

This fine watch was given to John Roosevelt by Ellen Crosby Roosevelt, daughter of John Aspinwall Roosevelt and Ellen Murray Crosby. John Aspinwall Roosevelt was the younger brother of James Roosevelt, Franklin D. Roosevelt's father. The watch belonged to Jacobus Roosevelt (1692-1776) great-great-great grandfather of Franklin D. Roosevelt. Jacobus Roosevelt was the founder of the Hyde Park branch, the grandson of the first Roosevelt to arrive in America in 1649 and father of Isaac Roosevelt, Revolutionary patriot. Isaac Roosevelt was a founder and president of the Bank of New York and a member of the State Convention which ratified The Constitution of the United States. The watch was on exhibition at the Franklin D. Roosevelt Library from 1945 until 1967. It still has its inventory number 46-108-1.

Many collectors of vintage *Heuer* chronographs from the 1960s and 1970s are attracted by the company's rich association with professional motorsports demonstrated during that period. The present Autavia is the embodiment of this notable history. It was presented to the legendary driver Marvin Panch upon his victory in the 1965 Atlanta 500 race, part of the NASCAR Grand National Series. Panch won the race in a 1965 Ford Galaxie. You can practically smell the gasoline and hear the roar of the engines when holding this exceptional piece of horological and motor history.

This Autavia was presented to the winner of the race in association with "Motor Age", a magazine with an emphasis on automotive service industry professionals that began in 1899 and continues to this day. To the best of our knowledge, this may be a unique dial with the "Motor Age" logo. Furthermore, that logo is placed where the "SWISS" is traditionally located, so the dial does not feature "SWISS", perhaps intentionally since the watch was destined for the American market.

Furthermore, the watch is preserved in absolutely outstanding condition, with an excellent dial, hands, and case. This Autavia could be identified as part of the "Second Execution" run with large luminous circles located outside the hour markers and dauphine hands.

Marvin Panch was a legendary and successful American stock car racing driver who famously won the 1961 Daytona 500 as well as 16 other NASCAR Grand National events over his 17-year career. In 1998, Panch was named one of NASCAR's 50 Greatest Drivers. He was inducted into the West Coast Stock Car Hall of Fame in 2002 and the National Motorsports Press Association Hall of Fame in 1987. Panch passed away in 2015 at the age of 89 in Florida. The present owner purchased this Autavia directly from Marvin Panch's daughter.

One of the most famous vintage watches associated with any American athlete is the *Patek Philippe* reference 130 chronograph with Breguet numerals that was owned by Joe DiMaggio. In fact, for many, this very watch was one of the highlights of the *Patek Philippe* Grand Exhibition held in New York this year. It was a special opportunity to see a watch that had remained in a private collection for years.

Joe DiMaggio is regarded as one of the most legendary players to ever wear the iconic blue and white pinstripes of the Yankees uniform. With nicknames such as "Joltin' Joe" and "The Yankee Clipper", he is regarded as one of the greatest hitters of all time. DiMaggio was a link in the legendary chain of Yankees players active in the 20th century. He played alongside Lou Gehrig, who had played with Babe Ruth, for a number of years and ended his career playing alongside a young Mickey Mantle. DiMaggio is best known for his legendary 56-game hitting streak in 1941, a record that amazingly still stands to this day, 76 years later.

It was not only his skills on the field that earned him the title of one of the most respected men in American history. DiMaggio's life was one of many wins, from his roots in San Francisco to becoming a star Yankee player, even after his more than impressive career, served voluntarily in the U.S. Military during World War II.

The provenance of this wristwatch may seem almost dream-like, but the watch itself is a dream come true for collectors of vintage *Patek Philippe*. Firstly, the reference 130 is one of *Patek Philippe's* landmark models, The first chronograph to be given a reference number, it was launched in 1934 and remained in production until the 1960s. Distinguished by its timeless design, the model remains an icon of vintage production. When looking at the dial, one is immediately drawn to the applied gold Breguet numerals, beautifully set against the immaculately preserved silvered dial. With raised enamel, the manufacturer's signature and scales represent the firm's skill of production. Furthermore, the case is also exceedingly well-preserved, highlighted in the hallmark to the case side, similar to when this watch left the factory 50 years ago. Offered with what appears to be the original strap, likely worn by Joe DiMaggio himself, this watch presents a one of a kind opportunity for collectors.

First offered at Hunt Auctions in 2006 as part of the celebrated Joe DiMaggio Auction, a public auction of his most treasured personal belongings, the present watch has been kept in a private collection ever since. Most recently it was admired by many as one of the main attractions of the *Patek Philippe* Grand Exhibition this past July in New York, however, for viewing purposes only. As thousands of watch enthusiasts from all over the world travelled to Cipriani on 42nd Street simply to catch a glimpse of this timepiece on display, Christie's is delighted to be able to offer this icon for sale for the first time in over a decade.

In the late 19th century *Marcus & Company*, an American luxury jewelry retailer, opened its doors on 17th street in Manhattan, the prominent location that would allow them to adorn the wealthiest of women in New York City. A family-run business, the firm was founded by Heman Marcus and his two sons, William Elder Marcus and George Marcus.

The business grew to become well-known for their exquisite use of enamel techniques, jewelry set with precious and semi-precious stones as well as designs inspired by the French Art Nouveau period. Bold and elaborate, their aesthetic is unmistakable as one of the most creative of the 20th century. This is not surprising as the Marcus family was inspired by *Tiffany & Co.*, Herman worked there for a period of time in his earlier years which credited him for expert craftsmanship. However, when one examines the necklaces and brooches made by *Marcus & Co.*, there is a great emphasis on composition and flair that is previously unseen by any other manufacturer of the time.

Notably, the original founder of Marcus & Co., William Elder Marcus, mentored famous American jewelry designer Raymond Yard as a young boy. Offering him a job at the age of 13 in Manhattan, this was the beginning of Yard's love of jewelry. Immersing himself in the world of jewelry, Yard climbed the ranks quickly and grew to become a world famous jewelry designer, notably of 'The Rockefeller Emerald' which sold at Christie's' New York in June 2017 and realized over 5.5 million dollars.

In the fall of 1895, when Florence Preston became engaged to the financier Henry Graves, Jr. - they married at St. Thomas's Protestant Episcopal Church on Fifth Avenue in New York on January 21, 1896 - the New York Times hailed their coupling as one of "social prominence."

Indeed, a golden couple of the Gilded Age, Graves was the scion of a wealthy New Jersey family whose fortune rested on railroads, Wall Street, and commerce. Today, he is perhaps best known as one of the most important watch collectors of the 20th century. It was Graves who commissioned the Patek Philippe masterpiece: the "Graves Supercomplication," delivered in 1933; a magnificent 18-karat gold double-dial pocket watch with 24 complications, among them, a stunning celestial chart calibrated to replicate the night sky above the Graves's Manhattan apartment.

Born on March 3, 1870 in Irvington-on-Hudson to Rebecca (née Duncan) and William Riley Preston, a wealthy commodities broker, Florence's family tree stretched all the way back to Emperor Charlemagne, was descended from King Edward III, and boasted eleven barons – witnesses to the signing of the Magna Carta in 1215. The seventh of ten children, Florence lived with her family in a townhouse just off Fifth Avenue on Forty-eighth Street; during the summers the Preston's lived in what was known as the Millionaire's Colony in Irvington, on a large estate that spanned between the Croton Aqueduct and the Hudson River. A member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the National Society of Colonial Dames; like many of her social set, as a girl, Florence studied at Mrs. Sylvanus Reed's English, French, and German Boarding, and Day School for Young Ladies in New York City, where she learned languages and how to be a refined gentlewoman.

Together, Mr. and Mrs. Graves, Jr. lived a life that can only be described as sumptuous. Along with their four children, the family resided at their 27-room mansion in Irvington-on-Hudson that featured a ballroom complete with Tiffany windows. Seasons were characterized not by climate but destination: summers at their Great Camp, Eagle Island in the Adirondacks, spring launched months-long trips to Europe, and winters were spent at their duplex at 834 Fifth Avenue.

The Graves family coat of arms contained the Latin motto: Esse Quam Videri (To Be, Rather Than To Seem) and indeed the couple's luxury and refined tastes were a testament to the family maxim. Henry was a great collector of fine and rare Chinese porcelains, gold coins, and Old Master engravings. Throughout their marriage he gifted his wife a great deal of stunning pieces of jewelry and other magnificent objects of art including a gem-laden crystal perfume bottle. As horology was a particular passion of his, several of his gifts reflected his intense, outsized interest in timepieces.

In the spring of 1928, the couple sailed aboard the RSS Olympic arriving in Cherbourg to begin a six-month European holiday. It was during this trip that Graves became obsessed with a Vacheron Constantin tourbillon chronometer awarded the First Prize in the timing completion at the Geneva Observatory. Engaging in a colorful correspondence with the watchmaker, before the piece was delivered to him personally at the Hotel de Crillôn in Paris by none other than Charles Constantin, the great-grandson of Francois Constantin, cofounder of the maison. It was around this time that Graves presented his wife Florence with a spectacular Patek Philippe rectangular wristwatch made of platinum featuring 3.54 carats worth of baguette diamonds -- a dazzling example of the Art Deco style.

A connoisseur with indelible taste, on another occasion, Graves gifted his wife with a Marcus & Co. pendant watch. Founded in 1892 by Herman Marcus, who had previously worked for Tiffany & Co., Marcus & Co. earned a well-deserved reputation for creating superb and meticulously crafted pieces of the Art Nouveau era, featuring strong colored stones, exotic motifs, and intricate enameling. Mrs. Graves's 18-karat gold and enamel pendant watch, with a removable butterfly brooch contains many of the brand's trademarks including the use of peridot gemstones, detailed enamel work, and lotus flowers embedded in the 12-inch gold chain, in the Egyptian revivalist style of which Marcus & Co. was famous.

Florence Graves's Patek Philippe wristwatch and Marcus & Co. pendant watch are believed to be the only known pieces from her personal collection to surface at market. She died on December 7, 1958, five years after her husband.

Widely recognized as one of the greatest jazz musicians of all time, Billie Holiday occupies a role in American culture that is as poignant and multifaceted as her unforgettable sound. Fearless yet fragile, 'Lady Day' as she was often called, was a pioneer for jazz vocalists everywhere with her superior talent for singing and songwriting. In addition, and perhaps at the forefront of her career, as an African American woman she served as the melancholic voice of an entire population, marginalized and undermined by the fell intentions of a divided nation.

"Strange Fruit", one of Holiday's most iconic singles, personifies her distinct style as well as her troubled role in the American narrative. If one had gone to see Holiday sing "Strange Fruit" at Café Society in 1939, they would likely have been stunned by her anguished, somber delivery as well as the highly controversial subject matter of the song. Additionally, if one were looking closely enough, they may have even observed the delicate diamond watch Holiday wore as it caught and refracted the hot, stage-lights of the famed Café. This present watch was gifted to Holiday in 1938; a year prior to "Strange Fruit" and the year after Holiday was christened with her famous nickname: Lady Day.

Likely worn by Holiday at the inception of her solo career, this watch was given to her during a period of her life personified by success and glamour. The innominate benefactor, "David", as referred to in the watch's inscription to the case back, was likely a patron to Holiday's career as well as a potential lover; an admirer of both Holiday and her talents. At the time of its beseeching, this diamond and platinum bracelet watch must have seemed a gift fit for a queen, and for many that is what Billie Holiday was and remains: a queen of musical inventiveness, protest songs, and unrivaled performative panache.

A token of friendship between two pioneering ladies of the 1930s, this watch was a gift given from Amy Johnson, an iconic British aviator, to her friend and well-known fellow American aviator, Amelia Earhart. The watch is engraved to the case back; *To Amelia, In Sincere Admiration, Amy.*

Amy had much to admire. In 1932, at the time Amy had given this gift to Amelia, Amelia had gained the title of the first female aviator to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean. Exactly five years after American aviator Charles Lindbergh became the first male pilot to accomplish a solo, nonstop flight across the Atlantic Ocean, female aviator Amelia Earhart dared this flight and became the first female pilot to repeat this incredible accomplishment. In May 1932, she successfully landed her plane in Ireland after flying across the North Atlantic. She was awarded a Distinguished Flying Cross by the U.S. Congress for this flight. Just as Amelia captured the hearts of European aviators, so it was that Amelia in turn was captivated by the British fliers. Amy Johnson was not only the first British woman to be granted an aircraft ground engineer's license, but she is most recognized as the first woman to fly solo from England to Australia in 1930. Johnson and Earhart created a phenomenon in the US and UK, evoking massive excitement internationally with their outstanding efforts and charming personas.

Both Amelia and Amy were thought of as a natural fliers, born for the industry with a knack for mechanics and a love for setting long distance records. Bound by their worldly visions, they had become close and soon founded the North Atlantic Flight Club, its members restricted to those who had flown alone across the North Atlantic, on which bases five pilots were then legible including the two women. However, their dedication stemmed further into other areas which included female rights, equality and education, topics so important to their progression. Amelia continued to promote 'The Ninety-Nines,' a New York based organization that she founded which was dedicated to female aviators and is still ongoing today. Among her other favorite organizations was the Society of Women Geographers.

In Amelia's own words, she describes the foundation for her choice of profession which captures her free spirit and allegiance:

"Flying is so much more than just a quick way to traverse space. It's freedom and color and form and style. I am at home in the air. Lots of women are at home in the air. Many others, if they aren't today, will be tomorrow."

Amelia Earhart and Amy Johnson overcame many battles in the world of female aviation at such a young age. Their story is one of triumph that will be ongoing in the history of flight as well as equal rights. Not only did this watch belong to a woman who broke boundaries, it is a symbol of reaching new heights, breaking molds and creating a world that favors personal ability.

The *Breitling* 765 AVI was introduced in 1953 as a chronograph for pilots. This reference pre-dates other legendary chronographs for pilots such as the *Breguet* Type XX.

The black dial with its large Arabic luminous numerals were designed for increased legibility, with three large subsidiary dials. Usually the counters for a chronograph measure 12 hours, 30 minutes and 60 seconds, however, here *Breitling* has modified the 30-minute counter of the Venus 178 chronograph movement to count 15 minutes. This change was made because 15 minutes was the duration of a plane's pre-flight check to clear for take-off. One will also notice the thick luminous dashes on this minute register, which mark every 3 minutes for increased accuracy during that pre-flight check.

The present watch dates to circa 1961 based on its serial number. It is preserved in outstanding and unpolished condition, with all original lume in the hands and on the dial. The rotating steel bezel is slightly newer than the watch.

Arguably the most elegant *Heuer* Autavia chronographs ever made are those with the tachymeter scale on the outer edge of the dial, as seen on this extremely rare version of the Autavia reference 3646. The dial features applied steel markers including simple and striking Arabic 12 and 6 numerals.

The dial features triangular lume plots like those found on *Heuer* watches from the late 1950s and early 1960s. Only a small number of these dials are known and they are prized by collectors of rare *Heuer* chronographs.

The present watch is a charismatic example featuring an "Hours" or "H" bezel and an unpolished case.

The present watch is an extremely rare Transitional Autavia reference 2446. Discovered in 2014 by Paul Gavin, these "transitional" cases are identified on a small number of watches with most possessing the "Third Execution" dial found on "Jochen Rindt Autavias", which are named after the famous Formula One racing car driver. The notable difference on these transitional cases is that the lugs do not have the bevels found on other manual-wind Autavias from the 1960s. They also possess wider bezels like those found on First Execution Autavia cases, but in the Type 2 bezel version without a solid triangle at 12 o'clock rather than an indented triangle to hold lume as found on the Type 1 bezel versions.

Quite unusually, the serial number on this watch is extremely early, placing it among Autavia reference 2446 First Execution watches known to the market, however it has traits of later watches, including the Third Execution "Jochen Rindt" dial, the Type 2 bezel (those Autavias known in that range all have Type 1 bezels), a *Heuer*-signed crown (those in that range have unsigned crowns), central hour and minute hands with the black stripe down the center, and a bridge signed "Heuer-Leonidas", whereas other bridges on that serial range say "Ed. Heuer". Furthermore, it features luminous dots on the dial similar to those found on early Heuer Carreras and Rolex Daytona and different from the rectangular luminous plots found on other "Jochen Rindt" Autavias.

The watch is preserved in outstanding condition with a seemingly unpolished case. For collectors of Autavias, this is a rare opportunity.

Introduced in 1965, the Carrera 2447 NT is one of the rarest and most sought after models. Only a few examples of the reference are known to the public. To the best of our knowledge this is the first to include this retailer's signature on the dial, "Meister." A prominent watch retailer in Zurich, the *Meister* signature is also found on a number of important vintage *OMEGA* watches including Speedmasters and Seamasters. Seldom is the signature found on the dial as well as the papers to accompany the watch, as is the extremely rare occurrence here where the *Heuer* guarantee papers are also signed "Meister Uhren".

Undoubtedly, this is one of the rarest and most well-preserved vintage Carrera's to come to market in recent years. It was originally purchased in July of 1968 at the renowned Swiss luxury watch retailer *Meister* for less than 100 dollars. Worn only a handful of times, it was put aside for over four decades and has remained preserved in excellent un-restored condition. The watch impresses due to its mint condition. The dial and hands have beautiful creamy tritium luminous material and the case is crisp with sharp and defined lugs.

"In the autumn of 1961 I decided with my production team to create a new "Autavia" as a wrist chronograph. Until then we had never added a turning bezel to one of our wrist chronographs. We therefore designed this new "Autavia" to have a turning black bezel with a choice of division markers. A bezel with 60 separate one-minute divisions, for example, would allow the wearer to set a marker for a defined interval of less than one hour; a 12-hour division would allow the time in another time zone to be displayed; and divisions of 1/100th of a minute would be useful for time study purposes... Looking back I can say that the "Autavia" wrist chronograph was the first real wristwatch product I personally created for the company."

2915-1. Double Swiss Underline. Say these phrases to a passionate sports chronograph enthusiast and they will immediately know what you are talking about, the very beginnings of the two of the most highly regarded chronographs models, the *OMEGA* Speedmaster and the *Rolex* Daytona, that began in 1957 and 1963 respectively and still exist to this day. Both of these watches were created with motorsports in mind, and have gone on to become cornerstones of two of the most prolific companies in watchmaking, helping them weather storms over half a century and evolving into two of the most recognizable and iconic timepieces ever created. But there is a watch

with an even closer connection to the world of unadulterated excitement, speed, and the playboys that should be held in at least as high regard as these two familiar faces of the watch world: the *Heuer* Autavia.

A portmanteau of the two disciplines it was aimed to encompass, that of the automobile and aviation, the Autavia was born in 1933 as a dashboard timer. It was superseded by the Auto-Rallye with a big central minute hand to make it incredibly legible, which then evolve into the Monte Carlo with digital hour recording. With the success of the Monte Carlo, the original Autavia dashboard timer was discontinued, leaving an abandoned catchy name. Jack Heuer and the design team in fall 1961 went to the drawing board to create one of the the first *Heuer* chronographs with a name and the first with a rotating bezel, allowing for a 60-minute timer, a rudimentary second time zone or a decimal scale. Launched in 1962, two variants were available, both manual wind: the reference 2446 for the three-register version powered by the legendary Valjoux 72 movement as used in a certain Rolex Daytona, and the reference 3646 for the two-register version powered by the Valjoux 92.

The earliest and most desirable examples are referred to by collectors as the "First Execution" and the dials of these models are distinguished by their large white sub-dials contrasting against black dials and painted radium hour markers to make the time as visible as possible at night. Due to the aging process, the luminous material no longer glows for extended periods and will generally have aged to tone ranging from soft caramel to burnt orange. The hands came in a variety of styles starting with hands entirely covered in radium, referred to as 'all lume', to a triangle-shaped insert of luminous material, and lastly a simple stick down the middle of the hand. These watches were introduced at a time of transition and at least two "First Execution" Autavia dials are known with the "T" signature above "SWISS" denoting tritium lume, while most have radium lume. All of these early Autavia watches have unsigned crowns and pushers that are slightly smaller than later generations.

While later examples made their way on to the wrists of such great drivers as Jochen Rindt, Mario Andretti, Jo Siffert, and Derek Bell, it is the First Execution Autavia that shows the origins of this iconic model.

The present watch represents an opportunity to own a charismatic example of this important sports chronographs. Consigned by a private collector, the watch displays a beautiful vintage look and crisp case. It is an immensely pleasing watch to wear and enjoy.

When observing this attractive 1940s wristwatch, one will immediately notice the attractive two-toned silvered dial. Set against it are three circular scales: An outer blue tachymeter scale, inner blue tachymeter scale and red telemeter scale. Here, the two blue tachymeter scales can measure from 12 kilometers per hour and as high as 700 kilometers per hour. More immediately, the spiral scales offer a spectacular aesthetic, heightened because the printing is preserved in remarkable original condition since its production in 1941.

Beyond the attractive dial, when one examines the case they will notice its sharp and full-proportioned sides and lugs, hardly worn, this watch is preserved in outstanding condition.

The reference 2915 marked the introduction of the Speedmaster. Paving the way for unparalleled historical occasions, the first Speedmaster reference 2915 was only in production for three years, from 1957 to 1959. The distinguishable features of this reference are the 'broad arrow' hands and steel bezel, although towards the end of its production the reference 2915-3 was fitted with a black bezel and 'alpha' hands, introducing those features to the reference 2915's successor: the reference 2998.

The present watch is from the second series of this first ever Speedmaster production, bearing the reference 2915-2. It is notable for its original and exceptional condition. With so few early reference 2915-1 and 2915-2 examples known to the market, particularly those retaining the original steel bezel and correct hands, this presents a rare opportunity to purchase an extraordinary original 'broad arrow' Speedmaster.

This watch is offered from the family of the original owner, has never been seen in the market before and surfaced after quite a historical journey. According to the consignor and later accredited by *OMEGA*, this was purchased in the Belgian Congo, what was a Belgian colony in Central Africa from 1908 to 1960, now recognized as the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

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The owner, who served in the Royal Air Force in Rhodesia teaching cadets how to fly, later found work with Goodyear Tires that sent him all over the world. He purchased the watch in 1958 upon transfer to the Belgian Congo. In the late 50's there was a great move toward independence in the Belgian Congo, resulting in riots and civil unrest. The marks an intensely uneasy period in the history of the country and the original owner's possession of so many international currencies aroused suspicion. At this time he was arrested and imprisoned as a spy, likely while wearing this Speedmaster. Some yeas later he returned to his favored locale, Rhodesia, and this Speedmaster was handed down through his family.

An example of the reference 2915 is illustrated and described in *OMEGA*, A Journey Through Time by Marco Richon, 2007, p. 596.



On 10 November 1801, horological legend *Abraham-Louis Breguet* (1747-1823) received a patent for his ingenious tourbillon invention. Breguet designed the tourbillon (or whirlwind) to compensate for fluctuations and errors in time measurement caused by the position a watch is placed in. For example, watches with traditional movements may keep excellent time when resting on a desk horizontally, but when that same watch is placed vertically in a pocket, gravity affects the frequency or rate of the escapement and thus its accuracy.

The present watch is of masterful engineering but also of exquisite design. Its platinum case houses the complex movement which can be admired in-between two sapphire crystals. Offered in excellent condition, it has a familiar timeless elegance that one would only associate with *Breguet* timepieces.

In 1795 Abraham-Louis Breguet invented the tourbillon to counteract the effects of gravitational pull on clocks and watch escapements. As for all F.P. Journe watches, the movement of this Centrigraphe Souverain comprises 284 components. The manually-wound mechanical movement can measure elapsed times from a 100th of a second to ten minutes. The striking subsidiary dials with red Arabic numerals indicate three time-reading options: for the 100th of a second subsidiary dial, the second hand revolves around the dial in one second on a scale marked in hundredths of a second. For the 20 seconds subsidiary dial, the second hand has 20 seconds to complete a round. Lastly, for the 10 minutes subsidiary dial, the minute hand will take half an hour to complete its tour. The watch is also equipped with a patented re-set button in the band at two o'clock, which can be rocked back and forth to make the chronograph start, stop or return to zero. This system is an ingenious variation of the standard buttons used in chronograph watches on each side of the crown. Moreover, the maintaining power and power reserve in this watch are highly efficient. The mainspring barrel features a maintaining power system to ensure that the driving force does not decrease during winding. Without utilizing the chronograph function, the mainspring can supply a minimum of 100 hours of power reserve and 24 hours if the chronograph is being operated continuously.

One of the more complex movements created by the celebrated firm, it was produced in various color combinations of dial and case. Recently, an anniversary model was introduced in titanium to celebrate the tenth anniversary of each of *Journe's* boutiques.

With its very slender profile, it is remarkable that inside this watch's 9mm thick case is a movement that is able to power a perpetual calendar and moon phase complication. The deep blue sunburst dial is equally stunning and at 40mm in diameter it is a prominent yet handsome timepiece.

Reference 8171 was made in a very small series between 1949 and 1952, mostly in yellow gold, with the exception of the far more uncommon pink gold and stainless steel examples.

Rolex has produced only two different models of wristwatches with complete calendar and moon phase, references 8171 and 6062. Both models are automatic, however reference 8171 has a snap-on case back, while reference 6062 is fitted with a water-resistant-type screw-down case back and thus carries the designation "Oyster" on the dial. Reference 8171 is 38mm in diameter, which was remarkably large for the era, whereas reference 6062 is 36mm in diameter. The reference 8171 was affectionately nicknamed the "Padellone" or "large frying pan" due to its unconventional size for the time.

This represents a rare opportunity for collectors to acquire a vintage watch which dates to the final year of production for this model. With a striking presence, it is clear just how well-preserved this watch is. The dial has aged to an attractive cream color which becomes slightly darker towards the edges. Most notably, the case is in excellent condition with full and well-proportioned lugs and still retaining the case number to the case back with the *Rolex* coronet.

For collectors of rare early *Rolex* chronographs, the present watch is an exciting discovery due to the rarity of the reference, scarcity to the market. and for its exceptional and original unpolished condition. The reference 4537 is one of the first chronographs from *Rolex* with a three-register movement in a case with more water-resistant pump pushers and a screw-down case back, earning the watch the designation of "Oyster" on the dial.

Seeing this watch in person gives the *Rolex* connoisseur a new understanding of the reference in terms of originality. The condition and beauty of this rare and important *Rolex* is an ultimate trophy of *Rolex's* early history of chronographs.

Reference 6034 is the successor to reference 4537, and was in production during the 1950s and early 1960s. The majority were cased in stainless steel or 18k gold, with an exception of a small series in 14k gold.

The present example is a unique variance of the so called 'pre-Daytona'. With both case and dial in very appealing condition, it has features which are so rare that it will pique the interest the most discerning collector:

Firstly, the dial is unique. It features a remarkably attractive color. that will only be found on this watch. Since its production in 1962, the dial has aged and changed color from the once black dial to now a gorgeous tobacco color, darker towards the edges. As no two dials can age in the same way, the new color is simply mesmerizing and this watch is truly one of a kind.

Secondly, one will notice on closer inspection that the dial is clearly marked with two 'T' letters just below the 6 o'clock register. This highlights that the luminous dial contains tritium. Since *Rolex* started using Tritium instead of Radium around this time, one can speculate that this is an extremely rare transitional example, seldom found and almost never seen for sale.

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Thirdly, upon inspection of the movement, it is stamped *ROW*, indicating it was made specifically for the American market.

The present watch is an extremely attractive specimen, ticking all the boxes for a truly exceptional and well-preserved vintage *Rolex* timepiece.

Amongst watch enthusiasts, reference 6238 is often referred to as a "Pre-Daytona" and enjoys today growing popularity within the community of *Rolex* collectors. Launched circa 1960, the reference 6238 was the company's last traditional chronograph wristwatch with a polished bezel. Clearly designed as a sport watch, the reference 6238 maintains, thanks to its case proportions, a very refined yet masculine look.

The present watch is a striking example with its very rare silver/grey dial which is preserved in excellent condition. Its charm is heightened upon closer inspection as the dial is clearly signed by the renowned retailer, *Tiffany & Co.* Furthermore, the movement is stamped *ROW* to indicate its initial intended importation to the USA.

Reference 6239, the very first model of the celebrated "Daytona" series, succeeded the previous lot, reference 6238, and could be found in sales catalogues in Europe as of 1964, though it is thought that the model was available in the US already in 1963.

Available in stainless steel, 14k and 18k gold, reference 6239 was the firm's first chronograph with the tachometer scale engraved on the bezel and the subsidiary dials printed in a different color than the main dial for better readability. The dials of the early models, as the present example, featured only the designation "Cosmograph", referring to the outer-space travels of the early 60s. The "Daytona" was added on later series to mark *Rolex's* sponsorship of the renowned NASCAR stock car race.

The present watch is a very early example of this reference with its original guarantee and box. Furthermore, this watch retains the original bezel calibrated to a maximum 300 units per hour, which was shortly thereafter changed on later examples of the reference 6239 to a maximum 200 units per hour.

Reference 6241 was introduced in 1965, and remained in production for 5 years only, discontinued in 1969. It is distinguished by a number of traits which make it one of the most appealing vintage *Rolex* references: it holds historical interest being the first time the combination of black bezel and pump pushers were seen on a Daytona, and the short production run renders it one of the rarest Daytona models produced by *Rolex*.

To the best of our knowledge, the present example is offered for the first time on the public market, consigned by a descendant of the original owner who has preserved the watch with care over the last few decades. With a flawless dial, free of any blemishes to the pristine cream color, this watch has luminous plots to the numerals that are fully in-tact and have aged evenly throughout, a very rare occurrence. Furthermore it features the original bezel and the correct caliber 722-1, used only in the last examples of the reference – an update from Cal. 722 found on all the other examples of the model.

Considering its condition, rarity and overall stunning aesthetic, it is safe to count the present piece among the most attractive and collectable examples of reference 6241 to ever appear on the market.

Sigma dials were first seen on the reference 6240, and were nicknamed "Goute A Prior" by Italian collectors and originally referred to the union of three *Rolex* dial producers: Singer, Stern, and Beyeler. On later references, the Sigma came to refer to indices and hands in gold.

The "Oyster Sotto" or "Oyster Below" dial is also commonly known as the "RCO" as it features the words "Rolex", "Cosmograph", and then "Oyster" aligned vertically on the dial.

The Paul Newman Oyster Sotto Daytona is unquestionably one of the ultimate goals for the Daytona collector. Amongst the extremely small number of such pieces produced, the watches with a Mark 1 dial are undeniably the rarest of the rare, near-unattainable trophies of the *Rolex* world.

Previously unknown to the auction market, the present *Rolex* reference 6263 Paul Newman Oyster Sotto Cosmograph Daytona is one of the most important examples of the model. Consigned by the original owner, an American who purchased the watch new directly from a *Rolex* retailer, it is a tremendous fresh-to-market example of this grail watch for many vintage *Rolex* collectors.

Less than 20 examples are known in total with the Oyster "Sotto" designation whereby the "Oyster" designation is found below the word "Cosmograph" instead of above it. The Oyster "Sotto" dials were only fitted to a very, very few of the first reference 6263 water-resistant Oyster Cosmographs. The Paul Newman dial itself was discontinued relatively shortly after the introduction of reference 6263, so only low serial number watches were fitted with this style of dial presumably at the request of either clients or certain retailers.

Furthermore, some of these very special "first of the few" have dials with a distinctly different font type that can be classed as a "Mark 1" dial as they only appear on those watches with the very lowest serial numbers. Of all the Paul Newman Oyster Sotto watches publically known, only a few examples including the present watch are publically known with Mark 1 dials. These watches were all manufactured in 1969 and, as would be expected, have

serial numbers in extremely close proximity to each other in the 2'0855** range, all are fitted with 6239 casebacks stamped *C.R.S* for the maker C.R. Spillmann S.A. and have caliber 727 movements.

Mark 1 Sotto Dial

Only found on watches made in 1969 within the 2'085'5** serial number range, it is distinguishable by the very different font type for the "R" of Rolex which is wider and "fatter", the "G" in Cosmograph has a serif and shorter inward return and the "H" is more pronouncedly asymmetric.

Mark II Sotto Dial

Found on watches from the 2'1 million serial number range onwards, it is distinguishable by the very close legs of the "R" of Rolex with very pronounced serifs, the "G" of Cosmograph without serif and long return almost touching the inner curve, wider and more even "H".

The "Sotto" Dial History

The dials that have become legendary as the "Oyster Sotto" were originally intended for the non-waterproof references such as 6262 and 6264 which are signed "Rolex Cosmograph Daytona" only. When the new water-resistant "Oyster" case was introduced for the reference 6263 around 1969 it is clear that certain customers must have specifically requested that their watch should have an exotic dial of the type now known by collectors as the "Paul Newman". Of course no such dials existed yet specifically for the waterresistant Oyster model and therefore a small number of the already printed current non-Oyster dials were adapted with the addition of the word "Oyster" in plain font. As the dials were already pre-printed there was no option but to place the word "Oyster" below the words "Rolex Cosmograph". And thus an anomaly was created that exists in so few examples that it has become a pinnacle of desirability among *Rolex* Daytonas.

The panorama of manually-wound *Rolex* Daytona Chronographs encompasses 7 different models, plus two bejeweled models produced in extremely small numbers. Among the non-bejeweled timepieces, only three models truly qualify as *Oyster* case (indeed, while these three models bear the *Oyster* designation on the dial, the others do not). A true *Oyster* case is defined by the screw back, screw down crown and screw down chronograph pushers that ensure increased water resistance. Reference 6265 is one of these highly sought-after models. Together with its sister reference 6263 (the difference being the black-insert bezel rather than the metal one), reference 6265 is the final evolution of the manually wound Daytona. It is distinguished, beyond its metal insert and screw down pushers, by the caliber 727 (evolved from caliber 722-1).

The present watch impresses due to its pristine condition. The dial is wonderfully preserved with black registers that are beginning to turn a dark shade of brown, a feature for vintage Daytonas that is highly sought after. In addition, the luminous dots which accent the baton numerals have aged well and evenly throughout. Furthermore, the dial prominently features the renowned retailers signature, *Tiffany & Co.* The case is full and well proportioned, offered with its original bracelet this watch ticks all the boxes for collectors of vintage *Rolex*.

Reference 565, the first large water-resistant watch featuring a two-piece case with screw back and dust cover, was available with either subsidiary or sweep centre seconds. The timelessly modern design of reference 565 served as inspiration for the creation of the 2006 stainless steel inaugural reference 5565.

Few watches capture the imagination of collectors more than the steel reference 565. Rare in numbers, elegant in style, and easily wearable, this watch has everything that the modern day watch aficionado desires.

One will notice the pristine steel Breguet numerals to the dial, elegantly paired with the steel case. Highly sought after and rarely seen on a steel 565, the style of numerals is also noted on the Extract from the Archives. Secondly, the case is offered in remarkable condition, still retaining the original metal dust cover. Crisp and unpolished, the case retains its original finish most notably on its outside case back. Elegant, sporty and sophisticated, this wristwatch perfectly embodies the spirit of the modern collector.

Reference 565 featured the caliber 12'120 until 1950 where it began to house a new caliber, 12'400. In 1939 the model was also produced with a sweep center seconds version with the caliber 12 SC such as the present watch until 1949 when it was replaced with the caliber 27 SC. Cases were made by Taubert, a company that specialized in waterproof cases. The model was cased in yellow gold, pink gold, and stainless steel, and was for a period of time the least expensive watch listed by the company.

The present example stands out with its pink gold Breguet numerals, confirmed on the Extract from the Archives . Combined with its attractive spade hands, the dial is highly unusual. Its charm extends to the pink gold case, well-preserved, the hallmark to the case side and edge of the lower right lug is still crisp, just as it was when it left the factory in the late 1940s.

To the best of our knowledge, this is one of two known examples of this reference in pink gold with Breguet numerals and spade hands.

The reference 570 is one of the most appreciated and well known vintage watches by *Patek Philippe*. Introduced in 1938, it is a larger scaled version of the reference 96, remaining in production until 1972. With a 35.5 mm. diameter, it was quite a large watch for the time, but it is the perfect size for the modern wrist. Furthermore, the flat bezel gives the watch an overall large profile when worn on the wrist in particular with the bold 20mm lug gauge for the strap.

The presently offered 570 in white gold is in a near perfect case with crisp hallmarks and no signs of polishing. The dial is wonderfully preserved with raised hard enamel and exquisite raised pearl minute markers. The 27 SC center seconds movement further distinguishes this fine watch, a specimen example of second series 570.

The present watch is an extremely rare example of black dial reference 530. Considered one of the most appealing vintage *Patek Philippe* references thanks to its large dimensions and timeless design, reference 530 was originally released as a time only model, later a chronograph version was produced with the same reference number and similar design. Whereas the present watch very much resembles a traditional reference 570, close examination shows differences in case proportions such as a larger diameter of 36.5 mm and a concave bezel.

Black dial vintage *Patek Philippe* watches are considered legendary timepieces by collectors and were rarely offered as standard options. Most vintage examples we see today were custom made orders for special clients of the manufacturer. So rare and so striking, their simple elegance and modern aesthetic transcends time. Most notably, the present timepiece features an attractive gilt underlay which is noticeable in the signature, minute markings as well as subsidiary seconds dial.

The case for this example is equally appealing. Housed in 14k gold as opposed to the more common 18k, it is extremely sought after in today's market. Georges Croisier, one of the best case makers of the period, made the superbly proportioned cases of the reference 530 model as seen in this key number 5 to the inside of the case back. Furthermore the case has been well-preserved, apparent in the hallmarks which are still visible to the case side and tip of the top right lug.

Examples of a "time only" reference 530 in 14k gold with black dial are almost unheard of. Uniting two of the most rare and sought-after traits which can be found in a vintage *Patek Philippe* model, the present watch is an exceedingly rare occasion for the avid collector of highly important timepieces. The last example of a reference 530 with black dial was sold at Christie's in the *Patek Philippe* 175 Anniversary auction in Geneva, November 2014. The watch realized 389,000 Swiss francs.

The present watch has been consigned from the family of the original owner who was a successful attorney in Budapest in the 1930s and 1940s. He purchased the watch in 1941, the date of its manufacture, at the age of 38 and at the height of his career. Also a businessman in the cinema industry, he owned several movie theaters and distributed films in Europe as well as internationally at the time. Often he and his wife would visit the 'New York Kavehaz,' (New York Coffee House) in Budapest, a meeting place of intellectuals, professionals, artists, writers and filmmakers of the era who had refined taste and recognized the allure of *Patek Philippe* early that would ultimately live on for many years to come.

The reference 2526 was the first self-winding watch produced by *Patek Philippe* in 1953. It was produced until the early 1960s until it was succeeded by the reference 3428 (please see Lot 42 in this sale). This particular example features the highly sought after first series dial as well as the original retailer signature on the dial, *Cuervo Y Sobrinos*.

Double signed dials are rare and sought after, especially when they are found on enamel dials from this era and with the signatures to the enamel seemingly untouched.

Fresh to market, to the best of our knowledge this watch has never before appeared in public, offering astute *Patek Philippe* collectors an incredible opportunity. This is the first time Christie's will be offering the reference 2526 with a 'Cuervo Y Sobrinos Dial'

Cuervo Y Sobrinos

The name 'Cuervo Y Sobrinos' or 'Cuervo and Nephews' signifies a time in history that should be cherished for its significance in the world of vintage watches. Founded in 1882 with Latin roots, Don Ramon Cuervo and his family established a jewelry and watchmaking business in the heart of Havana. Leading into the beginning of the 20th century, the Cuervo name became synonymous with high-end luxury and Cuban laidback living. A simple mention of the Cuervo family's brand was enough to impress during a time in Cuba which was a hub for style and fashion. Soon enough, top tier watch manufacturers such as *Patek Philippe, Rolex and Longines* were making watches just for Cuervo in the hopes that they would grace the watches with their signature and sell them in their store. The success of the business continued, expanding to other regions including North America and Europe, most notably La Chaux-de-Fonds, Neuchâtel, the capital of watchmaking.

In the mid to late 1950s an unfortunate turn of events occurred. The Cuban revolution forced the Cuervo family to flee their shop, to leave the business that they had spent so many years cultivating. The turbulence was shocking and most of the watch dials, cases and movements were left behind, suspended in time, clinging to a peaceful and profitable past.

Today, the the *Cuervo Y Sobrinos* name continues, headed by Italian entrepreneur Marzio Villa. The timepieces honor the original designs and strive to connote that splendid vintage Cuban flair.

Produced in an exceedingly small series, the 3428 is one of the rarest and most sought after of all vintage *Patek Philippe* wristwatches. Produced for only a few years in the early 1960s it insignificantly influenced the popularity of wristwatches featuring enamel dials.

The 3428 replaced the celebrated 2526, the first automatic wristwatch produced in series by *Patek Philippe*. (Please see Lot 41 in this sale). With case size remaining the same with perfect proportions made by Baumgartner, Geneva's master case maker identified with key number 2, both references boast an attractive enamel dial made by Stern Frères. It differs only with the newer caliber 27-460, upgraded from the 12-600AT.

Production of the reference 3428 was extremely low. In fact, approximately 24 were ever produced in white gold whereby only 6 including the present watch have ever been identified. This presents an extremely rare opportunity for collectors of fine vintage *Patek Philippe*.

One of the most important wristwatches ever made in series by *Patek Philippe*, the 3979 was launched in 1989 to celebrate *Patek Philippe*'s 150th anniversary, and is the legitimate successor of the highly coveted reference 2524/1. Production of reference 3979 was discontinued and to find examples in today's market is a significant discovery.

According to research only 100 examples were ever produced with less than a dozen cased in platinum. Fresh to the market and an important horological finding, this watch has been identified as the 5th of its kind to ever appear in public.

It is fitted with the ingenious caliber R 27 PS which impresses not only by its remarkable number of 342 parts but also by *Patek Philippe's* masterly performance of combining a micro-rotor and a minute repeating mechanism in a proportionally small 12^{'''} movement. This is one of the few watches made with an enamel dial that is more commonly found in the tradition of pocket watches.

The case of the present watch is remarkably handsome and well sized. Furthermore the case is full in its proportions and the hallmarks to the back of the lugs are crisp. Its appearance is modern with a white enamel dial and platinum case where the painted black Roman numerals are clear and legible. Ultimately, it's refined elegance highlights the essence of *Patek Philippe*.

Patek Philippe made a number of different types of repeating watches ranging from quarter to minute repeaters. However, it is the five minute repeater that is the rarest, which strikes the hours on one gong and then the number of five-minute periods after the hour on the second gong.

Introduction

It is remarkable to discover any Navigator's Trio, but in particular a Trio that served on one of the four US Navy zeppelins - the USS Los Angeles – which in 1924, (3 years before Charles Lindbergh's famed flight), took only 81 hours to fly from Friedrichshafen, Germany to New York.

In fact it is remarkable to discover any artifacts of the generally ill-fated US Zeppelin fleet. All but one of the US Navy airships ended in disasters similar to the German zeppelin Hindenburg. The lucky one was USS Los Angeles, or what the Navy called the ZR-3. It was a huge airship with a total length of 200 meters (656 feet), four times longer than a football field. It had a special navigation room, which, among other instruments, housed the Trio.

In 1917 the US Navy bought from *Patek Philippe* a series of four of what at the time were called Torpedo Boat Watches. They had consecutive serial numbers 170414, 415, 416, and 417. All four, in 1913, were presented by *Patek Philippe* to the Geneva Observatory contest and all did well. The total scores were 235.9, 217.7, 220.3, and 238.9 respectively. They were adjusted by three legendary timers, the highest paid class of watchmakers, H. Lossier, C. Batifolier, and J. Golay-Audemars. For the Trio, the Navy took the three watches with the highest scores, leaving No. 170415, with the lowest score of 217.7, for other purposes. We do not know the details of how and when the Trio, bearing the mark of USS Los Angeles, found its way to the airship. The Los Angeles was launched in 1924 whereas the watches for the Trio were bought in 1917. During those few years the Navy may have used them for a different purpose.

As some Navy historians suggested, the Trio was used by the Navy Observatory. Marvin Whitney, who worked at the Washington Observatory, noted; "They [The Navigator's Trios] were to be used by Observatory personnel on several different remote astronomical observation expeditions in which accurate time in these three frames was absolutely essential." ¹

There are only a few Navigator's Trio known, even fewer used on zeppelins. These Trio's were made by *Ulysse Nardin, Longines,* and *Hamilton* (FIG). So far, this is the only one known by *Patek Philippe*. It must have been the most expensive Trio the Navy ever bought. For instance, *Longines'* Navigator's Trios, which were less expensive, cost \$1000.00 in 1930.²

Torpedo-boat watches were among the most accurate watches ever made. This "Trio" represents, possibly, the finest grouping of precision watches ever assembled.



What is the Navigator's Trio?



The U.S. Navy identified the type of watch found in this Trio as a torpedoboat watch (TBW). The same type of watch was often referred to by other navies as a deck or chronometer watch. In Washington Naval Observatory correspondence, the term "chronometer watch" is used interchangeably with torpedo-boat watch.

The Navigator's Trio, officially called by the Navy "Torpedo-Boat Navigator's Timing Outfit", was a set of three watches used for one of three purposes;

-To assure absolute exact time in a Navy's synchronized attacks, when the smallest risk of an error in precise determination of time was intolerable

-To indicate three types of time at the same moment: sidereal, Greenwich Mean Time, and local time

-To indicate time in three different places, the departure place time, the destination time, and the local time



The use of three chronometers began with the British. Captain Shadwell noted that the system of supplying a ship with three chronometers originated in the British Navy around 1825. He wrote: "Two chronometers are of very little use; when one malfunctions it cannot be determined which one it is whereas with three chronometers, if one malfunctions, the other two still show the same correct time". ³

The US Naval Observatory recommended, for the same reasons, the use of three chronometers for each destroyer.

Marquis Francesco De Pinedo, a general in the Italian Army and one of the first aviation pioneers, used the Navigator's Trio exclusively during several of his famous intercontinental flights. ⁴

A Short History of the Zeppelins (Airships)

Zeppelins were the largest flying machines ever, reaching up to 803 feet in length. By comparison, a modern Boeing 747 airliner is 243 feet long.

The history of zeppelins has been dominated by the image of the crash of the Hindenberg on May 3, 1937.


For approximately the first three decades of the twentieth century, zeppelins played a major role in the early development of aviation. They were used for scientific and polar exploration, circumnavigating the earth, transatlantic luxury flights, and by the military for observation platforms, for escorting convoys, for bombing runs and others.

As an example, on January 24, 1925, the US Naval Observatory used USS Los Angeles zeppelin, cruising at 4500 feet to broadcast a live report of the eclipse.

They were even used as aircraft carriers having the ability to receive and deploy aircraft.

Up until the Hindenburg's explosion in 1937, America had been preparing infrastructure in anticipation of a future where zeppelins would dominate the skies, floating people and heavy cargo to almost any destination.

It is a little known fact that the top of the Empire State Building was planned to be constructed as a docking terminal for zeppelins. The U.S. government was so convinced airships were going to be the next big thing that a special act was enacted, the Helium Control Act of 1927, forbidding the sale of helium - used in zeppelins - to foreign governments. This was one of the reasons for the Hindenburg disaster, the United States refused to sell helium to Germany and the Hindenburg had to be filled with hydrogen.



The United States Navy had four zeppelins in their fleet, the USS Shenandoah (ZR-1), the USS Los Angeles (ZR-3), the USS Akron (ZRS-4), and the USS Macon (ZRS-5). The later two were the largest helium airships to ever fly at 785' long.

They were very expensive – for example, the Akron cost 4.5 million USD in 1933 – and were equipped with excellent instrumentation which would include their navigation timepieces.

One wonders what trios the other American zeppelins carried in their navigation rooms. We might never know because, unfortunately, the USS Los Angeles was the only US Navy zeppelin to not meet a disastrous end. The Akron crash, with 73 dead, was the world's worst airship crash. The Hindenburg, by comparison killed 36 people.

Zeppelins were once considered the future of air transport and interestingly, 80 years after the Hindenburg disaster, the fascination with zeppelins is reborn. Airlander Corp is building modern airships today. Amazon.com Inc. has filed for a patent to use airships to store products and serve as a base for delivery-drones. Sergey Brin, the founder of Google, is also building a huge new zeppelin, for fuel efficiency, suggested by Bloomberg.⁵

Mr. Brin, no doubt, will have great instruments, but none as remarkable as the *Patek Philippe* Trio.

Metropolitan Life Insurance Company

Organized by a group of New York City businessmen in 1863, the National Union Life and Limb Insurance Company began business in July 1864 insuring Civil War sailors and soldiers against wartime-related disabilities. By the end of 1864, National Union had written only 17 life and 56 accident policies, was in last place among the 27 life companies operating in New York State, and was running a deficit of \$1,400. After five difficult years in business and several reorganizations and name changes, President James R. Dow, (a medical doctor) and the board of directors decided to drop the casualty business and focus solely on life insurance business. And so began Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

When MetLife opened for business on March 24, 1868 (selling a small number of policies on that date) the company's first office consisted of only two rooms- enough space for six employees. A severe business depression that began in the early 1870s rapidly put half of the 70 life insurance companies operating in New York State out of business. Only very large, long-established ordinary life insurance companies remained strong. Policy lapses over successive years forced the company to contract until it reached its lowest point in the late 1870s.



In 1879, MetLife President Joseph F. Knapp turned his attention to England, where "industrial" or "workingmen's" insurance programs were widely successful. American companies had not bothered to pursue industrial insurance up to that time because of the expense involved in building and sustaining an agency force to sell policies door to door and to make the weekly collection of five- or ten-cent premiums. By importing English agents to train an American agency force, MetLife quickly transferred successful British methods for use in the United States. By 1880, the company was signing up 700 new industrial policies a day. Rapidly increasing volume quickly drove down distribution costs, and the new program proved immediately successful.

The MetLife agent became an important person in the lives of striving families. Manuals instructed agents to call at a home at the same time each week to ensure familiarity and contact. In the process of collecting premiums, insurance agents listened to the problems, concerns, and hopes of their clients. So successful was this approach that by 1909, MetLife became the nation's largest life insurer in terms of insurance in force, a leadership position they continue to hold today in North America.

Superintendent John A. Megargee (1855 - 1913)

Born in Pennsylvania, John A. Megargee joined Metropolitan Life Insurance in June 1875 when he was just twenty years old. Beginning as an agent, he joined at the time where industrial insurance was not wholly known in America. When the Metropolitan's industrial department was created, Mr. Megargee was appointed superintendent in New York City directly from his industrial agency in which he had been engaged for only six months. Holding his substantial position for over a quarter of a century, Mr. Megargee was ordered to retire due to his failing health, but not before his twenty-fifth anniversary had been appropriately celebrated by the company only a few weeks before. In a letter written on that occasion, President Hegeman said, amongst other things; "Thus we hail this young veteran. Some claim him now to be fifty years old, but we prefer to think of him as having been twentyfive years old twice...The onflowing years have left him with a patience, a gentleness, and a deference that compel admiration and make us wish we had thousands like him."

Fresh to the market, after being hidden away from the world for over a century, this horological treasure is filled with mystery and aesthetic beauty. For the *Patek Philippe* collector, it represents one of the earliest known digital perpetual calendars known to exist. For the Tiffany & Co collector, it represents the beauty and design of the jewelry house's close collaboration with *Patek Philippe*. For the historian, it shows the importance of the prominent Gibson family. Most mysteriously, the watch represents the love between a mother and a son, a Memento Mori shrouded in the secrecy of mystical signs of the Zodiac seen on the dial.

Custom-made by *Patek Philippe* for *Tiffany & Co.* and Mr. Gibson, this watch was meant to be a family treasure to honor the memory of Mr. Gibson's mother. Taking over a year to produce, *Patek Philippe* spared no expense in its production and the hand painted miniature signs of the Zodiac. The dial is attributable to Pierre Reymond, one the best dial makers of his time in Switzerland who *Patek Philippe* commissioned to make the enamel dials of some of their most outstanding watches.

The cuvette is engraved: Peter Gibson, In memory of his Mother, 9 July 1831 - 10 February 1907.

The miniature enamel crest featured on the back of the case may curiously derive its origin from Scottish heraldry. The phrase "Pandite Coeleste Portae" which translates to "Open Ye Heavenly Gates" is believed to be associated with the Scottish clan, Gibbs – onomastic root of surnames such as Gibson. The bird, a symbol known as 'the pelican in her piety', is also widely associated with the Gibson clan. The pelican of heraldic imagery is more similar in like and lore to mythical beasts such as a phoenix, than the familiar pouch-billed water fowl. Appreciated as a symbol of Christ and sacrifice, the pelican is well suited in combination with the pair of seraphs that flank either side of the crest.

This unique pocket watch is intriguing for a number of reasons. We have discussed the Coat of Arms to the case back which raises the possibility that this watch was made as a special request by the initial owner. However, to the dial there are other impressive details. The clean white enamel dial hosts cherry-red enamel signs of the zodiac in-between the Roman numerals.



Large and prominent with exquisite detail, the various symbols for Aries, Taurus, Gemini, etc. seem to come alive on the dial with a playful representation. This raises more questions. Did the original owner value astrological phenomena so much so that he commissioned *Patek Philippe* to produce this watch only for him? This becomes a strong possibility when one considers that in 1907, astrology was not considered a pseudoscience as it is today but was valued for its ancient scholarly tradition, considered another facet of astronomy useful for forecasting earthly events. The enduring presence of astrology in new age spiritual traditions and even popular newspaper columns demonstrates its powerful and enduring appeal within the greater societal psyche.

Furthermore, one cannot fail to notice the digital display for the perpetual calendar, above the aperture for phases of the moon. With a window for the day, date and month, the calendar also takes into consideration leap years. It is almost certain that upon commission of the zodiac symbols that the digital display was requested as well. Firstly, this digital display is so rarely seen in a pocket watch from this era but secondly, when the leap year falls every four years this is commonly thought to intercept the natural behaviors of humans, according to their sign. Although we have not seen a watch quite like his one before, astrology and astronomy has been favored on watches and clocks in the past. A very famous example is the clock which resides at the top of St. Marks Clock tower in Venice, Italy, which dates to 1499.

One of the great movements for those passionate about horology over the last two decades has been the support of the so-called "independents" - independent watchmakers designing watches by themselves or with very small teams under them. *Christian Klings* is one of the more under-the-radar independents, having produced only approximately 20 watches in his career spanning two decades, all working on his own, from scratch. For those few connoisseurs fortunate enough to know his work, *Klings* is given great respect for his designs, talent and workmanship. His timepieces are on par with some of the most famous and respected independent watchmakers working today, with an incredible attention to detail in all parts of the timepiece, as the few watches he produces tend to be spoken for immediately. Many experts believe that *Klings* is one of the most talented watchmakers alive today, even if he is not as well known as other "independents".

Klings works by himself in Wechselburg, Germany, a small town an hour away from Dresden. He does not employ any apprentices or anyone else

in his shop - each of his watches is made entirely by his own two hands using traditional methods and tools, many of which he has built for his own use. He creates everything from the dial, to the crown, to the case, to the complications by himself, which is traditional watchmaking at its truest and highest level.

This is a unique commission piece that took *Klings* years to complete. Consistent with *Klings*' watchmaking ethos, this watch was designed entirely by hand drawings, with no use of CAD-CAM or any other software, helping to explain how naturally the proportions bear more resemblance to vintage pocket watches of the past. In 2001, when the timepiece was begun, *Christian Klings* was not able to finish the watch because his knowledge then was not advanced enough to complete the timepiece with it's various complications. Since then the watch has been laying unfinished in a box. Years went by, and during sleepless nights he made numerous drawings until finally the technical difficulties were overcome. In 2016, after many years of perfecting, the watch was complete.

When one examines this watch, it is understandable that many laborious hours went into producing it. The tourbillon is combined with a detent escapement, an incredibly complex movement. A watch with a traditional detent escapement does not start by itself. *Klings* was able to develop a mechanism which starts and stops the balance at a certain angle. Needless to say it took several trials in order to bring the movement to perfection, in Klings' own words, it is only finished when the artist is satisfied. The construction of this watch including its start/stop mechanism took approximately 1,000 hours or more. Copies of drawings reflecting this process are included with this lot. With great design, *Klings* shows the full movement so that it can be admired by the wearer through a mineral crystal display back. The dial is classic and clean in its design. With ample room, the hours and minutes, power reserve and phases of the moon are legible and create a harmonious composition.

According to the Archives of Vacheron Constantin, movement 431'322 and case number 272'438 correspond to a reference 4178 produced in 1942. The records of Vacheron Constantin indicate the dial was upgraded to the present multi-scale dial sometime after purchase, perhaps at the request of a doctor for his use.

When it comes to iconic models from Vacheron Constantin, the reference 4178 is at the top of the list. With its elegant case featuring large flared lugs, the reference 4178 can also be considered one of the most beautiful and iconic chronographs of all-time. The reference 4178 seems to be imbued with the magical Vacheron Constantin DNA, flamboyant yet with a perfectly elegant case and dial design. While most examples of the reference 4178 were produced in gold, the present watch is one of only a very small number to ever come to market in a case of stainless steel.

The present watch features a complex, exceedingly rare, and beautiful multi-scale / triple-scale dial featuring a pulsometer scale (for measuring pulsations or heart rate per minute), asthmometer scale (for measuring respirations or breath rate per minute), and tachymeter scale (for measuring speed along a fixed course). Perhaps the perfect watch for a gentleman who aspires to be both a doctor and race car driver. While watches featuring pulsations scales are uncommon and prized by collectors, chronograph watches featuring asthmometer scales are extremely rare. The scale of

the present watch however is graduated for five respirations, so when the chronograph is started and the first breath is taken, it is stopped after the patient's fifth respiration and the number of respirations per minute is indicated on the scale. The watch is graduated for 30 pulsations, so likewise the chronograph is started upon detecting the first heartbeat and stopped after the 30th heartbeat, indicating the patient's pulse per minute.

To the best of our knowledge, only three such examples of the reference 4178 in steel with this multi-scale pulsometer, asthmometer, and tachymeter dial are known to the market. One with a dial with identical layout and style including curved "Vacheron & Constantin" text in the center was previously sold by Christie's in 2007. Only one other example is known with yellow gold indexes and a "Vacheron Constantin" signature in a straight line above 12 o'clock on the dial. The present watch was previously only offered at auction in 1995 and found its way into the important collection of Paul White, a notable chronograph collector. Paul White's collection is illustrated in the magnificent three-volume work "Chronograph Wristwatches: Precious Memories of the 20th Century / I Cronografi Da Polso: Preziose Memorie del XX Secolo." The present watch is illustrated on pages 151 and 152 of Volume II.

The movement of this watch is also extraordinarily beautiful. Inside is the *Vacheron Constantin* caliber 434, which was based on the Valjoux 22 movement. This example is relatively early for the reference 4178 and features a beautiful frosted-gilt movement found only in the earliest versions. The dial remains in original condition, although it appears that the central Vacheron & Constantin / Geneve text may have been darkened at some point due to fading.

GRADUE

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With increase in *Vacheron Constantin* watches increasing at rapid pace, particularly for chronographs and watches in steel cases, the present watch can be considered a watch that ticks all the boxes of being a "grail" watch for collectors of chronographs and *Vacheron Constantin* watches. It is a rare opportunity for connoisseurs to have the opportunity to purchase one of the three known steel versions of the reference 4178 with this exceptional dial configuration and the first time in a decade that one of the three has hit the open market.

In 1953, the first Fifty Fathoms watch was released, notably a dive watch that preceded that of *Rolex's* Submariner which debuted later in 1954. Beginning with the French Combat Diving School who helped with the design elements with their know-how of actual diving requirements, *Blancpain* made the first dive watch that was favored by divers and soon it was deemed ready for military use. These watches included a large and legible bezel that could time initial descent, luminous markings to see underwater, and of course the case was waterproof to great depths.

In addition to regular military use, the general population caught on to this good-looking dive watch. *Blancpain* already issued to various military in many countries, but recreational divers were also interested. In response, *Blancpain* decided to add a feature to their watches that would set them apart from the military issued watches. A bright yellow and red 'No Radiations' mark was placed in large format at 6 o'clock. This would also ensure the public that no harmful coatings were used in the making of their timepiece, further noted in the presence of the marking T < 25 MC. to the outside of the dial, highlighting that the tritium used is less than 25 mC.

The present watch was produced at the very beginning of this production, seen by the lack of date as well as 60 minute bezel. In 1971, the German Bundeswher ordered these watches for their dive units. It was therefore the only army that used the watch with 'no date' and 'no radiations' dial. With military engravings to the case back, the present watch is a model which is embedded in the early history of *Blancpain's* dive watches.

One of the Rarest Military-Issued Watches, The Tornek Rayville Reference TR-900

Extremely rare and highly sought after, *Blancpain*'s Tornek- Rayville diver's wristwatch is a dream for any collector of military watches. Developed in the early 1960s by Allen V. Tornek of the Rayville factory, the representative of *Blancpain* in the US, less than 1,000 were made especially for the US Navy.

However, very few were actually sent to the US Navy after they had been manufactured, this watch is one of those few that was sent, making it an even rarer specimen. Upon arrival to the Military base, the watch was assigned a serial number to its case back, written by the US Navy. These watches are so rare that it is believed that less than 100 survive, including those few that went directly to the US Navy such as the present watch, the vast majority of TR-900s having been destroyed by the government due to the Navy's rules regarding atomic waste disposal. Most of the remaining watches are likely resting in the safety deposit boxes of private collectors, it is a good explanation then why these watches almost never come to market, especially in this outstanding condition.

Offered fresh to the market, this watch has an interesting history after its initial assignment. In 1990 it was found with its original strap in an estate sale in New Jersey. The buyer, being a ex-military officer himself was instantly drawn to it. Amazingly the price paid then was only \$25. Ever since it has remained in the owner's possession, never worn but frequently admired.

The design of the Tornek-Rayville was based on *Blancpain's* "Fifty Fathoms" model already in production; it was fitted with the same caliber AS1361 and Promethium 147 (half life 2.5 years) for the luminous material. By changing its color from pink/blue to entirely pink, the humidity indicator to the lower half of the dial would show if water moisture had penetrated the watch.

Produced under US Military Specifications "MIL-W-22176 (SHIPS) WATCH, WRIST, SUBMERSIBLE (400-FOOT), NON-MAGNETIC". As requested by the US Government, the watches had to be legibly marked on the outside of the case back with the specification number ("MIL-W-22176"), serial number, the word "NONMAGNETIC" with the nonmagnetic symbol as well as the radiation symbol.

Reference 6538 came to international fame when it was worn by 007 Agent James Bond in the movie "Dr. No", played by Sean Connery. It was first seen in the movie when Bond enters a bar and checks the time on his watch while lighting a cigarette. He then presses on the dot, or "pearl" at 60 units and blows up an explosive device that was previously planted by him. Of course, Mr. Bond keeps his composure throughout. To *Rolex* collectors, the reference 6538 is often referred to as the "James Bond" model, a name associated with a legendary movie series that will live on for generations as will the watch itself.

Reference 6538 is characterized by a gloss dial with gilt designations, 8 mm. Brevet crown, and a slighter thinner case design than its forefather ref. 6200, thanks to the new thinner caliber 1030. Early models, such as the present watch, are distinguished by a closed minute ring, lollipop seconds hand (with big luminous dot), and bezel with red triangle. The present watch is also notable for its lighter luminous numeral at 6 o'clock, an additional sign of originality.

Rolex reference 6264 was introduced in 1970 and produced for only three years. Together with reference 6262 it was the last *Rolex* chronograph watch featuring the simple round push-down buttons. All future chronograph references, starting with references 6263 and 6265 in 1971 bear screw down chronograph buttons. Reference 6264 was available in stainless steel, as well as 14k and 18k gold. It has a bezel with black plastic insert and white tachymeter graduation.

Of all the *Rolex* Paul Newman watches, the reference 6264 must be considered the rarest. The reference 6264 on offer here excites even more. It is is in excellent overall condition, displaying sharp milling on the back and crisp gold marks on the underside of three of the four lugs, as well as beautifully preserved outlines.

This alone would be enough to entice the eager connoisseur. However, the present watch stands out by virtue of its distinguishable lemon-colored dial. The so-called "Lemoncello" Paul Newman refers to the pale hue of the background color, very few examples are known and the shade can vary from watch to watch.

While the originality of lemon dials is undisputed, their origin is shrouded in mystery. A number of theories have been put forward, among the most probable the fact that a small batch of dials was made with such a design either as a stylistic experiment or as a mistake. Subsequently the batch was gradually used during normal production possibly as a backup in case of lack of ready dials from the normal production. This thesis is supported by the fact that while lemon dials have been spotted on at least three different Daytona references, they are outstandingly rare, with a handful of examples known to the public. The aesthetic impact of the dial combined with its rarity and the aura of mystery surrounding its origin, makes this variation one of the most appreciated and soughtafter by collectors.

Manufactured in scarce volume, gold iterations of manual Cosmograph Daytonas were produced with two dial variations. Black background with champagne registers or champagne background with black registers.

Housing the Valjoux 727 mechanism, gold Daytona chronographs were powered by movements with the COSC official chronometer certification, which was an unusual feature for a chronograph of that period. Consequently, dials fitted on such examples, such as the present watch, bear the designation "Chronometer" at 12 o'clock, and "Cosmograph" above the 6 o'clock register.

In excellent overall condition, the present wristwatch is made even more desirable with its case crafted in 14k gold, such timepieces were reserved exclusively for the American market and are now highly sought-after by the most intricate collectors. Very well preserved, the dial displays a vibrant champagne color and the hallmarks to the back of the lug are crisp.

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Fresh to the market, the present 14k gold example of the stunning "John Player Special Paul Newman" reference 6241 distinguishes itself by its superb dial and amazingly well-preserved case. This watch comes from the original owner, an American collector, who initially received this watch in 1972 as a gift from his father for his milestone 21st birthday.

Produced between 1966 and 1969, reference 6241's total production amounts to roughly 3000 pieces, slightly less than 400 in 14k gold. It is an educated guess that only a fraction of these were fitted with the Paul Newman dial, either in gold or in this case, in black. Beyond its aesthetics, John Player Special reference 6241 is an extremely rare model. Less than 10 examples in 14k gold with black Paul Newman dial have appeared at auction in the last 20 years. Models in 14k gold, such as the present watch, were exclusively reserved for the North American market.

On the 21st of April, 1985, a young Brazilian driver gained his first great Formula One victory in the Portuguese Grand Prix held at Estoril. That day, Ayrton Senna started his racing career by crossing the finishing line for Team Lotus sporting the John Player Special livery in a vehicle that is still today regarded as one of the most 'beautiful' racing cars of all time. The colors of that car, totally black with contrasting gilt details and trimmings, are still synonymous with elegance and charm. The reference 6241 black dial Paul Newman echoes that elegance and charisma.

Of highly distinctive case form, reference 5100 takes its design from the similar, albeit smaller, reference 2554 from the 1950s, also known as the "Manta Ray" model. Produced in a limited edition, reference 5100 was launched in 2000 to celebrate the new millennium.

What makes this watch a modern take on its predecessor, apart from its size, is also the employment of a power reserve for the amazing duration of 10 days. Conveniently for the wearer of the watch, the mechanism will keep running up to ten days straight without requiring the daily or perhaps 36 hours winding necessary for ordinary timepieces.

Reference 5100 is *Patek Philippe*'s first model featuring a ten-day power reserve. Made in a limited edition, this watch can never be recreated exactly as the firm destroyed the tools that were necessary for making the reference. The prestigious Geneva maker made a total of 3,000 pieces of reference 5100. Of these, 1,500 examples were made in yellow gold, 750 in pink gold, 450 in white gold and 300 in platinum.

The successor to the reference 5140, the 5327 was introduced last year in 2016. Offered here from the original owner with all of its accessories, it is an impressive example of modern *Patek Philippe* production in both engineering and design.

This reference houses the caliber 240 Q, used for over three decades by the firm due to its reliability and precision. One will notice through the sapphire crystal display back the impeccable hand-finished movement with mini-rotor and PP seal of excellence. At a large 39mm, the case is significantly larger to those perpetuals which preceded such as the 5140 or the 3940.

The large diameter allows one to admire the 18k gold Breguet numerals which are spaced nicely offering a well proportioned aesthetic. To the untrained eye, the case seems fairly usual, apart from its larger size. However, upon closer inspection one will notice the beautifully sculpted lugs, reminiscent of he reference 5522 which was introduced in 2013. The scalloped sides offer an interesting perspective when on the wrist.

Fresh to market and worn only a handful of occasions, this watch is offered 'complete' and in excellent overall condition.

Reference 5970 was introduced to the market at Baselworld in 2005 and replaced the celebrated reference 3970. The model immediately enjoyed great popularity amongst collectors and was available in white gold or pink gold only until 2007 when the production of these two versions ceased. Reference 5970 in yellow gold was in production only in 2008. In 2008, the model was available exclusively in platinum.

At the 2011 Baselworld, the reference 5970 was replaced by the reference 5270 which additionally has a day/night indication on the dial, as well as a separate leap year cycle and is equipped with the in-house caliber CH 29-535 PS Q.

Reference 5970 was the last perpetual calendar chronograph of the company featuring the Geneva seal on the movement as *Patek Philippe* began stamping their movements with the *Patek Philippe Seal* from mid-2009 as a new quality benchmark for its mechanical timepieces. Despite having been manufactured in recent years, reference 5970 is already today considered a great classic and will not only provide enormous pleasure on its future owner's wrist, but will also be a pillar in any collection focusing on *Patek Philippe's* history of complicated wristwatches.

As the appeal for *Patek Philippe* perpetual chronographs is exceptionally strong, this watch further impresses. Upon its introduction at the Basel Fair in April 2011 it was the firm's first perpetual calendar chronograph to use a 100% in-house designed and manufactured movement. This model houses the celebrated caliber 29-535 PS with *Patek Philippe*'s modern hallmark of excellence, the PP Seal.

The 5270 was introduced with dial variants. The first, now discontinued, has a railroad outer seconds track, larger *Patek Philippe* signature, and black oxidized gold baton numerals. The second variation was introduced in late 2013 with both a silver as well as blue dial, such as the present watch. Perhaps the most distinguishing feature of these dials is the dip in the outer seconds track at 6 o'clock. Often referred to as a 'chin dial,' this feature is characteristic of only this second generation 5270. In addition, the dial features legible circular apertures for day/night as wall as leap year indication, two windows for day and month, all housed within a large and attractive 41mm case. The present timepiece with blue 'chin' dial has never before been offered at Christie's.

A successor to the 5970, this model represents the latest in *Patek Philippe's* perpetual chronograph evolution. One can say that due to the acclaimed all in-house caliber and distinguished dial that it is a true icon of modern *Patek Philippe* production.

Celebrating the 175th anniversary of *Patek Philippe*, reference 5975 represents a great milestone in the history of the firm and in commemoration they did not disappoint with this impressive production.

It is the first self-winding chronograph-only wristwatch ever produced by *Patek Philippe*. The first chronograph from the manufacturer without registers or subsidiary seconds, it furthermore differs from previous *Patek Philippe* wristwatches through its multi-scale dial. Featuring a telemeter scale to compute distances, tachymeter scale for speed and pulsation scale for heart beats, reference 5975 is the first *Patek Philippe* chronograph to enable all these measurements. Moreover, the dial does not seem crowded, the slender black scales are arranged in harmony against the silvered background. Large enough to house this attractive dial, the diameter measures 40mm.

Built with the caliber 28-520 stamped by the *Patek Philippe* Seal, attesting of its impeccable precision and finishing, the wristwatch is delivered only with a solid case back, engraved *175th Anniversary 1839-2014*, previously unseen on references with complication delivered after the early 1980s.

With first examples delivered in 2014, the chronograph was instantly adopted by collectors of the brand. Part of a limited production, only 400 watches were cased in white gold. Offered in excellent condition with all its accessories, this wristwatch presents a rare opportunity for astute collectors to acquire one of the most prized modern *Patek Philippe* chronographs.

Reference 5235 was released at Baselworld in 2012. The uniqueness of this watch lies in its movement which is constructed with the caliber 31-260 REG QA, the last letters standing for Régulateur Quantième Annuel. This is the first ever modern *Patek Philippe* annual calendar wristwatch produced with a regulator dial. In horological history, a regulator was a centrally located clock found in watchmaker workshops, with the large minute hand taking up visual importance. This allowed the watchmakers to regulate the watches they were building against the time displayed on the central regulator, hence the name. The regulator dial allows for more accuracy than a normal watch because it has a non-coaxial hour and minute hands, which means that the hour and minute hands do not share the central pinion position on the dial, but are independently placed.

The Patek Philippe Ruby World Time

Ref. 5130 was launched in 2006 and replaced the reference 5110. Its classic Calatrava style features a larger diameter of 39.5 mm. as opposed to the 37 mm. of its predecessor. The new size enabled the broadening of the width of the exterior rotating disc showing the 24 time zones, thus rendering the names of the 24 world cities even more legible.

Much inspired by the celebrated reference 1415, *Patek Philippe's* first World Time watch introduced in the 1930s, the dial is decorated with a new guilloché sunburst pattern while the distinctive hour markers give the watch an even more dynamic, contemporary look. The ring-shaped hour hand is also reminiscent of the firm's historic World Time watches, symbolizing the globe and reserved exclusively for this type of timepiece.

Unique timepieces from *Patek Philippe* continue to surprise and captivate the market. This example, with an extract confirming the Ruby on the dial is a subtle variation that makes this watch a stand out among its peers. For anyone residing in the GMT timezone, the ruby is a reminder that there truly is no place like home.

Launched in 2002, the 'Celestial' is one of the most important horological complications ever developed. This astronomical wristwatch borrows the principle of the celestial canopy from the most complicated wristwatch ever produced by *Patek Philippe* - reference 5002, the Sky Moon Tourbillon. The nocturnal sky of the northern hemisphere rotates to show the apparent angular motion of the stars and moon as well as the progression of the phases of the moon. Hours and minutes are displayed by two pierced white hands. A delicate elliptical contour on the inside of the glass frames the portion of the sky visible from all cities sharing the latitude of Geneva. To determine the highest possible accurateness for the astronomical displays, the engineers of *Patek Philippe* researched 25 trillion (25,000,000,000,000) ratio combinations, showing the enormous horological challenge the model represents.

The highly sophisticated automatic movement caliber 240 LU CL consists of 301 individual parts, meticulously hand-finished in the workshops of *Patek Philippe*. Three sapphire crystal discs are used to simulate the orbit of the moon and the passage of the stars, hence rendering it a remarkable sense of depth. For the mechanical module for the astronomical displays the firm was granted Swiss Patent CH 688 171 B5.

Reference 5102 was launched in 2002 in white gold only. In 2007 it was replaced by the yellow gold version of which a total of approximately 200 examples was made. It was substituted in 2009 by the pink gold and platinum variant. Production ceased in 2012 when it was replaced by reference 6102.

The reference 2597 "travel time" was launched in 1958 as a response to the arrival of transatlantic flights in the 1950's, and the need for a watch to quickly switch from home time to local time. Louis Cottier developed a solution for *Patek Philippe* that used two correction buttons in the band to adjust the position of the hour hand in either direction by exactly one hour while maintaining the correct relationship to the minute hand.

Reference 2597 was produced in two versions, the first featuring an independently adjustable hour hand, like the present watch. The second version included an additional hour hand. The model did not enjoy much commercial success, and production did not continue for long. Nevertheless, Cottier's patented wheel train is today the basis for *Patek Philippe's* Travel Time reference 5034, launched in 1997.

Launched in 1938, the reference 591 is one of the least known chronographs of *Patek Philippe's* production and was manufactured with the aim of offering a timepiece with a shape and size differing from the reference 130 and 533.

The design of the Reference 591 is quite groundbreaking for early *Patek Philippe* chronographs. Note how the lug side profiles imitate the shape of the chronograph pushers, underlining the nicknamed 'bean' aesthetic or 'fagiolino' in Italian. The cases were made for *Patek Philippe* by no other than Wenger, the same prominent Geneva case maker that later made the 1579 and early examples of the 2497 and 2499 among many other important references. With a total production estimated to only 100 examples in yellow and pink gold and only less than 30 thought to survive, this timepiece is considered rarer than any other chronograph model of the period.

Due to its unusual lug design, it is wonderful to be able to see it here with its full and intended proportions. The rectangular lugs are in seemingly unpolished condition with a crisp hallmark to the case side. This presents an opportunity for the discerning collector to purchase an extremely rare and understated vintage *Patek Philippe* from the first two years of this reference production.

The chronograph wristwatch offered here is a very appealing example of *Patek Philippe's* celebrated "spider lugs" reference 1579. Reference 1579 was launched at the Basel fair in 1943 and remained in *Patek Philippe* catalogues until 1964. The three-piece cases were made by Wenger, one of the most celebrated case makers at the time, the dials were provided by the renowned Stern Frères, the movements based on the Valjoux 13^{III} ébauche, renamed by *Patek Philippe* caliber 13-130 after having been finished to highest standards in the firm's workshops.

The present watch stands out as it comes from the very first year of production for this reference. An early reference 1579, the 1st series was manufactured from 1943 to 1949, with Arabic and baton numerals with baton or feuille hands. The patina of the dial echoes this early example, a warm caramel tone has emerged over time, especially in the top half of the dial. With high vintage appeal, the dial's enamel signature and scales are nicely raised in original condition. The case is also very well-preserved, one will notice the hallmark is still crisp to the back of the lower left lug.

According to research, less than 480 examples of the reference 1579 were produced and perhaps less than 180 are known to survive today.

The reference 1463 at its inception into the market, first in 1940, was marketed as the strongest chronograph that Patek Philippe had ever produced. What is perhaps most appealing about the present watch is its attractive two-tone dial. This example, being offered for the first time publicly from the original family, features a dial in original untouched condition from 1950. With the most desirable raised steel Arabic numerals combined with short indexes, this watch offers the opportunity for one to acquire a fresh to market unrestored example of the most coveted of early *Patek Philippe* sports watches. The present reference 1463 is a superb example of *Patek Philippe's* only vintage chronograph watch with screw back case and round pushers. Introduced in 1940, the model is unquestionably one of the renowned manufacturer's most iconic and popular sports watches.

Manufactured in 1950, the "tasti tondi" (Italian for round pushers, as the model is affectionately called by collectors) offered here for sale is from the "second" series, made from the mid-1940s until around 1961. It is distinguished by the larger winding crown, more substantial lugs with curled ends and a more angular, stepped bezel design, as opposed to the rounded bezel and straighter lugs of the earlier generation.

Patek Philippe produced less than 200 of this reference in steel and less than 100 have ever appeared at market.

Considered one the most beautiful chronographs of the mid-20th century, Reference 1463 is *Patek Philippe's* regular production vintage chronograph model (aside from the 1563) with screw back case and round pushers.

This "second series" reference 1463 was sold in 1954 in the midst of the second series production which ran from 1945 and ceased in 1961. The case of this water-resistant 1463 was made by renowned case maker Taubert (formerly Freres Borgel) and was considered a sports watch in its day for its water and dust resistant case combined with a chronograph.

With a striking appearance, the present watch is offered with a handsome black gloss dial with contrasting white scales. Housed within a bold yellow gold case, it is a timepiece that cannot be overlooked. What is perhaps most notable about the case, however, is the designation of *S*.& *L*. to the case back, a mark from the famous Venezuelan retailer, *Serpico Y Laino*.

Production of the Ref. 130 began in 1934 and continued through the early 1960s. This particular example was made towards the end of the production run of this iconic *Patek Philippe* best selling chronograph and was first sold on December 7, 1960 (coincidentally on the same day of this auction, 57 years ago to the day).

Cases for the Ref. 130 went through some significant evolution during the production run and three major case makers were used by *Patek Philippe* to supply the cases, Dubois, Croisier, and of course Wenger, the maker of the case for the presently offered lot. With full lugs and crisp hallmarks, this is a specimen example of the reference that has developed a fine patina over the decades. The dial features applied gold roman numerals and long stick batons that have developed a matching patina, attractively raised on top of the well preserved silvered dial.

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The presently offered 2497J is the third example of the reference ever to ever be made. The first example was the 2497 prototype with unique elongated lugs sold to Reginald H. Fullerton, Jr. Grandson of Henry Graves, Jr. (M: 888000 C: 663034) and the second was a 2497J with regular 2497 lugs M: 888001 C: 674366. The third, also with the typical 2497 lugs, is the 2497 presented here with M: 888002 C: 674367. It is interesting to note that these three early examples all feature '27 SC' stamped on the movements rather than the 27 SC Q seen on all later examples. Perhaps these early examples are all from the prototype phase of the launch project and the SC, or center seconds, was not yet fully described on the caliber as SC Q, or center seconds quantiemme (perpetual calendar).

The Perfect Combination of Rarity and Superlative Condition

The presently offered 2497 must be considered one of the most attractive examples of reference 2497 to ever appear publicly, revealing the best of all ingredients this important reference has to offer. Fresh to market, and rarely seen the light of day since 1954, this 2497 is a landmark discovery for the *Patek Philippe* market and offers the collector a chance to own a timepiece that is unquestionably best in class for the reference and arguably one of the best condition *Patek Philippe* complicated watches from the 1950s known to exist.

Remaining unworn for many years, the watch shows only very light signs of honest surface wear for a watch of its age. The case impresses with its full proportions, sharp fluting to the lugs, and crisp hallmarks. When the caseback is removed, it is obviously the back has only been opened a handful of times since the watch originally left the factory in the early 1950s. This superb example of the first series of reference is fitted with the more generous case proportions and alternating gold dot and Arabic numerals, as opposed to the applied gold baton numerals of the later generation.

The dial is free of all cosmetic enhancements and in absolutely original condition. The signature, dates, and scales are all beautifully raised as one would expect for an untouched dial. The dial color is warmly aged to an even tone and the crispness of the apertures further emphasizes the fact that the dial is untouched and was not exposed to the abuses of hard wear or restoration.

On top of the extraordinary condition, the watch is accompanied by its original *Patek Philippe* certificate or origin, sales receipt, and box. Fresh to the market, this 2497 is stunning in its condition and completeness, a trophy for the demanding collector.

Reference 2497 is without a doubt among the rarest, most attractive and important vintage complicated wristwatch models by *Patek Philippe*. It was in production from 1951 to 1964, and over these 14 years a meager 115 pieces were made in total. This means an incredibly low output of roughly 8 watches per year. It is powered by the 27SC Q movement, a perpetual calendar upgrade (Q stands for Quantième Perpétuel) of the best manually wound center seconds movement of the time: 27 SC (SC for Second au Centre). As a matter of fact, a specific movement number range was reserved for these movements: from 888'000 to 888'178. This means a total of 179 movements, 115 of them used for reference 2497 and the rest for its waterproof sister model, reference 2438/1.

The case of this reference is a virtual carbon copy of the case of reference 2499, without of course the chronograph pushers. As with reference 2499, the case design presents an evolution over time. The majority of these watches are cased in a Wenger case, featuring a domed case back and slightly downturned lugs. Very early examples, however, are cased in a Vichet case (case maker number 9), distinguished by markedly downturned lugs and a flat case back. The present timepiece is a representative of this rare and early variation of the model.

Accompanied by its original receipt from retailer *Gubelin* as well as original *Patek Philippe* certificate of origin and original presentation box, the present timepiece is offered in excellent condition. With full and crisp lugs and original dial, this represents a very rare opportunity for the discerning collector of vintage *Patek Philippe*.

The Reference 3448, 'Senza Luna'

The reference 3448, Senza Luna. A title that is reserved for an extremely small amount of watches and which prompts one of the most interesting historical narratives of *Patek Philippe's* entire production. One of only seven ever publically identified, this timepiece is one shrouded in mystery and pure excitement for connoisseurs.

The regular production of the reference 3448 began 1962, introduced to the market as the first perpetual calendar produced in series, and furthermore with a self-winding movement. According to literature, a total of 586 examples were made of this popular model which boasted a Patek Philippe patented mechanism, the complicated caliber 27-460 Q automatic movement, and a handsome, well-designed case. However, upon the discovery of the 3448 'Senza Luna,' or 'Without Moon,' enthusiasts had stumbled upon a highly desirable watch but now with an added and extremely rare anomaly. What was this incredibly rare specimen, and where can they be found.

The most famous 'Senza Luna' is the yellow gold "Alan Banbery Senza Luna" which sold for CHF1,840,900 at Sotheby's Geneva in 2008. This watch was accompanied by an Extract from the Archives from *Patek Philippe* dated 1999 confirming the special dial and the fact the watch was modified within *Patek Philippe's* workshops after its initial sale in May 1970.

The known facts of the Senza Luna watches are based on the forensic study of each individual timepiece. The existence of the Banbery Senza Luna is the starting point of this discussion and proves that there were 3448s that were modified by *Patek Philippe* even after they left the *Patek Philippe* workshops for the first time. The images of this watch, including a detailed image of the movement published in Huber and Banbery's *Patek Philippe Wristwatches*, pages 220-221 clearly exemplifies that *Patek Philippe* made special orders of the reference 3448 for important clients and in this case an employee of *Patek Philippe*, Alan Banbery.

There is a possibility then, that the presently offered 'Senza Luna,' produced in 1969, was later modified by *Patek Philippe* at the request of an important client. There is also the possibility that the watch was modified outside of the workshops. Considering that the Patek Philippe Extract from the Archives does not describe any modification, it is impossible to be absolutely confident when or where the Senza Luna modification was made.

A total of six (excluding the "Alan Banbery") watches are known publicly with "Senza Luna" dials: three in white gold, three in yellow gold. The majority, as far as is known from existing Extracts from the Archives, are originally described as having a moon phase indication. It is therefore assumed that all were later modified. – It is really a question of "when".

The watch offered here for sale, no. 1'119'103, was first publicly seen at Antiquorum in Geneva, 2003 when it was sold for CHF399,500. Unknown to the market beforehand, it is the one of the three yellow gold examples known to the market.

The (re-)appearance of this watch at auction gives the true *Patek Philippe* connoisseur the rare opportunity to acquire a timepiece of almost mythical status. Regardless, or perhaps because of the mysteries surrounding its production, the present watch is surely one of the most legendary timepieces associated with *Patek Philippe*.

The reference 3450, successor of reference 3448, was introduced into the market in 1981. The model differs from its predecessor by the modified leap year indication, the small eccentric window at 4 o'clock. The first series was made with a simple red disk and Arabic numerals. The second, personified by the present watch, is made with Roman numeral leap year indication.

A total of 244 examples of reference 3450 were made, the majority in yellow gold cases with only two in white gold are known to date. Production of both references 3448 and 3450 was discontinued in 1985 when reference 3940 was launched.

Reference 3970 was in production from 1986 until 2004 when it was replaced by reference 5970. The reference 3970 came with a solid snap on case back. Shortly after, the 3970 was fitted with a solid screw back, making it waterproof and this model became known as the 3970E such as the present watch (E stands for *etanche* or waterproof). Following the lineage of perpetual chronograph timepieces, the 3970 is the heir to the 2499 and the 1518, which share its unmistakable case construction characterized by its sculpted lugs.

While production of the reference 3970 may have ended only thirteen years ago, these modern yet classic perpetual calendar chronographs have become a must-have for the discerning collector of complicated wristwatches. Dating to the third and final series of this reference, the present watch represents a a time in the history of *Patek Philippe* that cannot be recreated. Fresh to market and never before been offered in public, this sophisticated timepiece is a treasure for its historical relevance to the firm's production, its complex movement and its stunning and original aesthetic.

A Fresh to Market Unrestored Treasure

On March 27, 1956, the original purchaser of this first series 2499 paid 1800 USD for this miniature technical marvel. As the only perpetual calendar chronograph on the market at the time from any maker, this *Patek Philippe* watch was purchased not only as a useful tool watch but also as the most luxurious and one of the most expensive watches of its era. With less than 38 first series examples ever made, this watch was the pinnacle of watchmaking over 60 years ago, and remains the pinnacle of watch collecting today.

The rediscovery of this fresh to market treasure after 6 decades in private hands is truly monumental in the watch world. Made by hand by the finest watchmakers of the time, this watch was meant to be used and preserved for generations. This example survived the test of time, was cared for and used for decades, and now offers a new owner the opportunity to obtain a watch that has been carefully maintained by *Patek Philippe* for generations.

Perhaps the most exciting aspect about this watch is that it is truly unrestored. It has been serviced numerous times by *Patek Philippe* over the generations but it has not been restored to its original aesthetic in modern times. The patina of the case, the exquisite aged beauty of the dial, and the unrelenting dependability of the movement, all add up to equal originality that defines a fresh to market watch that has not been modified and exclusively serviced by the *Patek Philippe* factory. The caseback of this 2499 was fully made by *Patek Philippe* and replaced the Wenger caseback during one of these services, most likely in order to replace a heavily engraved or damaged caseback. Also, the winding crown now bearing a *Patek Philippe* calatrava logo was exchanged by *Patek Philippe* during a service.

The dial, originally made by Stern Frères, is a first series dial of note and quite unique in a number of ways. The Arabic numbers combined with the tachometer are the first to catch the eye, then a more careful study shows the omission of the sector around the dates and moonphase aperture, a variation rarely seen on first series dials. Most notably, this dial features another variant only seen once before, the sub seconds and 30 minute chronograph registers are in raised enamel but not in sunken registers. These original flat registers are in fact larger than the more typical sunken registers and give the dial and overall bolder presence while making it easier to see the functions.

The case is also bold in its vintage presence. *Patek Philippe* commissioned no other than Wenger to make this case and it boasts a relatively massive 37.7 mm diameter larger than the earlier first series 2499s with cases made by Vichet with only 36.2 mm diameter. The size of case of case is only underlined by the fact that the case bezel and lugs have not been detailed or restored in any way and have been aged to perfect with a warm and even patina over the decades.

As an interesting side note, the movement and case numbers of the presently offered 2499J (M: 868347 C: 687763) are only one digit off from the famous 2499J originally retailed by Asprey (M: 868346 C: 687762) that sold for 2.2M CHF at Sotheby's Geneva, November 14, 2006.

When the caseback is opened, the movement is revealed as a literal time capsule containing original parts from the 1950s. Overhauled in the past by *Patek Philippe*, the 13 lignes caliber continues to run dependably and confidently, a masterpiece of mid-century design and technology.

For the collector looking to own a piece of *Patek Philippe's* history at the highest level, this 2499 entices and informs in its originality, character, and vintage charm.

The First Series 2499

When watch collectors think of *Patek Philippe*, they generally think of the round perpetual calendar chronograph wristwatch. This combination of complications has grown to define *Patek Philippe* as a brand, and the watches under this umbrella are at the heart of the horological legend. These timepieces have become icons of watch-investing and are now widely considered to be wearable works of art — the 'holy grail' for any collector of wristwatches.

Widely acknowledged as one of the world's greatest-ever vintage watch models, the 2499 has exerted a strong influence on the designs of many of the most renowned watchmakers. Over a period of 35 years, the 2499 was made in four separate series in a total production of only 349 pieces, the majority cased in yellow gold. The rarity of this model becomes evident when considering that an average of only nine watches left *Patek Philippe's* workshops annually. A 2499 is considered the ultimate statement watch today, instantly recognizable and coveted by collectors of modern and vintage alike.

In order to fully understand the gravity of this wristwatch, it is necessary to examine its role and importance in the history of *Patek Philippe*. Reference 2499 is a perpetual calendar chronograph wristwatch with moonphases. This set of complications is the "signature watch" by *Patek Philippe*. Many other sets of complications have starred in a *Patek Philippe* model at some point in time, but perpetual chronograph are the only line of watches that not only has always been present in *Patek's* catalogue since its first appearance on the market in 1941, but which kept a very recognizable style. In a way, one could say these models are the true custodians of *Patek Philippe* DNA and identity.

As mentioned, this line of wristwatches saw the light of day in 1941, with the presentation of reference 1518, the first serially produced perpetual

chronograph by any brand. Its three subcounters dial is such an achievement of design that it will be kept virtually unchanged through all the different incarnations of the perpetual chronograph. The heir to the 1518 is reference 2499, followed by 3970 in 1989. From 2004 to 2010 the torch was passed on to reference 5970, and the youngest heir is 5270, in production today since its introduction in 2011.

Reference 2499 is divided into four different series, with slightly different case and dial details:

- The first series, exemplified by the watch offered here, features square pushers and a traditional tachometer dial layout with outer railway fifth of a second divisions

- The second series keeps the same dial layout of the first series, but utilizes round pushers

- The third series has a cleaner dial layout, without tachometer scale, and round pushers

- The fourth series, also known as reference 2499/100, is the same as the third series, but with a glazed display case back

The first series was available until 1960, and it is considered particularly collectible not only for the limited production (a total of less than four dozen in yellow and pink gold) but also because it is the only series of 2499 to feature the very recognizable and attractive square pushers. Intriguingly, this can be considered a transitional series, as the square pushers are typical of reference 1518. Their appeal is so undeniable that recently *Patek Philippe* reintroduced it in the two latest versions of their perpetual chronos: reference 5970 and 5270.

Other examples of reference 2499 are illustrated and described in *Patek Philippe Museum - Patek Philippe Watches, Volume II*, pp. 306-307.

This is known as a minimum price guarantee. Where Christie's holds such financial interest we identify such lots with the symbol⁰ next to the lot number.

° ♦ Third Party Guarantees/Irrevocable bids

Where Christie's has provided a Minimum Price Guarantee it is at risk of making a loss, which can be significant, if the lot fails to sell. If the third party is not the successful bidder, the remuneration may either be based on a fixed fee or an amount calculated against the final hammer price. The third party may also bid for the lot above the written bid. Where the third party is the successful bidder, Christie's will report the final purchase price net of the fixed financing fee.

Third party guarantors are required by us to disclose to anyone they are advising their financial interest in any lots they are guaranteeing. However, for the avoidance of any doubt, if you are advised by or bidding through an agent on a lot identified as being subject to a third party guarantee you should always ask your agent to confirm whether or not he or she has a financial interest in relation to the lot.

Other Arrangements

Christie's may enter into other arrangements not involving bids. These include arrangements where Christie's has given the Seller an Advance on the proceeds of sale of the lot or where Christie's has shared the risk of a guarantee with a partner without the partner being required to place an irrevocable written bid or otherwise participating in the bidding on the lot. Because such arrangements are unrelated to the bidding process they are not marked with a symbol in the catalogue.

Bidding by parties with an interest

In any case where a party has a financial interest in a lot and intends to bid on it we will make a saleroom announcement to ensure that all bidders are aware of this. Such financial interests can include where beneficiaries of an Estate have reserved the right to bid on a lot consigned by the Estate or where a partner in a risk-sharing arrangement has reserved the right to bid on a lot and/or notified us of their intention to bid.

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

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

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
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
