This estate is one of the great classic Domaine's of Burgundy. A reference to all young winemakers.

In the 1920s Jacques d' Angerville was one of the first to start bottling all wines at the Domaine, the same time as Armand Rousseau and Henri Gouges. The Thienpont family in Belgium, of Vieux Chateau Certan and Le Pin, were one of the first to buy direct from the estate. Currently this Volnay Domaine is converying to biodynamics.

Here you will find classic high-quality Volnay in its purest form. Wines of elegance and freshness, but don't let yourself be fooled by accessibility while young as under this lace like finesse the Angerville wines age gracefully for decades. The monopole Volnay Clos des Ducs is the signature wine, while Volnay Champans and Cailleret are very worthy of attention too. The local saying goes: "Qui n' a des vignes en Cailleret, ne sait pas ce que vaut le Volnay" in English "He who doesn't have vines in Cailleret, doesn't know the true value of Volnay". This is a first class estate.

Organically farmed since 1990s and biodynamically since 2005. Top quality Grand Cru Corton's is what this fine estate is reputed for.

Corton Les Maréchaudes Grand Cru at the bottom of the hill, just above Ladoix and below Les Bressandes produces lighter wines, more refined and elegant.

Corton Les Bressandes Grand Cru the largest parcel, mid-slope. There is more tannic structure here. These are Cortons with character, long and lingering with depth.

Corton Clos du Roi Grand Cru, arguably the best sub-climat of the Corton hill. Delicate flavours with powerful depth of flavour from over sixty year old vines.

JEAN-JACQUES CONFURON NUITS-SAINT-GEORGES

Originally linked to the famous Noëllat estate this famous Domaine has been organically farmed since 1991. Not so long ago, no wine was bottled at the Domaine, the first vintage to appear under the Confuron label was 1988. They are very consistently high quality. The JJ Confuron Romanee St Vivant is made from very old vines, planted in 1922, located between those of Domaine Leroy and Hudelot. There are only ten owners of the famous vineyard, whilst DRC owns the majority, Confuron is the forth in size.

The Clos Vougeot comes from two excellent parcels both at the top of slope, the best part of this large Grand Cru vineyard. Rich concentrated wines with a nice touch of oak to support the natural terroir definition. The Nuits St Georges Les Boudots is remarkably Vosne is style, refined and concentrated, not surprising as the vineyard is a continuation of Vosne-Romanee Les Malconsorts.

The hallmark spice of a great La Tâche is present in spades with outstanding aromatic complexity that includes plenty of secondary fruit development but at this point, no sous-bois. There is excellent concentration to the velvety and wonderfully rich flavors that display the same wonderful depth of the nose, all wrapped in a mouth coating, delicious and hugely long finish. Dujac is undoubtedly one of the most highly respected Domaine's in Burgundy and has been producing their characteristic perfumed, silky, and elegant wines since the late 1960's when the Seysses family purchased Domaine Graillet in Morey-St-Denis and renamed it Domaine Dujac. Since those early days the Domaine has increased in size from 5 hectares to its present size of approximately 15 hectares. Domaine Dujac own holdings in some of the finest Grand Cru vineyards of the Côte de Nuits: Clos de la Roche, Clos St-Denis. Bonnes-Mares, Echézeaux, Romanée-Saint-Vivant, Chambertin and Charmes-Chambertin, as well as Premier Cru and Village level vineyards. Their philosophy is the same for all vineyards with minimal interventions and combining practices from organics, biodynamics and integrated pest management in achieving their overriding goal of ripe and healthy grapes. The Domaine manages to combine both traditional and modern vinification techniques and produces wines that are highly sought after and glorious examples of the magic of red Burgundy.

DOMAINE JEAN GRIVOT VOSNE-ROMANEE

A classic Domaine that has since the early ninetees retaken its position among the absolute best producers of Vosne-Romanee. The portfolio of vineyard holdings is breathtaking.

Their most famous is the Richebourg. With only 11 owners in total, Grivot owns 0.32 hectares. This is the most sought after part of the total Richebourg Grand Cru vineyard.

Second in the line up is Echezeaux, though some argue this is where the excellence of Grivot reaches its true heights. The lieu-dit Les Cruots bordering Suchots and Les Champs Traversins is closer to Musigny.

The third grand cru is Clos Vougeot where Grivot makes a very good wine in each vintage from vines on the lower slopes which shows what limited yields and highly skilled winemakers can do.

Next to these grand crus the Grivot Vosne-Romanee premier crus of Les Suchots and Les Brulees attract a lot of attention as these are phenomenal wines with great ageing potential.



DOMAINE ARMAND ROUSSEAU GEVREY CHAMBERTIN

The Domaine was started at the beginning of the 20th century by Armand Rousseau who came from a family of vignerons and wine-merchants. He had inherited through marriage several plots of vineyards in Gevrey Chambertin in the Côte de Nuits at the turn of the century. Gradually he increased the size of the Domaine with acquisitions of vineyards in Charmes Chambertin in 1919, Clos de la Roche and Chambertin in 1920 and 1921. Mazy-Chambertin in 1937. Mazoveres-Chambertin in 1940 and the esteemed 1er Cru Clos Saint Jacques in 1954. Following Armand's tragic death in a car crash in 1959, his son, Charles Rousseau, who had studied law and then oenology at Dijon University assumed control. Charles Rousseau instigated many improvements and investments. such as building two new cellars to increase storage capacity. Charles's son Eric and daughter Corinne have subsequently become involved at the Domaine and are responsible for producing some of the finest expressions of Pinot Noir coming out of Burgundy's world-famous Côte de Nuits.

The Domaine currently owns approximately 14 hectares of vineyards planted only with Pinot Noir, including 8 hectares of Grand Cru vineyards all situated in the communes of Gevrey-Chambertin and Morey-Saint-Denis producing their world famous Grand Crus; Chambertin Clos de Bèze, Chambertin, Mazy-Chambertin, Charmes-Chambertin, and Clos de la Roche; and their Premier Crus; Clos Saint Jacques, Les Cazétiers and Lavaux Saint-Jacques. The vines are old with an average age of between 40 and 45 years and a planting density of 11,000 vines per hectare. Yields are kept low, at between 30 to 40 hectolitres per hectare, with bud removal and green harvesting. No chemical fertilizers are used and harvesting is done completely by hand.

Vinification is traditionally Burgundian with 90% destemming, and fermentation for an average of 18 days in open-topped stainless steel vats with regular pumping over and pigeage. Fermentation temperature is controlled and does not exceed 33 degrees. Following alcoholic fermentation the wines are pressed in a pneumatic press, left to settle for 24 hours, and then transferred into oak barrels for the malolactic fermentation to take place naturally. The Chambertin and the Chambertin Clos de Bèze are aged in 100 % new oak with medium toast. The Clos Saint Jacques is put into between 70% and 100% new oak and the other wines are aged in either second or third-fill barrels. Ageing takes approximately 20 to 22 months and the wines are racked between 2 and 3 times. The wines are lightly filtered prior to bottling to retain as many flavour components as possible.

There is no disputing the quality of their wines. Anthony Hanson MW writing in his book, Burgundy stated that Armand Rousseau "is one of Burgundy's great, traditional domains" and the wines are "harmonious, elegant, rich and individual". Neal Martin stated that "Some of the greatest wines I have ever tasted have borne Rousseau's name, in particular outstanding Chambertin and Gevrey-Chambertin 1er Cru Clos Saint Jacques, the premier cru that merits promotion to Grand Cru more than any other. I also adore the Chambertin Clos de Bèze; the 1989 leaving a room full of tasters grasping for superlatives when tasted in 2003".

Tasting note: The expressive nose has always retained its genuinely stunning aromatic complexity and even with 14 years of age the still mostly primary black and red pinot fruit scents that are mixed with violets, dried rose petals and pungent soil notes display only the first hints of secondary development. There is a bit more size, weight and richness compared to the '01 Clos de Bèze (see herein) on the moderately structured but overtly mineral-inflected middle weight plus flavors that are buffered by ample dry extract before culminating in a wonderfully long and still firm finale. As classic Chambertin goes, this is not especially massive but it is incredibly long and the intensity is simply breathtaking. DOMAINE COMTE GEORGE DE VOGUE CHAMBOLLE-MUSIGNY

Domaine Comte Georges de Vogüé is unique as it can trace its history all the way back to the 15th century. The same year James Christie held his first auction in 1766 the vineyards were inherited into the de Vogüé family. Since then the Domaine has remained in the hands of the same family by inheritance or marriage. De Vogüé is unique in that they only make wines from Chambolle-Musigny. All vineyards are grown in a more or less organic way, though this is not indicated on the label or certified. More than 12.5ha are owned. The main Grand Crus are Musigny and Bonnes-Mares.

BONNES-MARES

While driving south from Morey-Saint-Denis the Bonnes-Mares vineyard is on your right and starts where Clos de Tart finishes. It continues until just before you enter the Chambolle-Musigny village.

Of the 15.06 hectares only a small part lies in Morey-Saint-Denis, 1.52ha. There used to be a part of Bonnes-Mares located within the Clos de Tart wall, this was rectified in 1965

Bonnes-Mares is mostly a Chambolle-Musigny grand cru though being located at the north side of the village it's distinctively different from Musigny in the south. In fact it's closer to Chambertin in soil and style. In total there are 25 owners. There is little soil, the vines grow mostly on the rock.

With 2.70ha Domaine Comte Georges de Vogüé is by far the largest owner of this highly regarded grand cru vineyard. The de Vogüé part is almost one block on the Chambolle side down slope alongside the road, the soil here is red clay.

MUSIGNY

A Musigny wine is elegant as lace, generous as a bouquet of flowers and vigorous. The aromas are complex and take years to truly reveal themselves. After a long aging the wine presents layer after layer of red and black fruits, spices and finally a perfume of licorice. With a very long aftertaste, Musigny will sing on your tongue leaving you in silent admiration. The true heights of organoleptic pleasure are here. The tannin structure is so different from the other Chambolle-Musigny grand cru, Bonnes Mares. Strength and power all in a velvet grove. In character Musigny is closer to Les Amoureuses then to Bonnes Mares further north.

To the North is Le Musigny or Les Grands Musigny, this is bordered to the west by the forest and on the right by Les Amoureuses. Les Grands Musigny has hardly any soil, the vines virtually grow on the rocks. Les Petits-Musigny is located just south of Le Musigny and faces the Clos Vougeot to the east, this part is solely owned by Comte de Vogüé. The southern border of Musigny is located at the foot of the Combe d'Orveaux.

In quality there is little difference between the two parts of Musigny. The wines from Les Petits-Musigny tend to be a touch more structured.

The soil is quite varied and different from the grand crus of Morey. Bathonian limestone on the upper slope and Comblanchien further down, with a relatively small top soil of red clay with gravel. There is less magnesium here which is quite different from Bonnes-Mares.

Domaine Comte Georges de Vogüé is the principal owner of Musigny, 7.12ha is owned from a total of 10.85ha. It's not for nothing that on old de Vogüé bottles it says: Domaine des Musigny.

The vieilles vignes part, of vines older than 25 years, is 5,67ha. The oldest vines date from 1953. Til the sixties there were two Musigny cuvees, one for the old vines and one from the younger vines.

From 1995 onwards the Musigny from vines younger than 25 years old are bottled as Chambolle-Musigny Premier Cru. As the average age is increasing there will be less of this wine, possibly up to the point that it's all Musigny vieilles vignes.

If there was to be contest for the top 10 wines in the world a Comte de Vogüé Musigny from a great vintage would definitely be on the short list. Musigny is the epitome of elegance and subtle energy. A de Vogüé Musigny takes about 10 to 20 years to show its true character and charm. However your patience will greatly be rewarded.

I had the good fortune of tasting it from barrel (where it was an enormous Graves fruit bomb) and watching it develop more nuances in bottle. At age 30, it remains a majestic, multidimensional, profound Bordeaux with another 20-30+ years of life ahead of it. It's no secret that the great vintages of Bordeaux have levels of fruit extract and depth that go beyond other years. It is this fruit, often referred to as "fat" or "concentration," that takes decades to dissipate and fade. As it does so, the extraordinary aromatic expression of the terroir asserts itself. Remarkably, the 1982 is still in late adolescence and has not yet reached its peak. Early in my career, much of my reputation was established on calling this vintage correctly, but I never in my wildest dreams thought the 1982s would mature as slowly and last as long as some seem capable of doing. One of the handful of perfect wines of the vintage, the La Mission still possesses a remarkably dense ruby/purple color with only a slight garnet and lightening at the edge. The fruit-dominated aromatics reveal lots of cassis, blueberry, scorched earth, black truffle, incense, graphite and high-class, unsmoked cigar tobacco-like notes. Still exhibiting remarkable concentration, enormous body, silky sweet tannin, and no perceptible acidity, the 1982 remains fresh, delineated and super-compelling. A massive La Mission made by the Dewravin family and their winemakers, all of whom were dismissed the following year when the estate was acquired by Haut-Brion, this modern day legend shows no signs of decline. Consistently prodigious and almost a sure bet to top the scoring card of any blind tasting of this vintage as well as other years, the 1989 Haut-Brion is a seamless, majestic classic, and a tribute to this phenomenal terroir and its singular characteristics. The wine still has a very thick, viscouslooking ruby/purple color, a spectacular, young but awesome smorgasbord of aromas ranging from scorched earth, liquid minerals, graphite, blackberry and black currant jam to toast, licorice, and spice box. The levels of fruit, extract, and glycerin in this viscous, full-bodied, low-acid wine are awe-inspiring. The brilliant symmetry of the wine, extraordinary purity, and seamlessness are the hallmarks of a modernday legend. It is still in its pre-adolescent stage of development, and I would not expect it to hit its full plateau of maturity for another 3-5 years, but this should be an Haut-Brion that rivals the greatest ever made at this estate. Tasting note: Both La Mission-Haut-Brion and Haut-Brion hit home runs in this vintage, which did not produce as many profound wines as the Bordeaux publicity machine suggested. 1989, the 200th anniversary of the French revolution, was an incredibly hot year (surpassed only by 1990 and 2003). Even from barrel the seamless 1989 La Mission revealed a special elixir aspect, tasting like it had been designed by Chanel. It still possesses a blue/ purple color with only a hint of garnet creeping in, and the explosive aromatics offer up notes of licorice, creme de cassis, blueberry liqueur, smoky barbecue meats, truffles and graphite. If that's not enough to get one salivating, the palate has never disappointed either. Full-bodied with extraordinary opulence as well as sweet, well-integrated, velvety tannins, this fresh, lively, blockbuster La Mission appears to be one of those rare wines that never goes through a closed, unfriendly stage. It has been a compelling, multidimensional effort from barrel, in its infancy, and as it heads into late adolescence. Levels: into-neck Tasting note: The final blend of 64% Cabernet Sauvignon, 32% Merlot and 4% Cabernet Franc was harvested between September 14 and October 3. The spring was cold, yet summer was extremely hot and dry - one of the hottest vintages since 1949. The fact that virtually no rain fell in September served as a catalyst to get all the grapes ripe and in cellars. Some bottles of this wine have a definite brett population that gives off the notes of sweaty horses, but this one did not. The ones I have had from my cellar where I have had it frequently - are guite pure and clean. I suspect that the brett population is in all of them, but unless the wine hits some heat along the transportation route or in storage, the wine will not show any brett. This one tasted at the chateau, as well as those I've had from my cellar, have been pristine and not showing the sweaty horse notes that can be in evidence in brett populations that have flourished in the bottle because of external temperatures. This wine has an incredibly complex nose of spring flowers. blackberry and cassis liqueur, scorched earth and barbecue spice. It is full-bodied, majestic and opulent, with low acidity and fabulous fruit. It is close to full maturity. The wine should continue to drink well for at least another 30 or more years, but it is showing secondary nuances in the perfume. The wine is absolutely magnificent, broad, savory and mouthfilling. Tasting note: Reminiscing over the 1989 and 1990 vintages, which I have followed from birth, there always seemed to be a dramatic difference in quality. Not that the 1990 was not a top wine, but in its infancy, I never thought it would come close to being as riveting and magnetic as its older sibling, the 1989. However, it has proven to be nearly as prodigious. One of the hottest years in Bordeaux, 1990, a vintage of enormous yields, even dwarfing yields in 1985 and 1982, produced a fabulously open-knit, seemingly fast track La Mission that, at age 22, shows no signs of fading or losing its grip. The color is slightly more mature and evolved than the 1989's, exhibiting a lighter rim and a less dark blue/ruby/purple hue. Classic La Mission-Haut-Brion aromatics of camphor, licorice, scorched earth, hot bricks, barbecue, cassis, blueberry and kirsch are well displayed. Broad, expansive, velvety-textured and opulent with high glycerin and perhaps slightly higher alcohol (I don't have the statistics to verify that), the 1990 is as delicious and open-knit as the 1989, with less density and possibly less potential longevity. Most 1990s have been quick to reach full maturity, and as brilliant as they can be, they need to be monitored carefully by owners. Currently in late adolescence, but close to full maturity, the 1990 should hold in a cold cellar for another 15-20 years. However, it is a fabulous wine to inspect, taste and consume, so why wait? 

TORRE BELLA

The vast Torre Bella estate can trace its origin all the way back to the first settlers who discovered Madeira. Some of the best vineyards on the island belonged to Torre Bella, mostly in Campanário, Camara de Lobos, Ribeira Brava and Arco da Calheta.

They had "lagares" in São Roque (Funchal), Ca Lobos, Campanário and Arco da Calheta, where they used to make wine. Over the centuries supplying the shippers with fine wines though hardly ever was any wine bottled under the Torre Bella name. Only small quantities were bottled and stored in the family house.

Noel Cossart describes the Torre Bella wines as having a specific character: "The Wines, which are mostly from the Câmara de Lobos and Arco da Calheta vineyards, are full, rich, well-balanced wines with an attractive acid finish"

Back in 1864 Christie's sold the private Madeira collection of Russell Manners Gordon, Visconde de Torre Bella. The estate was inherited over time by Mr Dermot Bolger, at the time of his death the family estate owned about 10,5% of the island. Dermot Bolger was also responsible for the revival of Malvasia Candida by replanting this variety in 1940, then only a few plants remained. Malvasia Candida was always highly sought after and is amongst some of the finest Madeira's ever made.

All the bottles in this selection come from the old Bolger family and were bottled from their original old demi johns of about 20 liters. Whilst preparing this auction Christie's specialists had the opportunity to taste most of these Torre Bella D. Bolger wines. Tasting notes are added where available.

The excellent quality was clear, making it easy to understand why the family kept these wines behind for family use. We are delighted to offer a fine selection of these wines in this sale for wine collectors to have a chance to enjoy these historic wines.



AN EXCEPTIONAL SELECTION OF CHARTREUSE INCLUDING RARE 19TH CENTURY BOTTLES AND THE THREE FIRST RELEASES OF VEP

This collection has been gathered by a reputable and passionate collector from the alpine region. All bottles have been then stored in perfect condition before packing by Christie's specialist staff.fantastic condition.

Chartreuse liquors are made from a clever combination of about 130 plants, which were originally cultivated by monks around Grande Chartreuse Monastery, situated in the French alpine region. The mixture of herbs is distilled twice then aged in large oak casks for about 3-5 years. This original recipe (still today 55% alcohol by volume) was used to start in Fourvoirie the production of green Chartreuse in bottles in 1840. The unique natural colour of the liquor results from an ancient knowhow, which today only these monks have mastered. In parallel, monks developed in 1840 another refined recipe, with a lower degree of alcohol (43% by volume) and a brighter colour. This sweeter and more delicate recipe - the yellow Chartreuse- immediately seduced liquors aficionados and was soon to be nicknamed the "Queen of liquors". During the 19th Century, both liquors were also famous for their assumed medicinal properties. A third liquor was also produced between 1860 and 1900, the white Chartreuse. The colouring process of the recipe was skipped and alcoholic degree reached 43% by volume. This liquor has been produced only for 40 years, the yellow Chartreuse having guickly outlined it. This is why white Chartreuse are so rarely seen nowadays.

Following this critical acclaim, the brand and monks gained more and more attention. However, at the beginning of the 20th Century, a French law controlling congregations was voted, and monks had to leave France. They thus started to produce their famous liquors in Spain, in the city of Tarragone in Catalonia. The recipe was still the same but cellars were

different, barrels being stored in warmer and dryer conditions than they were in France, allowing the liquors to gain the special taste that enlightened collectors detect in rare Tarragone-bottled Chartreuse that have survived this day.

In 1932, monks were again allowed to produce their liquors in France. The special connection they established in Tarragone was such that they decided to keep part of their production in that region at the same time. That is why you can find both Chartreuse and Chartreuse Tarragone liquors for the period 1932 to 1989, when the distillery in Catalonia was closed.

Due to a mudslide in 1935, the original Fourvoirie distillery was moved from the heart of the Chartreuse Mountains to the neighboring town of Voiron, where liquors are still produced today. The cellars there are still the biggest spirit cellars in the world today.

In 1942, monks started to bottle their first special cuvee of long aged liquor (10 years), the "Vieillissement Exceptionnel"(V.E.), to celebrate the return of production to Fourvoirie. The second V.E. was distilled in 1940 to celebrate the return of monks to their monastery. Only 800 bottles were produced, one of which is offered today in the sale. The very first V.E.P. ("Vieillissement Exceptionnellement Prolongé"), which are still produced today, was distilled in 1953 to celebrate the coronation of Queen Elisabeth II.

Apart from the V.E.P., Chartreuse liquors have no vintage, being the result of a blend of several different casks. However, there are several different ways to recognize the site and period of production, the labels and formats having been changed regularly over the years.



From time to time, Christie's may offer a **lot** which it owns in whole or in part. Such property is identified in the catalogue with the symbol Δ next to its **lot** number.

O Minimum Price Guarantees

On occasion, Christie's has a direct financial interest in the outcome of the sale of certain lots consigned for sale. This will usually be where it has guaranteed to the Seller that whatever the outcome of the auction, the Seller will receive a minimum sale price for the work. This is known as a minimum price guarantee. Where Christie's holds such financial interest we identify such **lots** with the symbol onext to the **lot** number.

○ Third Party Guarantees/Irrevocable bids

Where Christie's has provided a Minimum Price Guarantee it is at risk of making a loss, which can be significant, if the lot fails to sell. Christie's therefore sometimes chooses to share that risk with a third party. In such cases the third party agrees prior to the auction to place an irrevocable written bid on the lot. The third party is therefore committed to bidding on the lot and, even if there are no other bids, buying the lot at the level of the written bid unless there are any higher bids. In doing so, the third party takes on all or part of the risk of the lot not being sold. If the lot is not sold, the third party may incur a loss. 

ULLAGES

The amount by which level of wine is short of being full; these levels may vary according to age of the wines and, as far as can be ascertained by inspection prior to the sale, are described in the catalogue.

LEVEL/ULLAGE DESCRIPTIONS AND INTERPRETATIONS

(see notes below)



- into neck: Level of young Exceptionally good in wines 10 years old
- bottom neck: Perfectly good for any age of wine. Outstandingly good for a wine of 20 years in bottle, or longer.
- very top-shoulder
- top-shoulder: Normal for any claret 15 years old or older
- upper-shoulder: Slight natural reduction through the easing of the cork and evaporation through cork and capsule. Usually no problem. Acceptable for any wine over 20 years old. Exceptional for pre-1950 wines.
- mid-shoulder: Probably some weakening of the cork and some risk. Not abnormal for wines 30/40 years of age. Estimates usually take this into account.
- mid-low-shoulder: Some risk. I ow estimates
- low-shoulder: Risky and usually only accepted for sale if wine or label exceptionally rare or interesting. Always offered with low estimate.

Because of the slope of shoulder it is impractical to describe levels as mid-shoulder, etc. Wherever appropriate the level between cork and wine will be measured and catalogued in

The condition and drinkability of burgundy is less affected by ullage than its equivalent from Bordeaux. For example, a 5 to 7 cm. ullage in a 30-year-old burgundy can be considered normal, indeed good for age, 3.5 to 4 cm. excellent for age, even 7cm. rarely a risk.


