# CHRISTIE'S SWITZERLAND – FIVE DECADES OF OPULENCE... AND COUNTING



The appeal of Switzerland is hard to match; a visually stunning country with sprawling natural beauty, charming small towns amidst cutting-edge cities, nurturing an internationally acclaimed financial hub.

Against this ideal backdrop, we opened our first Swiss office and the then only saleroom in continental Europe at 16 rue du Marché, Geneva in 1967. We held our inaugural auction on 7 June 1968, presenting a rare collection of Meissen porcelain from a royal European family. Our first success brought CHF1,140,000

A second, greater triumph followed less than a year later. Our Chairman in London won a peerless consignment of jewellery, but there was a catch. The collection was in Paris and importing it to London would incur exorbitant taxes; import friendly Geneva was the perfect solution. So, on 1 May 1969, 800 collectors crowded into Hotel Richemond to bid on the awe-inspiring collection of Nina Dyer. The sale realized over US\$1 million, an unprecedented sum at the time. It also launched Geneva as Christie's key international saleroom for the finest and rarest.

Spurred by the momentum, we quickly presented another Jewellery auction in November, relocated to the old town into a majestic 16th century building once used as dormitory for monks; and from there the ball continues to roll... and roll.

From the 1970's onwards, Geneva has been a blooming auction centre for Christie's, prolifically hosting sales of jewels, watches, wines, silver, Russian works of art, objects of vertu, porcelain, furniture, paintings, vintage cars, stamps, and even historic arms and armor.

We also expanded our geographical reach within the country. In 1978, we opened our office in Zurich as a consignment center for Impressionist, Modern and Contemporary art, and from 1991 onwards a saleroom for Swiss art. From here, Ferdinand Hodler's "Der Holzfäller" made its way to the Musée d'Orsay in 2005, and Hodler's "Traum des Hirten" found a new home at the Metropolitan Museum in New York in 2013. We also orchestrated annual auctions in St Moritz from 1990 to 2007, beginning with the jewels of Suzanne Belperron and Rene Boivin, the first of 18 important auctions.

As Christie's adapts to changing times and tastes, we fine-tuned our operation in Geneva to focus on jewels, watches and wine, as our story continues...

...with the legendary collections of the most illustrious tastemakers of our time: Mrs Lily Safra, Mrs James A de Rothschild, Mohamed Shah Aga Khan III, Mouna Ayoub, Helene Rochas.

...with the world's most memorable gems: The Oppenheimer Blue, The Orange, The Art of De Grisogono, The Sweet Josephine, Winston Legacy, The Archduke Joseph Diamond, The Grand Mazarin.

...with the extraordinary horological wonders that shone at Christie's: the 18K gold perpetual calendar chronograph wristwatch with moon phases and tonneau-shaped case by Patek Philippe (CHF6,260,000, May 2010), the extremely rare 18K gold precision watch with two movements by Breguet & Fils (CHF4,340,000, May 2012), and never to be forgotten, the mid-17th century blue enamel and diamond watch created in Paris, presented in 1986 and hailed by experts as "the most beautiful watch ever seen."

...and with the most coveted wines: Bouchard Père & Fils La Romanée 1865 (CHF37,500), Chartreuse Blanche, 1878 to 1903 (CHF22,325), Madeira from 1740 (CHF20,400).

As we continue to focus on paintings in Zurich...

...with the numerous prestigious Swiss art collections we introduced: "Works from the Zumsteg Collection" in 2006 (CHF12,000,000), the Swiss Art Collection of Ernst Beyeler for the benefit of the Fondation Beyeler in 2011, the charitable sale of properties from the Estate of the late Bruno Giacometti in 2012, and Fischli Weiss' "Der Lauf der Dinge", the reigning world record for any contemporary Swiss artist sold at auction in Switzerland, at CHF1,020,000 achieved in 2008.

So, to sum up our 50 marvelous years in Switzerland - the exquisite jewels, watches, wines and art we presented, the many price records we created, the generations of connoisseurs we served, the support and friendship we enjoyed in this mecca of beauty and refinement. Our commitment to Switzerland has been an amazing and rewarding journey. We look forward to the coming decades with the greatest anticipation.

# **CHRISTIE'S SUISSE** – CINQUANTE ANS DE SUCCÈS... ET BEAUCOUP D'AUTRES À VENIR



Un pays visuellement étourdissant, doté d'une beauté naturelle, constitué de charmants petits villages et de villes à la pointe du progrès et qui nourrissent un hub financier et culturel florissant acclamé internationalement. L'attrait de la Suisse est difficile à éga ler.

Dans ce contexte hors du commun, le premier bureau de Christie's en Suisse a été ouvert en 1967, 16 rue du Marché à Genève. Le 7 juin 1968 se tint notre vente inaugurale, présentant une collection de porcelaine rare de Meissen ayant appartenu à une famille royale européenne. La vente est un succès et réalise CHF 1,140,000.

Moins d'un an plus tard, second succès : le Président de Christie's Londres avait réussi à obtenir une sublime collection de bijoux modernes par Cartier, Van Cleef & Arpels, ainsi qu'un très rare collier de perles noires; mais il y avait un hic. La collection se trouvant à Paris, son importation à Londres aurait généré des taxes d'importation exorbitantes. Genève, et sa politique d'importation favorable, se présentaient alors comme la solution idéale. Le 1er mai 1969, 800 collectionneurs se réunissaient à l'hôtel Richemond pour assister à la dispersion de la collection de bijoux de Nina Dyer. La vente réalisa plus d'un million de dollars, une somme inédite à l'époque. Cet événement propulsa Genève au rang de salle de vente internationale de premier ordre, en raison de la qualité des objets qu'elle proposait.

Grâce à ce développement, en 1970, Christie's emménage dans de nouveaux bureaux dans la vieille ville, dans un ancien monastère datant du 16ème siècle. Depuis cette époque, en novembre et en mai, ont lieu des ventes de joaillerie, auxquelles assistent grands collectionneurs et professionnels. Les activités de Christie's Genève se diversifient ; et aux ventes de joaillerie biannuelles s'ajoutent des vacations de montres, de vins, d'orfèvrerie, d'art russe, de porcelaines, de voitures anciennes, de meubles, de peintures, de timbres, et même d'armes anciennes...

En 1978, Christie's inaugure son deuxième bureau en Suisse, à Zurich, une région riche en collections d'art impressionniste et moderne. Puis dès 1991, Christie's Zurich devient l'unique salle de vente pour l'art Suisse. De grandes œuvres du peintre suisse Ferdinand Hodler (1853-1918), *Der Holzfäller et Traum des Hirten* sont acquises par des institutions de renommée mondiale, respectivement par le Musée d'Orsay en 2005 et par le Metropolitan Museum de New York en 2013.

En 1990, les ventes de St Moritz voient le jour, avec une vente inaugurale de bijoux signés Suzanne Belperron et René Boivin. 18 autres grandes vacations suivront jusqu'en 2007.

Londres, New York et Paris s'imposant pour les ventes de beaux-arts et d'arts décoratifs, Christie's adapte ses activités à Genève en privilégiant les ventes de joaillerie, montres et vins. Et l'histoire continue...

...avec les collections de personnalités qui façonnent les goûts et les tendances d'aujourd'hui comme Lily Safra, James A de Rothschild, Mohamed Shah Aga Khan III, Mouna Ayoub ou encore Hélène Rochas.

...avec la vente de diamants exceptionnels comme The Oppenheimer Blue, The Orange, The Art of De Grisogono, The Sweet Josephine, Winston Legacy, The Archduke Joseph Diamond, The Grand Mazarin.

...avec d'uniques chefs-d'œuvre horlogers comme une Patek Philippe vendue CHF 6,260,000 en mai 2010 ou une Breguet vendue CHF 4,340,000 en mai 2012 ; sans oublier la montre du 17ème siècle signée Jehan Cremsdorff, Paris, qualifiée comme « la plus belle des montres » d'après certains experts.

Au cours de ces cinquante années de succès, grâce à vous, raffinement, expertise et passion se sont unies pour faire briller notre maison. Nous nous réjouissons de poursuivre ce voyage en votre compagnie lors des prochaines années.



### THE BOLD DRAMATIC ALLURE OF RETRO CHIC JEWELS

As the 1930s wore on through the Great Depression and toward the Second World War fashion became less luxurious and began to be influenced by the events looming large on the world wide horizon. The bias-cut slipper satin dresses of the early 1930's, inspired by Madeleine Vionnet had been worn with large rows of square and emerald cut diamonds set geometrically in platinum for bracelets worn up the arm and known as 'service stripes'. By 1939, the silhouette had become more natural. Waists had become emphasised with narrow belts for the first time since the early 1920s. Skirts had started to shorten to just below the knee and become fluid, and shoulders to widen as can be seen in photographs of film stars at the time, such as Marlene Dietrich, Joan Crawford, Lauren Bacall and Ingrid Bergman.

### PLATINUM VS GOLD

The post-war years in Europe were difficult times that were marked by restrictions. The restriction on the use of platinum particularly impacted the jewellery designer's choices, they prefered polished and vari-coloured gold. Rose gold, because of the high percentage of copper allowed in, also became very popular. Gold was used in many ways: braided, woven and mesh patterns reappear in jewellery. Gemstones were also rare, Retro jewels were seldom set with them, and when they were, it was often semiprecious gems.

### RETRO JEWELS

Retro jewels are reflective of a unique period in time. It is marked by World War II and war reconstruction, and by what comes with it: the political changes, the restrictions and shortages as well as the incredibly fast industrial growth that followed.



# BUCCELLATI

At the beginning of the 20th century, Mario Buccellati opened his first shop in Via Santa Margherita in Milan. In the following years, the fame of Buccellati jewels began to attract the attention of royalty all over the world. In 1925, he opened a shop in Rome, in Via dei Condotti, followed in 1929 by one in Florence, and one in New York in 1953.

In 1965, the three sons of Mario, who were goldsmiths themselves, decided to create their own company: Federico Buccellati runs the shop in Rome and in Milan. Production is carried out today by 70 Italian craftsmen. The tradition is maintained by Federico and his three children.







# ART NOUVEAU

Art Nouveau was a brief moment (circa 1890-1910), which had a lasting impact on jewellery design and many other arts. It was a completely new style based on original ideas, innovative materials and entirely different design principles.

In reaction to increasingly machinemade, mass-produced jewellery, freefloating forms from the natural world were explored as never before. It was a softer aesthetic, sandwiched between the icy monochrome of Belle Époque diamonds and the hard-edged Art Déco geometry that would dominate the 1920s and 1930s.





### JANESICH

Leopoldo Janesich opened his first shop in Trieste in 1835, offering jewellery and silverware to an international clientele. At the end of the century, he established a branch store in Paris at 19, rue de la Paix, followed in by other locations as London and Monte Carlo. 





## AN IMPORTANT LATE 19TH CENTURY EMERALD AND DIAMOND NECKLACE, BY TIFFANY & CO.

Lot 315 is a truly magnificent example of Tiffany & Co.'s late 19th century style. From the supple make to the outstanding quality of the gemstones: a dazzling sequence of matched Colombian emeralds, vibrant green in colour and pure in clarity. The necklace is further enhanced by the incorporation of the *fleur-de-lys* motif, a stylised lily symbolic of French royalty since the Middle Ages. While the *fleur-de-lys* has appeared in countless European heraldry over the centuries, it is particularly associated with the French monarchy and remains an enduring symbol of France to this day, appearing on French postage stamps and emblems across the nation.

The name Tiffany & Co. is synonymous with the very best gems, having received countless awards at worldwide exhibitions for their innovative jewellery designs. Founded in New York City in 1837 as a stationary and fancy goods store known as Tiffany & Young, by 1853 Charles L. Tiffany had assumed complete ownership of the business and Tiffany & Co was born. The business prospered and had risen to the pinnacle of commercial success by 1876, shortly before this superb necklace was created.

In the late 19th century the company embarked on a buying spree in Europe and quickly became one of the most prolific collectors of aristocratic jewels. They were the major buyer at the auction of the French Crown Jewels in Paris in 1887, and that style and fervour for European jewels can be seen in the design of this necklace.

They were also one of the most prolific buyers at one of the most famous sales of Royal jewellery, that of Isabella II, Queen of Spain in 1878. Isabella II was famous for collecting some of the worlds' most fabulous emeralds, and a spectacular corsage ornament with very large emeralds averaging 55 carats each was exhibited at the London Crystal Palace exhibition in 1851.

Isabella II became Queen of Spain at the age of three, following the death of her father, Ferdinand VII in 1833. By 1843, with her mother having been exiled to France, she was declared of age to rule and was soon embroiled in a tumultuous marriage with her first cousin. Isabella's personal affairs were eventually her undoing, and with the outbreak of revolution in 1868, she fled to France and abdicated in favour of her son Alfonso XII. Ten years followed and in order to finance the restoration of the basilica in Atocha as a memorial to his deceased wife, it was decided that the magnificent jewellery collection of Isabella would be sold. The proceeds came to around \$1 million. It may well be that some or all of the emeralds in this magnificent necklace have originated from that historic sale in 1878.

Startling artistic pieces such as lot 315 are exactly the reason Tiffany & Co.'s international reputation as master jewellers for the wealthiest and most illustrious clientele of America's high society became so firmly cemented by the end of the 19th century. Each collet, made by hand, set with old-cut diamonds, and exquisitely graduated circular-cut emeralds, makes this necklace a jewel for both museums and collectors across the world.



# VAN CLEEF & ARPELS

The history of the famous Parisian jewellery house began in 1896 with the marriage of Estelle Arpels to Alfred Van Cleef. The company was founded in 1906 by Alfred and his brother-in law, Charles Arpels at 22, Place Vendôme. The design collaboration between René Sim Lacaze and Renée Puissant, the daughter of Estelle Arpels and Alfred Van Cleef, began in 1926, marking the start of two decades of highly creative design for the firm. The 1930s saw some of the company's most iconic designs: the house's arguable trademark, the Mystery Setting was invented in 1933; and the concept of the Minaudière, made in honour of Florence Jay Gould, was invented in 1930 by Charles Arpels. The versatile 'Passe Partout' range was also developed at this time. In the following decades, the firm upheld its reputation for innovation with the snowflake jewels of the 1940s, the zip necklace of the 1950s, the ballet jewels of the 1960s and the Alhambra theme of the 1970s.

René Sim Lacaze was one of the most important jewellery designers and artists of the 20th century. He was incredibly influential as Head of artistic and creative design at Van Cleef & Arpels, a position he held jointly with Renée Puissant, the daughter of Alfred Van Cleef. Lacaze played a major role in the development of the European Art Déco style, and the renderings alongside the beautiful advertisements he drew are referenced in jewellery books around the world

Having attended a four-year training course at Atelier Mentel in Paris, a studio which worked with the most famous jewellers of the time such as Cartier and Boucheron, he started at Van Cleef & Arpels in 1923. Upon his retirement in 1968, Lacaze devoted himself to painting and produced numerous watercolours. He died at the age of 99 in Maisons-Laffitte on 5 January 2000.

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# BIOGRAPHIES

#### ADLER

Adler was founded in 1886 by Jacques Adler in Istanbul. He began his career in Vienna as a jeweller's apprentice, and his passion for precious stones led him to Turkey. Inspired by Byzantine art, his use of heart, floral, and sculptural motifs on baguette-cut diamonds became the distinctive style of the firm. Today, the firm is led by Allen Adler and his wife Daisy, with Allen's niece Karen as head of boutiques and marketing. Stores are located on Rue du Rhone in Geneva, Bond Street in London and Prince's Building in Hong Kong.

#### **AUDEMARS PIGUET**

Audemars Piguet was founded in 1875 by Jules Audemars and Paul-Edouard Piguet in Le Brassus, Switzerland. Their first achievement was the creation of the Grande Complication, a pocket watch comprising three complicated mechanisms. They went on to develop the thinnest manual winding and repeating watches at the time, the first skeleton watch and the ultra-thin automatic perpetual calendar watch. Since 1992, Mrs. Jasmine Audemars, descended from the Audemars family, chairs the Board of Directors. The company is still owned by the original family.

#### BELPERRON

Elegant and mysterious, Suzanne Belperron founded a new aesthetic in jewelry. A star within connoisseurs' circles but otherwise lesser known, Belperron never signed her work, and when asked for the reason, replied "my style is my signature." Born in 1900 in France, Belperron studied drawing and jewelry at the Ecole des Beaux-Arts in Besancon, worked under her mentor Jeanne Boivin, then designed exclusively for Bernard Herz under the name of Herz. From her roots in Art Deco, Belperron pioneered ways to carve various crystals into sensuous shapes to be set in precious and semi-precious stones, employing motifs from Egyptian, Indian, Cambodian, Celtic, African and Mayan cultures. Fashion innovator Elsa Schiaparelli championed Belperron, whose expanding clientele included European royalty, the cafe society, and Hollywood luminaries. Bernard Herz perished in a concentration camp during World War II, and Belperron re-registered the business renaming it "Belperron". After the war, Bernard's son Jean survived as a prisoner of war and returned to Paris. The partnership resumed under the new name 'Herz-Belperron." Belperron retired in 1974 but consulted for friends and special clients until her death in 1983. New York based jewelers Ward and Nico Landrigan, owners of Verdura, purchased the Belperron name and archives in 1999, and published an illustrated biography in 2016.

#### **RENÉ BOIVIN**

Born in Paris in 1864. René Boivin began his career as a designer and engraver. In 1893 he married Jeanne Poiret, sister of the famous couturier and the first woman jeweller of the 20th century, and together they created some of the most bold and daring fashions of the early 1900s. After Boivin's death in 1917, Jeanne established herself at Avenue de l'Opéra with Juliette Moutard and her daughter, Germaine Boivin. The three worked together for forty years, joined between 1921 and 1932 by Suzanne Belperron, creating such signature pieces as the Starfish (1936). Upon Jeanne Boivin's death in 1959, the house was taken over by Louis Girard. In April 1991, the company became part of Asprey Group. The main office and boutique are located on avenue Montaigne.

#### BOUCHERON

Frédéric Boucheron opened his first jewellery salon at the Palais Royal in 1858, and soon gained fame and success. In 1893 he became the first jeweller to set up shop at the Place Vendôme, where the firm still operates. Over the years, the maison expanded throughout Europe, Asia and the Middle East, and exhibited extensively. In May 2000, Boucheron was acquired by the Kering Group, one of the world's leading multi-brand luxury goods company.

#### BREGUET

Abraham-Louis Breguet was born in 1747 in Neuchatel, Switzerland and founded his first shop in 1775 on the lle de la Cité in Paris. He became the preferred watchmaker of European royalties and elites, and supplied timepieces to Louis XVI, Marie-Antoinette and Napoleon I. The firm remained in the hands of the Breguet family until it was taken over by workshop foreman Edward Brown, whose family ran the business for the next 100 years. The firm changed hands several times in the 1970's and 1980's, and was acquired by the Swatch Group in 1999.

#### MARIO BUCCELLATI

Mario Buccellati, christened the "Prince of Goldsmiths" by the famous Italian poet D'Annunzio, was born in 1881 and became an apprentice at Milan jeweller Beltrami e Besnati at age 12. In 1919, he took over the firm, since renamed Mario Buccellati and known for its originality, craftsmanship, and exquisite details. Exhibiting at the Madrid exposition at the Casa Errazy y Comp brought Buccellati international success as well as a clientele that included members of royalty around the world. Mario died in 1965 and his 2 sons Gianmaria and Federico parted ways. The original shop on Via Condotti in Roma opened in 1926 is now run by Federico's children Lorenzo and Bendetta under the name of Federico Buccellati. The business expanded to Florence in 1929, and established itself in New York in 1953. It is still a private company owned by a branch of the family. Gianmaria runs another firm Gianmaria Buccellati based in Milan.

#### BULGARI

Born in 1857 in a Greek family of silversmiths, Sotirio Bulgari opened his first shop in 1884 in Rome on the Via Sistina, moving to the iconic Via dei Condotti location in 1905. Upon his death in 1932, sons Giorgio and Costantino took over the business, and established the highly distinctive 'Bulgari Italian style", combining classicism with modernity. The 1970's saw Bulgari's international expansion with stores in New York, Paris, Geneva and Monte Carlo, and the brand's initiation into the world of watches with the success of 'BVLGARI-BVLGARI'. In 2011, Bulgari joined the French luxury conglomerate LVMH (Louis Vuitton Moet Hennessy).

#### CARTIER

Louis-François Cartier founded in 1847 in Paris. His three grandsons, Louis, Pierre and Jacques, turned the House into a global enterprise, with Louis running Paris, Jacques overseeing London and Pierre managing New York. Branches were opened in Moscow and the Persian Gulf in 1910, soon followed by Cannes and Monte Carlo. Charles Jacqueau joined Louis Cartier in 1909 and Jeanne Toussaint was Director of Fine Jewellery from 1933. In 1964, on the death of Pierre, the family sold Cartier Paris, London and New York In 1972, a group of investors led by Joseph Kanoui bought Cartier Paris, with Robert Hocq as president who with Alain Dominique Perrin . created the concept "Les Must de Cartier". The group later reacquired Cartier London and New York. Today, Cartier is part of the Richemont group.

#### CHAUMET

In 1780 Marie-Etienne Nitot and son Francois Regnault became official jeweler to Napoleon during the Consulate and Empire, creating the Consular sword, the Pius VII tiara and grand parures for Empresses Josephine and Marie-Louise. After Napoleon's fall, Jean-Baptiste Fossin and son Jules took over the business, and Jules was later succeeded in 1868 by his business partner Prosper Morel. In 1875, Prosper Morel's daughter married Charles Chaumet, who assumed management pf Prosper's business in 1885, eventually renaming it Chaumet in 1889. In 1907 he moved the company to 12, Place Vendôme. He also expanded overseas with boutiques in London in 1905, and New York in the 1920s, the latter closing in 1934 due to the Depression. In 1999 the firm was acquired by LVMH.

#### MICHELE DELLA VALLE

Born in Rome, Michele della Valle began designing costume jewellery at the age of 16. He purchased his first stone in Burma in 1976, and took the gem to Christie's on the advice of renowned Swiss gem dealer Roger Varenne. There, he met Christie's Head of Jewellery Hans Nadelhoffer, who motivated Della Valle to become a gem dealer and jewellery designer. After a stint with Fürst Jewellers, the representing Harry Winston in Rome, he opened his workshop in Rome in 1978, traveling regularly to Asia for precious stones and beginning a collaboration with Bvlgari on special orders for the film and opera stars of Italy. In 1987, he moved to Geneva, and developed a line of jewellery which now bears his name.

#### GRAFF

In 1960, Laurence Graff founded Graff, a London based, vertically integrated enterprise that design, manufacture and retail distribution of jewellery and watches. It is considered today a global leader in Haute Joaillerie, said to have handled more diamonds of notable rarity and beauty than any other jeweler in the world; gem legends such as the Idol's Eye, the Emperor Maximilian, the Lesotho Promise, the Wittelsbach-Graff and the Letšeng Star. Graff's flagship store is located on London's New Bond Street with boutiques on Sloane Street and in Harrods. There are now over 55 Graff locations around the world, including Shanghai, Geneva, Hong Kong, Paris, Monte Carlo, Moscow and New York. In 2013, Mr Laurence Graff was awarded OBE (Officer of the Order of the British Empire) for his 5 decades at the pinnacle of the jewellery industry.

#### GÜBELIN

Founded in 1854, Gübelin has always been a family enterprise. Located in Lucerne, Switzerland, they have created superior quality watches and clocks for more than one hundred years. A collaboration with New York jeweller Edmond Frisch led to the creation of jewelled watches and jewellery. Today, Gübelin has salons throughout Europe.

#### JAEGER-LECOULTRE

In 1833 Antoine LeCoultre founded his watch company in the Joux Valley of Switzerland. Shortly after, he invented a machine for measuring the thousandth part of a millimetre, which established the firm as leaders in micromechanics. In 1903, the company invented the thinnest movement in the world, only 1.38mm. thick, and in 1929, the smallest mechanical movement in the world, measuring 14.00 x 4.85mm. In 1917 Edmond Jaeger went into business with Jacques-David LeCoultre, grandson of the founder, to form the modern company Jaeger-LeCoultre. Their most famous watch was designed and produced in 1931 and marketed under the name of the "Reverso", which is still being produced today. The firm has been acquired by the Richemont Group, one of the world's leading luxury goods company.

#### JANESICH

Leopoldo Janesich opened his first shop in Trieste in 1835, offering jewellery and silverware to an international clientele. At the end of the century, he established a branch store in Paris at 19, rue de la Paix, followed by locations in Biarritz, London, Monte Carlo and Vichy. During the 1920s, they officially become jeweller to the Houses of Savoy and Aosta in Italy. Janesich is well known for powder compacts and card cases in the Art Deco style. The company is now owned by Francesco Janesich, the sixth heir to a jewellers family, and continues to produce jewellers and objects in Trieste, at via San Nicolò 30.

#### JAR

After graduating from Harvard in 1965, Joel Arthur Rosenthal moved to Paris and started with his partner Pierre Jeannet a tiny boutique on rue de l'Universite, creating needlepoint art with wool threads of unexpected colors, a niche endeavor which earned him early fame. Subsequently he applied the same artisanal spirit to jewelry, and opened a salon with Jeannet in Place Vendome named JAR after his initials. Shy by nature, he lives an almost anonymous existence in the creative universe of his atelier, for a most exclusive clientele, producing only 70-80 pieces a year. He is admired for his sculptural work, inseparable from that ingenious pave work, juxtaposing stones with the sense of color that is his alone. There has been three solo exhibitions: in 1987 at the National Academy of Design in New York, at Somerset House in London in 2002, and in November 2013 at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York. The last exhibition was an important salute to Rosenthal's talents, as he was the first living jewelry designer to be accorded a dedicated retrospective in the history of the Met.

#### **RENE LALIQUE**

At the turn of the 20th century, René Lalique (1860-1945) broke with tradition, creating jewels as art, instead of ornament. True to the spirit of revolution, he chose unconventional materials such as glass, horn and rock crystal. Nature was the predominant theme of this "Art Nouveau", and Lalique's favorite motif was the female figure with dragonfly wings. He produced bracelets, necklaces, pendants and combs featuring dragonflies, peacocks, insects or snakes. In 1910, Lalique bought a glass factory at Combs-la-Ville, and turned his attention to crafting artwork in glass.

#### LEGNAZZI

The jewellery produced from Valenza, Italy, is well known for its great beauty and originality. Legnazzi is one of several small firms located in Valenza. The company was opened in 1911 and has passed down family lines to its current owner Roberto Legnazzi and his son, Antonio. Comprising 180 workers, the company has many talented jewellers and designers. Legnazzi is a recognised name in Italy, and produces high quality jewels in gold, diamonds, tourmalines and pearls. Roberto Legnazzi continues to carry the family philosophy to make jewellery that is beautiful and refined. In 1982, Roberto Legnazzi won the coveted "Gioello in Edito" prize in Italy in three categories: jewellery, goldsmith and decorative objects.

#### MARINA B.

Marina Bvlgari hails from the famous Bvlgari family, and created jewellery for the firm until the mid-1970s. After her father's death, she started her own eponymous brand, Marina B. in Geneva. Almost immediately, her iconic designs, based on bold colour combinations, adorned movie stars like Sophia Loren, and women of international high society. In June 2010, her firm was acquired by Windsor Jewelers Inc. In June 2017, it was again acquired by French American designer Guy Bedarida, formerly of Van Cleef & Arpels and John Hardy, acting also as the brand's artistic director.

#### MASSONI

Massoni was founded in Rome in 1790, by Pietro Massoni, artisan and supplier to the Vatican, and is still a family company today after seven generations, presently run by Giuseppe and Carlo Massoni. In the mid-1800s Pietro's son Giuseppe opened the first shop in Corso Umberto, next to the famous "Armeria Spadini", haunt of the Roman aristocracy. In 1932, Pietro Giuseppe II relocated to the shop to Via Condotti where it still stands. Appointed suppliers of the Royal House of Piedmont in 1937, Massoni continues to serve aristocrats and celebrities in Italy and beyond.

#### MAUBOUSSIN

In 1827 Mr Rocher and his cousin, Baptiste Noury, opened a jewellery shop in Paris. Noury's nephew, Georges Mauboussin, joined the firm, assuming control in 1896. In 1922 the business was named 'Mauboussin, Successeur de Noury', and later, simply 'Mauboussin'. The house of Mauboussin exhibited at all major international exhibitions in the first half of the 20th century, receiving the Grand Prix at the 1925 Exposition des Arts Décoratifs in Paris, with Georges Mauboussin awarded the "Légion d'Honneur" for his contribution to the jewellery industry. In October 1929 Mauboussin opened an office in New York, just a month before the stock market crash. A merger was negotiated with the American jeweller, Trabert & Hoeffer, and the firm traded as "Trabert & Hoeffer - Mauboussin" until the 1950s. In 2002, Dominique Frémont, a Swiss businessman, acquired the firm, with its flagship at 20, Place Vendôme. With shops at the Champs Elysees and 6 other locations in Paris, Mauboussin now caters to a more popular clientele

#### MEISTER

In 1881 Emil Meister, an accomplished goldsmith and designer, founded the firm bearing his surname in Zürich. Upon his death in 1921, the firm was taken over by his son Eduard Meister (1880-1954). Walter Meister, the son of Eduard (1917-1986), added a horological and a silverware section to the establishment. He also developed the firm's reputation as specialists in coloured stones, for which they are now famous. The firm is currently run by the fourth generation. Adrian Meister (b. 1952) heads the firm, assisted by his brother Roland (b. 1964) who heads the silver department.

#### **DAVID MORRIS**

David Morris began working as a goldsmith in the 1960s, quickly winning two prestigious Diamond International awards, and launching his own business. His son Jeremy now oversees the Bond Street atelier as the Head of Design. Being also a passionate about innovation and ingenuity in jewellery design, he now scours the globe for ideas to keep him one step ahead of fashion and design trends, and delves into jewellery history, updating themes and details to create refined jewels for today's most stylish women. The company also offers a bespoke engagement ring service.

From the early days the company has enjoyed an association with Hollywood, providing stars such as Madonna, Pierce Brosnan, Catherine Zeta-Jones and Elizabeth Taylor, with spectacular jewels. They also provided the diamonds for the James Bond films 'Diamonds Are Forever', 'Tomorrow Never Dies' and 'the World Is Not Enough', and more recently, in Guy Ritchie's hit movie 'Snatch'.

#### MOUAWAD

David Mouawad founded a jewelry workshop in Beirut, Lebanon in 1890. Son Fayez moved the operation to Saudi Arabia in 1950. Now in the hands of Fayez's son Robert and Robert's sons Fred, Alain and Pascal, Mouawad employed top artists and craftsmen to create masterpieces worthy of royalty, such as the jeweled Bonsai gifted to the new Emperor of Japan in 1993. Robert is known to have owned some of the world's greatest diamonds, including the Indore Pears, the Taylor-Burton and the Tereschenko.

#### MOUSSAIEFF

Moussaieff Jewellers was established in the 1850s in Bukara, Russia, by Shlomo Moussaieff. His son, Remo, established himself as a gem dealer in Paris, and in 1963 Remo's son, also named Shlomo, and his wife, Alisa, opened the first Moussaieff showroom at the London Hilton on Park Lane. Shlomo retired in 2005, leaving the business in the hands of Alisa and their three daughters. With over 55 years of experience, and the driving force behind this dynamic family business, Alisa Moussaieff has become one of the most influential and respected players in the diamond market, dealing with the rarest and the most valuable gems. Over the years, Alisa Moussaieff has built up a remarkable collection of extraordinary gemstones, which includes such historic pieces as the 'Moussaieff Red', which at 5.11 carats, is the largest certified Natural Fancy Red diamond in the world. Moussaieff jewels have adorned a prestigious international clientele from royalty to celebrities and are handmade in their Paris workshops, with showrooms in London, on Bond Street and at the Hilton Hotel, and in Geneva, at the Grand Hotel Kempinski.

#### PATEK PHILIPPE

Patek Philippe was founded in 1839 by two Polish nationals, Antoine Norbert de Patek and Francois Czapek as Patek, Czapek & Co. In 1845, Patek joined forces with French watchmaker Adrien Philippe, A great innovator, Philippe invented the modern stem-winding and setting mechanism for watches. The firm then developed the first keyless watch, one of the early versions of which was purchased by Queen Victoria at the world's first international trade fair - the Great Exhibition of 1851. The company went on to create an array of extremely complicated watches. Today, the company is run by the Stern family and is represented by about 350 watchmakers and jewellers worldwide.

#### PETOCHI

The brothers Giuseppe and Domenico Petochi opened a small atelier in the Palazzo Incalzi on via dei Pontefici in the heart of Rome in 1884. Later, in 1928, they moved to the Torlonia Palace in via Bocca di Leone. In 1942 they transferred to their current location at the Piazzi di Spagna in a boutique previously occupied by the French jeweller Pierret, a student of Castellani. A love of Roman mosaics inspired Domenico Petochi's (1949-1985) book on the subject. Published in 1981, it was followed by an exhibition in 1986 in the Vatican. Between 1978 and 1986, the firm was also active in New York, cultivating an American clientele. Today, the salerooms offer modern, as well as estate jewellery and fine silver.

#### PIAGET

Georges Piaget established his workshop in 1874 at La Côte-aux-Fées, Switzerland. He specialised in lever escapements before his rapidly growing company became a manufacturer. Supplier of watch movements to many world-famous brands, the family introduced watches under its own name in the late 1940s, launching the brand worldwide in 1957, and opening the first showroom at 40 rue du Rhône, Geneva, in 1959. Piaget rapidly became the specialist of the world's thinnest watches, creating them exclusively in gold and platinum, many enriched by precious stones. Pioneer of the stone dial in 1965, Piaget is regarded as a synonym for innovation in the luxury watch business. Since 1988, when Piaget joined the Vendôme Luxury Group, the company has upheld and consolidated its position as one of the main players in the field of top class horology, as well as jewellery.

#### ROLEX

The company Rolex was set up by M. H. Wilsdorf in London in 1905 in order to launch the new fashion of wristwatches in Britain. The trade name Rolex was devised as it was short and easy to pronounce in most languages. In 1919 Wilsdorf relocated the company to Geneva and in 1926 invented the waterproof 'Oyster' model, made famous by Mercedes Gleitze, who wore it when she swam the English Channel in record time. Rolex has won countless prizes for precision and records under hazardous conditions. Edmond Hillary wore a Rolex on his great Everest expedition and Jacques Piccard also wore one when he explored the depths of the ocean bed. Rolex, still located in Geneva, remains today one of the largest and most popular Swiss watch manufacturers.

#### RUBEL FRERES

Rubel Frères, the Parisian manufacturing firm associated with Van Cleef & Arpels, moved to New York in 1939 shortly after Van Cleef & Arpels opened their salon. In 1943, their affiliation was dissolved and Rubel opened at 777 Fifth Avenue, next to the Savoy, under his Americanised name, John Rubel Co. There followed branches in London and Paris.

#### STERLÉ

Pierre Sterlé was born in 1905 into a family of financiers. After his father's death during World War I, he was placed under the guardianship of his uncle, a jeweller, who taught him the rudiments of the trade. In 1934, he established his own business in the rue Sainte-Anne in Paris, moving in 1945 to an upstairs location at 43, avenue de l'Opera. From 1934-39, he created jewellery for other houses such as Boucheron Chaumet, Ostertag and Puiforcat. Although the ideas and concepts for all jewellery offered through his salon were Sterle's, he engaged the services of draughtsmen such as Jacques Desnoues and, after 1960, Yves Poussielgues, to carry out the designs. The firm remained open until 1976 when Chaumet bought the stock and also hired Pierre Sterlé as an artistic advisor.

#### TEMPLIER

Templier was founded in 1848 by Charles Templier and his cousin Louis. The son of the former, Paul, succeeded them in 1885 and became an important figure in the Parisian jewellery trade. He was renowned for his abstract designs executed by Théodore Lambert around 1900. Many of these jewels were exhibited at the 1901 Paris Salon. Born in 1891, Paul's son, Raymond, became a leading designer in the Art Deco period. In 1919 he entered his father's business and in 1929 he began a thirty-six year collaboration with the designer, Marcel Pecheron, creating jewellery with rigorous geometric leanings, almost totally exempt from decorative ornamentation. In 1935, after his father retired, he took over the firm. Raymond Templier passed away in 1968. Today, the family tradition is carried on by a descendant of Louis, Edouard Brunet.

#### **TIFFANY & CO.**

On September 21, 1837, Charles Lewis Tiffany and John P. Young opened a stationery and fancy goods store known as Tiffany & Young at 259 Broadway in New York City. Jewellery and silver items were later added to their stock. By 1853. Charles Tiffany had assumed complete ownership of the business, renamed Tiffany & Co. During the 19th century, Tiffany became a leading international jeweler, buoyed by designers Edward C. Moore and G. Paulding Farnham, and gemmologist George Frederick Kunz. From 1907, the firm manufactured and sold the jewellery designs of Louis Comfort Tiffany, son of Charles. From 1955, a number of groundbreaking talents joined the firm, including Jean Schlumberger and Donald Claflin, followed by Elsa Peretti in 1974 and Paloma Picasso in 1980. In 1979, Avon Products purchased Tiffany & Co. followed by a management-led buyout headed by then chairman William R. Chaney in 1984. The company eventually went public in 1987, expanding into key domestic and international markets. Today they cover over 100 locations worldwide.

#### VAN CLEEF & ARPELS

The house of Van Cleef & Arpels was the result of the marriage between Alfred Van Cleef and Estelle Arpels. In 1906, Alfred founded Van Cleef & Arpels with Estelle's brother Charles at 22 Place Vendome, soon joined by family members Julien and Louis Arpels. Rene Puissant, daughter of Alfred and Estelle formed a design team with Rene Sim Lacaze, and produced jewels for the firm for 2 decades. Claude, son of Julien joined the family business in 1932 and opened in 1939 at the Rockefeller Centre in New York the first of 6 boutiques in the US. The 1930's was as much a golden period for expansion as creativity; the house's trademark, the "Mystery" setting, the "Minaudiere", the "Pass Partout" line were all created during this time. Notable designs of the decades that followed include the "Snowflake" jewels of the 1940's, the "Ballet" of the 1960's and the 'Alhambra" theme of the 1970's. In 1972, the Boutique Des Heures was inaugurated to house the new watch designs launched by Pierre Arpels. In 1999, Van Cleef & Arpels was acquired by Richemont Group, and now has over 45 boutiques around the world.

#### VERGER

Georges Verger was one of the most famous clock designers of the 1920s. He was particularly known for his innovative use of precious materials in clocks, stands, frames and watches. He worked with all of the great jewellers of the day, among them Van Cleef & Arpels, Janesich, Lacloche and Boucheron in Europe, and Tiffany, Black, Starr & Frost and J. E. Caldwell in the United States.


#### **DAVID WEBB**

In 1941, at the age of 16, David Webb travelled from his birthplace, Asheville, North Carolina, to New York City, where his special gifts as a jeweller and designer quickly became apparent. He was noticed by Antoinette Quilleret, a French socialite living in Manhattan, with exquisite taste. In 1948, with her backing, he formed David Webb Inc., setting up shop on 57th Street. At the height of production, his two fulltime workshops employed 200 jewellers and 37 setters. David Webb's designs of the 1950s and early 1960s showcased endless variations on animals, flowers and organic forms. His love of nature took shape in jewels of all sizes and varieties. He then adopted a new vocabulary of hammered gold, enamel, colours, textures and shapes, synthesised into geometric motifs that reflected the spirit of the 1970s. By his untimely death in 1975, David Webb had established himself as "the" jeweller in Manhattan. In addition, he was also dedicated to creating special order pieces for New York society members who flocked to him. After his death, the company was managed for 35 years by Nina Silberstein, David Webb's business partner and later, her son, Stanley. Over this period, they oversaw the firm's expansion into new markets such as Beverly Hills, Houston and Kuwait. In 2010, it was purchased by New York jewellery dealers Mark Emanuel and Robert Sadian. Under this new ownership, David Webb's tradition of design and craftsmanship is being actively maintained, with older pieces remade according to their original drawings and archives.

#### HARRY WINSTON

Harry Winston (1896-1978) bought his first emerald at the age of twelve, acquired many prominent collections during his career and at one point owned as many as a third of the famous diamonds of the world. He founded his first business in New York City, the Premier Diamond Company, at age 24. In 1932 he incorporated under his own name and began to manufacture and retail jewelry. Winston was responsible for the cutting of such famous diamonds as the Jonker, Vargas, Star of Sierra Leone and what would become the legendary Taylor-Burton diamond. Proclaimed the King of Diamonds in 1947 by Cosmopolitan magazine, he was responsible for donating perhaps the most famous of all diamonds, the Hope diamond to the Smithsonian. Upon his death in 1978, son Ronald assumed control of the company. In 2004, Aber Diamond Corporation acquired a controlling interest in the company, taking it public in 2007 under the name Harry Winston Diamond Corporation. In 2013 the Swatch Group acquired the retail arm of Harry Winston, with the mining group under separate ownership under the name of Dominion Diamond Corporation. Today, Harry Winston retail salons span across the US, Europe and Asia, championing Rare Jewels of the World, the company's motto.


