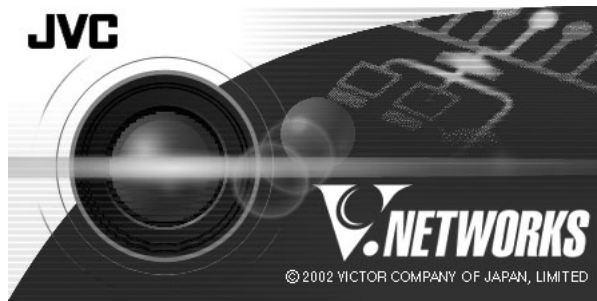

IMPORTANT SAFEGUARDS

1. Read all of these instructions.
2. Save these instructions for later use.
3. All warnings on the product and in the operating instructions should be adhered to.
4. Unplug this appliance system from the wall outlet before cleaning. Do not use liquid cleaners or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning.
5. Do not use attachments not recommended by the appliance manufacturer as they may cause hazards.
6. Do not use this appliance near water - for example, near a bathtub, washbowl, kitchen sink, or laundry tub, in a wet basement, or near a swimming pool, etc.
7. Do not place this appliance on an unstable cart, stand, or table. The appliance may fall, causing serious injury to a child or adult, and serious damage to the appliance. 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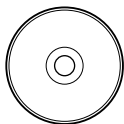

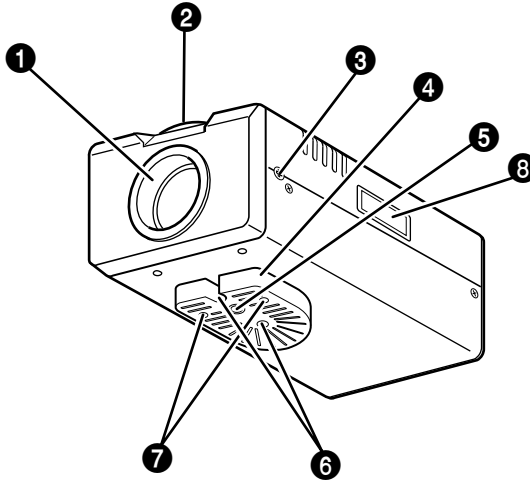

Operating Precautions

- VN-C10 is designed for indoor use. For outdoor use, prepare a proper housing to cover and protect the camera.
- The product should not be installed or used in the following locations.
 - Locations subject to rain or water.
 - Locations with hot air or oil vapors such as in kitchens, etc.
 - Locations where the allowed ambient temperature (0 °C to 40 °C) is exceeded.
 - Locations exposed to X-ray radiation or where strong electrical or magnetic waves are generated.
 - Locations where corrosive gas is generated.
 - Locations with vibrations.
 - Locations with excessive dust.
- If VN-C10 and the cables connected to VN-C10 are installed at a location where strong electrical or magnetic waves are generated, near a radio, TV set, transformer, motor etc., the quality of image and color may be affected.
- If a high-intensity object (such as a lamp) is shot, the image on the screen may have vertical lines (smear) or blur (blooming) at its periphery. This is a characteristic of the CCD, and is not a defect.
- Clean the unit with the power turned off. Use a soft cloth like cotton flannel to wipe out dirt. Do not use paint thinner or benzine as a cleaning agent as this may cause melting or tarnishing of the unit surface. If dirt is persistent, use a cloth soaked with water-diluted mild detergent and then wipe it with a dry cloth.
- Because the cable holders of the terminals could come loose, perform cable connection carefully and securely.
- Insufficient dissipation of heat from the unit may cause damage. Use the unit at a well-ventilated location. In particular, do not block the unit's cooling-fan ventilation opening.
- In a narrowband environment, for example, of dial-up connection, smooth running of MPEG4 images cannot be obtained. This is due to the product design, therefore not a defect.
- When this product is installed in an NAT environment, MPEG4 images cannot be viewed. This is due to the product design, therefore not a defect. (This product uses a network protocol called RTP for transmitting MPEG4 images. Generally, an NAT router cannot carry out NAT translation of RTP packets properly.)
- Certain hubs and switches equipped with SNMP functions have a broadcast or multicast control function. If the function is enabled, multicast images created by this product may not be viewed properly.
- To save electricity, turn off the power to the system when not in use.
- **As local recording images are saved to the volatile memory of the product, the images are deleted if the power is turned off. (☞ Page 33)**

Controls, Connectors and Indicators

(Front, top and side views)



❶ Lens mount

The mount for attaching a lens. Either a C-mount or a CS-mount lens can be used.

❷ Back-focus adjustment ring

The ring for adjusting back-focus and changing the mount method. For adjusting back-focus or changing the mount method, loosen the back-focus locking screw (❸) by turning it counterclockwise and, after the operation, fix it by turning it clockwise. At the factory, VN-C10 is optimized for attaching a CS mount lens.

❸ [BF LOCK] locking screw

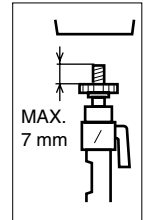
This serves to fix the back focus-adjustment ring.

❹ Bracket for camera mounting.

At the factory, the bracket is attached on the bottom of the camera. According to the installation condition, this can be attached at the top. Use the screws (❺) for attaching the bracket to the camera.

❺ Screw hole (1/4-20UNC)

For attaching the camera to a fixer or a pan/tilt unit. The screw length must not exceed 7 mm. If a longer screw is used, the internal parts of the camera may be damaged.



❻ Fall-preventive holes

For installing the camera securely, use these holes to prevent it from falling off.

❼ Screws for the bracket (x 2: M2.6 X 6 mm)

Screws of the length of 6 mm should be used. A longer screw may damage the internal parts.

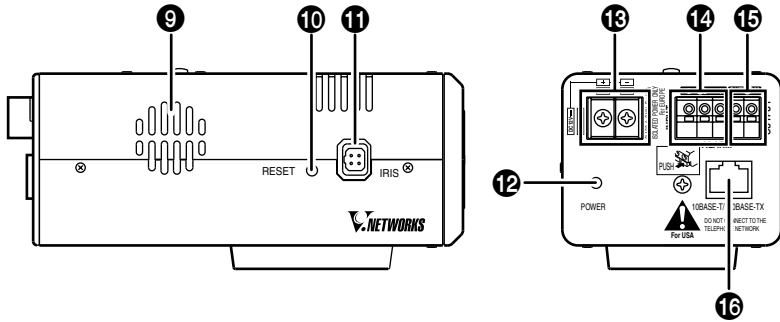
❽ [MAC address]

Physical address unique to the unit. Cannot be changed.

9 Ventilation opening

For the internal cooling fan. Install the camera in a way that does not cover the opening.

10 [RESET] button

Press this button to reset VN-C10. If this button is held down for 2 seconds or longer, the values set with [V.Networks Setup Tool] return to those set at the factory, and VN-C10 restarts.

11 [IRIS] terminal

For connecting with a DC IRIS lens.
(A video iris lens cannot be connected.)

12 [POWER] indicator

This indicator starts blinking when the power is turned on. When the camera is ready for network connection, this becomes steady on. If the indicator blinks while the camera is in use, check the camera and/or the network equipment.

13 [DC 12 V/AC 24 V] Power terminal

For connecting to a DC 12 V or AC 24 V, 50 Hz/60 Hz, power source. (☞ Page 14)

14 [ALARM INPUT] terminals

For connecting with an external alarm equipment. (☞ Page 16)

15 [ALARM OUTPUT] terminals

For connecting with an external alarm equipment. (☞ Page 16)

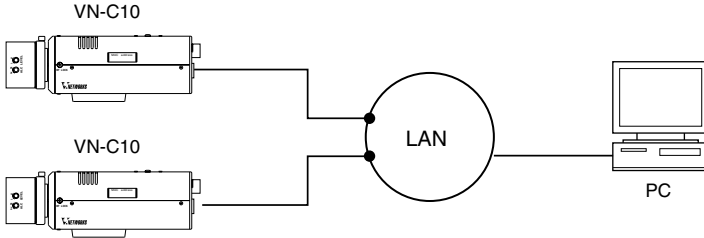

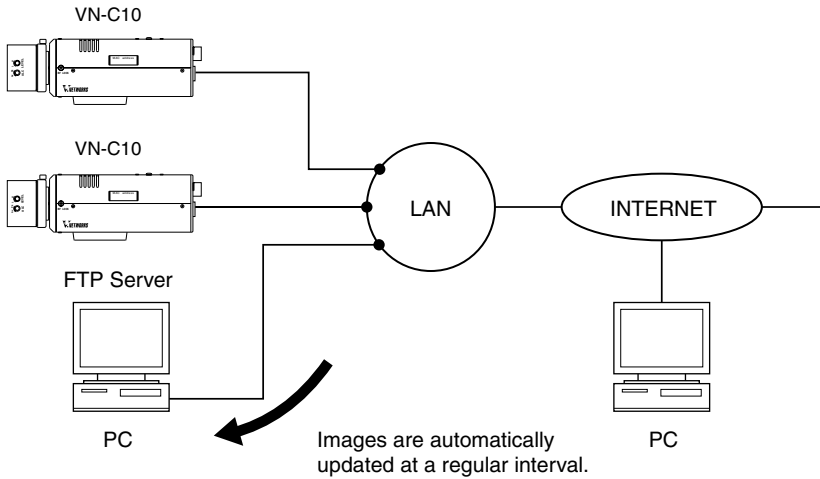

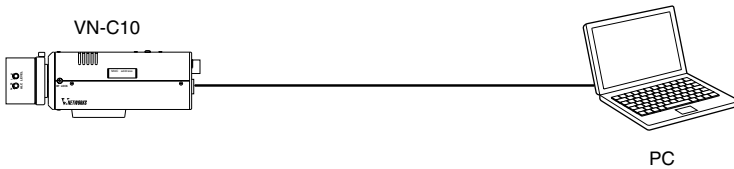

Preparation Procedure

Set the camera in the following procedure.

Step 1 Connection and Installation

Attach a lens and connect the power cable, a LAN cable and an alarm etc. Then, install the camera to a fixer, etc. Fix a wire securely for preventing the camera from falling off.

Step 2 Setting the Network

Install the software [V.Networks Controller], and set the network for the PC and VN-C10. Also perform the setting with [V.Networks Setup Tool] and registration of the connected camera with [V.Networks Controller].

※ If multiple PCs are in use, first turn on the power for one PC and proceed to 2-4 Other Settings with V.Networks Setup Tool. Only then, turn on the power to a second PC and go on to 2-4. Repeat the procedure for other PCs. ( Page 14)

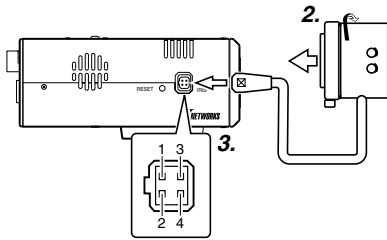
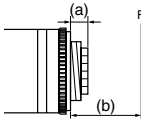
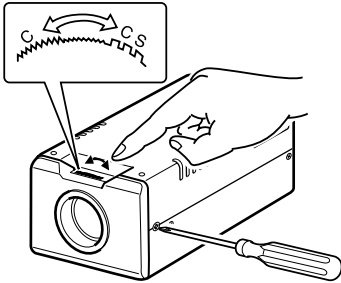

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Preparations (Step 1 Connection and Installation)

1-1 Attaching a Lens

Attach a lens in the following procedure.



1. Before attaching a lens, check the mount method of the lens.

VN-C10 is set for CS-mount at the factory. For attaching a C-mount lens, loosen the back-focus locking screw using a screwdriver and turn the back-focus adjustment ring to change the mount method accordingly with a finger or a pointed tool like a screwdriver.

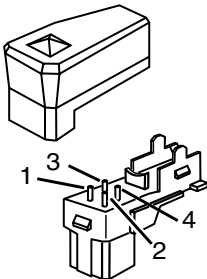
To attach a lens, observe the length shown as (a). Do not use a lens with a length longer than (a) as it may cause damage to the internal parts of the camera and proper lens attachment would not be possible.

Lens	Flange-back distance (b)	Length (a)
C-mount lens	17.526mm	10 mm max.
CS-mount lens	12.5mm	5.5 mm max.

2. Attach the lens to the camera securely by turning it clockwise.

3. In the case of a DC IRIS lens, connect the lens cable to the socket while examining the pin arrangement.

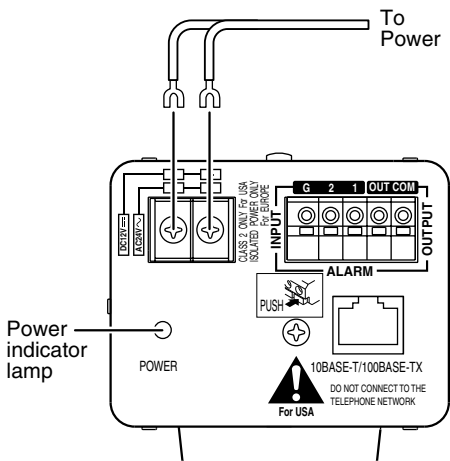

Preparations (Step 1 Connection and Installation)

1-2 Connecting the Power Cord

Connect the camera to DC 12 V or AC 24 V.

The power indicator is lit when the power is turned on.



Power Cord

- Do not connect the power cord to DC 12 V and AC 24 V at the same time.
- Use a lug plate to securely connect the power cord to the power terminals and avoid misconnection or loose connection.
- For DC 12 V connection, ensure that the polarities, positive and negative, are correctly oriented.
- For DC 12 V connection, the ripple voltage should not exceed 50 mV.

Length: 30 m maximum
UL1007, UL1015 or equivalent
AWG #20 or equivalent, or higher

WARNING

Connect with the appropriate power-supply voltage. The rated voltage for VN-C10 is DC 12 V or AC 24 V, 50 Hz/60 Hz. If a voltage exceeding the rating is supplied, malfunction, or in the worst case, fuming or fire, may be caused.

For AC 24 V, ensure that the primary side is insulated with the secondary one.

For a system with multiple VN-C10s

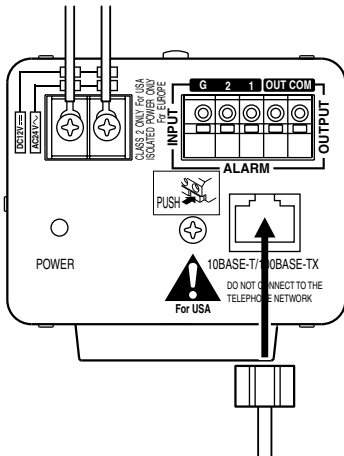
In a system where more than one VN-C10 are used, turn on the power for a VN-C10 first and proceed the setting to 2-4 Other Settings with V.Networks Setup Tool. Only then turn on the power for a second one and go on to 2-4. Repeat the procedure for the other cameras.

Note

The IP address of VN-C10 is set to "198.168.0.2" at the factory. Proper access cannot be established due to IP address redundancy if the power is turned on for multiple cameras at one time under a single LAN environment. **Do not turn on the power for multiple cameras at the same time.** If an IP address redundancy occurred, ensure that only one VN-C10 exists on a single LAN environment and wait for some time (at least 10 minutes). Or turn off the power once for all network equipment and turn it on again for proper access to VN-C10.

1-3 Connecting a LAN Cable

Connect the camera to a hub or a PC by using a LAN cable.



- **For hub connection**
Use a straight cable.
- **For PC connection**
Use a cross-over cable.

Caution

There are a few types of LAN board for which a cross-over cable cannot be used. Check the specifications of the LAN board to be used before performing connection.

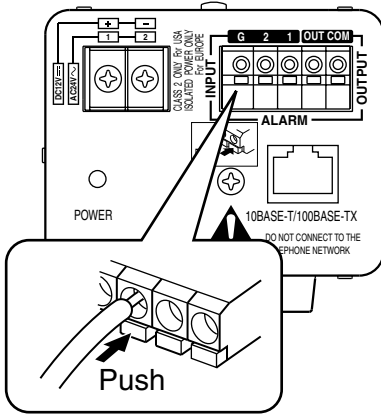
Note

For 100 BASE-TX, use a CAT-5 cable.

Preparations (Step 1 Connection and Installation)

1-4 Connecting the Alarm I/O Terminals

Connect the alarm I/O terminals with external equipment such as a sensor, buzzer, etc.



Press the buttons for connecting or disconnecting cables as shown on the left.

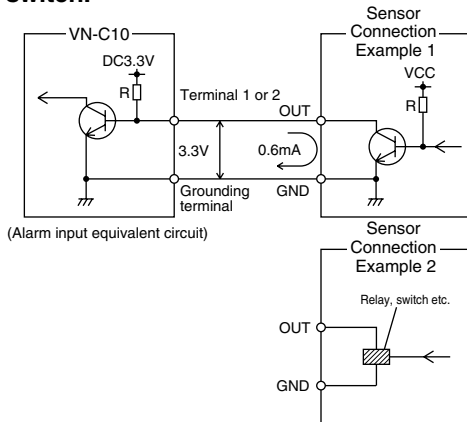

Due to external noise, the camera may not work properly even if the length of the cable is less than 50 m. If this occurs, use a shielded cable or keep the cable away from the noise source.

Alarm Input Terminal

This terminal is for connecting with a sensor, infrared, door or metallic, or a manual switch.



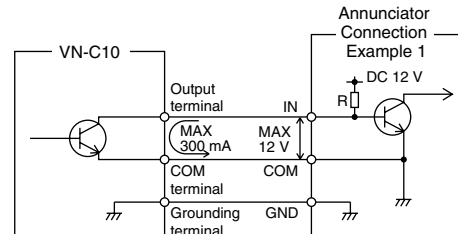
Input Requirements

- No-voltage relay “A-contact” input or NPN open collector input
(A-contact: Contact is normally open and closes when the alarm is turned on.)
- Active low level
- Latch/Momentary (at least 500 ms)
- Circuit current at low level: 0.6 mA
- Voltage applied at high level: 3.3 V

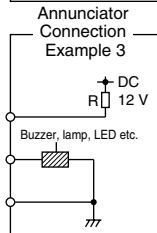
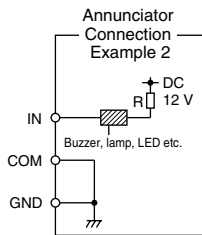
1-4 Connecting the Alarm I/O Terminals (continued)

Alarm Output Terminal

This terminal is for connecting with an alarm annunciator such as an indicator, a lamp or a buzzer.



(Alarm output equivalent circuit)



Output Requirements

- Equivalent to NPN open collector output (The output logic is set with [V.Networks Setup Tool.])
- Allowed applied voltage: DC 12 V max.
- Allowed input current: 300 mA
- Momentary output: 2 to 5000 ms (The duration is set with [V.Networks Setup Tool.])

Caution

Connect the VN-C10 grounding terminal to the one of the annunciator.

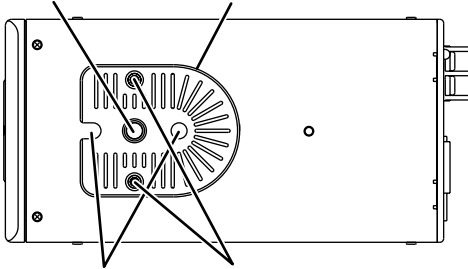

1-5 Installing the Camera

Fall-Preventive wire

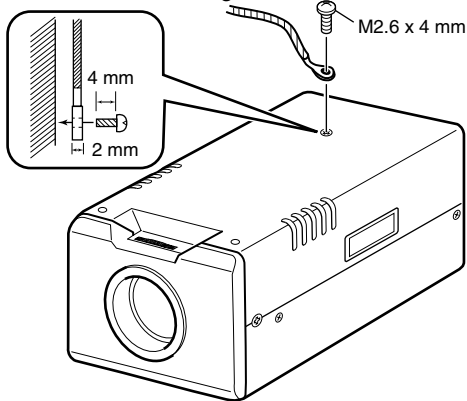
For attaching the camera to a fixer or a rotating platform, use the screw hole of the mounting bracket.

Camera mounting screw hole Camera-mounting bracket



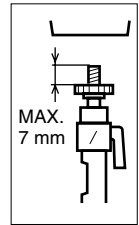
Fall-preventive holes Screws for the bracket

Caution

- The length of the screw for mounting the camera must not exceed 7 mm. Do not use a longer screw as it may damage the internal parts of the camera.
- In the factory setting, the bracket is attached on the top of the camera. For attaching it at the bottom, remove the two screws fixing the bracket.



Caution

For fixing the bracket, screws of the length of 6 mm should be used. Do not use a longer screw as it may damage the internal parts of the camera.

[Fall Prevention]

WARNING


- Special care is required if the camera is installed on a wall or ceiling. You should not attempt to install it by yourself as it may cause injury or an accident. This installation work should be carried out only by qualified and experienced personnel.
- When the camera is attached to a fixer or a pan/tilt unit, use the holes for fall prevention to secure it.
- To prevent the camera from falling off, secure it to a secure and stable structure such as a ceiling slab or a channel by using a wire.
- Ensure that the length, strength, routing and material (insulation) of the securing wire to be used are appropriate.
- To attach the securing wire, use the black screw on the top side of the camera.
- For fixing the wire, a screw of M2.6 X 4mm should be used. Do not use a longer screw as it may damage the internal parts of the camera.

Preparations (Step 2 Setting the Network)


2-1 Installing the Software

For operating VN-C10, install the software from the CD-ROM, which is supplied with the camera in the following procedure.

Installing V.Networks Controller

1. Select [Setup.exe] found in the [JVC] folder.
2. Proceed by following the instructions shown on the screen.
3. If the installation is successfully executed, the [V.Networks] icon is created in [Programs] of the Windows [Start] menu.  [V.Networks Controller] is displayed in [V.Networks].

Installing V.Networks Setup Tool

1. Open the [JVC] folder and then the "setup" folder inside. Select [Setup.exe].
2. Proceed by following the instructions shown on the screen.
3. If the installation is successfully executed, the [V.Networks] icon is created in [Programs] of the Windows [Start] menu.  [vn-c10u Setup Tool] is displayed in [V.Networks].

Installing DirectX 8.1 and Codec

[DirectX 8.1] and ISO MPEG4 Codec are required for viewing MPEG4 images with VN-C10. If the version currently installed in the PC is older, install the version 8.1 by following the procedure below.

Installing Codec

Select [WMPCD8.exe] and install Codec by following the instructions shown on the screen.

Installing DirectX 8.1

1. Click [Start] and select [Run]. And enter [dxdiag] in the box and click [OK].
2. If the version is older, select [DX81NTeng.exe] and follow the instructions on the screen.

2-3 Setting the IP Address for VN-C10 with V.Networks Setup Tool


- After the power for VN-C10 is turned on, there will be about 20 seconds until VN-C10 becomes ready to be connected with the PC. This is not a defect.
- At the factory, DHCP is set enabled for VN-C10.
- About the DHCP function
JVC does not recommend operating VN-C10 with this function enabled because a different IP address may be assigned upon the renewal of the leasing contract. The DHCP function of VN-C10 is designed for simplifying the installation and setting procedures.


For connecting VN-C10 with the factory settings, either one of the environments described below is required.

- Environment where no DHCP server exists.
- Environment where a DHCP server exists, which clearly defines the allotted IP address and MAC address.






According to access right (authorization) levels, up to 3 passwords (user, operator and administrator) can be set.

Do not forget the passwords as they cannot be changed unless the current, and correct ones are entered.

- A password must be alphanumeric and can be up to 8 characters.

- For a password-protected VN-C10, the password request screen appears.
- VN-C10 cannot be set up unless the correct administrator password is entered.
- The security level is highest for the administrator and lowest for the user. If password is set only for lower security level(s), password protection is not effective.

This section describes alarm setting.

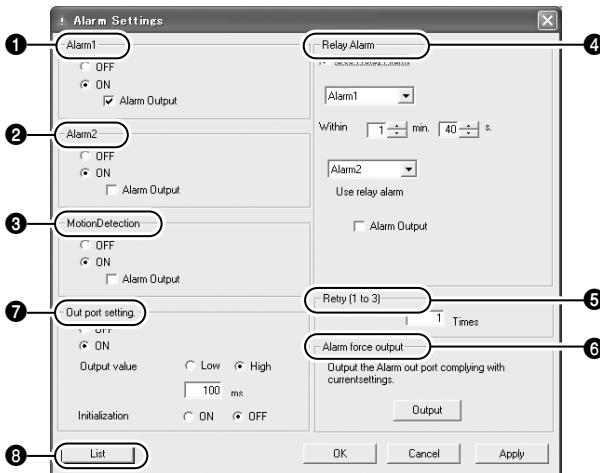
Alarm input is activated in the following cases.

- Input signals are received from an input terminal located on the rear panel of the camera, [ALARM INPUT 1] or [ALARM INPUT 2]. (☞ Page 16)
- Motion has been detected. (☞ Page 30)

Operation when alarm input is activated.

- Output signals are sent from the output terminal located on the rear panel of the camera, [ALARM OUTPUT]. (☞ Page 17)
- Alarm information is reported to [V.Networks Controller.] (☞ Page 29)
- Alarm Images are recorded. (☞ Page 32)

1. Start up [V.Networks Setup Tool] and select [Alarm].



2. When the setting is complete, select [Apply] and then .

2-4 Other Settings with V.Networks Setup Tool [2. Alarm Setting] (continued)

1 Alarm 1

Select [ON] to convert signals input to the [ALARM INPUT 1] terminal to [Alarm 1] signals.

If [Alarm Output] is selected, alarm signals are sent to the [ALARM OUTPUT] terminal according to the output port setting.

2 Alarm 2

Select [ON] to convert signals input to the [ALARM INPUT 2] terminal to [Alarm 2] signals.

If [Alarm Output] is selected, alarm signals are sent to the [ALARM OUTPUT] terminal according to the output port setting.

3 Motion Detection

Select [ON] for motion within the set area to be recognized as a cause for an alarm.

If [Alarm Output] is selected, alarm signals are sent to the [ALARM OUTPUT] terminal according to the output port setting.

4 Relay Alarm

Select here to enable the alarm function, which is activated when two alarms are successively received within a certain period of time.

The sequence and interval of alarm input can be set.

If [Alarm Output] is selected, alarm signals are sent to the [ALARM OUTPUT] terminal according to the output port setting.

Note

- A second alarm input enables this relay alarm function, and alarm will not be activated for this second input.
- Unless the alarm output is enabled, this function is not activated even if [Alarm Output] of the [Alarm Settings] screen is selected.

5 Retry [1 to 3]

This function sets how many times an alarm alert to [V.Networks Controller] is repeated (1 to 3).

Note

Depending on the LAN environment, alarm alert might fail. If it fails, set the value to "3". In such a case, alarm by [V.Networks Controller] itself is set off only once.

6 Alarm force output

If [Output] is pressed, alarm signals are sent to the [ALARM OUTPUT] terminal. This forced output is used for checking the alarm function.

7 Out port setting

Enable this function to output alarm signals to the [ALARM OUTPUT] terminal.

Using output values, set the polarity, high or low, and output time (1 to 5000 ms) according to the equipment connected.

If initialization is set to start, the set alarm signal is output once when the power is turned on.

8 List

Press here to show the IP addresses of the PCs to which alarm input is reported. To delete an IP address, select the address and press [Delete].

Note

- If more than 10 destinations are set, this function is not activated.


2-4 Other Settings with V.Networks Setup Tool [3. Motion Detection Setting]

This section describes the setting of the motion detection function which enables VN-C10 to trigger an alarm when motion is detected in a specified area. Motion is monitored while being compared to the reference image. The area within which the function is effective can be set in the following procedure.

(This function cannot be set for MPEG4.)

1. Start up [V.Networks Setup Tool]. Select [Alarm] and then enable [Motion Detection Alarm].
(☞ Page 28 [Alarm Setting])

2. Select [Motion Detect] of [V.Networks Setup Tool].



① Select the desired monitoring area by clicking and holding down the left button of the mouse and dragging it. The selected area is displayed in yellow. Click the right button of the mouse and, while holding it down, drag the mouse to cancel a monitoring area.

The area in which motion has been detected is displayed in red.

② The [Detail] button is used for more detailed settings.

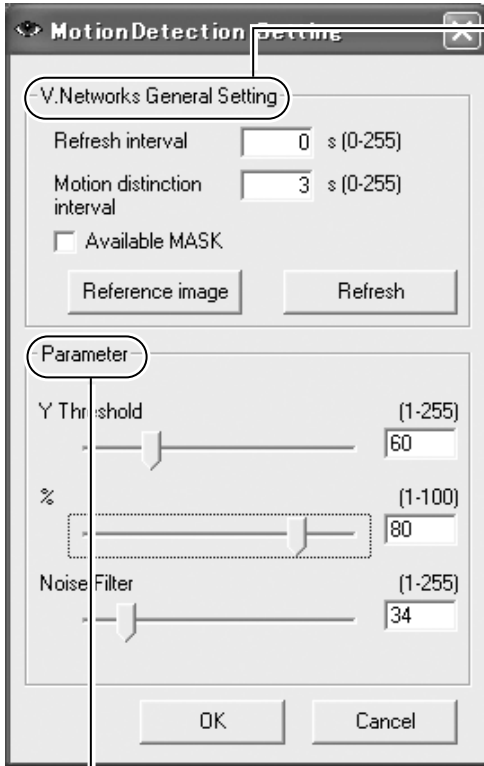
Note

- A selected area is only for reference. To ensure accuracy, perform operation check.
- One screen is divided in 300 (20x15) blocks. Adjust magnification of the lens so that the monitoring area (object) covers more than one block.

Caution

The motion detection function is not designed to prevent burglary or fire. It may not function properly depending on the condition of the object or settings described in this document. In no case, shall JVC be liable for any accidents and/or damage caused.

3. Press [Detail] to display [Motion Detection Setting].



V.Networks General Setting

Refresh Interval

The reference image on which motion detection is based is refreshed at a regular interval. In a condition where the reference image changes, like outdoors, set a low value.

Note

With the interval set to "0 second," the reference image is automatically refreshed if a motion is not detected for 10 seconds.

Motion Distinction Interval

This is for setting the minimum duration of time for which the object being monitored must move to be recognized as "motion." If the object is slow moving, the time should be longer to avoid detection errors.

Available MASK

Areas outside the one already set for motion detection (displayed in yellow) can also be selected.

Reference Image

For checking the reference image. The screen below is displayed.

Refresh

Press this button to refresh the reference image.

Parameters

Y Threshold

A smaller value allows motion detection even if the difference of brightness with the reference image is insignificant.

%

Set to a smaller value if the moving object is not large enough and cannot be detected.

Noise Filter

Set to a larger value to reduce noise in the whole image.



Updates the reference image.

If this is selected, the reference image is automatically refreshed at a designated interval.

2-4 Other Settings with V.Networks Setup Tool [4. Recording Setting]

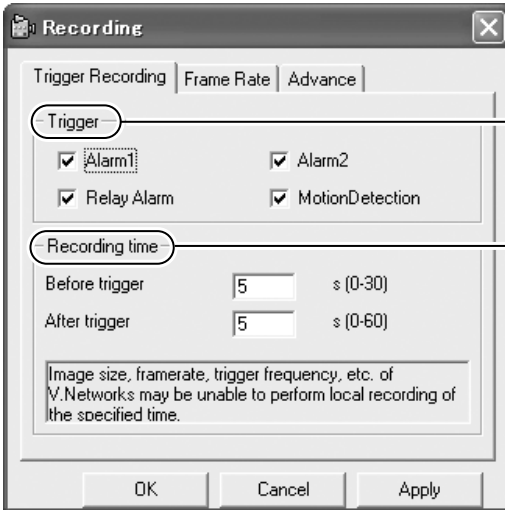
This function records the image to the memory of VN-C10 when an alarm is activated. (This cannot be set for MPEG4.)

- When an alarm is activated, image recording can be carried out in one of the following two ways. One way, local recording, saves images to the VN-C10 memory, and the other records images with [V.Networks Controller] and saves them to the PC hard disc drive, etc. (Page 51)

1. Start up [V.Networks Setup Tool] and select [Recording].

To make new values effective, press [Apply] and then .

Trigger Recording



① For selecting the record starting trigger, the alarm input signal to start local recording.

② For setting the recording time. Up to 60 seconds can be set both before and after an alarm input.

Caution

- If the value for before a trigger is set to "0," set a different value for after the trigger. Both values cannot be set to "0" at the same time.
- Because of the memory capacity of VN-C10, the setting times before and after a trigger and the actual maximum recording time are not the same.

Example:

- If 160x120 (30 fps)/320x240 (15 fps)/640x480 (5 fps) with a compression rate of 2, the actual recording time is 5 to 0 and 30 to 35 seconds, before and after a trigger respectively.
- For the maximum recording (30 before and 60 seconds after a trigger), perform the setting as follows:
Image size : 160x120
Frame rate : 30 fps
Compression rate : 7

2. Frame Rate



③ For setting the frame rate for local recording, select [Change the Recording FrameRate during trigger recording] and set the frame rate (30, 15, 10, 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 or 1). The default value is 30 fps.

3. Others



- ④ Set the recording action when the memory capacity for recording has become full. One of the following two can be selected. (The internal memory capacity is 8 MB.)
- Stop recording until a free memory space for recording is created.
 - Delete files older than the designated number of days. (If the number of days is set to “0,” the files are deleted, starting with the oldest one.)

Note

Recording time

- While maximum recording time varies depending on the recording frame rate and image size, recording may not be possible for a desired length of time because of other factors such as the compression rate and the object quality.

Recording files

- A trigger-recording file is created each time a trigger occurs. Even if triggering keeps occurring and recording continues, only one file will be created for each trigger.

Caution

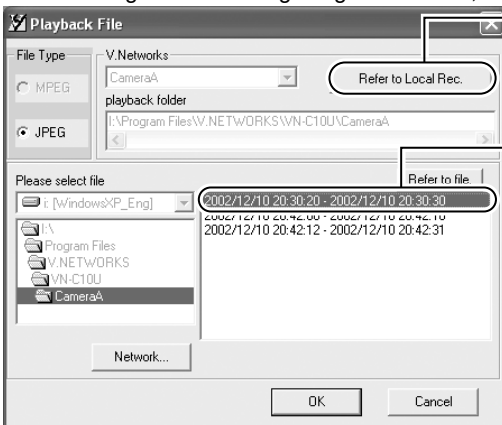
Saving images of local recording to the PC

As local recording images are saved to the VN-C10 volatile memory, the images are deleted if the power is turned off.

Rec files that were locally recorded can also be automatically uploaded to an FTP server. (Page 34 “Rec File FTP”)

With recording by [V.Networks Controller], with which images are saved to the PC hard disk drive, etc., saved files can be retained even if the power is turned off.

For saving local recording images to the PC, follow the procedure below.



- ① Select [Refer to Local Rec].
- ② Select the file to save it to the PC.
- ③ Right-click the file to select [Download to PC].

By selecting desired items in [Trigger] and also performing necessary settings for [Message], etc. in [Alarm Setting], you can be certain whether or not local recording has already started. (Page 51)

2-4 Other Settings with V.Networks Setup Tool [5. FTP Client Setting]

VN-C10 is equipped with an FTP client function which regularly uploads still images to an existing FTP server, thus enabling simultaneous image monitoring at many places and by many people.

(This function cannot be set for MPEG4.)

1. Start up [V.Networks Setup Tool] and select [FTP Setting]. The [FTP Setting] screen is displayed.

To use the FTP function, select [Available].

2 Rec File FTP

Select [Available] if locally recorded *.rec files are to be uploaded to an FTP server automatically.

Note

- Uploading automatically starts when a rec file was created.
- Delete Rec file according to the [Lower memory size] setting of the Record setting screen.
- When the built-in memory size of the main unit is not enough to create a Rec file, [Rec file FTP] can not be set. When [Rec file FTP] is available, it is recommended that the [Lower memory size] be set to [remove old files 0 days].
- While uploading a Rec file, uploading of still images temporarily stops.

3 User Name

Enter the user name to use for verification with the FTP server. It can be “anonymous.”

4 Password

Enter the password to use for verification with the FTP server. The password is displayed as asterisks (*).

5 FTP Server IP Address

Enter the IP address of the upload destination FTP server.

6 FTP Port

Enter the FTP port number of the upload destination. This is normally set to “21.”

7 FTP Folder

Enter the folder name on the upload destination FTP server. If this box is left blank, images are uploaded to the default folder.

8 Upload Interval

Specify the upload interval at which images are uploaded to the FTP server.

(0 to 84600 seconds)

If [Disconnect every time] is selected, connection with the FTP server is cut after an image was uploaded.

9 Error Recovery

(Connection error)

Specify a recovery action when an error occurred for TCP connection or FTP verification of VN-C10.

Retry forever : Recovery attempt is repeated until the power for VN-C10 is turned off.

*min. Retry : Recovery attempt is repeated for a specified period (*1 to 600 minutes).

(Transfer error)

Select a recovery action when a transfer error occurred in uploading an image.

FTP Disabled: The FTP function is automatically disabled.

Note

To enable the function again, select [Available] for [FTP].

10 Filename

*.jpg : If this file type is selected, uploading is performed with the entered file name.

Note

Only one image file is stored in the FTP server as files are overwritten with the latest one.

Time stamp : Files are uploaded with the time of the built-in clock as their file names.

Note

- Set the correct time in the [Time Setting] screen.
- All uploaded image files are stored in the FTP server.

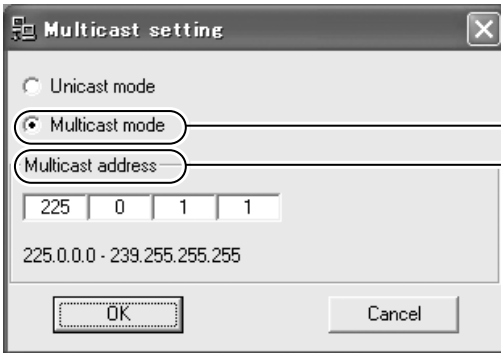
Preparations (Step 2 Setting the Network)

2-4 Other Settings with V.Networks Setup Tool [6. Multicast]

Selecting [Multicast Mode] allows VN-C10 to send the same image data to multiple recipients on the network at one time without lowering the frame rate.

- In a narrowband environment, for example, of dial-up connection, select [Unicast Mode].
- Multicast cannot be set for MPEG4.

1. Start up [V.Networks Setup Tool] and select [Multicast]. The [Multicast Setting] screen is displayed.



① Select [Multicast Mode].

② Enter a multicast address to [Multicast address].

Multicast

- A multicast address can be set from 225.0.0.0 through 239.255.255.255. Do not set the same multicast address for different devices on the same system.
- To view VN-C10 images in the multicast mode through a router, an operating environment or a router setting is required as follows:
 - ① The router supports IGMP Ver. 2 and is synchronized with the starting and stopping of multicast transmission. And the route setting can be dynamically changed.
 - ② If the router does not support IGMP Ver. 2, a static route for multicast must be set to the router.

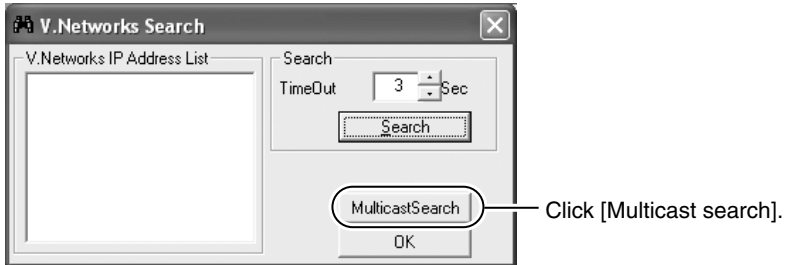

- With MPEG4, up to 4 clients can be connected at one time. If 5 or more clients are connected, the message “The VN-C10U has not start the Streaming Service.” appears.
- In the MPEG4 mode with the frame rate set to 30 fps, image noise may appear momentarily depending on the condition of the object. This is not a defect.

2-4 Other Settings with V.Networks Setup Tool [8. Memory Capacity]

Memory capacity can be checked.

1. Start up [V.Networks Setup Tool] and for the compression format, select [JPEG] or [MPEG4].




① Check the free memory space. The memory capacity of VN-C10 is 8000 kB.

2-4 Other Settings with V.Networks Setup Tool [9. Web]

An HTML file can be set as the default page of the web browser.

1. Start up [V.Networks Setup Tool] and select [Web].



① Select whether to enable the setting of the HTTP default page. If [Available] is selected, specify an html file for the default page.

② Set the port number.

③ There are a few types of proxy server that caches CGI and the above setting cannot be properly done. In such a case, select [No Cache].

Caution

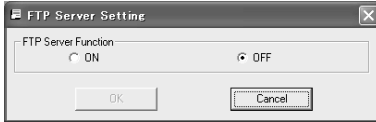
- It is possible to enhance the level of security by changing the default port number (80) of VN-C10 HTTP server (1 through 65535 excluding 21 and 554). With this number changed, it can be accessed with a Web browser by entering “http://192.168.0.2:12345” or “http://192.168.0.2:12345/index-e.html” (in the case of the port number, 12345). If you have forgotten the port number, refer to [Setup Tool].
- The default page refers to the page displayed when the IP address is specified (for example, “http://192.168.0.2/”) in a Web browser. Even with this function enabled, if the specified file does not exist, the message, “404: Not Found” will be displayed when “http://192.168.0.2/” is entered.

Preparations (Step 2 Setting the Network)

2-4 Other Settings with V.Networks Setup Tool [10. FTP Server]

Using FTP client software, HTML pages, GIF and JPEG images can be uploaded.

1. Start up [V.Networks Setup Tool] and select [FTP Server].



Select whether to enable or disable the FTP server function.

Note

- The FTP server name is fixed to [Administrator] and also use the password for the administrator.
- For the FTP user area, approximately 300 kB are allotted.
- All uploaded folders are stored directly under the [user] folder. It can be accessed as in “http://192.168.0.2/user/aaa.html” with a Web browser. (“192.168.0.2” denotes the VN-C10 IP address when “aaa.html” is referred to.)
- Folders cannot be created in the VN-C10 FTP server. Only uploading, deleting and renaming of files are possible.

2-4 Other Settings with V.Networks Setup Tool [11. Time Setting]

This section describes how to set the standard time for VN-C10. NTP can be used for this function.

1. Start up [V.Networks Setup Tool] and select [Time].

There are two ways to set the time, with or without NTP.

NTP is not used.

- ① Set the date and time.
- ② The time by the PC clock can be checked.

NTP is used.

- ① Enter the IP address of the NTP server.
- ② Set the time zone.
- ③ Set the interval at which the current time is obtained from the NTP server.

Note

- An NTP server is required for the NTP setting.
- If the time setting is changed while local recording is in progress, the local recording time may not be properly counted. Thus, recording for the specified seconds may not be obtained.
- We recommend using an FTP server. Without it, the time returns to the initial value, January 1, 1900, when the power is turned off. In a situation wherein an FTP server cannot be used, set the time appropriately when the power is turned on again.
- With Windows XP Home Edition and Windows XP Professional, NTP sever functions become enabled when they are installed in the standard procedure.
- For Windows 2000, follow the procedure below to enable NTP server functions.

1. Set the value for the following registry to "1." (The default value is "0.")

HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SYSTEM\CurrentControlSet\Services\W32Time\Parameters\LocalNTP

Registry editing is a highly risky operation.

Safety measures should be taken beforehand, e.g. creating registry backups. JVC shall not be held liable for any loss caused by registry editing.


2. Restart the Windows Time Service.

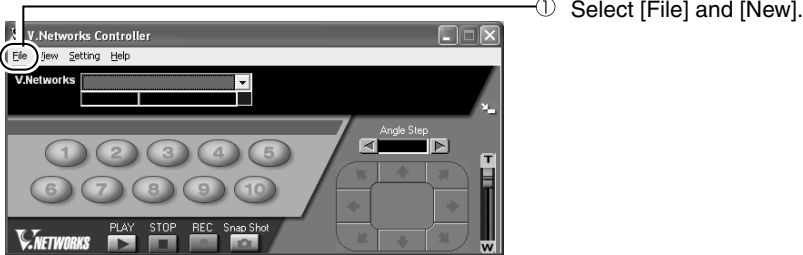

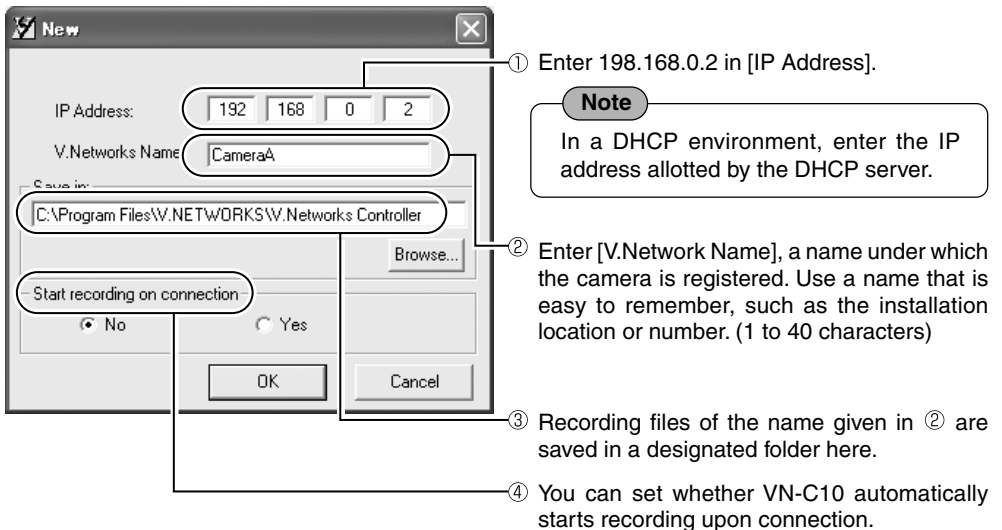
2-5 Registering the Connected Camera with V.Networks Controller

For connecting VN-C10 with the factory settings, either one of the environments described below is required.

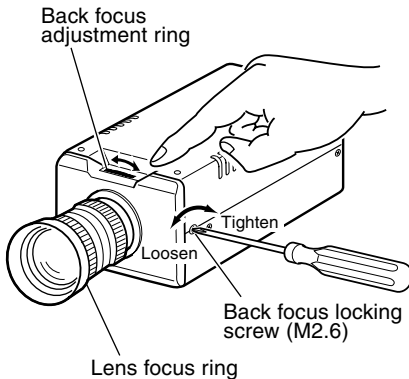
- Environment where no DHCP server exists.
- Environment where a DHCP server, which clearly defines the IP address and MAC address allotted to VN-C10, exists.

Preparations (Step 3 Adjusting the Camera)

3-1 Back-focus Adjustment

At the factory, back-focus is set at the point for the widest range of use for CS-mount. However, it is necessary to readjust back focus if a zoom or C-mount lens is used or if focus cannot be attained using the focus ring of the lens. To adjust, follow the procedures described below.

In order to adjust back-focus appropriately, use the iris adjustment function and an ND filter to release the lens iris before proceeding with the adjustment. (An ND filter acts to reduce the overall amount of light entering the lens equally over all wavelengths.)



<For a fixed-focus lens>

If focus cannot be attained using the focus ring of the lens, adjust the back-focus as follows.

1. Loosen the back-focus lock screw by turning it counterclockwise with a Phillips screwdriver.
2. Aim the camera at the object or a spot of detail somewhere away from the object while checking the image on the PC screen.
3. Turn the focus ring to ∞ .
4. Turn the back-focus adjustment ring to optimize the focus.
5. Tighten the back-focus lock screw securely by turning it clockwise.

<For a zoom lens>


If the image gets out of focus when zoomed in/out, adjust the camera as follows:

1. Loosen the back-focus locking screw by turning it counterclockwise with a Phillips screwdriver.
2. Aim the camera at the object or a spot of detail somewhere away from the object while checking the image on the PC screen.
3. Zoom in the lens and adjust the focus by turning the focus ring.
4. Zoom out the lens and adjust the focus by turning the focus ring.
5. Repeat steps 3 and 4 a few times.
6. Tighten the back-focus locking screw securely by turning it clockwise.

Operations (Step 4 Setting with V.Networks Controller)

4-1 Starting Up V.Networks Controller

With the installed Controller, camera images can be monitored. The settings for recording, replay and frame rate etc. can also be performed.

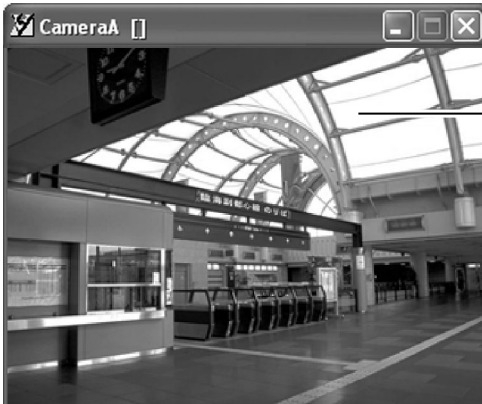
1. Select [Start], [Programs], [V.NETWORKS] and then  [V.Networks Controller] to start up [V.Networks Controller].



- ① In the pull down menu, select the camera to connect.

Caution

After the power for VN-C10 is turned on, there will be about 20 seconds until VN-C10 becomes ready to be connected with the PC. This is not a defect.



- ② Live images from the camera are displayed.

Note

- If a password has been set, enter the correct password.
- This [Controller] can be connected to VN-C1, VN-C2, VN-C3, VN-C30 (only for JPEG), VN-A1 and VN-C10.
- In the MPEG4 mode, up to 4 clients can be connected at one time. If 5 or more clients are connected, the message "The VN-C10U has not start the Streaming Service." appears.

4-2 Function Settings with V.Networks Controller

With [V.Networks Controller], settings for image size, alarm etc. can be performed.



1 File

- New : Creates a new file if the camera is connected for the first time.
- Delete : Deletes a file.
- Motion Detect Standby : For selecting the camera for which motion detection is enabled.
- Exit : Exits "Controller."

2 View

- Image Size : Sets the image display size.

BLC : Back light compensation. When there is a bright light source in the background of the object, VN-C10 adjusts the weighted zone.

Note

- AES cannot be turned on when AGC is set to [OFF].
- AES cannot be turned on if the shutter speed is set to [1/100].
- BLC cannot be turned on when AGC is set to [OFF].

Returns all values, except that for iris level, for image quality to those set at the factory.

7 Iris level

Brightness adjustment for a DC IRIS lens. A smaller value makes images darker, closing the iris.

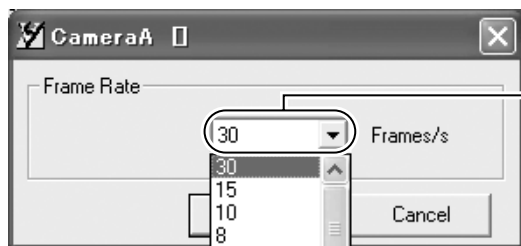

Sets the maximum number of images per minute that are sent from VN-C10. This value is set to “15” at the factory.

Note

The actual number of frames received and displayed per second is affected by factors such as the PC performance and the image compression rate as well as the LAN environment. In the case of a LAN environment where multiple operations are being performed at one time (particularly where the network traffic is always heavy), reduce the number of frames to be transmitted.

Caution

Frame rate for local recording cannot be set with [V.Networks Controller]. It is only possible with [V.Networks Setup Tool]. (Page 32)

4-7 Alarm Setting

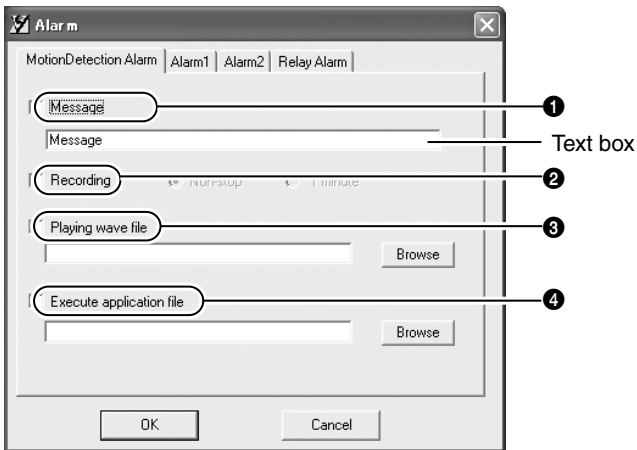
With [V.Networks Controller], it is possible to set the action to be taken upon reception of an alarm signal.

Settings are performed for [Motion Detection Alarm], [Alarm 1], [Alarm 2] and [Relay Alarm].

4-7 Alarm Setting (continued)

① Message

When an alarm is received, the message entered into the text box is displayed. The maximum number of characters that can be entered is 100.

② Recording

Stop 1min : Recording stops after 1 minute.

- The [Stop 1min] mode is for conserving the hard disk space.
- In this mode, recording stops after 1 minute even if recording has already started before the alarm input.

③ Playing wave file

When an alarm is received, a specified Wave file is replayed. Press the [Browse] button to specify a Wave file.

Note

If a large Wave file (.wav) is selected, the alarm operation may become slow depending on the PC performance.

④ Execute application file

When an alarm is received, a specified program is executed. Press the [Browse] button to specify a program.

Note

Alarm Operation

The following settings are required for the operation of the alarm that has been set.

1. [Alarm Reg] is enabled in the [Setting] menu of the [V.Networks Controller.] (☞ Page 45)
2. Each alarm setting in [Alarm Setting] of [V.Networks Setup Tool] is enabled. (☞ Page 28)

Relay Alarm

When the relay alarm function is enabled, subsequent alarms will not be activated.

4-8 Time Stamp

With [V.Networks Controller], the [Time Stamp] function can be set. This function displays the date and time on the camera images, and the date and time are recorded.

1. Select [Setting] and [Time Stamp].



2. Proceed with the setting.

① Select [Visible].

② Select the display style in [Style].
“YYYY,” “MM,” and “DD” represent “year,” “month” and “day” respectively.
“HH” represents “hour” while “MM,” “minute,” “SS,” “second” and “mm,” “millisecond.”

③ Click [Font...] to select the font.

④ Set the text color in [TextColor].

⑤ Set the background color in [BackColor].

⑥ Click .

Note

- With MPEG4, ③, ④ and ⑤ cannot be set.
- By left-clicking the mouse while holding down the [shift] key on the moving image or playback window screen, the time stamp will appear where the mouse was clicked.
- Time stamp in the MPEG4 mode is shown in the title bar of the image window.

Other viewer software

- Still-image files saved with VN-C10 can be viewed with general viewer software. However, images inverted by VN-C10 will not be displayed as such. Also, image color may also be different.

Operations (Step 6 Operations with a Web Browser)

It is possible to view still/moving images and perform various settings via not only the provided [Controller] software but via a Web browser as well.

However, note that MPEG4 files cannot be viewed with a browser. Also, the browser does not support the image inversion function.

6-1 Required Operating Environment

The following environment is required for viewing and operating VN-C10 with a Web browser. **It is necessary for the PC to satisfy the technical requirements described in this instruction manual (☞ Page 7).**

The PC must also satisfy the following Web browser conditions:

- A Web browser compatible with JavaScript and frame, that is, Netscape Ver. 4.x or Internet Explorer Vers. 4.x, 5.x and 6.x.
- For the recommended CPU performance and required memory capacity, refer to the Web browser in use.

For smooth display of large-screen moving images, specifications much better than those recommended are necessary.

Images from the camera will not be displayed properly in the 256-color mode.

- For Internet Explorer, an environment where Java can be properly run (Microsoft VM) is required.

LAN Environment

- VN-C10 can work as a web server that uses HTTP. Access linkage using a host name is possible if the environment supports DNS (Domain Name System).
- A direct connection of VN-C10 to a PC is possible using a cross-over cable. (Though rare, certain LAN boards do not allow the use of a cross-over cable. Be sure to check your LAN board.)

Note

Web page images

Web page images shown in this document refer to Web page data within VN-C10, including images captured by the VN-C10 camera and displayed by a Web browser.

Depending on the type and settings of the Web browser, the page format and character fonts of the displayed Web pages may vary. Should the page contents fail to be displayed in total, try resizing the window, etc.

The illustrations in this manual are obtained from Internet Explorer display screens.

For Internet Explorer

- After the password has been changed, the password authentication window may ask for the password twice. In this case, enter the same password twice.

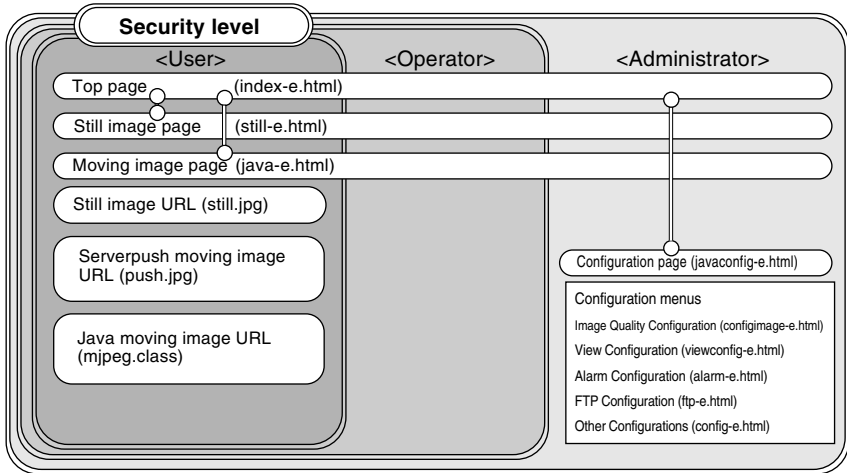
For Netscape Navigator

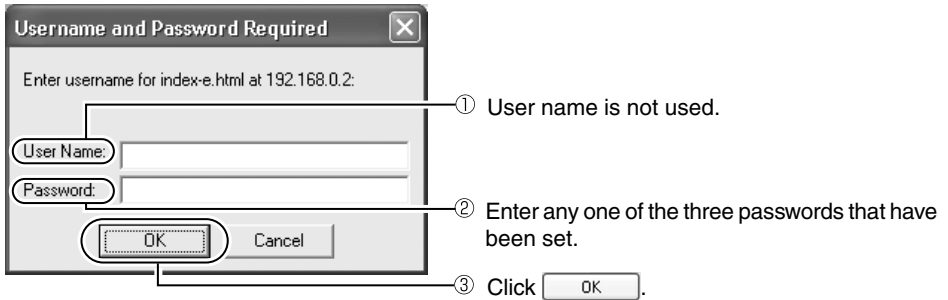

File name	Specify the file name of an image to be uploaded.
*.jpg	Uploading is performed with the file name entered here. * Only one image file remains in the FTP server as files have the same file name. (The latest image file overwrites.)
Time Stamp	The current time, obtained from the NTP server, is used as the file name for uploading in the form of “YYYY-MM-DD-HH-MM-SS-mmm”. * As each file has a unique name for uploading, all image files uploaded remain in the FTP server.
Username	Enter the user name (up to 16 characters) to be used for verification with the FTP server.

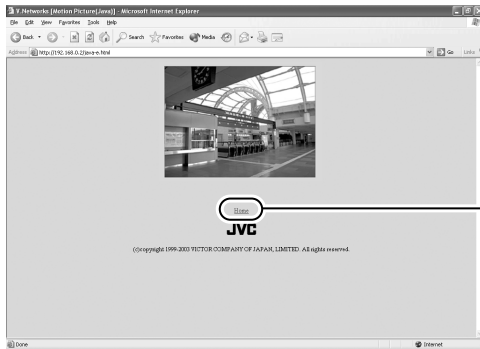

6-7 VN-C10 Image Link

VN-C10 output images can be pasted onto separately created web pages – Images (still and moving) captured with VN-C10 can be incorporated and displayed on a user-created web page.

Note

Images cannot be displayed when VN-C10 is in the MPEG4 mode.

Displaying a Moving Image:

A moving image can either be in the Serverpush or Java format.

It is necessary to choose the image type or adjust the content description of the web page according to its compatibility with the web browser in use.

Display in Serverpush

By creating a web page with the following description, you can display a moving image in Netscape Navigator that supports Serverpush.

Display in Java Applet

By creating a web page with the following description, you can display a moving image (Java applet) in Internet Explorer, etc. that supports Java.

Note

- The images (both still and moving) are displayed according to the size and compression rate already set. If Java is disabled in the Web browser, images may not be displayed correctly.
- If a password has been set, prior password authentication is necessary before Java Applet can be displayed (an Internet Explorer restriction).
- The values of "WIDTH" and "HEIGHT" should be identical to those of the image size setting of VN-C10.
- If the browser version used is older than Netscape Ver. 4.06, it is required to update the Java Plug-in version to 1.1 or higher in order to browse moving images. Java Plug-in is available in Web sites such as "http://java.sun.com/getjava/" etc.

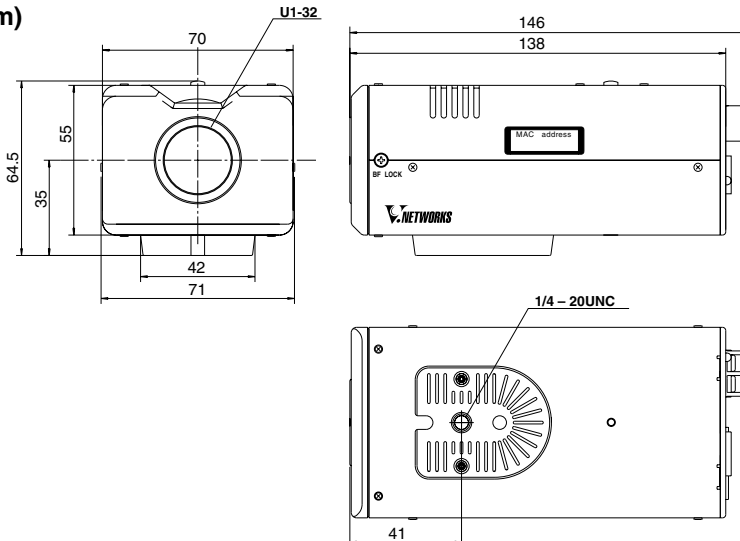
