

Entirely refreshed, its finishing is called "special Tudor", the rotor now engraved and gilded.

The Omega observatory contest movements are part of the very DNA of the company, official proof of Omega's supreme watchmaking skill. As such, they are only rarely appearing on the open market, most being kept by the manufacturer for decades and few have ever been released for sale



MARCHIE The present fresh to the market example was successfully submitted to the observatory competitions an astounding nine times, winning multiple prizes. Furthermore, the Bulletin de Marche from the Neuchâtel Observatory was issued on 31 December 1967, the last day of the last year of the competitions at Neuchâtel.

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This timepiece was amongst the most accurate observatory-tested wristwatch movements of the 1960s, part of a small group of Omega movements designed specifically for these contests. In common with other makers, when intended for observatory trial Omega movements are double numbered. The observatory calibre 30 movements are of special construction, featuring a Guillaume balance with gold poising screws and an increased frequency of 25,200 vibrations per hour instead of the usual 18,000 vph. These along with other modifications such as only using the best part of the mainspring, gave the calibre a more stable rate. The various modified calibre 30 movements including the caliber 30 GD were the most precise wristwatch movements ever tested and continued to make their mark until 1967, the last year of the competitions. It is furthermore fitted with the Maltese Cross mechanism (Geneva stop work) which ensures that the most constant torque portion of the mainspring is used to power the gear train, thereby increase the timekeeping performance.

In 1967, the present watch was adjusted for competition by one of the most revered Master Régleurs at Omega, Joseph Ory. The result was an extremely good 3.84 points. Between 1959 and 1967 this movement achieved an incredible nine Bulletin de Marche in the Observatory Contests, five at Neuchâtel including one First Prize, one Second Prize and two Third Prizes and a further four Bulletin de Marche from the Observatory of Geneva.

Observatory Trials were the ultimate test of chronometry, the embodiment of the expertise of watchmaking. Omega had sensational success at the observatory trials, their esteemed régleurs won a total of 93 victories and of these, 72 were records and one a world record in all categories. In 1962, for the third year in succession, Omega was awarded three out of the four Swiss accuracy records for wristwatches. In 1964 the best results for the most accurate watches were gained by Omega movements with only 2.89 points. This is equivalent to an accuracy of 99.999333% during the full 45-day test.

In 1965 Joseph Ory said "The wristwatch that reaches absolute accuracy is still a watchmaker's dream, but Omega are closer than anyone else in the world to turning it into reality. The great value of the precision awards lies in the official proof they give that Omega specialists are supremely skilled in preparing and regulating watch movements. The same minds, the same fingers that win these precision records for Omega are also responsible for the design and manufacture of the Omega watches that can be obtained from any Omega dealer in the world."

Consigned by a private collector, the rarity and exclusivity of the present "Flightmaster De Luxe" chronograph is enhanced by its very good original overall condition.

The Flightmaster De Luxe in gold is amongst the rarest watches ever made by Omega. According to literature and as confirmed on the Omega Certificate, the model was made in a limited but not numbered series of 200 examples, however only 20 fitted with a gold bracelet, such as the present watch. The first example of the "De Luxe" series with gold bracelet, weighing an impressive 250 grams, was sold to King Hussein of Jordan (see Omega -A Journey through Time by Marco Richon, p. 516, pl. 1136). Omega's celebrated "Speedmaster" launched in 1969 is unquestionably one of the firm's most popular models ever made. It is however much less known that in the same year, another icon saw the light of the day: the "Flightmaster", a manually wound dual time chronograph, designed as the ultimate pilot's watch of the period.

Impressive not only by its, for the period, large size and the avant-garde case design without an outer bezel, the model is furthermore distinguished by the engraved airplane symbol and inscription "Flightmaster" to the case back.

In order to facilitate its use, Omega's engineers ingeniously devised a colour-coding for the functions and relevant hands. The chronograph hand, distinguished by its bright orange colour, same as the hands of its 12 hours and 30 minutes register, is operated by the two standard push buttons in the right band. The two crowns to the left side are set with a blue respectively black inset, used to adjust the blue GMT-hand and the inner revolving bezel.

Marketed as "A very comprehensive instrument with a number of individual features, which tells the time in two places at once, records time from 1/5th second up to 12 hours, has a totally enclosed movable bezel and is clear to read, simple to use and looks like this", the "Flightmaster De Luxe" and its typical 1970s colourful dial design has become an icon amongst collectors.

Reference 16700 was introduced in 1988 as successor of the reference 16750. It is the last GMT-Master without single adjustment of the 24 hour hand. At the same time the reference 16760 until 1988 and reference 16710 from 1989 were available with an independent 24 hour hand, these watches were named GMT-Master II. After the technical differences, the watches were also different in price. The customer had a choice whether he decided to choose technological progress or the slightly cheaper version.

The present "Green Submariner" is preserved in very good original overall condition, the rarity enhanced by the presence of the original guarantee and accessories.

Reference 16610LV for Lunette Verte or green bezel was launched in 2003 to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Rolex Submariner.

The present watch is fitted with the rare first green bezel generation, the so-called "Flat 4", indicating that the number 4 of the graduation 40 has a flat top, as well as the MK1 dial featuring slightly larger hour markers, an oval "O" for the Rolex script, a widely spaced "Oyster Perpetual Date" signature and the "Swiss Made" indication on the bottom of the dial extending from 28 to 32 min.

The property of an important private European collector, the present Explorer II is offered in attractive overall condition with a coveted Mark I dial featuring the T Swiss T script at 6 o'clock. Due to ageing and exposure to external elements, the dial of the timepiece displays attractive luminous accents which have slightly aged throughout the years, as well as a straight seconds hands free of the luminous lollipop, which was fitted on the early examples of the reference and often replaced during servicing.

Launched in 1971, the Explorer II was primarily designed for speleologists. The model is fitted with a fixed bezel with 24 hour display and a special 24 hour hand that can be set to distinguish day from night hours or to read the current time in different time zones. Reference 1655 is frequently referred amongst collectors as the "Steve McQueen" or "Freccione", Italian for "big arrow".

\$37,000-47,000 €31,000-40,000 The present COMEX ref. 16800 was consigned by the family of the original owner, a professional diver who worked for COMEX Aberdeen on oil rigs from 1975 until the day of his death.

The transitional Submariner, reference 16800, was in production between 1982 and 1986. It differs from its predecessor 1680 by a deep rating to 1000 ft (300 m), sapphire crystal, quick-set date function and the entirely new movement caliber 3035. Various important technical changes were made during this short production time: the stainless steel was upgraded from 306L to 904L, extremely resistant against oxidation and much harder. The dials of early models featured luminous indexes as in reference 1680, later generations were fitted with the white gold borders around the luminous numerals.

The COMEX designation was featured on the outside of the screw back and on the dial. Part or the entire serial number was repeated to the inside of the case back, a feature only seen on this model and reference 5513 which was supplied to COMEX and to military forces.

The inside case back of the present watch bears reference 16800 and 8'269'189, the entire serial number. Furthermore the reverse of the dial is stamped 0121 149, the reference number attributed to dials used for ref. 16800 with COMEX signature.

COMEX (Compagnie Maritime d'Expertise), a professional diving operation for the oil industry was founded in 1961 in Marseille by Henri-Germain Delauze, Comex or Compagnie Maritime d'Expertise pioneered in professional diving in the commercial field, requiring tool watches designed for conducting safe diving operations at greater depths, known as saturation diving. The successful collaboration between Comex and Rolex started in the early 1970s when all divers were progressively equipped with watches especially made for Comex: the improved "Submariner" model meeting the most stringent technical and professional demands of the professional deepsea diver. Over the years, the watches featuring the legendary Comex name have undergone major technological innovations, the most famous still today remaining the gas escape valve, a crucial feature on diver's watches.

The helium valve, allowing helium and other gases to escape hence enabling the watch to withstand compression even at extreme depths, was developed by *Rolex* in cooperation with the French diving firm COMEX and used for the Submariner references 5513 and 5514. Following the success of these models, Rolex decided to commercialize their invention with the launch of the celebrated Sea-Dweller reference 1665 in 1967, the first wristwatch designed for use in saturation diving, fitted with a Rolex patent valve in the band and guaranteed waterproof to 610 meters depth.

The model was rushed to production while Rolex had not received the final approval for the patent of the helium valve, resulting in the very first models of reference 1665 being sold with the case backs engraved (Patent Pending) in parenthesis. According to literature, only around 150 examples of these early examples were made with serial numbers ranging between 1.7 million and 2.2 million.

The present reference 1665 is one of these extremely rare examples, featuring a number of specific characteristics of this celebrated version, clearly distinguishing them from their "patented" successors:


-most evidently the so-called Mark I or Mk I dial, standing out by the color of the double red printing of the "Sea-Dweller" on the first line followed by the "Submariner 2000" on the second line. The two lines are of identical size. Furthermore the letter "B" of the word SUBMARINER is perfectly aligned with "S" of the model name SEA-DWELLER

- "Oyster Gas Escape Valve" and (Patent Pending) engraved around the case back

- inside of the case back featuring reference 1665, the last three digits of the serial number and quarter and year of production, in this instance 475 and IV.67 -the rare Rolex bracelet with the extension piece marked "Rolex " and "Pat. Pend".

Introduced in late 1960s, the reference 1680 was the first Submariner to feature a date indicator as well as the cyclops magnifier. Distinguished by its red Submariner printing to the dial, the "Red Sub" as it is known to collectors has become a cult classic.

In attractive overall condition, this example of the highly coveted reference stands out through its very warm and appealing tropical dial with red Submariner script. Gradually changing from black to a dark brown color, the present single red "meter first" dial is allied to a stainless steel case of strong proportions, bearing a serial number usually seen on examples with dials featuring the "feet first" script.

The present ref. 6205 is an attractive and well-preserved example of an early Submariner model, the appeal further enhanced by the presence of the rare Submariner signature on its dial and the period accessories.

One of the rarest and most sought-after Submariner models ever produced, reference 6205 was exclusively available in 1954 and 1955 and made in a very small series. Only some models featured the designation "Submariner" on the dial. It is the second so-called "small crown" Submariner after reference 6204, introducing many new improvements, most notably the increased depth resistance of 100 meters, the larger crown (6 mm.) for better handling, black lacquer dial with gilt printing but without the depth rating, luminous dot hour markers, Mercedes hands and a large seconds hand. The bezels featured a silver triangle, without the first 15 minutes, only five minute intervals.

The present watch is a fine example of the rare Rolex reference 6204, the firm's first Submariner, in production only for one year from 1953 until 1954. Its appeal is further enhanced by the presence of the period accessories.

In attractive overall condition it features the typical elongated "pencil hands", the sweep centre seconds hand is easily recognizable by its characteristic luminous dot at the tip without pointed extension, the so-called "lollipop hand". The dial features already the designation "Submariner" however no depth rating as this indication only became a feature on future references. A further characteristic of reference 6204 is the word "BREVET", patented, just above the reference number found between the lugs at 12 o'clock.

Reference 6204 was available in two bezel versions, one without the minute graduation for the first guarter, like the present watch, or the other with the graduation for the first 15 minutes. The minute graduation became a standard feature on the model's successors.

Consigned by an important private collector, this very rare reference 6536 has to the best of our knowledge never been offered at auction before.

As any Rolex enthusiast will recognize, the dial is the exceedingly rare "underline" version in superb original overall condition. Dating from around 1963, it is of almost equal rarity to as watch itself. The reverse is stamped Beyeler, one of the firm's dial suppliers, it was presumably fitted during a service. The "underline" found beneath the signature at 12 o'clock is a small but very significant detail that sets this dial apart, as is the wording "Superlative Chronometer, Officially Certified" found as of around 1959. The "underline" is thought to signify the use of tritium for the luminous material and was placed on dials when Rolex transitioned from using radium to tritium around 1963-1964.

A highlight for the connoisseur of rare timepieces, this unpolished gem of a Submariner impresses with its full case and well defined facets to the lugs. The case back features the crossed-out stamped reference 6538, the new reference number 6536 engraved below. It is furthermore fitted with the correct gold hands and the small crown with the cross symbol surmounted by the Rolex logo.

A superb Gay Frères riveted Oyster bracelet with expandable links, date stamped third quarter 1956, and the period accessories complete the watch, making it a worthy addition to any world-class collection of rare sports watches.



Reference 6536

Ref. 6536 is one of the rarest Submariner models, made only for one year ,1955. It features the "Submariner" name introduced in late 1954 and a five-digit serial number. It is thought that only up to 100 examples were manufactured in total. The reference 6536 came after the reference 6204 and around the same time as the 6538 with the bigger crown. Both models were fitted with the caliber 1030 movement with bidirectional rotor which improved the efficiency of the automatic winding.

The early history of the Rolex Submariner is perhaps one of the most interesting amongst all vintage Rolex watches. These models were made in exceedingly small numbers and during a very short period only, changing reference as each development and update was introduced.

This fact has left today's collectors a legacy of a rich variety spread over several early period Submariner references all with subtle differences in design and construction. These Submariners, made in such small numbers and even fewer surviving, are now amongst the most desirable to collectors.

The present ref. 6536/1 is preserved in very attractive original overall condition, the dial is unrestored, the case shows strong proportions and well-defined edges to the lugs. The crown is the correct version, featuring the cross symbol surmounted by the Rolex logo. The bracelet dates from 1957.

The watch is furthermore sold with a set of period accessories, all rarities by themselves, including the Rolex anchor. These anchors were attached to every Submariner to signify that the model was pressure-proof to the indicated depth.

Reference 6536/1

Reference 6536/1 and its brethren 6536 were in production for a short time between 1955 and 1959. Both feature the new calibre 1030 movement, cases without crown guard and a 6 mm. crown. Ref. 6536 has a slightly thicker case and slightly smaller dial diameter than ref. 6536/1. The bezel of early models had minute markers in 10-minute intervals and a red triangle, later series the minute markers for the first 15 minutes. No certainty exists on why two such similar models have been sold at the same time. It is speculated that the more robust reference 6536 was targeted to a more professional market and the slenderer 6536/1 to the public at large.

In production for one year only, 1958, reference 5510 is one of the rarest "big crown" Submariners, and among the most sought-after Rolex sports watches. The combination of the very large 8 mm. crown and the lack of crown guards make it one of the most immediately recognizable Submariner models.

The present reference 5510 is a most appealing example of this rare reference, distinguished by its overall very original condition, including the correct "Brevet" crown, gilt hands and the bezel with small red triangle and minute markers between 1 and 15. The black gloss dial is in attractively aged, unrestored condition, showing "spider" lines defined by the crisscrossing of light cracks throughout its entire surface. Like the colour shift of tropical dials, this characteristic is due to ageing and it amplifies the collectability and esthetic impact of the timepiece. The luminous material to numerals and hands shows an even cream discoloration from age, further enhancing the look of this rare timepiece. The case has not been subject to careless polishing, demonstrated by the well-defined facets to the lugs.

Consigned by a private collector and sold with period accessories, rarities by themselves, this "Big Crown" is a trophy for the collector of vintage sports watches.

In the movies Dr. No and Goldfinger, Sean Connery alias James Bond is wearing a Rolex Submariner. Since then, the early Submariner models without crown guard such as the present reference 5510 as well as references 6200 and 6538 and others are also known as the "James Bond" models.

It is a fine and early example of a reference 5513 dating from 1962, first year of production of the model. In excellent original overall condition, the present timepiece is a very rare and highly attractive example of the Sea-Dweller reference 1665. The beauty of the timepiece is emphasized through its magnificent dial with the highly coveted 'Double Red' signature. Furthermore, the case back not only matches the reference number 1665, but is stamped IV.67 indicating that it was built in the last quarter of 1967, also present are the final three digits of the serial number, 311.

This Rolex "Double-Red" Sea-Dweller is an asset to any collection. Its extremely early 1.7 million serial number dates the watch to 1968 and indeed, the date stamp in the back of the case shows it was produced in very late 1967, the year of the initial launch of this reference. Vintage Rolex watches with original specially produced signed dials for Middle Eastern rulers are amongst the most desirable of all to collectors. The present reference 5500 Air-King is entirely fresh to the market and preserved in exceptional and original overall condition. Not only is the dial enhanced by the gilt signature of Sheikh Abdullah Al-Jaber Al-Sabah but it has tropicalized over the last 55 years to a most appealingly rich dark brown colour, beautifully harmonizing with the ivory tone of the luminous accented numerals, hands and gilt printing.

Only two other Rolex watches are known publically with the signature of Sheikh Abdullah Al-Jaber Al-Sabah on their dials: a steel reference 6094 Oysterdate Precision and a steel reference 1002 Oyster Perpetual. Both these watches, like the present watch, date from 1962.

Each of the three known watches with Sheikh Abdullah Al-Jaber Al-Sabah signature dials are of different references, rendering them unique pieces.

The present watch was presented by the Sheikh to the grandfather of the former owner on 9 August 1964 at the second World Ohrid Swimming Marathon in Macedonia, as thank you not only for his part in the organization of this sports event but also as acting as the official companion and translator to the Sheikh.





The Ohrid Swimming Marathon is an international swimming competition taking place since 1962 at Lake Ohrid, in the Republic of Macedonia. For the competition the participants have to swim the 30 kilometers between Sveti Naum and Ohrider harbor.

Sheikh Abdullah Al-Jaber Al-Sabah was a member of the House of Sabah, the ruling family of Kuwait and the country's first Minister for Education after independence in 1961.

He is remembered for his great contribution to the improvement of the country and led an educational, cultural and enlightenment renaissance in Kuwait. He had a far-sighted vision that saw the importance of education and culture for the present and future of Kuwait. Opening public libraries, bringing the first antiquities excavation mission, opening the first National Museums and making arrangements for the establishing of the first university in Kuwait were but a few of Sheikh Abdullah's achievements.

The Palace of Sheikh Abdullah Al-Jabir Al-Sabah is a heritage site in the State of Kuwait. The exotic chateau-like palace built in early twentieth century has a desert coast setting. It was bought by the Sheikh as a family residence, thereafter converted it to the first national museum in Kuwait and the Arabian Gulf region, it remained the property of his heirs until it was taken over by the State and preserved as an historic building.

Rare gems in the world of vintage timepieces, Rolex wristwatches with personalized dials always attract the passions of the most astute collectors. Made in exceedingly small numbers, dials featuring royal emblems or coat of arms were usually manufactured for the most important clients of Rolex, with the example of Middle-Eastern countries including the Sultanate of Oman, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain or Saudi-Arabia. Usually presented by the government as gifts to dignitaries as token of appreciation and respect, watches displaying such rarified dials have become throughout the years grail watches rarely appearing at auction.

Previously unknown to the auction market, the present reference 1665 is bestowed with an emblem rarely seen on Rolex sports watches, the Kuwaiti coat of arms. Adopted in 1962, the emblem is composed of a golden falcon bearing a shield depicting the national flag. Displaying a traditional sailingvessel between the wings of the falcon, the full name of the state is written at the top of the disk. Of great appeal, the timepiece is made even more important through the presence of its original guarantee, carefully kept by its owner, and stamped by Zaid Al-Sarhan & Sons, Rolex agents at Amad Street in Kuwait.



A celebrated reference, the Sea-Dweller 1665 was developed following the requirements of divers for a timepiece able to resist to important depths and saturation diving. Widely considered as amongst the most collectible timepieces of Rolex, the Sea-Dweller appeared in the late 1960s and featured a gas escape valve enabling helium to escape from the watch-case during decompression, preventing the pressure from expelling the Plexiglas. Created with different dial variations depending on the year of production, the present example is part of the reference 1665 nicknamed "Geat White", with scales and text differing from previous versions and printed entirely in white.

The present timepiece represents an extremely rare opportunity for collectors to acquire an important example of an iconic reference of the Rolex manufacture, complete with its box and original guarantee, a testimony of the longstanding relationship between Rolex and the Middle-East



An incredible tour-de-force of mechanical ingenuity, the "Primo 4 Jukebox" was made in a limited edition of 50 pieces in each white, pink and yellow gold in 2007.

The Primo 4 is the only mechanical watch with a musical function that provides four tunes on four separate musical discs. It is fitted with the mechanical cal. MF-which took four years to develop. With 577 components, 36 rubies and 28,800 vibrations/hour providing 40 hours of autonomy, the Primo 4 offers four different melodies which can be chosen on demand. The music, stored on four separate mini-discs located at the four points of the compass, is read using the principle of the juke box. To listen to a tune, it suffices to press the push button situated at 7 o'clock, which sets in motion the reading mechanism, moving the discs to the note comb. This operation can be repeated as often as wished.

One of the major challenges in designing the Primo 4 was to provide the case with perfect acoustics. Research was carried out on the bridges and the base-plate as well as the case's false bottom which was to act as a sound box. The sapphire glass also took twelve months to develop, in order to perfectly transmit the sound vibrations. Different patents have been filed for this unique and exceptional system.

The result is a remarkable watch, intended for music lovers and connoisseurs of exceptional timepieces.

The first Thomas Prescher Tourbillon to be offered at public auction, fresh to the market and consigned by the original owner, this triple axis flying tourbillon with constant force mechanism is described by its maker as "a kinetic sculpture of time". This exceptional watch is far more than just a beautiful and mesmerizing mechanical work of art, it is a triumph at the highest level of watchmaking craftsmanship coupled with extraordinary technical knowhow.

The genius of its design is that it allows the tourbillon to seem to hover in mid-air on its three flying axes. It is also the first wristwatch to feature a constant force mechanism within the tourbillon carriage itself. Furthermore, the movement powered by two barrels is crescent-shaped to allow the maximum amount of space to display the tourbillon to full advantage.

Thomas Prescher is a highly innovative modern watchmaker who has a particular interest in developing the multi-axis tourbillon for use within the challenging confines of the wristwatch. The "Tourbillon Trilogy" a series consisting of a single, double and triple axis tourbillon each with constant force mechanism was developed for Baselworld 2004 where the triple axis tourbillon was unveiled for the first time.

Thomas Prescher's tourbillon calibers are designed and made in-house, constructed as flying tourbillons to maintain a light and transparent appearance, the triple axis tourbillon is the ultimate model – a tourbillon with two axes rotating once every minute and a third circular axis turning 360 degrees per hour. The making of a triple axis tourbillon small and light enough posed an immense technical challenge, in fact it was long considered impossible to attain the level of miniaturization required for its use in wristwatches. In addition, a flying tourbillon is much more difficult to make than a standard bridged version and even more so in the triple axis tourbillon which is not supported at its outer extremities and therefore needs exceptionally good balance of all axes as they relate to one another. The competence required to achieve this miniaturized marvel is exceptional.

In common with all tourbillon watches, the present watch is descended from Breguet's original invention patented in 1801 to cancel out the negative effects of gravity to gain improvements in timekeeping. However, it was not until the British horologist Anthony G. Randall added a second axis to a tourbillon for use in carriage clocks in the 1977 that multiple axis tourbillons came into being. The triple axis tourbillon itself is based on the study of the work of Richard Good who developed his mechanisms again for use in clocks in the 1980s. Thomas Prescher realized that merely making a miniaturized copy of Good's tourbillon would not work due to problems with weight distribution, gearing and friction. Prescher also wanted to make his watches with flying tourbillons so he designed and made an entirely new triple axis tourbillon caliber displayed to wonderful effect in the present watch.

During the development of the triple axis tourbillon, Thomas Prescher realized that the escapement needed a "boost" of energy to the escape wheel in order to give enough impulse to power the pallet fork and balance. The answer was to incorporate a constant force mechanism that impulses the escape wheel by releasing power at regular intervals from a secondary spiral spring mounted just below the escape wheel. The spring constantly re-tensions and releases during the running of the watch. In the present watch this process occurs an incredible six times per second at a frequency of 3 Hertz, the same frequency at which the watch beats.

This superb and visually impressive masterpiece of the watchmaker's art will appeal to all who appreciate mechanical intricacies and the incredible original invention that exists in contemporary watchmaking.

The property of an important private collector, the present Equation du Temps Marchante impresses by its excellent overall condition and the presence of the accompanying accessories. It is no. 35 of the limited edition of only 50 examples of this model.

Amongst the most refined and elegant timepieces of the Blancpain manufacture, the present watch features an important array of complications, including an impressive equation of time display which allows the watch to follow the cycle of the sun. For convenience, humans have defined the day to be exactly 24 hours in length and watches that we know of are faithful to that definition regardless of their complication. In reality, however, the defined 24-hour day is a convenience, an average that serves most purposes well but does not correspond exactly to the actual length of a solar day. As the earth's orbit is not exactly round and the earth's axis of rotation is inclined by 23 degrees, the actual solar day may be several minutes longer or shorter, depending on the time of year, than 24 hours. The difference between the length of the actual solar day, termed "solar time", and the 24-hour day, termed "civil time", is called the equation of time. The accumulated differences between civil time and solar time can be as much as +14 minutes and -16 minutes; on four days per year the errors catch up and the solar time and civil time correspond exactly.

Blancpain was successful in mastering an innovative gear train that combines the running of the equation gear train controlled by a complexshaped cam, and the running train of the watch's civil minutes-hand to drive the running equation hand. This complication had been previously used in large clocks and pocket watches and is a skill that has been developed carefully over two centuries.

Countering the effects of gravity on the mechanism, the Carrousel of the Blancpain manufacture is the first to be assembled with a cage rotating entirely in one minute.

A beautiful scenery, the mechanism can be observed through the semiskeletonized dial and the 12 o'clock aperture, assembled within a platinum case with stepped bezel. With a known retail price of approximately 188,700 Swiss francs in Switzerland, the present wristwatch represents a rare opportunity for collectors to acquire such a prime example of contemporary watchmaking.

A rare find at auction, the present timepiece represents one of the most advanced mechanisms ever developed by the Jaeger-LeCoultre manufacture. With a highly appealing semi-skeletonized display, the model synthetizes years of research and development from Jaeger-LeCoultre and symbolizes their successful attempt in creating a minute repeating wristwatch of high-stature. Featuring the Calibre 947 with patented crystal gong, the wristwatch uses its sapphire crystal in order to magnify the intensity and purity of the sound vibrations emitted by the repeating mechanism. The gong of the timepiece has its heel directly attached to the sapphire's crystal, liberating vibrations initially trapped within the case. Illustrating the attention carried by Jaeger-LeCoultre towards the development of their minute repeating mechanism, the skeletonized movement is furthermore developed in order to provide more room inside the case, resulting in an important enhancement in resonance and ultimately a sound of greater volume.

With a power reserve of 15 day as well as a torque indication to its dial, the present timepiece represents a rare occasion for collectors of haute horology to acquire one of the most accomplished minute repeating timepieces crafted by the Jaeger-LeCoultre manufacture

The property of an Important Private Collector, the present watch is only the third Jaeger-LeCoultre Duomètre à Sphérotourbillon to be offered at Christie's. Preserved in very good overall condition, the timepiece can be considered as one of the most charismatic and coveted watches of Jaeger-LeCoultre's modern production.

Purchased from the famous French retailer Dubail, located on the prestigious place Vendôme in Paris, the wristwatch is offered with its original guarantee, accessories and presentation box. Launched at SIHH (Salon International de la Haute Horlogerie) in 2013, the model was developed based on two innovations, both included in its name, the "Duomètre" as well as the "Sphérotourbillon".

The Sphérotourbillon: a precision adjusted tourbillon

Precision is the cornerstone of the Dual-Wing concept and was the watchword for the Jaeger-LeCoultre watchmakers in their reflection leading to the creation of the Duomètre Sphérotourbillon. The result is a watch that can legitimately claim to be the first tourbillon watch adjustable to the nearest second.

There are indeed very few tourbillon models with an extremely readable display of the seconds in a dedicated subsidiary dial, and even fewer with a stop seconds device. Certainly none until now had ever enabled the user to stop the seconds hand and bring it back to zero in order to perform an ultra-accurate time setting.

Using the Dual-Wing concept enabled the Jaeger-LeCoultre watchmakers to create the first precision-adjusted tourbillon. A push-piece at 2 o'clock serves to bring the small seconds hand positioned beneath the tourbillon back to zero, according to the fly back principle.

One special feature of this fly back system is that it does not halt the operation of the regulating organ. The small seconds hand is reset to zero and begins running again instantly. This means the watch maintains optimal precision even when accurately adjusting the time to the nearest second.

A multi-axis tourbillon

Above and beyond its exemplary reliability, the chief characteristic of this Sphérotourbillon watch is its tourbillon. Initially devised for pocket-watches, the traditional tourbillon does not serve to compensate for the effects of gravity in all positions. An additional rotation axis must be added in order to achieve a three-dimensional rotation movement and thus prove itself more effective in all positions that a wristwatch may adopt.

The open worked dial provides a fascinating view of the tourbillon performing an extremely unusual rotation movement. As well as revolving around the axis of its titanium carriage, the tourbillon also spins around a second axis, inclined at a 20 angle. The combination of these two distinct and fast rotations (respectively 30 and 15 seconds per revolution) serves to free the watch from the effects of gravity.

This spectacular tourbillon incorporates all the innovations that enabled Jaeger-LeCoultre to win a brilliant victory in the first official timing competition of the 21st century. The carriage machined from a single block of titanium features a combination of lightness and extreme precision. The cylindrical balance-spring with its two terminal curves beats with a concentricity impossible to achieve with a traditional balance-spring. The balance with its generous inertia oscillates at a cadence of 21,600 vibrations per hour. The balance-spring stud-holder is protected by a screw-locking system from the effects of shocks and vibrations to which the watch is subjected.

For enhanced visual pleasure, a transparent case back provides an admirable "backstage" view of the intricate working of the hand-assembled and decorated movement, Jaeger-LeCoultre Calibre 382.

According to the Archives of Jaeger-Lecoultre, the present watch was manufactured in 1997. The etched and blackened hunting motif to the case back is a later addition.

The present wristwatch is preserved in very good overall condition and sold with the full set of accessories.

The Reverso wristwatch, the world's longest-running watch model, was launched in 1931 and designed upon special request by polo players who wished to have a timepiece able to endure their sport. The ingenious system allows a 180-degree rotation of the case, hence protecting the crystal and consequently the dial from damages.

The case back, its second face, provides a background for elaborate engravings such as initials, coats of arms and others, as well as for miniature enamel paintings.



The present clock is number 19 of 25 limited pieces as identified by the gilt brass plate on the upper edge of the front drawer. The model was made to celebrate the third Millennium.

The intricate wood marquetry panels are by master cabinet makers Philippe Monti and Jérôme Boutteçon, their names are stamped on the underside of the wooden case. Jérôme Boutteçon, master inlayer, received the 1994 award as France's finest craftsman.

The marquetry of this clock contains many different species of wood such as walnut, burr-walnut and fruitwood. The portraits of young ladies on the inside of the side doors are based on Art Deco period paintings depicting *Aurore* and *Crépescule*, the front of the secret drawer depicting *Dusk*, all after Alphonse Mucha.

With the 1000-year full calendar and perpetual barometric pressure-driven movement Jaeger-LeCoultre began a "1000-year journey" beginning on 1 January 2000. The clock would serve as "the precious receptacle of 1000 years of important moments, traditions, secrets and joys, which undoubtedly would flow through the tide of countless generations". To this end the secret drawer was originally fitted with ten lacquered engraved gilt tubes each containing a parchment (tubes and parchment now missing). The pen and ink are provided so that generations of owners will be able to "record significant family exploits or the grand hours of the millennium".

The Atmos Marqueterie series shares the same mechanism as the rest of the Atmos range. However what sets these clocks apart is the stunning craftsmanship which has made the Atmos Marqueterie one of the most sought after of all modern Atmos clocks.

This very attractive and thin watch bears the engraved inscription "Dono di Gioacchino Rossini 1853" (given by Gioacchino Rossini 1853) to the inside of the back cover.

It is understood it was given by the composer Rossini to his friend, the banker Laudadio della Ripa de Pesaro, whose nephew was Rossini's doctor.

The watch has a high-grade lever escapement with compensation balance and a beautiful white enamel dial, the unusually large subsidiary seconds are a particularly stylish feature.



Gioacchino Rossini (1792-1868)

One of the most famous composers of the 19th century and one of the most popular opera composers in history, Rossini was a prolific talent who wrote 39 operas as well as numerous other pieces earning him the nickname "the Italian Mozart".

He made his debut at 18 with *La Cambiale di Matrimonio* and went on to write *The Barber of Seville* and *The Thieving Magpie* (*La Gazza Ladra*) which are perhaps his most enduring works. Rossini moved to Paris in 1824 and his last opera was the epic William Tell which helped to usher in the taste for grand opera in France.

Jean-François Bautte

One of the great Geneva watchmakers and goldsmiths in Geneva during the 19th century. After the death of Jean-François Bautte (1772-1837), the firm continued under the name of 'Jean-François Bautte & Cie' until 1855 when it changed its name to 'Rossel, Bautte & Cie'.

This rare and fascinating devotional silver dual-time zone watch made by Vacheron Constantin and retailed by Ratel of Paris is sold with the original box and descriptive document detailing the meaning and use of the timepiece.

The elaborately designed case shows Christ on the cross in high relief to the back. Edge of the back and bezel are decorated with an engraved rosary. The band is inscribed "VIGILATE QUIA NESCITIS DIEM NEQUE HORAM" (Matthew 25, 13: "Watch therefore, for ye know neither the day nor the hour").

The pendant is three-shaped and richly engraved with the depiction of the Virgin Mary and the Holy Spirit. On the dial there are 12 hours fields with descriptions of the Passion of Christ, the blued steel hands are in the form of the scourging tools of Christ.

The Hora Christi watch is intended to be the perpetual subject of pious meditations enabling Christians around the world to find themselves united in the same thought at the same time, the time of Jerusalem is taken as a universal time and the other hands adjusted according to the time difference existing between each country.

It would appear that Ratel et Cie. devised the design and making of the Hora Christi watch as the company's speciality. The firm was established at 53, Rue Mr. Le Prince, Paris, and described themselves as watchmaker to His Holiness the Pope.

PROVENANCE: Hugh Vivian

The first owner of this watch, Hugh Vivian, was born in Portugal in 1884 where his father William Vivian was a mining engineer. Hugh went to school in England but later studied engineering and metallurgy in Germany. In 1909 he was made technical director of the Vivian & Sons copper smelting business in Swansea. In 1922 he became managing director.

Hugh Vivian was also a member of the governing body of the University of Wales and the National Museum of Wales. His long involvement with the metals industry may well explain his purchase of this highly sophisticated anti-magnetic watch.

Offered at auction for the first time in over a decade, the present watch is extremely well preserved. This superb example of a Bonniksen karrusel watch made by one of the very best English firms of the period, S. Smith & Son. It is one of the exceptionally rare anti-magnetic karrusel watches, part of a small series which Smith destined for the Kew Observatory trials. The company's no. 191-222 won a 3rd place in 1898, no. 192-256 an 11th place in 1915. Smith's no. 192-233, classified as a deck watch, took part in the 1918 trial.

The movement of the present watch would have been supplied by Bonniksen and then adjusted by Smith for entry into the Kew Observatory trials in which patent Karrusels enjoyed particular success.

In the Smith & Son catalogues of the time, English revolving escapement watches of this type with special Kew certificates sold for 55 pounds. The karrusel mechanism was invented around 1890 and patented in 1893 by Bahne Bonniksen (1859-1935), a Danish watchmaker working in England.







Recognizably similar to the tourbillon, the karrusel was designed to ensure that a watch kept time regardless of how it was positioned. Although the rotating escapement of the karrusel has the same equalizing effect on positional errors as the tourbillon it is constructed in an entirely different way. The genius of Bonniksen's invention was that, unlike the tourbillon, it could be made in quantity and serviced by any competent watchmaker. Furthermore, the karrusel watch was an exceptionally good timekeeper due largely to the relatively slow rotation of 52 ½ minutes. In fact, the timekeeping performance of the karrusel is usually equal, in many cases better and certainly more consistent than the tourbillion.

Various testing laboratories around the world were responsible for grading and testing watches. The most stringent being the Kew (Teddington) Observatory, just west of London. A standard Swiss chronometer test would last 15 days, however, the Kew test lasted 44 days. The tests consisted of observing the time keeping of the watch in various positions and at various temperatures and awarding points for accuracy in these differing states. The present watch with 82.3 marks is regarded as especially good although scores of over 90 were regularly obtained by 1900.

S. Smith & Son.

The leading London firm for high quality and complicated watches at the end of the 19th Century and during the opening decades of the 20th, was founded by Samuel Smith, jeweler and watchmaker, c.1851. Watches were made for him by Nicole Nielsen. Alongside the wide range of civilian watches and clocks, Smith's also made chronometers which performed well and made the firm a supplier to the Admiralty. Under the guidance of Herbert S.A. Smith, the firm developed into a large manufacturing company with its own research laboratories, the family succession being continued a further generation by Sir Alan Herbert Smith, with the company going on to make automobile and aircraft instruments alongside clocks and watches. The company won a medal for their "non-magnetizable" watches for which they became well known.

This superb quality precision pocket chronometer is both extremely attractive and very well preserved. Remarkably the original signed and numbered certificate and box are still present, together with the spare mainspring and crystal.

The reverse of the certificate details the testing of the movement between 4 and 8 April 1867 showing a variation of between 2 3/10th seconds slow and 1 3/10th seconds fast, the regulation took place in temperatures between 40 and 100 degrees of Fahrenheit.

The present watch is technically highly sophisticated and with a high degree of precision and complication. The two mainspring barrels for the going and independent seconds trains are wound in unison by the crown, the movement is fully jewelled and the wheels of the train are made of gold. The detent chronometer escapement is only used in watches when greater accuracy is required, it is also particularly suitable for watches with centre seconds because there is no recoil action and therefore the seconds hand can advance in very precise steps. This watch can be used to time an event with an accuracy of up to 1/6th second in the same way as a chronograph although without a return-to-zero facility.

This excellent example of fine Swiss watchmaking will delight any connoisseur of horological complications and high precision timekeeping.

The watchmaker Ulysse-Adrien Breting (1812-1891) of LeLocle, Switzerland, produced watches under his own name as well as under Breting Frères together with his brother Jules. They were renowned for their production of chronometer grade movements and movements incorporating tourbillons, jumping seconds and other complications. The firm was awarded a gold medal at the Universal Exhibition in Besançon, France, in 1860, and a fourth prize at the Neuchâtel Observatory for a pocket chronometer with bascule escapement. The present "Chronometro Gondolo" is one of Patek Philippe's exceedingly rare examples of this model featuring a hunter case as opposed to the more commonly found openface version. According to research, only five other hunter case Gondolo watches of different case sizes have appeared in public to date, however only one other with the same 53 mm. diameter, rendering this specimen exceedingly rare.

Fresh to the market this Gondolo is furthermore accompanied by the original box numbered underneath with the movement number 132'244, spare crystal with numbered paper and spare mainspring and, most importantly, the original certificate confirminng the "savonnette" or cover for the hunter case as well as the engraved initials J.S.

Interestingly and further underlining the fact that a hunter case is unusual for a Chronometro Gondolo, the designation "découverte" (openface) on the pre-printed Gondolo certificate was crossed out when the certificate was originally completed by hand and the designation "savonnette" substituted.

The relatively small number of hunter case Chronometro Gondolo watches that have appeared at auction to date would suggest that the hunter case version was supplied only when requested by a customer.

Made in 1909 and sold in 1918 the present reference 10 is one of the extremely rare surviving examples of this early model to appear in public.

Reference 10 was initially named "model 10" before being attributed ref. 10 in 1934 when Patek Philippe started implementing reference numbers to their wristwatches. It is the sister model of the celebrated "Gondolo" wristwatches featuring the same case size, construction and shape, both considered icons in today's collectors market.

The present example is preserved in generally very good condition for a 100-year-old wristwatch. Since its first appearance at public auction in Geneva in 2008 it has remained in the same important private collection. Evidently not often used, the engraved signatures and numbers as well as hallmarks to the outside of the case back are still crisp. The dial, a curved silver plate, features luminous numerals, fully confirmed by the Extract from the Archives. As to be expected, the luminous material was replaced at some point. The movement is a calibre 12^{'''} with Gondolo standards.

Only very few "survivors" of reference 10 have appeared in public to date. Those preserved in such good overall condition despite their age, such as the present one, are a rare opportunity for the collector of early timepieces.

To the best of our knowledge the present ref. 11 has never been offered in public before. It is preserved in very attractive overall condition and believed to be the only example with the retailer signature Eberhard Milan known to exist to date.

Made in a small series only, ref. 11, the "little sister" of ref. 10, see the previous lot in this auction, is distinguished by the rectangular curved hinged case and the stretched "explosion" or "tumbling" numerals, rendering it a very unique look.

It was originally named "model 11" before being attributed ref. 11 in 1934 with the beginning of the official reference system at Patek Philippe. The models were fitted with two-part hinged curved cases, the movements were 9" or 10" LeCoultre based calibres. The dials were supplied by Stern Frères, silvered matte or gilt, with various types of numerals. More than half of the production of ref. 11 was sold to the US.

It is rare to find a nearly 100-year-old wristwatch in such well preserved overall condition as the present example.

The present watch is an early and rare example of Patek Philippe's reference 137, distinguished by its elegant and facetted body and facetted crystal, its elongated case with slightly curved back ergonomically fits on the wrist. Reference 137 was launched in 1933 and remained in production for only three years. Introduced into the market in 1952, reference 2526 was Patek Philippe's first self-winding or automatic watch, starting with movement number 760'000. The model features the legendary calibre 12-600 AT which was granted Swiss patent No. 289758 in 1953 for "a self-winding mechanism for a wristwatch movement using the energy supplied by a rotary mass causing an eccentric part to transmit a swinging movement to an organ of the mechanism".

The majority of reference 2526 was cased in yellow gold, a small series in pink gold and an exceedingly limited number in white gold and platinum. Mainly fitted with enamel dials with applied gold baton numerals, the white gold and platinum examples were also available with silvered metal dials with diamond indexes.

A paragon of understatement and timeless class combined with a state-ofthe art movement, reference 2526 has significantly influenced the popularity of wristwatches featuring enamel dials. In 1960, it was replaced by reference 3428, equipped with the second generation self-winding movement, calibre 27-460.

Entirely fresh to the market, this is perhaps the ultimate Audemars Piguet coin watch. It is distinguished not only by its excellent overall condition and the rare retailer signature *Asprey*, but also its archive-confirmed green gold double-signed dial.

According to the Archives of Audemars Piguet, the commissioning client provided the gold 100 Francs Monaco coin to be used to make the watch and it was sold in 1938 to Golay & Son in London. The Archives also confirm the *"dial in old green gold with Breguet numbers signed Audemars Piguet, Geneva and Asprey, blued steel Breguet hands"*. It is noteworthy that rarely seen green gold is used for the dial. Green gold is very subtly nuanced and actually appears as greenish-yellow rather than green. Green gold was known as long ago as 860 BC under the name electrum, a naturally occurring alloy of silver and gold.

It is quite probable that this coin watch is unique in being an Audemars Piguet watch set into a gold coin of the Principality of Monaco. It is also an early example of the genre. Indeed, to the best of our knowledge no other examples are known publically. Furthermore, it was retailed by the prestigious London firm of Asprey, of the small number of coin watches made by Audemars Piguet, very few display retailer signatures.

The Cent Francs gold coin of Albert I, Prince of Monaco, was produced between 1891-1904. It was engraved by Louis-Oscar Roty (1846–1911), one of the most celebrated medallists of the Art Nouveau period.

The Archives of Audemars Piguet confirm the manufacture of the present watch in 1924 with 18K pink gold case, finely stripped dial signed Audemars Piguet Genève and Chiappe, baton hands, and its subsequent sale to Chiappe of Genoa in 1941. Highly attractive and rare, it impresses with the combination of a pink gold case and the well preserved pink dial with beautifully raised hard enamel indexes and numerals, further enhanced by the signature of the prestigious Italian retailer Chiappe of Genoa. The meticulous collector will appreciate this watch as an exercise in pared down elegance coupled with the sophistication of the minute repeating movement.

Considered as one of the noblest complications, the minute repeater was developed to answer the need to know the time in the dark, a more than common occurrence before the widespread use of electrical illumination in the home. With a very attractive and loud tone, the minute repeating mechanism of the present watch is working perfectly and made even more impressive through the thin nature of the movement and case.

The celebrated Italian retailer Chiappe created and retailed exquisite jewelry and watches. Founded by Filippo Chiappe (1863-1936), the house was appointed court jeweler to the Savoy House and was also the official supplier to the Italian Royal Family. Today it is located at Via XX Settembre.

The present watch is prominently illustrated in Audemars Piguet by G. Brunner, C. Pfeiffer-Belli, M. Wehrli, p. 140.

According to the Archives of Audemars Piguetthe present watch was made in 1924 with "extra flat" movement, 18K white gold "Murat Style" case, cathedral hands, applied numbers in white gold and English calendar. It was sold to Bittmann in St. Moritz in 1931.

The luxury jewellery and watch retailer Bittmann in St Moritz retailed many important Audemars Piguet watches, including unique and complicated models. An almost identical watch with the preceding number 32'702, also sold to Bittmann of St. Moritz, was auctioned in this saleroom on 15 November 2004, lot 63.

Fresh to the market and very well preserved, this watch represents one of the great classic models of Audemars Piguet - the minute repeater with perpetual calendar and moon phases with "extra flat" movement. The proportions of the white gold case and the supremely beautiful dial combined create a look both bold and elegant, a perfect creation of the Art Deco period.



The movement is certainly amongst the thinnest of the time for a complicated watch, the height or thinness of a movement also being a significant price factor. Interestingly, the "extra flat" movement has an elongated centre bridge with an additional screw so as to provide extra strength in case of any pressure being applied to the back.

Audemars Piguet has always been associated with the making of complicated watches of the highest possible grade. At the same time the company has historically striven to be the leader in the production of the world's thinnest watches with some notable milestones along the way including in 1891 the world's first and thinnest 18''' movement with minute repeater and in 1925 the flattest pocket watch in the world with a movement of just 1.32 mm. in height.

This model of pocket watch is contemporary with and closely related to Audemars Piguet's first calendar wristwatches of the 1920s. Stylistically they share the same style of dial, a look chosen for its clarity and elegance in displaying complications in a way that is pleasing to the eye.


This rare, complicated and elegant watch will appeal to both pocket watch and wristwatch collectors alike and to those who appreciate the haute horology of Audemars Piguet.

The Archives of Audemars Piguet confirm that this watch, number 4289, a *"19'" Horloge chronographe, quantième, savonnette"* was sold to E. Francillon & Co. on 14 December 1895.

The emergence of this entirely fresh to the market Audemars Piguet "Grande Complication" watch, consigned by a private collector and in excellent overall condition, is an exciting event. As one would expect, it is of extremely high quality and finish, with some extra touches of sophistication, such as the locking of the chronograph and hand-setting buttons when the front cover is closed, the glazed cover over the movement to allow viewing of its mechanical ingenuity which, in turn, is covered by a gold cuvette engraved with a list of the watch's complications.

The movement itself would almost certainly have been supplied to Audemars Piguet by Louis Elisée Piguet (1836-1924) of Le Brassus. Very complicated watches such as the present watch naturally required immense skill and experience to make, subsequently only a handful of watchmakers were capable of producing them. During the last quarter of the 19th century, most of the great watch houses including Audemars Piguet, Patek Philippe and Vacheron Constantin bought either finished movements or part-finished ébauches for their high complication watches from outside workshops. Arguably the most famous of these was Louis Elisée Piguet, one of the most talented watchmakers of the period who, amongst other things, improved the keyless winding system and chronographs and invented the fixed star repeating mechanism.

A total of 40 Grande Complication watches with a minimum of Grande Sonnerie, minute repeating, chronograph and perpetual calendar were made in Louis Elisée Piguet's workshops and then supplied to several of the great watch manufacturers. The close collaboration between Audemars Piguet and Louis Elisée Piguet at the time shows the increasing importance of watches with strike and repeating mechanisms in the company's production programme and their popularity with customers.

The present watch is early for a signed Audemars Piguet Grande Complication and is most likely unique for a signed watch of this configuration. It displays several characteristics in its construction indicating that the ébauche was made by Louis Elisée Piguet: watch number 4289 fits precisely into Louis Elisée Piguet's known production for 1894 for Grande Sonnerie, repetition minutes, chronograph watches; the "wavy line" decoration of the calendar plate is typical of Piguet (see fig. 1); the unusual cap plate secured with screws on the chronograph column wheel (fig. 2) and the keyless system with small cone-shaped wheel for the setting/winding (fig. 3) have not been seen before in any other of Audemars Piguet's signed watches but are features that are sometimes found in Louis Elisée Piguet's watches made for other manufacturers.

One of the most important markets for high-grade Swiss watches was Germany who were the principal customers for some of the most complicated watches, many of which employed L. E. Piguet movements. For example, Audemars Piguet supplied 35 complicated watches to Glashütte Union between 1895 and 1912, a large part of the ébauches for these watches were made by Louis Elisée Piguet. The German market preferred their watches to be fitted in heavy-gauge, usually pink gold cases in a style loosely called "Louis XV" with typical high stepped covers and prominent bow. Traditionally therefore, many of the complicated watches supplied to Germany were cased locally. The present watch was certainly made specifically for the German market with German days of the week calendar and the signature on the cuvette "Audemars, Genf". The case is not signed by Audemars Piguet but is fully numbered and bears German gold marks. The present "Grande Complication" furthermore impresses with no less than 11 complications (in addition to the essential timekeeping functions such as hours, minutes and seconds which are not considered complications):

- 1. The perpetual calendar
- 2. The days of the week
- 3. The months
- 4. The days of the month
- 5. The phases of the moon
- 6. The chronograph
- 7. The central 60-minute register
- 8. The minute repeating
- 9. The grande sonnerie
- 10. The petite sonnerie
- 11. The twin barrel bi-directional winding

Francillon & Co. were, along with Cartier, Breguet, Golay Fils & Stahl, Gübelin and Tiffany, very special customers of Audemars Piguet. The businessman Ernest Francillon (1834-1900) was a major figure in the watchmaking world during the 19th century. He took over his uncle's company, Agassiz and founded Francillon-Longines in 1867 which in the course of time became the Longines Watch Company.

An extremely similarly constructed movement with grand and small strike, minute repeater, chronograph and centre minute counter is illustrated in: Audemars Piguet, Brunner, Pfeiffer-Belli and Wehrli, 1993, p. 46. A similar watch made by Louis Elisée Piguet for Lange & Söhne is illustrated in: Louis Elisée Piguet, Six générations d'horlogers de la Vallée de Joux, Fritz von Osterhausen, 2014, p. 83.

The Archives of Audemars Piguet confirm that the calibre 18SMCRQS movement no. 12'541 of the present hunter case « Grande Complication » watch (minute repeating, split seconds chronograph, perpetual calendar) was put into production in 1908. It was encased in the 18K gold case no. 12'541 with black enamel Greek decoration, finally striped dial with black enamel numerals signed Gübelin Lucerne, blued steel Breguet hands, and sold to Gübelin in 1922 for CHF3,600.

To most people, the mere mention of the name Chrysler immediately conjours up the image of this New York Art Deco masterpiece, the Chrysler Building in Manhattan, and the automobiles that bore his name. Walter P. Chrysler was one of the greatest American entrepreneurs of the 20th century, his name still famous the world over from his involvement in the American car industry. The company he founded still bears his name today – The Chrysler Corporation.

This superb and complicated Audemars Piguet watch was certainly a suitably stylish and impressive gift for a man of Chrysler's stature. It was given to him, as the engraved inscription states, by his friend James C. Brady on 7 June 1922. Brady also had Chrysler's initials "WPC" engraved to the back cover.

Slim complicated watches of this design are among the pinnacles of Audemars Piguet's production.The design of the dial is very pleasing to the eye with prominence given to the calendar functions, the soft sheen of the brushed silvered plate a perfect foil for the rich blue enamel moon phase. The split second chronograph function would have greatly appealed to a man like Walter P. Chrysler, it enables the timing of two events at the same time, for instance two cars racing, and has a 60-minute counter for single events of longer than one minute in duration.

- 5. Months
- 6. Moon phases and age
- 7. Chronograph
- 8. Split seconds function
- 9. Chronograph register

Preserved in very good original overall condition, the rarity is further enhanced by the retailer's signature Gübelin, Audemars Piguet's distinguished retailer in Lucerne.

E. Gübelin was founded in 1854 and has always been a family enterprise. Located in Lucerne, Switzerland, the renowned company has been manufacturing and retailing superior quality watches and clocks ever since. The firm was one of Audemars Piguet's most important clients in the first quarter of the 20th century and watches supplied to them were bearing exclusively the Gübelin signature, such as the present example. This at the time common practice had been agreed by contract, stipulating the omitting of Audemars Piguet's signature, with the exception of the serial numbers.

PROVENANCE:

Walter P. Chrysler (1875-1940)

One of the great American industrialists. Chrysler did not enter the automobile business until he was 36 years old, when he met Charles Nash, president of General Motors. Nash persuaded him to join GM as the manager of the Buick plant in Flint, Michigan. Under Chrysler's leadership, Buick became the strongest unit of General Motors and the most successful automobile brand in the country. Within a year of his resignation from Buick, Chrysler had assumed direction of both the Willys-Overland Company and Maxwell Motor Company. At the time, Maxwell was an ailing company, drowning in debt, Chrysler set about reviving it, introducing the Chrysler Six in January 1924 during the New York Automobile Show. The genius of Chrysler's new car was not only its advanced engine technology and its stylish appearance but its price: under \$2,000, it was priced for average folk. The low-cost car was a hit with the public, and some 32,000 units were built and sold in a single year. Chrysler was named *Time* magazine's 1928 Man of the Year, the same year, the Chrysler Corporation entered the top tier of American automobile makers, alongside General Motors and the Ford Motor Company.

Not content just to build iconic automobiles, Chrysler turned his attention to the erection of an iconic building. Between 1928 and 1930 he supervised the construction of the Chrysler Building, the striking Art Deco skyscraper, 77 stories high, on the corner of Lexington Avenue and 42nd Street in New York City. Until the Empire State Building was completed in 1931, the Chrysler Building was the tallest building in the world. The structure was a separate endeavour from the auto business, designed as a business venture for Chrysler's two sons, who were not interested in joining their father in the car industry.

Chrysler retired as president of his company in 1935, though he stayed on as chairman of the board until his death. In 1937 he published his life story in serial format; these articles were later gathered into an autobiography, *Life of an American Workman* (1950).

James C. Brady (1882-1927)

James Cox Brady, founded the Maxwell Motor Company, later bought by the Chrysler Corporation. As a banker and major investor at the Maxwell Motor Corporation in Michigan, he was very closely involved with Chrysler, Maxwell being the company chosen to launch the first Chrysler car models. The company was ailing when Chrysler took over as director for a four-year period from New York. Under Chrysler's direction the company was turned around. Chrysler's underlying ambition was to take control of Maxwell and make cars only under his own name and the Maxwell Motor Corporation was finally bought by the Chrysler Corporation in June 1925.

Lot 2396 was further accompanied by the stand "Italian Renaissance", ref. 9624, a unique 18K gold, enamel and diamond-set piece.

According to our researches, watch no. 932'117 and stand "Italian Renaissance" made their first public appearance on 7 June 1999 at Antiquorum's Important Jewelry, Watches and Wristwatches auction in Hong Kong, lot 127, with original fitted box, invoice, and "Originally, two watches of this type were purchased by Mr. Moradpour with two different watch holders. According to the invoice and certificate, one of the sets had a watch holder entitled "Lion" with the enamelled scene on the watch depicting a pastoral scene of Patrician life, while the other set had a watch holder entitled "Italian Renaissance" with the enamelled scene on the watch depicting Apollo and Isee. The two watches were subsequently switched at the request of the owner's son who was to receive one of these sets as a gift. Therefore, the set now offered for sale has the "Italian Renaissance" watch holder together with the watch of which the enamelled scene depicts a pastoral scene of Patrician life."

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The whereabouts of the present "Apollon & Issé" watch and "Lion" stand were unknown until May 2018 when consigned for this auction after more than 30 years in the collection of the late Claude Nobs, prominently exhibited in his mythical Chalet "Le Picotin" and admired by the countless famous artists which he entertained after their performances at the Montreux Jazz Festival.

The present dress watch with hand-painted enamel miniature and the finally crafted gold lion are works their own right. These two unique masterpieces exemplify Patek Philippe's savoir-faire not only in finest watchmaking but also in enamelling, jewelling and goldsmithing, all specialities in which the manufacture has always held a prominent position.

The enamel miniature on the present watch is signed by one of Patek Philippe's foremost enamellists, G. Menni, who, along with Suzanne Rohr, was one of the most reputable enamellers in the field. It is after François Boucher's "Apollon révélant sa divinité à la bergère Issé", Musée des Beaux Arts Tours, France.

Working in Geneva in the late 20th century, G. Menni painted several enamel miniatures for Patek Philippe, including famous works such as Canaletto's "Canale Grande" in 1984, Albert Samuel Anker's "The Village School" in 1987, Renoir's "Déjeuner des Canotiers" in 1990, and Picasso's "Seated Harlequin" in 1993. One of the few artists able to perpetuate the supremely exacting art of miniature painting on enamel, in her hands the secret alchemy of the coloured enamels is offering a second life of unequalled depth and finesse to some of the world's greatest art treasures.

For centuries, fine enamelling has decorated and enriched watches, jewellery and objects d'art. Patek Philippe maintains this rare craft of miniature enamelling, traditionally associated with the finest Geneva timepieces, and in many ways the most difficult of the decorative arts. Narrated by Ovid (The Metamorphoses, VI, 124) the story of Apollo in love with the shepherdess Issé became popular in France by the opera created by Destouches in 1697. The Marquise de Pompadour presumably ordered the painting representing her under the features of Issé she played at Versailles in 1749 with the viscount of Rohan in the role of Apollo.

François Boucher (1703-1770)

Trained by his father, a lace designer, Boucher won the Prix de Rome in 1723. He was influenced by the works of Giovanni Battista Tiepolo, Peter Paul Rubens, and his teacher François Le Moyne.

Boucher first became famous with his sensuous and light-hearted mythological paintings and pastoral landscapes. He executed important decorative commissions for the queen at Versailles and for his friend and patron, Mme de Pompadour, at Versailles, Marly, and Bellevue. In 1765 he was named director of the Royal Academy and held the title of first painter to King Louis XV.

During the 1740s and '50s Boucher's elegant and refined but playful style became the hallmark of the court of Louis XV. His work was characterized by the use of delicate colours, gently modelled forms, facile technique, and light-hearted subject matter. Boucher is generally acclaimed as one of the great draftsmen of the 18th century, particularly in his handling of the female nude.

He is also famous for his saying: "La nature est trop verte et mal éclairée" (nature is too green and badly lit).

Reference 3969 Patek Philippe's renowned reference 3969 series was made in a limited edition of 450 examples in pink gold and 50 in platinum to celebrate the company's 150th anniversary in 1989. The model can never be recreated as the firm destroyed the tools that were necessary for making it, hence preserving the limited edition distinctiveness and assuring that it will not be reproduced.

> Reference 3969 is inspired by the jump hour watch originally launched by Patek Philippe in the 1920s. The particularity of a jump hour watch lies in its unusual mechanism and appearance. The hours are indicated by a small disc turning underneath a window. The disc rotates every time the minute hand, set within the centre of the dial, hits the full hour. The tonneaushaped case was a typical design of the 1920s and is currently reliving a du timbre de l'Age nostalgic popularity. othoin

Introduced in 1992 and discontinued in 2007, the reference 5040 was produced in two series, the first series bearing movement numbers beginning in 77, such as the present example. The second series began in approximately 1998 with the movement numbers beginning with 312.

It was available in all gold colours as well as in platinum and is distinguished by its tonneau tortue case, a style typical of the 1920s and 1930s, but much less common in modern times. Tonneau indicates a "barrel" shape (indeed tonneau means barrel in French) with narrow ends and wide center. Tortue (turtle, in French) describes a case with short lugs and rounded corners, resembling the legs of a turtle protruding from the shell. As this term defines a case detail, rather than a case shape, it is normally used in conjunction of the case shape, one can have tonneau tortue, like the present watch, or also carre tortue, cushion tortue, etc.

Reference 3940 is the quintessential perpetual calendar and undeniably amongst Patek Philippe's greatest classics. Launched in 1984 as replacement for reference 3450, it was at the time the slimmest automatic perpetual calendar wristwatch.

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The model was available in yellow, pink and white gold and platinum. The rarest version, the platinum models, were delivered with the plain snap on back only whereas the other case versions were available with both solid and glazed back.

The present ref. 3940 in platinum was purchased by the original owner in 2006 from Patek Philippe's prestigious retailer Sincere Watches in Singapore. Wishing to admire the intricate movement he requested the manufacture of an additional platinum sapphire crystal case back, with platinum. The request was granted and Patek Philippe supplied the especially made second case back now fitted on the watch.

The second glazed display back is fully confirmed in writing by the letter of Patek Philippe's International Customer Service Geneva stating "the adaptation was done in our manufacture in October 2007". In addition, the original Singapore Patek Philippe Service Centre invoice confirms that the watch was sent to Geneva "for installing the crystal case back". The total cost of this was US\$11,340.00.

A further interesting feature that sets the present watch apart is that although it was made towards the end of reference 3940 production it still boasts a second series dial. The main difference being the presence of the two-tone 24-hour sector for day and night, a feature no longer present on third series dials.

Safely kept away and hardly ever used the present 3940P is preserved in excellent overall condition, has never been polished, and is sold with the full set of accessories including the Certificate of Origin and original solid platinum case back. It represents the rare occasion of acquiring one of only two known examples of this model in platinum fitted with a specially made second sapphire crystal case back.

An initial series of around 100 pieces were manufactured between 1984 and 1985, the first 25 were especially made for the 225nd anniversary of Patek Philippe's retailer Chronometrie Beyer in Zurich, numbered and personalized. In 1985, reference 3940 went into standard production. Until the model's discontinuation in 2007 when it was replaced by reference 5140, three series were produced. Reference 3940 has always been regarded as rather a special watch to collectors and certainly a significant reference in the modern history of Patek Philippe. The 3940s reputation is further enhanced by the knowledge that the then head of the company, Philippe Stern, chose to wear the model as his everyday watch.

Reference 3700/11 in stainless steel and gold is one of the rarest variants of this model, the rarity of this example enhanced by Beyer signature: only two other steel and gold references 3700/11 signed by the famous retailer are believed to have appeared in public to date.

The partnership between Patek Philippe and Beyer Chronometrie dates back to the Geneva-based manufacturer's earliest years. It is the longest-standing relationship forged by either company – and, since the Stern family took over Patek Philippe in 1932, one of the most personal: the two have always been connected by more than just business. And so Beyer Chronometrie – and Zurich – was awarded the honour in July 2011 of opening the first (and to-date only) retailer-managed Patek Philippe Boutique in Switzerland.

The Nautilus Water-Resistant Case Ref. 3700/1

The case patent design of the original Nautilus, reference 3700/1 was registered on 23 April 1976. The cases were made for Patek Philippe by Favre-Perret SA, Le Crêt du Locle, from 1976 until 1980 when production was transferred to Patek Philippe's own Ateliers Réunis workshops. In 1980 Patek Philippe launched the manufacture of cases and bracelets in their Ateliers Réunis workshops and the Nautilus changed its reference number to the new ref. 3700-11. The new stainless steel used is called "Chrome-Nickel-Moybdenum steel" and the deployant clasp of the bracelet has been reduced to 16 mm., from 18 mm. of the previous reference.

Beyer Chronometrie Zurich

Since its foundation in 1760, the prestigious firm has always been passed down from father to son, each a fully trained watchmaker. Beyer Chronometrie was the first shop in Switzerland specializing exclusively in watches, clocks and jewellery and has been retailing watches signed Patek Philippe for over 165 years. The firm is currently managed by René Beyer who represents the eight generation of the Beyer family.

The company also owns the renowned Clock and Watch Museum Beyer Zürich, one of the world's most important horological collections. It comprises some 500 pieces dating from 1400 BC to the present day.

The full case has not been subject to careless polishing, the well preserved "Sigma" dial is enhanced by white gold luminous indexes just mellowed to a pleasing hue. The discovery of this watch presents collectors with the increasingly scarce opportunity to own an early and untouched example of this truly landmark reference.

Caliber 28-255 C

Generally agreed to be one of the great watch calibers, it was based on the original Jaeger-LeCoultre caliber 920 of 1967 and regarded as one of the most beautiful and refined automatic movements ever produced. Crucially it is also very thin at only 3.15 mm., therefore highly appropriate for the slim and elegant Nautilus. The development of the caliber 920 was partly jointly financed by Patek Philippe, Audemars Piguet and Vacheron Constantin. Audemars Piguet fitted their version, now the revered caliber 2120 into the Royal Oak, a further shared familial link with the Nautilus. Vacheron Constantin's version became their caliber 1120.

The caliber is 12.5 lignes and has 36 jewels and 19,800 vibrations. It is supplied with the shock-protected free-sprung Gyromax balance with eight rotatable weights allowing rate adjustment without the need for a conventional regulator index. The winding rotor is formed from a beryllium ring with 21K gold rim, this clever design with four additional ruby rollers to support the rotor around its periphery allows the thinness of the movement to remain uncompromised.



The Dials of Nautilus reference 3700/1

Created by Stern Frères, the distinctive striped dials of the Nautiluswere entirely hand-made – each line recess is engraved separately. To achieve the aptly named "gray depth of ocean" colour specified by Patek Philippe the dials were painted alternately black and blue several times and then covered with a protective "Zapon" varnish. Early examples often display a degradation of the varnish so that depending on how a watch has been stored over the years, an individual dial may have tropicalized more towards either blue, gray, chestnut or green.

The indexes and hands are made of gold (sometimes erroneously called "steel" on some Extracts from the archives) and filled with luminescent material. The Patek Philippe signature and the outer minute divisions were painted. Below the 6 o'clock index is the word "Swiss" flanked on each side by the "Aprior" mark of two sigma symbols. The Aprior mark was conferred by the "Association pour la Promotion Industrielle de l'Or" on dials made of solid gold or at least with solid gold indexes.


The Nautilus Waterproof Case Ref. 3700/1

The case patent design of original Nautilus, reference 3700/1 was registered on 23rd April 1976. Made for Patek Philippe by Favre-Perret SA, Le Crét du Locle, from 1976 until 1981 when production was transferred to Patek's own Ateliers Reunis workshops. It comprises two parts, the main body and the bezel, at each side is an "ear" which couples with a corresponding flange, the two parts are secured by lateral screws. A rubber seal sits between the bezel and case body and is thus compressed when subject to water pressure forming a perfect watertight seal. The last three digits of the case number are always stamped on the inside of the bezel. The reference 3700/1 was made in stainless steel, steel and gold, 18K yellow gold, 18K white gold and platinum.





Reference 6239, the very first model of the celebrated "Daytona" series, succeeded reference 6238 and could be found in sales catalogues in Europe as of 1964. The model remained in production until the mid-1970s. Available in stainless steel, 14K and 18K gold, reference 6239 was the firm's first chronograph with the tachometre scale engraved on the bezel and the subsidiary dials printed in a different colour than the main dial for better readability. The dials of the first models featured only the designation "Cosmograph", referring to the outer space travels of the early 60s. The "Daytona" was added shortly after to mark Rolex's sponsorship of the renowned Nascar stock car race.

The property of an important private Italian collector, the present wristwatch is a very attractive example of the rare and desirable Daytona chronograph with Paul Newman dial. With a coveted and well preserved dial, original crystal and the highly reliable Valjoux 722-1 movement, the timepiece features clearly legible serial and reference numbers as well as a case back stamped 6239 to its inside. Today amongst the most coveted timepieces at auction, it is around 1967 that the first Rolex chronographs, such as the present example, were provided with "exotic" dials bearing a new tridimensional graphic layout. Diverting from standard dials, the background of the outer fifths of a second division matches the subsidiary registers, both slightly sunken with regards to the central surface of the dial.

Furthermore, square shaped hour indexes were applied instead of the common baton indexes.

Originally offered to customers as an alternative, "exotic" dials arose to fame once the celebrated actor Paul Newman was seen wearing a Daytona chronograph with such a dial in a publicity shoot for the film *Winning*. Following their discontinuation, Rolex chronographs with "exotic" dials have become undisputed icons in the world of vintage watch collecting and part of the most prized trophies for astute collectors.

Consigned by a descendant of the original owner and preserved in very honest original condition, the present watch is one of the exceedingly rare examples of the very first series "Speedmaster Broad Arrow" 2915-1 to appear in public. Made in 1959, it still retains the original crystal etched with the Omega symbol, original bezel and equally rare 7077 bracelet.

In production for less than three years, the 2915-1 is the most highly prized of all Speedmasters. Also because of its original classification as tool watch – which meant heavy usage and consequently many lost examples – reference 2915-1 is now an astoundingly rare timepiece.

With so few early reference 2915-1 and 2915-2 examples known to the market, particularly retaining the original caliber 321 movement, steel bezel, correct hands and bracelet, this watch presents the increasingly rare opportunity to purchase an extraordinary original 'broad arrow' Speedmaster.

The Omega caliber 321 movement was used for the Speedmaster made between 1957 and 1969 in three distinct generations:

- 1st generation (such as the present watch),1957-1963, distinguished by its arrow-shaped index and symmetrical clutch bridge

- 2nd or transitional generation, 1963-1964, with lozenge-shaped index and symmetrical clutch bridge $% \left({{\left[{{{\rm{S}}_{\rm{s}}} \right]}_{\rm{s}}} \right)$

- 3rd generation, 1964-1969,with lozenge-shaped index and asymmetrical clutch bridge

The bracelet of the present watch is very rare and sought after by collectors today, designated by Omega as reference 7077. It was in production only between 1957 and 1961. The main feature of this first-generation Speedmaster bracelet is the partially expanding double links closest to the clasp and short length clasp cover. With the introduction of the reference 7912 in 1961 the double expanding links were no longer present and the clasp cover is 5 mm. longer than the one of ref. 7077.

The 2915 Omega Speedmaster

Launched in 1957, the celebrated Omega "Speedmaster" was the creation of Pierre Moinat, head of Omega's "creative" department, with the case designed by Claude Baillod and the prototype made by George Hartmann. The watch was originally destined for "men who reckon time in seconds", i.e. automobile racers, athletes, engineers and scientists, the tachymetre scale engraved on the bezel allowing the calculation of speed at a glimpse, hence the name "Speedmaster". As the thought of men on the moon was still in the realm of science fiction at the time, it was only later that it became the "Moon Watch".

Even before its conquest of space, the "Speedmaster" was and still is one of the most iconic watches in production and can be considered the progenitor of the water-resistant sports chronograph. The most important improvement is unquestionably the tachymeter scale on the bezel as opposed to being printed on the dial, hence rendering the dial more legible while simplifying the calculation of speed. In the years to come, this revolutionary feature was incorporated by most other watch manufacturers, notably by Rolex when introducing the "Daytona" in the 1960s.

The original "Speedmaster Broad Arrow" ref. CK 2915 such as the present watch has a 38.5 mm. water-resistant case with engraved steel bezel graduated to 300 km/h, its principle characteristics, the "Broad Arrow" shaped hands, and the calibre 321 movement protected by an anti-magnetic soft iron cap. The dial exhibits some very distinctive features such as the applied metal "Omega" logo as opposed to the printed version, the "Omega" signature in a different font, appearing smaller and thinner, the letters "O" and "G" almost oval in shape, and the simple "Swiss Made" below 6 o'clock, without the "T" designation.

In 1959, the model became ref. 2998, the "Broad Arrow" hands were replaced with "Alpha" hands and the engraved steel bezel by the version with black insert graduated to 500 km/h.

We are honoured to present today one of the most significant Patek Philippe references 2499/100 in existence: the possibly unique example with tachymeter scale dial.

Patek Philippe manufactured less than 100 examples of ref. 2499/100, the fourth and last model of the legendary series, cased mainly in yellow gold. The vast majority of the dials omitted any tachymeter and telemeter scales, standard features of the first and second series.

To date, only three other reference 2499/100 dials with outer scales are known to exist: two with telemeter graduation, the third also with a tachymeter scale, however reconditioned and omitting the "Sigma" symbols to each side of the "Swiss", rendering the present tachymeter example extremely special and possibly unique.

Scholars conclude that these exceptionally few 2499/100 timing scale dials must have been made on special request of their first owners wishing to acquire the series' new model with a dial reminiscent of the early versions. The assumption is emphasized by the fact that hardly any element of these dials is identical to the standard version of ref. 2499/100, or for that matter to the graduation dials of the first and second series.



On the present watch, the most eye-catching is, of course, the tachymeter scale which however shows differences to the scales generally found on first or second series 2499s: whereas the latter generally featured the designation "BASE" or "MILE" and a 1000, 600, 500 etc. calibration, this scale omits any wording but features an additional calibration for 800 meters, rendering it a very unique appearance.

Furthermore, the list of other differences between this dial and the regular version is long, supporting the theory that it was always intended to be a one-off.

The most immediately noticeable of these differences after the unusual tachymeter scale are the following:

-the signature is printed closer to the centre -the font style of the numerals in the counters is different -the minute ring and markers are by necessity narrower -the "Sigma Swiss Sigma" designation is lower. Below the 6 o'clock index is the word "Swiss" flanked on each side by the "Aprior" mark of two sigma symbols. The Aprior mark was conferred by the "Association pour la Promotion Industrielle de l'Or" on dials made of solid gold or at least with solid gold indexes

This possibly unique reference 2499/100 represents the likewise possibly unique opportunity of acquiring one of the rarest and visually different versions of this true Patek Philippe landmark reference.

Reference 2499

Reference 2499, widely acknowledged to be one of the world's greatest watch models ever created, has undoubtedly greatly influenced the design of many of the most renowned watchmakers. Introduced to the market in 1950 it replaced the legendary reference 1518, the world's first perpetual calendar wristwatch with chronograph made in series.

Over a period of 35 years, reference 2499 was made in four series in a total production of only 349 pieces, the majority cased in yellow gold. The cases were made by Wenger, denoted by the number 1 within a key symbol stamped on the inside of the case back, a few of the very last 2499/100s were made by Ateliers Réunis (28 within a key). The rarity of this model becomes evident when considering that an annual average of only 9 of these watches left Patek Philippe's workshops.

Reference 2499 is generally divided into the following four series:

- first series (see lot 234 in this auction): square chronograph buttons, applied Arabic numerals and tachymeter scale

- second series: round chronograph buttons, either applied baton or applied Arabic numerals and tachymeter scale

- third series: round chronograph buttons, applied baton numerals and outer seconds divisions

- fourth series: round chronograph buttons, applied baton numerals, outer seconds divisions and sapphire crystal

A pleasant sighting at auction, vintage chronographs from the 50s have always been appreciated by young and astute collectors. An attractive wristwatch, the present timepiece features a multiscale dial combined within a stainless steel case of 35 mm. diameter.

First named Wyler, the manufacture was known for producing timepieces with components improving the shock resistance or durability of their movements. The name Vetta came to existence during the 1930s, once Wyler started distributing their timepieces in Italy under the name of Wyler Vetta and later decided to shorten it for marketing purposes.

Tracing its history to Paul Wyler, the Basel watchmaker who pioneered the development of watch balances beginning in 1896 and patented the 'Incaflex' in 1927 for shock resistance, the company was also known for inventing the advertising testimonial when Wyler Vetta watches were first seen on the Italian Soccer team in 1934. The manufacture also promoted the durability and resistance of their watches through an advert in the 1950s showing a timepiece being thrown from the top of the Eiffel Tower.

The present chronograph is one of the exceedingly rare Heuer Carrera Skipper ref. 7754 to appear in public to date. Consigned by a private collector and recently serviced in the workshops of TAG Heuer, it is furthermore preserved in very attractive overall condition.



The story of the model begins in 1967 with the American skipper Emil Mosbacher winning the 20th America's Cup on "The Intrepid" with Heuer chronographs on board. To celebrate this victory, Jack Heuer commissioned the Heuer Carrera Skipper ref. 7754, today among Heuer's rarest and most coveted vintage watches. Launched in 1968 it is believed that only 20 examples have ever been made.

Nicknamed "Skipperera" as it is the only Skipper model with the original 35 mm. Carrera case ref. 7753 and the iconic faceted lugs, the most striking design elements of ref. 7754 are the colours, taken from the vivid colours of The Intrepid: a metallic blue dial, mint green subsidiary seconds and the distinctive tri-colour mint green, green and orange 15 minutes count-down register, ensuring optimal legibility and precision necessary for a regatta timer. It mirrors the start of a regatta, when four shots are fired at fifteen minutes intervals. The first three shots are warnings, representing respectively 15, 10 and 5 minutes to the start, the final one indicates the beginning of the race. When the chronograph is activated at the first shot, this subsidiary dial indicates to the crew the exact time left before the beginning of the race. The hand advances with 30 seconds increments, for a more accurate reading.

An important factor for the success of a regatta is the timing and position in relation to competitors when crossing the starting line. To count down the start of a race a series of horns and colourful flags is used in five-minute intervals. The skipper needs a tactical plan and reliable timing instruments to reach the starting line at the precise moment when the horn sounds to start the race. Boats crossing the line too early will be penalised, those crossing it too late begin with a disadvantage.

Ref. 7754 served as inspiration for the limited edition of 125 examples of the 2017 Heuer Carrera Skipper, co-designed by HODINKEE and TAG Heuer to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Emil Mosbacher's victory at America's Cup.

The present original Heuer Carrera Skipper ref. 7754 is an exceedingly rare trophy for watch collectors and sailing aficionados alike.

The present chronograph wristwatch is a well-preserved example of the rare Heuer "Bundeswehr" model.

The Heuer "Bundeswehr" was made between the 1960s and 1980s for the German Air Force, part of the German armed forces or "Bundeswehr" hence the nickname. Another version was also used by the Norwegian Air Force (called the Luftforsvaret").

The model was destined for military and civilian use, the main difference between the two are the military markings on the case back and red "3 H" indication on the dial, which highlights the use of tritium for the numerals and hands. These "Bundeswehr" watches are very functional with an easy-to-read dial, long-stem pushers and crown (so the wearer can set the time and activate the chronograph with gloves easily), and rotating bezel with minute demarcations.

Consigned by a private collector and fresh to the market the present Royal Air Force Mark XI is distinguished by its excellent overall condition.

Manufacture of the Mark XI, one of the most legendary navigator's watches, was launched in 1948, year of production of the present watch. The iconic model was always fitted with IWC's famous hand-wound calibre 89, with or without the hacking feature, and cased in stainless steel, some early versions in chrome-plated brass. The Mark XI is renowned for its timekeeping accuracy, a fundamental specification required by the British Armed Forces. As a result, the watches were regulated in five positions and tested in temperatures ranging from -5 degrees to 46 degrees over a 44 day testing period.

The Mark XI was issued to the B.O.A.C. (British Overseas Airline Company), the Royal Air Force and Commonwealth forces, including South Africa, New Zealand and Australia. The engraved numbers on the back differ depending on service. Dials and military markings also vary but those for military use show a broad arrow, some also the Ministry of Defence specification for Tritium, the encircled T.

The original dial of the Mark XI models featured radium and were replaced in the 1960s by IWC with the less radioactive and consequently safer Tritium version. \$7,300-10,000 €6,200-8,800

The present watch is engraved with Mark XI reference number 6B/346, the "6B" signifying "Flying", the combination of "6B/346" was the watch specification. Number 1538 is the serial number and 48 the year of production.

The present reference 431 is an extremely well-preserved example of this rare pilot's watch, impressing with a superb original dial and crisp case.

In 1940, IWC produced 1200 examples of calibre 52 19^{III} H 6 TSC, numbered 1013801 to 1015000 out of which 1000 examples of this "B-Uhr" or Beobachtungsuhr, observation watch, were made for the German Air Force, following strict specifications regarding accuracy. The cases of these 1000 watches were numbered 1033201 to 1034200 and shipped to IWC's agent Siegfried Heindorf in Berlin. With a diameter of 55 millimetres it is the largest wristwatch ever produced by IWC.

The movements were fitted with an indirect sweep centre mechanism with hacking feature, the balance is stopped and hands can be set while the crown is pulled out to enable pilots and navigators to synchronize their watches with down-to-the-second precision. The large size of the crown allows winding and setting even when wearing gloves. The black dial with clear instrument design, luminous indexes and hands assured legibility even in difficult lighting conditions.

The inside case backs were engraved with the following military markings:

B-Uhr (for Beobachtungs-Uhr or observation watch)

Bauart (manufacturer): I.W.C.

Werk Nr. (movement no.):

Anforderz. FL 23833 (classification number)

As of around 1937, watches used by the German Air Force were engraved with above details. However, to disguise information regarding manufacturer and quantities produced, these indications were coded from 1941 onwards.

The watches were primary tested by the Deutsche Versuchsanstalt für Luftfahrt DVL (German Aviation Research Institute) and classified with a socalled "FI.-Number". The FI. stands for flight and the first two digits, 22, for flight control; 23 stands for navigation and 25 for radio surveillance, followed by the three digits serial number given by the DVL.

The present Stop Seconde chronograph is a very attractive example of an aviator's wristwatch from the first half of the 20th century. The colour of its dial shows that it is undergoing a so-called "tropicalization" process, the black colour already shifting towards an intense dark chocolate hue, the change likely to continue over time. The original dial featured radium and was most likely replaced by Longines to a later date by the present non-luminous and consequently much safer version. The case is in very good condition and impresses with full proportions, the engraved inscription "NAV. 112".

Considering the harsh conditions these watches were subject to during their day to day use it is rare to find such a well-preserved example.

Longines supplied reference 5824, the Stop Seconde chronograph of perfect design for military use, to various armed forces. The large black dial with luminous hands provides excellent readability, the oversized ball-form crown and the chronograph button just above enable pilots to easily use the watch even while wearing gloves. The choice of placing the engraved scale of the revolving bezel on a sloped plane inside the crystal increases its size and thus its readability, and protects it from scratches and impacts.

A similar watch is prominently illustrated and described in Longines Watches by John Goldberger, pp. 138-139. It is interesting to note that it bears a similar "NAV" engraving to the back, and the archival image of the original workbook confirms that it was also originally delivered to the Netherlands. The case patent design of the first Nautilus, reference 3700/1, was registered on 23 April 1976. It comprises two parts, the main body and the bezel, at each side is an "ear" which couples with a corresponding flange, the two parts are secured by lateral screws. A rubber seal sits between the bezel and case body and is thus compressed when subject to water pressure forming a perfect watertight seal. From 1976 until 1980, the cases were made for Patek Philippe by Favre-Perret SA, Le Crêt du Locle.

In 1980, Patek Philippe launched launched the manufacture of cases and bracelets in their Ateliers Réunis workshops and the Nautilus changed its reference number to the new ref. 3700-11.

The new stainless steel used is called "Chrome-Nickel-Moybdenum steel" and the deployant clasp of the bracelet has been reduced to 16 mm., from 18 mm. of the previous reference.

The present Nautilus represents the extremely rare opportunity for collectors to acquire an example of the legendary ref. 3700/11 sold with the duplicata of the Certificate of Origin, the Nautilus cork box and outer packaging, all rarities by themselves. Fresh to the market and preserved in excellent overall condition it was consigned by the descendant of the original owner who, faithful to Patek Philippe's motto, had indeed merely looked after it for the next generation.

The high collectability of this Nautilus is further enhanced by the fact that it was retailed by Beyer in Zurich, one of the longest standing and most revered watch retailers worldwide. The specific Beyer reference number for this watch is finely engraved to the underside of the top left lug.

The partnership between Patek Philippe and Beyer Chronometrie dates back to the Geneva-based manufacturer's earliest years. It is the longest-standing relationship forged by either company – and, since the Stern family took over Patek Philippe in 1932, one of the most personal: the two have always been connected by more than just business. And so Beyer Chronometrie – and Zurich – was awarded the honour in July 2011 of opening the first (and to-date only) retailer-managed Patek Philippe Boutique in Switzerland. A five-strong team ensures that nothing is left to chance in creating an atmosphere of sophistication.

Patek Philippe and Beyer have harboured the desire to jointly operate a boutique in Zurich for many years. Already two generations earlier, Henry Stern and Theodor Beyer had nurtured this dream, which came true in 2011. The Geneva-based manufacture was founded in 1839, and Beyer has been selling these top-quality timepieces since around 1842. The collaboration between the two companies has been very intensive from the start. In 1880, Adelrich Beyer was apprenticed to Patek Philippe and also met his future wife there. In turn, the present-day CEO of Patek Philippe, Thierry Stern, spent time at Beyer to gain some practical experience.

Reference 3700

Reference 3700/1 was equipped with calibre 28-255 C based on a Jaeger-LeCoultre ébauche, the best thin automatic movement at that time. The cases were manufactured by Favre-Perret and they existed in stainless steel, steel and gold, 18K yellow, white gold and platinum, the dials were hand made by the highly skilled Stern Frères creators.

In 1980 Patek Philippe launched the manufacture of cases and bracelets in their Ateliers Réunis workshops and the Nautilus changed its reference number to the new ref. 3700-11. The new stainless steel used is called "Chrome-Nickel-Moybdenum steel" and the deployant clasp of the bracelet has been reduced to 16 mm., from 18 mm. of the previous reference.

Patek Philippe automatic movement caliber 28-255

Another of the many attractions of the *Nautilus* Ref. 3700/1 for the watch aficionado is that from the very beginning it was fitted with what is generally agreed to be one of the great watch calibers - the 28-255. Based on the original Jaeger-LeCoultre caliber 920 of 1967 it is regarded as one of the most beautiful and refined automatic movements ever produced. It is also very thin at only 3.15 mm., therefore highly appropriate for the slim and elegant *Nautilus*. The development of the caliber 920 was partly jointly financed by Patek Philippe, Audemars Piguet and Vacheron Constantin. Audemars Piguet fitted their version, now the revered caliber 2120 into the *Royal Oak*, a further shared familial link with the *Nautilus*. Vacheron Constantin's version became their caliber 1120.

The caliber is 12.5 lignes and has 36 jewels and 19,800 vibrations. It is supplied with the shock-protected free-sprung Gyromax balance with eight rotatable weights allowing rate adjustment without the need for a conventional regulator index. The winding rotor is formed from a beryllium ring with 21K gold rim, this clever design with four additional ruby rollers to support the rotor around its periphery allows the thinness of the movement to remain uncompromised.

In 1981 to coincide with the launch of a new *Nautilus* reference, the mid-size 3800/1A, Patek Philippe introduced its own new slim automatic caliber, the 335 SC with centre seconds feature.

In 1986, Patek Philippe launched a new generation of the perpetual calendar chronograph wristwatch, designated reference 3970, replacing the hugely successful reference 2499 in production in four different series from 1951 to 1985. The main difference in the movement was the arrival of the new Lemania based ébauche which replaced the Valjoux movement used for the previous 50 years.

Starting with movement number 875'000, the first series of reference 3970 was produced with a solid snap on back, comprising approximately 100 examples. The second series introduced a solid screw back, designated reference 3970E (E for étanche, French for waterproof). A small number of watches from both series were also available with a sapphire crystal back, designated reference 3971E.

In 1989, a third series of ref. 3970 was launched, fitted with a solid screw back as well as an additional sapphire crystal display screw back.

Reference 3970 was discontinued in 2004 and replaced by reference 5970.

While production of the reference 3970/3971 may have ended fourteen years ago, these modern yet classic perpetual calendar chronographs have become a must-have for the discerning collector of complicated wristwatches.

The property of a Royal family, the present reference 5131 has never been offered in public before and is furthermore preserved in very good overall condition.

Since its launch, the world time model fitted with the highly attractive cloisonné enamel dial has always been a favourite among collectors of contemporary timepieces.

Reference 5131 is the successor of reference 5130 and shows three notable differences: use of a distinguishable cloisonné enamel dial, the names of the 24 cities are displayed in Italic type and the signature *Patek Philippe* and company location *Genève* are engraved on the bezel. Only two or three enameller artists are able to produce these rare dials and together they can only deliver 30-40 dials of each color every year. In 2012 a special and unique reference 5131 was produced with a view of the Geneva lake, and in 2014 limited editions were produced for much celebrated the *Patek Philippe* 175th Anniversary.

A modern world time wristwatch, the mechanism used harks back to the 1930s when talented Geneva watchmaker Louis Cottier devised it and offered his invention to *Patek Philippe*. Cottier's ingenuity resulted in the company's now classic references 1415 HU and 2523. In 1959, *Patek Philippe* obtained a patent for Cottier's device (Swiss Patent No. 340 191). The company further developed the movement, introducing caliber 240 HU in 1999.

The present ref. 530 is one of the exceedingly few examples of an IWC wristwatch fitted with a cloisonné enamel dial. It can be assumed that it was added upon special request, bearing in mind that this variant was much costlier than the standard gilt or silvered version.

Cloisonné enamel dials are always individual artisan creations, with their unfading brightness and rich lustre the watches with such dials are amongst the most desirable across all brands. The main supplier of cloisonné dials was the celebrated firm of Stern Frères.

Each Stern Frères dial was individually stamped on the reverse with a number code, the first digits are the brand code. For the present dial numbered 61*2521, 61 is the code for IWC and 2521 being this particular stylized flower design.



This superb Neptune cloisonné dial Rolex was first discovered and sold by Christie's in 2011. We are now delighted to be able to give today's most discerning collectors a new opportunity to obtain what is believed to be the only example of a reference 8382 with Neptune cloisonné enamel dial known to exist. As such it is one of the most important "time only" Rolex wristwatches of all, the dial still as beautiful and vibrant as the day it was made over sixty years ago. Watches embellished with a cloisonné enamel dial are amongst the rarest models ever made by Rolex. In total only three Rolex watches, each of a different reference, are known with a cloisonné enamel dial depicting Neptune: the present watch, reference 8382; a reference 6301, illustrated in "100 Superlative Rolex Watches" by John Golberger and a square reference 4645.

Executed for Stern Frères using a solid gold plate decorated by the legendary enamellist Mrs. Nelly Richard, this Rolex "Neptune" is not only preserved in superb condition but also beautifully documented in the archives of Stern Frères. In fact, the reverse of the dial is stamped 103*774 and furthermore hand-scratched Neptune. The first three numbers, 103, are the internal client code for Rolex.







The sales records of Stern Frères, here reproduced, list the dial of the present watch as follows:

3774: this is the job number of Stern Frères. It is most comforting to know that the last three digits of this project code are reproduced on the back of the dial (see first paragraph)

1: quantity of dials ordered/made "Neptune": name of the subject

No. 83: precise drawing job. It is not uncommon that the same drawing was also finished for another manufacturer. Interestingly, job no. 83 was also supplied to Omega

O 31.60: the precise diameter of the dial. Interestingly, several independent measurements confirm the diameter of the present to be precisely 31.60 mm.

midi 132: this indicates what type/style of gold application had to be put at the noon (French midi) position. In this instance, shape 132 is the gold Rolex crown

æ No. 60: this code explains what type of gold numerals are applied at the three, six and nine o'clock positions. In this instance they are elongated, hexagonal facetted batons

8 No. 116: this abbreviation defines the remaining 8 numerals to be applied at the 1, 2, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10 and 11 o'clock positions. Here they are highly unusually double-facetted dagger-shaped hour markers

Stern Frères

Founded in 1868, Stern Frères specialized in the production of highest quality dials including dials decorated with cloisonné enamel scenes which were supplied to eminent watch manufacturers. The highly skilled enamellist Nelly Richard worked for Stern Frères from the late 1940s until the 1950s, she executed the majority of the most famous cloisonné enamel dials of the period featuring Neptune, dragons and maps commissioned not only by Rolex but also by Omega, Patek Philippe, Vacheron Constantin and others.

The production of these solid gold dials was extremely costly as they had to be individually made by a skilled craftsman and not on a production line. The artist created the outline of the desired motif by arranging thin gold wires on a dial. These partitions, called "cloisonné" in French, were filled with small quantities of enamel powder in the desired colour. The dial was then fired in an oven at around 900 degrees Celsius causing the powder to melt. Finally it was hand-polished until a perfectly flat surface was obtained. Hand-made by celebrated enamel artists, notably Nelly Richard and Marguerite Koch, these dials can be regarded as unique works of art in their own right. From research, it appears that the "Neptune" dial was one of the most expensive designs compared to others made at the same period.

Another highly unusual feature of the present watch is its large size and, for Rolex, unusual case design. With a substantial diameter of 37 mm., it is larger in size than its Oyster-cased peers with enamel dials.

Consigned by a lady and fresh to the market, this 1940s pink gold watch is a superb example of one of the most famous and significant watchmaking inventions of the 20th century, Louis Cottier's world time system. Yet at the same time it is an immense rarity and one of the least known versions to collectors, that made by Rolex.

Rolex world time watches are almost unheard of and to the best of our knowledge only three including this example have so far appeared at public auction. The appeal of the present watch is further enhanced by the pink gold case and its charmingly original untouched overall condition.

Furthermore, the dial exhibits a documented classic spelling error on the world city dial, the city of "Istanbul" is misspelled as "Ista**M**bul". It is thought that Rolex had requested their dial maker to correct this mistake in future batches. The present watch is only the second example known publically with the misspelled dial, the other, with case number 1'010'383 – only three numbers away from this watch - was sold in this saleroom on 15 November 2010, lot 112.





The world time or "Heure Universelle" mechanism was invented in 1931 by the celebrated Geneva watchmaker Louis Cottier (1894-1966). The technology was incorporated into watches by several of Switzerland's leading watch firms, including Patek Philippe (ref. 605, 1415, 2523), Vacheron & Constantin (ref. 3372), Agassiz and Rolex (ref. 4262). Cottier further improved the system in 1953 with the ability to adjust the city disk via a secondary crown, this allowed Patek Philippe to eventually patent a system in 1958 where the hour hand could be moved without affecting the regular progression of the minute hand.

Fascinatingly, apart from a handful of exceptionally rare examples such as the present watch, Rolex did not put a world time watch into regular production. These few existing watches dating from the mid-1940s are fitted with an Aegler S.A. 18 jewel chronometer movement with Rolex patented escapement protecting cap, modified on the dial plate side to accommodate the world time system, such as the present example.

Rolex were certainly experimenting with various world time systems as research into their Swiss patents shows. Between 1948 and 1950 Rolex had patented at least three various world time systems including one (Swiss patent no. 273742) with close visual similarities to Cottier's. Quite why Rolex never put any other world time watches into full production can only be conjecture. However, looking at the wider picture, this was a period of experimentation and development of new models within the company, with the focus starting to switch to the robust tool and sports watches for which Rolex has since become synonymous. It was perhaps felt that a world time watch was uncommercial and too expensive to produce and by the early 1950s work on the new GMT-Master may have already begun.


The few world time watches made at this pivotal era in the company's history have now entered the pantheon of Rolex timepieces most desired by collectors.

This model is prominently illustrated (also with the "IstaMbul" misspelling) in the 1946 Jubilee Collection. A rare find at auction, the present Rolex watch is consigned by an Italian private collector. Kept with the upmost care throughout the years, the timepiece features a very attractive two-tone rose sector dial displaying extremely sharp markings and scales. Made in the late thirties, the model was manufactured in extremely scarce number, with an estimated production of 30 pieces in yellow gold, even less with a rose two-tone sector dial. Also known as "aviator" dials, such examples are highly coveted by collectors and superb representatives of the mid-1930s. Made by Stern Frères, the present dial can be considered as a specialty of the Swiss dial maker, requiring an exhaustive amount of labor in order to carefully engrave scales as well as fill them with hard enamel. Evidence of its stellar overall condition, the hard enamel is perfectly preserved enabling the dial to feature very sharp and well-defined scales. The back of the dial furthermore features clear stern production codes 35 42 1.

Widely understood as being part of the most challenging complications to manufacture, the present timepiece features a single button chronograph. While most chronographs require two buttons in order to operate the start, stop and reset function, the present watch controls the chronograph complication through only one button integrated into the winding crown.

The present reference 6090 is a fine representative of the so-called "Bombé" family, French for "domed", referring to the unusual shape of the finely sculpted lugs.

It is one of the exceedingly rare examples fitted with a charismatic black lacquer dial enhanced by the much sought-after star-shaped indexes. In fact, to date only one other ref. 6090 with this configuration is believed to have appeared at public auction, however cased in 14K, sold in this saleroom on 11 November 2013, lot 346. Although Rolex used a variety of dial manufacturers in the 1950s, dials featuring star numerals were exclusively supplied by Stern Frères. Two different versions were available, one with luminous dots placed next to the stars, such as the present example, the second with the luminous material to the inside of the stars.

Each dial was individually stamped with a number code and Stern Frères star symbol. The present dial is stamped 103*989 2, the number 103 being the Stern Frères code for Rolex, 989 referring to the dial type and 2 indicating that it is the second example of this particular dial made.

The present ref. 6090 was submitted to Rolex Geneva in 2018, an estimate for a vintage restoration was obtained but refused by its owner.

Stern Frères

Founded in 1898 in Geneva by Henri Stern and his wife Louise, the company soon distinguished itself as a superior dial maker. By the mid-1950s, the company was unanimously considered the best dial maker in the market. Over the years the firm supplied prominent manufacturers such as Patek Philippe, Rolex, Longines, Breguet, Cartier, Vacheron Constantin, Omega and IWC, to name but a few.

Launched in 1956, the Rolex Oyster Perpetual Day-Date quickly became one of the firm's most popular timepieces. The manufacture's first self-winding waterproof wristwatch to display the date and day of the week, the model became the manufacture's playground with a wide array of variants produced with diverse case materials and dials.

Produced from 1959, the reference 1803 can be widely considered as the most successful and enduring reference of the Day-Date. The model was crafted with a more refined case and a fluted bezel. 
Reference 6239, the very first model of the celebrated "Daytona" series, succeeded reference 6238 and could be found in sales catalogues in Europe as of 1964. The model remained in production until the mid-1970s. Available in stainless steel, 14K and 18K gold, reference 6239 was the firm's first chronograph with the tachometer scale engraved on the bezel and the subsidiary dials printed in a different colour than the main dial for better readability. The dials of the first models featured only the designation "Cosmograph", referring to the outer space travels of the early 60s.

The "Daytona" was added shortly after to mark Rolex's sponsorship of the renowned Nascar stock car race. The so-called "exotic" or "tropical" dial, later surnamed "Paul Newman", became available soon for reference 6239, either two-coloured white/cream and black or three-coloured, with the addition of the red seconds scales.

Few watches elicit as much excitement from collectors today as a completely fresh to the market reference 6263 Paul Newman "Panda". This extremely impressive watch was bought new by the original owner in Geneva around 1969/70 and has since always been in the same family until offered here for the first time.

In June 2018, after almost 50 years of use, it was extensively revised and serviced by the prestigious firm of Bucherer in Bern. A full schedule of the completed works accompanies the watch. Crucially, the dial was preserved and some of the replaced original parts were retained and have now been reinstated so that the charm and originality of the correct period appearance for the reference can be enjoyed once again.

With a monochromatic black and white palette, the "Panda" Paul Newman Rolex Oyster Cosmograph reference 6263 is considered the ultimate vintage Cosmograph model. Its water-resistant case with screw down chronograph pushers and black bezel is combined with what is generally agreed to be among the most beautiful dials ever created for a wristwatch. It is unquestionably one of the ultimate goals for the Rolex collector.

The present watch is elevated to a higher level due to its very rare Mk 1 dial. Paul Newman "Panda" dials with Mk 1 script are amongst the rarest gems in the world of vintage watch collecting and are set apart from their contemporaries.

The Mk I dials were originally intended for the reference 6240 and can therefore only be found on the early production of references 6263 and 6265. The Mk I is distinguishable by the very different font type for the "R" of Rolex which is wider and "fatter", the "G" in COSMOGRAPH has a serif and shorter inward return and the "H" is more pronouncedly asymmetric.

Complementing the overall importance of the present timepiece, the stainless steel case by C.R. Spillmann S.A. features the very rare Mk 1 pushers, highly sought-after by the most astute collectors and often replaced during services. The Mk 1 type pushers were quickly superseded by the 24-P301 version.

The case back stamped 6239 is also entirely correct for this very early examples of the reference, and confirms yet again the already well known theory that Rolex were using up the leftover case backs of the reference 6239 and 6241 for the new model. Furthermore, the bracelet is the correct 7835 folded-link Oyster bracelet with matching 271 end links.

The present watch represents an extremely rare opportunity for collectors to acquire the most coveted reference of manual Rolex Daytona.









Reference 6263

Sporting a black bezel and screw down pushers, it inherits the legacy of reference 6240, the first of the screw down pusher Daytonas, also sporting a black bezel. The similarity is obvious, the differences much less so. As a matter of fact, however, the case design of reference 6263 is slightly bigger, and the movement is the new calibre 727, whilst reference 6240 is usually fitted with the older calibre 722 (even though early examples are known with the earlier 72B calibre, and late ones with cal. 722-1). The defining feature of both references is undeniably the presence of the screw down pushers, which make the entire watch look bigger, more sporting and masculine.



The meteorite itself is millions of years old and believed to have fallen to earth in prehistoric times and spread over a wide area. Today, this historical deposit is protected by Namibian law.

In their use of this rare and very exclusive meteorite deposit to make the dials for a series of Daytona watches Rolex again demonstrate their innovation and constant quest to produce rare and exclusive luxury timepieces.

The present watch is a fine and very well preserved example of a "Mystérieuse" watch. It is furthermore believed to be one of only around 10 known to date with gold cases as opposed to the more commonly found silver version.

Patented by Armand Schwob & Frère in Paris on 24 January 1889, the "mystérieuse" or "mystery" watches were built on the principle invented by Robert-Houdin for clocks: the watch appears to work without any mechanical movement, the hands without any apparent means of connection. In fact it is driven by the crescent-shaped movement concealed above the dial in the border, the hands attached to and revolving along with the glass plates.

Probably intended for the Chinese market, several watches of this model are known with the additional signature of the retailer J. Ullmann of Hong Kong and Shanghai.

The present watch is a rare form of a quarter repeating automaton in which figures appear to strike the hours when the repeating is activated while being concealed during normal timekeeping. It shows a representation of Pulcinella combatting the Hangman, derived from the Greek God Chronos, based on the famous 16th century personage of Italy's Commedia dell'Arte, known in many countries under different names such as "Mr. Punch", "Polichinelle" or "Kasperl"

The repertory of Pulcinella's 'descendants' corresponds in broad outlines with that of their forefather: the protagonist fights with the beast (monstrous dog or crocodile), he has to combat the Death, he is confronted with the hangman and the gallows, but always triumphs over his opponents.

Jaquemarts have a long tradition and figure already in the first edition of the French National Academy's dictionary, which appeared in 1694, with the following definition:

A comparable example of this rare automaton was in the Ed. Gélis collection in Paris and is illustrated and described in: Le Monde des Automates, Chapuis et Gélis, 1928, p. 34, fig. 295.

A visually appealing and very well preserved example of mid-19th century Swiss watchmaking, the present timepiece is an early and technically interesting two time zone watch with stoppable jumping centre seconds and flying 1/5ths of a second indications.

Unlike the majority of similar watches fitted with two wheel trains, the mechanism of this unusual dual time zone watch essentially has only one wheel train driving a set of motion work for both dials. The hands on both dials are each adjusted by an individual arbour accessed via the cuvette. In this sense the watch is a true dual time zone watch as it has two independent time displays sharing the same mechanism.

The two time zones function of this watch is indeed a highly unusual feature as, when it was manufactured around 1850, the establishment of time zones was still in its early years. On 1 November 1884, during the International Meridian Conference in Washington D.C., it was agreed to establish international zones according to the same system. GMT, Greenwich Mean Time, was considered the "time zero" and the twenty-four standard meridians marked the centres of the zones. The International Dateline was placed along the 180-degree meridian in the Pacific Ocean. Around the world, clocks were reset to adapt to the new system of timekeeping.

Courvoisier Frères, La Chaux-de-Fonds, previously Courvoisier & Cie. successors to Robert & Courvoisier, were a famous Swiss watchmaking firm run by the brothers Henri-Louis and Philippe Auguste Courvoisier from 1842 to 1852. Specialising in high quality watches, they were commissioned by the city of La Chaux-de-Fonds to manufacture a watch for the Prussian King William IV.

This fine and highly attractive watch is by one of the greatest watchmakers of the 18th century and would have been considered absolutely avant-garde when it was made in the years immediately preceding the French Revolution. It is a prime example of the work of Jean-Antoine Lepine (1720-1814) watchmaker to Louis XV, Louis XVI and Napoleon Bonaparte, and exhibits several of his most notable horological inventions. The inscription "Invenit et Fecit" refers to the revolutionary movement design, known today as "Lepine caliber" which employes bridges in place of a full plate covering the entire mechanism, as well as to the standing mainspring barrel and improved repetition system. It also includes the highly individualistic dial design, his invention of concealed hinges, as well as the "secret" back cover opening mechanism.

The movement of this watch illustrates all the characteristics associated with Lepine's work. According to research, Lepine made his first watches with wolf's-tooth trains in 1771, but it was mainly between 1787 and 1789 that he used this train for watches numbered between 5200 and 5711.

Perhaps the feature that immediately catches the eye when examining the present watch is the stunning and curious way the numerals are arranged with a complete mixture of both Arabic and Roman numerals. This dial arrangement appears to be unique to Lepine and is only seen on some of his watches made between 1788 and 1790. No explanation has been found as to the reason for the production of these dials other than the fact that Lepine was obsessed with aesthetics and indeed these dials are a hypersophisticated creation. Lepine was in fact the first maker to use Arabic numerals on dials for the hours as well as for the minutes and the first horologist to have concentrated on aesthetic design, in the modern sense of the word, on watches. This was continued by Brequet.

Until recently, this possibly unique and technically important watch was known only from the archive description. Having descended within the family of its original owner, the 2nd Earl of Lucan, it is offered here at auction for the first time.

Constructed with several of Breguet's greatest technical innovations, the present watch can be regarded as being amongst the finest to have been produced in the master's workshops. Descended from the original aristocratic owner, it affords the serious connoisseur the opportunity to obtain a completely fresh to the market example of a great horological rarity by the legendary Abraham-Louis Breguet.

The Breguet Archives confirm that watch number 3105, a gold minute repeater with cuvette engraved with the equation of time, was sold to Lord Lucan and collected by his son Lord Bingham on 17th August 1819. It is a matter of conjecture as to whether it was being collected by Lord Bingham on behalf of his father or if it was intended as a gift to Lord Bingham from him.

Breguet number 3105 displays the very finest workmanship and would have been both time consuming and very difficult to construct. Subsequently it was very expensive, selling to Lord Lucan in 1819 for 4,800 Francs and thereby ranking amongst Breguet's most costly watches of the period, the equivalent of a small fortune at the time. The price reflected not only the difficulty in making the minute repeating mechanism but also the high cost of producing watches with lever escapements, a category of watches described in the Breguet Archives as being *"sur les principes des chronomètres"* (constructed on the principles of the chronometers) to distinguish their superior qualities such as high-precision balance and full jewelling in addition to the lever escapement.

Minute repeating watches by Breguet are exceedingly prestigious, almost all his minute repeaters apart from a very few examples including the present watch are *perpetuelles*. After 1810 virtually all other Breguet repeating watches are either quarter or half-quarter repeating.

Indeed, the present watch would appear to be the only known example of a minute repeater watch constructed on the principles of the *garde-temps* with repeating effected by a combination of both à *toc* and gong.







This minute repeating system is particularly unusual in that it uses both à *toc* and a gong to transmit the sound. The purpose of this system was to allow an audible distinction between the hours and quarters and the minutes, this was before the production of gongs with different tones had been perfected. The system is mentioned by George Daniels in *The Art of Breguet*, 1975, p. 66, and one other example incorporating this type of minute repeating (watch no. 2246) is illustrated on page 210.

The construction used for the hammer to strike the gong in this watch is Breguet's most sophisticated, when the repeating is activated the hammer does not make direct contact with the coiled gong. Placed between the hammer and gong is an intermediary solid hammer fixed to the plate by screws, the primary hammer in fact makes contact with the fixed hammer which in turn strike the gong. This system was developed by Michel Weber, Breguet's chief craftsman in June 1793 and was intended to improve the sound of the gong. Breguet said "we will equip all our best watches with this system in future".

The movement is fitted with Breguet's final form of the lever escapement made from 1812 onwards, developed to enable him to produce a reliable watch with a close rate for everyday wear. The balance is made of laminae of steel and a special silver/copper alloy which was apparently invented by Breguet and employed in only his best watches including the *perpetuelles*. It is evident that the style and design of the movement layout is a development of his early minute repeating movements of 1795-1800 with full plate and separate bridge for the spring barrel.

The construction of the silver dial is also worthy of note being a "three-piece" type whereby the subsidiary seconds ring and power reserve sector scale are made as separate parts secured to the main dial by blued steel screws from the reverse.

A feature found in a number of Breguet's repeaters is the jump hour. The hand stands stationary until about three minutes to the hour when it begins to move. By the time it is half way to the next hour the minute hand will be at the hour and the hour hand will jump the remaining distance to the hour.

Directly comparable but with several important differences is Breguet number 3104, immediately preceding the present watch. It is also minute repeating and was originally sold to the Infante of Spain in 1818 for 2980 Francs. That watch, rediscovered in 2015 and sold at auction the same year for CHF195,000. It has a similarly designed movement with separate barrel bridge, however, unlike the present watch it is fitted only with a cylinder escapement and the typical two-gong form of minute repeating.

The present watch, number 3105, is not only equipped with the most unusual form of minute repeating it also possesses Breguet's prized lever escapement and high-precision balance, explaining its considerably higher original purchase price in 1819 of 4800 francs.

PROVENANCE:

Richard Bingham, 2nd Earl of Lucan (4 December 1764 – 30 June 1839), was an Irish peer and Tory politician. He entered the House of Commons as MP for St. Albans in 1790, representing the constituency until 1800. After the Act of Union in the following year, he sat in the House of Lords from 1802 until his death in 1839.

Field Marshal George Charles Bingham, 3rd Earl of Lucan, GCB (16 April 1800 – 10 November 1888), styled Lord Bingham before 1839, was an aristocrat and British Army officer. He was one of three men including Lord Raglan, responsible for the fateful order during the Battle of Balaclava in October 1854 that led to fateful Charge of the Light Brigade. Lord Lucan also came up with a solution that allowed Jews to sit in Parliament. He was subsequently promoted to field marshal. The following four lots, 173 to 176, represent an exceedingly rare selection of early timepieces made by Patek & Czapek, Geneva, and Czapek & Cie., Geneva, narrating the relationship between two of the world's leading horologists. The historical and technical characteristics of the pieces render them worthy additions to even the most exalted collection.

Introduction¹

Not much is known about Antoni Norbert Patek's ancestors. However, a Patek ancestor, from the Polish nobility was mentioned in 1790. In 1830 Patek joined the Polish rebellion against Russian domination. He was a brave and intelligent soldier and rose quickly within the ranks, eventually winning the highest military order "Virituti Militari".

When the war ended, Patek was forced to leave the country. General Bem, the commander-in-chief, sent the young man first to Bamberg, Germany and later to France². In France, he became an officer of the "Holy Battalion", a regiment of Polish émigrés on French soil who set out to aid the Frankfurt insurrection. On 9-10 April 1833, Patek's journey ended unexpectedly - upon crossing the Swiss border, the regiment learned that the uprising had collapsed, they consequently remained in Switzerland, where they were warmly welcomed. The regiment formed the "Association of Polish Émigrés in Switzerland", who mostly found work with Swiss farmers and a few dozen learned watchmaking³.

Patek, however, did neither. His artistic aspirations led him to begin studying with Alexandre Calame, the famous Swiss landscape artist, best known for his Alpine scenes. By 1835, possibly concurrently with his study of art, Patek bought his first watch movements, had them cased, and sold the completed watches⁴ to Polish clients. There is only one such watch from that period known to survive⁵.

Patek's charm and good manners helped him gain the support of an influential Polish clientele. His buying and selling business⁶ was growing and he decided to form a watch company. Not being a watchmaker though, he needed a proficient partner in the field: this was Franciszek Czapek.

Patek Et Czapek

On May 1, 1839 in Geneva, Patek and Franciszek Czapek established a business under the name of "Patek & Czapek" with Mr. Moreau as a silent partner (see Czapek's biography for details, lot 176 in this auction). Czapek, a professional watchmaker, was also a soldier in the Polish National Guard⁷.

Moreau and Patek each invested 8,000 Swiss francs in the company, Moreau held no official responsibilities, while Patek was responsible for the accounting and management. Czapek, who contributed tools and most likely some early machinery, was responsible for the production.

During the first 14 months Patek and Czapek ran the company alone. They purchased unfinished movements from various companies specialized in the manufacturing of raw movements (ebauches), they then sent them to a case maker, and finished them in their shop. Up until July of 1840 Czapek finished all movements by himself. The company then hired one or two watchmakers to speed up the finishing process and to help cope with the delays, a problem they apparently faced in 1840. As Patek put it: "…. I insisted that until July 1 [1940] all watches to be finished by Czapek himself, it lowered the expenses. The business improving, two months ago (July, 1840), I increased the number of craftsmen..."⁸

The Polish Connection

As Patek himself stated⁹, the majority of their clientele was Polish. In the early years, the support of the Polish community was vital for the company's survival. As émigrés, without that support and without financial backing, they would not have been able to overcome the fierce local competition. Patek's growing ties with Poland and the Polish clientele became the basis of his business. In a letter to Princess Czartoryska, he wrote, "... recommend us, we can satisfy those coming to our national Polish manufactory, which one day we will move to our Motherland"¹⁰.

Perhaps if Poland had gained independence sooner, we would be collecting watches signed "Patek Philippe, Warsaw", today ...

The company's profits were very much dependent on Polish connections. In 1844 Patek wrote: "Our manufactory goes less well than in former years, because only very few of our people [Poles] are coming here"¹¹.

Although Patek was a shrewd businessman with a strong sense for marketing, the business was not going so well financially. Recognizing that quick action needed to be taken, in 1844, Patek and Czapek participating in the Paris Products of Industry Exhibition met Adrien Philippe, who received a gold medal for his keyless winding watches¹². Patek, producer of 42 keyless watches¹³ made from rather complicated Audemars ebauches, was immediately interested by Philippe's new invention. What's more, he had the foresight to recognize this as his passport to a worldwide clientele. Patek and Czapek parted their ways, Philippe joined Patek and the rest is history.

\$47,000-67,000 €40,000-57,000 The most surprising feature of the present watch is its size, 25.6 mm, slightly more than the American nickel illustrated next to it. To the best of our knowledge there is no other known Patek & Czapek as small.

At the time it took Antoine Norbert de Patek five years to make a similar one. He made it when he was already with a new partner, Adrien Philippe (now in the Patek Philippe Museum). The present watch was so remarkable that Czapek, who finished it himself, scratched his name on the reverse of the dial, making sure that the posterity will know who was responsible for such a marvel (fig. 1). The front is engraved with a winged cherub's head surmounted by seven stars within foliage and scrolls. The mystery of the seven stars is explained by Jesus Christ himself in Revelation 1:20 relayed by Saint John, "The mystery of the seven stars... The seven stars are the angels of the seven churches...". The seven brightest stars have been associated with angels who guard the most important seven early Christian churches (fig. 2). The winged cherub on the dial (fig. 3) represents them and guards the owner of the watch.

The high relief of the case decoration found in this watch is equally rare for Patek watches. Very few of them are known and the present is believed to be the earliest one. The next known Patek Philippe watch with high-relief decoration, no. 3925, was made nine years later, in 1850, when the company had already changed its name to Patek, Philippe & Co. (now in the Patek Philippe Museum).

The present back cover is decorated in high relief with allegorical flower stem that begins with acanthus and ends with Lilies of the valley. The Lilies of the valley (the tears of Virgin Mary pouring out while she was witnessing the crucifixion) - symbolize humility – a self-restrain, distancing oneself from vanity¹. The acanthus has been an allegory of immortality and a long life. The longevity's allegorical element is enforced by a surprising part of the watch – the setting of the gemstones on the case back - which are finished as snake heads (fig. 5 & 6), another symbol of immortality, rebirth and healing.

The case is in an excellent condition, the lift spring works well, the covers are tight, and the definition of the coin edge and decoration is high.

The 10 lignes movement with a diameter of 22.56 mm. is stamped with the serial number 489 and Patek & Czapek's trade mark "P, C" (fig. 4). It is in excellent condition and keeps reasonable time.

To truly appreciate the small size of the watch one needs to understand the degree of difficulty with making a small watch versus a larger one.

In the early 1830s, when Breguet began making small, time-only watches, the company priced them between 3000 and 4000 francs. For that money one could have bought a large, heavy gold watch combining repetition, alarm and calendar, as for instance, No. 3524 of 23 lignes sold in March 1833 for 3000 francs².

Only the wealthiest could have afforded these small watches. The list of buyers of those miniature marvels from Breguet matches the "Who is Who" of the European 19th century including Queen Victoria, Infante d'Espagne, Comte Fersen, Comte Potocki, Baron Schickler, Count Demidoff, etc.

COMPARABLE OBJECTS

A comparative analysis of similar watches cannot be done because no other watch like this one is known. The closest watches that appeared on the market are the small Breguet timepieces mentioned above. For instance, Breguet No. 7, a small watch in a gold case from 1835, was auctioned in Geneva in 1991 for 180,000CHF3.

Another small Breguet, No. 5012, from 1833, was sold by Christie's, New York on 26 October 1987, lot 432, for US\$44,000. That was at the time when a Patek Philippe minute repeating split seconds chronograph sold for US\$7,700. The same watch today costs around US\$30,000. Extrapolating, the watch today would be worth around US\$170,000. There are at least six of these small Breguet pieces known, but there is only one watch as small from the earliest period of Patek Philippe's history, it is the present example.

CONCLUSION

Patek Philippe & Co., one of the two most important watch companies in existence, considers itself a natural continuation of Patek & Czapek's company⁴. Its early watches are extremely rare, only 48 are known to have survive, including the present⁵. It is unique for the high relief decoration, unknown in any other, it is unique for its allegorical significance, also not known in early Patek watches, the excellent condition and especially for the unique small size, the smallest known Patek from the earliest period of the firm's history.

PATEK & CZAPEK. AN HISTORICALLY IMPORTANT 18K GOLD OPENFACE CYLINDER WATCH WITH AN ENGRAVING OF SPECIAL SIGNIFICANCE

The present watch appears to be the only existing timepiece made by Patek et Czapek embellished with an engraved scene taken from a drawing owned by Patek Philippe in Geneva⁵. The drawing is by François le Villain and depicts the dethronement of Tsar Nicholas I of Russia by the Polish Senate in 1831. It bears the stamp "Patek et Czapek Fque d'Horlogerie à Genève" (fig. 1).

The inside of the back cover is engraved with a Polish inscription (fig. 2) translating to:

To Klemens Dwenicki⁶ 29 November 1844 Godfather Jan Ledochowski

Klemens Dwernicki⁷ (1841 - ?) was the son of the Polish general Józef Dwernicki (1779-1857) and his second wife Alina de Broc. The general and Jan Ledochowski (1791-1864, member of parliament in Warsaw from 1825 to 1831), were not only friends but both were members of the Polish senate which dethronized Tsar Nicholas I in 1831. Both are depicted on the back of the watch.

It is a remarkable story to discover an early watch by Patek Philippe with the decorative inspiration still hanging on the firm's wall. The remarkability is further enhanced by a puzzle which the receiver of the watch must have tried to solve, a puzzle clearly intended by Ledochowski for his godson: which one, among the dozens of people depicted in the scene, was his father and which one was his godfather?

THE DIAL

At the time, the majority of Patek & Czapek dials were made of silver with champlevé Roman numerals. Enamel dials existed, for instance in No. 161, but were quite rare. They were often ordered from Chenevard who charged less than 10CHF. The hands were almost always Breguet in style, made mostly in steel, as in this watch, but also in gold. They were bought in bulk and installed by Czapek or one of his helpers.

THE MOVEMENT

The movement is of fire-gilded brass with cylinder escapement, key wound and key set. The company used this ébauche often and purchased it from Deloche, Louis Audemars, or Piguet Frères. Their cost was around 20CHF.

THE CASE

The case is of 18K yellow gold with hinged cuvette and an engraved back cover. The company, at the time, used different casemakers, such as Chappuis or Oltramare. Some marked their cases with their trademarks, usually in a form of their initials, while some did not. The cost of the case was the most expensive singular item in the production of time-only watches but it would cost less than 100CHF for a watch like that.











THE DECORATION

When the case was ready it was to be decorated. This could have had many forms, one of which was engraving. The company at the time had very strong Polish connections. In a letter to Princess Czartoryska, Patek wrote:

"...recommend us, we can satisfy those coming to our national Polish manufactory, which one day we will move to our Motherland".¹

In an outward sign of these ties, the shop was decorated with Polish engravings and paintings, some of which served as inspirations for the engravings on the backs of watch cases. The vast majority of these engravings were dispersed over the years². There were not many that were left in the company³. Therefore, we do not know what art hanging on the company's walls inspired Patek and Czapek for their cases.

One of the surviving engravings in the Patek Philippe archives is by François le Villian depicting dethronement of Tsar Nicholas I of Russia by the Polish Senate. It is marked with Patek et Czapek's stamp. This engraving was the inspiration for the decoration of this watch. The engraving of the case, most likely, was entrusted to Markowski, whom Patek and Czapek often used for this type of decoration⁴.

Dethronement of Tsar Nicholas I

In 1815 the Congress of Vienna, convened after the defeat of Napoleon Bonaparte, decided to create a Kingdom of Poland. Through the person of the Tsar, it was joined in a personal union with Russia. The Tsar and King in a single person, Alexander I, guaranteed the new Kingdom its own constitution, along with a separate government, Sejm (parliament), army, and treasury. However, the Tsar soon began to suppress the freedoms awarded to the Polish people. Nor did his younger brother and successor, Nicholas I, crowned King of Poland in 1828, intend to honour those freedoms. These developments led to an insurrection that broke out on 29 November 1830 - the November Uprising. Because the initiative to launch the November Uprising came from the milieu of officer cadets of the Kingdom of Poland's army and was ill-prepared politically, during the first phase of the Uprising power was held by people connected with the existing regime who saw no chance for success in the clash with Russia. Thus, they endeavored to resolve the conflict through negotiations with Tsar Nicholas I and thereby to extinguish the Uprising.

Influenced by the radical patriotic sentiments sweeping the streets of Warsaw, the deputies to the Sejm resolved unanimously on 25 January 1831 to remove Nicholas I from the throne of Poland. This was tantamount to severing the personal union between the Russian Empire and Poland, declaring the Kingdom's independence, and continuing the war against Russia. All the attempts made by the Uprising's interim authorities in December 1830 to agree terms with Russia thus came to naught.

Following the collapse of the November Uprising, the act on dethronement was whisked away to France and safeguarded there from the Russians, who sought to obtain and destroy it.



\$26,000-36,000 €23,000-31,000 Watch no. 3277 is an exceedingly rare example of a "Demi-Chronometer" made by Czapek. It is thought that only four other watches with this designation are known to exist to date, no. 3395 sold to Emperor Napoleon III, nos. 3583, 5011, and 5077.

From this series the present watch is the earliest high quality Czapek known giving us a rare opportunity to track his progress in developing his precision timekeeping. It also allows us to have a glimpse into his watchmaking abilities and judge his role in his previous partnership with Antoine Nobert de Patek. One might ask how much credit should be given to Czapek for it.

No. 3277 is furthermore the only known watch made by Czapek fitted with a personalized dial, rendering it an extraordinarily rare timepiece.

The movement

High quality isochronous calibrated lever escapement, exposed ruby pallets and mustache-shaped fork's tail (fig. 1), temperature-compensating bimetallic balance with gold adjustment screws and Breguet balance spring, Audemars' all-or-nothing type repeating mechanism activated by a slide at 2 o'clock, Geneva stop-work to prevent overwinding. The train has 19 ruby jewels and the entire escapement is jeweled and capped - each arbor is mounted in two jewels with holes and two flat ones. All of the latter are components of exceptionally high quality and finish.

To make sure that this is understood, Czapek engraved the cuvette "PÓŁ-CHRONOMETR" meaning "DEMI CHRONOMETER" which indicates the highest quality.

It is stamped with Czapek's trademark both outside (fig. 2) as well as under the dial (fig. 3). Additionally, it bears the watch serial number matching the serial number of the case.

The dial

Instead of the standard numerals 1-12, the dial has Gothic letters spelling: JÓZEF SZEMIOT, the person who has ordered the watch. It was handpainted which is clearly shown by comparing the differences between the "E" in "JÓZEF" and the "E" in "SZEMIOT".

It is secured to the movement by two screws at the 12 and the 6. At the time it was a typical dial fixing solution for Czapek, as well as for his first partner, Antoine Norbert de Patek.

Personalized dials by Czapek, as well as by Patek, are very rare. It appears that this is the only one made by Czapek known. Very few were made by Antoine Norbert de Patek, numbers 25'586, 90'035, 97'950, 134'352, and one more¹.

The Case

Engine turned, made by Etienne Piguet, a Geneva master casemaker listed as *Monteur de boites en or*², owner's coat-of-arms in high relief on the back cover (fig. 4).

Czapek & Cie.

The importance of Frantisek or François Czapek in the world of horology lies in the fact that he was the first partner of Antoine Norbert de Patek, founder of what was to become Patek, Philippe & Cie. However, there is more to it than meets the eye. As Patek stated himself, it was Czapek who first established the watch business and Patek then joined him on 1 May 1839³.

In 1838 or early 1839 Antoine Patek, in an application for a permanent visa, stated to the Geneva police that he was interested in joining the company of Czapek & Moreau⁴. Monsieur Moreau was a French watchmaker who had settled in Versoix, near Geneva. Czapek, who got married on 22 October 1836 in Versoix, lived with his wife in Moreau's house and also worked with him.

Moreau didn't have children and took care of his, quite attractive, niece Marie-Adelaide Thomasine. Patek, who also lived in Versoix, knew Czapek and consequently Moreau. All in all, Marie-Adelaide became Patek's wife and Moreau & Czapek became Patek & Czapek with Moreau as a silent partner.

Franciszek Czapek was born in Bohemia in 1811 but grew up in Poland. He participated in the Polish uprising of 1830 (see lot 174 for details) as a soldier of the Polish National Guard in Warsaw. After the end of the uprising he escaped to Switzerland. By 1836 Czapek was already a well experienced watchmaker⁵.

Provenance

The Princes Szemiot is an old Russian family. The owner of the watch was from a branch that settled in the north-western part of Poland, near the Russian boarder, and, in time, Polonized completely.

Józef Szemiot, who ordered this watch, was born around 1820. His father, Tadeusz Szemiot was a marshal of Szawelski, a position Józef was also awarded. During the war with Russia (January uprising 1863-65) Józef was a captain in the Polish Army fighting Russians. He died in 1864 in a forest battle near Bronkowice. The watch was, most likely, with him.



After parting with Patek in 1845 where, in addition to his share of the profit he was paid 100 Swiss Francs per month⁶, he established his own business Czapek & Cie. with financial backing from Juliusz Gruzewski, his new partner. The latter was not only a hero of the 1830 Insurrection but was also actively involved in the Polish independence movement. In 1863 his loyalty earned him the position of an official agent of the Polish National Government in Switzerland, with responsibility for arms purchases and their transport to Poland⁷. His ties with Polish emigres as well as with wealthy Poles in Poland must have been far-reaching. In addition, he was a personal friend of Napoleon III and secured a position for Czapek as a watchmaker to the Emperor⁸. Czapek had a factory in Geneva⁹, a shop in Warsaw¹⁰, and another in Paris¹¹. He sold watches directly to clients as well as to other watchmakers who put their names on them.

In 1850 he wrote a book about watches and watchmakers¹². It is obvious from reading it that he knew watchmaking well, both in theory and in practice.

An interesting fact is that Czapek's early watches incorporated Adrien Philippe's patented stem-winding and setting mechanism. In his book¹³ Czapek stated that he used only this design. It is hard to imagine that Patek was not aware of this, there must have been a reason why he allowed him to use Philippe's patented invention. This mystery, so far, is still unsolved. Maybe, there is even more to the relationship between Patek and Czapek than meets the eye.

To date, only three carriage clocks made by Czapek are known, no. 4305, the present no. 5422, and no. 5447. No. 4305 is in a private London collection and no. 5447 was in an important Swiss collection until only a few years ago.



CARRIAGE CLOCKS

Carriage clocks are small portable clocks that can be easily moved. They are descendants of so-called coach watches which were popular during the entire 18th century¹. At the end of the 18th century, Breguet introduced in Paris a new clock competing with coach watches, a portable clock, which, in time, was named a carriage clock.

Unlike coach watches that needed a hook to hang onto, carriage clocks could have been also desk clocks to be used in a coach and on a desk. Because of this versatility they quickly became popular and within twenty years surpassed coach watches.



First introduced in France carriage clocks continued to be produced there for about 150 years in many styles and with a variety of complications.

From the point of view of a traveler, a clock must strike the time, repeat the time on demand, and wake the owner up for another day of voyage. The present clock has all three of these features: the striking that can be heard in the *grande* form - hours and quarters at each quarter, or in the *petite* form - just quarters. It also has an option to stop the striking.

CARRIAGE CLOCKS IN PATEK PHILIPPE AND CZAPEK PRODUCTIONS

We found the first mention of a Patek or Czapek carriage clock in an 1845 letter from Patek to Jan Kozmian about two carriage clocks, C38 and C47. He does not provide details except that C38 had a square movement and C47 had a leather box².

In 1851 a carriage clock was presented by Patek at the London Exhibition while he was already in partnership with Philippe and Gostkowski. The clock does not have a serial number. It was sold at auction in Geneva in 2000 for CHF86,000³ and is now in the Patek Philippe Museum.

This clock is quite similar to our clock, however with a different escapement and without the *Grande Sonnerie*, or full strike. In appearance, the present clock has an additional florally engraved gilt dial cover.

Clocks made by Patek as well as Czapek, together or on their own, are exceptionally rare. They were not in their repertoire and were made only for either very special clients or special events such as world exhibitions.

Watchmakers are more precise than clockmakers. Therefore, when a watchmaker gets into making a clock, his clock will often be more precise than the counterpart finished by a clockmaker. There is a well-known story of Thomas Earnshaw, a watch and chronometer maker, who was given a task of making a clock. He complained that he did not know anything about clocks though but when the clock was finished even the Royal Astronomer praised how exceptionally well it was done. Similarly, clocks by the watchmakers Patek or Czapek are finished with high watch precision.

THE CLOCK

It is glazed on all sides to view the movement. The movement is engraved with the same serial number as the dial. It comes with a double key, fitting perfectly and bearing the clock's serial number and of an unusual shape. There is one other key like this one that is known belonging to Czapek's regulator clock. It is virtually of the same shape and with the serial number of the clock engraved on it. It appears that this shape was Czapek's fingerprint.

The movement has a platform with a lateral lever escapement with the pallet fork having inserted ruby pallets. The escapement is regulated by a bimetallic temperature compensating balance with gold adjustment screws.

Usually, these movements were manufactured in France and either sold as they came or were improved upon. This one falls clearly to the latter category. Interestingly, the serial number 172 of the movement is very low, suggesting that it might have been a special small-series production.

The case is of the so-called *gorge* style (grooved) which was used for the finest clocks⁴. The name comes from the case design in which both the base and the pillars are grooved.

Usually, the *gorge*-case clocks came with plain enamel dials. Only the best come with gold ones which usually meant they were engine turned. Very few were fitted with highly engraved dials, such as this clock. The dial is also unusual for another feature, it is the only known Czapek clock dial signed by him on the back "Czapek & Cie / 5422 / Paris & Geneve".

It appears that Czapek signed his dials on the back only if he felt that the watch (or a clock) was exceptional.

We know this from an early miniature watch No. 489, signed Patek & Czapek, while Czapek was still in partnership with Patek and in charge of the production (see lot 173 in this auction). It was the earliest watch they made that was so small. Czapek, who worked on the watch himself, proudly signed his name on the reverse of the dial. Like in this clock.

The clock comes from the time when Czapek opened a branch in Paris (1860) at Rue Vendôme 23. The clock, in the French style, was one of his first ones for the French public. It is the second Czapek timepiece signed Paris & Genève⁵ ever known and one of the earliest ever sold in his new Paris branch.

This desk clock by Hermès is closely related to the designs of the French designer and architect Paul Dupré-Lafon (1900-1971).

Dupré-Lafon's genius was to link the Art Deco and and modernist movements with his refined creations that were produced to appeal to a rich clientèle. A champion of craftsmanship and excellence, he used luxurious materials combined with stone, leather or chromed steel to create bold contrasting effects.

The present clock has a distinctly contemporary feel even today and is the perfect objet de luxe for the desk or table.

According to the Archives of Vacheron Constantin, the present Toledo 1952 model was manufactured in 2008.

It is no. 13, considered a blessed number in Jewish tradition, of a limited edition of only 100 examples made for Vacheron Constantin's retailer Chronotime in Tel Aviv to commemorate the 60th anniversary of Israel. Consigned by a private collector the present watch is furthermore preserved in very good overall condition.

The "Toledo 1952" is a re-edition of Vacheron Constantin's famous "Cioccolatone" model originally launched in the early 1950s. It is distinguished by its large square-shaped case and the triple date indication with moon phases.

According to the Archives of Audemars Piguet, the present watch was sold in 1999 in Great Britain. It is no. 4 of the limited edition of the John Shaeffer Minute Repeating Star Wheel model produced between 1995 and 1999, comprising a total of 17 examples instead of the originally planned 25: 7 in pink gold, including the present watch, 3 in yellow gold and 7 in platinum (see Audemars Piguet 20th Century Complicated Wristwatches, Appendix 2, Exhaustive and Illustrated List of Models Equipped with Chiming Function, 1992 – 2002, pp. 292 & 300).

Audemars Piguet manufactured their first minute repeating wristwatch in 1907 for the renowned American industrialist John Schaeffer. This customised pioneer version was housed in a cushion-shaped case, the numerals on the dial were personalised with the letters of his name instead of numerals. In the early 1990s, Audemars Piguet launched the "John Shaeffer" limited edition series, paying tribute to the original "coussin tortue" or "cushion turtle" design.





The "Star Wheel" system was invented by the firm at the same period, including different variations of "wandering hour" wristwatches. Three transparent sapphire disks, or star wheels, each inscribed with four hour indicators are attached to a rotating centre wheel. As the assembly turns, the indicator for the actual hour is rotated into view and then passed across a 120-degree minutes sector. Making its debut at Basel in 1951, the Jaeger-LeCoultre Memovox was created with the aim of providing a reliable wristwatch with alarm complication. Although the timepiece was a success, the Memovox encountered many developments throughout the years and became in 1956 the first self-winding alarm watch in history.

One of Jaeger-LeCoultre's most collectible timepieces, the name of the Memovox Polaris originates from a period of passionate polar exploration, ocean voyages and the conquest of space. Produced in 1,714 examples from 1965 to 1970, the Polaris was part of a small production, and became throughout time one of the most desirable diving wristwatches on the market.

With the reference E859, Jaeger-LeCoultre introduced a new case of 42 mm diameter, considered very wide for the period. Through its size, the case of the wristwatch provided clear legibility under water and was furthermore delivered with a pierced case back designed to render the alarm sound more distinct under water.

Based upon a design by Gerald Genta, the Royal Oak was the first luxury steel watch with integrated bracelet. Priced at a level above gold watches, it was a polarizing watch and it was highly uncertain if it would be a success. Since its inception Audemars Piguet would make many variations of the Royal Oak including the present wristwatch.



Part of the most coveted wristwatches of Patek Philippe's contemporary production, the reference 5004 quickly grasped the attention of collectors through its combination of complications as well as aesthetics.

The property of an important private Swiss collector, the original owner, the present chronograph was purchased directly from the Salons Patek Philippe in Geneva, and has been kept with the upmost care throughout the years. Assembled with a clean and attractive dial with applied gold Arabic numerals, the timepiece features a case of strong proportions with a design reminiscent of the reference 3970, itself inspired from the iconic reference 2499.

Launched in 1994 and produced until 2009, the reference 5004 is the last complicated reference, with the reference 5070, to be manufactured by Patek Philippe with an out-sourced calibre base. Using the Nouvelle Lemania, the movement was especially developed for Patek Philippe and finished in their workshops. The yellow gold case of the timepiece encountered a similar conception than the reference 3970 with very attractive stepped lugs, but differentiates itself through its size, slightly larger by 0.8 mm and its highly recognizable oversized crown with coaxial feature.

Already considered a modern classic, the reference 5004 embodies the essence of Patek Philippe's design legacy of the post war decades, but also the savoir faire of their skilled watchmakers, who managed to encompass such an array of complications and include a split-second within a case of subtle proportions. Now discontinued, the reference was succeeded by the reference 5204.

One of the most prestigious example of the reference, cases made in yellow gold were manufacture by Favre-Perret, La Chaux-de-Fonds with embossed dial.

The present reference 5711/1P-010 was purchased by the present owner, an important private collector, at the prestigious Salon Patek Philippe in Geneva. Carefully kept in a vault and hardly worn, it is preserved in excellent overall condition and offered with its Certificate of Origin and box.

Part of the most coveted timepieces of Patek Philippe's contemporary production, the ref. 5711/1P-010 is one of the grail examples for collectors of the Nautilus model. Made in a very limited number, believed to be less than 50, for some of the firms most loyal clients, the reference has to date only been seen once at public auction, testimony of its exclusivity. Crafted with a vibrant blue dial, the wristwatch is distinguished from its stainless steel counterparts by featuring a framed date window at 3 o'clock, the "Patek Philippe" and "Geneve" text on a flat surface instead of being often printed over the ribbed pattern as well as a diamond set in the band of the bezel at 6 o'clock. Enhancing its exclusivity and appeal, the wristwatch further distinguishes itself through its prominent hallmarks on the case back and its heavy platinum Nautilus bracelet.

The Reference 5711

In production since 2006, reference 5711 is a celebration of the first Nautilus model, reference 3700, to which it is practically identical on an aesthetical level, the only difference being a 1 mm. wider case. Technically, however, it is quite different: reference 5711 presents a display screw back. This was introduced to facilitate the access to the movement, and also to allow the beholder to admire the intricacy of the gears. Believe to have been released in 2012, the reference 5711/1P-010 was never featured in the Patek Philippe catalogue and is considered as one of the rarest examples of the contemporary Nautilus.

The present 2438/1 was purchased for the original owner on the occasion of his 50 birthday, 19th January 1963, as attested to by the engraving on the screw back, acquired from Patek Philippe's prestigious retailer A. Mersmann in Lugano.

Immediately apparent to the observer is the striking beauty of the unrestored dial, clear and clean with wonderfully raised hard enamel signature and scales and a subtle surface sheen. It was supplied by the renowned Stern Frères, the reverse is stamped 93 077: 93 Stern Frères' code for Patek Philippe, 077 the order number.

The case displays the gentle signs of use that only many years of careful private ownership can imbue. Retaining its proportions and correct original Calatrava crown, both hallmarks are still visible. The last three digits of the case number, 199, are punched on the inside of the upper left lug.

The aesthetic impact of the reference 2438/1 largely stems from its iconic lugs, defined by the carved groove to the upper outer edges, a feature it has in common with the reference 2499. This detail transfigures the overall look of the watch rendering it a subtle yet stately importance and leaving no doubt that one is in the presence of a watch collecting's all-time classics.

With the alchemic combination of fresh to the market private provenance, excellent original overall condition and original certificate stamped by one of Switzerland's premier retailers, the present watch can be considered a stellar example of one of the rarest of Patek Philippe perpetual calendar watches.

Gioielleria Mersmann

Founded in 1925, the celebrated firm Mersmann is situated near the lake in the historic Via Nassa in Lugano, official agent for the world's most renowned manufacturers, notably Patek Philippe.

Reference 2438/1

Reference 2438/1 was produced between 1952 and 1963 and only available in yellow or pink gold. It was in fact made as a water-resistant variation of the more familiar reference 2497 which is fitted with the same movement and dial.

Supplied by Wenger, one of the best case makers in Geneva, the case of the 2438/1 is fitted with a screw down back as opposed to the 2497s snap on back. It is 0.7 mm smaller with a still impressive diameter of 37 mm. - oversized at the time of its first inception, but totally in line with today's standards.

Between references 2497 and 2438/1, a total number of only 179 examples were produced, making both models amongst the rarest perpetual calendar watches made by Patek Philippe.

The references 2438/1 and 2497 were the first and only sweep centre seconds perpetual calendar watches produced by Patek Philippe right up until the launch of references 5050 and 5059 nearly forty years later in 1993.

The present watch is from the model's second series with a second series Mk I dial. The first series reference 2438/1 is recognized by its applied Arabic numerals and feuille hands. The second series, such as the present watch, can be found with two dial variations:

Mk I: with applied five-facet "bullet" baton numerals and dauphine hands; Mk II: with shorter four-facet baton numerals.

An example of reference 2438/1 is illustrated and described in Patek Philippe Museum - Patek Philippe Watches, Vol. II, pp. 295.

This first series reference 2499 is a sensational and most significant discovery to the world of wristwatch collecting. Purchased by the late father of the present owners in the early 1960s in Caracas, Venezuela, and entirely fresh to the market, it is distinguished by its superb original overall condition and the signature SERPICO Y LAINO, CARACAS, to the combined date and moon phases dial. As to be expected, the outside of the case back displays the stamps "S.&L." and "18K", the calendar discs for day and month are in Spanish. To date, no other ref. 2499, all four series combined, retailed by Patek Philippe's celebrated representative in Venezuela is known to exist. The rarity is furthermore enhanced by the fact that this is the earliest ref. 2499 case made by Wenger identified so far.

The reference 2499 offered here for sale embodies the result of our present owners' late father's persistence in achieving a goal through hard work, honoured by the text composed by his children published in this catalogue.

He had left his home country Italy as a young man in the early 1950s to immigrate to Venezuela, just as the founders of Serpico y Laino some three decades earlier. Following difficult years in the beginning he prospered in the retail business and his dream came true in the form of the present watch. It is unknown if it was purchased directly from his compatriots Serpico y Laino or from its possibly first owner but it undoubtedly was his treasure, cherished and carefully kept for over 50 years.

Preserved in generally excellent original overall condition, the case has never been subject to careless polishing, underlined by the full proportions, the crisp gold mark to the tip of the lower right lug, the "S.&L. 18K" stamps to the case back and the well-defined fluting to the lugs. The inside of the upper left lug and the inside of the bezel are stamped with the last three digits of the case number, 757. The crown and chronograph pushers appear to be original.

The case furthermore impresses with its, particularly for the period, large diameter of 37.6 mm. It was made by Wenger, one of Geneva's best case makers at the time, indicated by the key symbol numbered 1 to the inside of the snap on back. The cases of the very first references 2499 were supplied by Vichet (hallmark key 9), featuring a smaller diameter of 36.2 mm., a concave case back and more elongated lugs.



The dial is free from any cosmetic enhancement, highlighted by the hard enamel signature and scales, perfectly well-defined without any loss and in wonderfully raised "indélébile". Over time, an ivory-coloured patina and small spotting has formed in places, underlining that it is in absolutely untouched condition. The back is engraved with the movement number, 868341, the "short" signature "Patek Philippe" is the correct version, the eye-catching "Serpico y Laino Caracas", unique to any ref. 2499, will further delight the collector's heart.

It is a privilege for Christie's to present this exceptional timepiece. It is both for an auction house as for the demanding collector a once in a lifetime opportunity to discover, handle and possess (either temporarily or permanently) such a rare trophy.

PROVENANCE:

The following text was composed by the children of the original owner of this exceptional timepiece, to commemorate their late father.

I'll tell you a story... We are in the early post-war years. My father is part of those who migrated to the new world. In the fifties at a very young age he took a suitcase full of hopes and fears and set off in search of fortune.

He told me about the early days: 10/15 people had to share the same roof in uncomfortable conditions and work non-stop. Great sacrifices in difficult years, rewarded by an economy that experienced great growth.

What we are experiencing here and now is an effect of his perseverance over time.













Widely acknowledged as one of the world's greatest watch models ever created, reference 2499 has strongly influenced the designs of many of the most renowned watchmakers. Introduced to the market in 1950 it replaced the legendary reference 1518, the world's first perpetual calendar wristwatch with moon phase and chronograph made in series.

Over a period of 35 years, reference 2499 was made in four series in a total production of only 349 pieces, the majority cased in yellow gold. The rarity of the model becomes evident when considering that an annual average of only 9 watches left Patek Philippe's workshops.

Reference 2499 is generally divided into the following four series:

- first series, the present watch: square chronograph buttons, applied Arabic numerals and tachymeter scale
- second series: round chronograph buttons, either applied baton or applied Arabic numerals and tachymeter scale

- third series: round chronograph buttons, applied baton numerals and outer seconds divisions

- fourth series: round chronograph buttons, applied baton numerals, outer seconds divisions and sapphire crystal (see lot 112 in this auction)

Serpico y Laino

Serpico y Laino was founded in the late 1920s by two Italian immigrants, Leopoldo Serpico and Vicente Laino, a young goldsmith. Initially focusing on jewellery, they soon expanded into watches and became the exclusive distribution agent for Rolex in Venezuela following a meeting with Hans Wilsdorf in Geneva in the early 1930s. Shortly after other brands were added and the firm was appointed the sole authorized retailer for another famous watch manufacturer: Patek Philippe. In 1966, after forty years of flourishing business, the leading watch retailer in Caracas closed.







André and Edouard Wenger

The brothers André and Edouard Wenger, originally from Le Locle, founded their workshop in Geneva in 1912. Right from the start the firm became renowned for the extraordinary quality and contemporary design of the cases, supplied to the most important watch companies of the time.


In the 1930s, the Wenger's launched a truly revolutionary project, the production of shaped stainless steel cases and developed, amongst other items, the first reversible wristwatch.

Their designs strongly influenced the creation of wristwatch and pocket watch cases particularly during the Art Deco period and are still today considered true collector's pieces.






