PETRUS

11.5 Hectares: 95% Merlot, 5% Cabernet Franc Production: 30,000 bottles per annum

During the 19th Century, Pétrus belonged to the Arnaud family and encompassed only 6.5 hectares planted in a traditional mix of 70 % Merlot and 30 % Cabernet Franc. At the beginning of the 20th Century, the Arnauds founded La Société Civile du Château Pétrus, offering shares in the company to the public. Madame Loubat, wife of the owner of the Hôtel Loubat in Libourne, began to acquire shares in 1925, and by 1949, she owned the domaine outright. The estate was passed down to two nieces in 1961; Mme. Lily Lacoste and Mme. Lignac. In 1943 Jean-Pierre Moueix became their sole agent and in 1969 bought a majority share from Mme. Lignac. In the same year the estate was increased with the purchase of four hectares from neighbouring Château Gazin. Today Pétrus is owned by Jean-François Moueix.

The vineyard is located in Pomerol on a plateau dominated by iron-rich (crasse de fer) clay soils that give the wines their structure and power. They are well drained due to a gentle slope. The clay content retains some water which reduces hydric stress and creates a cooler mesoclimate that is ideally suited to the early ripening Merlot. The average age of the vines is 45 years. The utmost care is taken in the vineyard, with strict green harvesting to limit yields and helicopters have even been rented to dry out the vines at harvest time after wet spells.

Grapes are picked early to retain acidity which provides freshness, finesse and elegance to the wines rather than baked jammy flavours that can sometimes be a result of later harvesting. Grapes are sorted twice, then destemmed and fermented in cement vats, although since 2005 two stainless steel tanks were added to the winerv which has increased the options for parcel selections. Generally indigenous yeasts are used, although cultured veasts are also considered as an option. Vinification is traditional with pumping over and malolactic fermentation taking place in tank, and the press wine is kept apart until January when the quality is assessed and up to 7% might be blended back in. The wine spends about two years in (generally) new oak with rackings every three months, fining with egg-whites and filtered only when absolutely necessary. Pétrus, unusually for Bordeaux is almost entirely Merlot as in practice Cabernet Franc is rarely included in the blend.

Stephen Brook wrote in The Complete Bordeaux "the name, Pétrus conjures up Bordeaux at its most splendid, most rarified, and most luxurious..... Pétrus is a sumptuous wine".

RARE MAGNUMS OF PETRUS 1947 & 1961

These five magnums of Petrus 1947 and five magnums of Petrus 1961 were bought by the vendor from a Bordeaux merchant prior to delivery to Octavian. The magnums were delivered to Petrus for an authentication clinic in January 2018. Following inspection by the team at Petrus, some of the original Château capsules were exchanged with replacement Château capsules and the magnums were returned to the vendor's account in Octavian in March 2018.

Petrus 1947

Pomerol, cru exceptionnel

Two slightly damaged capsules. Slightly bin-soiled labels. One stained and two slightly damaged labels. Nicolas red stamp on labels. Levels: one top-shoulder. three upper-shoulder and one mid to upper-shoulder. Tasting note: The 1947 Petrus is the most decadent "wine of the century." While not as port-like as the 1947 Cheval Blanc, it is a massive, unctuously-textured, viscous wine with amazing power, richness, and sweet fruit. The nose explodes from the glass, offering jammy fruit, smoke, and buttery caramel scents. The wine's viscosity is reminiscent of 10-W-40 motor oil. It is so sweet, thick. and rich one suspects a spoon could stand upright. The wine is loaded with dream-like quantities of fruit, as well as high alcohol, but there is no noticeable tannin. While drinkable now, given its amazing fruit extract, and high levels of glycerin and alcohol, it is capable of lasting two more decades, Robert Parker, Wine Advocate Bordeaux Book, January 1998.

Pomerol, cru exceptionnel

One slightly corroded capsule, Four with 'Daniel Querre, Libourne' slip labels. Slightly bin-soiled labels. One damaged and four slightly damaged labels. Levels: two upper-shoulder and three mid to upper-shoulder. Tasting note: For some time, and understandably, one of the stars if the saleroom. Though I first tasted it in 1967, I only awoke to its magnificent, amazing fruit, and velvety richness in 1978 and made eight glowing notes through the 1980s, Colour 'black as Equpt's night', opulent, 'rich. rich, rich', spicy, even peppery (alcohol), chunky yet velvety, with soft ripe mulberry-like fruit, fleshy, 'almost cloying', a 'railroad chairman's wine' - which sounded a rather old-fashioned expression; well, an oil-rich potentate or tycoon's wine, for the reason that you do not have to be an expert to appreciate this wine, you wallow in it: and you have to have that sort of wealth to have it in your cellar, let alone to order it in a restaurant. But I must stop being condescending. It is a superb, almost unbeatable mouthful. Of my two most recent notes, one will have to be dismissed as it was presented as a dinner party in January 2000 as 'believed to be Petrus 1961'. It had a phoney-looking wax capsule and cork branded 1988! Back to 1994 for a superb bottle, sweet. exceedingly full -body and fruit. A luscious mountain of a wine. Noted blind, at Wolf's tasting of '61s and '59s in Aschau, Nov 1994 ***** and no end in sight. M.B.

Tasting note: Also very popular, and not just because of its English name, bottled extensively by merchants. A superb, ripe, fleshy, spicy, well-muscled magnum in 1989....Most recently, medium deep, fully mature, classic cedary bouquet; superb sweetness and ripeness, lovely flavour, gloriously rich and harmonious. *Feb* 2001 **** M.B.

Château Latour 1996

Pauillac, 1er cru classé In original wooden case

Tasting note: A spectacular Latour, the 1996 may be the modern day clone of the 1966, only riper. This vintage, which is so variable in Pomerol, St.-Emilion, and Graves, was fabulous for the late-harvested Cabernet Sauvignon of the northern Medoc because of splendid weather in late September and early October. An opaque purple colour is followed by phenomenally sweet, pure aromas of cassis infused with subtle minerals. This massive offering possesses unreal levels of extract, full body, intensely ripe, but abundant tannin, and a finish that lasts for nearly a minute. Classic and dense, it displays the potential for 50-75 years of longevity. Although still an infant, it would be educational to taste a bottle. Anticipated maturity: 2015-2050. Robert Parker, Wine Advocate 129, June 2000.

Château Léoville-Barton 1996

Saint-Julien, 2ème cru classé In original wooden cases

Tasting note: This impressive wine is a classic. Although backward, it exhibits a dense ruby/purple colour in addition to abundant black currant fruit intertwined with spicy oak and truffle-like scents. The wine is brilliantly made, full-bodied, and tightlystructured with plenty of muscle and outstanding concentration and purity. It should turn out to be a long-lived Leoville Barton, and somewhat of a sleeper. However, patience will be required. Robert Parker, Wine Advocate 122, April 1999.

Château La Mission-Haut-Brion 1998

Pessac (Graves), cru classé In original wooden case

Tasting note: A candidate for the wine of the vintage from this somewhat forgotten year, consumers should be seeking out wines from the Right Bank and Graves as 1998 was a great vintage in those appellations. La Mission's 1998 exhibits a healthy, opaque blue/ purple colour with no lightening at the edge. Thirty minutes of aeration brings forth a sensational bouquet of chocolate, cedar, truffles, graphite, blackberries, cassis and incense. La Mission's so-called scorched earth/charcoal/hot rocks characteristic has not vet appeared. Full-bodied with superb purity, a multilayered texture, sweet tannin, good acidity and a fabulously long finish, this great, young La Mission-Haut-Brion's finest days are yet to come. Anticipated maturity: 2018-2040. Robert Parker, Wine Advocate 202, August 2012.

Château Lafite-Rothschild 1998 Pauillac, 1er cru classé In original wooden case Tasting note: A blend of 81% Cabernet Sauvignon and 19% Merlot, this wine represents only 34% of Lafite's total harvest. In a less than perfect Medoc vintage, it has been spectacular since birth, putting on more weight and flesh over the last year. This opaque purple-coloured 1998 is close to perfection. The spectacular nose of lead pencil, smoky, mineral, and black currant fruit soars majestically from the glass. The wine is elegant yet profoundly rich, revealing the essence of Lafite's character. The tannin is sweet, and the wine is spectacularly layered yet never heavy. The finish is sweet, super-rich, yet impeccably balanced and long (50+ seconds). Château Pape-Clément 1998

Pessac (Graves), cru classé In original wooden case Tasting note: A prodigious effort from Pape Clement, this wine is smokin'! It boasts a dense ruby/purple colour in addition to a terrific nose of charcoal, blackberries, cassis, tobacco, minerals, and spice. This brilliantly-focused, medium to full-bodied 1998 already reveals a boatload of complexity as well as a remarkably long finish. A large-sized effort for this estate, it exhibits a sweet mid-palate and ripe tannin. Robert Parker, Wine Advocate 134, April 2001.

Château Pichon-Longueville, Lalande 2000

Pauillac, 2ème cru classé

In original wooden case

Tasting note: Sitting next to my former colleague. Pierre Antoine Rovani, at one of the tastings, he commented that he didn't like the striking green note in the aromatics of this wine, which I didn't detect at all, and a subsequent bottle at another tasting did not reveal it either. I do think there is a hint of bay leaf and a meatiness to it. In short, I find this to be a spectacular Pichon Lalande. Dense purple in colour, with loads of coffee, mocha, creme de cassis, and chocolate notes. this is a somewhat unusual blend of 50% Cabernet Sauvignon, 34% Merlot, and a whooping 10% Petit Verdot, with a little bit of Cabernet Franc. The Petit Verdot certainly gives the wine more of a tapenade, floral note, which I think can be interpreted by some as herbal. This is a rich, opulent, stunning Pichon Lalande that is beginning to drink beautifully, yet should continue to improve for at least another 10-15 years and last 30 or more years. Margaux's 2001, which is somewhat reminiscent of both the 1985 and 1999, is an elegant, seamlessly constructed effort with a deep ruby/purple colour, and a beautiful nose of flowers, creme de cassis, blackberries, and cedar. A blend of 82% Cabernet Sauvignon, 7% Merlot, 7% Petit Verdot, and 4% Cabernet Franc, this forward, opulent beauty can be drunk now or cellared for 15-20 years. A hint of truffles emerges as it sits in the glass. Medium-bodied with sweet fruit (mostly black) and nicely integrated wood, it builds incrementally in the mouth, ending with a 50-second finish. Pauillac, 1er cru classé In original wooden case

Tasting note: The 2003 Lafite Rothschild comes as close to perfection as any of the great Lafites made over the past three decades (1982, 1986, 1996, 2000, 2005, 2008, 2009 and 2010). This sensational effort came in at 12.7% natural alcohol, it is made in the style of one of this estate's great classics, the 1959. Composed of 86% Cabernet Sauvignon, 9% Merlot and the rest Cabernet Franc and Petit Verdot, it exhibits a dense ruby/purple colour to the rim along with a luxurious bouquet of cedarwood, lead pencil shaving, white chocolate, cocoa and cassis. Fat, rich, opulent and full-bodied with low acidity and stunning seductiveness and complexity, this noble wine possesses a bountiful, generous, heady style. It is just coming into its plateau of maturity where it should hold for 20-25 years. This is one of the candidates for the wine of the vintage - make no mistake about that. This beauty boasts a deep plum/ruby/purple colour with a touch of lightening at the edge. Aromas of licorice, creme de cassis, incense and spring flowers are followed by a full-bodied, opulent wine with loads of fruit and glycerin as well as a plush texture. Opulent, full-bodied and close to full maturity, it is a seamless classic that will age for 15-20 more years. Kudos to the Delon family for such a brilliant achievement in a tricky vintage. Château Ducru-Beaucaillou 2005

Saint-Julien, 2ème cru classé In original wooden case Tasting note: The 2005 Ducru Beaucaillou is a 10.000-case blend of 67% Cabernet Sauvignon and 33% Merlot (they used to produce 18.000-20.000 cases). It is an exceptionally powerful wine with a dense purple colour, superb intensity, and a beautiful, sweet nose of spring flowers, raspberries, blueberries, graphite, and creme de cassis. Full-bodied with fabulous concentration, exceptionally high tannin. good acidity, and massive layers of richness that build incrementally on the palate, this monumental effort is more structured than their outstanding 2003. Among the most powerful Lafites ever made (it came in at 13.59% alcohol), the final blend was 82.5% Cabernet Sauvignon, 7% Merlot and the rest Petit Verdot. The selection was incredibly severe with only 45% of the crop being utilized. A tight, but potentially gorgeous nose of graphite, black currants, licorice and camphor is followed by a full-bodied wine revealing the classic elegance, purity and delineated style of Lafite. It is phenomenally concentrated with softer tannins than the 2005, the 2003's voluptuous, broad, juicy personality, and low acidity. There are several vintages that I thought were a replay of their colossal 1959, most notably 1982 and 2003, but 2009 is also one to keep an eye on. It is still extremely youthful and seems slightly more backward than I would have guessed based on the barrel tastings, but it needs 10-15 years of bottle age, and should last for 50+. It is an extraordinarily complex, concentrated effort made from a blend of 46% Merlot, 40% Cabernet Sauvignon and 14% Cabernet Franc with the highest alcohol ever achieved at this estate, 14.3%. Even richer than the perfect 1989, with similar technical numbers although slightly higher extract and alcohol, it offers up a sensational perfume of subtle burning embers, unsmoked cigar tobacco, charcoal, black raspberries, wet gravel, plums, figs and blueberries. There is so much going on in the aromatics that one almost hesitates to stop smelling it. However, when it hits the palate, it is hardly a letdown. This unctuously textured, full-bodied 2009 possesses low acidity along with stunning extract and remarkable clarity for a wine with a pH close to 4.0. The good news is that there are 10,500 cases of the 2009, one of the most compelling examples of Haut-Brion ever made. It requires a decade of cellaring and should last a half century or more. Readers who have loved the complexity of Haut-Brion should be prepared for a bigger, richer, more massive wine, but one that does not lose any of its prodigious aromatic attractions. A remarkable effort from the Dillon family, this is another large-scaled La Mission that tips the scales at 15% alcohol. A blend of equal parts Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot (47% of each) and the rest Cabernet Franc, it exhibits an opaque purple colour as well as a magnificent bouquet of truffles, scorched earth, blackberry and blueberry liqueur, subtle smoke and spring flowers. The wine's remarkable concentration offers up an unctuous/viscous texture, a skyscraper-like mouthfeel, sweet, sumptuous, nearly over-the-top flavors and massive density. Perhaps a once-in-a-lifetime La Mission-Haut-Brion, the 2009 will take its place alongside the many great wines made here since the early 1920s. The good news is that there are nearly 6,000 cases of the 2009. It should last for 50-75+ years. Brunello di Montalcino began at Il Greppo, the Biondi-Santi estate, in the nineteenth century. Both the Annata and the Riserva undergo fermentation in traditional Slavonian oak for 18 days, followed by aging in large oak casks of 800 to 7,000 litres for a period of two to three years for the Annata, while the Riserva is released six years after the harvest. In April 2013, the wine world lost an icon when Franco Biondi-Santi passed away at the age of 91. The great "Gentleman of Montalcino" might be gone from the world, but his legacy lives on. We are proud to present a historic offer from the cellar of Franco Biondi-Santi's Il Greppo, the birthplace of Brunello di Montalcino. Marchesi di Barolo

Encompassing approximately 430 acres of vineyards in the Langhe, including some of the finest sites in Piemonts, Marchesi di Barolo has long been established as one of the finest producers in the region.

The history of this estate dates back to the early 19th century when the Marchese Carlo Tancredi Falletti di Barolo and his wife, Giulia started producing wine which was known at the time as "the wine from Barolo." Following the death of the couple, the family assets were donated to a charity created in their name, "Opera Pia Barolo", with the sale of wine funding the charity. Local winemaker Petro Abbona purchased the cellars formerly owned by the Marchesi in 1929 who then went on to purchase all the vineyard holdings.

Marchesi di Barolo remains a family business to this day. Since 2006, the estate has been under the direction of Pietro's great-grandson and fifth-generation winemaker, Ernesto Abbona and his wife Anna.

The vintage has a very irregular reputation, but not so much for the Cabernet Sauvignon grape in the Medoc. Harvest occurred September 23 and finished October 6, a relatively short period, even at a large estate such as Montrose. The wine has sweeter tannins than the 1995, but doesn't have quite the ripeness noticeable in 2003, 2005, 2009 and 2010. This wine is the classic. or more traditional style of Montrose, with dusty loamy soil notes intermixed with blackcurrant and blackberry fruit. Licorice, underbrush and floral notes were all present in this wine, which has good acidity and is not far from entering its plateau of full maturity. This massive wine may be the biggest, largest-scaled Lafite I have ever tasted. It will require many years to come around, so I suspect all of us past the age of fifty might want to give serious consideration as to whether we should be laying away multiple cases of this wine. Screaming Eagle

A true Californian icon, Screaming Eagle has, in a relatively short space of time, come to be recognized as one of the most desirable wines in the world. The 57 acre vineyard in Oakville was acquired by former real estate agent Jean Phillips, who started by selling the grapes produced at the estate to various Napa wineries. When encouraged by Robert Mondavi to make wine, she turned to winemaker Heidi Barrett, and together, these two women crafted one of the world's most legendary wines.

The debut 1992 vintage caused a stir, with Robert Parker describing it as one of the greatest young Cabernets he had ever tasted, an acknowledgment which showcases the virtuosity of the winemaking talent and of the magical site on which these grapes are grown.

Three wines are produced at this estate. Their top wine is their Screaming Eagle Cabernet Sauvignon, a blend of Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot and Cabernet Franc. Production of this wine is minuscule, rarely surpassing 600 cases in each vintage and is sold on a tightly controlled mailing list. Another red wine is produced at this estate called The Flight. Originally called Second Flight, the name was changed in the 2015 vintage as it was misleading consumers into viewing it more as a second wine. Composed of mostly Merlot, this wine shows a more restrained and elegant expression of this magical vineyard. A third wine is the elusive Sauvignon Blanc, a wine which few will ever taste due to its minuscule production of just one barrel each vintage.

Now owned by Stan Kroenke, current winemaker Nick Gislason continues to push the envelope of quality, consistently producing blockbuster wine, year after year.

Pahlmeyer

Pahlmeyer began as the passion project of former lawyer Jayson Pahlmeyer to make wine in Northern California. He partnered up with the owner of a 55 acre site in south-east Napa Valley, and set to work crafting a wine that Jason hoped would come to be seen as a "California Mouton". He believed that the key to this would be the planting of the best French clones of the red Bordeaux varieties. something which proved to be a considerable challenge due to the fact that the import of clones into the USA was a criminal offence. After months of work with viticulture professors at the University of Bordeaux, Jason was informed that the best crop to grow on this land would be corn, however, undeterred, he persevered and identified the best Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Cabernet Franc, Petit Verdot and Malbec vines to plant on their vinevard. Smugaling these clones into the USA through Canada. Jason was stopped at the border where the border authorities asked them to hand over their contraband. Luckily, they turned over clones which they had purchased from U.C. Davis instead of their French clones. Planted in 1981, the clones were slow to adapt but once they did, showed exceptional promise, Randy Dunn of Dunn Vinevards was extremely impressed asked to purchase the entire crop, with Jason agreeing, on the one condition that he make the "Pahlmeyer" Napa Valley Bordeaux blend.

Now made by acclaimed winemaker Bibiana Gonzalez Rave, the wines crafted at this estate continue to impress. with Robert Parker speaking extremely highly of the wines crafted here, writing that the "Pahlmeyer offerings are prodigious...mind-boggling efforts."

Starting in 1939, the history of this vineyard began when John Daniel Jr, great-nephew of Inglenook winemaker Gustave Niebaum, took over the Inglenook estate with a view to restoring it to its pre-Prohibition standing. He convinced his neighbour JJ Cohn to plant 80 acres of Cabernet Sauvignon vines on the parcel that Cohn had purchased neighbouring Inglenook, which he used as a summer retreat for himself and his family. Though Cohn had no ambition to make wine himself. John Daniel promised to buy his entire production of grapes, grapes he later went on to sell to other estates such as Opus One and Insignia.

After J J Cohn died in 1996 aged 100, the estate was sold to Francis Ford Coppola in a deal which divided the estate with Cohn's grandson Bret Lopez. Bret Lopez and his partner Mimi DeBlasio renamed the estate Scarecrow, an homage to Cohn who was Chief of Production at MGM when they made the Wizard of Oz.

Two wines are made at this estate, the 100% Cabernet Sauvignon Scarecrow Proprietary Red as well as the M. Etain produced from the younger vines on the estate. Now viewed as one of the cult wines of Napa Valley, lots from this winery fetch progressively higher prices at the annual Premiere Napa Valley auction, with a lot of five cases of Scarecrow breaking the previous record and selling for \$125,000 in 2011.

First debuted in 1979, Opus is the brainchild of two giants of the wine world, Robert Mondavi and Philippe de Rothschild, the owner of Château Mouton Rothschild at the time, from a desire to combine their respective winemaking expertise, creating a perfect marriage between Bordeaux grape varieties and Californian terroir and climate.

A Bordeaux blend modelled on the Bordeaux first growths, the Opus one vines are planted at five times the density of what is usual in the region, which encourages the growth of smaller berries. This is believed to increase the intensity of the aromas in the grapes and contributes to the complexity and richness of the wine. Current winemaker Michael Silacci is keen that despite the use of Bordeaux varietals, the wine should be a balanced representation of the Californian terroir on which the grapes are grown and it is clear that this is perfectly embodied by the end product; a wine of depth, concentration, ripeness and longevity.

It is a big, but impeccably well-balanced Shiraz that should shed some of its structure and tannin over the next 4-5 years, and be at its best between 2010-2030+. Minimum Price Guarantees

On occasion, Christie's has a direct financial interest in the outcome of the sale of certain lots consigned for sale. This will usually be where it has guaranteed to the Seller that whatever the outcome of the auction, the Seller will receive a minimum sale price for the work. This is known as a minimum price guarantee. Where Christie's holds such financial interest we identify such **lots** with the symbol^o next to the **lot** number.

• Third Party Guarantees/Irrevocable bids

Where Christie's has provided a Minimum Price Guarantee it is at risk of making a loss, which can be significant, if the **lot** fails to sell. Christie's therefore sometimes chooses to share that risk with a third party. In such cases the third party agrees prior to the auction to place an irrevocable written bid on the **lot**. 

ULLAGE

The amount by which level of wine is short of being full: these levels may vary according to age of the wines and, as far as can be ascertained by inspection prior to the sale, are described in the catalogue.

LEVEL/ULLAGE DESCRIPTIONS AND INTERPRETATIONS

- into neck: Level of young wines. Exceptionally good in wines over 10 years old.
- 2 bottom neck: Perfectly good for any age of wine. Outstandingly good for a wine of 20 years in bottle, or longer.
- 3 very top-shoulder
- 4 top-shoulder: Normal for any claret 15 years old or older.
- 5 upper-shoulder: Slight natural reduction through the easing of the cork and evaporation through cork and capsule. Usually no problem. Acceptable for any wine over 20 years old. Exceptional for pre-1950 wines.
- 6 mid-shoulder: Probably some weakening of the cork and some risk. Not abnormal for wines 30/40 years of age. Estimates usually take this into account.
- 7 mid-low-shoulder: Some risk. Low estimates.
- 8 low-shoulder: Risky and usually only accepted for sale if wine or label exceptionally rare or interesting. Always offered with low estimate.

Because of the slope of shoulder it is impractical to describe levels as mid-shoulder, etc. Wherever appropriate the level between cork and wine will be measured and catalogued in centimetres.

The condition and drinkability of burgundy is less affected by ullage than its equivalent from Bordeaux. For example, a 5 to 7 cm. ullage in a 30-year-old burgundy can be considered normal, indeed good for age, 3.5 to 4 cm. excellent for age, even 7 cm. rarely a risk.



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
