# Safety Precautions

The following safety precautions should be observed before using this product and any associated instrumentation. Although some instruments and accessories would normally be used with non-hazardous voltages, there are situations where hazardous conditions may be present.

This product is intended for use by qualified personnel who recognize shock hazards and are familiar with the safety precautions required to avoid possible injury. Read the operating information carefully before using the product.

The types of product users are:

**Responsible body** is the individual or group responsible for the use and maintenance of equipment, for ensuring that the equipment is operated within its specifications and operating limits, and for ensuring that operators are adequately trained.

**Operators** use the product for its intended function. They must be trained in electrical safety procedures and proper use of the instrument. They must be protected from electric shock and contact with hazardous live circuits.

**Maintenance personnel** perform routine procedures on the product to keep it operating, for example, setting the line voltage or replacing consumable materials. Maintenance procedures are described in the manual. The procedures explicitly state if the operator may perform them. Otherwise, they should be performed only by service personnel.

**Service personnel** are trained to work on live circuits, and perform safe installations and repairs of products. Only properly trained service personnel may perform installation and service procedures.

Exercise extreme caution when a shock hazard is present. Lethal voltage may be present on cable connector jacks or test fixtures. The American National Standards Institute (ANSI) states that a shock hazard exists when voltage levels greater than 30V RMS, 42.4V peak, or 60VDC are present. A good safetypracticeistoexpectthathazardousvoltageis present in any unknown circuit before measuring. Users of this product must be protected from electric shock at all times. The responsible body must ensure that users are prevented access and/or insulated from every connection point. In some cases, connections must be exposed to potential human contact. Product users in these circumstances must be trained to protect themselves from the risk of electric shock. If the circuit is capable of operating at or above 1000 volts, **no conductive part of the circuit may be exposed**.

As described in the International Electrotechnical Commission (IEC) Standard IEC 664, digital multimeter measuring circuits (e.g., Keithley Models 175A, 199, 2000, 2001, 2002, and 2010) are Installation Category II. All other instruments' signal terminals are Installation Category I and must not be connected to mains.

Do not connect switching cards directly to unlimited power circuits. They are intended to be used with impedance limited sources. NEVER connect switching cards directly to AC mains. When connecting sources to switching cards, install protective devices to limit fault current and voltage to the card.

Before operating an instrument, make sure the line cord is connected to a properly grounded power receptacle. Inspect the connecting cables, test leads, and jumpers for possible wear, cracks, or breaks before each use.

For maximum safety, do not touch the product, test cables, or any other instruments while power is applied to the circuit under test. ALWAYS remove power from the entire test system and discharge any capacitors before: connecting or disconnecting cables or jumpers, installing or removing switching cards, or making internal changes, such as installing or removing jumpers.

Do not touch any object that could provide a current path to the common side of the circuit under test or power line (earth) ground. Always make measurements with dry hands while standing on a dry, insulated surface capable of withstanding the voltage being measured.

The instrument and accessories must be used in accordance with its specifications and operating instructions or the safety of the equipment may be impaired. Do not exceed the maximum signal levels of the instruments and accessories, as defined in the specifications and operating information, and as shown on the instrument or test fixture panels, or switching card.

When fuses are used in a product, replace with same type and rating for continued protection against fire hazard.

Chassis connections must only be used as shield connections for measuring circuits, NOT as safety earth ground connections.

If you are using a test fixture, keep the lid closed while power is applied to the device under test. Safe operation requires the use of a lid interlock.

If a  $(\stackrel{\frown}{=})$  screw is present, connect it to safety earth ground using the wire recommended in the user documentation.

The <u>symbol</u> symbol on an instrument indicates that the user should refer to the operating instructions located in the manual.

The symbol on an instrument shows that it can source or measure 1000 volts or more, including the combined effect of normal and common mode voltages. Use standard safety precautions to avoid personal contact with these voltages.

The **WARNING** heading in a manual explains dangers that might result in personal injury or death. Always read the associated information very carefully before performing the indicated procedure.

The **CAUTION** heading in a manual explains hazards that could damage the instrument. Such damage may invalidate the warranty.

Instrumentation and accessories shall not be connected to humans.

Before performing any maintenance, disconnect the line cord and all test cables.

To maintain protection from electric shock and fire, replacement components in mains circuits, including the power transformer, test leads, and input jacks, must be purchased from Keithley Instruments. Standard fuses, with applicable national safety approvals, may be used if the rating and type are the same. Other components that are not safety related may be purchased from other suppliers as long as they are equivalent to the original component. (Note that selected parts should be purchased only through Keithley Instruments to maintain accuracy and functionality of the product.) If you are unsure about the applicability of a replacement component, call a Keithley Instruments office for information.

To clean an instrument, use a damp cloth or mild, water based cleaner. Clean the exterior of the instrument only. Do not apply cleaner directly to the instrument or allow liquids to enter or spill on the instrument. Products that consist of a circuit board with no case or chassis (e.g., data acquisition board for installation into a computer) should never require cleaning if handled according to instructions. If the board becomes contaminated and operation is affected, the board should be returned to the factory for proper cleaning/servicing.

This quick reference guide includes summary information on front panel and IEEE-488 operation for the Model 7002 Switch System. For detailed information, consult the Model 7002 Instruction Manual.

## **Operation Summary**

### Card type

On power-up, the Model 7002 detects Model 701X series cards that are installed and automatically configures itself for proper operation. Non-701X series card are not detected by the Model 7002. The model number of each non-701X series card must be assigned to the slot that it is installed in.

The TYPE selection in the CARD CONFIG MENU allows you to check and/or change the card type assignment for each slot:

Press: CARD CONFIGURATION Select: TYPE SLOT-#1 through SLOT-#10

Use the cursor keys (  $\blacktriangleleft$  and  $\blacktriangleright$ ) to check card type assignment for any slot. To change a slot assignment, select the slot, use the cursor keys to change the card type and press ENTER.

An empty slot can be used as a simulator by assigning it the model number 9990 (40-channel multiplexer) or 9991 (4  $\times$  10 matrix).

### Light pen option

Point and click programming using the light pen provides an easy and fast method to enter channels into the channel list and scan list. You simply point the pen at the appropriate channel LED and press the button on the barrel. Control LEDs are also provided to perform other operations using the light pen. Most of these LEDs simply perform the same operations as their front panel key counterparts.

The light pen is operational when it is plugged into the front panel receptacle labeled LIGHT PEN.

#### **Display modes**

There are two basic display modes for the Model 7002; the relay status display mode and the list display mode. The VFD messages for the display modes are shown as follows:

Relay Status Display Mode	List Display Mode
RELAY STATUS	CHANNEL LIST DISPLAY or SCAN LIST DISPLAY

In addition to the basic display modes, you can also control the LED Graticule. Disbling the LED Graticule eliminates the dimly lit state for LEDs. LEDs are either off or brightly lit. See LED Graticule Control for more details.

#### Relay status display mode

In this display mode, the channel LEDs indicate the status (open or closed) of each channel. Table 1 summarizes the significance of the channel LEDs in this display mode.

Use the relay status display mode when closing/opening or scanning channels so that you can monitor the real-time state of each switch in your system.

#### List display mode

In this display mode, the channel LEDs indicate which channels are included in the selected list (channel list or scan list). Table 1 summarizes the significance of the channel LEDs in this display mode.

If you use this display mode when creating a list, be sure to return to the relay status display mode so that you can monitor the real-time state (on or off) of each available channel in your switch system.

#### Changing the display mode

The display mode can be changed through the MAIN MENU:

Press:	MENU	
Select:	GENERAL	
Select:	DISPLAY	
Select:	SHOW-LIST	
	RELAY-STATUS	CURRENT-LIST

RELAY STATUS selects the Relay Status Display Mode and CURRENT LIST selects the List Display Mode (see Menu Structures).

The display mode can also be changed by using the optional light pen. To toggle the display mode, simply click the SHOW LIST LED.

### LED graticule control

LED Graticule control allows you to increase contrast between on and off LEDs by eliminating the dimly lit state for LEDs. With the LED Graticule disabled (off), LEDs will be either off or brightly lit. Table 1 explains the significance of the channel LEDs for the two graticule modes.

LED Graticule control is performed from the MAIN MENU as follows:

Press:	MENU
Select:	GENERAL
Select:	DISPLAY
Select:	GRATCULE-CONTROL
	ON OFF

Select OFF to disable the LED Graticule or ON to enable it.

#### Default configurations

From the front panel, default configurations are accessed from the MAIN MENU. Refer to Menu Structures for additional information on using the MAIN MENU.

**RESET** — The RESET default conditions are listed in Table 5. RESET is performed from the SAVESETUP selection in the MAIN MENU as follows:

Press:	MENU
Select:	SAVESETUP
Select:	RESET

**Factory Defaults** — The instrument will return to the factory default conditions listed in Table 5 on power-up if the Power-On Default is set for Factory Default as follows:

Press:	MENU
Select:	SAVESETUP
Select:	PWRON
Select:	FACTORY-DEFAULT

**User Saved Defaults** — Up to ten setup configurations can be saved for future recall. The save and restore operations are performed from the SAVESETUP selection in the MAIN MENU as follows:

Press:	MENU	
Select:	SAVESETUP	
	SAVE	RESTORE

Use the SAVE selection to save the setup in a memory location (0-9). Use the RESTORE selection to return the instrument to the configuration saved at the specified memory location.

The instrument will return to user saved defaults on powerup if the Power-On Default is set for User Setup as follows:

Press:	MENU
Select:	SAVESETUP
Select:	PWRON
Select:	USER-SETUP

Use the USER SETUP selection to specify the memory location that contains the saved configuration.

Over the IEEE-488 bus, the following commands can be used to perform the same save and restore operations:

*SAV <nrf></nrf>	Save current setup configura- tion in memory (0 to 9).
*RCL <nrf></nrf>	Restore 7002 to setup config- uration saved at specified memory location (0 to 9).
:SYSTem:POSetup SAVX	Program 7002 to power-on to the setup saved at memory location X (where $X = 0$ to 9).

**Bus Defaults** — Over the IEEE-488 bus, the following commands can be used to return the Model 7002 to default conditions:

*RST	Return 7002 to *RST defaults listed in Table 5.
:SYSTem:PRESet	Return 7002 to :SYSTem: PRESet defaults listed in Table 6.

The Model 7002 can be programmed to power-on to the \*RST or :SYSTem:PRESet defaults by sending one the following commands over the bus:

:SYSTem:POSetup	RST	Power-on to the *RST defaults.
:SYSTem:POSetup	PRESet	Power-on to the :SYSTem: PRESet defaults.

#### **Channel List and Scan List**

A Channel List specifies the channels to be closed or opened, and a Scan List specifies the channels to be scanned. SELECT CHANNELS

SCAN CHANNELS

#### Creating a list

- Select the desired list (Channel List or Scan List). Press the SCAN LIST key or click the SCAN LIST LED to toggle from one list to the other.
- 2. Enter channels into selected list:
  - A. Keypad Method Use the number keys to enter the channel assignment. Press ENTER or ▶ to separate entries or terminate the list. Use the hyphen key (-) to specify a channel range (i.e. 1!1-1!10).
  - B. Light Pen Method Click the corresponding channel LED to enter the channel into the list. Use the hyphen LED (-) to specify a channel range (i.e. 1!1-1!10).

#### **Edit Keys and LEDs:**

Cursor ( $\blacktriangleleft$  and  $\triangleright$ ) — Select a channel entry by positioning the cursor on it.

DELETE - Press (or click) to delete selected entry.

INSERT — Press (or click) INSERT to enable insert function, place cursor at desired location in list and enter channel(s). Press (or click) INSERT a second time to disable insert function.

BACKSPACE — Click this LED to move the cursor to the left and delete the channel entry.

HOME — Click this LED to move the cursor to the beginning of the list.

END — Click this LED to move the cursor to the end of the list.

**IEEE-488 bus commands** — Over the bus, the Channel List is included with the commands to open and close channels (see Closing and Opening Channels). The Scan List is created using the :SCAN <list> command. Examples:

:SCAN (@ 5!4, 5!6, 5!8)

Scan List = channels 4, 6 and 8 of Slot 5.

:SCAN (@ 1!1:1!40)

Scan List = channels 1 through 40 of Slot 1.

#### Closing and opening channels

**CLOSE key or CLOSE LED** — Use to close channels specified in the displayed (selected) Channel List.

**OPEN key or OPEN LED** — Use to open channels specified in the displayed (selected) Channel List.

**OPEN ALL key or OPEN ALL LED** — Use to open all channels.

**IEEE-488 Bus Commands** — Over the bus, the :CLOSe and :OPEN commands are used to control channels. Examples:

:CLOSe (@ 4!1, 4!5) Close channels 1 and 5 of Slot 4.
:OPEN (@ 4!1, 4!5) Open channels 1 and 5 of Slot 4.
:OPEN ALL Open all channels.

#### Scanning channels

Channels are scanned in the order that they are presented in the Scan List. To perform a scan, first program the controlling aspects of the scan (see Table 4), and then press (or click) STEP to take the Model 7002 out of the idle state (ARM indicator on).

Regardless of how the scan is configured, the STEP key (or LED) is always active allowing you to manually step through the scan. The scan can be terminated at any time by pressing (or clicking) OPEN ALL. All closed channels will open and the Model 7002 will return to the idle state (ARM indicator off).

**IEEE-488 bus commands** — Over the bus, a scan is configured using the Trigger Subsystem commands (see Table 16). The following command starts the scan by taking the Model 7002 out of the idle state:

#### :INITiate

The scan can be terminated by sending the following command:

#### :ABORt

All closed channels will open and the Model 7002 will return to the idle state.

### Channel patterns (STORE and RECALL)

Up to 500 channel patterns can be stored in memory. A channel pattern is simply a pattern of open and closed channels.

There are two methods to store a channel pattern. One method is to store an actual open and closed pattern of relays (RELAY PATTERN) and the other method is to store the channel list (CURRENT LIST).

When a RELAY PATTERN is recalled, each channel will assume the state determined by the stored relay pattern. When a CURRENT LIST is recalled, the channels contained in the stored Channel List will close. Channels not included in the list will open.

#### Storing a Relay Pattern:

- 1. Close the desired channels.
- 2. Press STORE and select RELAY PATTERN.
- 3. Key in the memory location (1 to 500) and press ENTER.

#### Storing the Current List:

- 1. Create a Channel List.
- 2. Press STORE and select CURRENT LIST.
- 3. Key in the memory location (1 to 500) and press ENTER.

#### Recalling a channel pattern:

Press RECALL, key in the memory location of the stored channel pattern and press ENTER.

**IEEE-488 bus commands** — Over the bus, the following commands are used to store and recall channel patterns:

:MEMory:SAVE M<num>

Save Relay Pattern at specified memory location; <num> = 1 to 500.

:MEMory:SAVE:LIST <list>, M<num>

Save Current List at specified memory location; <list> = Channel List and <num> = 1 to 500.

:MEMory:RECall M<num>

Recall channel pattern from memory; <num> = 1 to 500.

### Menu Structures

The desired menu is displayed by pressing the appropriate key; MENU, SCAN CONFIGURATION or CARD CON-FIGURATION. Once in a menu structure, place the cursor ( $\blacktriangleleft$  and  $\blacktriangleright$  keys) on the desired selection and press ENTER. Use the keypad to enter parameters. Use the EXIT key to back out of the menu structure and disable the menu.



Figure 1. Standard event status





Figure 2. Operation event status

Figure 3. Questionable event status




Figure 4. Status Byte and Service Request (SRQ)
