

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

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INTRODUCTION Geir Kløver

O n a recent trip to Seattle, I had the chance to spend time in Martin Greene's awe-inspiring polar library. To browse those books was like making a journey through the history of cold-weather exploration; seldom have I seen so many first editions and primary sources in one place. The large atlases alone are worthy of an exhibition, while the older Russian titles are well nigh impossible to find elsewhere. I am thinking of original accounts by Fyodor Litke, Mikhail Lomonosov, Gavriil Sarychev, Stepan Krasheninnikov and Ivan Kruzenshtern. There are many other Russian treasures. Vasily Berkh's book on Bering's first sea voyage caught my eye, as did the Buache-Delisle atlas showing the routes of the earliest Russian expeditions. I saw Pyotr Tikhmenev's book on the Russian-American Company, and documents relating to the Russian-American telegraph project. These rare works are important not only for their geographical findings, but also for their meteorological, biological and ethnographic observations.

The collection also led me to more familiar ground – the exploration of the Northwest Passage and attempts to locate a Northeast Passage. Here on the shelves were some of the most elusive 19th-century titles relating to the search for John Franklin's lost ships: books by James Anderson, Alexander Armstrong, William Henry Browne and Samuel Gurney Cresswell among others. Martin Greene's interests reach further still in time and geography – titles on the circumnavigation of Antarctica, early attempts to reach the North Pole, and expeditions to Greenland and Svalbard.

This sale will be an opportunity for collectors and an inspiration to scholars. These are wonderful books, after all, telling incredible tales of triumph and failure, of camaraderie and competition, of scientific excellence and raw human courage.

reading, traveling and collecting books – great hobbies that have filled empty hours and enriched my life. What a privilege it was in 1998 to go with legendary book dealer Bill Reese to the Beinecke Library at Yale to collate four copies of the Sarychev 1802 texts and plate books, two belonging to the library and two of ours. I could not understand why the Library of Congress listed 56 plates, which, if true, meant that all the copies we had were defective. This question sent me on trips to the Library of Congress and to many libraries in the USA and Russia to look at 15 other known copies of this rare work. Sure enough, the Library of Congress copy was the "defective" one, with six plates from another book added to the 50 plates from the Sarychev.

My parents' families came to the United States from Russia in the 1890s, settling in Nebraska and Minnesota. By age 16 I had visited all 48 of the United States, later adding Alaska and Hawaii to the list (admitted as states in 1959). After moving to Seattle in 1969, I visited Alaska many times, climbing mountains and collecting more books. Visits to Sitka, former home of the Russian-American Company, to Fairbanks to see the wonderful collections at the University of Alaska Rasmuson Library, and climbing Mount McKinley (Denali) and other mountains were highlights of my life.

In London, in June of 1999, I waited in the queue for the opening of the Olympia Book Fair and went immediately to Reg and Philip Remington's booth. Philip asked if I would be interested in a Kruzenshtern atlas that had come into their shop the day before. The answer, of course, was a very definite "yes," and I sat down and spent the next two hours with this incredible set. In time, other dealers wandered by, and soon the whole room became a-twitter that there was a Kruzenshtern atlas at the fair. But I did not let it out of my hands until I confirmed with Philip that I would indeed purchase it. What a find! No other copy of this work has been on the market, to my knowledge, since that memorable day.

An enjoyable aspect of collecting for me was that I could make my own rules. I decided to collect books on Greenland, but not on Iceland. With our Russian background, and with two children and a granddaughter who spoke Russian to assist me, I set a goal to acquire the 161 titles in Valerian Lada-Mocarski's *Bibliography of Books on Alaska published before 1868* (New Haven and London: 1969). Lada-Mocarski included books which he considered most important in telling the story of the exploration and settlement of Russian-America before the U.S. purchase of Alaska in 1867. His own collection was sold in 1971 by San Francisco book dealer Warren Howell to Elmer Rasmuson of Alaska. I believe the present sale includes the most extensive privately held collection of Lada-Mocarski titles (140 lots representing 99 of the 161 Lada-Mocarski entries) since that author's own collection was described and sold nearly 50 years ago.

The search for these rarities has been exciting, educational, and a lot of fun. I thank my book dealer friends and the sellers and underbidders at auctions for helping me along this road. The story of the 1844 Sherman edition of Wilkes's Narrative of the United States Exploring Expedition during the Years 1838, 1839, 1840, 1841, 1842 (lot 295) is fascinating. Apparently, a book scout found this set in a pile of books scheduled for deaccession by the State Library of Iowa in Des Moines. He called Greg Gibson in Massachusetts, who then called me. The bindings needed work but apparently the books had never been opened by the good people of Iowa. All the tissue guards were present and the pages had virtually no wear or foxing. Only one other set, the one belonging to Wilkes himself, has ever come on the auction market. The remaining 71 copies (after an early fire destroyed 27 of the original 100 printed) were given to States or foreign governments, and are very difficult for collectors to obtain. I was very lucky indeed.

For this auction, we selected titles that I would like to be in the hands of other collectors. They tell the stories of some great explorations – of Alaska, important Pacific Voyages to America, the Northwest and Northeast Passages, the search for Sir John Franklin's lost expedition, and of Arctic and Antarctic explorations. I smile when I look at these books, and I will smile when I think of others enjoying them in their collections.

Lada-Mokarski Concordance

This auction includes 140 lots which are described in Valerian Lada-Mocarski's *Bibliography of Books on Alaska published before 1868* (New Haven and London, Yale University Press, 1969). Lada-Mocarski included those books which he felt to be the most important in telling the story of the exploration and settlement of Alaska before the United States purchased it from Russia in 1867. The Greene Library includes books listed or referred to in 99 of the 161 entries in the Lada-Mocarski bibliography. To our knowledge, this is currently the most extensive privately held collection of Lada-Mocarski titles.

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



ANSON, George (1697-1762) – WALTER, Richard (c.1716-1795). *A Voyage Round the World in the Years MDCCXL,I, II, III, IV.* London: for the author by John and Paul Knapton, 1748.

A landmark of 18th-century English

circumnavigation. The first official report of George Anson's voyage, which laid the groundwork for the British voyages of exploration in the Pacific in the latter half of the 18th century. Walter produced a masterpiece of descriptive travel that became the most popular book of maritime adventure of the time. Cox I, 49; Hill 1817; Sabin 101175; Spence 37.

ANSON, George (1697-1762) – PHILIPS, John (fl. 1740). An Authentic Journal of the Late Expedition under the Command of Commodore Anson. London: J. Robinson, 1744.

The first edition of the first published account of the Anson expedition. George Anson sailed around the globe, raiding Spanish settlements in South America before traveling around Cape Horn to Macau, where his fleet captured a Spanish treasure galleon. Over three quarters of the sailors died of scurvy and other disease, and the crew of the Wager mutinied after the ship was separated from the rest of the fleet. Howgego A100; Sabin 62458.






The first edition of "one of the most important geographical books on North American of the 18th century" (Streeter), accompanied by the second issue of Bellin's definitive map of French North America. Bellin was the Official Hydrographer to the French King and a contributor to Diderot's Encyclopedie. His work provides an even-handed analysis of the extant information on the New World, incorporating reports from Russian explorers as well as those of Pierre Gaultier de Varennes - which relied heavily on information from Native American maps. 

The first edition, uncut in original wrappers. Part of Huguenot bookseller Jean Bernard's series *Recueil de voiages au Nord*, this work includes early accounts detailing the Louisiana Territory, Hudson's Bay, and the travels of Martin Frobisher; the plates depict North American curiosities such as the beaver and snow shoes. 
BUACHE, Philippe (1700-1773). Considérations géographiques et physiques sur les nouvelles découvertes au nord de la Grande Mer. Paris: Académie Royale des Sciences, 1753.

The first edition of the magnum opus of eighteenth-century Pacific Northwest geography, in the most desired state with maps separately bound in atlas format. This work brings together significant reports concerning the geography of the Pacific Northwest, including the Russian explorations of coastal Alaska, into a coherent cartographic project. Issued over the course of three years, complete sets are extremely rare.

Buache, who married into the Delisle family of cartographers, has been overshadowed somewhat in historical estimation by the Delisles on the one hand, and his successor d'Anville on the other. But Buache was not only highly esteemed by his contemporaries, he was considerably ahead of his time in his approach to cartography. A pioneer of what is now called thematic mapping, he created unusual charts which mapped the tremors of the earth, undersea mountain ranges, and the ocean floor of the English channel. Following his uncle-in-law Joseph-Nicolas Delisle, Buache became a proponent of the existence of the Great Western Sea described in the apocryphal letter of Admiral Bartholomew de Fonte. Despite occasional errors, his maps nevertheless contributed greatly to the history of geography—providing here one of the earliest depictions of the Alaskan peninsula, as well as important new details about Louisiana. BUACHE, Phillipe (1700-1773). Cartes et tables de la géographie physique ou naturelle. Paris: Delisle & Buache, 1754-7.

The first edition of this collection of innovative maps by Philippe Buache and his father-in-law Guillaume Delisle—very rare at auction. Buache was a pioneer of early thematic mapping techniques, and here he has created maps which, in addition to presenting up-to-date geographical knowledge of America, trace the depths of the ocean floor, the connections of underwater mountain ranges to those on land, and even the topography of the streets and buildings of Paris. The maps are dated to as early as 1744 – which, if accurate, would make Buache's map one of the earliest to depict the Alaskan coast, only 3 years after Bering's expedition there. Aside from the present copy, this work has only appeared at auction once in

the last fifty years according to ABPC and RBH. Lada-Mocarski 11; Phillips 220.

CHAPPE D'AUTEROCHE, Jean-Baptiste (1722-1769). Voyage en Sibérie. Paris: Debure, 1768.

The first edition of Chappe's account of his journey to Siberia to observe the transit of Venus. The 1761 transit of Venus saw scholars dispatched all over the world in order to take measurements from as many disparate locations as possible. This scientific effort allowed scientists to calculate the size of the solar system for the first time. Chappe was appointed to travel to Tobolsk in Siberia, where he observed the transit guarded by a squad of Cossacks-necessary to protect him from the suspicious local population. The engravings after Jean-Baptiste Le Prince, a student of François Boucher, are particularly attractive, offering a rococo vision of Siberian life.

Volume two contains his translation of Krasheninnikov's Opisanie zemli Kamchatki (St Petersburg: 1755). Although a French translation had been previously published, it was based on the abridged English translation, whereas Chappe worked from the original Russian. According to the preface, the translation was made in St. Petersburg, where he consulted Gerhard Friedrich Muller-supervisor of both Krasheninnikov and Steller on Bering's second expedition. 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

The first English edition of Chappe d'Auteroche's report on Siberia. A selection of Jean-Baptiste le Prince's celebrated illustrations from the French

The first edition of this epistolary report on the Hudson's Bay Company. Cluny was posted for a year at the Hudson's Bay Company's headquarters in York Passage, where he wrote this discussion of economic relations between Britain and the colonies. Cluny's book is largely an attack on the HBC, condemning their monopoly and suggesting that they might be hiding knowledge of a Northwest Passage to protect their own interests. To this end, in his fanciful map of America, Cluny names the entrance to the Northwest passage "Cape Spurel" and "Cape Fowler" after the company's chief officers. It was enough to pressure the company to fund Samuel Hearne's expedition to search for the passage. Howes C-501; Lande 428; Sabin 13796; Streeter sale 740; TPL 428.

The first edition of an important report on Russian discoveries in Alaska. William Coxe, an English priest and historian, conducted research in St. Petersburg to compile this account of Russian exploration in the decades after Bering's Great Northern Expedition. One of only 60 copies of the large-paper issue of the definitive fourth edition. The substantial additions to this edition are delineated in the preface and include first appearances in English of Steller's narrative on Behring's expedition, an account of Shelikhov's settlement in Kodiak, and the narrative and maps of Krenitzin's and Levashev's 'secret' expedition. "In view of the above additions, one should consider the fourth edition of 1803 as the most desirable for study of contemporary knowledge of Russian discoveries... Esthetically, one is likely to prefer this large paper edition to the octavo of 1803" (Lada-Mocarski). The type was reset for this large-paper edition and it has different pagination from the octavo, though both are denominated the "fourth edition" on the title-pages. The first published report of any results from Vitus Bering's Great Northern Expedition, with

rare original map. The voyages of Bering, Tchirikow, and Spanberg are all recorded, as well as Delisle's own trip to Siberia to witness the transit of Mercury in 1741 -albeit in a partial and somewhat garbled state. The map also depicts the mythical "Sea of the West," cementing its spurious place in the history of cartography. Delisle had been invited by Peter the Great to establish a school of astronomy in Saint Petersburg and also served as an assistant to J. K. Kirilov at the Russian Academy of Sciences working on the Atlas Rossicus. Betraying his employers, Delisle sent news of some of Bering's discoveries to Paris, where they were included in Du Halde's monumental 1735 atlas of China. His further publication of secondhand Russian intelligence in this volume aroused widespread indignation in that country. DELISLE, Joseph Nicolas (1688-1768). Nouvelles cartes des découvertes de l'amiral de Fonte et autres navigateurs espagnols, portugais. Paris, 1753.

The first edition of Delisle's infamous "imaginary" cartography of the Pacific Northwest, in attractive contemporary decorated wrappers. In 1708 a letter appeared in London's Monthly Miscellany purporting to be by Bartholomew de Fonte "then admiral of New Spain and Peru, and now Prince of Chile," describing a voyage through a Northwest passage. Although there is no evidence suggesting such a person (or passage) ever existed, the letter excited the imagination of Europeans hoping for a Western sea route to China. The Delisle family was particularly taken in by the mythical de Fonte, and this book was Joseph Nicolas's attempt to reconcile de Fonte's journey with the known geography of North America, based on recent Russian expeditions in Alaska. The maps also present the work of the author's cartographer brothers Guillaume and Louis—in some cases, publishing theories (such as the Western Sea) which his brothers would not have themselves have committed to publication. 

The extremely rare German edition, in original boards, of Delisle's 1752 Explication, bound with Müller's devastating critique of the French cartographer's betrayal of Russian geographic intelligence. Unseen by Lada-Mocarski, both translations were done by Johann Victor Krause. Müller's *Schreiben* is the first authentic record of Vitus Bering's 1741 expedition, correcting the errors promulgated by Delisle in his prematurely published work. Also published in French in the same year, its importance "cannot be overemphasized" (Lada-Mocarski). After Bering's death, the news of the discovery of Alaska reached the European press only in small spurts. Delisle's publication of garbled details gleaned from his time working at the Russian Academy of Sciences aroused the indignation of his former colleagues. Müller, who was actually a part of the Great Northern Expedition, was compelled to publish an authoritative account to counter him. No copies are recorded by ABPC or RBH. 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

DOBBS, Arthur (1689-1765). An Account of the Countries Adjoining to Hudson's Bay, in the North-west Part of America. London: J. Robinson, 1744.

A large-paper copy in original boards of the first edition of this seminal work in the history of the search for the Northwest Passage and the colonial struggle over New France. Dobbs was embroiled in a conflict with Christopher Middleton, whom he had sent on an expedition in pursuit of the passage. When the mission failed, Dobbs accused Middleton of colluding with the Hudson's Bay Company to hide its existence. At the end of the book, he includes a glossary of Inuit words. 

He stated definitively that California was not an island but rather a peninsula and rejected the fantastical "Sea of the West" asserted by Buache and Delisle. On the other hand, his critiques of Müller's map of Siberia were unfounded, and his understanding of the rivers of Western North America was described by Wagner as characterized by "remarkable imagination." "The air seemed as if it were frozen, with the appearance of a fog...birds fell down out of the air as if dead...during the day, short as it was, parhelia and haloes round the sun were frequently seen, and in the night mock moons and haloes about the moon."

The first edition of the most important early work on the natural history of Siberia, with a distinguished scientific provenance. Gmelin served as natural historian on the Great Northern Expedition, one of the largest exploratory enterprises in history, which mapped the Arctic coast of Siberia under the auspices of Vitus Bering. Travelling overland with the historian Gerhard Friedrich Müller and the astronomer Louis Delisle de la Croyère, Gmelin was to survey all aspects of the area and eventually rendez-vous with Bering's seaborne expedition to Kamchatka. However, this plan was abandoned in late 1736 following various difficulties, including a fire which destroyed Gmelin's instruments, notes, and specimens.

The party continued to explore by land, ranging broadly across the previously unsurveyed territories before returning to St Petersburg in February 1743, some nineand-a-half years after their departure. This copy is formerly of the libraries of Dr. Johann von Autenreith, anatomist and chancellor of the University of Tübingen, and Carl Robert von der Osten-Sacken, consul-general of Russia in New York City until 1871 and a renowned Arctic scientist in his own right. 

Most copies of the second edition (even with the Cadiz report) are found with the later title-page, dated 1599. The Cadiz report itself is in Church's first issue. This second edition is greatly expanded over the first edition of 1589, with the entire third volume dedicated to America. 



The first edition of the first description of Kamchatka. A handsome copy with fine provenance of

"a very rare book" (Lada-Mocarski). Krasheninnikov's narrative comprises one of the earliest printed accounts of Alaska and the Aleutian Islands. "The engraving of an 'American,' facing p.128, is the earliest pictorial representation of a native inhabitant of any part of Alaska" (Lada-Mocarski). Krasheninnikov joined Bering's second expedition and explored Kamchatka as Steller's assistant. Steller's own account was not published until nearly forty years later, but his notes were available to Krasheninnikov who compiled this *Description* from both their journals. Steller's observations on America are "an important part of this work"; Krasheninnikov had intended to highlight Steller's contribution in the preface to this book, but died before he could write it. This copy is from the first issue: without the preface by G.F. Müller and with one notice to the reader rather than two. Copies from this issue are thought to be from a small group (less than a hundred out of 1350 in the edition) intended for presentation to eminent contemporaries. RBH and ABPC record only one copy at auction (from the second issue; Christie's, 20 May 1992, lot 324).

Bornovolokov – the first recorded owner of this book – was deputy head of the Russian-American Company, and the intended successor of the redoubtable Aleksandr Baranov (1747-1819) as de facto governor of Russian America. But Bornovolokov died in the wreck of the *Neva* when this famous ship, which had sailed in the first ever Russian circumnavigation, was caught in a storm while crossing from Kamchatka to Alaska. Although the title is dated 1755, publication had been delayed by production of the plates, which were not ready until 1756. 

In addition to being the first to suggest the Ural continental border, Strahlenberg's work on Tartar dialects was groundbreaking. 

The first edition in Latin of this major work of 16th century Arctic exploration, describing three voyages under Willem Barentz in search of a Northeast Passage to the Far East. In the latter part of the 16th century the English and the Dutch attempted to discover a northeastern trading route to the Far East by sea. After several failed attempts the English gave up, never reaching further than to Novaya Zemlya (three centuries later a notorious Soviet nuclear test site). De Veer's account describes the three voyages undertaken by Willem Barentsz (c.1550-1597) in the form of an illustrated diary. On the first two of these expeditions Barentsz was accompanied by Jan Huyghens van Linschoten, famed for his voyage to the East. The first voyage of 1594 sailed the length of Novaya Zemlya and then via Vaygach to the Kara Sea. Believing they had found the Northeast Passage, the Dutch set out on a second expedition the following year with ships heavily loaded with trading goods intended for the Chinese, but this trip was thwarted by frozen waters. The third voyage of 1596-97, which takes up most of De Veer's account, is one of the most important in the history of polar exploration. After the discovery of Bear Island and Spitsbergen, Barentsz sailed to Novaya Zemlya, eventually rounding the northern cape. The ship was crushed in ice, and the expedition members were forced to make the first recorded overwintering this far north, surviving in a hut constructed of driftwood. This hut, which features in this works illustrations, was remarkably rediscovered in 1873. It was filled with ice but many artifacts were salvaged for museums. Barentsz died on this third voyage, but the surviving members (including De Veer, who had also participated in the second voyage) managed to reach the Kola Peninsula where they found three Dutch ships which gave them transport home. The illustrations depict the many hardships, including the construction of the camp on the ice, numerous encounters with polar bears, and many other scenes of the expe

De Veer's important account was first published in 1598 in Dutch, with this Latin and the French editions appearing in the same year. The Dutch first edition is practically unobtainable; this first Latin is also very rare with only three copies appearing in the auction records of RBH after 1961. 

His manuscript was ultimately edited and published by Father Andrés Marcos Burriel in Madrid, who judiciously revised the original account and added information gathered by other explorers, including George Anson and Vitus Bering, to his account of the Pacific coast. In the course of this friendly note to the Marques de Montealegre, the Mexican lawyer Francisco Xavier Gamboa announces the arrival of Bodega y Quadra in a small billander at the Spanish naval base in San Blas. Bodega y Quadra has sailed as far as Sitka, Alaska in search of Russian colonies—finding none, he claimed the rest of the Pacific coast for Spain. The expedition suffered from scurvy as well as attacks from Native Quinault people, but refused to turn back until the mission had been completed. 



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

The very rare first edition of one of the most important voyages made to the Northwest Coast of America, supplementing Vancouver's achievements. In 1791 Broughton sailed with Vancouver and explored the mouth of the Columbia River in the *Chatham*. In 1793 he returned to the northwest in Bligh's old ship, the *Providence*, to rejoin Vancouver at Nootka Sound for further surveys. Britain based her claims to the Oregon Territory in 1846 on these surveys. Its importance also lies in Broughton's notices of Japan and of Russian interests in Asia. From Cape Horn, he commenced his surveys in Australia, Tahiti and Hawaii before making for Nootka, but failing to make his rendezvous with Vancouver he continued south to California. The maps all pertain to his charting of the Sea of Japan, Formosa and the Ryukyu Islands while the plates are of Japanese subjects. Although Broughton did not call at any ports in Alaska, he reported on the Russian American Company's possessions outside the northwest American coast, especially in the Kurile Islands, and on Russian-Japanese relations. Forbes records two issues of the first edition, the sole difference occurring on p. 394: one issue with the list of plates on this page (this copy) and the other with advertisements. 

I), with a separate "History of the Buccaneers of America" in vol. IV, and completed to 1764 in vol. V. Burney became a great authority on maritime history, having served the whole of his professional life in the Navy and on Cook's second and third voyages. Through his access to the London literary world he collected the voyages for this work, and wrote important remarks on them which a contemporary review called 'a masterly digest of the voyages to the South Sea, displaying a rare union of nautical science and literary research'. 





A very rare and splendid fully colored copy of the first edition, the plates drawn by the expedition artist on Kotzebue's world voyage of 1815-1818. Essentially, this is an illustrated album recording only the most memorable facts of the voyage but with full explanations of the plates—more of which relate to California, Hawaii, Kamchatka and Alaska than any other work of the period—and the Philippines, Chile and Easter Island. It is arranged in 8 sections which were first sold in 22 livraisons, 1820-1822 (although both Brunet and Howes state that publication ended in 1823). Two title-pages were printed, dated 1820 to accompany the first *livraison*, and 1822 for the successive parts. There was only one issue of the text and plates, according to Forbes, and although a lithographic portrait of the artist is found in a few copies, its presence does not constitute an issue point. Indeed, it may have been produced only after the work was completed.

The text was written and edited by J.B. Eyries and the list of subscribers (present in this copy) accounts for 188 copies. Choris supervised the execution of the plates himself and reworked several to his liking. Four variant plates are noted by Forbes as the most important and this copy has the last and presumably preferred variants of all of them: the dance at the mission in San Francisco lithographed by Langlumé; King Kamehameha less wrinkled; Queen Kaahmanu with spelling of her name corrected (to "Cahoumanou"); and the dance of the Hawaiian women with the additional background and a possible self-portrait of Choris in the foreground. This latter plate is the "much more beautiful" of the two issues in the opinion of Lada-Mocarski. The manuscript text of the voyage was

never published but his album is highly prized for its beauty and its historical record. Forbes writes that it contains "a final and very beautiful pictorial examination of the Hawaiian Islands and of Hawaiian culture as it existed prior to the death of Kamehameha I in 1819, and prior to the abolition of the 'kapu' or feudal system following the king's death" and considers it "*the* great colorplate book of the Northern Pacific" (emphasis ours). Wagner states that the maps of the Northwest Coast in the atlas are superior in some respects to Vancouver's and that Alexandre von Humboldt used them as models for some of the maps in his very influential *Essai politique sur le Royaume de la Nouvelle Espagne* (1811).

Attribution of this work is a source of some debate. Fernández de Navarrete was a member of a family with long-standing naval tradition and was a career naval officer with access to privileged



information. He was instrumental in founding the Depósito Hidrográfico in Madrid and compiled a great deal of data about Spanish naval history, including the transcription of over forty immense volumes of rare manuscripts regarding Spanish voyages since the fifteenth century. The work is sometimes attributed to José Espinosa y Tello, the cosmographer on the Malaspina expedition, whose own account of the voyage was published in 1809. However, given his accumulated study, it is more likely that Fernandéz de Navarrete authored this summary of Spanish exploration of the Northwest Coast, especially in light of the fact that neither Palau nor Sabin associate Espinosa y Tello with the work. 



"Golovnin served as the model for the cosmopolitan, professionally trained naval officer for future generations. Three future explorers – Fedor Litke, Ferdinand Wrangel, and Fedor Matiushkin – served under him on the *Kamchatka* and praised the strict and rigorous training they received in the 'Golovnin School'" (Whittaker). 

The rare first edition, German version, of the first Russian circumnavigation of the globe. Kruzenshtern's atlas is an outstanding accomplishment of Russian cartography and travel illustration, and "one of the best – one may say magnificent – examples of Russian printing and engraving of the nineteenth century" (Lada-Mocarski). Here the atlas is in the earliest variant known for this issue: the world map is dated 1813 (rather than 1815 or 1818), and all the maps and coastal profiles have captions in Russian only. Nearly all the maps in this copy are printed on thick, bluish paper. RBH and ABPC record no copy of the atlas having ever been offered at auction.

Kruzenshtern's voyage is one of the most important after Cook, and is especially valuable for its description of the Northwest coast of America and of the North Pacific. The expedition greatly improved cartographic knowledge but had much grander objectives: Kruzenshtern envisioned that, while exploiting this region's resources – mainly fur – and trading these with China, Russia would develop its own, home-grown navy and finally shed its troubling dependence on Britain for personnel and training. This ambitious expedition also set out to examine the viability of colonizing California, aimed to improve trade in South America, and to open relations with Japan and the Sandwich Islands. Kruzenshtern sailed from Kronstadt and visited, among others, the Marquesas, Hawaii, Kamchatka, Japan, Macao, and St Helena. The atlas includes very fine views of these locations. Kruzenshtern was assisted by the brilliant Lisianskii, Langsdorff and Kotzebue. The expedition separated once it reached Hawaii: Lisianskii sailed to the Northwest coast aboard the *Neva*, and Kruzenshtern continued to Japan – a journey that required considerable diplomatic sensitivity at a time when Japan was still a closed country.

Lada-Mocarski notes that "in different copies of the same issue [...] the number and the type of plates vary considerably". He gives the typical range as between 106 and 112 plates, quoting Obol'ianinov as his source for the higher number, but this is incorrect: Obol'ianinov lists 109 plates only. The copy in the Library of Congress, the Russian version originally in the Palace Library at Tsarskoe Selo, lists a total of 110 plates. The Greene copy and the Library of Congress copy appear to be the only two in the U.S. with the maximum number of plates. A handsome first edition in English of the first Russian circumnavigation, a voyage undertaken in part with the aim of reducing Russian dependence on England for naval training. Kruzenshtern had a brilliant corps of officers: Lisianskii (commanding the *Neva*), Rezanov, Langsdorff, Kotzebue and Bellingshausen–all men who went on to make their mark on Pacific exploration. Although sponsored by the Czar, the voyage was funded by the Russian American Company to "open relations with Nippon and the Sandwich Islands, to facilitate trade in South America, to examine California for a possible colony, and to make a thorough study and report on the Northwest coast, its trade and future" (Hill). Kruzenshtern was a precise and fastidious man, he objected to Richard Hoppner's sometimes inaccurate translation, particularly of navigational terms and references. A Russian-language issue was published in the same year. RBH and ABPC record only three copies of both languages altogether; all three - including the Streeter copy - featured only the South Pacific maps; apparently no copy of the North Pacific section has sold at auction before.

This landmark of cartography – certainly one of the most important early atlases of the American Northwest – was compiled by Kruzenshtern from his own voyage around the world, supplemented by various subsequent voyages in the North and South Pacific. The engraved general title was apparently issued only once both parts had been published. All the South Pacific maps are dated 1824 in the engraving, and all the North Pacific maps are dated 1826 or 1827; one of the North Pacific maps [plate 33] has an engraved statement in the bottom margin, in French, that the map was corrected in 1828. Lada-Mocarski notes that later editions are known, in which some of the South Pacific maps bear a similar printed statement of correction dated variously 1835 or 1838. Three text volumes were published to accompany the atlas, but the last volume appeared a decade after the first: consequently, the text is seldom found together with the atlas. Cf. 

This was the first French expedition to visit Alaska and the first non-Spanish European expedition to stay at the Spanish settlements in California. With Count Rezanov, a founder of the Russian American Company and Russian Ambassador to Japan, he sailed to Japan to open trade talks (which failed), but their stay is finely detailed and illustrated to include a voyage to Hokkaido and an appended vocabulary of the Ainu language. Langsdorff left the expedition in Kamchatka with Rezanov in 1805 and sailed for Alaska and Sitka, then continued to California where he visited the first Russian settlements at Fort Ross and San Francisco. 

The recipient of this copy, Menshikov, accompanied Tsar Alexander throughout his campaigns against Napoleon; later, during the Crimean War, he served as Commander-in-chief by land and by sea; and from 1836 to 1855 Menshikov was Minister of the Imperial Navy. 

A very handsome copy of the rare first edition in English, by the commander of the Neva on Kruzenshtern's voyage around the world. Lisianskii had been given a different assignment to that of Kruzenshtern in the *Nadeshda* and so he alone called at Easter Island and remained longer in Hawaii, where he discovered the island that bears his name. His stay in Alaska was also longer and he spent a productive time recording his observations and trading for furs. At Sitka he became involved with Baranof's retaking of the Russian fort which had been overrun by the Tlingit Indians. From Kodiak he made straight for Canton with his furs and a hasty voyage to Kronstadt, arriving two months ahead of Kruzenshtern. Nonetheless, as Kruzenshtern commanded the expedition it is to him that credit goes for Russia's

first circumnavigation. The excellent maps are from Lisianskii's own surveys; the large map shows the track of the voyage and there are charts of the Coast from Behrings Bay to Sea Otter Bay, Washington Island, and Lisianskii's Isle. The superb views of Kodiak and Sitka are from his drawings. The English edition was translated from Russian by the author and contains his ship's log and vocabularies of the languages of the Marquesas, Hawaii, Kodiak, Unalaska, and Baranof [Sitka]. 


MACKENZIE, Alexander (1764–1820). Voyages from Montreal, on the River St. Laurence, through the continent of North America to the Frozen and Pacific Oceans, in the years 1789 and 1793. London: T. Cadell and W. Davies; Corbett and Morgan, 1801.

An important association copy: a Hudson's Bay Company copy of the first edition of the first documented crossing of North America, sponsored by their bitter rivals, the North West Company. George Simpson, whose name appears here crossed out on the title-page, was appointed Governor-in-Chief of the Hudson's Bay Company in 1820 and oversaw its period of greatest power. Mackenzie, a Scots fur trader, emigrated to North America in 1779 and was employed by the North West Company. In what is now the province of Alberta, Mackenzie and a cousin set up a trading post, Fort Chipewyan, on Lake Athabasca in 1788. This was the starting point of his expedition of 1789. The route followed the Mackenzie River from the Great Slave Lake to the river's delta on the Arctic Ocean. Mackenzie crossed the Rocky Mountains in 1793 from Fort Chipewyan to the Pacific coast of what is now British Columbia. Together these journeys constitute the first known transcontinental crossing of America north of Mexico. The work includes important vocabularies of the Knisteneaux, Algonquin, Chipewyan, Hegailer and Atnah Indian languages. Shortly after Simpson joined The Hudson Bay Company, it merged with the North West Company. 

It came to ruin in a storm near Kruzof Island, in the Alexander Archipelago. Markov, a merchant on business in the region, met one of the survivors in Sitka, and wrote down his account of the fearsome events, which included the capture and torture of some survivors by an indigenous tribe. RBH and ABPC record no copy having been offered at auction; WorldCat locates just one copy, at Yale University. The survivors's camp, with artifacts, was found in 2015 near Sitka, on Kruzof Island.





The first edition of "one of the early and fundamental books on the northwest coast of America," with the three Dixon-Meares controversy pamphlets—rarely found bound together in a contemporary binding. Meares captained the *Nootka* on a fur-trading mission to Russian America in 1786. A disastrous overwinter in Prince William Sound might have resulted in the loss of the expedition if not for the help of Captains Portlock and Dixon, who were also sailing in the area and provided vital aid. This work describes that voyage, along with a detailed report on American trade with China, as well as a return trading journey in 1788-89.

The publication of Meares's report, which contains some unflattering comments about Dixon and Portlock, fueled a small controversy waged in print between the fur traders. Dixon responded with *Remarks on the voyages of John Meares*, in which Dixon calls out his exaggerations and mocks his navigational skills. This in turn inspired an exchange of two more insulting pamphlets. As notes in one of them: "a contention between individuals is seldom of sufficient importance to be communicated to the Public; as, generally speaking, few are entertained by, and still fewer are interested in, the concerns of private persons: the present case, however, I humbly conceive not as merely relating to Mr. Meares and myself, but of real importance to all who may hereafter be concerned in prosecuting the commerce of which it is the subject, or navigating the seas where that commerce is carried on." Various bibliographies call for differing numbers of plates. The present copy with 28 plates conforms to the Lada-Morcarski copy and to the majority recorded at auction. A very rare preliminary document of the Nootka Sound Convention. While questions of ultimate sovereignty over the disputed territory were deferred, Spain here agreed to indemnify owners of British ships seized by the Spanish Navy at Nootka bay, including John Mearee's *Iphigenia*. 





This work was compiled by Ezekiel Terry, who writes in the preface that Patterson's "...nerves are so affected by his sufferings, as that he is incapable of writing himself, and the deficiency of his papers has been filled up by the compiler, under his inspection. Much pains has been taken in preparing this work for public view, to render it truly useful and beneficial to the world." 



There is a manuscript note on the front endpaper: "The gift of the author afterwards Lord Mulgrave." 

Rikord landed at Kunashie where he negotiated the eventual release of Golovnin, averting war with Japan. Takadaya-Kahei several months in Kamchatka and was instrumental in convincing the Japanese government that the Russians could be trusted. He later helped settle between the two nations territorial disputes in the Kuril Islands. Golovnin's account of his captivity was published in the same year (see lot 81). Despite lack of profit, however, France now had an up-to-date report on conditions on the west coast of America from California to the Aleutians, on Hawaii, the Marquesas, and on the prospects for trade in each of these areas. In the section on the northwest coast of America, Roquefeuil gives many details of the Indian inhabitants" (Hill). Despite its successes, and although the voyage had been authorized by the French Ministry, upon return Roquefeuil was denied promotion and therefore resigned from the Royal Navy. 



A rare complete copy of the first edition, finely bound in contemporary Russian red morocco. "One of the fundamental and very rare early books on the Aleutian Islands" (Lada-Mocarski). RBH records only one other complete copy having sold at auction in more than forty years: the Lada-Mocarski copy (sold, PBA, 29 October 2015, lot 572, \$138,000). Sarychev's exploration in the North Pacific is the earliest substantial scientific account of the Aleutians and part of the Alaska coast; its plates and maps constitute the most important iconography and cartography of Alaska up to the time. Nearly all the second volume relates to Unalaska, and also includes important linguistic material on the dialects of Russian America. The expedition was sponsored by Catherine II and led by Joseph Billings who had accompanied Captain Cook on his third voyage. The party sailed from Okhotsk in 1787 with Billings piloting *Pallas* and Sarychev at the helm of *The Glory of Russia*. In addition to charting the Siberian coastline and regions, Sarychev was charged with asserting Catherine's sovereignty in the area and assuring locals of her protection.


Historically, there has been much confusion about the correct number of plates in a complete copy, and about whether the plates were intended to be bound into an atlas or within the text. Martin Greene conducted extensive research into these issues, and examined nearly every recorded example in institutions in the U.S. and Russia. Greene's research showed conclusively that a complete set comprises 51 plates, and that these were made available to buyers soon after the text (in 1802-03) together in one volume without a separate title page. Complete copies of the plates volume are very rare: RBH records only one other sold at auction in the past 25 years: the Lada-Mocarski copy (sold, PBA, 29 October 2015, part of lot 78, together with the text, \$138,000).

Historically, there has been much confusion about the correct number of plates in a complete copy, and about whether the plates were conceived as an atlas or if they were intended to be bound within the text. Martin Greene conducted extensive research into these issues, and examined nearly every recorded example in institutions in the U.S. and Russia. Greene's research showed conclusively that a complete set comprises 51 plates, and that these were made available to buyers after the text (in 1802-03) together in one volume without a separate title page. That they were issued without a title page strongly suggests that the publisher did not consider them to constitute a separate atlas as such. All the plates have printed page references, indicating that the publisher intended that buyers would bind these with the text. But very few did: only two copies are known with the plates bound into the text, one of them the Greene copy (see lot 144).

Sarychev's is "one of the fundamental and very rare early books on the Aleutian Islands" (Lada-Mocarski). The expedition was sponsored by Catherine II and led by Joseph Billings who had accompanied Captain Cook on his third voyage. The party sailed from Okhotsk in 1787 with Billings piloting *Pallas* and Sarychev at the helm of *The Glory of Russia*. In addition to charting the Siberian coastline, Sarychev was charged with asserting Catherine's sovereignty in the region. This copy was once in the collection of Angus Ward, American Consul in Russia in the build-up to and during the Second World War; first in Moscow in 1938, and later as Consul General in Vladivostok. He was also Consul in Mukden, China, during the final years of the civil war and was held under house arrest by Mao's forces for nearly a year – a diplomatic hiccup now known as "The Ward Incident" (1948-1949). 

An important association copy of the first edition of "one of the cornerstones of any collection of books on Alaska" (Lada-Mocarski). The Delarov family copy: Efstratii Ivanovich Delarov (c.1740-1806) was an early general manager of the Russian-American Company from 1787 to 1791, known then as the Shelikhov-Golikov Company. Delarov was the immediate predecessor of the redoubtable Alexander Baranov, and remained a director of the company until his death. Paul I granted the company its charter in 1799, giving it a monopoly over all trade in its reach. Fort Ross, just north of San Francisco, was built by the company and marked the southernmost outpost of Russian America. The maps include a large folding map of the Russian colonies on the shores of the Pacific, a map of Sakhalin and the Amur estuary, a map of the Aleutian Islands, and a hand-colored folding map of the indigenous dialects of the Russian-American colonies. Pavel Viktorovich Delarov, who also added his name to this copy, was a noted collector of Old Masters. A manuscript note by Delarov's father Pavel records the provenance, in Russian: "My grandfather, Commercial Councilor, Evstratii Ivanovich Delarov, who is written about in this book, in the above mentioned pages [listed above this inscription] died in St. Petersburg as the Director of the Russian American Company in the year 1807, in his 63rd year of life. [And, in Pavel's hand:] This note made by my father, Viktor Ivanovich Delarov. [Signed] Pavel Viktorovich Delarov, Pavlovsk (Petersburg Guberniya). 22 July 1905." 






The Search for the Northeast and Northwest Passages Revived: Litke and Ross through McClure

Hooper's health was irreversibly weakened by three Arctic winters and he wrote this narrative to relieve his own boredom while bedridden in London. He described befriending Chukchi children and one of the text illustrations is his own portrait: "a specimen of Tuski drawing, being in fact my Likeness, drawn by Enoch, the Canny lad. An important document evidencing the treaty between the two great Northwest fur-trading companies of the 19th century. The Hudson's Bay Company and the Russian-American Company were rivals for decades but in 1839, under the aegis of James Douglas, they entered a commercial treaty whereby HBC had the right to lease fur-trading territory south of Mount Fairweather (the present-day Alaska panhandle) in exchange for 2000 otter pelts and a number of supplies. The present document details transactions in 1843, including, on the credit side: two maps of British North America for Nicholas von Freymann, and "land otter returns"; and on the debit side: supplies landed at Sitka for Fort Victoria, Fort Vancouver and three ships, including boots, a rudder, nails, iron, fish and deer. It mentions A.A. Etholen (1799-1876), the Chief Manager of the Russian American Company by name. The final balance of accounts is £13,789. 2s. 10d.

The first separate edition of this rare survey of Russian circumnavigations. It covers all ships, including those of the Russian-American Company which sailed to the North Pacific, even if they failed to reach their destination or to make the return. A number of these are not strictly speaking circumnavigations, but are included still. Ivashintsov was especially interested in the hydrographical data collected during these voyages, which he compiles into a very substantial table of nearly 100 pages. Ivashintsov, who eventually reached the rank of Rear Admiral, was awarded the Russian Geographical Society's Konstantin prize, primarily for his hydrographic work. His review first appeared as parts 7 and 8 of *Zapiski gidrograficheskago departmenta Morskago Ministerstva* (1849-1850). Wickersham notes that 25 offprints of Ivashintsov's *Zapiski* chapters were issued, none for sale. Most notable from a historical perspective is King's charge that Capt. Back appropriated his own research and that Back's conclusions were less than exact. Whereas Back is relatively dismissive, King praises to great length the Chipewyan chief Akaitcho who fed the starving parties of the first two Franklin expeditions and Back's third and without whose generosity Franklin would not have sailed on his last fateful journey. 



The rare first edition of Litke's survey of Novaya Zemlya: an important stage in establishing the Northeast Passage to the Pacific. RBH and ABPC record no copies having been offered at auction. The easternmost point in Europe, Novaya Zemlya separates the Barents Sea from the Kara Sea – a body of water long thought to be impenetrable. This expedition made four attempts to circumnavigate Novaya Zemlya from the north, each one prevented by exceptionally heavy ice. But it made important contributions to the Northeast Passage project, correcting significant mistakes in the positions of landmarks such as the Matochkin Strait, studying extensive areas of the Barents Sea, and mapping-out possible anchorages. Litke had participated in Golovnin's around-the-world voyage on board the sloop "Kamchatka" (1817-1819), and it is Golovnin that recommended that Litke be put in charge of the Novaya Zemlya expedition. The first edition of the account of Ross's second voyage, a tall set. After Ross's disastrous voyage of 1818, the Admiralty refused to allow him to lead another Arctic expedition until 1829. With assistance from gin magnate Felix Booth and with contributions by Ross himself, he commanded the steam vessel *Victory* with his nephew James Clark Ross as second in charge. In searching for a passage south from Regent's inlet, the *Victory* was stopped by ice, and Ross and his men spent the winter of 1829-1830 in Felix Harbor. In the summer of 1830, the ship made some progress and got a few miles further south to winter in Victoria harbor. But there it remained stuck in the ice, and in May 1832 was abandoned. Ross and his men made their way to Fury Beach, where they passed yet another winter in a hut built from the wreck of the *Fury* and managed to survive by eating an Inuit diet. In the summer of 1833, they succeeded in reaching Ross's old ship, the *Isabella*, in Lancaster Sound and used it to return to England. The voyage, remarkable for the length of time spent in the ice, yielded much in the way of scientific observations, including information on natural history, meteorology, navigation, and ethnology. The very rare first edition of "the only full and detailed printed account of Malaspina's voyage from California to Alaska by one of the participants" (Lada-Mocarski); it is also one of the rarest of books relating to Australia. Alessandro Malaspina (1754-1810), of Italian birth sailing in the service of Spain, made a crucial 18th-century world voyage that included a visit to Port Jackson in 1793. Upon his return to Spain, the court intrigue which resulted in Malaspina's imprisonment also halted the publication of an official account. The results of his expedition, including sixty crates of specimens, were lost in the archives of the Madrid Museum. Malaspina's own journal was not studied until eighty years later when Pedro de Novo y Colson edited a version for publication in 1885. Francisco Javier de Viana was an ensign on the voyage who settled in Uruguay on its completion and his is the first report of the Malaspina voyage to be published. In the context of Australian exploration the work is of great importance, providing detailed information about Port Jackson just five years after the first settlement (the section occupies pp.258-266). Of perhaps equal importance was the voyage's exploration of the coast from California to Alaska. Lada-Mocarski notes that with the exception of José Espinosa y Tello's introduction to the *Relacion del viage...por las goletas Sutil y Mexicana* (Madrid, 1802), there is "nothing as complete and detailed [about the Malaspina expedition] printed before 1868."

Viana's sons prepared their father's account for the press. It was printed on the travelling press of the army besieging Montevideo during the war between Argentine and Uruguay, thus partially explaining its great scarcity. THE FRANKLIN SEARCH EXPEDITIONS, Lots 236-294

The fate of Sir John Franklin, and the search to discover it, dominated the 19th century mind and inspired countless the interior of North America, Franklin's search for the Northwest Passage began on 19 May 1845, when he sailed from England with two ships, the *Erebus* and the *Terror*, carrying 128 officers and men. The vessels were last sighted by British whalers north of Baffin Island at the entrance to Lancaster Sound in late July of that year. In 1847, when no word had been received, search parties were sent out. For 12 years, various expeditions sought the explorers, but their fate was unknown until 1859, when a final search mission, sent in 1857 by Franklin's second wife, Lady Jane Franklin, and headed by Captain Francis Leopold McClintock, reached King William Island, southwest of Lancaster Sound. They found skeletons of the vessels' crews and a written account of the expedition through April 25, 1848. The sunken ships *Erebus* and *Terror* themselves were only very recently discovered, in October 2014 and September 2016 respectively, and their contents are currently undergoing salvage and study.

The only known separately published account of Anderson's Franklin search expedition, first edition. 



A poignant artifact from an important Franklin Search expedition, in Admiralty binding and with contemporary inscription describing the desertion and rescue of the Resolute, commanded by Edward Belcher. The inscription is on the upper inside cover and reads in full: "This book formed a portion of the library of the Resolute, which was abandoned in the Arctic regions & after floating more than 1000 miles, was found by a vessel from New London & brought to the U.S. after 14 months from the period when she was deserted." In April of 1854, the Resolute was abandoned in the slowly moving floe ice in which it had been trapped since the preceding August and her men marched across the ice to join the other ships of the expedition. It was not until September 1855 that the Resolute was rescued by an American whaler on the open seas off Baffin Island. The U.S. returned the ship to Great Britain and as a token of thanks Queen Victoria presented President Hayes with a desk made from its wood. The "Resolute" desk remains in the Oval Office of the White House to this day.

The rare first edition by the captain who came closest to the site where Franklin's expedition ended. "In 1849 Collinson was appointed to command an expedition for the relief of Sir John Franklin, by way of the Bering Strait; he himself had command of the Enterprise, and with him was Commander Robert Le Mesurier McClure in the Investigator. The two ships sailed together from Plymouth on 20 January 1850 but unfortunately separated in the neighbourhood of Cape Horn and did not meet again. The Enterprise passed Point Barrow, Alaska, on 21 August, but the ice forced Collinson to return south and winter in Hong Kong. In 1851 he was again hampered by ice and in 1852 was frozen in at Cambridge Bay for the winter. In 1853 the Enterprise was caught in the ice at Camden Bay, and there passed a third winter. She reached Point Barrow on 8 August 1854, after being shut up in the Arctic, entirely on her own resources, for upwards of three years. Of the many who had searched for Franklin, Collinson came closest to the place where the expedition had ended. Collinson's addition to geographical knowledge on this Arctic trip was very considerable, and would have been tantamount to the discovery of the north-west passage, had this not been already actually achieved by the men of the Investigator" (DNB). 



A presentation copy of these rare and spectacular views of the entrapment and abandonment of H.M.S. Investigator in the Arctic ice, inscribed on the title-page: "Thomas Masters Grendon[?] / from S. Gurney Cresswell / Lynn / March 1855." In 1850, Robert McClure was given command of the *Investigator* as part of the second Franklin search expedition. Entering the North-West Passage from the Bering Strait and sailing eastwards, the ship became trapped in pack ice in the autumn of 1851, before being finally abandoned in 1853. Although the events were fully documented, the location of the wreck was not known for over 150 years because of difficulties reaching the area. In July 2010 the *Investigator* was found at a depth of 8 metres, just off Banks Island, in the Beaufort Sea. Of the three Franklin Search plate books (Cresswell, May and Browne), this is the most handsome and rare. We trace no other presentation copies in the auction records. 



John Richardson advocates for "the moccasins and socks universally worn by the native population of Rupert's Land," emphasizing that in "the coldest weather, not less than three, nor more than four, socks, should be drawn over each foot." The first edition, recounting McClure's discovery of a Northwest Passage. In 1850 McClure took command of the *Investigator*, one of two ships sent to find the British explorer Sir John Franklin, missing in the North American Arctic since 1845. McClure entered the Bering Strait from the Pacific and found two entrances to the Northwest Passage around Banks Island, now part of the Northwest Territories of Canada. The *Investigator* became trapped in the ice of Mercy Bay just north of Banks Island, compelling McClure to abandon the ship; his party was rescued by two ships at nearby Melville Island. The rescue ships were in turn abandoned and McClure then continued north and east to meet Belcher's ships which had come in from the east, thus completing a transit of the Northwest Passage. For abandoning the ship, McClure was court-martialed, then honorably acquitted and finally knighted for his endeavors and given the 10,000 pound award as the discoverer of the Northwest Passage. 





The excessively rare official printing of the first edition "of the great American scientific voyage of the nineteenth century, issued by the United States Congress to announce America's scientific coming of age" (Forbes), being a presentation copy to the State of Iowa. Only 100 sets of this official issue were printed, and a quarter of these are thought to have been destroyed in the 1851 Library of Congress fire. Of the remaining 75, the large majority are in institutional collections as they were intended for presentation to American state libraries, as here, and to foreign heads of states. Haskell traced only one privately held set (the Wilkes copy, which sold at auction in 2009).

The United States Exploring Expedition "was the first American scientific expedition of any size, charged to 'extend the bounds of Science and promote the acquisition of knowledge,' and was one of the most ambitious Pacific expeditions ever attempted" (Forbes). The Expedition represents 'the first governmental sponsorship of scientific endeavor and was instrumental in the nation's westward expansion. Specimens gathered by expedition scientists became the foundation collections of the Smithsonian Institution. Significant American contributions in the fields of geology, botany, conchology, anthropology, and linguistics came from the scientific work of the expedition. Wilkes's evaluations of his landfalls influenced later U.S. positions in those areas' (*Dictionary of American Biography*). Wilkes's impressive survey of the Pacific Islands resulted in over 200 new charts for 280 islands, notably Hawaii, the Fiji group, the Philippines and the islands of Micronesia. Wilkes was first to use the term "Antarctic Continent." His ships surveyed 1600 miles of coastline, and discovered the Shackleton loe Shelf and Wilkes Land. The charting of the North West American Coast was equally important. Wilkes surveyed the entrance to the Columbia






River then in the disputed Oregon territory, and all of the Puget Sound. A separate party travelled overland to San Francisco from the Columbia via Fort Sumner, and completed the earliest map of this new trail. After his return Wilkes spent the next 27 years producing a number of expedition reports. Hale's "volume 6" present here is also one only 75 of the official issue, with "By Authority of Congress" on the half-title. The ethnography and philology covered largely relates to Oceania and Australia. Forbes 1517, 1589; Haskell 1, 15, 19; Hill 1746, 1866, Howes W-414, Rosove 353.A1, 354-1.A1.





The first edition, unofficial issue "of the great American scientific voyage of the nineteenth century" (Forbes); this set with documents relevant to its publication laid in. The present is the unofficial issue of the United States government edition, of which 150 sets were printed according to a letter written by Wilkes on January 28, 1845. Of these, 25 sets are presumed to have been retained by Wilkes for distribution amongst his friends. Among those friends may have been Maryland Congressman (later Senator) James A. Pearse, some of whose correspondence concerning the publication of Wilkes' narrative is laid in. The laid in items comprise: an ALS from Titian Peale to Pearse, 18 June 1847, concerning the proof sheets for Peale's zoology report for the Wilkes expedition; a 2-page MS signed by A.R. Spofford as Librarian of Congress, [after 1864], detailing the extraordinary cost of the Wilkes narrative and the disposition of the sets; 2 printed Congressional reports by James Pearse: from 7 February 1835 concerning the prayers of citizens that the Expedition would occur, and from 25 June 1846 concerning the printing of additional copies of the Narrative. 

The first octavo edition in original cloth "of the great American scientific voyage of the nineteenth century" (Forbes). The present is the imperial octavo issue of the United States government edition, of which 1000 sets were printed, being the first edition intended for the citizenry. Later octavo editions omitted the Atlas. The United States Exploring Expedition "was the first American scientific expedition of any size, charged to 'extend the bounds of Science and promote the acquisition of knowledge,' and was one of the most ambitious Pacific expeditions ever attempted" (Forbes). WILKES EXPEDITION – PALMER, James Croxall (1811-1883). *Thulia: A Tale of the Antarctic*. New York: Samuel Colman, 1843.

The first edition of the "earliest published Antarctic poetry"

(Rosove). This delightful work recalls Palmer's time under the command of Charles Wilkes in the United States Exploring Expedition of 1838-1842. He was aboard the U.S.S. *Flying-Fish* which achieved the highest southern latitude to date. "The ice, the piles of ice, arrayed / In forms of awful grandeur still; But all their terrors how they fade, / Before proud man's sublimer will" (p. 36). A collection of correspondence by or relating to Wilkes and the 1838-1842 United States Exploring Expedition which he commanded. The two letters from Wilkes regard various aspects of his published account, *Narrative of the United States Exploring Expedition During the Years 1838, 1839, 1840, 1841, 1842* (1844) – his letter of 14 April 1851 presents a copy of his introduction to J.K. Tefft, Esq., at the Georgia Historical Society and his second, dated 2 January 1868, authorizes Captain D.F. Strand to dispose of the publisher's plates in Philadelphia. The other letters are either written by members of the expedition or concern the expedition in some regard. The earliest, dated 1833, is from Dr. Charles Pickering, who would later serve as Naturalist under Wilkes. He writes to recommend Dr. H. McMurtrie as a lecturer in Zoology. The second letter, dated 1838, is from W.B. McMurtrie, who would serve as an assistant Zoological Draughtsman under Wilkes, and includes a list of 16 items for use during the expedition. The third letter, 1838, is addressed to Wilkes and is regarding "Young

Stebbins," whom the writer, Ogden Hoffman, recommends for the expedition.



The very rare zoological atlas to the United States Exploring Expedition, one of only 150 copies printed of the unofficial, Lippincott issue. The scientific reports to the Wilkes Expedition took over 30 years to complete and the final print run was whittled down to only 100 'official' sets and 150 'unofficial'. Most copies of this issue have the second state of plate 42, but this copy has the first state with snow petrel perched on floating ice and a ship and large iceberg in the background. This atlas was issued in lieu of the unpublished atlas meant to accompany Titian Peale's text volume on this subject from 1848. Peale's atlas had been rejected and in 1852 Cassin agreed to rewrite the text and reconfigure the atlas, still using 32 of Peale's plates. 


contributions by William Sullivant, Edward Tuckerman, Jacob Bailey, William H. Harvey, M.A. Curtis, M.J. Berkeley, and John Torrey. The intended atlas volume was never published but the plates appeared variously in other publications. Although the Wilkes Expedition returned in 1842 and Asa Gray was not delinquent in preparing the manuscripts, the scientific reports in general were severely delayed first by politicking and budget concerns and then by the Civil War. ALASKAN BOUNDARY TRIBUNAL – Proceedings of the Alaskan Boundary Tribunal. Convened at London, under the treaty between the United States of America and Great Britain, concluded at Washington, January 24, 1903, for the settlement of questions ... with respect to the boundary line between the territory of Alaska and the British possessions in North America. Washington: Government Printing Office, 1904.

A complete first edition set of the proceedings of the Alaskan Boundary Tribunal between Great Britain and the United States. Because of the lack of exact geographic knowledge, establishing the precise boundaries of Alaska was a complicated and long-standing task. When the US bought Alaska from Russia, the boundaries negotiated with Great Britain in 1825 had to be negotiated yet again. In 1903, the Alaskan Boundary Tribunal set the boundaries in favor of the United States over Canada, leading to a surge in Canadian nationalism spurred by anger at what they felt was Britain favoring America over their own colonial holding. The exact borders of Alaska were not completely surveyed and established until 1952. Ricks p. 6; Wickersham 9373.

Elihu Root's copy of the British Argument in the Alaska boundary dispute, in red morocco presentation binding. The dispute concerned the exact location of the division between Alaska and Canada in the incompletely surveyed boundary of the panhandle of Southeast Alaska. Root represented the United States at the Alaskan Boundary Tribunal, which ruled 4 to 2 in favor of the United States against Canada. Canadians felt unfairly treated by Britain, leading to an upsurge of Canadian nationalism. Wickersham 895.





The first British edition of the harrowing account of Luigi Amadeo's expedition toward the North Pole. Although the party beat Nansen's "Farthest North" record, the Duke lost two fingers and was unable to join the sled journey to 86° 34'. Arctic Bib. 10423.

The first edition account of the first successful negotiation of the Northwest passage in a single ship. Amundsen and his team traversed the Northwest passage in the *Gjøa*, overwintering on King William Island. Over the course of several years on the ice, Amundsen learned about Arctic survival skills from the Netsilik Inuit—skills which would later enable him to endure the journey to the South Pole. The *Gjøa* was given to the United States and located in Golden Gate Park, San Francisco, until 1972 when it was returned to Norway. 



The company sponsored several polar expeditions over the years, and a mountain range in Antarctica was named after them by explorer Richard E. Byrd.

A colorful printed handkerchief commemorating Salomon Andrée's first attempted balloon voyage to the Arctic. The text reads "Lycklig Resa! Valkomna Ater! ("Happy Travels! Welcome Back!"), so that supporters could use it to both wave the expedition off and welcome it back home. Andrée was forced to turn back early and the expedition's meteorologist found that the balloon needed to be replaced. Refusing to take this advice, Andrée's second attempt resulted in tragedy when the balloon and her crew was lost North of Spitzbergen.







Astrup pioneered the combination of dog sleds and skis that revolutionized polar expeditions, and is still the youngest person to ever receive the Order of Saint Olav. He died tragically young while on a solo ski trip. The Philadelphia imprint appears to be uncommon. Arctic Bib. 777.

Peary and Cook clashed over who had been the first to reach the North Pole—Balch here sides with Cook, although the courts and public opinion at the time did not. The Norwegian Balchen piloted the first flight over the South Pole and later became an American citizen. The Peary Arctic Expedition of 1896 had been arranged for, and the place and date of sulling had been fixed upon (Sydney, Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia), perhaps as early as the evening of Sunday, July 18th. Some of the party had come to Sydney by Thursday, July 9th, and our immediate party had come from Baddeck, Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia, on the night of July 18th. Some of the baggage of this party had come to Sydney nearly a week before, on July 6th and 7th. Those of the party who came previously were Mr. Russell W. Porter, Jr., Mr. Putnam of Washington, D. C., of the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey, who had been detailed by the U. S. government to make pendulum observations; and Mr. Hugh Lee of Meriden, Con., who had been with Lieut. Peary on a former trip.

The weather had been warm and the foliage of the country around Sydney was fully out, strawberries were in bearing, and the evergreens were dark. On Sunday the

The original edition was published in Swedish, and only partly translated in French and German; but this Russian translation will have been especially valuable to Russian administrators. RUSSIAN NORTHERN SEA ROUTE – KANTAROVICH, Lev Vladimirovich (attributed to, 1911-1941). Photographic portrait of Captain Otto Iulevich Schmidt, c.1932.

An uncommonly large and evocative photographic portrait of Captain Schmidt, the tireless leader of Russia's attempts to open the Northeast Passage with icebreakers, in order to liberate the vast riches of Siberia. For these efforts Schmidt won the highest distinctions: he was named a Hero of the Soviet Union, he was awarded the Order of Lenin, and – most valuable of all – he was spared during Stalin's purges despite falling out of favor. Schmidt, captaining the *Sibiriakov*, was the first to complete the crossing in one sailing season without wintering. This photograph was probably taken during that landmark voyage; Kantarovich was the artist and photographer on the *Sibiriakov* expedition.

Saving the crew of the Cheliuskin became a matter of national pride, with events swiftly gaining a mythological dimension and a place in the consciousness of Stalin's Russia akin to Shackleton's epic in Britain. Voronin was no stranger to Arctic heroism: he had commanded the icebreaker Aleksandr Sibiriakov on the first successful navigation of the Northeast Passage without a wintering stop; and he had also commanded Georgii Segov on its search for Umberto Nobile's dirigible Italia which had crashed on its return flight over the North Pole.

- a heroic endeavor that was celebrated and mythologized by Stalin's Russia as much as Shakleton's and Scott's voyages were in Britain. *Cheliuskin*, a reinforced steamship rather than an icebreaker, was sent to establish if conventional ships could sail the Northern Sea Route in a single season. It made it to the entrance of the Bering Strait before being crushed by pack ice. The crew escaped and carved a landing strip for their rescue, which had to be rebuilt more than a dozen times, all with the most rudimentary tools. The rescue pilots that found them were the first to receive the newly created Hero of the Soviet Union award - the highest possible distinction. They had been assisted by two American mechanics who were awarded the Order of Lenin. Arctic Bib. 6314.





The plate captions, and Head of Expedition Otto Schmidt's preface, are published in four languages to capitalize on the propaganda value of this achievement. 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

Samoilovich's inscription describes her as a "worthy participant" (*dostoinaia uchastnitse*). The crash of Nobile's dirigible on its return flight to the North Pole led to a series of rescues attempts, during one of which Roald Amundsen lost his life. The icebreaker *Krasin* eventually reached the survivors. Samoilovich was feted at first, but was later caught up in a Stalinist purge and executed. He was rehabilitated in 1957, and in 2000 his portrait appeared on a Russian stamp commemorating the expedition. Vorontsova published her own account (*Na* 81° severnoi shiroty) in 1929; it is reproduced, in part, in this volume (pp.158-174).

Innocent is also remembered for devising an alphabet based on Cyrillic for Unangan, the most widely used Aleut dialect. 



In addition to the **hammer price**, the successful bidder agrees to pay us a **buyer's premium** on the **hammer price** of each lot sold. 2 TAXES

 - (a) This additional warranty does not apply to: (i) the absence of blanks, half titles, tissue guards or advertisements, damage in respect of bindings, stains, spotting, marginal tears or other defects not affecting completeness of the text or illustration;

However, if we choose, we can also sell your property in any way we think appropriate. We will use the proceeds of the sale against any amounts you owe us and we will pay any amount left from that sale to you. If there is a shortfall, you must pay us any difference between the amount we have received from the sale and the amount you owe us.

2 EXPORT AND IMPORT

8 WAIVER

No failure or delay to exercise any right or remedy provided under these Conditions of Sale shall constitute a waiver of that or any other right or remedy, nor shall it prevent or restrict the further exercise of that or any other right or remedy. No single or partial exercise of such right or remedy shall prevent or restrict the further exercise of that or any other right or remedy.

9 LAW AND DISPUTES

This agreement, and any non-contractual obligations arising out of or in connection with this agreement, or any other rights you may have relating to the purchase of a lot will be governed by the laws of New York. Before we or you start any court proceedings (except in the limited circumstances where the dispute, controversy or claim is related to proceedings brought by someone else and this dispute could be joined to those proceedings), we agree we will each try to settle the dispute by mediation submitted to JAMS, or its successor, for mediation in New York. 

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STREET MAP OF CHRISTIE'S NEW YORK LOCATIONS



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

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
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
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
