



### Advanced Focusing Models

In addition to the regular fixed-focus model, four focusing models of the Memo are supplied. With these, critical sharpness on objects as close as 3 feet may be obtained with the lens wide open. These four focusing models are fitted respectively with Wollensak F:6.3 Velostigmat at \$25, B. & L. F:6.3 special anastigmat at \$30, Wollensak F:3.5 Velostigmat at \$35, and B. & L. F:3.5 special anastigmat at \$40.
