Questions and Answers on Your Benefit Program

In the March issue of MEASURE, Dave Packard announced a new \$2,500 medical insurance program for retired employees and their dependents. This will affect very few initially, but it has already raised a number of questions. Here are a few of

Question: I plan to retire when I reach 100 percent vesting on the Retirement Plan. Will I be eligible for this new insurance?

Answer: You can retire at 41 if you want, Ed, but you won't qualify for the health insurance. You meet one requirement—ten years of service—but you must also be age 60 at the time of your retirement. Your Retirement Fund will get bigger and better. Why don't you stick around for a few more years?

Question: How much do I pay for the family coverage on the retired insurance program?

Answer: No charge. You and your eligible dependents are all covered at no cost to you.

Question: I've been carrying a Green Shield plan on my family for many years. Would you suggest dropping it upon retirement if qualified for the HP plan? Answer: You must have your colors mixed—Green Shield is the plan for domestic pets. Under our new plan, you can still qualify for medical benefits after retirement even if you continue to pay the full premium on a private plan. You would be disqualified for our benefits, however, for expenses covered by any plan for which another employer or the Government pays part of the premium.

Question: What percent of the expenses do I pay after the deductible? Answer: 25 percent.

Question: The doc has suggested an occasional nip of scotch for my arthritis. Are drugs included under the new plan?

Answer: I understand McKesson and Robbins distributes a good brand. Drugs are includable only if a written prescription from a physician is required.

Question: Awfully nice of you folks to include pregnancy coverage. Is this some sort of a joke?

Answer: No-we only cover the serious cases. It's not likely you will need it for yourself, but the plan includes pregnancy complications of qualified dependents. With that young wife of yours, you never can tell!

All qualified employees will be advised the details of this new program prior to retiring. The general provisions are similar to the major medical coverage under the present group health plan. If you have questions, contact Personnel.

HEWLETT-PACKARD'S POST OFFICE— SMOOTH, WELL-COORDINATED SERVICE

In fact: "The Mail operation at Hewlett-Packard Company is one of the finest in this area" (quote from Post Office supervisor)-

The Mail Desk at HP operates as a section of Office Services, which in turn is part of Finance Department's Administrative Services. It is indeed a smooth-running, wellcoordinated, highly versatile team of HP'ites. Keeping track of people at HP is like chasing that old needle (the one in the haystack) and with all our shifting, transferring, divisionalizing, and re-designating of departments, it takes a bit of doing. For the information of those who may wonder how his mail arrives, here is how.

The mail is initially picked up at the East Palo Alto Annex of the Post Office by an HP driver and delivered to the Mail Desk in Building 3-U of the Stanford Plant. Here it is first "rough sorted" into the various mail slots, and from there "fine sorted" to delivery carts for distribution to various buildings and specific locations.

While distributing the incoming mail, the mail personnel also pick up your outgoing mail, and upon the crew's return to the Mail Desk, these items are then sorted into their various categories, weighed, metered, wrapped, and finally bagged for delivery to the Palo Alto Post Office.

In many ways the handling of mail is one of the most critical and vital operations of a smooth-running office such as ours at HP. Consider what would happen if the mail desk stopped functioning. We would receive no purchase orders, no bills or acknowledgments, we couldn't send out checks or invoices, and think of the number of stamps that someone would have to lick!

Seriously, "written communications are the lifeblood of any business operation," and without efficient mail handling, nothing else would be accomplished on time. When we consider the chain reaction set off by the absence of this operation we can appreciate what it does accomplish. Here is just one year's statistics:

- Approximately 272,700 lbs. of mail received.
- 105,050 lbs. of mail sent out.
- 1,212,700 pieces of interoffice correspondence distributed.

To do the above, the Post Office group makes 5,757 trips around the plant for a total of 2,490 miles of mail-cart pushing to deliver the goods.

Between runs and when time permits, the mail gals provide various administrative services where needed, i.e., typing, filing, copying, as well as helping out in the teletype room. The mail boys assist in the Print Shop and maintain all copying equipment in the Stanford plant.

The group makes use of the most modern equipment and procedures at our mail desk, such as: electric letter openers, automated postage machines, folding and inserting equipment, plus our special mail pouch system from Palo Alto to Loveland and Colorado Springs which insures us of "next day" service to these two locations.

It's a complicated job-keeping on top of all the internal moves as well as keeping abreast of the rate changes and train schedules, but like the saying goes—the mail must get through—and we've got the crew that can do it, and does




