Solar-powered dome table clocks were launched by *Patek Philippe* in the mid-1950s. Still produced today, only few pieces are made every year, each of them being unique through their individually decorated case featuring engravings of varying pattern or cloisonné enamel scenes.

The Zenith El Primero A386, featuring the legendary caliber 3019 PHC, was the first high-beat, fully integrated automatic movement. Combined with an iconic and unique dial design, interest in the A386 continues to grow as collectors place it among the most important and iconic chronographs ever made.

The reference A386 was first released in 1969 and it is reported that *Zenith* made only 2,500 examples of the A386, with far fewer surviving today. The A386 was the only El Primero to offer the rounded case shape that is highly prized by collectors. This watch features unusual and stunning tri-color registers (light grey for running seconds, blue for minutes, and dark grey for hours) with a central red seconds hand.

With a striking resemblance to the *Breguet* Type XX chronograph, it is understood that *Mathey Tissot* produced and assembled the *Breguet* Type XX wristwatches for Breguet, however they produced a very small number of similar flyback chronograph wristwatches under there own name. The present watch is one of the few acclaimed Type XX watches which are signed *Mathey Tissot*.

The dial features an unusual fifteen minute counter at 3 o'clock with luminous hour markers every three minutes. The dial also features a 12-hour counter at 6 o'clock making it extremely rare as it is estimated that roughly 50 examples of this watch were made with this third subsidiary dial.

The $\emph{Ulysse Nardin}$ reference 7536-1 an extremely attractive example of a vintage steel chronograph from the 1960s. Rarely seen on the open market, its scarcity makes this watch even more desirable. The black and white dial with black tachymeter bezel is reminiscent of the highly-sought after \emph{Rolex} Daytona, however it is not available for collectors nearly as often.

Upon closer inspection, one will notice the interesting details on the dial. Black with bright white registers, the 12-hour and 30-minute registers are fitted with an arrow-head hand, an unusual and distinctive addition. Combined with the applied baton numerals and applied *Ulysse Nardin* logo at 12 o'clock, the black and white dial is harmonious and perfectly balanced at a generous 38mm diameter.

Preserved in excellent condition by its original owner, it would be an asset to any collection for its rarity and attractive condition.

This three-register Autavia chronograph has garnered the nickname the "Jochen Rindt Autavia" as the legendary Formula One driver wore a similar reference 2446 while racing in the 1960s until his untimely death in 1970.

The combination of features that this watch possesses, including the Valjoux 72 movement and the "inverse panda" dial produced by Singer make this watch somewhat similar to 1960s *Rolex* Daytona models, and it is thus no surprise that these have risen significantly in value and interest in recent years. Furthermore, this watch impresses with is extremely rare tachymeter bezel, according to research, this bezel has been found on less than 20 examples to date.

Beginning in the 1940s, *Heuer* began making watches branded for sale by *Abercrombie & Fitch* in New York. At that time, *Abercrombie & Fitch* was an elite outfitter of sporting goods. Two of the proprietary models *Heuer* produced for *Abercrombie & Fitch* were the Solunar and the Seafarer, which tracked the tide and time that fish and animals were most active based on the solunar theory. The solunar theory posited that the movement of animals and fish was affected by the location of the Moon. The Seafarer incorporated a chronograph.

Purchased directly from Abercrombie & Fitch towards the mid 1970s, the original owner of this watch was an engineer by profession. He grew up during the depression in the city of Buffalo and after dropping out of high school he worked at Bell Aircraft before the second World War. When Pearl Harbor occurred, he enlisted and went into the 101st Airborne Division when it was just being formed. He jumped into Normandy on D-Day, jumped into Holland in operation Market Garden, and was trucked up to Bastogne in the middle of the night for the Battle of the Bulge. He trained for a year, fought in Europe for a year, and came home on a hospital ship to recover over a period of time from his war wounds. He finished high school in a veteran high school where he acquired an engineering degree in college on the G.I. Bill, and went on to a very successful career with DuPont in his chosen field. hen he started to have a little discretionary income in the 1950's, he started sailing, and racing sailboats. It is clear that this sought-after watch appealed to its owner because at the time Abercrombie and Fitch was a well respected name and retailer. Secondly, the "Seafarer" chronograph with it's tide function appealed to his sailing background, his ultimate passion.

Offered in good condition, the original owner of this watch only wore it only a handful of times before putting it into a drawer where it has stayed for almost 40 years.

As *Heuer* transitioned the Autavias from screw-back cases to the compressor cases, the Autavia GMT chronographs went through the same transition. Around 1969, *Heuer* moved the Autavia GMT chronograph to the reference 2446C compressor case.

The first execution 2446C GMT featured a black dial with three white subdials and was signed 'T Swiss' in the bottom hours register. The dial had tritium lume applied hour markers for better legibility over the standard silver markers, as the watch was originally intended for use by airline pilots. The Autavia GMT uses the same plain steel matchstick tritium-filled hands as the standard Autavia, with a red GMT hand and white chronograph second hand. Based on the printing style of the numbers in the registers, this example is from the "Second Execution."

Featuring a very well preserved dial and case as well as the original *Heuer* sticker on the case back, it is clear that the previous original owner has only worn this watch at most a handful of times and has kept the watch in excellent condition, complete with its original product literature and presentation box.

The present watch is a spectacular find for collectors of automatic *Heuer* Autavias. Launched in 1962 and initially designed for automotive and aviation events, the Autavia model was in production for over 20 years and came in many variations. This automatic GMT chronograph has many interesting features including a rotatable blue and red "Pepsi" bezel and neon GMT hand. This model has a classic 1970s chronograph look with an innovative automatic GMT movement.

This watch is preserved in nearly new old stock condition and was notably featured in the book, *Heuer Autavia Chronographs* 1962-1985, by Richard Crosthwaite and Paul Gavin. Notably, the present watch appears on the cover of the copy of the book included with the watch and has been in notable *Heuer* collections as an outstanding example of the reference and of a vintage *Heuer* chronograph generally.

The Speedmaster Reference 2915: The Birth of the Legend

The 1950s marked the introduction of a number of legendary "tool" or "sport" watch lines that continue to be produced today. The Swiss watch industry, which had previously faced healthy competition from abroad including the United States, began to assert its international market dominance in the 1950s. Swiss watch companies began increasing in revenue and prestige, while technical advancements allowed for the introduction of more robust watches, including highly water-resistant watches for divers and antimagnetic watches for engineers and those working near strong magnets. *OMEGA* introduced its own series of these robust "tool" or "sport" watches during this time: the Seamaster 300, Railmaster, and Speedmaster lines. These watches were each made and marketed more specifically as tools for particular customer segments rather than as watches meant for popular purchase and use. With its completed design toward the end of 1956 and introduction to the public in 1957, the Speedmaster, in particular, was a completely new innovative category of watch: the "tool" or "sport" chronograph.

The Speedmaster, according to original advertisements from the time, grew out of the Seamaster line, sharing a similar case and screw down case back to the Seamaster 300 reference 2913 and Railmaster reference 2914, but adding round capped pushers and using the caliber 321 chronograph movement supplied by Lemania (that *OMEGA* used for years prior in other chronographs). While *OMEGA* designed the Seamaster 300 for diving and the Railmaster for use by strong magnetic fields, *OMEGA* designed the Speedmaster specifically for driving, with flying as a secondary use. The engineers that developed the Speedmaster could scarcely dream that successors in the Speedmaster line would be used by astronauts floating in space and walking on the surface of the Moon.

INNOVATIONS

The Speedmaster had a particular key innovation: a fixed bezel showing a tachymeter scale. The benefit of this bezel was that it was much easier to read speed when driving than previous chronographs that placed small tachymeter tracks around the edge of the dial. When placed on the dial surface, the tachymeter scale would often be extremely small and difficult to read. An external bezel depicting a tachymeter scale would allow for the scale to never be blocked by a central seconds hand or obscured by a crystal, while placing it at a height in line with the central seconds hand. This made reading the tachymeter scale much easier when driving around a fixed course with marked distances at a high speed.

The Speedmaster also appealed to drivers due to the large rectangular luminous markers and the hands filled with lume, allowing for the reading of the time in darker conditions or at night. The Speedmaster was quite large in size for its time, again assisting with legibility. The size also allowed for the screw down case back and capped rather than square pushers, making the Speedmaster more resistant to water, dust, and other difficult conditions that would damage other chronographs from the time. A number of the Speedmaster's characteristics made the watch appealing for use by pilots, and the Fuerza Aerea del Peru (or Peruvian Air Force) ordered examples of the reference 2915.

KEY ELEMENTS

The reference 2915 featured a number of special elements later altered within the Speedmaster line. The reference 2915-1, 2915-2, and early examples of the 2915-3 included a unique hour and minute hand shared across the early examples of the Seamaster reference 2913 and Railmaster reference 2914 lines: an hour hand with a large luminous triangle at the end and long triangular minute hand, commonly referred to as 'broad arrow' hands. In many instances, the luminous material fell out of the hour hand, perhaps due to the larger surface area of the luminous material making it more prone to falling out during shocks or drops. For later examples of the reference 2915-3, *OMEGA* changed these hands to dauphine (also referred to as Alpha hands), or thin triangular hands, before switching to the straight baton hands introduced in the 1960s and still used in the Speedmaster Professional today.

Another key element of the reference 2915-1, 2915-2, and early examples of the 2915-3 was the steel bezel with an engraved tachymeter track. There are variations of the steel bezel on surviving examples, including some with a flat "3" in 300 while others hand a rounded "3" in 300. Some also appeared to have numerals that were originally unpainted, while others had black paint in the numerals. It is possible that OMEGA may have outsourced the bezel production to different companies, or had some variation from a single company over time. The steel bezels seemed particularly prone to losing adhesion to the case and were not as legible as the painted bezel with minute demarcations on the Seamaster, so OMEGA developed a bezel with an aluminum insert painted black with the tachymeter numerals exposed as grey metal. OMEGA introduced this aluminum insert bezel on the reference 2915-3 and it is believed that some earlier reference 2915-1 and 2915-2 examples may have had their bezels switched to the aluminum insert for better visibility, while other examples may have had their bezels switched simply due to the original steel bezel no longer adhering to the case.

Additional notable elements of the reference 2915 were the case back and the movement. The case back on the early reference 2915 examples simply was blank and on the beveled edge near where a tool could be used to open the screw down case back was an engraved "SPEEDMASTER" in all capital letters. Later examples of the reference 2915 had the famous hippocampus, or mythical seahorse, logo engraved on the case back. Jean-Pierre Borle, an engraver, developed the logo after seeing an image in Venice of the Roman god of the sea Neptune driving a chariot pulled by "seahorses" resembling real horses. OMEGA began using the hippocampus logo to symbolize water resistance in 1958 and the logo depicted the bridles on the seahorse as an artistic way to reflect the image of Neptune and suggest the wearer of a watch with the symbol could also be a god of the sea. Finally, the caliber 321 movement used in the reference 2915 had certain minor modifications in later references.

THE BIRTH OF A LEGEND

The distinctive elements of the early examples of the reference 2915, particularly the 'Broad Arrow' hands and steel bezel, combined with the fact it was the first Speedmaster reference made and the absolute rarity of original extant examples, make it the most desirable Speedmaster reference for collectors. There is no question that as the origin of the "tool" or "sport" chronograph genus and *OMEGA*'S most recognizable and legendary line of watches, the Speedmaster reference 2915 is one of the most important *OMEGA* references ever made. Thus, it should serve as no surprise that original examples of the reference 2915 are some of the most highly-sought trophies by vintage watch collectors.

The Speedmaster reference 2998 was the successor of the original Speedmaster: the reference 2915. (Please see Lot 9 in this sale). From the second generation of Speedmasters, this reference began its production in 1959 where eight case references (-1, -2, -3, -4, -5, -6, -61, and -62) were successively introduced during only four years.

The present watch features an attractive dial with Alpha hands and nicely aged luminous material as well as period bracelet and desirable No. 6 endlinks.

The present model is exceedingly rare as it was produced for a very short amount of time. For only two years, between 1962 and 1964, approximately 2,200 to 2,600 examples were produced. Some examples were fitted with 'alpha' hands, such as the present lot. Some later versions of this reference featured the first use of baton hands, which continue to be used through the present day.

In 1962, a new reference system was adopted by *OMEGA* called *Mapics*. It was designed to classify watches groups. Each number in the reference would correspond to a feature so distinguishing the type of watch was made easier. For example, the first number corresponds to the type of watch such as a man's watch or a woman's watch. The second number would refer to the type of movement such as manually wound or self-winding. This would be continued to classify all the numbers in the reference for that watch, allowing those who are able to decode Mapics to know all its features. The reference ST 105.002 was the first to use the 1962 newly introduced coding system and therefore the present watch shares a unique part of OMEGA's company history.

The reference 105.003 was produced between 1964 and 1969, and it was this reference that superseded all other brands by passing NASA's rigorous qualification tests in 1965 that resulted in the *OMEGA* Speedmaster becoming the official watch used on space missions. This reference is also the last of the Speedmasters with straight lugs, also known as the 'Pre-Professional'. In addition, it is sometimes referred to as the 'Ed White' after the first American astronaut to walk in space outside of the space module during the Gemini IV mission of 1965.

Reference 6239, the very first model of the celebrated "Daytona" series, succeeded the reference 6238, and could be found in sales catalogues in Europe as of 1964, though it is thought that the model was available in the US already in 1963.

Available in stainless steel, 14k and 18k gold, reference 6239 was the firm's first chronograph with the tachometer scale engraved on the bezel and the subsidiary dials printed in a different color than the main dial for better readability. The dials of the early models featured only the designation "Cosmograph", referring to the outer-space travels of the early 60s. The "Daytona" was added on later series to mark *Rolex*'s sponsorship of the renowned NASCAR stock car race.

The present watch is an attractive example, still retaining the original bezel calibrated to a maximum 300 units per hour, which was shortly thereafter changed on later examples of the reference 6239 to a maximum 200 units per hour.

For detailed descriptions and illustrations of the dial and bezel variations of reference 6239 see *Rolex Daytona - a legend is born* by Carlo Pergola, Stefano Mazzariol, Giovanni Dosso, pp. 44 - 61. Reference 6240 was the first "Oyster Cosmograph" model produced by *Rolex*. This novelty was predominantly characterized by the screw down push buttons. In production only during the second half of the 1960s, it was replaced by the better known references 6263 and 6265.

The present watch is distinguished by its early non-Oyster dial, not yet making reference to the screw down pushers. In fact, this example still features a dial version better known on reference 6239, for example, with the sought-after small, shifted Daytona designation. Only for a second generation of reference 6240, *Rolex* designed a dial with the Oyster denomination.

Other examples of *Rolex* chronograph models featuring the small "Daytona" designation are illustrated in *100 Superlative Rolex Watches* by John Goldberger, p. 238, 246 & 247 and in *Rolex Daytona - a legend is born* by Carlo Pergola, Stefano Mazzariol, Giovanni Dosso, pp. 46 & 51.

Meanwhile, the more standard version of the reference 6240 with "Rolex Oyster Cosmograph dial" is described and illustrated in Rolex Daytona - A Legend is Born by Carlo Pergola, Stefano Mazzariol, Giovanni Dosso, pp. 76-92, in I Cronografi Rolex - La Leggenda by Pucci Papaleo Editore, pp. 304-311, and in 100 Superlative Rolex Watches by John Goldberger, p. 239.

Reference 6262, along with the reference 6264, was produced from the end of the 1960s through approximately 1972. The model was produced in stainless steel and both 14k and 18k gold, and the 6262 featured a metal bezel with engraved tachometer scale, while the 6264 featured a bezel with black plastic insert and printed tachometer scale. Around 9,000 steel versions and several dozen gold versions of the 6262 model were produced, and all featured the latest generation 727 caliber, which was an improved version of the Valjoux 72 featuring a higher-beat rate for greater accuracy.

Although there are many Daytona watches, naturally some of them age better than others. Over time, the subsidiary dials of this chronograph have changed in color. The once black registers on this dial are now a dark brown color, lighter in some places, which offers a very attractive look against the silvered dial. Rare and highly sought-after, "tropical" subdials for a *Rolex* Daytona from this period are highly desirable, combined with the well-preserved case, this watch presents a great opportunity for many collectors.

The present reference 6263 features a dial that is known as a "Sigma" dial, indicated by two small Sigma symbols on either side of the "T Swiss T". The Sigma symbols indicate that the baton numerals and hands on a dial are made of gold, in this case white gold. This example is known as a "Tight Sigma" where the Sigma signs are closer together and less common.

Sigma dials were first seen on the reference 6240, and were nicknamed "Goute A Prior" by Italian collectors and originally referred to the union of three *Rolex* dial producers: Singer, Stern, and Beyeler. On later references, the Sigma came to refer to indices and hands in gold.

For a note on the "Goute A Prior", see *Rolex Daytona*, a legend is born by Carlo Pergola, Stefano Mazzariol, & Giovanni Doss, p. 82. An example of a reference 6263 with Sigma Dial is illustrated on p. 136.

The words "Panda Paul Newman" are those which will excite the most discerning collectors. The present watch can be considered one of the most beautiful and important "Panda" Paul Newman Oyster Cosmographs to have appeared on the market. In the world of vintage watches where a *Rolex* Daytona is a must have, this example is a dream.

With a monochromatic black and white palette, the "Panda" Paul Newman is simply superb, considered by many to be one of the most attractive dial variations to be found on a vintage Daytona - it is certainly one of the rarest and most recognizable.

Purchased new in Switzerland during the early 1970's while the original owner was touring Europe by motorcycle, the present "Panda Paul Newman" has been hidden for the last 30+ years. Only worn a handful of times by its owner, it was then placed into a safety deposit box, emerging decades later, fresh to market and in impeccable condition.

With a Mark 1 dial, this example is extremely impressive. Very clean, the stark contrast of the bright white dial with black registers is accentuated as of its unblemished appearance, almost unheard of for an original watch which is over 50 years old. With all-original crown, pushers and bezel, the case is extraordinary, accompanied by its original *Rolex Oyster* bracelet.

The present "Panda" 6263 exemplifies the state of preservation and originality that collectors crave and provides an exceptionally rare opportunity to acquire what is unquestionably one of the most appealing Paul Newman "Pandas" to ever appear at auction.



THE MEL AND NOEL BLANC COLLECTION

LOTS 18-26

Known as 'The Man of 1000 Voices', Mel Blanc possessed a talent that can only be described as a natural gift, magical, extraordinary and everlasting. Giving our favorite cartoon characters their "character", it's estimated that over 250 million people around the world hear and recognize his voice magic each and every day. From Bugs Bunny's "What's up Doc?", Daffy Duck's "You're Despicable" or Tweety Pie's "Oooh I taut I taw a Puddy Tat" you're hearing Mel Blanc.

In fact, virtually every Looney Tunes character in every Warner Bros. cartoon has spoken to you thanks to Mel. From Taz, Sylvester, Marvin the Martian, Porky or Pepe to Yosemite Sam, Foghorn Leghorn and Speedy Gonzalez... all the voices you know and love were created by him. Even Woody Woodpecker and Barney Rubble and Dino of the Flintstones were Mel when he ventured out to other Animations Studios. For Noel, his childhood was special, entertained by his father's vast menagerie every day.



A little less well known than his characters was his extensive watch collection, which included over 500 watches and clocks. Reserved for his friends who would often visit him at home, he would proudly display his collection in glass cabinets, preserving them as delicate trophies to be admired. Collecting since the early 1940s, Mel had a museum of his own including perpetual calendars, repeaters, automatons and more, some he acquired directly from the watch factories he frequented several times a year in Switzerland, in watch havens such as Chaux de Fonds and Le Locle.

It was Mel's wife Estelle who first recognized his preoccupation with time. She was always waiting for Mel to study every watch on exhibition in every jewelry store, antique shop or museum they passed by so, finally she decided to purchase one as a gift for him. On his birthday in 1946, Estelle chose a Patek Philippe minute repeating pocket watch at a Venice, California, antique store. Mel of course knew the name and reputation of Patek, but was absolutely beside himself when he found out that his wife had spent \$375.00 for the watch. Later he was a lot happier when he saw the same watch at Tiffany's in New York at a substantially higher price. It was certainly Patek Philippe that captivated Mel, he is frequently pictured wearing his beloved perpetual calendars, namely the reference 2499, (please see Lot 20 in this sale). However, Mel pursued many brands and enjoyed timepieces that carried interesting provenance, for example, a rose gold oversized Zenith chronograph which once belonged to actor Mario Lanza whose family were friends and neighbors to the Blancs, (please see Lot 22 in this sale).

Mel has been said to have "a built-in clock of his own." His fascination with accuracy, the fact that he could master almost any pitch with absolute perfection was a catalyst for his love of both watches as well as cars and may help to account for his fellowship with mechanical counterparts. His many years as a musician, conductor, host performer and voice person in radio, television, movies and cartoons demanded split-second timing and Mel was always impeccable. The master of timing, Jack Benny, was Mel's "boss" and one of his closest friends. Mel even got Jack interested in collecting watches, including a pair of 1951 Jaeger LeCoultre cufflinks, (please see Lot 25 in this sale), which Jack gave to Noel on his 13th birthday.

It only took a few years before Noel was as interested as his father in timepieces. He loved learning the history of the great watchmakers as told through the skills and voices of his father. "Our collection is evolutionary" he would say. Noel and his father would visit museums together, marveling in the history behind many of the brands and becoming friends with designers and experts such as Gerald Genta and Dr. Helmut Crott. Owning a vast array of Patek Philippe pocket watches, some are archived in the first Alan Banbery publishing, where Noel is given credit for his collection. In accordance, Mel's scholarship in the field of Horology was recognized when he was made a "Fellow" of the National Association of Watch and Clock Collectors in the 1970's.

Henry-Daniel Capt (1773-ca 1840)

One of the most famous Swiss automata makers, Henry-Daniel Capt came from a wealthy family, his father was a member of the Grand Conseil of the Canton de Vaud. In his youth, he worked for a legendary maker of large automata, Jaquet Droz. When settled on his own and established, in 1802, a partnership with his brother in law, Isaac Daniel Piguet, his watches showed a clear Droz' influence. After 1811, when Piguet joined Philippe Meylan, Capt worked on his own, creating his most spectacular pieces. He sometimes also would supply the new firm of his brother in law, Piguet & Meylan, as well as some others, which is the reason why his watches are rarely signed. This watch is one of only four known from Capt's musical erotic automata collection that was signed by him. Another one, although not so splendid, No. 422, is in the Swiss National Museum (Inv. LM 74729).

In 1815 he was listed in Geneva as a *horloger-mécanicien*, *établisseur*, with many workmen. This watch is from that period, with a modern (at the time) form of the cock, the enamel painted by the same artist who enameled many cases for Piguet & Meylan and the musical mechanism driving the automaton whose figures "dance" to the music. According to research, the most recent Christie's sale of a similar Capt pocket watch realized 146,500 Swiss francs, in 2013.

The reference 865 hunter case pocket watch was launched in 1969 and was produced until 1990 with varying decorative case designs. Made only in yellow and white gold, approximately 220 cases have been decorated using this reference. Each decoration was unique and made by the best artists of that time. In this example, the case was made by Favre-Perret in the early 1970s.

This unique timepiece is finely engraved with an intricate detail to both sides of its hunter case. With the theme, "Les Vases," as confirmed on the Extract from the *Patek Philippe* archives. To the best of our knowledge this watch has never before been offered in public.

Reference 2499

Widely acknowledged as one of the world's greatest watch models ever created, reference 2499 has strongly influenced the designs of many of the most renowned watchmakers. Introduced to the market in 1950 it replaced the legendary reference 1518, the world's first perpetual calendar wristwatch with chronograph made in series.

Over a period of 35 years, reference 2499 was made in four series in a total production of only 349 pieces, the majority cased in yellow gold. The rarity of this model becomes evident when considering that an annual average of only 9 watches left *Patek Philippe's* workshops.

Reference 2499 is generally divided into the following four series:

- first series: square chronograph buttons, applied Arabic numerals and tachymeter scale
- second series: round chronograph buttons, either applied baton or applied Arabic numerals and tachymeter scale
- third series: round chronograph buttons, applied baton numerals and outer seconds divisions
- fourth series, the present watch: round chronograph buttons, applied baton numerals, outer seconds divisions and sapphire crystal

Reference 2499 is illustrated in *Patek Philippe Wristwatches* by Martin Huber & Alan Banbery, second edition, pp. 302 & 304, and in *Patek Philippe Museum - Patek Philippe Watches, Volume II*, pp. 306-307.

Offered fresh to market, notably, the present watch was one of Mel Blanc's favorite watches to wear, he was frequently seen wearing the attractive perpetual calendar chronograph, shown in the the detail of photograph (Fig. 1).

Upon first glance, we are immediately struck by this watch because of its oversized pink gold case and its complimentary pink dial. At a large 46mm diameter, its presence on the wrist is definite, and its character emulates. However, according to the Archives of *Zenith*, this watch has yet more enticing details that are not visible upon first glance.

The movement is produced by *Martel Watch Co.*, a Swiss manufacturer which was once situated not far from the *Zenith* headquarters. *Zenith* usually commissioned them to make movements for their watches, prior to *Zenith* acquiring the company in 1959-1960.

The dial, superb with its large registers, has an unusual 30 minute counter. Usually, for watches destined in Europe and elsewhere, the longer subsidiary marker lines are situated at 3, 6 and 9, however, here they are situated at 4, 8 and 12. The longer strikes were used by *Zenith* in what was known as a 'Telechronograph,' a term reserved for a chronograph that was used to time the length of a telephone conversation, by the minute. In the 1940s, telephone calls were charged by the minute and the price would increase rapidly. In fact, in Europe, the price would be relatively low but then would increase at the 3rd minute- the reason for chronographs destined for delivery to Europe to have longer markings at 3, 6 and 9. In the U.S., however, it is likely that the pricing structure by the minute was different, perhaps at 4 minutes was the point in price fluctuation -the reason for the longer strikes on this watch at 4, 8, 12. Having been retailed by *Tourneau*, a U.S. company, with their signature also on the dial alongside *Zenith*, this watch was made specifically for the U.S. market, for their own timing needs.

Telechronographs were made for communications companies, cafes, bars, or individuals- practically anyone who used a telephone. However, in this case, this watch has an special provenance. From the collection of Mel and Noel Blanc, the Blanc family had acquired it directly from the family of famed American actor and tenor Mario Lanza, a close friend and neighbor of the Blanc family.

Embedded in the history of Zenith and their chronograph market in the U.S., this watch is valuable for its history of the brand as well rarity and provenance.

Reference 96 is a landmark model in the history of *Patek Philippe*. Previously unknown to the market, this watch presents a rare and unusual discovery of an extremely early *Patek Philippe* minute repeating wristwatch. In the 1920s and early 30s, wristwatches were still in their youth, having made their appearance some 20 years before. Consequently, manufacturers were resistant to make complicated wristwatches. Very often, wristwatches were the result of modified pocket watches or of movements being re-cased. Wristwatches fitted with minute repeaters are the most coveted and difficult complications in watchmaking and from this period can be considered holy grails of horology.

In order to fully appreciate the rarity of the present timepiece, it is worth noting that these treasured horological masterpieces very rarely come to auction. Due to their masterful execution of design and technicality, in the first half of the 20th century, *Patek Philippe* produced no more than 40 wrist repeaters¹ of which approximately half have ever been discovered, 11 having tonneau or cushion cases, of which only five are almost identical to this watch².

Incredibly rare, even for *Patek Philippe*, this watch was a mystery. In their 1988 book, on page 239, it describes this watch but the picture inserted was in fact an archival picture of a sister watch, No. 138'147 which, although has almost an identical case, the movement is completely different. In articles about *Patek Philippe* repeaters the watch either was not mentioned or described as "unknown". This is because since the day it was sold the watch has been in the same family. Very few were ever put into production and those that were produced were reserved only for the most important clients.

It is no surprise that such an exclusive and elusive watch was made for one of *Patek Philippe*'s most important clients ever: Henry Graves Jr. Born into an affluent banking family, he soon developed a passion for complicated timepieces and became an endeared *Patek Philippe* client. Mr. Graves is famous for his unusual competition with Mr. James Ward Packard. Although never officially meeting, the two would compete for the most complicated timepieces and beyond allegedly saving *Patek Philippe* from bankruptcy during the years of the Great Depression, this antagonism is what brought to the world pieces such as the Henry Graves Supercomplication, finished in 1933 after 8 years of studies and development, and which remained the most complicated timepiece in the world until 1989, when *Patek Philippe* introduced the Caliber 89. Among the more than 30 *Patek Philippe* watches specially made for Graves, only four of them were fitted with minute repeating mechanisms: two fitted with tonneau-shaped cases, both on

permanent exhibition at the *Patek Philippe* Museum. In 2014, Christie's auctioned the exact same watch as the one on offer here, with cushion-shaped case and applied Breguet numerals, however it was cased in platinum and with movement number 198'095, a few digits away from the present watch. The example belonging to Mr. Graves realized 1,205,000 Swiss francs.

The vast majority of these watches were bought by wealthy American industrialists or financiers such as Mr. Graves. Other notable clients include Ralph Teetor, a blind automotive engineer, the inventor of the cruise control, who paid 10,000CHF for his (No. 112057)³, and Albert Clement Middleton of RCA. Highly desirable, in 1930 when very successful businessman Eldridge Johnson asked his attorney, Floyd Bradley, if he would prefer a car or a watch for a present, Bradley chose a watch, a sister to this one, No. 198'213, delivered in 1931. In addition to the large value paid in 2014 for Mr. Graves' example, No. 975'89 sold in 2012 for \$2,994,500.

In addition to its impressive history embedded in the DNA of Patek Philippe, the watch itself is a stunning example of craftsmanship. The earliest wrist repeaters were based off of women's pendant repeating movements. They came in four sizes, from 10 to 14 lignes (22.5-31.5 mm). With the advent of wristwatches, a new movement was needed that would be slim enough to make the watch easily slide under a shirt sleeve. The earliest ones were of 26 douziems4 (4.9 mm). They were too thick for wristwatches. However, in the beginning of the 20th century, as Patek Philippe explained in their publication *Minute Repeaters*, there was a big breakthrough in component miniaturization achieved by Victorin Piguet, a traditional supplier of complicated raw movements to Patek Philippe, which allowed them to produce movements that were well fitted for wristwatches⁵. Victorin Piguet started working on the idea of the miniaturization already in the 19th century. Around 1890 they developed a very characteristic 10 ligne movement with the center bridge going all the way to the edge of the main plate and following the curvature of the setting bridge⁶. They were used in women's pendant watches, such as, for example, No. 97'012 (1892)7. The company continued using them for about a guarter of a century⁸ as demonstrated by the first Patek Philippe wrist repeater, No. 174'603 from 19169. As with all breakthroughs, the path to perfection took time. During the quarter of a century Victorin Piguet made considerable advances to the design. The diameter was enlarged to 11 lignes (24.80 mm) and the thickness lowered to 20 douziemes (3.76 mm)¹⁰. The architecture of the movement was also changed. The subject of the movement architecture, virtually

never discussed, was very important. Horological architects had two goals; practicality and aesthetics. The design team of *Patek Philippe* and Victorin Piguet¹¹, after a quarter of a century, had made a magnificent creation. The winding/mainspring bridge was separated into two bridges. All bridges followed the shape of the adjoining ones to please the eye. They were made of a special alloy, Maillechort¹² for durability, and all of them were decorated with the Geneva stripe pattern (*côtes de Genève*)¹³.

Not many of these movements were produced and all were put into very special watches, including the most complicated wristwatch of the time, minute repeater with perpetual calendar, *Patek Philippe*, No. 198'340 (finished in 1930 and sold in 1939). One of those movements was kept by the company for over half of a century and used in 1986 making it another record breaking wristwatch; a minute repeater, perpetual calendar and a chronograph (No. 866'787)¹⁴.

It's cushion-shaped case with generous bezel proportion grants this watch a presence on the wrist that well exceeds that of other timepieces of similar size. The design of the case was entrusted to the most famous Geneva casemaker, Edouard Wenger who surpassed everyone's wildest dreams, it was so much ahead of its time. It was constructed differently than any other case before and after. The bezel and the band were stepped for the superb fit, almost like a jigsaw puzzle, the slide was inserted in a specially milled groove for the same reason. Everything in this watch is an ode to understated elegance. In a time and place when excess was the norm, the roaring Art Deco period in America, the owner of this wristwatch favored an incredibly advanced timepiece which would not impose its importance to the world, rather it would be a treasure understood only by a very select few.

Gifted the watch by her daughter in 1939 who purchased it at Isaac Stern & Co. in Manhattan, the original owner of this watch was visually impaired and relied heavily on the minute repeater to tell the time as it chimes so clearly the hours, quarter hours and minutes of each day with a simple slide fitted to the case side. It is notable that the mechanism which was so difficult to produce at the time was incredibly valued by its wearer, a direct descendant of President John Adams and Priscilla Mullins & John Alden of the 'Mayflower".





This presents an opportunity to own a true horological masterpiece belonging to a single owner and kept in her family for the last 70+ years. The present watch is the last from the series, having 40 years of improvements (1890-1930), bringing it to the top of the most marvelous series of wrist repeaters of the Art Deco period. A treasure of *Patek Philippe's* early production of complicated wristwatches which are almost never seen on the open market, its scarcity is a product of artistry as perfection.

Manufacture of reference 425 was launched in 1934 and remained in production until 1960 when it was replaced by the slightly larger reference 2461. Together with the legendary Calatrava reference 96 it was one of *Patek Philippe's* most popular wristwatches, its typical Art Deco architectural design serving as inspiration for the firm's other rectangular models of the time. It was fitted with the celebrated rectangular-shaped caliber 9-90, *Patek Philippe's* finest non-circular movement of the period.

The present model further impresses with its striking diamond-set hour markers, set against the double-signed dial, the fourth to ever be identified with the Gubelin signature.

This watch is confirmed by the *Patek Philippe* Extract from the Archives as being manufactured in 1942 with "rose dial, raised rose gold hour-markers, tachometer scale". The long signature of this dial is







beautifully preserved in its original hard enamel as well as the tachometer. The retailer signature is equally well preserved in its original state. Interestingly, the extract of the watch states the case was made in steel and does not mention the rose gold bezel. However, the dial color is confirmed as rose and furthermore the hour markers in rose gold and the watch retains its period crown and buckle in rose gold. As a fresh to market example of this important reference, impressively well preserved, it is exciting to see such a piece surface on the market 75 years after it was first sold in Italy. While this model is celebrated at one of *Patek Philippe*'s most sought-after productions it is extremely rare to discover an example with a two-color case, here in steel with pink gold, a very attractive combination. While this model was produced in different precious metal versions as well as in stainless steel, very few examples have been discovered in stainless steel and rose gold, in fact, less than 10 have appeared publicly, even less which were retailed and signed by *Hausmann & Co.*, the prestigious Italian jewelry house.

The reference 130 was the first chronograph wristwatch fitted with a caliber 13" movement and in production from 1936 until 1964. It is interesting to note that the lugs of the stainless steel version are different from the yellow, pink or white gold ones. They are slightly thicker but shorter in design as well as the slightly larger diameter of 33.5 mm. as opposed to the 33 mm. of the precious metal model gives the watch a rather tonneau-shaped design and a more sportive, robust and masculine look.

Preserved in outstandingly crisp condition with sharp edges to the lugs and chronograph pushers, together with the beautiful and charismatic two-tone rose dial, the present watch is a highly attractive collector's piece, which can certainly be described as one of *Patek Philippe's* most refined designs ever.

To the best of our knowledge this watch has never before been offered in public.

Hausmann & Co.

Hausmann & Co. was founded in Rome in 1794 by Ernst Hausmann, a young German clockmaker and his friend and partner Hermann Frielingsdorf. The firm is still residing in the same premises in Rome's historical centre and represents the world's most prestigious watch and clock manufacturers.

One of the cornerstone models of *Patek Philippe*; combining the "Calatrava" style case with the chronographic feature, the reference 130 is regarded as one of the most appreciated *Patek Philippe* creations, and the base of any serious vintage *Patek Philippe* collection.

Produced in yellow, pink and white gold, as well as in stainless steel, it features a number of dial variations. One of the most alluring is, without a doubt, the present, so-called "pink-on-pink" combination: pink gold case and pink dial.

When looking at the production numbers for different case materials for any vintage wristwatch, it is evident that pink gold versions are always more rare than yellow gold. This is a consequence of the fact that, in the beginning of the 20th century, the exotic glow of pink gold was considered unusual, and yellow gold versions were much easier sellers. Interestingly, pink gold watches were highly appreciated in South America, and it is not unusual for watches signed by South American retailers to be pink or even pink-on-pink.

While we do not know the destination market for the present lot, this does not prevent us from appreciating its glorious aesthetic, this timepiece is furthermore preserved in splendid condition. If pink gold watches were considered unusual, pink-on-pink examples were deemed by many as superbly exceptional. Consequently, production of such masterpieces is extremely limited. For example, it is estimated that of the total production of reference 130, less than 25 percent were cased in pink gold. Of course, just a fraction of these went on to be fitted with a pink dial as well: only ten pink-on-pink 130s are known from the market. Only from the 1960s on, following the momentous social changes of the time and their repercussions on the fashion trends, pink gold watches started to be worldwide cherished creations.

The more understated looks of pink gold watches is now very much appreciated by those who deem yellow gold too ostentatious, but still want the pleasure of feeling the weight and appreciating the glowing looks of gold on the wrist. The present timepiece brings the whole pink gold concept one step further, thanks to the splendidly preserved pink gold dial, with the wonderfully raised long "Patek Philippe & Co." signature, absolutely correct for a watch manufactured before 1948.

This "second series" reference 1463 was sold in 1949 in the midst of the second series production which ran from 1945 and finished 1961.

This particular example of the 1463 is important for a number of reasons. First and foremost, it is one of the earliest short signature 1463s known to exist. With the change over from *Patek Philippe & Cie* (long signature) to *Patek Philippe* (short signature) in 1948, it is exciting to see an example of a 1463 from this transitional year with the correct dial from the post-war period. The well preserved dial also features the rare variant of Roman numerals combined with long stick batons. The majority of 1940s and 1950s gold 1463s feature Arabic or Breguet dials making this Roman version a rare exception. Furthermore, this example features a second series case with beautiful heavy downturned lugs and a large gold crown. Altogether one of the most wearable of vintage *Pateks* for the modern wrist, the 1463 is an attractive addition to any collection.

Considered one the most beautiful chronographs of the mid-20th century, Reference 1463 is *Patek Philippe's* regular production vintage chronograph model (aside from the 1563) with screw back case and round pushers. The case of this water-resistant 1463 was made by Taubert (formerly Freres Borgel) and was considered a sports watch in its day for its water and dust resistant case combined with a chronograph. A soft-iron dust cap also protects the movement. This fine watch can be considered a great rarity both for its condition, originality, and beauty in design, a true vintage wearable work of art.

The present watch stands out due to its important horological as well as historical relevance. An extremely rare war time single-button chronograph, *Cartier* treasures such as this rarely come to market, especially those that are also valued for their Americana interest.

Collectors consider the single-button chronograph one of the most complex and sophisticated mechanisms available. Unlike the more common chronograph in which the functions are typically operated through two crowns in the band, the single-button chronograph is fully operated through the crown. In the collecting community, a single-button chronograph from the 1940s is a special discovery as they were made in small numbers and very few have survived the last 70+ years.

Most interesting is that the majority of the *Cartier* watches from this period house movements made by the *European Watch Company* but during times of war alternative suppliers needed to be leveraged. In this case, the movement is made by *C.H. Meylan Watch Company*. Quite remarkably, the standard *Cartier* numbered stamp is still visible to the back of the top left lug as is the gold hallmark to the side of the top right lug.

William Clay Ford Sr. (1925-2014)

William Clay Ford was the youngest child of Edsel Ford and the last surviving grandson of Henry Ford, the founder of Ford Motor Company- one of the largest American automotive companies in existence. Born in Detroit, near the headquarters of the motor company, William was welcomed into a life of wealth and success. One year after his grandfather, Henry Ford's, passing in 1948 he was appointed to Ford Motor Company's Board of Directors. Afforded with this large responsibility, William had proved himself to be worthy of such responsibility after his graduation from the Hotchkiss School in 1943 and also after receiving a Bachelor Science in Economics from Yale University soon after. Upon his graduation from Hotchkiss, William was given the present watch by his father, Edsel. The case back is engraved with the school logo inlaid with blue enamel and surrounding text; William Clay Ford, May 22, 1943. William Ford Sr. went on to own the Detroit Lions National Football League franchise.

Very few Patek Philippe watches are designated "Extra", the present watch is one of those rarified pieces. Only superb watches of the highest chronometer standard were inscribed this way. The present watch was chosen specifically for inclusion in the Observatory Timing Contests of 1923-1924. When destined for participation in this contest, the movements were engraved with the movement number twice. The inscription "Extra" on the bridge of the movement refers to the high finishing of all the parts of the movement. This watch was awarded second prize as confirmed on the cuvette engraving as well as the Extract from the Archives.

Property From the Original Family





A Tradition Born in England, Worn by America's First Family of Luxury for Generations

One hundred and sixty years ago, *Tiffany & Co.* founder Charles Lewis Tiffany acquired this Charles Frodsham watch and began a family tradition that lasted for generations. Upon reaching adulthood, each generation passed the watch from the parents to an heir and brought the watch back to *Tiffany & Co.* to engrave each new recipient's name and their birth date on the inside of the front case cover.


The watch remained a discreet and private family heirloom until now. Previously no one outside the family and the *Tiffany & Co.* engravers had knowledge of the existence of this watch until recent news of the 'discovery' of this watch crossed the Atlantic and spread around the world.

The fact that America's leading retailer of jewelry and watches personally chose to wear an English made pocket watch as his most prized personal possession rewrites horological history and underlines the importance of the relationship and respect between *Tiffany & Co.* and English watchmaking in the 19th century.


According to the Charles Frodsham company archives, 'Messrs Tiffany & Co.' bought a number of quality timepieces and complicated watches (mostly chronographs) from Frodsham in the second half of the 19th century for retail to their most discerning clients. Furthermore, the Frodsham archive records that a 'Miss Tiffany' bought a fine gold open faced pocket chronometer in September 1883. The buyer is believed to be one of Charles Lewis Tiffany's two daughters.


Mr. Tiffany may have chosen this particular watch for a number of reasons. First, it is important to note the desire for Americans at the height of society to own a fine English made chronometer at this point in history. Junius Morgan, JP Morgan, and JP Morgan, Jr, all chose Frodshams as their preferred watchmakers. However, the main reason Tiffany may have chosen this watch was his close relationship with Frodshams as the 'Sole Agents in New York' for the company. Dozens of advertisements are known from 1867 through the early 1870s highlighting this important relationship.





Charles Frodsham






According to John Loring's 'Tiffany Timepieces', it transpires that initial watch offerings from *Tiffany* in NY were not just *Patek* but also *Frodshams*. "Tiffany did not begin using individual watchmakers' names in its advertising until about 1860, but there is little doubt that Adrien Philippe's stem winding system and Charles Frodshams chronometers were among its initial offering. A formal exclusivity agreement on the importation of watches was reached with *Patek Philippe* in 1854 and the exclusive right to import *Frodsham* watches to the Unites States was secured in 1860 from *S. Willard & Son* in Boston. (Loring, John. *Tiffany Timepieces*, p. 8)

In addition to the famous Tiffany Timers being sold by *Tiffany & Co*, advertisements from the 1860s highlight the offering from the famous retailer. 'Tiffany & Co. have also a full assortment of Watches of all desirable sizes and styles, of the same quality in addition to their usual stock of Frodshams and Jurgensens'. Other ads from the era describe 'Fine watches for Gentlemen: Frodsham, Jurgensen, and all other best makers'. Clearly *Tiffany & Co.* had the clientele to sell the best watches made globally and many chose to buy these English made masterpieces. However, buying a *Frodsham* came at a price for Americans. During this period of time, the price to own a Frodsham watch was \$500 up to \$1500, a huge amount of money for the mid-19th century.

This watch is London hallmarked for 1858 inside the case, and the casemakers initials AN are for Adolphe Nicole. It is interesting to note that the association between Nicole and Frodshams (through various directorships and company owners) runs continuously through to the 1930s. Furthermore, the Tiffany watch has an early form of keyless winding system invented by the same Adolphe Nicole, in 1844. The watch is thus inscribed Patent. It is often forgotten today that Adrien Philippe's keyless winding system was not the first keyless winding system widely used in the 19th century. The earliest keyless winding system was patented in 1820 by Thomas Prest, John Arnold's workshop foreman, and it was not for another 24 years that Adrien Philippe introduced his keyless winding system in 1844, the same year he joined Patek as head watchmaker.

This watch offers the opportunity to not only own an important piece of horological history but also the chance to own a watch with impeccable provenance from the founding family of the world's most famous luxury goods retailer.



Charles Lewis Tiffany (1812-1902)

On September 21, 1837, Charles Lewis Tiffany and John P. Young opened a stationery and fancy goods store known as *Tiffany & Young* at 259 Broadway in New York City thanks to a loan from \$1000 loan from Tiffany's father. Within ten years, jewelry and silver items were added to their stock. By 1853, *Tiffany* had assumed complete ownership of the business and the name was changed to *Tiffany & Co*. Soon watches, a personal interest of Mr. Tiffany, became an increasingly important part of the business. During the 19th century, designers such as Edward C. Moore and G. Paulding Farnham, as well as renowned gemologist George Frederick Kunz, propelled *Tiffany & Co*. to the forefront of the international jewelry world. With watches, Tiffany forged relationships with the world's most important watchmakers of the time including *Patek Philippe, Jules Jurgensen,* and of course *Charles Frodsham*. In the mid-1870s *Tiffany & Co*. opened its first watchmaking facility in Geneva, Switzerland at Place Cornavin, one the most state of the art watchmaking facilities of the time.

The *Tiffany & Co.* empire continued to grow to unimaginable levels even during Mr. Tiffany's lifetime. At the time of his death at the age of 90, Tiffany's company was worth over \$2 million in 1902. Today, Tiffany & Co. is recognized as one of the most important names in luxury retail.

In 1839, Tiffany married his partner John B. Young's younger sister, Harriet Olivier Avery Young (1817-1897). Their oldest son, Louis Comfort Tiffany, was born in 1848 and later on as an adult inherited the presently offered watch

Louis Comfort Tiffany (1848-1933)

Louis Comfort Tiffany was known primarily for his "hand-wrought" style in the tradition of the Arts and Crafts movement, and continually challenged the American palette with themes of exoticism, naturalism and light. During his half century career, from the 1860s to the 1920s, he demonstrated a multitude of talents as an architect, painter, interior and jewelry designer.

While Louis Comfort started as a painter, it was in the decorative arena where he truly made his mark. There was hardly a medium to which he did not turn, and he became interested in the decorative possibilities of


glass from 1875. He operated under Tiffany Furnaces, separated from the auspices of *Tiffany & Co.* and his father, Charles Tiffany. It was here that he produced richly colored lamps and vibrantly toned favrile glass, pottery, tapestries, enamels, metalwork, furniture and hundreds of other items that would grace the homes of some of the most important Americans of the time including Mark Twain, Cornelius Vanderbilt II as well as The White House itself. Renowned for his excellence and perfection, Louis Comfort personally examined each piece before it received the final stamp of approval.

It was not until the death of his father, the patriarch Charles Tiffany, in 1902, that Louis Comfort began to manufacture his own jewelry designs. It is possible that this late flowering was due to the fact that he felt that his designs would be rejected, so as not to compete with those from Tiffany and Co., a firm that had defined American taste and style in jewelry for so many decades. Immediate yet highly secretive production was begun by Louis Comfort and his team of craftsmen in anticipation of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition to be held in St. Louis in 1904. It was at this world's fair that he showcased twenty-seven pieces of jewelry in the Arts and Crafts style, which received international acclaim.

Louis Comfort continued to work at the "Art Jewelry" department, which remained open until his death in 1933, producing approximately 5,500 individual pieces of jewelry. With a clear focus on color and a constant drive to express unusual combinations through themes of nature, he was driven to stimulate the ordinary palette and test the limit of conventional style.

Louis Comfort Tiffany married Mary Woodbridge Goddard in 1872. Their oldest daughter, Mary Woodbridge Tiffany (1873-1963) married Graham Lusk and the watch passed down through the Lusk branch of the family to this day.

An exceptional pocket watch of the highest quality with ruby banking pins

Patek Philippe classified its watches, in terms of quality, as quality 1, quality 2, and quality 3. The first quality was called "EXTRA", the second "SPECIAL". Then, there was EXTRA "EXTRA" quality. The present watch was a watch of "EXTRA" quality but was improved. The improvement was in banking pins. The pallet fork, an integral part of the watch's escapement, hits its banking pins almost half a million times a day. A year of constant use of over 150 million hits takes a toll on banking pins. Patek Philippe, in their best of their best, used ruby inserts instead of banking pins.

Very few of these watches were made, even less are known to exist. Most of them were destined for Geneva Observatory Timing Contests. Usually, watches destined for Observatory Contests were cased in displayed nickel cases. Observatory personnel needed an easy access to the movement.

The Extract from the Archives for this watch states that the case was specially replaced for *Tiffany*. This was because, as was customary, the watch went to the Geneva Observatory Timing Contest in a regular case. *Tiffany*, which apparently prized these watches highly, wanted a special case therefore, after the watch came back from the observatory, the company provided their highest quality case with concealed hinges.

In addition to the above, the watch shows all the features of 'EXTRA' quality Patek Philippe products:

The winding wheels are of so called wolf-shape which are of higher robustness assuring centuries of smooth windings. The caliber on which the movement is based was not used often by *Patek Philippe*, most likely due to the cost of the production. It is found in a few special watches. One of them, a small minute repeater of this model, is in the *Patek Philippe* Museum, Inv. P-803.

The vast majority of *Patek Philippe* watches from this period have white enamel dials. This watch has a gilded silver dial with the center engine turned in sunburst pattern and the edge engine turned in barley-corn pattern. The dial was first engraved with numerals and with the minute track and then a black enamel was inserted into the groves and fired. These are the most durable dials the company ever made.

Notably, the attractive case is also special with the hinge of the back cover made almost invisible. This was done not only to please the eye but also to make sure that it will not catch a thread in the pocket when worn.

To the best of our knowledge this watch has never before been offered in public.

Manufactured in 1912, it is remarkable that this fresh to market and extremely attractive minute repeating pocket watch is still accompanied by its original box, original certificate, and even the original envelope for that certificate, a rarity for those collectors who are seeking to acquire a 'complete' watch.

One will notice the retailer's stamp on the inside of the box, on the top left corner of the envelope, but it is also seen on the movement, alongside that of *Patek Philippe*. Retailed by Hope Brothers, Knoxville, Tennessee, clearly *Patek Philippe* made this watch specifically for their store. This landmark establishment was situated on the south side of Gay Street in the heart of town and was frequented by those looking for the most special watches and jewelry pieces at that time, all they had to do was look for the iconic clock that stood outside, a recognizable feature of the famous boutique.

For a watch that is over 100 years old, it is astonishing that the minute repeater sounds so pure, but that is to be expected from *Patek Philippe* production, who were known for making the finest complicated watches of the time. Upon closer inspection of this watch, one will notice the gorgeous blue/purple enamel which decorates the bezel, similarly, the same color is seen in the long *Patek Philippe* & *Co.* signature to the dial. The monogram to the case back upon first glance seems to contest in color, the richness matched in comparison, however, it is in fact a monogram filled with lapis lazuli, as confirmed on the Extract from the *Patek Philippe* archives.



A Poet For the People

Sholom Aleichem (1859-1916) born Sholem Naumovich Rabinovitz is recognized as the greatest of Yiddish writers and supreme Jewish humorist. His capturing of laughter through tears endeared him to his readers as a member of family. He attained fame in his lifetime and was cherished as the 'writer of the people'.

A Russian-speaking leading novelist, essayist, playwright and influencer, he is widely considered an unrivaled designer of modern literature. Writing over 40 volumes of significant and celebrated works, perhaps his most famous work is a play entitled *Tevye the Dairyman*, first published in 1894, for which the musical 'Fiddler on the Roof' was based, one of the most popular shows of all time

An acknowledgement in the Jewish faith, 'Shalom Aleichem' is a term used to greet one another, a pleasantly among friends which is used by the Jewish people all over the world. Literally meaning 'peace be upon you,' it seems no coincidence that the Yiddish writer named himself this, since his literary focus was on the ways of life of the Jewish people, their daily activities, and their interactions with one another.

Immensely influential, his plays highlighted both the comedic and the more difficult sides of Jewish life in the late 19th and early 20th century. Critics have called him the "Jewish Mark Twain," a writer who was able to create rich and vibrant characters that resonated with their readers for their humanity and universal appeal. Some have noted that he treated his characters as if they were real, and his followers believed him.

Born in Ukraine, he was part of a small town with a large Jewish population. His plays surely echo what is likely first-hand accounts of the realistic surroundings of his upbringing. His first Yiddish story, written in Hebrew,





was produced when he was just 24 years old, entitled *Tsvey Shteyner* ("Two Stones"). He soon became they key figure in Yiddish literature, the inherent dialect of nearly all East European Jews, which is still used today. It was always a hope of his that Yiddish would adopt a higher distinction and be widely adopted as a modern European language. An enthusiast of the Jewish faith and its people, he also devoted himself to Zionism, the development and protection of a Jewish nation in what is now Israel, established as a political organization in 1897, for which many of his writings detail.

Not only did Sholem Aleichem write stories that were favored, but his influence on an entire population was evident. Every week he would produce a new story for the Yiddish press, sometimes more. Reading these stories became a ritual of Shabbat, read aloud in the homes of so many families that adored his satirical script. Beyond this huge outreach, it is important to understand that these were not just stories to be read and discarded. They encouraged the common man to have a voice, encouraged the Jewish presence in the political life of Eastern Europe as well as America, and ultimately explored how to be a Jew in a modern world, yet not lose the continuity of a civilization.

Sholem Aleichem relocated to New York City in 1905. During the years of 1908 and 1914, Sholem Aleichem also resided in Geneva, Switzerland. This is where he received this very special watch which was retailed by Guggenbuhl-Merian Basel, based in Basel, in 1911.

The present watch was a gift to Sholem Aleichem, for this contribution to the 10th Zionist Congress The inscription to the inside caseback reads;

An unseren beliebten Volksdichter Schalom Allichem zum Andenken an den X Zionisten Kongress von David Wissotzky aus Moskau Basel 1911



Translated to English as;

To Our Beloved, Poet of the People, Schalom Allichem, To Commemorate the 10th Zionist Congress, From David Wissotzky, Moscow, Basel, 1911

David Wissotzky, (1861-1930), wasborn in Russia. Continuing his father's business, heading the largest tea manufacturer in the world, Wissotsky Tea, Mr. Wissotsky is also heralded as a chairman of the Economic Board for Jewish prayer institutions in Moscow, and for his contributions to the Zionist cause. The historic irony is that Sholom Aleichem had written the story "Gitl Purishkevitch." Gitl, an agent for Wissotsky's tea who, as she repeatedly asserts, "owes everything she is to God and then Wissotsky." This was an initial use of product placement and resulted in much success for Wisstosky. This no doubt contributed to David Wisstosky's lavish gift.

It is understandable that Mr. Wissotsky had a very meaningful relationship with Sholem Aleichem, considering the two men had many attributes in common. Both contributed heavily to the Jewish faith, were entrepreneurs in their own right, and established businesses that have flourished for many years after their death. They touched a nation with their passions, the funeral for Sholem Aleichem in the streets of New York in 1916 is a testament to

this. It is estimated that 100,000 mourners attended, coming from all three boroughs to pay their respects, this is the largest funeral in New York City to date. In addition to a Tel Aviv street named after



Zenith Grande Sonnerie with Minute Repeater

The Zenith company was founded in 1865 by Georges-Emile Favre-Bulle as Georges Favre-Jacot & Cie. In 1896 Georges Favre-Jacot founded a new company in order to raise capital: Fabrique de montres Georges Favre-Jacot & Cie. Their main market was Russia to which was half of the production was sent and at this time, production of deck watches and pocket chronometers increased rapidly. In 1897 Georges Favre-Jacot registered the Trademark 'Zénith', to produce watch cases and pocket watch movements. In 1900, as managing director of Zenith, James Albert Favre-Bulle, nephew of the founder, decided to make some radical commercial changes. He opened an agency in Warsaw, Poland, St. Petersburg, and Moscow and also looked for new agents in Germany and England. In 1904 James Favre was determined to start selling Zenith in the United States and succeeded in doing so by 1905. By 1917, Zenith had a work force of 600 men and produced thousands of watches annually; these Zenith watches were renowned for fine timekeeping while remaining relatively low priced. In 1918 a commercial agency was opened in Geneva. At that time, they specialized in table clocks and Neuchâtel clocks and in 1957 Zenith boasted of being one of the few remaining Manufactures, a firm that not only producing its own watches but also that cast its own alloys to make its own tools. That year Zenith had a staff of 800 and used 9.000 machines.

In the last decade of the 19th Century, Zenith collaborated with producers which were specialized in complicated mechanisms, such as Le Phare – amongst others – of which Zenith became the majority shareholder in 1915. Although sometimes the movement was not completely manufactured by Zenith, they earned the right to add their signature, identifying themselves with very high-quality and sought-after timepieces.

According to the Archives of *Zenith*, the present watch, a highly-complicated gold Grande Sonnerie with Minute Repeater was fitted with a Repeater caliber which isn't identified with *Zenith* traditional movement serial numbering but which *Zenith* signed as when using it in its high-end Repeater Pocket Watches from other Manufacturers (such as Audemars Frères, for example). This enhances the probability that this is a movement advertised by César Racine Workshops in Le Locle.

According to his ad from 1900 in the *Journal of the Fédération de Horlogère*, César Racine was specialized in Grande Sonneries (simple or combined with other complications such as Chimes, Chronographs, Calendar, or Automatons), and furthermore the author of numerous patents in the area of Sonneries (Patents CH16112 from 1898 or CH18543 from 1899, notably) or in the barrel's area. It is worth noting that the invention described in his

Patent CH66903 from 1913 in this area, "a single barrel winding two trains", differs from the solution used in the case of this caliber: two barrels (for the striking-mechanism and for the main mechanism) being wound alternatively, depending on the direction in which one turns the crown. The study of this caliber further shows that it existed in a large variety of possible finishing Calibers signed with *Zenith* generally were gold-plated and fitted with 27 or 30 jewels for example (including jewels on its center-wheel and on striking-work's pinions).

Patek Philippe, No. 33549, cameo to the design of B. Thorvaldsen, execution attributed to Tomasso Saulini, completed in 1868, sold the same year, on November 26. The only known *Patek Philippe* cameo watch with a matching original Patek Philippe cameo brooch.

The story of this watch goes back to 1815 when Bertel Thordvaldsen (1770-1844), a legendary sculptor of the Neoclassical period¹, carved two bas reliefs in marble; Night and Day (Fig. 2 & 3)².

Little did he know that the posterity will remember him not by his colossal statues of Nicolas Copernicus³ or Pope Pius VII⁴, but by his two allegorical representations of a day and a night.

Thordvaldsen was so famous that a museum was built for his work already during his lifetime. Over the years it has grown and now is one of the most important Danish museums.

Thordvaldsen, who spent most of his career in Italy, had a student, Tommaso Saulini (1793-1864). Saulini became one of the most famous cameo carvers, working both in stone and in shell. Today, he is celebrated as much as during his lifetime. When Queen Elizabeth II visited Italy in October 2000 she was presented by the Italian President, Carlo Ciampi, with an official state gift which was two cameos by Saulini, one representing Minerva and the other Medusa⁵.

In 1862 there was an international Grand Exposition in London. It was the most important art, craft, and industry international gathering in years, attracting over six million visitors from all over the world⁶. Saulini took part in the exposition for which he crafted a cameo based on his master's masterpiece - The Allegory of Night⁷. The work was exquisite and the judges awarded him a prize for "excellence of design and workmanship"⁸.

The cameo, which is signed T. Saulini, is strikingly similar to the one in the brooch of this watch. *Patek Philippe* took part in the same exposition and no doubt became familiar with Saulini's prized work. Since *Patek Philippe* records do not list the maker of this cameo, it must have been taken from the stock. Most likely, it was purchased from Saulini directly at the exhibition and put in stock in anticipation of a commission for a cameo watch.

A cameo is made from a solid bi-color stone. The top layer is carved into a desired shape and the rest is removed down to the contrasting background color. The quality of a cameo is measured by the flatness of the background and the purity of the layers.

Looking at this watch's cameos one can see (rarely present in cameos) perfect circular frames in both pieces. This can be done only in the best cameo stones. Usually, even in relatively high quality cameos, a frame varies in thickness and in height. Here, it is uniform in its entire length.

The carving is exquisite, the details remarkably well carved, even the facial features are presented exceptionally well. Clearly, it is a work of a master carver working the highest quality stone. From the resemblance to Saulini's work it is well justified to attribute the work to Saulini, a prize winner at the 1862 exposition.

The night is presented by Nyx, a Greek goddess of the night with her two children, one of whom, Hypnos, was the god of Sleep. Her hair is braided with poppies inducing sleep, tthe night bird, the owl, which always accompanies her, flies towards us announcing that its mistress is coming.

Night does not appear in mythology often but when she does, she is shown with such great power and beauty that she was feared by Zeus himself, as related by Homer.

The Allegory of Day is symbolized by Aurora, Roman goddess of dawn, flying across the sky every morning spreading roses on the earth, announcing the arrival of her brother, Sol, the Sun. She is accompanied by her son, the Light Bringer.

Patek Philippe cameo watches are exceptionally rare. Only three are known:
No. 33549 made 1868. THIS WATCH, with a matching brooch
No. 55107 made 1878. A pendant watch. In a private collection
No. 805957 made 1921. Men's dress (pocket) watch. Never sold, in Patek
Philippe Museum

Patek Philippe featured Thornvaldsen's Day and Night on a number of other occasions but only in its enamel watches. For instance, a hunter, No. 28168 made in 1866 had Day painted in the front and Night on the back⁹. The painting was entrusted to one of the best enamel painters of the time, Madame Gaspard Lamuniere. It is now in the Patek Philippe Museum (Inv P-384). Apparently, the subject was so attractive that the company, two years later, decided to make another one, even more stunning, this time in cameo.

Offered for the first time at auction, this watch is a museum piece exemplifying the quality of products *Patek Philippe* searched for to implement in their watches.

The present bracelet watch impresses with its extreme rarity. A most unusual design, the craftsmanship of late 1940s *Patek Philippe* is unmatched in this timepiece. Set with 47 diamonds to the dial cover, weighing 1.50 carats total, the pink gold bracelet is simply stunning.

A marvelous example of the firms move towards creating functional ladies jewelry watches, *Patek Philippe* is known for their attention to detail in the mid-20th century when they began experimenting with innovative case designs- no doubt a request from women who wanted the elegance of a well-crafted wristwatch that can also function as an attractive jewelry statement piece.

With outstanding presence on the wrist, the articulated scrolled lugs are mesmerizing when seen from the side, a detail that should be witnessed first-hand to be fully admired. Extremely glamorous, this set includes a *Patek Philippe* watch, ring and earrings of matching design which combine yellow gold and deep rich blue lapis lazuli to great effect. Lady's "haute joaillerie" watches by *Patek Philippe* have always been very exclusive and made only in small numbers. A decade of activism, freedom and self-expression dominated the 1970s and established fashion and jewellery trends which became more individualized. Often described as "haute couture" because the original owners often bought these pieces to accessorize their couture fashion. Today such wonderful objects are still highly sought for their chic sophistication and timeless wearability.

This piece unique enamel dome clock depicts an endearing mythological tale of love. It tells the story of of *Endymion*, a handsome young shepherd prince and also the son of Zeus. The young prince is adored by many but especially by the moon-goddess Selene. This is playfully illustrated on the left panel where see cupid striking an arrow towards the couple in a candlelit setting. The young prince has been cast into eternal sleep, immortality, and everlasting youth- a request some say that Zeus granted him at his request, shown in the next panel where Zeus is illustrated laying his hand over his sons head. Others say that it was Selene, so charmed with his beauty that she sent him to sleep so she could kiss him every night without being observed by him. On the third panel we see her journey under a bright moon to visit her prince. On the top panels are depictions of the goddess of hunting, thought to be the Greek Artemis or the Roman Diana. It was said that she protected the young prince's fortunes, increased his flock, and guarded his sheep and lambs from the wild beasts.

Towards the end of the 1940's, the Swiss watchmaking industry began using the technique of cloisonné enamel. This technique uses fine bands (filaments) of gold or copper to outline the design subject, which are then soldered to the surface of a plate. The empty spaces are then filled with ground enamel and fired multiple times so that the surface becomes perfectly level.

Patek Philippe opened its Electronic Division in 1948 with the goal of exploring photoelectric, electronic, and nuclear timekeeping. The department produced the groundbreaking solar clock, the first of its kind. The first dome clocks produced in the 1950's and 1960's came with a mechanical caliber 17" pocket watch movement, wound by an electric winding device.

In 1955, the solar-powered photoelectric clocks were exhibited at the 1955 World Symposium, and displayed at the Museum of Science in Boston, Massachusetts. In the 1970's, *Patek Philippe* began using quartz technology in its clock production, and began phasing out the use of solar versions. These Dome clocks are highly collectable, and often feature a unique and individually decorated case, featuring cloisonné enamel scenes. These clocks also feature a circular brass dial, engraved Roman hour markers, lighter skeleton hands that replaced the heavier Dauphine hands featured on earlier clocks with mechanical movements.

Similar examples of this clock are illustrated and described in *Patek Philippe Museum - Patek Philippe Watches, Volume II*, p. 404-411.

The reference 5029 was produced in 1997 to commemorate the opening of the new *Patek Philippe* factory in Geneva and only 30 examples were produced - 10 each in platinum, pink and yellow gold respectively. According to research, only five were ever produced with a champagne dial such as the present watch.

The subtle elegant appearance of Ref. 5029 with its gently curved case and straight screw-set lugs pays homage to the design traditions of *Patek Philippe*. The case of the present lot was made by the renowned case maker Jean-Pierre Hagmann, whose mark, *JHP*, is stamped on the inside of the hinged case back.

Originally trained as a jeweler, Jean-Pierre Hagmann set up his own company in 1984, specializing in the manufacture of custom-made high quality watch cases. He worked for several of the world's most famous watch manufactures, notably *Patek Philippe*, to whom he supplied amongst others cases for references 3974, 3979 and 5029, all models of the firm's "Grand Complication" series.



The offset rotor in 22-carat gold sunk into the main-plate reacts to the slightest wrist movement to keep the chronometer wound for optimum time-keeping. A rated performance well ahead of official chronometer standards testifies to the thorough finish and precision assembly of movements hallmarked with the Geneva Seal.

Patek Philippe commissioned advanced metallurgical research to develop an acoustic steel that chimes in the confines of a wristwatch. As a result, nothing mars the sharp, clear chime of its repeaters, not even the spinning speed-regulator that governs the strike of

The Patek Philippe reference 3970 perpetual calendar chronograph is considered a modern classic. The third iteration of the celebrated perpetual chronograph line of timepieces from Patek Philippe, the 3970 is the heir to the 2499, with which it shares the unmistakable case construction characterized by its sculpted lugs. Also, the 3970 replaces the Valjoux caliber of its predecessors with a Lemania caliber.

The 3970 represents the first 'production era' perpetual chronograph from *Patek Philippe*, and the fact that significant numbers of this reference were made relative to the 1518 and 2499 makes the 3970 more accessible in terms of price point and of exceptional value. This particular example has a well preserved platinum case with crisp outside hallmarks, a screw down sapphire case back, and a black dial with diamond hour markers, all confirmed on the archive.

Coming from the final series of this model, to the best of our knowledge this watch has never before been offered in public.

Production of the 5040 was launched in 1992 and it stayed in production until 2007. During its run, it is estimated that just under 4000 examples were produced and approximately 500 examples were made in white gold.

This example of the 5040 is arguably one the most important and rare example of this reference to exist and one of the last 5040s to ever leave the manufacture. As one of the rarer modern *Patek Philippe* references to begin, this particular example of the reference takes rarity to the level of truly unique. The dial features three variants never before seen on this reference. Reference 5951 was launched in 2010 by *Patek Philippe* and is one of *Patek Philippe's* leading contemporary examples. Cushion-shaped single-button chronograph watches by *Patek Philippe* have a long history and go back to the late 1920's, a time where the Swiss manufacture had already produced their technically most ingenious and beautiful masterpieces. Therefore, it comes as no surprise that when thinking about the design of this watch that *Patek Philippe* went back into their prestigious history to inspire themselves in creating this superb timepiece.

Cushion-shaped examples have always been a rare production for *Patek Philippe*, especially those which combine such complications as a perpetual calendar with split second chronograph, no less operated through a single button in the band. The single-button chronograph mechanism allows its wearer to operate "stop-watch" functions via the crown, enabling the designers to achieve a most elegant and smooth line. Combining a perpetual calendar with a state-of-the-art chronograph movement, this reference 5951 is one of the most important wristwatches ever created by *Patek Philippe*.

The reference 5951 with this original dial layout was only available for approximately two years after it was first released. Less than 10 examples with this dial variant are known to exist and it is no surprise that is one the most difficult to find modern *Patek Philippe* watches. When the knowledge behind names such as *Hublot* and *Ferrari* collaborate, it is destined to produce a force of power, engineering prowess, and dynamic design. The black PVD case, which emanates a powerful aura itself, is topped by a titanium and carbon insert at its center, revealing the winding crown. Integral to the design, the winding crown is positioned under the case, achieving a seamless and harmonious design.

Launched in 2014, the *Patek Philippe* reference 5975 multi-scale chronograph was made in a very special limited edition of a total of 1300 watches to celebrate the 175th anniversary of the firm.

400 examples each were produced in yellow gold, pink gold and white gold and 100 in platinum.

What sets the reference 5975 apart from other chronographs is that it was the first automatic chronograph-only wristwatch ever produced by *Patek Philippe* and furthermore it is the first made without chronograph registers or a subsidiary seconds.

In fact it is a highly accurate true tool watch with three different timing scales: a tachymeter, for calculation of speed over a known distance; a telemeter for determining distance based on a calculation between the speed of light and the speed of sound and a pulsometer, for measuring heartbeats per minute.

Following firmly in the tradition of *Patek Philippe*'s best mid-century vintage chronographs, the dial of the 5975 is a masterful piece of design, managing to remain understated and elegant despite its complexity. The 40 mm. stepped case is superbly rendered with sharp angles and a solid case back, engraved "175è Anniversaire 1839 - 2014", previously unseen on references with complications delivered after the early 1980s.

Fitted with the caliber 28-520 movement stamped with the *Patek Philippe* Seal, attesting to its impeccable precision and finishing, the precision of the caliber was increased especially for the 5975.



To commemorate *Patek Philippe's* 175th anniversary in 2014, the firm reinterpreted the legendary World Time model, for the first time giving it a hauntingly poetic moon phase display. To help it venture into these new technical and aesthetic dimensions, the manufacture developed a new version of ultra-thin self-winding movement: the caliber 240 HU LU. The engineers dispensed with the usual aperture and its disk adorned with two moons; instead, a single, large, richly atmospheric moon turns clockwise at the center of the dial against a star-studded nocturnal sky. The effect is achieved with two very thin disks of mineral glass. The lower disk, depicting the moon, completes a rotation in a lunar month. The fixed upper disk is a heart-shaped mask; its outline reveals the changing visible portion of the moon night after night with astonishing accuracy. A complex new metallization technique has produced a moon whose face stands out against its starry background with almost photographic realism.

The elegant case of the reference 5575 differs in shape from the famous references 5110 and 5130 with its voluptuous lyre-shaped lugs and lack of crown guard, giving the model a clean sharp line contrasting perfectly with the complexity of the dial. For the first time, the city of Geneva replaces Paris as the European time zone city.

First launched in 1930s and patented in 1959, *Patek Philippe's* World Time watches enjoy cult status among travelers and collectors. The two rotating disks show the time simultaneously in all 24 time zones. With the 1999 patented single pusher adjustment mechanism is possible to correct all the displays with the single push of one button, without affecting the rate of the watch movement.

The reference 5575 was made in a limited series of 1,300 pieces and exclusively in white gold. It is one of the most popular watches in today's market, highly sought-after by collectors worldwide.

Reference 5131 is the successor of reference 5130 and shows three notable differences: use of a distinguishable closionné enamel dial, the names of the 24 cities are displayed in Italic type and the signature *Patek Philippe* and company location *Genève* are engraved on the bezel. Only two or three enameller artists are able to produce these rare dials and together they can only deliver 30-40 dials of each color every year. In 2012 a special and unique reference 5131 was produced with a view of the Geneva lake, and in 2014 limited editions were produced for much celebrated the *Patek Philippe* 175th Anniversary.

A modern world time wristwatch, the mechanism used harks back to the 1930s when talented Geneva watchmaker Louis Cottier devised it and offered his invention to *Patek Philippe*. Cottier's ingenuity resulted in the company's now classic references 1415 HU and 2523. In 1959, *Patek Philippe* obtained a patent for Cottier's device (Swiss Patent No. 340 191). The company further developed the movement, introducing caliber 240 HU in 1999.

Production of reference 5004 was launched in 1994 and remained in production until 2009. It is estimated that less than 140 examples of this reference were made in white gold over this time period. Of all 5004s, excluding the 5004s made in stainless steel, white gold examples are believed that to be the rarest case color. *Patek Philippe* replaced it with two other much slimmer and smaller platinum split-seconds chronograph references: the cushion-shaped reference 5951 released in 2010 with in-house caliber CHR 27-525 PS Q and the reference 5204, released in March 2012 at the BaselWorld with in-house caliber CHR 29-535 PS Q.

The reference 570 is one of the most appreciated and well known vintage watches by *Patek Philippe*. Reference 2526 is a legendary model in the history of watchmaking: not only is it the first automatic wristwatch by <code>Patek Philippe</code>, but it is also one of the best performing automatic movement ever designed; its performances and accuracy can be considered superior even by today's standards.

In addition, it is one of *Patek Philippe* models which presents most variations: it is known in the three gold colors and in platinum, with leather strap or with one of many possible bracelet designs. Its dial can be metal or enamel, with baton, Breguet or diamond-set indexes. One version even presents the Golden Rule on the dial. Furthermore, the model underwent an evolution over the years, thus presenting different series.

With such a "milestone status" among automatic wristwatches, such an array of different options, and the undeniable elegance of its simplicity, it is no surprise that this reference is a favorite among collectors.

Among the plethora of different variations, black 2526 dials are the most appreciated because of the incredible rarity and unsurpassed appeal of the iconic black dial. The ultimate echelon of collectability for this reference, consequently, is embodied in this watch: a black enamel first series dial, easily distinguished by glimpsing the flared holes under the numerals.

As this watch was manufactured after first series dials were no longer made, it is likely that the original buyer specially requested a black dial to be placed on this watch. Since the archive does not mention the original dial color of the watch, it is likely that this watch sold in 1956 was 'born' with this black dial from an early batch of dials from the mid-1950s as *Patek Philippe*





often filled special requests in this era. The fact remains that this dial is in exceptional condition and is exceptionally rare, a dial and reference coveted by collectors from around the world.

First series dials are distinguished by the fact that the numerals are not glued to the enamel, as seen with second series dials. Rather, the enamel presents flared holes in correspondence of every numeral through which the feet of the numeral are positioned before being soldered to the back of the dial. While guaranteeing maximum durability, this solution is extremely costly, as a high number of dials do not survive through the manufacturing process due to the many flared holes. This is why this methodology was abandoned in favor of a simpler one (and, later, an even simpler one when the dial becomes metal rather than enamel in the third series). Such a manufacturing procedure is proof of the nearly unreasonably high quality standards <code>Patek Philippe</code> maintained for their production over its entire existence.

Patek Philippe introduced the reference 5150 or "T150" in 2001 to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the relationship between Patek Philippe and Tiffany & Co. This model was offered in yellow, pink, and white gold and produced in a limited production of only 150 examples of each metal. The T150 features the distinctive "T" at 12 o'clock and an officer-style case back which opens to view the celebrated movement.

The reference 3450, successor of reference 3448, was introduced into the market in 1981. The model differs from its predecessor by the modified leap year indication, the small eccentric window at 4 o'clock. The first series was made with a simple red disk and Arabic numerals. The second, such as the present watch, is made with Roman numeral leap year indication.

A total of 244 examples of reference 3450 were made, the majority in yellow gold cases with only two in white gold are known to date. Production of both references 3448 and 3450 was discontinued in 1985 when reference 3940 was launched.

The case back of this 3450 features a 'tab' to easily open the caseback. This subtle and useful detail was added at the time of manufacture by *Patek Philippe* to a handful of 3450s.

Reference 3940, the quintessential perpetual calendar and distinguished by its timeless elegance, is undeniably amongst *Patek Philippe's* greatest classics. Launched in 1984 as replacement for reference 3450, it was at the time the slimmest automatic perpetual calendar wristwatch.

An initial series of around 100 pieces were manufactured between 1984 and 1985, the first 25 were especially made for the 225th anniversary of *Patek Philippe's* retailer Chronometrie Beyer in Zurich, numbered and personalized. Starting in 1985, reference 3940 went into standard production. Until the model's discontinuation in 2007 when it was replaced by reference 5140 three further series were produced.

Reference 3700 was equipped with caliber 28-255 C based on a *Jaeger-LeCoultre* ébauche, the best thin automatic movement at that time. One of the most iconic vintage *Rolex* references, the so-called Freccione (Italian for "big arrow") or Steve McQueen was in production from 1971 to 1985. Incorporating an annual calendar and dual time function, the Sky-Dweller is among the most complicated watches made by *Rolex*, and it is one of the very few forays into complicated timepieces for the company, known chiefly for sport and tool watches such as the Daytona or the Milgauss. Of particular ingenuity is the so-called "Ring Command" bezel: it can be turned to four positions, each one respectively selecting a different function for the crown: time setting, second time zone setting, calendar setting, and neutral. A regatta timer is used by the skipper of a yacht to determine when their vessel can cross the starting line. The countdown is usually under ten minutes, allowing the boats to prepare for the race ahead by tacking back and forth at the starting line. Having a precise timer at this point is essential as not be be penalized by crossing the staring line preemptively.

The Yacht-Master II has a flyback regatta timer that allows the wearer to time the countdown for a chosen period of up to ten minutes. In addition, the countdown can be adjusted while in use so that it can be as accurate as possible in accordance to the audible signals given at the start of race. The blue "Command Bezel," as named by Rolex, can be turned to set the countdown timer and the re-set button allows the seconds hand to fly back to zero and the minute hand to fly to the nearest minute, allowing for incredible precision.

With a strong nautical feel, the present watch stands out because of its bright blue bezel, red countdown hand and large white dial, further enhanced by the attractive two-tone steel and pink gold case and bracelet

The present reference 6263 features a dial that is known as a "Sigma" dial, indicated by two small Sigma symbols on either side of the "T Swiss T". The Sigma symbols indicate that the baton numerals and hands on a dial are made of gold, in this case white gold.

Sigma dials were first seen on the reference 6240, and were nicknamed "Goute A Prior" by Italian collectors and originally referred to the union of three *Rolex* dial producers: Singer, Stern, and Beyeler. On later references, the Sigma came to refer to indices and hands in gold.



A true Oyster case is defined by the screw-down case back, screw down crown and screw down chronograph pushers, thus ensuring increased water resistance. Reference 6265 is indeed one of these highly sought-after models. Rolex Daytona models had been in production for twenty years until the firm produced the reference 16520 in 1988 with an automatic movement. The movement in this new self-winding Daytona was based on the Zenith Caliber 400 which was a celebrated movement and the industry's only self-winding chronograph movement that met Rolex's high quality standards. Although it was a movement that met standards, Rolex decided to improve on it and modified the caliber to its own specification including a new larger escapement, freely sprung balance and balance spring with Breguet overcoil (which was a more costly configuration that lead to higher accuracy). The balance oscillation rate was reduced allowing for a less frequent watch service and the date function was eliminated. Retaining just 50% of the Zenith movement, the final result was the caliber 4030 which was used in modern Daytonas until 2000, at which time Rolex introduced the reference 116520 with the new and fully in-house caliber 4130.

The 16520 models had dials which went under a transformation due to oxidation where the chapter rings around the subsidiary dials changed color from white to a shade of brown. These Compax Marrone or Brown Compax models, as they are nicknamed, occurred on watches that were produced in the 1990's, and watches that have the upside down 6 digit on the 12 hour register. Color-change or "tropical" dials are extremely sought after as they are usually attributed to small production runs. Once the firm realized that the dials would change color, it was seen as a defect and consequently the material used was changed in hopes of finding a solution. Pieces with a small production are rare and those with a color-change dial are even rarer making the present Brown Compax a very special timepiece.



The present *Rolex* wristwatch is a stunning example of the reference 5508, the upgraded version of reference 6536/1, depth rated to 100 meters (330 ft), the case without crown guards. In production from 1957 until circa 1961, the dial correctly displays the signature *Rolex* and the words *Oyster Perpetual* and *Submariner* in gilt while the depth rating of 100m=330ft is white.

On closer inspection of this attractive timepiece, one will notice that the dial is turning a lighter black/brown due to aging and a sought-after 'spider' pattern has developed on the dial over the last 50+ years. Combined with a faded grey bezel, this watch emulates full character and charm that is only found on well-preserved *Rolex* sports watches from this era. Furthermore, this watch is offered with its original *Rolex* Guarantee and presentation box, an exceedingly rare occurrence for collectors.

Few Submariner models fascinate *Rolex* aficionados as much as the "Big Crown" - AKA James Bond -Submariner. A staple of any serious *Rolex* collection, Big Crowns are as charismatic and attractive as they are rare. Finding a genuine 6538 in today's market is rare, furthermore finding one that is fresh to market and from the family of the original owner is even more rare. However, what sets this watch apart from almost all others is the impossibly rare so-called "explorer" dial - with Arabic numerals at 3, 6, and 9 - a configuration usually reserved for the Explorer model.- which can truly be called the finding of a lifetime.

On closer inspection, one will also notice that the dial has yet another extremely rare detail. The seldom seen 'meters first' depth rating of "200/660," is printed in red, as opposed to the more common white printing, an occurrence which is almost never seen, especially on a dial which is in absolute original condition. For its untouched dial, and unpolished natural case, this "Explorer James Bond" would be the crown jewel in any of the most important sport *Rolex* collections.







Having surfaced after many years of belonging to one owner, this occasion is nothing short of an unprecedented discovery. Formerly belonging to John Simpson, a Australian Seaman and adventurer, in his son's own words, the story of how he came to own this fascinating watch is told below;

"My father, John Simpson, started work as a Seaman on Australian Merchant Ships from the mid 1940's through the early 1950's during and post Second World War hostilities, traveling the globe stopping in obscure ports from Christmas Island to Vladivostok. During a Seaman's strike in 1953, he was "paid off" a ship in Vancouver, British Colombia.

His first afternoon on dry land, he walked passed what appeared to be an electrical supply house with a "help wanted" poster in the window. He found the shop manager in the back of the warehouse and asked if the position had already been filled. The man said "no" and asked if John could splice cable. When he said "yes", the man asked if he could weld, and again John said "yes". The man then asked, "Have you ever run men?" and John replied "a few" so the man asked "How many?" and John said, "75-100 or so". The man then said, "how do you feel about the Arctic", and John replied, "I hadn't much

thought about it." So the man asked, "How do you feel about Arctic pay?" John said, "I hadn't much thought about that either, but it doesn't sound like a bad thing." The man told him to come back in the morning and they would sort out a job for him.

John soon found himself running crews of men for Canadian Aviation and Electronics assembling and painting large radio towers for the "DEW (Distant Early Warning) Line" above the Arctic Circle for the Canadian and U.S. militaries and helped develop techniques to complete those assemblies in about one third of the scheduled time frame. His relaxed Australian attitude toward challenges and "Can Do" personality made him popular with the men and the management. He was often transported to other radar bases to advise on the construction of various structures.

A few months later on a quick trip back down to Vancouver, John stopped into a watch shop because he had recently broken his current watch in the North. He asked the man if he had a sturdy watch that was also waterproof because he enjoyed waterskiing and skin (scuba) diving when in warmer weather. The man picked out a standard Rolex Submariner from the case



and handed it to John to try on. John asked the shopkeeper about the cost who told him it was \$100 Canadian Dollars. John said, "That's a bit rich for my blood mate," gently handed it back to the shopkeeper and left the store. He looked around the city for the day but was unable to find anything that matched the ruggedness of the Submariner so he reconsidered the purchase. After all, he was being well paid, was still a bachelor at the time and thought he could justify the higher cost as he needed a hearty replacement watch before heading back to work in the Arctic.

At the end of that day John returned to the first watch shop to see if the standard Submariner was still available, tried it on and agreed to purchase it for \$100CAD. The shopkeeper asked John if he wanted to see something else before he completed his purchase, so John said, "why not?" The shopkeeper showed him another Submariner with a few subtle differences on the dial from the one he had on his wrist. John said, "I like the numbers and shiny writing on the dial, the red depth is also nice. How much for that one?" The man told him \$150CAD so John handed him back the watch and said, "That's still a bit rich for my blood mate." The man said, "but it's a special one. Some British guy ordered it 6 months ago then didn't come back for it." John said, "I'll give you the same for it as the one in my hand." The man said, "But it's a special order." John said, "Yes, but you still have it here in your case. That's ok mate, I'll just take the one with the dots on the dial." The shopkeeper paused for a while, then agreed to sell the special one to John for the price of the standard Submariner because he didn't know if he would be able to sell it to anyone else.





Happy with his purchase, John wore the watch daily from the date of purchase in 1956 while working in the Arctic for another couple of years. At some point he received a notice from Rolex asking him to return the watch to have the radium removed from the dial, but he had missed the window for a free service while away in the North and never sent the watch back.

He eventually returned to Vancouver and met a nice Dutch girl and the couple were married not long after. They moved back to Australia where John worked as a tradesman for a time, before eventually immigrating to the United States in the early 1960's. John worked as a Union House Painter from that time on. He removed the bezel from the watch and put it in a drawer in the mid 60's because he complained to his wife that paint drips

would get down in between the bezel and the crystal making it hard to turn and it was easier to clean without the bezel on. He continued wearing his watch without the bezel every day until he retired in the mid 1990's when he then wore the watch in his retirement activities, fishing, sailing, motorcycling, diving and walking on the beach until his passing in mid 2017 when the watch passed to his son. A friend of John's son noticed him wearing the watch one day and said, "That looks pretty old, does it still keep time?" John's son said, "yes." The friend said, "It looks different from the other ones I've seen. You should have it looked at instead of wearing it every day."

(b) Our description of any lot in the catalogue, any condition report and any other statement made by us (whether orally or in writing) about any lot, including about its nature or condition, artist, period, materials, approximate dimensions, or provenance are our opinion and not to be relied upon as a statement of fact. We do not carry out in-depth research of the sort carried out by professional historians and scholars. All dimensions and weights are approximate only.

2 OUR RESPONSIBILITY FOR OUR DESCRIPTION OF LOTS

We do not provide any guarantee in relation to the nature of a lot apart from our **authenticity warranty** contained in paragraph E2 and to the extent provided in paragraph I below.

3 CONDITION

- (a) The condition of lots sold in our auctions can vary widely due to factors such as age, previous damage, restoration, repair and wear and tear. Their nature means that they will rarely be in perfect condition. Lots are sold "as is," in the condition they are in at the time of the sale, without any representation or warranty or assumption of liability of any kind as to condition by Christie's or by the seller.
- (b) Any reference to condition in a catalogue entry or in a condition report will not amount to a full description of condition, and images may not show a lot clearly. Colours and shades may look different in print or on screen to how they look on physical inspection. Condition reports may be available to help you evaluate the condition of a lot. 1 NEW BIDDERS

2 TAXES

The meaning of authentic can be found in the glossary at the end of these Conditions of Sale. The terms of the authenticity warranty are as follows:

- (a) It will be honored for claims notified within a period of 5 years from the date of the auction. After such time, we will not be obligated to honor the authenticity warranty.
- (b) It is given only for information shown in UPPERCASE type in the first line of the catalogue description (the "Heading"). It does

- not apply to any information other than in the **Heading** even if shown in **UPPERCASE** type.
- (c) The authenticity warranty does not apply to any Heading or part of a Heading which is qualified. Qualified means limited by a clarification in a lot's catalogue description or by the use in a Heading of one of the terms listed in the section titled Qualified Headings on the page of the catalogue headed "Important Notices and Explanation of Cataloguing Practice". From time to time, Christie's may offer a lot which it owns in whole or in part. Such property is identified in the catalogue with the symbol Δ next to its lot number.

On occasion, Christie's has a direct financial interest in the outcome of the sale of certain lots consigned for sale. This will usually be where it has guaranteed to the Seller that whatever the outcome of the auction, the Seller will receive a minimum sale price for the work. This is known as a minimum price guarantee. Where Christie's holds such financial interest we identify such lots with the symbol onext to the lot number.

o ♦ Third Party Guarantees/Irrevocable bids

Where Christie's has provided a Minimum Price Guarantee it is at risk of making a loss, which can be significant, if the lot fails to sell, Christie's therefore sometimes chooses to share that risk with a third party. In such cases the third party agrees prior to the auction to place an irrevocable written bid on the lot. The third party is therefore committed to bidding on the lot and, even if there are no other bids, buying the lot at the level of the written bid unless there are any higher bids. In doing so, the third party takes on all or part of the risk of the lot not being sold. If the lot is not sold, the third party may incur a loss. Lots which are subject to a third party guarantee arrangement are identified in the catalogue with the

In most cases, Christie's compensates the third party in exchange for accepting this risk. 

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


