New Amigas gain power

A DEVELOPER claiming to have two new Amigas says Commodore have scrapped plans to use 68020 processors in their new mid-range Amiga, and instead chosen the more powerful 68030 chip.

Expected around the end of this year, the machine is fitted with the new AA chip set. It will have sockets for up to 16Mb of fast RAM and 4Mb of chip RAM.

Housed in a "pizza-box"-style case, three inches high and 15 inches wide and deep, the machine runs from Workbench 2.1. It has a high density floppy disk drive, an internal 52Mb Quantum hard drive and possibly a smart card slot.

A microphone port works with a built-in digitiser allowing 8-bit 22kHz sampling and there will be a pair of Midi ports.

AA chip set

Among the new chips is an Amber-type de-interlacer chip with 1Mb of video RAM to handle increased colour depths and de-interlacers all but the highest resolution modes.

Lisa is another addition, which a technical expert says appears to be responsible for graphics.

Resolutions are similar to those with the ECS, with the addition of 800 x 300,

800 x 600 interlaced, 1,280 x 480 and 1,280 x 960 interlaced.

The palette is 24-bit. The 800 and 1,280 modes have 8-bit 256k colours and 6-bit 4,096 colour HAM modes respectively and can handle up to 30 frames per second.

Sprites change to match the screen resolution and can be up to 64 pixels wide and have no height limitation.

Unconfirmed reports suggest Motorola's powerful Digital Signal Processing chip will open up the potential for scores of new high-end applications to be run from the Amiga. There is an A/D chip for the

microphone and two D/A chips for the audio.

The computer's sound will be 16-bit four channel at up to 56kHz, and will be able to emulate eight 8-bit channels at

56kHz and up to 16 8-bit 28kHz channels. And at the top of the Amiga range, the A4000 uses much of the technology from the new machine lower in the range.

It has a 68040 processor and a Quantum 105Mb hard drive. Essentially an improved A3000, it has Zorro III expansion slots identical to the A3000's.

It will be supplied with 16Mb of fast RAM and 4Mb of chip RAM. These can be expanded to 64Mb and 16Mb respectively.

"These machines are stable enough for production, but the higher-ups won't release them," said our source. "It's frustrating to see such potential wasted."

Commodore remain quiet on new models. "We are spending a lot of time and a lot of money investing in the Amiga," offered a spokesman.

He added: "There might be new machines as early as this year."

Switching systems

AMIGA users can now switch between different versions of the computer's operating system by clicking on mouse or joystick buttons.

Power Computing's (0234 843388) Automatic Kickstart Switch fitted with Kickstart 1.3 and 2.04 ROMs sells for £99.

CDTVs in trade-in deal

UNDER a scheme organised by Commodore, A500 owners can trade in their computers for a new Amiga CDTV bundle containing a CDTV player, keyboard, mouse and disk drive.

Housed in black plastic casing, the setup enables Amiga owners to use their existing software and CD-ROM-based programs. The usual cost for the Multimedia Home Computer Pack is £599.99 but the offer price is £399.99.

Said Commodore's Kelly Sumner: "We think this is an excellent deal for Amiga owners."

"In exchange for any Amiga 500, even a four or five-year-old 1.2 model, they

can get a brand new Amiga with CD-ROM and a 12-month warranty... the whole shooting match."

Running until September 15, the promotion is backed by independents and electronics chains Dixons and Comet.

Sumner takes control

KELLY Sumner, Commodore UK's former sales director, has taken over as head of the company's UK operations, it was confirmed recently.

His promotion comes at a time when the company faces fierce competition from Japanese console and CD-ROM manufacturers.

One of Sumner's main tasks will be to ensure that the Amiga sells the 300,000 machines forecast at the beginning of the year.

As predicted last month, Steve Franklin who has been in the number one seat for more than five years, is to take charge of a European campaign for CDTV.

Since its launch last year CDTV has sold only 50,000 machines throughout Europe. Franklin's job is to make CDTV happen and to do that he says it will need to become exciting enough to make eight to 16-year-olds want it.

"Steve has taken Commodore to the top of the UK leisure computer market. His knowledge of the industry and the potential of CDTV is unrivalled," said Sumner.

He added: "It's a great move for Commodore UK and Commodore in Europe."

A600 price cut denied

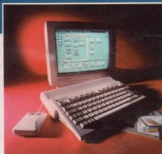
INDUSTRY rumours suggest Commodore could be set to slash the cost of the A600 within the next few months.

The manufacturer denies the move, although dealers reporting low enthusiasm for the machine consider a price cut likely and there has been some discounting already. Some firms are selling the basic model for £329, but these could be grey import machines – the A600 sells for about £300 in Germany.

One reliable source says the drop will be just £40, but some people are talking of a new price tag of between £199 and £250.

"The prices being quoted are fantasy land," says Commodore's Andrew Ball. "At the moment the recommended retail price for the A600 is £399."

The A600 was always intended to sell at a low price to enable it to compete against the games consoles which are starting to eat into the home computer market.

A570 to cost £349

A570 CD-ROM drives have gone into mass production and will now cost £349.99 – £50 less than originally planned – Commodore have announced.

The drives connect to any A500 to enable it to use compact disk-based programs and another drive called the A670 is due later this year for the A600.

YTV tune in to games

MORE details are now known about a new weekly computer and video games television show due for all ITV regions this autumn. Producers Yorkshire Television say that while the programme will be console-led there will be some coverage for popular home computers such as the Amiga.

Aimed at 10 to 16-year-olds, the as yet unnamed show will be made up of news, reviews and tips, and there will be a special feature each week covering subjects such as virtual reality and flight simulation.

Children will give their views on most of the games featured and there will also be a regular male and female presenter.

There will also be competitions and viewers will be able to get help from the 25-minute show. The first programme is due at 4.45pm on Thursday October 29.

Repair centre closes

THE company approved by Commodore to repair Amigas has gone into liquidation, leaving many computers stranded at FMG's Peterborough site.

Just before we went to press Commodore had gained a court order for the release of all third-party stock from the failed firm and say they are now working through the backlog.

A Commodore spokesman would not say how many Amigas needed attention but expected delays to be short. Computer giant Wang stepped in to help from their Brentford site.

Wang already had the contract to maintain A600s, including the on-site warranty offered with the computer.

"Wang are helping this interim but we haven't made a full appointment," said a Commodore's Andrew Ball.

Two telephone support lines have been set up for worried Amiga owners who had equipment at the repair centre and for those whose machines have just developed a fault.

For products covered on a return to dealer basis call 081-847 2223, or 081-231 3700 for Commodore products covered with on-site maintenance warranty.

Blaze guts Progressive

A FIERCE blaze has destroyed a top Amiga peripheral developer's Denver head office.

The night-time fire is believed to have started in a picture frame manufacturing plant next to the Progressive Peripherals and Software plant before spreading to engulf the computer firm.

Many of the products ruined in the fire were software for C64 and C128 computers. Development of high-end Amiga boards takes place at another office in the city.

The destroyed building was used mainly for administration, manufacturing and warehousing.

"The place is real gutted," said Mr Eric Stein, a local man. "I've driven past and it looks pretty totalled."

At the time of going to press none from the firm was available for comment, although a recorded message told telephone callers that Progressive were moving to a new site.

Mastering the Amiga

THREE books have been added to Bruce Smith Books' (0923 894355) range of publications for Amiga enthusiasts.

Mastering Amiga DOS 2 – Volume 2 contains extra commands to take it up to date with AmigaDOS 2.04. Mastering Amiga Printers is a guide to choosing and using printers. The third release is a C tutorial, Mastering Amiga System. Starting with a basic knowledge of C it is claimed Amiga programmers will progress to the state of expert.

The books cost £19.95 each, except for Mastering Amiga System which supplied with a disk costs £29.95.

Superbase range improves

THERE have been a number of changes and improvements to Oxi's (010 1 310 427 1227) Superbase database range, including the launch of SBase Personal 4.

Compatible with Workbench 2.0, the home version now has improved data management and more ease of use features.

Listed among the improvements are new data manipulation tools and Logical Fields which broaden the types of data that can be handled.

Said Oxi boss John Houston: "SBase Personal 4 brings some of the most sophisticated data management tools to the Amiga computer at an exceptional price point."

Costing £149.95, registered users of earlier versions can upgrade for between \$50 and \$65.

Higher up in the range, Superbase Professional 4 has bugs from v1.01 corrected and also boasts improved ARexx and printing support.

Upgrades to v1.2 are free to anyone who bought the program after June 1 and \$20 to other users of Superbase Professional 4. Newcomers pay \$299.95.

And for people needing to share files with other Superbase users, including those using the program on PCs, there's SBase Professional 4 LAN.

Up to ten machines can be linked and a key feature of the package is its record locking ability which prevents multiple users of the same file updating out of date records.

Prices range from \$149 to \$799, depending how many users are needed.

He added that there would be a similar deal for tower systems.

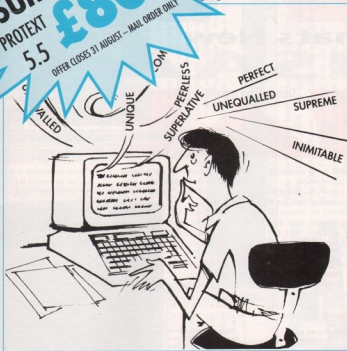

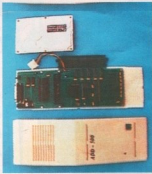

Thanks to the graphics explosion, the art of producing and manipulating imagery has become the Amiga's biggest growth area.

In this article we'll examine the latest ADPro from ASDG, ImageMaster from Black Belt, plus an exclusive preview of Montage – formerly Mirage – the all new IP package from GVP.

Art Department Professional 2.1.3

Until the release of Image Master, ADPro was the only real contender for the image processing crown. Now its monopoly has ended and ADPro will have to fight hard for its place in the market.

Thanks to its individual style and dedicated approach, it's by no means the end of the ageing heavyweight.

Unlike the other two contenders, ADPro doesn't attempt to be all things to all men. In fact the software is much more akin to programs such as Adobe PhotoShop which have long been the Mac's main source of artistic inspiration in the field of commercial DTP.

Unlike ImageMaster and Montage, ADPro does not try its hand as a 24-bit paint package or indeed as a dedicated special effects processor.

Instead the software concentrates its efforts on converting images from one file format to another and in turn from one machine to another while processing its creations to give the best possible output.

Neither of the other two packages can match ADPro's linguistic features when it comes to available formats.

As a result, it's still the perfect

choice or anyone who already has finalised artwork and merely requires it in another format, whether that be an alternative Amiga display or perhaps in a form other machines and users such as PCs, Macs or commercial print bureaux can understand.

Having said that, describing ADPro as a glorified CrossDOS is to say the least a little unfair. It's true that if you have a file no matter what the format the chances are ADPro will be able to load it and subsequently save it in almost any other, but between the load and save the program offers an impressive array of processing and composition tools.

Graphics from a whole host of sources can be easily combined into a new and totally original images.

Although now common in a lot of serious software, ADPro was the first power program to implement a modular design. This means that although the basic framework of the software can remain the same, a whole host of new features can be added as plug-in modules which the software can then access.

Dedicated

Because of this ASDG already offers dedicated module sets which expand the already impressive range of loaders and savers while also adding control for additional hardware such as scanners.

As mentioned earlier, ADPro offers an unrivalled range of loaders and savers which can be easily expanded thanks to the modular design. As you can see from the screenshots, the choice is impressive and is made even more so by the program's ability to load from and save directly to an ever-growing collection of 24-bit cards such as the IV24, Harlequin and FireCracker.

Once an image is safely imported, the actual processing can begin. Often the process in question may be simply a matter of adjusting the colour balancing in which case three RGB sliders are on hand to edit the current image plus brightness, contrast and Gamma. Like most of

The

ADPro's processing options these affect the entire image.

A selection of six dithering options are also on hand to smooth out the colour transitions when working in lower resolutions.

Finally come the palette options giving complete control over the colour composition of the graphic in question, and of course palettes can be edited, saved and loaded as required.

As you can no doubt see from the operators screenshot, the choice is impressive. Unfortunately the majority of operators work on the entire image and cannot be restricted to specific areas as is the case with ImageMaster and Montage.

This above all underlines ADPro's main area of expertise. As mentioned earlier the package is not designed as a paint package but rather a dedicated image processor capable of altering existing images and combining the results with others thanks to the program's excellent composition options.

A perfect example of this is the GraphicStation image which has been compiled in ADPro from a scanned star field, a VistaPro generated landscape and a Real3D ray tracing which again incorporates scanned elements.

All the various images were initially in different formats and image sizes but with the help of ADPro's loaders and operators they were compiled together within a matter of minutes.

Once the choice of file format has been made, whether it be loading or

saving, the more mundane options come into play via the command options.

These produce requesters for both loading and saving and also allow you to specify the orientation of the image to be imported, plus whether it is to be composited with any existing imagery which may already be loaded.

Also lurking within the Command options are the separation controls which again underline ADPro's forte for publishing.

This is a feature unique to ADPro and allows colour separations of the current image – something which is often essential for material destined to appear in print.

Lastly, We come to screen control. From here it's possible to define in what form the image will appear on-screen, if for example you were working with 24-bit images but didn't have a board to

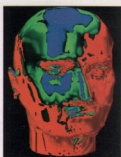

view them, it's still possible to create an Amiga-based representation of the effects applied to the 24-bit data.

Alternatively once a standard Amiga display has been defined and executed, the software will give you the option to save directly in that format.

As a result, raw scans or 24-bit frame grabs can be converted directly into the Amiga display format of your choice.

ImageMaster

After a long wait, a challenger to ADPro has finally appeared thanks to Black Belt, the company famous for the amazing disappearing HAM-E trick – a hardware display system which mysteriously vanished into the black hole known as the Commodore non-disclosure agreement.

Since the disappearance of the aforementioned hardware, Black Belt have gone noticeably quiet. Now the silence has been shattered by the release of ImageMaster, which in its youth was known as Image Professional and came as part of the HAM-E software bundle.

Although 24-bit boards have been on

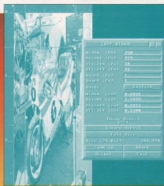
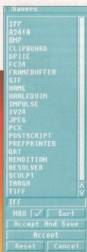
the market for around two years, up until the release of ImageMaster, ADPro was the only IP software capable of manipulating their output – and only then with a relatively limited number of special effects. Its main purpose was as a format converter, compositor and PostScript supplier.

What was required by the 24-bit community was a special effects engine capable of producing the kind of imagery Industrial Light and Magic have made famous. Unbelievable as it may sound, Black Belt have done exactly that by bringing Hollywood within the reach of anyone.

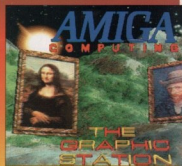
The actual software itself comes in several forms. ImageMaster is designed for the general user while Black Belt also offer a version designed specifically for the

FireCracker 24-bit board and, as mentioned earlier, Image Professional for HAM-E.

As is the case with all three packages, ImageMaster has ignored the standard format of pull-downs and icons and has gone for a control strip across the bottom of the screen which instantly evolves as you move through the software, constantly updating the display with a new selection of buttons reflecting your previous choice.

If there's one area in which the software suffers more than any other, it's undoubtedly in the interface. Although the progression from one control strip to another is very logical, it certainly does nothing for your inspiration.

This is a real shame as the artistic juices inspired by the incredible special effects soon dry up as you stumble around the package looking for the next option you wish to apply.

Guidance

It's true that the problem tends to cure itself in time but even after prolonged use you still find yourself yearning for the comfort of the occasional icon or at least some form of guidance through the seemingly endless selection of identical control strips.

This particular problem hasn't gone unnoticed by the lads and lasses at Black Belt and as a result a revised interface is promised for the next update to the package.

Let's hope it arrives sooner rather than later for the sake of the software, and the frayed nerves of countless disoriented

Morphing

Morphing is the buzzword of modern computer graphics and ImageMaster is the first package to bring it to the Amiga. It's true that DPaintIV has boasted morphing as an available function but in truth the DPaint offering is image to image transformation in its most basic form.

ImageMaster however, brings true 24-bit morphing employing geometric and colour information from both source images.

The basic concept of morphing is to produce an actual

transformation of selected areas from the primary to the secondary. This should not be confused with a fade where an entire image gradually replaces another.

In the case of morphing points or shapes are selected in the first image and these then move and are subsequently replaced by elements of the second, giving the impression of a physical change rather than a simple fade, something which is impossible with any other method.

This is exactly how many of the stunning effects in movies such as *Terminator II* have been achieved. All that's required by the software is a "before and after" and ImageMaster will generate the "twens".

users. If you can forgive the interface the rest of the package is nothing short of a astonishing, thanks to a selection of effects and animation options which are almost beyond belief.

However, before I fall inextricably into delirious ramble mode, it's worth a look at the structure of the software and the various options on hand.

On entry you're greeted with a selection of nine buttons which allow access to all IM's main functions. As you might expect, the first of these is the input/output button.

From here you can load an impressive array of standard Amiga images both 24-bit and otherwise. Unfortunately there's a noticeable lack of Mac and PC formats on offer – an omission that makes an IM and ADPro combination a must for commercial users.

This is followed closely by the Composition button,

which on boot-up is ghosted, as both a primary and secondary image are required for composition – as I said, it's logical stuff.

Next comes the process button where the vast majority of special effects await your command. We'll return to linger on these a little later.

Following that, we have the Paint panel in which you apply standard painting techniques, define and cut brushes, select fonts and specify the impressive array of blending options.

Next comes the display panel where among other things you can watch IM-generated anims as small thumbnail representations of their 24-bit counterparts.

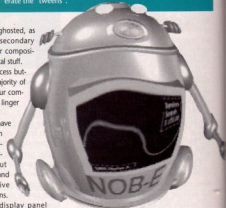
It's also here where you can activate the program's excellent Film Strip option which produces a piece of pseudo-celuloid across the lower part of the screen which documents all your actions as the imagery is processed – an extremely useful feature if you're trying to master the animation of a specific effect.

Unlimited

Following that comes the buffer panel which allows total control of the unlimited number of buffers, whether they be full-screen images or simple brushes.

ImageMaster allows you to create as many 24-bit buffers as your system memory will allow and from here they can be swapped, shuffled and deleted as required.

Almost every action creates a new buffer, and as a result if not managed properly the software can soon become full of countless images whether they be tiny brushes or "before and afters" generated

by the application of special effects. Each new buffer must be individually named and then retrieved from the panel when required – again not good news for the creative juices.

Black Belt would be well advised to take a close look at the new Scala and its miniature icons as an alternative system. The film strip already uses the technique so why not apply it to buffers?

Alongside buffer control we have the macro and setup panels which allow direct access to Arrex scripts and specification of the output image whether it be in a standard Amiga form or alternatively as a set command which executes a script each time the display is updated, thus allowing the new image to appear either on the FireCracker, Harlequin or other Arrex friendly 24-bit hardware.

Finally comes the Info panel which as the name suggests supplies all the necessary information on both the state of your

system and all the relevant details on the buffers presently in use.

Composition processing and painting are three main areas of ImageMaster's expertise. As mentioned earlier, all three have their own button on the main panel. The composition controls allow you to combine the primary and secondary images into a new third image.

As with all ImageMaster's features, composition has been handled expertly, though through the eyes of a programmer rather than those of a designer.

Amazing

As a consequence, the options and output can be amazing. But thanks again to the interface it will be a long time before you'll feel happy about attempting any image combinations without the manual firmly at your side.

Processing options, on the other hand, are much easier to come to terms with and offer the kind of image adjustment and colour correction tools only matched by ADPro.

It's here where the 55 definable geometric transformations and special effects await your command, and that doesn't include the morphing options...

Aside from the pure power and variety of effects, one of the most pleasing features is the way in which they can be applied. Rather than simply affecting the entire image — as is often the case with ADPro — each effect can be used on an area in the same way as a standard paint package, thanks to a wide variety of rectangles, polygons and freehand option.

The painting options are again astonishing with the widest collection of available tools I've seen to date. The brush application options alone need to be seen to be believed, but unfortunately the perennial problem of the interface rears its ugly head yet again. Even minor adjustments such as colour, brush size and selection require countless trips through the interface.

In short, ImageMaster painting offers unbelievable power but you'll need a bottle of inspiration close at hand to keep your spirits up, and your juices flowing.

ImageMaster overview

As a processing environment, Image Master is just what the Amiga has been waiting for. The number and variety of processing options and special effects are quiet literally beyond belief.

If you can live with the less than inspired interface, and are will to invest the time and effort required to master its immense potential, ImageMaster is an essential addition to any serious artistic collection.

Montage

After many years as one of the leading exponents of hardware innovation, GVP have finally taken the plunge and released their first serious software release.

Unlike the two previous products, Montage has been designed to be an "all-rounder" capable of digital photographic retouching, scanner controller, 24-bit image processing, file format conversion and frame grabbing control.

All of this can be displayed either as 24-bit creations via display boards such as the IV24 or as reduced colour representations in standard Amiga modes — much in the same way as ImageMaster.

Now before we delve into the available features, it's worth stressing that the software on test is a pre-production version and as a result it would be unfair — and in some cases impossible — to draw direct comparisons between Montage and the other two packages. As a result, the following will simply list the features which are planned for the finished release.

Excellent

Aside from the options on offer, the most pleasing aspect of the package is the excellent interface which after ImageMaster comes as a real relief.

The interface again takes the form of a lower screen strip but the layout and design are much more friendly, although in part this is due to fewer available options.

It's obvious that GVP have done all they can to make the software as familiar to the average Amiga user as possible and as a result even a beginner will soon feel perfectly at home with the transition from standard Amiga graphics to the world of 24-bit art.

Just like ImageMaster and ADPro, 24-bit hardware is not essential as all graphics can be represented via standard Amiga displays even though the actual changes are applied to the hidden 24-bit master.

So, don't despair if your finances won't stretch to an enhanced display system as you can still apply its power effectively using a standard Amiga display.

The same applies to the software's scanning and frame grabbing options which

can also display the imported imagery as standard Amiga graphics even though the internal data is true 24-bit.

The only real restriction regarding 24-bit data is the software's limitation to just two full images in memory as opposed to the unlimited number available within ImageMaster.

In addition, Montage also has space for an Alpha channel, undo buffer and brush buffers. Just like a standard paint package, the two resident images can be flipped, copied and have brushes cut or pasted as required.

According to the accompanying buntf, Montage will in principle be capable of controlling all Amiga compatible scanners and frame grabbers.

Although some are already catered for such as the X100 and the ES300C, I'm not convinced that such a grandiose claim will be possible, at least not before the software's initial release. Having said that though, GVP are not known for making promises they can't keep.

All the scanners will share a generic interface that will allow "previews" prior to full scanning and of course region boxes to define the scanning area, plus the usual assortment of options such as scanning resolution, landscape, portrait and so on.

Frame grabbing won't require the intricacies of the scanning interface but will benefit from Montage's AReX interface which can be made to control interactive video players allowing the capture of entire sequences that could then be edited and sent to still frame recorders or alternatively converted into standard Amiga formats.

Due to Montage's virtual memory, options such sequences — or in fact any image — can be stored directly onto hard disk, optical or any form or removable

Input and output

Before you commit your creations to disk you're offered a full selection of possible formats which include all Amiga formats including those designed for the Enhanced Chip Set, HAM-E and DCITV. There's also an impressive series of non-standard Amiga formats including TIF, TGA and the all important Adobe PostScript plus many more.

Unlike ImageMaster, Montage makes a serious challenge to ADPro's dominance as a multi-format interpreter, which further enhances its position as a jack of all trades.

When loading images Montage once more lends a technique first seen within ADPro. Rather than specifying a specific file format, the software uses its own version of ADPro's Universal loader, instantly importing any file format supported by the package.

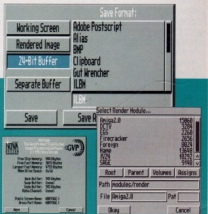


The Montage scanning option all ready for action

Obviously this is going to be a big attraction to animators and those with limited available RAM. The only compromise is a noticeable but nevertheless bearable loss of speed.

selection of palette controls which allow you to combine various palettes and apply standard effects such as spreads, swaps, sorts and copies. The only worrying aspect concerns their actual application.

When the colour is applied to the canvas, the dreaded hospital green that haunts Macro paint and IV24 combination rears its ugly head once again.

Every time the paint is applied this nauseating colour is the one that actually makes the mark on the canvas and is only replaced by the selected colour after the stroke is complete. Even more worrying is

the application of larger brushes. Not only do they draw in the infamous hospital green but they initially appear as a single pixel line which is then blown up into full size when the stroke is complete and the colour added.

If GVP want to market the paint package element of the system as a serious contender this particular problem must be addressed. What the application loses the Toolbox goes a long way towards making up for with a selection of familiar painting tools combined with a series of more unusual options which include ADPro style operators, special effects,

ARexx implementation

Although there has been little mention of ARexx throughout the article, all three packages use the language in various degrees, with both ADPro and ImageMaster relying heavily on it especially during animation, as indeed does Montage to a lesser degree.

In the case of ADPro, ARexx is the key to Fred, an additional program which comes as part of the package allowing the user batch process images ready for still frame recording or composition with others.

It also allows the application of operators and the mass conversion of files to other formats.

In the case of ImageMaster, ARexx is an essential in order to get the best from the program's multi-frame sequencing potential.

For those users conversant in the language, ImageMaster can become a 24-bit DPaint and much more besides, with animated effects that would leave even the most sceptical Hollywood mogul gasping for breath.

It's a real shame that none of the developers have made the effort to provide a method of producing automatically generated ARexx macros as part of their products. This would instantly eradicate the painful learning curve necessary to get the very best from their assorted systems.

The sooner software companies realise that serious animators, artists and multimedia users neither have the time, nor often the inclination to develop the ARexx skills their software requires, the sooner the Amiga will realise its true potential as an unbeatable graphics engine. Here endeth the sermon.

Held up by your hardware?

RAM

No matter which IP package you invest in, there is a whole host of behind the scenes hardware which can be almost as important as the software.

Although all the manufacturers are at pains to stress that their packages will operate on near-standard machine it's almost impossible to get the best from such software without first a hard disk, some extra RAM and a respectable degree of acceleration.

The first and most essential element of the big three is RAM. Without at least 2Mb of memory most of the aforementioned software will not run at all. In the case of ADPro, 4Mb is recommended for any serious use.

Although ADPro's 4Mb operating minimum may seem a little extensive, that's just about par for the course among all three contenders, with Image Master being more than capable of eating as much RAM as you can provide thanks to its unlimited number of 24-bit buffers.

Acceleration

Although separate entities, there's a close relation between RAM and additional speed. In order to get the best from any accelerator that's to be employed primarily as an image engine you'd be well advised ensure that the unit comes with an FPU or floating point unit – also known as a maths co-processor – which is an essential addition when serious number crunching ensues.

For A1500 and A2000 owners and above, perhaps the perfect RAM and acceleration combination comes from GVP's Combo card which boasts an 030 CPU with either a 25, 33 or 40MHz FPU on-board, plus an option for up to 16Mb of 32-bit memory.

If you're an A500-based IP fan, GVP also have a market leader in the form of their new A530 hard disk and accelerator combination with the option for 8Mb of 32-bit RAM on-board – all housed in a single box which fits neatly into the side slot, just like GVP's original A500-HD.

Armed with this little beauty, even an entry-level Amiga is capable of very impressive image processing. If you're willing to make a slightly larger investment an 040 accelerator is perhaps the ultimate choice with vastly enhanced speed over 030-based accelerators plus the usual array of FPU's ranging from 25, 28 or 33MHz.

To keep pace with the enhanced speed many of the 040's boast variable on-board RAM with additional daughter boards which can expand your available RAM to an almost unbelievable 100Mb in certain cases.

Until recently, 040s were solely the domain of the larger members of the Amiga family. However, at a recent show Progressive Peripherals and Software were offering their latest A500-based 040 for just £750, which in 040 terms is almost a freebie.

brush and buffer controls, access to ARexx and the Alpha channel plus an impressive array of additional effects which include morphing.

It remains to be seen if the Montage version of morphing can match the performance of the ImageMaster variant mentioned earlier.

Alpha channels are essentially just another buffer, with the essential difference being that they are used to create smooth compositions between two images, which for example may have masked or graduated elements in specific areas.

Montage allows for a 24-bit Alpha channel, so in theory transitions from one image to another within the same frame should be very smooth indeed.

The Alpha channel can also be used as a frisket or stencil which in effect temporarily marks the define area of the screen out of service allowing the application of paint and effects only to apply to the remaining areas.

The software has fairly extensive printing support direct from the software itself and can output both 12- or 24-bit images via intuition-based preferences along with

Hewlett Packard PCL printing, direct encapsulated PostScript plus Group Three (G3) fax support.

All output can be either full digital halftone or alternatively sent using a variety of dithering methods.



Montage overview

Although not a finished product, the existing software does give a good impression of the overall feel and undoubtedly points towards its potential place in the market.

If the painting problem can be addressed, GVP will almost certainly have another winner on their hands in the form of a general purpose 24-bit environment ideal for the general user who may require a wide variety of options at the drop of a hat.

As a multimedia workstation complement to the IV24 it's ideal, if perhaps a little out of tune in the animation stakes by ImageMaster and to a lesser extent ADPro.

If you've been reading Amiga Computing for a while, you'll probably have noticed that we've never had a kind word to say about KindWords 2.

In fact, we've always said KindWords 2 is one of the slowest, most bug-ridden word-processors available for the Amiga, so what, you may be asking yourself, has changed with version 3?

The answer is everything. KindWords 3 is an entirely new program, so completely unrelated to its unfortunate ancestor that chalk and cheese do not offer a sufficient contrast.

The program was coded for The Disc Company by Digita International, producers of Wordworth, and when it loads you could be mistaken for thinking that you are in fact using the Digita product.

KindWords 3 opens on a screen well-nigh identical to Wordworth, from the ruler bar to the toolbox on the left of the text area, and as you explore the menus the similarity continues.

Resemblance

All the familiar options are in their usual places, the important screens for preferences, page layout and so on bear more than a striking family resemblance to their Wordworth counterparts, and even the default font could sneak in unnoticed at the back of a Digita wedding photo.

Though obviously based on Wordworth's basic code – Digita deny it, but KW3 was written by the same programmer and is copyright Digita International! – and more of a marketing exercise than a new word-processor, KW3 manages quite nicely to fill a niche of its own.

The first thing most old KindWords 2 owners will try to do is open a document previously saved using the original program, and this is possible through the Open Format option for IFF text (the type used by KindWords 2). However, the options to load WordPerfect, ProWrite, and Protext documents found in Wordworth do not appear in KW3. The restriction is also found in the Save Format options, such that the KW3 owner

will have to be content with loading and saving in KW3 – or Wordworth – format, Ascii, or IFF text.

There is no specific option to load or save documents which include IFF pictures in KindWords format, but the program will accept these and convert them, thus assuring a 100 per cent compatibility with old KindWords documents.

Other missing Wordworth features include several of the neat – and sometimes useful – extra touches which give Wordworth its edge in the wordprocessor battle. Auto-save has taken a dive, along with page preview, the screen saver, and PostScript support among the useful features, and playtime, open new Shell, and the facing pages option among the more frivolous.

What really annoyed me was the lack of an insert literal option. This is invaluable if you need a character which is hidden below a huge finger-cracking key combination, and can save a lot of messing about when writing documents including foreign words or scientific terms.

In addition, those who type a lot of standard letters will rue the lack of a glossary of standard phrases, though it's not something I'll miss very myself.

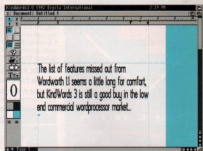
Possibly the most innovative feature of

the original Wordworth was its comprehensive support for the built-in fonts found in many popular printers. By supplying a huge range of printer drivers for specific printers, Wordworth was able to offer mouse control over one of the trickiest aspects of getting the most from your printer.

KW3 has no such option, and in conjunction with the lack of PostScript support, this places the program well below Wordworth in the printing stakes.

Not all is negative, however, and to compare KW3 solely to Wordworth is a mistake. We've looked at what separates the program from its sibling, but possibly a more valuable exercise would be to compare it to its rivals.

KW3 will make most of the low-end Amiga wordprocessors look pretty pale by comparison. With the exception of ProWrite, whose artificial price cut is so obviously designed to produce some sort of UK market penetration, the opposition can offer little of KW3's user-friendliness and almost none of its modernity. Just in case future users feel like moving on, there will be an upgrade

option allowing them to move onto Wordworth 1.1 or perhaps Wordworth 2.0, planned for release later this year.

The Disc Company, for so long suffering under the yoke of a program which was advanced for its time but which soon fell by the wayside (KW2) has taken the easy way out and opted for a variation on an existing and popular theme.

KindWords 3 may look like a simple marketing exercise, but it is a good wordprocessor which benefits from the best features of Wordworth while lacking only those you would expect considering the price difference.

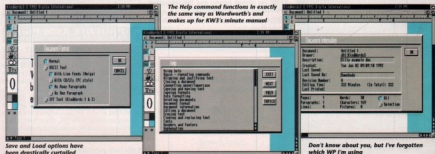

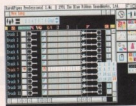

A superb sequencer and music-composition tool. Bars & Pipes has been specifically designed to be an open-ended Midi sequencer and in many cases adding new effects and expanding the sequencer's facilities is just a matter of adding some new B&P tool.

A whole range of these add-on packages exist providing internal sounds, multimedia add-ons, sound effects tools, programmer guidelines and so on. Each consists of a temporary folder containing one or two disks and any necessary loose-leaf documentation.

To incorporate the new software you just copy the new facilities to their respective ToolBox and Accessory drawers and add the new documentation to your main manual.



Making music is a satisfying pastime, and if you are new to the Amiga music scene you'll be pleased to know that it is not necessarily going to cost you an arm and a leg.

To get into the world of sampling you will need some digitiser hardware with suitable software to control it – most of the Amiga sampling packages include both. Getting into Midi will be a little more expensive but even a modest investment in a synthesiser, a Midi interface, and some sequencing software will open up fascinating new possibilities.

Connecting up a simple Midi system essentially means linking together a sequencer, synthesiser and a Midi interface, and it couldn't be easier.

Firstly, connect the Midi interface to the Amiga's serial port connector. Then take one Midi lead from the Midi Out of the synthesiser to the Midi In of the Midi interface and connect a second cable from the Midi Out of the Midi interface to the Midi terminal of the synthesiser.

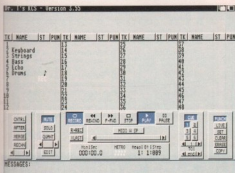
Switch the Midi equipment and your Amiga on, load the sequencer program as per the manual instructions, and you'll be home and dry.

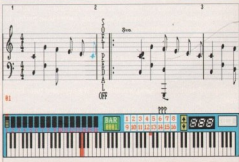

One of the biggest music teaching improvements seen over the last few years has been the introduction of the SFX keyboard tutor and song books.

SFX notation is based on the well-established scheme of providing a melody line for a song coupled with shorthand chord symbols. SFX however goes further in that note names are written inside the notes – which makes it easy to work out melody lines – and awkward key signatures are avoided.

Notes which need sharps or flats are treated as accidentals and you therefore see all necessary sharps and flat signs in front of each note rather than having to imply their existence from the key signature.

The range of the SFX song material is substantial and includes classical themes, show music, country, pop and jazz with a great many artist-specific books. The songbooks which include words cost £3.95 and contain about 15 to 20 songs per book.

Each SFX book contains chord charts and notes on reading musical notation. If you need extra help with keyboard playing, a number of SFX keyboard tutor books are also available.

SFX books are distributed by Music Sales Ltd. As likely as not you'll find many of them in local music stores but they can also be ordered directly.

Philip Rees have recently announced this line driver system which effectively eliminates the 15-metre Midi limit altogether. These MLD Line Driver units convert the Midi signals into a balanced differential signal that can then travel up to 1,000 metres.

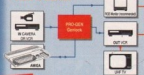

This disk is excellent value for money, containing a selection of programs designed mainly for the manipulation of graphics. It's good to see PD programmers using the extra space on their disks after the "main" program to give the user even better value for money, so make sure you do your bit and get your shareware fees in should you find any of the programs useful. Ooh, I went all self-righteous then.

Anyway, Picturesque is now at v2.5, and is an excellent Amos tool for the creation of graphics for games, demos and the like, as well as sprites of any size up to a full screen.

As Paul says, he's not trying to compete with the likes of DPaint, just attempting to make it easier for programmers (or just the interested) to design games and demos using Amos. Picturesque is polished and

professional and worthy of the attention of anyone who's looking for a little help designing the next Etrix (ooo-er).

The disk also contains Daisy Painter, a basic but extremely well presented graphics program, shifting the emphasis firmly from dull professionalism to the realm of fun!

The icons used to control the action are clear and chunky, and they include a "fun" option which "mirrors" the screen from the centre, allowing the creation of all sorts of symmetrical patterns.

It's a bit like a kaleidoscope crossed with one of those drawings you do on a folded up piece of paper, which turns into a symmetrical pattern when you open the paper out. Either way, it's extremely good fun.

There are no text or print options, but you can save your creations out to disk as standard IFF files, or using the program's custom saving format - unfathomably called Spac Save - which shrinks the file to a much more manageable size. Indeed, the author claims that it is possible to save over 100 pictures on one floppy using this method.

The most notable feature about this program, though,

is the paint mixing section. Instead of RGB sliders and saturation numbers, as is common elsewhere in the graphic package world, Daisy Painter has extremely user friendly tubes and pots of paint, which can be mixed simply by selecting and clicking on them. It's all very intuitive, and far less intimidating than more "professional" colour mixers.

It came as no surprise to P Robson, the author of this simulation, that commercial cricket software seemed to be doing just that, so he set out to write the ultimate cricket sim.

Now I've been dreaming of a disk like this for sometime. "Why," I've been thinking, "has nobody collected a bunch of classic arcade games onto one PD disk?"

Hurrah! Someone has, and jolly decent most of them are too. Croak is, unsurprisingly, a Frogger clone, and it's all there - the road and the river contain the usual mix of deadly (and friendly) horizontal scrollers.

Cars, snakes, logs, turtles, spiders, flies, ducks - all are good and present and ready to help or hinder your little frog in his quest to get back to his suspiciously symmetrical resting place on the bank of the river.

Particularly compelling are the almost luminous red splats on the road when you get run over, which remain there throughout the game, to remind future would-be flippant frogs of the ephemerality of their existence. It's a classic game, acceptably re-programmed here.

Mouth Man is a Pac Man clone, faithful to the original in just about every way, including the ghostly eyes which glide around the tunnels when you eat one of our translucent chums, and the wonderful sound effects, which together with the graphics evoke the original extremely well.

Bi-Planes is an everyone's-played-it-for-ten-seconds-at-some-time game, where you have two planes, a hut and lots of sky.

The idea, using the unfashionably fiddly control system, is to shoot down your opponent before he shoots you, but you'll probably pass over it for Drip!

Now I must admit that Drip! doesn't ring any bells from my arcade past, but it's pretty good nonetheless. The unlikely scenario is that (read this carefully) someone has piped your "party juice" and you must "rust" a grid of pipes to "let your juice flow again". Hmmmm. What this all translates to is legging it around a grid until



Go and play on a motorway, dear...

It's all changed colour, avoiding the baddies. It's much like Pac Man, except the baddies aren't tied to the pipes which you have to move around, giving them a freedom of movement which you have to match with your human acumen and intuition. It's all riveting stuff... for about ten minutes.

Squamble is a version of defender with big, chunky graphics and many of the features of the original. It's good fun - I'm a sucker for shoot-'em-ups, especially ones which are quite easy, such as this - and still has the outrageous addictive quality of the original, even though overall it's not particularly faithful to its ancestor.

It's a lot better than Trailblazer, a copy of the arcade original of the same name, where you guide a ball along a scrolling track. Looking back, this is the grandfather of the racing game, and with a pedigree like that, I suppose it's only to be expected that it'll become tedious quite quickly.

All in all this is a brilliant disk, full of continuously rewarding flashbacks and brimming with the same addictive strains which characterised the originals.

Maybe one's critical faculties are suspended when faced with so much nostalgia, but I'd rather spend a couple of quid having my critical faculties suspended than having my brain numbed - how about you?

Video Manager

Video Manager is a small database program dedicated to the organising and cataloguing of your video collections, and has several unique features to make it as effective as possible at the job.

The VM screen opens with a number of empty boxes used to hold video information, and a panel of VCR controls. The latter are used for entering and searching through your data, but for the moment there won't be any, so press the Play button to load the data from disk.

Now let's have a browse through the seven or so videos for which we have records. Pressing the Fast Forward and Rewind buttons will skip forward and backward one video at a time, the plus and minus signs add or delete a tape from the collection, and the Record button saves your data to disk.

So far so easy, but what if you need to find a video with just enough spare room to tape the end of the match? Normally you'd spend ages messing about with a huge array of badly labelled tapes until you either gave up or the match ended before you'd found one. With VM all this is history.

Simply hold down the right mouse button and select Find Space from the Video menu. A requester will pop up asking you

to specify in hours and minutes how much time you need on a tape, and the direction you'd like to search in.

After this, it's a matter of a second or so before you know which tape you can fit the program on and what number to look for on the shelves. Oh – and remember to keep a note of videotape numbers, or VM is about as much use as a chocolate teaspoon.

For those of you with long play VCRs, VM will keep a note of whether a program was taped in long play or standard mode using the arrow button directly to the right of the program title in the tape list.

By clicking on this button you should be able to see the length of the arrow toggle between long (for long play) and short (for standard mode).

A note of caution – remember to tell VM the actual running time of a program when you set up a new video record. The program will automatically work out the tape time for programs recorded in long play mode, so you'll only confuse it if you start to work the values out for yourself.

Video Manager should enable you to keep a record of what's on tape, and where, and help you effectively use the space left over on all those videotapes.

It can only do this if you're prepared to apply a little organisation of your own – every tape will have to be numbered and a record kept of what's on it – but then we're all very tidy VCR owners already, aren't we?

LhA v1.32

LhA has for over a year been the leading archiving utility on the Amiga scene by virtue of its speed and mind-boggling array of options.

Its success has been such that the older ZOO, ARC, and ZIP files are hardly ever in evidence on bulletin boards or PD libraries.

This latest version of LhA is an official

release – unlike some badly bugged copycat programs – of the evaluation package, so shareware donors can look forward to even more powerful features. See the on-disk documentation for shareware registration details.

There may well be many of you who've never used an archiver before, so here's a quick explanation of what they do. Unlike PowerPacker, which is a runtime cruncher/decruncher, archivers normally work in such a way that they compress the selected files into a much smaller space but don't run them afterwards.

In other words, an archiver is used to crunch an entire directory or two into a single archive file which must be extracted again before the programs contained in it will run.

The upside of using an archiver is that impressive compression ratios of 75 per cent and above can be achieved, which makes programs such as LhA ideal for use in comms where large amounts of data are sent whizzing down the phone lines every day. Smaller files mean shorter transfer times, which mean smaller bills.

Run time packers will crunch a single program file, add a crunch header to the file, then save the lot to disk. When the crunch header is clicked on, the decrunch header is activated, makes use of the packer's library file, and decrunches the file in memory before running it.

This is very handy, but useless for large lists of files which have to be sent down the phone lines, hence the invention of complex archivers.

Using LhA can be either a mildly complicated operation or a nightmare of almost 68000 assembler code proportions. There simply isn't enough space here to cover the most complex ways of using the program, so we'll just look at adding and extracting files from an archive and leave you to read the superb program documentation for the rest.

To create a new archive, you must use the "a" (add) option and tell LhA what the new archive is called and where it is to be

found. For example, you might type:

```
LhA &RAR:AC (filename and path)
```

and LhA will create an archive called AC.LHA in the RAM: disk containing your specified file.

If you wanted to archive all the files in a directory, the easiest way would be to change directory such that the desired drawer was the current drawer, then type:

```
LhA &RAR:AC
```

As you failed to specify a file or file pattern, LhA will just archive all files in the directory, which is a quick and easy way of going about things.

Extracting files, which is what most archivers spend most of their time doing, is simplicity itself. The only prerequisite is that the archive to be extracted is in a drawer or on a disk with enough space to hold the extracted files.

Probably the best answer is to copy the archive to a blank floppy or into RAM if you have 1Mb or more, then type:

```
LhA E (archive name) (destination pathname)
```

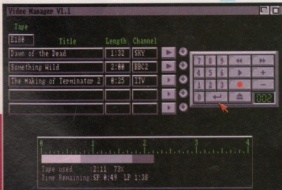
The optional destination pathname is used when the archive is in a full directory and you want to redirect extracted files somewhere else. For example, to extract our file AC.LHA and send the files to a floppy disk called UNARC, we would type:

```
LhA E AC.LHA UNARC:
```

This command should result in the extracted files from AC.LHA being copied to the blank floppy from where we can access them at a later time.

The above introduction is hardly even the tip of the LhA iceberg, though in describing the basic extracting and compressing commands we've covered the most important areas.

To make fullest use of this utility, especially all you comms fans out there, see the lengthy but comprehensive documentation on the CoverDisk.



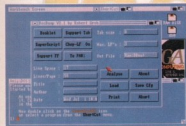

DocDump is a unique printing utility designed to take existing text files and send them to your Epson-compatible

printer as documents, complete with page numbers, superscript text, headings, and a title page.

It will work with all the common printer models, including the Sharp, Citizen, Swift, and Panasonic ranges, so it should offer something for most people.

To use DocDump (DD), just double click on its icon and the DocDump screen will open over your Workbench. You should now be confronted with a range of selection gadgets and text strings used for the settings which will govern the finished document's appearance.

All documents created with DD are printed in half size print, either superscript or subscript, so it is possible to print entire mini-booklets.

The program will ensure that the pages are printed in the correct places on a page (four can

View has an easy to use interface



be fitted on one side of A4), and will then print the reverse when you turn the paper over.

This can be a bit tricky, but once mastered is an ideal way of producing a booklet out of a long document, especially some of the tediously long accompanying some shareware and PD programs.

If you think the booklet idea a bit too much hassle, you need only select the Dump option, and DD will print four pages of your document on one page of A4.

Experimenting with this program could save you a lot of messing about with other print programs, not to mention the savings in eye damage. Have you ever read something off a computer screen for half an hour or more?

View v3.2

Animation players are the sort of hum-drum utilities you never give a second thought until you decide to actually produce and run your own animation, at which time you suddenly realise just how dull and inadequate many of the available players can be.

This situation arose recently in the Amiga Computing office, so we set out to find you (and us) the best and most friendly anim player around. There were a

couple of candidates, but View v3.2 won the contest by virtue of its easy interface and range of sensible features.

In particular, we were looking for a player which could be used when recording Amiga animations on videotape, and that's where this program comes into its own.

View can be run either from its icon or from Shell, and can also be specified as the default tool type for an animation's project icon, so it will work no matter how you want to kick it up. When running, however, the program begins to show its class.

Speed can be controlled from 1 to 60 frames per second (fps) thus allowing full speed interlaced anims, and the anim can be paused, advanced a frame at a time, or set to run at the default speed.

All of these controls can be applied as the animation is running, so for those recording their work to VCR, View offers the ideal environment.

There are no messy gadgets or menus involved in View's interface, and all controls are allocated to either a function key (for the various speeds), the space bar (pause), or some other keypress. This enables control of an animation from the background, thus keeping the screen clear for the anim.

View will accept all ANIM 5 format files, and will view standard IFFs or Sculpt RGB format files.

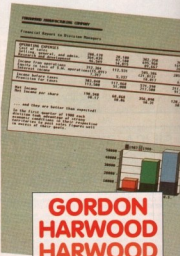
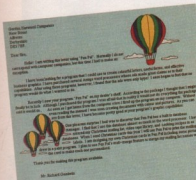

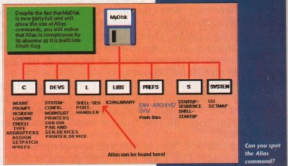

Stevie Kennedy
looks at the Shell-
startup and ways
to make life easier



When the average user begins to use Shell and AmigaDOS, it is usually the case that a quick double click without thinking more about the working environment is the simple route to opening a command window.

However, before the Shell window pops up on screen there's a great deal of behind the scenes malarkey which can be put to use in the cause of user friendliness.

Earlier in the series, when setting up the Shell handler on our disk, we created a file in the S: directory called "shell-startup". This file is accessed by Shell every time a new process window is opened.

Shell-startup will normally execute the Prompt command and a few very useful Alias commands. Alias is much neglected by users, partly because it is best used in an area many people don't go near, so I'm going to concentrate this month on how best to employ its peculiar talents.

An alias is applied when there is a long and often used command word rather than type out in full, but it can also be treated as a convenient keyboard short-cut. In syntax terms, the Alias command goes something like:

```
Alias (your shortcut) (DOS command)
```

so to make closing a Shell window as quick as possible, you'd use the command:

```
Alias & ENDCL
```

Add this line to your shell-startup file and closing a Shell window will be a much faster job in future.

If you sit and think about it, there are numerous occasions when this sort of short-cut would be a real blessing. I mean, how many times have you typed:

```
DISKCOPY FROM SFD: TO DFI:
```

To cut out the typing, you can simply add

This month's commands

Alias

This can be typed in at any Shell window, but is best used in the shell-startup sequence. It has the syntax:

```
Alias (keyboard shortcut) (AmigaDOS command)
```

and is used to make life easy when typing commands in Shell.

The alias command is an integral part of the Shell handler, so there's no need to copy it from one disk to another. So long as a disk is set up to open a Shell (as opposed to the old-fashioned CLI), users can alias to their heart's content.

If you really insist on copying the Alias command to a new disk, try to find it first! A fever to the person who does...

the following alias to your shell-startup:

```
Alias S01 "DISKCOPY FROM SFD: TO DFI:"
```

Notice the quotation marks? These enable the use of complex command strings when setting up aliases such that just about any single line AmigaDOS operation can be reduced to a couple of keystrokes.

Astute users might already be thinking of the limitations of the Alias command, especially where an AmigaDOS command expects some sort of parameter to be passed before it will work.

However, Alias has an answer to these doubts through the use of square brackets which tell the alias when to expect the parameter.

For example, one of my favourites, which saves a great deal of messing about when de-archiving files crunched using the Lharc or Lha archivers, is:

```
Alias EX "LHA C,X [ ] RAR"
```

The square brackets are simply substituted where the command LHA would normally expect the name of an archive to be, so when used, the alias might look something like:

```
EX MY_ARCHIVE
```

rather than the finger-popping:

```
LHA C,X MY_ARCHIVE RAR
```

You get the picture. It takes only a moment's consideration to think up a long list of possible time-savers, included among which might be:

```
Alias EOS "E: S:STARTUP-SEQUENCE"
Alias FB "FORMAT DRIVE SFD: NAME C:1
Alias WDC "LHA C RAR-MY_ARCHIVE C:2"
```

and so on, ad infinitum.

The use of Alias doesn't necessarily stop at shortening lengthy commands, however. If you make extensive use of Shell and don't like having to go to Workbench to click on icons for particular programs, it is possible to set up a couple of aliases for your most used applications. For instance:

```
Alias PPF "RUNNING-HELL-STARTUP/HELL-STARTUP/POWERPACKER"
```

reduces the command to run PowerPacker to three keystrokes.

For those who have recently joined the series, or – perish the thought – those of you who might have given up on editing things, you can edit your shell-startup file by booting from a Workbench disk, opening Shell, and typing:

```
E: S:HELL-STARTUP
```

It is then a simple matter of inserting as many aliases as you require.

Each must be on a line of its own and, for the sake of neatness, should be inserted just before the Prompt command found at

the end of the file. Shell-startup is a also a useful place to set up Assigns which you only use when accessing Shell.

For example, you may already have a Wordprocessor disk with the assign TEXT: set up in the startup-sequence, but when carrying out a predominantly Shell-orientated job such as C programming or de-archiving files, the shell-startup is a good place to start.

The reason for this is that when booting from a floppy, a long list of Assign commands in your startup-sequence will slow down the booting sequence quite a bit, which is uneconomical if you are going to use only a couple of the assigns in day-to-day work.

To keep all those commands in the place best suited to them, and shorten your booting time, take such assigns as:

```
Assign INCLUDES:SYS:UTILITIES/LATTICE/INCLUDES
```

out of the startup-sequence and stick them in shell-startup.

Can't remember what an Assign command does? It is simply a way of telling the Amiga that for some very long directory path names, you'd rather type a simple device name – the ones with the colons at the end.

An assign command enables the user to choose a device name and allocate it to a

directory which would otherwise be a pain to type every time you wanted to access that directory.

For example, all copy generated on my machine for the magazine is saved in a directory whose full path name is DHD:Wordworth/Text, but it can be accessed as just plain old TEXT:

Next month we'll finally take a look at the prefs directory and some of the ways in which it can be used to make your Workbench disk work better for you.

This month's jargon

Keyboard short-cut

This can mean many things, but is basically any quick keypress or combination of keypresses which makes a long-winded operation a little faster.

Most users will never bother to learn the keyboard short-cuts for, say, their favourite wordprocessor, as every function is usually accessible from drop-down menus or icons.

Do it this way if you like, but if you like life quick and easy the keyboard short-cut is always a useful little beast.

When most Amiga DTP enthusiasts turn their thoughts to the world of magazine publishing, their minds are almost always filled with images of large profitable companies wielding commercial clout and enough cash flow to drown Scrooge McDuck. The result is that one of the potentially most profitable areas of Amiga use is hurriedly abandoned.

Printing at this level is a complex business, because unlike our camera-ready printed output of last month, the magazine we'll construct this month will need full PostScript output and the aid of a vast array of printing technology. It all, however, starts with the Amiga, and for this job you'll need a bit of a whopper.

An Amiga 1500 with 68030 accelerator, 4Mb 32-bit RAM, and an 80Mb hard drive is the minimum requirement, though a much bigger hard drive, more RAM, or perhaps an optical drive would be better.

It all sounds very expensive, especially when you add the cost of PageStream, ProPage, or Saxon Publisher, but I guarantee you won't find commercial publishing a reality on any other system at the same price.

Next you'll probably need a fast modem. Due to the size of the PostScript files you'll be sending to the printers, floppies are useless, and the files (often in excess of 2Mb for each colour separation - 8Mb a page) will have to be sent down the phone wires so that they can be printed to film using a linotron.

Separation

The process can be made a lot less painful if you stick with spot colour and use mechanical separation (see last month's discussion of this technique) because file sizes are then very much smaller and many will fit on a floppy disk.

However, if you go full colour, an HST modem or removable optical/hard drive is the only choice.

Starting at the beginning, the potential publisher designs and plans, say, a local listings magazine. Our magazine will be a free paper, so advertising will have to pay at least for the printing and distribution. This necessitates the use of cheap paper, mono or at best spot colour printing, and little in the way of extras.

The cover (a four-page section, when you think about it) will be the only glossy

colour part of the mag. To skimp on this would be suicide as the cover design will often determine whether a magazine is opened, or used to line the bottom of little Joe's cage.

How big should the magazine be? This is a crucial decision which will determine your printing costs, and can only be taken after much planning and an appreciation of how many adverts can be sold.

A good bet would be a 64-page main body with a glossy cover, leading to a total pagination (a fancy term for the number of pages) of 68.

Now you've designed your magazine, given it some original page layout and a splodge of top quality editorial. You've even managed to sell a few adverts on the strength of your cheap rates and the magazine's imminent release into a niche market.

Getting in print

It's at this point that you hit the paper barrier - just how are you going to get the thing printed? I phoned Alan Leech at Carlisle Web Offset (the printers of Amiga Computing) and asked him for some gen on the publishing business, and where most new customers go wrong.

He told me that, due to the time and paper wastage when starting a print job, the minimum print run for a web offset printer is 10,000 copies.

Web offset printers are the type you see in movies where giant reels feed paper through the printing presses at alarming



speeds. While the four presses reach operation speed (one for each of CMYK, about 4,000 sheets of paper are wasted (this is, of course, recycled) which means only larger jobs can be accomplished with any kind of economy.

When at full speed, a web offset printer can output up to 30,000 copies an hour, so turnaround times are often less than 24 hours from the time the films reach the printer to delivery of the finished product. These sort of speeds are essential when distribution deadlines are tight.

To begin a job, Carlisle Web Offset can accept PostScript output from any machine (Amigas included), have it printed to film at

Carlisle Studios, carry out any reprographics (scanning photographs or transparencies), then lay the whole lot down on aluminium plates for printing.

For those with little knowledge of the hugely technical side of printing, most companies, Carlisle included, can offer technical advice on what sort of files to supply, along with such essential information as whether the films should be positive or negative, emulsion side down or up, and so on.

Reasonable

As an example of what can be done for a reasonable outlay, I phoned Carlisle's estimating department at Milton Keynes. My fictitious request was for our 64-page A4 size listings magazine, printed on 65 gram BCM paper - Blade Coated Mechanical - which means it is slightly glossy.

The cover was to be printed on 90 gram paper in full-colour and laminated (the cheapest varnish finish), saddle stitched (to you and me this means bound with two or more staples), and delivered bulk-packed on pallets ready for quick freebie distribution (to you, me, and a small van).

The price quoted was £4,294 including good quality paper (you could save a few hundred by going cheaper), so if you consider that a listings magazine is certain to be at least 60 per cent advertising (about 40 pages), you'd have to sell each advertising page for only £107.35 each to clear your printing costs.

Not a lot of room for error, perhaps, but with a bit of hard work, a good measure of luck, some business acumen, and a good telephone sales person, it is possible to launch yourself into the publishing arena for a lot less than you would initially have thought.

After that it's up to you, your skill, and the bank manager.

Give the punters what they want and you too could fall off a yacht some day.

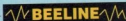

In this month's Updates we'll start with a preview of the long-awaited revision to Scala. Following close behind comes TVPaint 1.8 - Tectsoft's ever-evolving 24-bit paint package.

A close third comes an impressive update to Quarterback, a program that's been the professionals' choice since the very first Amiga hard drive went AWOL.

Finally, at the rear we have the all-new Mastering AmigaDOS 2 (vol 2), still battling gamely for a place in the medals.

Scala Multimedia MM2.00

I'm sure that regular readers are thoroughly sick of constantly being told how wonderful Scala - the all-singing, all-dancing presentation and multimedia system - is.

Well I'm afraid that's a situation you may just have to become accustomed to, due to its latest incarnation as Scala Multimedia MM2.00.

To draw a comparison, the difference between new and old is similar to that between Workbench 1.2 and 2.0. OK, perhaps I'm exaggerating a tad, but the enhanced features nevertheless look nothing short of astounding, and if the final product fulfils its pre-release promise, even the £199 upgrade price will be bargain.

One of the main user-friendly enhancements is the inclusion of the new Scala Shuffle option, which allows the user to view his or her presentation as a series of thumbnails representations appearing as anything from one to 14 images across the page in a series of columns building up to a maximum of 112 individual slides on each.

These new miniatures can be activated by a new main menu Shuffler button which instantly replaces the standard text lines and allows the various thumbnail screens to be moved around within the presentation thanks to a few simple click and drag operations with the trusty

mouse. Although the simplified organisation and arrangement offered by the new Shuffle option is a welcome addition, perhaps the most interesting improvement for existing users are a selection of 25 new effects.

These include stretch, flow, flip, cube and so on - all of which add up to what Digital Creations claim is "the software toaster".

Other new additions include unlimited horizontal text crawls, outwipes for both text and brushes, improved text fly-on, area transitions, plus a new link feature which allows several selected lines to be introduced simultaneously.

Having seen a pre-production version in Germany last year, I must admit that even such a grandiose claim isn't as unbelievable as it may sound.

acceptable sound sources. No matter what the source, Scala offers full control over volume, fade in/out, balance and playback speed.

To accompany the program's new musical prowess, a novel Record Time feature has been added which allows the user to manually enter display change times, thus providing potentially perfect synchronisation between Midi, video, internal sound and the computer output.

Snapload is a virtual memory option in disguise, allowing you to load anims and digital video direct from hard disk during a presentation.

While in the domain of the artist and animator, the new Scala has extended its artistic repertoire to include DCTV images both in their still and animated form. Again this has to be music to the ears of the average DTV fan...

Interactive

To enhance the program's multimedia appeal further, additional interactive options have been added. The ability to start one script from within another, run DOS applications, send Altrex commands, employ conditional branching, use variables, plus add pre-defined time-outs on interactive pages.

As almost every serious package in the business jumps on the Altrex bandwagon, Scala offers the option to save scripts as Altrex programs which can then be run from - and in concert with - any other Altrex-convertant software.

To add the icing to the cake, a selection of additional Art Libraries are on the way, with a whole array of additional backdrops and typefaces as well as specially composed music and sound samples.

As is the norm with Scala, these additional libraries are unlikely to be cheap, but that's all too often the case if you want the best in the business. As mentioned earlier the update price is £199, while the first-time buyer will need to shell-out a

are indeed impressive, and when this is combined with full support for Overscan these two points alone make the new Scala a must for any serious DTV enthusiast.

Aside from enhancements to the interface and assorted special effects, perhaps the most noticeable move in the area of multimedia expandability is the new EX module system which opens the new Scala to an impressive array of additional hardware and hitherto alien programming languages.

Scala comes with six new EX modules which allow access to Lasersdisks, still video, Midi, 16 sounds via CDTV, Altrex and the new ECS genlock modes which make it possible to choose a colour other than zero as a potential background colour.

Yet another new option is that of optional sound. Unlike its predecessor, the new software has impressive support for sound with 8SVX IFFs, SMUS, Soundtracker and DDS songs all being

overdraft-inducing E464.12 for the new software.

Although PC-style software prices are something new to the Amiga, Scala is one of the very few packages that are worth such a hefty investment.

TVPaint v1.8

If you regularly peruse the pages of AC there's a chance you might remember our exclusive review of the amazing Vlab real-time 24-bit frame grabber.

If so, you may also recall that one of the board's many features included direct support for the Harlequin 32-bit display board - a feature which allowed the imported image to be instantly displayed on the Harlequin in all its 24-bit glory without the usual rigmarole of the tire-some save and load procedure. As you may have guessed, Tecsot, the creators of

TVPaint, haven't been slow to take advantage of this feature, and have now taken the next logical step and incorporated Vlab's grabbing features directly into their latest version of TVPaint.

Now thanks to a new requester it's possible to grab from Vlab directly into TVPaint. It's true that the simplified view window and importation controls of TVPaint do leave a lot to be desired in comparison to Vlab's own software, which is now in its more-enhanced third revision.

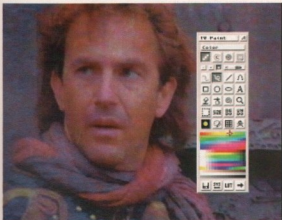
Having said that, the convenience of instant capture and importation go a long way towards make up for the missing whistles and bells of the original software.

Now the TVPaint and Harlequin combination have the final piece of the artistic jigsaw in place. With the system now complete, it's difficult to see a challenger to the Harlequin's artistic crown, with perhaps the only exception being G2's 32-bit release, which as yet has not made its way to the AC offices.

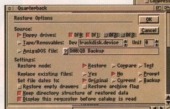

Quarterback v5

After a long time in search of Amiga stories and interesting users, I'm yet to meet a serious Amiga fan who doesn't have a copy of Quarterback in one form or another lurking somewhere within their system.

Now in its fifth incarnation, the latest version is more akin to a new product than a standard upgrade, as its rather unassuming title suggests. The most striking change is the implementation of a new WB2-style front end complete with a new requester-driven preference.

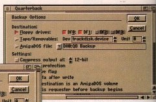
Thanks primarily to the simplified organisation and an impressive array of new features, v5 is by far the most flexible and easy to use backup and restoration system on the market, boasting an array of storage mediums that make the floppies-or-nothing options found on most backup programs pale into insignificance.

Aside from simple floppy storage, the new version offers the opportunity to back-up onto tape streamers, not to mention an unlimited assortment of removable media such as opticals and hard disks. There's even an option to backup your valuable data to a pre-defined directory on the resident hard disk of your choice.

To assist the management of all the new options, a new SCSI interrogator details all available devices for both backup and restoration, while a selection of ten definable macros wait for regular users to custom to their specific requirements.

Other assorted whistles and bells include options to assign passwords to stored data, define buffer sizes, include assigned directories to volume lists plus complete control over catalogue information.

In short, the new version puts what was already a market-leading product into an almost unassailable position. If you have a

hard drive and want to keep its contents safe and sound, the new Quarterback is quite simply the expert's choice.

Mastering AmigaDOS 2 (vol 2)

Probably the most useful and approachable AmigaDOS reference work available, Mastering AmigaDOS 2 (MA2) suffered until recently from its early appearance before the latest 2.04 version of Workbench was released.

With the revised volume now on the shelves, though, users of A500 Plus and A600 machines have no excuse for not diving into their Amigas and doing a bit of exploration.

A total of 25 new commands have been added to the book's comprehensive coverage of the Shell environment, bringing the MA2 reader bang up to date with Workbench developments, and sustaining the publisher's claims to "complete command coverage".

Volume one of the two-volume set has not been updated as it deals in more general terms with the operating system.

For those interested in the Amiga as a serious tool, especially those who use the Shell a great deal, Mastering AmigaDOS 2 is probably the best buy around. It's a little more expensive than some I could mention, but even at £19.95 a volume it's a sound investment.

Logitech Kidz

This has to be the cutest mouse in the test. I dare you not to go "ahh, innit lovely".

As you've probably gathered, the Kidz mouse is actually mouse shaped. The cable comes out of the rear of the casing and curls round to look like a tail, with little blue ears that act as buttons.

It's easy to tell that this mouse was designed especially for children because it's far too small for anyone with large hands to control it properly.

I personally have hands like shovels so I kept losing it but we gave it to people with smaller hands and they loved the feel.

Logitech have gone to a lot of trouble developing this mouse. The main differ-



ence between the Kidz mouse and a normal mouse is the size of the tracking ball.

It's been shrunk from the standard 2.5cm to 1.5cm, which doesn't sound like a lot, but makes a hell of a difference to movement response.

It's not the most accurate mouse you can buy, but the manufacturers' specs pegged the resolution at 200dpi, which isn't bad. Anyway, accuracy won't be that important on applications for children.

Budget hardware of this standard doesn't crop up every day. If you're looking for a replacement mouse for your Amiga or Atari ST then you can't really go wrong with this one.

You don't get any freebies with this package, just the mouse, the standard of which is brilliant. The design is basically the same as a Naksha with a slightly wider profile. The body is made of good grippy plastic and it's nice and heavy.

Whoever makes the sQuik mouse really knows how to upset the big companies - the tracking speed, which clocks at 290dpi, is faster than the Naksha and the Golden Image.

It runs as smooth as glass and is the fastest mouse we've had in. The only drawback is the buttons, which clunk just like on an original Amiga mouse.

Golden Image optical

Overrated and not much use just about sums this one up. The optical mouse is an absolute waste of time - it's less accurate and slower than the budget models and two or three times more expensive.

The body itself is a pretty poor shape and because of the absence of a trackball it's far too light to get good control over.

It will hardly, if ever, need maintenance because it has no trackball so if you have a serious aversion to cleaning mouse balls then rush out and buy one now.

The point about low maintenance is a valid one. If you work in a moderately dirty

environment like a building site office, or a very dirty environment like the AC office, then the track ball in your mouse will get clogged with gunge and subsequently bung up the rollers that sense the movement of your mouse.

one of the AC team made was the fact that no manufacturer had made an ambidextrous mouse. A mouse should be made that has a switch on the side to change the button function, making left and right vice versa.

The casing is the same horrible "made in Taiwan" plastic as the Itsa but looks aren't everything, as they say. At 220dpi this is one of the slowest we tested.

This isn't necessarily bad - I like slow



mice to a point because I don't like my pointer to go whizzing around the screen so fast that I can't see it. But if you're short of desk space then this isn't the one for you.

The Contriver is one of those mice you will either love or hate. It's like driving a 2CV - cheap and very reliable.

As usual, there is no substitute for quality. Naksha are always one of the companies mentioned when you ask people about quality mice.

To look at the mouse it's relatively unremarkable but once you've used it, it's a different story. It's fast and very, very smooth and unlike the sQuik the buttons don't clunk because Naksha have used good quality micro switches. The body's good and heavy with a really sturdy feel to the build. Best of all are the freebies with the package - you get a nice mouse house that sticks to the side of your screen and a very good mat.

But it seems that the budget mice are still the latest of the lot - the sQuik mouse beats Naksha's 280dpi by 10dpi, so if you're worried about desk space then I would go for the faster sQuik.

To finish off the package, Naksha have thrown in a corking game. Operation Stealth is a completely mouse-driven

Logitech Pilot

Logitech can always be relied upon to give you a no-messing quality piece of hardware. They do put a lot

of research into their field and don't make clones, which is a relief because all mice seem to be copied off each other nowadays.

The Pilot has got quite an unusual shape - I've only ever seen similar on a Champ mouse for the PC. You don't get anything with



the mouse, but that's the price you pay for quality. The mouse itself is an arch shape that fits surprisingly well into your hand. It has long dual buttons that are set back from the nose of the mouse.

Major points seem to have been overlooked on this design. Unlike the rest of the mice we looked at, the Pilot doesn't have a machine selector button so presumably they will have different models for the ST and the Amiga.

It works on an opto-mechanical system - this means the movement of the trackball is being read by light. Usually the movement is tracked by small cogs that rotate

with the ball, but opto-mechanical mice have a light gauge which senses the movement of the rollers.

Opto-mechanical sounds very grand but it doesn't do that much, and it doesn't make that particular mouse an optical mouse. However, it does make your mouse last longer because it has fewer moving parts, and it's slightly more accurate.

Sadly, as you point out, not all software companies are capable of reaching the high standards demanded from what users these days. I can only suggest that you try to test a piece of software in your local dealers before buying it.

If this is not possible and you buy a real lemon which was advertised as the best thing since sliced silicon, contact your local Trading Standards Office and return the product with a demand for a refund under your statutory rights as a consumer.

If you refuse to take "no" for an answer and put the wind up them with a mention about the fair trading laws, your rights, and the TSO, most companies will become refreshingly helpful.

Hari Kiri disk

Earlier this year I received some money for my eighth birthday and purchased a copy of First Samurai by MirrorSoft from a company called Turbosoft.

To my dismay the disk wouldn't load, so I sent it back to the address quoted in the instruction manual, which says I should allow 28 days for delivery of a new disk.

To my disgust I found out that the company was owned by Mr Maxwell, and had gone bust. I then tried to contact Turbosoft but I now believe that they are no longer trading! Can anyone help?

Where is my faulty disk and is there no way I can get another copy of what is a fabulous game? What about the new company who are selling First Samurai? As I said earlier, I am only eight years old and £20 is a lot of birthday money to me.

The only company I can track down who are distributing First Samurai at the moment are UbiSoft (081-343 9055), who are selling it as part of a compila-

tion. As they didn't sell you the game in the first place, they are under no obligation to replace the disk, but if you phone them and ask very nicely, they might be able to help you out somehow.

Sorry to hear of your predicament, but the number of people who lost enormous sums of money when Cap'n Bob went belly up seems to grow every month, and there must be plenty of former customers in a similar situation.

Your only other hope is to try to contact the liquidators of the original software company and explain what has happened. As long as your letter and disk arrived at the company's offices, they should be able to at least put you in the queue for compensation.

So far the score is drawn at one-all, but this can change if we get enough letters from FMG customers with positive or negative reports.

Of course, with the recent news that FMG have gone into liquidation, this exercise is more a post-mortem than anything else!

Shoddy coding?

I am writing to complain about some games manufacturers. Recently I bought a megaboard RAM expansion to increase my A500's memory to 2Mb.

When using it on Wordworth it worked fine, but when trying to run Project X and various other games they just crashed.

I assume the memory is all right as I have had no other problems. The only way to get the games to work is to open the Amiga and remove the board and Gary chip connector.

Manchester Unit Europe is a good game as it can sense the board's presence and use it. Why don't other games companies do this or at least stop

It can be difficult for games companies to take all the third-party peripherals into consideration, as there are so many around and not all of them work in a perfectly OS-legal way.

From your letter, it is unclear whether the games or the expansion board is to blame, but you should at least contact the companies concerned to let them know of the problem.

Games which are fussy about fast memory used to be more common on the Amiga, necessitating the use of the NoFastRAM utility to kill the extra memory before warm booting with the game disk.

Problems such as this are rare these days, but they still happen, so for the moment try using NoFastRAM or a similar PD utility to switch off your extra RAM without having to open the Amiga.

Poor postman

Your magazine is very good, but your distribution department is less so. European readers should be warned that when they subscribe to AC they probably won't get the magazine when it appears in England, but three weeks or more later, as happens to me every month.

So what is the idea of subscribing then? I have complained, but my letter was apparently distributed directly into the trashcan. Don't deceive people into advancing a lot of money when you cannot deliver in a reasonable time!

Two competing magazines to which I also subscribe always arrive around the same date as they come on the English news-stands. That's what people expect when they subscribe.

If you don't print this then you should at least give European readers some similar information about the delay. Anything else would be unfair.

Guri Refines, Ooscangate, Norway

There is an unavoidable delay when sending copies of the magazine overseas, Guri, but the three week delay you seem to be suffering is unacceptable. Perhaps it'd

help if I explain a little of how our distribution system works.

Our magazines are sent to the subscription department at the same time as the rest go off to our wholesale distributors, Comag.

There is then a period of four days or so before the mags hit the news-stands, during which time the subscription issues should be in the post.

News-stand magazines are flown to all overseas distributors, but for subscription issues we depend on the speed of the local postal services and delivery times are therefore a bit varied.

You should, however, receive your magazine, even overseas, no later than about a week after we hit the British news stands.

We could use a faster postal service when sending out subscriptions, but this would result in our very competitively priced subscription rates being increased - they are presently cheaper than any competitor magazine.

We don't think that the majority of subscribers would be prepared to pay the extra, but if huge numbers of you write in with your comments on the situation this could change. What do the rest of you think?

Industry reply

As the piracy debate has raged on, we've made a few stabs at provoking a comment from the games software industry in the hope that the other side of the story can be put straight from the horse's mouth.

The following is the first letter we've received from the industry on any piracy-related topic:

As a specialist games dealer, I feel it's high time I entered the piracy debate.

I don't think that the readers of AC realise how seriously the actions of pirates are affecting the software industry. How many of you can put your hands on your hearts and say "I have not copied software"? Not many, I'm sure.

Even by accepting one copied game from a friend you are contributing to the end of the Amiga!

I bet you're thinking: "This guy's talking rubbish. How can one copy spell the demise of the Amiga?" Well, let me explain. We are about to stop stocking Amiga software because we just don't sell any. "So what?" you're probably thinking, and if it were only our shops deserting Amiga games this would be fair comment, but it isn't.

Independents up and down the country have had enough. Even the big shops have pulled the plug. Check out the aisles in Toys R Us and you can count the

Amiga games on one hand. Of course, you can always buy mail order, can't you? Or can you? Think about it logically and you will realise that once the shops stop stocking Amiga software the publishers will stop releasing new games.

They are, after all, in the business of making money, and without the prospect of a substantial number of outlets for their product they will find something else to sell.

The same could be said for the PC except for one huge difference. The PC is basically a business computer that happens to have some games, whereas the Amiga is a games machine with a smattering of applications software.

In other words, without games the PC will survive, but the Amiga will curl up and die.

If after reading this your readers can't see the damage they're doing by accepting software from pirates, then I can only assume they're the sort of people who's still using ozone-depleting aerosols because "one can of hairspray won't make any difference".

Software retailers are in a unique position in that high prices and piracy both hit hardest in the retail sector, and both are beyond the control of the person trying to make a living from selling software.

However, the analogy between piracy and aerosols is a fairly weak one. Aerosols containing CFCs cause ozone depletion, a scientific fact which has been accepted virtually the world over.

However, the supply-demand chain is an artificial economic system totally unlike a natural phenomenon, and to ascribe one factor as the main cause of the retailer's woes would be oversimplistic.

The continuing popularity of budget games, judging by our Gallup charts, shows that software which is older and in most cases already widely available in its cracked or pirated form will sell in numbers as long as the price is right.

Piracy is wrong and should be stamped out, but so should ridiculously high prices.

This doesn't help the retailer, who must let a little bit pig-in-the-middle, but perhaps if the National Association of Specialist Computer Retailers (NASCR) took some sort of official position on soaring prices and low quality over-hyped software, we would see the games houses begin to take notice. Many of them so obviously do not listen to the punters.

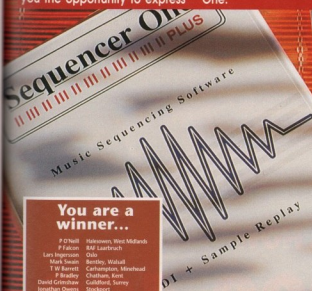

Expensive upgrade

I own an A500 with A501 RAM expansion. Is there a product on the market which will enable me to use A2000 cards and/or internal drives? Are there any power supply or compatibility problems?

Several months ago, I read about such a system made by Checkmate Digital, but I have not seen it advertised for a while.

If it is possible to use cards and/or internal disk drives, buying add-ons would be much cheaper (£90 cheaper in the case of the GVP 52Mb hard drive) and I would be able to take advantage of many peripherals already available as cards for the A2000.

Is this a good route for upgrading?

Adam Chringer, Henley-on-Thames

The HiQ Tower system from Checkmate Digital is a system designed more as a top-end A2000 replacement than an A500 upgrade path. It offers much more room for extra drives and cards than an A2000, but is rather expensive if all you need it for is to take advantage of a couple of A2000 peripherals.

The only other option is a Bodega Bay unit, which offers four Zorro II slots. This is again a rather pricey unit, and is fairly bulky, though it has the advantage of simply slotting into your A500 DMA port. Phone ZCL on 0543 414817 for details.

My advice to upgraders such as yourself would be to sell the A500 and put the money towards an A5000/2000 base unit, which can be purchased for about £500 these days.

This is only £100 more expensive than the add-on system boxes described above, which should leave you £100 from the sale of the A500 to buy new peripherals.

Alternatively, you could hang on a few months more and check out the new Amigas due for release in late Autumn. If, as we think, they are released with the AA chip set, they will be something very special indeed.

Programming choice

Can you tell me which is the best programming language for the Amiga? Is it Amos, Easy Amos, Amiga Basic, C, Devpac 3, 68000 machine language, or AmigaDOS?

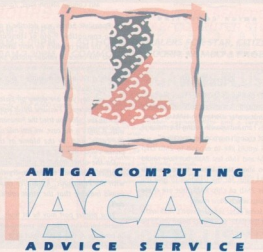
There are so many of them around, where do you start? I am about to take an A-Level computing course, so I need to know which would be best.

The programming language you choose depends entirely on the sort of programming you want from it.

If you are going to concentrate on games, then Amos is the obvious choice, but if your efforts will be mostly aimed at using the Amiga's operating system, you

should go for C. As a serious tool for development, Devpac 3 is probably the Amiga's number one choice, though your A-Level course may not require the sort of advanced programming involved in 68000 machine language.

If you intend to carry on your programming endeavours and use the Amiga to its full potential, Devpac is the package for you. Otherwise, stick to C or Amos.

Don't even consider Amiga Basic. It's garbage and Commodore don't support it any more, but if you really want to program in Basic you could opt for HiSoft Basic or GFA basic.

Both of these can be compiled and both have been optimised to make best use of the Amiga's special features. Good luck!

What's the score?

As an observer of the Amiga, before I bought my A500 Plus, I was extremely impressed by its musical abilities. I now want to write music on my Amiga but am completely ignorant of the availability of composition software.

This is what any potential software would have enabled me to do:

1. Write the music on-screen using stan-

dard musical notation.

2. Play back the music immediately through the Amiga's four sound channels.

3. Print the notation to paper.

4. Write for up to 32 instruments in notation on one page for printing purposes. I write orchestral music, and you have no idea how laborious a process it can be to write three pages of 32 stave music.

5. Store a group of sound samples – ideally string instruments which I can play back in a realistic-sounding form.

6. Be idiot proof.

7. Be able to save music to disk so I can load it later and go back to it.

8. Be reasonably priced.

9. Work on my standard A500 Plus without me having to spend a fortune on extra RAM and so on.

All I can find in my local Amiga shops is games and more games, so any suggestions would be greatly appreciated.

You don't ask for much, do you? There are a few packages around which fulfil some of your requirements, but very few which come close to meeting them all.

Your best bet would be the Copyist or Copyist Apprentice software from Zone

Distribution (081-766 6564). This software will enable you to write in standard notation, but whether or not it has the ability to compose and play back samples I can't tell you as I've never used it.

Phone Zone Distribution and ask them for some advice on the matter. They stock most decent music packages and should be able to fit you up with the software that best suits your needs, though I think you should be warned that this sort of highly specialised software isn't usually completely user-friendly and is even less likely to be cheap.

Ah dinnae kern

When I was using a proportional font with my favourite DTP program I noticed that the proportional bit was not all it could be. Some letters were bunched up together and others were further apart than the words.

I loaded FED, the Workbench fonts editor, and had a look at the font's Kern, Space, and Width values, which seemed to be all over the place with no logic at all.

I set all the kern values to zero and the Space values to one greater than the Width, then saved it back and it looks a lot better.

Now for my plea for help. What does the Kern value do? I know that it has something to do with one letter overlapping the space occupied by another.

I also know that the Width is the number of pixels that the data for the letter occupies, and the Space is the number of pixels used on-screen for that letter. Could you please explain how the Kern value affects the rendering of the font characters?

Kerning is the process whereby two specific characters are squeezed closer together or given a little more breathing space, and it differs from "tracking" in that it is usually applied to given troublesome character combinations, such as "AV", the traditional illustration for this technique.

How kerning works will usually depend on which wordprocessor or DTP package you are using, but in general a positive kerning value will create space between two letters, and a negative value will remove the space and fit the letters more closely together.

Tracking, usually applied to space a line of text out so that it fits better into a given space, is used across a whole group of characters or words.

The problem with your proportional font is that you seem to have managed to transform it into a non-proportional font.

The whole idea of proportional fonts is that the individual characters have kerning values already set so that they fit bet-

ter with one another. This may sometimes result in a messy on-screen picture, but did you try printing your text in NLQ or graphics mode before you messed with the font?

You may find that your new font with its uniform values looks better on screen and worse on paper.

Dodgy games

I recently bought a second-hand Amiga 500 with Workbench/Kickstart 1.3, which I intend mainly to use as a wordprocessor and desktop publisher with the eventual addition of a hard drive.

When using QuickWrite and PageSetter 2.0 the Amiga is great, but when using certain games, such as Final Fight, Lotus Turbo Challenge, and some demos, the last few lines of the screen are cut off and in some cases appear in another part of the screen.

This is definitely not because my monitor is out of tune, as there is still space under the main game screen area. Some games such as Super Monaco GP won't even work, and just load so far before crashing.

I'm sure the software can't be at fault because the games work fine on a friend's Amiga - a fairly recent model, though not a Plus - with the whole screen intact.

I'm not sure what revision number my Amiga is, but I do know it has a red power light and green drive light unlike some later models, and that it has an ECS 8372A Fatter Agnus and 0.5Mb RAM expansion, both of which were fitted by the previous owner. Do I need to upgrade my system or is it a professional repair job?

If your productivity and Workbench software loads without the sort of problems you've been encountering with games software, things get a bit more baffling, but if the same thing happens with all software, you're obviously suffering from some frayed video circuitry.

The problem could be almost anything, but to whittle the possibilities down you should scrounge a TV modulator from a friend who doesn't use a monitor and try the Amiga's RF output.

Next, use a simple phono cable and see if the composite video (CVBS) output has the same problem.

If the same thing happens with all types of video signal, the chances are that your Agnus or Denise chip is acting up, which would necessitate a replacement.

If not, it could still be your monitor or monitor cable, but a more likely candidate is your RGB port. Either way, I'd recommend you send the Amiga for a professional repair.

Plus RAM

After buying an A500 Plus I feel the need to expand its memory, as when creating animations or working in HAM art packages I am fed up with seeing the message "not enough memory for operation".

I would like to expand to 2Mb chip RAM and 1Mb fast RAM, but how would I go about this? I know there are 1Mb RAM cards for the trapdoor to give the Plus 2Mb of chip RAM, but are there boards which allow more?

Some older software won't work without fast RAM, so a bigger board would be of more use.

There are two obvious RAM upgrades for your purposes. One is from Power Computing (0234 843388) and the other is from Ashcom (0483 740664). Both are external boxes which fit in the DMA port on the left-hand side of the Amiga and both can hold up to 8Mb of extra RAM.

The entry-level models come with 2Mb each, which would give you the 2Mb chip and 1Mb fast RAM you require, but the bad news is that they both cost over £100.

Check out the prices in this month's magazine and Amiga Mart section, then go for one or the other. In terms of quality there's little to choose between them, so it all boils down to price.

Epson compatible?

I have two problems which I hope you may be able to help me with.

Firstly, I cannot use my Panasonic KXP1081 with my Amiga despite buying what I was told was the correct cable for it. Does anyone have the correct printer driver for this printer, and can I get a copy, or have I been supplied the wrong cable?

I have an Epson printer on loan but would prefer to use my Panasonic.

Secondly, I started off with the A500 Plus Cartoon Classics bundle and bought Platinum Works for my office work. This program has worked well for me but I was concerned the other day when writing up minutes for a meeting, because after only five-and-a-half pages I got an insufficient memory message. Surely a

1Mb machine should be able to handle more than this?

Could someone please let me know if this is correct, and how would I go about increasing the directly accessible memory for use with Platinum Works?

The Panasonic printer you describe is an Epson compatible 9-pin of standard design, the likes of which we have littered around the office in various places, and all of which work fine with any Amiga, if the printer will not work, either it or your cable is at fault.

As you say you are using an Epson without problems - I assume this is working with the cable you tried the Panasonic with. If that's the case, we can rule out the cable, and lay the blame at the printer's doorstep.

On the other hand, if you're using another cable with the Epson, try this with the Panasonic. A positive result would indicate that the other cable is dull.

Your printer port may be at fault, of course, but if this is the case you will have to have the Amiga checked out by a reputable repair company.

Confused consumer

I have £200 to spend and I don't know which of three things to do as events are moving so fast in computerland.

1. Buy a 2Mb RAM expansion.
2. Buy the entire 2.04 ROM set and ECS chips.
3. Wait a little longer and buy the new GVP A530 Combo/52Mb hard drive. Does this goodie have room for a maths co-processor?

I have a Kickstart 1.3 A500 (1Mb) with printer and external drive. Can you advise me?

Oh, and something else. I recently bought a PD disk and when I came home and booted the thing up, I placed another disk in DF1 to stop it clicking. It was a rather important disk, being my save game disk.

Anyway, when the PD disk had stopped loading I saw a little CU screen which said "Saddam checker" and it became active when I asked for a directory on DF1.

Now, because the Amiga read the disk in DF1 the checker found that the disk-validator was in fact the dreaded Saddam virus, and it began to repair the disk to deactivate Saddam. Is this a new checker?

Without an idea where your main productivity interests lie I would be silly to recommend a specific upgrade option.

However, I would definitely not go for the 1.5Mb RAM expansion if you are even remotely interested in a hard drive with a RAM upgrade option.

The GVP A530, though we've not as yet tested one, looks like a good buy. I'd want to see it seen the magazine tests if I were you, but if it comes through with flying colours, the A530 represents a superb value for money buy.

The ECS and Kickstart 2.04 upgrade you seem to be considering as an alternative should be looked upon as a "must buy" extra if you are in any way serious about the Amiga.

After only ten minutes using Kickstart and Workbench 2, you won't want to look at another 1.3 screen again, let alone use one.

Oh, and don't worry about the checker as it appears to be doing its job fine.

Dodgy Gazza

I have an A500, Ashcom 1.8Mb RAM expansion, Cumana external drive, and a Citizen 124D printer, and recently suffered a similar problem to that of Mr McLean (Issue 50).

I found that whenever a write-enabled disk was initialised in either drive and the disk was initialised or written to, the disk sector header was destroyed. This of course made the disk unusable.

When a disk was initialised, the read/verify counter appeared as normal, but only a few seconds later a message would appear telling me "Initialisation failed. No sector header. Try a different disk".

In my case, the fault was caused by the Gary expansion board connected to the 1.8Mb RAM expansion by a ribbon lead. I returned the unit twice to Ashcom who eventually replaced it and advised me to make sure it was pressed fully into the socket when installed. My Amiga is now formatting and copying disks normally.

If Mr McLean still has problems he might try removing his Gary expansion board, replacing the Gary chip in its socket, then attempting a disk format. If it works, he should replace his Gary expansion board and ensure a tight fit. Hope this helps.

Thanks for the feedback. You seem to have been lucky in buying your RAM card from a supplier who made an effort to help you out!

If Mr McLean is reading this, give it a try, but I must confess to a certain amount of surprise that a RAM card is affecting disk operations. Maybe someone can write and explain why?

Mini Office works on all Amigas with 1 megabyte RAM, can read Amiga IFF files and for US users, fully supports the NTSC standard.

How many times have you thought about buying a piece of commercial office software then on seeing the price changed your mind? Probably more times than you care to remember.

The only packages that actually combat this are either shareware or very old packages that are obsolete. But not this one. Five of the most commonly used programs in business and home software on three disks in one package. All you could ever need – or is it?

A database – perhaps the one thing that every company needs – is the first sub-application in the Mini Office suite. Thankfully it's simple to use, which is a relief. So much business software is released with a manual that's too sparse or written in a completely unfriendly style.

The package is quite pleasing to the eye – the designers have adopted a screen format which puts the search icons at the bottom, looking like pseudo-VCR buttons, so you have Play, Fast Forward, and Record to search through and save all your files. It also does all the normal string searches.

Storage

Don't worry about storage space if you have millions of files – you're not likely to run out of processing room because the storage capacity runs on disk space, which is a lot of information even if you're just storing on one floppy.

On the same disk are the floppy utilities, which are very similar to SID, the souped-up shareware file manager. Your screen is split into two so you can load the contents of a floppy or a hard disk into either of the two different cells.

Once the information is up on the screen you can manipulate it in a number of ways. It has all the basic utilities, like a disk formatter and a copying utility between the two information sources.

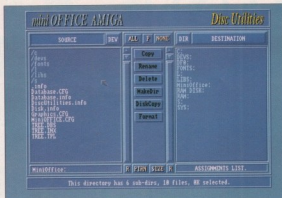
Painful

Spreadsheets are an awkward thing to use – more often than they are very elegant and generally painful. Mini Office's spreadsheet is standard with all the usual pull-down menus, but features like importing Ascii files and crunching binary code, as with K-Spread and other top spreadsheets, are lacking.

Again the programmers have used the VCR buttons for scrolling through the sheet. They're very clear and work well with the program, but look aren't everything.

As soon as you enter the wordprocessor you'll think you've entered the database again by mistake. The VCR buttons are at the bottom of the screen again but this time they replace scroll bars for text manipulation and shifting from one page to another.

One disappointing aspect of the program is that it doesn't support PostScript

printing, which limits capabilities slightly. This also means that the number of fonts you can use are limited to about six or seven of the standard Workbench variety. It does, however, let you import pictures into the text which is a big plus.

All in all, it's a good, standard wordprocessor with the usual utilities, counts, checks and various text bending utilities, so it basically does the job quite well.

Graphical representation of mathematical data is always a handy way of showing people what you're on about without baffling them with streams of numbers. The graphics utility in this package is perfect for doing just that.

Endless

Once you have imported the data from your spreadsheet you can then draw the graph. The option for the graphs are endless – options for positive and negative data and various permutations of the way the information is calculated.

What is really nice is that the different options are displayed as icons and not as huge long names, so you're working on a what you see is what you get basis. The graphs themselves are pretty uninspiring – just normal pie charts and so on.

Printing-wise they're not really up to a good commercial standard, mainly because of the layout which again is pretty uninspiring.

Graphically they're nicely coloured and put together and a good aid for manipulating existing information, but they wouldn't stand up on their own.

All business software manufacturers should think of doing something like this. All the different programs are interactive – numbers you crunch in the spreadsheet can be transferred to the graphics utility and converted into graphs.

In turn, the final graph can be placed into the text in the wordprocessor. As well as working together, all the programs share a similar design which is handy because it helps the user gain familiarity easily.

Indeed, the biggest plus for the package as a whole is its ease of use. Many programs leave you guessing how to use them, and so many have a manual that's been written by an igloo dweller with a speech impediment who's never used a computer.

It's not exactly the ultimate business package because it doesn't have the frills of other individual pieces of software, but it's pretty good for the price.

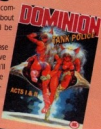

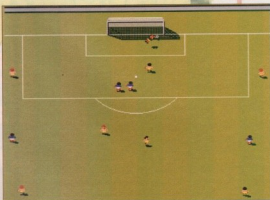

And so, Dojo Dan – The Computer Game came into being. An unassuming little role that didn't make a very big impact due largely to its rather formulaic appearance and lack of overall style. However, rather than returning to the booze, Dojo took the comments in his stride. It was said that the game was a rather uneven mix of beat-'em-up and platform. While this may have been a bonus, it didn't really add all that much to an otherwise by-the-numbers platform game.

There was also criticism for the way that

Dojo Dan – the story so far (or How To Almost Make It In A Platform Game). Born in Wolverhampton, young Dojo Dan was a problem child from the beginning.

Posessed by a disturbing desire to leap onto any raised surface and hit anything that came close to him, he became the first child to be expelled from nursery school for a combined acrobatics and grievous bodily harm offence.

With his parents at a loss, the authorities took him into care to decide what to do with him. A careers officer looked over his case file and immediately found the perfect occupation for wee Dojo.

He would be the star of a platform game. Simple. He had all the qualifications. His name, for a start. Alliteration, you see. Plus! A talent for martial arts. Plus! Plus! His alarming "raised surface" antics. He was a natural. They packed his things and sent him off to Softwareland.

But things weren't quite as rosy as they'd thought. Dojo arrived, alone and penniless, hoping to find himself a nice starring role in a big, popular platform game, and maybe a couple of squeals.

What he didn't plan on was the three thousand other hopeful computer characters all trying to do the same. Months went by, and no starring role for Dojo. He almost managed to get a non-speaking part for a fairly big budget production of Last Ninja 2, but the role was snatched by some ponce in b j a c k jim-jams.

Dojo started drinking. Whole days wasted by through motel windows in a haze of Jack Daniels. Dojo was on the skids. He watched his rivals scale the heady heights of Softwareland.

That stupid little plumber found a place in the fledgling console sector, and a cheeky young upstart calling himself RoboCod – a false name, I'll warrant – was gaining friends and awards left, right and centre. They were hard times.

Dojo slowly came to his senses. He enrolled in the Miner Willy Detox Clinic and came out a reformed sprite. He also gained a slightly more realistic approach to his work.

Rather than bust



all too often the game required Dojo to leap off-screen, without knowing if there was a platform beneath him. This contributed an unnecessary amount of blind luck to an already overly difficult game, said many critics.

There was also concern at the lack of a password system, and the odd idea of saving the game to disk at the end of each section. Mind you, it did receive praise for the rather nice graphics, with Dojo himself being described as "a bit of a cutie".

Many also enjoyed the vast number of levels, and the ability to decide which order you play the levels in each world.

The soundtrack also received praise, and would later appear as a cover version on Elton John's 700th album, entitled "A Hair Raising Musical Extravaganza". Possibly. Ultimately

though, Dojo's debut performance gained only a minor audience. It was put in the shade by the simultaneous arrival of The Addams Family and Fire and Ice, and the promise of Zool in the future.

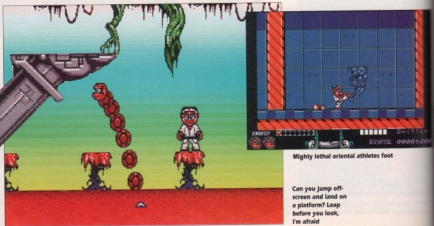

So come on, what is it with the programmers this month? They've all been smoking those nice cigarettes that the man in the big long coat gives them.

The story lines to all the games seem to have gone completely haywire. Fire and Ice

looks like a normal platform affair to your poor unsuspecting game reviewer, but look in the manual and like wow man, it's all talk of intergalactic monsters that have been incarcerated for 2,000 years for blowing up solar systems. Freaky man.

In short, your funskome coyote has been chosen to search out and kill Glemm, the monster who has escaped from his prison of 2,000 years. You must travel from your home, the polar ice cap to the beastie's home and do him over.

No problem, but that the presence of the big nasty man is corrupting the minds of all the poor creatures on the planet so they all want to beat you up. A pretty poor excuse if you ask me.

To be truthful, they gave this game to the wrong person to review because as a rule I hate platform games. But no, I took instantly to Fire and Ice because of the nice touches and the large characters.

I am sick to death of games with characters so small you can hardly differentiate between them and the large bogle that I left on my screen for consumption later.

Old Cool Coyote himself is brilliantly drawn, but for some bizarre reason he's got wings. Each to his own, I suppose.

To help Coyote on his mission he has puppies following him around. With these

puppies being mere whippersnappers, they are a bit slow, but they do have their advantages.

They shoot at the same time Coyote does, so you can kill double the number of nasties, and when jumping from level to level if the puppy is with you, you gain an extra life.

To get from level to level you must kill the nasties and grab the bits that come out. These bits are pieces of a key. When you've got all the key, find the keyhole and jump through.

At various points in the game there are level skippers so you don't have to do the whole section, but you still have to find them which isn't easy.

Killing nasties is quite easy - just freeze them with your ice pellets and jump on them so they shatter. Probably the biggest flaw in the game is the difficulty of the levels.

Trying to complete all of the levels with only three lives is as impossible as trying to unlance your 20-hole docs after drinking ten pints. It is without doubt a very hard game, but you can but try.

Fire and Ice is well put together, but slightly behind its time. No fresh ideas are explored in the game so it loses its appeal very quickly.

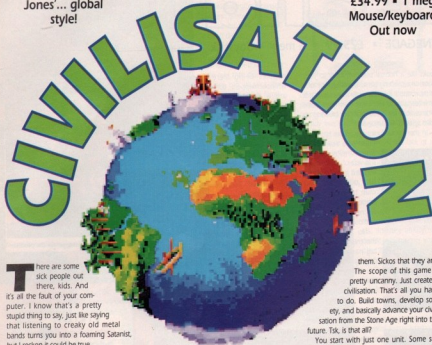

There are some sick people out there, kids. And it's all the fault of your computer. I know that's a pretty stupid thing to say, just like saying that listening to creaky old metal bands turns you into a foaming Satanist, but I reckon it could be true.

A certain type of game has arisen that stirs up some very unpleasant emotions in us human beings, and it encourages us to indulge these feelings. It tells us that it's right to be cruel, power-crazed maniacs, and that it's the only way to win. It's the 'God game', and by jiminy, here's the biggest so far.

There are a small minority out there in

Amigaland. A wandering band of nomads. They are the ones who felt that Powermonk didn't give them enough power, that Populous 2 left them with an appetite for more. Mega-lo-mania wasn't mega enough, and that Sim City just didn't kick butt.

Civilisation is a game written just for

them. Sickos that they are. The scope of this game is pretty uncanny. Just create a civilisation. That's all you have to do. Build towns, develop society, and basically advance your civilisation from the Stone Age right into the future. Yik, is that all?

You start with just one unit. Some settlers, to be exact. You know nothing about your surroundings, your fellow civilisations, or even what's going to happen. Use the settlers to wander around the map to begin with, revealing the landscape as they go.

Any unexplored land is shown as black, but as you traverse it reveals itself. Clever, eh?

Once you've explored as far as you can,

tell the settlers to, well, settle and they'll found your very first city. Name the city, and then you can get on with building stuff. Military units perhaps, or if you fancy a peaceful existence, start to build the essentials for a comfortable existence.

To begin with, things'll be pretty basic, but by instructing your scholars to work on certain skills, you can advance as a civilisation.

For instance, if they discover weapons working, you start to build better weapons; if they discover navigation you can build ships to explore the rest of the planet.

On the other hand, you can work on the social aspects, by developing different ways of thinking - communism, the republic, monarchy and so on - and learning how to build libraries and universities.

Help your cities thrive and grow, keep ahead of your neighbours by constantly developing new sciences, and most of all surround your towns with plenty of helpful military units.

You see, you're certainly not alone in this game. There are the other civilisations for a start. Before you begin playing, you can see how many others there'll be, but if one civilisation gets wiped out then another rises in its place.

That way, there'll always be the set number of civilisations. Thanks a bunch. And on top of all that, you'll probably have run-ins with barbarians.

They tend to be a bit hard, but unless you can't develop new weapons as quickly or found cities. So you can soon kick their hairy heads in.

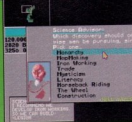
Make friends with other leaders, declare war on others, exchange or steal ideas, build a bigger and better civilisation until the game ends.

This happens in one of three instances. Your civilisation being crushed is the most obvious (and the most frequent), or maybe you could crush all the others (highly unlikely and very violent).

The third way to end the game is the most intriguing and one that shows you just how much depth civilisation has. The first civilisation to master space travel and reach Alpha Centauri is automatically



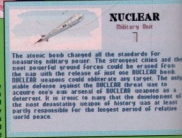

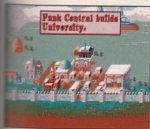

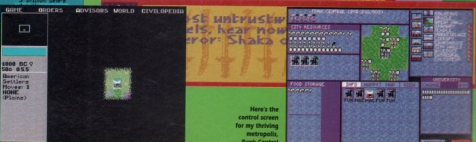

And if you're really rubbish and lose all your matches then you become England manager and lose the European Cup. Sorry, but you can become England manager, and of the two disks, the second is devoted entirely to that challenge.

It's a lot more detailed than other management games. Every single player from every single team is featured in a little file all of their own, including all their genuine stats. And in

the game goes on, players you know and love will get older and retire and fresh new players will move up from the junior squad. Like I said, it really gives you the impression of being part of a real sport. Brilliant.

OK, the actual game. As with most of these games, it's controlled from icons and a couple flicks deny this. You can scout to spy on other teams or to give you a report on another player to see if he's worth poaching.

You can, of course, transfer players and even borrow them from other lower league clubs. You can train your whole team, or give each individual player more specific training. You can basically do everything except smack Jimmy Hill on his aggravating chin.

The graphics are nice and clear for the icons and so on, and in the matches it's a view from the top runaround like Kick Off, but with bigger graphics.

You don't get to control the action, but you make substitutions whenever you want and after it's all over you can comment on your team's performance and make them feel really insecure.

Another nice feature is the ability to watch any match from any division. So if you really can't be bothered to see how your boys do against Southcote, you can go and watch

the Liverpool and Man Utd match instead. Not exactly very good management, but it lets you keep track of your fave clubs while you sink without trace.

And that's another good point (by jingo there's a lot of 'em). If your team starts to drop like a stone, you can abandon ship and move to another team. And then train your old team into the ground. Ha ha ha.

It's a good game, basically, if it could get a response from such a sportsphobic like me, then it's got to be good. Maybe people who know football inside out will find some inconsistencies, but I doubt it. I enjoyed it immensely, and I reckon you will too. Yes, you. Well worth a gander.

If only there was one like that. Hark, what do I see bounding over the hills like a breath of fresh air, but a puzzle game with the odd title of D/Generation and, look, it's got loads of lasers and stuff you wouldn't normally see in a puzzle game.

D/Generation is a Neogen. I bet you're really confused now, so I'd better start from the beginning. You play the part of a man, a male, a bloke, a non-woman, got it? The poor little chap hasn't got a name and personally I think he should have one, so I will christen him, Eric.

Eric isn't a muscle bound hero with a super weapon and neither is he a normal hero without a super weapon. Eric is just a delivery boy armed with only a simple package, but – and this is a but that will alter Eric's whole life – the package contains something that could save the whole wide world and more likely will make Eric the president or something.

Eric has to deliver the package to Singapore to a place called the Genoc Biotib. The Genoc Biotib produce Neogen organisms and these Neogens have escaped. The Neogens haven't worked out how to get out of the labs – yet! Prior to the out-

break; some recon satellites spotted an explosion near the top of the building. This is where Derrida, the head scientist, is creating the next Neogen prototype, the D/Generation.

There are three other generations of Neogens. The A/Generation is a bouncing red ball that smother's its target and can cloak itself by going transparent. There is the B/Generation which is a bouncing blue cylinder that crushes its target. It's extremely fast and can hide in the floor. The C/Generation is a humanoid that can disguise itself as anything, animate or inanimate. This Neogen decapitates its targets (gulp).

If the D/Generation were to escape from the labs out into the real world it would threaten the life of every single person on the planet (double gulp and even a slight gasp).

Unfortunately Eric has unknowingly walked into the building to hand in his package, and the door has closed behind him. Eric finds the receptionist hiding behind her desk. She tells Eric that Derrida has been demanding the package and it is extremely important to Derrida. Eric's mission is that he must take the package to Derrida and if possible rescue any survivors that he finds along the way.

Well I suppose after all that waffle, you're probably wondering whether it's any good. Well personally – and this is only my opinion – I think it is good.

D/Generation is a nice refreshing change. If you're fed up shooting wave upon wave of aliens and bored stiff of beating the hell out of enemy upon enemy, then D/Generation could well be worth a look.

The puzzles range from the easy to hard. Some are obvious, some are not so obvious. As well as using your head to solve the puzzles, you have to be pretty good at wagging your joystick. There are plenty of A/B/C/Generations all

looking to squash and mangle you to death. D/Generation takes a while to get into, but once you're in there you might find yourself trapped and unable to get out. The game is massive with about 20 levels of puzzling that'll keep you entertained for ages and ages.

D/Generation doesn't have that certain something that makes it stand out from loads of other games, but it's a really good and very enjoyable puzzle-em-up.

A bit of history for you. Anyone reading this remember Daley Thompson's Decathlon on the good old Sinclair Spectrum? Yes, of course you do, it was the start of something big and it would revolutionise athletic games for ever and ever. Amen.

Yes, the one game that would be responsible for the end of an era. As you may or may not know, Daley's Decathlon involved tapping two keys as fast as you could. This undoubtedly led to the N and M being worn out before any of the other keys.

This, among other things, led to the death of my Spectrum, so with a tear in my eye I waved goodbye to the good old Speccy and said a big hello to my brand spanning new Amiga. Hurrah, hurrah and thrice hurrah.

Being a sentimental and thoughtful sort of guy (you've got to be joking - Ed) I still look back to the days when Daley ruined my micro, but in some way maybe it was a god-send and I was meant to receive an Amiga on that fateful day.

The marathon is the "key" event. You start with the marathon and in between you travel to all the different events. After the event has finished you return to the

marathon to check on how you're running is doing. You can alter his rhythm and speed, plus you can tell him what to take on the refreshment stand.

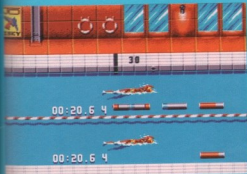
You have a choice of glucose, water or steroids. Oops, I mean a sponge. Don your swimming togs because the next event is diving.

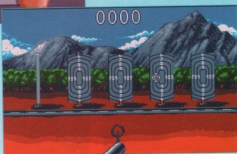
riding a horse, it's more like driving a car. Right, that's another review done and dusted—all I need to tell you now is what I think about it. Overall International Sports Challenge is a very polished product indeed. The 3D bits add a new dimension to the genre, plus the fact that you have the marathon running all the way through the game—another new idea which works well.

I can't actually compare it to any of the other recent sports games, simply because I haven't seen any of them. The graphics are good and the sound is fairly average, but the playability is excellent.

I think you'll probably come back to this one even after all this Olympic business has died down. I liked it, but it doesn't last too long which is probably its only major fault, mainly because there aren't enough events.

Also, £30 is a bit expensive, but if you're feeling in a particularly sporty mood then I would recommend that you buy this.

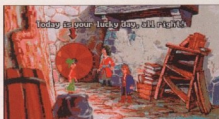

A puzzle for you. Do you know who invented Tetris? No, it wasn't Keith Chewing, although you're quite close. I'll tell you. It was the Devil.

Yes, Tetris is Satan's computer game. It's a brainwashing device, designed to turn the people of Earth into drooling techno-zombies. And, God help me, I love it.

You see, Tetris is full of Satanic messages. And we can prove it. We videotaped a game of Tetris, and then played it backwards. And there it was, in Morse code, "Worship Satan!" it said. "Hey Kidd! Fancy going to a party round at Satan's house? Surf like that, Gulp."

Ever since, Bill's taken to spinning round violently, cursing at priests in Latin and spewing pea soup everywhere. Some things never change, eh?

So, Microprose have joined up with the Dark One and brought "that game" to the Amiga once more. And this time it's Super, apparently. Let's fill up on holy water and take a closer look...

First of all, who doesn't know what Tetris is about? Just you, eh? You must be a bit of a sad case. Well, just for you, I'll explain it. Take a look at the screenshots, as this'll help you visualise what I'm on about.

You've got a "pit", and different shaped blocks tumble from the top. By rotating them, you've got to make complete lines in the pit. Each complete line vanishes, thus leaving you more room. Each incomplete

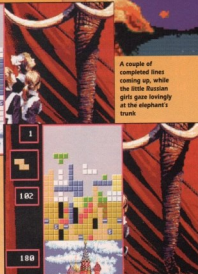


line remains where it is, and clogs up your pit. If the blocks reach the top, it's game over. And that's it.

Now, on Super Tetris things are a bit different. We've got some new features to talk about. So let's go through them one by one.

For a start the pit starts half full of blocks. You've got to clear this "hubble" to progress to the next level. The trouble is, you've only got a limited number of blocks per level.

For each line you complete, you get two bombs. These can be used to blast away

your cook-ups, or to collect treasure. Which leads us on to...

The treasures. These nestle in among the rubble and can be collected by hitting them with bombs. The bonuses range from extra pieces, destroying a whole line or giving you one of those elusive and ever so handy long blocks.

You've got a two-player option where you can either play against or with your friend. You can also link up two Amigas and play that way. There's a timed game where you've got to finish each level in under a set time.

Perhaps the most bizarre addition is the Save Game option, that lets you load up your old games and carry on where you left off. Spooky.

So that's what's "Super" about this new version of Tetris. Is it worth it? Erm, to be honest, the answer is no. Tetris has been around for yonks and you can pick up a perfectly adequate version of it from any good PD library. In fact, I do believe we've given you a version of it on the CoverDisk

Handling

With this article we complete our introductory overview of AREXX. We have looked at all the main constructs of the language, from the predictable DO loops, IF statements and functions, to the more novel macro, parsing and compound symbol features.

We have also seen the all-important AREXX ports which allow the interprocess communication, and their related host addresses.

In future we will be looking at more specific subjects from the varied and resourceful world of AREXX, including access to Amiga system structures from AREXX, specific AREXX-based languages supplied with major packages, interesting new libraries, examples of automation scripts, AREXX compilers and much more.

It would be wrong to conclude any overview of AREXX without looking at one of its most interesting features – the ability to generate code dynamically.

Admittedly this is a more advanced feature, but anyone who wants to use AREXX for more than mundane automation tasks will find it quite rewarding to explore. The dynamic abilities of AREXX allow it to address some major programming tasks, much more easily than, say, Basic, or other languages.

What does dynamic code handling mean? Well, first of all, AREXX can create new variables while it runs, and it can "drop" old ones – we saw this last time, when we looked at compound symbols.

Not only that, but it can also create variables with names specified by the user as the program runs! It can also create or build program lines – not originally in the code – and run them just as if they were normal AREXX program lines.

These abilities are achieved using the very powerful Interpret instruction, and its sidekick, the VALUE() function. Interpret takes any expression as an argument, and, after evaluating it, attempts to interpret/execute it just as if it was the next line of the code.

By this means, it is actually possible for a program to create commands for itself while it is running, and subsequently to run them!

The following simple example takes advantage of this, in order to implement a simple "readloop". This reads each line typed in at the "?" prompt, and runs it just as if it was a regular AREXX clause (command line):

```

/* a simple readloop */
do forever
  options prompt "?"=

```

Note that in the above program, the input (input-string) is actually a variable until it is converted to a clause by the Interpret instruction. You can probably already see the enormous potential of this.

The contents of the string to be interpreted can be any valid AREXX code – the string can contain more than one program line. It is considered as an independent unit block, not unlike the blocks specified within a DO...END range.

A Break clause within this string will make the program break out of the Interpret instruction, but

there must be no Leave or Iterate instructions, unless they are in the context of a DO loop. Other than that there are hardly any restrictions.

In the above example we see an arbitrary string being executed as a clause. If the contents of this string are, "var1 = 77", a new variable called "var1" is created and given the value 77. Now, to complete the process, we will also need the ability to retrieve the value of a variable whose name we specify.

This is done with the function VALUE(). The argument to this function is an expression which evaluates to the name of the variable. Consider the following example:

```

/* using the value() function */
var1 = 77
var2 = 'var1'
say value(var2)
say value('var2')

```

You will see that in the first case "var2" is evaluated, and the result, "var1" is used as the argument, so "77" is printed out. In the second case the literal value of the string, ie "var2" is used as the argument so "var1" is printed out.

So, not only can variables be created but they can also be accessed by their names while the program is running! In most other languages this is only possible while tracing/debugging.

The VALUE() function can thus be used as a kind of a pointer to give us the value of a variable during run-time – a lot of power here, but also a lot of potential for errors.

This is not possible in other languages such as Basic, where all variable names must be declared at the start, and the language prevents any mixing of the variable names with the variable contents.

As well as being able to find the value of a variable specified during run-time, AREXX is also able to give us certain information about it, such as whether the variable is initialised to a value, and what kind of string it contains.

Two functions are provided for this – SYMBOL() and DATATYPE(). SYMBOL() takes one argument, the (potential) name of a variable, and returns one

of the following three strings - VAR, LIT or BAD.

VAR means that the string we have given is an initialized variable within the program; LIT means that it is a literal string, in other words it can be used as a variable name but is not currently initialized; while BAD means that the string is not a legal ARexx symbol and may not be used as a variable name.

This is a useful check to make before attempting to create new variables dynamically!

DATATYPE() is used to inform us of the contents of the variable we specify. If used with one argument, it will return one of two strings, NUM or CHAR, depending on whether the variable content is a number or a character string.

In addition, DATATYPE() can also take an optional second argument. This specifies even more detailed information to check for, and returns either 1 or 0, depending on whether the test succeeded or not. The options for the DATATYPE command are shown in Figure 1.

Note that the first argument, as always, is evaluated before being tested, so datatype(1/2,numeric) = 1, but datatype(1/2,numeric) = 0.

As you can see, the tests provided by DATATYPE() are extremely useful, and can save a lot of boring coding.

Structures

One example of the use of these facilities might be the creation of a simple database, where the elements can be stored in variables under their own names, as they are given in. This dispenses with the need to provide appropriate structures beforehand.

Data storage is also far more flexible, and a new category, or a special case can be stored very easily, without having to modify the complete database substructure. When used in conjunction with compound symbols, this can yield some extremely flexible and powerful computing.

Note that a program which creates a database like this (a simplistic example is given in the listing

below), ends up with a different set of variables to those with which it started out - the program has modified itself while running.

This approach could be taken even further, with a program modifying itself until it is quite different from the way it started. Of course, we always hope that any changes a program makes to itself are for the better!

In languages that do not allow this kind of dynamic evolution, all the possible outcomes would have to be taken care of in the initial algorithm. Dynamic code allows the flexibility to deal with the unexpected.

Programs that make major changes to themselves while running are known as self-modifying. Their real value is in artificial intelligence and other problem-solving applications.

Here the self-modification represents the new states learned by the program. However, use of code like this - powerful as it is - is extremely sensitive and prone to error unless it is very rigorously programmed, so any major complexity is better avoided.

While it does a lot to simplify small jobs, I do not recommend using it for anything complex without a good understanding of dynamic code, as it makes it all too easy to tie oneself up in knots.

The ability to intermingle the names of variables with their contents is technically known as syntax/semantics collapsing. The syntax of the

program (ie the language rules) blends into the semantics or meaning of the program, (ie what the program does).

It is a prominent feature of the Lisp family of languages, which have been a major tool in AI research. Think of syntax/semantics collapsing as plastic explosive - it is flexible enough to be made into any shape you like, powerful, and should be treated with extreme care.

Now, Rexx was primarily designed to be a practical language, and was never intended for complex AI use. However, combined with its good parsing abilities, it is possible to use it constructively in a number of programming applications, for example syntax analysis and problems concerning an evolving program state.

These uses are more advanced, and we may have a better look at them in the future.

As we said, the majority of ARexx users will mainly be interested in its script automation facilities. Yet there is one application area - not as complex as AI use, but a little more involved than automation scripting - which will interest many users.

This involves the conversion of files from one format to another. ARexx was practically made for this task, and even less experienced programmers should find that format conversions are a breeze, whether they be text, graphics, or sound.

Most of the utilities that do this kind of job come from the Unix world and assume some familiarity with the C way of doing things. On the whole they have been the province of professional programmers; the amateurs having been left to plod along in Basic.

Yet with a little thought, ARexx can do quite a bit of what dedicated reformatting and pattern-matching programs like AWK, PERL, SED and even SNOBOL can do, in a surprisingly straightforward manner.

So next time you have a file you cannot use, because it is not in quite the right format, don't despair. Write an ARexx script to do the job. You might be surprised at how easy it is.

Still life

Most videophiles assume that if an image is to appear on video it has to be animated. In fact like any other artistic exploit DTV productions benefit immensely from a little light and shade.

If a project is solely comprised of a constant stream of ever-changing animated images it soon becomes rather monotonous, and just a tad irritating – a brief glance at the average low budget music video is testament to that.

If you're trying to make a point, during a documentary for example, stills are an excellent way of producing an authoritative, news-like atmosphere.

Also, if you're an animator, stills can be a very convenient method of stretching the production without forcing your system to expend the huge amount of effort additional animation sequences require.

Bonus

Another animation bonus is that stills offer you the opportunity to display images as they really are, rather than being forced to compromise quality as is often the case when imagery is compiled into an anim.

If you're the lucky owner of one of the many 24-bit display boards, stills may be the only method you'll ever have to show your work as it should be rather than suffering the sometimes painful transition to Ham, which is still the only really viable method of displaying photo-realistic full screen images without the assistance of a still frame recording system.

As I'm sure you're aware, there are countless methods of importing images into the Amiga, but

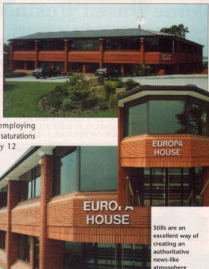
no matter what the method the process invariably boils down to either scanning or frame grabbing.

In the case of frame grabbing, the conversion from live video to a still frame image is relatively painless. As you're already dealing with a video-legal image there's no palette adjustment necessary to avoid the dreaded colour bleeding so often associated with composite video.

This is a regular problem when employing scanned images which contain colour saturations which exceed 191 or approximately 12 within the Amiga's colour register.

Even though video grabs are "legal", it doesn't mean that they are completely free from ham. One of the most frequent grabbing disasters is image blur, a phenomena which is usually accompanied by a horrendous amount of interface flicker.

This happens all the time when dealing with fast action grabs. Fortunately there is an answer which although not ideal is a lot better than the migraine-inducing effect of a particularly flickery grab. All the main image processing programs such

as ADPro, Image Master and Mirage now offer a de-interlace option as standard – see this month's main feature for a head-to-head look at all three.

All video and broadcast images are made up of two alternating fields which are used to effectively double the resolution of the image.

Unfortunately such images are often less than ideal in their static form. De-interlacing has the effect of dividing the two signals into their respective fields.

As a result, the flicker between the two is removed. Unfortunately this does mean you lose half the original resolution.

If you plan to employ colour scans rather than grabs, life can be a little more difficult as it's essential to avoid excessive saturation.

Again, image processing is the answer, with all the major packages allowing adjustment of overall colour saturation as well as individual colour editing within the palette.

ADPro is particularly well blessed in this area with an all new operator which allows the user to apply broadcast limits to the image. As a result, producing a video legal image is simplicity itself.

No matter what the subject or style of your show a genlock is a near essential for a professional finish. Although direct exposures are useful on occasion – echoes being an example – the option to fade stills up or down through live video really adds to the production.

Well, that's enough advice, now it's time to dig up that long forgotten digitiser/scanner and set to work!

Practical production

If we assume the images are ready for video and in the correct proportions – interlace and over-scan where possible – it's time to add them to the production.

There are several ways to achieve this, perhaps the most impressive being via Scala which can be used to introduce stills with a variety of wipes and fades.

If your finances won't stretch to Scala you could employ a PD picture viewer or even better load them into View 3.0 – the excellent anim player and picture viewer found on this month's CoverDisk.

With this program it's possible to compile several individual images into an anim and play them back frame by frame thanks to the program's single frame advance option.

When a series of stills are combined with a genlock, the results can be stunning, especially if the stills are from the actual video on display. Now you can employ the classic TV trick of "echoing".

How often do we see a still frame flashback of a flying footballer frozen for posterity after a vicious attack by a particularly ferocious breath of wind?

Now you can do the same, constantly flashing back to the high spots of any event, perhaps with a voice over adding to the atmosphere.

Narration is another great reason to employ stills within a show. If you have a mixture of live video, computer graphics and music it's very difficult to add a voice-over without confusing the viewer.

Once again, the still can provide the quiet spot where a voice over can be added and more importantly absorbed without an apparent pause in the performance.

Apart from sporting flashbacks, perhaps the best place for such effects is within documentary-style productions. If you're working for a client who wants to establish a corporate ID, nothing impresses more than the occasional still of the boss or a panoramic shot of the new offices.

A different view

It is possible to create a screen display without Graphics Primitives commands – an enterprising assembler programmer can tell the registers exactly what to do.

The Viewport can be replaced by Copper lists, and the View by DMA commands and instructions to registers. This reduces overheads if more time is needed for each game cycle. It also gives the programmer more flexibility and a chance to show off.

Some commands from the Amiga Library are still used. Commands to enable and disable the multitasking allow the program to coexist with any others, and to exit gracefully.

If I use Amiga Library commands to allocate and free memory, I can be sure that there is no clash of interest with the rest of the system. If a program is going to take over the machine completely it does not have to be so diplomatic.

The Copper can change the contents of some registers at certain screen positions. The Copper has a program called a Copper list that is stored in memory and executed command by command, at the same time as the main processing.

Colourmap

Viewports consist mainly of sets of instructions for the Copper, as can be seen from the Viewport structure. Four of the structure members are pointers to Copper lists – `vp_Dispins` (display), `vp_Srlins` (sprites), `vp_Clrins` (colour) and `vp_UCopins` (the user Copper instructions).

The colourmap, `vp_ColorMap`, is an area where the colours are stored so that the Amiga can use them when creating its Copper list. There are some structure members for the size of the Viewport and some of the display options used in the View.

There is a pointer to the next Viewport, if any. The `MrgCop0` command merges all the Copper lists for all the Viewports so that the instructions

are in the correct order. The Viewport has a pointer to the RastInfo structure, which in turn has a pointer to the Bitmap structure. The start address of each Bitplane must be set so that the DMA controller can find the data.

A pair of registers, `BPLXP` and `BPLXT`, is used for the high and low word of the address of each plane. The data can be moved into these registers from the Copper list, which is set up as follows:

For more information on how to create, set up, and trigger a Copper list, and use the hardware registers, see the Almanac page for December, 1991.

The view structure contains a pointer to the first viewport, and to the two Copper lists which are the result of all the other Copper lists merging. The

main or long frame Copper list will be used here, the short frame Copper list is an additional list used for interlace mode.

The display instructions and view modes can be set by addressing the registers directly. The colours are placed in the colour registers directly at the same time.

The register `DMVSTRT` sets the upper left-hand corner of the start of the display (vertical 48, horizontal 129) and the register `DMVSTOP` sets the lower right-hand corner (vertical 304, horizontal 256+193).

This centres the screen display, allowing for the blanking gap, and the shape of the picture tube. The registers `DDFSTRT` and `DDFSTOP` determine the horizontal start and finish of the bit plane DMA.

Eight bus cycles are needed to read all the bit planes in lo-res, and four in hi-res. Register `DDFSTRT` contains the bus cycle of the first bit plane DMA in the line (\$38 in lo-res, \$3c in hi-res), and `DDFSTOP` the bus cycle of the last bit plane DMA in the line (\$d0 in lo-res, \$d4 in hi-res).

Setting the bits in register `BPLCON0` activates the following functions:

Bit	Function
15	hi-res mode on
11	hold and modify on
10	audio playfield on
9	video colour on
8	genlock audio on
3	light pen active
2	interlace mode on
1	external synchronisation on

Bits 12 to 14 contain a three-digit number representing the number of bitplanes. This display has four bitplanes, colour, and no fancy ViewModes. The `BPLCON2`, `BPLCON1`, `BPL1MOD` and `BPL2MOD` registers are cleared for this display. I hope to cover these in a future Almanac feature.

Rather than re-invent the wheel, I have made use of an assembler IFF picture file reading module that I wrote for the May issue of Amiga Computing. The support disk contains a fully commented version of the source code.

Because this is a general purpose IFF file reader, it works equally well with today's low level graphics, with graphics primitives or with interlaced.

I have set up a bitmap structure, as the file reader expects a bitmap structure as input. The structure will hold the four bit plane addresses, but these addresses will be accessed directly by this program, instead of being linked to a screen structure.

The other inputs to the routine are the name of the file containing the picture, and the address of the memory area where the colours are to be stored.

My next Almanac pages will have C and assembler features on sprites, vsprites and bobs, and hopefully a book review.

The demo program

The demo program on the support disk contains the source module, `iffread2.a`, which is the general purpose picture file reader.

The colours from the CMAP chunk are copied to the colourlist in the calling program. The picture data in the BODY chunk is read in, decoded, and copied to the bitplanes specified by the bitmap structure in the calling program. The file is closed, and control goes back to the main program.

The instructions for the start of the four bit planes is copied into a Copper list in chip memory. Instructions are added that gradually changes the background colour from light to dark cyan, and then from dark to light brown as the raster beam goes down the screen.

The CopperDMA is disabled, then enabled again after the new Copper list is put in place and triggered. The picture from the IFF file is displayed but instead of a black background, the colour instructions from the Copper list are obeyed.

The picture is displayed on the screen until the user presses the joystick Fire button, or clicks a mouse button. The old Copper list is brought back, the memory freed, and the program exits.

A background of graded colours could be produced using a similar Copper list to the one used in the program. This could give an illusion of perspective for a game where the player has to shoot at a menacing series of wire frame triangles and squares as they rush towards him.

Another possibility is to adjust the bitplane pointers part of the way down the screen to produce a parallax scroll – this can look very effective.

Plus points

It's been a long time in the making but Gadgets have finally come good and delivered the long awaited upgrade to Sequencer One.

The aforementioned software was a massive seller back in 91, with a claim of 70,000 units shifted. Now Gadgets is well placed to repeat their success with this impressive sequel.

At first glance the software appears to be much the same, but lurking beneath the familiar front end are a plethora of well thought-out enhancements.

The basics of the program remain the same with full 16-channel MIDI support over 32 separate tracks plus four channels devoted to the Amiga's built-in sound capacity.

The program retains the original track list, step editor and bar editor but now also boasts two new additions – the tempo and jukebox screens.

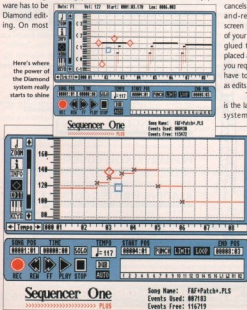
Tempo maps are familiar features on most modern sequencers but as is the norm with Gadgets, theirs is perhaps the easiest to use, thanks in part to their inspired Diamond editing system – a feature which appears throughout the new version.

Instant

Inserting tempo changes is simply itself – all the user need do is clicking within the edit window and the tempo line instantly becomes glued to the pointer as it glides over the window.

Once a suitable point in time and tempo is reached, a click instantly locks that particular change into position. The process can then be repeated as many times as necessary.

The strongest selling points of the new software has to be the Diamond edit mode – in most editing, On most

sequencers editing individual notes can be a laborious process but thanks to the new feature, Plus is arguably the simplest note editing environment on the Amiga.

Although present within the Tempo map where it can be used to define the interval, snap to interval, move changes or even remove the edit all together, it only really comes into its own within the Step Edit screen.

To activate the system you simply select Diamond Edit mode and click and hold down the left mouse button anywhere within the Edit window.

If you then move onto a note, the Diamond Edit becomes active with a selection of four diamonds and a solitary square surrounding the selected note.

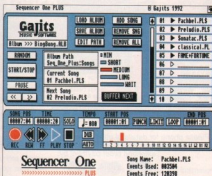
Clicking the upper Diamond allows the note to be moved, while the diamonds to the left and right allow adjustment of the beginning and end positions.

Finally the lowest member of the fab four allows volume change. The real beauty of the system is that editing is instant, no requests, no typing, just a simple click and drag and the job's done.

At any point clicking the right mouse instantly cancels the selection, while a click-and-release elsewhere on the screen produces a standard note – of your own design – which is then glued to the pointer and can be placed at any pitch or time position you require. All editing features also have to option to sound the note as edits are made.

The mysterious blue square is the last element of the Diamond system. Unlike all the other Diamond icons this produces a pull-down.

As in the tempo map, there are options to define an interval at which notes will appear and of course lock the note in question to the newly defined point if

required.

There are also more basic edit controls which allow the note to be duplicated, resized, volume adjusted, or alter the gate settings all from a simple pop-up requester.

Although impressive additions, my particular favourite has to be the option to define a note as a control change. As a result, you can insert a program or voice change at any point, adjust the volume from that point onwards or even alter the pan position. Again Plus makes what can sometimes be a tricky procedure on other sequencers simple.

Identical

As mentioned earlier, the main body of the program remains almost identical. As a consequence, any upgrader should feel perfectly at home, especially with the upgrade cost being a very reasonable £39.95.

Unfortunately for the newcomer Plus is a little more expensive at £129.95. Having said that, for a sequencer boasting a very respectable 192 PPQN (Pulses Per Quarter Note) and a degree of ease of use unrivalled by the option it's nevertheless still a bargain.

Basically, Plus is ideal for two areas of the market. Firstly due to its ease of use it's perfect for the MIDI beginner. Secondly it offers the speed, accuracy, and no-nonsense options that will appeal to busy professionals who are already proficient musicians and simply require a method of recording and manipulating their creations as quickly as possible.

On the down side Plus – like its predecessor – can't match some of the power features found on software such as Bars and Pipes Pro and KCS. Having said that, it's sure to be a long time before the average user runs into a problem that can't be resolved with this excellent update.

Get the message

For most people, the attraction of bulletin boards is the opportunity to download public domain and shareware programs. While this useful service is available on most BBSs, it is by no means all that is offered.

Many BBSs are linked in to an enormous network called Fidonet which offers callers to those boards the opportunity to chat to other callers all over the world for the cost of a local call.

Fidonet works in the following way. Each BBS on the system is part of a long chain which runs around the world, branching out here and there. Every night a BBS will receive messages from the board behind it in the chain, add those it has received that day from the local callers, then pass the whole lot on to the next BBS in the chain.

After a few days of this messages can travel all round the world, being seen by the callers of each BBS en-route.

So what's in the messages, and why should you bother? The message system can be likened to a shelf full of special and general interest magazines, each crammed with readers, letters.

Here you can read people asking questions, putting forward a point of view, arguing, suggesting innovations and responding to other readers' queries.

Published

The messages found on bulletin boards are just the same except that you can be certain your letter will be published since you effectively publish it yourself.

In the UK, in May this year, the statistics show that over 100,000 messages were passed round the system – around 3,000 plus per day. That's an awful lot of messages to have to read, especially if many of them hold no interest for you.

To get round this messages are divided into "echoes", each of which can be thought of as a single specialist magazine. Thus there might be an echo dealing with vintage cars and another in fishing.

The Open University has an echo of its own where students and tutors get together. As a caller you simply choose the echo or echoes that interest you and read just those areas.

Once inside an area you will find messages from

all over the world on that subject. As you read you will find information, leg-pulling and raging arguments.

After a while there will be a message which incenses you so much that you just have to respond to it. At this point, simply typing something like "R" for reply – different boards vary slightly but there will be a menu to help you – will put you into a simple text editor where you can bash out your reply then save it to the BBS's hard disk.

From now on, anyone else calling the BBS and reading that area will see your message, and the message itself will travel around all the other boards on the net too so that people from all over will see what you have to say.

With so many messages flying around in different echoes, there needs to be a certain amount of policing – partly to stop illegal or offensive messages travelling around, but also to ensure that messages are kept on topic.

It's very easy to go off at a tangent and find that while the thread – a series of messages linked to each other – began extolling the virtues of a particular modem, it's now progressed to talking about someone's new car.

This is where moderators come in. Each echo has one or more moderators who keep an eye on all the messages there and warn callers when they are breaching the rules of that echo.

The rules themselves are usually posted in the echo about once a month so that everyone knows where they stand. Another reason for being off topic is when a few people start talking among themselves about local or personal matters. Since these are of

no interest to most of the readers a place is needed where they can do this quietly – but where?

Running alongside the national and international echoes are two other systems. The first is a local system which is run by most boards. This is just like the long-distance echoes and may even cover the same subjects, but the messages in these areas are not passed along to other BBSs.

It's not that they are particularly private – anyone logging on can see the areas, but they are usually only of local interest.

For instance, my local board has local areas like "sysop" where callers can report problems on the board, ask for help in finding their way round, receive news of forthcoming changes and so on.

Beer

At the moment we are discussing arrangements for a local meeting so that all these names can have faces put to them (and lots of beer down put the faces too by the sound of it).

That's fine for local people, but what if you want to talk privately with someone at the other end of the country? This is where Netmail comes in.

Netmail works in a similar way to the ordinary national echoes, but instead of everyone in the echo being able to read the messages, only the person it's addressed to can.

This is ideal if you want to help test out a programmer's new product, and need to report bugs and problems. Obviously the programmer won't want these details out in the open for everyone to see.

The AC echoes

Once you get going in the message areas you will find yourself spending a lot of time and money on the hobby. Even local call charges mount up after a while.

So how do you cut costs without losing touch with all your new friends? The answer is an offline reader (OUR). Most boards offer some method of bundling up all the messages you want to read and compressing them.

You can then download the bundle as if it were any other file and log off the board. With the phone safely back on the hook you can decompress the messages and take your time reading and composing replies.

Sending your replies to the board isn't quite as straightforward, but there are ways and means which I'll be covering in later months. For the moment though you can chop your costs by at least a third by downloading the messages.

Most boards will have suitable decompression programs available for download. If you're not sure, just ask the sysop who will normally be happy to hold your hand while you get the hang of things.

Let's talk about text

Text in computer programs is something you take for granted. I know I do, and it's hard to think beyond the kind of things that have been possible in AmigaBasic, which is what most people's programming experience consists of pre-Amos.

But Amos opens up new vistas of programming, and simply too. This month we'll be looking at how you can spice up your text, whether it be a game logo, high score table, or just the title screen of your new business program.

Text in a computer program tells you two things. The words on the screen tell you what to do, and the style with which they tell you a lot about the programmer's attention to detail.

Normal text blocks include clever formatting and changes of colour. But more impressive are changes of font and size. It's like the difference between typing on a typewriter and making up your text in a DTP program.

Firstly if you don't want to fall about with fonts, make your titles a different colour with Pen and centre them with Centre. But there are two kinds of text in Amos - normal text and what they call "graphic text".

Normal text is printed to the screen with a Print statement, but graphic text needs to be put to the screen using Text, like so:

The Get Fonts command scans the Rom and Fonts: directory on disk for fonts, and Set Font sets the font to be printed to the appropriate font in the pecking order.

The colour of graphic fonts is set using the ink command rather than Pen (they're drawn rather than printed, being graphics!).

Once you have graphic text under control you can do all manner of technical tricks like putting shadows under the text

using JAM! mode via the GR WRITING command to ensure a good impression. Or if you're particularly clever you can even add a drop shadow using

the same program but simply changing the last two lines:

```
ink 2 : Text 3=2,1=2,AS

This offsets the final white printing of the character up and to the left of the black outline, creating a drop shadow.

Experiment with the code and see how many effects you can do. How about making the last print in the same ink as the Paper colour, for an outline font?

More exotic effects can be obtained using Aaron Fothergill's CText program, in which graphic text is taken to its extreme. If you get this program (either from Aaron's Amos Club or Déjà Vu Software) you can create a font in Deluxe Paint and include it in your program just like the pros do.

The font is stored on an IFF picture file like the example screen on this page, and then scanned into CText a letter at a time. Then you can print it to the screen in the same way you would ordinary text, or even do a scroll message across another screen.

Finally, Rainbow text is easy, and very effective. Basically what you have is a rainbow you set up using the copper, and the text is like a lot of holes

punched through a coloured covering the rainbow, giving you rainbow coloured text! Try this listing to give you a taster:

Cascades of colour

From the professional point of view there are two levels of desktop publishing. Mono DTP is what most of us practice, which generally involves using a bunch of mono devices like hand scanners, laser printers and even mono monitors.

If your output is going to be mono, anything to do with colour – with the exception of greyscales of course – is a waste of time and money. When you start experimenting with colour desktop publishing, the first thing you notice is that – compared to mono DTP – the costs are astronomical.

Forgetting the costs of the colour separations and the plates and the inks and the special types of paper you need for decent colour results, there's the more immediate problem of getting coloured photographs and illustrations from paper into the computer.

To do this you need a colour scanner. Colour technology has advanced quickly over the past three years or so, and it's becoming cheaper all the time – witness the number of colour photocopiers on the High Street for instance.

It's the same with colour scanners, and Epson have just broken the sub-£1,000 barrier with their GT-6000 A4 flatbed scanner (known as the ES-300C in the States).

At first sight the GT-6000 looks a lot like a little photocopier, until you peek under the lid. Through the glass you can see into the beast's belly, which consists of the tractor mechanism and the scanning head.

If it was a cat you'd find yourself mumbling

"plenty of room under the bonnet". Its footprint is 20 by 12in, and it's just under five inches high. A small control panel on the front sports three buttons – that – thanks to the software – you'll probably never need to use, and an LED display provides feedback about brightness and magnification levels.

At the other end there is an on/off switch, and three sockets – one for the power supply, plus serial and parallel ports.

The parallel port is used to connect it to the Amiga, using the special cable provided – it's not a standard parallel (printer) cable, but that's all it is, a cable – no lumpy interface hardware to worry about, as it plugs directly into the Amiga's parallel port.

The GT-6000's lid is triple-hinged so that books up to about two inches thick can be placed on the scanning window and the lid still close – if you need to scan something thicker than this, the lid can be removed completely by simply lifting it out of its slots, as it's not actually fixed to the scanner.

The program that controls the scanner costs extra – £129.95 – but is a superb piece of software. Written by ASDG, it is basically an Art Department Professional (ADPro) "load module", except that it can be used on its own, without having to own ADPro – if you want ADPro as well it will set you back about another £200.

Without ADPro the scanning software scans direct to disk, only displaying a greyscale preview of the subject. Be warned that 24-bit IFF ILBM files are big – anything worthwhile won't fit on a floppy disk, so a hard drive is an absolute requirement.

The preview scan can be of the whole bed (216mm by 297mm, which is US Letter paper wide and A4 paper length), or of an area of the bed

specified by moving the handles of a bounding box. String gadgets allow you to enter measurements in inches, centimetres or pixels if you need this kind of accuracy.

Once you have decided which area of the preview scan is to be scanned real – by placing the bounding box around it – you hit the Accept button, after which you are given a further requester of options.

From here you specify, among other things, the scanning resolution and whether the scan is to be full colour, greyscale or mono.

Memory

The GT-6000 can scan at a 19 different resolutions, ranging from 50 to 600dpi. Between these limits are resolutions that match the output resolutions of almost every printer on the market – 9-pin, 24-pin, inkjet, bubblejet, laser or whatever.

The greater the resolution at which you scan, the more memory or hard disk space you will require to store the image. To take extreme examples, a full colour A4 scan at 600 dpi requires about 140Mb, a mono A4 scan at 50dpi needs just over 275,000 bytes.

To take a more sensible example, to scan a 4 by 3in colour photograph at 300dpi you'll need about 4Mb of storage space.

In operation the GT-6000 is quiet – all that can be heard are a few high-pitched whirs like a dentist's drill as the scanning head positions itself, followed by a low rumbling as the scan is performed.

It's all over in one pass of the head – some rival scanners need to do three passes – which takes between a few seconds and ten minutes depending on the size and type of scan, and the resolution selected.

The results are stunning. Even when converted from 24-bit (16.7 million colours) to HAM (4,096 colours), the quality on-screen makes you gasp.

Of course you won't get photographic quality results from 24-bit pictures on dot-matrix colour printers – their resolutions are too low and they simply can't handle that number of colours – but imagewriter output is excellent provided you scale the graphic correctly.

The only disappointment with the GT-6000 is that it doesn't scan transparencies very well – they come out dark and muddy, but at least the manual has the honesty to admit this fact and suggest a workaround.

Smokin' CDTV

On-Line Entertainment have been responsible for more CDTV titles than anybody else so far, and certainly have a keen sense of fun when it comes to their games.

Next month I'll be looking at what they have done so far, and what is in development. I'll also be talking to On-Line's mastermind Clem Chambers.

As a taste of what is to come, I thought I would take a look at one of On-Line's recent releases, *Town With No Name*.

Best described as an interactive cartoon experience, *Town With No Name* - TWNN from now on - is based upon the Spaghetti Westerns of the early 70s.

You take the role of The Man With No Horse, and having rode into town and shot Evil Eb's brother you spend the rest of the game trying to avoid being shot by the rest of Evil Eb's gang.

Humour

The humour of On-Line Entertainment, and that of Fergus McNeil who Directed TWNN, is apparent throughout the game.

For example, if you select the pebbles around the base of the sign that forms the main menu selection at the very start of the game, you are treated to a most unexpected display. I won't tell you what it is because that would only spoil the fun.

While the gameplay is irritatingly simple at times, there are enough different ways of doing things to keep you occupied for quite a while.

This is a game that really tries hard to live up to the title of "interactive". I have played it through a couple of times now, and still managed to find new and unexpected sequences. In fact, after a while most of the fun starts to come from exploring the game to see just what Fergus has hidden away inside.

A hint is to take time out and shoot at the

sky, or at a building, instead of the baddie who is trying to kill you. You may die, but you may be in for yet another audio-visual treat.

It is obvious that TWNN's development went through the same stages as a movie. There is even a "Making of TWNN" section for goodness sake!

Lots of cinematic tricks and angles were used, some working better than others. The aerial shots and especially the feeling of flying down from great height into the scene were very well done.

The animation is smooth, if somewhat flat and simplistic on the whole, reminding me of the early CinemaWare games - but there is nothing wrong with that.

Town With No Name is let down by its lack of real lasting gameplay, but the interactive elements and the fact that there is so much humour and so many hidden sequences lift it above being just another game.

Irritation

An amazingly small point, which causes me an amazingly large amount of irritation, is that the "clang" used for the input acknowledgement (when you press button A or B) is a noise which stops being amusing after you have heard it for the 99th time!

A pat on the back to Clem Chambers and his team at On-Line though, for continuing to be the people who are actually

writing games for the CDTV rather than simply porting across games from the Amiga and stapling on some extra graphics and audio.

New music format for CDTV

It is a well known fact that the *ITV Chart Show* is produced with more than a little help from an Amiga or two. Indeed, Amiga Computing ran a competition in conjunction with the producers of the show back in the November 1991 issue.

Now the CDTV is set to break into the world of the Top 40. GJ Productions, in association with Almathera Systems, are launching a new concept in the music industry - the CDTV Interactive Video Single.

Playing like a normal audio CD in a bog standard CD player, the Interactive Video Single breaks new ground when you shove it into your CDTV. The music is still there, of course, but is now accompanied by synchronised animated graphics which are under the control of the user.

It certainly sounds as if it will be a humungous advance over the CD-G format, which never really took off (let's face it, the countdown sequence stopped at four).

By the time you get your mitts on this issue the first of these Interactive Singles, by Guru Josh, should be available, followed by

Interactive Video Albums if everything goes according to plan. I hope to bring you a proper review of the format just as soon as I can get my sticky mitts on a copy.

Not content with just the one innovative advance, GJ Productions and Almathera Systems are also working together to offer a professional music service to developers of CDTV titles.

Considering that GJ Productions handle such well known artists as Right Said Fred, 2 Unlimited and Technotronic, it looks like we could be in for some stunning soundtracks on CDTV titles in the future.

The thought of playing a CDTV game with superb graphics and a Top 10-selling soundtrack is really quite exciting. Let's just hope that any developers out there are listening too, and will make use of such facilities.

Over the last couple of months there has been a considerable amount of press coverage about current and future developments of the Amiga. I don't know about you, but I've become fairly confused as to what the current position of the Amiga is and what I should buy if I want an Amiga, so with my investigator's hat on I went detecting.

Firstly, if you want a plain Amiga just to run games software, your choice is easy. The A500 is in widespread supply and perfectly capable of playing most games. It's different from the A500 in a number ways and has several new features that will help Commodore continue to stay ahead of their competitors, but essentially it's still an Amiga and will run existing software.

The A600 is available from most dealers at prices starting at around £379 and upwards. It is also available from most of the bigger dealers at the Commodore set price of £399 with a large selection of games and other promotional freebies.

Such offers are admittedly designed to entice you to buy from these dealers, but usually the offers are genuinely good value for money and worth every penny.

What if you want to do more than just play games? Well the Amiga is a computer rather than just a games console. As such it's expandable, but because the A600 is so new it doesn't have this expandability. Given time it will have a collection of its own

expansions and peripherals to match those currently available for the A500, but not yet, so unless you just want a hard drive, stick to the A500 Plus.

This takes us to the thorny subject of hard drives. The A600 is available with a hard drive built in for just £100 more, which looks like great value, but let's just think about this for a minute. You want to buy an Amiga because it's the best in its field. Why shouldn't this apply to the hard drive you use with it?

The hard drive supplied with the A600 is good value for money, yes, but far from the best, and in the years since the A500's release, companies such as GVP, IVS, and Supra have

had the chance to bring state of the art hard drive technology to the Amiga.

£100 for a hard drive may sound good value, but for a couple of three hundred more you can go for GVP HD8+ or the new IVS Triumpcard 500AT. Both are bigger, faster, and offer up to 8MB RAM expansion.

The A500 Plus is still on sale and, contrary to comments from some sources, the A500 is far from a dead product. Whilst the A600 will be expandable eventually, for the time being the A500 Plus is the only sub-£500 Amiga that can be easily expanded. Companies like GVP, IVS, and Vortex will keep supporting the A500 for a long time yet and look after their customers far into the future.

Most of the UK dealers, particularly the larger ones, have also earned a reputation for backing up their customers and are not about to forget A500 buyers. So if you want to do more than play games or want to expand your Amiga in the future, you really have no choice other than buying the A500. I'd still recommend and, in fact, intend to buy an A500 and have no fears about doing so.

Finally, there is the often forgotten Amiga 1500. This is perhaps the most expandable Amiga with a price suitable for the home. Fully compatible with the Amiga 500, yet with real expansion slots, it is ideal for anyone wishing to expand their Amiga at a later date.

With an Amiga 1500 you can easily fit extra RAM, more hard drives, flicker fixers, accelerators – in fact anything you can think of. In this way you can buy a low cost start-up system and gradually expand it to a fully functioning graphics workstation!

So what are my recommendations? Well if you want to play just games, the A600 cannot be beaten. If you want a fully fledged home computer buy the A500 Plus while you still can. And if you want a really expandable computer with real potential look at the A1500 – it's hard to beat.

On the other hand...

COMMODORE is presently taking the Amiga, albeit slowly, through a major evolutionary process. The death of the multi-million selling A500 and its replacement with the A600 should be enough to confirm this suspicion – despite Commodore's silence on the matter – and prompt the Darwins among us to look at the other machines in the range with an eye to the survival of the fittest.

What becomes immediately apparent is that the only member of the Amiga family other than the A600 which will survive into 1993 is the A3000. The release of a new mid-level Amiga in the autumn will spell the end of the A1500/2000's manufacture in exactly the same way as the A600 closed down the A500 production lines. Not all is doom and gloom for present and prospective A1500 owners, however, as the machine is still the most stable and expandable Amiga around, a

situation which is unlikely to change if the new machines are released in slimline form. In addition, it is highly unlikely that Commodore will drop the Zorro II expansion slot standard, so a steady supply of new A1500-compatible peripherals seems secure.

The present range of applications to which the Amiga workhorse is now being put form another guarantee of its longevity. Commodore may not think twice about changing the standard at the low end – the A500 has sold far too many units to be deserted by the third party manufacturers – but they would have to be a few chips short of a motherboard to damage the Amiga's foothold in the serious markets.

That said, we would have scoffed at the idea of the A500 going belly up less than a year after its release, so we should perhaps take all assumptions about Commodore's intentions with a pinch of salt.

As long as someone has produced a piece of educational software that doesn't treat the user like a complete driving idiot.

It seems that the vast majority of educational programmers think that all children are brain dead until they reach 14. But someone has finally cracked it and hit a happy medium between programs that are too hard to use and too easy to be bothered with.

Many other packages I've seen in the past that have supposedly interactive characters are very poor indeed. They invariably have very badly animated stick men with a repertoire of about three sentences.

This isn't the case with Adi. Most of the time you can't get his ugly mug to belt up. Adi can only be described as an ugly – but likeable – little alien who lives in your machine. He's there to encourage when answering questions or moan at the kids when they play games all the time.

Almost human

He's a very chatty little bloke and is very well animated. From his position of power in the top left-hand corner of your screen he frowns, smiles and gets excited, and angry at the users.

If you click on him with the mouse he moans at and generally abuses you, but if you leave him long enough he'll have a kip.

On the packaging it states that Adi relates to children in a language they understand. This was the one thing that I thought would be the death of the program.

There is nothing, but nothing that will put children off more than out-of-touch "adults" trying to be really hip and with them – right kids! It always comes across complete bobbins that makes children cringe.

After you've boosted up, you enter what's called the Environment. This is a sort of workbench in which you can talk to Adi and enter all the various sub-applications.

On this workbench there is a clock – which is updated by the internal clock on your machine – and various icons along the bottom of the screen. This is how the pupil gets around the Environment's main education system and the games.

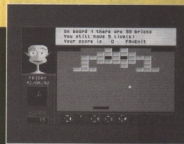
There are no worries about children getting confused or lost in the program because it has its own built-in tutorial – conducted by Adi, of course. There is a big list of tools available in

the Environment, like a calculator and a diary. I thought the calculator was an especially good idea because you can still call up the tools on top of the applications, so if you're like me and can't do 11-year-old-standard sums without a calculator, it's great.

The education system is actually split into two parts. The first is a document's section where you are shown a slide show

on the subject of your choice. There are all sorts of topics ranging from volcanoes to the circulation of blood around the body. Graphically the slide shows are brilliant – they're clear and concise with a good sense of humour thrown in.

There was also a show on pregnancy and child birth which had most of the AC editorial staff running for cover.

Section two of the education system – the applications section – is the program's most impressive feature. Each application that you enter from the Environment has its own theme.

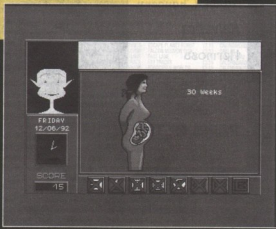
For instance, the Maths application's theme is the seven wonders of the world – the various different wonders have maths subjects tagged with them.

One of the most appealing things about the applications is the quality of the graphics. Education packages are notorious for their diabolical graphics, but on the whole Adi's graphics are beautifully drawn.

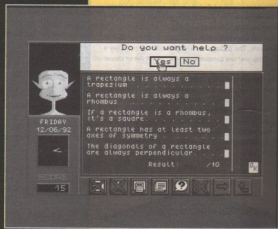
As the pupil gets further through the program, the questions become progressively harder and to hold interest they're quite diverse. Each time you get a question right or wrong there is a little animation that goes with it.

One major pitfall in education software is the way the questions are structured – other packages' questions have been lifted out of a text book and are deadly boring.

Adi's a winner because the questions have been designed for

Another copier, and a tricky piece of software to get working, but once it's up and running it's fairly impressive. It comes in the shape of a cartridge covered with last year's Christmas wrapping that you plug into the side of your Amiga in the DMA port.

It enables you to freeze any game or application at any time you like by twisting the little knob on top of the cartridge. The knob not only freezes the action but actually controls the overall speed.

This is handy because you can slow down tricky bits on games, as I did on Project-X.

Once the software is installed, you escape out of the main menu and load up whichever application you want. Once in the application, hitting the big red button on the card pops up the lovely mouse-driven menu, full of options. The menu would be fine but it gets very technical and confusing.

Enough talk about twisting knobs - it's nasty gritty time. A lot of the options on the menu are pretty complicated, but learn them - it's worth it.

There are tools for changing the graphics on the game and there's one cracking little utility which lets you alter the sound. All the sound is displayed in waveform and you can fiddle at will using the mouse.

As well as the sound utility there's an automatic cheat mode that will alter the configuration of the game and give you infinite

lives. Remember though, that cartridges such as this should never be used for commercial software theft.

In spite of the lack of decent copying utilities the cartridge isn't bad but I really can't see the attraction for home use. If you want infinite lives and like fiddling with other people's programs then it's worth giving it a try. Otherwise I would just stick to software copiers that do just as good a job.

Super Ami Card II

After grunting and groaning with X-Copy you've probably had enough of copiers, but hardware copiers such as Ami do have a valid place on the market. Ami card works by taking the signal that comes from your external drive and making an identical copy of the information on your internal drive.

Sometimes the card may have to convert the signal to re-write the data on to the other drive. This is where other copiers frequently fail - because of the way they do or don't convert the signal, they either push the data that is to be copied onto the target disk or change the rate at which it is copied.

To look at Ami it's a pretty unimpressive piece of equipment - just a small dongle about 2in by 1.5in in size that plugs into your serial port, your external drive plugging into the back of the dongle, piggy-back style.

Along with the card is the driving software that installs the card and gives you the various copying options.

The software works with the card in the memory on top of

There aren't many packages available on the shareware market that can be used on a professional level, especially on the Amiga. EMC have a set of fonts that are a very cheap and effective way to enhance anybody's DTP package.

The fonts come in volumes of four or five disks. There's a massive range, from the smooth, reliable sans serifs (like the fonts supplied as standard with a package like PageStream) to the really silly ones usually reserved for party invitations or sending billing letters to people.

In the main the fonts are reliable - not boring, but not quite up to the standard of Adobe. But EMC have hit on a winner because they've combined quality with quantity.

With five different volumes to choose from there's bound to be something in there that you want. You can't really go wrong - every volume goes right across the board, starting with the compulsory Dingbats, moving to the more sober typefaces that are going to get used more often.

Somebody has really thought about the mixtures of fonts on the volumes. Volume six contains all the serious fonts com-

mercial DTP. The only problem I found with a few of the fonts was the loss of clarity when using them on a small point number (below 12pt).

Volume four contains the most diverse fonts - there are some really bizarre ones that no-one would ever use, like a Dingbats selection with nothing but graphics of trains. But there are some good classic fonts in there like Black Chancery or Hermosa.

The price that EMC are asking is outrageously low for the number of fonts you actually get in the package. £12.50 for 60-odd fonts including all the different weights is a real bargain compared to paying £60 to £250 pounds for a single original Adobe font.

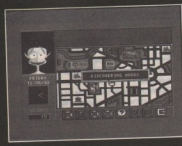

Art Tutor

It's a sad fact of life that students still have to put up with some bumbling teacher waffling on about obscure painters. Hopefully programs like Art Tutor will take over very soon and will do a much better job, and they won't act like ageing hippies and have silly beards.

I think it would be a good idea to make it clear that this pro-

gram has nothing to do with art research. There is no information about other artists - all of the tutorial is dedicated to the practical side.

Firstly, don't be put off by Art Tutor's appearance - basically it looks like a very dodgy back room company production. Not only is the packaging shabby but the cover art is naïf which is a bit foreboding.

Things still look slightly iffy as you enter the program. You are presented with a start screen though which you enter the tutorial or the studio.

The way this screen is laid out isn't very aesthetically pleasing - the typeface is bogus and the graphics themselves are just DPaint refugees.

The sun breaks through clouds once you get started, though - the tutorial is well set out with a modular learning process, so you choose which aspect of art you wish to study.

Tutorial one covers design, cartoons, landscape, perspective and vehicles - basically all the aspects that a beginner would be able to handle. To illustrate some of the points the on-screen graphics are animated, which is a nice touch.

All the different parts are very concise and to the point -

make the card more prone to outside damage like leakage, but that is pretty unlikely unless your machine is kept in damp place.

You have to buy the card with at least 512k already installed so you can't have a completely unpopulated board to add on to. Like the Amitek card BaseBoard also has a jumper switch to turn off the extra RAM.

A600 RAM expansion boards

Countless people will have bought the 1Mb A600 since its release in spring and been deeply disappointed. After they had lovingly opened the box and set up the machine they will have realised that it won't run 1Mb applications.

The thing responsible for making it run off and sulk in a corner is the hard drive. Yes, the computer has 1Mb of RAM but a lot of that is eaten up when the machine boots up and configures the hard drive.

The only solution to this dilemma is to buy an A600 RAM expansion and up until a few weeks ago there weren't exactly hundreds of them.

Now there is a healthy enough selection for us, the Gripe Gurus, to have a wander through the good, the bad and those considering cosmetic surgery.

First off is Silica Systems' RAM board which seems to be the most impressive. It has an internal clock that is constantly recharged by the Amiga as it is used so your machine will never say it's 3.43am in the year 2045 ever again.

You don't have to purchase the board populated, so you can stick in RAM chips as and when you need them. One other nice little touch is the enable/disable switch which allows you to turn the expansion off if any of the applications you use don't like it. Should

you buy the board unpopulated it has two rows of four sockets to stick your expansions on.

To check if your card has been recognised by the machine, the free memory statement at the top of the screen should read 1,300,000 for 512k or 1,800,000 for a 1Mb upgrade.

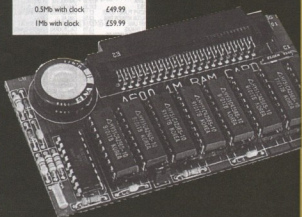
