Appreciation for Monkeys goes back to Biblical times where they were admired for their entertaining qualities. King Salomon enjoyed them and, as the First Book of Kings reported (10:22), "Once every three years the fleet of ships of Tarshish used to come [to Israel] bringing gold, silver, ivory, apes, and peacocks." In Western art, a monkey became a symbol of playfulness with elements of silliness as exhibited, for instance, by Jean Baptiste Chardin at the Salon du Louvre in 1740 in a form of a painting of a monkey painting a painting.

It appears that the first Monkey automata were created during the Renaissance. In Louis XV inventory there is a description of a clock "on a tortoiseshell base, possibly Renaissance, with an automat monkey and a 24-hour movement" (Archives nationales O1 3622, as reported by Jean-Dominique Augarde). In 1785 Marie Antoinette was presented with a Monkey Trio Automaton, one monkey playing on a violin, two on violencellos.

Eighty years later, in 1862, Alexandre Nicholas Théroude of Paris went further designing a monkey "nodding his head to the bow movement, moving his jaws, and drawing a bow across the violin" (French patent No. 55,760). In the 1855 Paris Exhibition Théodore's marvels became the star attractions, including a monkey playing a violin. The 1871 London Exhibition report was even more flattering; "The king of toys was, as always, our compatriot M. A. Théroude. ... This was the most well-known place in the whole Exhibition, and the curious people carefully collected the announcement of the hours when the birds would sing, the monkey played the violin, and so on."

During that time, in the 1870s, Théodore's younger colleague, Jean Marie Phalibois, another ingenious Parisian automata maker, whose automaton "The Conversation on the Rooftop" was a sensation at the Paris Exposition of 1878, made a monkey to Théroude's design with modified details employing easier to handle threads instead of wires. The details of our automaton are so characteristic to Phalibois' that there is little doubt that the Monkey is his creation, possibly one of a few presented at the 1878 Paris Exhibition. Extremely rare, ingeniously constructed, it mesmerizes an observer not only by the music but by uncanny mimics resembling more, as the Paris judges suggested, *tableau animé* than an automaton.

Alexandre Nicholas Théroude (1807-1892)

He came to Paris in 1823, at the age of sixteen. In 1832 he married and used his wife's dowry of 18,000 francs to establish a toy making business. In 1840 he declared bankruptcy which, ironically, was responsible for his future success. The bankruptcy terms called for him to pay 20 cents on a dollar (franc) during the next five years. To avoid painful experiences with small toys he abandoned making such and began making large automata which became so successful that by 1845 he paid almost the entire debt and moved to a larger facility. During the 1449 Paris Industrial Exhibition he was already established as "one of our foremost mechanical toy makers with no competition in foreign countries".

Jean Marie Phalibois (1835-1900) was Théroude's natural successor who, alongside pieces designed by older colleagues, expended the line for life-size automata, as for example, life-size lady playing on lyre (formerly in New York, International Doll Library Foundation). His most unusual automaton, "The Conversation on the Rooftop" showing cats walking over roof tiles, chimney pipes turning around, a student singing to a young lady while another with a guitar climbs to reach her from the other side, was not only a hit at the 1878 Paris Exposition but a clear testimony of his remarkable talent in designing and making automata. His very successful business was carried over by his son Edouart Henri well into the 20th century.

Vincenti & Cie.

The company was established by a Corsican, Jean Vincenti, in 1823 in Montbéliard, eastern France, almost at the border with Switzerland, where Vincenti's ancestors had settled already in 1791. The company specialized in manufacturing clock movements, by a force of 30 to 40 workers, using machines of their own invention. The company consistently made high quality movements as evidenced by awarded medals in 1834, 1839, 1844, and 1855 Paris Universal Expositions.





According to the archives of $\mathit{Gubelin}$, the present watch was manufactured in the mid-1940s.

Found in exceedingly small numbers, a steel *Gubelin* triple calendar wristwatch which is fully signed on its movement, case and dial, is seldom seen on the market. Its desirability is increased by its attractive two-tone dial color which has now aged to a light copper tone.

The case is in excellent and very well-preserved condition with full and sharp case proportions. One will notice the elongated curved lugs of this model which offers perfect vintage appeal.

Beginning in the 1940s, *Heuer* began making watches branded for sale by *Abercrombie & Fitch* in New York. At that time, *Abercrombie & Fitch* was an elite outfitter of sporting goods. Two of the proprietary models *Heuer* produced for *Abercrombie & Fitch* were the Solunar and the Seafarer, which tracked the tide and time that fish and animals were most active based on the solunar theory. The solunar theory posited that the movement of animals and fish was affected by the location of the Moon. The Seafarer incorporated a chronograph.

This Seafarer reference 2443 is one of a small number known with this dial configuration and this example is exceptionally attractive. It features the original and highly unusual blue luminous material both in triangular plots on the dial and in the hands. The overall interplay of colors, including the gilt Arabic numerals as well as the green and yellow accents, make this a vibrant and exceptional watch.

Heuer introduced its tide indication chronographs beginning in the 1950s, marketed under the names "Mareographe" and "Seafarer". Around 1970, Heuer began producing Solunagraph chronographs for Orvis, a retailer of fishing equipment. The present example offers an attractive grey dial which compliments the blue and white subsidiary dials, set within a well-preserved steel case.

The *Ulysse Nardin* reference 7536 is an extremely attractive example of a vintage steel chronograph from the 1960s. Rarely seen on the open market, its scarcity makes this watch even more desirable. The black and white dial with black tachymeter bezel is reminiscent of the highly-sought after *Rolex* Daytona, however it is not available for collectors nearly as often.

Upon closer inspection, one will notice the interesting details on the dial. Black with bright silvered registers, the 12-hour and 30-minute registers are fitted with an arrow-head hand, an unusual and distinctive addition. Combined with the applied baton numerals and applied *Ulysse Nardin* logo at 12 o'clock, the black and white dial is harmonious and perfectly balanced at a generous 38mm diameter. Notably, the movement is decorated most unusually with a 'Perlage' finish, as opposed to the more common 'Côte de Genève'.

Preserved in excellent condition by its original owner, it would be an asset to any collection for its rarity and attractive condition.





According to the archives of *OMEGA*, this prototype watch is a predecessor of the Alaska III project.

This watch was subjected to the extensive and harsh testing to destruction demanded by NASA and which was carried out by both *OMEGA* and the Swiss Institute. This included severely comprising and impacting the crystal to ensure that there was no splinter break off whilst in space. To the best of our knowledge this is the only known example of a post NASA test result watch.

The present ALASKA IV prototype is a spectacular discovery for any Speedmaster collector. Preserved in excellent overall condition, this was was part of the 12 examples especially made and delivered to NASA in 1978 to be tested by the astronauts of the Space Shuttle program, specifically Shuttle pilots.

The ALASKA IV examples have a very specific configuration using the prototype caliber 1621 with tritium stripes (called the "BETA light") as a permanent lighting system and differing from the regular production version equipped with caliber 1620 that had a switchable miniature light bulbs (as most digital watches had at that time). A total of 20 prototypes were produced and 12 examples were selected to be sent directly to several NASA astronauts who tested the watches during their Space Shuttle training.



The present watch, marked number 33 on its caseback as well as its movement, is a prototype model. Developed in the mid-1980s, it is an extremely rare hybrid movement, a cross between a mechanical rotor and a quartz time-keeping regulator, as confirmed on the *OMEGA* Extract which accompanies this lot.

The reference 105.003 was produced between 1963 and 1969, and it was this reference that superseded all other brands by passing NASA's rigorous qualification tests in 1965 that resulted in the *OMEGA* Speedmaster becoming the official watch used on space missions.

This reference is also the last of the Speedmasters with straight lugs, also known as the 'Pre-Professional'. In addition, it is sometimes referred to as the 'Ed White' after the first American astronaut to walk in space outside of the space module during the Gemini IV mission of 1965.

The present watch is an extremely early and attractive example of this landmark model. Known as the 'Asymmetric T', because there are two 'T' next to the "Swiss Made" on the dial at 6 o'clock, this reference 105.003-63 is a transitional version where the 'Ts' were added later, following legislation making the indication of radioactivity mandatory.

The Omega reference 105.003-63 'Asymmetrical T' is illustrated in *Moonwatch Only, 60 Years of Omega Speedmaster* by Grégoire Rossier & Anthony Marquié pp. 274.

According to the *Omega* Archives, the present watch was completed on December 10, 1969, and delivered to the United States.

The *OMEGA* Speedmaster Apollo 11 model in solid gold was created in the fall of 1969 to commemorate Apollo 11's successful Moon landing. A total of 1,014 examples were produced.

The first two in the series were presented to President Nixon and Vice President Spiro Agnew, which now reside in the *OMEGA* museum, the following 28 examples were given during a gala dinner in Houston to the astronauts having participated in this space mission as well as earlier conquests, the case backs engraved with the relevant astronaut's name and inscription *To Mark Man's Conquest of Space with Time, Through Time, on Time.* The remaining examples were given to Swiss politicians and watch-industry professionals while the majority were made available for the general public to acquire.

The available examples were assigned an engraved dedication, *OMEGA* Speedmaster - Apollo XI 1969 - The First Watch Worn on the Moon, and numbered. There are three different types of engraving: thin and unpainted for approximately the first 100 examples, then thick and unpainted and finally thick and painted with a burgundy color, which complements its burgundy colored bezel. The present watch is from the latter version, with thick painted lettering.

Two dial variants were also available, the present dial showing an oval 'O' in the *OMEGA* signature as opposed to the later version, which is more round-shaped. Preserved in excellent original overall condition, the present watch is number 486 of this extremely rare and limited series.

An example of all three casebacks made in this series are illustrated described and described in *OMEGA*, *A Journey Through Time* by Marco Richon, 2007, p. 605.



Reference 4178, one of *Vacheron Constantin's* landmark chronograph models, was in production from 1938 until the early 1970s. It existed with oval-shaped chronograph buttons or with the better known rectangular variant, the bezel was either beveled or flat.

This watch is a particularly fine example of the celebrated reference 4178, impressing with the highly attractive silvered dial, beautifully harmonizing with the gold case and elegant teardrop lugs.

For other *Vacheron Constantin* chronograph models from the 1940s, designed to measure short periods of time, such as pulsations, or for events captured by tachymeter and telemeter scales, see *Secrets of Vacheron Constantin* by Franco Cologni, p. 238.

Vintage minute repeating wristwatches are amongst the rarest and most desirable trophies in the current collectors market. Due to the extreme cost and complexity of production, only an exceedingly small number of such horological masterpieces were ever made by an even smaller number of watch manufacturers.

With the creation of reference 4261 in the mid-1940s, *Vacheron Constantin* surpassed this technical challenge by adding yet another horological complexity: an ultra-thin caliber with a thickness of only 5.25 mm., thus combining two complications requiring special manufacturing know-how and tremendous skill.



Distinguished by its large, ultra-slim case and stylish tear-drop lugs, this exceptional timepiece is certainly one of the most elegant minute repeating wristwatches made in the last 70 years. In production until the mid-1950s, reference 4261 was made in two series: one fitted with a 12" caliber movement, generally identified by the subsidiary seconds and a case with a diameter of 34mm or, such as the present watch, with the 13" movement without subsidiary seconds and the thinner but larger 36mm case.

It is commonly believed that a combined total of approximately 40 reference 4261 were ever made, cased in yellow gold, pink gold and platinum, with a variety of dial colors and designs. However it would appear that less than a third of the entire production was finished with the 13" movement and without subsidiary seconds, as the present watch.

Produced in 1954, this example is in remarkably well-preserved condition. The very attractive 'teardrop' lugs are especially notable, full and well defined, uncompromising of their intended shape. Upon closer inspection, one will notice the gold hallmark is still crisp to the side of the top left lug, a sign that this watch has been well cared for since it left the factory over 60 years ago.



The watch offered here for sale is one of the exceedingly few examples of this model to appear in public and doubtlessly one of the finest, outstanding for a variety of details: the stylish visual appeal of the large gold case combined with the silvered two-tone dial, its excellent overall condition, the superb repeating sound, and that it is offered with its charming original presentation box and *Vacheron Constantin* Certificate.

Two examples of reference 4261, however with subsidiary seconds, are illustrated in Franco Cologni's *Secrets of Vacheron Constantin*, p. 224.



No other watch so immediately evokes the glamorous world of 1950s international air-travel as the *Rolex* GMT-Master. Advertised at the time as being "the ideal watch for air-pilots, ships' captains, travelers and businessmen", the GMT-Master has a fourth arrow-tipped hand for the display of a second time zone with corresponding 24-hour numerals on the bezel.

The reference 6542 model was developed at the instigation of Pan American Airlines (Pan Am) who asked *Rolex* to produce a watch on which two time zones could be read simultaneously. Originally, pilots set the additional hand to Greenwich Meantime, hence the origin of the model's name "GMT-Master".

Following the success of this model, in 1959 *Rolex* introduced its successor, the reference 1675, which *Rolex* produced until 1980. This reference 1675 has a well preserved glossy black dial with the correct small triangle GMT hand.

The *Tudor* ref. 7923 is the only Submariner made by *Tudor/ Rolex* to house a manual wind movement. This is one of the rarest Submariner models ever produced and is seldom seen in the marketplace, the present watch is an extraordinary example of the reference 7923, introduced in 1955.

A Brief History

"Tudor", quintessence of the "tool watch", was born from Hans Wilsdorf ingenious idea of supplying reliable yet affordable watches alongside his brand "Rolex", hence creating a larger market share for his two companies.

Originally registered in 1926 by a Geneva based watchmaking firm "Veuve de Philippe Hüther", the brand name "The Tudor" was taken over by Wilsdorf in 1936. Early watches featured the signature Tudor with the horizontal bar of the T lengthened above the other letters. In 1936, the new symbol representing the union between strength and elegance appeared: the rose of the *Tudor* dynasty within a shield. In 1946, just after the end of World War II, Hans Wilsdorf felt that the time had come to expand and to give the brand a proper identity. Thus, on 6 March 1946, he founded "Montres TUDOR S.A." specialized in the manufacture of watches for men and women. *Rolex* would guarantee the technical, artistic and functional characteristics along with distribution and after sales service. The shield of the logo was removed, only the rose remained, until the 1960s when it obtained its final version: the shield only which better represents the concept *Tudor* wishes to convey for their watches, robustness and reliability.

1952 saw what would become *Tudor*'s most popular line: the birth of the Oyster Prince. Wilsdorf's advertisement campaign emphasized the model's strength and precision in a comprehensive text and through illustrations showing men at work in extreme conditions wearing a *Tudor* on their wrist: "I have decided that the TUDOR Prince deserves to share with *Rolex* two



advantages I would allow no other watch to use - the famous and unique waterproof Oyster case and the original self-winding Perpetual 'rotor' mechanism. All TUDOR Oyster Princes will have these two exceptional features, previously exclusive to *Rolex*. This indicates, I think, the measure of our faith in the new watch. I am proud to give my personal endorsement" Hans Wilsdorf.





Reference 7923

In 1955, another icon was born; *Tudor*'s diver's watch, the reference 7923, The first manually wound diver's watch ever made, this technical advance allowed the watch to lay flatter on the wrist and therefore allowing for better wear while underwater. The technical assets of the new model enjoyed immediate success, making *Tudor* the brand of choice of various Armed Forces and explorers, including the US Armed Forces and the French Marine Nationale, who had used *Tudor* wristwatches as standard issue timekeepers for its most elite servicemen for more than 25 years. The screw-down caseback and crown, already associated with the Oyster case, as well as the domed crystal allowed a depth of 100 meters, and the dial is proudly marked in red; *100 / 330*. The black dial was no longer signed; *"Rotor, Self-Winding,"* as it did not house an automatic movement. Instead, it was replaced with *"Submariner"* and *"Shock-Resisting*, clearly seen and notably in well-preserved condition to the present watch.

The present example has pencil hands with the so-called 'lollipop' seconds hand with luminous dot at its end. Its bezel has been lost at some point during its life, however, its extremely attractive dial and case create a collectors dream watch that equals vintage *Tudor* perfection.

The present watch represents an extremely important discovery. Possibly the earliest *Rolex* reference 6062 ever produced, the present watch can be regarded as one which led the way for all examples of this reference to follow.

Of the 670 reference 6062 produced in yellow gold (approximate), less than 150 examples have ever appeared on the market, far fewer with the iconic luminous "Star Dial" and perhaps no other will be found with an extremely early serial number. Prototypical in its design, we must delve deeper into the elements of this particular example, the first ever seen in the market of its kind.

What is most striking about the present watch is that its serial number, 579'781, as confirmed by *Rolex*, dates this watch to 1948, two years before its official introduction to the market. Moreover, the chronometer number is clearly marked '00002', indicating it is possibly the second of its kind ever produced. The first can only be presumed not completed, or owned by the manufacturer.



The Original Owner

The original owner of this timepiece was a contractor and was based in Los Angeles in the 1940s. It is not known as to how he came to own a prototypical example of this reference, however, the amazing discovery of it by his granddaughter is enough to surmise that he understood perfectly the value that it holds.

Upon his passing, his granddaughter was in charge of selling their house and some of its contents. After the rooms had been cleared and the last box closed, she thought to draw the curtains before leaving. As she pulled the curtains together she noticed that they were unusually heavy. With great surprise she discovered that a metal object had been carefully and purposefully sewn into the material of the drapes.

It soon became clear that this was the exact watch that she had seen worn by her grandfather every day and that he must have hidden it in a rather unusual place for safekeeping, she realized that this was perhaps a practice learned during the Great Depression. Kept in the family until recently and cared for greatly throughout its life, this impressive collectable has qualities which should be cherished in the future as they have been in the past.

Reference 6062

In the second half of the 1940s, following the launch of the definitive "Oyster" case shape, *Rolex* introduced a variety of different watches with a diversity of movements for this celebrated case. It was predominantly used for the perpetual model with date window, later named "DateJust", until the 1950s when a second aperture was added introducing the weekday at 12 o'clock, the celebrated "Day-Date". The Oyster case was also produced with different chronograph movements, either with a constant seconds register or three subsidiary dials including the hour register. The most complicated chronograph version cased in the "Oyster" style is the famous "Dato-Compax", later nick-named "Killy" by collectors, featuring a full calendar on top of the chronograph mechanism.

The top-of-the-line version however was reference 6062, fitted with the inhouse automatic movement, upgraded with a full calendar and moon phase indication. Introduced in 1950 and produced for approximately 10 years, the reference 6062 is one of only two *Rolex* models to feature a triple calendar, the other being the reference 8171 "Padellone". These two models are the only watches ever made in series with moon phases, until just last year with the introduction of the Cellini reference 50535. The difference between the 6062 and the 8171 "Padellone" is that the reference 6062 was housed in the iconic *Rolex* "Oyster" case.

The Case

Worn everyday by its owner, the present watch does show signs of a life well lived. Nowadays, we cherish watches such as this for their rarity and character by today's standards alongside modern ceramic, titanium, and sapphire counterparts. However, in the late 1940s, this watch was one to wear during daily wear, and in this case during the daily grind of a contractor.

Gold cases of the reference 6062 were made by *Genex*, in Geneva, the case department of *Gay Frères*. The master case maker mark for *Genex* is number 12 inside a key, such as the present watch. (12 for *Genex*, the key for Geneva). Some inside casebacks are marked with an extra '*Montres SA Rolex*' side engraving. This was on cases made before 1953, such as the present watch, but still in inventory when the company address was changed in 1953, and renamed *Montres Rolex SA* in Geneva.

With a diameter of 35mm, this case is perfectly proportioned to one's wrist with this example also sporting the original "Super-Oyster" crown, a most meaningful feature to the educated collector. Two variants of crown are seen on this reference, the "Super-Oyster", and the Twin-Lock crown. While the present "Super-Oyster" is seen on this example, it is seen on the majority of models for this reference. On closer observation, one will notice a cross between "Super" and "Oyster". This cross was added once the crown was patented.


The Dial

This reference is seen with the "Star Dial", also known as "Stelline", the most unusual configuration. Known as a 'Mark 1 Dial Type 755' by *Stern Frères* examples, it is the only dial made for this reference which has star-shaped hour markers with three faceted dagger-shaped hour markers at 3, 6 and 9 o'clock with radium luminous material to their center. Only one other dial variant (Dial Type 453) has star-shaped numerals, however, the luminous material is not central to the numerals but rather stands as an accent on the outer dial and it is without radium. The gold luminous stars are a rarity for this dial configuration and shine brightly against the matte silvered dial.

Another striking feature of the dial is the designation of "Officially Certified Chronometer" located in the subsidiary dial as opposed to under the *Rolex* signature. The moon phase disc was produced by *Stern Frères* with the blue enamel champlevé technique, also used in *Patek Philippe* calendar watches. However, one will notice that for this model they were produced with the moon phase having eyes, a nose and a mouth, adding increased charm to the dial. The calendar discs, also made by *Stern Frères*, are with inscriptions painted black and were produced in five languages; English, French, German, Italian or Spanish, the present example in English.

Movement

Last but not least, housed in this superlative gold Oyster case is the Caliber 655 which was especially developed for this reference. It boasted the latest in technology, the patented *Rolex* Super-Balance. The automatic movement has commonality with most automatic movements of its time, however, this one had an added function that would allow the calendar to advance through the setting pin holes in the band. As mentioned earlier, along with the reference 8171 these two models are the only watches ever made in series with a triple date and moon phases until 2017 with the introduction of a modern variant. This is a testament to the master craftsmanship of the manufacture and underlines the rarity and skill of these movement.

The *Rolex* Submariner reference 5512 is considered an icon of *Rolex* production. Along with the reference 5513, they were a design improvement from their predecessors by adding "crown guards" to help prevent the stem and crown from being damaged by being hit directly against a hard object. The reference 5512 featured a chronometer-rated movement and the added text on the dial.

The first Submariner model with crown guards, this watch also features the popular black lacquer dial, which is often referred to as a black gloss dial. These black dials must be regarded as the ultimate state of the art in dial manufacturing as they reveal a rich complexity of different layers applied to the metal base. The bezel of this watch was lost during its life and has not been replaced.

With a "four-line dial", the two lines of the depth rating and "SUBMARINER" are in gold or "gilt" text while "SUPERLATIVE CHRONOMETER OFFICIALLY CERTIFIED" is split across two lines in silver text. The gilt first two lines and minute markings are not printed on the black background but underneath and shine through in negative relief. However, to further enhance its sophistication, the silvered text to show that this watch has been chronometer certified is superimposed and printed onto the black background.

Reference 5513 was launched in 1962 and depth rated to 200 meters (660 feet). Manufactured in the first year of production for this model, the case back is stamped '1.62', providing information that it was in fact manufactured during the first quarter of the first year of the reference production.

The present model also features a gilt dial with silver two-line printing and "Exclamation Dial," making this watch a very rare and desirable timepiece. The "Exclamation Dial" nickname comes from the fact that there is an extra small luminous dot below the rectangular marker at 6 o'clock that allows the rectangle and dot to resemble an exclamation point.

Exclamation Dials were used by *Rolex* as a means to indicate that the radium used on the dial to make it luminous was within the norm approved by the Atomic Energy Commission in the U.S. These types of dials are found only on models from the late 1950s to early 1960s. The radioactive radium used on luminous watch dials in the first part of the 20th century was replaced in the middle of the century by less harmful tritium.

The present watch is preserved in excellent condition with no service marks to the back. It is truly an outstanding example of an early reference 5513

Rolex's first Submariner with date, the reference 1680, was introduced in 1968 with much success. The present watch dates to 1969 and is part of the early 1680 examples with the recognizable and attractive red writing on its dial.

Nicknamed "Red-Sub" by *Rolex* collectors, the timepiece features attractive luminous accents that have aged to a uniform color. Adding to the appeal of the wristwatch, the color of the dial has changed to a dark brown color and is allied to a well-preserved stainless steel case with strong proportions, featuring clear reference and serial numbers.

Furthermore, this example is attributed to the rare 'meters first Mark II dial'. Brown dial Submariners such as the present watch are highly sought after, especially rare and appearing usually only in case numbers in the 2.2-2.4M serial range.

Reference 3525

Introduced to the market in 1939, reference 3525 was made for the duration of the Second World War with production ending in 1945. Available in pink gold, yellow gold, stainless steel or steel and gold it was an important landmark model for *Rolex*, the reference being the very first chronograph wristwatch to be fitted with a water-resistant "Oyster" case with screw-down crown.

Reference 3525 has the further distinction of being known as the "POW" or prisoner of war watch since it was the model supplied directly by Rolex to captured Western Allied airmen incarcerated in German camps, including Stalag Luft III made famous by the movie "Great Escape".

The present watch has an Oyster case that has retained excellent proportions, the numbers are crisp and clearly readable, the original Oyster Patent crown is still present. Made during the intermediate production of the reference, the serial number and reference is stamped on the outside of the case back, as opposed to between the lugs, a feature of later models.

Rolex produced a very limited number of complicated models. Historically, the company was focused on professional, reliable timepieces rather than grand complications. The brand, for example, never made a perpetual calendar wristwatch, and overall very few models went beyond dual-time timepieces, or simple calendar or chronograph watches.

The present reference, however, not only represents one of the scarcest examples of more complicated *Rolex* timepieces, but it is the earliest representative of what will become the longest-lived line of complicated Rolex models: the triple calendar chronograph, known as "Datocompax" or "Jean-Claude Killy", because of the appearance of reference 6236 on the wrist of the Olympic ski legend. The Datocompax line comprises ref. 4767, the non-oyster ref. 4768, 5036, 6036 and 6236.

The archetype for this legendary line of watches is here represented by this steel version of reference 4767. The present watch is furthermore one of the earliest examples of the reference: ref. 4767 was launched in 1947 (and remained in production for around four years only) and indeed this watch was manufactured that same year. The dials for this reference were made by Stern and Beyeler, and at least five different models are recognized so far. The model was available in stainless steel and pink and yellow gold, all the cases made by Spielmann. A very rare reference, it is estimated that only around 200 pieces were realized in steel. Of them, so far about 30 are known from the market.

Reference 6034

The two-body case reference 6034 was introduced to the international watch market in 1950 and is the successor to reference 4537. It was equipped with the reliable manual-winding Valjoux 72 caliber and characterized by the word "Antimagnetic" on the dial, as well as having both a telemeter and a tachymeter scale. Equipped with smooth bezel and round chronograph buttons, the water-resistant watch with screw back has an elegant and sporty flair. Most examples of the reference were cased in stainless steel or in 18k gold and a small series in 14k gold. The present example is a highly sought-after variance of the reference 6034 and is particularly impressive for the following reasons;

Firstly, the glossy black dial has aged supremely well and features gilt printing, offering a bold and very appealing aesthetic. Amongst the most coveted trophies within the *Rolex Oyster* chronograph family of references 6034 and 6234 must be considered examples featuring a black lacquer dial. Such lacquered black dials must be regarded as the ultimate state of the art in dial manufacturing as revealing a rich complexity of different layers applied to the metal base.

Secondly, the case is with nicely defined lugs, sharp edges to the bezel, crisp reference and serial numbers seen in-between the lugs and correct "Swiss Cross" crown, correct for pre-1960.

Thirdly, upon inspection of the movement, one will notice the engraved letters "ROW" on the balance cock, confirming it was produced especially for the American market.

The present reference 6034 is a superbly appealing chronograph, one of the best-looking watches from the golden age of *Rolex* chronographs.



The *Rolex* Cosmograph Daytona is among the most appreciated and recognized chronograph models by any manufacturer. When it comes fitted with the rare "exotic" or so-called "Paul Newman" dial, its rarity, aesthetic appeal, and collectability are profoundly increased. This dial, distinguished by the three dimensional construction, with sunken subsidiary dials and sunken outer chapter ring, was an alternative dial offered to clients at the time. Ironically, this variation was not appreciated by the market at the time of its production. It took decades for collectors to prize this "exotic" dial variation. Paul Newman himself wore a reference 6239 with a white dial such as the present example, reportedly a gift from his wife, and he used it in particular for his racing career.

The present lot is a highly important discovery in the world of prized vintage *Rolex*. Collectors and enthusiasts alike will note that this timepiece is almost unheard of in the market today and constitutes extreme rarity among collectable timepieces.

Joseph Linz & Brothers

Retailer to the most prestigious brands, *Joseph Linz & Brothers* opened in 1877 and have since maintained a large and impressive store in Dallas, Texas.

Its beginnings stem with five brothers, who in the late 19th century opened in Denison, despite their upbringing in St. Louis. For decades, the jewelry firm were a staple in the community but they were recognized far and beyond their physical location. It was their reputation which preceded them, and their long-standing relationships with clients which held them in high esteem.

It is no coincidence then, that when *Rolex Watch USA* moved into the Texas market in the mid-20th century, that they chose to sell their exclusive watches through *Linz Brothers*. And it was not only brands which favored selling in the *Linz* store, but clients also showed loyalty to the retailer. In fact, it is known that one of the most important watch connoisseurs and collectors, Mr. J. B. Champion, chose *Linz Brothers* as his preferential retailer, alongside the *Henry Stern Watch Agency* in New York, frequenting both on a regular basis and placing special orders to add to his already impressive watch collection.

Despite *Linz Brothers* being one of the biggest retailers for *Rolex* in North America at that time, an extremely small number of watches with the 'LINZ' signature have ever come to market. Moreover, only a few have ever been seen to grace the dials of the coveted *Rolex* 'Paul Newman'.

Reference 6239 "Paul Newman" Daytona

The *Rolex* Cosmograph Daytona, is among the most appreciated and recognized chronograph models by any manufacturer.

Available in stainless steel, 14k and 18k gold, reference 6239 was the firm's first chronograph with the tachymeter scale engraved on the bezel and the subsidiary dials printed in a different color than the main dial for better readability. The dials of the first models featured only the designation "Cosmograph", referring to the outer space travels of the early 60s. The "Daytona" was added shortly after to mark *Rolex*'s sponsorship of the renowned Nascar stock car race. The so-called "exotic" dial, later nicknamed "Paul Newman", soon became available for reference 6239, either two-colored white/cream and black or three-colored, such as the present watch, with the addition of the red seconds scales.

When the Daytona comes fitted with the rare "exotic" or so-called "Paul Newman" dial, its rarity, aesthetic appeal, and collectability are profoundly increased. This dial, distinguished by the three-dimensional construction, with sunken subsidiary dials and sunken outer chapter ring, was an alternative dial offered to clients at the time. Ironically, this variation was not appreciated by the market at the time of its production. It took decades for collectors to appreciate this "exotic" dial variation, now considered a treasure. The dial is preserved in excellent condition and its attractiveness is increased through the obviously original and nicely aged luminous accents. Paul Newman himself wore a reference 6239 with a white dial, a gift from his wife, and he used it in particular for his racing career.

The reference 6239 Paul Newman Daytona was available with a white dial and black text and registers, or as is the case here, a black dial with white printing and registers. On the present example, the unmistakable 'LINZ' logo with 'N' written backwards stands out in white so clearly against the deep black dial. Moreover, the graphics of the numerals, the font of the *Rolex* designation, the sunken subdials style, the step at 6 o' clock, the angular *Singer* hallmark on the back of the dial, absolutely everything is exactly as it should be on a black Paul Newman dial, but it is the crisp white *LINZ* signature which catches the eye and gives this already highly appealing timepiece a stand out quality like no other. Its bold and attractive aesthetic is heightened by its well-preserved case and crisp serial and reference numbers which are rightfully stamped in-between the lugs.

Of those sought-after watches that were signed by the maker as well as the retailer, such as those with *Rolex* and *Tiffany* & *Co.* signed dials (please see lot 72 in this sale), or perhaps those with *Patek Philippe* and *Gübelin* signed dials, (please see lot 92 in this sale), this example must be considered the rarest, most well-pronounced and distinctive statement of the so-called 'double-signed' dial.



The McMillan Plan

James McMillan, (May 12, 1838 – August 10, 1902), was a United States Senator. A dominant figure in the Michigan Republican party, he was elected as a Republican to the United States Senate and served from 1889 until his death in 1902.

Born in Hamilton, Ontario, he moved at an early age to Detroit, Michigan, and began investing in The Detroit & Milwaukee Railway and the Michigan Car Company, which was at one time the largest in the United States. A director of several Detroit banks, owner of the Detroit and Cleveland Steam Navigation Co., and the Detroit Transportation Co., he contributed significantly to hospitals and shipbuilding companies.

The McMillan Plan is a comprehensive planning structure for the development of the core and park system of Washington D.C., the United States capital. Formed in 1902 by the Senate Park Commission, it is widely acknowledged as the McMillan Commission after its chairman and sponsor of legislation.

The McMillan Plan, which was presented to the public and President Theodore Roosevelt in January, 1902, continues to guide urban planning in and around Washington, D.C.

The dial of this watch has an enamel portrait of a child, thought to be James McMillan's first son, William Charles McMillan, and the hinged case back with monogram *J. Mc. M. for* James McMillan. To the best of our knowledge this watch has never before been offered in public.



In 1996, *Gérald Genta* decided to return to his first passion, painting, and sold his company. Taken over in 2000 by the Bulgari Group, *Gérald Genta* SA continues offering small series of complicated, in-house designed and produced movements combined with avant-garde design.



Reference 5050, *Patek Philippe's* first perpetual calendar wristwatch featuring a retrograde date made in series was introduced at Baselworld in 1993, cased in yellow gold only. Reference 3940, the quintessential perpetual calendar and distinguished by its timeless elegance, is undeniably amongst *Patek Philippe's* greatest classics. Launched in 1984 as replacement for reference 3450, it was at the time the slimmest automatic perpetual calendar wristwatch.







A true Oyster case is defined by the screw-down case back, screw-down crown and screw-down chronograph pushers, thus ensuring increased water resistance. Reference 6265 is indeed one of these highly sought-after models. Together with its sister reference 6263 (the difference being the black-insert bezel rather than the metal one), the reference 6265 is the final evolution of manually wound Daytonas. It is defined, beyond its metal insert and screw-down pushers, by the caliber 727 (evolved from caliber 722-1).

Very well preserved, the present *Rolex* 6265 astonishes through its beautiful champagne dial and contrasting engine-turned black subsidiary registers. Crafted with an 18k gold case retaining strong proportions, this wristwatch was clearly cherished throughout the years, featuring highly legible hallmarks to the back of its case.

A must have for collectors, the *Rolex* reference 6265 was launched around 1970 and is distinguished by its metal bezel with engraved tachymeter scale, screw down chronograph buttons and caliber 727 movement.

Manufactured over a period of approximately 17 years, gold examples of the reference were produced in scarce volume, estimated to approximately 10% of the overall production, and were made in 14k as well as 18k gold. Only visible on gold iterations of the reference, the dial of the timepiece is bestowed with the chronometer certification text, "Superlative Chronometer Officially Certified" at 12 o'clock as well as the "Cosmograph" writing at 6 o'clock.

Reference 6240 was the first "Oyster Cosmograph" model produced by *Rolex*. This novelty was predominantly characterized by the screw-down push buttons. In production only during the second half of the 1960s, it was replaced by the better known references 6263 and 6265.

Reference 6241 was introduced in 1965, and remained in production for 5 years only, discontinued in 1969. It is distinguished by a number of traits which make it one of the most appealing vintage *Rolex* references: it holds historical interest being the first time the combination of black bezel and pump pushers were seen on a Daytona, and the short production run renders it one of the rarest Daytona models produced by *Rolex*.

With a flawless dial, free of any blemishes to the pristine cream color, this watch has luminous plots to the numerals that are fully in-tact and have aged evenly throughout, a very rare occurrence. Given its exceptional condition, this dial is the ideal textbook on which to study the subtle differences present on these early "Paul Newman" versions.

The most apparent of these is the Swiss designation at 6 o' clock. It is slanted to the sides, with the center markedly higher than the extremities. This so-called "sing-a-song" style is found only on early "Paul Newman" versions, and it is later abandoned in favor of linear, more modern graphics. Interestingly, when the outer track is white, the Swiss designation is printed red in one passage. On black outer tracks, such as in the present piece, the process is two-step: first the designation is printed white, and then a red layer is printed on top of the white one. It is thought this process was intended to make the red more bright and contrasting. It appears that three-color white Paul Newman dials – with red divisions on black outer track – later tend to be superseded by examples with white fifth of a second divisions, most probably because of the increased contrast provided by the white on black color scheme.

Furthermore it features the original bezel and the correct caliber 722-1, used only in the last examples of this reference – an update from Cal. 722 found on all the other examples of the model, as well as the correct caseback for this reference, stamped 6241.

Considering its condition, rarity and overall stunning aesthetic, it is safe to count the present piece among the most attractive and collectable examples of reference 6241 to ever appear on the market.

Rolex Daytona models had been in production for twenty years until the firm produced the reference 16520 in 1988 with an automatic movement. The movement in this new self-winding Daytona was based on the Zenith Caliber 400 which was a celebrated movement and the industry's only self-winding chronograph movement that met Rolex's high quality standards. Although it was a movement that met standards, Rolex decided to improve on it and modified the caliber to its own specification including a new larger escapement, freely sprung balance and balance spring with Breguet overcoil (which was a more costly configuration that lead to higher accuracy). The balance oscillation rate was reduced allowing for a less frequent watch service and the date function was eliminated. Retaining just 50% of the Zenith movement, the final result was the caliber 4030 which was used in modern Daytonas until 2000, at which time Rolex introduced the reference 116520 with the new and fully in-house caliber 4130.

The 16520 models had dials which went under a transformation due to oxidation where the chapter rings around the subsidiary dials changed color from white to a shade of brown. These Compax Marrone or Brown Compax models, as they are nicknamed, occurred on watches that were produced in the 1990's, and watches that have the upside down 6 digit on the 12 hour register. Color-change or "tropical" dials are extremely sought after as they are usually attributed to small production runs. Once the firm realized that the dials would change color, it was seen as a defect and consequently the material used was changed in hopes of finding a solution. Pieces with a small production are rare and those with a color-change dial are even rarer making the present Brown Compax a very special timepiece.

On 7 December 2005, A. Lange & Söhne commemorated the 15th anniversary of its reinstated manufacture with an imitable expression of micromechanical virtuosity and watchmaking ingenuity. Testing the boundaries of physics and mechanical possibilities, for the very first time in the history of horology, the manufacture united three marvels from the realm of grand complications: a fusée-and-chain transmission, a tourbillon, and a rattrapante chronograph mechanism in a single wristwatch. This very special opus is the Tourbograph "Pour le Mérite".

Echoing the Tourbillon "Pour le Mérite" that was presented in 1994, the Tourbograph once again unites the two most complex mechanisms dedicated to enhancing long-term rate accuracy, but Lange goes the further mile by integrating a timekeeping mechanism that allows lap times to be measured, as suggested by the name Tourbograph.

The Tourbograph is the second Lange creation with the attribute "Pour le Mérite", an accolade for the superb horological skills of *Lange's* master watchmakers. The name alludes to the most prestigious order of merit inspired by Alexander von Humboldt, sponsored by King Frederick William IV in 1842, for outstanding, predominantly scientific accomplishments.

The hand-crafted manually wound L903.0 caliber is composed of no less than 1,000 individual components. The tourbillon alone consists of 84 parts yet weighs a scant 0.5 grams. Just the finishing process of the bridge requires two days to complete.

The Tourbograph was crafted in a limited edition of 101 examples out of which 51 were made in platinum such as the present lot and is no longer in production.

In 1795 Abraham-Louis Breguet invented the tourbillon to counteract the effects of gravitational pull on the escapements of clocks and watches in their constant change of position. The tourbillon invention received its patent from Frances's ministry of the interior on 26th June 1801. This new creation successfully solved the issue of gravitational pull by rotating the entire balance and escapement about their common axis once a minute, averaging out the positional errors by constant rotation.

The *Breguet* Double Tourbillon exemplifies *Breguet*'s most important invention. Inspired directly by the principles with which *Breguet* revolutionized watch making the mechanism consists of the double tourbillon, each working independently from one another. The two tourbillons are coupled by means of differential gears and mounted on a rotating center plate effecting a complete revolution in twelve hours.




This "second series" reference 1463 was sold in 1949 in the midst of the second series production which ran from 1945 and finished 1961.

This particular example of the 1463 is important for a number of reasons. First and foremost, it is one of the earliest short signature 1463s known to exist. With the change over from *Patek Philippe & Cie* (long signature) to *Patek Philippe* (short signature) in 1948, it is exciting to see an example of a 1463 from this transitional year with the correct dial from the post-war period. The well preserved dial also features the rare variant of Roman numerals combined with long stick batons. The majority of 1940s and 1950s gold 1463s feature Arabic or Breguet dials making this Roman version a rare exception. Furthermore, this example features a second series case with beautiful heavy downturned lugs and a large gold crown. Altogether one of the most wearable of vintage *Pateks* for the modern wrist, the 1463 is an attractive addition to any collection.

Considered one the most beautiful chronographs of the mid-20th century, Reference 1463 is *Patek Philippe's* regular production vintage chronograph model (aside from the 1563) with screw back case and round pushers. The case of this water-resistant 1463 was made by Taubert (formerly Freres Borgel) and was considered a sports watch in its day for its water and dust resistant case combined with a chronograph. A soft-iron dust cap also protects the movement. This fine watch can be considered a great rarity both for its condition, originality, and beauty in design, a true vintage wearable work of art

The present reference 1463 is a superb example of *Patek Philippe's* only regular production vintage chronograph watch with screw back case and round pushers. Introduced in 1940, the model is unquestionably one of the renowned manufacturer's most iconic and popular sports watches. Over the years, its case has seen a number of improvements and changes.

Made in 1958, the "tasti tondi" (Italian for round pushers, as the model is affectionately called by collectors) offered here for sale is from the "second" series, made from the mid-1940s until around 1961. It is distinguished by the larger winding crown, more substantial lugs with curled ends and a more angular, stepped bezel design, as opposed to the rounded bezel and straighter lugs of the earlier generation.

Preserved in superb condition, highlighted by the beautifully raised hard enamel signature and scales and the attractive pearlescent patina, the dial is in perfect harmony with the crisp case. Free from any careless polishing it impresses with its full, sharp-edged proportions and an impeccable satinfinish.

The overall appeal of this beautiful timepiece is further enhanced by two extremely rare features, the signature of the prestigious Swiss watch and jewellery retailer *Gübelin* and the stainless steel *Gübelin* bracelet made by the renowned *Gay Frères* in Geneva, another rarity in itself. This watch also bears the typical *Gübelin* hand engraved Sales line inside the case back below the case number, the watch recently a went through a thorough inspection by *Gübelin* and it's most experienced senior watchmaker, Eugen Fink, resulting in a full confirmation of the watch and issue of an extract of the *Gübelin* archives.

Moreover, this example is believed to be one of only three examples of a reference 1463 in steel retailed by *Gübelin* to appear in public to date, one of them with a consecutive case number and a movement number as close as 3 digits. However, this is the only confirmed watch by *Gübelin* and the only one with this particular early dial layout but short signature. The present watch is doubtlessly one of the most attractive examples of this landmark model to appear in public in recent years.

The present reference 2438-1 is an extremely attractive example of this super-rare model, of which only approximately thirty examples in yellow gold are publicly known. Very seldom offered at auction, the legendary reference 2438-1 must be considered, along with the references 1518, 2497 and 2499, amongst the most iconic and sought-after of *Patek Philippe's* "golden-age" complicated wristwatches.







Reference 2438-1

Reference 2438-1 was produced between 1952 and 1963 and only available in either yellow or pink gold. It was in fact made as a water-resistant variation of the more familiar reference 2497 which is fitted with the same movement and dial. Supplied by Wenger, one of the best case makers in Geneva, the case of the 2438-1 is fitted with a screw down back as opposed to the 2497s snap on back and is 0.7 mm smaller with a still impressive diameter of 37mm - oversized at the time of its first inception, but totally in line with today's standards.

The references 2438-1 and 2497 were the first and only sweep center seconds perpetual calendar watches produced by *Patek Philippe* right up until the launch of references 5050 and 5059 nearly forty years later in 1993.

The aesthetic impact of the reference 2438-1 largely stems from its iconic lugs, defined by the carved groove to the upper outer edges, a feature it has in common with the reference 2499. This detail transfigures the overall look of the watch imbuing it with a subtle yet stately importance leaving no doubt that one is in the presence of one of watch collecting's all-time classics.

The present watch is from the model's second series with a second series Mark I dial. The first series reference 2438 is recognized by its applied Arabic numerals and feuille hands. The second series, such as the present, can be found with two dial variations: Mark I - with applied five-facet "bullet" baton numerals and dauphine hands; Mark II - with shorter four-facet baton numerals.

Not worn for decades and evidently always treated with care and respect the full case impresses with perfectly preserved sharp edges to top and bottom of the lugs, crisp gold marks underneath the lugs and the pristine condition of the small steps to the bezel. The charismatic dial is just as remarkable: in unspoiled condition, without the slightest trace of either intervention or degradation, the hard enamel signatures and scales beautifully raised as one would except. Over the years, a most charismatic, uniform ivory-colored patina has accumulated, lending it the ultimate touch of vintage - subtle signs of natural ageing one would expect on a wristwatch which, for so many years, was exposed to the elements.

The Extract from the Archives confirms that the present ref. 3448 was sold with a detachable white gold bracelet which must have been the request of the original owner while purchasing his treasure in 1969. As not any bracelet is suitable for the model, not only for the size but most importantly because of the openings to both ends required to access the calendar correctors in the band, one can safely assume that the present *Gay Frères* one is in fact that bracelet.

The first owner of the watch and grandfather of the present owner was a renowned ophthalmologist practicing for 45 years and serving also as research associate and consultant. He retired in 1974 as an associate professor and passed away after a long and fulfilled life at the age of 94 in 1997. The meaning of the small metal calendar clip attached to the bracelet of his ref. 3448 remains a mystery: stamped with the name of a pharmaceutical company producing eye drops and dated 1969 it is however related to both his profession and the year of purchase of his watch, adding a personal touch to this superb timepiece.

Reference 3448, introduced into the market in 1962, was at the time the first self-winding perpetual calendar wristwatch. According to literature, a total of 586 examples were made, the majority in yellow gold cases. Only around 130 were cased in white gold, 2 in platinum and 1 in pink gold are known to exist to date.

Reference 3448 was fitted with the celebrated caliber 27-460, amongst the most sophisticated and lavish automatic movements ever made. It was later upgraded with Patek Philippe's patented perpetual mechanism fitted on the movement plate underneath the dial and renamed 27-460 Q.

Reference 3448 was available with four different dial styles:

- -enameled small baton minute divisions from 1962 to circa 1965
- -beady minute divisions and small date ring, such as the present example: 1965 to circa 1973
- -beady minute divisions and large date ring: 1971 to circa 1978
- -printed, not enameled small baton minute divisions: after 1978

In 1981, reference 3450 was introduced into the market with the improved 27'460 QB (Quantime Bissextile) caliber. The model differs from its predecessor by the modified leap year indication, the eccentric small window to 4 o'clock.

With the launch of reference 3940 in 1985, production of both references 3448 and 3450 was discontinued.

Manufacture of reference 425 was launched in 1934 and remained in production until 1960 when it was replaced by the slightly larger reference 2461. Together with the legendary Calatrava reference 96 it was one of *Patek Philippe's* most popular wristwatches, its typical Art Deco architectural design serving as inspiration for the firm's other rectangular models of the time. It was fitted with the celebrated rectangular-shaped caliber 9-90, *Patek Philippe's* finest non-circular movement of the period. The present model further impresses with its striking diamond-set hour markers.

The caseback of the present watch is engraved;

Fulgencio Batista y Zaldívar, born Rubén Zaldívar, (January 16, 1901 - August 6, 1973)

Fulgencio Batista, originally born Rubén Fulgencio Batista Zaldívar, remains one of Cuba's most well-known political figures. The son of impoverished farmers, Batista joined the army as a sergeant. Eleven years later he had gained enough popularity to successfully organize students, labor leaders, as well as fellow officers into a revolt against Cuban dictator, Gerardo Machado. When Machado's reign toppled, Batista became the most powerful man in Cuba and in 1940 he was elected president. His reign was relatively stable, with strong economic growth, an emphasis on public works projects, and the expansion of the education system. In 1944, Batista lost the presidential election and stepped down gracefully, moving to Florida with his wife and living quietly until 1952. By 1952, Cuba's government had, once again, fallen deeply into corruption and Batista saw this as his opportunity to regain control.

While Batista's second reign was a golden age for tourism in Cuba, conditions for Cuban citizens outside of Havana were not as impressive. The gap between the rich and poor widened as government corruption increased. As Batista repeatedly delayed plans to step down from office, he faced growing opposition from the Cuban people. Faced with the rise of the rebel forces led by Fidel Castro, Batista and his wife decided to flee Cuba in 1959 before settling in Portugal.

The present watch is thought to have been offered from Batista in 1954 to Associated Press journalist, Ben Meyer, who published many news stories during his long time as a U.S. correspondent and Bureau Chief in Habana, Cuba. No doubt Meyer and Batista spent much time together during Batista's reign and since the caseback reads, 'in memory of...,' is likely that this watch was given with an underlying sarcastic tone, perhaps at a time when Batista was planning to step down from office. Once referring to Batista as "Cuba's resurgant strong man," the extent of the relationship the U.S. press agent and Cuba's second time reigning president is not known, however, the gift of such a thoughtful timepiece with a joke engraved on its back shows that they were certainly close friends and no doubt relied on each other in a what can only be described as a turbulent time for relations between the U.S. and Cuba.

Introduced into the market in 1952, reference 2526 was *Patek Philippe*'s first self-winding or automatic watch, starting with movement number 760'000. The model features the legendary caliber 12-600 AT which was granted Swiss patent No. 289758 in 1953 for "a self-winding mechanism for a wristwatch movement using the energy supplied by a rotary mass causing an eccentric part to transmit a swinging movement to an organ of the mechanism".

The majority of reference 2526 was cased in yellow gold, a small series in pink gold and an exceedingly limited number in white gold and platinum. Mainly fitted with enamel dials with applied gold baton numerals, the white gold and platinum examples were also available with silvered metal dials with diamond indexes.



Reference 2526 is a legendary model in the history of watchmaking: not only is it the first automatic wristwatch by *Patek Philippe*, but it is also one of the best performing automatic movement ever designed; its performances and accuracy can be considered superior even by today's standards.

It is also one of *Patek Philippe* models which presents most variations: it is known in the three gold colors and in platinum, with leather strap or with one of many possible bracelet designs. Its dial can be metal or enamel, with baton, Breguet or diamond-set indexes. One version even presents the Golden Rule on the dial. Furthermore, the model underwent an evolution over the years, thus presenting different series.

With such a "milestone status" among automatic wristwatches, such an array of different options, and the undeniable elegance of its simplicity, it is no surprise that this reference is a favorite among collectors.







Among the plethora of different variations, black 2526 dials are the most appreciated because of the incredible rarity and unsurpassed appeal of the iconic black dial. The ultimate echelon of collectability for this reference, consequently, is embodied in this watch: a black enamel first series dial, easily distinguished by glimpsing the flared holes under the numerals.

As this watch was manufactured after first series dials were no longer made, it is likely that the original buyer specially requested a black dial to be placed on this watch. Since the archive states the original dial color of the watch is not mentioned in the records, it is likely that this watch sold in 1964 was 'born' with this black dial from an early batch of dials from the mid-1950s as *Patek Philippe* often filled special requests in this era. The fact remains that this dial is in exceptional condition and is exceptionally rare, a dial and reference coveted by collectors from around the world.

First series dials are distinguished by the fact that the numerals are not glued to the enamel, as seen with second series dials. Rather, the enamel presents flared holes in correspondence of every numeral through which the feet of the numeral are positioned before being soldered to the back of the dial. While guaranteeing maximum durability, this solution is extremely costly, as a high number of dials do not survive through the manufacturing process due to the many flared holes. This is why this methodology was abandoned in favor of a simpler one (and, later, an even simpler one when the dial becomes metal rather than enamel in the third series). Such a manufacturing procedure is proof of the nearly unreasonably high quality standards *Patek Philippe* maintained for their production over its entire existence.

THE FIRST KNOWN REFERENCE 2481 LARGE CENTER SECONDS MEN'S WRISTWATCH WITH POLYCHROME *CLOISONNÉ* ENAMEL "TROPICAL OASIS" DIAL

After the horror of WW II, the second half of the 20th century was celebrated as a new beginning, a time for joy and hope. There were festivities everywhere, and Geneva was not an exception, including its watch companies. *Rolex* launched the Constellation "Star" calendar wristwatch, Ref. 6062, and *Patek Philippe* produced two remarkable new models; Ref. 2499 and Ref. 2481.

Reference 2481 was officially introduced into the market in 1950. With its 37mm case diameter and with the nickname "King Size," it is one of the largest vintage *Patek Philippe* ever produced, a trait that is nowadays making this model more and more sought-after.

It is of no surprise with its generous case proportions and very attractive design that examples of Ref. 2481 were worn by some very important people; French president, Charles de Gaulle, Marchal Tito, the president of Yugoslavia as well as the King of Saudia Arabia, who liked them so much that he ordered almost 150 of them for gifts.

Manufactured in 1950 as stated on the *Patek Philippe* Extract from the Archives, when we extend our research to examine the movement number as well as the serial number, we can see clear indications that present watch is the first of its kind in its series, considered a highly important position today.













The Movement

In 1949 Patek Philippe was ready to launch its new movement caliber to celebrate the new, better half of the century. They named it 27 SC. The "27" was its diameter in millimeters', the "SC" stood for Seconde Centrale. The first such movement bears the number 700,000. The company states that the series ran consecutively from 700,000 to 712,669². It was a robust movement, with 18 jewels and with directly driven sweep-second hand. The early ones, like this one, were fitted with bi-metallic temperature compensating balances (the later ones were fitted with mono-metallic glucydur³ balance). It was also the first series of movements with direct center seconds⁴.

By searching the data base of over 100,000 *Patek Philippe* watches sold on the secondary market within the past half a century⁵, we know that caliber 27 SC was first used in References 2457, 1513, 1491, 1578, 565, 2466, and finally in Ref. 2481 starting at No. 700,260 which was this watch.

Both the serial number of the movement as well as the serial number of the case are far ahead from the main numbers of this reference. Our watch has the serial number 700,260. The next Ref. 2481 known has No. 701,298, over a thousand numbers later. Those thousand numbers were used for the references we mentioned above but not for the 2481.

The case number of our watch, 660,758, is over 8000 numbers smaller than the case number of the next 2481 known, 668,427. There is little doubt that this watch is the first known and after its trial period when the company decided that it is to their satisfaction, it was then put into production which lasted thirteen years from 1950 to 1963.

The Case

The case was entrusted to a young master case maker, Bernard Dubois, who opened his shop in Le Locle, at Beau-Site 25, only three years before. It is two-part, snap-on construction was more difficult to make but resulted in added protection from the elements. It features long claw lugs, similar to the lugs of the legendary Ref. 2499, and a rare concave band. Dubois company lasted forty years making cases for other firms and also for different models for *Patek Philippe*, like, for example, the Ref. 2452.

The fascinating and highly attractive case design still retains a "Calatrava" feeling, but with the adoption of unusual, avant-garde solutions such as the concave bezel and the heavily stepped lugs, it is a timepiece that, thanks to the visionary genius of *Patek Philippe's* design, can be worn and appreciated daily even today, more than fifty years after its conception.

The Dial

Collectors of rare wristwatches are fascinated by complications and their complex mechanisms. However, wristwatches fitted with cloisonné enamel dials take a most prominent position in terms of beauty, craftsmanship and rarity. *Patek Philippe* made an exceedingly small number of "time only" wristwatches where highly detailed and incredibly artistic cloisonné enamel dials were fitted. Only an extremely small number of watches were upgraded with these wonderful and vivid dials, depicting popular motifs such as the tropical oasis, the lighthouse and sail boats, but also flowers, portraits and maps. The majority of the dials for Ref. 2481 were regular silver ones but the examples with cloisonné ones are far rarer.

The Sterns, the owners of *Patek Philippe*, had their own dial company, Stern Freres, the largest one in Switzerland. In the 1940s they were already experimenting with cloisonné dials with a few pocket watches⁶. For their rare enamel dials they used highly skilled enamel artists. The one who made this dial, Marguerite Koch, was one of the best. The company paid her on an average 75CHF per dial. She worked for the company till 1960's. Some of the most spectacular examples Patek Philippe dials, including the World Time watches (Heures Universelles), like Ref. 1415, Ref. 605, and Ref. 2523 came from the talented Mlle. Koch's hand. As an inspiration for the Tropic dials she used work by Henri Rousseau and Paul Gauguin from their famous Rainforest Series. She was also taking private orders where one could order a dial from her by visiting her small studio at route de Malagnou 34, in Geneva.

The present watch dial is a much sought-after earlier kind of cloisonné enamel technique. Nowadays the mixture that was used in the 1950s, that being materials such as lead, mercury and cyanide that were used in the enameling process are no longer used. The result is that the new enamel techniques seen on recent cloisonné enamel watches, for example, although still masterfully executed, do not have a certain raw element which creates 'vintage' inspired color such as the present watch. This is a big factor for any avid collector who rightfully understands that it is these differences which offer increased value in the earlier examples.

The enamel artist, here Marguerite Koch, created the outline of the desired motif by arranging thin gold wires on a dial. These partitions were filled with small quantities of enamel powder in the desired color. The art is seen in the ability to arrange a single partition with different hues. The dial was then fired in an oven at around 1000 degrees Celsius causing the powder to melt and then it was usually hand-polished until obtaining a perfectly flat surface.



The present dial has been identified as belonging to the 'Forêt Vierge,' or 'Jungle' theme and the back of the dial carries the correct coding: "93" stands for the client, in this instance Patek Philippe and "6003" as the order number when it was requested. The scene is a dreamlike landscape where two palm trees flank either side of the dial, gracefully bowing over the blue sea and exotic fruits below. The sand is depicted in yellow and lays towards the base of the dial, framing this vibrant yet harmonious setting. Not only is this enamel dial a true work of art impressing with luminosity and artistic flamboyancy, but one should also mention that the surface covered with enamel does not distract from being able to read the time as the brushed outer ring and large applied Roman numerals offer increased legibility for the wearer.

There are only six examples of Ref. 2481 with a combination of rose gold and cloisonné jungle dial known. This watch is the earliest of them, as well as the earliest of all watches from this series. The Patek Philippe Museum has eight examples of Ref. 2481 including The Tropics but not a single rose gold one with the Tropic-Oasis dial.

In accordance with New York law, if Christie's arranges the shipment of a lot out of New York State, New York sales tax does not apply, although sales tax or other applicable taxes for other states may apply. If you hire a shipper (other than a common carrier authorized by Christie's), to collect the lot from a Christie's New York location, Christie's must collect New York sales tax on the lot at a rate of 8.875% regardless of the ultimate destination of the lot.

If Christie's delivers the **lot** to, or the **lot** is collected by, any framer, restorer or other similar service provider in New York that you have hired, New York law considers the **lot** delivered to the successful bidder in New York and New York sales tax must be imposed regardless of the ultimate destination of the **lot**. In this circumstance, New York sales tax will apply to the **lot** even if Christie's or a common carrier (authorized by Christie's that you hire) subsequently delivers the **lot** outside New York.

Successful bidders claiming an exemption from sales tax must provide appropriate documentation to Christie's prior to the release of the lot or within 90 days after the sale, whichever is earlier. For shipments to those states for which Christie's is not required to collect sales tax, a successful bidder may have a use or similar tax obligation. It is the successful bidder's responsibility to pay all taxes due. Christie's recommends you consult your own independent tax advisor with any questions.

E WARRANTIES

1 SELLER'S WARRANTIES

- For each lot, the seller gives a warranty that the seller:
 (a) is the owner of the lot or a joint owner of the lot acting with the permission of the other co-owners or, if the seller is not the owner or a joint owner of the lot, has the permission of the owner to sell the lot, or the right to do so in law; and
- (b) has the right to transfer ownership of the lot to the buyer without any restrictions or claims by anyone else.

If either of the above warranties are incorrect, the seller shall not have to pay more than the purchase price (as defined in paragraph F1 (a) below) paid by you to us. The seller will not be responsible to you for any reason for loss of profits or business, expected savings, loss of opportunity or interest, costs, damages, other damages or expenses. The seller gives no warranty in relation to any lot other than as set out above and, as far as the seller is allowed by law, all warranties from the seller to you, and all other obligations upon the seller which may be added to this agreement by law, are excluded.

2 OUR AUTHENTICITY WARRANTY

We warrant, subject to the terms below, that the **lots** in our sales are **authentic** (our "authenticity warranty"). If, within 5 years of the date of the auction, you give notice to us that your **lot** is not authentic, subject to the terms below, we will refund the **purchase price** paid by you. The meaning of authentic can be found in the glossary at the end of these Conditions of Sale. The terms of the authenticity warranty are as follows:

- (a) It will be honored for claims notified within a period of 5 years from the date of the auction. After such time, we will not be obligated to honor the authenticity warranty.
- (b) It is given only for information shown in UPPERCASE type in the first line of the catalogue description (the "Heading"). It does not apply to any information other than in the Heading even if shown in UPPERCASE type.
-) The authenticity warranty does not apply to any Heading or part of a Heading which is qualified. Qualified means limited by a clarification in a lot's catalogue description or by the use in a Heading of one of the terms listed in the section titled Qualified Headings on the page of the catalogue headed "Important Notices and Explanation of Cataloguing Practice". For example, use of the term "ATTRIBUTED TO..." in a Heading means that the lot is in Christie's opinion probably a work by the named artist but no warranty is provided that the lot is the work of the named artist, Please read the full list of Qualified Headings and a lot's full catalogue description before bidding.
- (d) The authenticity warranty applies to the Heading as amended by any Saleroom Notice.

Further, it does not apply if the Heading either matched the generally accepted opinion of experts at the date of the auction or drew attention to any conflict of opinion.

 - (i) give us written notice of your claim within 5 years of the date of the auction. We may require full details and supporting evidence of any such claim;
 - (ii) at Christie's option, we may require you to provide the written opinions of two recognised experts in the field of the lot mutually agreed by you and us in advance confirming that the lot is not authentic. If we have any doubts, we reserve the right to obtain additional opinions at our expense; and
 - (iii) return the lot at your expense to the saleroom from which you bought it in the condition it was in at the time of sale.
- (i) Your only right under this authenticity warranty is to cancel the sale and receive a refund of the purchase price paid by you to us. We will not, under any circumstances, be required to pay you more than the purchase price nor will we be liable for any loss of profits or business, loss of opportunity or value, expected savings or interest, costs, damages, other damages or expenses.
- (i) Books. Where the lot is a book, we give an additional warranty for 2 t days from the date of the auction that any lot is defective in text or illustration, we will refund your purchase price, subject to the following terms:
 - (a) This additional warranty does not apply to:
 - (i) the absence of blanks, half titles, tissue guards or advertisements, damage in respect of bindings, stains, spotting, marginal tears or other defects not affecting completeness of the text or illustration;
 - (ii) drawings, autographs, letters or manuscripts, signed photographs, music, atlases, maps or periodicals;
 - (iii) books not identified by title;
 - (iv) lots sold without a printed estimate;
 - (v) books which are described in the catalogue as sold not subject to return; or
 - (vi) defects stated in any condition report or announced at the time of sale.

- (b) To make a claim under this paragraph you must give written details of the defect and return the lot to the sale room at which you bought it in the same condition as at the time of sale, within 21 days of the date of the sale.
- (k) South East Asian Modern and Contemporary Art and Chinese Calligraphy and Painting. In these categories, the authenticity warranty does not apply because current scholarship does not permit the making of definitive statements. Christie's does, however, agree to cancel a sale in either of these two categories of art where it has been proven the lot is a forgery. Christie's will refund to the original buyer the purchase price in accordance with the terms of Christie's Authenticity Warranty, provided that the original buyer notifies us with full supporting evidence documenting the forgery claim within twelve (12) months of the date of the auction. Such evidence must be satisfactory to us that the property is a forgery in accordance with paragraph E2(h)(ii) above and the property must be returned to us in accordance with E2h(iii) above. Paragraphs E2(b), (c), (d), (e), (f) and (g) and (i) also apply to a claim under these categories.

3 YOUR WARRANTIES

 - (i) you have conducted appropriate customer due diligence on the ultimate buyer(s) of the lot(s) in accordance with all applicable anti-money laundering and sanctions laws, consent to us relying on this due diligence, and you will retain for a period of not less than 5 years the documentation evidencing the due diligence. 2 TRANSFERRING OWNERSHIP TO YOU

The risk in and responsibility for the **lot** will transfer to you from whichever is the earlier of the following:

- (b) If you owe money to us or to another Christie's Group company, we can use any amount you do pay, including any deposit or other part-payment you have made to us, or which we owe you, to pay off any amount you owe to us or another Christie's Group company for any transaction.

5 KEEPING YOUR PROPERTY

If you owe money to us or to another Christie's Group company, as well as the rights set out in F4 above, we can use or deal with any of your property we hold or which is held by another Christie's Group company in any way we are allowed to by law. We will only release your property to you after you pay us or the relevant Christie's Group company in full for what you owe. However, if we choose, we can also sell your property in any way we think appropriate. We will use the proceeds of the sale against any amounts you owe us and we will pay any amount left from that sale to you.

If there is a shortfall, you must pay us any difference between the amount we have received from the sale and the amount you owe us.

G COLLECTION AND STORAGE

- (a) You must collect purchased lots within seven days from the auction (but note that lots will not be released to you until you have made full and clear payment of all amounts due to us).

2 EXPORT AND IMPORT

Any **lot** sold at auction may be affected by laws on exports from the country in which it is sold and the import restrictions of other countries. Many countries require a declaration of export for property leaving the country and/or an import declaration on entry of property into the country. Local laws may prevent you from importing a **lot** or may prevent you selling a **lot** in the country you import it into.

This agreement will be binding on your successors or estate and anyone who takes over your rights and responsibilities.

6 TRANSLATIONS

If we have provided a translation of this agreement, we will use this original version in deciding any issues or disputes which arise under this agreement.

We will hold and process your personal information and may pass it to another **Christie's Group** company for use as described in, and in line with, our privacy notice at www.christies.com/about-us/contact/privacy.

8 WAIVER

No failure or delay to exercise any right or remedy provided under these Conditions of Sale shall constitute a waiver of that or any other right or remedy, nor shall it prevent or restrict the further exercise of that or any other right or remedy. No single or partial exercise of such right or remedy shall prevent or restrict the further exercise of that or any other right or remedy.

9 LAW AND DISPUTES

This agreement, and any non-contractual obligations arising out of or in connection with this agreement, or any other rights you may have relating to the purchase of a lot will be governed by the laws of New York. Before we or you start any court proceedings (except in the limited circumstances where the dispute, controversy or claim is related to proceedings brought by someone else and this dispute could be joined to those proceedings), we agree we will each try to settle the dispute by mediation submitted to JAMS, or its successor, for mediation in New York. If the Dispute is not settled by mediation within 60 days from the date when mediation is initiated, then the Dispute shall be submitted to JAMS, or its successor, for final and binding arbitration in accordance with its Comprehensive Arbitration Rules and Procedures or, if the Dispute involves a non-
