Getting Started

Product Description

The MTS400 Series MPEG Test Systems provide a comprehensive and integrated suite of real-time and deferred (offline) analysis tools. The tools include TS (transport stream) compliance, buffer, PES, MPEG2, and MPEG4 video and audio elementary stream analyzers. Also included are an editor and a multiplexer for the creation of stream content, and test and error-stressing streams.

Standards compliance is ensured though built-in customizable scripting which supports a broad range of ratified and evolving DTV standards. New standards and proprietary tables, can easily be implemented by loading Tektronix supplied updates, or creating your own custom scripts.

The MTS400 series instruments have a large LCD display with a powerful 2.8 GHz processor with support for multiple physical layer interfaces such as ASI, SPI, SMPTE310M and Gigabit Ethernet.

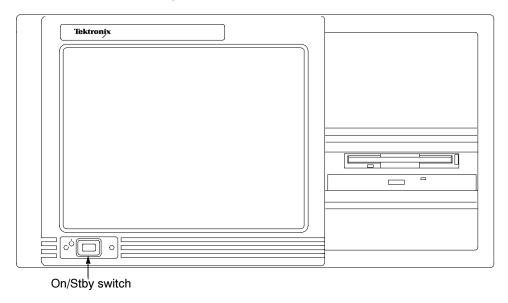


Figure 1-1: MTS400 Series System front panel

There are three variants of the MTS400 Series MPEG Test System; the MTS400 system, the MTS430 system and the MTS400 Stand-alone system:

- The MTS400 system includes SPI, ASI and SMPTE310M interfaces, real time transport stream analysis and transport stream play and record.
- The MTS430 system includes SPI, ASI and SMPTE310M and 10/100 IP interfaces, real time transport stream analysis, play and record, deferred time

transport stream, packetized elementary stream and Buffer analysis and Multiplexing.

• MTS400 Stand-alone system allows the deferred analysis and testing components to be installed on a personal computer.

Software Protection

The MTS400 Series System software options require that a software key be installed so that the purchased set of options can be accessed. A software key is a small hardware device; two forms are available, one can be connected to the unit parallel port, the other to the USB (Universal Serial Bus) port; the form supplied will depend upon the original order. For the MTS400 Series System unit, the (parallel port) software key is initially installed at the factory.

If you subsequently obtain additional options, software (and upgrade instructions) to upgrade the software key will be supplied.

Any printer compatible with the installed operating system can be connected to the unit through the parallel port version of the software key.

MTS400 Series System Installation

This section describes how to install the MTS400 Series System instruments. The analysis functions (where enabled) can be used with no installation other than providing power and making a transport stream available on the hard disk of the unit. The monitoring and real-time analysis functions similarly require power but also require connection to an external transport stream.

The MTS400 Series System is configured with the software and hardware options that you ordered at the time of purchase. Options can be added using upgrade kits available from Tektronix (see *MTS4UP Options*, page 1-9).

Unpacking the MTS400 Series System

Table 1-5 on page 1-10 lists the standard accessories that are shipped with the MTS400 Series System.

Placing the Instrument



CAUTION. Do not operate the MTS400 Series System instrument in the vertical position. Using it in the vertical position does not allow sufficient ventilation or clearance for cables at the rear of the unit.

Test System Interconnections

Use the following procedure to make electrical, signal and network connections:



CAUTION. Do not supply power to the instrument until all other connections have been made.

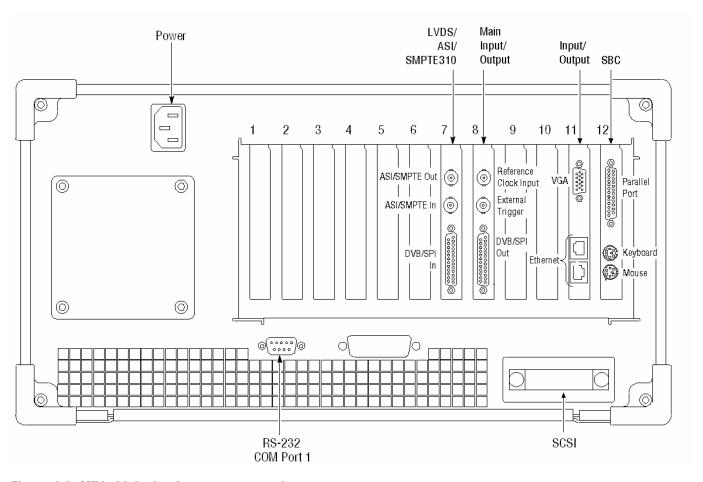


Figure 1-2: MTS400 Series System rear-panel connectors

Figure 1-2 and Table 1-7 show the MTS400 Series System rear panel connectors. When the instrument is mounted securely, make the transport stream, network and peripheral device connections necessary for the working environment.

CAUTION. To prevent instrument damage from overheating, maintain at least two inches (5.1 cm) of clearance at the rear and sides of the instrument cabinet when locating the instrument on a bench.

Plug the keyboard into the proper rear panel connectors. Note that the keyboard has two connectors at the end of the cable, one connector for the keyboard and one connector for the track pad. Refer to Figure 1-2. Alternative connectors for mouse and keyboard are provided on the side panel of the unit.

Ensure that the software key is in place. If you are using the parallel port software key, ensure that the securing screws are tightened to 4 inch-pounds of torque (45 Newton centimeters).



CAUTION. To prevent instrument damage from electrostatic discharge, ensure that the parallel port software key securing screws are properly tightened before operating the instrument.

The MTS400 Series System applications will not run without the software key installed. Do not remove the software key.

To use the Parallel port with the software key installed, attach any parallel port cables (such as a printer cables) directly to the software key. The software key does not interfere with parallel communications.

NOTE. If you return the test system to a Tektronix Service Center for upgrade or repair, do not remove the software key.

Supplying Power

The MTS400 Series System and MTS430 units are designed to operate from a single-phase power source having one of its current carrying conductors at or near earth ground (the neutral conductor). Power sources that have both current carrying conductors live with respect to ground, such as phase-to-phase or multiphase systems, are not recommended. A protective ground connection, by way of the grounding conductor in the power cord, is essential for safe operation.

The electrical operating requirements for the MTS400 Series System are shown in Table 1-8. See the *MTS400 Series System Technical Reference* (071-1724-xx) for more detailed electrical characteristics.

After you have installed the MTS400 Series System and completed making the signal and peripheral connections, plug the power cord into the mains. See Figure 1-2 for the location of the power connector on the rear panel.

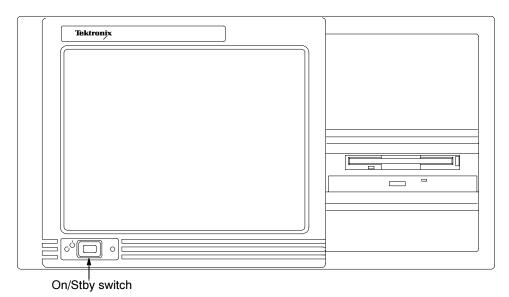
Powering On and Off

This section contains the procedure for powering on the instrument for the first time. To power off the instrument, see *Powering Off* (page 1-19).

First Time Power On

Power on the test system as follows:

1. Press the front-panel On/Standby switch to power on the unit.



2. Wait for the instrument to complete its power-on self-tests.

The screen displays an Enter Windows Password dialog box prompting you for a logon name and password. However, if a password is entered, then each time you power on the measurement set you will be prompted for logon information. To avoid this, perform the following steps:

- **a.** Enter a user name (for example, MTS400) in the Enter Windows Password dialog box.
- **b.** Click OK, but do not enter a password.
- **c.** Click OK in the Set Windows Password dialog box, but do not enter a password.

NOTE. If subsequently want to set a password, refer to your Windows documentation.

Powering Off

Always power off the instrument using the Windows XP shutdown process (select **START > Shut down...**). The system (including applications) will shut down automatically. When prompted, press the front panel On/Standby switch to remove power from the unit.

Alternatively, press the front panel On/Standby switch for two seconds and release. The system will shut down and power off automatically with no further intervention.

Network Installation

The MTS400 Series System can be attached to a computer network. Refer to your Network Administrator for details of the correct network configuration. For installation and operating instructions, refer to the documentation that is supplied with the network hardware and software.

Duplex Operation

The MTS400 Series System can be operated in duplex mode. For example, while the Player is playing out a stream, the TS Compliance Analyzer can be analyzing a separate stream or, if the output is looped back to the input, the output of the Player can be monitored by TS Compliance Analyzer (TSCA).

Setting up Loopback

With the following procedure you can:

- Use the MPEG Player to play out a stream.
- Loop the instrument output back to the input.
- Monitor/analyze the incoming stream using the TSCA.

Before starting:

- Identify the stream to be played out (in this example the sym1.mpg test stream is used).
- Choose the output/input interface (ASI/SMPTE310 or DVB SPI) and make the necessary connections (loop between the connectors) at the rear of the instrument (see Figure 1-2 on page 1-14).

In the following example, the stream is looped back using the ASI interface and the stream is looped (to play continuously).

NOTE. You can choose either ASI or SPMTE310 to be output via the BNC connectors. The DVB SPI output will always be available, whatever the settings are in the player.

MPEG Player Setup

 Open the MPEG Player: Start menu > Programs > Tektronix MTS400 > Player > MPEG Player.

2. Open a stream:

File > Open... > sym1.mpg

3. Make the following settings in the **Play** menu:

Packet size: 188 Update: On Sync: TS Packet Loop: On

Other: Standard: DVB

TSCA Setup

1. Open the TSCA:

Start menu > Programs > Tektronix MTS400 > Analyzers > TS Compliance Analyzer.

- 2. In the start-up dialog box (**Open Transport Stream**...), select Stream Interpretation and select the DVB base standard with no extensions.
- 3. Select Real-time Analysis and select **ASI** from the **Interfaces** drop-down list.
- 4. Select OK.

Start the Playout/Analysis

- 1. Return to the MPEG Player window and play the stream by selecting: Play > Start/Stop or use the toolbar button.
- 2. In the Player window, note that the status bar is now displayed and that playout has started.
- **3.** Return to the TSCA window and note that analysis has started.

The MPEG Player is now playing out the sym1.mpg transport stream and, via the ASI input and output on the instrument connector panel, the TSCA is monitoring and analyzing the stream.

For detailed descriptions of the MPEG Player and the TSCA, refer to the *MTS400 Series User Manual* (071-1507-xx).

MTS400 Stand-alone System Installation (MTS4SA option)

The MTS400 Stand-alone system makes the MTS400 Series System applications (except the real-time features) available on a PC. The full specification is given in the MTS400 Series System Technical Reference (071-1724-xx).

If the MTS4EA option (MTS4EA Compressed Video ES Analyzer) has been purchased, use the installation procedure provided in the accompanying user manual (MTS4EA Compressed Video ES Analyzer, 071-1641-xx).

If the MTS400 Stand-alone system software is to be installed on an AD953A MPEG Test System, choosing the Complete or Deferred setup options will remove all of the AD953A software, including the real-time applications. The MTS400 real-time applications will not work with the AD953A hardware. It is recommended that the custom setup and installation be used.

System Requirements

The following minimum PC configuration is recommended for installing the MTS400 Stand-alone system:

- Microsoft WindowsTM NT 4.0, Windows 2000 or Windows XP operating system
- Processor speed >1.0 GHz
- Memory at least 256 MB RAM
- Screen resolution at least 1024x768
- 120 MB minimum hard disk space.

NOTE. The MTS4EA MPEG Compressed Video ES Analyzer application will run satisfactorily on a PC with the above specification. However, some of the more intensive operations will benefit from using a more powerful PC. Refer to the MPEG Compressed Video ES Analyzer User Manual (071-1641-xx) for more details.

NOTE. All deferred applications will run satisfactorily on the AD953 MPEG Test System.

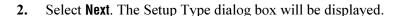
Installation

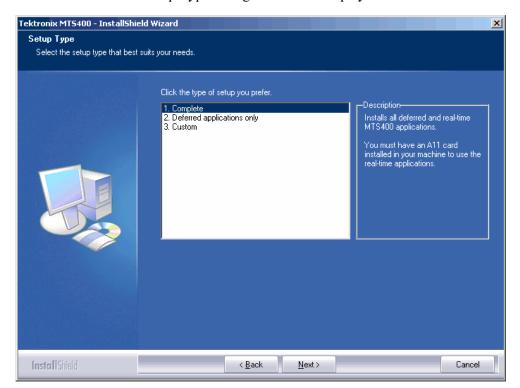


CAUTION. If you already have MTS400 Stand-alone software installed on your PC, it must be removed before the new MTS400 software is installed.

After you place the MTS4SA CD-ROM in the PC drive, the Welcome dialog box will display an option to remove all installed features. Choose this option and complete the removal procedure before attempting to install the new software. After restarting the PC, the CD-ROM must be removed and reinserted before the installation can continue.

Place the MTS4SA CD-ROM in the PC CD-ROM drive.
 The CD will autostart and display a Welcome dialog box.





This dialog allows you to select the type of installation that will be installed.

Three options are offered:

Complete Installs all deferred and real-time applications and

features.

NOTE. Although they will be installed, real-time features of the MTS400 test system will not be usable, since the A11 Main Input/Output card (as installed in the MTS400/MTS430 unit) will not be present.

Deferred Installs only the deferred analysis applications and

features.

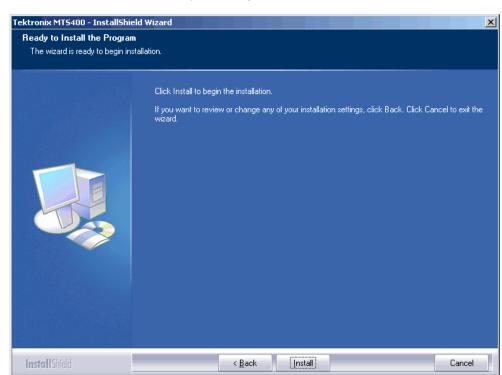
Custom Displays a list of the MTS400 applications and allows you

to select which are to be installed.

3. Choose the setup that you require and select Next.

NOTE. Operational access to features is controlled by the licenses available on the software key (see page 1-10). Applications and features can be installed, but will not be available unless the appropriate license has been obtained. Notification of these is provided when the product or additional licenses are purchased.

4. If the Custom setup has been chosen, refer to *Custom Setup* on page 1-29.



5. Confirm the installation by selecting **Install**.

6. Allow the installation process to proceed.

NOTE. A number of dialog boxes are displayed during the installation process. Normally, no user intervention is required.

The average installation time is approximately five minutes.

InstallShield Wizard Complete

The InstallShield Wizard has successfully installed Tektronix MTS400. Before you can use the program, you must restart your computer.

Yes, I want to restart my computer now.
No, I will restart my computer later.

Remove any disks from their drives, and then click Finish to complete setup.

7. When installation is complete, the Installation Complete dialog box is displayed.

8. Choose the option to restart the PC and then select **Finish**.

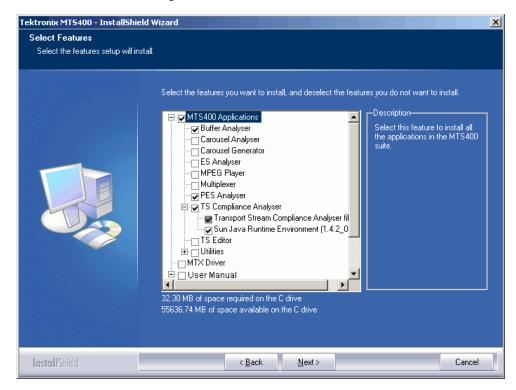
The PC will shut down and restart. The licensed MTS400 Stand-alone applications will now be available in the Windows Start menu (see page 1-31) and via desktop icons.

NOTE. Desktop icons are not installed for stand-alone operation. Applications can be started from the Windows Start menu.

NOTE. The software key must be installed before any of the applications can be opened (see Software Protection, page 1-10).

Custom Setup

Where Custom setup is chosen, you can choose the location of the files to be installed. Unless otherwise required, select **Next** to accept the location and display the feature selection dialog box.

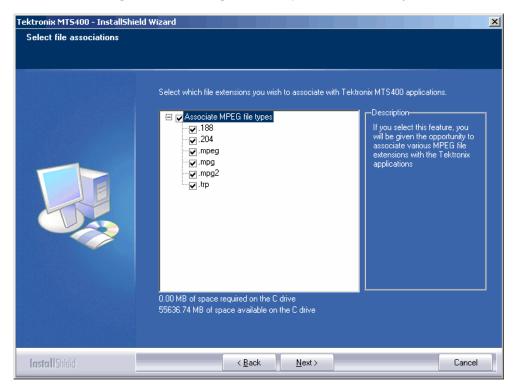


1. Select the check boxes next to the required features.

NOTE. Adobe Acrobat Reader will be required to read the User Manual.

2. When you have selected all the required features, select **Next** to proceed with the installation.

3. Custom installation allows you to specify MPEG file association using the Transport Stream Compliance Analyzer (part of the MTS400). Associated files can be opened in the compliance analyzer or edited using the TS Editor.



- **4.** Select the check boxes of the files to be associated with the MTS400.
- **5.** Select **Next** to proceed with the installation; the installation continues as for Complete or Deferred installation.

Starting an Application

All applications are started from the **Start > All Programs > Tektronix MTS400** menus.

A brief description of each application is given on page 2-1 of this manual. The *MTS400 Series System User Manual* (071-1507-xx) provides full descriptions of all applications. Table 1-9 shows the hierarchy of applications in the Start menu.

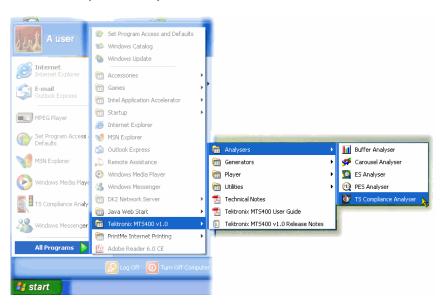
This section briefly describes how to set up and analyze off-line and real-time streams using the Transport Stream Compliance Analyzer (TCSA). You can find information on how to interpret the analysis results in the relevant chapter of the user manual.

You must perform the following actions in order to analyze a stream:

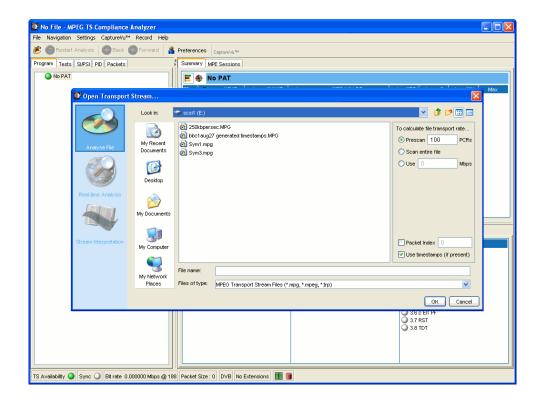
- Start the TSCA.
- Verify and, if necessary, select the stream interpretation standard.
- Set the stream transport rate calculation method (off-line only).
- Identify and select the stream to be analyzed (off-line or real-time).

Starting the TSCA

1. From the Start menu, select Start > All Programs > Tektronix MTS400 > Analyzers > TS Compliance Analyzer.



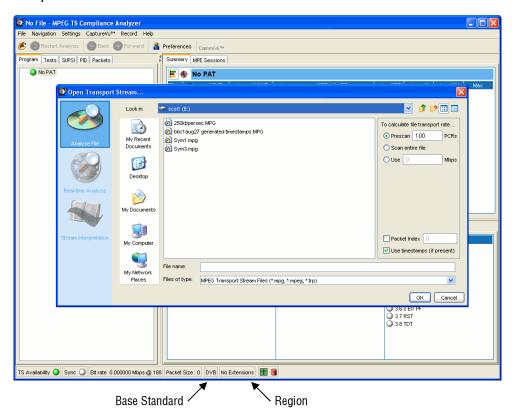
The TSCA is opened immediately overlaid by the **Open Transport Stream...** dialog box.

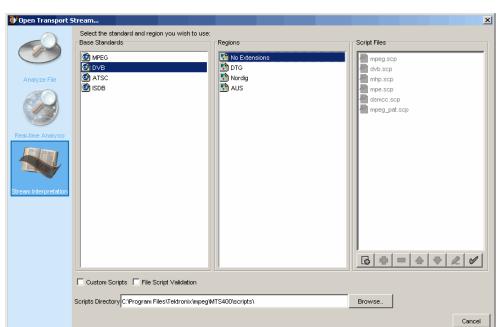


NOTE. The Real-time Analysis selection in the Open Transport Stream... dialog box is not available in stand-alone configurations.

Setting the Interpretation Standard

For a stream to be analyzed correctly, the interpretation standard in the TSCA must be set to be the same as that used to create the stream. You can see the Base Standard and Region currently set for the TSCA by looking at the stream interpretation fields in the status bar of the main window.



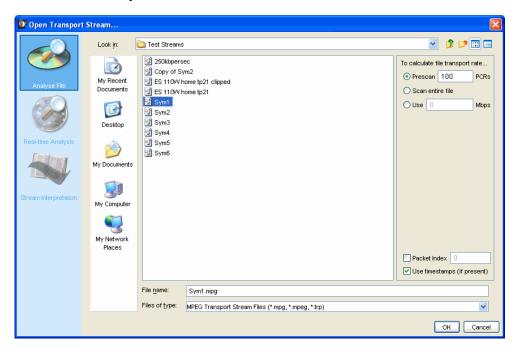


1. If you need to change the interpretation standard, select the **Stream Interpretation** view.

2. Set the **Base Standard** and **Region** as required. Note that the scripts used in the current selection are listed in the **Script Files** pane.

Off-line Analysis





2. Identify and select a file.

For the file to be analyzed correctly, the bit rate must be known. You can let the TSCA do this automatically or you can set it manually.

If PCRs (Program Clock Reference) are present in the file, the TSCA is able to calculate the bit rate automatically either by prescanning the first 100 PCRs or by scanning the entire file. Scanning the entire file is a more accurate method of calculating the bit rate but analysis of the file will take longer.

3. Enable the **Use Timestamps** checkbox.

If timestamping is present in the file to be analyzed, it can be used to provide a more accurate calculation of the bit rate. If timestamps are found not to be present, the bit rate will be calculated using PCRs.

4. Set the packet index.

The packet index field allows you to specify how many packets in the stream are to be analyzed. The value entered will be the last packet analyzed; that is,

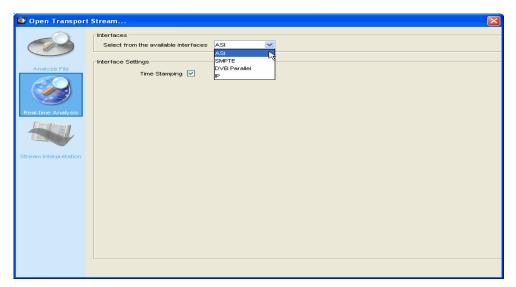
from packet zero to the value entered. Note that if too small a sample of the stream is analyzed, insufficient service information may be available for meaningful analysis.

Disable the Packet Index checkbox to ensure full stream analysis.

5. Select **OK** to proceed with the off-line file analysis. During analysis of a stream, a progress bar is displayed in the toolbar.

Real-time Analysis

1. Select the **Real-time Analysis** view.



- **2.** Select the MTS400 Series System interface. This is the input that your real-time stream is being received on.
- 3. If present in the Interface Settings pane, enable the Use Timestamps checkbox.

If timestamping is present in the file to be analyzed, it can be used to provide a more accurate calculation of the bit rate. If timestamps are found not to be present, the bit rate will be calculated using PCRs.

For the IP interface, select the port number.

4. Select **OK** to proceed with the real-time file analysis.

Stream Analysis Results

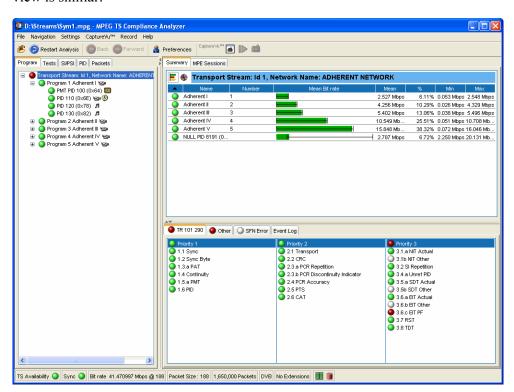


Figure 1-3: TSCA - File Open

Figure 1-3 shows the result of off-line analysis. The layout of the real-time analysis view is similar.

Appendices

Appendix A: Cleaning and Maintenance

This appendix describes general care and service procedures for the MPEG Test System.

- Preventive Maintenance provides cleaning instructions.
- *In Case There is a Problem* provides some hints for troubleshooting startup errors.
- Repackaging for Shipment gives instructions for packing and shipping the instrument.

General Care

Protect the instrument from adverse weather conditions. The instrument is not waterproof.



CAUTION. To avoid damage to the instrument, do not expose it to sprays, liquids, or solvents.

Do not use chemical cleaning agents; they may damage the instrument. Avoid chemicals that contain benzene, toluene, xylene, acetone, or similar solvents.

Preventive Maintenance

Check the electrical performance and verify that the instrument accuracy is certified (calibrated) once a year.

Preventive maintenance mainly consists of periodic cleaning. Periodic cleaning reduces instrument breakdown and increases reliability. You should clean the instrument as needed, based on the operating environment. Dirty conditions may require more frequent cleaning than computer room conditions.

Cleaning the Exterior

Clean the exterior surfaces of the instrument with a dry, lint-free cloth or a soft-bristle brush. If dirt remains, use a cloth or swab dampened with a 75% isopropyl alcohol solution. A swab is useful for cleaning in narrow spaces around the

controls and connectors. Do not use abrasive compounds on any part of the instrument.



CAUTION. Avoid getting moisture inside the instrument during external cleaning and use only enough solution to dampen the cloth or swab. Use a 75% isopropyl alcohol solution as a cleanser and rinse with deionized water.

Do not wash the front-panel On/Standby switch. Cover the switch while cleaning the instrument.

Cleaning the Compact Disc Drive

The compact disc drive requires routine maintenance to operate at maximum efficiency. The compact discs can be damaged if dirt and dust accumulate on the surface of the discs. Store any discs in their protective containers to keep them from being exposed to dust or dirt.



CAUTION. Electrostatic discharge (ESD) can damage components in the CD-ROM drive. Do not touch lens or exposed metallic parts on the platter, with the exception of the center hub.

Clean the face of the CD-ROM drive monthly with a cloth dampened with deionized water.



CAUTION. Do not allow moisture to enter the disc drive. When power is applied, the internal components might be damaged.

Cleaning the Keyboard

Clean the exterior surfaces of the keyboard and integrated tracking device with a dry, lint-free cloth or a soft-bristle brush. A swab is useful for cleaning in narrow spaces around the controls and connectors. Do not use abrasive compounds on any part of the instrument.



CAUTION. Avoid getting moisture inside the keyboard and integrated tracking device during external cleaning and use only enough solution to dampen the cloth or swab. Use a 75% isopropyl alcohol solution as a cleanser and rinse with deionized water.

In Case of Problems

This section addresses problems that you may encounter while using the test system. This section does not identify specific problems related to performance verification or adjustments. The diagnostic procedures for the MTS400 Series System provided in this section can help you isolate problems. For a performance verification procedure, refer to the MTS400 Series System MPEG Test System Technical Reference, supplied as a PDF file on the MTS400 Series System MPEG Test System Recovery CD-ROM.

Power-on diagnostics run when you first power on the instrument to start the test system application. These diagnostics check the operating system and hardware for correct operation. If error messages occur during the power-on diagnostics, there may be a system error that prevents the MTS400 Series System software from starting.

Table A-1 lists some of the symptoms of hardware problems (related to the operating system and peripheral devices) and possible solutions.

Table A-1: Troubleshooting power-on failures

Symptom	Possible causes and recommended actions
Instrument does not power on	Verify that the power cord is connected to the instrument and to the power source.
	Check that the instrument receives power when you press the On/Standby switch; check that fans start.
	Check that power is available at the power source.
	Contact your local Tektronix service center.
Instrument powers on but does not complete the power-on sequence	Check for and remove any disk in the floppy disk drive; make sure instrument boots from the hard disk drive.
Power-on diagnostics fail	Contact your local Tektronix service center.
Instrument does not recognize accessories such as monitor, printer, or keyboard	Check that accessories are properly connected or installed.
	Contact your local Tektronix service center.
Instrument will not power off with On/Standby switch	Try powering off the instrument using the Windows XP shutdown procedure. If the instrument still does not power off, use the task manager to close down tasks. Finally, try the hard shutdown procedure; push and hold the On/Standby switch for five seconds to power off the instrument.

Software Problems

Your MPEG Test System comes with software already installed. For any suspected software problems, try to isolate the problem to the test system application software or to other installed software.

Many software problems are due to corrupted or missing software files. In most cases, the easiest way to solve software problems is to reinstall the software. See the *Software Repair and Recovery* appendix.

If you suspect networking problems, see *Appendix D: Network Troubleshooting*.

Hardware Problems

Hardware problems can have several causes. Review the installation instructions in this manual to verify that you have properly installed the instrument. There are no user serviceable parts in the MTS400 Series Systems, so you should contact your local Tektronix Service representative if you have a hardware problem.

Repackaging for Shipment

Your instrument was originally shipped by Tektronix in a carton with packaging components designed to protect the instrument from damage during shipment. If you need to ship the instrument to another location, it is strongly recommended that you use the original shipping carton and packaging components to provide adequate protection during shipment.



CAUTION. To prevent the loss of your instrument's warranties, Tektronix strongly recommends that you use your original shipping carton (one that is in good condition) when you ship the instrument to another location or when you return the instrument to a Tektronix service center for repair.

Tektronix cannot honor the instrument's warranties if the instrument arrives at the service center damaged and it was not shipped in its original carton or in a replacement carton (and its supporting packaging material) purchased from Tektronix. If you lose your original packaging material, contact your Tektronix representative to obtain replacement packaging.

Packaging Inspection

When preparing to ship your instrument to another location, it is important to inspect your existing packaging materials for condition and missing components.

If the condition of your existing packaging materials is poor, or if you are missing some of the components, it is strongly recommended that you order a new packaging kit.

Replacement Packaging Materials

New packaging materials are available from Tektronix. To obtain these items, contact your Tektronix representative.

The replacement packaging kit, Tektronix part number 065-0714-xx, includes all the packaging material required to properly package the instrument for shipment.

Repackaging Procedure

When the instrument is shipped, it is important to package it well to protect the instrument. It is not necessary to return the accessories received with the instrument when returning the instrument for repair.

- 1. If the instrument is to be shipped to a Tektronix field office for repair, attach a tag to the instrument showing the following:
 - Owner's name and address
 - Instrument serial number
 - Description of the problem(s) encountered and/or service required.
- 2. Place the protective front cover on the front of the instrument.
- **3.** Place the instrument in the protective bag. The bag prevents dust, moisture, and other debris from entering the cabinet.
- **4.** Fold the top of the bag neatly over the top of the instrument to make it as flat as possible and seal with packing tape.
- 5. Place the front cushion over the front of the instrument.
- **6.** Place the rear cushion over the rear of the instrument.
- 7. Carefully lift the instrument with front and rear cushions attached and lower it into the shipping box.

8. Position the cardboard tray into the top of the box, pressing the tray down until it rests on the tops of the front and rear cushions.

NOTE: To ensure packaging integrity and product safety, the tray must be installed regardless of whether accessories are being included in the package.

- **9.** If you are shipping the accessories, arrange the accessories in the tray.
- 10. Close and tape the shipping box.
- 11. Attach the appropriate shipping documents needed to ship the instrument to its destination.

Appendix B: MTS400/MTS430 System Recovery

If you have problems with the BIOS configuration or the MTS400/MTS430 system/application software, use the procedures in this section to restore the system to factory default installation and configuration.

NOTE. If you are restoring software after replacing the hard disk drive with one that you ordered as a replacement from Tektronix, follow the instructions provided with the hard disk replacement kit.

If you are restoring software after reformatting the hard drive, perform all of the procedures in this section in sequence.

Overview

These procedures require the MTS400 Series System Recovery CD-ROM, which was shipped with the MPEG Test System.

Only a qualified technician who is familiar with installing drivers and configuring systems for networking should perform this installation.

These tips apply to the procedures in this section:

- Use default settings unless otherwise indicated in the following procedures.
- These procedures use drive "D:" as the CD-ROM drive.
- At the end of some steps, you are instructed to restart the system. To do this, if you are prompted to restart, select **Yes.** If not prompted, select **Shutdown** from the Start menu and then select **Restart the computer.**

You can use the procedures in this section to do any of the following:

- Restore the system BIOS settings to factory defaults.
- Restore the complete system, including installation and configuration, to factory defaults.

The complete system includes:

- Microsoft Windows XP Professional with Service Pack 2
- Internet Explorer 6.0 SP2
- SigmaTel C-Major Sound Driver
- Mobility Radeon 7500 Display Driver (ATI)
- Tektronix Soft Power Down Driver & Shutdown Service
- Intel EtherExpress PRO/100B and PRO/1000 PCI Adapter Driver
- Symbios SCSI Driver
- Nero CD/DVD recording software
- Intel Application Accelerator
- Intel INF Update
- Media Player 10
- Adobe Acrobat 6
- Tektronix MTS400 Series System MPEG Test Systems application software

Restore the BIOS Settings



CAUTION. The MTS400 Series systems are programmed with custom BIOS settings; choosing any other settings will cause instrument malfunction. Do not use the setup defaults of the BIOS manufacturer.

Boot Options

The system is set at the factory to boot from a floppy disk, CD-ROM and then the hard disk drive. If this setting has been changed, you must reset the boot options before you can restore the BIOS settings from the CD-ROM.

To reset the boot options, perform the following procedure:

- **1.** Reboot the system.
- 2. Press **DEL** to enter BIOS setup when prompted during the system startup.
- **3.** Go to the Advanced BIOS Features setup menu.
- 4. Change the **First**, **Second** and **Third Boot Device** to: **Floppy**, **CDROM** and then **HDD-0**.
- 5. Exit with Save Settings.

Restore BIOS settings from the CD-ROM

To reprogram the CMOS NVRAM to the custom factory settings for the BIOS, perform the following steps:

- 1. Power up the MTS400 Series system.
- 2. Press **DEL** to enter BIOS setup when prompted during the system startup.
- 3. Select Load Optimized Defaults and Y to confirm the selection.
- 4. In the Advance BIOS Features menu, change the First, Second and Third Boot Device to: Floppy, CDROM and then HDD-0.

 Press Esc to return to the main menu.
- 5. In the Advanced Chipset Features menu, change Turbo Mode to Enabled to allow DDRAM to operate at maximum speed.
 Press Esc to return to the main menu.

6. In the Integrated Peripherals menu, change USB Keyboard Support to Enabled, change the Init Display First to Onboard/AGP, change the Parallel Port Mode to ECP+EPP, and change the EPP Mode Select to EPP 1.9.
Press Esc to return to the main menu.

7. In the Power Management menu, change the **ACPI Function** to **Disabled** and the **Power Management** function to **Min Saving**.

Press Esc to return to the main menu.

8. In the PnP/PCI Configurations menu, change the PNP OS Installed to Yes, change Reset Configuration Data to Enabled, change the Resources Controlled By to Manual.

In the IRQ Resources menu, change the **IRQ-11 assigned to Legacy ISA**. Press Esc twice to return to the main menu.

9. In the PC Health Status menu, change the CPU Warning Temperature to 70 °C/158 °C, change the Shutdown Temperature to 80 °C/185 °C, change the Warning Beep to Enabled, change the CPU Fan Failure Warning to Enabled. Press Esc to return to the main menu.

10. Save the changes and exit.

Restore the Contents of the Hard Disk

In some situations, such as when the power has been interrupted or files were mistakenly deleted, the system may fail to boot from the hard drive. If this happens, use the *MTS400 Series System CD-ROM* to restore the hard drive to factory default installation status.

Easy Restore

To restore the MTS400 Series System use the following steps. This restore process is effective only if the hard disk drive is still good. The process will restore the operations system and the application software. (The process should take less than 20 minutes.)

- 1. Power up the MPEG Test System with the MTS400 Series System CD-ROM in the CD-ROM drive.
 - The system should immediately autostart the recovery procedure. If not, wait until Windows XP has initialized and enter d:\restdisk.bat either in the Start > Run box or in the Command Prompt dialog box.
- 2. Click Continue or Next when prompted.
- **3.** The final message box before recovery commences warns you that all present installation will be destroyed by the recovery process; confirm with **Yes**. A window will show the progress of the restore function.
- **4.** Remove the CD-ROM from the drive and restart the system when prompted.
- 5. On startup, the system will prompt you to set up Windows XP. Follow the procedure, accepting defaults where necessary.
- **6.** Allow the system to restart when prompted.

This completes the MTS400 System Recovery Procedure.

Appendix C: Network Troubleshooting

Networks are based on standards; however, there are many unique characteristics of each network (LAN or WAN) that make it difficult to troubleshoot without a thorough knowledge of the specific network. Consequently, an expert who knows your network characteristics should perform in-depth network troubleshooting.

This appendix provides some basic procedures that can eliminate some of the more common sources of network errors. If you cannot resolve problems using these procedures, contact your network administrator.

Basic Requirements

Fulfill the following requirements before troubleshooting your host machines:

- Configure your system for use on the network as described in the documentation that is supplied with the Network Adapter card. Contact your network administrator for details.
- Ensure that any applications that you may have loaded on your test system since receiving it are not using the ports assigned to the test system components.

IP Parameters

The illustrations in this section depict how each IP parameter (IP address, subnet mask, and default gateway) can negatively affect network connectivity.

Incorrect IP Address

If the IP address for your test system is incorrect (not unique), then you may not be able to communicate over the network. In Figure C-1, TVTest_1 uses the same IP address as Rennes. If Rennes is started first, TVTest_1 will recognize the IP address conflict and will not load TCP/IP; consequently, the system will not be reachable over the network.

If your IP address is incorrect, and the IP address does not exist on your subnet, you may be able to communicate from the device (system or monitoring station), but you may not be able to communicate to the device.

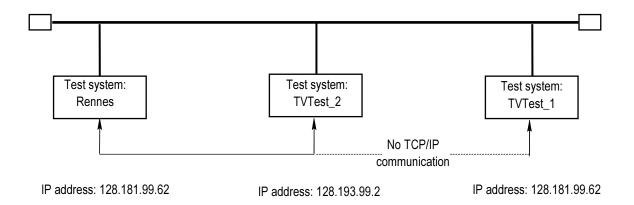


Figure C-1: Incorrect IP address

Incorrect Subnet Mask

Subnets and subnetting networks are complex and require a thorough understanding of IP addressing. Call your network administrator if you think your networking problem involves subnets. Figure 4-8 shows a simple (and fairly common) subnet mask problem.

In Figure C-2, the subnet mask for TVTest_1 indicates that the network address is contained in the first two bytes of the IP address. In dotted decimal notation, the network address is 128.181. This information allows the device to communicate with any other device with the same network address without being routed through a default gateway.

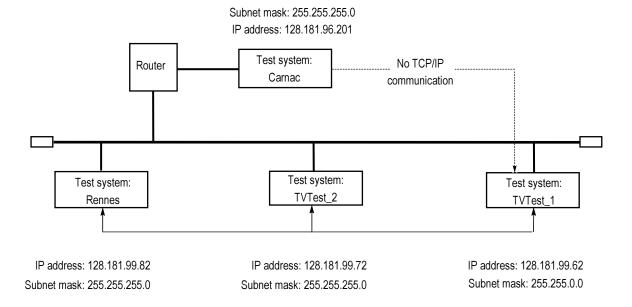


Figure C-2: Incorrect subnet mask

TVTest_1 cannot communicate with Carnac, because, according to the subnet mask on TVTest_1, Carnac and TVTest_1 are logically on the same network. Consequently, messages sent from TVTest_1 to Carnac are never routed. Because these two devices do not share a connection, TVTest_1 will never find the correct address for the network card on Carnac and will not be able to reach Carnac.

TVTest_1 can communicate with TVTest_2 and Rennes because these three devices share a connection, so messages from TVTest_1 do not need to be routed. TVTest_1 is therefore able to find the correct addresses for TVTest_2 and Rennes in spite of having an incorrect subnet mask.

Incorrect Default Gateway IP Address

The default gateway you have specified in the TCP/IP Properties dialog box is the device that "knows about" your subnetwork and others on your network. When you send messages (for instance traps from your system to a device on another subnet), the default gateway is able to route the message to the appropriate subnet. If the IP address specified in the TCP/IP Properties dialog box is incorrect, messages to devices on other subnets will not reach their destination (because they never made it to the default gateway). See Figure C-3.

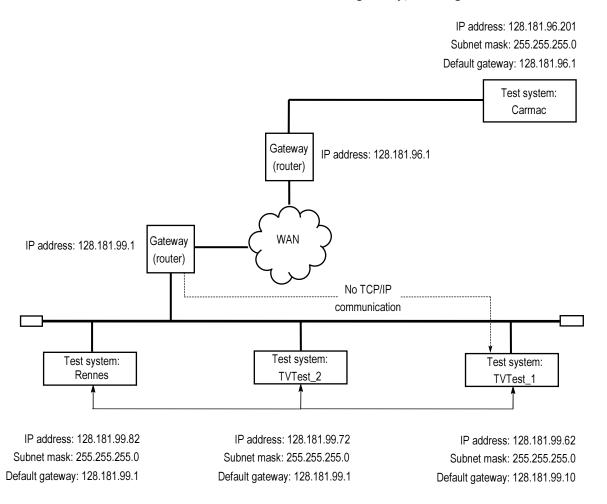


Figure C-3: Incorrect default gateway IP address

Common Troubleshooting Procedures

Many of the procedures performed in the following sections are common tasks.

Pinging a Host Machine

One of the utilities provided with all TCP/IP installations is Ping.exe. (Look in the C:\windows\system32\\directory.) This utility allows you to send communication packets to and record the response from an indicated host machine. This, in essence, determines whether your packets arrived at the destination. To run ping, use the following procedure:

- 1. Select **Run** from the Start menu. The Run dialog box appears.
- **2.** Type one of the following into the Run text box:

ping machineName

ping IPaddress

In the examples, machineName and IPaddress represent the host machine name and IP address, respectively, of the networked device you are trying to ping.

3. Click OK.

A DOS window indicates whether or not the machine is responding to the ping. In Figure C-4, the destination machine (Oxford4) is not responding.

Ping only runs briefly, and the DOS window closes when the process is complete.

Tracing the Route of TCP/IP Packets

Sometimes it is helpful to know how far your packets made it on the way to a destination machine and which devices the packets pass through on the way. The utility that provides this functionality is tracert.exe. Tracert can also indicate a congested point in the network. To run tracert, use the following procedure:

- 1. Select **Run** from the Start menu. The Run dialog box appears.
- 2. Type one of the following into the Run text box:

tracert machineName

tracert IPaddress

In the examples, machineName and IPaddress represent the host machine name and IP address, respectively, of the networked device you are trying to reach.

3. Click OK.

A DOS window (see Figure C-5) indicates the progress of your packets. The far right column indicates the IP address of the nodes on the network that successfully pass your tracert packets. This information indicates the last good node on the path to the destination device.

Finding IP Addresses for Devices on Your Network

At times, you may need to find or confirm the IP address of a computer on your network (or, conversely, the network name if all you have is an IP address). You may want to find this information to ensure that IP addresses and network names you use in the Hosts file are correct. The utility that will display this information is nslookup.exe. Use nslookup as described below:

- 1. Select **Run** from the Start menu. The Run dialog box appears.
- 2. Enter one of the following and press Enter, where machineName or IP address is the network name or IP address, respectively, of the device you are trying to lookup.

nslookup machineName

nslookup IP address

The network name and IP address of the device you are trying to lookup is displayed. If your network uses DNS, the IP address and network name of the DNS server is also displayed. See Figure C-6.
