




Figure 1 MT1810A appearance




Figure 2 Front Panel of MU181600A Module




Figure 3 Front Panel of MU181601A Module




Figure 4 Front Panel of MU181620A Module



About This Manual

A testing system combining an MP1800A Signal Quality Analyzer or MT1810A 4-Slot Chassis mainframe, module(s), and control software is called a Signal Quality Analyzer Series. The operation manuals of the Signal Quality Analyzer Series consist of separate documents for the installation guide, the mainframe, remote control operation, module(s), and control software, as shown below.



This document provides usage of the MT1810A for the first time, as well as module composition change, remote control or software update procedures.

- Read all the chapters in this document when using the MT1810A for the first time.
- To change module composition, refer to Section 2.3 "Installing and Removing Modules."
- To perform remote control, refer to Chapter 5 "Remote Control."
- To update the software, refer to Chapter 6 "Other Functions."
- When an abnormality occurs during operation, refer to Chapter 8 "Troubleshooting."

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Chapter 1 Overview

This chapter provides an overview of the MT1810A 4 Slot Chassis (hereinafter, referred to as "MT1810A").

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1.1 Product Overview

Various plug-in modules (hereinafter, referred to as "module") can be installed into the MT1810A, to support research, development and production of module devices for the optical communication market or interconnection within a Gbit/s class high-speed device. The MT1810A is also useful for research and development for the next-generation communication market, including optical packet transmission.

A maximum of four modules can be installed in this equipment.

Two or four of the following modules installed in this equipment can be controlled by selecting options matching the application.

- MU181020A 12.5 Gbit/s Pulse Pattern Generator
- MU181020B 14 Gbit/s Pulse Pattern Generator
- MU181040A 12.5 Gbit/s Error Detector
- MU181040B 14 Gbit/s Error Detector

(In this manual, the above modules are described as the MU181020A, MU181020B, MU181040A, and MU181040B.)

When multiple units of the MU181020A or MU181040A are installed, Multi-Channel operation is supported. 40Gbit/s and PON applications can be supported by using the Combination and Channel Synchronization functions to perform pattern generation sync and receive sync between each module.

In addition, as a way of reducing cost, the display and control parts have been omitted from the MT1810A, which is then controlled by the MX180000A Signal Quality Analyzer Control Software installed in the external control PC. Remote control by the control PC can also be performed via the GPIB or LAN interface.

1.2 Product Composition

1.2.1 Mainframe




Figure 1.2.1-2 Front panel of MT1810A

1.2.2 Modules

When installing the MU181020A, MU181020B, MU181040A, and/or MU181040B, the installation position and installed number of boards vary according to the options being added. See the release notes attached to the MT1810A for details on the possible location and quantity of modules that can be installed for operation.

Modules that are not correctly installed become invalid and fail to operate. In this event, the port icons of the invalid modules are disabled in the Tree View. For details on the Tree View and port icon, refer to Section 4.3 "Tree View" in the MX180000A Signal Quality Analyzer Control Software Operation Manual.

For the latest information on the modules that can be mounted on the main unit, refer to the Anritsu homepage (http://www.anritsu.com). For specifications and how to operate each module, see the corresponding operation manual.

1.2.3 Restrictions on operations multiple modules are mounted

This section describes the restrictions on operations for executing the Independent function when two or more MU181020A/B and/or MU181040A/B modules are mounted on the MT1810A. These restrictions apply only when generating Data, Zero-substitution, Mixed, or Sequence patterns, and do not apply when generating PRBS patterns.

Restrictions on Independent function operations

- When two or more MU181020A/B and/or MU181040A/B modules are mounted on one MT1810A unit, two frequency bands of 0.1 to 6 Gbit/s and 6 to 12.5 Gbit/s must not be mixed between MU181020A/B modules and between MU181040A/B modules. However, the frequency band for the MU181020A/B modules and that for the MU18040A/B modules can exist within the MT1810A. Operations at different frequencies are allowed as long as the frequencies fall within the same frequency band.
- When two or more MU181020A/B and/or MU181040A/B modules are mounted onto one MT1810A unit, the module inserted in the following slot is recognized as the master module. Be sure to input a clock signal to the master module.

Master module of MT1810A-015

MU181020A, MU181020B: Slot1 MU181040A, MU181040B: Slot1




Figure 1.2.3-2 Example restrictions in b

However, the following modules become the master module, when the MU181020A/B is installed in Slot1 and 2 and when the MU181040A/B is installed in Slot 3 and 4. (Refer to Fig. 1.2.3-3 Example restrictions in c.)

- When the module configuration is reconfigured or when the MU181020A/B or MU181040A/B is retrofitted, input the clock signal in the master module of the MU181020A/B and MU18040A/B.
- If the MU181040A-x20 or MU181040B-x20 Clock Recovery option is mounted and selected in an MU181040A/B module, adjust the clock recovery setting bit rate according to the frequency band for the other MU181040A/B modules.




Figure 1.2.3-3 Example restrictions in c

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2.1 Environmental Conditions of Installation Site

The MT1810A operates in the temperature range from 5 to 40°C. Avoid using it under any of the following environment conditions which may cause failure.

- Strong vibrations
- High humidity or dust
- Direct sunlight
- Chemically active gases
- Substantial temperature changes

Note:

Dew may form inside of the MT1810A if it is moved to a warm location after operating for a long time in a cool location. In such a case, be sure to wait until the MT1810A becomes completely dry before turning on the power. Doing so with condensation present may cause a short circuit and damage the MT1810A.

For the installation environment for the external control PC, refer to the operation manual of the PC used.




Figure 2.1-1 Installation Orientation

Install the MT1810A horizontally as shown in Figure 2.1-1.

CAUTION

If the MT1810A is not installed in a "good" direction as above, a small shock may turn it over and harm the user.

2.2 Distance from Fan

A cooling fan is provided on the sides of the MT1810A. Install the MT1810A at least 10 cm away from walls, peripheral devices, or the like to prevent blockage of ventilation. Insufficient ventilation may cause the internal temperature to rise, resulting in failure.

When using multiple MT1810A units arranged in a row and lying flat, prevent air emitted from the MT1810A exhaust vents from directly flowing into the air inlets by taking measures such providing partitions between the units, because the exhausted air becomes hot.




Figure 2.2-1 Distance from fan

2.3 Installing and Removing Modules

Slots for the modules are numbered 1 to 4, from the top.




Figure 2.3-1 MT1810A and modules

2.3.1 Installing modules

- 1. Disconnect the power cord.
- 2. Fully insert a module, sliding along the grooves.
- 3. Check that the module ejectors are set facing out. Fit the hooks into holes on the chassis.




Figure 2.3.1-1 Module hooks

4. Upon insertion, use a Phillips screwdriver to tighten the screws on both the left and right sides of the module.




Figure 2.3.1-2 Modules and screws



- Be sure to check that the power cord of the MT1810A is disconnected before installing the modules. Installing modules with the power cord connected may result in failure.
- Take countermeasures against static electricity (ESD) when installing modules. Failure to do so may result in failure.

CAUTION

Insert the modules such that they are parallel to the grooves, without tilting them (see the figure below). Failure to do so may deform the metal spring on top of the modules.




Figure 2.3.1-3 Module insertion

- Do not touch any electric component mounting surface. Doing so may damage the components.
- Be careful not to catch your fingers when manipulating the ejector. Doing so may cause injury.
- Tighten the left and right screws after inserting a module. Failure to do so may cause malfunction or failure of the module, or allow it to drop out when transported.
- Do not touch any part of the module's optical fiber. Doing so may change the optical characteristics or damage the cord.
- Attach a blank panel to every slot where no module is installed. Not attaching blank panels may result in failure due to air currents or internal temperature rise.

2.3.2 Removing modules

- 1. Disconnect the power cord.
- 2. Loosen the left and right screws on the module to be removed.




Figure 2.3.2-1 Modules and screws

- 3. Press the red ejector lock buttons on both sides of the module to unlock the ejector.
- 4. Set the ejectors to the outside.
- 5. Hold the ejectors and gently pull out the module.




Figure 2.3.2-2 Modules and ejectors




Figure 2.3.2-3 Module pullout

- Do not touch any part of the module's optical fiber. Doing so may change the optical characteristics or damage the cable.

2.4 Power Connection

This section describes the procedures for supplying power.

2.4.1 Power Requirements

For normal operation of the MT1810A, observe the power voltage range described below.

Power source	Voltage range	Frequency
100 Vac system	100 to 120 V	50 to 60 Hz
200 Vac system	200 to 240 V	50 to 60 Hz

Changeover between 100 and 200 V systems is made automatically.



CAUTION

Supplying power exceeding the above range may result in electrical shock, fire, failure, or malfunction.

2.4.2 Connecting the Power Cord

Insert the power plug into a grounded outlet, and connect the other end to the power inlet on the rear panel. To ensure that the MT1810A is properly grounded, always use the supplied 3-pin power cord,.



WARNING

Always connect the MT1810A to a properly grounded outlet. Do not use the instrument with an extension cord or transformer that does not have a ground wire.

If the MT1810A is connected to an ungrounded outlet, there is a risk of receiving a fatal electric shock. In addition, the peripheral devices connected to the instrument may be damaged.



WARNING

Always connect the instrument to a properly grounded outlet. Do not use the instrument with an extension cord or transformer that does not have a ground wire.

If the instrument is connected to an ungrounded outlet, there is a risk of receiving a fatal electric shock. In addition, the peripheral devices connected to the instrument may be damaged.

Unless otherwise specified, the signal-connector ground terminal, like an external conductor of the coaxial connector, of the instrument is properly grounded when connecting the power cord to a grounded outlet. Connect the ground terminal of DUT to a ground having the same potential before connecting with the instrument. Failure to do so may result in an electric shock, fire, failure, or malfunction.



CAUTION

If an emergency arises causing the MT1810A to fail or malfunction, disconnect the MT1810A from the power supply by disconnecting either end of the power cord.

When installing the MT1810A, arrange the power inlet and outlet so that an operator may easily connect or disconnect the power cord. Moreover, DO NOT fix the power cord around the plug and the power inlet with a holding clamp or similar device.

If the MT1810A is mounted in a rack, a power switch for the rack or a circuit breaker may be used for power disconnection.

It should be noted that, the power switch on the front panel of the MT1810A is a standby switch, and cannot be used to cut the main power.

2.5 Measures Against EOS and ESD

This section describes how to prevent MT1810A from being damaged by electrical over-stress (EOS) or electrostatic discharge (ESD).

2.5.1 How to use the GND connection cable

There is a risk of damaging MT1810A due to EOS if MT1810A and other peripheral equipment (including experimental circuits) are not connected to the common ground.

When connecting MT1810A and other peripheral (including experimental circuits), connect other peripheral equipment to the ground terminal of MT1810A's chassis with the GND connection cable before connecting the I/O connectors.




Figure 2.5.1-1 How to Use the GND Connection Cable

2.5.2 How to use the ESD Discharger

There is a risk of damaging MT1810A if the coaxial cable you connect to MT1810A is charged electrostatically.

To prevent MT1810A from being damaged by ESD, remove electrostatic charges from the cable by using the ESD Discharger before cabling the connectors.

The ESD Discharger can be used with one of SMA connector (and its compatible connector) and V connector (and its compatible connector).




Figure 2.5.2-1 How to Use the ESD Discharger

2.6 Connecting with Control PC

Connecting to control PC via Ethernet

To control the MT1810A from the control PC, connect the Ethernet connector of a 10 BASE-T or 100 BASE-TX cable to the RJ45 modular jack on the front panel. The straight or the cross cable is available. The cable type is automatically recognized. Note that this connector is dedicated to connection with the control PC and cannot be directly connected to a network.




Figure 2.6-1 Ethernet connector

The MT1810A is provided with two Ethernet connectors. They have the same function while connected via an internal hub.

2.7 Four-Unit Serial Connection

Up to four units of the MT1810A can be connected from the control PC. The connection method is shown below.

1. Changing IP address

The MT1810A has a fixed IP address. When connecting multiple MT1810A units, the IP address of each unit must be unique. To change the IP address of the MT1810A, change the Main Frame ID on the front panel. The set Main Frame ID is identified as shown below.

2. Limitations

The number of controllable modules is limited as shown below.


- (a) In a system integrating four MT1810A units, up to eight MU181020A/MU181020B and MU181040A/MU181040B modules in total can be controlled.
- (b) Modules are controlled in ascending order from the MT1810A unit having the smallest unit number. If nine or more PPG and/or ED modules are mounted in a system integrating multiple MT1810A units, the unit with the ninth and/or subsequently numbered modules mounted cannot be controlled. In the Tree View screen of the main application, units that cannot be controlled are displayed as "disabled."

Example: When four MT1810A units are connected serially:

Unit1: ED Can be controlled
Unit2: $PPG \times 4$ Can be controlled
Unit3: $ED \times 4$ Cannot be controlled

3. Connection

To connect multiple MT1810A units to the control PC, connect them in series by using the two Ethernet ports on the front panel of each unit. Otherwise, a hub can also be used to connect the control PC and the MT1810A units.

After the connection is completed, turn on each MT1810A unit and activate the main application on the control PC.


How to install the MX180000A Signal Quality Analyzer Control Software (hereinafter, referred to as "MX180000A") is described below. When MX180000A is already installed, reinstallation is performed by overwriting the existing program. Uninstallation is therefore not required before reinstallation.

- 1. Insert the MX180000A CD-ROM into the CD-ROM drive.
- 2. Select [Run] from the Start menu to execute the following file in the CD-ROM.





 - a) Click the Settings tab, and then click [Advanced]. Click the General tab, and check that the DPI setting is set to "Normal size [96 dpi]". If not, set to "Normal size [96 dpi]".
- When using Windows 7, check the following settings. If a setting is incorrect, sometimes screen distortion may occur.
 - a) At the Windows 7 Start menu, press [Control Panel] and then [Customize Desktop].
 - b) Select [Display] and [Set Custom Text Size (DPI)].
 - c) Check that the DPI setting is Normal Size (96 DPI).

If it is not, set it to Normal Size (96 DPI).

16. Be sure to check the software version of the MT1810A after installing MX180000A. If the firmware version is not the latest, necessary files must be downloaded. See Chapter 6 "Other Functions" for details on how to check the version and how to upgrade the software.






Figure 3.3-2 Confirmation Dialog of USB Driver Installation (2)




Figure 3.3-3 Screen when Installation Finished




Figure 3.3-8 Removing USB Driver




Figure 4.1-1 MT1810A front panel




Figure 4.1-2 Selector screen

If the module configuration has changed from that at the last termination of the application, the internal software corresponding to the new configuration may be downloaded. Do not power-off the MT1810A during downloading, or the MT1810A may be damaged.

• Self test






Figure 5.1-1 Control PC




Figure 5.1-2 Remote control PC




Figure 5.1-4 Setup Utility Login screen




Figure 5.1-5 Remote Control tab window




Figure 5.2-1 IP address setting

5.3 Using GPIB

To use GPIB, select [GPIB address] referring to 5.1 Selecting Remote Interface.

To control the MT1810A via GPIB, mount a National Instruments' GPIB interface card into the control PC. Be sure to connect the GPIB cable before turning on the MT1810A. Up to 15 devices, including the controller, can be connected in one GPIB system. Note that the cable length is limited, as shown below.

- Total cable length: ≤20 m
- Cable length between devices: ≤4 m

The method for configuring settings for operating the MT1810A as the target device is described below, using National Instruments' Measurement & Automation Explore 4.1 as an example.

- 1. Insert a National Instruments GPIB interface card into the PC controlling the MT1810A.

This chapter describes the procedure for checking the software versions of the MT1810A, modules installed in it, and the control PC, as well as procedures for updating, setting initialization, and adding options later.

6.1 Checking Installed Software Version

The version of the software installed to the MT1810A can be checked by using [Help] on the menu bar of the main application or from the setup utility.

Select [Help] \rightarrow [Version] on the menu bar of the main application. The screen shown below displaying the currently installed software version opens.

An object displayed with a yellow background on the Version display screen indicates that its version does not match with the installed one. In this case, update the internal software by referring to Section 6.2 "Updating Software." Using the MT1810A while the internal software versions mismatch may result in abnormal operation.

Click [Setup utility] from the selector screen displayed after exiting an application.

Clicking [Setup utility] opens the Setup Utility Login screen. Click the [OK].

Click the [Version] tab to open the software version display screen. The software version and serial number of the MT1810A can be checked on the screen.




Figure 6.1-4 Software version display screen

An object displayed with a yellow background on the Software version display screen indicates that its version does not match with the installed one. In this case, update the internal software by referring to Section 6.2 "Updating Software." Using the MT1810A while the internal software versions mismatch may result in abnormal operation.

The setup utility version can also be checked by clicking the [Help] tab.

6.2 Updating Software

Software of the MT1810A and each module can be updated from the setup utility screen.

When a new version of the software is installed, a version mismatch may occur between the new-version software and the MT1810A internal software. Operations are not guaranteed in the version mismatch state. The version mismatch can be solved from the setup utility screen. When the setup utility is started up, click the [Download] tab. Object files that can be downloaded are listed in the download file display area. Select the checkbox for the files to be updated (downloaded), then click [Load] to start file download. When all the selected files are downloaded, the MT1810A internal software is updated. The MT1810A internal software can usually be updated to the latest version just by clicking [Load].




Figure 6.2-1 Download tab window

[1]	Shows the files that can be downloaded.
	The versions displayed in the New column are those of the object files that can be provided by the installed MX180000A.
	The versions displayed in the Current column are those of the internal software that has already been installed in the MT1810A.
	If the versions in the New and Current columns do not match, select the checkbox for that object file and download it.
[2]	Select the checkbox for the file to be downloaded.
	The checkbox is initially selected for the object files that need to be downloaded (for example, the versions in the New and Current columns do not match).
[3]	Execute downloading. The file versions stored in the internal HDD by the MX180000A installer are compared with the file versions downloaded in the MT1810A and each module, and if they differ, downloading of files is executed.
[4]	Shows slot number and file name for downloading.
[5]	Shows download progress.
[6]	Stops downloading.
[7]	Exits the setup utility.

Notes:

- If the version is not displayed in the Current column and the checkbox is cleared, select the checkbox and execute download.
- When one of the following FPGA is downloaded, the MT1810A must be turned off and then on again in order to enable the updated information. It takes 10 minutes per file. Follow the procedure described in Section 4.2 "Stop Procedure" when turning off the MT1810A.

6.3 Initializing Settings

The MT1810A can be initialized to the factory settings by clicking [Initialize] in the MX180000A File menu. It can also be initialized to the factory settings, using the setup utility. Start the setup utility and click the [Help] tab.




Figure 6.3-1 Initialization of settings

Click [Execute] in the [Initialize] group box to initialize the MT1810A to the factory settings.

The IP address setting is not initialized.

Chapter 7 Self-Test

The MT1810A has a self-test function to check if the installed modules operate normally. This chapter describes the self-test procedure.

7.1 Self-Test

The MT1810A has a self-test function (self-test application). This function detects module abnormalities.

Be sure to exit the main application software before starting the self-test application. Next, select [Self Test] on the selector screen to display the Self-test main screen. If the module for self-test is not installed in the mainframe, the error message "No Module!" will be displayed.




Figure 7.1-1 Self-test main screen

Table 7.1-1 Explanation of self-test main screen

No.	Name	Function	
[1]	Select	Opens the selection screen for the module on which self-test is performed.	
[2]	Start	Click to start the self-test. The [Start] button is disabled when no test module is selected.	
[3]	Stop	Click to stop the self-test.	
[4]	Result tab	Displays self-test results. Nothing is displayed (blank) immediately after the application is started up.	
[5]	Guide tab	Displays the self-test target module connection guide. Nothing is displayed (blank) immediately after the application is started up.	
[6]	Save	Click to open the self-test result saving screen in which the self-test results can be saved. Disabled when no self-test result data exists or during self-test execution.	
[7]	Exit	Exits the self-test application and returns to the selftest selector screen. Disabled during self-test execution.	

When [Select] is clicked on the Self-test main screen, the Test Module Select screen shown below is displayed for selecting a self-test target module. In this screen, a combination of modules for which the self-test is executed can be automatically selected by clicking [Auto]. Clicking [OK] closes the Test Module Select screen.




Figure 7.1-2 Test module select screen

[5]	Module selection check box	Display the modules inserted into the mainframe. Select modules to be tested.	
[6]	OT.	Combinations of selected modules are also displayed.	
[6]	OK	Reflects module selection and moves to the self-test main screen.	
[7]	Cancel	Discards module selection and moves to the self-test main screen.	

Notes:

- For the combination of modules and options available for self-testing, access to the "MP1800 Series Signal Quality" on your Web site (http://www.anritsu.com). Right-click the "MP1800 Series Signal Quality" and you can access to your area website.
- Refer to the MX180000A Signal Quality Analyzer Control Software Operation Manual for details on self-test.

A self-test may not be executed, depending on the conditions of the installed modules, such as the following:

- 1. No combination of valid PPG and ED modules exists.
- When ED module option is MU181040A-002 0.1 to 12.5 Gbit/s or MU181040B-002 0.1 to 14 Gbit/s and MU181040A-x30 Variable Clock Phase or MU181040B-x30 Variable Clock Phase not installed
- 3. When PPG module option is MU181020A-002 0.1 to 12.5 Gbit/s or MU181020B-002 0.1 to 14 Gbit/s and MU181000A 12.5 GHz Synthesizer or MU181000B 12.5 GHz 4-Port Synthesizer not installed

The connection guides are displayed in the Guide tab window. Connect the modules, referring to these guides. When the modules are connected completely, click [Start] to start a self-test.

Modules may be damaged if they are connected without following Notes on the screen.

Notes:

- Handle connectors that are not used in a self-test properly, using processes such as termination and open following the description in each module's operation manual.
- In self-tests, optical I/O signals of the XFP and/or SFP modules should be connected via a loopback connection.

When the self-test is completed, the self-test results are displayed in the Result tab window. The item is left blank if a self-test is not executed for that item.




Figure 7.1-4 Result display screen
