THE TREASURY: FINEST WINES FROM A PEERLESS COLLECTION

We are delighted to introduce The Treasury. This impeccable collection has been collated by a wine lover over many years from merchants and auction houses. The cellar features an extensive selection of Bordeaux from top Châteaux, Château Lafite-Rothschild from sensational vintages such as 1986, 2005 and 2010 and Château Mouton-Rothschild from the monumental 1982 and 2000 vintages, with the latter in magnum. Château Haut-Brion is offered in cases from landmark vintages such as 1989 and 2015. Across the Gironde, Petrus and Le Pin are well represented, in wooden cases, from top vintages such as 1995, 2000 and 2009.

Burgundy forms the heart of the collection, with famous Domaines appearing in the catalogue; Domaine de la Romanée Conti, Domaine Comte Georges de Vogüé, Domaine Georges Roumier and Domaine Leroy. Cases of Richebourg 2009 from Domaine Leroy are particular highlights as are cases of Bonnes Mares 1971 from Domaine Comte Georges de Vogüé and Chambolle-Musigny Les Amoureuses 1961, which is a jewel for wine collectors. The offering of wines from Domaine Armand Rousseau is extraordinary, with Chambertin and Chambertin Clos de Bèze forming vertical offerings through astonishing vintages.

Further afield, the range of Italian wines on offer, in this single owner sale, is extraordinary. Soldera is presented in magnum and bottle, from the famous 1988 and 1990 vintages respectively. Bruno Giacosa, Giacomo Conterno, Bartolo Mascarello and Roagna all feature in case quantities.

From Spain, vintages of Vega Sicilia, Unico and wines from Viñedos Artadi will excite lovers of wines from the Iberian Peninsula. This marquee auction features the best wines from the most sought after vintages and represents the chance for collectors to delve deep into one of the most treasured cellars to come to auction in recent history.

CHATEAU LATOUR

Château Latour manages to achieve a rare stylistic balance, in that its wines are internationally known for both their elegance and purity of linear fruit flavour, and for their power, muscularity and heroic longevity. Few wines age with such consummate grace as those of Château Latour. These wines are highly tannic in youth, and are famously distinctive in the way they mature slowly, and on their own terms; stubbornly refusing to succumb to the effects of the natural passing of time. The other great hallmark of Latour is its consistency- the wines are consistently impressive, irrespective of whether the vintage is great, mediocre or even slightly disappointing.

The 47 hectares which surround the Château are called "l'Enclos". Only the grapes from these 47 hectares make it into the "Grand Vin de Château Latour". The soils vary from clayey gravel on a subsoil of marly sediment, gravelly sands with small pebbles and marly clay which suits Merlot. All the soils are characterised by excellent drainage which encourages the vines to develop deep roots in search of nutrients and water.

Frédéric Engerer, the President, along with Technical Director Hélène Génin have ensured that grape selection is paramount, and only grapes from vines that are at least 25 years old are allowed into the Grand Vin. Hand-harvesting and a first sorting are carried out by 200 pickers, before being transported to the winery for the second round of sorting and destemming. The winery contains 66 temperature controlled stainless steel vats which enables the separate vinification of different plots. By December the wine is in new oak barrels, where it remains for about 18 months with rackings about every three months. Blending is completed by March the following year, with fining with egg white, but since 1999 there is no filtration and the wine is retuned to vat for a month prior to bottling.

CHATEAU LAFITE-ROTHSCHILD

The name Lafite comes from the Gascon language term "la hite", which means "hillock". The estate is situated at the northern end of Pauillac, close to Cos d'Estournel which is just over the border in St-Estèphe. The vineyard consists of three major areas: the hillsides around the Château, the adjacent Carruades plateau to the west, and 4.5 hectares in neighboring Saint Estèphe (which is entitled to the Pauillac appellation). The well-drained soils are deep fine gravel up to 4 metres deep mixed with Aeolian sands on a bedrock of tertiary limestone. The best area is on slightly raised land known as the plateau which is just south of the chai where the gravel is very deep and has excellent drainage. Where there are dips in the land, Merlot is normally planted and drainage channels have had to be installed. There are many variations of aspects and soils and consequently the winemakers try and vinify as many lots separately as possible and the same vineyard workers are assigned the same parcels year after to year to ensure they have a deep understanding of the vines and terroir. The average age of the vines on the whole estate is 35 years old. There are some vines younger than 10 years old (about 20 hectares) which are not used in the Grand Vin. Therefore the average age of the vines used in the Grand Vin is 40 years. 18 hectares of vines are more than 50 years old and the oldest plot, called "La Gravière", are over 120 years old, having been planted in 1886. Vine density ranges from 7,500 to 8,800 vines per hectare.

Only minimal interventions of fertilizers are used. Yields are kept low and harvesting is done by hand in approximately 12 days by up to 350 pickers. Grapes are sorted in the vineyard before being brought in to the two reception bays where different plots are vinifed separately. Vinification takes place half in stainless steel tanks which are equipped with computerized temperature control and half in traditional oak vats, with no cold soak or pigeage. Malolactic fermentation also takes place in the vats before the wine is transferred into new oak barriques (the estate produces its own barrels in their cooperage).

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CHATEAU MOUTON ROTHSCHILD

In 1853 Baron Nathaniel de Rothschild bought Chateau Brane-Mouton and renamed it Mouton Rothschild. Baron Philippe de Rothschild became involved in the estate following the death in 1920 of Laura-Thérèse who had run the property after becoming widowed by Baron Nathaniel de Rothschild. Baron Philippe de Rothschild worked tirelessly and drove innovations such as commissioning the artist Jean Carlu in 1924 to design a new label. In the same year he also bottled the entire vintage at the Château, a practice that had up until then been virtually unheard of. In 1945 to celebrate the 'Année de la Victoire' he commissioned the artist Philippe Juillan to design the label which began the tradition of different artists painting the label for each vintage, that continues to this day (except for 1953, 1977 and 2000). Such famous names as Picasso, Kandinsky, Francis Bacon and Andy Warhol have featured on the labels and helped to strengthen the reputation of the Château. Artists have never been paid for their work, but have received Mouton Rothschild wine. Baron Philippe de Rothschild's main goal and achievement was the promotion of Chateau Mouton Rothschild to First-Growth status in 1973. Since his death in 1988 the estate was managed by his daughter, Philippine until she passed away in 2014. For the *Grand Vin* the average age of vines is 44 years with a density of 10,000 per hectare planted on gravel soils. Vinification takes place in oak vats for between 15 and 25 days followed by maturation in oak barriques for between 19 and 22 months, the percentage of new barrels depends on the vintage.

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CHATEAU MARGAUX

There have been moments or startling brilliance, such as the monumental 1945 or 1953 vintages and since the Mentzelopoulos family took over in the late 1970's the wines have been on magnificent form; the wines from the 1980's and 1990's are nothing short of spectacular. The wines of Château Margaux are celebrated for their elegance and finesse and for their inimitable fragrance.

The Ginestet family became majority shareholders of the Château in 1949. In 1977 Pierre Ginestet decided to sell the property to André Mentzelopoulos. André invested heavily in the Château. In the vineyards, new drainage systems were installed and new vines were planted. Improvements were made in the cellar in conjunction with the oenologist Emile Peynaud who helped with the reintroduction of Pavillon Rouge. The success of the 1978 vintage was testament to the hard work and investment undertaken at the property and the high quality reputation of Château Margaux was rapidly re-established.

Following his untimely death in 1980, André's daughter, Corinne, and widow Laura took over the running of the estate. Paul Pontallier was appointed Director and until his untimely passing in 2016, worked tirelessly to promote and ensure the smooth running of the property.

The majority of the vineyards are on deep gravel and gravely clay soils which are ideally suited to Cabernet Sauvignon. Merlot is planted on soils which have higher content of clay and limestone. Average yields are around 40 hectolitres per hectare. The grapes are strictly sorted in the vineyard by highly trained pickers. The wine is aged for between eighteen to twenty four months in new medium-toast barriques, the majority of which are made by the estate's own cooper.

CHATEAU HAUT-BRION

Château Haut-Brion has been highly regarded for many centuries, being mentioned in Samuel Pepy's diary in 1663 (as "Ho Bryan") and is the oldest of the Bordeaux classed Growths. In 1935 Haut-Brion was bought by the American banker, Clarence Dillon and since 2008 his great-grandson, His Royal Highness Prince Robert of Luxembourg is the current President. The contribution of the Delmas family should be mentioned as the family have been involved in the property since 1923, when George Delmas was employed to administer the estate. Subsequently he was succeeded in 1961 by his son Jean-Bernard, and then by his son, Jean-Philippe in 2004. Jean-Bernard pioneered the use of stainless steel, and in 1961 Haut-Brion became the first major Bordeaux estate to vinify in stainless steel. Further improvements and investments have been instrumental in retaining its reputation of producing one of the finest wines in the world, of both red and dry white wines. In 1983 the Dillons acquired the next door property La Mission Haut-Brion.

The average age of the vines is over 35 years, with some vines dating from the 1930's, and a vine density of 8,000 vines per hectare. The 48 hectares planted to red grapes consists of 45.4% Merlot 43.9% Cabernet Sauvignon, 9.7% Cabernet Franc and 1% Petit Verdot. The red grapes are sorted in the vineyard, then brought to the winery and destemmed, lightly crushed to break open the skins and pumped into tanks. Indigenous yeasts are used for the alcoholic fermentation and the temperature is carefully controlled. Maceration lasts for approximately 15 days. Malolactic fermentation occurs naturally due to the presence of natural lactic bacteria in the chai. The wines from different vats are blended and then transferred to approximately 80% new oak barrels for between 18 to 22 months. CHATEAU COS D'ESTOURNEL

Château Cos d'Estournel is named after its 19th century owner, Louis-Gaspard d'Estournel. The word "Cos" derives from the Gascogne language, meaning "hill of pebbles". In 1917 the property was purchased by Fernand Ginestet, whose daughter Arlette married into the Prats family which is how the Château came into the hands of Bruno Prats who managed Cos d'Estournel until 1998 when it was sold to the Taillan Group. His son Jean-Guillaume Prats has remained as general manager and in 2000 the estate was bought by Michel Reybier. Since 2004 the technical director has been Dominique Arangoits. Cos d'Estournel is located in the south of the St-Estèphe appellation, on the border with Pauillac. The vineyards are superbly sited on a south-facing gravel ridge with a high clay content, just north of Lafite-Rothschild, separated by the La Jalle de Breuil tributary stream. The 91 hectare estate is planted with 60% Cabernet Sauvignon and 40% Merlot. The average vine age is 35 years at a density of 8,000 to 10,000 per hectare and only vines over 20 years of age end up in the Grand Vin. Yields are kept to about 40 to 45 hectolitres per hectare and harvesting is done by hand with a rigorous sorting of the grapes. A state-of-the-art *cuvier* was opened in 2008 and enables pumping over through racking off by gravity with the help of four lift-operated vats and precise control of fermentation temperatures which makes it possible to obtain a selection of the softest tannins and maximum preservation of fruit. Fermentation takes place generally with natural yeasts. The different grape varieties are then blended together before being put into barriques. The oak barrels are sourced from the forest of Alliers and since 2000 the proportion of new oak has varied depending on the vintage. The wine is aged for about 18 months and remains on the lees without racking until July. The wine is then fined but not filtered before bottling.

CHÂTEAU CHEVAL BLANC

The name Cheval Blanc was first used in 1852, 20 years after the founding of the 39 hectare estate in Saint-Emilion in 1832. The domaine has a long history, with archives indicating that vines have been grown at Cheval Blanc, date as far back as the 15thcentury. The ethos in the vineyard is minimal intervention with limited use of fertilizers and no chemical herbicides.

Grapes are harvested entirely by hand at Cheval Blanc and only picked when they have reached the exact desired degree of maturity. Pruning and green-harvesting limit the crop to five or six bunches per vine so that the vines focus their energy on producing high quality fruit. The harvest takes place according to the ripeness of each grape variety in each plot. The grapes from each plot are processed separately – no grapes from one plot are mixed with ones from another. Grape selection occurs both before and after destemming and less than 5% of the grapes are left whole and less than 5% are crushed.

The average age of vines is over 40 years, and density is high at around 8,000 vines per hectare. Cabernet Franc accounts for 58% of plantings and Merlot 42%, which adds richness and roundness to the blend. The château is most famous for its Cabernet Franc vines, and some of these date from the 1920's. This grape offers complex and elegant aromatics and freshness to the finish on the palate.

CHÂTEAU AUSONE

The 7 hectare estate of Château Ausone is situated on the limestone hillsides of the town of St-Émilion and is undoubtedly one of the leading properties in Bordeaux. The name Ausone is derived from the Roman poet Ausonius (AD 320 -395) who is believed to have owned a villa on the site. Ausone's reputation was enhanced significantly when in 1892 the property was inherited by Edouard Dubois (who later married and changed his surname to Dubois-Challon) and then was passed to his children Cécile Vauthier and Jean Dubois-Challon. The estate produced some exceptional wines in the twentieth century, such as the 1921, 1947 and 1949 to name a few. Ausone's outstanding reputation has been growing further in recent years. In 1997, the Vauthier family took full control of the estate and have invested considerable sums and energy into improvements, such as repairing the terrace walls, installing a new drainage system and replanting vines where necessary. They also increased the proportion of Cabernet Franc in the vineyards, which now stands at 55% with 45% Merlot. Today the domaine belongs to Alain Vauthier and his sister Catherine, who bought their aunt Hélyette Dubois-Challon's share in 1997. Part of the vineyards are located on the soils of the limestone plateau and the remainder are on clay-limestone slopes. The south-east exposure protects the vines from the cool northerly winds and enables the grapes to reach optimal maturity. The vines are old, with an average age of 50 years and the vineyard faces south-east which protects it from the north wind and westerly rain. Vauthier has reduced yields, begun to harvest more mature fruit, and believes malolactic fermentation should be done in small barrels as opposed to tank. This has produced wines which are beautifully expressive of terroir.

During the 19th Century, Pétrus belonged to the Arnaud family and encompassed only 6.5 hectares planted in a traditional mix of 70% Merlot and 30% Cabernet Franc. At the beginning of the 20th Century, the Arnaud's founded La Société Civile du Château Pétrus, offering shares in the company to the public. Madame Loubat, wife of the owner of the Hôtel Loubat in Libourne, began to acquire shares in 1925, and by 1949, she owned the domaine outright. The estate was passed down to two nieces in 1961; Mme. Lily Lacoste and Mme. Lignac. In 1943 Jean-Pierre Moueix became their sole agent and in 1969 bought a majority share from Mme. Lignac. In the same year the estate was increased with the purchase of four hectares from neighboring Château Gazin. Today Pétrus is owned by Jean-Francois Moueix.

The vineyard is located in Pomerol on a plateau dominated by iron-rich (crasse de fer) clay soils that give the wines their structure and power. They are well drained due to a gentle slope. The clay content retains some water which reduces hydric stress and creates a cooler mesoclimate that is ideally suited to the early ripening Merlot. The average age of the vines is 45 years. The utmost care is taken in the vineyard, with strict green harvesting to limit yields and helicopters have even been rented to dry out the vines at harvest time after wet spells.

Grapes are picked early to retain acidity which provides freshness, finesse and elegance to the wines. Grapes are sorted twice, then destemmed and fermented in cement vats, although since 2005 two stainless steel tanks were added to the winery which has increased the options for parcel selections. Generally indigenous yeasts are used, although cultured yeasts are also considered as an option. Vinification is traditional with pumping over and malolactic fermentation taking place in tank, and the press wine is kept apart until January when the quality is assessed and up to 7% might be blended back in. The wine spends about two years in new oak with rackings every three months, fining with egg-whites and filtered only when absolutely necessary. Pétrus, unusually for Bordeaux is almost entirely Merlot as in practice Cabernet Franc is rarely included in the blend.

LE PIN

Le Pin is one of the most collectable wines in the world. Production is about 600 or 700 cases per year, and this combination of rarity and the superbly-concentrated, rich and powerful wines results in exceptional prices at auction. The name, Le Pin, comes from a solitary Pine tree that grows near the winemaking facility. 1979 was the first vintage.

The vineyard was purchased from Mme. Loubie in 1979 by Jacques Thienpont, his father and uncle. With time Jacques has become the sole owner. The property was extended with the purchase of a small plot of adjacent land in 1984. The southfacing vineyard is located on the Pomerol plateau. The soil which is very well drained is composed of gravel, some sand and clay on an iron-rich base. Yields are kept low at around 30 hectolitres per hectare. The grapes are hand-harvested and are fermented in stainless steel before being matured in new oak barriques for between 14 and 18 months and bottled without filtration. Famous. blockbuster vintages such as 1989, 2000, 2005, 2009 and 2010 are joyous wines.

DOMAINE DE LA ROMANÉE-CONTI

Domaine de la Romanée-Conti is widely considered to be among the world's greatest wine producers, and has, for many decades, been Burgundy's most famous Domaine, known purely by the initials DRC. DRC bottles are among the worlds' rarest, most renowned and most highly sought-after. It takes its name from the Domaine's most famous vineyard, Romanée-Conti Grand Cru. The boundaries of this vineyard were established back in the 16th century, and over time, its name changed from Cros des Cloux, to La Romanée, to Romanée-Conti, after its purchase by King Louis XV's cousin, the Prince de Conti.

Domaine de La Romanée-Conti is the proud owner of the most famous Grands Crus on the Côte d'Or, a maker of richly complex, long-lasting ethereal wines produced from their almost 28 hectares of vineyards. DRC produces stunning wines that manage to combine finesse with power and grace with intensity. The greatly missed, Michael Broadbent MW used to describe their wines as *"a fist of iron in a velvet glove"* and having a *"peacock's tail"* of a finish, meaning that the flavours and aromas open up with time in the mouth to reveal complex nuances which are extremely long lasting with a fragrant aftertaste.

For many people Domaine de la Romanée-Conti is "The Domaine" in Burgundy and the pinnacle for Burgundy-lovers. The Domaine owns two famous monopoles; the 1.81 hectares of Romanée Conti and 6.06 hectares of La Tâche. Additionally DRC owns nearly half of Richebourg, over half of Romanée-Saint-Vivant over a third of Grands Echézeaux and significant holdings in Echézeaux, 0.68 hectares of Le Montrachet, and since 2009 has produced a Corton Grand Cru. Occasionally the Domaine produces a Vosne-Romanée Premier Cru Cuvée Duvault-Blochet from younger vines in their Grand Cru vineyards. DRC also own a minuscule section of Bâtard-Montrachet, which is not commercialised so only if you are ever lucky enough to visit DRC will you get a taste of this extraordinarily rare white Burgundy.

The Domaine has been at the forefront of viticultural developments and has adopted biodynamic approaches, helping the vines in building up natural resistance to pests and diseases. The winemaking at the Domaine is directed by Alexandre Bernier and his team, following the retirement of Bernard Noblet in 2018, who was their winemaker and cellarmaster at Domaine de la Romanée-Conti since the 1986 vintage.

There is no disputing the quality of the wines, particularly their highly sought-after longest-lived, greatly-prized Romanée-Conti Grand Cru. This is very scarce, as on average only 450 cases are produced each vintage, and some vintages only around 3000 bottles. Vagaries like the spring frosts that vineyards in France have suffered in 2021 can significantly reduce the yields.

Next in the pecking order comes the La Tâche, which in some vintages can match the longevity of Romanée-Conti, but tends to be more approachable, a lighter and more delicately perfumed and fragrant style. La Tâche is only separated from Romanée-Conti by a narrow track and it is amazing that these wines often have a completely different character from the same vintage. Richebourg is powerful, rich and complex with an earthier and spicier character. Romanée-Saint-Vivant is delicate, elegant and floral and can be rated qualitatively alongside Grands-Echézeaux in terms of power and persistence. Grands-Echézeaux is considered a finer, fleshier and slightly more intense wine than the suppler tannic structure of Echézeaux.

DOMAINE ARMAND ROUSSEAU

This domaine was started at the beginning of the 20th century by Armand Rousseau who came from a family of vignerons and wine-merchants. Through marriage, he acquired several plots of vineyards in Gevrey Chambertin in the Côte de Nuits. Gradually he increased the size of the Domaine with acquisitions of vineyards in Charmes Chambertin in 1919, Clos de la Roche and Chambertin in 1920 and 1921, Mazy-Chambertin in 1937, Mazoveres-Chambertinin 1940 and the esteemed 1er Cru Clos Saint Jacques in 1954. In 1959 Armand was succeeded by his son Charles and since 1982 Charles's son Eric (born 1957) assumed control helped by his daughter Cyrielle. Eric has implemented a more precise approach to viticulture, with the use of green harvesting where necessary. The vines are between 40 and 45 years of age, with a planting density of 11,000 vines per hectare.


Vinification is traditionally Burgundian. After destemming, the grapes are cooled to 15°C before 18 to 20 days of maceration, without heating or temperature control. Both punching down and pumping over are used. The wines are aged in barrel with the same percentage of new oak followed each year, except the Clos-St-Jacques which may vary. For Chambertin and Clos de Bèze 100 per cent new wood is used and 100 per cent one-year-old wood for other grands crus, although a little new oak is now used for Clos des Ruchottes.

'BOTTLED POETRY': WINES FROM DOMAINE COMTE GEORGES DE VOGUE

Burgundy's historic Domaine Comte de Vogüé dates back to 1450. Of this estate 7.25 hectares are dedicated to the fabled Le Musigny, 2.75 to the production of Bonnes-Mares, and 1.8 to the Premier Cru Chambolle-Musigny. At the head of the estate is François Millet — a poetic bon viveur for whom taming vines is an art akin to an author penning a poem, or a musical maestro raising his baton. Millet distills the essence of his wines through a tumult of lyrical French. Here, with a touch of that poetry, an introduction to five of the estates most exceptional wines:

The apex of Millet's portfolio at Domaine Comte Georges de Vogüé is the 7 hectares of Musigny Grand Cru. Great care is taken with the production of the noble grape, with only the oldest vines - a total of 3.8 hectares - used to produce wine with the most consistency and depth of character. In most vintages only 900 or so cases of the Musigny comes to market; the result is a wine to be sought out and treasured. For Millet, the character of the resulting wine is that of a noble old gentleman; a cravat-wearing cognac-sipper, smoking a cigar as he holds forth on world affairs. Musigny is as sophisticated and serious as the metaphor suggests; strong vintages suggesting a robe of rich cherry and raspberry fruit billowing over warm chocolate and a Crème Brûlée texture. Stellar vintages such as 1990 and 2000 have an element of oriental spice, with a spray of sumac, paprika and blackpepper. When, in 1991, a swathe of hail hit the Côte d'Or - with potentially disastrous effects for the grapes - Millet, an inventive and quick-thinking winemaker, instructed 60 locals to bring their tweezers to the sorting tables, and help remove every single damaged grape. As a result, the character of the 1991 Musigny today is fresher and riper than many Grand Cru Burgundies from that 'annus horribilis'.

The Chambolle Musigny 1er Cru is, to Millet 'Musigny in shorttrousers'; a child prodigy playing a Steinway piano in Carnegie Hall, only occasionally missing the melodic arpeggios of a Mozart concerto. The wine began its life with the 1995 vintage and, today, the domaine produces around 500 cases of a grand cru wine masquerading as a lowly premier cru. Vintages such as 2000 have a creamy edge and a fine lace of red fruit, before a late grab of tannin.

The domaine's other star is their 2.7 hectare plot of Bonnes Mares, which accounts for 400 cases a year. The vines are on the Chambolle side of the Morey boundary — a parcel which tends towards elegant, refined Bonnes Mares. Fine old vintages deliver violet, strawberry notes with a delicate peony blossom underpinned by a ground coffee bean flavour and toasty oak. Darker and more brooding than the Musigny, for Millet it is an electric wine; like a thunderstorm about to break.

The 'first lady' of the de Vogüé portfolio is the premier cru Les Amoureuses — or, the lovers. Ploughed by horses because of the stony topsoil, the parcel is a tiny 0.56 hectare holding and so a mere 160 cases vintage leave the domaine. Millet sees the wines as Musigny's little sister, refined but never frivolous and a tasting of his stellar 1999 vintage reveals a bouquet of redcurrant and loganberry against a back-drop of sous-bois and mushroom. In time complexity develops, yet it never reaches the leatherarmchair study wreathed in cigar-smoke where Les Amoureuses older brother Musigny sits.

Millet works alongside Jean-Luc Pepin, who runs the Domaine and Eric Bourgogne, who tends the vines. It is a triumvirate that produces outstanding results vintage upon vintage and has enabled the domaine to recover its reputation in recent years. In 1925 the estate was inherited by the Comte Georges de Vogüé and, until the early 60's, fabulous wines were crafted from the

plots under his ownership in Chambolle. The Comte's absence from Burgundy in the 60's and 70's saw quality levels slide and it is the current team that have maintained a celebrated level of quality under the ownership of the Comte's granddaughters since the early 80's. Winemaking at the Domaine Comte Georges de Vogüé is like a conversation, with the wines matching Millet's lyrical poeticism with structure, energy and a complex cornucopia of flavours.

DOMAINE COMTES GEORGES DE VOGUE

The historic Domaine Comte Georges De Vogüé can trace its history back to 1450 when Jean Moisson erected the original building in Chambolle Musigny. In 1766 Moisson's descendant, Catherine Louise Bouhier de Versalieu, married Cerice François Melchior de Vogüé. The family managed to retain the Domaine, despite being exiled to England during the French Revolution. Comte Georges de Vogüé took over the estate in 1925. Today the Domaine is owned by sisters Comtesse Claire de Causans and Marie de Ladoucette and run by a team comprising Eric Bourgogne (vineyard manager) and Jean-Luc Pépin (sales and marketing director). It is considered by many as the greatest estate in Chambolle Musigny.

The Domaine is considered amongst the very best in Burgundy, producing rich, elegant, perfumed and deliciously complex wines that can age for half a century or more. Francois Millet aims to achieve full expression of the exceptional terroirs in his wines. Anyone attempting to draw up a list of the top ten wines in the world would surely have to consider a Comte de Vogüé Musigny from a great vintage, such as those offered in this remarkable collection.

DOMAINE FOURRIER

Domaine Fourrier is a domaine in the Gevrey-Chambertin region of Burgundy. In 1994, having previously completed six month internships with Henri Jayer and Domaine Drouhin in Oregon, Jean-Marie Fourrier took over the domaine from his father Jean-Claude who had been working since the age of fourteen, on the death of his own father in 1961. Having taken over the Domaine, Jean-Marie increased the range of wines produced by bottling each of Gevrey-Chambertin 1er cru separately rather than blending them. The vines in his vineyards are old, with most being planted between the wars. Once harvested, grapes are de-stemmed and are then given a 3 to 4 day maceration before fermentation starts. Skins are punched down frequently without any pumping over and after fermentation is complete, the vats are cooled down. All the wines are matured in 20% new oak and the wines are not racked at all until transferred to tank about two months before bottling in the spring, eighteen months after harvest. The results of all this meticulous work are exceptional wines, each of which shows a clear sense of place. The wines are bright in colour with very pure red fruit flavours on the nose.

LOUIS JADOT

Maison Louis Jadot was founded by Louis Henry Denis Jadot in 1859, and is considered one of the major players in Burgundy with extensive vineyard holdings; including70 hectares in the Côte de Beaune and in the Côte de Nuits; due to expansions in vineyard holdings and the acquisition of part of the Clair-Dau Domaine in 1986.

Maison Louis Jadot produces an extensive range of wines with Grand Cru wines such as Bonnes-Mares and Chambertin Clos de Béze. The company was taken over in the mid 1980s by the Kopf family, who own their US importer, Kobrand. The Gagey family have been running Jadot with the financial backing of the Kopf family for the last few decades, with Pierre-Henri Gagey currently at the helm. The highly talented and passionate Jacques Lardière has been involved as their winemaker since 1970, and continues to oversee the creation of many different Cuvées.

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DOMAINE DUJAC

Dujac is undoubtedly one of the most highly respected Domaine's in Burgundy and has been producing their characteristic perfumed, silky, and elegant wines since the late 1960's when the Seysses family purchased Domaine Graillet in Morey-St-Denis and renamed it Domaine Dujac. Since those early days the Domaine has increased in size from 5 hectares to its present size of approximately 15 hectares. Domaine Dujac own holdings in some of the finest Grand Cru vineyards of the Côte de Nuits; Clos de la Roche, Clos St-Denis, Bonnes-Mares, Echézeaux, Romanée-Saint-Vivant, Chambertin and Charmes-Chambertin, as well as Premier Cru and Village level vineyards. Their philosophy is the same for all vineyards with minimal interventions and combining practices from organics, biodynamics and integrated pest management in achieving their overriding goal of ripe and healthy grapes. The Domaine manages to combine both traditional and modern vinification techniques and produces wines that are highly sought after and glorious examples of the magic of red Burgundy.

CLOS DE TART

Clos de Tart is located in the village of Morey St-Denis in Burgundy's world-famous Côte de Nuits. Founded in 1141 by Cistercian nuns, the *Bernardines* of Notre Dame de Tart, the Domaine is surrounded by its 1.2 kilometres of "Clos" stone walls. The 7.53 hectare monopole vineyard of Clos de Tart is the largest of the five Grand Cru monopoles in Burgundy. The Domaine has only changed hands three times in its illustrious history since its founding in 1141 by the Cistercian nuns; to the Marey-Monge family, owners from 1791 to 1932; to the Momessin family from 1932 to 2018; and most recently to the Pinault family via their holding company, Artémis Domaines, since April 2018.

Since March 2019 the Estate Director at Clos de Tart is Alessandro Noli, who replaced Jacques Devauges, and prior to that Sylvain Pitiot was régisseur from 1995 to 2014. Unusually in Burgundy, the vines are planted on a north/south exposure, which has the benefit of reducing soil erosion and allows the rows to be exposed to morning and afternoon sunshine to enable optimal ripening. The average age of the vines is around sixty years old. Biodynamic principles have been employed since 2016. In 2019 a new vat room was inaugurated with an increase in the number of vinification vats allowing even more precision with the winemaking. On average 55% of whole bunches are used with only wild yeasts and the wines undergo malolactic naturally and age for an average of 18 months in barrel.

Clive Coates MW wrote in *The Wines of Burgundy* that "Clos de Tart has emerged in the last decade as one of the truly great wines of Burgundy...full and the most masculine of the Morey-Saint-Denis Grands Crus". Clos de Tart Grand Cru is renowned for its impressive concentration and complexity, supreme balance and longevity.

DOMAINE GEORGES ROUMIER

In 1924 Georges Roumier took over the Domaine which had previously belonged to his wife's family in Chambolle Musigny. Production had until 1945 always been sold to local négociants until Roumier began domaine bottling. His son Jean-Marie succeeded in 1957 and his grandson Christophe took over in 1992.

The Domaine consists of approximately 13 hectares of vineyards spread over nine separate appellations. Their holdings include 0.1 hectares of Le Musigny Grand Cru, 0.2 hectares of Corton Charlemagne, 1.60 hectares of Bonnes-Mares and and 3.07 hectares of Chambolle-Musigny.

The grapes are sorted in the vineyard with a *table de tri* and depending on the vineyard and vintage, they are mostly destemmed then placed in wooden fermenters. Use of oak is restrictive, with new oak being limited to 15-25 percent for villages wines and no more than 50% for the Bonnes Mares. These wines are now regarded as some of the most precise and a greater sense of precision has been achieved in recent years.

JACQUES-FREDERIC MUGNIER

Domaine Jacques-Frédéric Mugnier is a family-owned Domaine founded in 1863 by Frédéric Mugnier with the purchase of the Château de Chambolle-Musigny from the Marey-Monge family and vines in Chambolle-Musigny and Nuits-Saint-Georges.

Today the Domaine, based in Chambolle-Musigny is run by Jocelyne and Frédéric Mugnier. The Domaine owns 13.5 hectares of vineyards, including 1.14 hectares of Le Musigny and 0.35 hectares of Bonnes-Mares and the 10 hectares of Clos de la Maréchale in Nuits Saint Georges and 4 hectares in Chambolle-Musigny. In 2004 Frédéric Mugnier took back the monopole Clos de la Maréchale in Nuits-St.-Georges which had been leased to Domaine Faiveley for the 50 previous years.

Frédéric Mugnier's approach to both viticulture and wine-making is aimed at preserving in the wines the purest expression of nature with minimal interference from technological practices. Domaine Jacques-Frédéric Mugnier is best known for their superlative Musigny, but they are also renowned for their Bonnes Mares, Chambolle-Musigny Premier Cru Les Amoureuses and Clos de la Maréchale.

Their 1.14 hectare parcel in the fabled Musigny vineyard is located in the prime area known as "Grand Musigny". Their vines were planted between 1947 and 1962, and these old vines produce low volumes of exceptional quality, with annual production varying between 2000 and 5000 bottles. Their Musigny is an incredible wine with richness and depth of flavour and an exceptional length. The longevity is undoubted and rewards those lucky enough to taste a Mugnier Musigny that has had time in bottle to evolve and reveal the multi-layered nuances and complexities of a mature Pinot Noir.

JOSEPH DROUHIN

In 1880 Joseph Drouhin established his own négociant firm and acquired the old cellars of the Dukes of Burgundy at Collégiale Notre-Dame. His son Maurice began buying vineyards, staring with Beaune Clos des Mouches and he also had distribution rights for a portion of the Domaine de la Romanée Conti. Robert Drouhin, the adopted heir, took the reins in 1957 and now looks over the Domaine which is run by his children. Laurence Jobard consulted on the wine-making from 1973 until 2005 and many great vintages were produced under his careful watch.

Great names in both the Côtes are produced by Drouhin; Chambertin and Clos de Bèze, Bonnes Mares and Musigny, Corton-Charlemagne and Bâtard-Montrachet. The family produce Montrachet on behalf of the Domaine Marquis de Laguiche, who own a 2.06 hectares of the Grand Cru.





MARQUIS D'ANGERVILLE

The Domaine Marguis d'Angerville can trace its beginnings back to 1805. Jacques Marguis d'Angerville completed 53 vintages starting with the harvest in 1950. Following the death of Jacques in 2003, today the Domaine is run by Guillaume Marguis d'Angerville and his brother-in-law Renaud de Villette. The Domaine owns 14 hectares of vineyards, the majority of which are located in Volnay. They own the whole of Volnay 1er Cru Clos des Ducs, and also part of Volnay 1er Cru Champans, Les Frémiets, Taillepieds and Les Caillerets, and have holdings in Meursault 1er Cru Les Santenots and Les Combes in Pommard. Today the vineyard is run biodynamically. Grapes are completely de-stemmed and then cooled for a pre-fermentation maceration. They do not use punching down the cap (pigéage), but prefer pumping over (rémontage). They use a maximum of 25% new oak and age the wines for approximately 15 to 18 months. The wines are usually not filtered nor fined. The Domaine is famous for their outstanding Volnays, particularly their monopole Clos des Ducs which is a wine of real depth and intensity yet retaining elegance and purity.

HERMITAGE LA CHAPELLE

The Chapel of Saint Christopher (La Chapelle as it has become known) is the holy grail of Rhône vineyards. In 1224 Gaspard de Sterimberg, a knight returning from the Crusades, sought peace and quiet on the hill of Hermitage by building a small stone Chapel. Vines were planted around the hillside in the following years and the reputation of the wines produced here grew to such a degree that Louis XIII declared Hermitage as the chief wine served at the Royal Court.

In 1889 Paul Jaboulet bought 2.83 hectares of the Hermitage hill. However it was not until 1919 that he added La Chapelle to his vineyard portfolio. The hill is split into three sections, Les Bressards, L'Hermite and Le Méal. La Chapelle, at the peak of the hill is mainly limestone soil on the Le Méal side and granitic soils on the Les Bressards side, the combination yields powerful wines that show grace and refinement as they age with a purity and vibrancy of fruit that far surpasses other plantings of Syrah.

Stellar vintages such as 1990 have long been lauded. Michael Broadbent MW awarded five stars to the 1990 and described it as 'magnificent' and 'impressive'.

ROAGNA

Roagna was established in the 1950s when the Roagna family purchased the Paje vineyard in Barbaresco. Since then, the estate has expanded and now covers 15 hectares of prime vineyard sites in both Barbaresco and Barolo.

The estate's greatest wines are from its Barbaresco core: Paje, Crichet Paje and Paje Riserva. The wines are firmly in the traditional camp in terms of production with no new oak used and a lengthy maceration period of between 30 and 90 days. The wines are neither fined nor filtered and are bottled with minimal sulphur dioxide use.

LUCIANO SANDRONE

Luciano Sandrone is one of the leading producers in Barolo in the Piedmont region of North West Italy, famous for wines made from the Nebbiolo grape. Sandrone's first harvest was in 1978, and recent developments have seen the opening of new cellaring premises built in 1998 at Via Pugnane at the base of Cannubi hill, in the heart of the Barolo district.

The focus of Luciano Sandrone can be summarized by low yields in the vineyard and a relatively short maceration period, which produces rich, attractive, elegant and complex wines in a modern style that are approachable when young but also have the structure and potential for ageing and development as traditional Barolos. Sandrone does not believe in heavily oaked wines and therefore uses only 10% new oak in the maturation process. The low production volumes mean that Sandrone wines are highly sought after due to their relative rarity. Sandrone is huge fan of Burgundy and his wines display the elegance and finesse that are characteristic of top Burgundy wines. Sandrone's best-known wines are his single vineyard Barolos, Cannubi Boschis and Le Vigne. They are amongst the most complex and interesting Barolos being produced today which has resulted in their fabled status.

ANGELO GAJA

Angelo Gaja has been one of the main driving forces for putting Barbaresco wines firmly into the category of international cult status wines and has proved that wines from his native Piemonte, in Italy could sell for higher prices than many top-class Clarets or Burgundy. Gaja is famous for his single vineyard Nebbiolo wines, winning numerous awards for his Sori Tildin, Sori San Lorenzo, Costa Russi, and Barbaresco.

The family firm can trace its roots back to 1856 when they opened a small restaurant in the town of Barbaresco, serving its wines to complement the Italian food. Angelo Gaja joined the family business in 1961, and he has subsequently made many changes and improvements, none more important than only using grapes grown in his own vineyards and restricting yields, and vinifying and bottling separately his single-vineyard Barbaresco wines; Sorì San Lorenzo in 1967, Sorì Tildìn in 1970 and Costa Russi in 1978. Gaja's wines are noted for their opulence, elegance, complexity and longevity and are designed to evolve and last for decades. Any serious wine collector should ensure that their collection includes Gaja's signature wines.

SASSICAIA

The first vintage of Sassicaia was produced at the Tenuta San Guido estate in 1968, and Sassicaia has subsequently become an international cult wine, one of the original 'Super Tuscans'. Sassicaia is almost single-handedly responsible for launching the Super Tuscan movement and is one of the most keenly sought after wines in the world. The Marquis Mario Incisa della Rocchetta was a fan of French wines and therefore decided to experiment with the traditional Bordeaux varieties of grapes and planted a small vineyard of Cabernet Sauvignon in the Bolgheri hills in 1944. He discovered that Cabernet Sauvignon performed extremely well in their Tuscan estate, Tenuta San Guido. The Marquis had noted the estates' similarity to Graves in Bordeaux. In the same was as the "Graves" region in Bordeaux was named after the gravel soil, the earth at Tenuta San Guido gave Sassicaia its name, which in Tuscan dialect means "stony ground."

In 1965, the Marquis planted two more vineyards of Cabernet Sauvignon and Cabernet Franc. Mario Incisa della Rochetta, assisted by Giacomo Tachis (Piero Antinori's winemaker) were the pioneers of modern Italian wine making and are widely credited with creating the Super Tuscan movement. The Marguis' son Marchese Nicolo Incisa della Rocchetta continues the tradition started by his father. Today the vineyards cover 65 hectares and, produce about 5000 kg of grapes per hectare. The grape varieties are divided into 85% Cabernet Sauvignon and the remaining 15%Cabernet Franc.

Vinification takes place in stainless steel vats of 35-110 hl with optional thermal conditioning of the fermentation process. Maceration lasts around 14 days. The Sassicaia is aged in 33% new 225 lt. French oak barrels for 24 months

VEGA SICILIA

Único is the flagship wine of Vega Sicilia, so named because it trailblazed a unique style in the Ribera del Duero. Founder, Don Eloy Lecanda y Chaves, returned to the Spanish region in 1864 from Bordeaux. He brought with him cuttings of Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot. He sunk these cuttings deep into the limestone, chalk soils of the Ribera valley. Local winemakers were shocked, as they focused on the Spanish grape, Tempranillo. The estate has maintained plantings of the Bordeaux grapes and Único is a blend of Tempranillo and Cabernet Sauvignon. The Cabernet adding weight, drive and grip to the red fruit warmth, chalky texture and delicate acid backbone of Tempranillo. Único rests in French and American oak barrels for 10-15 years. Único can unfurl and expand in bottle over many decades, thrilling wine lovers upon its eventual awakening from the bottle. The magnum releases of Único are the most collectible wines from Spain. Every vintage has a different 'artist label' and only Spanish artists are invited to illustrate a characteristic of the wine through the special labels. For collectors, putting together a magnum vertical has become as fascinating seeking out Château Mouton-Rothschild artist labelled bottles.



BODEGAS Y VIÑEDOS ARTADI

Bodegas Artadi is today, undoubtedly, a reference point as one of the best Bodegas in Spain. The seeds of this renowned winery started in 1981, when its current owner, Juan Carlos López de Lacalle, founded a cooperative. In 1992, the cooperative was dissolved and Bodegas y Viñedos Artadi de Laguardia, S.A. was established. In 1990 they decided, being aware of the importance of the age of the vineyards, to select and produce a wine from the old Tempranillo vineyards that they owned in the region: the wine Pagos Viejos. In 1945, a family member, Jenaro San Pedro, made his personal and family dream come true by planting Viña El Pisón. The estate chosen was a piece of land close to the village, with a medieval mill in the centre, located in a natural amphitheatre. In 1963 he passed away, at the age of eighty years old, but his dream did not end with him; his family continued it. In 1991, Juan Carlos López de Lacalle produced the first vintage of his family's single vineyard : Viña El Pisón. In 1994, Grandes Añadas was released, paying attention to the relevance and singularity of the best vintages.

CHRISTIE'S INTEREST IN PROPERTY CONSIGNED FOR AUCTION

△ Property Owned in part or in full by Christie's

From time to time, Christie's may offer a **lot** which it owns in whole or in part. Such property is identified in the catalogue with the symbol A next to its **lot** number. Where Christie's has an ownership or financial interest in every **lot** in the catalogue, Christie's will not designate each **lot** with a symbol, but will state its interest in the front of the catalogue.

o Minimum Price Guarantees

On occasion, Christie's has a direct financial interest in the outcome of the sale of certain lots consigned for sale. This will usually be where it has guaranteed to the Seller that whatever the outcome of the auction, the Seller will receive a minimum sale price for the work. This is known as a minimum price guarantee. Where Christie's holds such financial interest we identify such **lots** with the symbol^o next to the **lot** number.

• Third Party Guarantees/Irrevocable bids

Where Christie's has provided a Minimum Price Guarantee it is at risk of making a loss, which can be significant, if the **lot** fails to sell. Christie's therefore sometimes chooses to share that risk with a third party who agrees prior to the auction to place an irrevocable written bid on the **lot**. If there are no other higher bids, the third party commits to buy the **lot** at the level of their irrevocable written bid. In doing so, the third party takes on all or part of the risk of the **lot** not being sold. **Lots** which are subject to a third party guarantee arrangement are identified in the catalogue with the symbol **%**.

In most cases, Christie's compensates the third party in exchange for accepting this risk. Where the third party is the successful bidder, the third party's remuneration is based on a fixed financing fee. If the third party is not the successful bidder, the remuneration may either be based on a fixed fee or an amount calculated against the final **hammer price**. The third party may also bid for the **lot** above the irrevocable written bid. 

ULLAGE

The amount by which level of wine is short of being full: these levels may vary according to age of the wines and, as far as can be ascertained by inspection prior to the sale, are described in the catalogue.

LEVEL/ULLAGE DESCRIPTIONS AND INTERPRETATIONS

(see notes below)



- 1 into neck: Level of young wines. Exceptionally good in wines over 10 years old.
- 2 base of neck: Perfectly good for any age of wine. Outstandingly good for a wine of 20 years in bottle, or longer.
- 3 top-shoulder: Normal for any claret 15 years old or older.
- 4 upper-shoulder: Slight natural reduction through the easing of the cork and evaporation through cork and capsule. Usually no problem. Acceptable for any wine over 20 years old. Exceptional for pre-1950 wines.
- 5 mid-shoulder: Probably some weakening of the cork and some risk. Not abnormal for wines 30/40 years of age. Estimates usually take this into account.
- 6 mid-low-shoulder: Some risk. Low estimates.
- 7 low-shoulder: Risky and usually only accepted for sale if wine or label exceptionally rare or interesting. Always offered with low estimate.

Because of the slope of shoulder it is impractical to describe levels as mid-shoulder, etc. Wherever appropriate the level between cork and wine will be measured and catalogued in centimetres.

The condition and drinkability of burgundy is less affected by ullage than its equivalent from Bordeaux. For example, a 5 to 7 cm. ullage in a 30-year-old burgundy can be considered normal, indeed good for age, 3.5 to 4 cm. excellent for age, even 7cm. rarely a risk.


We therefore repeat that there is always a risk of cork failure with old wines and due allowance must be made for this.
