



## New HP President visits Australia

JOHN YOUNG, newly appointed President of the Hewlett-Packard Company, and his wife ROSEMARY were visitors to Australia the last week in April.

At a luncheon for Melbourne employees he predicted that sales will double within five years, which will necessitate employing 20,000 additional people world-wide by 1983. Total number for HP Australia will be between 800 and 1,000 employees.

Seven million square feet of additional space (approximately one building per week the size of the Melbourne office) will be needed world-wide within the next five years.

According to John Young, Hewlett-Packard will become the No. 3 Computer Company behind IBM, No. 1 and Digital Equipment Corporation, No. 2.

This is a shift from Hewlett-Packard's image as a test and measuring equipment business.


Sales for data processing products for FY77 were approximately \$US571 million and \$US577 million for test and measuring equipment, and he predicts that change to computer systems will be the largest selling product line in the next few years.

During his visits to Melbourne and Sydney, John was the guest of honor at luncheons with leading Australian business men attending. He also met representatives of the media at a breakfast press conference at the Sydney Hilton.













# Calculator Organisation is now Computational Products Group

### Fort Collins Division becomes part of Computer Systems Group

In this issue of Depth, I would like to familiarise you with the Computational Products Group within Australia.

First of all, the Computational Products title came from the need to rename the sales force and their products. Why? The name Industrial Calculators sales force evolved from the need to differentiate between Consumer Calculators and Industrial Calculators.

The products, however, were more and more approaching mini-computers whereas the industry's understanding of the term calculator was not in line with the product's capabilities. For this reason the products were termed Desk-Top Computers and the new name for the sales force became Computational Products.

An important organisational change was the recent Fort Collins Division move. Both Fort Collins Division and Computer Systems Group had been developing products which were converging in capability, while they were to be sold to a common market, namely commercial. It made sense therefore to have the full range of products to be sold to this market within the one group responsible for sales to the commercial market. Hence the Fort Collins Division became a part of the Computer Systems Group. This has the advantage of making us look like one company to the customer.

The Computer Group, as a consequence, will be heavily involved in the commercial and business data processing markets and the Computational Group's major thrust will be into the Scientific/Engineering, Industrial and Graphics markets.

## Computer Systems Group

PIE IN THE SKY?

The year is 1981. Two groups of businessmen are sitting in conference rooms thousands of miles apart, discussing details of a contract. The computer screens are displaying information transmitted from one computer to the other via a communications satellite 22,500 miles above the earth.

Large colour TV displays allow each group of businessmen to see the other. Teleconferencing is a substitute for business travel and has advantages over telephone communications. Either full motion or freeze-frame video can be used. Freeze-frame images show not only photographs of conference participants, but also charts and other visuals.

High-speed facsimile units allow the transmission of a complete page of printed material in ten seconds.

#### IS ALL THIS PIE-IN-THE-SKY SCIENCE FICTION?

Actually the capability to perform these functions exists today – as demonstrated in the U.S.A. called "Project Prelude".

"Project Prelude" is an exciting experiment being conducted to advance the state-of-the-art in intracompany communications services.

Hewlett-Packard was chosen as the Computer Network supplier by the co-ordinator of the experiment — Satellite Business Systems (S.B.S.). During the period November 1977 to January 1978, six business sites have taken part in these experiments using portable earth stations located at each site.

Late in November 1977, Larry Hartge, the manager of HP's part in "Project Prelude", visited Australia and spoke to a number of interested people at seminars in Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane.

Even though it is unlikely Australia will have a domestic communications satellite for some years, there is immediate interest in linking computers using HP's advance Distributed Systems capability. In fact, as a result of Larry's visit, at least one large Melbourne company has ordered an HP 3000 as the start of a Distributed Systems Network.

The major advantage of distributed processing is that computers are placed where the work is done, but still allows the degree of central control required.

NO! It's not Pie in the Sky. Hewlett-Packard has aptly demonstrated that all this is feasible today. In fact, S.B.S. plan to have this in operation across the United States by the year 1981.


Recently two sales awards were presented to Field Engineers in the Group for outstanding sales performances during FY'77

#### Organisational Change.

JOHN SPRINGALL, AUSTRALASIAN SERVICE MANAGER APPOINTED COMMERCIAL SERVICES MANAGER.

After nearly 15 years as Service Manager, it was strange to arrive at work on February 1 and realise that you are no longer responsible for that part of the organisation, but have assumed responsibility for another important part of our business.

And Order Processing is a vital part of HP – it is a key link in converting "sales" to "shipments" and thus "profit".

During the next few months, there are a number of areas in which you will see changes –

**Order Flow:** We have to be more responsive to market and sales needs. Facilities are available which allow for order entry and acknowledgement within hours – not weeks – we'll be using them more effectively.

**Open Order File:** In April we will be implementing SODA (Sales Office Data-Access). This COMSYS-based system will greatly enhance our ability to monitor and report open-order status etc.

**Invoicing:** Sales don't mean much until they are reflected as cash receipts. Key links in the total process are accuracy and compatibility of our invoice to the customer order and the delay between shipment and invoicing. These areas are being closely reviewed.

**Statistics:** The quantity and quality of historic sales data needs to be upgraded. Sales Order Stats (SOS) was put into operation in late FY77 and by mid FY78 many of the current weaknesses will be eliminated.

**Communications:** Our ability to communicate is vital to HP. Steps have already been taken to upgrade the mechanics.

- COMSYS will be extended to Sydney later this year.
- COMGRAMS from other offices will be relayed rather than re-entered in Melbourne.
- --- TELEX procedures will be enhanced.
- VDU's will be available in strategic places in sales as well as Administration areas. (Melbourne only – unfortunately at this stage).

As indicated above, these changes will improve the mechanics, but there is a desperate need for every employee to improve the quality of communication.

Stock control is receiving greater attention. All parts inventory – including kits, will be under FICS control by April 30.

We are currently reviewing instrument stock control and cataloging procedures and anticipate significant improvements by end July.

You can see that I anticipate being busy for several months if these objectives are to be achieved – as well as cope with above quota order rates in most disciplines.

I believe my previous experience will help solve some of the difficulties that will be encountered, but I would welcome your comments and constructive criticism. Most of all the O/P group would appreciate an occasional compliment for all the support they give sales.



#### **HP Social Club**










Part of the Instructor Training Workshop required participants to split into pairs and co-lead sessions using various techniques that facilitate the learning task.

#### Where Do You Go When You Can't Go Home?

For most of us "home" is the centre of our existence — a place where we can be ourselves, wanted and loved — the place which reflects our personalities. But for some people — young and old — all that is a myth and for various reasons they must leave — or are kicked out AND IT HAPPENS IN BLACKBURN.

Several years ago, the teenagers and youth leaders at the church to which I belong became concerned about the young people who had nowhere to go after coffee shop closed. Out of this sprang an emergency accommodation program in which members of the church (and other families) opened their homes to strangers. Some of the kids stayed days – others have become permanent members of the new family.

This community "service" became known, and soon official requests were received from organisations such as the police – keen to prevent having to institutionalise some young person whose only offence is to be homeless.

In mid 1976, it became obvious that in addition to the foster-family program, there was an obvious need for a "half-way" house. After a lot of searching, we found a suitable house. True it was not ideal, and the Estate Agent lulled us with the usual "... minor renovations, suit handy man", but we bought it and that is when I became involved and the fun started.

I had never stripped wallpaper, replastered walls, set window frames, installed central heating and all those other minor jobs, but as Secretary of the management committee and member of a dynamic church, I soon found people who had. Local business and service organisations such as Rotary helped considerably. The wallpaper was easy — just redirect the juvenile talent that normally finds its outlet in wrecking phone boxes, painting signs on walls etc. Painting is also a good outlet for energetic kids — provided you don't mind offwhite carpets and spotty windows.

In April, 1977 the house was ready for use, and since that time, under the parentage of a married couple and two people in their twenties, it has provided a "home" for about fifty kids, for periods of up to 6 weeks.

If the program can help these kids to find themselves, and a place in the community; it will be worthwhile. But that's not enough; there is a desperate need for permanent homes in those situations where reconciliation with the natural family is not possible.

We are also keen to establish a counselling service and are pursuing possible government funding. Many of the kids desperately need jobs — and work is not easy to get. Until we can provide this sort of help, the program is not complete.

It is easy to accept the security of a family and stable employment in a company such as HP; but these should be a platform from which we move out to help those not so well-off.
