

The cathedral gongs produce a much richer sound. The quality of the sound is further enhanced by the generous proportions of the 44 mm case, and its thickness, calculated to a hundredth of a millimetre.

Christophe Claret is widely recognised as a master of minute repeaters and it was natural for Harry Winston to collaborate with him on this complication.

Another striking characteristic of the Opus 4 is the design of the case. It pays tribute to the *Premier* collection of Harry Winston and, more importantly, it has a fully rotating case. 

The Reference 5070 represented Patek Philippe's return to production of chronograph watches in 1998 after a break of almost 30 years. The last chronograph model produced before this was reference 1463, production of which ceased in the late 1960s.

The 5070 was originally launched in yellow gold only, but after three years examples were produced in white gold. This was followed by pink gold in 2003 and platinum in 2008. Production ceased in 2010 with the introduction of the reference 5170.

The inspiration for the 5070 was the vintage reference 2512, an unique split-second chronograph wristwatch produced by Patek Philippe between 1950 and 1952. This legendary model can be seen exhibited at the Patek Philippe Museum (inv. P-1160). The case and dial designs are very much alike.

The calibre 27 70 157 is largely recognised as one of the best chronograph movements and is based on a Nouvelle Lemania ébauche especially developed for Patek Philippe. The movement was only used in the 5070 and 5071 references (the white gold diamond-set version of the 5070).

The platinum 5070 having the shortest production period is the rarest with only 18 pieces having re-appeared on the market so far. The highly attractive "bleu nuage" (cloudy blue) dial, which was only fitted on the platinum versions, is a stunning representation which has countless nuances depending on the light. Combined with its robust case, the 5070P is already considered as an iconic piece and one of the most sought-after models of the entire modern production of Patek Philippe.

With the technical advancements that were made in the scuba diving in industry during the 60s and 70s came the need for better designed equipment. Watches in particular were important tools used by professional divers and were heavily relied upon. This new demand for precision timepieces that could tolerate the stresses of prolonged, deep-water, submersion sparked a period of significant innovation within watch manufacturer.

Omega, who had just recently provided watches to NASA for the astronauts that went to the moon, naturally embraced this new challenge with similar vigour. And so, working in collaboration with COMEX (the Compagnie Maritime d'Expertise), the Omega Seamaster Professional 600 was born.

The Plongeur Professional nicknamed 'PloProf' was marketed as being able to withstand depths of up to 2000ft, comfortably enduring Omega's "Seabed-to-Everest" torture testing. Tests conducted later by Ocean Systems Inc., a diving research centre operating out of the United States, concluded the watch was 'more watertight' than a submarine.

Released officially in 1970 after 4 years of continuous research and development, the 'Ploprof' has many distinguishing features. Its large asymmetric case forged from a single piece of stainless steel, the red or orange pusher to the top of the case. bi-directional bezel and oversized broad arrow hands provided optimal functionality for divers while, at the same time, producing an aesthetic synonymous with the 1970s - an aesthetic that is as attractive now as it was then.

According to the consignor this watch was purchased by his grandfather from a diver who worked for Comex (Compagnie Maritime d'Expertise) and who worked in the oil industry offshore in Aberdeen in the 1970's. As its condition demonstrates, the watch was used by the diver as a tool of his trade and has been used while he was diving in the North Sea, During that period, companies started installing oil field platforms. The work carried out by these divers was an ideal environment for watch companies such as Rolex and Omega to test their watches in extreme conditions.

The family still remembers today how their grandfather approached the Comex diver seeking to purchase the watch from him, and eventually the diver agreed. Very proud of his purchase, he wore it constantly.

This prototype watch is a fascinating artefact from a significant period in the diving history. This example was, until today, unknown to the market.




Accompanied by additional parts for the co-axial escapement, balance wheel and spring and a letter from Dr George Daniels confirming that the present lot is 'part of the first experimental co-axial series for production'.

This watch was a gift from Dr. George Daniels to Dr. Andrew Lumsden. Friends since they met on a South London street in 1970, when Dr. Daniels was passing by on his BMW motorcycle and saw Dr. Lumsden working on his Vincent motorcar and offered him advice. They shared a love of all things mechanical and consulted each other for insight and guidance, this included Dr. Lumsden reviewing the manuscript of Dr. Daniels book Watchmaking who confirmed his understanding of it and therefore it would be a useful guide to notice watchmakers. Dr. Lumsden also wrote a compelling forward for Dr. Daniels' autobiography, All in Good time. It clearly expressed the admiration he had close friend, for his enduring determination enormous contributions he made to horology.

#### FOREWORD BY ROGER SMITH

The arrival of a Daniels masterpiece on the market is always momentous, partly due to their rarity, but also because George is regarded as the most influential watchmaker of the late 20th and early 21st Century. His watchmaking approach was certainly unique and he could see no barriers to achieving his goal of improving the function of the mechanical timekeeper, which had seen little change during the previous 250 years.


What is so fascinating about this small collection is that it represents a snapshot of a lifetime's work at the bench. This collection comprises George's first ever horological piece (lot 119) through to a fine example of the Millennium wristwatch (lot 122) which was built to celebrate Omega's acceptance of his co-axial escapement as the future for their mechanical wristwatch production.

To summarise this collection of Daniels' work is to summarise his life's work. We have the tentative steps of a brilliant novice finding his way without a master to guide him, whose success encourages him to reach ever higher (lot 119). We have the technical mastery of a maker who tests himself against a legendary marque in Breguet and achieves its highest accolade (lot 120). We have a pocket watch

of such audacity and brilliance it would be perhaps the greatest triumph for a true master at the height of his powers (lot 121). And finally, in the sunset years of his life's work, we have its culmination in a watch befitting a millennium (lot 122).

This beautifully curated collection is indeed a horological narrative of the greatest watchmaker of the last 250 years. But it is also much more; for to gaze into these watches, is to experience the very essence of George Daniels.

Roger W. Smith's horological career began when he enrolled at the Manchester School of Horology aged 16, passing out top of his class, and winning the British Horological Institute's Bronze medal. During his time on the course, Dr. George Daniels (1926 – 2011), was a visiting speaker and inspired Roger's career path to make a watch according to the Daniels Method. Eventually, after -working alongside his mentor in the creation of a Millennium Series, Roger established his own studio in the Isle of Man in 2001, with the creation first, of the Series I and then, in 2006, his seminal Series 2 watch. In 2013 Roger was invited by the Prime Minister's office to become an ambassador for the GREAT Britain campaign and in 2015 announced the first range of authentic British watches for decades.

As his first horological timepiece, this marine chronometer marks an important milestone in the career of George Daniels. Made shortly after completing his watch repair course at Northampton Polytechnic in 1952, this was a seminal period in Daniels' life when his ambitions craved a challenge beyond his work as a watch repairer. At the time, he had considered the production of a marine chronometer as the "ultimate manufacturing exercise" [Daniels, All in Good Time, p.52].

It was following a lunch given by the British Horological Institute that George Daniels had the opportunity to meet Frank Mercer, head of the chronometer firm, Thomas Mercer of St Albans. Frank Mercer had a reputation for being irascible and strongly opinionated and Daniels knew that he risked being quickly sent on his way. To Mercer's amazement, Daniels insisted that he wanted to make a marine chronometer whereupon Mercer proceeded to question the young Daniels on the subject of chronometers. Impressed by his answers, Mercer invited Daniels to visit his St Albans' factory. It was here that Mercer agreed to sell Daniels the two-day marine ébauche with plates, bridges, wheels and gears - but, crucially, without the escapement, case, dial or hands - that form the

present timepiece. Such a project would have been a daunting task for any novice since the work required the production of the detent – a skilled operation even for a highly experienced horologist. The detent is not only delicate and fragile but the extreme accuracy of its construction is critical to ensure the success of the chronometer's timekeeping; a process made all the more fraught by the hardening and tempering process which can easily damage, distort or break it. Daniels carried out the work on a table in his rooms, his fireplace a makeshift forge. In order to make the traditional mahogany casing, Daniels salvaged wood from a Victorian sideboard. Daniels took the chronometer to show Mercer upon its completion, later recollecting Mercer's astonishment at his achievement, Daniels said: "He never thought I would do it but I knew I would." [Clerizo, George Daniels, p. 51]

Interestingly the dial is uniquely signed G. W. Daniels because George, at that time, liked to add the middle name William, even though it was not one of his given names.

Accompanied by the winding key, copy of the original Breguet Certificate No. 3200 dated 20th December1968 and instructions.

George Daniels was appointed London agent to Breguet in 1967 and had visited their Paris workshops where he had seen an original three-wheel timepiece. "Before that trip to Paris I had never seen one of these clocks. As far as can be determined Breguet made four: But when I saw it I was very struck by it. You could see how it worked in an instant" [Clerizo, George Daniels, p. 110]. His admiration was such that he asked George Brown (the then proprietor of Breguet) for

permission to measure the original with a view to making a copy. Permission was granted and when George Brown visited George Daniels' London workshop he was so impressed with the copy that he suggested granting it a Breguet certificate so that it would be a genuine Breguet. This was agreed upon in exchange for the profit that Breguet would have achieved had they sold the timepiece, a practice that Breguet himself had engaged in. Daniels made just two examples of the three-wheel timepiece and each were entered into the Breguet records under numbers 3224 and 3225. Dr Daniels retained the present example, no. 3225, and it took pride of place on the mantelpiece in the drawing room of his Riversdale home until his death.

The original three wheel clocks, known as *pendule à trois* roues, were made by Breguet between 1795 and 1818, two are illustrated in Daniels' book, *The Art of Breguet*, 1975, plates 104 & 99 – the former is unnumbered and the latter, which Daniels dates to c. 1795 is numbered 111.



# THE SPACE TRAVELLER II

FOREWORD BY ROGER SMITH

This piece holds special memories for me for this was more often than not George's dress watch of choice at events and was the watch that he wore during his visit to the then Manchester School of Horology where I studied. It was the sight of this watch which steered me from the repair of watches to their making. The watch was made in circa 1982 and very quickly achieved its iconic status for its stunning aesthetic appeal and fascinating movement.

In 2012 I was fortunate enough to have been given the opportunity to refresh the piece which resulted in a complete strip down of the mechanism. It was whilst working on the piece that my view of George changed dramatically, for the mechanism was like no other that I have seen before, or since.

The level of creativity throughout is out of this world, and you can see how George circumvented a potential design issue with simplistic brilliance. One of the stand-out features for me are the two escape

wheels, which drive the common balance. This is George's unique double-wheeled escapement but with this piece the Sidereal train has an escape wheel of fourteen teeth, whereas the Solar train has just thirteen. The geometric difficulties that this feature creates are mind boggling and I am sure the very idea would have stopped most makers in their tracks. For George however, it was simply another challenge that had to be overcome.

Another interesting feature is the chronograph mechanism which allows the user to switch between recording solar or sidereal seconds. In order to achieve this the maker developed a clutch system which was the genesis for his unique compact chronograph mechanism which would feature in two further watches.

This watch was the culmination of thirteen years of making highly original one-off pieces and went on to be the catalyst for many future developments.



In 1974 George Daniels invented the independent double-wheel escapement; the movement was to captivate collectors with its visual appeal of symmetrical trains.

George Daniels was on a trip to Zurich where he met an important collector for dinner. The collector nudged him and said 'what do you have in your pocket', so he took out his watch, a gold Daniels pocket watch with independent double-wheel escapement. The collector said he had to have the watch and asked him to sell it to him. Daniels said it was not for sale but the collector persisted. Thinking this was an enormous compliment as the collector had not even asked the price, Daniels sold him the watch. Immediately regretting his decision, Daniels decided to make another watch which would be an improvement on the first both in terms of complication and accuracy. Having not fully exploited the first watch, the second watch would have separate calculations for each train, it was therefore possible to indicate both mean-solar and sidereal time.


In the  $18^{\text{th}}$  century, to check the accuracy of your watch, you had to have a precision clock which was set by a star. This watch, by means of having solar and sidereal time, could make the calculation for you, the difference being 3.555 minutes per day.

To try and improve the calculation of the train which allowed for an error of 0.8 seconds per year, George Daniels contacted a friend at Cambridge University to ask if they knew of a mathematician interested in watches. He received a response almost immediately and extraordinarily enough the mathematicians name was Professor Daniels. The professor was able to calculate a better ratio of 0.28 seconds per day, which George Daniels was very happy with.

George Daniels used to say to people, 'when you are on your package tour to Mars you need a watch like this, and when using the telephone for long distance calls you could switch the chronograph into sidereal time to cut your bills by 3.555 minutes per day'.

Originally the watch had been referred to as the Daniels squared (²) because of the assistance he received from Professor Henry Daniels, but George Daniels did not think this was good enough, so re-named it the 'Space Travellers' watch in honour of the American landing on the moon which was the greatest space exploratory journey of the century.


George Daniels made two Space Travellers' watches. The first. originally sold by Bobinet in 1982, was subsequently sold at Sotheby's Geneva to a private collector, on 17th November 1988. The present watch, the Second Space Traveller, is the most complex of the two watches, having the addition of the chronograph function. Viewing the two movements side by side, one is immediately struck by the added complexity of the chronograph work visible to the backplate of the Space Traveller II. The central bridge work on the Traveller II is noticeably slimmer than Traveller I, this is in order to incorporate II's chronograph work. It is also interesting to note that the case back of the Space Traveller II is fully glazed – as Roger Smith has observed. this was Daniels' dress watch of choice, especially at events. Of course everyone was always keen to see what watch George Daniels was wearing - the design of this watch meant that, not only could the viewer marvel at the beauty of its dial, but they could be equally mesmerised by the complexity and wonder of the movement, clearly visible through the exhibition case back.



The Millennium series with slim Co-Axial escapement was so named and made to commemorate the start of the new millennium.

The objective of the Co-Axial escapement - invented by George Daniels in the mid 1970s - was to improve the long-term performance of the mechanical watch. The escapement is virtually without sliding friction which means that, unlike the conventional lever escapement, the rate is unaffected by the viscosity of the lubricant.

Initially Dr. Daniels had planned to only make a dozen Millennium watches in order to satisfy friends. However it transpired that the popularity and eager anticipation of such a watch meant that finally, a limited edition was made; comprising: 47 pieces in yellow gold and 7 pieces in white gold.

Buyer's Premium A buyer's premium will be added to the hammer price and is payable by the buyer as part of the total purchase price. The buyer's premium is 25% of the hammer price up to and including £175,000; 20% on any amount in excess of £175,000 up to and including £2,000,000; and 12.5% on any remaining amount in excess of £2,000,000. These rates are exclusive of any applicable VAT.

The rate of exchange is the rate at the time of production of this catalogue. Therefore, you should treat the estimates in US dollars or euros as a guide only

Condition of Lots Prospective buyers are encouraged to inspect the property at the pre-sale exhibitions. Solely as a convenience, Sotheby's may also provide condition reports. # VAT AND OTHER TAX INFORMATION FOR BUYERS

The following paragraphs are intended to give general guidance to buvers on the VAT and certain other potential tax implications of purchasing property at Sotheby's. The information concerns the most usual circumstances and is not intended to be complete. In all cases the relevant tax legislation takes precedence and the VAT rates in effect on the day of the auction will be the rates charged except for lots sold. subject to Temporary Admission for which the applicable rate will be that in force at the time of collection. It should be noted that, for VAT purposes only, Sotheby's is not usually treated as an agent and most property is sold as if it is the property of Sotheby's.

In the following paragraphs, reference to VAT symbols shall mean those symbols located beside the lot number or the pre-sale estimates in the catalogue (or amending sale room notice).

# 1. PROPERTY WITH NO VAT SYMBOL

Where there is no VAT symbol, Sotheby's is able to use the Auctioneer's Margin Scheme and VAT will not normally be charged on the hammer price.

Sotheby's must bear VAT on the buyer's premium and hence will charge an amount

in lieu of VAT at the standard rate on this premium. This amount will form part of the buyer's premium on our invoice and will not be separately identified. A limited range of goods, including most books, are not liable to VAT and therefore no amount in lieu of VAT will be added to the premium.

Please see 'Exports from the European Union' for the conditions to be fulfilled before the amount in lieu of VAT on the buyer's premium may be cancelled or refunded.

(VAT-registered buyers from within the European Union (EU) should note that the amount in lieu of VAT contained within the buyer's premium cannot be cancelled or refunded by Sotheby's or HM Revenue and Customs.)

Buyers requiring an invoice under the normal VAT rules, instead of a margin scheme invoice, should notify the Post Sale Service Group or the Client Accounts Department on the day of the auction and an invoice with VAT on the hammer price will be raised. Items sold to buyers whose address is outside the EU will be assumed to be exported from the EU. The property will be invoiced under the normal VAT rules (see 'Property sold with a†symbol' above). Although the hammer price will be subject to VAT this will be cancelled or refunded upon export - see 'Exports from the European Union'. However, buyers who are not intending to export their property from the EU should notify our Client Accounts Department on the day of the sale and the property will be re-invoiced showing no VAT on the hammer price (see 'Property sold with no VAT symbol' above).

# 4. PROPERTY SOLD WITH A $\pm$ OR $\Omega$ SYMBOL

These items have been imported from outside the EU to be sold at auction under Temporary Admission. When Sotheby's releases such property to buyers in the UK, the buyer will become the importer and must pay Sotheby's import VAT at the following rates on the hammer price:

(VAT-registered buyers from the EU should note that the import VAT charged on property released in the UK cannot be cancelled or refunded by Sotheby's, however you may be able to seek repayment) by applying to HM Revenue and Customs - see 'VAT Refunds from HM Revenue and Customs')

(VAT-registered buyers from the UK should note that the invoice issued by Sotheby's for these items is not suitable evidence in respect of import VAT.)

On request, immediately after sale, the Temporary Admission Department can either ask HM Revenue and Customs to generate a C79 certificate (for UK buyers), or obtain a copy of the import C88 (for other EU VAT registered buyers), which may be used to claim recovery of the VAT. Otherwise Sotheby's may re-invoice the lot as if it had been sold with a † symbol and charge VAT at the standard rate on both the hammer price and premium and provide a tax invoice to the buyer. This may enable a buyer who is VAT registered elsewhere in the EU to avoid payment of VAT in the United Kingdom. Re-invoicing in this way may make the lot ineligible to be re-sold using the margin scheme.

# 5. EXPORTS FROM THE EUROPEAN UNION

The following amounts of VAT may be cancelled or refunded provided Sotheby's receive the appropriate export documents within the time limits stated:

# Property with no VAT symbol (see paragraph 1)

The amount in lieu of VAT charged on Buyer's Premium may be refunded provided the purchaser resides outside of the United Kingdom and the property is exported from the EU within 3 months of the sale. Sotheby's must be provided with the appropriate proof of export immediately after export of the goods.

# Property with a † symbol

The VAT charged upon the hammer price may be refunded provided the purchaser resides outside of the United Kingdom and the property is exported from the EU within 3 months of the sale. Sotheby's

must be provided with the appropriate proof of export immediately after export of the goods.

# Property with a $\ddagger$ or a $\Omega$ symbol

The Temporary Admission VAT charged on the hammer price may be refunded under the following circumstances:-

- Sotheby's is instructed to ship the property to a place outside the EU
- The property is hand carried from the UK directly outside the EU and Sotheby's pre lodge the export entry with HMRC
- The VAT liability is transferred to your shipper's own Temporary Admission or Customs Warehouse arrangement prior to collection from Sotheby's

Under all other circumstances Sotheby's is required to complete the importation and pay the VAT due to HM Revenue and Customs prior to the property leaving its premises and so a VAT refund will not be possible.

### Proof of export required

- for lots sold under the margin scheme (no VAT symbol) or the normal VAT rules († symbol), Sotheby's is provided with appropriate documentary proof of export from the EU. Buyers carrying their own property should obtain hand-carry papers from the Shipping department to facilitate this process.
- for lots sold under Temporary Admission ( $\ddagger$  or  $\Omega$  symbols), and subsequently transferred to Sotheby's Customs Warehouse (into Bond). The property must be shipped as described above in the paragraph headed Property with a  $\ddagger$  or a  $\Omega$  symbol.
- buyers carrying their own property must obtain hand-carry papers from the Shipping Department for which a small administrative charge will be made. The VAT refund will be processed once the appropriate paperwork has been returned to Sotheby's.
- Sotheby's is not able to cancel or refund any VAT charged on sales made to UK or EU private residents unless the lot is subject to Temporary Admission and the property is exported from the EU and the requisite export papers provided to Sotheby's within one month of collection of the property.
- Sotheby's is not able to cancel or refund any VAT charged on sales to UK or EU private residents unless the lot is subject to Temporary Admission and is shipped as described above.

Buyers intending to export, repair, restore or alter lots sold under Temporary Admission ( $\div$  or  $\Omega$  symbols) and therefore transferred to Customs Warehouse after sale should notify the Shipping Department before collection. Failure to do so may result in the import VAT becoming payable immediately and Sotheby's being unable to refund the VAT charged on deposit.

# 6. VAT REFUNDS FROM HM REVENUE AND CUSTOMS

Where VAT charged cannot be cancelled or refunded by Sotheby's, it may be possible to seek repayment from HM Revenue and Customs. Repayments in this manner are limited to businesses located outside the LIK.

# 7. SALES AND USE TAXES

# 1. INTRODUCTION

- (a) Sotheby's and Sellers' contractual relationship with prospective Buyers is governed by:
- (i) these Conditions of Business;
- (ii) the Conditions of Business for Sellers displayed in the saleroom and which are available upon request from Sotheby's UK salerooms or by telephoning +44 (0)20 7293 6152;
- (iii) Sotheby's Authenticity Guarantee as printed in the sale catalogue;
- (iv) any additional notices and terms printed in the sale catalogue, including Buying at Auction and,
- (v) in respect of online bidding via the internet, the BIDnow Conditions on the Sotheby's website, in each case as amended by any saleroom notice or auctioneer's announcement at the auction.
- (b) As auctioneer, Sotheby's acts as agent for the Seller. A sale contract is made directly between the Seller and the Buyer. However, Sotheby's may own a lot (and in such circumstances acts in a principal capacity as Seller) and/or may have a legal, beneficial or financial interest in a lot as a secured creditor or otherwise.

# 2. COMMON TERMS IN THESE CONDITIONS OF BUSINESS:

Bidder is any person considering, making or attempting to make a bid, by whatever means, and includes Buyers;

Buyer is the person who makes the highest bid or offer accepted by the auctioneer, and includes such person's principal when bidding as agent;

Buyer's Expenses are any costs or expenses due to Sotheby's from the Buyer and any Artist's Resale Right levy payable in respect of the sale of the Property, including an amount in respect of any applicable VAT thereon:

Buyer's Premium is the commission payable by the Buyer on the Hammer Price at the rates set out in Buying at Auction; Counterfeit is as defined in Sotheby's Authenticity Guarantee;

Hammer Price is the highest bid accepted by the auctioneer by the fall of the hammer (in the case of wine, as apportioned pro-rata by reference to the number of separately identified items in that lot), or in the case of a post-auction sale, the agreed sale price:

Purchase Price is the Hammer Price and applicable Buyer's Premium and VAT; Reserve is the (confidential) minimum Hammer Price at which the Seller has agreed to sell a lot;

Seller is the person offering a lot for sale (including their agent (other than Sotheby's), executors or personal representatives):

Sotheby's means Sotheby's, the unlimited company which has its registered office at 34-35 New Bond Street, London W1A 2AA; Sotheby's Company means both Sotheby's in the USA and any of its subsidiaries (including Sotheby's in London) and Sotheby's Diamonds S.A. and its subsidiaries (in each case "subsidiary" having the meaning of Section 1159 of the Companies Act 2006);

VAT is Value Added Tax at the prevailing rate. Further information is contained in Buying at Auction.

# 3. DUTIES OF BIDDERS AND OF SOTHEBY'S IN RESPECT OF ITEMS FOR SALE

- (a) Sotheby's knowledge in relation to each lot is partially dependent on information provided to it by the Seller, and Sotheby's is not able to and does not carry out exhaustive due diligence on each lot. Bidders acknowledge this fact and accept responsibility for carrying out inspections and investigations to satisfy themselves as to the lots in which they may be interested.
- (b) Each lot offered for sale at Sotheby's is available for inspection by Bidders prior to the sale. Sotheby's accepts bids on lots solely on the basis that Bidders (and independent experts on their behalf, to the extent appropriate given the nature and value of the lot and the Bidder's own expertise) have fully inspected the lot prior to bidding and have satisfied themselves as to both the condition of the lot and the accuracy of its description.
- (c) Bidders acknowledge that many lots are of an age and type which means that they are not in perfect condition. All lots are offered for sale in the condition they are in at the time of the auction (whether or not Bidders are in attendance at the auction). Condition reports may be available to assist when inspecting lots. Any estimate may not be relied on as a prediction of the selling price or value of the lot and may be revised from time to time in Sotheby's absolute discretion.
- (e) No representations or warranties are made by Sotheby's or the Seller as to whether any lot is subject to copyright or whether the Buyer acquires copyright in any lot.
- (f) Subject to the matters referred to in Conditions 3(a) to 3(e) above and to the specific exclusions contained at Condition 4 below, Sotheby's shall exercise such reasonable care when making express statements in catalogue descriptions or condition reports as is consistent with its role as auctioneer of lots in the sale to which these Conditions relate, and in the light of (i) the information provided to it by the Seller; (ii) scholarship and technical knowledge; and (iii) the generally accepted opinions of relevant experts, in each case at the time any such express statement is made.

# 4. EXCLUSIONS AND LIMITATIONS OF LIABILITY TO BUYERS

- (a) Sotheby's shall refund the Purchase Price to the Buyer in circumstances where it deems that the lot is a Counterfeit and each of the conditions of the Authenticity Guarantee has been satisfied.
- (b) In the light of the matters in Condition 3 above and subject to Conditions 4(a) and 4(e), neither any Sotheby's Company nor the Seller:
  - (i) is liable for any errors or omissions in information provided to Bidders by Sotheby's (or any Sotheby's Company), whether orally or in writing, whether negligent or otherwise, except as set out in Condition 3(f) above:
  - (ii) gives any guarantee or warranty to Bidders and any implied warranties and conditions are excluded (save in so far as such obligations cannot be excluded by law) other than the express warranties given by the Seller to the Buyer in Condition 2 of the Sellers' Conditions of
- (iii) accepts responsibility to any Bidders in respect of acts or omissions (whether negligent or otherwise) by Sotheby's in connection with the conduct of auctions or for any matter relating to the sale of any lof.
- (c) Unless Sotheby's owns a lot offered for sale, it is not responsible for any breach of these conditions by the Seller.
- (d) Without prejudice to Condition 4(b), any claim against Sotheby's or the Seller by a Bidder is limited to the Purchase Price with regard to that lot. Neither Sotheby's nor the Seller shall under any circumstances be liable for any consequential losses.
- (e) None of this Condition 4 shall exclude or limit Sotheby's liability in respect of any fraudulent misrepresentation made by Sotheby's or the Seller. or in respect

of death or personal injury caused by the negligent acts or omissions of Sotheby's or the Seller.

# 5. BIDDING AT AUCTION

- (a) Sotheby's has absolute discretion to refuse admission to the auction. Bidders must complete a Paddle Registration Form and supply such information and references as required by Sotheby's. Bidders act as principal unless they have Sotheby's prior written consent to bid as agent for another party. Bidders are personally liable for their bid and are jointly and severally liable with their principal if bidding as agent.
- (b) Sotheby's advises Bidders to attend the auction but will seek to carry out absentee written bids which are in pounds sterling and, in Sotheby's opinion, clear and received sufficiently in advance of the sale of the lot, endeavouring to ensure that the first received of identical written bids has priority.
- (c) Where available, written, telephone and online bids are offered as an additional service for no extra charge, at the Bidder's risk and shall be undertaken with reasonable care subject to Sotheby's other commitments at the time of the auction: Sotheby's therefore cannot accept liability for failure to place such bids save where such failure is unreasonable. Telephone and online bids may be recorded. Online bids ("BIDnow") are made subject to the BIDnow Conditions available on the Sotheby's website or upon request. The BIDnow Conditions apply in relation to online bids, in addition to these Conditions of Rusiness

# 6. CONDUCT OF THE AUCTION

- (a) Unless otherwise specified, all lots are offered subject to a Reserve, which shall be no higher than the low presale estimate at the time of the auction.
- (b) The auctioneer has discretion at any time to refuse any bid, withdraw any lot, re-offer a lot for sale (including after the fall of the hammer) if he believes there may be error or dispute, and take such other action as he reasonably thinks fit.
- (c) The auctioneer will commence and advance the bidding at levels and in increments he considers appropriate and is entitled to place a bid or series of bids on behalf of the Seller up to the Reserve on the lot, without indicating he is doing so and whether or not other bids are placed.
- (d) Subject to Condition 6(b), the contract between the Buyer and the Seller is concluded on the striking of the auctioneer's hammer, whereupon the Buyer becomes liable to pay the Purchase Price.
- (e) Any post-auction sale of lots offered at auction shall incorporate these Conditions as if sold in the auction.

# 7. PAYMENT AND COLLECTION

(a) Unless otherwise agreed, payment of the Purchase Price for a lot and any Buyer's Expenses are due by the Buyer in pounds sterling immediately on conclusion of the auction (the "Due Date") notwithstanding any requirements for export, import or other permits for such lot.

- (b) Title in a purchased lot will not pass until Sotheby's has received the Purchase Price and Buyer's Expenses for that lot in cleared funds. Sotheby's is not obliged to release a lot to the Buyer until title in the lot has passed and appropriate identification has been provided, and any earlier release does not affect the passing of title or the Buyer's unconditional obligation to pay the Purchase Price and Buyer's Expenses.
- (c) The Buyer is obliged to arrange collection of purchased lots no later than thirty (30) calendar days after the date of the auction. Purchased lots are at the Buyer's risk (and therefore their sole responsibility for insurance) from the earliest of i) collection or ii) the thirty-first calendar day after the auction. Until risk passes, Sotheby's will compensate the Buyer for any loss or damage to the lot up to a maximum of the Purchase Price paid. Buyers should note that Sotheby's assumption of liability for loss or damage is subject to the exclusions set out in Condition 6 of the Conditions of Business for Sellers
- (d) For all items stored by a third party and not available for collection from Sotheby's premises, the supply of authority to release to the Buyer shall constitute collection by the Buyer.
- (e) All packing and handling is at the Buyer's risk. Sotheby's will not be liable for any acts or omissions of third party packers or shippers.
- (f) The Buyer of any firearm is solely responsible for obtaining all valid firearm or shotgun certificates or certificates of registration as a firearms dealer, as may be required by the regulations in force in England and Wales or Scotland (as applicable) relating to firearms or other weapons at the time of the sale, and for complying with all such regulations, whether or not notice of such is published in the Sale Catalogue. Sotheby's will not deliver a firearm to a Buyer unless the Buyer has first supplied evidence to Sotheby's satisfaction of compliance with this Condition.

# 8. REMEDIES FOR NON-PAYMENT

Without prejudice to any rights the Seller may have, if the Buyer without prior agreement fails to make payment for the lot within five days of the auction, Sotheby's may in its sole discretion (having informed the Seller) exercise one or more of the following remedies:

- (a) store the lot at its premises or elsewhere at the Buyer's sole risk and expense:
- (b) cancel the sale of the lot;
- (c) set off any amounts owed to the Buyer by a Sotheby's Company against any amounts owed to Sotheby's by the Buyer in respect of the lot;
- (d) apply any payments made to Sotheby's by the Buyer as part of the Purchase Price and Buyer's expenses towards that or any other lot purchased by the Buyer, or to any shortfall on the resale of any lot pursuant to paragraph (h) below, or to any damages suffered by Sotheby's as a result of breach of contract by the Buyer;

- (e) reject future bids from the Buyer or render such bids subject to payment of a deposit:
- (f) charge interest at 6% per annum above HSBC Bank plc Base Rate from the Due Date to the date the Purchase Price and relevant Buyer's Expenses are received in cleared funds (both before and after judgement);
- (g) exercise a lien over any of the Buyer's property which is in the possession of a Sotheby's Company. Sotheby's shall inform the Buyer of the exercise of any such lien and within 14 days of such notice may arrange the sale of such property and apply the proceeds to the amount owed to Sotheby's:
- (h) resell the lot by auction or private sale, with estimates and reserves at Sotheby's discretion. In the event such resale is for less than the Purchase Price and Buyer's Expenses for that lot, the Buyer will remain liable for the shortfall together with all costs incurred in such resale:
- (i) commence legal proceedings to recover the Purchase Price and Buyer's Expenses for that lot, together with interest and the costs of such proceedings on a full indemnity basis; or
- (j) release the name and address of the Buyer to the Seller to enable the Seller to commence legal proceedings to recover the amounts due and legal costs. Sotheby's will take reasonable steps to notify the Buyer prior to releasing such details to the Seller.

# 9. FAILURE TO COLLECT PURCHASES

- (a) If the Buyer pays the Purchase Price and Buyer's Expenses but fails to collect a purchased lot within thirty (30) calendar days of the auction, the lot will be stored at the Buyer's expense (and risk) at Sotheby's or with a third party.
- (b) If a purchased lot is paid for but not collected within six months of the auction, the Buyer authorises Sotheby's, having given notice to the Buyer, to arrange a resale of the item by auction or private sale, with estimates and reserves at Sotheby's discretion. The proceeds of such sale, less all costs incurred by Sotheby's, will be forfeited unless collected by the Buyer within two years of the original auction

# 10. EXPORT AND PERMITS

It is the Buyer's sole responsibility to identify and obtain any necessary export, import, firearm, endangered species or other permit for the lot. Any symbols or notices in the sale catalogue reflect Sotheby's reasonable opinion at the time of cataloguing and offer Bidders general guidance only. Without prejudice to Conditions 3 and 4 above, Sotheby's and the Seller make no representations or warranties as to whether any lot is or is not subject to export or import restrictions or any embargoes. The denial of any permit or licence shall not justify cancellation or rescission of the sale contract or any delay in payment.

# 11. GENERAL

(a) All images and other materials produced for the auction are the

- (b) Notices to Sotheby's should be in writing and addressed to the department in charge of the sale, quoting the reference number specified at the beginning of the sale catalogue. Notices to Sotheby's clients shall be addressed to the last address formally notified by them to Sotheby's.
- (c) Should any provision of these Conditions of Business be held unenforceable for any reason, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect.
- (d) These Conditions of Business are not assignable by any Buyer without Sotheby's prior written consent, but are binding on Buyers' successors, assigns and representatives. No act, omission or delay by Sotheby's shall be deemed a waiver or release of any of its rights.
- (e) The Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999 is excluded by these Conditions of Business and shall not apply to any contract made pursuant to them.
- (f) The materials listed in Condition 1(a) above set out the entire agreement and understanding between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof. It is agreed that, save in respect of liability for fraudulent misrepresentation, no party has entered into any contract pursuant to these terms in reliance on any representation, warranty or undertaking which is not expressly referred to in such materials.

# 12.DATA PROTECTION

Sotheby's will use information provided by its clients (or which Sotheby's otherwise obtains relating to its clients) for the provision of auction and other art-related services, loan and insurance services, client administration, marketing and otherwise to manage and operate its business, or as required by law. This will include information such as the client's name and contact details, proof of identity financial information records of the client's transactions, and preferences. Some gathering of information about Sotheby's clients will take place using technical means to identify their preferences in order to provide a higher quality of service to them. By agreeing to these Conditions of Business, the client is agreeing to such disclosure.

Please be aware that Sotheby's may film auctions or other activities on Sotheby's premises and that such recordings may be transmitted over the Internet via Sotheby's website. Telephone bids may be recorded.

# 13.LAW AND JURISDICTION

Governing Law These Conditions of Business and all aspects of all matters, transactions or disputes to which they relate or apply (including any online bids in the sale to which these Conditions apply) shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with English law.

Jurisdiction For the benefit of Sotheby's, all Bidders and Sellers agree that the Courts of England are to have exclusive jurisdiction to settle all disputes arising in connection with all aspects of all matters or transactions to which these Conditions of Business relate or apply. All parties agree that Sotheby's shall retain the right to bring proceedings in any court other than the Courts of England.
