Beginning in the 1940s, *Heuer* began making watches branded for sale by *Abercrombie & Fitch* in New York. At that time, *Abercrombie & Fitch* was an elite outfitter of sporting goods. Two of the proprietary models *Heuer* produced for *Abercrombie & Fitch* were the Solunar and the Seafarer, which tracked the tide and time that fish and animals were most active based on the solunar theory. The solunar theory posited that the movement of animals and fish was affected by the location of the Moon. The Seafarer incorporated a chronograph.

This Seafarer reference 2443 is one of a small number known with this dial configuration and is arguably the finest example known to the market. It features an unpolished case and all the original and highly unusual blue luminous material both in triangular plots on the tan dial and in the hands. The overall interplay of colors, including the gilt Arabic and dot numerals as well as the green and yellow accents, make this a vibrant and exceptional watch. Additionally, the reference 2443 wears large both because of its size and also because of the 20mm width between its lugs.

Heuer "First Execution" Autavia

2915-1. Double Swiss Underline. Say these phrases to a passionate sports chronograph enthusiast and they will immediately know what you are talking about, the very beginnings of the two of the most highly regarded chronographs models, the *OMEGA* Speedmaster and the *Rolex* Daytona, that began in 1957 and 1963 respectively and still exist to this day. Both of these watches were created with motorsports in mind, and have gone on to become cornerstones of two of the most prolific companies in watchmaking, helping them weather storms over half a century and evolving into two of the most recognizable and iconic timepieces ever created. But there is a watch with an even closer connection to the world of unadulterated excitement, speed, and the playboys that should be held in at least as high regard as these two familiar faces of the watch world, and will inevitably find its place in the core of the line-up of one of the most storied manufactures for years to come when it is reintroduced next year: the *Heuer* Autavia.

A portmanteau of the two disciplines it was aimed to encompass, that of the automobile and aviation, the Autavia was born in 1933 as a dashboard timer. It was superseded by the Auto-Rallye with a big central minute hand to make it incredibly legible, which then evolve into the Monte Carlo with digital hour recording. With the success of the Monte Carlo, the original Autavia dashboard timer was discontinued, leaving an abandoned catchy name. Jack Heuer and the design team in fall 1961 went to the drawing board to create one of the the first *Heuer* chronographs with a name and the first with a rotating bezel, allowing for a 60-minute timer, a rudimentary second time zone or a decimal scale. Launched in 1962, two variants were available, both manual wind: the reference 2446 for the three register version powered by the legendary Valjoux 72 movement as used in a certain Rolex Daytona, and the reference 3646 for the two register version powered by the Valjoux 92.

The earliest and most desirable examples are referred to by collectors as the "First Execution" and the dials of these models are distinguished by their large white sub-dials contrasting against black dials and painted radium hour markers to make the time as visible as possible at night. Due to the aging process, the luminous material no longer glows for extended periods and will generally have aged to tone ranging from soft caramel to burnt orange. The hands came in a variety of styles starting with hands entirely covered in radium, referred to as 'all lume', to a triangle-shaped insert of luminous material, and lastly a simple stick down the middle of the hand. These watches were introduced at a time of transition and at least two "First Execution" Autavia dials are known with the "T" signature above "SWISS" denoting tritium lume, while most have radium lume. All of these early Autavia watches have unsigned crowns and pushers that are slightly smaller than later generations.

While later examples made their way on to the wrists of such great drivers as Jochen Rindt, Mario Andretti, Jo Siffert, and Derek Bell, it is the First Execution Autavia that shows the origins of this iconic model.

"In the autumn of 1961 I decided with my production team to create a new "Autavia" as a wrist chronograph. **Until then we had never added a turning bezel to one of our wrist chronographs.** We therefore designed this new "Autavia" to have a turning black bezel with a choice of division markers. A bezel with 60 separate one-minute divisions, for example, would allow the wearer to set a marker for a defined interval of less than one hour; a 12-hour division would allow the time in another time zone to be displayed; and divisions of 1/100th of a minute would be useful for time study purposes... Looking back I can say that the "Autavia" wrist chronograph was the first real wristwatch product I personally created for the company."



The combination of features that this Heuer Autavia possesses, including the Valjoux 72 movement and the "inverse panda" dial produced by Singer make this watch somewhat similar to 1960s *Rolex* Daytona models, and it is thus no surprise that these have risen significantly in value and interest in recent years. The present lot is preserved in excellent condition and it is rare to find one of these with the original guarantee.

The present Tri-Compax is preserved in excellent overall condition. It is from the "Panda" version of the model, also known as the "Eric Clapton Tri-Compax", as it was famously worn by the celebrated musician during his time playing with the band Cream.

The Tri-Compax chronograph was launched in 1944 and stayed in production until the 1960s, available in stainless steel and gold and with a variety of dial colors and designs. The designation "Tri" is derived from the three complications, 1. chronograph including minute and hour register; 2. Full calendar showing day, date, month; and 3. the moon phase.

The Universal caliber 281 replaced the slightly smaller cal. 481 in the late 1950s. This allowed for the introduction of new chronograph pusher styles and the use of screw down case backs.



Ref. ST 376.0822, nicknamed "Holy Grail" by collectors, is the first Moonwatch of the Speedmaster collection produced with an automatic movement. It was in production from 1987 to 1988 only and is considered one of the rarest Speedmasters ever made.









OMEGA created this watch to commemorate the 45th anniversary of the successful return of the Apollo 13 Command Module. The astronauts aboard the module were wearing their Speedmaster Professional watches. These proved to be life and mission-saving as the astronauts had to deal with an unexpected crisis. One of the oxygen tanks exploded and in order to calculate the correct trajectory to safely return to earth, the astronauts had to use their Speedmasters to time the engine burns.

NASA awarded *OMEGA* with the Silver Snoopy Award in recognition of their contributions to the Apollo program. This watch features a white dial that has a super-luminova Snoopy in the 9 o'clock sub-register. Also on the dial are the quotes, "Failure is not an option," and "What could you do in 14 seconds?" The 14 squares on the outer part of the dial from 12 to 3 represent the 14 squares of the Snoopy comics. On the back, the case back has a 925 silver Snoopy medallion surrounded by dark blue enamel.

This watch represents a great achievement in the history of *NASA* and *OMEGA*. Additionally, this watch is offered in excellent condition.

One of the Rarest Military-Issued Watches, The Tornek Rayville Reference TR-900

Extremely rare and highly sought after, *Blancpain*'s Tornek- Rayville diver's wristwatch is a dream for any collector of military watches. Developed in the early 1960s by Allen V. Tornek of the Rayville factory, the representative of *Blancpain* in the US, less than 1,000 were made especially for the US Navy.

However, very few were actually sent to the US Navy after they had been manufactured, this watch is one of those few that was sent, making it an even rarer specimen. Upon arrival to the Military base, the watch was assigned a serial number to its case back, written by the US Navy. These watches are so rare that it is believed that less than 100 survive, including those few that went directly to the US Navy such as the present watch, the vast majority of TR-900s having been destroyed by the government due to the Navy's rules regarding atomic waste disposal. Most of the remaining watches are likely resting in the safety deposit boxes of private collectors, it is a good explanation then why these watches almost never come to market.

The design of the Tornek-Rayville was based on *Blancpain*'s "Fifty Fathoms" model already in production; it was fitted with the same caliber AS1361 and Promethium 147 (half life 2.5 years) for the luminous material. By changing its color from pink/blue to entirely pink, the humidity indicator to the lower half of the dial would show if water moisture had penetrated the watch.

Produced under US Military Specifications "MIL-W-22176 (SHIPS) WATCH, WRIST, SUBMERSIBLE (400-FOOT), NON-MAGNETIC". As requested by the US Government, the watches had to be legibly marked on the outside of the case back with the specification number ("MIL-W-22176"), serial number, the word "NONMAGNETIC" with the nonmagnetic symbol as well as the radiation symbol.

Around 1935 and following disappointing tests carried out on watches available at that time, the Royal Italian Navy approached Giuseppe Panerai with the request of designing a watch resistant to extreme conditions while at the same time keeping exact time. The prototype which *Panerai* submitted to the First Submarine Group Command was called "Radiomir" and passed all tests successfully. A further order was made and following an extensive secret test phase watches were supplied to the Italian naval forces as of 1938.

From the beginning, watches with reference no. 3646 were made by *Rolex* for *Panerai* following strict technical requirements, notably a 47 mm. wide cushion-shaped case with soldered curved wire lugs, screw down "onion" crown, 12-sided case back and a Perspex crystal. The 16 lines caliber 618 Cortébert movements were finished by *Rolex* and decorated with the Geneva stripes.

Watches and other instruments made by *Panerai* were standard-issue tools for Italian Navy frogmen, SLC torpedo riders and commandos but were supplied also to naval forces of other countries, notably Germany.

Since the 1940s, this was has remained in the same family, based in $\ensuremath{\mathsf{America}}$.


Both *Tudor* Oyster-Prince Submariner "no crown guard" references 7922 and 7924 were launched in 1958, shortly after the celebrated and better known *Rolex* reference 6538. Whereas reference 7922 was water-resistant to 110 m, (330ft), and fitted with the smaller crown, reference 7924, such as the present watch, was equipped with a larger case and crown in order to withstand water pressure to 220 m. (660 ft). As reliable as their "sisters" signed Rolex, but available at a lower price, the *Tudor* diver's watches were the brand of choice of many Armed Forces, particularly certain units of the French and the U.S. Navy. The present watch is fitted with the celebrated "Auto-Prince" caliber 390, a 17 jewels movement developed by *Rolex* in the 1950s for *Tudor*.

This *Tudor* Submariner reference 7924 made by *Rolex* and the little brother of the legendary "Big Crown" Submariners stands on its own for the charismatic condition of the case, dial, and hands. The dial has aged to a beautiful brownish-black depending on the angle of light you view it. The inside case back is stamped III.59, indicating this watch was made in the third quarter of the year 1959.

Few Submariner models fascinate *Rolex* aficionados as much as the "Big Crown" - AKA James Bond -Submariner. A staple of any serious *Rolex* collection, Big Crowns are as charismatic and attractive as they are rare. Reference 6538 came to international fame when it was worn by 007 Agent James Bond in the movie "Dr. No", played by Sean Connery. It was first seen in the movie when Bond enters a bar and checks the time on his watch while lighting a cigarette. He then presses on the dot, or "pearl" at 60 units and blows up an explosive device that was previously planted by him. Of course, Mr. Bond keeps his composure throughout. To *Rolex* collectors, the reference 6538 is often referred to as the "James Bond" model, a name associated with a legendary movie series that will live on for generations as will the watch itself.

Reference 6538 is characterized by a glossy dial with gilt designations, 8 mm. Brevet crown, and a slighter thinner case design than its forefather ref. 6200, thanks to the new thinner caliber 1030. Early models, such as the present watch, are distinguished by a closed minute ring, and lollipop seconds hand (with big luminous dot.). The present watch is also notable for its lighter luminous numeral at 6 o'clock, an additional sign of originality.

However, perhaps the most notable detail of this present early example of the reference 6538 will impress collectors with its unusual dial printing. The designation of "Officially Certified Chronometer" resides above the depth rating as well as "Submariner," not below it as is most commonly seen on this model. This was only true for the earliest models, in this case those born in the first years of production, in 1956.

Rolex's first Submariner with date, the reference 1680, was introduced in 1968 with much success. Collectors will make a distinction between a reference 1680 with red writing on the dial and a reference 1680 with all-white writing. *Rolex* changed to the all-white print dial in 1976/77, marking the end of red writing on the Submariner. The present watch dates to 1973 and is part of the early 1680 examples with the recognizable and attractive red writing on its dial.

Furthermore, the astute collector will notice the unusual color of the luminous material to the numerals and hands. Due to age, it has turned a dark shade of yellow, almost orange, hence its derived nickname; Pumpkin Patina. This color is known to develop for Mark VI dials which fall into the 3.7 million serial range, correct for the present watch.






This example of the highly coveted reference 1680 stands out through its clean and attractive dial with red Submariner script.

Nicknamed "Red-Sub" by *Rolex* collectors, the timepiece features attractive luminous accents that have aged to a uniform color. Adding to the appeal of the wristwatch, the color of the dial has changed to a dark brown color and is allied to a well preserved stainless steel case with very strong proportions, featuring clear reference and serial numbers.

Furthermore, this example is attributed to the rare 'meters first Mark II dial'. Brown dial Submariners such as the present watch are highly sought after, especially rare and appearing usually only in case numbers in the 2.2-2.4M serial range.

Launched in 1967, the celebrated Sea-Dweller reference 1665 was the first wristwatch designed for use in saturation diving, fitted with a *Rolex* patent valve in the band and guaranteed waterproof to 610 meters depth. The valve was first developed on the Submariner model and allows helium and other gases to escape, enabling the watch to stand compression.

The present dial features one of the most scarce – and at the same time most peculiar and recognizable – versions: the Mark II. Mark II dials are defined by at least three features: the second red line of text presents fonts smaller than the first; the red fonts are bright red and very crisp with neatly defined serifs (especially on the last "E" of "dweller"); and – and this is the most immediately recognizable feature – the *Rolex* coronet is not at all well-defined, with the spikes somewhat blurry and imprecise and the opening at the bottom nearly nonexistent. Most possibly, this less-than-perfect quality is the reason why *Rolex* very soon dismissed this version of the Double Red dial. In fact, it is found only around serial numbers 1.7 Million.

The present watch stands out with it highly attractive "tropical" dial where the color of the dial has aged and transformed, now a rich brown color, highly sought-after in today's market. Furthermore, offered complete, the watch is accompanied by two matching *Rolex* punched Guarantee's and its *Rolex* presentation box.


Launched in 1967, the celebrated Sea-Dweller reference 1665 was the first wristwatch designed for use in saturation diving, fitted with a *Rolex* patent valve in the band and guaranteed waterproof to 610 meters depth. The valve was first developed on the Submariner model and allows helium and other gases to escape, enabling the watch to stand compression.

Four production versions of this dial are known, in addition to some early prototype variations and later service examples. The present watch features the final version of the double red dial, the "Mark IV". It is most easily distinguished by the grainy texture of the red designations, which appear at high magnification as if it were made of many small dots. Other characteristic traits are the much bigger fonts of the first line of text compared to the second, and a very well defined, clear crown with a large opening at the base.

What is most notable and attractive is the faded black bezel, now an even light grey color which contrasts with the black dial with vivid red printing. The present specimen of this legendary model is offered in excellent condition. Not only does the dial appear to be untouched, the luminous material now sporting an extremely attractive light vanilla tonality, but the case as well is remarkably well-preserved, with full lugs featuring pinholes well distanced for the edges.

The Wrecking of the Nuestra Senora de Atocha

More than half a century before the founding of the chief colonial cities such as Boston, Philadelphia, and New York, the Spanish were leading the rapid expansion of the New World, at centers like Mexico City, Lima and Potosi. Vital to the Spanish throne was the continent's mineral wealth of silver and gold. Between 1561 and 1748, two fleets a year were sent with supplies to colonists in the New World and would returned to Spain filled with silver and gold.


On 6 September 1622, one such heavily laden treasure galleon of King Philip IV's Tierra Firme Fleet sank during a hurricane near Florida Keys. Two hundred and sixty people and many tons of cargo were lost at sea. When the ship went down it was carrying 1000 silver bars, each weighing 70 troy pounds, 250 troy pounds of gold, along with 582 slabs of copper and an unspecified amount of contraband

Salvage attempts began immediately. The Atocha was found in 55 feet of water with the top of its mast in plain view. Divers, limited to holding their

breath, attempted recovery but were unable to break into the hatches. While the divers were gathering further materials needed for the recovery of the cargo, a further hurricane destroyed the parts of the ship visible above water level. With no marker of the location of the Atocha, salvage attempts proved futile for many centuries, until the shipwreck was discovered in July 1985 by famed treasure hunter Mel Fisher. When discovered, the hull of the Atocha was lying in 55 feet of water, exactly as recorded by the first salvagers in 1622.

One of the six "Golden Crew" members to discover the Atocha treasure was Curtis W. E. White. While diving and ultimately locating the wreckage and all its precious cargo in 1985, he was wearing the present Submariner wristwatch. The clasp is engraved; *C.W.E.W.*

Accompanying the present watch is a piece of Atocha coin given to Mr. White by Mr. Mel Fisher as well as the book, *Treasure Hunt*, by George Sullivan, in which Mr. White is editorialized and photographed.



An extremely rare timepiece, the present *Rolex* Submariner wristwatch is offered in 'like new' condition. Accompanied by its *Rolex* warranty, it was manufactured for the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the model.

With the 50th anniversary debuting in 2003, the *Rolex* reference 16610LV marked collectors and has been highly sought-after ever since. A highly recognizable and attractive timepiece, the present example is part of the rarest and most desirable watches of the contemporary Submariner model. Stamped 'T' on its case next to the reference number, the wristwatch was part of the early timepieces to be manufactured without lug holes. Furthermore, close inspection indicates that the case is part first year of production for this production, an 'F' serial number indicating it was made in its debut year of 2003.

Indication that this timepiece is part of the first edition of the 50th anniversary submariner, its collectible importance is further enhanced as the wristwatch is offered with the rare first generation green "Flat Four Serifed" bezel, indicating that the number 4 of the graduation 40 has a flat top and that all the numbers with internal angles have very sharp and pronounced serifs in comparison to other examples. Part of the first timepieces of the reference, the wristwatch is bestowed with a highly attractive Mk1 Maxi dial featuring slightly larger hour markers, an oval "O" for the Rolex script, a widely spaced "Oyster Perpetual Date" signature and the "Swiss Made" indication on the bottom of the dial and extending from 28 to 32 min and shortening 5 minute markers instead of 3.

In unworn condition and completed with its box and papers, this very rare F serial anniversary Submariner encompasses all the traits enabling it to become a future classic.

Preceding the Cosmograph Daytona family of watches, the Oyster chronograph reference 6234 is one of *Rolex's* most timeless watches, effortlessly combining a sporty look with elegant, understated flair. Produced in 18k and 14k gold, the majority were cased in steel- fitting for a sports model.

The dagger numerals, small subsidiary dials and blue telemeter scale work together nicely to create an informal yet refined look. The present piece is offered in outstanding condition, the dial absolutely untouched, perfectly preserved and with the luminous material evenly aged to an attractive hue. Furthermore, the 1950s *Rolex* steel buckle is very rare.

The present example of the so-called "grandfather" of *Rolex* Daytonas, is with serial number 130'950. The reference was produced from 1955 - 1961, the serial number showing that this model dates to the earliest year of its production, 1955. To find an example from the beginnings of production is extremely rare, especially in this honest and un-restored condition. Furthermore, another notable detail is that the movement is stamped *ROW*, indicating it was initially intended for the American market.

Reference 6034 is the successor to reference 4537, and was in production during the 1950s and early 1960s. The majority were cased in stainless steel or 18k gold, with an exception of a small series in 14k gold.

This much sought-after reference can be considered the grandfather of today's Cosmograph Daytona. It may thus also be described as the "pre-pre Daytona", immediately preceding "pre-Daytona" reference 6238. The latter is the company's last traditional chronograph with polished bezel. Reference

6234 is distinguished by its polished bezel, three-part case and hand-wound movement. A charismatic watch by any standard, the reference was in production from 1956 to the early 1960s.

The present watch stands out among its peers by virtue of its very rare underline dial. Easily missed, the underline is just situated directly underneath "Oyster Chronograph" and above the hands. Underline dials were used by *Rolex* on watch dials for a short period of time to indicate the use of tritium as a luminous compound, which is less harmful than radium. On this watch, tritium was used on the hands and for the accents on the dial. Furthermore, the movement is stamped *ROW*, indicating it was initially intended for the American market.

Preceding the Cosmograph Daytona family of watches, the Oyster chronograph reference 6234 is one of *Rolex's* most sought-after watches, effortlessly combining a sporty look with elegant flair. The present example is a unique variance of the so called 'pre-Daytona'. With both case and dial in very appealing condition, it has features which are so rare that it will pique the interest the most discerning collector:

Firstly, the dial is unique. It features a remarkably attractive color. that will only be found on this watch. Since its production in 1962, the dial has aged and changed color from the once black dial to now a gorgeous tobacco color, darker towards the edges. As no two dials can age in the same way, the new color is simply mesmerizing and this watch is truly one of a kind.

Secondly, one will notice the "SWISS" only at the base of the dial, as opposed to the more commonly seen "T SWISS T," indicating Tritium. This "SWISS" only was used on early models, those which were using Radium and had not yet transitioned to using tritium, a change that was made to *Rolex* dials in the early 1960's.

Thirdly, upon inspection of the movement, it is stamped *ROW*, indicating it was made specifically for the American market. Furthermore, the steel *Jubilee* bracelet is stamped *ROLEX U.S.A*

The present watch is an extremely attractive specimen, ticking all the boxes for a truly exceptional and well-preserved vintage *Rolex* timepiece.

The present watch is an excellent example of the reference 6239 "Cherry Red" Daytona from the final period of production. The caliber 722-1 which had evolved from the caliber 72 B was only used in the reference 6239 between 1967 and 1969.

Reference 6239, the very first model of the celebrated "Daytona" series, succeeded reference 6238 and could be found in sales catalogues in Europe as of 1964. It is thought though that the model was available in the US already in 1963. Available in stainless steel, 14k and 18k gold, reference 6239 was the firm's first chronograph with the tachymeter scale engraved on the bezel and the subsidiary dials printed in a different color than the main dial for better readability. The dials of the early models featured only the designation "Cosmograph", referring to the outer space travels of the early 60s. The "Daytona" was added on later series watches such as the present watch to mark *Rolex's* sponsorship of the renowned NASCAR stock car race.

The present reference 6263 features a dial that is known as a "Sigma" dial, indicated by two small Sigma symbols on either side of the "T Swiss T". The Sigma symbols indicate that the baton numerals and hands on a dial are made of gold, in this case white gold. Sigma dials were first seen on the reference 6240, and were nicknamed "Goute A Prior" by Italian collectors and originally referred to the union of three *Rolex* dial producers: Singer, Stern, and Beyeler. On later references, the Sigma came to refer to indices and hands in gold.

The *Rolex* Cosmograph Daytona is among the most appreciated and recognized chronograph models by any manufacturer. When it comes fitted with the rare "exotic" or so-called "Paul Newman" dial, its rarity, aesthetic appeal, and collectability are profoundly increased. This dial, distinguished by the three dimensional construction, with sunken subsidiary dials and sunken outer chapter ring, was an alternative dial offered to clients at the time. Ironically, this variation was not appreciated by the market at the time of its production. It took decades for collectors to prize this "exotic" dial variation. Paul Newman himself wore a reference 6239 with this dial, reportedly a gift from his wife, and he used it in particular for his racing career.



The present lot presents an extremely rare and exciting opportunity for collectors. This fresh to market *Rolex* "Paul Newman" Daytona has been consigned by a descendant of the original owner, a Canadian test pilot who purchased the watch in November, 1971, in Paris as a gift to himself for his accomplishments. Astonishingly, the watch comes complete with its original *Rolex* guarantee, dated and stamped by the retailer, *Fred* in November, 1971, as well as the original sales invoice from *Fred* on the same date for the original purchase price of 1,100 Swiss Franc, as well as the original *Rolex* presentation box.

The original owner began his career in the RCAF flying F86 Sabres at nineteen and went back to school to complete his Engineering Physics degree so he could follow his dreams of become a test pilot. During his career he was a production pilot on F104 Starfighters before becoming chief test pilot where he tested various aircraft, which included testing a tilt wing aircraft (CL84) with the US government (landing one at the Pentagon!) Most notable was his work on the Bombardier Challengers and Regional Jets. These aircraft are widely used as private aircraft and commercial jets today.

However, without the attributed provenance and complete condition of this stunning watch, the watch itself is very rare discovery. *Rolex* reference 6264 was introduced in 1970 and produced for only three years. Together with reference 6262, it was the last *Rolex* chronograph watch featuring the simple round push-down buttons. All future chronograph references, starting with references 6263 and 6265 in 1971 bear screw down chronograph buttons. Reference 6264 was available in stainless steel, as well as 14k and 18k gold. It has a bezel with black plastic insert and white tachymeter graduation.

Of all the *Rolex* Paul Newman watches, the reference 6264 must be considered the rarest. When Rolex introduced their new chronographic caliber 727 in 1969, most of the Daytona line was upgraded. Reference 6239 - pump pushers and metal bezel - became reference 6262, and reference 6241 – pump pushers and black bezel – became the present reference 6264. Reference 6240, with black bezel and screw pushers, did not receive an immediate upgrade. This is probably because the market was originally quite wary of the screw pushers to the point of some customers complaining the prominent buttons would wear down shirt's cuffs. However, after few years, in 1972, the superior waterproof capabilities of the screw pushers case was fully recognized, and not only reference 6240 was upgraded with the new caliber - spawning two references: 6263 and 6265, with respectively black and metal bezels - but furthermore references 6262 and 6264 were at the same time discontinued. This decision resulted in these two references being the Daytona models with the shortest production run: only 4 year from '69 to '72, and consequently among the most difficult to obtain.

Kept in pristine condition with the care that one would expect form an accomplished pilot, the watch is in extremely good condition. Kept in a drawer for most of its life, the dial is beautifully preserved without blemishes to the cream sector. The case is also in remarkably good condition, stamped 2 70 and 2 71 to the endlinks, matching the date of the watch serial number as well as *Rolex* Guarantee.



Rolex is well-known for their ability to create wristwatches which can showcase a multitude of colors, whether in the form of dial colors dreamed up with lacquer such as "Stella" dials, or indeed as the present watch demonstrates, dials and cases that are masterfully diamond-set.

Beginning in the 1980s *Rolex* dared to launch diamond, sapphire and ruby-set watches that also flaunted a chronograph mechanism. These well-known designs set with jewels served an elite clientele and aimed to offer them designs which were classic yet elegant. As much as they may appear as anachronisms, these masterpieces must be regarded as a superb symbiosis of two worlds, sport and elegance. The present watch is a striking asset to any collection and represents the cornerstone of the Swiss manufacturers' craftsmanship.

Rolex is a watch manufacturer who can alternate seamlessly from classic to avant-garde designs. This has been demonstrated numerous times over the decades. For example, the gold reference 6262 in the late 1960s and early 1970s, the diamond-set reference 6269 and reference 6270 in the 1980s, the beach Daytonas and the Leopard at the beginning of the new millennium. This tradition of innovation lives on in the second decade of this century, as the present watch demonstrates.

Whilst maintaining the case style and overall dial layout of a regular Daytona, it is apparent that this masterpiece is anything but usual. The bezel is set with baguette-cut sapphires in the colors of the rainbow, the lugs and crown guard are set with brilliant-cut diamonds. The case design is sublime, encasing the large white masterpiece case in a multi-colored aura. The innovation continues on the dial. While the graphic is similar to that of normal Daytonas, the color scheme creates a daring masterpiece of innovation and design exploration. Diamond-set numerals shine on the pitch black dial, as do the meteorite subsidiary dials, whose color scheme is revolutionary on a Daytona.

Verger Frères

The name "Verger Frères", a synonym for watches, clocks and jewelry of unparalleled creativity and design. The celebrated house was founded in Paris in 1872 by the talented jeweler and watchmaker Ferdinand Verger (1851-1928). His sons Georges and Henri, as gifted as their father, joined the firm which, in 1911, was renamed Verger Frères, introducing the famous trademark "VF" in a lozenge-shaped stamp, the acknowledged mark for the most esteemed pieces, produced well into the Art Deco period. In the years to follow, the manufacture reached its peak, excelling in the production of the most creative designs of the period. Verger Frères creations are distinguished by their innovative use of precious materials and the outstanding workmanship .Although often associated with *Vacheron* & *Constantin, Verger* also worked with all of the great houses of the time, among them *Ostertag, Van Cleef* & *Arpels, Janesich, Lacloche, Jaeger* and *Boucheron in Europe,* and *Tiffany, Black, Starr* & *Frost, Spalding* & *Co.* and *J. E. Caldwell* in the United States, just to name some.

The present timepiece is exceptionally elaborate, even for *Verger*. The case is beautifully decorated with an oversized carved emerald to its center, surrounded by ribbons of diamonds, gracing the even larger carved rock crystal case. Every millimeter of this pendant has highly accurate attention to detail that can only be attributed to such a celebrated maker. The craftsmanship does not conform to tradition casemaking tradition suggesting that it was produced as a special assembly, for instance for an exposition.

Furthermore, the movement was produced by *Jaeger-LeCoultre*, the Caliber HRV, which was initially launched in 1899 for the 1900 exposition. Evidence is seen in the stamping on the movement signifying a rushed production to meet an important exhibition deadline. Usually these special productions are seen with both movement signed as well as case signed, the case mostly *VF* (Verger Frères), but a very small number are known where only the movement is signed such as the present timepiece.

This masterpiece represents a true treasure of both horology and design.

Franklin Delano Roosevelt (January 30, 1882 - April 12, 1945)

The only United States president to be elected to the office four times, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, byname FDR, is remembered to be one of the nation's greatest leaders. Under his leadership, America survived through two of the darkest periods of the 20th century: the Great Depression and World War II. Roosevelt created a series of programs and reforms for economic recovery during his presidency, known as the New Deal. These programs may not have come to fruition without the support of his wife Eleanor Roosevelt, with whom he had one of the strongest political partnerships in American history. A leader in her own right, Eleanor transformed the role of the First Lady from that of a social hostess into a more visible, active participant in her husband's administration. She was an advocate for women, American workers, and the poor. She was also an early champion of civil rights for African Americans, and supported government-funded programs for artists and writers.

Audemars Frères

Audemars Frèreswas one of the three successor businesses founded in approximately 1885 after the bankruptcy of the original Louis Audemars Company. Audemars Frères was set up by brothers Hector and Charles-Henri Audemars who were grandsons of Louis Audemars, the original founder (1811). Their father Charles-Henri was the youngest son of the founder and is most credited for advancing and perfecting the use of the perpetual calendar. Of the three successor companies, Audemars Frères was the most successful and survived the longest.

Given that Audemars Frères was in operation from approximately 1885 to the early 1900s, it is likely this watch may have been a gift from Eleanor to former American President, Franklin D. Rossevelt, for their wedding on March 17, 1905, especially since there is a well-placed photograph of Eleanor which remains in remarkable condition to the inside of the case.

The extremely elegant pocket watch is preserved in excellent condition, considering that Franklin D. Roosevelt likely wore this watch daily and it has survived over one hundred years of use. When examining this watch, the dial is especially attractive in two-tone gilt with Arabic numerals on a blank chapter ring, contrasting with the guilloché center. Furthermore, the guilloché to the outside of the hunter case is also well-preserved and the monogram, *FDR*, is still clearly visible on the blank oval plaque to the outer case. When the slide in the band is activated, the chime of the quarter repeater sounds beautifully, an ode to the skilled watchmakers of *Audemars Frères*.

In 2005 and 2012, Heritage Auctions sold this historically important quarter repeating pocket watch which had previously been sold by Sotheby's in October 1988. The consignor to Sotheby's was James Roosevelt, who was FDR and Eleanor's eldest son. This watch sold for \$18,400 in 2005 and \$27,485 in 2012.

The present watch is incredibly rare and impressive. The sharp-edged rectangular case is seemingly un-polished and has been worn perhaps only a few times in its life. The platinum hallmark to the case side is very crisp, almost never seen on watches of this age.

The reference 570 is one of the most appreciated and well known vintage watches by *Patek Philippe*. Reference 3417 was *Patek Philippe's* first anti-magnetic wristwatch produced in series and was made in stainless steel only.



In addition, it is one of *Patek Philippe* models which presents most variations: it is known in the three gold colors and in platinum, with leather strap or with one of many possible bracelet designs. Its dial can be metal or enamel, with baton, Breguet or diamond-set indexes. One version even presents the Golden Rule on the dial. Furthermore, the model underwent an evolution over the years, thus presenting different series. The present example was manufactured in the mid-1950s and comes form the first series for this reference. It was retailed by the renowned retailer, *Gubelin*, and their signature graces the center of the dial, below that of *Patek Philippe*. 'Double-signed dials' are amongst those most sought-after in today's market, especially seen on such a well preserved enamel dial such as this one. Remarkably, the dial is so clean that it shows no visible evidence of hairlines or cracks, a sign of a beautifully executed hand-made production over 50 years ago.

Furthermore, the bracelet alone is one of extreme rarity and pure admiration. Produced by *Gay Frères*, its articulated links and *GF* stamped clasp lends itself to the charisma and sheer elegance of this reference. To the best of our knowledge the present watch has never before been offered in public.

The reference 130 is one of *Patek Philippe*'s landmark models, The first chronograph to be given a reference number, it was launched in 1934 and remained in production until the 1960s. Distinguished by its timeless design, the model remains an icon of vintage production. When looking at the dial, one is immediately drawn to the applied gold Breguet numerals, beautifully set against the immaculately preserved silvered dial. With raised enamel, the manufacturer's signature and scales represent the firm's skill of production. Furthermore, the case is also exceedingly well-preserved, highlighted in the hallmark to the case side, similar to when this watch left the factory 50 years ago.

A strikingly similar reference 130 with Breguet numerals and with the tachymeter scale for miles was once favored and owned by famed American athlete, Joe DiMaggio, and was sold at Christie's' New York in December, 2017, realizing a value of \$281,250.

One of the cornerstone models of *Patek Philippe*; combining the "Calatrava" style case with the chronographic feature, the reference 130 is regarded as one of the most appreciated *Patek Philippe* creations, and the base of any serious vintage *Patek Philippe* collection.

Produced in yellow, pink and white gold, as well as in stainless steel, it features a number of dial variations. One of the most alluring is, without a doubt, the present, so-called "pink-on-pink" combination: pink gold case and pink dial.

When looking at the production numbers for different case materials for any vintage wristwatch, it is evident that pink gold versions are always more rare than yellow gold. This is a consequence of the fact that, in the beginning of the 20th century, the exotic glow of pink gold was considered unusual, and yellow gold versions were much easier sellers. Interestingly, pink gold watches were highly appreciated in South America, and it is not unusual for watches signed by South American retailers to be pink or even pink-on-pink.

If pink gold watches were considered unusual, pink-on-pink examples were deemed by many as superbly exceptional. Consequently, production of such masterpieces is extremely limited. For example, it is estimated that of the total production of reference 130, less than 25 percent were cased in pink gold. Of course, just a fraction of these went on to be fitted with a pink dial as well: only ten pink-on-pink 130s are known from the market. Only from the 1960s on, following the momentous social changes of the time and their repercussions on the fashion trends, pink gold watches started to be worldwide cherished creations.

The more understated looks of pink gold watches is now very much appreciated by those who deem yellow gold too ostentatious, but still want the pleasure of feeling the weight and appreciating the glowing looks of gold on the wrist. The present timepiece brings the whole pink gold concept one step further, thanks to the splendidly preserved pink gold dial, with the wonderfully raised long "Patek Philippe & Co." signature, absolutely correct for a watch manufactured before 1948.

Offered fresh to market, the present watch is one of very few known examples with a pink dial and case, and Breguet numerals. Preserved in excellent and original condition, the gold hallmark to the case side is still crisp. On close inspection of the movement we can see the import stamp, *PXP*, which tells us that this watch was made specifically for the American market.

Reference 1579 takes a unique position in *Patek Philippe's* production of vintage chronograph wristwatches as it is not only one of the largest models with a diameter of 36mm but also the only example with the highly attractive facetted lugs. Launched in 1943, the model was predominantly available in yellow and pink gold, few examples were cased in stainless steel.

Reference 1579 was launched at the Basel fair in 1943 and remained in *Patek Philippe* catalogues until 1964. The three-piece cases were made by Wenger, one of the most celebrated case makers at the time, the dials were provided by the renowned Stern Frères, the movements based on the Valjoux 13^{'''} ébauche, renamed by *Patek Philippe* caliber 13-130 after having been finished to highest standards in the firm's workshops.

The chronograph wristwatch offered here is a very appealing early example of *Patek Philippe's* attractive "spider lugs" reference 1579. The present watch stands out as it comes from the very first year of production for this reference. An early reference 1579, the 1st series was manufactured from 1943 to 1949, with Arabic and baton numerals with baton or feuille hands such as the present watch. Notably, the crisp hallmark is still seen on the well preserved case side and the dial is in excellent condition with the long signature, correct for those in production before 1948.


According to research, less than 480 examples of the reference 1579 were produced and perhaps less than 180 are known to survive today.



The 2499

When watch collectors think of *Patek Philippe*, they generally think of the round perpetual calendar chronograph wristwatch. This combination of complications has grown to define *Patek Philippe* as a brand, and the watches under this umbrella are at the heart of the horological legend. These timepieces have become icons of watch-investing and are now widely considered to be wearable works of art — the 'holy grail' for any collector of wristwatches.

Widely acknowledged as one of the world's greatest-ever vintage watch models, the 2499 has exerted a strong influence on the designs of many of the most renowned watchmakers. Over a period of 35 years, the 2499 was made in four separate series in a total production of only 349 pieces, the majority cased in yellow gold. A 2499 is considered the ultimate statement watch today, instantly recognizable and coveted by collectors of modern and vintage alike.

In order to fully understand the gravity of this wristwatch, it is necessary to examine its role and importance in the history of *Patek Philippe*. Reference 2499 is a perpetual calendar chronograph wristwatch with moonphases. This set of complications is the "signature watch" by *Patek Philippe*. Many other sets of complications have starred in a *Patek Philippe* model at some point in time, but perpetual chronograph are the only line of watches that not only has always been present in *Patek's* catalogue since its first appearance on the market in 1941, but which kept a very recognizable style. In a way, one could say these models are the true custodians of *Patek Philippe* DNA and identity.

As mentioned, this line of wristwatches saw the light of day in 1941, with the presentation of reference 1518, the first serially produced perpetual

chronograph by any brand. Its three subcounters dial is such an achievement of design that it will be kept virtually unchanged through all the different incarnations of the perpetual chronograph. The heir to the 1518 is reference 2499, followed by 3970 in 1989. From 2004 to 2010 the torch was passed on to reference 5970, and the youngest heir is 5270, in production today since its introduction in 2011.

Reference 2499 is divided into four different series, with slightly different case and dial details:

- The first series features square pushers and a traditional tachometer dial layout with outer railway fifth of a second divisions
- The second series keeps the same dial layout of the first series, but utilizes round pushers
- The third series has a cleaner dial layout, without tachometer scale, and round pushers
- The fourth series, also known as reference 2499/100, is the same as the third series but the presently offered example is not only historically important as one of the first 2499/100s made with case by Atelier Reunis (please see the following essay), it is also one the best preserved fourth series in existence. The case is crisp with the clean unpolished lines of the lugs boldly protruding from the case. The dial is original and untouched showing only the slight signs of aging expected for a 36 year old. The movement is also in beautiful original condition. This watch was originally sold by a *Patek Philippe* authorized retailer in New York City in 1982 and has remained unknown to this day. As a fresh to market trophy, this watch is a superlative example of the reference and will be a prize example for the discerning collector.

THE VERY FIRST PATEK PHILIPPE WRISTWATCH FINISHED AND CASED IN THE HOUSE

Philip Poniz

To appreciate the importance of this watch we must understand the deep desire of Patek Philippe to consolidate all aspects of its production under one roof, the desire that goes to the very core of Patek Philippe's ideology and the philosophy of their production. In the beginning, the company relied on different subcontractors supplying rough movements, cases, dials, etc.

As soon as Adrien Philippe joined the company he began making it more independent. In 1850, he succeeded with in-house production of the movements. He built machinery capable of producing rough watch movements (ebauches)¹ which used to be supplied by Louis Audemars, D.H. Piguet, Piguet Freres, and others. The system worked, but not to the complete satisfaction.

It took another hundred years until the Sterns, the new owners, decided to pick up Philippe's philosophy². Over the years the family invested almost one billion francs to build a facility where they could consolidate all the aspects of the production under one roof³. It took a few decades for them to succeed. Christie's is proud to present the very first fruit of this success - a gold, complicated wristwatch, Reference 2499/100, with the Movement No 869435 and the Case No. 2792095.

The watch comes from the legendary two series of the most complicated wristwatches the company, at the time, produced; Ref. 1518 and its successor Ref. 2499. Both feature a perpetual calendar, a chronograph with an option of start/pause/go or start/stop/return-to-zero⁴, and minute registers. Most of them were equipped with a tachometer and some with pulsometer scales. The company was producing approximately fourteen of these watches per year⁵.

Ref. 2499 held a special place in the Patek Philippe production. It was introduced in 1950 to join the celebration of the second half of the century, a time full of hope for brighter years. All the important Swiss watch companies took part in the celebration. Rolex, for instance, had a large celebration on a yacht sailing the lake of Geneva. To make the trip more interesting, they set, but not wound, a few of their waterproof and self-winding watches, put them in a cage attached to the boat and dropped them into water and towed them all day long while the festivities lasted. Then, at the end of the day, the watches were brought up aboard; all ran and kept good time.

Patek Philippe celebrated the festivities with the launching of Ref. 2499. Eventually, it became the most legendary series of their watches. At the time of its creation, this series was one of the most complicated watches Patek Philippe had ever produced. Generally, Ref. 2499 is divided into four subseries. This is a simplification, but for our story it is not important.

What is important is the fact that the Sterns wanted to produce their most complicated watches with all the components made by Patek Philippe itself. They started the journey with the Ref. 2499. The watch we present here is the first one produced on that journey.

The company knew that it could produce its own movements. As we saw, this was proven by Philippe already in 1850. The Sterns also knew how to make watch dials. After all, they owned one of the most prestigious watch dial companies in Switzerland⁶. But they had little, if any, experience with manufacturing watch cases.

For instance, the entire Reference 1518, the most important complicated watch series at the time, was cased by Emile Vichet, an excellent Geneva casemaker, whose claim to fame came from his ability of making cases even for ultra-thin movements, including casing them in coins.

With the advent of Reference 2499, Emile Vichet continued casing this series too, but only for about the first two years. After that, Patek Philippe subcontracted the famous Wenger, SA, run by Édouard Wenger, who kept casing Ref. 2499 until 1982 including 2499/100.

What Wenger probably did not know, was that the owners of Patek Philippe were planning to have their watches made in their own cases, entirely by Patek Philippe itself.

To that end, in the 1970's, Philippe Stern⁷ bought Ateliers Réunis S.A., a watch case company in Geneva, at Rue des Vieux-Grenadiers 7. Please note that the address is the same as where the Patek Philippe Museum stands today, a museum housing the most important watch collection in the world.

Ateliers Réunis was a case and watch bracelet company owned by the Sterns. In the beginning, the Sterns were not involved in the running of the company, but in 2005 Philippe Stern became the president taking over Monsieur Perret Marcel's duties. It was there, that Philippe's son, Thierry Stern, began studying the manufacturing side of the business, where he also became involved with the methods of production for the first time. In 2009 he took over his father's duties and became the president of Ateliers Réunis. A few years later he consolidated the company with the Patek Philippe empire as a watch case manufacturing department.

In order to continue with our watch we must point out certain characteristics of Ref. 2499.

UNDERSTANDING REF. 2499

As I mentioned before, the division of Ref. 2499, as it stands today, is far from perfect. To go over the differences is beyond the scope of this essay but certain elements must be pointed out to understand the importance of this watch.

- The serial numbers are not chronological. For instance, an early No. 869250 corresponds to 2499/100 from 1982, but a higher number 869441 corresponds to 1971 from, the so called, Series 3.
- The series is often mixed with another series, for instance, No. 863,792 belongs to Ref. 2499 but the following number, 863,793, belongs to an earlier Ref, 1518.
- The sub-series are also mixed; a watch from Series 3 can be before series 2.
- The reason for all this was that during the production, any of the 13"-130 QP movements⁸ could fit any of the cases. It was not practical to always follow the numerical order.
- The division of Ref. 2499 for Series 1, Series 2, Series 3, was not done by Patek Philippe but by a certain horologist in the late 1980's, who wanted to aid himself with the descriptions of these watches. Although, at the time, helpful, it missed the divisions made by Patek Philippe itself.
- The Ref. 2499/100 is unique because it was marked so, by the company itself.

The decision to start this new series was made by Patek Philippe in 1970s.

The casing was done by Wenger, for whom it was a natural continuation of casing Ref. 2499, which he started about a quarter of a century before. He continued making cases for 2499/100 until 1982, his last case No. 2,779,193 having the movement No. 869432⁹.

We do not know exactly when Sterns decided to make their own 2499/100. It might have been earlier than it is believed. For their first watch (this one) they took a movement, No. 869,435 from circa 1970. It was from a series of movements designated for Wenger, who used them from the early 1960s to

at least 1977. It was a complete series of numbers starting from No. 869,329 to No. 869,491 or maybe a few numbers more.

The serial number of this watch, 869,435, is from a series of Wenger 2499's, not from the series of Patek Philippe 2499/100s, as we will see. The consecutive ten numbers 869,436 - 869,446 Wenger cased in 1971 and 1972.

In 1982, the Sterns were ready to make their own cases for the Ref. 2499¹⁰!

Although 1982 saw the last of Ref. 2499 cased by Wenger it was not the end of 2499 for the Sterns. For them it was actually the beginning of Ref. 2499 cased by Patek Philippe itself, the most complicated series cased in the house!

There is a general misconception regarding the 2499/100. It has been thought that 2499/100 is just the finish of the Ref. 2499. But no, it was actually the beginning of Patek Philippe's complicated watches made in the house! And the very first, is this one!

After completing this watch with a movement from the Wenger series, the company designated a series of movements from No. 869,238 to 869,309 which, with a few exceptions, was used for Ref. 2499/100 finished and cased in the house.

The entire, in-house series, with the exemption of this one (which was a prototype), follows an order, in a sense, that an increase in the number of the movement follows the increase in the number of the case. The second in-house 2499/100, with the case that has the subsequent serial number to ours, No. 2,792,096, cased the movement No. 869,238. And starting with movement 869,250, the number of the movement increases the same amount as the case number.

The first case made by Ateliers Réunis S.A. for the new series was No. 2,792,095 made in 1982, housing this very watch. The last one was No. 2,817,877, made in platinum, completed in 1989 and never sold. It is now in the Patek Philippe Museum (Inv. P-711). The first one we are proudly presenting in our New York auction on December 6.

The successor to Ref. 2499, Ref. 3970 was cased also by Ateliers Réunis. It was cased in a similar case, improved by a waterproof threaded back. And all that began with this very watch.

Production of reference 5004 was launched in 1994 and remained in production until 2009. It is estimated that less than 140 examples of this reference were made in white gold over this time period. Of all 5004s, excluding the 5004s made in stainless steel, white gold examples are believed that to be the rarest case color. *Patek Philippe* replaced it with two other much slimmer and smaller platinum split-seconds chronograph references: the cushion-shaped reference 5951 released in 2010 with inhouse caliber CHR 27-525 PS Q and the reference 5204, released in March 2012 at the BaselWorld with in-house caliber CHR 29-535 PS Q.

Reference 5004 is illustrated in *Patek Philippe* Wristwatches by Martin Huber & Alan Banbery, second edition, p. 312.

Patek Philippe Ref. 3970

In 1986, *Patek Philippe* launched a new generation of the perpetual calendar chronograph wristwatch, designated reference 3970, replacing the hugely successful reference 2499 in production in four different series from 1951 to 1985. The main difference in the movement was the arrival of the new Lemania based ébauche which replaced the Valjoux movement used for the previous 50 years.

Starting with movement number 875'000, the first series of reference 3970 was produced with a solid snap on back, comprising approximately 100 examples. The second series introduced a solid screw back, designated reference 3970E (E for étanche, French for waterproof). A small number of watches from both series were also available with a sapphire crystal back, designated reference 3971E. In 1989, a third series of ref. 3970 was launched, fitted with a solid screw back as well as an additional sapphire crystal display screw back.

Reference 3970 was discontinued in 2004 and replaced by reference 5970. While production of the reference 3970/3971 may have ended only thirteen years ago, these modern yet classic perpetual calendar chronographs have become a must-have for the discerning collector of complicated wristwatches. The present example has a dial which is set with 10 diamond hour markers and one baton-cut diamond index at 12 o'clock.

As the appeal for *Patek Philippe* perpetual chronographs is exceptionally strong, this watch further impresses. Upon its introduction at the Basel Fair in April 2011 it was the firm's first perpetual calendar chronograph to use a 100% in-house designed and manufactured movement. This model houses the celebrated caliber 29-535 PS with *Patek Philippe's* modern hallmark of excellence, the PP Seal.

The 5270 was introduced with dial variants. The first, now discontinued, has a railroad outer seconds track, larger *Patek Philippe* signature, and black oxidized gold baton numerals. The second variation was introduced in late 2013 with both a silver as well as blue dial, such as the present watch. Perhaps the most distinguishing feature of these dials is the dip in the outer seconds track at 6 o'clock. Often referred to as a 'chin dial,' this feature is characteristic of only this second generation 5270. In addition, the dial features legible circular apertures for day/night as wall as leap year indication, two windows for day and month, all housed within a large and attractive 41mm case. The present timepiece with white 'chin' dial has never before been offered at Christie's.

Reference 5970 was introduced to the market in 2005 and replaced the celebrated reference 3970. The model immediately enjoyed great popularity amongst collectors and was available in white gold or pink gold only until 2007 when the production of these two versions ceased. Reference 5970 in yellow gold was in production only in 2008. Since 2008, the model was available exclusively in platinum.

At the 2011 Basel Fair, the reference 5970 was replaced by the reference 5270 which additionally has a day/night indication on the dial, as well as a separate leap year cycle and is equipped with the in-house caliber CH 29-535 PS Q. (Please see lot 82 in this sale).

Reference 5970 is the last perpetual calendar chronograph of the company featuring the Geneva seal on the movement as *Patek Philippe* began stamping their movements with the *Patek Philippe Seal* from mid-2009 as a new quality benchmark for its mechanical timepieces. Reference 5020 was in production from 1994 until 2002, and available in yellow, pink, and white gold, as well as platinum. It takes a unique and different design approach to perpetual calendar chronographs, and today is a highly sought after model. Introduced as an alternative to the 3970 perpetual chronograph, the 5020 was dubbed the 'TV set' in the late 1990s due to its tonneau shape taking inspiration from vintage *Patek Philippe* chronographs.

Reference 5020 was in production from 1994 until 2002, and available in yellow, pink, and white gold, as well as platinum. It is believed that less than 600 examples of this reference were ever made. Of all the colors made, platinum is considered one of the rarest variants and is considered a holy grail of watch collections today. Thanks to its generous proportions, reference 5020 is easily distinguishable from other *Patek Philippe* wristwatches and takes a unique position in the production of perpetual calendar chronographs.

This example was made in 2001 and is one of the last examples of the 5020P to ever be produced. While no one but *Patek Philippe* knows exactly how many platinum examples were ever produced, less than 10 examples in platinum have ever surfaced publicly for sale to date and strong prices to compete to own complete examples are the norm at auction today.

This example is offered from the original owner who purchased the watch at *Hausmann Jewelers* in 2001. Please note, platinum versions of the reference 5020 were not manufactured with an extra solid case back. To the best of our knowledge the present watch has never before been offered in public.

The Reference 5101 is the first timepiece that combines two complications which are very difficult to accommodate in the confined space of a rectangular movement: two tandem mainspring barrels with 240 hours of energy storage capacity and a tourbillon precision regulator composed of 72 individual parts.

Characteristic for *Patek Philippe*, hardly any signs on the outside of the piece would reveal the complexity of its inner workings. Understated elegance has always been a hallmark of *Patek Philippe* but the tourbillon cage is in fact concealed for a very practical reason - the oil used to lubricate the mechanism is sensitive to ultraviolet rays and will decompose when exposed to daylight, thus losing its beneficial tribological properties. Extremely stringent standards are imposed on all *Patek Philippe* movements and even more so on tourbillon pieces.

To commemorate *Patek Philippe's* 175th anniversary in 2014, the firm reinterpreted the legendary World Time model, for the first time giving it a hauntingly poetic moon phase display. To help it venture into these new technical and aesthetic dimensions, the manufacture developed a new version of ultra-thin self-winding movement: the caliber 240 HU LU. The engineers dispensed with the usual aperture and its disk adorned with two moons; instead, a single, large, richly atmospheric moon turns clockwise at the center of the dial against a star-studded nocturnal sky. The effect is achieved with two very thin disks of mineral glass. The lower disk, depicting the moon, completes a rotation in a lunar month. The fixed upper disk is a heart-shaped mask; its outline reveals the changing visible portion of the moon night after night with astonishing accuracy. A complex new metallization technique has produced a moon whose face stands out against its starry background with almost photographic realism.

The elegant case of the reference 5575 differs in shape from the famous references 5110 and 5130 with its voluptuous lyre-shaped lugs and lack of crown guard, giving the model a clean sharp line contrasting perfectly with the complexity of the dial. For the first time, the city of Geneva replaces Paris as the European time zone city.

First launched in 1930s and patented in 1959, *Patek Philippe's* World Time watches enjoy cult status among travelers and collectors. The two rotating disks show the time simultaneously in all 24 time zones. With the 1999 patented single pusher adjustment mechanism is possible to correct all the displays with the single push of one button, without affecting the rate of the watch movement.

The reference 5575 was made in a limited series of 1,300 pieces and exclusively in white gold. It is one of the most popular watches in today's market, highly sought-after by collectors worldwide. To the best of our knowledge the present watch has never before been offered in public.

The movement consists of 406 parts, the plates and bridges are made of untreated German silver and finished with circular graining and Glashütte ribbing. The balance bridge is manually engraved with a master's personal free-hand technique, making each Datograph a one-of-a-kind timepiece.

Introduced into the market in 2005, the *Lange 1 Time Zone* is another example of *A. Lange & Söhne's* conception of exceptional watchmaking, uniting several complications, aesthetics, readability and simplicity of use.

The model features two eccentric dials each with its own independent day/ night indicator. Using a system which allows easy adjustment, the wearer can select which time zone is to be displayed on the larger of the two dials: home time, or the local time in a particular country, or any other time zone. The second time zone can also be easily selected using a pushbutton and a rotating city ring. With each push, the city ring and the hands of the second time zone advance simultaneously one notch and one hour. The oversized date is automatically synchronized with the larger of the two dials.

Reference 4178, one of *Vacheron Constantin's* landmark chronograph models, was in production from 1938 until the early 1970s. It existed with oval-shaped chronograph buttons or with the better known rectangular variant, the bezel was either beveled or flat.

This watch is a particularly fine example of the celebrated reference 4178, impressing with the highly attractive silvered dial, beautifully harmonizing with the gold case with the elegant teardrop lugs. PROPERTY OF A NORTH AMERICAN FAMILY

The following special section represents part one of an important collection of Patek Philippe watches assembled over decades by a family that is simply passionate about watches. Defined by rarity, quality, and condition, this collection was curated with a creative approach to assemble one of the finest collections known in North America with a mixture of modern and vintage timepieces focusing on the evolution of complications.

In many cases, collections are living and breathing entities that evolve over time based on changing tastes and interests. With this assembly of timepieces, the collection honors Patek Philippe 's heritage of making some of the world's most extraordinary complicated timepiece as well as the heritage of bold Patek Philippe design. The majority of this first part of the collection features time only pieces of unusual design and complicated Patek Philippe timepieces dating from the 1950s to 2010s with examples of timepieces from each major type of complication.

The time only selection is highlighted by a complete set of Ref. 5500s being offered separately. The iconically designed Pagoda timepiece was made as a limited edition to celebrate the opening of Patek Philippe's factory in 1997. On the eve of the opening of a new expansion of this same complex in 2019, it is fitting to look back at the beginnings of this historic centralization of Patek Philippe's watchmaking.

With chronographs, the selection includes a 5070G and R and two chronographs with the most desirable of retailer signatures in the present era, a 5170J and 5960R each with Tiffany & Co. signatures. From a very early example of a 3940J to the recently produced 5940J, the bookends of the perpetual offerings are filled with some of the most desirable perpetual calendars made by Patek Philippe in recent years. Representing minute repeaters, the iconic 3979J with an enamel dial and the extraordinarily complicated and elegant Ref. 5013R are presented and offer insight into the long journey of Patek Philippe repeaters from a design and technical perspective.

The vintage highlights include two extremely important vintage offerings. First, a 2438/1J in incredibly preserved original condition. One of the rarest examples of vintage complicated Patek Philippe watches, with less than 40 examples made, is the ref. 2438/1. As the water resistant titan of early perpetual calendars, the 2438/1 is rare as it is is appealing to the modern eye with its bold oversized case.


Finally, the vintage highlight of the collection, and one of the most important watches to resurface this year is the GRAVES-FULLERTON 3448J formerly owned by the Grandson of Henry Graves, Jr. This 3448J was purchased by Reginald 'Pete' Fullerton to complete his vertical collection of Patek Philippe perpetual calendars from the vintage through the modern era. It is in the spirit of Graves and Fullerton that the family assembled this remarkable collection.



Reference 3940, the quintessential perpetual calendar and distinguished by its timeless elegance, is undeniably amongst *Patek Philippe's* greatest classics. Launched in 1984 as replacement for reference 3450, it was at the time the slimmest automatic perpetual calendar wristwatch.

An initial series of around 100 pieces were manufactured between 1984 and 1985, the first 25 were especially made for the 225th anniversary of *Patek Philippe's* retailer Chronometrie Beyer in Zurich, numbered and personalized. Starting in 1985, reference 3940 went into standard production. Until the model's discontinuation in 2007 when it was replaced by reference 5140 three further series were produced. The present example stands out with its attractive and rare gilt dial.

The present reference 2438-1 is an extremely attractive example of this super-rare model, of which only approximately thirty examples in yellow gold are publicly known. Very seldom offered at auction, the legendary reference 2438-1 must be considered, along with the references 1518, 2497 and 2499, amongst the most iconic and sought-after of *Patek Philippe's* "golden-age" complicated wristwatches.

The hallmark on the bottom right left lug is crisp and clearly visible, indicating that the watch has never been subject to careless polishing. The unrestored dial depicts a lovely shine, adding to the overall appeal of this fine timepiece.

Reference 2438-1

Reference 2438-1 was produced between 1952 and 1963 and only available in either yellow or pink gold. It was in fact made as a water-resistant variation of the more familiar reference 2497 which is fitted with the same movement and dial. Supplied by Wenger, one of the best case makers in Geneva, the case of the 2438-1 is fitted with a screw down back as opposed to the 2497s snap on back and is 0.7 mm smaller with a still impressive diameter of 37 mm. - oversized at the time of its first inception, but totally in line with today's standards. The references 2438-1 and 2497 were the first and only sweep centre seconds perpetual calendar watches produced by *Patek Philippe* right up until the launch of references 5050 and 5059 nearly forty years later in 1993.

The aesthetic impact of the reference 2438-1 largely stems from its iconic lugs, defined by the carved groove to the upper outer edges, a feature it has in common with the reference 2499. (Please see Lot 77 in this sale). This detail transfigures the overall look of the watch imbuing it with a subtle yet stately importance leaving no doubt that one is in the presence of one of watch collecting's all-time classics.

The present watch is from the model's second series with a second series Mark I dial. The first series reference 2438 is recognized by its applied Arabic numerals and feuille hands. The second series, such as the present, can be found with two dial variations: Mark I - with applied five-facet "bullet" baton numerals and dauphine hands; Mark II - with shorter four-facet baton numerals.





Previously owned by Reginald 'Pete' Fullerton, Grandson of Henry Graves, Jr., the present reference 3448 offered here for sale is an impressive example of the reference with superlative provenance.

Manufactured in 1973, the timepiece features a stunningly well preserved dial with perfectly clear markers and signature. It displays the "Aprior" mark on either side of the word "Swiss" at 6 o'clock and the minute divisions painted in batons, perfectly complementing the gold baton hour markers.

The 18k gold case is likewise very well preserved, with clearly legible gold marks and sharp, well-defined edges, now developing an attractive patina.

The Graves-Fullerton Reference 3448

Reference 3448 is one of *Patek Philippe*'s best known perpetual calendar models and also one of the most easily recognizable thanks to its angular, architecturally designed case made by Antoine Gerlach. The model was introduced in 1962 and was at the time the first self-winding perpetual calendar wristwatch. It is thought that a total of only 586 examples were made, the majority in yellow gold cases. Few watches were cased in white gold and only two examples in platinum are known to date.

The movement is the celebrated caliber 27-460 that was upgraded and renamed caliber 27-460 Q with a perpetual calendar mechanism fitted on the movement plate underneath the dial. The caliber 27-460 Q is amongst the most sophisticated and lavish automatic movements ever made.

Reginald 'Pete' Fullerton (1933-2012)

Reginald 'Pete' Fullerton, developed an acute passion for collecting under the watchful tutelage of his grandfather, Henry Graves, Jr. Arguably one of the greatest watch collectors of all time, Graves passed in 1953, leaving his collection to his daughter who, in turn, passed it to her son, Reginald Fullerton. Fullerton inherited one of the most important collections of watches ever assembled – and went on to put together an impressive collection of his own. Born in the midst of the Great Depression in 1933, just a few months after his grandfather took possession of the *Patek Philippe* Supercomplication, Reginald 'Pete' Fullerton inherited a life of privilege at the pinnacle of New York society. His mother, Gwendolen Graves Fullerton, was the daughter of notable collector Henry Graves, Jr. His father, Reginald Fullerton, came from the same tight circle of well-connected, pedigreed New York families. As a child, Pete eagerly spent time with his grandfather and observed him meticulously care for his extensive collection of timepieces. Pete addressed Henry Graves, Jr. as 'Grandfather', a name said with deep respect and admiration for the man who had immeasurable impact on both Pete's character and interests. Pete's desire to be closer to his grandfather developed into a true appreciation for watches and a desire to assemble his own collection.

Educated at Westminster School in Simsbury, CT and Phillips Academy in Andover, MA, young Pete often accompanied his grandfather to visits to the Henri Stern Watch Agency and Tiffany & Co. in New York and observed attentive staff cater to his grandfather's needs. Only after Henry Graves, Jr. passed in 1953 did Fullerton acquire his first *Patek Philippe* watch five months to the day after his grandfather passed away. He chose a Ref. 1578 purchased for 1000 Swiss francs (\$234). He went on to study business at Yale University, completing his degree in 1953, before joining the family business.

Fullerton followed his father into finance and joined Bankers Trust, quickly ascending to Vice President, the youngest in the company's storied history. During these years of long hours and relentless work, his greatest pleasure was travel and he embarked upon numerous trips to Europe and Africa. On a trip to Geneva in 1960 with his mother Gwendolen, Fullerton celebrated his early success at Bankers Trust with a purchase of a reference 2497 in prototype case.

After his mother's death in 1969, Fullerton inherited the Henry Graves, Jr. collection. Fullerton found himself the caretaker of one of the world's greatest watch collections, including the *Patek Philippe* Supercomplication (the world's most complicated watch at the time). During this decade and the decade to follow, mechanical watchmaking entered a period of profound quiet in the wake of the quartz revolution. Fullerton's continued appreciation of fine mechanical timepieces was nearly unique in a world that was rapidly moving toward more groundbreaking technologies. Although he did eventually decide to part with select examples of his Grandfather's collection, including the Supercomplication, Fullerton kept the majority intact out of respect to his grandfather's memory and the sheer enjoyment he felt being the family steward of these rare mechanical timepieces.

Inspired by his grandfather's extraordinary collection, Fullerton was determined to quietly and discretely make his own mark in the world of watch collecting to connect with and complement his grandfather's legacy. As the appreciation for fine mechanical timepieces returned in the 1980s, Fullerton interest in acquiring select timepieces was reignited as he retired from the family bank. Approximately 50 *Patek Philippe* timepieces were looked after by Pete during his lifetime as he continued to collect verticals of watches based on themes developed by his grandfather. After acquiring the prototype 2497 and a 3940, for example, he hunted to find a 3448 (the presently offered lot) and later a reference of a 3450 with a special dial. Only *Patek Philippe* was allowed to service and care for his watches while under his stewardship.

Although in private, he was dedicated to preserving and continuing the family legacy, his public life was fully dedicated to the numerous local social organizations and charities close to his heart. Widely known in his community as a gentleman and philanthropist, Pete was a cornerstone of the local social fabric as a longstanding member and trustee of several social clubs in New York and Watch Hill. His passion for the protection and conservation of animals both on a local and international scale most captured his imagination. His passion for animals was a topic he most enjoyed discussing with acquaintances and close friends. Indeed, two of his constant companions were his dogs who would accompany him during his nightly ritual of winding and taking care of his family collection.

For Pete, each watch represented his ties to family history, a story of a personal accomplishment, and a legacy for the future. His passion for collecting was the one constant throughout his life, carefully developed under the watchful eye of his grandfather - one which he furthered in his own right.

Ref. 5940 was launched at Baselworld in 2012, available in yellow and pink gold only. The white gold version, such as the present watch, was introduced in 2014, with silvery-white or black dial.

The cushion or "tortue" design is inspired by *Patek Philippe's* watches from the 1920s and 1930s, the dial adorned with Breguet numerals further evoking the Art Deco period.

Reference 5940 is the successor of reference 3940 and houses the exact same automatic movement as its predecessor, caliber 240.

Part of Patek Philippe's "Grand Complication" series, reference 5013 is the first minute repeating wristwatch featuring an automatic movement combined with a perpetual calendar and retrograde date. At the time of its introduction in 1992, it was the firm's most complicated wristwatch ever made and was available in yellow, white, pink gold and platinum. It is fitted with Patek Philippe's legendary caliber R 27 PS QR, self-winding with minute repeating, distinguished by a chime of exceptional quality. Extensive researches in metallurgy and acoustics where necessary to achieve a sound of such perfection and unrivalled purity. On demand, the minute repeater will strike the hours, the quarter hours, and the minutes which have elapsed since the last guarter hour. One hammer strikes the number of hours on a low pitched gong, followed by two hammers consecutively striking the number of quarter hours on the low pitched and the high pitched gong. Finally, the number of minutes elapsed since the last guarter hour are stroke by the second hammer on the high pitched gong. The largest number of strikes - 32 in total - is required to indicate the time at 12.59h: twelve low pitched strikes, three high-low double strike and 14 high strikes.

In 2011, the original retail price of a Ref. 5013R was 607,200 CHF. The reference 5013 is one of the rarest by number of all *Patek Philippe* Grand Complications made in the post-2000 era and the platinum and rose gold models are the rarest color variations. In fact, less than 20 pink gold examples are believed to have been produced.

As one of the most complicated *Patek Philippe* wristwatches on the market in the 1990s and early 2000s, it is interesting to note that Richard Mille watches adapted a similar shape with their introductions to the market in 2001. Not by coincidence, this tonneau and cushion shapes of this era defined the look of high end watchmaking with a distinctive design flare and homage to classic shapes from the vintage world.


Since its launch, to the best of our knowledge this will be the 7th pink gold version to be identified to market and has never before been offered in public.

GMT-Master

Due to the extraordinary success of the *Rolex* Sports models in the 1950s, it came as no surprise when the world's largest airline Pan Am commissioned a specially designed watch allowing their pilots to keep track of time in two locations.


With the beginning of transatlantic flights with jet aircrafts in 1956, travelers appreciated the fact that the journey times were reduced from 13 hours to 7 but suffered from new phenomena, jet lag. Worried about the possible effects on their pilots, and after research, Pan Am management advised them to keep on "home" time while away from base. As at the same time they needed to know the local time, a joint Pan Am and Rolex task force was assigned. The team devised a watch with an additional hour hand, which revolved once every 24 hours, and a rotating bezel marked with those same 24 hours. The model was named "G.M.T.-Master" after the world's standard time, the Greenwich Mean Time.

The first GMT model, reference 6542, was launched in 1954 and was immediately recognizable by the bright acrylic or bakelite bezel insert with the twenty-four hour markings printed on its underside. This material was chosen to reduce reflection which would disturb the pilots. The bezel ring was also made of acrylic and coated in an alloy to resemble metal. It then turned out that the flexibility of this material could cause the bezel insert to break and that in very warm environments the printing would often flake off. Consequently, *Rolex* decided to replace the acrylic insert against a more resistant metal version.

The present GMT-Master is an extremely rare and attractive example. Retaining its original bezel which has now aged to a dark navy and deep burgundy color, the dial has also aged where the luminous numerals have a caramel hue and the alternate black and red date wheel solidifies the vintage aesthetic.

The GMT-Master model was originally developed in association with Pan Am Airlines to allow pilots to track time in two time zones: local and home. This was because physicians at Pan Am suggested that keeping track of the home time might mitigate the effects of jet lag. Thus, this model was born as an absolute tool watch, furthermore responding to a specific need. Its success, however, soon prompted *Rolex* to realize examples in precious metal and later on even brought forth bejeweled examples of the model.

The present timepiece is a representative of this "luxury evolution" of the line. It features the sought-after "nipple dial", the nickname deriving from the shape of the dot numerals. The deep gold hue of the case and bracelet is masterfully reprised by the gilt designation of the dial and bezel, and the midnight black dial is mirrored in the black bezel insert. This alternation of deep dark tones and warm hues impart to the timepiece a remarkable aesthetic appeal and perfect legibility. The presence of the Jubilee bracelet further amplifies the appeal of the timepiece and, thanks to the links, the watch conveys a markedly sophisticated and vintage aesthetic. Interestingly, the serial number is a palindrome, which means it is read the same way forwards and backwards.

The present chronograph wristwatch is a beautiful example of the much sought-after *Rolex* reference 6236. The highly collectible *Rolex* Oyster triple calendar chronograph watches, which are also known as Dato Compax models, consist of four different series. Famed French Olympic skiing legend and *Rolex* enthusiast Jean-Claude Killy has sported a Dato Compax in the past and the model family hence has been dubbed by watch enthusiasts the "Jean-Claude Killy". The three earlier series of the Dato Compax model were given reference numbers 4767, 5036 and 6036.

Reference 6236, such as the present watch, is the final version of the model. It was in production between 1958 and 1962 and is easily identifiable by the larger bezel compared to its predecessors. In fact, the case of reference 6236 is made of three elements, the bezel no longer carved from the same block as the centre piece of the case. The dial displays a charismatic, uniform ivory-colored patina and has aged well in its 60+ year lifetime.

The present lot is offered by a descendant of the original owner, who acquired this watch in the early 1960s and wore it frequently throughout his extraordinary lifetime. The history of Doctor Luis Gallardo and his watch comes directly from his son, Luis Gallardo Jr., who tells us in his own words below about one particular event which shaped his life and consequently the lives of many others.

"Tragedy at Mount Iztaccíhuatl was an adventure experienced by Doctor Luis Gallardo, who lived this ordeal in 1968 wearing his Rolex watch. In it, he played an important part saving the life of twenty-one persons in peril (nineteen young boys and two adults), caught in a storm at high altitude in a 16,000 ft. Mexican mountain.

As a youngster, our man, Dr. Luis Gallardo, studied at a famed catholic boys school¹ in Guadalajara², noted for its forward attitude. It made emphasis on academic issues and physical or sportive effort, among this mountaineering, being the CAIC³ its climbing club, under the direction of popular and well loved "Old Padre" Luis Hernandez-Prieto during the 1950's and 60's.

All year round, the CAIC made many hiking and mountain climbing trips, spearing for the end of the season the conquering of the three highest Mexican peaks. One of them is Mount Iztaccíhuatl, close to Mexico City and scenario of this story. The CAIC also made trips overseas some years, having climbed Mont Blanc and Matterhorn in the Alps the year before this story (just to make emphasis that some of the boys and guides had pretty good experience). This mentioned because some press people considered "inexperience" as the cause to blame the "Padres" of the tragedy and not to a terrible storm, one that happens once every three to four decades, a storm that closed some roads and highways as far as 100 miles from the mountain for many hours. Some cousins of mine belonged to this group (CAIC) and one of them, when in threat at the time, remembered his uncle Luis (my father) and made the radio call asking for help.

Dr. Luis Gallardo, my father, was born (1922) in Guadalajara. After finishing medical school, he left the city and went to gain postgraduate training at a famous hospital⁴ in America. World War II had just ended and there he met US Navy nurse Margaret⁵, a beautiful gringa⁶ with whom decided to share life and raise a family. They came to live to Mexico City where they had seven children⁷. He was a hard and responsible worker so gave his family a comfortable life and had the time and the means for his passion: Outdoor Sports. He loved nature, was a good mountain climber and for that, among others, he was admired by many of his family and friends; a condition that made possible the episode to be narrated here.


Tragedy at Mount Iztaccíhuatl⁸ (February 1968)

It took place early that year, when the spring season was just about to turn in⁹. That year in particular started with greetings in Mexico, since the summer Olympic Games would then take place in our country. All was cream and honey, but suddenly tragedy stroked our souls. The sons of some of the most prominent families in Guadalajara were lost and dying in a storm at Mount Iztaccíhuatl, one of the highest and among the most famous of our mountains.

The CAIC - Alpine Corp of a named Jesuit school in Guadalajara, had send, as most years had done, his intrepid students to climb such a noted mountain. It takes between seven to nine hours¹⁰ to reach the summit from Base Camp, needing another four or five to come back down so, in order to fulfill the task during day light, the enterprise must start much before dawn. That is why sixty or so kids between 12 and 22 years of age started a very early climb guided by young but experienced mountaineer priests. After a five-hour ascent, the group reached a partial summit, a place with a magnificent view where, after a rest and restore stop, they split, the youngest boys coming back down to Base Camp and the oldest and strongest ones heading to the top.

After a while, they reached the base of a wide hanging cliff called *Las Espinillas*¹¹. It is a rock face about 60 ft. high that stands below the south summit called *La Rodilla*¹². In order to reach the summit from this place, mountaineers must climb through a narrow strait known as the *Canaleta*¹³, a concealed pass that permits to do so with much precaution but without the need of nails, ropes and rappel. At the base of that cliff stand a small mountain refuge, a shelter made out of aluminum and wood named *Esperanza López Mateos*. When they reached that point, five of the big boys also decided to return to Base Camp, among them a cousin of mine. The other 30 with two priest-guides kept on toward the summit.

It had been a beautiful day, sunny, clear and free of wind. Then, while the boys were at the summit (well after noon), a terrible storm suddenly covered

the whole mountain with its blizzard and lightning. The turning back hike now became precariously slow and scary, and worst, since two feet of new snow erased the tracks and enclosed the pathways across crevasses and precipices. It was nighttime when the freezing boys reached the mentioned cliff separating them from safety. With the new snow covering the rocks and trails, plus the lack of light and the blizzard, they could not find the *Canaleta*, the safe path to come down the cliff and small mountain refuge. Therefore, they decided to spend the night there and they all gathered to prepare a bivouac behind the rocks.

After midnight, the storm diminished and the stars began to shine. Some of the bigger boys went in search of the *Canaleta* or a place suitable to climb down. Communication through walkie-talkies was able again, so then the first report in the Base Camp was that they were trapped there by the storm; and later added that three of the boys had died (they had fallen in their attempt to find or climb down the frozen wall).

That night at Base Camp, with the storm and not knowing about the fate of the climbers, one of the young Padres and a cousin of mine (the one who had returned earlier into the Base Camp and had mentioned my father's knowledge of the mountain)¹⁴, went to a Transmitting Station that was close to camp. There, by radio, got hold to my father at home: "Uncle Luis, my friends are trapped in a storm at Mt Iztaccíhuatl... maybe three dead" he said.

"The first SOS calls found an angel guardian many miles away...," $^{\rm 15}$ said later one of the Jesuit priests.

Immediately after the call, we jumped out of bed. My mother, brothers and sisters made lots of sandwiches, filled bottles with water and juice, picked up food cans, candies, a brandy bottle and gathered all in packs with blankets, jackets, sweaters, gloves, caps, etc. while my father and I got the mountain gear and first aid kit ready. We speeded up the mountain in my dad's car and at daybreak reached Base Camp where an Army helicopter was waiting¹⁶.

The chopper was just standing there reflecting the first sunrays, but with the rising sun came good news for the boys, Yes, help was on their way! "...we were asked about the weather, since they planned to send a helicopter to help us... It is cover with fog, we replied...," ¹⁷ wrote later in his report Oscar Sarabia, one of the young survivors that by then had taken command of the situation¹⁸.

We crowded the helicopter with stuff, my father climbed in (no room for me)¹⁹ and then he guided the pilot to the wreck scene high above among the clouds. After several tries the site was found in middle of the mist but, with no place to land the chopper, my father dropped close by all the bags with supplies and then he jumped from it, into the air, toward the nearest side of the mountain's falling slope, where he had a tough but uninjured landing. With the help of some of the boys that came to greet him, they carried all the stuff to the place where, at his arrival, started giving the boys not only food, water and clothing but also embraces and most of all faith and hope.

Help had arrived from the sky: "... latter came a helicopter. Since it could not make a safe landing, it let drop some bags full with food and clothes. At the same time, a man, Doctor Luis Gallardo, jumped from the machine... another boy and I picked up the stuff, while the doctor went to attend Mayorga, Cortez, Javier Olavarria and Jesus Jimenez. Olavarria was numb-frozen and Cortez had just recovered his senses", wrote Oscar Sarabia in his report²⁰.

But not only came help, also did motivation: "That doctor was an angel that came to help, to inspire a little courage, providing refreshments and support at such time...," said Oscar Sarabia forty years later²¹.

At my father's arrival, eleven boys had already perished (some from falls but most of them frozen during their sleep at night) and by then some of the healthy ones were gathering the bodies together. Quickly my father started to give medical attention to the ailing; a few of the boys and guides were injured or in a state of shock, some had hypothermia, one also with severe froze bite in hands and feet. This last was at first considered lifeless but fortunately got my father's medical attention on time²²

There was another lad considered dead that, with his attention, came back to life with his cheering friends around him! Many years later, wrote a friend in his name, he *"learned the name of the man that help him survive after being frozen at Iztaccihuatl... doctor Luis Gallardo, the man that jumped from the helicopter..."*²³

After giving the surviving boys and priests first hand help, rations and some comfort, it took the rest of the day to walk them down to the next mountain refuge; a bigger shelter -the lgloo- built a few hundred steps below the one at the base of the cliff. Before nightfall, a small group of rescuers arrived and there they shared with the boys another very nasty night.

At dawn next morning a small group of mountaineers, I among them, reached the refuge where my father had gathered the boys. Then we all tied up together under my father's instructions and started the way down. In such a manner, we brought back the survivors into the arms of their loved ones. The corpses were to come later but, brought by Red Cross helicopters that had arrived that day, they got into Base Camp a little before we did by foot.

At Base Camp anxiously awaited "old Padre" Hernandez-Prieto with the younger boys and some family. At our arrival, the Padre and my father held in a long, warm and meaningful embrace²⁴. By that time, the word of the accident had spread and the Base Camp was full with reporters, cameras, microphones, vehicles, lights. Distracted with the arrival of the corpses, we got our chance to leave: my father gave me a blink with an eye and a small head sign that I understood well and then quietly we left the scene, got into our car and headed back home.

"That doctor was a real hero for me... but he just left the same way he came", recalled later Oscar Sarabia, the helpful and supportive survivor.²⁵

Reporters surrounded the boys at their arrival and soon, the ones that kept some strength and were able to talk, monopolized the attention. When they got to the part that involved a "guardian angel", reporters started desperately to look for him. For many days, the mystery of such an angel or of the 'spirit of a gallant doctor' (gallant, gallardo in Spanish and our last name) was in the mouth of many media²⁶. Days later, when everything had cooled off, we reunited with the boys at memorial services held in Guadalajara, where we met their parents.

Many years have passed and my father is dead now. Only a cross eight-foot high stands in the site of the cliff below the summit where the tragedy took place²⁷; a cross with a spiritual legend on it: - *They did not die, they reached the Highest* ²⁸- and a plaque with the names of the eleven fallen boys.

Mountaineers that pass by it today name it the "Cruz de Guadalajara". Once every few years the mountaineers from their school come to clean it and fix whatever it needs.

My father bought his Rolex watch around 1960, wore it until his death in 1994, and always did it with pride, at all times and every outdoors event, sure that it was made for any kind of weather, precise and never to fail, even at high altitude and extreme cold. Yes, he was wearing it on his left wrist when the above-mentioned event took place. During such long, desperate and terrible hours, he would look at it with tears in his eyes, thinking of his own sons and the parents of the dead boys²⁹.

"Time seemed so slow that night..." he would say.

Indeed, my father was a hero, not only for me but also for many others. With his memory, he left us his love and that pride. I inherited his mountain gear with the Rolex, but I did not use it much. I found my modern black Cassio more practical. Anyway, my father's Rolex has always been with the family and now, at age 70, I can say that its outdoor and mountaineering history is past, so it is time it goes to another adventurer's wrist..."

Amongst watch enthusiasts, reference 6238 is often referred to as a "Pre-Daytona" and enjoys today growing popularity within the community of *Rolex* collectors. Launched circa 1960, the reference 6238 was the company's last traditional chronograph wristwatch with a polished bezel. Clearly designed as a sport watch, the reference 6238 maintains, thanks to its case proportions, a very refined yet masculine look.

The present watch is a striking example with its very rare silver/grey dial which is preserved in excellent condition.


Reference 6036, the third generation of the celebrated "Dato Compax" Oyster triple calendar chronograph model presented by *Rolex*, was available with various dial layouts, cased mainly in yellow gold and in stainless steel. The highly collectible *Rolex Oyster* triple calendar chronograph watches, also known as "Dato Compax" models, consist of four different series. Famed French Olympic skiing legend and *Rolex* enthusiast Jean-Claude Killy has sported a Dato Compax in the past and the model hence has been dubbed by watch enthusiasts the "Jean-Claude Killy".

The two earlier series of the Dato Compax model carry the reference numbers 4767 and 5036, the fourth and last reference 6236, fitted with a three-piece case, (Please see Lot 150 in this sale).

Examples of reference 6036 are described and illustrated in *I Cronografi Rolex - La Leggenda*, Pucci Papaleo Editore, pp. 380 - 401.

On July 16, 1969, at the Kennedy Space Center launch of the Apollo 11 first moon landing spacecraft, Mr. Robert Lightner was one of the few people that were allowed anywhere close to this historical site. Mr. Lightner was conducting a scientific project requested by the former director of the Kennedy Space Center and first director of NASA's Launch Operations Center, Dr. Kurt Debus. NASA contracted Mr. Lightner to engineer the Apollo logging system to record all the communications channels plus support equipment and to deliver this system to be installed by General Electric. The system was delivered successfully and was used on the first Apollo mission and all to follow. The only individuals allowed this close to the iconic event were the fire rescue team and the astronauts. In Mr. Lightner's own words, "... my insides shook hard!"

In addition to accompanying Mr. Lightner to the Apollo 11 launch, the present watch was worn by Mr. Lightner many times to the pit and paddock areas of Daytona races, often coming within 10 feet of racer Paul Newman in the pit area when he drove a Ford GT to win the GT class in the 24-hour Daytona race in 1995 when he was 70 years old, a feat no-one had previously accomplished at this age.

Not only has the present watch been extremely close to events which have been categorized as some of the most heralded events in history, but the discovery of this watch is a very rare occurrence in its own right.

Reference 6239, the very first model of the celebrated "Daytona" series could be found in sales catalogues in Europe as of 1964, though it is thought that the model was available in the US already in 1963.

Available in stainless steel, 14k and 18k gold, reference 6239 was the firm's first chronograph with the tachometer scale engraved on the bezel and the subsidiary dials printed in a different color than the main dial for better readability. The dials of the early models, as the present example, featured only the designation "Cosmograph", referring to the outer-space travels of the early 60s. The "Daytona" was added on later series to mark *Rolex's* sponsorship of the renowned NASCAR stock car race.

A very early example, this watch retains the original bezel calibrated to a maximum 300 units per hour, which was shortly thereafter changed on later examples of the reference 6239 to a maximum 200 units per hour. One will also notice that the "Cosmograph" designation is slightly lower, almost 'floating' on the dial, correct for this early example, and the hands are longer and thinner, also correct for early and rare examples. Furthermore, the movement is stamped *ROW*, indicating it was initially intended for the American market.


It is quite remarkable that the present watch has witnessed first hand history of the two main associated events of the *Rolex* Daytona, space travel as well as professional racing. Offered in excellent overall condition, complete with its original bracelet and *Rolex* presentation box, this watch is just as iconic as the events to which it has been proudly worn.

The presently offered wristwatch is a very attractive example of a "Big Red" Daytona reference 6263, the name derived from the bright red "Daytona" designation, a most popular model in today's market.

The reference 6263 was first introduced to the market in the early 1970s where the "Daytona" designation is found on examples from the mid-1970s onwards. The presently offered watch dates to circa 1985 and has been well-preserved over the last few decades. The silvered dial and black subsidiary dials are clean and the red Daytona designation retains is vivid color.



Reference 6240 was the first "Oyster Cosmograph" model produced by *Rolex*. This novelty was predominantly characterized by the screw down push buttons. In production only during the second half of the 1960s, it was replaced by the better known references 6263 and 6265.

The first of the screw down pushers Daytona, also mounting a black bezel, is a very attractive variant of the *Rolex* Daytona. Whilst the reference 6240 mounts the caliber 722 (even though early examples are known with the earlier 72B caliber, and late ones with the 722-1 caliber), the defining feature is undeniably the presence of the screw down pushers as opposed to pump pushers, which make the entire watch look bigger, more sportive and aggressive.

To come across a reference 6240 is rare, but to discover this example with a "Paul Newman" or "Exotic" dial is very rare indeed, especially coming form the original owner who purchased the watch in Italy in 1967 while traveling in Europe.

Immediately recognizable through its dial and aesthetics, the present chronograph is part of the reference 6239, launched in the early 1960s and the first *Rolex* chronograph reference with an engraved tachymeter scale on its bezel. Manufactured with pump chronograph pushers and an attractive stainless steel case, later followed by gold versions, part of the most coveted examples of the reference feature exotic "Paul Newman" dials.

The case back is correctly stamped 6239. The stamp CRS stands for the case maker Charles-René Spielmann.

Rolex reference 6264 was introduced in 1970 and produced for only three years. Together with reference 6262, it was the last *Rolex* chronograph watch featuring the simple round push-down buttons. All future chronograph references, starting with references 6263 and 6265 in 1971 bear screw down chronograph buttons. Reference 6264 was available in stainless steel, as well as 14k and 18k gold. It has a bezel with black plastic insert and white tachymeter graduation.

Of all the Rolex Paul Newman watches, the reference 6264 must be considered the rarest. When *Rolex* introduced their new chronographic caliber 727 in 1969, most of the Daytona line was upgraded. Reference 6239 - pump pushers and metal bezel - became reference 6262, and reference 6241 - pump pushers and black bezel - became the present reference 6264. Reference 6240, with black bezel and screw pushers, did not receive an immediate upgrade. This is probably because the market was originally quite wary of the screw pushers to the point of some customers complaining the prominent buttons would wear down shirt's cuffs. However, after few years, in 1972, the superior waterproof capabilities of the screw pushers case was fully recognized, and not only reference 6240 was upgraded with the new caliber – spawning two references: 6263 and 6265, with respectively black and metal bezels - but furthermore references 6262 and 6264 were at the same time discontinued. This decision resulted in these two references being the Daytona models with the shortest production run: only 4 year from '69 to '72, and consequently among the most difficult to obtain.

The reference 6264 on offer here will excites the seasoned collector. One will observe that it s has been kept in excellent overall condition, displaying sharp milling on the back, full and well-defined lugs and has beautifully preserved outlines. Furthermore, the white section of the dial is extremely clean and without blemishes, very rare for a watch which is almost 50 years old. The luminous material is in tact and has aged evenly throughout. Upon first glance, this watch is extremely attractive and highly-sought after for its rarity and very well preserved condition of both dial and case.

The present piece not only is an extremely well-preserved example of this highly collectible reference, but it furthermore features the hallowed "Paul Newman" dial – or "exotic", as it was at the time called by *Rolex*. It is interest to note how the dial correctly lacks the "Oyster" designation, as in fact the case is not an Oyster case due to the lack of screw pushers, and features a flat Swiss designation, as opposed to the sloped "sing-a-song" designation found on earlier Paul Newman versions.

A cornerstone of a serious *Rolex* collection, reference 6265 is distinguished by its metal bezel with tachymeter scale, screw down chronograph buttons and caliber 727. The present example is the most lavish iteration of this model: The bracelet itself is the rare version with riveted links and stamped *69*, considered by the *Rolex* collecting community a collectible on its own. The alternation between the central polished link and outer brushed links adds flair and movement to the ensemble. In addition, the correct caseback is stamped with the reference number, *6265*, as well as its 3.7 million serial number, denoting this very attractive watch was produced in 1973.

Produced between 1966 and 1969, reference 6241's total production amounts to roughly 3000 pieces, slightly less than 400 in 14k gold. It is an educated guess that only a fraction of these were fitted with the Paul Newman dial, either in gold or in this case, in black. Beyond its aesthetics, John Player Special reference 6241 is an extremely rare model. Less than 10 examples in 14k gold with black Paul Newman dial have appeared at auction in the last 20 years. Models in 14k gold, such as the present watch, were exclusively reserved for the North American market.

On the 21st of April, 1985, a young Brazilian driver gained his first great Formula One victory in the Portuguese Grand Prix held at Estoril. That day, Ayrton Senna started his racing career by crossing the finishing line for Team Lotus sporting the John Player Special livery in a vehicle that is still today regarded as one of the most 'beautiful' racing cars of all time. The colors of that car, totally black with contrasting gilt details and trimmings, are still synonymous with elegance and charm. The reference 6241 black dial Paul Newman echoes that elegance and charisma.

A shining star in the universe of collectable vintage Rolex watches, this magnificent and impressive 18k gold reference sixty sixty-two "Stelline" or "Star Dial" is an exceptional example of what many Rolex collectors and scholars consider the most prestigious model ever made. Amplified by its unique aesthetic, it is undoubtedly one of the most important examples to ever come to market.

Reference 6062

In the second half of the 1940s, following the launch of the definitive "Oyster" case shape, Rolex introduced a variety of different watches with a diversity of movements for this celebrated case. It was predominantly used for the perpetual model with date window, later named "DateJust", until the 1950s when a second aperture was added introducing the weekday at 12 o'clock, the celebrated "Day-Date". The Oyster case was also produced with different chronograph movements, either with a constant seconds register or three subsidiary dials including the hour register. The most complicated chronograph version cased in the "Oyster" style is the famous "Dato-Compax", later nick-named "Killy" by collectors, featuring a full calendar on top of the chronograph mechanism.

The top-of-the-line version however was reference 6062, fitted with the inhouse automatic movement, upgraded with a full calendar and moon phase indication. Introduced in 1950 and produced for approximately 10 years, the reference 6062 is one of only two Rolex models to feature a triple calendar, the other being the reference 8171 "Padellone". These two models are the only watches ever made in series with moon phases, until just last year with the introduction of the Cellini reference 50535. The difference between the 6062 and the 8171 "Padellone" is that the reference 6062 was housed in the iconic Rolex "Oyster" case.

Of the 670 reference 6062 produced in yellow gold (approximate), less than 150 examples have ever appeared on the market, far fewer with the iconic luminous "Star Dial" and no other will be found with this awe-inspiring case. This example must be considered the most important and complex Oyster model ever made by Rolex.

The Case

Firstly, the extraordinary and striking 18k yellow gold case must be discussed for its unique quality that will not be found on any other watch in quite the same way. Upon first glance it is not immediately apparent that the case is in fact yellow gold, given its lovely dark patina which spreads like a veil over the bezel, sides and caseback. Although the reference 6062 was produced in a variety of metals: steel, yellow gold, and pink gold, the yellow gold version would be most likely to be able to develop such a deep and iridescent color, displaying a rainbow-like effect when viewed from different angles.

Only possible by being unworn and impeccably preserved over its 60+ year lifetime, the case, now for decades displaying an obvious dark oxidation is one of the fullest and closest to original finish we have ever seen. Most probably it has not been polished since new, and the case lines are excellently preserved, both on the upper side of the case, but also to the back. In fact, the screwed case back retains its original satin finish and so is the case preserved underneath the lugs. The numbers in between the lugs are stunningly crisp, and so are the pinholes, proof of how seldom the watch was worn. Furthermore, a crisp gold hallmark is seen to the back of the top right lug. Gold cases of the reference 6062 were made by Genex, in Geneva, the case department of Gay Frères. The master case maker mark for Genex is number 12 inside a key, such as the present watch. (12 for Genex, the key for Geneva). Some inside casebacks are marked with an extra 'Montres SA Rolex' side engraving. This was on cases made before 1953, such as the present watch, but still in inventory when the company address was changed in 1953, and renamed Montres Rolex SA in Geneva.

With a diameter of 35mm, this case is perfectly proportioned to one's wrist with this example also sporting the original "Super-Oyster" crown, a most meaningful feature to the educated collector. Two variants of crown are seen on this reference, the "Super-Oyster", and the Twin-Lock crown. While the present "Super-Oyster" is seen on this example, it is seen on the majority of models for this reference. On closer observation, one will notice a cross between "Super" and "Oyster". This cross was added once the crown was patented.



The Dial

Secondly, to discover this reference with the "Star Dial", also known as "Stelline", the most unusual configuration, is quite remarkable.


Known as a 'Mark 1 Dial Type 755' by Stern Frères examples, it is the only dial made for this reference which has star-shaped hour markers with three faceted dagger-shaped hour markers at 3, 6 and 9 o'clock with radium luminous material to their center. Only one other dial variant (Dial Type 453) has star-shaped numerals, however, the luminous material is not central to the numerals but rather stands as an accent on the outer dial and it is without radium. The gold luminous stars are a rarity for this dial configuration and shine brightly against the matte silvered dial.

Another striking feature of the dial is the designation of "Officially Certified Chronometer" located in the subsidiary dial as opposed to under the Rolex signature, dating this watch to 1952-1953. The moon phase disc was produced by Stern Frères with the blue enamel champlevé technique, also used in Patek Philippe calendar watches. However, one will notice that for this model they were produced with the moon phase having eyes, a nose and a mouth, adding increased charm to the dial. The calendar discs, also made by Stern Frères, are with inscriptions painted black and were produced in five languages; English, French, German, Italian or Spanish, the present example in English.

The Movement

Thirdly and by no means least, housed in this superlative gold Oyster case is the Caliber 655 which was especially developed for this reference. It boasted the latest in technology, the patented Rolex Super-Balance. The automatic movement has commonality with most automatic movements of its time, however, this one had an added function that would allow the calendar to advance through the setting pin holes in the band. As mentioned earlier, along with the reference 8171 these two models are the only watches ever made in series with a triple date and moon phases until 2017 with the introduction of a modern variant. This is a testament to the master craftsmanship of the manufacture and underlines the rarity and skill of theses movements.

Examples of this "grail" model in such perfectly original condition, in the most sought-after case material and dial combination, and so crisp after 60 years, are dreams for the most educated Rolex collectors in the world.

The present watch was last sold at Christie's New York, December 2011, and realized \$542,500. Ever since it has remained unworn and in the possession of one of the most important and distinguished collectors.

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3 CONDITION

- (a) The **condition** of **lots** sold in our auctions can vary widely due to factors such as age, previous damage, restoration, repair and wear and tear. Lots are sold "as is," in the condition they are in at the time of the sale, without any representation or warranty or assumption of liability of any kind as to condition by Christie's or by the seller.

They offer our opinion but they may not refer to all faults, inherent defects, restoration, alteration or adaptation because our staff are not professional restorers or conservators. For that reason condition reports are not an alternative to examining a lot in person or seeking your own professional advice. It is your responsibility to ensure that you have requested, received and considered any condition report.

4 VIEWING LOTS PRE-AUCTION

- (a) If you are planning to bid on a lot, you should inspect it personally or through a knowledgeable representative before you make a bid to make sure that you accept the description and its condition. We recommend you get your own advice from a restorer or other professional adviser.
- (b) Pre-auction viewings are open to the public free of charge. Our specialists may be available to answer questions at pre-auction viewings or by appointment.

5 ESTIMATES

Estimates are based on the condition, rarity, quality and provenance of the lots and on prices recently paid at auction for similar property. Estimates can change. Neither you, nor anyone else, may rely on any estimates as a prediction or guarantee of the actual selling price of a lot or its value for any other purpose. Estimates do not include the buyer's premium or any applicable taxes.

6 WITHDRAWAL

Christie's may, at its option, withdraw any lot from auction at any time prior to or during the sale of the lot. Christie's has no liability to you for any decision to withdraw

7 JEWELLERY

- (a) Coloured gemstones (such as rubies, sapphires and emeralds) may have been treated to improve their look, through methods such as heating and oiling. These methods are accepted by the international jewellery trade but may make the gemstone less strong and/or require special care over time.

The gemmological laboratories will only report on the improvements or treatments known to the laboratories at the date of the report.
- (d) For jewellery sales, estimates are based on the information in any gemmological report. If no report 5 BIDDING IN PERSON is available, assume that the gemstones may have been treated or enhanced.

8 WATCHES & CLOCKS

- (a) Almost all clocks and watches are repaired in their lifetime and may include parts which are not original. We do not give a warranty that any individual component part of any watch is authentic. Watchbands described as "associated" are not part of the original watch and may not be authentic. Clocks may be sold without pendulums, weights or keys
- (b) As collectors' watches often have very fine and complex mechanisms, you are responsible for any general service, change of battery, or further repair work that may be necessary. We do not give a warranty that any watch is in good working order. Certificates are not available unless described in the catalogue.
- (c) Most wristwatches have been opened to find out the type and quality of movement. For that reason, wristwatches with water resistant cases may not be waterproof and we recommend you have them checked by a competent watchmaker before use. Important information about the sale, transport and shipping of watches and watchbands can be found in paragraph H2(f).

B REGISTERING TO BID 1 NEW BIDDERS

2 RETURNING BIDDERS

As described in paragraph B(1) above, we may at our option ask you for current identification, a financial reference, or a deposit as a condition of allowing you to bid. If you have not bought anything from any of our salerooms within the last two years or if you want to spend more than on previous occasions, please contact our Credit Department at +1 212-636-2490.

3 IF YOU FAIL TO PROVIDE THE **RIGHT DOCUMENTS**

If in our opinion you do not satisfy our bidder identification and registration procedures including, but not limited to completing any anti-money laundering and/or anti-terrorism financing checks we may require to our satisfaction, we may refuse to register you to bid, and if you make a successful bid, we may cancel the contract for sale between you and the seller.

4 BIDDING ON BEHALF OF ANOTHER PERSON

If you are bidding on behalf of another person, that person will need to complete the registration requirements above before you can bid, and supply a signed letter authorising you to bid for him/her. A bidder accepts personal liability to pay the purchase price and all other sums due unless it has been agreed in writing with Christie's, before commencement of the auction, that the bidder is acting as an agent on behalf of a named third party acceptable to Christie's and that Christie's will only seek payment from the named third party.

If you need to bid in a language other than in English, you must arrange this well before the auction. We may record telephone bids. By bidding on the telephone, you are agreeing to us recording your conversations. You also agree that your telephone bids are governed by these Conditions of Sale.

(b) Internet Bids on Christie's LIVETM For certain auctions we will accept hids over the Internet. Please visit www.christies.com/ livebidding and click on the 'Bid Live' icon to see details of how to watch, hear and bid at the auction from your computer. In addition to these Conditions

2 RESERVES

3 AUCTIONEER'S DISCRETION

The auctioneer can at his or her sole option: (a) refuse any bid;

- (b) move the bidding backwards or forwards in any way he or she may decide, or change the order of the lots; (c) withdraw any lot:
- (d) divide any lot or combine any two or more lots;
- (e) reopen or continue the bidding even after the hammer has fallen; and
- (f) in the case of error or dispute and whether during or after the auction, to continue the bidding, determine the successful bidder, cancel the sale of the lot, or reoffer and resell any lot. If any dispute relating to bidding arises during or after the auction, the auctioneer's decision in exercise of this option is final.

8 SUCCESSFUL BIDS

Unless the auctioneer decides to use his or her discretion as set out in paragraph C3 above, when the auctioneer's hammer strikes, we have accepted the last bid. This means a contract for sale has been formed between the seller and the successful bidder. We will issue an invoice only to the registered bidder who made the successful bid. While we send out invoices by mail and/or email after the auction, we do not accept responsibility for telling you whether or not your bid was successful. If you have bid by written bid, you should contact us by telephone or in person as soon as possible after the auction to get details of the outcome of your bid to avoid having to pay unnecessary storage charges.

9 LOCAL BIDDING LAWS

You agree that when bidding in any of our sales that you will strictly comply with all local laws and regulations in force at the time of the sale for the relevant sale site.

D THE BUYER'S PREMIUM AND TAXES 1 THE BUYER'S PREMIUM

In addition to the **hammer price**, the successful bidder agrees to pay us a **buyer's premium** on the **hammer price** of each lot sold. On all lots we charge 25% of the **hammer price** up to and including US\$250,000, 20% on that part of the **hammer price** over US\$250,000 and up to and including US\$4,000,000, and 12.5% of that part of the **hammer price** above US\$4,000,000.

2 TAXES

The successful bidder is responsible for any applicable taxes including any sales or use tax or equivalent tax wherever such taxes may arise on the **hammer price**, the **buyer's premium**, and/or any other charges related to the **lot**.

For lots Christie's ships to or within the United States, a sales or use tax may be due on the hammer price, buyer's premium, and/or any other charges related to the lot, regardless of the nationality or citizenship of the successful bidder. Christie's will collect sales tax where legally required. The applicable sales tax rate will be determined based upon the state, county, or locale to which the lot will be shipped. In accordance with New York law, if Christie's arranges the shipment of a **lot** out of New York State, New York sales tax does not apply, although sales tax or other applicable taxes for other states may apply. If Christie's delivers the **lot** to, or the **lot** is collected by, any framer, restorer or other similar service provider in New York that you have hired, New York law considers the **lot** delivered to the successful bidder in New York and New York sales tax must be imposed regardless of the ultimate destination of the **lot**. In this circumstance, New York sales tax will apply to the **lot** even if Christie's or a common carrier (authorized by Christie's that you hire) subsequently delivers the **lot** outside New York.

E WARRANTIES 1 SELLER'S WARRANTIES

For each **lot**, the seller gives a **warranty** that the seller:

- (a) is the owner of the lot or a joint owner of the lot acting with the permission of the other co-owners or, if the seller is not the owner or a joint owner of the lot, has the permission of the owner to sell the lot, or the right to do so in law; and
- (b) has the right to transfer ownership of the lot to the buyer without any restrictions or claims by anyone else.

If either of the above **warranties** are incorrect, the seller shall not have to pay more than the **purchase price** (as defined in paragraph F1 (a) below) paid by you to us. The seller will not be responsible to you for any reason for loss of profits or business, expected savings, loss of opportunity or intrest, costs, damages, **other damages** or expenses. The seller gives no **warranty** in relation to any **lot** other than as set out above and, as far as the seller is allowed by law, all **warranties** from the seller to you, and all other obligations upon the seller which may be added to this agreement by law, are excluded.

2 OUR AUTHENTICITY WARRANTY

We warrant, subject to the terms below, that the **lots** in our sales are **authentic** (our "**authenticity warranty**"). If, within 5 years of the date of the auction, you give notice to us that your **lot** is not **authentic**, subject to the terms below, we will refund the **purchase price** paid by you. The meaning of **authentic** can be found in the glossary at the end of these Conditions of Sale. The terms of the **authenticity warranty** are as follows:

(a) It will be honored for claims notified within a period of 5 years from the date of the auction. After such time, we will not be obligated to honor the authenticity warranty.

(b) It is given only for information shown in UPPERCASE type in the first line of the catalogue description (the "Heading"). It does not apply to any information other than in the **Heading** even if shown in **UPPERCASE type**.

- (c) The authenticity warranty does not apply to any Heading or part of a Heading which is qualified. Qualified means limited by a clarification in a lot's catalogue description or by the use in a Heading of one of the terms listed in the section tiled Qualified Headings on the page of the catalogue headed "Important Notices and Explanation of Cataloguing Practice". For example, use of the term "ATTRIBUTED TO..." in a Heading means that the lot is in Christie's opinion probably a work by the named artist but no warranty is provided that the lot is the work of the named artist. Please read the full list of Qualified Headings and a lot's full catalogue description before bidding.

- not **authentic**. If we have any doubts, we reserve the right to obtain additional opinions at our expense; and (iii) return the **lot** at your expense to the saleroom
- (ii) retain the total year types to be an automit from which you bought it in the condition it was in at the time of sale.
 (i) Your only right under this authenticity warranty is
- to cancel the sale and receive a refund of the **purchase price** paid by you to us. We will not, under any circumstances, be required to pay you more than the **purchase price** nor will we be liable for any loss of profits or busines, loss of opportunity or value, expected savings or interest, costs, damages, **other damages** or expenses.
- (j) Books. Where the lot is a book, we give an additional warranty for 21 days from the date of the auction that any lot is defective in text or illustration, we will refund your purchase price, subject to the following terms:
 - (a) This additional warranty does not apply to:
 (i) the absence of blanks, half titles, tissue guards or advertisements, damage in respect of bindings.
 - advertisements, damage in respect of bindings, stains, spotting, marginal tears or other defects not affecting completeness of the text or illustration;
 - (ii) drawings, autographs, letters or manuscripts, signed photographs, music, atlases, maps or periodicals;
 - (iii) books not identified by title;
 - (iv) lots sold without a printed estimate;(v) books which are described in the catalogue as sold not subject to return; or
 - (vi) defects stated in any condition report or announced at the time of sale.
 - (b) To make a claim under this paragraph you must give written details of the defect and return the lot to the sale room at which you bought it in the same condition as at the time of sale, within 21 days of the date of the sale.
- (k) South East Asian Modern and Contemporary Art and Chinese Calligraphy and Painting. In these categories, the authenticity warranty does not apply because current scholarship does not permit the making of definitive statements. 2 TRANSFERRING OWNERSHIP TO YOU

You will not own the **lot** and ownership of the **lot** will not pass to you until we have received full and clear payment of the **purchase price**, even in circumstances where we have released the **lot** to you.

3 TRANSFERRING RISK TO YOU

The risk in and responsibility for the **lot** will transfer to you from whichever is the earlier of the following: (a) When you collect the **lot**; or

(b) At the end of the 30th day following the date of the auction or, if earlier, the date the lot is taken into care by a third party warehouse as set out on the page headed 'Storage and Collection', unless we have agreed otherwise with you.

4 WHAT HAPPENS IF YOU DO NOT PAY

(a) If you fail to pay us the purchase price in full by the due date, we will be entitled to do one or more of the following (as well as enforce our rights under paragraph F5 and any other rights or remedies we have by law):

5 KEEPING YOUR PROPERTY

If you owe money to us or to another **Christie's Group** company, as well as the rights set out in F4 above, we can use or deal with any of your property we hold or which is held by another **Christie's Group** company in any way we are allowed to by law. We will only release your property to you after you pay us or the relevant **Christie's Group** company in full for what you owe. However, if we choose, we can also sell your property in any way we think appropriate. We will use the proceeds of the sale against any amounts you owe us and we will pay any amount left from that sale to you. If there is a shortfall, you must pay us any difference between the amount we have received from the sale and the amount you owe us.

G COLLECTION AND STORAGE

- (a) You must collect purchased lots within seven days from the auction (but note that lots will not be released to you until you have made full and clear payment of all amounts due to us).

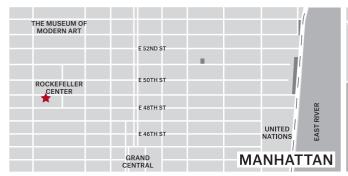


