## Important Safety Instructions

1. Read these instructions.
2. Keep these instructions.
3. Heed all warnings.
4. Follow all instructions.
5. Do not use this apparatus near water.
6. Clean only with dry cloth.
7. Do not block any ventilation openings. Install in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
8. Do not install near any heat sources such as radiators, heat registers, stoves, or other apparatus (including amplifiers) that produce heat.
9. Do not defeat the safety purpose of the polarized or grounding-type plug. A polarized plug has two blades with one wider than the other. A grounding type plug has two blades and a third grounding prong. The wide blade or the third prong are provided for your safety. If the provided plug does not fit into your outlet, consult an electrician for replacement of the obsolete outlet.
10. Protect the power cord from being walked on or pinched particularly at plugs, convenience receptacles, and the point where they exit from the apparatus.
11. Only use attachments/accessories specified by the manufacturer.
12. Use only with the cart, stand, tripod, bracket, or table specified by the manufacturer, or sold with the apparatus. When a cart is used, use caution when moving the cart/apparatus combination to avoid injury from tip-over.
13. Unplug this apparatus during lightning storms or when unused for long periods of time.
14. Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel. 15. Damage Requiring Service  
Unplug the apparatus from the wall outlet and refer servicing to qualified service personnel under the following conditions:
  - A. When the power-supply cord or plug is damaged,
  - B. If liquid has been spilled, or objects have fallen into the apparatus,
  - C. If the apparatus has been exposed to rain or water,
  - D. If the apparatus does not operate normally by following the operating instructions. 16. Object and Liquid Entry  
Never push objects of any kind into the apparatus through openings as they may touch dangerous voltage points or short-out parts that could result in a fire or electric shock.  
The apparatus shall not be exposed to dripping or splashing and no objects filled with liquids, such as vases shall be placed on the apparatus.  
Don't put candles or other burning objects on top of this unit.



#### 17. Batteries

Always consider the environmental issues and follow local regulations when disposing of batteries.

18. If you install the apparatus in a built-in installation, such as a bookcase or rack, ensure that there is adequate ventilation.  
Leave 20 cm (8") of free space at the top and sides and 10 cm (4") at the rear. The rear edge of the shelf or board above the apparatus shall be set 10 cm (4") away from the rear panel or wall, creating a flue-like gap for warm air to escape.
19. Slots and openings in the cabinet at the sides and underneath are provided for ventilation. To ensure reliable operation and to protect the unit from overheating, these openings must not be blocked or covered. Avoid installation in enclosed spaces such as bookcases unless suitable ventilation is provided.

#### Precautions

Do not place the unit on the furniture that is capable of being tilted by a child and an adult leaning, pulling, standing or climbing on it. A falling unit can cause serious injury or even death.

1. **Recording Copyright**—Unless it's for personal use only, recording copyrighted material is illegal without the permission of the copyright holder.
2. **AC Fuse**—The AC fuse inside the unit is not user-serviceable. If you cannot turn on the unit, contact your Onkyo dealer.
3. **Care**—Occasionally you should dust the unit all over with a soft cloth. For stubborn stains, use a soft cloth dampened with a weak solution of mild detergent and water. Dry the unit immediately afterwards with a clean cloth. Don't use abrasive cloths, thinners, alcohol, or other chemical solvents, because they may damage the finish or remove the panel lettering.
4. **Power**  
**WARNING**  
BEFORE PLUGGING IN THE UNIT FOR THE FIRST TIME, READ THE FOLLOWING SECTION CAREFULLY.  
AC outlet voltages vary from country to country. Make sure that the voltage in your area meets the voltage requirements printed on the unit's rear panel (AC 120 V, 60 Hz).  
The power cord plug is used to disconnect this unit from the AC power source. Make sure that the plug is readily operable (easily accessible) at all times. Pressing the [ON/STANDBY] button to select Standby mode does not fully disconnect from AC power source. If you do not intend to use the unit for an extended period, remove the power cord from the AC outlet.

#### 5. Preventing Hearing Loss

##### Caution

Excessive sound pressure from earphones and headphones can cause hearing loss.

#### 6. Batteries and Heat Exposure

##### Warning

Batteries (battery pack or batteries installed) shall not be exposed to excessive heat as sunshine, fire or the like.

7. **Never Touch this Unit with Wet Hands**—Never handle this unit or its power cord while your hands are wet or damp. If water or any other liquid gets inside this unit, have it checked by your Onkyo dealer.

#### 8. Handling Notes

- If you need to transport this unit, use the original packaging to pack it how it was when you originally bought it.
- Do not leave rubber or plastic items on this unit for a long time, because they may leave marks on the case.
- This unit's top and rear panels may get warm after prolonged use. This is normal.
- If you do not use this unit for a long time, it may not work properly the next time you turn it on, so be sure to use it occasionally.
- When you've finished using this unit, remove all discs and turn off the power.

#### 9. Installing this Unit

- Install this unit in a well-ventilated location.
  - Ensure that there's adequate ventilation all around this unit, especially if it's installed in an audio rack. If the ventilation is inadequate, the unit may overheat, leading to malfunction.
  - Do not expose this unit to direct sunlight or heat sources, because its internal temperature may rise, shortening the life of the optical pickup.
  - Avoid damp and dusty places, and places subject to vibrations from loudspeakers.
  - Never put the unit on top of, or directly above a loud-speaker.
  - Install this unit horizontally. Never use it on its side or on a sloping surface, because it may cause a malfunction.
  - If you install this unit near a TV, radio, or VCR, the picture and sound quality may be affected. If this occurs, move this unit away from the TV, radio, or VCR.
10. **To Obtain a Clear Picture**—This unit is a high-tech, precision device. If the lens on the optical pickup, or the disc drive mechanism becomes dirty or worn, the picture quality may be affected. To maintain the best picture quality, we recommend regular inspection and maintenance (cleaning or worn part replacement). every 1,000 hours of use depending on the operating environment. Contact your Onkyo dealer for details.

## 11. Moisture Condensation


### Moisture condensation may damage this unit.

Read the following carefully:

Moisture may condense on the lens of the optical pickup, one of the most important parts inside this unit.

- Moisture condensation can occur in the following situations:
  - The unit is moved from a cold place to a warm place.
  - A heater is turned on, or cold air from an air conditioner is hitting the unit.
  - In the summer, when this unit is moved from an air conditioned room to a hot and humid place.
  - The unit is used in a humid place.
- Do not use this unit when there's the possibility of moisture condensation occurring. Doing so may damage your discs and certain parts inside this unit.

If condensation does occur, unplug the power cord and leave the unit for two to three hours in the room temperature.

12. **Region Codes**—The Blu-ray Disc™ / DVD standard uses region codes to control how discs can be played around the world, the world being divided into three regions (Blu-ray Disc™) or six regions (DVD). This unit will only play Blu-ray Disc™ / DVD discs that match its region code, which can be found on its rear panel (  ).

13. **About this Manual**—This manual explains how to use all of this unit's functions. Although the Blu-ray Disc™ / DVD standard offers many special features, not all discs use them all, so depending on the disc being played, this unit may not respond to certain functions. See the disc's sleeve notes for supported features.

Never use a gas duster on this unit.

The gas trapped inside of this unit may cause ignition and explosion.

### Servicing

- Please refer to relevant topics on "TROUBLESHOOTING" on page 47 before returning the product.
- If this unit becomes inoperative, do not try to correct the problem by yourself. There are no user-serviceable parts inside. Turn the unit to the standby mode, unplug the power plug, and contact your Onkyo dealer.

### Disc handling

- For best results, keep your discs clean. Fingerprints and dust can affect the sound and picture quality and should be removed as follows. Using a clean, soft cloth, wipe from the center outwards, as shown. Never wipe in a circular direction.
- To remove stubborn dust or dirt, wipe the disc with a damp, soft cloth, and then dry it with a dry cloth.
- Never use solvent-based cleaning fluids, such as thinner or benzine, commercially available cleaners, or antistatic sprays intended for vinyl records, because they may damage the disc.

### IR signal check

- If the remote control is not working properly, you can use a digital camera (including a cellular phone with built-in camera) to see if it is sending out an infrared signal.

With a digital camera (including built-in cell phone cameras): Point a digital camera towards the remote control. Push any button on the remote control and look through the digital camera. If the infrared light appears through the camera, the remote control is working.

#### BD-Java

With some Blu-ray™ discs which support Java applications, you can enjoy the interactive functions such as games or interactive menus.

#### DVD upscaling for enhanced picture quality

Your current DVD will look even better than before thanks to video upscaling. Upscaling will increase the resolution of standard definition DVD to high definition up to 1080p over an HDMI connection. The picture will be less jagged and more realistic for a near high definition experience.

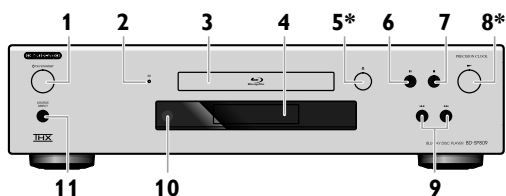

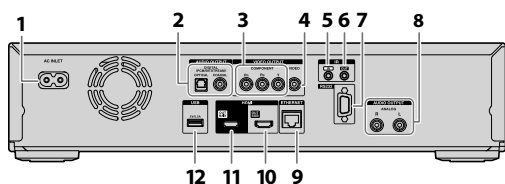

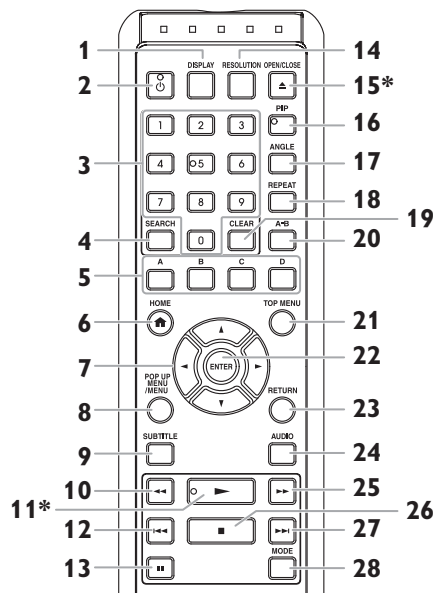

### 4.3 Remote Control



\* The unit can also be turned on by pressing these buttons.

  - Press to display the on-screen display menu.
2.  **(on/standby) button**
  - Press to turn on the unit, or to turn the unit into the standby mode. (To completely shut down the unit, you must unplug the AC power cord.)
3. **Number buttons**
  - Press to select a chapter during playback.
  - Press to enter numbers in the input field.
4. **SEARCH button**
  - Press to display the search menu.
5. **A / B / C / D buttons**
  - Press to activate shortcut keys on some BD-video functions.
  - When file list / thumbnail list is shown, press to switch between pages.
6. **HOME button**
  - Press to display the home menu.
7.  **buttons**
  - Press to select items or settings.
8. **POP UP MENU / MENU button**  
**Blu-ray Disc™:**
  - Press to display the pop-up menu.**DVD:**
  - Press to display the disc menu.
9. **SUBTITLE button**
  - Press to select subtitles on a disc.

#### 10. ◀◀ (reverse) button

- During playback, press to fast reverse the playback.

#### 11. ▶ (play) button\*

- Press to start playback or resume playback.

#### 12. ◀◀◀ (skip) button

- During playback, press once to return to the beginning of the current title, chapter, track or file.
- During playback, press twice to return to the previous title, chapter, track or file.
- During the JPEG playback, press to return to the previous file.

#### 13. || (pause) button

- Press to pause playback.

#### 14. RESOLUTION button

- Press to set the HDMI output mode.

#### 15. OPEN / CLOSE ▲ button\*

- Press to open or close the disc tray.

#### 16. PIP button

- Press to switch picture in picture feature on/off (only applicable to BD-video which supports the PiP (BONUSVIEW™) function).

#### 17. ANGLE button

- Press to access various camera angles on the disc.

#### 18. REPEAT button

- Press to select repeat modes.

#### 19. CLEAR button

- Press to clear the information once entered.
- Press to cancel the A point which was set in A-B repeat mode.

#### 20. A-B button

- Press to play back a defined section between point A and B repeatedly.

#### 21. TOP MENU button

##### Blu-ray Disc™:

- Press to display the top menu.

##### DVD:

- Press to display the title menu.

#### 22. ENTER button

- Press to confirm or select menu items.

#### 23. RETURN button

- Press to return to the previously displayed menu or screen function.

#### 24. AUDIO button

- Press to select the audio channel (such as audio languages) on a disc.

#### 25. ▶▶ (forward) button

- During playback, press to fast forward the playback.
- In pause mode, press to slow forward the playback.

#### 26. ■ (stop) button

- Press to stop playback.

#### 27. ▶▶| (skip) button

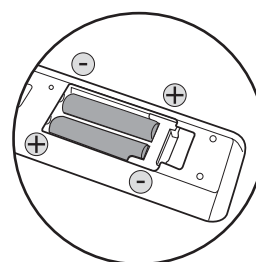
- During playback, press to skip to the next chapter, track or file.
- When playback is in pause mode, press to forward the playback picture by picture.

#### 28. MODE button

- During playback, press to display the play menu.

#### ■ Installing the Batteries in the Remote Control

Install 2 AA (1.5V) batteries matching the polarity indicated inside battery compartment of the remote control.



#### ! Caution

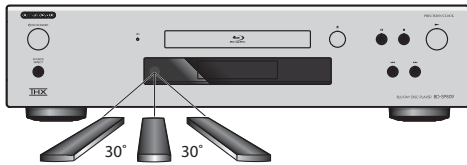
Incorrect use of batteries can result in hazards such as leakage and bursting. Please observe the following:

- Do not mix alkaline, standard (carbon-zinc), or rechargeable (ni-cad, ni-mh, etc) batteries.
- Do not mix new and old batteries together.
- Do not use different kinds of batteries together. Although they may look similar, different batteries may have different voltages.
- Make sure that the + and - ends of each battery match the indications in the battery compartment.
- Remove batteries from battery compartment, when the remote is not going to be used for a month or more.
- When disposing of used batteries, please comply with governmental regulations or environmental public rules that apply in your country or area.
- Do not recharge, short-circuit, heat, burn or disassemble batteries.

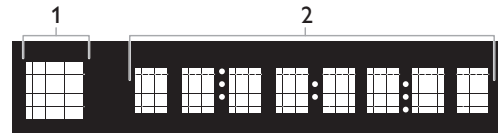
## ■ Using the Remote Control

### Remote Control Usage Guidelines:

- Make sure that there are no obstacles between the remote control and the infrared sensor window on the unit.
- Remote operation may become unreliable if strong sunlight or fluorescent light is shining on the infrared sensor window of the unit.
- Remote controls of different devices can interfere with each other. Avoid using a remote controls of another device which is located close to the unit.
- Replace the batteries when you notice a fall-off in the operating range of the remote control.
- The maximum operable ranges from the unit are as follows.
  - **Line of sight:**  
approx. 23 feet (7 m)
  - **Either side of the center:**  
approx. 16 feet (5 m) within 30°
  - **Above:**  
approx. 16 feet (5 m) within 15°
  - **Below:**  
approx. 10 feet (3 m) within 30°

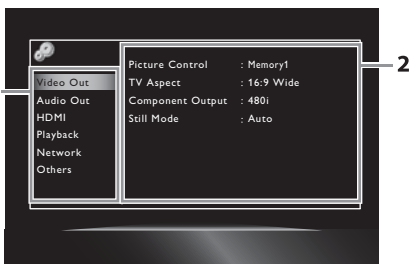

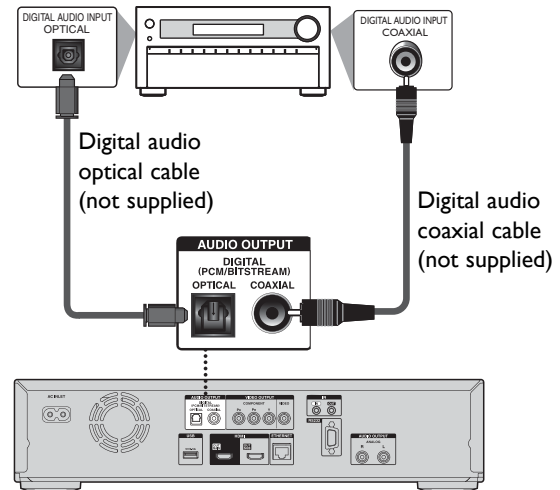

- If you connect SD card or USB flash drive via USB card reader or USB hub, BD-ROM data will be write onto the first connected card or device. Connecting a USB flash drive directly to this unit is recommended.

#### ⓘ Note

- The resume information will be cleared when;
  - **[■ (stop)]** is pressed while in the Resume-On-Stop mode.
  - the USB flash drive is removed.
  - the unit is switched to standby mode.
- Do not delete the folders or files in the USB flash drive with your computer. This unit may not read USB flash drives formatted on a computer.
- If a folder or file name includes one of the following unrecognizable characters, the folder or file name may not be displayed correctly.
  - Unrecognizable characters:  

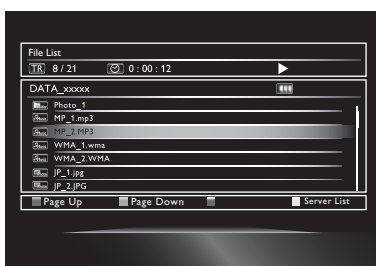

## 8.4 Playing Back Movie / Music / Photo from DLNA Certified Home Media Servers



On this unit, you can play movie, music and photo files stored on DLNA certified home media servers connected to your home network. In order to use this feature, you must connect this unit to the Internet.

- For details, refer to the user manual of the DLNA certified device.
1. Connect this unit to the Internet.
    - Refer to “Connection to the Network” on page 20.
  2. Set up the necessary network connection settings.
    - Refer to “Network Connection” on page 40.
  3. Start DLNA home media servers in your home network.
  4. Press **[HOME]**.
  5. Use **[▲/▼/◀/▶]** to select “Home Network”, then press **[ENTER]**.
    - This unit will start loading the home server list.
    - To cancel loading, press **[■ (stop)]**.
    - To reload the home server list, press **[D]**.
    - To go back to the root directory, press **[TOP MENU]**.
  6. After loading, home server list will appear. Select a home server you want to access, then press **[ENTER]**.
  7. File list of the selected home server will appear. Select a file you want to play back, then press **[▶ (play)]** or **[ENTER]** to start playback.
    - If you select a folder, select a file in the folder and then press **[▶ (play)]** or **[ENTER]** to start playback.



- Refer to “Guide to File List” on page 24.

To control the playback, use following buttons.

Button	Action
▶▶ (skip)	For movie files, playback will be step by step in pause mode.
▶▶ (forward) ◀◀ (reverse)	During playback, press to fast reverse/forward the playback.

▶ (play)	Return to the normal playback.
■ (stop)	Stop the playback. (For movie files, playback will be in Resume-On-Stop mode.)  <b>Resume-On-Stop mode for movie files</b> Playback will start from the point where it is stopped next time you press <b>[▶ (play)]</b> . If you press <b>[ENTER]</b> instead of <b>[▶ (play)]</b> , playback will start from the beginning of the file instead of resuming from the stop point.

### Note

- For the home server list, maximum of 10 servers can be displayed.
- The system can recognize up to 9,999 files (including folders).
- The 10th and deeper hierarchies cannot be displayed.
- This unit supports following formats. (Formats other than listed below cannot be recognized.)
  - Movie : MPEG 1, MPEG 2 PS, MPEG 2 TS / TTS
  - Music : LPCM, MP3, WMA
  - Photo : JPEG
- Unplayable files in the home server will not be displayed in the file list.
- For some files, playback is not available even if displayed in the file list.
- In order to play back the contents in the home servers, the player and the servers must be connected to the same access point.
- Compatibility and available playback function may differ depending on the home server.
- If you select a photo file in step 7 on page 28, the selected file will be played back and go to the next file in the current hierarchy in turn every 10 seconds.
- For photo files, every press of **[◀/▶]** will turn the image by 90 degrees when an image is displayed.
- The quality of the playback picture or audio differs depending on your network condition.
- It will take a while for loading when going to the other hierarchy.
- For some files on DLNA home server, **[|| (pause)]** may not function during playback.



## 8.5 Using the Title / Disc / Pop-up Menu

BD-V DVD-V AVCHD

Some BD-videos, DVD-videos or AVCHD files may contain a title menu which describes the contents of the disc, or a disc menu which guides you through the available functions in the disc.

With such discs, a title menu or a disc menu may appear automatically when you insert the disc. Otherwise, press **[TOP MENU]** or **[POP UP MENU / MENU]** to call up the menu. Refer to the disc's manual on how to navigate through the menu.

### Note

- Menus vary among discs. Refer to the information accompanying the disc for details.
- **[TOP MENU]** or **[POP UP MENU / MENU]** may not work with some discs.



## 9. SPECIAL PLAYBACK

### 9.1 Fast Forward / Fast Reverse



1. During playback, press **[▶▶ (forward)]** repeatedly for fast forward.  
During playback, press **[◀◀ (reverse)]** repeatedly for fast reverse.  
Every time you press **[▶▶ (forward)]** or **[◀◀ (reverse)]**, the playback speed will change.
2. Press **[▶ (play)]** to return to normal playback.

#### ⓘ Note

- For Blu-ray Disc™, DVD and AVCHD, speed changes in 5 different levels.
- For audio CD, MP3, WMA, and movie / audio files on DLNA home server, speed changes in 3 different levels.
- For some movie / music files on a DLNA home server, fast forward / fast reverse may not function.
- For audio CD, MP3 and WMA, fast forward / fast reverse search between different files or tracks are not available.

### 9.2 Slow Forward Playback



1. During playback, press **[⏸ (pause)]**. Then press **[▶▶ (forward)]**.  
Every time you press **[▶▶ (forward)]**, the playback speed changes in 3 different levels.
2. Press **[▶ (play)]** to return to normal playback.

#### ⓘ Note

- Only slow forward is available.
- For some movie files on a DLNA home server, slow forward may not function.
- Set “Still Mode” setting to “Field” in “Video Out” menu if pictures in the slow forward playback mode are blurred.

### 9.3 Step by Step Playback



1. In pause mode, press **[▶▶| (skip)]** repeatedly.  
Every time you press **[▶▶| (skip)]**, playback will advance one step at a time.
2. Press **[▶ (play)]** or **[⏸ (pause)]** to return to normal playback.

#### ⓘ Note

- Only step by step forward is available.
- Set “Still Mode” setting to “Field” in “Video Out” menu if pictures during step by step playback mode is blurred.

## 9.4 Repeat Playback

Available repeat function varies depending on the discs.

1. During playback, press **[REPEAT]**.
2. Use **[▲/▼]** to select the desired repeat mode.

Repeat Mode	Available Media
Chapter Repeat The current chapter will be played back repeatedly.	
Title Repeat The current title will be played back repeatedly.	
Track Repeat The current track or file will be played back repeatedly.	  
All Repeat All tracks in the media will be played back repeatedly.	
Group Repeat The current group (folder) will be played back repeatedly.	 
Random Repeat (Audio CD) Repeats the random playback.	
Random Repeat (MP3 / WMA / JPEG) Repeats the random playback in a folder.	 

3. Press **[RETURN]** to exit.

### Note

- The repeat setting will be canceled when you stop playback.
- When the repeat setting is set for a MP3 or WMA folder (file), the repeat setting will be canceled if you select other MP3 or WMA folder (file) to play back.
- For some movie / music / photo files on DLNA home server, repeat playback may not function.

## 9.5 A-B Repeat



You can play back the specific part (between point A and point B) repeatedly.

1. During playback, press **[A-B]** at the desired starting point A.
2. During playback, press **[A-B]** at the desired ending point B.  
As soon as you set the point B, the part between point A and point B will start playback repeatedly.
  - To cancel the A-B repeat, press **[A-B]** again.

### Note

- Point B should be set within the same title or track as point A.
- A-B repeat is not available with some scenes.
- To cancel the A point which was set, press **[CLEAR]**.
- For some movie files on DLNA home server, A-B repeat playback may not function.

## 9.6 Slide Show



1. Follow steps 1 to 2 in “Playing Back a Disc” on page 25.
2. Open the folder which contains the desired JPEG files.
3. Use **[▲/▼/◀/▶]** to select a desired file to be played back, then press **[▶ (play)]** or **[ENTER]**.
  - An image will be played back from the selected file and go to the next one in turn every 10 seconds.
4. Press **[■ (stop)]** to stop playback.

### To return to the first item:

Press **[TOP MENU]**.

### To return to the file played last:

Press **[POP UP MENU / MENU]**.

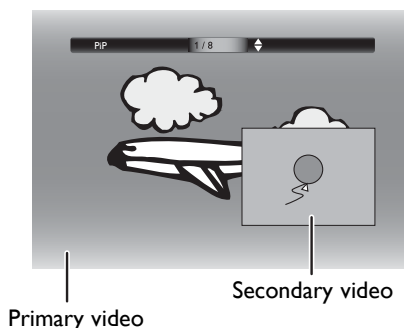

## 9.7 PiP (BONUSVIEW™) Setting

Some BD-videos have the PiP function which enables you to display the secondary video in the primary video.



1. During playback, press **[PIP]**.
2. Use **[▲/▼]** to select the secondary video you want to show.
  - The secondary video will be displayed with the secondary audio.
  - Use **[◀/▶]** to switch between current setting and "Off".
3. Press **[RETURN]** to exit.
  - On how to output the secondary audio, refer to "Switching Audio Soundtrack" on page 34.

### Note

- You can also change the PiP setting from the play menu. Play menu can be called up by pressing **[MODE]**.

## 9.8 Enjoying BD-Live™ Discs Using Internet

BD-V

You can enjoy BD-Live™ which enables you to use interactive features when the unit is connected to the Internet.

Examples of BD-Live™ features:

- Online access to additional content such as movie trailers, subtitles, BD-Java applications, etc.
- While downloading, special video data may be played back.
  - **Service and functions differ depending on the disc. Follow the instructions given by the disc when using the BD-Live™ function.**
  - **Connect USB flash drive of at least 1 GB capacity before using BD-Live™ features on a Blu-ray Disc™.**
  - **Do not remove the USB flash drive while using BD-Live™ features.**

### Note

- You must connect the unit to the Internet and set up necessary settings in order to use BD-Live™.
- For the network connection, refer to "Connection to the Network" on page 20.
- For the network setup, refer to "Network Connection" on page 40.
- For certain discs, BD-Live™ setting in "Manual" Setup may need to be changed. (Refer to page 40.)
- Depending on your connection environment, it may take time to connect to the Internet or the Internet may not be connected.
- When BD-Live™ functions are used and the unit is connected to the Internet, you may be charged for this communication.
- Some discs with BD-Live™ function require memory when playing back the content. If you cannot play back a disc with BD-Live™ function, connect USB flash drive (1 GB or more) which is formatted on this unit.

### Note for AACs Online

- The player or disc IDs may be sent to the content provider when playing back a disc with BD-Live™ function.
- If you save your viewing history on the server by using these IDs, you will be introduced to other similar movies.
- You can save game score histories.



Playback will start from the beginning of the title / chapter.
5. Press [RETURN] to exit.

### ⊖ Note

- You can also search from the play menu. Play menu can be called up by pressing [MODE].

### ■ Using [the Number buttons] (Direct Search)

#### Chapter Search

During playback, enter the chapter number you want to search using [the Number buttons]. Playback of the chapter will start in a few seconds.

### ⊖ Note

- As for the BD-video, how it performs will be strongly determined by the disc, and may not perform as described.



## 9.10 Track Search

CD MP3 WMA JPEG

1. During playback, press [▶▶ (skip)] to skip the current track or file and move to the next. The track / file will move forward one at a time. To go back to the beginning of the current track / file, press [◀◀ (skip)]. Press [◀◀ (skip)] repeatedly to go to the previous track / file. The track / file will move backward one at a time.

## 9.11 Time Search

BD-V DVD-V CD AVCHD DLNA VIDEO

1. During playback, press [SEARCH].
  - For movie files on DLNA server, skip to step 3.
2. Use [▲/▼] to select "🕒", then press [ENTER].  
e.g.) Blu-ray Disc™  

3. Use [the Number buttons] or [▲/▼] to enter the time count you want to jump to.  
e.g.) Entering 1 hour 45 minutes and 15 seconds.  

4. Press [ENTER].  
Playback will start from the desired time entered.
5. Press [RETURN] to exit.

### ⊖ Note

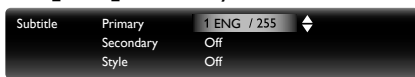
- For some movie files on DLNA home server, time search may not function.
- You can also search from the play menu. Play menu can be called up by pressing [MODE].

## 9.12 Switching Subtitles

Some video materials may have subtitles in one or more languages. For commercially available discs, the supported languages can be found on the disc case. Follow the steps below to switch the subtitle language during playback.

2. Use **[▲/▼]** to select “Primary”, “Secondary” or “Style”, then press **[ENTER]**.
  - “Primary” : Sets the subtitle for the primary video.
  - “Secondary” : Sets the subtitle for the secondary video.
  - “Style” : Sets style of the subtitle.
3. Use **[▲/▼]** to select your desired subtitle or style.



- Use **[◀/▶]** to switch between current subtitle setting and “Off”.

4. Press **[RETURN]** to exit.

**DVD-V**   **AVCHD**

1. During playback, press **[SUBTITLE]**.
2. Use **[▲/▼]** to select your desired subtitle.



- Use **[◀/▶]** to switch between current subtitle setting and “Off”.

3. Press **[RETURN]** to exit.

### Note

- Some discs will only allow you to change the subtitles from the disc menu or pop-up menu. Press **[TOP MENU]** or **[POP UP MENU / MENU]** to display the disc menu or pop-up menu.
- If the disc has no subtitle language or subtitle style, “Not Available” will be displayed on the TV screen.
- During playback of the secondary video, the primary subtitle setting is not available except when there is no subtitle for the secondary video.
- You can also change the subtitle setting from the play menu. Play menu can be called up by pressing **[MODE]**.

## 9.13 Switching Audio Soundtrack

When playing back video material recorded with two or more soundtracks (these are often in different audio languages or audio formats), you can switch them during playback. For Blu-ray Disc™, available audio varies depending on “BD Audio Mode” setting.

**BD-V**

1. During playback, press **[AUDIO]**.
2. Use **[▲/▼]** to select “Primary” or “Secondary”, then press **[ENTER]**.
  - “Primary” : Sets the audio for the primary video.
  - “Secondary” : Sets the audio for the secondary video.
3. Use **[▲/▼]** to select your desired audio stream channel.



- For “Secondary”, use **[◀/▶]** to switch between current audio setting and “Off”.

4. Press **[RETURN]** to exit.

**DVD-V**   **CD**   **AVCHD**

1. During playback, press **[AUDIO]**.
2. Use **[▲/▼]** to select your desired audio stream channel.



- For audio CD, you can select following options.
  - “Stereo” : Both right and left channels are active (stereo).
  - “L-ch” : Only left channel is active.
  - “R-ch” : Only right channel is active.


3. Press **[RETURN]** to exit.

### Note

- The secondary audio will not be output when the secondary video is not displayed or when “BD Audio Mode” is set to “HD Audio Output”. (For some Blu-ray™ discs, secondary audio will be output even when secondary video is off.)
- The sound mode cannot be changed during playback of discs not recorded in multiple audio mode.
- Some discs allow changing the audio language setting on the disc menu. (Operation varies depending on the discs. Refer to the manual accompanying the disc.)
- **[AUDIO]** may not work on some discs with multiple audio streams or channels (e.g. DVDs that allow changing audio setting on the disc menu).
- If the disc has no audio language, “Not Available” will be displayed on the TV screen.
- For DTS-CD (5.1 music disc), selecting audio streams or channels are not available.
- You can also change the audio setting from the play menu. Play menu can be called up by pressing **[MODE]**.


## 9.14 Switching Camera Angles

BD-V DVD-V

Some BD-videos and DVD-videos contain scenes which have been shot simultaneously from various angles. You can change the camera angle when  appears on the TV screen.

1. During playback, press **[ANGLE]**.
  - The selected angle will be displayed on the display bar at the top of the TV screen.
2. Use **[▲ / ▼]** to select your desired angle.
3. Press **[RETURN]** to exit.

### Note

- If “Angle Icon” setting is set to “Off”,  will not appear on the TV screen.
- You can also change the angle setting from the play menu. Play menu can be called up by pressing **[MODE]**.

## 9.15 Adjusting the Picture



You can adjust the picture quality and store the setting you have adjusted on “Memory1” to “Memory (Source Direct)”.

1. During playback, press **[MODE]** to display the play menu.
2. Use **[▲/▼]** to select “Picture Control”, then press **[ENTER]**.
3. Use **[▲/▼]** to select a memory from “Memory1” to “Memory (Source Direct)” to store your setting, then press **[ENTER]**.
  - When “Video Resolution” is set to “Source Direct”, “Picture Control” will be set to “Memory (Source Direct)” automatically.



4. Use **[▲/▼]** to select an item to be adjusted, then press **[ENTER]** and use **[▲/▼]** to adjust the setting.

“Pass” : Network connection succeeds.

“Failed” : Network connection failed.

5. If the connection test passes, press [ENTER].

#### ⓘ Note

- If the connection test passes, you are ready to use BD-Live™, DLNA home media server, or network update function, using the Internet without making any additional settings.
- If the connection test fails, you may need to check your router settings and make sure the physical connection is secure. If you need the MAC address of this unit to complete your router settings you can view it on the “Network Status” screen (refer to page 39).
- When connecting this unit directly to a modem for the first time or connecting it to a modem which was previously connected to any other network device (e.g. a router, PC, etc.), you may have to power cycle the modem to reset the settings on the modem.

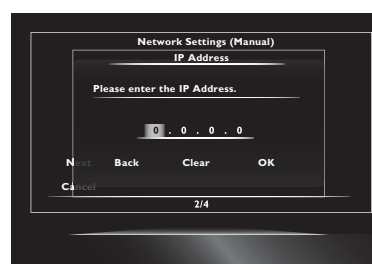

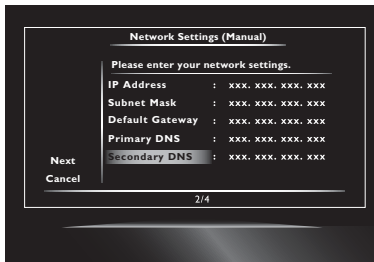

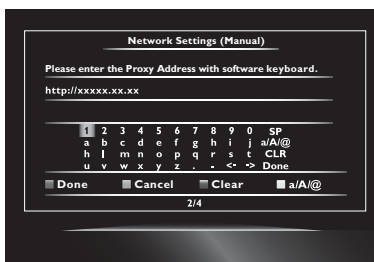

5. Use [▲/▼/◀/▶] to select “OK”, then press [ENTER].

6. Select "Subnet Mask", "Default Gateway", "Primary DNS" and "Secondary DNS" in turn, and enter each address number with cursor buttons and number buttons, then press **[ENTER]**.
  - Enter the DNS addresses provided by your Internet provider.
  - If the DNS address is unknown, check the DNS address of other devices (e.g. PC connected via LAN cable) and assign the same DNS address.



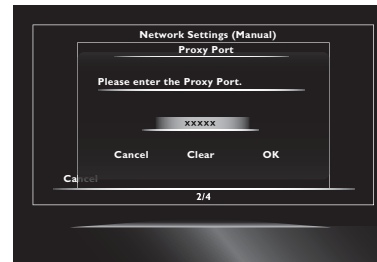
7. Use **[▲/▼/◀/▶]** to select "OK", then press **[ENTER]**.
8. Use **[▲/▼/◀/▶]** to select "Next", then press **[ENTER]**.
9. Use **[▲/▼]** to select "Yes" or "No" for proxy server, then press **[ENTER]**.
  - If you use proxy server, select "Yes" to go to the next step.
  - If you do not use proxy server, select "No" to go to step 13.
10. Proxy address setting screen will appear. Enter proxy address with cursor buttons, number buttons and color key.



- [▲/▼/◀/▶]** : Move the highlight.
- [the Number buttons]** : Enter number.
- [ENTER]** : Enter the highlighted number or letter.
- [A]\*** : Set the entered number or letter.
- [B]** : Exit the network setting.
- [C]** : Clear the entered number or letter.
- [D]\*** : Switch between abc, ABC and @!?

\* These buttons can be used in other network settings.

11. Press **[A]** to go to the proxy port setting screen. Enter proxy port number with number buttons.



12. Use **[▲/▼/◀/▶]** to select "OK", then press **[ENTER]**.
13. Connection speed setting screen will appear. Use **[▲/▼]** to select the desired setting, then press **[ENTER]**. (The default setting is "Auto".)
14. BD-Live™ setting screen will appear. Use **[▲/▼]** to select the desired setting, then press **[ENTER]**. (The default setting is "Allow".)
  - "Allow" : Internet access is permitted for all BD-Live™ contents.
  - "Limited Allow" : Internet access is permitted only for BD-Live™ contents which have content owner certificates. Internet access without the certificates is prohibited.
  - "Prohibit" : Internet access is prohibited for all BD-Live™ contents.
15. Connection test confirmation screen will appear. Select "Yes" to start the connection test and the test result will appear right after the connection test finishes.
16. Select "End" to complete the settings.

⊖ **Note for “IP Address”, “Subnet Mask”, “Default Gateway”, “Primary DNS” and “Secondary DNS”**

- The range of input numbers is between 0 and 255.
- If you enter a number larger than 255, the number will automatically be 255.
- When you enter a wrong number, select “Clear” to clear. (The number will be back to “0”.)
- If you want to enter a 1 or 2-digit number in one cell, press [▶] to move on to the next cell.

⊖ **Note for “Proxy Address” and “Proxy Port”**

- The range of input numbers for the port number is between 0 and 65535. (If you enter a number larger than 65535, it will be regarded as 65535.)
- For proxy port, certain ports might be closed, blocked or unusable depending on your network environment.
- Choose a connection speed in accordance with your network environment.
- When the settings are changed, the network connection may be disabled depending on the device.

## 11.2 HDMI CEC

[HOME 🏠] → “Settings” → “HDMI” → “HDMI CEC”

HDMI CEC allows integrated system control over HDMI and is part of the HDMI standard. This function may not work properly depending on the device connected to the unit. When “HDMI CEC” setting is set to “On”, functions listed below will be available.

### ■ One Touch Play

HDMI CEC operations are performed using remote control buttons. The TV will automatically be turned on and switched to the appropriate input source signal.

#### Buttons for one touch play:

- [▶ (play)], [◀◀ (skip)], [▶▶ (skip)], [the Number buttons], [HOME 🏠], or [DISPLAY]
- [TOP MENU] or [POP UP MENU / MENU] (when a disc is inserted in the unit)

### ■ One Touch Standby

When you press and hold [⏻ (on/standby)] for 2 seconds, it will turn off the power to the TV first and then turn off the power to this unit.

When the connected HDMI CEC compatible display device is turned off first, this unit will be turned off subsequently.

### ■ System Information

#### Get & Set Menu Language

The unit recognizes the OSD language set on the TV and automatically sets the same language as the player menu language (OSD menu language) for this unit. Refer to the “Player Menu” on page 38 for available languages.

- This feature is available only when “Auto” is selected in the “Player Menu” section in the setup menu.

#### ⊖ Note

- HDMI CEC function is only available for HDMI OUT MAIN jack.

### 11.3 HDMI Output

[HOME] → “Settings” → “HDMI” → “HDMI Output”

You can set the video and audio output settings from HDMI OUT MAIN and SUB jacks.

#### “Main”

Outputs both of video and audio signals from HDMI OUT MAIN jack only.

#### “Dual (Main and Sub)”

Outputs video and audio signals from both of HDMI OUT MAIN and HDMI OUT SUB jacks.

#### “AV Split (Main:V, Sub:A)”

Outputs video signals from HDMI OUT MAIN jack and audio signals from HDMI OUT SUB jack.

#### Note

- To enable “HDMI Output”, it is necessary that both HDMI OUT MAIN and HDMI OUT SUB jacks are connected with other HDMI devices and this unit should obtain EDID (Extended Display Identification Data).
- When “HDMI Output” is set to “Main”, there will be no output from the HDMI OUT SUB jack.
- HDMI video resolution will normally be as selected in “Video Resolution” except when “HDMI Output” is set to “Dual (Main and Sub)” and “Video Resolution” is set to “Source Direct” or “Auto”. When the unit is set to these settings video and audio from HDMI OUT MAIN and SUB jacks will be the same by EDID.
- When playing 3D contents with the unit set to “AV Split (Main:V, Sub:A)”, a compatible display device and AV receiver/amplifier must be connected to the unit. Without a compatible device audio output will not occur.
- When set to “HDMI Output”, unplugging the HDMI OUT MAIN or HDMI OUT SUB jack will clear settings.
- Only remove HDMI cables when this unit is in standby mode. Do not unplug cables when outputting video and audio signals from HDMI OUT MAIN and SUB jacks.
- The video output from HDMI OUT SUB jack and the video output which “HDMI Output” is set to “Dual (Main and Sub)” are not THX certified.

### 11.4 Video Resolution

[HOME] → “Settings” → “HDMI” → “Video Resolution”

Set the resolution of the video signal being output from the HDMI OUT jack.

You can select the desired “Video Resolution” among the settings listed below:

“Auto”, “480i”, “480p”, “720p”, “1080i”, “1080p”, “1080p/24”, “Source Direct”.

- Composite video output (VIDEO) jack can only output 480i.
- For AVCHD, outputting the video in 24 frames per second (1080p/24) is not available.
- Even if “Video Resolution” is set to “Source Direct”, HDMI video resolution will be changed when your TV is not compatible with the video resolution of a disc material.

### Note

- You can select “Source Direct” or “Auto” by pressing **[SOURCE DIRECT]** on the front panel.
- You can also change the resolution of the video signal being output from the HDMI OUT jack by pressing **[RESOLUTION]** repeatedly.
- Pressing **[RESOLUTION]** does not work when HDMI cable is not connected, or when no video signal is being output from the HDMI OUT jack.
- Pressing **[RESOLUTION]** does not work during the playback of a BD-video or AVCHD.
- The selected resolution must also be supported by your display device.
- If your TV and the unit is connected by a DVI cable and if you select “Auto” or “Source Direct”, “480p” will be automatically in effect.
- Even if “Video Resolution” is set to “1080p/24”, for a Blu-ray Disc™ that is not recorded in 1080p/24 or for DVD, the video resolution supported by the disc and the display device will be output instead of 1080p/24.
- Refer also to your TV’s manual.
- When the HDMI OUT jack is outputting the video in 1080p/24 or 3D, picture will not be output from the VIDEO OUTPUT jacks.
- Do not remove HDMI cable during playing the video in 1080p/24 or 3D. Video signals will not be output if you replace the connection to a device which is not compatible with 1080p/24 or 3D contents.
- When connected to an HDCP incompatible display device, the picture will not be displayed properly.
- The audio signals from the HDMI OUT jack (including the sampling frequency, the number of channels and bit length) may be limited by the connected device.
- Among the display device(s) that support HDMI, some do not support audio output (for example, projectors). While connected to a device such as a projector, audio will not be output from the HDMI OUT jack.
- When this unit’s HDMI OUT jack is connected to a DVI-D compatible display device(s) (HDCP compatible) with an HDMI-DVI converter cable, the signals are output in digital RGB.
- When you make a selection, the TV monitor temporarily goes blank and then comes back again. If it does not come back, press **[RESOLUTION]** repeatedly to change the resolution or touch and hold **[▶ (play)]** on the front panel for 5 seconds to change the setting back to its default.
- When playing back a Frame Sequential 3D Disc, video resolution of output picture will depend on contents on the disc. (“Video Resolution” setting is not applicable for Frame Sequential 3D Discs.)

### Copyright protection system

To play back the digital video images of a BD-video or DVD-video via an HDMI connection, it is necessary that both the player and the display device (or an AV receiver / amplifier) support a copyright protection system called HDCP (high-bandwidth digital content protection system). HDCP is copy protection technology that comprises data encryption and authentication of the connected AV device. This unit supports HDCP. Please read the operating instructions of your display device (or an AV receiver / amplifier) for more information.

## 11.5 Parental

Rating’s control allows you to set a limit, which prevents your children from viewing inappropriate materials. Playback will be stopped if the rating’s exceed the level you set, and it will require you to enter a password before playing back the disc.

1. Use **[the Number buttons]** to enter your 4-digit password.  
**For first time use:**  
Use **[the Number buttons]** to enter any 4-digit number (except for 4737). That number will be used as the recover password. Record your password, in case you might forget it.
  - If you forget the password, enter **[4], [7], [3], [7]**. The password will be cleared and rating level will be set to “Off”.
  - When you input the password, select “Clear” to clear the number, then re-enter the password.

### ■ BD Rating Level

**[HOME 🏠]** → “Settings” → “Playback” → “BD Rating Level”

1. Use **[▲ / ▼ / ◀ / ▶]** to select “Settings” in the home menu, then press **[ENTER]**.
2. Use **[▲ / ▼]** to select “Playback”, then press **[ENTER]**.
3. Use **[▲ / ▼]** to select “BD Rating Level”, then press **[ENTER]**.
4. Use **[the Number buttons]** to enter your 4-digit password.
5. Use **[▲ / ▼]** to select your desired option, then press **[ENTER]**.
  - “Off” : To release the limitation.
  - “Age Setting” : To set the age limitation.
    - After selecting “Age Setting”, use **[the Number buttons]** to enter the age.  
(e.g., For age 6, enter **[6] + [ENTER]**.  
For age 15, enter **[1], [5] + [ENTER]**.)
6. Press **[HOME 🏠]** to exit.



## ■ DVD Rating Level

[HOME] → “Settings” → “Playback” → “DVD Rating Level”

1. Use [▲/▼/◀/▶] to select “Settings” in the home menu, then press [ENTER].
2. Use [▲/▼] to select “Playback”, then press [ENTER].
3. Use [▲/▼] to select “DVD Rating Level”, then press [ENTER].
4. Use [the Number buttons] to enter your 4-digit password.
5. Use [▲/▼] to select your desired level, then press [ENTER].
6. Press [HOME] to exit.

## ■ Password Change

[HOME] → “Settings” → “Playback” → “Password Change”

1. Use [▲/▼/◀/▶] to select “Settings” in the home menu, then press [ENTER].
2. Use [▲/▼] to select “Playback”, then press [ENTER].
3. Use [▲/▼] to select “Password Change”, then press [ENTER].
4. Use [the Number buttons] to enter your 4-digit password.
5. Use [the Number buttons] to enter a new 4-digit password.
6. Use [the Number buttons] to retype the same new 4-digit password.
7. Press [HOME] to exit.

### To cancel parental lock temporarily

Some discs allow you to cancel the parental lock temporarily. With those discs, the message below will appear when you try to play them back.  
“Enter current password.”

Follow the instruction which appears on the TV screen to cancel the parental lock. After entering the password, rating level appears. Select desired rating level, then press [ENTER].

## 11.6 Software Update

[HOME] → “Settings” → “Others” → “Software Update”

This unit lets you update the software yourself using a software update disc or USB flash drive. To update the software, you must first download the latest version software to a PC. Then write the update to a disc or USB flash drive, then execute “Software Update”.

### ■ Disc / USB Update

You can update the software by using a disc or USB flash drive.

Prepare a software update disc or USB flash drive:

Access [www.onkyo.com](http://www.onkyo.com), and download the latest version software to a blank disc or USB flash drive using a PC by following the directions described on the website.

- Use a blank disc or USB flash drive and download one software per disc and USB flash drive.
  - For more details on how to download the software, please refer to the website.
1. Use [▲/▼/◀/▶] to select “Settings” in the home menu, then press [ENTER].
  2. Use [▲/▼] to select “Others”, then press [ENTER].
  3. Use [▲/▼] to select “Software Update”, then press [ENTER].
  4. Use [▲/▼] to select “Disc” or “USB”, then press [ENTER].
  5. Use [◀/▶] to select “Yes”, then press [ENTER].
  6. Insert the disc or connect the USB flash drive for software update.
  7. After loading disc or USB flash drive, confirmation message will appear. Select “Yes” and press [ENTER] to start updating.
    - It may take a while to complete the updating.
  8. After the update finishes, this unit will restart. Remove the disc or USB flash drive from the unit.

### ⚠ Caution

- Please do not unplug the AC power cord while executing the “Disc / USB Update”.

### ℹ Note

- All settings will remain the same even if you update the software version.

## ■ Network Update

You can update the software by connecting the unit to the Internet.

1. Follow steps 1 to 3 in “Disc / USB Update” on page 45.
2. Use [▲/▼] to select “Network”, then press [ENTER].
3. Use [◀/▶] to select “Yes”, then press [ENTER].
  - This unit will then start checking for the latest software version.
4. Confirmation message will appear. Select “Yes”, then press [ENTER].
  - The unit will start downloading the latest software version.
5. When the download completes, confirmation message will appear. Press [ENTER].
  - The unit will start updating the software version.
  - It may take a while to complete the updating.
6. After updating finishes, this unit will restart automatically.

### ⚠ Caution

- Please do not unplug the AC power cord or LAN cable while executing the “Network”.

### ℹ Note

- In order to update the software via the Internet, you must connect the unit to the Internet and set up necessary settings.
- For the network connection, refer to “Connection to the Network” on page 20.
- For the network setup, refer to “Network Connection” on page 40.
- All settings will remain the same even if you update the software version.

## 11.7 Initialize

[HOME 🏠] → “Settings” → “Others” → “Initialize”

Menus to reset player settings, format USB flash drive, local storage and clear network settings.

1. Use [▲/▼/◀/▶] to select “Settings” in the home menu, then press [ENTER].
2. Use [▲/▼] to select “Others”, then press [ENTER].
3. Use [▲/▼] to select “Initialize”, then press [ENTER].
4. Use [▲/▼] to select the desired setting, then press [ENTER].

### “Reset Settings”:

All the settings except for the parental lock and network settings will be reset to default.

### “Reset Network Settings”:

Resets the network setting to the default.

### “(Unit) Erase Saved BD-ROM Data”:

Clears the data saved for the BD-ROM contents, such as BD-ROM game scores, on this player.

### “(USB) Erase Saved BD-ROM Data” (Available only when a USB flash drive is connected.):

Clears the supplemental data for the BD-ROM playback, such as subtitle data, from the USB flash drive.

### “Format USB” (Available only when a USB flash drive is connected):

Initialize the USB flash drive.

5. Use [◀/▶] to select “Yes”, then press [ENTER].
6. Confirmation message will appear. Press [ENTER] to complete the setting.
7. Press [HOME 🏠] to exit.

- Do not remove the USB flash drive while executing the “Format USB” or “(USB) Erase Saved BD-ROM Data”. It will damage the drive.

## 13. GLOSSARY

### Analog Audio

An electrical signal that directly represents sound. Compare this to digital audio which can be an electrical signal, but is an indirect representation of sound. See also "Digital Audio".

### Aspect Ratio

The width of a TV screen relative to its height. Conventional TVs are 4:3 (in other words, the TV screen is almost square); widescreen models are 16:9 (the TV screen is almost twice as wide as its height).

### AVCHD

AVCHD is a new format for high definition video camcorders which can record and play high-resolution HD images.

### BD-Live™

BD-Live™ is a BD-video (BD-ROM version 2 Profile 2.0) which contains new functions (e.g. Internet connection), in addition to the BONUSVIEW™ function.

### Blu-ray Disc™

Blu-ray Disc™ is a next generation optical video disc which is capable of storing much more data than a conventional DVD. The large capacity makes it possible to benefit from the features such as high-definition videos, multi-channel surround sounds, interactive menus and so on.

### Chapter

Just as a book is split up into several chapters, a title on a BD-video or DVD-video is usually divided into chapters. See also "Title".

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### Component Video Output

Each signal of luminance (Y) and component (PB/CB, PR/CR) is independent to output so that you can experience picture color as it is. Also, due to compatibility with progressive video (480p),

you can experience higher-density picture than that in interlace (480i).

### Digital Audio

An indirect representation of sound by numbers. During recording, the sound is measured at discrete intervals (44,100 times a second for CD audio) by an analog-to-digital converter, generating a stream of numbers. On playback, a digital-to-analog converter generates an analog signal based on these numbers. See also "Sampling Frequency" and "Analog Audio".

### DLNA (Digital Living Network Alliance)

DLNA is a cross-industry organization of consumer electronics that formulates DLNA Interoperability Guidelines for sharing digital contents within a home network.

### DNS Server

A server which translates Internet domain names into IP addresses.

### Dolby® Digital

The system to compress digital sound developed by Dolby Laboratories. It offers you sound of stereo (2ch) or multi-channel audio.

### Dolby Digital Plus

Dolby Digital Plus is the next generation digital audio compression technology developed as an extension to Dolby Digital. Blu-ray Disc™ supports 7.1 multi-channel surround sound output.

### Dolby TrueHD

Dolby TrueHD is a lossless coding technology developed for next generation optical discs. Blu-ray Disc™ supports 7.1 multi-channel surround sound output.

### DTS® (Digital Theater System)

DTS® is a multi channel surround sound system. You can enjoy movie dynamic and realistic sound like movie theater. DTS surround sound technologies were developed by DTS, Inc.

### DTS-HD®

DTS-HD® is a lossless coding technology developed as an extension of the original DTS Coherent Acoustics format. Blu-ray Disc™ supports 7.1 multi-channel surround sound output.

### Gateway

IP address of the electronic devices (such as router) which provide Internet access.

### HDMI (High-Definition Multimedia Interface)

---

A digital interface between audio and video source. It can transmit component video, audio, and control signal with one cable connection.

### Hub

---

A device used for connecting multiple device to the network.

### IP Address

---

A set of numbers which are assigned to devices participating in a computer network.

### JPEG (Joint Photographic Experts Group)

---

JPEG is a method of compressing still picture files. You can copy JPEG files on BD-RE/-R, DVD-RW/-R, CD-RW/-R, or USB flash drive from a computer and play back the files on this unit.

### LAN (Local Area Network)

---

A group of computer networks covering a small area like a company, school or home.

### Local Storage

---

A storage area of sub contents for playing virtual packages on BD-video.

### MP3 (MPEG audio layer 3)

---

MP3 is a method of compressing files. You can copy MP3 files on BD-RE/-R, DVD-RW/-R, CD-RW/-R, or USB flash drive from the computer and play back the files on this unit.

### PCM (Pulse Code Modulation)

---

The most common system of encoding digital audio, found on CD and DAT. Excellent quality, but requires a lot of data compared to formats such as Dolby Digital and MPEG audio. For compatibility with digital audio recorders (CD, MD and DAT) and AV amplifiers with digital inputs, this unit can convert Dolby Digital, DTS, and MPEG audio to PCM. See also "Digital Audio".

### Proxy Server

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Proxy server is a server which acts as an intermediary between a workstation user and the Internet to ensure security.

### Region Code

---

Regions associate discs and players with particular areas of the world. This unit will only play back discs that have compatible region codes. You can find the region code of your unit by looking on the rear panel. Some discs are compatible with more than one region (or all regions).

### Router

---

A networking device which distinguishes the IP address assigned to each device and routing and forwarding information in the computer network.

### Sampling Frequency

---

The rate which sound is measured by a specified interval to turn into digital audio data. The numbers of sampling in one second defines as sampling frequency. The higher the rate, the better the sound quality.

### Subnet Mask

---

A mask which is used to determine what subnet an IP address belongs to.

### Title

---

A collection of chapters on BD-video or DVD-video. See also "Chapter".

### Track

---

Audio CD uses tracks to divide up the content of a disc. The BD-video or DVD-video equivalent is called a chapter. See also "Chapter".

### Virtual Package

---

The function which copies data to other media (local storage) from the Internet and plays secondary video, secondary audio and subtitles at the same time. The method of the playback varies depending on discs.

### Windows Media™ Audio

---

Windows Media™ Audio is the audio compressing technology developed by Microsoft. You can copy Windows Media™ Audio files on BD-RE/-R, DVD-RW/-R, CD-RW/-R, or USB flash drive from a computer and play them back on this unit.

### x.v.Color

---

"x.v.Color" is a promotion name given to the products that have the capability to realize a wide color space based on the xvYCC specifications and is a trademark of Sony Corporation.

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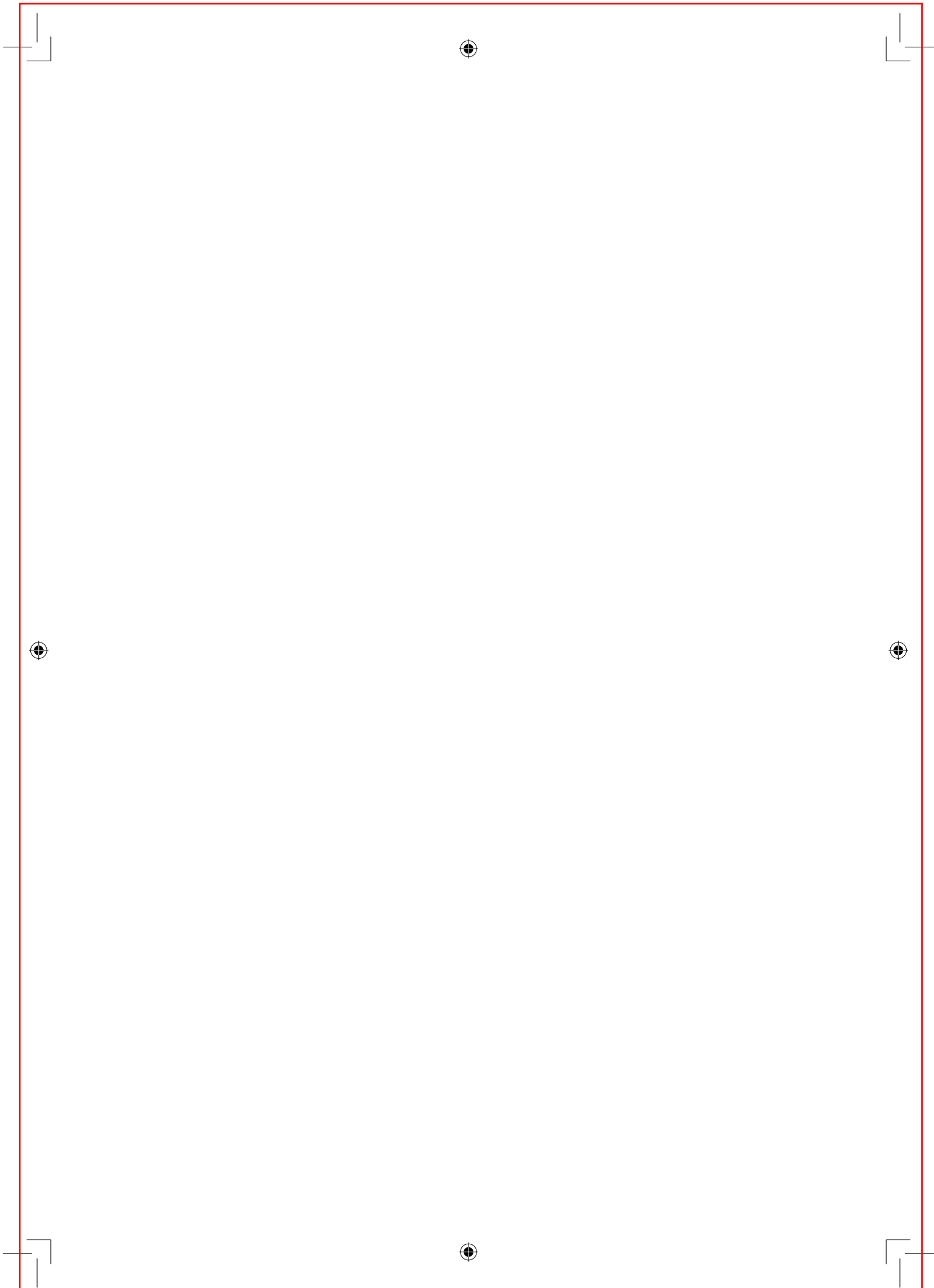
