very similar "Chronoscope" watches by Vacheron Constantin are illustrated in *Secrets of Vacheron Constantin*, Franco Cologni, 2005, p. 250, *Treasures of Vacheron Constantin*, 2011, p. 58.

King Fouad I

Born in Ciaro in 1868, King Fouad I, father of King Farouk, was the first leader of modern independent Egypt. During his reign (1917-1936) as the ninth sovereign of the line of Mohamed Ali, Egypt changed from its brief status as a sultanate under a British protectorate (and its earlier status, prior to World War I, as a khedivial state nominally subservient to the Ottoman Sultan-Caliph in Istanbul) to become a full-fledged and independent kingdom.

Fouad had played a major role in the establishment of the Cairo University. He was an instrumental force in modern Egyptian historiography, employing numerous archivists to copy, translate, and arrange eighty-seven volumes of correspondence related to his paternal ancestors from European archives, and later to collect old documents from Egyptian archives into what became the Royal Archives in the 1930s.

The present watch has, in common with many of Breguet's watches, a fascinating and illustrious documented history. Breguet's workbook confirms that watch no. 1608 was sold to Princess Murat on 2 June 1806 for 1,800 French Francs. Princess Murat, the former Caroline Bonaparte, was the younger sister of Napoleon and had married Joachim Murat in January 1800. Between 1808 and 1815 the couple were installed as King and Queen of Naples. Caroline Murat is regarded as "the best client Breguet ever had" and it was for her that Breguet famously made the first ever wristwatch. Watch no. 1608 had evidently been ordered so that Caroline's husband Prince Murat could present it as a token of appreciation to the military chief of the Camp de Boulogne, Captain Yves-Marie Gabriel Le Coat, Baron de Saint-Haouen, later in June 1806. The engraved inscription inside the back cover confirms the gift.

The present watch is particularly well documented in Breguet's workbooks charting its upgrades and embellishments as fashions changed. The archives state that at the time of its sale in 1806 it had a plain gold case, no. 721 by Amy Gros, and an engine-turned gold dial. In 1831 it is recorded watch no. 1608 was returned and the present "blanc matte" silver dial was fitted. Furthermore, in 1840, the watch was again returned to Breguet where at the request of the then owner the movement and dial were removed from the case, the case was then sent to be engraved outside Breguet's workshops. Upon completion of the engraving the case was returned to Breguet and the movement and dial put back into the case. It is certainly very unusual that the workshop removed the movement and dial so that the case could be decorated by an outside engraver. This illustrates the level of customer service the house of Breguet has always endeavoured to uphold.

A mechanism found in a number of Breguet's repeaters is the jump hour. The hand stands stationary until about three minutes to the hour when it begins to move. By the time it is half way to the next hour the minute hand will be at the hour and the hour hand will jump the remaining distance to the hour. Mechanically this works because the usual motion work for the hands is dispensed with and the hour hand is mounted on a wheel geared directly to

another wheel on the hour snail star wheel. As the hour hand is driven from it the hand jumps with the star wheel to each successive hour.

A further interesting feature of the present watch is the construction used for the hammer to strike the gong, it is Breguet's most sophisticated. For a detailed note see the following lot in this auction.

His Imperial Highness Prince Joachim-Napoleon Murat, King of Naples (1767 - 1815)

Murat was a Marshall and Admiral of France under Napoleon's rule. He was styled His Imperial Highness Prince Joachim-Napoleon 1805-1806, Grand Duke of Berg and Cleves between 1806-1808 and King of Naples from 1808-1815. He was noted as a daring, brave and charismatic cavalry officer as well as flamboyant dresser earning him the soubriquet "the Dandy King". He received his titles in part due to his marriage to the ambitious and very beautiful Caroline Bonaparte, Napoleon's younger sister. After the fall of Napoleon, Murat was captured and sentenced to be executed on 13th October 1815. When the moment came he said "Soldiers! Do your duty! Straight to the heart but spare the face. Fire!"

Yves-Marie Gabriel Pierre Le Coat, Baron de Saint-Haouen (1756 - 1826)

Was a French Rear Admiral and Chief of Staff of Admirals Latouche-Tréville and Bruix as well as military chief of the Camp de Boulogne, a base for attacks against England. In 1805, 60,000 men were stationed at the camp. He is best known for having developed a terrestrial and maritime telegraph system, competing with that of Chappe, which has the peculiarity of being the first usable day and night, the Telegraphe Saint-Haouen.

Fresh to the market and of exalted noble provenance, the present watch is an epitome of Breguet's work and a highlight for the enthusiast of outstanding timepieces.

Purchased by the Marchioness of Bute on 25 September 1823, interestingly, just days after the great Abraham Louis Breguet's death on 17 September that year, it is likely that it was bought as a gift for her son-in-law, the Earl of Harrowby (styled Viscount Sandon between 1809 and 1847) to mark the occasion of his marriage to her daughter Frances on 15 September 1823. The engraved inscription on the inside back of the case "THE SILENT HOURS STEAL ON" is taken from William Shakespeare's Richard III, act 5, scene 3, referring to the small hours of the morning but a wholly appropriate inscription in general for any timepiece.

Frances, Marchioness of Bute was the daughter of Thomas Coutts, founder of the banking house Coutts & Co. During her marriage to the 1st Marquess of Bute she bore him two children, Frances, who became Countess of Harrowby and from whose family the present watch has descended, and a son, Lord Dudley Coutts Stuart (1803-1854). Although the watches of Breguet were well known by the British aristocracy, through Lord Dudley Stuart, there is an interesting more direct family connection that may well have influenced Lady Bute to become a customer of Brequet. Lord Dudley Stuart married Princess Christine Alexandrine Egypta Bonaparte (1798-1847), daughter of Lucien Bonaparte, Prince of Canino, Napoleon's younger brother on 20th July 1824. The Bonaparte family were Brequet's best clients, they bought in total about a hundred timepieces from Breguet, or the equivalent of one year's entire production. Lord Dudley and Princess Christine had one son, Paul Amadeus Francis Coutts Stuart, who died unmarried in 1889.

Watch no. 3515 incorporates several of Breguet's numerous inventions, starting with the repeating mechanism which marked a turning point in the history of watchmaking. Introduced in 1783, Brequet's "ressort-timbre", a wire gong surrounding the movement which replaced the hitherto used bell, improved not only the quality of the sound but especially helped to reduce the thickness of a watch considerably. The repeating pull-and-twist piston concealed in the band is another of Breguet's inventions. Generally used after 1800, the system is both elegant and reliable. A further interesting feature is the construction used for the hammer to strike the gong, it is Breguet's most sophisticated. When the repeating is activated the hammer does not make direct contact with the coiled gong. Placed between the hammer and gong is an intermediary solid hammer fixed to the plate by screws, the primary hammer in fact makes contact with the fixed hammer which in turn strikes the gong. This system was developed by Michel Weber, Breguet's chief craftsman in June 1793 in order to improve the sound of the gong. The intermediate hammer was intended to form a connection between the hammer and the gong so that the main hammer would strike against the intermediate hammer to deliver the impulse to the gong no matter what spring tension the main hammer was under, therefore the sound would be undistorted. Breguet said "we will equip all our best watches with this system in future".

The ruby cylinder movement is fitted with a "suspension élastique", Breguet's ingenious elastic balance suspension also known as pare-chute, the ancestor of the shock-protection devices conceived to protect the pivots from blows. Other typical Breguet style elements found in this watch are the engineturned silver dial combining two different effects, a technique he introduced around 1787. This new design enhanced not only the readability of the time but also the watches' overall aesthetics.

It is a very rare event when an early and remarkable tourbillon watch made by one of the great masters of Swiss watchmaking is offered for sale at auction. The present watch made by Jacques-Frédéric Houriet for Berthoud Frères around 1828 is one of such watch, one of only seven known examples of this model and one of only two made for Berthoud Frères.

In the words of Jean-Claude Sabrier: "Tourbillon pocket chronometers, undoubtedly the most original of all Houriet's creations, represent the culminating point of his research on compensation balances and the isochronism of balance springs".

The workmanship and finish of this watch, as one would expect from one of the watchmaking "greats", is simply extraordinary. Houriet was almost certainly the first watchmaker after Breguet, its inventor, to make use of the tourbillon regulator in his watches. Breguet had been granted a 10-year patent for his tourbillon regulator in June 1801 and therefore others were forbidden from producing and selling them until after 1811. However, Houriet, due to his exceptional skills was chosen by Breguet himself to produce his pocket chronometers with tourbillon, the most elaborate of their kind.

For greater precision, in the present watch the tourbillon is coupled with an Earnshaw-type spring detent chronometer escapement, much less common than the usual lever found in most tourbillon watches and the one which Houriet considered preferable for obtaining the greatest regularity of rate. In addition, this watch is fitted with both of Houriet's most iconic technical innovations – the "isochronous" spherical balance spring and his own version of the Réaumur thermometer. Technical virtuosity coupled with clarity and boldness of design have come together in this watch to create a mechanical masterpiece that is also extremely beautiful.

The spherical balance spring with which this watch, no. 96, is fitted enables it to be isochronous, meaning that the timekeeping is unaffected by fluctuations in the amplitude or swing of the balance as the watch goes from a fully wound state to a state of unwind. In other words, the frequency of the balance spring is independent of its amplitude. Houriet used the spherical balance spring in his watches from 1815 asserting that "....I had the idea of making balance springs that were spherical in form, in which the coils augment or diminish progressively with perfect uniformity".

It is interesting to discover that Houriet's technique for making spherical springs has survived, he employed a two-part mould onto which were adjusted five brass discs. He turned this system into a sphere flattened at the poles and traced a tread on it with a fusée engine.

Another fascinating aspect of the present watch is the inclusion of a thermometer. It was Houriet who first conceived the idea of fitting a thermometer to watches, in particular his tourbillon chronometers. Interestingly, it was Houriet's pupil and son-in-law. Urban Jürgensen who justly claimed to be the inventor of the metallic pocket thermometer constructed in 1801. The idea was then improved upon by Houriet and incorporated in his finest timepieces.

After 1818, Houriet adapted a new numbering system for his watches and chronometers. These pieces were almost never signed with his name but, as with the present watch, can be identified by the punchmark "FH" on the pillar plate along with the watch number.

EXCEPTIONAL TOURBILLON DETENT CHRONOMETER WITH SPHERICAL BALANCE SPRING AND THERMOMETER

Jacques-Frédéric Houriet (1743-1830) was a remarkable horologist considered to be the father of Swiss precision watchmaking. He knew or worked with most of the most eminent horologists of his time. His research on compensated balances and the spherical balance spring allowed him to develop and perfect the most precise chronometers of his day. In addition, he successfully solved the problem of the influence of magnetic fields on the rate of chronometers. He was apprenticed to his uncle. Daniel Gagnebin, at Renan, and later to the celebrated Abraham-Louis Perrelet, the inventor of the self-winding watch. In 1759, at the age of sixteen, he and his elder brother, an engraver, moved to Paris. Between 1761 and 1768 he studied with some of the leading French horologists, notably Breguet, LeRoy, Berthoud and Romilly and was the first Swiss watchmaker to make tourbillons. Antide Janvier, one of the most eminent horological minds of all time, considered Houriet an "artist worthy of emulation under the double relation of instruction and responsibility."

He is best known for his pioneer work in the construction of marine and pocket chronometers and in particular for his experiments with isochronism of the hairspring or helical spiral and the effect of gravity or magnetism on the balance and escapement. He supplied a tourbillon chronometer to William Parry for the 1819-21 North Pole Expedition which was especially constructed for anti-magnetic properties. Houriet also trained the Danish watchmaker Urban Jürgensen on whose work he had a great influence and who became his son-in-law.

Berthoud Frères When Louis Berthoud died in September 1813, his widow appealed to Henri Motel to run the workshop and complete the training of her two sons. Following the departure of Motel, the family workshop continued making marine watches in the same tradition under the trade name of Berthoud Frères. The two brothers divided the work between them. The elder, Louis looked after the retail outlet in Paris, and Charles-Auguste directed the workshop at Argenteuil. The chronometers produced by their manufacture were noticed at the exhibition of 1819. At the exhibitions of 1823 and 1827 the jury awarded them the Silver Medal. Jean-Louis-Simon-Henri, who called himself Louis like his father, abandoned chronometry to devote himself to the retail business. Charles-Auguste continued making chronometers retaining the same caliber.

The present watch incorporates Fasoldt's double-wheel lever escapement, patented on 1 February 1859. The remarkably reliable system does not require oil and has a very strong draw on both locking pallets. It furthermore features his patented micrometric torsion regulator.

Charles Fasoldt (1818 Dresden, Germany - 1898 Albany, NY) was together with Albert Potter the most renowned American watchmaker. In 1848, he narrowly escaped the death penalty for his part in the revolution by escaping from the prison where he was held. He then emigrated to the USA where he opened a watchmaking company which also made precision medical instruments. Following his move to Albany, NY, in 1860, Fasoldt further perfected his technique and became increasingly successful. One of his first watches, serial number 26, was made for General Armstrong. Fasoldt

watches sold for between 150 and 300 dollars, a considerable sum at the time, but the middle classes paid willingly. All watches were designed by Fasoldt himself and the majority were fitted with his lever escapement, patented on 1 February 1859: Patent no. 16652 for a chronometer escapement with a hitherto unseen feature: a double-wheel lever escapement. Although called "chronometer escapement", Fasoldt's invention is in fact a lever escapement with two escape wheels, the smaller one giving impulse in one direction and the larger one in the other direction.

Throughout his life, the prolific inventor continued to create microscopes, watches, clocks and clock towers. Charles Fasoldt died in 1898 in the city of Albany.

Very well preserved, the present gold and silver cased watch is not only highly attractive and pleasing to the eye with visible moving parts, it is also technically extremely fascinating and innovative.

The balance has a seconds-beating action to allow the centre seconds hand to advance in one-second increments, the escapement is ultimately derived from that invented by Moise Pouzait in the late 18th century but unlike the Pouzait escapement, the balance is small diameter and without a balance spring. Instead, a pirouette wheel with a balance spring meshes with the balance pinion, this wheel is driven by a toothed rack at one end of the lever and the escape wheel is set in the center of the dial plate.

The maker of this watch who as yet remains unknown although almost certainly Swiss, was evidently familiar with Moise Pouzait's lever escapement

which he developed in the 1780s. In 1786 Pouzait made a model of his escapement which he presented to the Geneva Societe des Arts. Due to its highly visible and mesmerizing action, Pouzait's invention was much appreciated by the Chinese before Jacot's invention of the "Chinese duplex" escapement which made the production of centre-seconds watches feasible in larger numbers. The maker of the present watch has ingeniously developed his own equally interesting and visually appealing version of the seconds-beating balance using a smaller diameter and therefore more stable and less delicate balance in contrast to Pouzait's original large-diameter balance. Therefore, the end result of a centre seconds hand moving at a rate of one-second "jumps" is achieved whilst improving the watch's practicality as a usable timepiece. The skeletonized regulator-type dial and addition of a calendar add to the watch's overall beauty.

Rarely seen on the market today, this impressive example of the very attractive "double dial" minute repeating watch by Haas of Geneva is not only high quality but surprisingly complicated. The movement has separate wheel trains for the going of the watch and for the jump centre seconds mechanism, both spring barrels are wound by the same crown but in different directions. This system of separate trains for each function allows the seconds to be started and stopped via a lever without affecting or stopping the timekeeping function of the watch, hence it is known as "independent seconds". This watch can, in other words be used in the same way as a chronograph to time an event, however, without a chronograph mechanism the seconds hand cannot be returned to zero or the elapsed seconds recorded. The back cover opens to reveal a calendar ring with hand driven by the movement.

This fascinating and unusual watch successfully combines both watchmaking prowess and aesthetics and is a worthy addition to a collection of fine watches.

Haas & Cie. was founded by Leopold and Benjamin Haas in 1848 and manufactured from the beginning small series of gold or platinum watches featuring the classical complications such as perpetual calendars, quarter repeaters, chronographs and split-second chronographs. Over the years, new family members joined the company and consequently it was renamed to Haas Neveux & Cie. in 1884. In the same year, Haas launched a highly innovative pocket watch with a movement that was wound by opening and closing of the cover. This mechanism was further developed and patented and presented at the 1893 Chicago World Exhibition.

This exquisite rock crystal pendant watch is a well preserved and very attractive example of a seventeenth century crucifix form-watch. Very seldom seen at auction, crucifix watches are represented in several of the world's great museum collections. A similar watch with almost identical pendant to the present watch is in the Louvre (Inv. OA 7040) and an almost identical watch is in the British Museum Collection (inv. 74, 7-18, 28).

In keeping with the crucifix-form case, the decoration of the lower part of the dial plate is engraved with a scene of Christ on the cross accompanied by Mary and Mary Magdalene, the arms are engraved with the tools and implements of crucifixion. From the style of the set-up and the balance cock secured by a screw rather than being pinned, the present watch can be dated to around the middle to third quarter of the seventeenth century but naturally before the invention of the balance spring in the 1670s.

Jean Rousseau

Jean Rousseau the younger (1606-1684) was an eminent watchmaker and Master of the Clockmakers' Company of Geneva. He was the greatgrandfather of the philosopher Jean-Jacques Rousseau. He was known for making form watches and complicated pieces such as clockwatches, alarm watches and astronomical watches. Among his apprentices were some of Geneva's best watchmakers including Isaac Bordier and Amédée Marchand.





Crucifix form watches

Following the "Ordonnances somptuaires" introduced by the reformer Jean Calvin in 1558, the new rules for goldsmiths implemented in 1566 forbid the manufacture of "crosses, chalices or other instruments serving the papacy or the idolatry". Nevertheless the clandestine distribution of these very popular watches continued until things were eased a few decades later and goldsmiths, enamellers and watchmakers of Geneva could again officially make crucifix form watches, sometimes called "montre d'abbesse". Signatures found on such watches are for example Pierre Duhamel (1630-1686), Charles Bobinet (1610-1678), Jérémie Delafeuille and notably Jean Rousseau. These watches were generally fitted with a dial decorated with motifs from the passion and crucifixion and rock crystal covers.

Beautifully preserved in near mint condition, the present watch is both a technically fascinating and unusual precision timepiece and a visual delight. It is also extremely rare, to date no other examples appear to have been offered at auction.

This watch is extremely interesting for several reasons: it is a two-time zone watch made before the official adoption of time zones as we know them today. The earliest two-time zone watches such as the present watch were fitted with two dials and two movements, later versions use a single train with a clutch mechanism to adjust the second hour hand. Because one of the separate dials has Turkish numerals, it is a possibility that this watch was made at the request of a ship's captain who made regular journeys to or from Turkey and Europe who needed to know the time in his home port as a navigational aid or for the timing of journeys – up to 12-hours each way for instance. The two separate wheel trains can be stopped sequentially and then restarted in unison by the co-axial button in the crown. One press stops the right-hand movement for the Turkish dial, the second press stops the second movement – at which point the entire mechanism is stopped, a third press then restarts both movements at exactly the same moment.

Precision was evidently a concern in the construction of the watch of which all the parts are of very high quality. The calibrated and counterpoised lever escapements are mounted in mirror-image form and each has a white metal helical balance spring mounted above so it is therefore likely that the watch is antimagnetic. The bimetallic compensation balances themselves are oscillating free because the balance springs are mounted within the movement and it is probable that when both trains are running over a long period the watch benefits from the effects of resonance.

This very attractive and highly innovative watch would make a wonderful addition to any collection and will certainly appeal to the aficionado of Swiss master watchmaking.

Extremely well preserved, the present watch is a large and very beautiful example of the sumptuous enamel watches made by Bovet for the Chinese market.

The history of the celebrated Chinese market watches signed Bovet Fleurier began with the Swiss master watchmaker Edouard Bovet (1797-1849). Born in Fleurier, the 21 year old Edouard arrived in Canton in 1818 and almost immediately sold four watches for 10,000 francs, about one million US\$ dollars today. He consequently decided to stay in Canton where he established in 1822 a trading company in partnership with his brothers, the firm founded by charter in London the same year. Very soon, the name "Bo Wei" or "Bo-vay" became synonymous for "watch" and in the turmoil of late Manchu China, Bovet watches spread throughout the country as a medium of exchange. In the meantime, their hometown Fleurier in the Val-de-Travers had become the European centre for the manufacture of Chinese watches, with several brands dedicated only to that flourishing market.

Bovet's production of high quality watches made in Switzerland for the Imperial Chinese market was a resounding success. "Chinese watches" as they were soon called were elaborately decorated pocket watches, generally sold in symmetrically opposed pairs. Their cases often featured enamel miniatures painted by the most celebrated artists of the time, cloisonné and champlevé decorations pearl-set borders. Bovet further specialized in the art of engraving and skeletonizing movements, hence enhancing the appeal of his high-end Chinese watches with its Mandarin customers.

Since their first appearance nearly 200 years ago, these extremely attractive watches have never lost their fascination.

This impressive and substantial repeating and calendar watch was presented to the remowned surgeon Albert Ritter Mosetig von Moorhof by King George V of Hanover in 1874. The nature of the inscription suggesting everlasting gratitude implies that von Moorhof successfully treated the King or a member of his family.

The present watch was evidently an important and substantial gift, it has been engraved with von Moorhof's arms as Surgeon-General of the German Order of Knights and was purchased in Paris from the very prestigious jewellers Tessier. The motto "Per Ardua ad Alta" translates as "Through Adversity to the Stars".

Of both historical and horological interest, the present watch is a superb piece for the collector and connoisseur of fine watchmaking.







Albert Ritter Mosetig von Moorhof (1838-1907) was a famous Austrian surgeon who was present in the battlefield in Bohemia in 1866. He was chief surgeon in a French military hospital in Paris in 1870/1871 and was then appointed to the primary surgical department of the Rudolf Institution hospital. In 1873 he worked as the chief physician of the Viennese world exhibition. He is most remembered for the introduction of iodoform in the treatment of wounds and devised a number of useful instruments.

George V of Hanover (1819 – 1878) was the last king of Hanover, the only child and successor of King Ernst Augustus. George V's reign was brought to an end by the Unification of Germany.

Born Prince George of Cumberland, he was the only son of Prince Ernest Augustus, Duke of Cumberland, fifth son of King George III. Upon the death of William IV and the accession of Queen Victoria to the British throne, the 123-year union of the British and Hanoverian thrones ended. The Duke of Cumberland succeeded to the Hanoverian throne as Ernst August I, and Prince George became the Crown Prince of Hanover. As a legitimate male descendant of George III, he remained a member of the British Royal Family, and second in line to the British throne until the birth of Queen Victoria's first child, Victoria, the Princess Royal, in 1840.

The Crown Prince succeeded his father as the King of Hanover in November 1851, assuming the style George V. From his father, George had learned to take a very high and autocratic view of royal authority and engaged in many disputes with the Hanoverian parliament.

George V died in Paris, on 12 June 1878. He was buried in St. George's Chapel, Windsor Castle.

Consigned by an important private collector, this very high quality and impressively large complicated watch is preserved in superb condition, the crisp, heavy pink gold case showing almost no signs of wear.

A distinctive and unusual aspect of the present watch is the digital calendar whereby the date, days of the week and the months are displayed in windows rather than the typical subsidiary dial display seen on most watches of the period. This is a rare feature seldom found in 19th century watches, it was not until the 1920's that this form of calendar became popular, a similar system in linear single-window form was adopted by Patek Philippe and eventually became known as the "American calendar".

The present watch was originally sold by the famous German retailer Dürrstein & Co. of Dresden whose owner Johannes Dürrstein founded the "Uhrenfabrik Union" watch manufacture in 1893. The company was renowned for selling watches of the very highest quality and supplied complicated watches upon request. Many of the complicated watches sold by Dürrstein had movements supplied by Audemars Piguet and occasionally other Swiss makers depending on the nature of the piece. The very high-grade beautifully finished movement of the present watch appears to be unsigned, however, the back of the dial is scratch signed "A D Nicolet, Ponts, 1896". It is therefore almost certain that the maker is Armand Nicolet of Ponts de Martel in the Swiss Canton of Neuchatel. Nicolet was born in 1871 and died in 1944. He specialized in the production of complicated watches and mainly worked for Mathey Tissot.

Johannes Dürrstein started his career in watchmaking after an apprenticeship at the wholesaler Ludwig & Fries, working as a travelling salesman for a Swiss watchmaker. In 1874, he decided to set up his own business, founding the watch wholesaler Dürrstein & Compagnie in Glashütte together with his brother Friedrich. With his experience as a watch wholesaler and his flair for sales, Dürrstein was in a perfect position to start producing his own watches. To demonstrate his watchmaking skills, he hired the master watchmakers Julius Bergter and Martin Simmchen, both highly talented and reputed artists.

On 1 January 1893, "Uhrenfabrik Union" was founded, with the aim of producing only the best, finest and most accurate watches. Union's watches were of highest quality and on special request could be supplied with the most complicated of mechanisms including pocket chronometers, tourbillons and perpetual calendars and with a rating certificate from the Hamburg Observatory. To satisfy their clients' strong demand, Dürrstein often bought best quality Swiss movements which were then finished, cased and sold under his or Union's name. The trademark of a stylized temple was introduced in 1896.



Preserved in exceptional condition, this stunning bracelet watch is one of the rarest and most attractive sculptural Piaget "21st Century Collection" watches to be offered at auction in recent years. According to our research it is the first example of this design to appear at auction, only one other example in white gold is known publically. The dial is made from a single wafer-thin piece of jade and each individually hand-made textured 18K gold bracelet link is set with a panel of either lapis lazuli or jade, or both.

Piaget is known as "the jeweller of watch making" and it is no exaggeration to describe this watch as an artwork, a masterpiece of the jewellers craft. In common with all good design, the innate style of the piece transcends the vagaries of fashion, as utterly contemporary today as it was nearly fifty years ago.

From 1969, under the direction of Valentin Piaget, the company saw an unrestrained explosion of creativity. The designs created were resolutely avant-garde, breaking technical boundaries with dramatic uncompromising pieces carved out of solid gold and set with bold coloured stones. These "haute couture" pieces were totally in-tune with the wider world of fashion. When they were unveiled at the Basel Fair, the Journal de Genève of 15th April 1970 commented: "this year, Piaget has indulged its taste for colour by going for dials in precious stone, carved out of solid jade, lapis lazuli, opal, coral, turquoise and tiger's eye. Fresh to the market, the present watch is one of the exceptionally rare Jaeger LeCoultre Geophysic models in a gold case, the majority of the model being cased in stainless steel. Only two pieces in 18K gold, including this watch, are known publically to date, and one other example in a 9K gold case.

The Geophysic Chronometer is amongst the most important watches in the history of Jaeger-LeCoultre, representing the manufacturer's values of precision, robustness and aesthetic purity. Made at a time of fundamental scientific and political developments, it was directly involved in this historical context.

To match the model that would resist any type of challenge, in particular water-resistance, antimagnetism, adjustment, etc., the name Geophysic Chronometer was suggested, also as it perfectly met the criteria and values of the International Geophysical Year (IGY). This particularly significant scientific event was organized on the initiative of the United States and took place at the high point of solar activity, from 1 July 1957 to 31 December 1958. It was also the first year of the Space Age, with the launch of the first artificial satellite, Sputnik 1, on 4 October 1957.

The models were fitted with Jaeger-LeCoultre's first chronometer movement, the calibre P478/ BWSBR developed in 1957, new water-resistant cases with soft iron domes to protect the movement from magnetic field influence up to 600 gauss, thus meeting the needs of research scientists working on polar bases, in laboratories or inside submarines. The origin of this watchmaking project was the call for "resistance to any type of challenge". Consequently, the cases were able to withstand magnetic fields, given that magnetism was also one of the scientists' main areas of study. Precision, guaranteed in mechanical watchmaking by the term 'chronometer', is another crucial necessity as every science requires exact measurements.

The precision, robustness and reliability of the Geophysic Chronometer made it a symbol of excellence and the logical choice when Jaeger-LeCoultre decided to revive the Geophysic tradition in 2009.

\$8,300-12,000 €7.000-10.000 The "Reverso" wristwatch, the world's longest-running watch model, was launched in 1931 and designed upon special request by polo players who wished to have a timepiece able to endure their sport. The ingenious system allows a 180 degree rotation of the case, hence protecting the crystal and consequently the dial from damages.

The case back, its second "face", provides a background for elaborate engravings such as initials, coats of arms and others, as well as for miniature enamel paintings. It appears that in the early 1930s, India's Maharajah of Karputala was so impressed with the Reverso that he ordered 50 examples, each decorated with his enamelled portrait.

Essentially unchanged for more than 70 years, the Reverso continues to flourish both as a modern timepiece and as one of the few original Art Deco objects still in use.

This elegant, rare and attractive white gold classic Cartier Tank was retailed through the firm's London boutique indicated by the presence of London import hallmarks on the inside case back dating it to 1975. At this period, few watches were made in white gold, the majority being cased in yellow gold. The present watch also impresses by its well preserved white dial, so hard to find in this condition.

Regarded since its inception as a timeless beauty, the Tank model with its strong Art Deco style has always been perfectly adaptable to reinterpretation for each new era. In the 1970s, the Tank was given a new lease of life with the launch of twelve new models in gold in 1973. The "classic" Tank of which the present watch is a fine white gold example is characterized by its elegant rounded corners, it is descended from the model originally called "Tank à Bords Arrondis" when created in 1922 and dubbed the "Tank L.C." or Tank Louis Cartier from 1924. The model has always been an enduring success dues to its understated elegance and has been favoured by some of the 20th century's most prominent people, Andy Warhol, Yves St. Laurent, Elizabeth Taylor to name but a few. In 1951 Cartier London produced another incarnation called the "Tank JJC" named after the then Director of the London branch Jean-Jacques Cartier.

The subtle and restrained chic of this white gold Tank lends itself to both casual and formal occasions, a truly timeless classic that is always appreciated as a marker of style.



The entire dial is sumptuously set with the technique of paving the surface with rows of tightly packed diamonds known as pavé. The bezel is further set with two stunning rows of brilliant-cut diamonds enhancing the overall luxury of the piece.





The case was made for Patek Philippeby Antoine Gerlach in Geneva, his mark of a number 4 within a key is punched inside the back of the case. The beautifully understated dial is perfectly complemented by Dauphine hands and the sharp, crisp, "Calatrava" case with flat bezel completes this true Patek Philippe classic.

The Calatrava model reference 570 was introduced into the market in 1938, the first large Calatrava watch produced in series, featuring either subsidiary or sweep centre seconds. It was available in stainless steel, yellow, pink and white gold and platinum.

Never offered in public before, the present reference 3417 immediately exudes the feel of a watch that has enjoyed minimal intervention over the years, the dial is in particular extremely well preserved displaying that ever so elusive and pleasing effect that can only be conferred by the hand of time.

The "type 1" dial seen on this watch was used between 1961 and early 1963, in common with the so-called "indelible" dial which preceded it (1958-1960) it is distinguished by the absence of the word "Swiss" at 6 o'clock.

Manufacture of reference 3417 was begun in 1958 and ceased around 1970. It was Patek Philippe's first "Anti-Magnetic" wristwatch made in series, available exclusively in stainless steel. At the time of its launch, the "Amagnetic" feature was a sign of superiority and consequently mentioned on the dial

The first series were fitted with a cal. 12 AM 400 movement, as of 1960, the calibre 27-AM 400 was used until the models' discontinuation. The caliber 12 AM 400 movement is regarded by many as the most desirable manual movement made by Patek Philippe, it is fitted with a gold or beryllium lever escapement and covered by a soft iron (permalum) cap. The caliber was designed to withstand up to 450 oersteds of magnetic strength, in other words, more than four times the level of magnetism needed to stop a standard watch.

The present watch is an exceptional and original example of the reference 3417, a timepiece that is sure to attract the most discerning of collectors.

Part of the early chronographs of the reference, the wristwatch was assembled with a superb two-tone silvered sector dial, considered as being amongst the most desirable combinations for collectors. Made for a limited time period, sector dials appeared on chronographs in the mid 1930's, the present timepiece further embellished by the presence of a tachometer scale and applied stainless steel indexes confirmed by the extract from the archives.

Manufactured with an attractive stainless steel case with lugs providing the chronograph a more masculine look, the movement of the wristwatch is stamped with the PXP export mark, indicating that the timepiece was originally intended for the American market.

Offered by an important private collector, the present reference 130 in stainless steel with sector dial can be considered as offering one of the most attractive combination known for the reference.

Reference 130

Reference 130, one of Patek Philippe's landmark models, was launched in 1934 and remained in production until the 1960s. Distinguished by its timeless "Calatrava" design, the model was available in different precious metals as well as in stainless steel.

It is interesting to note that the lugs of the stainless steel version are different from the yellow, pink or white gold ones. Their slightly thicker but shorter design gives the watch a rather tonneau-shaped design and a more sportive, robust and masculine look. Not seen on the market for almost twenty years, this very attractive example of the reference 130 impresses by its good overall state of preservation. The reference 130 was the first Patek Philippe chronograph model to be given a reference number. The gold cases were made by Vichet, one of Geneva's best case makers of the time

The present watch is fitted with a very fine silvered dial with raised gold hour markers, strongly raised enamel signature and scales and delicate surface sheen. The manufacture date of 1938 however, precludes the use of the "short" signature on the dial, this style of signature was only in use from 1948. The undoubtedly fine Patek Philippe dial must therefore have been fitted after 1948, perhaps to replace a damaged dial or for a change of colour at the then owner's request.

Reference 3970

In 1986, Patek Philippe launched a new generation of the perpetual calendar chronograph wristwatch, designated reference 3970, replacing the hugely successful reference 2499. The main difference in the movement was the arrival of the new Lemania base ébauche which replaced the Valjoux movement used for the previous 50 years.

Starting with movement number 875'000, the first series of reference 3970 were produced with a solid snap on back, comprising approximately 100 examples. The second series introduced a solid screw back, designated reference 3970E (E for étanche, French for waterproof). A small number of watches from both series were also available with a sapphire crystal back, designated reference 3971E.

In 1989, a third series of ref. 3970 was launched, fitted with a solid screw back as well as an additional sapphire crystal display screw back.

Reference 3970 was discontinued in 2004 and replaced by reference 5970.

While production of the reference 3970/3971 may have ended only thirteen years ago, these modern yet classic perpetual calendar chronographs have become a must-have for the discerning collector of complicated wristwatches.

Fresh to the market, the present watch is an exceedingly rare and superbly well-preserved pink gold example of the celebrated and timelessly classic "Grande Calatrava Etanche" reference 565. It is furthermore believed to be the only second pink gold reference 565 retailed by Serpico y Laino to appear at auction to date.

The case has evidently never been subject to careless polishing, impressively demonstrated by the full proportions, crisp hallmarks and engraving to the case back. The dial has never been cosmetically enhanced and displays a highly charismatic cream-coloured patina from age. The "short" signature "Patek Philippe, Genève" is correct for the date of manufacture, the enamel scales are beautifully raised and the "Serpico y Laino Caracas" signature is perfectly preserved.

PATEK PHILIPPE Pink Gold Ref. 565 Retailed by Serpico Y Laino



It is one of the last examples of the reference to be fitted with the caliber 12-120 movement before it was replaced by the caliber 12-400 in 1950.

According to the engraved inscription on the case back it was presented to Edward L. Steiniger of the American Sinclair Oil and Refining Company, working in oil exploration in Venezuela as of 1937. Edward L. Steiniger was the President of the company from 1958-1964.

Reference 565

Reference 565, the first large water-resistant watch featuring a two-piece case made by Taubert & Fils with screw back and dust cover, was available with either subsidiary or sweep centre seconds. The first series was launched in 1938 with calibre 12"120, the second with calibre 12"400 in 1950.

The timelessly modern design of reference 565 served as inspiration for the creation of the 2006 stainless steel inaugural reference 5565.

The present watch is a wonderfully original and extremely attractive pink gold example of the reference 2526 with first series enamel dial and original Gay Frères bracelet. To the best of our knowledge, it has never been offered in public before and is one of only approximately ten examples of the reference fitted with luminous indexes and hands to appear at auction to date.

The enamel dial of the present watch is a superb "textbook" example of the first series type in which the dial presents flared holes under each index in order to allow for their setting in two drilled holes secured from the back. Flared holes are also present around the centre for the hands and for the subsidiary seconds. This method of attaching the indexes meant that the enamel dials were both difficult and expensive to produce. Made only for a relatively short period, these first series dials are naturally the most sought after by collectors especially when combined with the exceedingly rare addition of luminous indexes as in the present watch.

Enhancing its desirability further is the exquisite pink gold bracelet made by renowned jeweller Gay Frères. The Extract from the Archives confirms that the present watch was sold with a rose gold bracelet in 1955, matching the punched "55" for 1955 on the clasp. It can therefore be concluded that the bracelet is indeed original to the watch.

The caliber 12-66 AT movement is universally recognized as one of the best automatic movements ever conceived, luxuriously finished and wound by a massive gold rotor, this calibre, thanks to the size of the plate, employs relatively large parts that allow for an accuracy comparable with that of modern mechanical timepieces.

Reference 2526

Introduced into the market in 1952, reference 2526 was Patek Philippe's first self-winding or automatic watch, starting with movement number 760'000. The model features the legendary calibre 12-600 AT which was granted Swiss patent No. 289758 in 1953 for "a self-winding mechanism for a wristwatch movement using the energy supplied by a rotary mass causing an eccentric part to transmit a swinging movement to an organ of the mechanism".

The majority of reference 2526 was cased in yellow gold, a small series in pink gold and an exceedingly limited number in white gold and platinum. Mainly fitted with enamel dials with applied gold baton numerals, the white gold and platinum examples were also available with silvered metal dials with diamond indexes.

A paragon of understatement and timeless class combined with a state-of-the art movement, reference 2526 has significantly influenced the popularity of wristwatches featuring enamel dials. In 1960, it was replaced by reference 3428, equipped with the second generation self-winding movement, calibre 27-460.

The reference can be divided in three distinct series:

- First series: domed case back, enamel dial and riveted indexes. The dial presents flared holes under each index in order to allow for their setting.
- Second series: domed case back, enamel dials with the numerals glued to the surface. The dial presents only two flared holes for the hands.
- Third series: flat case back, and in later examples metal dial.
- Fourth series: same as third series, but with new calibre 27-460



THE PROPERTY OF AN IMPORTANT EUROPEAN COLLECTOR













The collection of 23 wristwatches was compiled by an important private European collector over a period of 20 years. It comprises rare timepieces signed by some of the world's most celebrated manufacturers including Cartier, F.P. Journe, Patek Philippe, Rolex and Vacheron Constantin, made between the 1920s and recent years and prone to please the heart of collectors and watch aficionados alike.

The highlights include among others a Cartier single button "tortue à pattes" chronograph from the late 1920s, one of only two Vacheron Constantin ref. 92900 chronographs in platinum ever made, a Rolex ref. 3525 chronograph in steel with salmon dial, one of only two known white gold examples of Patek Philippe's legendary ref. 130, and last but not least an example of the firm's iconic perpetual calendar ref. 3448 in white gold without the moon indication, nicknamed the "senza luna".

F.P. JOURNE

Lots 113 - 115 are attractive examples from the workshop of one of the most acclaimed contemporary independent watchmakers: F. P. Journe.

François-Paul Journe was born in Marseille in 1957. He graduated from the Paris School of Watchmaking in 1976 and immediately joined forces with his uncle, a noted restorer of antique timepieces. Before creating his own complete line of wristwatches, Journe restored some of the world's most important historical timepieces, devised and built unique pocket watches to order and designed and made complications for prestigious watch brands.

In 1996, Journe established a workshop in Geneva, designing and making watch mechanisms for other brands.

Three years later, in 1999, he launched his own watches under the label "F.P.Journe Invenit et Fecit

This extremely attractive Octa Chrono is an example of the "second series" with 18K pink gold movement. This version is rarely seen at auction and is particularly appealing and pleasing to the eye.

The Octa Chrono was in production between 2005 and 2008 and was the first flyback chronograph with large date offering a power reserve of 120 hours.

F.P Journe produced the Octa Zodiaque in a limited edition of 150 pieces between 2003 and 2005. With the dial that transitions from simplicity in the center to complication around the edges, Journe alluded to the position of the stars in the sky. The outer ring rotates to display the current zodiac sign at the 12 o'clock position. The silver and slate grey dial is reminiscent of the other models of the Octa collection; however, the Zodiaque is only the second watch from F.P. Journe that features central hour and minute hands.

The Chronometre à Résonance model was launched in 2000 and is a firm favourite amongst Journe's watches. It is one of the exceedingly rare and fascinating wristwatches in the world based on resonance, a natural physical phenomenon. The two closely positioned balance wheels synchronize each other by means of the resonance effect and naturally beat alternately. The negative effects of wrist and body movements are hence considerably reduced.

The effects of resonance upon a timekeeper was first noticed by Antide Janvier around 1780 who made clocks with two pendulums beating in resonance, the idea was taken further by Abraham Louis Breguet who successfully completed pocket watches with twin resonant balances. The genius of F.P. Journe reinvented the mechanism for the modern world and produced the "Chronometre A Resonance" wristwatch, the present watch is one of that remarkable series. The two dials can of course be used to show two different time zones, however, many watch collectors have both dials displaying the same time to remain true to the original theory of resonance. To facilitate precise setting of both movements, the seconds can be zeroed and started simultaneously by pulling out the crown at 4 o'clock on the band.

It is one of only two examples of the platinum cased reference 92900 chronograph made upon special request in 1990. Both watches are fitted with historic movements dating from 1939, the case of the present watch is numbered 509'768, the second example bears the consecutive case number, 509'769. The latter being fitted with a silvered dial and applied baton and Roman numerals render the two watches unique.

The spectacular two-tone silvered dial features hour markers and scales in raised black hard enamel. The screw back "water-resistant" case, is endowed with the timeless proportions of Vacheron Constantin's best known chronographs and fitted with the caliber 295 movement, one of the company's most famous, used in the early part of the production of the legendary reference 4072.

Furthermore preserved in excellent, original overall condition, this attractive and highly exclusive platinum timepiece combines the tremendous appeal of the very best "golden age" vintage chronographs with the functionality of modern-day case making.

Preserved in excellent overall condition, this extremely attractive Cartier "tortue" wristwatch is one of the rarest models amongst Cartier's "golden age" watches from the 1920s. The single button chronograph mechanism in use during this period allows its wearer to operate all three stop-watch functions: start, stop and return-to-zero, coaxially via the winding crown only, instead of the two button system found in most later chronograph watches – this gives these early watches a most elegant, smooth and uninterrupted line.

According to our research the present watch is only the tenth example of the tortue single button chronograph to ever be offered at auction.

In common with the most sophisticated vintage watch dials, this beautiful and clear matte silvered dial has inlaid champlevé hard enamel Roman numerals, chronograph/minute track, small seconds and 30-minute register, only the signature itself is printed. The solidly constructed case still exhibits clear hallmarks and is naturally fully numbered by Cartier.

Collectors and connoisseurs will appreciate the fine movement by the European Watch & Clock Co. Inc., the company formed in the early 1920s with Edward Jaeger (of Jaeger-LeCoultre) to make movements specifically for Cartier. It is now the signature most associated and desired when considering the vintage watches and clocks of Cartier.

Cartier Tortue

The tonneau-shaped "tortue à pattes" or "turtle on legs" wristwatch was designed by Louis Cartier in 1912. The shape of the case was made to resemble a turtle, a very popular animal during this era and a symbol of good fortune and longevity in many civilisations.

The first tortue model was the precursor of numerous watchmaking creations in the early 20th century, these first tortue watches were destined for ladies, the gentleman's version featuring a single button chronograph was available as of 1928.

In the same private collection for more than a decade, this rare and unusual steel reference 3484 impresses by its very good overall condition and the striking non-luminous black dial with gilt printing and both tachymetre and telemetre scales. The case is designed with a flat band and straight angled lugs lending it a very clean minimalist look emphasized by the contrast of the steel and the rich black and gilt dial.

In common with other Rolex references at this period such as the "monoblocco" ref. 3525 (see lot 120 in this auction), the serial and reference numbers are on the outside of the case back as opposed to between the lugs of later models. Particularly sensible to wear or careless polishing, both numbers are still very crisp, underlining the very good overall condition of this rare chronograph.

Reference 3484 was in production from 1939 to 1948 and was cased either in stainless steel or gold. The model is described and illustrated in *I Cronografi Rolex - La Leggenda*, Pucci Papaleo Editore, pp. 132 & 133.

Reference 3668

After years of success with the newly invented Oyster model, a wristwatch with screw back and screw down crown, Rolex launched the first Oyster chronograph, reference 3481, in 1939. Immediately afterwards, its larger successor, reference 3668, was presented and remained in production for only a few years.

Produced in small quantities, reference 3668 occupies a unique position in the history of Rolex chronographs as it clearly stands out with its exclusive design incorporating a reeded bezel chased with hour markers. The reeded bezel was available in both pink and yellow gold and fused onto the steel case.

In outstanding original condition, this reference 3525 is among the most appealing and attractive examples of this model to be offered at auction in recent years. Its superb dial impresses with an extremely beautiful and warm salmon tone, free of any cosmetic enhancements. The hard enamel numerals and scales are full, the colours of the black tachymetre and the blue telemetre scales strong and vibrant.

From the early production of the reference it features the reference and serial number to the outside of the case back as opposed to between the lugs as found in later models. The case shows excellent proportions, the numbers are crisp and clearly readable, the original Oyster Patent crown is still present.

Reference 3525

Reference 3525, one of the manufacturer's first "Oyster" chronograph wristwatches, was produced between 1939 and 1945, and was available in a variety of metals. It is affectionately nick-named "monoblocco" by Italian collectors, referring to the fact that with the exception of the case back the entire case consists of one block including bezel and lugs.

Two-body case reference 6034 was introduced to the international watch market in 1950. In production for only five years, it was equipped with the reliable manual-winding Valjoux 72 calibre and characterized by the word "Antimagnetic" on the dial, as well as having both a telemetre and a tachymetre scale. Equipped with smooth bezel and round chronograph buttons, the water-resistant watch with screw back has an elegant and sporty flair. Most examples of the reference were cased in stainless steel or in 18K gold and a small series in 14K gold.

Reference 6238 can be considered the first of the "modern-conception" vintage Rolex chronographs: it is the precursor to one of the most successful chronograph models by any manufacturer, the Daytona, and indeed it is nicknamed by collectors the "Pre-Daytona". Technically, the model already bears nearly all the traits which are present in the subsequent evolutions, the calibre can be 72B or 722, the same found in early Daytona chronographs; the dial layout is virtually the same as reference 6239, and the Oyster chronograph case also bears all the attributes of its future iterations. The main differences are the monochrome dial and, most importantly, the presence of the tachymeter scale on the dial rather than on the bezel (though some examples bearing the scale on the bezel are known).

The present ref. 2442 is an attractive example of the affectionately nicknamed "Banana" model, further distinguished by the rare retailer signature "S&L" for Serpico y Laino, Patek Philippe's representative in Caracas, Venezuela.

Between 1930s and 1950s, Patek Philippe produced a significant number and variety of rectangular wristwatches. In the 1950s, round watches were considered fashionable and chic, production of rectangular watches soon became a rarity, and even more if fitted with a rectangular movement. Patek Philippe ceased production of rectangular movements all together in the 1960s, and it is hardly surprising that even the famous "Pagoda" model is powered by a round movement. Reference 2442 was introduced into the market in 1948 and could be found in Patek Philippe sales catalogues until circa 1960. The majority was cased in yellow gold, few examples in pink gold and only three in platinum are known to scholars thus far. The model features the 9-90 rectangular calibre, reserved exclusively for rectangular Patek Philippe models.

This watch is an exceedingly rare example of a reference 565 in stainless steel, featuring a silvered dial with the much sought after Breguet numerals and luminous dots, all confirmed by the Extract from the Archives. Research has revealed that only nine other examples with this particular configuration have been offered in public to date.


It is fitted with the celebrated calibre 12""SC with indirect centre seconds. The ébauche was the result of Victorin Piguet's and Patek Philippe's collaboration, where the centre seconds mechanism was ingeniously added to the existing 12""120 "subsidiary seconds" movement.

The appeal of this rare ref. 565 is furthermore enhanced by its very good, original overall condition

Reference 565

Reference 565, the first large water-resistant watch featuring a two-piece case with screw back and dust cover, was available with either subsidiary or sweep centre seconds. The first series was launched in 1938 with calibre 12"120, the second with calibre 12"400, such as the present watch, in 1950. The centre seconds version featuring a calibre 12 SCi movement started in 1939, replaced by the new calibre 27 SC as of 1949.

The timelessly modern design of reference 565 served as inspiration for the creation of the 2006 stainless steel inaugural reference 5565.



The property of the same private collector for almost fifteen years, this watch is a charismatic "pink-on-pink" representative of Patek Philippe's first water-resistant chronograph wristwatch, reference 1463. Launched in 1940 and remaining in production until 1965, the pink gold examples of the model are much rarer than those in yellow gold or stainless steel, with only around 50 watches in this exquisite material known publically. Of these, only a handful are fitted with a pulsation dial, very few including the present watch are confirmed by the Extract from the Archives.

The dial plate of this ref. 1463 features Stern Frères' punched number 93 586 2, "93" being Stern's code for Patek Philippe. Although the Extract from the Archives confirms that this watch was indeed originally made with a pulsometer scale dial, the present dial - signed with the post-1948 "short" signature - was probably fitted during the second half of the 1990s, possibly during a servicing at Patek Philippe. It wonderfully completes the pink gold case, with full hard enamel signature including the accent in the "è" of "Genève, the minute and chronograph scales are still beautifully raised. It has evidently been subject only to light cleaning over the years.

The case is well preserved with sharp hallmarks on the side of the upper right lug and the left side of the brushed band, the watch still has its metal dust or humidity cover. As evidenced by the stamped initials FB and the number 11 within a key on the inside of the back, the water-resistant-type case with screw back was made by Taubert, formerly Frères Borgel, a company that specialised in waterproof cases.

The sporty look of this water-resistant chronograph reference 1463 combined with the pink case and champagne-rose dial make this watch a beautiful and wearable piece for any occasion.



Reference 1463

Reference 1463 was launched in 1940 and remained in production until 1965, the case undergoing a number of improvements and changes to its shape over the years. The majority was cased in yellow gold, few examples in pink gold and stainless steel.

Undeniably one of the rarest and best-looking references 130 to be offered at auction in recent years, this charismatic watch cased in white gold is also one of the rarest and most desirable specimen of the legendary model.

Launched in 1934, reference 130 was predominantly cased in yellow gold, pink gold and stainless steel. To date, only one other example in white gold is known to have appeared in public: no. 863′540/640′999, with silvered matte dial, sold at auction in 2002 for CHF2,918,500, at the time a world record for any chronograph wristwatch.

Manufactured in 1939 with "rose dial, raised white gold indexes, tachometer scale" as confirmed by the Extract from the Archives, it is apparent that the present dial has been professionally restored, now showing a highly attractive, two-tone pale salmon-gilt finish with matching pink gold numerals and indexes, the hard enamel elements full and clearly raised, and retaining what are most likely the original hands.

The dial plate is punched 67 3323, 67 being Stern Frères' code for Patek Philippe, 3323 the order number. It is furthermore hand-scratched "Rh 2975" for "rhabillage" or servicing, possibly dating to the 1970s when the dial was most likely restored in the workshops of Stern Frères to its original salmongilt finish.

The exceptionally rare white gold case has been very gently polished, presumably at the same time, leaving both hallmarks clearly visible.

Last offered at auction in 1994 and for many years the cherished property of the same important private collector, this white gold reference 130 must be considered a trophy for the aficionado of outstanding timepieces.


Reference 130

Reference 130, one of Patek Philippe's landmark models, was launched in 1934 and remained in production until the 1960s. Distinguished by its timeless "Calatrava" design, the model was available in different precious metals as well as in stainless steel.

With stunning good looks, a black dial confirmed by the Extract from the Archives and Gobbi Milano retailer's signature – one of only two black dial examples known at auction with the Gobbi signature and the only one of the two examples with confirmed black dial known to date – this exciting watch can be considered as a great treasure for collectors.


Especially well preserved, it remains in excellent overall condition with true hard enamel dial, strong definition to the case and lugs and clear hallmarks on the band between the lower lugs and on the back of the upper left lug.

Among the numerous different variations of the reference 2526, the black enamel dial is the most appreciated because of its incredible rarity and unsurpassed iconic appeal. It is important to note that the present watch sports a true kiln-fired hard enamel dial complete with counter enamel on the reverse, one of the ultimate tenets of collectability for this reference. Enamel dials on any wristwatch are a very special thing, fundamentally time consuming and costly to make they can never be truly mass-made. Their essential rarity naturally adds considerably to their desirability as does the fact that enamel can last indefinitely.

Less than twenty gold cased reference 2526 with black dials have appeared at international auction, of these only a handful are confirmed by the Extract and only one other is known signed by Gobbi Milano.







Reference 2526

Reference 2526 is a legendary model in the history of watchmaking, introduced into the market in 1952. Not only is it the first automatic wristwatch by Patek Philippe, but it is also fitted with one of the best automatic movements ever designed, its performance and accuracy can be considered superior even by today's standards. The legendary calibre 12-600 AT was granted Swiss patent No. 289758 in 1953 for "a self-winding mechanism for a wristwatch movement using the energy supplied by a rotary mass causing an eccentric part to transmit a swinging movement to an organ of the mechanism".

A paragon of understatement and timeless class combined with a state-ofthe art movement, reference 2526 has significantly influenced the popularity of wristwatches featuring enamel dials.

The present watch is one of the trophy pieces of the reference – regarded as a Patek Philippe classic and a true eternal beauty whose appeal is certainly likely to endure.


The overall monochrome white appearance of the entire watch is beautifully harmonizing the matte silver dial with white gold indexes confirmed by the Extract from the Archives, the white gold Dauphine hands perfectly styled to suit the white gold case. Realized with both polished and brushed finishes, the light playing over the surfaces, angles and curves of the case makes use of light and dark, reflection and shadow to brilliant effect.

A trophy for the Patek Philippe collector, this striking and impressive watch provides almost certainly the only opportunity to possess the one known example of a reference 1491 in a white gold case.

Reference 1491

Reference 1491, launched in 1940, is a perfect example of Patek Philippe's continuous search for new and avant-garde innovations, whether in the movement of their watches, or, as in this instance, in the design. The unusual lugs of this model are the progenitor of the new era of watchmaking design that fully dawned in the sixties with unusual case shapes, stepped bezels and fancy lugs.

This superbly preserved "first series" reference 2597 was purchased by the present owner in these rooms in 2004 at which time it was entirely fresh to the market. Stored away ever since in the same important private collection it is now being offered only for the second time at auction.

This ref. 2597 impresses with its outstandingly good, original condition, the case showing little or no signs of polishing, its symmetry, size, angles and hallmarks are a delight to examine. Similarly the dial retains its original finish and sheen, the hard enamel details of the seconds indexes and signature are

beautifully raised and intact. The caliber 12"400 HS movement is as crisp and fresh as the day the watch left Patek Philippe. It would be hard to find another example of the reference 2597 so wonderfully intact and pleasing to the eye.

Combining all the elements a demanding collector looks for, this reference 2597 is furthermore sold with the original certificate, envelope, box and tag, rendering it the perfect trophy for the collector of exceptional timepieces.

Reference 2597

Production of reference 2597 with movement caliber 12"400 HS jumping hours or *heures sautantes* in French was launched in 1958. This ingenious "Time Zone Watch" was designed by the legendary Louis Cottier, Patek Philippe patented it under Swiss Patent 340191 in 1959. With the arrival of transatlantic flights with jet aircraft in the 1950s, the need for a watch showing both local and home time increased. Various attempts were made but none could compete with Louis Cottier's elegant solution. The main problem was the setting of the hours independently of the minutes, allowing travellers to easily and quickly adjustment the hour indication to their local time zone without losing the correct time in minutes.

Cottier's design enabled the moving of the cannon pinion and consequently the hour hand in 12 steps around a 12-pointed star-wheel driven by the motion work. By pushing the two correction buttons in the band, the position of the hand can be changed in either direction by exactly one hour while maintaining its correct relationship to the minute hand.

Reference 2597 was made in two versions, the present watch is from the first series with an independently adjustable hour hand, as described above, the pushers on the left-hand side of the case advance or move back the hour hand in one hour "jumps". The second version, available from about March 1962, featured an additional hour hand.

Ravishingly striking and minimalist, very few Patek Philippe wristwatches are so famous or have been the subject of so much discussion as the so-called "Senza Luna" reference 3448, a perpetual calendar watch without the moon phase indication.

Seven Senza Luna Patek Philippe watches are known to exist, the most famous being the yellow gold "Alan Banbery Senza Luna" which sold for CHF1,840,900 at Sotheby's Geneva in 2008. This watch was accompanied by an Extract from the Archives from Patek Philippe dated 1999 confirming the special dial and the fact the watch was modified within Patek Philippe's workshops after its initial sale in May 1970.

The known facts of the Senza Luna watches are based on the forensic study of each individual timepiece. The existence of the Banbery Senza Luna is the starting point of this discussion and proves that there were 3448s that were modified by Patek Philippe even after they left the Patek Philippe workshops for the first time. The images of this watch, including a detailed image of the movement published in Huber and Banbery's *Patek Philippe Wristwatches*, pages 220-221 clearly exemplifies that Patek Philippe made special orders of the reference 3448 for important clients and in this case an employee of Patek Philippe, Alan Banbery.

Other than the publication of the Banbery book, these prototype pieces were not shared in company literature or advertisements and contribute to the mystery around these watches. Furthermore, their known Extracts from the Archives, except for no. 1'119' 202, do not mention detailed dial descriptions mentioning the fact the watches were modified without the moon phases.

The confirmed proof from Patek Philippe of the Senza Luna legend led to a fever pitch this past summer with the revealing of the Extract from the Archives of the white gold 3448 Senza Luna movement no. 1'119'202 at the Christie's Patek Philippe exhibition in New York. For the first time the public was able to see documented evidence of a Senza Luna from Patek Philippe with the Extract stating that movement number 1'119'202 "does not include a moon phase function."

Sphinx-like, the 3448 "Senza Luna" has to date eluded attempts to fully understand its evolution. Shrouded in mystery, was this moonless dial type a true experimental or prototype product or special client order, or a combination of both?

A groundbreaking academic article published by the online magazine HODINKEE in February 2017 by Cara Barrett titled *In-Depth The Curious Case Of The Patek Philippe Reference 3448 'Senza Luna'* opened a public dialogue on the question of the Senza Luna and gave these watches an almost mythical status in the public eye. This article is not to be missed in exploring their multiple facets and their place in the pantheon of Patek Philippe collecting.



Reference 3448 - White Gold "Senza Luna" - A Patek Philippe Legend





The "Senza Luna" History

A total of six (excluding the "Alan Banbery") watches are known publicly with "Senza Luna" dials: three in white gold, three in yellow gold. The majority, as far as is known from existing Extracts from the Archives, are originally described as having a moon phase indication. It is therefore assumed that all were later modified – it is really a question of "when".


Several theories abound in relation to the conception of the "Senza Luna" and with each of the seven watches the question of when the pieces were modified is a subject of academic debate. It is certain that clients could order Patek Philippe watches on special request and many dials were made for Patek Philippe to test new concepts and design aesthetics. In a pre-digital age, the very existence of a watch such as a Senza Luna on Alan Banbery's wrist would have had the inner circle of Patek Philippe collectors buzzing. His watch, as a brand ambassador, was sure to inspire others to own something similar.

Among the six known Senza Luna watches (the seventh being the "Alan Banbery" with the deviation of the perpetual calendar indication), the key is to try to identify which pieces were likely to have been modified by Patek Philippe in-house and which were possibly changed outside their workshops. A forensic study of each individual piece is required to make an opinion of each of them.

The study of the presently offered watch, no. 1'119'585, has led to forming a probable scenario for its production. Focusing in detail in an analytical way and with knowledge of production and sale dates it can be concluded that it is very likely that it has been modified within the Patek Philippe workshops.

What is evident immediately on examination of the case is that the moon phase corrector is still present on the band between the lower lugs – a feature of all seven known examples each with cases made for Patek Philippe by celebrated casemaker Antoine Gerlach. Upon removal of the dial, the moon phase mechanism is still extant, although without the moon disc. That the watch has been modified is not in question, but was this done by Patek Philippe? To attempt to answer this key question it is necessary to look at the known history of the movement itself - number 1'119'585, caliber 27-460 Q, made in 1981.

Fascinatingly, based on the movement number, this was the last reference 3448 ever made. The next consecutive movement number 1'119'586 was the first ever watch of the reference 3450 also of course made in 1981. That particular watch (sold by Christie's on 12 May 2014, lot 440) was, significantly, a highly unusual and possibly unique "hybrid" - being the first reference 3450 but still fitted with the caliber 27-460 Q of the reference 3448 and therefore without the leap year indication that typifies the reference 3450, which was from then on fitted with the next generation 27-460 QB (Quantième Bissextile) with "red dot" or Roman leap year indication.



It is relevant to the "Senza Luna" as it demonstrates that at the exact moment in 1981 when the present "Senza Luna" was in the Patek Philippe workshops, the company was at a crucial stage of experimentation during the transition period between the references 3448 and 3450. It is also worth considering that in 1981 nobody would have known whether the new reference 3450 was going to be a success or not and consequently this "Senza Luna" was perhaps a trial or test piece for a planned non-moon perpetual calendar watch that never came into production. Lending credence to this theory, the present watch was not sold until the end of January 1982 meaning that for at least several months it remained in the factory workshops, hence allowing plenty of time for modifications to take place before its sale.

Patek Philippe made several watches with perpetual calendar modifications (with/without moon, with/without leap-year indication etc.) based around the 3448 and new 3450 cases at this period. Apparently, these pieces were one-offs and occasionally special orders used to gauge market potential for watches being considered for development.

The dial of the presently offered watch is in itself a work of art preserved in remarkable condition. The reverse of the dial is inscribed "OR" (French for gold) indicating it is of Geneva manufacture and a special alloy white gold used for watch dials and for jewellery. The subtle low-gloss finish, white gold "lapped" baton and pyramidal indexes, raised hard enamel signature with accented "e" and date numerals also in hard enamel is pure Patek Philippe in feel and execution.

Interestingly, the dials of the Senza Lunas are all slightly different from each other in both appearance and construction, including orientation of the date numerals and size of the indexes. The serial movement numbers range from 1'119'014 – the earliest known on a watch dating from circa 1965 - to 1'119'585, the present watch dating from 1981.

The watch offered here for sale, no. 1'119'585, was first publicly seen at Antiquorum in Geneva on 24 April 2004 when it was sold to its actual owner for CHF686,500. Unknown to the market beforehand, it is the only example of the three known white gold Senza Lunas to be born without a bracelet.

The (re-)appearance of this watch at auction gives the true Patek Philippe connoisseur the rare opportunity to acquire a timepiece of almost mythical status. Regardless, or perhaps because of the mysteries surrounding its production, the present watch is surely one of the most legendary timepieces associated with Patek Philippe.

The present "Grand Complication" is believed to be the only second example of the special order series ref. 5033P-001 with Roman numerals to appear in public to date, impressively demonstrating its extreme rarity.

It is preserved in excellent overall condition and represents the scarce opportunity of acquiring one of the only 10 examples of this particular model ever made.

Launched in 2002 as a special order of only 10 watches in platinum and 1 in titanium it is Patek Philippe's first "Grande Complication" wristwatch combining a minute repeating and the patented annual calendar mechanism. The watches are distinguished by the specially made two-tone silvered dials with engine-turned centre and the elongated black Roman numerals.

Its celebrated calibre R27 PS QA, one of the firm's most complex movements, comprises 483 individual parts and incorporates the "Cathedral" repeating mechanism, consisting of a high-tone and a low-tone gong. The length of the gong in a standard repeating mechanism corresponds to almost precisely one turn in the movement whereas those of the "Cathedral" mechanism exceed the case circumference by at least one and a half,

even two turns. Consequently, a much richer and fuller timbre is achieved, resembling the chime of the bells of a cathedral.

Patek Philippe's annual calendar mechanism, patented in 1996, requires to be adjusted only once a year, on 1st March.

The combination of rarity, finest craftsmanship and the elegant minimalist understatement design render this ref. 5033P-001 a fine trophy for the collector of exceptional timepieces.

The "Anakin Skywalker" Seamaster chronograph garnered its nickname from its large case and unusual dial, reminiscent of something found in a science fiction movie. The multi-colored dial features an outer white tachymeter scale. This Seamaster chronograph is an extremely bold and unique product of the 1970s. The same reference with black PVD case was nicknamed 'Dark Vador'

The so called "Baby Anakin" large Seamaster, also known as the "Giant", has often been closely associated to the similar 'Anakin Skywalker' chronograph model due to the 44mm Tungsten case coating as well as its unique shape. The chronograph version is thicker and longer however. This simpler version has therefore often been nicknamed the 'Baby Anakin' or 'Baby Skywalker' among collectors, even if it remains an oversized wristwatch, which also earned it its first nickname.

In 1978, a new NASA spacecraft, the Space Shuttle, called for retesting of all equipment to be used on board and therefore Omega submitted three different watches for qualification. All developments centered on the Space Shuttle qualification were code-named "ALASKA III" by Omega. Proposals included the Speedmaster Professional reference ST 145.022, a prototype Speedmaster reference 11 003 successfully sold at Christie's "Omega Speedmaster 50" in December 2015 in New York, and the present reference ST 188.0002: the Speedsonic f 300 Hz Chronometer.

All three models were successful and qualified, although the ultimate choice was once again the Speedmaster Professional that in 1978 became qualified for all manned space flights.

This Speedsonic has a calibre 1255: a hybrid movement of quartz and mechanical with a tuning fork that was licensed by Bulova to Omega. As part of the Alaska project series, this model is encased in a specially commissioned American-made watch case. OMEGA commissioned Star Watch Case Company of Michigan to produce cases for the watches destined for the qualification process. This was done to comply with an official part of the procurement rules called "Buy American Act" that called for 50% of the product's value program to be American-made.



The present watch is a fine examples of an early military chronograph made by Minerva, standing out by its very good overall condition.

Founded in 1858 by Charles-Yvan Robert and Hyppolite Robert of Villeret, what would eventually become the Minerva Watch brand in 1887, was initially a "tablisseurs" of watches, an assembler of watches from parts manufactured elsewhere. It wasn't until 1902, under the leadership of C. Robert's sons, Charles-Auguste and Georges-Louis, that Minerva became a watch manufacturer with own engineering workshops.

The earliest Minerva wristwatch was made in 1909, but the watch company's greatest success came in 1923 with the introduction of the calibre 20, a movement that perfectly illustrates the classic and refined architecture of wrist chronographs of that era, with the iconic "V"-shaped bridge, column-wheel mechanism, a Breguet balance-spring and 17 jewels. With the launch of this watch, the company earned its reputation as a manufacturer of complicated movements of exceptional quality. Minerva was bought by the luxury goods group Richemont in 2006.





This remarkable Compax chronograph is very attractive, as most examples are usually seen with a silvered dial, the present chronograph bears a black dial cased in a large 46 mm stainless steel case with fixed lugs. This Omega Seamaster cal. 286 ref. 135.004 was produced in the mid-1960s for the Pakistani Air Force. The Railmaster designation implied a bad reputation given the past history.

The Omega Railmaster was designed for professionals such as scientists, technicians and electricians working within close distance of powerful electric currents. This antimagnetic tool watch has a special 1mm (instead of 0.4mm) thick matt black dial and anti-magnetic iron cover inserted between the case back and the movement. This Faraday cage rendered the watch resistant to 1'000 Gauss.


According to scholars, Omega supplied the Pakistani Air Force with two different Railmaster references:

The first in 1960, reference CK 917-5, featuring older broad-arrow hands, counting approximately 250-300 pieces.

The second in 1964, reference 135.004, featuring baton hands in two batches: the first with an estimated total of less than 100 pieces had a serial number of 20'476'XXX such as the present watch. The second batch with an estimated 100 - 200 pieces had a serial number of 21'087'XXX.

The Guillaume Balance

In 1899, Dr. Charles Edouard Guillaume noted that steel with an addition of 44.4% nickel had a negative square coefficient of thermal expansion. The new alloy, called "Anibal" exhibits unusual properties both in terms of thermal expansion and in changes in elasticity. Anibal, combined with brass in bimetallic laminae, makes expansion close to quadratic. Balances with bimetallic rims made of anibal and brass are usually called Guillaume balances after their inventor.

This exceedingly rare chronograph is from the second series of this first ever Speedmaster production, bearing the reference 2915-2. It is notable for its original condition and even brown tropicalized dial. With so few early reference 2915-1 and 2915-2 examples known to the market, particularly retaining the original steel bezel and correct hands, this presents a rare opportunity to purchase an extraordinary original 'broad arrow' Speedmaster.

Launched in 1957, the celebrated Omega "Speedmaster" was the creation of Pierre Moinat, head of Omega's "creative" department, with the case designed by Claude Baillod and the prototype made by George Hartmann. The watch was originally destined for "men who reckon time in seconds", i.e. automobile racers, athletes, engineers and scientists, the tachymetre scale engraved on the bezel allowing the calculation of speed at a glimpse, hence the name "Speedmaster". As the thought of men on the moon was still in the realm of science fiction at the time, it was only later that it became the "Moon Watch".

Even before its conquest of space, the "Speedmaster" was and still is one of the most iconic watches in production and can be considered the progenitor of the water-resistant sports chronograph. The most important improvement is unquestionably the tachymeter scale on the bezel as opposed to being printed on the dial, hence rendering the dial more legible while simplifying the calculation of speed. In the years to come, this revolutionary feature was incorporated by most other watch manufacturers, notably by Rolex when introducing the "Daytona" in the 1960s.

The original "Speedmaster Broad Arrow" ref. CK 2915 such as the present watch has a 39 mm. water-resistant case with engraved steel bezel graduated to 300 km/h, its principle characteristics, the "Broad Arrow" shaped hands, and the calibre 321 movement protected by an anti-magnetic soft iron cap. The dial exhibits some very distinctive features such as the applied metal "Omega" logo as opposed to the printed version, the "Omega" signature in a different font, appearing smaller and thinner, the letters "O" and "G" almost oval in shape, and the simple "Swiss Made" below 6 o'clock, without the "T" designation.

In 1959, the model became ref. 2998, the "Broad Arrow" hands were replaced with "Alpha" hands and the engraved steel bezel by the version with black insert graduated to 500 km/h.

The "Speedmaster Broad Arrow" is described and illustrated in Marco Richon's *Omega - A Journey Through Time*, pp. 596 - 597, *Omega Saga*, pp. 372 - 374, *Omega Sportswatches* by John Goldberger, pp. 95 - 107, where it is prominently featured on the cover and in *Moonwatch Only*, Rossier & Marquié, pp. 246 - 247.

It is an extremely rare event when an historic Omega watch specifically produced for testing purposes and actually worn as part of a famous mission is offered for sale on the open market. It becomes even more exciting when that watch is a super-stylish early 60s diver's watch and the mission was headed by legendary oceanographer Jacques-Yves Cousteau (1910-1997). This watch can certainly be regarded as one of, if not the most desirable of all Seamaster 300 watches in private hands.

The present watch was used by Jacques-Yves Cousteau's team during the underwater experiment Precontinent II conducted in the Red Sea in July 1963, where a "station" and a "main house" were immersed. The "station" immersed to a depth of 25 metres and supplied with a mixture of helium and oxygen, sheltered two men for seven days. The starfish-shaped "main house" immersed at a depth of 11 metres

and supplied with air sheltered five men for one month. The undersea colony was supported with water, food, power, and all other essentials of life, from a large support team above. In the 1960s Jacques Cousteau was involved with a set of three projects to build underwater "villages", funded in part by the French petrochemical industry, the projects were named Precontinent I, Precontinent II and Precontinent III. Each ensuing project was aimed at increasing the depth at which people continuously lived under water, and were an attempt at creating an environment in which men could live and work on the sea floor. The projects are best known as Conshelf I (1962), Conshelf II (1963), and Conshelf III (1965). The names "Precontinent", and "Continental Shelf Station" (Conshelf) were used interchangeably by Cousteau. Conshelf Two is documented in Jacques Cousteau's 1964 documentary film World Without Sun.







Confirming that the present Seamaster 300 was officially supplied, it may be noted that the movement - Omega caliber 552, has a most unusual serial number: 00000554. Confirmed by the certificate, this is because the movement was issued from a special batch reserved only for testing purposes. Such movements were pretested to very high tolerances in the factory and then fitted into watches supplied to expeditions and for events where they could be field-tested being subjected to extreme and prolonged "reallife" situations. The results obtained after the watches had been put through their paces were in turn invaluable to Omega in the development of ever more reliable and consistently performing tool watches.

The Seamaster 300 has been the choice of many of the world's most famous explorers and divers over the years. The "Professional" range of Seamaster watches was introduced in 1957 with the launch of the Seamaster 300 using the caliber 28 SC-501 movement. In 1962 the present model was introduced "specially designed for professionals and underwater sports' lovers alike" fitted with the caliber 552 movement, matt black oxidized dial with large luminous hour markers, stainless steel case with Speedmaster-type lugs and reinforced crystal, the back featuring the Seahorse medallion and inscribed "Certified High Pressure Waterproof Seamaster"

This reference 325 is a very attractive example of the legendary "Portugieser model, impressing with its very good, original overall condition, fully serviced by IWC in Schaffhausen in 2015 and ready to wear.

In the late 1930s, IWC received a rather unusual order from a customer in Portugal who requested a wristwatch with the same size and accuracy of a pocket watch. To comply with his request, IWC chose their at the time slimmest and most reliable calibre 74 movement and cased it in stainless steel. With its impressive diameter of 43 mm, the Portuguese (Portugieser in German) was considered enormous compared to wristwatches popular at the time, not corresponding to the Zeitgeist of the period, more oriented towards smaller, Art Deco style watches. As a consequence, only a very limited series of the model was made.

Its main design features are a sober, easy to read streamlined dial with Arabic numbers, a slender bezel to make the watch look even larger, leaf hands and a large subsidiary seconds dial at six o'clock. Although IWC used a variation of dial layouts, hands and numerals, the most common combination was a silvered dial with embossed Arabic numerals and leaf ("feuilles de sauge") hands. The majority of the Portugieser watches made during the 1940s and 1950s was fitted with calibre 98, an upgraded version of the original calibre 74.

The Portugieser, the first wristwatch using a pocket watch movement, can be considered a precursor of today's large size wristwatches. A legend and classic amongst collectors, the revolutionary model is one of IWC's signature pieces and the obvious choice to celebrate the company's 125th anniversary in 1993 with the launch of a limited edition of total 1000 examples. Since then, the "Portugieser" series of watches comprising nearly every conceivable horological complication has been one of IWC's most successful lines





It is in fact believed to be one of only two examples ever made with this configuration, furthermore, it is the first of the two known watches to be conceived, the direct result of the client's original idea and commission.

Special order watches were almost never made for individual clients requesting only one watch, a fact which makes the present Day-Date and its stablemate completely exceptional. Entirely made of 18K white gold, it is truly a special-order piece, the dial and bezel are not merely adapted from existing parts but manufactured specifically for this watch and therefore of great significance in the history of Rolex.

Ordered by the father of the present owner from Klarlund in Copenhagen, the largest and most prestigious Rolex agent in Scandinavia, he preferred the luxury of the Day-Date model but wanted a watch that would be equally suitable to wear whilst matching his favourite hobby, sailing. Once the client's requirements were noted, remarkably Rolex agreed to make the watch he desired as a "one-off" piece. The watch was completed and apparently delivered to Klarlund at the end of 1969. Quite by chance, on the day that the client came to collect his special Rolex a very important Royal client of Klarlund was at the shop. He examined and admired the then unique piece and immediately asked if another could be made for him. Consequently, two examples are thought to exist.

The documented service history of the present watch shows that it was serviced by Rolex agent Klarlund in Copenhagen on four occasions from the 1970s to 1990s, first in 1976, again in 1978 and then in 1994 and 1996. In 2017 it was fully overhauled by Rolex in Geneva thus confirming its correctness officially. On 7 April 2017 the watch was collected from their headquarters by its owner in the presence of a Christie's representative and taken directly to Christie's offices in Geneva in order to be prepared for the auction. To further support its unique history the watch will be sold with a large amount of original photos, magazines etc. showing the original owner wearing it, dating from the early 1970s until 2005.

In the course of Rolex's production history the company has made extremely few watches as special request orders, particularly when such orders were from an individual and that additionally required some components to be specially made. As a rule, Rolex has only made such watches in series and for large companies or organizations, for example the Comex Submariners and Sea-Dwellers and more recently the special edition for members of the British SAS. The watches made for the Sultan of Oman can also be included in this category.

The present watch differs significantly from the standard production reference 1803 Day-Date, specifically, the dial, hands and bezel are evidently custom-made only for this special-order version:

Dial: "Submariner-style" matte black with large luminous dot and baton indexes, the luminous dots at eleven and one o'clock truncated to accommodate the day of the week window. White painted signature with wide space between the second and third lines, white painted minute divisions. Without "Swiss" designation at 6 o'clock.

Hands: luminous steel "Mercedes" hands normally only fitted to the sports models such as the Explorer, Submariner, Sea-Dweller, GMT-Master etc.

Bezel: inclined smooth and polished bezel normally reserved for the platinum version of the Day-Date instead of the normal "faceted" bezel of the Ref. 1803 model in gold or stainless steel. According to the present owner, after analysis of the gold composition Rolex confirmed verbally that the bezel was made at the same time as the watch and of the same material.

Of extraordinary rarity and preserved in excellent overall condition, this Day-Date "Submariner" presents a one-off opportunity for the avid collector to acquire one of the extremely scarce "special order" Rolex watches.

Part of the early Submariners, the present reference 6536-1 was manufactured in 1955 and is among the most desirable and sought-after examples of the model.

Created in a stainless steel case with a small non-protected crown, the timepiece was manufactured with a rotating bezel with black insert, a black dial with gilt printing, Swiss script and gold hands.

Seen on extremely rare occasions, the dial of this watch is not only preserved in excellent overall condition but features the very rare and coveted red 100/330 depth rating. Appearing on the earliest examples of the reference, such as the present watch with a case back stamped 6536-1 IV. 55 indicating that it was made in the fourth part of 1955.

It can safely be assumed that Rolex tested a rating indication in red, without mentioning feet of meters before finally settling on the white "100 = 330ft" found on later models.

A highlight for the connoisseur of rare timepieces, this Submariner is preserved in very appealing overall condition. A compelling example of the model, the original two-line gilt gloss dial is in fantastic untouched condition having aged absolutely beautifully. The gilt signature and minute track have turned a ravishing dark orange-copper colour and in addition the gloss lacquer has crazed throughout. The original hands including the painted "lollipop" seconds hand are equally beautifully aged further amplifying the collectability and aesthetic impact of the timepiece. The present watch is a fascinating study in tropical Rolex dials and how each example presents an opportunity to learn about how the different types of printing and materials can age in a variety of ways.

Reference 6538 was in production from 1955 to around 1959, it is characterized by a gloss dial with gilt designations, large 8 mm. "Brevet" crown, and a slighter thinner case design than its forefather the Ref. 6200, thanks to the new thinner calibre 1030. Early models, such as the present watch, are distinguished by a closed minute ring and lollipop seconds hand (with big luminous dot).

Among the most recognizable Submariner models, reference 6538 is also known as "James Bond", as it was present on the wrist of the most elegant spy in the world in two different movies: "Dr. No", 1962 (on a leather strap) and "Goldfinger", 1964 (on a Nato nylon strap).



The watch offered here for sale is a highly attractive example of a Submariner reference 5513 from the 1960s, featuring the rare and much sought-after black gloss "Swiss underline dial" and the so-called "Cornino" case. The attentive observer will notice the small silvered line underneath the designation "Oyster Perpetual". It is thought that Rolex produced such underline dials to indicate to use of tritium only around 1963-1964, presumably on watches bearing serial numbers ranging from 950'000 to 1'100'000 These dials were characterized by a small silvered line underneath the designation Submariner or the word Oyster Perpetual.

The present unrestored black gloss dial with the attractive gilt printing, also a characteristic of the early reference 5513 models, must be regarded as the ultimate art in dial manufacturing since they reveal a rich complexity of different layers applied to the metal base. In fact, the gilt writing and minute markings are not printed on the black background but are underneath and shine through in negative relief. However to further enhance its sophistication, the silvered underline is superimposed and printed onto the black background. The luminous material to numerals and hands is original and displays an attractive ivory colour from age.





Moreover, the watch features pointed crown guards, affectively called "cornino" or small horn by Italian Rolex aficionados, another typical feature of Submariner watches produced between 1962 and 1964. All later versions were fitted with the now standard rounded crown guard shoulders.

The very good overall condition of the present ref. 5513 is demonstrated by the full body of its case and the sharp angles to the facets of the lugs, showing that it has never been subject to careless polishing. Its homogenically bleached bezel, also the correct version featuring the silvered triangle, now displays a rich grey tone, enhancing the appealing look of this rare timepiece. The riveted Oyster bracelet reference is contemporary to the watch and likewise preserved in very good overall condition.

Reference 5513 was launched in 1962 and depth rated to 200 meters (660 feet), fitted with the 8 mm. crown and pointed crown guards. The non-chronometer version used the same dial as the early reference 5512. The bezel displays minute divisions for the first fifteen minutes and has a silver triangle. The dials are black gloss and have gilt printing. As of 1964, the designation "Swiss T<25" was added to the bottom of the dial. In the late 1960s the dials changed to feature all-white printing.

Nicknamed "Explorer Three-Six-Nine" dial in reference to the Explorer I family, wristwatches with such unusual and rare combinations are highly coveted by astute collectors and to be found on a limited amount of references other than the Explorer. Last reference known to feature this design, the reference 5513 later evolved to feature the more common baton and round marker design making the present timepiece a very rare sighting at auction.

With a very charismatic look, the dial of the timepiece will surprise through its unrestored condition. Due to the very nature of the submariner model, it is has become increasingly difficult to find examples of the period with unrestored dials, as many would have been exposed throughout the years to external elements such as humidity, water or dust. Complementing the overall appeal of the timepiece, the stainless steel case displays strong proportions and is allied with the correct case back stamped 5513 and III. 64, indication a production in the third part of year 1964.

Launched in 1967, the celebrated Sea-Dweller reference 1665 was the first wristwatch designed for use in saturation diving. Immediately recognizable by the bakelite bezel insert with twenty-four hour markings printed on its underside, the present example of the GMT-Master reference 6542 is offered by an important collector and impresses by the color of its dial. Of high appeal, the dial has changed over time to a magnificent metallic brown tone. This phenomenon is commonly known as tropicalization and can result in changing the color of a dial to a different color, which can be any shade from dark chocolate to a light brown.





Created in 1954 following Pan Am's request, the Rolex reference 6542 is the first GMT reference, and the beginning of one of the most legendary and appreciated wristwatch lineage. Landmark in the history of Rolex, the timepiece was commissioned by Pan Am in order for their pilots to manage the negative effects of jet-lag due to the increased speed of intercontinental flights. The timepiece was developed with a second hand, enabling its wearer to keep track of both the local time and the time in their home time zone. The watch was also crafted with an anti-reflective bakelite bezel graduated for 24 hours, which would prevent glaring during flights and therefore limit interferences with navigation.

Nicknamed by collectors "Pussy Galore", following the character in the James Bond movie "Goldfinger", the popularity of the GMT-Master reference 6542 has steadily increased throughout the years. One of the most globally recognized and appreciated timepieces, the desirability of the present wristwatch is further enhanced by the beauty and rarity of its dial.



GMT-Master

Due to the extraordinary success of the Rolex Sports models in the 1950s, it came as no surprise when the world's largest airline, Pan Am, commissioned a specially designed watch allowing their pilots to keep track of time in two locations.

With the beginning of transatlantic flights with jet aircrafts in 1956, travellers appreciated the fact that the journey times were reduced from 13 hours to 7 but suffered from new phenomena, jet lag. Worried about the possible effects on their pilots and, after research, Pan Am management advised them to keep on "home" time while away from base. As at the same time they needed to know the local time, a joint Pan Am and Rolex task force was assigned. The team devised a watch with an additional hour hand, which revolved once every 24 hours, and a rotating bezel marked with those same 24 hours. The model was named "G.M.T.-Master" after the world's standard time, the Greenwich Mean Time.

The first GMT model, reference 6542, was launched in 1954 and was immediately recognizable by the bright acrylic or bakelite bezel insert with the twenty-four hour markings printed to its underside. This material was chosen to reduce reflection so as not to disturb the pilots. The bezel ring was also made of acrylic and coated in an alloy to resemble metal. It turned out that the flexibility of this material could cause the bezel insert to break and that in very warm environments the printing would often flake off. Consequently, Rolex decided to replace the acrylic insert with a more resistant metal version.

Mainly cased in stainless steel, the few examples of the early GMT Master series in gold and with the original bakelite bezel, such as the present watch, are highly coveted trophies for the avid collector.

Fresh to the market and preserved in remarkable condition, this stunning reference 6542 is one of the most exclusive and attractive examples of the first GMT-Master model in gold to appear in public in recent years. Its rarity is enhanced by the original bakelite bezel, correct hands and crown. Furthermore, it is accompanied by the original Guarantee from Pearce Sons Ltd. of Leicester, England, a highly prestigious jewellers established in 1838.

The present reference 6542 is a particularly charismatic representative of this celebrated model, the Bakelite bezel lends a third dimension and depth to the case, it is very rare to find one in such good condition, as the material itself is relatively fragile. The profile of the lugs demonstrates the subtle faceted edges so often polished or worn away over the years. The dial features the highly attractive so-called nipple indexes and the rare small arrow for the 24-hour indication - the famous "freccino". Not only is this configuration is much rarer, but the "freccino", with its much more discreet proportions compared to the full-sized arrow, has the effect of making the entire watch look more distinguished and refined, especially when coupled with the gold case and brown dial, without changing the inherent aesthetic of the GMT-Master model. The overall look is striking with one of the most beautiful colour contrasts ever achieved on any post war wristwatch. Its sporty yet not bulky proportions let it shine on any collectors' wrist.



According to research approximately thirteen examples of the gold reference 6542 with bakelite bezel are known publically. Including the present watch, only eleven have appeared at international auction in the last twenty years, two further examples are illustrated in: 100 Superlative Rolex Watches, John Goldberger, p. 192.

The serial numbers of the thirteen known watches fall into three distinct groups:

367'383 - 367'399 - four examples dating from 1958;

424'243 – 424'304 – three examples including the present watch dating from



Rolex watches embellished with a cloisonné enamel dial are amongst the rarest and most highly desirable prizes of all. Usually only six pieces of each design were ever made, the present watch being one of the fabled "dragon" designs made for Rolex by Stern Frères in collaboration with the enamel artist Mrs Nelly Richard.

Consigned by a descendant of the original owner, the fresh to the market provenance furthermore renders this masterpiece one of the most appealing "time only" Rolex wristwatches of all with a dial still as beautiful and vibrant as the day it was made over sixty years ago.







After decades of use with a leather strap, the serial number between the lugs is almost worn away. However, under high-power magnification, the trained eye can decipher some of the numbers ?852?8.

In the absence of a fully readable serial number, a likely date of manufacture of 1952 can be deduced after comparison with the other known watches with the "dragon" cloisonné dial from the same series. Interestingly the "dragon" dials are fitted to watches of varying references but all with serial numbers dating them to 1952. Most conclusively, the dials (where known) including the present watch are stamped on the back beneath the counter enamel with the same Stern code number 103 for Rolex and 770 which is the specific order number for the "dragon" design.

The inside of the case back of the present watch is stamped with reference 6098 which has been erased with four horizontal lines in typical fashion and correct reference 6099 engraved beneath. This was necessary because reference 6098 has a smooth polished bezel whereas 6099 has an engineturned bezel. The case backs were of course interchangeable between the two references and the renumbering of the reference was done for accuracy.

Stern Frères

Founded in 1868, Stern Frères specialized in the production of highest quality dials including dials decorated with cloisonné enamel scenes which were supplied to eminent watch manufacturers.

The celebrated Nelly Richard worked for Stern Frères from the late 1940s until the 1950s, she executed the majority of the most famous cloisonné enamel dials featuring Neptune, dragons and maps commissioned not only by Rolex but also by Omega, Patek Philippe, Vacheron Constantin and others.

The production of these solid gold dials was extremely costly as they had to be individually made by a skilled craftsman and not on a production line. The artist created the outline of the desired motif by arranging thin gold wires on a dial. These partitions, called "cloisonné" in French, were filled with small quantities of enamel powder in the desired colour. The dial was then fired in an oven at around 900 degrees Celsius causing the powder to melt. Finally it was hand-polished until a perfectly flat surface was obtained. Hand-made by celebrated enamel artists, notably Nelly Richard and Marguerite Koch, these dials can be regarded as unique works of art in their own right.

Very attractive chronograph, the reference 3695 is a very uncommon finding at international auctions.

Introduced in 1940, the wristwatch was developed for an extremely short amount of time and is part of the rarest chronographs produced by the manufacture. Preserved with the upmost care throughout the years, the timepiece was consigned by the descendant of the original owner and features a very attractive dial with two slightly sunken and engine-turned subsidiary registers, as well as a tachymeter scale with clear writings. In astounding overall condition, the elegance of the dial of and overall appeal of the timepiece is enhanced through the contemporary sized 18K gold case, which retains attractive proportions and clear legible coronet, serial and reference numbers to its case back.

Considering its rarity, overall condition and provenance, the present chronograph represents a rare opportunity for astute collectors to acquire an attractive and important timepiece of the Rolex manufacture.

The present watch is not only beautifully preserved and very attractive, it also has the distinction of being an extremely rare and highly desirable example of a French cased Rolex pink gold triple calendar chronograph. Only a handful of these French cased special pieces are known publically across all references and complicated models such as this watch are the rarest of all.

The reason for the existence of the "French case" is that in the climate of political instability during the immediate post-war period the French government forbade the buying of gold from any source except the French state, furthermore it was forbidden to import any finished articles in gold. This included watch cases and so a very small number of examples of both Rolex and Patek watches can be can occasionally be found with unsigned cases bearing French hallmarks from this period.

This fascinating anomaly is an important part of Rolex's manufacturing history and, like all great Rolex rarities, it has become highly desirable to the collector.

Of impressive quality, the present wristwatch distinguishes itself through its rare and attractive cream exotic "Paul Newman" dial and accompanying Rolex Guarantee dated 10 January 1972. With an attractive case of striking proportions, the timepiece is assembled with the iconic Valjoux movement caliber 722-1 and a bezel graduated to 200 units, made standard for the reference in 1967 once brought down from 300 units, all corresponding with the serial number of the timepiece.

Introduced during the 1960s, the Rolex Cosmograph was named following the fervor surrounding outer space travel. Later bearing the inscription Daytona, due to Rolex's involvement with the celebrated International Speedway, the popularity of the chronograph soared throughout the years, leading it to become an icon and source of great fascination.

With the ending production of the reference 6238, the 6239 differed through its metallic bezel with engraved tachometer scale enhancing the legibility of the bi-color dial. Built with two push down chronograph buttons, the timepiece was assembled in stainless steel, 14 or 18K gold.

With the ending production of the reference 6238, the Cosmograph was subject to research in order to enhance its commercial appeal. It is around 1967 that the fist chronographs, such as the present example, were provided with exotic dials bearing a new tridimensional graphic layout.



Diverting from standard dials, the background of the outer fifths of a second division marched the subsidiary registers, both slightly sunken with regards to the central surface of the dial. Furthermore, square shaped hour indexes were applied instead of the common baton indexes.

Originally offered to customers as an alternative, "exotic" dials arose to fame once the celebrated actor Paul Newman was seen wearing a Daytona chronograph with such a dial in a publicity shoot. Following their discontinuation, Rolex chronographs with "exotic" dials have become undisputed icons in the world of vintage watch collecting and timepieces retaining such an attractive condition as well as their guarantee have become part of the most prized trophies for astute collectors.

Making a striking visual impact, the dial merges beautifully with the case through its complementary colours and impresses through its clean and original condition.

With a highly appealing 18K gold case of strong proportions, this timepiece has been preserved throughout the years with the utmost care, displaying mark 1 bezel, sharp gold marks beneath two lugs and a crisp French Rolex importation stamp on the case back beneath a transparent service sticker from long ago. The French Rolex importation marks "Sté\"R" for "Société Rolex" seen here are only found in a few very rare instances. Most importantly, identical marks are found on another reference 6241, with John Player Special dial and retailed by Hermès, sold at Christie's Geneva in May 2013 and bearing serial number 1'947'352 - only 17 numbers away from the serial number of the present watch. The close correlation between the serial numbers of these two "sister" watches indicates that at least two of this model and perhaps others, were specifically sent to France to be retailed in Paris

Produced between 1966 and 1969, the reference 6241 was built with a black acrylic bezel with white tachymeter scale, push down buttons and housed either the 72B Valjoux caliber, 722 or the 722-1 variations. The production of the reference 6241 amounts to roughly 2,300 pieces in stainless steel with possibly less than 700 crafted with gold cases. Out of the examples crafted in gold, even less were fitted with Paul Newman dials either in gold or in this case, black. Of the utmost rarity, the reference 6241 with black 'John Player Special' dial hardly ever surfaces at auction and always attracts the interest of the most esteemed Rolex collectors.

Nicknamed "John Player Special", after the Formula One car of the Brazilian legend Ayrton Senna. Regarded as one of the most beautiful racing vehicles of all time, the car of Team Lotus sported the John Player Special livery made of black with contrasting gilt details and trimmings. Synonymous with elegance and charm, the nickname was an easy fit with this black and gold Rolex Paul Newman.



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
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














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
