Two Million Dollar Edifice Dedicated

A new Hammond Organ performed the first of many musical chores when the Rockland, Massachusetts, High School was dedicated recently. This modern educational plant, completed at a cost of \$2,250,000.00, was opened last Fall, and will accommodate up to 800 students.

Generous donors of the new Hammond Organ were Dr. and Mrs. Joseph Lelyveld, long time residents of Rockland, who have owned a Hammond Organ for twenty-five years. The organ was given in memory of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Lelyveld, and Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Moss.

To the principal of Rockland High School, John T. Higgins, the Hammond Organ is an old friend, as he has played and enjoyed one for a number of years. He shares with Dr. and Mrs. Lelyveld the hope of establishing a Music Scholarship fund through money raised by concerts played on the Hammond Organ. The organ will also be used for student programs, assemblies, and civic gatherings held in the school auditorium where it is installed.

At the console of the Hammond Organ during the school and organ dedication ceremony was 16 year-old Carol Jean Evans, senior student at the school, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence E. Evans of Rockland. Carol Jean is an organ student of Miss Doris Tirrell of Boston, and has been playing the Hammond Organ in her home since childhood.

In addition to playing a number of selections before the dedication program started, Carol Jean rendered two numbers in honor of Dr. and Mrs. Lelyveld. In presenting the Hammond Organ to the school, Dr. Lelyveld expressed the wish that it contribute to increased music appreciation and participation on the part of the students.

The gift of a Hammond Organ to Rockland High School assures many generations of students music at its best. And to the donors, the benefits of giving will be returned a thousand fold through the educational benefits it will give to thousands of students for years to come.

COP'S SHARP ON BEAT OR DOWNBEAT

This Young Irishman Strikes New Note as Officer-Organist

People never laugh when Bill Young sits down to play the Hammond Organ. They're too surprised to laugh.

Young, a husky, good-natured Irishman, is a lieutenant on the police force in St. Augustine, Florida. And of all the people in St. Augustine, he'd probably be the last person you'd pick as being an accomplished organist.

For Young just doesn't look like the aesthetic type. Glancing over his husky frame, a stranger might guess he was a football coach. Or possibly a salesman because of the friendly smile and warm personality. But his huge hands with fingers like plump sausages just don't seem capable of flitting across the keyboard of such a musical instrument as the organ.

But play he does—and well—classical, popular and sacred songs. And he never resents the fact that people often register amazement when they first hear him play.

Young, a native of Nebraska, came to St. Augustine in 1946 after his discharge from the U. S. Navy at Green Cove Springs. He decided to stay in Florida because he liked it, and, he claims jokingly, he didn't have enough money to go very far. He joined the police

department in 1947 and to supplement his salary did odd jobs during his off hours.

In 1953, he was working in his spare time as an ambulance driver for a local mortician. An organ was purchased for the chapel and the book of instructions that came with it recommended that it be operated daily to keep out moisture.

Young performed this chore, although he said he had never been close to an organ before. While working on the keys he became so fascinated with the instrument that he started reading four instruction books that came with it.

Then he got some professional tips from Mrs. Elsie Thompson Boyd, a former organist with CBS and NBC television and radio, who is now living in St. Augustine.


Young's debut as an organist was also unusual. He was napping in the funeral home one day between ambulance calls and was summoned hurriedly to play the organ for a funeral. It was an emergency, since the family had requested a special organ number and the regular organist wasn't available.


Young got through the assignment beautifully, even though he had no time to practice the number. A few months later he played at a wedding in Jacksonville with the aplomb of a veteran and was on his way.



FUN AT THE HAMMOND

Registration Resolutions



There is no time like the present to make good resolutions about your drawbar registrations. You know, of course, that with a little intelligent attention to what you are doing (and a lot of careful listening,) you can produce the most beautiful tones on your Hammond Organ that you have ever heard in your life. Let's just take strings for example. How do you set up a string tone? Well, think of holding a piece of string loosely between your hands; not pulled tightly, but with just a little "play". It makes sort of a little curve, doesn't it? That's an easy way to start thinking of string tones-like a curved line. Maybe a zero or a one on each end of the drawbar set, and then the little curve toward you. Pull all the drawbars out in a little wavy line-12 1212 121. That will do it! But that's only the start of the story. Don't depend on patterns alone. That's a wonderful little start, but from this simple little start you can make dozens and dozens of beautiful string tones, each one entirely different from the other. In fact, you can make more string tones on a Hammond Organ than you can obtain on a pipe organ costing \$50,000 or more.

Write Down The Numbers

How do we do it? Once you get the "feel" of setting this little wavy line up quickly, then start writing down the registration numbers, because you'll find some little beauties as you experiment, and you don't want to lose them . . . put them down in writing, right on the number for which they're intended, so you'll always have them. And never, never be satisfied with the printed registration. Whether it's mine, or anyone else's, it's just one man's idea of how he wanted that number to sound. You can select one just as good (and many times better) if you are willing to spend a bit of time experimenting. I have found some outrageous printed registrations, and I'm sure you have, too. Just because it's there in print doesn't necessarily make it right. Many things get into print which are entirely false. So always test the registrations you want. If the printed ones don't suit you, change some of the numbers in that set that's printed until you get the tone YOU want. But, don't always want the same tone! Most Hammond organists are lazy (I am) and they have a tendency to just use a half dozen or so "pet" registrations. Why, there are millions possible, so resolve this year to work out one new registration every day. You can do it! That's why Hammond is such a capable instrument, you can get EXACTLY the tone you want regardless of the reverberation count of the room, or how much heavily-padded rugs or furniture you have in the room . . . that tone is there for you to use, if you just spend a little time experimenting.

String Registrations

Here are some characteristic string settings. We'll put them all on the upper manual at first, and suggest a solo voice contrast against that for use on the lower. Now, on the upper manual (either Pre-Set Model or Spinet) try each of these in turn, and check them off:

Use Vibrato 3 on Upper 00 2332 332 00 2333 321 00 2333 321 12 2343 321 01 2333 323 01 1222 221 00 2343 221 00 1232 210

Now try solo notes (a melody) on the lower on any of these combinations with Vibrato off on the lower. Then combine accompaniment on upper with melody on the lower manual:

Pre-Set 00 4433 200 Spinet 4433 2000 00 3543 200 3543 2001 00 4332 200 4332 2000 00 6620 000 6620 0000 00 4543 200 4543 2000

Play the notes of the melody with the left hand an octave lower than written, and on the lower manual with the Vibrato off. Isn't that a beautiful contrast with the upper string tone using the Vibrato? Here again, Hammond is the only organ on which you can use Vibrato on one manual and not on the other and so produce this wonderful effect. Try it often.

For Spinet Organists

I find there are many Spinet Organ players who have trouble adapting registrations of Pre-Set Organ music to the Spinet Organ. It's simple: on the lower manual of the Spinet there are no two first brown drawbars, so you merely SKIP THE FIRST TWO NUMBERS of any lower manual registration for Pre-Set Organ and start with the third number. That third number is for your first white drawbar for the lower manual. Follow the numbers of the set up just as they are written and you find, since you have eight drawbars for the lower manual that you have one left over, the last one. Ah, here's that little beauty, the black drawbar with the red dot. It's one of the most beautiful and useful of all; it adds to the intensity of the strings (pulled out to only 2 or 3) or, if you draw it out to 5 or 6, it gives a particularly fine reediness to your set-up. It's a combination of the overtones of the other last two black drawbars, coupled together and sounding an octave higher than those two. Use it sparingly, but use it often; you'll be bewitched with it.

Eddie Baxter - Don Johnson - Al Anthony

Offer New L.P. Recordings on Hammond Organ

One of the most popular Hammond Organ record albums, "King of Organ with a Beat", is played by Don Johnson, a native of Muskegon, Michigan. Don travels all over the country with his Hammond Organ, which he transports in his 35 foot mobile home. On this long-playing recording, Don is accompanied by guitar, string base, and drums.

Eddie Baxter is a prolific Hammond Organ recording artist. A native of Denver, Colorado, Eddie is currently working in California. He gained valuable experience as arranger for the Glen Gray and Frankie Master dance bands, and has also worked with a number of smaller groups. Eddie has brought a wealth of musical background and experience to the recording of four albums, "This Love of Mine", "Speak Low", "Temptation", and "The Tasty Touch".


The second Hammond Organ album by Al Anthony, "Swinging Hi-Fi", was recently released by Liberty Records. These volumes have been issued through the years from time to time and always meet with a hearty reception because the music is all very fine, is never too difficult to play, and is not expensive. Twenty-three postludes for a dollar and a half—you can't beat that.

SIMPLIFIED STANDARD SONGS No. 2

Ethel Smith Music Corp. \$1.50 1842 West Avenue, Miami Beach, Florida

Eighteen simplified arrangements of standard pop tunes with words and chord symbols. One thing that recommends this volume is that the tunes are not the old hackneyed ones. I doubt it you have many of these in your library.

Mark Laub has done a fine job of arranging and registering in these two volumes. The arrangements are all short and not at all difficult to play. These well loved tunes should be a welcome addition to the libraries of Hammond Organ owners.

POPULAR STANDARDS IN RECORD TIME

This is one of those deals which includes a record in which the band plays introductions and accompaniment and you play the organ along with it. A suggestion: this is a popular pastime at Hammond Organ Society meetings. It's fun and a change of pace from just solo playing.

THE MODERN ORGANIST Book 1

Pointer System, Inc. \$1.50 64 E. 2nd St., Winona, Minn.

The ever popular Pointer System is now issuing volumes to gently lead the player into a more professional manner of playing. This volume shows how to learn to read the bass cleff and to use inversions as well. Every pointer system player should get this volume and find out for himself how simple it is to learn the bass cleff, and also to find out how much more professional he will sound.

GOLDEN FESTIVAL OF SONG

This is printed on only two staves with pedal "ad lib" (that means it's cued in on the bass cleff) and here again, the table of contents lists songs that don't appear very often in collections, like the KASHMIRI SONG, DUNA, NOW SLEEPS THE CRIMSON PETAL, etc. Everybody always plays the same old trite pop tunes. Why don't you learn some of these and do something a little different?

LYRIC PIECES FOR PIANO AND ORGAN

During the past few years I've noticed a great interest in music for piano and organ, and from time to time I've reviewed publications of this nature. This folio of nine classical numbers I think is especially nice. Dr. Dunham is one of our finest organ teachers, he's at the University of Colorado in Boulder, so of course, the music is of the best. One of the most effective numbers in the collection is the "Canon in B Minor" by Schumann. When you play it, remember it does not go nearly as fast as it looks. You teachers be sure to take a look at this folio. Two copies needed for performance.

GOOD AND EASY MUSIC TO PLAY Book 1

arr. by Martha Seichell R. D. Row Music Co. \$2.50 353 Newbury St., Boston 15, Mass.

This book is for HOME AND CHURCH, seventy-one pages of light classical and sacred music, designed especially for those thousands who have organs in their homes and wish to play good music but lack the technique to play the standard organ editions. The music is simple enough, and the arrangements are tasteful. The nice simple arrangement of Franck's "Panis Angelicus" would be worth the price of the whole book. If you like this volume keep in mind that Book 2 will be off the press in the near future.

LEARN YOUR CHORDS Books 1, 2, 3

This series is intended as a combination instruction and work book to enable a beginner to thoroughly master the chord system of playing. It is so comprehensive that one could complete the course without the aid of a teacher. The accomplished chord system player must know all the chords and their inversions, so quite a bit of space is taken teaching the inversions. Mr. Glover is an excellent teacher himself, and has used this system for several years so he knows that it will work. Incidentally, the books are for all keyboard instruments. Obviously so, because chords are the same on any keyboard.

EASY VOLUNTARIES

by Juanita Hardy Wilson Ethel Smith Music Corp. \$1.50 1842 West Avenue, Miami Beach, Florida

It says on the cover, "Eighteen Sacred Compositions particularly arranged for use by the volunteer church organist." They're all short and quite simple and the music is good church music. One thing, though, while you'll find this collection useful, I still feel that church music should be played mostly with no vibrato. And I've found, too, that even nonmusical parishioners appreciate this fact once it's demonstrated to them.

MOONLIGHT SERENADE ON THE TRAIL

Two excellent concert-type arrangements by Rosa Rio, neither of them difficult to play. Registrations are very fine, too. Get these. There are two other numbers in this series, "Manhattan Serenade" and "Shangri-La" which you might want to look at, too.

If you're like most church organists, you'll like to do some real work on difficult pieces, but while you're learning them you'll need some easy music for fill in. This'll do the trick.

PLAYING MELODIES, Book 2

This is a companion book to "Organ Playing Is My Hobby" which was reviewed several months ago. It's for the beginner using very simple chords and pedal. Should be a useful teaching aid.

IN THE CLOISTER

by Alma Dodworth Milliken Mills Music, Inc. \$1.00 1619 Broadway, New York 19, N. Y.

These two organ preludes for church use, "The Loving Saviour" and "The Angelus" are very pretty and melodious, quite simple to play. Arrangements by Virginia Carrington Thomas.

FOUR EASY SERVICES FOR THE CHURCH ORGANIST

Pointer System, Inc. \$1.50 64 E. 2nd St., Winona, Minn

A Hammond Organ has been installed in the church. The pianist is expected to play it next Sunday for the service. She's scared to death, what'll she do? This volume is a onepackage unit providing the necessary music for the first four services! Prelude, Offertory, and Postlude. The music is simple, of course, and the pieces are short.
