Christie's Wine Department is delighted to introduce a magnificent auction to complete Christie's June Luxury Week sales. This is our first sale of 2018 at Rockefeller Center; it follows a highly successful online auction in March. The market is buoyant and superlative wines from the world's great collections are more in-demand than ever, so we are proud to offer our clients such an extraordinary assemblage of collections in this June sale.

Our sale opens on Thursday, June 14th with a superb collection of wines from the cellars of an established East Coast collector. The wines were primarily bought on release, and stored thereafter in professional temperature and humidity-controlled storage in New York. The collection is exceptional for a number of reasons, perhaps most compelling is the depth of rarest Burgundy. The producers the collection is built around are icons of the region. DRC, Rouget, Mugnier, Roumier and Dujac lead an impressive array of producers. Burgundy is not the only area of interest, the collection includes superb Rhône, Bordeaux and Italian wines from in-demand producers and Chateaux.

Our sale on Friday, June 15th opens with a thrilling opportunity for collectors. Château Lafleur is without doubt one of the finest wines of Bordeaux, and one of the rarest, most collectable wines on earth. This stock of Lafleur and other Guinaudeau Family Estate Wines in pristine condition, proof-tagged from the 2005 vintage onwards and packed in banded original wooden cases. All have been stored since original release in perfect cellar conditions by WeinArt of Germany, a major European distribution agent and friend of Lafleur and the Guinaudeau Family and vendors for this sale.

The theme of superlative Bordeaux follows in the form of a private collection with a particular focus on the 2000 vintage. The collector took sage advice on the importance and quality of this historic vintage, and that manifests itself in deep parcels of 2000 vintage wines from Lafite-Rothschild, Mouton-Rothschild, Haut-Brion, Lynch-Bages, Leoville-Las-Cases and Pavie. This is the personification of the modern Bordeaux collection.

Rarities follow the classics. Christie's is honoured to present an unprecedented offering of rare Jura wines and spirits from the cellars of Jean Bourdy, one of the most historic and singular Domaines in France. The Domaine is today run by brothers Jean-Francois and Jean-Philippe, who are the 15th generation of the family. #### 1-204 A CURATED COLLECTION OF RAREST WINES FROM ICONIC DOMAINES

We are delighted to open our June sale with an evening session that focus entirely on the wines from one estimable collection. The property included in the offering is exceptional and includes a roll call of producers that will set the hearts of Burgundy lovers convulsing. The collectors worked closely with some of the finest merchants in New York and London in the early years of the last decade to acquire deep reserves of wines that are today almost impossible to acquire. DRC, Roumier, Dujac, Mugnier and Lignier are some of the best represented producers, but the list of legendary wines is extensive and includes Burgundy, Rhone, Bordeaux and Italy.

## 205-393 A COLLECTION OF CHÂTEAU LAFLEUR AND OTHER GUINAUDEAU FAMILY ESTATE WINES

Château Lafleur is without doubt one of the finest wines of Bordeaux, and one of the rarest, most collectable wines on earth. Christie's is honoured to offer this exceptional stock of Lafleur, Pensées de Lafleur and other Guinaudeau family estate wines. The collection is in pristine condition, all wines have been stored since original release in perfect cellar conditions by WeinArt of Germany, a major European distribution agent and friend of Lafleur and the Guinaudeau Family and vendors for this sale.

#### 394-564 SUPERLATIVE BORDEAUX FROM THE COLLECTION OF DAVID AND TERESA DISIERE

This is a magnificent collection of Bordeaux that focuses primarily on the 2000 vintage – the greatest vintage of the new millennium. The wines come from the impressive collection of David and Teresa Disiere. The depth of quality is arresting, and the collection is what one might call top heavy, in that the greatest wines, those from the most lauded Châteaux, feature in the deepest parcels. Lafite and Mouton 2000 lead the charge, but are followed by other legends of the vintage like Leoville-Las-Cases, Pavie and Lynch-Bages. Bordeaux is supported by a fine cast of other great wines, including a superb collection of Remoissenet and rare Cristal and Krug.

### 565-706 A HISTORIC OFFERING OF RARE JURA WINES

All wines in the collection were specially selected by Jean-Francois Bourdy from the family reserves, built up since 1896. These wines were made and laid to rest in the damp humid Arlay cellar by previous generations. One thing they have in common is their quality. Be it a Cote du Jura blanc or rouge or a Chateau Chalon, all of these Bourdy wines are legendary and sought after. Truly a once in a lifetime tasting experiences. From the Domaine's vintage notes, we have compiled a vintage guide referencing the various harvests of long gone by days. Reading these notes is like stepping back in time.

### 707-730 A CLASSIC MID-CENTURY CELLAR

Throughout his life, Richard Gill was an avid sportsman, outdoor enthusiast and world traveler. A love of cuisine and foreign lands took him around the world many times, especially to Europe where he developed an interest in wine.

Richard Gill established a longtime friendship with Alexis Lichine, one of the wine world's foremost personalities, in early 1953 when Gill received the first of several price lists of Burgundy and Bordeaux available through his firm. Through the course of many letters and exchanges we see first a straightforward business relationship blossom as Richard Gill agreed to become an original investor in the fledgling Alexis Lichine & Co. importing company. This close association would eventually develop into a friendship, as formality gave way to first names and updates about wives and family became the norm. Lichine would later remark that Richard Gill's cellar, comprising in large part of wines purchased directly from Lichine himself, was the finest that he ever assembled or advised on.

#### 763-767 DOMAINE DE LA ROMANÉE-CONTI ASSORTMENTS FROM THE LEGENDARY 1990 VINTAGE

This is an outstanding, small collection of rare wines from the Domaine de la Romanée-Conti. The collector bought two exceptionally rare 1990 DRC Assortment cases on release, from MacArthur Beverages in Washington DC, in 1992. These cases and the few other bottles in the collection have been stored since they were acquired in professional, temperature and humidity controlled storage. One of the cases was opened prior to Christie's taking delivery of the consignment, the other arrived at Christie's still banded prior to our Specialist inspections, both are in superb condition.

#### 768-774 RARE PETRUS AND ICONIC WINES FROM THE DOMAINE DE LA ROMANÉE-CONTI

Rarities abound here. For Burgundy lovers; a full case of the Domaine's Montrachet, magnums of Richebourg and three bottles of that holy grail, Romanée-Conti 1990. Moving to Pomerol's hallowed terroirs, Petrus is offered in magnums and double-magnums from the great Petrus sibling-vintages of 1989 and 1990. These wines were bought on or shortly after release from the most reputable New York merchants and thereafter stored in exceptional professional storage.

#### 775-810 HISTORIC AMARONE FROM BERTANI

Amarone Classico Bertani is the jewel in the winery's crown, the wine that has made it famous all over the world. This year Amarone Classico Bertani celebrates "Fifty Vintages", from 1958, the first vintage produced, to 2008, the current vintage released in January. This exceptional anniversary not only attests its incredible longevity but certifies Amarone Classico Bertani as a benchmark and most authentic expression of Valpolicella. Christie's|Wally's is proud to present these fine and rare examples direct from Bertani's Archivo Storico in Verona, Italy. Each lot is shipped direct to Christie's warehouse in New York City and is offered with Bertani's guarantee of ideal storage conditions. New labels have been applied by hand upon release from the Historical Archives and offered in original wooden case.

#### 828 - 881 WINES FROM THE ESTATE OF OGDEN MILLS PHIPPS

Christie's is delighted to present this superb collection of historic wines and spirits from The Estate of Ogden Mills Phipps. Ogden Mills Phipps, the late American financier and thoroughbred horse breeder, inherited many of the historic bottles that feature in this offering from his father Ogden Phipps, whose grandfather was a founding shareholder in the Carnegie Steel Company. Many of these bottles have been in the family collection for at least two generations. Several of these rare Ports and Madeiras are described as "Decanted, Demijohned and Rebottled for Mrs. Vanderbilt" June 1907 by Morten & Co, New York. This is a rare cache of truly historic Madeiras and rare spirits, the like of which rarely comes to market.

#### 882-883 MACALLAN IN LALIQUE

Two of the rarest bottles from the Macallan Lalique series, act as highlights of the Exceptional Spirits section of this sale. These whiskies, broad-shouldered titans enrobed in the finest crystal, are arguably the most collectable whiskies on the market today. ## A CURATED COLLECTION OF RAREST WINES FROM ICONIC DOMAINES

#### **DOM PERIGNON**

In 1935 Moët were asked to supply a special bottling for their British importers, Simon Bros and Co., to celebrate the London firm's centennial. The Epernay house provided 300 specially commissioned heavy bottomed bottles with a shield-shaped label which bore the inscription, "Champagne especially shipped from Simon Bros and Co.'s Centenary 1835-1935." Bottles of the 1926 vintage were sent to the importer's top 150 customers. Even in the post-prohibition era, there was great demand for luxury cuvées and word spread amongst affluent American society. In response to these requests, 100 cases were shipped to New York in November 1936, this time importing the finer and more mature 1921 vintage. Moët decided to name this cuvée Dom Pérignon, after Champagne's founding father. The 1921 vintage and subsequent vintages up to 1943 underwent secondary fermentation in a regular bottle before being transferred into the custom Dom Pérignon bottles we still know today.

#### **DE VOGUE**

This famous estate owns 70 percent of the Grand Cru Musigny and nearly a fifth of Bonnes Mares. Its wines are made under and around the same fifteenth-century house in Chambolle which was inhabited by adn perhaps even built by an ancestor of the present owners. Few estates in Burgundy have held their vineyard lands so long. The estate also owns 0.4 hectares of Chardonnay vines in Musigny, potentially the only white Grand Cru from the Côte de Nuits.

#### **ROUMIER**

Domaine Georges Roumier has now been a top Côte de Nuits source for over 50 years, becoming recognised, over the last two decades, as one of Burgundy's true super-stars. This is thanks to the brilliance of Christophe Roumier, who joined the Domaine in 1981 and is one of the most talented, and inspiring wine-makers of his generation.

The wines come from vineyards cultivated with respect for the environment, without fertilizers or weed-killers. The fruit is brought to ripeness thanks to careful low yields and many tiny attentions to detail. Hand-picking is followed by careful sorting, then by partial de-stemming of the bunches. Fermentations often start slowly, to allow cool, gentle extraction, then last up to 3 weeks, bringing structure, fruit intensity, supple, fleshy tannins and complex length. Aging partially in new oak allows gentle oxygenation, developing the bouquet. The proportion of new barrels varies according to the strength of the wines – typically First Growths will age 25-40% in new oak, Grands Crus up to 50%. These are sturdy wines of character, with great potential for silkiness when mature. Bottling takes place without filtration, and often without fining, accounting for the exceptional creamy textures, great length of flavour and complexities.

#### DUJAC

Dujac is undoubtedly one of the most respected Domaines in Burgundy and has been producing their characteristic perfumed, silky, and elegant wines since the late 1960's when the Seysses family purchased Domaine Graillet in Morey-St-Denis and renamed it Domaine Dujac. Since those early days the Domaine has increased in size from 5 hectares to its present size of approximately 15 hectares. Their philosophy is the same for all vineyards with minimal interventions and combining practices from organics, biodynamics and integrated pest management in achieving their overriding goal of ripe and healthy grapes. The Domaine manages to combine both traditional and modern vinification techniques and produces wines that are highly sought after and glorious examples of the magic of red Burgundy.

#### CHAPOUTIER

"The family motto "Fac et Spera" - do and hope - says it all.

Two words that sum up all the patience and daring that this art demands: patience, in relation to nature which presides; daring ,for the winemaker who observes, chooses and assists. These are the words that represent the Chapoutier ethos.

Michel Chapoutier is one of the most highly regarded winemakers in France. Taking over the family firm founded in 1808 at age 26, Michel Chapoutier was, in 1990, at the end of a long line of succession. Under his stewardship he transformed a rather traditional and commercial enterprise into a leading Rhône Valley producer recognized the world over. He combines the modern and the traditional: crusading for biodynamic winemaking, while expanding operations around the globe and experimenting with cutting edge winemaking techniques.

Chapoutier now produces the most diverse and complex wines to be found in the northern Rhône. All the vineyards are now run on biodynamic principles, with the grapes in Hermitage and Châteauneuf du Pape being totally destemmed prior to fermentation. Previously, Chapoutier wines were criticised for the length of time they spent in old wood. Michel Chapoutier has thrown out the old chestnut foudres and now the wines spend a maximum of 18 months in small oak casks, up to a third of which are new. Chapoutier's wines are bottled unfined and unfiltered to help preserve their character.

Crucial to Michel Chapoutier's philosophy is the production of "téte de cuvées", which include La Mordorée made from 60 year old vines on the Côte Blonde and Hermitage La Pavillon from 70 year old vines at the base of Les Bessards. Michel Chapoutier first produced Hermitage Vin de Paille in 1990 and it is by far the finest sweet wine produced in the Rhône Vallev.

#### GUIGAL

From Roman times to the latter part of the 19th Century the vignoble of Côte-Rôtie enjoyed fame and prosperity. This glory ebbed in decline until the appearance of one family, the Guigals notably Marcel- whose energetic and single-minded pursuit of quality put Côte-Rôtie back on the worlds fine wine map. Marcel Guigal's reputation is based on his three single-vineyard wines; intense, powerful yet supremely elegant and with long-life potential. La Mouline: Made from approximately one hectare of Syrah vines in the Côte Blonde, to which is added roughly 11 Viognier. The wine first appeared under the Mouline name in 1966. La Turque: from a hectare on the Côte Brune, including 5 Viognier. Though not planted until 1982, La Turque burst on the scene in 1985, producing a remarkable wine. Its depth and finesse put Guigal firmly on the international fine wine map. La Landonne: from 2 hectares of Syrah on the Côte Brune, replanted in 1974 and subsequently. The wine has been aptly described as the most magisterial of the remarkable trio.

#### **BEAUCASTEL**

One of the longest lived of all Chateauneuf-du-Pape, the domaine was founded in 1549 by Pierre de Beaucastel as a simple hovel. The large 270 acre vineyard is meticulously organically farmed and while other growers are gravitating solely toward Grenache; Mourvèdre is championed as a lesser, though distinct grape, such as Counise, Muscardin, and Vaccarese are given their due. The regular cuvee of Beaucastel generally contains one third Mourvèdre. Indeed, it is one of the few major estates to still contain all thirteen permitted varietals for the appellation. The cepage combined with a playful amount of brettanamyces gives an unusual flavor profile of dark roasted fruits, merdre, mushrooms and saddle leather. Though a popular and marketable label, it is clearly not a wine for everyone and generally Beaucastel draws a strong reaction one way or the other. This distinct wine and the Mourvedre grape, reaches its apogee in the Hommage a Jacques Perrin, a tête cuvee of seventy percent Mourvedre. A tribute to the stalwart who steadfastly maintained the tradition and uniqueness of Beaucastel, it is easily a fifty year wine in the better vintages due to its massive extraction, weighty substance and stolid structure.

## A REMARKABLE RANGE OF CHATEAU LAFLEUR AND OTHER WINES FROM THE GUINAUDEAU FAMILY

Château Lafleur is without doubt one of the finest and rarest wines of Bordeaux, producing only around 12,000 bottles of their exceptional Grand Vin from the tiny 4.5 hectare Pomerol vineyard situated amongst illustrious neighbours, Le Pin, Vieux-Château-Certan, La Fleur-Petrus and closest of all, Petrus itself. The wine is typically a near 50/50 harmonious blend of Merlot and Cabernet Franc grown on the gravel, clay and sandy soils of the Pomerol plateau, rich in deposits of potassium and iron. Robert Parker says of Lafleur, "It is one of the most distinctive, most exotic and greatest wines - not only in Pomerol, but in the world." High praise indeed.

The property is owned and run by the Guinaudeau family with Jacques and Sylvie first taking responsibility in 1985, now supported in all matters by their son, Baptiste and his wife, Julie. The family ownership of Lafleur can be traced back directly to 1872 when the property was founded by Jacques's great-great grandfather, Henri Greloud. The Guinaudeau Family became sole owners of Lafleur in 2002.

Following their perennial pursuit of excellence and ever better quality, the family introduced Pensées de Lafleur as a second wine in 1987, which has since been described as 'an insider secret' of the wine world. Indeed, Pensées is now a wine rarity in itself with a production of only a fraction of that of Lafleur being produced each vintage and since the late 1990's, harvested exclusively from mature vines in a specific section of the main vineyard (since the late 1990's Les Pensées ceased to be a second wine, and became a cru apart, coming every year from the same parcel in the centre of the Lafleur vineyard, differing only in soil to the other parcels). The average age of the vines at Lafleur is over 35 years, some being more than 60. Often spoken of in the same breath as Petrus, the wines of Lafleur have more in common perhaps with those of Cheval-Blanc, sharing similar aspects of soils and vineyard plantings. Lafleur is undoubtedly a top level Pomerol Château - but with more alignment to a fine Burgundian Domaine in their vineyard and winery from the twin perspectives of quality and quantity.

Aside from Lafleur and Pensées, the family are also responsible for a growing stable of other exceptional wines, all tended and produced by the dedicated Lafleur team. Château Grand Village near Fronsac is home to Jacques and Sylvie and produces high quality red and white Bordeaux belying it's humble classification. Acte was born in 2009, another carefully crafted blend of Merlot and Cabernet Franc (the CF coming from the former Lafleur genetic and their own massale selection) and Les Champs Libres, an ultra-premium dry white, has been produced from Sauvignon Blanc (originating in an old selection from Sancerre) since 2013.

This stock of Lafleur and Pensées is in pristine condition, proof-tagged from the 2005 vintage onwards and packed in banded original wooden cases (a mix of original wooden cases and cartons for the other Family wines) – all have been stored since original release in perfect cellar conditions by WeinArt of Germany, a major European distribution agent and friend of Lafleur and the Guinaudeau Family and vendors for this sale. All wines inspected and photographed by Christie's Wine Department prior to shipment for this sale.

(Some wines featured in this catalogue have had the original bands removed for photography but retained within the wooden cases).

We are indeed honoured to have had the full blessing and support of the Guinaudeau family, plus their invaluable and directive advice in the preparation and promotion of this sale. A short, personal message from Jacques Guinaudeau is shown alongside this introduction.

The estate is situated at the northern end of Pauillac, close to Cos d'Estournel, which is just over the border in St.-Estephe. The vineyard consists of three major areas: the hillsides around the Château, the adjacent Carruades plateau to the west, and 4.5 hectares in neighboring Saint-Estephe (which is entitled to the Pauillac appellation).

The well-drained soils are composed of deep fine gravel up to 4 meters deep and are mixed with Aeolian sands on a bedrock of tertiary limestone. The 107 hectares of vines are planted with Cabernet Sauvignon (70%), Merlot (25%), Cabernet Franc (3%) and Petit Verdot (2%). The average age of the vines is 35 years, although vines younger than 10 years old are not used in the Grand Vin. 18 hectares of vines are more than 50 years old and the oldest plot, called "La Gravière", is over 130 years old, having been planted in 1886.

# MOUTON-ROTHSCHILD



#### **MOUTON-ROTHSCHILD**

In 1853 Baron Nathaniel de Rothschild bought Château Brane-Mouton and renamed it Mouton Rothschild. In 1920, Baron Philippe de Rothschild became involved in the estate following the death of Laura-Thérèse who had run the property after becoming widowed by Baron Nathaniel de Rothschild. Baron Philippe de Rothschild worked tirelessly and drove innovations such as commissioning the artist Jean Carlu in 1924 to design a new label. In the same year he also bottled the entire vintage at the Château, a practice that had up until then been virtually unheard of, and is now universally adopted for all the Grand Vins.

In 1945 to celebrate the 'Année de la Victoire' he commissioned the artist Philippe Jullian to design the label which began the tradition of featuring a different artist on the label for each vintage. This tradition continues to this day (except for 1953 and 1977). Such famous names as Picasso, Kandinsky, Francis Bacon and Andy Warhol have featured on the labels and helped to strengthen the reputation of the Château.

Artists have never been paid for their work, but have received Mouton-Rothschild wine. Baron Philippe de Rothschild's main goal and achievement was the promotion of Château Mouton Rothschild to First-Growth status in 1973. For the Grand Vin the average age of vines is 44 years with a density of 10,000 per hectare planted on gravel soils. Vinification takes place in oak vats for between 15 and 25 days followed by maturation in oak barriques for between 19 and 22 months (the percentage of new barrels depends on the vintage). Annual production is approximately 300,000 bottles.

#### **LATOUR**

Château Latour manages to achieve a rare stylistic balance, in that its wines are internationally known for both their elegance and purity of fruit flavor, and for their power, muscularity and heroic longevity. Few wines age with such grace as those of Château Latour. These wines are highly tannic in youth and are famously distinctive in the way they mature slowly, and on their own terms. The other great hallmark of Latour is its consistency – the wines are always impressive, irrespective of whether the vintage is great, mediocre or even slightly disappointing.

#### MARGAUX

Margaux is unique among the communes of the Médoc: it is the farthest south (isolated from its three famous cousins to the north, Saint-Estéphe, Saint-Julien and Pauillac) and is made up of several non-contiguous parcels of vineyard land. The appellation of Margaux encompasses the village of Margaux, of course, as well as the villages of Cantenac, Soussans, Labarde, and Arsac. Ideally, the limestone, chalk, clay and sand of Margaux combine (especially where gravel dominates, facilitating drainage) to make a fragrant and silky wine. More Margaux properties were included in the famous classification of 1855 than any other commune.

Château Margaux has been occupied since at least the 12th century, with the site occupied by a fortified castle known as Lamothe or La Mothe (from motte, a small rise in the land), and wine under names such as "Margou" and "Margous" was known in the 15th-century. With the arrival of the Lestonnac family in the 16th century that wine production became of particular importance, and in the 1570s Pierre de Lestonnac expanded the property and cleared many of the grain fields to make way for vines.

#### **HAUT-BRION**

Château Haut-Brion has been highly regarded for many centuries, being mentioned in Samuel Pepy's diary in 1663. In 1935 Haut-Brion was bought by the American banker, Clarence Dillon. His descendants still own the estate in the form of his grand-daughter Joan Dillon who is the President and her son, His Royal Highness Prince Robert of Luxembourg, the Vice President and Managing Director. In 1983 the Dillons acquired the property next door, La Mission Haut-Brion

The average age of the vines is over 35 years, with some vines dating from the 1930s. The red grapes are sorted in the vineyard, then brought to the winery and destemmed, lightly crushed to break open the skins and pumped into tanks. Indigenous yeasts are used for the alcoholic fermentation and the temperature is carefully controlled. Maceration lasts for approximately 15 days. Malolactic fermentation occurs naturally due to the presence of natural lactic bacteria. The wines from different vats are blended and then transferred to predominantly new oak barrels for between 18 to 24 months. Haut-Brion has its own cooperage which ensures that the Château has complete control over the toasting of the barrels, which is normally light.

Haut-Brion is renowned for the classic earthy and smoky character of Graves, combined with the opulent and approachable nature provided by the higher proportion of Merlot in comparison to the other Médoc First Growths.

#### LEOVILLE-LAS-CASES

Château Léoville-Las-Cases is the most northerly of the Saint Julien properties and closest to the vineyards of Pauillac. The richness and power of their wines means that Léoville-Las-Cases are often mistaken for a top Pauillac. The estate has 97 hectares of vines divided into 125 parcels, the largest and most important is the 50 hectare walled vineyard called Grand Clos.

The vineyards are generally planted with 65% Cabernet Sauvignon, 20% Merlot, 12% Cabernet Franc and 3% Petit Verdot. The grapes are entirely hand-harvested and fermentation which takes place in a mix of wooden, cement and stainless steel vats lasts for between 12 and 24 days at temperatures between 24°C and 28°C. The wine is then aged for between 18-20 months in 60-100% new oak depending on the vintage.



#### **PAVIE**

Château Pavie's history goes back to Roman times. The first vines in Saint Emilion were planted on the slopes of Ausone and Pavie in the 4th century AD. At the time, the limestone plateau was devoted to mixed farming. Up until the 18th century, "pavies" or clingstone vineyard peaches with red flesh were grown here. Over the years, the peach trees gradually disappeared, and were replaced by vines. The outstanding quality of the terroir on the famous south-facing Côte de Pavie was revealed over generations, and became widely-acknowledged by the mid-twentieth century. Impressed by the estate's history, geographical location, and terroir, Gérard Perse acquired Château Pavie in 1998. Château Pavie has 37 hectares of vines in a single block with three different terroirs: clay-limestone plateau, clay slope, and gravel and clay soil at the foot of the slope. In September 2012, Château Pavie was promoted to Premier Grand Cru Classé "A" status, joining the closed circle of the ten greatest estates in Bordeaux.

#### A HISTORIC OFFFRING OF RARE JURA WINES

Domaine Jean Bourdy is a historic French domaine who can trace their roots back to about 1475 when the family dug out the cellar under their house. This is the same cellar where all wines and spirits we will offer today have been aging for decades, sometimes over a century. The first wines were made in 1579.

Today the Domaine is run by the brothers, Jean-Francois and Jean-Philippe Bourdy. In total 10 ha are owned, including the rare Château Chalon of 0.5 ha.

#### 1784

Immense Vieille Fine, with velvet mouth feel. Very complex. About 50% ABV.

#### 1815

Pre-Phylloxera vintage. Lots of snow and frost in January. After dry May month both June and July were quite wet with frequent rain. This caused uneven flowering. On top of this a big hailstorm took away any hopes, in the end the quantity was well below the average. Harvest commenced on 4 October. Fortunately the wines were of good quality.

#### 1820

Pre-Phylloxera vintage. A difficult growing season finally resulted in good quality. The cold June made for a bad uneven flowering. After an normal summer the harvest was started on 26 October. Recorked the size of a normal crop, this was a very small yield.

#### 1822

Pre-Phylloxera vintage. Hardly any frost during winter. In fact this year was the warmest of the 19th century. Harvest already began end of August with average rendements. The high sugar in the must of the sweet wines made for slow and difficult fermentations, here patience was required.

#### 1849

Pre-Phylloxera vintage. After a normal winter weather in December, January was very wet with many flooding and damage. The flowering which started fairly early was disrupted by snow and frost at the end April. The beautiful summer was very warm. Harvest started on 15 October. 30hl/ha. Very good wines were made!

#### 1860

Pre-Phylloxera vintage. Late budding, quite abundant. Uneven flowering in July. A grey summer with lots of rain. Harvest started on 24 October. 27 hl/ha. Selection was necessary as part of the grapes had not fully ripened. Wines with a high natural acidity.

#### 1865

Pre-Phylloxera vintage. A long cold winter with a lot of snow at the end of March. Spring arrived soon after causing the budding to start by the end of April followed by flowering on 20 May. Unfortunately a big hailstorm already on the 25th May reduced the crop by a fifth. Summer was very good with many periods of high temperatures. Harvest started on 26 September. Very good with 35/40 hl/ha. One of the best vintages of the 19th century.

#### 1868

Pre-Phylloxera vintage. After a cold winter and spring the budding started late in May. The summer that followed was very nice, some occasional showers and a dry period in August lead to the harvest on 22 September. Only average quantity of 20 hl/ha. Great quality!

#### 1870

Pre-Phylloxera vintage. Budding started on mid-April. Some short periods of frost without extremes was followed by warmer weather causing a quick even flowering. July and August were very warm and very dry. Harvest started on 25 September. Wines of very high quality.

#### 1888

In 1879 Phylloxera was first discovered in the Jura, by 1892 the whole region was affected. This reduced the crops severely from then on.

Spring arrived late, budding started on 15 May. The rainy June month caused for a prolonged flowering from 13 June to 10 July. The cold and wet summer months lead to a late veraison on 1 September. This month was beautiful and resulted in a good ripening of the grapes. Harvest started on 22 October. Small crop of 20 hl/ha, also caused by Phylloxera. Average quality.



#### 1893

Severe winter with very low temperatures. Dry and warm spring lead to early flowering. Warm and wet July was followed by a very warm and dry August and September. The harvest started on 25 September was of good quantity; 25-30 hl/ha. The wines were of very high quality. More and more farmers could no longer live of the production of their grapes and corn so they moved to breeding cattle.

#### 1895

Spring frost and snow by mid-May characterized the start of the season. A warm and dry vintage. Nice harvest of 35-38 hl/ha of very good quality.

#### 1292

Very small harvest.

#### 1899

Another very small harvest, only 7 hl/ha.

#### 1900

The effects of Phylloxera very hard felt. In the nineteenth century nature was not always smiling on the vignerons in three periods, 1809-1817 / 1851-1856 / 1879-1892 there was a lot of misery. And now the disaster of Phylloxera can be added.

#### 1904

An abundant vintage of great quality. One of the first real harvests since Phylloxera.

#### 1907

Cold grey spring. Lots of uneven fruit set resulting in small quantity. Year of the revolt.

#### 1911

A remarkable vintage, the driest August of the last 15 years. Small harvest due to the hail of 1910. No more then 10-12 hl/ha.

#### 1913

Good wines. Still showing well in bottle.

#### 1921

Very nice and dry spring with little problems. July and August were very dry followed by a fine warm September. Exceptional quality. Average quantity of 20 hl/ha. By March 1922 some wines were still not finished fermenting caused by the very high sugar degrees. There was Vin Jaune made from Trousseau! One of the three best vintages of the 20th century!

#### 1928

Severely reduced harvest by strong spring frosts. Very good quality.

#### 1929

Very cold winter with temperatures dropping to -23°C (-9.4°F). Fortunately snow saved the vines. Big harvest of very good quality. Nature was generous; after a very small harvest in 28 an abundant one arrived in 29.

#### 1934

This year sees the reintroduction of the old Jura bottle, after a model which has been in our cellars since the 15th century. A great vintage with the rare combination of quality and quantity.

#### 1935

Good quality in Arlay, despite the spring frost. In Château-Chalon a large harvest of superior quality, not really affected by the heavy rains just before harvest.

#### 1937

After a mild and wet winter the vine suffered much. Despite a dry summer there were some serious Mildew and Oidium attacks. The wines are of excellent quality.

#### 1938

Serious frost on 20 and 21 April reduced the crop. Fortunately Château Chalon did not suffer from this frost. Late harvest got on the way on 10 October.

#### 1942

Spring was marked by a severe frost on 1 May. This reduced the crop by about 50%. Apart from an occasional shower the summer was dry and warm. Harvest started on 22 September. Exceptional wines of high quality. Great maturity in the Pinot Noir.

#### 1943

A fine spring and summer without major difficulties followed by some well-timed and welcome showers on 15 September lead to a harvest on 27 September with the lighter wines. The maturity of the high quality parcels was not quite there yet, so the Bourdy's waited until the 4 October to continue harvest. On 23 October, after a week of warm winds, the Château Chalon grapes were harvested in perfect conditions. Great vintage.

#### 1945

This vintage started with a cold snowy winter which lasted until February. The fine spring was dry and a little ahead. This year of the liberation was also one of the driest in memory. In August some strong but very welcome showers refreshed the vines just enough to prevent hydric stress. Though the continuous warm weather did cause some pourriture. By the 10th of September the harvest commenced, one of the earliest on record. All the grapes were harvested in perfect state with lots of natural sugar and acidity. Great vintage.

## 1946

The vintage started with a cold period followed by a dry spring period which lasted until May. Afterwards the clouds and rain set in. May was relatively cold and wet causing an uneven fruit-set. Early August was marked by hot weather which caused some red grapes to suffer. After some rainy spells in September fortunately better weather returned. 1946 was an exceptional vintage for Chardonnay.

### 1947

After a cold December 1946, January was relatively mild but then the cold weather returned throughout February delaying the start of spring. On 25 February 25cm of snow fell. From mid-April warmer weather arrived. The season continued quite warm and even the following months. Summer was hot and dry. Harvest started on 10 September under excellent conditions. The resulting wines were very high in sugar and density. In fact these degrees where not seen since 1893. An exceptional vintage.

#### 1949

On 6 March the thermometer registered a -14°C, it's been a longtime since they have seen such low temperatures in March. Good omen for the 1949s. On 10 April the 1948 Vin de Paille was pressed, never been so late. What followed was uneven cold weather in May and early June. On the 20th finally the warmer dry period arrived jumpstarting the flowering. Summer was warm and dry, by the end of August some younger vines started to suffer. On August 24th with the change of the moon finally some rain arrived. By then the harvest quantity was already severely reduced by almost half. On 4 September another heatwave arrived. Harvest started on 27 September under perfect blue skies. A great vintage for Pinot Noir.

## 1951

After a very wet mild winter on 30 April frost attacked the already budding vines. The whole season up until September was marked by uneven cool and wet weather. Autumn was a bit better but not with the so desired warm temperatures and sun. Wines with high acidity and low alcohol were the result. Good vintage for Vin Jaune.

#### 1952

The 1952 season started with a mild and humid period. After a cold snowy February and March spring got on the way with warmer weather early April. This continued into May setting off the first flowers of the Chardonnay. The fantastic June completed the flowering. They had to wait until 9 August for the first spells of rain. The rest of summer continued well, the grapes started to mature quite rapidly. What followed was a disastrous September. All aspirations for an excellent vintage where brought down to just a good vintage. Some very good Chardonnays and Château Chalons were made.

#### 1953

The winemaking year started with pressing the Vin de Paille 1952. On 11 May the already well growing vines were attacked by a severe frost, fortunately Château Chalon was left untouched. June and July were relatively cool and wet, causing a lot of mildew. The superb August month could not prevent the volume being well below the average. Nature was not very favorable to the Jura vignerons in 1953. The little quantity that was made is of very good quality. Rarely seen nowadays.

#### 1954

After a mild winter by mid-April frost and snow arrived. Spring continued fairly cold, fortunately flowering was finished in a slow but steady pace. Summer saw some showers and hailstorms which brought down the volume of the vintage by almost fifty percent. After a wet and cold September finally warm weather arrived in October. Bringing the necessary maturity. The wines of 1954 have quite high acidity levels. Even though a challenging year the wines have turned out surprisingly good.

#### 1955

A terrible winter with lots of flooding's in December, January and February. A warm spring without any low temperatures provided for excellent fruit-set. A hailstorm on 14 July reduced the crop by 14%. Normal summer. Even though mid-September was cold by the time October started fine warm weather returned which brought the finale push to full maturity. Slow fermentations due to a cold November.

#### 1956

After a mild and wet January on 9 February a strong frost arrived bringing the temperatures down to -23°C (-9,4°F). This period of extremely cold weather caused many vines in France to die, fortunately in Jura the vineyards can handle cold spells of as low as -25°C before damage will be done. This cold weather severely reduced the season only after a beautiful warm May did the vines come to full life. Then a long period of rain arrived, in fact there wasn't a single week without rain between June and 10 September. Though the end of the month and October were better this remains a difficult vintage.

#### 1957

Year of disappointment. The early start of spring brought the vines to quick start, unfortunately this made the young buds susceptible to late frosts. Sadly the cold month of May delayed the fruit-set, apart from the Savagnin. The warm but humid summer brought the grapes further to full maturity. The months running up to the harvest were very dry and sunny, bringing the harvest forward. Very small volume harvested of very good quality.

#### 1958

January was cold and wet, in February a period of warm weather arrived. While bottling the Fine 1947 on 11 March about 40cm of snow fell, recalls Jean-Francois' grand-father. This period of frost and snow continued until mid-April. May was warm and sun-rich setting of the flowering in a steady pace. On 16 May a violent storm arrived causing much damage to the forests and reducing the crop. From then on warm weather stayed on right up the harvest.

#### 1959

February was mild and dry, March and April went by slowly without and excesses.

From May 2nd to 1st September there was no more than 6 hours of rain. In August some light showers refreshed the vines. For the rest the summer was hot and dry. Already early on this as clearly an exceptional vintage, maybe even better than 1947. A great classic.

### 1962

A long a cold winter which lasted until early May characterized start of the growing season.

After a short period of warmer weather the season continued at below average temperatures up until 10 July. The fruit-set was very good. July and August were generally warm and dry. Apart from some showers on 15 and 20 August. It became very hot by the end of the month.

September started well then on the 16th a cool period arrived which stayed for more than ten days. Fortunately the sun came back on the 25th of September. Traditionally at Domaine Bourdy the ladies start the harvest with the grapes for the Vin de Paille, this was the first week of October in overwhelming hot temperatures. The Château Chalon harvest started on 2 November. An above average harvest volume of wines with a fine acidity and length.

#### 1963

The first months of the year were cold and snowy, the season went a bit up and down: March warm, April humid, May warm and June grey and rainy. Apart from one rainy day on the 19th, July was very sunny and dry. All expectations for a great vintage were tempered by a cold and grey August by the end of the month warmer weather arrived which lasted up until October. The wines were saved by a miraculous Indian summer.

#### 1965

Not an easy vintage. After a fairly rainy spring finer weather arrived. Especially the end of June was great. Summer was a bit up and down with sunny weather alternating with rainy periods. September started rainy when finally the skies cleared for warmer sunny weather which stayed until harvest. The growing season was delayed by the cold spring hence the harvest didn't start until 11 November. Nice wines with high acidity degrees.

#### 1966

Miserable winter. Finally on 22 May the rain stopped, which lasted until 18 June allowing an exceptional flowering. The vines were in very good condition due to the warm weather over summer. In 1966 some good wines were made.

#### 1967

Very cold and snowy start of January with temperatures dropping to -23°C. After milder sunny part at the end of January cooler weather arrived with more or less stayed the whole spring. Quite a lot of vines got frosted, bringing down the volume. Though the season started with a delay the hot summer quickly made up for this running up to a harvest on 2 October.

Small quantity harvested, good quality.

#### 1968

Cold winter with lots of snow and frost. When the winds changed in April a nice spring announced itself, unfortunately this was only for brief period as May was cold and wet. Only by the 23rd did the below zero temperatures go ahead, flowering started fairly shortly after on the 31st. A fine July raised the hopes for a magnificent vintage, especially the savagnins and pinots looked great. Apart from difficult start of August and heavy rains at the turn of the month the rest of summer went by with good not exceptional weather. Harvest started on 12 October.

#### 1969

January fairly mild. February cold and snowy, in the week of 9-17 March a lot of snow fell.

On June 7th a crazy low temperature of -7°C was measured. Flowering started on the 11th of that same month. Until mid-August dry and very warm weather brought the grapes to a quick ripening. More uneven weather arrived, delaying the veraison. The end of season was excellent and dry making for a great vintage. Harvest started on 10 October.

## 1970

In all a strange vintage. After a very long winter the fruit-set was well on the way by May 18th and the flowering got started on the 18th of June. This is very rare. By August 26th the vines were in an exceptional state. September was very sunny and warm. 1970 was a year from the book. A great vintage.

#### 1971

The year started with a very low -25°C during winter. Fortunately the vines were covered by 30cms of snow protecting them from the extreme temperatures. Though the lengthy very cold weather did in the end have its effects on especially the pinot and chardonnay vines. Very reduced harvest of only 5 hl/ha in Château Chalon. After the generous 1970 now nature was more severe on the vignerons.

#### 1976

A great vintage formed by an exceptional warm summer. The rains early September were warm and had little effect on the quality of the grapes.

#### 1979

A memorable vintage in line with 1929. Good for the white, exceptional for the Jura reds and Château Chalon.

#### 1981

Difficult growing season, with cold weather followed by hot periods and thunder storms. Rain during harvest made for severe selection of the best grapes. Due to the very small harvest all Savagnins were vinified together, so no Château Chalon made.

#### 1982

Fantastic vintage of historical wines. The Château Chalon harvest started on 12 September and finished just in time before on the 14th a 15 hour long heavy rain was unleashed on the hills

#### 1983

After a cool May, June and July were textbook months which got the flowering and fruits-set well on the way. The warm and humid September caused pourriture which made strict selection necessary. A very good vintage.

#### 1985

Excellent vintage with fantastically ripened grapes. The very warm August and September made the vintage.

#### 1991

It all started well with a nice March and start of April but then a cold period arrived dropping temperatures to -5°C on the 22nd over the young buds. The most disastrous frost since 1953. And the cold stayed bringing another night of frost on the 17 May. Then the weather stayed quite dry and humid. A very small harvest; 39hl in Arlay and only 800 litres of Château Chalon. But what was harvested was of exceptional quality, though very rare!

#### 1992

A memorable vintage of good volume, after a small harvest nature corrects itself again. Wines with a good acidic backbone made for long aging.

#### 1993

After a dry winter spring was relatively wet. Summer was normal with fairly cool nights. Harvest started on 9 October. Very small quantity of Château Chalon.

#### 1994

A vintage of good quality and below average volume. During a violent hailstorm on 14 July half of the crop was lost in one evening. August was warm and September cold and wet. Harvest started on 23 September. Even less Château Chalon harvested compared to 1993 but with higher extract and sugar.

#### 1995

The summer months were beautiful, warm and dry. September was cold and humid causing lots of pourriture, strong selection of the grapes was necessary. A very good vintage, though again small volume.






# RICHARD GILL: AN AMERICAN LIFE

Throughout his life, Richard Gill was an avid sportsman, outdoor enthusiast and world traveler. A love of cuisine and foreign lands took him around the world many times, especially to Europe where he developed an interest in wine. Richard Gill established a longtime friendship with Alexis Lichine, one of the wine world's foremost personalities, in early 1953 when Gill received the first of several price lists of Burgundy and Bordeaux available through his firm. Through the course of many letters and exchanges we see first a straightforward business relationship blossom as Richard Gill agreed to become an original investor in the fledgling Alexis Lichine & Co. importing company. This close association would eventually develop into a friendship, as formality gave way to first names and updates about wives and family became the norm.

Lichine would later remark that Richard Gill's cellar, comprising in large part of wines purchased directly from Lichine himself, was the finest that he ever assembled or advised on.

#### **CLOS DES LAMBRAYS**

The Clos des Lambrays in Morey Saint Denis comprises several different individual lieux-dits, each with slight variations in soil and aspect. The Clos was first mentioned by name in the 14th century and, like many famed vineyards, was divided among several buyers following the French Revolution. Mostly re-assembled under a single owner by the end of the 19th century, the Cosson family took control in 1938 and directed operations through 1979; the Clos des Lambrays became an official Grand Cru in 1981.

The 1947 and 1949 Clos des Lambrays were ordered by Richard Gill on February 26, 1953 and were included in an invoice dated August 29, 1953. Richard Gill's confirmed order for 148 cases of wine from Alexis Lichine, departed on board the SS Perou of the French Line, from Le Havre to New York on August 22nd, 1953

## **CHATEAU LASCOMBES**

In 1952, Château Lascombes was purchased by Alexis Lichine in conjunction with a syndicate of American investors, including David Rockefeller. Earlier in the decade Lichine had also purchased the moribund Château Le Prieur and renamed it Prieuré-Lichine. At Lascombes Lichine vastly improved the quality of wine produced and oversaw an increased export to the American market.

#### **PETRUS**

Within the world of fine wine appreciation, there is something of an 'ultra-elite,' an inner-circle that few wines will ever enter. This is a group of maybe five or six, almost exclusively French wines, whose prices and reputations exceed those of all others. In the best vintages few wines compare in terms of price or critical acclaim, these wines are best known for their power, concentration and multi-layered complexity. Pétrus is the ultimate expression of the opulence and charm that right bank wines can deliver when at their best.

The vineyard is located in Pomerol on a plateau dominated by iron-rich (crasse de fer) clay soils that give the wines their structure and power. They are well drained due to a gentle slope. The clay content retains some water which reduces hydric stress and creates a cooler mesoclimate that is ideally suited to the early ripening Merlot. The average age of the vines is 45 years.




# HISTORIC AMARONE FROM BERTANI

Founded in 1857 by brothers Glovan Battista and Gaetano Bertani in north Verona, Bertani have risen to become the market leader for Valpolicella the world over. They have been making Amarone purposefully dry since 1959, prior to this the style was known with some sweetness (marketed under the name Recioto). The winery has long been known to have commercially available vintages back to 1962, therefore the 1958 on offer below is a rather unique opportunity for collectors.

Bertani Amarone is typically made from 80% Corvina and 20% Rondinella grapes grown in the Tenuta Novare hills, in the heart of the Valpolicella Classico D.O.C.G., in vineyards devoted entirely to producing drying grapes. Harvest is done by hand in the second week of September. After careful bunch selection, the grapes are taken to the drying rooms (appassimento process) and laid in a single layer on bamboo racks called "aréle" in accordance with traditional production methods. They remain here for about 120 days to concentrate and develop a rich aromatic profile. In mid-January the grapes are destemmed and crushed. Maceration at 4-5°C for about 20 days, then a slow fermentation starts – about 30 days in concrete vats at a maximum temperature of 18°C. Then ageing in large barrels for at least six years, in bottle for at least 12 months to give it a stable structure, making it one of the longest-lived red wines in the world.

Amarone is a wine of intense red color, with garnet nuances. There are the typical notes of plum, cherry and Morello cherry on the nose, followed by a great variety of tones: nuts, tea leaves, liquorice and spices. On the palate there are hints of red berry fruits, softened by plush vanilla notes, in perfect harmony with the acidity and tannins.

# THREE COLLECTIONS OF SINE QUA NON

Sine Qua Non officially hit the scene in the mid 1990s. with heavy, odd-shaped bottles, gaudy labels and ostentatious proprietary names such as Omadhaun Poltron, Imposter McCoy and The Other Hand. Brilliant pieces of marketing, there are often serial like stories attached to each. Yields are incredibly miniscule, often under one ton per acre from a combination of old vines, canopy management and shoot thinning. The winery, utilizes indigenous yeasts, a lengthy cold soak, traditional open top fermenters, several punch downs, extended skin contact, malolactic fermentation in new oak casks, and just one racking prior to bottling. The wines are outrageously rich yet have subtlety and definition of flavor. Originally, the Rhône varieties were sourced from the Alban, Bien Nacido, and Stolpman vineyards with the pinot juice coming from the famed Shea Vineyard of Oregon. With artisanal practices and acute attention to detail in the vineyard, winery and canvas, production is exceedingly minute with most cuvées hovering around 500 cases a year and even less for the late-harvest wines. The Krankls fully invest their heart, soul and personality into the art of each bottle.

Because of the slope of shoulder it is impractical to describe levels as mid-shoulder, etc. Wherever appropriate the level between cork and wine will be measured and catalogued in centimetres.

The condition and drinkability of burgundy is less affected by ullage than its equivalent from Bordeaux. For example, a 5 to 7 cm. ullage in a 30-year-old burgundy can be considered normal, indeed good for age, 3.5 to 4 cm. excellent for age, even 7 cm. rarely a risk.


