

#### Installation

#### **Placement**

To prevent the risk of electric shock or fire due to overheating ensure curtains and other materials do not obstruct the unit's ventilation.
- Foreign material—Ensure objects and liquids do not get into the unit. Avoid exposing the unit to excessive smoke, dust, mechanical vibration, and shock.
- Magnetism—Situate the unit away from equipment and devices that generate strong magnetic fields.






#### **Use of Batteries**


- If this unit is not to be used for a long period of time or is used only from an AC power source, remove all the batterles to prevent potential damage due to possible battery leakage.
- Align the poles (+ and -) properly when inserting the batteries.
- Do not mix old and new batteries or different types of batteries.
- Do not recharge ordinary dry cell batteries.
- Do not heat or disassemble the batteries. Do not allow them to contact flame or water.
- Do not keep together with metallic objects such as necklaces.
- · Do not use rechargeable type batteries.
- Do not use batteries if the covering has been peeled off.

#### **Power Sources**

#### A Operating the unit on AC power

Connect the AC power supply cord.

#### Conserving power

The unit consumes 1.0W even when it is turned off with [TAPE/OFF DOZE]. To save power when the unit is not to be used for a long time, unplug it from the household AC outlet. Remember to reset the radio stations and any other memory items before using the unit again if you haven't inserted memory batteries.

#### Using batteries (not included)

The unit cannot be powered by batteries if the AC power supply cord is connected.

The remote control cannot turn the unit on when batteries are used.

#### **Battery installation**

Place unit on a soft cloth when installing and removing batteries to avoid damaging the front panel.

#### Inserting the batteries.

- Slide and press in the direction of the arrow to open the battery cover on the bottom of the unit.
- 2 Install batteries in the order indicated in the diagram.

#### Closing the cover.

Slide in the direction of the arrow.

#### Removing the batteries.

Press the negative end of the number 2 battery and remove the batteries.

#### **Battery life**

"UO1" is displayed when the batteries are running down. Replace all the batteries with new ones.

# Memory Back-up Batteries (not included)

Insert these batteries to save the information contained in the memory, such as the clock and alarm settings, if there is an interruption to the power supply.




#### Replacing the batteries


- The memory batteries last about one year.
- Connect the unit to AC power before replacing the batteries.
- Extend the life of the memory batteries by always pressing [TAPE/OFF DOZE] to turn the unit off before disconnecting the unit from the AC power source or replacing the power batteries.

#### Removing the batteries

Lift the positive end of the number 4 battery to remove batteries.







When the unit is supplied with AC power, buttons 1 to 4, 3, 9, 10, 13, 15 and 16 function in the same way as the controls on the main unit. To save power, the unit cannot be turned on from the remote control when the batteries are used.

#### B Batteries (not included)

Insert so the poles (+ and -) match those in the remote control.

Remove if the remote control is not going to be used for a long period of time. Store in a cool, dark place.

Replace if the unit does not respond to the remote control even when held close to the front panel.


#### C Use

Aim at the sensor, avoiding obstacles, at a maximum range of 7 meters directly in front of the unit.


- Keep the transmission window and the unit's sensor free from dust.
- Operation can be affected by strong light sources, such as direct sunlight, and the glass doors on cabinets.


















# Numbered buttons 7 8 9 0

#### **CDs**

#### A Normal Play

- 1 Push [♠ CD OPEN/CLOSE] to open the CD lid, load a CD, and push [♠ CD OPEN/CLOSE] to close the CD lid.
- 2 Press [►/II] to start play.

The unit comes on and plays to the end of the CD and stops.

3 Press [VOL -, VOL +] to adjust the volume.

#### To stop play

Press [ ALARM STOP].

#### One touch play

When a CD is loaded, press [►/II]. The unit comes on and play starts.

#### To pause play

Press [►/II] during play. Press again to resume play.

#### To skip tracks

Press [-/I◄◄] (backward) or [+/▶►I] (forward).

#### Searching through tracks

Press and hold [-/I◄◄] (backward) or [+/I►►] (forward) during play.

"NO DISC" is displayed if there is no disc in the unit.

#### Notes

- If interference occurs to radios or televisions, place the unit as far as possible from this equipment.
- Do not press [ CD OPEN/CLOSE] during play, pause or immediately after you inserted the CD and closed the CD lid. CD may be scratched.

#### CD selection

Choose CDs with this mark: (@)

This unit can play CD-DA (digital audio) format audio CD-R and CD-RW that have been finalized (a process that enables CD-R/CD-RW players to play audio CD-R and CD-RW) upon completion of recording.

It may not be able to play some CD-R or CD-RW due to the condition of the recording.

#### Do not;

- use irregularly shaped CDs (b). •
- use CDs with labels and stickers that are coming off or with adhesive exuding from under labels and stickers. (©)
- attach scratch-proof covers or any other kind of accessory.
- write anything on the CD.
- clean CDs with liquids. (Wipe with a soft, dry cloth.)
- · use CDs printed with label printers available on the market.
- load a blank CD-R/CD-RW as it will cause abnormal malfunction and may damage the CD-R/CD-RW.



#### Program play

Select up to 24 tracks to play in the order you choose.

#### Preparation:

Press [►/III] and then [■ ALARM STOP] to switch to CD mode.

#### Remote control only

- 1 Press [PGM/CLEAR].
- 2 Enter the track number with the numbered buttons.

For tracks numbered 10 and over, press [≥10] then the two digits.

Repeat this step to program the tracks in the required order.

3 Press [►/II].

All the tracks are played in the selected order.

#### To stop play

Press [ ].

"P" is displayed indicating that the program is still active.

#### To cancel

Press [PGM/CLEAR] in the stop mode and "CLr" is displayed. The mode is also canceled if the CD lid is opened.

#### "FULL" is displayed

If 24 tracks have already been programmed.

#### "-- --: -- " is displayed

If the total play time of the program exceeds 100 minutes. You can still program and play tracks.

#### When "P" is displayed

- · To check the contents of the program
- Press [-/ **!◄◄**] or [▶▶**!**/+].

Each time one of the buttons is pressed, a track and its order in the program are displayed.

• To add to the program Repeat step 2.

#### Notes

- Program play does not work when "(RANDOM)" is displayed (press [PLAY MODE] to clear it).
- · Search can be done within track only.

#### A CD play modes

#### Remote control only

You can repeat one track (1-C), all tracks (C) or play the tracks in random order ((RANDOM)).


Press [PLAY MODE] before or during playback to select the desired mode.

Press [►/II] to start play if in the stop mode.

These modes remain active until canceled.
These modes are also canceled if the CD lid is opened.
You can use repeat mode with program play.

#### Note

Random and program play cannot be done at the same time.



#### The Radio: manual tuning

- 1 Press [TUNER/BAND] to select "FM" or "AM".
- Press  $[-/| \blacktriangleleft ]$  or  $[+/ \triangleright \rightarrow ]$  to select a station.
- Press [VOL -, VOL +] to adjust the volume.

#### Auto-tuning

Press and hold [-/I◄ ] or [+/I>I] until the frequency starts changing rapidly.

Auto-tuning stops when it finds a station. (Interference may also cause it to stop. Start auto-tuning again if this occurs.) To stop auto-tuning

Press [-/I◄◄] or [+/▶►I].

#### Using auto scan

#### Remote control only

You can search for a station by listening to all tuned-in stations for 8 seconds each.

- Press [TUNER] to select "FM" or "AM".
- Press [AUTO SCAN]. Auto scan starts.
- 3 Press [AUTO SCAN] when you find the desired station.

Auto scan ends when it reaches the original frequency

To stop during the process, press [AUTO SCAN].

#### B To improve reception

FM: Change the length and position of the antenna.

AM: Change the facing of the unit.

To improve reception when using the unit in a building or vehicle use it near a window.

#### If noise is excessive in FM

#### Remote control only

#### Press [PLAY MODE] to display "wow".


Monaural sound is selected and noise reduces when reception is weak.

Press [PLAY MODE] again to cancel the mode.


#### To receive FM broadcasts allocated in 0.1MHz Main unit only


First press [TUNER/BAND] to select "AM". Now, press and hold [TUNER/BAND]. The display changes in a few seconds to show the current lowest FM frequency. Continue to hold down the button.


The minimum frequency changes and the step is changed at the same time. Changing the step erases all preset stations. Repeat the above to change the step back.



















#### The Radio: preset tuning

#### Remote control only

Tuning is simpler if you pre-set stations.

Preparation: Press [TUNER] to select "FM" or "AM".

#### Pre-setting radio stations

You can pre-set 12 FM and 12 AM stations.

- Tune to the station you want to preset.
  (⇒ page 10)
- 2 Press [PGM/CLEAR].
- While "PGM" is flashing

  Press the numbered buttons to enter the station into a channel (1 to 12).
  - •To enter channels 10, 11, and 12 Press [≥10], then the two digits.
- 4 Repeat steps 1-3 to preset other stations.

#### To select channels

Press the numbered button(s) to select the channel (1 to 12).

To select channel 10, 11 or 12, press [≥10], then the two digits.

#### A Using preset scan

You can search for a station by listening to all preset channels for 8 seconds each.

1 Press [PRESET SCAN] and "PS" appears on the display.


Preset scan starts.


2 Press [-/I◄◄] or [►►I/+] when you find the desired channel.

Preset scan ends after searching through each preset channel once.


To stop during the process, press  $[-/! \blacktriangleleft \blacktriangleleft]$  or  $[\triangleright \blacktriangleright !/+]$ .


The station occupying a channel is erased if another station is preset in that channel.











#### Cassettes

- Press [■/▲ STOP/EJECT] to open the deck and load a cassette. Close the deck by hand.
- Press [TAPE/OFF DOZE] to switch to tape mode.
- Press [◀ PLAY] to start play.
- 4 Press [VOL -, VOL +] to adjust the volume.

#### To stop play

Press [■/ STOP/EJECT].

#### To eject tape

Stop tape play, then press [■/ STOP/EJECT].

#### To pause

Press [II PAUSE] during playback.

To resume, press [II PAUSE].

The unit's power is on in the pause mode. Stop tape to turn the unit off by pressing [■/ STOP/EJECT] when leaving the unit.

#### One touch play

When a cassette is loaded, press [◀ PLAY]. The unit comes on and play starts.

#### Fast-forward and rewind

Stop tape play, then press [◄◄ FF/CUE] (fast-forward) or [►► REW/REV] (rewind).

#### To find a particular spot

Press and hold [◄◄ FF/CUE] (to search forward) or [>> REW/REV] (to search backward) during playback. Play is resumed when the button is released.

#### Full auto-stop


The automatic stop system will release the buttons when the tape reaches the end during play, recording, fast forwarding or rewinding.


#### Selection of tapes

This unit is suitable for playing normal position tapes, but high and metal position tapes will not be played to their full potential.


#### Cassette tape care


- · Tapes exceeding 100 minutes are thin and can break or get caught in the mechanism.
- · Tape slack can get caught up in the mechanism and should be taken up before the tape is played.
- · Endless tapes can get caught up in the deck's moving parts if used incorrectly.











#### Recording

You can record radio broadcasts or CDs.

#### Before recording

- This unit is suitable for recording normal tapes, but it cannot record onto high and metal position tapes to their full potential and prior recordings will not be erased correctly.
- The recording level is set automatically.
- · Take up the leader tape before proceeding.
- 1 Press [■/≜·STOP/EJECT] to open the deck and load a cassette.

Close the deck by hand.

2 Select the source to be recorded. When recording radio broadcasts

Tune in the station.

(Do steps 1-2 of "The Radio: manual tuning" on page 10.)

#### When recording CDs

Press [►/II] and then [■ ALARM STOP] to switch to CD mode.

Insert the CD to be recorded.

(Do step 1 on page 8.)

If you want to record programmed tracks, program desired tracks before proceeding to step 3. (Do steps 1–2 on page 9.)

#### 3 Press [● 🖼 ] to start recording.

[◄ PLAY] is also depressed with [♠ RE♠].
Recording starts (one side only).
The CD also starts playing if in CD mode.

#### To stop recording

Press [■/▲ STOP/EJECT]. (The CD does not stop.)

#### To stop recording temporarily

Press [II PAUSE]. (The CD does not stop.) Press once again to resume recording.

#### To record on the other side of the cassette

Turn the cassette over and press [● REC].

#### If the CD finishes before the cassette

Recording continues. Press [■/♠ STOP/EJECT] to stop it.

#### If the cassette finishes before the CD

The CD continues playing. Press [■ ALARM STOP] to stop it.

#### Note

Noise may be recorded if this unit is near a TV. Keep the units at least 1.5 meters apart.

#### A Erasure prevention

Use a screwdriver or similar object to break out the tab.

#### B To re-record on a protected cassette

Cover the hole with adhesive tape.


#### To erase a cassette

- 1. Press [TAPE/OFF DOZE].
- Insert the cassette with the side to be erased facing towards you and the exposed tape facing up.
- 3. Press [● **REC**].

[◀ PLAY] is depressed at the same time.

#### Reference

Changes to volume and sound quality do not affect recording. To prevent interruptions to recording, supply AC power to the unit or replace the batteries.



# 3D sound with the Sound Virtualizer

#### Remote control only

You can create a three-dimensional sound field when listening to stereo sound.

#### Press [S.VIRTUALIZER].

Press again to cancel.

#### Note

Recordings are unaffected by this feature.

The actual effect depends on the source played.
