

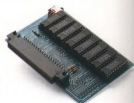

Pound crisis to force Amiga prices up £30

AS EXCLUSIVELY forecast in last month's Amiga Computing, unfavourable currency exchange rates have now forced Commodore to plan a £30 price hike for all Amiga packs.

The move is due to come into effect on January 1, and will take the entry-level A600 back above £300 and the new A1200 to over £400.

Like most multi-national firms, Commodore calculate their British prices based on the pound to dollar exchange rate, making allowances for slight variations.

But since September the pound's value has sunk over 20 per cent from around \$1.98 to below \$1.55, although Amiga prices are due to be increased by less than ten per cent.

The firm had tried to maintain their price policy by cutting retail margins, but like many other computer manufacturers now say rises are now "inevitable", Commodore's Andrew Ball

said: "Our margins have been adversely affected since September. It's more than likely that our prices will go up."

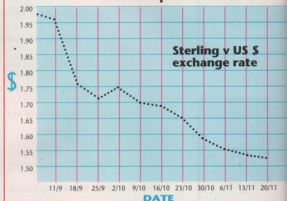
And now only an unexpected sterling recovery can stop the A600 rising to £329, the Wild, Weird & Wicked pack to £379, and the A600 Epic pack and standalone A1200 to £529.

The A1200, however, still remains in a perfect position to combat any possible threat from rival manufacturer Atari, when their 32-bit Falcon computer becomes available.

The 1Mb machine was due to be released in Britain during September with a £499 price tag, but as we went to press had still not appeared with dealers.

Commodore have promised to cut prices to their previous levels if the pound recovers.

Expansion trio on the way

AMERICAN peripheral manufacturer Great Valley Products are set to release three new products for the Amiga including an internal hard drive and RAM accelerator card.

The hard drive plugs into the A600 and A1200's IDE slot, and has 85Mb of storage capacity. Supplied with appropriate utilities software, it costs £399.

And A1200 users can also increase the speed and memory of their computers with a new 68030EC RAM accelerator card, running at 40MHz.

The £399 card will make Amigas run about four times faster than normal, and has a slot for a maths co-processor. Between two and 32Mb of hi-speed memory can be added.

No prices were available for the memory, although an industry expert said 16Mb SIMMS like those used in the expansion are "seriously expensive".

The third expansion from GVP will give the A1200 a SCSI interface, a slot for a maths co-processor and up to 8Mb of extra memory.

"Once again GVP have come to the aid of Amiga users, pushing the boundaries of Amiga technology ever forward," said a spokesman for UK distributor Silica Systems.

Faster maths for A1200

MICROBOTICS MBX 1200 is an A1200 upgrade, giving owners a Motorola floating point unit and up to 8Mb of fast RAM.

Fitting onto the A1200's internal expansion connector, the board is claimed to speed floating point operations by up to 55 times that of the standard machine.

Those who will see most benefit from the board are users of memory and maths-intensive applications such as animation, ray-tracing, morphing, scientific calculation and image processing.

Comic 2 carries epilepsy warnings

Epilepsy warnings played down

BRITISH doctors have played down warnings from two leading games console manufacturers and scares in national newspapers that light patterns used in video games could trigger epileptic fits.

Instructions supplied with Sega's Sonic 2 say that the video game may induce an epileptic seizure, and advises players to discontinue use if they feel certain conditions.

Sega say they issued the warnings to protect themselves against possible legal action, although the firm were unaware of cases of epileptic fits being caused by games.

Similar advice to Nintendo customers was given after one or two isolated incidents, a spokesman said.

But experts stress that games cannot cause epilepsy in people not affected by the condition, although they admit that light flashes in games played on some television sets could trigger fits.

Sue Cooper, spokeswoman for the British Epilepsy Association, said that there are up to 350,000 British epileptic sufferers but fewer than 10,000 are sensitive to flashing lights.

"It's such a small proportion of sufferers that we don't consider it a problem," said Sue. She advised parents not to be put off buying video games for their children.

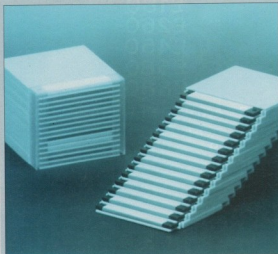
Cubes fill with disks

Officidata Micro 15 is a cube which can hold up to 15 disks. It can be pushed from a cube to staircase design, allowing disks to be selected easily. A pack of six cubes costs £19.95.

The more conventional Officidata Datafile 10 is an easel-opening storage box which holds up to ten disks. It costs £22.95 for a pack of eight boxes.

North American Amigans lusting after Commodore's new A1200 could flirt with the machine, but not take it home, at the World of Commodore-Amiga show held in Toronto, Ontario on December 4 to 6, 1992.

The Amiga 1200 was on display in a number of dealer's booths, but wasn't yet available for sale. Commodore was promising machines for the US before Christmas, but couldn't commit to a 1992 release in Canada.

Interestingly, it seems that Canadian A1200s will have the UK-style keyboard with the small Return key and two blank keys, while the US machines will have keyboard with full-sized Left Shift and Return keys and no blanks. It's unusual for the two countries to end up with different configurations.

The crowd was a bit smaller and more subdued compared than in past years, which is unusual given Commodore's new releases and the increased attendance at US shows this year. The exhibitors were enthusiastic, though, and were happily showing off their wares.

Hot stuff

There weren't many completely new products, as most manufacturers had at least previewed their new programs at the World of Commodore show in Pasadena earlier this year, but there was some hot stuff on display.

One of the big hits of the show was Digital Creations' Brilliance, the 24-bit paint program. Brilliance supports all AGA screen modes and stores data in 24-bits internally.

This means you can load in a 24-bit picture and touch it up, even on a classic ECS Amiga, and not lose any colour infor-



mation or detail. The company had just got the HAM8 version of the program up and running for the show, so it looked like they were going to miss their December ship date.

It should be available soon after you read this, though, if it's not already.

Gold Disk was showing the new Professional Page 4.0, which was almost complete. Along with 256-colour screen support on AGA Amigas, this update also adds a font previewer, visual letter-pair kerning, a free paint program (the creators of DPaint and Brilliance need not feel threatened), a page-sorter, and a number of new Genies (Special ProPage ARexx macros).

ProPage has got a bit better at talking to the outside world, with new text import

modules and a much wider range of graphics import filters including GIF, TIF, PCX, BMP, Adobe Illustrator, Aldus Freehand, and of course IFF and Professional Draw. The price is still

\$295, and the upgrade fee to v4.0 is \$75 U.S.

INOVAtronic's demonstrated Directory Opus v4.0, a vastly improved version of their popular directory utility. It had better be improved, as the retail price has jumped up to \$99, with a \$40 upgrade fee from previous versions (more than some people paid for their original version!).

Along with a new, cleaner interface, Directory Opus v4.0 now supports AGA screen modes (for both running the program and displaying pictures); Noisetacker, SoundTracker, Protracker,

MED (with Midi!), Oktalyzer, 8SVX, and RAW sound files; and Anim and AnimBrush playback in AGA modes.

The program is now an AppWindow when run under AmigaDOS 2 or greater - you can, for instance, load a disk into Opus Window simply by grabbing the disk icon and dragging it onto the Opus window.

This is a pricey upgrade, but with every feature imaginable crammed into it, it certainly looks to be worth the money.

Worth the wait

Soft-Logik is finally shipping Art Expression, their structured drawing program that supports EPS, ProDraw, and DR2D formats. Over three years in the making, the program is well worth the wait, and promises to bring new flexibility to Amiga graphic artists.

The company also showed their new TypeSmith program, an outline font editor that supports PostScript Type 1, Soft-Logik DMF, and Compugraphic Intellifonts.

No longer are you limited to using one font with one program and having to go out and buy the same font in a different format for use with another - TypeSmith will easily convert between all the formats it supports.

It will even let you load in Amiga bitmap fonts or IFF pictures and trace over them! A full set of drawing tools and automatic kerning features will delight the desktop typographer.

Look for some great PD and shareware fonts after TypeSmith hits the market in January at a suggested retail price of \$199.95.

Rumours

Commodore's New Leggebrecht spilled the beans on new chipset developments, whetting Amiga users' appetites for future 24-bit machines (see my Pasadena show report for more details).

Even more interesting, though, were rumoured products that were supposedly discussed in more private settings by Commodore representatives. There was talk of the already-known SCSI-II controller for the A4000 and the AT&T DSP module, which are apparently set to ship in the first quarter of 1993, but even more interesting were rumours of both a 68030 and less-expensive 68EC030 model of the Amiga 4000 that would appear early next year along with the A4000 tower.

These machines could be just the thing for folks who want more power than the A1200 can provide but who can't foot the bill for an A4000/040.

Other interesting rumours included a PCMCIA 386SX emulator for the A600 and A1200 developed by a third-party in cooperation with IBM, full-motion video software for the Amiga operating system, and future support of the Kodak Photo CD format.

Vista gets more colourful sunsets

A long-awaited upgrade to VistaPro is getting ready to ship from Virtual Reality Laboratories, Inc. The company provided me with a beta version to preview for this column, and it looks hot (check out the accompanying screenshots).

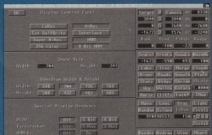
VistaPro 3.0 will now render pictures in 256-colour or HAM8 modes on the Amiga 1200 and 4000. Support has also been added for the 1,280 pixel wide super hi-res mode.

The improvement in picture quality in this version is amazing - the HAM8 output looks as good as true 24-bit output (AGA isn't required, though - the old modes are still supported.)

The program's tree-generation capabilities have been dramatically improved - you can now place pine, oak, and palm trees, as well as cacti, in your landscape. The program will also generate grass in a number of different textures.

A new Place panel lets you manually place simple buildings and roads on your landscape, as well as trees and grass.

The new Altitude texture gives you detailed pictures even when you set your camera view very close to a small patch of terrain. The cloud generation in VistaPro 3.0 makes for more realistic scenes - you can now generate clouds randomly, as well as adjust their density and thickness. Enhanced ARexx



VistaPro gets an even more extensive set of features

support makes script-based animation even easier.

Actual picture rendering is much faster, as several critical short routines have been re-coded in Assembly language (you'll still find this program best if you're running a faster Amiga, though).

Even with the new features, the program still retails for \$99.95. If fractal landscapes are your thing, check this out.

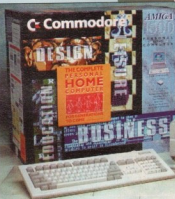

HiSoft Basic

In the vast Amiga world out there are quiet a few versions of Basic, but none quiet as easy to use and powerful as HiSoft Basic. One of the main advantages of Basic is its easy to understand commands which makes programming much more simple.

Unfortunately, though, most Basics are extremely slow. This is due to the fact that the computer has to turn each command in Basic into something which it understands before it can move to the next command in the program.

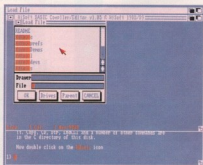
This process slows it down a considerable amount, so to get a Basic program to work at a more reasonable speed it has to be turned into something which the computer can understand more easily, which in turn will speed up the Amiga's running of initially Basic programs.

Compiling

The process of converting basic programs into something which the computer understands is called compiling. HiSoft Basic has two main programs – HiSoft Basic, which is the integrated editor and compiler, and HB.Compiler, which is the compiler itself (required by the editor).

When you want to start programming you only need to load the HiSoft Basic program and not the HB.compiler. This is because when you program with HiSoft it always compiles the program for you and then runs it. This makes HiSoft one of the fastest Basic programming packages around.

To use HiSoft Basic you have to reset your Amiga and place the CoverDisk which contains HiSoft in the disk drive – it

will auto-boot. Once loaded, click on the HiSoft Basic Editor icon, which is main part of the program.

Once loaded you are presented with the main editing area which at the moment is blank. If you now hold down your right mouse button you will see several

menus appear at the top of the screen.

One of the main advantages of HiSoft is its compatibility with other Basic packages. This means that you can load, say, an Amiga Basic program into HiSoft and compile and run it. This also means you can

export HiSoft programs into most other Basic packages.

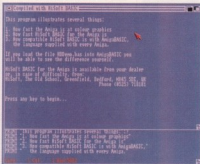
HiSoft is compatible with all Amigas with Kickstart 1.2 or higher. Obviously the more memory you have the easier programming will be – it is also handy to have an extra disk drive but this is not essential.

There are four pull-down menus altogether which are Project, Search, Options and Program. HiSoft acts rather like a wordprocessor enabling you to edit your programs with ease.

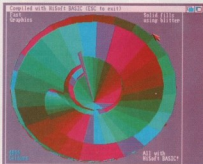
Fast

We will now load one of the demos on the CoverDisk to see how easy it is and how fast HiSoft really is. First of all pull-down the Project menu and select the Load option. You will then be presented with the file requester. Click on the demo driver and then double click on the triangles.bas file.

You will now have a program called tri-

angles, bas on-screen. This program when run will draw coloured triangles to make patterns. If you now pull down the Program menu and select Run, HiSoft will compile "triangles" and then run it. To stop it, just press the Esc button and you will be returned to the listing.

You will notice how fast this program runs. If you were to load the same program into Amiga Basic it would run considerably slower.

When you load certain programs you may get an error telling you that the text buffer is not large enough for the program you are trying to load. This does not mean you have run out of memory, but that the standard preset of 10,000 bytes is not large enough.

You can set the text buffer by pulling down the Options menu and selecting Prefs. You can then type in the amount you wish to reserve for the buffer.

Buffer

If you already have a program in memory and have run out of text buffer space, you must save your program before trying to increase the buffer, as changing the text buffer size will clear the memory and you will lose your program. You must leave at least 100k for the system to operate in.

As mentioned earlier, HiSoft's main advantage is its ability to compile Basic programs to make them run much faster. If you have a Basic program loaded and you wish to compile it, you can do this in two ways. To compile something, go to the Program menu and select Compile. You will then be asked if you want to compile to disk or memory.

If you select Compile To Memory, it will compile the program and allow you to run it. This is the quickest way to compile something, and it is also ideal for trying things out and debugging programs.

When you select Compile To Disk, HiSoft Basic will compile the program and save it to disk. If you have not previously saved the program, HiSoft will call it

NONAME. The compiled version will have the extension .bas.

When you have compiled a program to disk it becomes a standalone program which you can then run by double clicking on its icon from Workbench, but the program will need the hisoftbasic.library file to run.

Whenever you're doing any type of work with your computer it is a good practice to save out regularly, but more so when doing programming as the computer tends to crash more often if you haven't de-bugged your program properly. Regular saving of your work will save you a lot of typing!

If you are writing a new program which when run puts up an error message, HiSoft will ask you if you wish to continue running the program. Until you are familiar with HiSoft Basic you should reply with N, then go to the line which HiSoft tells you the problem is in and rectify it.

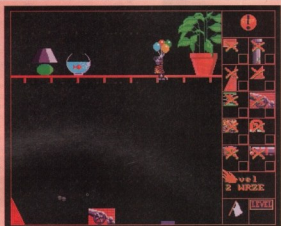

Mouse Impossible

Mouse Impossible is a Lemmings-style game where the main object is to stop the mouse from stealing your cheese. This may sound a simple task but it's definitely not.

There are a total of 30 levels for you to try to complete and with each level the task becomes harder and harder. Once Mouse Impossible is loaded, saving your cheese is the name of the game.

A mouse will try to float down to your cheese and steal it using a bunch of balloons. Once he has the cheese, a cannon starts to fire across the screen and you have to put various obstacles in the cannon's way to deflect the shots towards the mouse, making him drop the cheese.

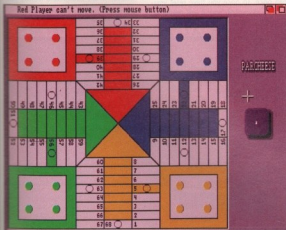
When the mouse begins his descent you must place obstacles in the path of the cannon. You can only place the obstacles while the mouse is descending, so it's best to think about the level before trying it.

You place the obstacles, which are on the right edge of the screen, by clicking on them with your left mouse button then putting them where you think they should be, finally clicking the left mouse button again.

While you are holding the obstacle you can click the right mouse button to turn it around - this makes the obstacle deflect the cannon's shots differently.

When you complete each level you are given an end-of-level code, so when you play the game again you don't have to do the levels which you've already done before.

This game requires some skill in judging where to put the obstacles and the best bet is to study the level hard first, and try turning some of the obstacles over to see what effect they have on the cannon's shots.

D-Sam

D-Sam is an extension for Amos, giving you an extra 46 sound-related commands. Before you can use these extra commands you have to install them into Amos, which is a very simple procedure – just follow these instructions:

- Copy the file "D-Sam.lib" to your Amos system directory
- Run the Config_1.3. Amos program from Amos
- Load the default configuration
- Set loaded extension number 15 to "Amos_System/D-Sam.lib"
- Select Save configuration menu

The D-Sam.lib is in the Utilities/D-Sam drawer. Once you have followed these simple steps you will have the 46 new commands built in to Amos. The new commands are all designed to make it easier for you to create programs using music and samples.

With the extra D-Sam commands fitted into your copy of Amos you can play back samples and music directly from floppy or hard disk, which enables you to save memory, or you can load the samples into memory first then play them back.

To start using D-Sam you only need to learn five commands:

SMP OPEN <samplenum>,<"filename">
(samplenum is valid between 0 and 65,535)

Opens IFF or RAW samples for playback direct from disk file.

SMP LOAD <samplenum>,<"filename">
(samplenum is valid between 0 and 65,535)

Loads IFF or RAW samples from an AmigaDOS file to memory. The file must exist, be loadable, and capable of

supporting a seek() call.

SMP PLAY <samplenum>,<channels>
(channel is valid between 1 and 15)
This plays a sample (num) on the channels specified.

SMP CLOSE <samplenum>
(samplenum is valid between 0 and 65,535)

SMP RESET Stops all channels playing, frees all channels and closes all opened samples.

The computer will then ask the player who is to go first – click the mouse button to roll the dice. You can't start to move your players until you roll a six.

When you've managed to roll a six you can then select which one of your men is about to start his trip home, then you roll the dice again to see how far your man is to move.

If you roll a six you can move six places then roll again, but if you get a six three times or more then one of your men must go back to the beginning and start again.

If your opponent lands on one of your men then that man must return back to the beginning and wait until another six is thrown before starting again. The aim is to be the first to get all his men home.

If you use it in your startup sequence then you must type it in as follows.

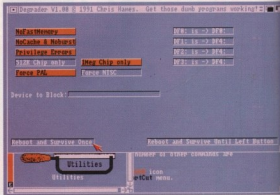

Fun School on CDTV makes learning a little less boring

CDTV software – is it any good?

You can now buy a CD-ROM drive for your Amiga and use the growing range of CDTV software that is available. But why should you part with approaching £300 anyway? What can you do with it? Are the CDs now available worth handing over your hard earned dosh for?

To answer to these questions I locked myself in a room, plugged in my trusty Amiga with attached AS70 and examined some of the growing range of CDTV titles.

A Bun for Barney • £29.99 BBC Multimedia

This is a great advert for CDTV. In its raw form – without any interaction – it is a fairly simple story for children lasting for around 15 minutes.

Even at this level, with its beautifully

drawn pictures, Tom Baker narration and sweet story line, A Bun for Barney would keep many young children happy.

But the best it yet to come. As the pointer is moved around the screen, which any inquisitive child is bound to do, and over certain areas of the pictures, it changes into a magic wand.

Press the button at this point and the pictures spring into life with bunnies that jump out and dance, frogs that leap and trees that sway. A definite trendsetter and one which all prospective CDTV developers should take a look at!

Advanced Military Systems £29.99 • Dominion

Most us, speaking from a masculine point of view, go through a period of being fascinated with guns, tanks and weapons. For

anyone going through such a period this one's a must – masses of information on the most deadly and exciting (?) military hardware in the world.

Combining the world of computers and war, two popular pastimes of a lot of children, I would guess this is likely to be a small success!

All Dogs go to Heaven • £34.99 Merit Software

A pretty basic painting package which suffers from being to simple for its own good. Very simple in concept, you have a series of drawings which you then add your own colour to – the '90s version of painting by numbers?

Select the colour, move over an area and then pour the colour into that area. For small children it's probably quite good, but for everyone else it's just too limiting.

Even for children it has the limitation that there are only so many variations. If there'd been additional picture disks it would have had more potential.

Animals in Motion • £29.99 On-Line

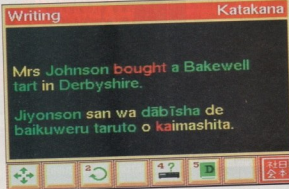
A bit of an odd one this. Why anyone would want to spend just under £30 to look at a collection of black and white pic-

tures of animals I don't know. However artist friend of mine has assured me that budding animators, illustrators and painters find this CD is invaluable so I guess £30 is a good value.

Apparently the work of Eadweard Muybridge, which this CD is all about, trailblazing stuff when originally done still is for artists creating movement animators.

This CD shows his work as stills and animations and I have to admit that even

tempting this made me want to try drawing... If you've got artistic leanings, take a look.

Battle Chess • £39.99 • Interplay
A game of chess with a difference. Using a top-down view of the board, you watch as your pieces move around the board – under your instructions – and do battle.

Although it's another Amiga conversion and not a great one at that, it still has a lot of novelty value and plays a reasonable game of chess, something to waste away the winter evenings with.

Now if someone would only do a version where you actually played the game from a piece's-eye view, and charged around the board, I think they'd have a far greater hit on their hands. But for the time being Battle Chess is a good attempt at a first introduction to computer chess.

Battle Storm • £29.99 • Titus

A great Amiga game perfectly adapted to CDTV media. Not! It's a basic arcade game with multi-directional scrolling, lots of aggressive aliens trying to blow you to bits to which you must react in a like fashion.

No advantage of using this on the CDTV and pretty standard as arcade games go. Overall boring and disappointing.

Case of the Cautious Condor £34.99 • Tiger Media

A lot of people have raved about this particular title and admittedly it shows what can be done with masses of storage space.

It's a simple detective story where you must solve a murder by wondering around, listening to other people's conversations and picking up clues. The graphics are fine and there are loads of 'em – are fantastic, almost real cartoon quality and the sound is impressive.

Unfortunately I found the depth of the gameplay lacking – the only way you are prevented from solving the case in the first place is by a time limit (given enough time you could solve it on your first go). Worth owning but don't bank on it as a long term source of entertainment.

CD-Remix v2 • £29.99 Microdeal

The quickest way to describe this title is as a sequencer for CDs. You specify parts of a music CD which you can then remix, looping and repeating them at will.

There are a couple of niggles but nothing serious, ie changeovers are a little rough, but these aren't the fault of the CD software and without some awfully expensive studio equipment there are no easy answers.

These gripes aside, it's very simple and sweet CDTV application that will give owners hours of enjoyable fun.

Connoisseur Fine Art Collection £34.99 • Lascelles

Personally I've always wondered just who buys books with nothing but picture after picture in them. However someone must, and given that, this disk is quite reasonable.

It's basically a collection of digitised photos of paintings across time, with explanatory text. If you're into this kind of thing, open your wallet and take your flexible friend for a walk, you won't regret it.

Dr Wellman • £54.99 Digita Multimedia

Where as most of the games reviewed here started off badly, Dr Wellman started well and kept up appearances. There are several different ways of getting to the information you want, and all well presented.

The software utilises the medium well with lots of informative text, most of which is backed up with pictorial support.

To further help and give you confidence in the product – important given the subject matter – there is a lot of narration, and

the voice immediately helps being in a relaxed but confident manner. It contains a lot of information covering a many of the general medical topics you'd expect to come across in the home.

This is probably one of the few titles I looked at that I was sad to return – it seemed that me want to cut my finger to find out how to apply the plaster!

Falcon • £49.99 Spectrum Holobyte

For the armchair pilot who's doesn't have another computer, Falcon is a pretty good introduction to combat flight simulators. For A570-owning Amiga users, however, there are several better programs available for the Amiga.

Possibly Falcon's biggest problem is that given the amount of control you have through the remote controller, you have only a small amount of control over the plane.

This aside however, it's still a good game with lots of different missions, nice graphics, reasonable speed and OK graphics.

Fractal Universe • £29.95 Almathera

A lot of people are fascinated by fractals and if you're one of them then this is the CD for you! As well as the ability to generate fractals (and let's face it, fractals can look pretty impressive sometimes – see the screenshot of the Fred Fish Collection) Fractal Universe also includes full background information and a lot of text on the subject of fractal art.

I can't help feeling however that £29 for this is a little over the top, but if you're into fractals then you should have it.

Fred Fish Collection • £19.95 Almathera

The Fred Fish Collection is a large assortment of programs, utilities and games. While for normal Amiga users their collection on to a single CD is to be welcomed (you don't want to know how many floppy disks it takes to store this collection normally) I'm doubtful of their use to the CDTV user.

This is because many of the utilities and programs were designed for use with a keyboard and as such CDTV owners will have to buy a keyboard to get the maximum benefit from it.

For A500 with an A570 however it's a great collection and a useful CD.

Fun School • £24.99 • Europress

On the Amiga the Fun School range of educational software has been well received by children. It's a fun and easy educational range that get children learning while they're having fun – which must be a good thing.

There's nothing exceptional in this Fun School series of several CD-ROMs each costing £24.99 that provide an educational age range from under five to over seven.

The only question I have is that given that CDTV disks are supposed to be cheaper to produce and the capacity of one CD disk equals a lot of floppies – couldn't Europress have put more than one Fun School title on a CD-ROM and charged the same?

Still if you've got the money and children to educate (surely a contradiction in terms?) wander down to your dealer and take a look.

Garden Fax Series • £34.99 Intersearch

The Garden Fax Series are in fact four disks, each costing £34.99, but because they are all so similar – the only difference being the type of plant they cover – I'm looking at them as a whole.

Initially they are disappointing – gaudy colours and poor graphics they don't appear to offer much. But on further examination they provide an informative, detailed analysis of plants (along with photos), all of which is easily accessible.

Using a simple selection process which starts you at the top of a list of 200-odd plants, answering various questions you work your way through a series of conditions (light, colour, temperature etc) that your prospective plants must live in.

The program then presents you with a small list of plants to choose from, on which you can call up growing information and so on. Neat, simple and effective but could do with a little tidying up around the edges.

Global Chaos

If you're into the raw scene this is a definite must. Abstract patterns set to some pretty wild audio tracks and a simple game thrown in for free.

The result is likely to become a cult product and will undoubtedly further the Amiga's street credibility, but unlikely to sell in great quantity.

Guinness CDTV Disk of Records £34.99 • Guinness

One of many encyclopaedia-type CDs, it's of reasonable quality with digitised photos, pictures, speech, the odd animation and film clips. For those interested in records, this provides what must be the definitive reference guide and a really useful, yes

really useful, product giving near-instant access to a vast amount of information.

Sound of the Baskervilles £29.99 • On-Line

This is the CDTV title of the famous Sherlock Holmes case and I have no problem in recommending you stay with the book version.

I can only describe this CDTV title as, erm, poor, poor and poor. Very few pictures, no moving images that I saw, very little interactivity and generally lacking in quality.

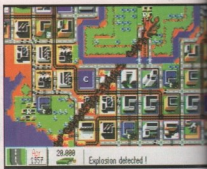
The only redeeming aspect is the quality of the vocals – these at least have been done by someone who knows how to narrate – clear and authoritative.

If you're looking for a detective story or Sherlock stories, take a look at Sherlock Holmes Consulting Detective.

Illustrated Holy Bible • £29.99 Animated Pixels

A disappointing CDTV title this one. It's immediately obvious that little work went into this. There are blatant mistakes in the text where it has been mistyped and the Amiga-drawn pictures of scenes from the bible are lousy.

Add to this that there's very little true interaction and it's a disappointing CD all round. The only real point of this CD is that you can search for particular words and verses, but I'd seen this done about 12 months ago on a PD floppy disk-based version. That cost about £8... it's your choice.



Sim City – a god game for town planners everywhere

Japan World • £49.99 Global Learning Systems

Imagine a language tuition course where you could hear and see the language in question. You could also call up information on just about every aspect of life in the country of the language. You'd have a powerful aid.

Japan World is just such a package. Maybe it's because I've always been fascinated by Japan, or maybe it's because this is a good disc in its own right, but either way I was really impressed by Japan World.

If there were other language courses (say French, German, Spanish) of a similar quality to this, Commodore would have a strong advert for CDTV!

Lemmings • £34.99 • Psygnosis

What needs to be said that hasn't already been said about Lemmings? This is a pretty standard implementation of the classic Psygnosis game.

It's a little disappointing that with all the storage space available thousands of more levels weren't added and that the CDTV controller is not the best way to command your Lemmings, but it's still a great game. If CDTV is you're first computer you should take a look at this.

MyPaint • £29.99 SaddleBack Graphics

This had great potential. The CDTV as a home entertainment environment will obviously have a large number of young children using it. Every child I know loves to paint and draw and as such a CDTV painting package is great opportunity.

Sadly, MyPaint suffers from the CDTV's controller, which just isn't suitable for painting. Every

time I tried I just ended up with a straight line!

Given a decent controller like a draw tablet or light pen this program would be great. Philips CD-i system has a children's controller that looks like it's out of a Fair Price factory and if such a product were available for CDTV I'd be only too happy to recommend this.

NASA – The Heroic Age of Space £19.99 • Trokia

This title uses Commodore's claim answer to FMV, CDXL. Unlike FMV which can display moving images occupying the complete screen, CDXL can only have a quarter of the screen.

The consequence on this particular is a like watching a scrambled Sky Satellite

CDTV and CD-ROM options

In addition to software there's also a number of peripherals now starting to appear for CDTV which add to the enjoyment possible. The more notable ones is:

Trackball Controller • £79.99 • Commodore

Basically an alternative way of controlling the pointer on screen. A large ball is mounted in a casing. Rolling the ball with the palm of your hand moves the pointer on screen.

Tracker balls have been available for the Amiga for a while but never really managed to rival the mouse for control. This one, although a good tracker ball, fails because CDTV software doesn't require the precise placement that tracker balls offer. The Trackball Controller also has interfaces for two joysticks.

Video Genlock Card • £149.99 • Commodore

Allows you to take moving pictures from video camera, video player and the like and mix them with the display that the CDTV is producing, and then record this back out to a video recorder. Ideal for video titling-type applications.

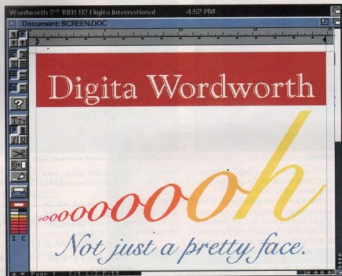
Voice Master • £39.99 • Microdeal

Simply this allows you to add your voice to CDTV titles that support it. In language courses for instance you can pronounce the foreign language yourself to see how your version differs from the correct version. Limited by the number of CDTV titles that support it, but worth keeping an eye on.

It's just a pity it's not FMV! Hopefully when Commodore sort FMV out, Troika will come up with a follow up which will really show the CDTV off.

Psycho Killer • £29.99 • On-Line

Some has described this as the closest any CDTV title has yet come to an interactive movie. I wouldn't. It's long series of digitised photographs (of London) which you move through screen after screen.

The only action comes on certain screens where you must quickly move the pointer to a certain part of the screen and click the button. Get it wrong and you're history. Sadly lacking in excitement, graphics or enjoyment.

Sherlock Holmes Consulting Detective • TBA Icon Simulations

There review is of a brand new title from America, and was responsible for holding up this article! Just as I was about to send the copy off, through the door popped this title. At first I ignored it, but on closer inspection it merited holding the whole review back for.

Sherlock Holmes Consulting Detective is a title which is on most American CD-ROM owners' "must buy" lists and for a good reason.

This is no easy way to describe this - OK, maybe there is, but don't want to spoil the enjoyment you'll get from this when you see it, except to say that it features professionally recorded sound, nice atmospheric pictures and masses of quality CDXL moving pictures.

The narration is pretty timed to the

CDXL pictures so you begin to believe that Sherlock and Watson are actually sitting there talking.

There are no rough edges and few unexplainable pauses as the next images/data is loaded. Best yet, instead of just dumping the graphics to the screen, a slide projector-type screen (complete with video-style buttons) pops up, in which the moving images are displayed.

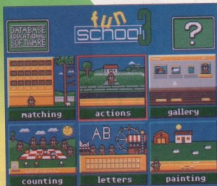

Sim City • £29.99 • Infogrames

At the ECTS trade show this was the application that picked up the very first CD-ROM software award. Highly recommended for any CDTV or Amiga CD user.

The Demo Collection • £19.95 Almathera

Following on from CPDP collection, the Demo Collection is a must for A570 owners, but not recommended for the CDTV owner. It contains loads of pictures, animations, fonts, games and two versions of the Amiga's operating system (1.3 and 2.04).

If you're a serious or hobbyist Amiga owner you'll find this a valuable CD-ROM, although some of the stuff could do with more documentation.

Wrath of the Demon • £29.99 REAHYSFT

This title didn't even start well. Three megabytes of data it boasts, great, but a CD disks can hold 550Mb! Starting the game, things get a little better, with a very nice introduction sequence. Sadly it

goes nowhere from here. The remote control doesn't work with this type game, the game graphics are average (pretty poor sound (given what could have been achieved) and limited gameplay. Nothing really bad, but nothing really good either!

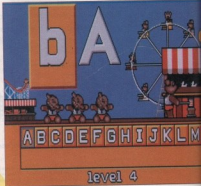
Women in Motion • £29.99 On-Line

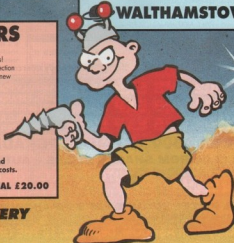

First steps to productivity

You're wasting your machine's potential if all you're doing is zapping aliens. Gary Whitely looks at some more productive applications

Berilant - you've just finished the last level of Zool and are contemplating suicide because there are no challenges left for your trigger finger. Outside a dark shape stalks the streets, turning ever closer until it reaches your door.

A resounding crash shakes you back to reality. Stumbling around in the dark you realise that it's only the postman - and a silly grin creeps across your face. As you watch the package containing that desktop publishing software you ordered it seems that things aren't so black after all.

Yeah, I know, this isn't how real life happens. But if you believe the sales figures it would appear that many Amiga owners are locked into a little world of their own anyway - games, games, games and rarely a glimpse of even a Workbench screen!

Believe it or not, there can be more to computing than zapping baddies or collecting keys. OK, playing games may be a lot of fun, but have you ever considered what else you can use your Amiga for?

So put that joystick down and pay attention while we reveal another side of your favourite computer - productivity.

"Hu! And just why should productivity interest me?" you are probably asking. Well, if you're old enough to have friends, possessions, money, hobbies and a desire to communicate with the outside world you might just find that productivity could improve your life, or at least help to make it more manageable.

If you run one of Britain's increasing number of home-based businesses you will have to keep accounts, turn out letters and reports and file information on customers and services - productivity can help here too.

However, productivity doesn't have to be just for the serious things in life. Maybe your school, youth group, sports club or company needs a newsletter and you want to produce it, as well as some nice illustrations for it. Productivity can help here too, since it covers a multitude of sins.

Spreadsheets, databases, desktop publishing, wordprocessing, disk utilities, accounts and graphics packages are all productivity applications, and they can all help you do better things with your Amiga than endlessly playing games.

As you've seen, productivity software can be very wide-ranging. So to help you figure out what's what, here are a few introductions to the main animals in the productivity jungle.

Databases

Every time you make a list of information - such as the names, addresses and telephone numbers of your friends, you are producing a database.

In many cases this will take the form of a little notebook, card index, Filofax insert or, in more upmarket circumstances, as data stored in an electronic personal organiser.

A computerised database is also a list of

information, set up and entered according to the requirements of the user and anything which can be listed can be set up as a database - library books, video cassettes, stamp catalogues, recipes - you name it, you can database it.

By first designing a screen template to take the data you wish to enter and then typing the data into a blank form for each separate record a whole database can be built up, and updated as necessary.

The data files can be selectively printed out, or specific data can be found by searching for keywords, such as all occurrences of the surname Jones, or all books about Amiga computers, for example.

Database design requires both discipline and an awareness of exactly how you may need to extract the data in the future, but like most things a little practice will go a long way.

Graphics

As well as producing business graphics, which are often created for within spreadsheet software, it's nice to be able to produce your own illustrations for newsletters, birthday cards, reports

and so on.

You may already have a graphics program, but if you don't I would highly recommend Deluxe Paint III or IV. Although Deluxe Paint IV is the latest version (4.1 actually), I still prefer Dant in many ways as I find it simpler to work with, though of course it doesn't handle HAM (Hold and

Modify, 4096 colour) graphics, which probably isn't that important if you plan on printing in black and white anyway.

Graphics produced with Deluxe Paint (or any other which can output IFF format images) can be imported into DTP or word publishing packages which can utilise bitmapped pictures, though in some cases there are restrictions on the number of colours that the software will use.

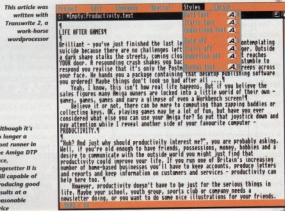
Even if you can't draw for toffee there is always the possibility of scanning in a logo or picture by using a relatively inexpensive hand scanner, or even an expensive flatbed model. By running a hand scanner across an image it can be turned into a greyscale (or even colour with newer models) IFF file which can be used just like any other image.

Another way of grabbing pictures is to use a digitiser (such as Romb's Vid-Amiga 12) to capture images from a video camera or video deck with solid freeze frame.

Wordprocessing

What's the difference between wordprocessing and desktop publishing (DTP)? No, this isn't a joke, it's something which can be quite confusing - especially as some software packages now seem to be blending features which were previously regarded as being exclusively in the domain of DTP software.

Wordprocessing, as the name suggests,

◀ is the processing of words. In essence this means typing text into your computer, editing it to your requirements, spell checking it, doing some basic layout and then printing out the results.

The inclusion of good spell checking software with a wordprocessor is very important, even if you consider yourself to be literate, as many silly mistakes often creep through when working at speed.

Most of these goods can be filtered out quite easily with a spell checker, though you'll still need to proof read to catch those occasions where a correctly spelled word is in the wrong place - eg "the" instead of "them".

This article was written on a wordprocessor (Gold Disk's Transwrite 2, in fact) but instead of being printed out it was delivered to Amiga Computing as a text file on a floppy disk.

By importing the text and laying it out with the pictures in a desktop publishing program the pages that you are now reading are constructed.

The major difference between DTP and wordprocessing software is that DTP can also incorporate true graphics elements - pictures, clip art, structured graphics and specialist typefaces, where wordprocessors only deal with text.

Inevitably this means that a DTP package requires much more memory to run successfully than a wordprocessing program, as it has to cope with so much more data - particularly when producing pages which contain large amounts of graphics.

But the distinctions between wordprocessors and DTP programs have become increasingly blurred by "word publishing" programs such as Pen Pal, Wordworth, KindWords 3 and Final Copy, which mix some of the features of DTP packages (such as graphic fonts and picture importing) with more traditional wordprocessing functions. Of course, this can only be an

advantage to the user, as such software inevitably offers more bang for the buck.

Spreadsheets

Putting it very simply, spreadsheets are definable grids in which numbers can be placed and then manipulated mathematically to provide results.

By adding headings and column information and entering numerical data which relates to these headings it is possible to build up complex applications, double entry book-keeping, financial forecast sheets and the like.

I use a spreadsheet to keep track of my income and expenditure because the Inland Revenue, in particular, are keen that I tell them what my earnings for each

financial year are.

On one side of the spreadsheet I enter my income, along with any necessary details, and on the other my expenditure - which I break down into categories such as travel, bank charges, computer purchases, National Insurance payments and so on.

Every month I input all the relevant data from my invoices, bank account and purchase receipts and then total everything up.

This way I can have an instant view of how the old bank balance stands, and where the money goes.

In the simple example shown I've taken a theoretical cafe and looked at some of their monthly grocery outgoings.

By dividing the year into months it's

easier to see patterns of spending emerge and by breaking the purchases down into specific items it's possible to see exactly how much has been spent on each item.

Each of the monthly costs is placed in a "cell", for example cell D8 holds the cost of tea for March. The total yearly expenditure on tea can be found by adding all the monthly spending on tea together by entering the formula SUM(D6:D17) in the TOTAL cell at D19.

When this formula is executed it adds up all the costs in column D from D6 to D17 and shows the result in D19. If any of the data is subsequently altered, the total will adjust automatically, saving a lot of recalculation.

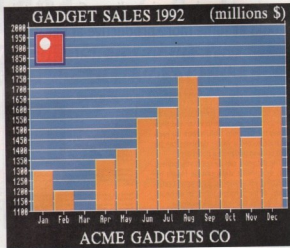
By printing out the results you can have a hard copy of precisely what has been happening in the kitchen during the year. By designing different spreadsheets it's possible to keep a check on all kinds of things - profit and loss accounts, football league tables, stock control and so on.

Printing out endless lists of figures is the only way of seeing what's going on, and many of the better spreadsheets and integrated software packages allow graphs to be produced from selected sets of data.

Pie charts, bar charts, line graphs - the choice is yours in this voyage into the realms of big business.

Accounting

Instead of using a spreadsheet to lay out financial matters, a program such as Digital's Home Accounts 2 takes an entirely different approach. By defining a set of transaction types such as CASH, HOME SAL etc (for cash, hobbies, salary and so on) and then setting up as many separate accounts as you need to reflect your financial affairs it is possible to keep track of your financial transactions across a whole range of accounts and spending categories.

Expansion - what is it and why do it?

You might think that once you've bought your Amiga that that's the end of it, and that you've got all the hardware you'll ever need. But don't be fooled for one minute, unless of course you've bought one of the high-end machines such as the A3000 or 4000 which include extra memory, hard drive, fast processors and all the rest.

The range of add-ons which suppliers are keen to sell Amiga owners seems never-ending, as you will no doubt be aware from reading the adverts in this magazine.

Mice, tracker balls, disk drives, memory, hard drives, graphics tablets, monitors, printers, scanners, digitisers and accelerators all crop up with monotonous regularity because these are items that people not only want to buy, but quite often actually need to accomplish their desired tasks.

Probably the most vital addition you can make to your Amiga is to upgrade the amount of memory (RAM) which it contains. Extra RAM can make all the difference to success or failure, particularly in applications like desktop publishing, where large amounts of data or graphics can be involved.

RAM can also help to speed things up, as the computer has more room to crunch data in and doesn't have to spend so much of its time rearranging its

storage areas.

An extra 2Mb of RAM can do wonders for your machine's versatility, and upgrading to a megabyte of chip RAM (for those faithful to older Amigas) will help to ensure that you don't run out of screen display during those vital last minute document changes. In fact, many serious last minute documents require at least 1Mb of chip RAM just for starters.

The next essential for serious productivity work, and more relaxed eyes, is a good monitor - preferably one which connects to the Amiga's RGB output for higher quality.

Professional users often use multisync monitors and de-interlacing hardware to reduce the screen flicker, but I imagine that such equipment will be well beyond your modest budgets, so enough said.

A second disk drive will prove invaluable to many users, especially when lots of multiple disk access is required, though a hard drive will certainly be an option you should consider if you decide to get seriously involved with productivity.

Some programs, particularly DTP software, can require access to huge amounts of data, for instance Compugraphic fonts or clip art, and a hard drive will save

a great amount of access time and disk swapping.

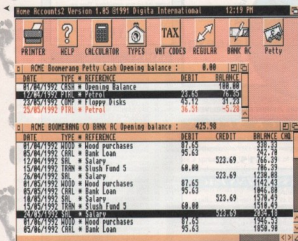
Buy the largest capacity drive that you can afford - no fill up much later than you might expect - and go for SCSI one if you can.

Naturally, if you need to get hard copy, you'll need a printer. Your choice will inevitably be based both on a requirement - and cost. While there are truckloads of cheap 9-pin dot matrix printers knocking about that may well not provide the quality you are looking for, especially for DTP work.

Laser printers currently give some of the highest quality but can be pretty expensive to buy and to run. Twenty-four pin dot matrix printers offer good quality at a reasonable cost, but are noisy, though they can do reasonable cost colour work and graphics.

For my money, a good printer buy would be a modern inkjet model like the Canon BJ10ex or Star 548. They provide very good print quality with whisper-quiet printing. With some ingenuity and coloured ink refills they can also provide nice colour output if you are prepared to improvise a little.

A word of warning though - make sure that the printer you choose has a proper Amiga printer driver, otherwise you may well be buying a dead duck.



Accounting software such as Home Accounts 2 offers an alternative approach to spreadsheet book-keeping which many users may well prefer because of accessibility and user-friendliness.

GOVERNMENT

As a newcomer to this approach I found it to be very accessible and easy to get to grips with – though remember all the categories will take a bit of practice.

Because the accounts can be interlinked, anything transferred from one to another can be tracked easily. Reports based on selected data or formats can be printed out for easy reading or inclusion in documents.

I reckon that's it's just a matter of choice. Spreadsheets are probably more flexible in the long run, but for day to day administrative work in small business, home accounting or cost tracking, an accounting package will do an admirable job in all but the toughest circumstances.

Disk utilities

If you have ever tried to use the CLI or SHELL interfaces provided with

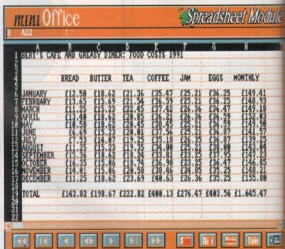

Workbench you'll know how frustrating it can be to do some very simple tasks, such as formatting a disk or moving a few files around.

Disk utilities are designed to free you from such drudgery and add more power to your elbow by providing a point and click environment where all of the usual disk operations (and often a great deal more) can be easily and quickly achieved.

Current favourites such as Directory Opus (which I find absolutely invaluable) or SILD 2 are so flexible that they can also be used to launch other programs, display pictures, play sampled sounds, archive files and print out documents, in addition

to all the disk manipulation, formatting, copying and other tasks that they perform.

Hard drive owners will find such software especially useful.

As you've probably gathered by now, productivity can burn quite a hole in your pocket. But if you are in business you'll appreciate the time, effort (and cost) saved on doing manual book-keeping, typing letters, and producing printed materials, while the creativity involved in

producing a newsletter can be very satisfying, as well as educational.

By all means continue playing games as we all know that all work and no play makes Jack a dull boy (or so they say) — but once in a while consider doing something a little more serious. You now know, you could even end up making money out of it.

Samplers

Getting into sound sampling on the Amiga nowadays just couldn't be easier. There's a good range of hardware and software with prices that start from virtually free – ie the public domain software offerings – to units which have the price-tags and specifications which attract professional users.

In short, there is something on the Amiga for everyone! Despite its popularity however there are still plenty of users who have yet to jump on, and enjoy, the sound sample bandwagon.

Whether you are a newcomer or not doesn't matter this month though, because there should be something in this sampling superstore to help or interest everyone.

Topics first and foremost on the agenda? How about we start with an explanation of what "sound sampling" actually is.

Complex

Musical notes are made up of sound waves that have a certain frequency (pitch) and a certain loudness (amplitude). When you listen to a piece of music, or any other sound, come to that, you are listening to a complex mass of sound waves which include many different frequencies and amplitudes.

If at any point in time you could take a snapshot of the sound you were hearing and measure the amplitude of that part of the soundwave then, using some agreed convention, you could express the loudness as a number.

If you did the same thing over and over again, a whole series of numbers could be obtained and, at the end of the day, you would have a list of numbers that represented the original sound.

It is these ideas which form the basis of sound sampling. By using special hardware which measures that amplitude information many thousands of times a second it is possible to build up a very detailed numerical,

ie digital, copy of the original sound.

For what should now be obvious reasons the hardware units which provide this magic conversion are called "digitisers". Once the digitising process has been carried out the sound will have been turned into a stream of numbers.

This then allows a computer to be used to perform sophisticated editing effects – a user can take a piece of one sound, mix it with another, speed up or slow down the rate at which the sample is played, or even produce phasing and flanging effects by

shifting the time-position of a sample before adding it back to itself.

These are things which are either difficult or impossible to do using conventional analogue recording techniques.

The quality of any digital sound depends on the accuracy of the original digitisation process and here there are two different variables to consider – the sampling rate, and the resolution of the numbers used to define the amplitude.

It should be pretty obvious that faster sampling rates will give better waveform detail, and equally obvious that increasing the range of numbers used to represent the amplitude measurements should also lead

to better waveform detail.

Because on the Amiga the final sound will in most cases be played using the internal sound chips, amplitude digitisation on most Amiga digitisers is performed to an accuracy of eight bits (allowing for a possible "loudness" values).

One term you will hear over and over again in the world of Amiga sampling is "8SVX", which is one of the IFF standardised file formats used for sampled sound. Its claim to fame, as many of you will already know, is that allows one Amiga program to load and play back samples created by any other Amiga program.

As far as basic equipment goes, you really need to get into the world of sampling is some digital hardware and the software to control it. Many of the Amiga

Sampling packages include both eight-bit Amiga digitisers start at about £20 with the top of the range units costing about ten times that amount. Hard disks and lots of RAM obviously help any application but they are not absolutely essential and the 1Mb Amiga user without a hard drive can still do an awful lot of sound processing.

To be honest it is possible to get into the world of sound sampling even before getting a digitiser unit. There are literally thousands of good sound samples readily

available and providing you have the software to utilise those sounds you can mix, alter, and use those samples to your hearts content.

Most people however, once bitten by the sampled-sounds bug, do go out and get the necessary hardware/software so that they can actually sample their own sounds.

Although Midi doesn't come into the picture when you are creating and editing sound samples, you will find that having access to a Midi keyboard will be a big help as far as composing music is concerned.

Many tracker programs and sequences which allow sampled sounds to be used to create songs also allow the musical note data to be entered using a synthesiser keyboard rather than the Amiga keyboard.

This makes life much easier and if you are going to use sampled sounds in this way a cheap Midi keyboard will be a good investment!

Almost all sound sample digitiser units attach to the Amiga's parallel port. Basically

Some terms explained

Clipping A waveform distortion caused by a signal being too strong for the input circuitry of a recording or sampling device.

The circuitry gets overloaded and the top parts of the incoming waveforms get distorted or chopped off. The end result is always the same - a poor quality sound.

IFF 8SVX This is the IFF (Interchange File Format) name of a file arrangement used for storing sound samples.

RAM scanning This means exactly what it says - programs which provide RAM scanning facilities allow you to scan through the Amiga's memory and, by "playing" the data, look for sound samples.

Raw sample Basically a copy of the byte values of a sound sample waveform just as they appear in memory (as opposed to a sample stored in a specially designed file structure such as IFF 8SVX).

you plug one end into the sound source - which might be a tape unit, CD, microphone, or some other audio signal output - and the other end into the parallel port.

The lower-priced units will probably have no controls at all. Higher priced units include both line-level and microphone-level inputs, signal gain controls, switchable parallel-through port connections (so that the digitiser can be left permanently plugged in) and perhaps a number of other goodies.

Having switched on and booted up the sampling editing software the rest is comparatively easy. Set an appropriate sample rate, adjust the volume of the input signal to a suitable level, and then just hit record. Your sample will be sitting in the editor waiting to be saved or edited.

OK, so some details do vary from package to package, but the above scenario should give you the basic idea of how easy

the sampling process is. Be warned that initially, your results may not be very good. It takes time and practice to learn how to get the recording parameters to their optimum values.

Practice does however make perfect and after a few attempts the whole process becomes second nature.

Tracker

In the early Amiga days, programmers needed a fast, convenient way of creating music for games and demos and one of the earliest utilities to appear was called SoundTracker.

Within a couple of years a number of these programs had appeared and they became generally known in the trackers.

Being essentially programmers' tools, these trackers adopted programmer-like conventions for specifying music sequences. Song descriptions were built around lists showing the times and the pitches at which various samples should be played, and so on.

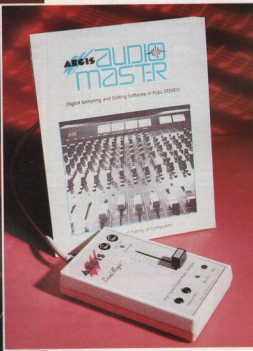
While not ideal from a musician's viewpoint, this method of composing music rapidly became established, but the race was then on to create programs that were more user-friendly.

One of the most successful trackers was a program called MED (short for Music Editor) which allowed songs to be created by linking together small blocks of music.

These blocks could be arranged and repeated in any way so, once the blocks had been defined, building the song became very easy indeed.

During the following years a number of new MED versions were

released providing new editing facilities, a standalone song player utility called MEDPlayer, and support for MIDI instruments.

Up to this point these programs were – and the original programs still are – public domain, but when MED's successor, OctaMED, arrived a decision was made to go commercial.

An enhanced version, called OctaMED Pro, has now been released and, as you'll see from our product/price listings, it is by no means expensive.

OctaMED Pro is more powerful and much easier to use than the original MED program and is highly recommended for those of you who need a tracker.

Samplers

Lots of magazine and PD disks include sound samples that can be extracted and used for your own purposes.

Finding them is easy enough if you only have a few directories on the disk – especially if the samples have been given obvious names such as crash.hif, bang.snd or snare.8SVX.

Locating them when the samples have less intuitive names (eg PDX.80) can be much harder, especially if the disk is packed with many directories.

More to the point – it may take a lot of time to look at every file in every directory! The result of course is that all too often you can miss potentially useful sound samples just because they were not easy to identify.

Fortunately there's a nice easy solution – we automate the whole process and let the Amiga do all the hard work...

Search is a small CLI/Shell utility that does just that. It looks not only for 8SVX sound samples but all common IFF files (such as pictures, SMUS files etc).

It will even find things like Music X, MSCN, CanDo DECK, standard MIDI files (SMF Files), and the new AIFF (Audio IFF) files that are going to be used by the new 16-bit sampling products due to appear!

To use it, just open a CLI/Shell window and type Search followed by the disk drive to be looked at. SearchDF0, for example, will search all of the directories of the disk

Public domain freebies

Don't forget also that there are literally hundreds of disks containing sound samples floating around in the public domain. The only trouble is that it is usually a bit and miss affair as far as quality is concerned.

There are some really excellent samples floating around, but you usually have to wade through a lot of rather more average sounds to find them.

Having said that, it doesn't take that long to build up a reasonable collection of good sounds. Public domain libraries like PD Direct, who offer a lot of music disks, will be able to point you in the right direction.

in drive d0 and give you a list of the required files and their directory locations. This is the sort of output you'll get.

If you are searching a hard disk or a floppy with many files and nested directories then the program may take a minute or two to locate the required information, but it will be a lot quicker than other methods.

You can, incidentally, cancel the search operation at any time by hitting Ctrl-C or Ctrl-D. If you need a permanent copy of the program output, just redirect the output to a disk file, or to the PRN device. For instance, the command:

SEARCH >RAM:contents.BTF:

will send details of the d0:1 analysis to a RAM disk file called "contents".

Sampling hardware and editing software

AMAS 2 • Microdeal • £100

This is an upgraded version of the very popular AMAS sampling hardware which includes stereo digitising hardware that can sample at rates of up to 90kHz.

This sort of sampling speed can't be realised with the current Amiga range but the AMAS 2 software doing the driving can achieve mono recording sampling rates of up to 55.9kHz and stereo recording rates of 27.9kHz (replay frequencies are up to 55.9kHz).

Software adjustable input level controls are provided and as well as the usual cut/copy/paste type editing controls there are a whole range of effects that can be produced (echo, phasing, chorus, reversal and so on) and it is possible to overlay samples, swap and copy channels, fade in and out, and do things like stereo bouncing.

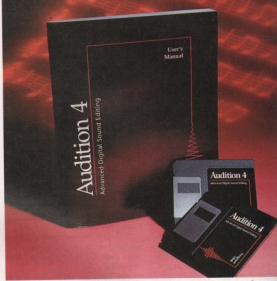
Sampled sounds can be saved in IFF and raw formats, and in a new "executable" form that allows samples to be played outside of AMAS 2 simply by clicking on an associated icon.

The software also includes things like a 3D FFT (Fast Fourier Transform) display and a dual real-time spectrum analyser.

A small, but reasonably useful, sample-orientated, MIDI sequencer is also provided and you even get a microphone thrown in as well.

AMAS 2 offers new users a very attractive total package and it's probably to this, plus the fact that it is a well supported product, that the package owes its popularity.

When you compare raw AMAS 2 results



Audition 4 is a very capable and well supported package

with those of less expensive packages, such as TechnoSound Turbo and Beat Studio, you'll often find surprisingly little difference (or no difference) in sample quality.

AMAS 2 software however is reasonably powerful and, as an integrated sampling and editing package it must be said that because of this AMAS 2 does, at a price, win hands down over the cheaper alternatives.

Audio Engineer Plus HB Marketing • £204

This Ramscan/GSOF offering is, quite simply, the best 8-bit Amiga sampler available at the current time. Unfortunately it is also the most expensive.

The stereo digitising unit is a GSOF Audio Imager and this includes two separate, and very fast, A/D (analogue to digital)

converters. The hardware is in fact rated in excess of 300k samples per second and is capable of sampling at rates well beyond that obtainable with Amigas fitted with 68020/68030 accelerator cards.

Audio Engineer boasts solid construction, switchable microphone and line inputs, signal level adjustment, printer switch-through connections (so that the digitiser can be left permanently plugged in) and above all a quality by which all other Amiga samplers are judged!

Audio Engineer II, the associated sample recording/editing software, is also extremely good – as well as offering all the usual types of edit effects, the software also includes time-stretching and time-compression, frequency cut and boosting via software filters, very powerful low creation

Sampled sounds

IFF Sound Sample Library • Walkabout Music

One disk: £2.50, ten disks: £19.95 all disks: £49.95

There are a lot of sample libraries around but this one is absolutely brilliant and covers everything from the usual types of drums, bass, synth and piano sounds to obscure things like African and Indian instrument collections.

Each disk contains samples from a particular sound category and in fact the full library lists goes something like this... African, Indian instrument, Indian percussion, Aztec, Far East, European, Oceania, Americas, FX percussion, Drum Kit, Analogue Percussion, Latin percussion, guitars, bass guitars, analogue bass, brass, synth brass, pianos, strings, string strings, choir, organs, bells, and sound FX.

The number of samples on each disk ranges from about 20 to over 100 and there's no doubt at all that Walkabout Music have done an excellent job (helped no doubt by the fact that they are all musicians and know the difference between a good sample and a bad one).

If you want to get an idea of the quality of the library just get hold of the bass guitar samples disk (it's actually disk 14 in their catalogue) – all too often bass guitar samples are mediocre but this stuff is so good it'll blow your socks off!

Sample Series • Gajits • £9.95

A range of high-quality IFF samples for use with music programs. Percussion & Effects, Guitars & Strings, Brass & Woodwind, Synth & Vocals and Piano & Keyboard volumes are currently available.

facilities, and special methods for providing playback of stereo samples at rates of up to 56k samples per second.

When used with machines such as a standard Amiga A500 or A2000, quite a bit of Audio Engineer Plus's high-standard hardware specification is inevitably wasted, but there's no doubt that this package is nevertheless the business. For the serious user it is worth every penny of the asking

AudioMaster IV HB Marketing • £70

This is basically the Aegis release of RamScan's Audio Engineer Plus software and needless to say it's not only brilliant but is generally regarded as the best Amiga 8-bit sampling software around at the present time.

Audition 4 • HB Marketing • £50

This piece of stereo/mono sound sample editing software comes from SunRize, a company that know an awful lot about Amiga sampling.

Although the configuration menu has specific options for selecting Perfect Sound samplers (another SunRize product) a generic option allows the program to work with any other parallel-port based 8-bit Amiga sampler.

Audition 4 is an excellent piece of software with a great many useful features, including being able to preview and adjust effects in real-time before making permanent edits, and direct recording to disk or RAM.

Although it has been overshadowed in a number of respects by AudioMaster IV it is

Miscellaneous hardware and software

Audio Sculpture • Software Management Group • £49

This program by Expose Software is a relatively new tracker utility which compares favourably with OctaMED Professional in all but one respect — it costs over twice as much!

Musick Pack 5 • PD Direct • £12

This pack contains a whole host of public domain programs, songs and samples including MED v3.2 and Pro Tracker.

OctaMED Professional Amiganuts • £22.50

Despite the fact that it has a few rough edges, this is one of the best tracker programs around at the present time and is excellent value for money. OctaMED users can upgrade for just £12.50! OctaMED

Pro contains a whole range of different screens but two areas in the display are always visible. Firstly there is a status bar which provides current edit modes, block/instruments numbers or names, and, maybe, play track status.

Secondly there is a 15-button menu panel. Ten of the menu panel buttons cause other control panels to be displayed and these control the loading and saving of songs and instruments, the setting of relative track volumes, transposition, Midi settings and a variety of block/track editing facilities.

The remaining five menu panel buttons switch between the five main OctaMED Pro editors.

There's a Block editor which is used for entering note data in conventional MIDI format, a Graphic note editor which allows you to enter and display/print music a bar at a time using conventional nota-

tion, a Sample editor, a Synthetic Sound editor and a Sample List editor.

Compositions can incidentally be saved in a variety of different formats: Song files with song and instruments/samples, and modules containing multiple songs in a single file.

Arrangements can also be saved in a Sound/Noise/ProTracker-compatible format. Another point that is worth mentioning is that the OctaMED Player program is Amiga controllable so it is possible to load and play songs under AReXX script control!

Sound Enhancer Plus Omega Projects • £34.95

This unit sits between the audio outputs of your Amiga and an external amplifier and can improve the audio quality of Amiga's internal sound chip output considerably.

hardware and software package that joins the ranks of Beat Studio, TechnoSound Plus etc.

The hardware does what it is supposed to well enough but that's about all that can be said. On the whole TechnoSound Plus is a much better proposition, and it is somewhat cheaper!

Micro Sampler • Datel • £25

This is a budget-priced mono sampling hardware unit which comes with some software. The hardware seems to do a reasonable job!

Perfect Sound 3 • HB Marketing • £60

This is another combined hardware and software stereo/mono sampling system which is able to produce excellent results. It comes from SunRize and the software provides most of the common editing facilities including fades, sample mixing, reversing, resampling etc., required for serious work.

Pro Sound Designer Gold Power Computing • £39

A reasonably priced hardware/software sampling system which, as far as value for money goes, competes well with other similarly priced offerings.

Sound Master HB Marketing • £130

This Aegis offering is one of the better hardware/software stereo/mono sampling systems available and perhaps most important of all it now comes with the brilliant Audiomaster IV software.

The hardware includes a volume level control, overload indicator, line and microphone inputs.

still a very capable, and well supported, program.

Beat Studio • Panda Marketing £40 approx

This fairly new offering from City Beat comes complete with all the hardware and software necessary to get into the world of Amiga sampling.

The manual is lousy but what has surprised an awful lot of people is the fact that, with a little care, the hardware can produce extremely good results.

The editing software is adequate but it

cannot compete with offerings like AudioMaster IV or Audition 4.

Crystal Sound • BlitSoft • £94

This 8-bit sound digitising unit has only just started to arrive in the UK and there's no doubt that it is very good indeed. It provides twin, ultra fast, low noise A/D converters which can sample at up to 70kHz in stereo.

It has microphone and line level inputs (with active audio filters on all inputs), separate left and right gain controls and a printer pass-through.

Crystal sound is directly compatible with Audio Engineer Plus and Audition 4 if sampling in Perfect Sound mode.

Datel Stereo Sampler Datel • £50

This sampling hardware and software package does its job but it is not particularly impressive considering the competition.

Digital Sound Studio Silica Systems • £50

This is a good, easy to use, hardware and software 8-bit sampling system and one that has earned much praise from existing users.

Good documentation is provided and the program includes things like software-controlled input levels and microphone/line switches which makes it easy to adjust input signal strengths.

Another plus for this offering is that a four-track sample sequencer is included in the software. The digitiser itself is well made and, all in all, this package is good value for money.

MegaMix Master • Rombo Productions • £40

This is another budget-priced sampling

This is a popular budget mono digitiser whose hardware includes a parallel port pass-through connector (so you don't have to unplug it to use your printer).

Sound Trap comes with its own software. The most serious users prefer to use it with packages like AudioMaster.

Stereo Master • Microdeal • £40

This is a budget-priced stereo/mono sampling package which includes both hardware and software. Signal input, incidentally, is via a 3.5mm stereo jack socket rather than the separate phono connectors used by most sampling hardware.

For digitising hardware but can be supplemented with a variety of different sample editing software. With Audition 4 for example this package costs £69.99 and this is quite a powerful, and cost-effective, combination.

At the higher end of the market

For non-professional users, Amiga samplers have caught on in a big way, but there is no doubt that the 8-bit amplitude limitation has severely limited professional and semi-professional interest in Amiga sampling.

In a comparison, CD sampling uses a sampling rate of 44.1kHz and 16-bit amplitude resolution.

It is only comparatively recently that higher amplitude resolution digitiser units

have been announced for the Amiga but already there are three units to choose from.

AD1012 SunRize Board HB Marketing • £470

The AD1012 audio card fits inside the A2000/A3000 Amiga series and adds 12-bit digitising and SMPTE facilities to the system.

It comes complete with SunRize's Studio 16 recording and editing software and this can record and playback directly from disk.

You need a hard disk system with a fast drive to get the best out of this digitiser and if you are thinking of intensive use with an A2000 machine you are likely to find you'll need a 68030 accelerator card as well!

Clarity 16 • Microdeal • £150

This is the first low-cost hardware and software stereo 16-bit sampler to be produced for the Amiga and it's due out any time.

If it lives up to the press releases it is going to be a winner because not only will it offer a 16-bit system that can sample at up to CD rates (44.1kHz) but the software can convert between 8-bit and 16-bit formats so you'll still have IFF-BSVX support as well as 16-bit file format support.

Samples will be able to be played both through the stereo 16-bit cartridge output and through the Amiga's standard output channels.

The hardware includes an integral Midi interface and the software will support the Amiga as a sample-based Midi sound expander.

AD516 SunRize Board HB Marketing • Price: TBA

This is a 16-bit hardware sampling board with software and a specification that is going to attract professional audio-visual users. It seems as though it is a rename for

a board originally announced – some six months ago or so – as the SunRize AD1016. The AD516 hasn't arrived in the UK yet but there is little doubt that when it does it is going to have a price tag much higher than the AD1012 board – prices of around £800 have been suggested!

Conclusion

All the 8-bit digitisers tested behaved extremely well when presented with suitable signals. With the more expensive packages you get things like input level control, Midi connections, printer through ports and so on, but whether these things are important, and worth the extra cost, depends very much on your particular needs. If for instance you are a

musician/hi-fi freak who already has a mixing desk then you will not particularly need a digitiser with input level control.

If on the other hand you want to sample voices using a microphone or any other non-adjustable audio output, but have no external way of altering signal levels, then you will need a digitiser whose input levels can be adjusted.

It's quite clear that quality-wise Audio Engineer Plus comes out on top, but as far as digitising hardware is concerned the new Crystal Sound unit also made a very good impression. The software front is AudioMaster which is essentially the Audio Engineer software, that steals the show.

There are now a lot of fairly cheap hardware/software entry-level digitiser packages around but TechnoSound Turbo is quite a reasonable choice for a first time buyer.

Sampling tips and tricks

The key to good sampling is to get a good input signal to start with. Where possible this means sampling directly from source rather than using a microphone.

The object of the exercise is to avoid clipping but still ensure that a strong, clear signal is provided to the digitiser. The cheaper samplers will not have signal controls on them so it's necessary to adjust the volume of the actual source being used.

Some people find that a small hi-fi quality mixer can provide so much control over signal gain/equalisation that coupled with good quality leads even the lower-priced samplers produce results that come near to the top of the range samplers.

Remember also that for song creation it is not always necessary to create single note sound samples. Suppose for instance that you want to create a drum part consisting of bass drum, snare, open and closed hi-hats – with perhaps a couple of tom-tom drums thrown in.

One approach is to program a Midi drum machine to play the drum part and then sample one bar of it. Nowadays most drum machines use high quality sampled drum sounds and sampling a pattern being played by a drum machine is a good way to get a good quality drum track laid down with the minimum of effort. This approach has a number of benefits espe-

cially when tracker programs are being used – the drum track becomes ridiculously simple because only one single note and one voice (the sampled drum track) per bar is needed to reproduce the drum pattern no matter how complex the original part was.

You do of course have to take care with timing issues so that the drum part properly synchronises to the tracks which will contain the other song data but as always practice makes perfect and once you've got a suitable drum part you can of course re-use it to your hearts content.

Another space/effort saver is to sample chords instead of notes because again this allows a chord backing track to be created by entering just single notes.

Don't forget that your samples and music will sound much better if you use external speakers rather than those present in your Amiga monitor.

There are plenty of reasonably priced amplifier and speaker systems available and if it is physically convenient you can even use your hi-fi system.

Sound enhancers, units that boost particular audio frequencies, are also available and these can sometimes dramatically improve the quality of the Amiga's audio output.

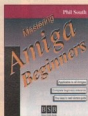

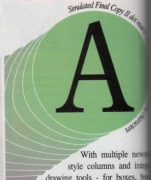

in the prosecution of those you consider to be pirates.

However, if you supply FAST with pirated software and proof of its purchase, or some other solid evidence of piracy connected to an identifiable individual, they will act on case.

Your concern and willingness to act is greatly appreciated, and we urge you to keep up the good work.

It's a giveaway

As an Amiga owner of a few years now, I have collected a wide range of PD software, and although I only recently started teaching myself to program the computer, I have now written a public domain program. The problem is I now realise I haven't a clue how to release it.

Please print an answer to my question, as there is no program of its kind, and I think it will benefit a number of Amiga owners.

Releasing a PD program is as simple as appending some documents to it stating your intention that it be PD, then sending

the disk to a number of PD libraries or uploading it to a few bulletin boards.

If you wish to retain copyright of your program to stop commercial software authors using the idea to make money, say so in the documents.

As soon as you write and publish something, be it a program or a piece of text, it is your artistic copyright, so don't worry about the legal aspects.

If you wish the program to be shareware, state so in your documents and provide information on what donation to make, how to register, and where to send the registration fee.

A good bet if you're unsure about how to do this is to study the documents attached to many of the programs on the Amiga Computing CoverDisk, as these are often written and distributed by experienced shareware authors.

C Compendium

I am learning the C programming language, and find your Almanac programming column very interesting. What would be even more useful is a compilation of all the programming features ever published in AC.

I'm sure I'm not the only person stuck with books that don't even mention sprites or sound or IFF picture files.

By the way, a note to anyone starting C - Northc from Amiganuts United is an excellent, easy to use compiler, complete with editor. I highly recommend it.

And finally, has anyone else had trouble with the CLI command Install? The common "Install Drive DFO:" asks for Workbench, loads the command, then tries to install Workbench!

After hours of thinking, I came up with the solution. Copy the command to RAM and use it from there.

Try Damark, and if they can't supply you with the games, place an ad in our classifieds section. One of our readers may be prepared to send you the disks or do a swap, you never know.

Piracy excuse

How can companies say piracy leads to higher prices? Just look at the prices for the uncopyable console games. Imagine paying £35 for a game which has the same graphics, sound, and playability as a C64.

If piracy was stopped, it would not result in more games being sold because nobody would have more money to buy the extra games.

You could say someone will not buy an original product if they have access to the pirated version, but this would hurt the industry as the money saved

would result in the user buying a different piece of software.

To be fair, the problem of large-scale professional piracy is rife in the cartridge industry, though home copying is of course impossible without specialist equipment. This is not the reason for high cartridge prices, however.

Console games are often sold at ridiculous prices because many contain, in effect, up to 6Mb of RAM. In addition, the consoles themselves are sold with very small profit margins, and you will find that the major manufacturers make most of their money from cartridge sales.

What will be a more accurate measure of industry claims about piracy will be the expected CD-ROM explosion. If CD-based titles sell for the same price as floppy-based games once the market begins to expand, the piracy argument will be scotched and the industry's cynical profit-making exposed.

One small problem remains in that Kickstart 2.04 has a bug when formatting a disk in the internal drive. If the disk you booted from is write-protected, every disk you try to format from that disk will appear as if it is write protected, regardless of the position of the protect tab.

This is Commodore's fault and it is a widely documented bug recently fixed with Kickstart 2.05. All those AS500 Plus owners out there who have had problems should simply write-enable the CoverDisk, re-boot, and de-archive from there. Problem solved.

Never has an imminent software release been quite so imminent for quite so long. First we had Montage, then Mirage and now at long last GVP have finally thrown copious amounts caution to the wind and plumbed for ImageFX.

Regular readers may remember AC's exclusive preview of Montage – as was – in our September image processing special.

Since those beta-testing days, ImageFX has come a long way, implementing all the features hinted in the early days while adding a few new twists fit to whet even the most discerning artistic appetite.

The software and attendant donkey-chocking manual come in the now almost mandatory ring-bound hardback, complete with an Scala style storage sleeve – ideal for easy access and perfect to impress your friends.

Installation as you'd expect is simple, however the results are fairly surprising as not one but four separate programs appear in the newly created ImageFX drawer. Alongside the expected ImageFX the additional contents include ImageFX_WB, CineMorph and the curiously titled IMP.

As the name suggests, the ImageFX_WB



program in the collection, CineMorph, may already be familiar thanks to last month's Morph Mania spectacular. Like ADPro's MorphPlus, the program can run as either a standalone or in the case of ImageFX as a Hook or plug-in module which can be loaded directly from ImageFX on request.

Due to last month's feature, I'll concen-

trate primarily on ImageFX and IMP, but for those who missed the last issue here's a brief synopsis of CineMorph and its assorted morphing and warping skills.

As you can see from the screenshots, CineMorph employs a dual screen system for source and target images. Like both MorphPlus and Image Mr, the package

supports both static warps and morphs plus animated morphs – alas there's no option for animated warps.

Again as is obvious from the screenshots, CineMorph uses a mesh to define differences between the source and destination images. Although undoubtedly the latest morphing package as far as rendering is concerned, it must be said that a com-

program allows you to open the program on the Workbench window, providing the power of ImageFX in the style of a commodity, instantly accessible as and when required.

This instant access is further enhanced by a "put to sleep" button which appears on both versions of ImageFX allowing the user to temporarily iconify the program while either retaining or disposing of any images already present.

The only notable difference between the custom and Workbench version is the lack of a Preview option within the latter.

Buffer

However, this doesn't mean you can't view images, as simply rendering the selected buffer instantly throws the current image to the rendering medium of your choice, whether that be a standard Amiga mode or alternatively a dedicated display device such as the IV24, HAM-E, DCTV and the like.

Although the difference between preview and render may be rather confusing, all will be explained a little later, but for now perhaps the simplest analogy is to describe the Workbench option as an ADPro-style environment, where you only see the effects of your actions when the render option is applied.

Conversely, the custom screen counterpart provides a constantly updated preview every step of the way. The next

Now we're reaching the heart of ImageFX. Although fairly bland, the toolbox is undoubtedly where most time will be spent. Like its predecessors, ImageFX offers an impressive array of processing tools and special effects including, balancing, composition, sizing, rotation, convolutions, transformations, filtering, Alpha channel support, special effects, brush handling, ARexx and last but not least the invaluable Hooks.

The Hooks apply pre-designed ARexx programs to produce additional SFXs, but perhaps more importantly allow access to external programs such as the aforementioned IMP and CineMorph.

Aside from image processing, the Toolbox is also the home of the program's built-in painting tools. These tools include all the classics which benefit en masse from the added power of a true 24-bit painting environment thanks to features such as optional alpha channel, gradients, trace through, rub through, saturation, colorize (sic), hue and so on.

One of the few faults of the painting environment is the limited

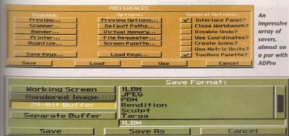
number of display formats offered during preview. These are either IV24, Amiga, Firecracker or HAM-E. Obviously if you're without one of the three aforesaid display boards you're stuck with basic Amiga graphics.

Alas in this case basic really means basic with just 16 colours or greyscales plus optional HAM. These versus the straightforward colour, dithered colour, the aforementioned greyscale with HAM remaining strictly old-school 4,096 lo-res.

Although bearable when image processing as a rough guide the 24-bit buffer such basic Amiga graphics simply aren't good enough for serious applications. No doubt GVP would like us all to rush out and buy an IV24. Back in the real world it simply isn't going to happen.

amount of speed is sacrificed due to the rather cumbersome mesh editing system.

The results of the morphing/warping process can be spectacular, especially on soft features such as eyes and mouths which lie on a fairly uniform backdrop. Unfortunately CineMorph isn't quite as strong when dealing with hard edges such as profiles or images with hard distinct out-

lines. When morphed or warped, hard edges do tend to "ghost" around the edges rather than transform with the same degree of accuracy offered by both Image Mr and to a greater extent MorphPlus.

Having made a point of the program's ghosting problem it's worth stressing that in effect CineMorph comes as almost a freebie - very appealing considering that CineMorph in its stand alone form retails at a staggering £99.95.

The last software surprise is mysterious IMP which when stripped of its acronym becomes the ImageFX Multi Processor. Although you'd never guess from the title the IMP is a batch editor in the style of ADPro's FRED.

Fortunately for the novice it's much easier to use than the aforesaid FRED, but in turn does sacrifice a lot of the sophistication and flexibility available from its ADPro friendly counter-

part. Like CineMorph, IMP operates as a hook as well as a pseudo-standalone which opens the IMP interface alongside the ImageFX_V8 program as a processing tool.

As you can probably see, the interface is pretty simple with a main and swap field for source images plus an excellent Alpha channel option which allows you to use a predefined series of greyscale masks as a transparency filter between the two source images.

Below the Alpha lurks the essential destination field, which as you'd expect works as a definable repository for your animations, rendered images or batch-processed data bits.

Next comes the First/Last file parameters closely followed

With the program's modular design, the addition of new and existing display boards shouldn't be a problem. If GVP do the current thing and issue preview modules for, say the Macintosh, Opalvision, Avidio or even DCTV, the success of ImageFX would be assured - the question is, will they?

If like me you're without either the now defunct HAM-E or an N24 the only option left is to move to the Render screen and re-render the image for an accurate overview.

Although this provides access to a much wider selection of display formats, it invariably means painting is at best hit and miss and invariably much more time consuming than a normal paint package.

The next minor gripe is the actual application of the paint itself. Unfortunately GVP have insisted on sticking with the infamous "paint and wait" approach pioneered on the N24.

For those unfamiliar with the N24 and Macro Paint the problem appears whenever paint is applied to the canvas as if only the outline of the effect is applied in real time.

For example, an airbrush first appears as a series of overlapping circles which are only replaced by the chosen colour after the stroke is complete.

A similar problem affects large brushes as they first appear as single pixel lines and only expand to their true size and colour after the event.

Going colour crazy

Colour organisation is an essential for any self-respecting image processor and here again

ImageFX scores well with a whole selection of spreads and swaps, pick options and ranging features.

The available pots for colour placement default to 32 but with the assistance of the program's add and subtract arrow gadgets the selection can vary from just two colours up to a maximum of 256.

Building colours from the ground up is equally well catered for with RGB, HSV, CMY, YIQ and YUV colour space models. If you prefer to pick colours rather than create them, a toggle gadget allows you to select colours from a default

palette or alternative palette provided by the rendering process.



by the render, anim, or 24-bit output. Other processing essentials include palette lock which when active applies the palette of the first frame to all subsequent images.

Delete frames does as suggested, while "wait for source" simply instructs IMP to wait for all frames to be created by an external source prior to executing the batch. The Prep and Proc options are per-

haps the most impressive of all the available gadgets.

The Prep option allows you to specify either a single or selection of commands to be applied prior to processing, while Proc allows a separate selection to be applied after processing.

Fortunately no knowledge of ARexx is required as long as you stick to the supplied ImageFX commands. Customising the commands and the required rendering format is simply a matter of defining the required effects within ImageFX before clicking the begin button.

As a result, once batch processing begins IMP simply reads the existing settings within ImageFX and acts upon them.

Although fairly unassuming, IMP is in my opinion one of the strongest selling points of the ImageFX package, bringing batch processing to the masses without the need of any ARexx experience. For the busy graphic artist with neither the time nor the inclination to master ARexx, IMP is nothing short of a dream come true.

ImageFX itself is separated into five distinct areas, all of which have their own unique interface occupying a strip on the lower portion of the screen. The five areas are Scanner, Palette, Toolbox, Render and Print. Although each panel is unique to its

intended application a few select gadgets are generic throughout the program. These include load, save, prefs and of course quit.

The load and save options, although self explanatory, do have a few surprises in store when applied. For example when loading images there's no format selection required, as the software automatically

Rendering

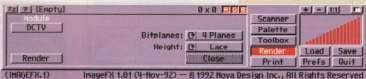
However, all is not lost, especially if you own an A1200/4000, as it's here where at least some of the potential of the AGA has been applied.

ImageFX is totally at home with a 256-colour display which with the assistance of the four available dithering formats, three dithering styles - either left to right, right to left or zig zag - and three definable strength settings ensures that exceptional good results await in the resolution of your choice.

The software automatically senses which machine is being used and as a result automatically tailors the selection of screen modes and resolutions to suit.

Once the display method and dithering options are set simply clicking the render button instantly sends image to the device or screen.

As you may have guessed, thanks to the distinction between display and render it's impossible to actually edit the rendered image as it's designed purely to give the best possible representation of the 24-bit buffer.

loads as long as the particular format is already supported.

Such files include Alias, Anim, BMP, DCTV, DP16, FLI, GIF, HAM-E, ICO, IFF - including IFF24, Impulse, info, jpeg, PBM, PCX, QRT, Rendition, Sculpt, Unix's PBM format, Targa, Tiff and VMEM. An impressive selection and no need to specify a thing.

Added twist

On the output side, things are equally impressive with an added twist of a whole selection of options including the ability to save the working screen, the rendered image, the 24-bit buffer itself and finally the swap buffer - again in its 24-bit form.

For the working, rendered and swap buffer images the save options include anim, BMP, Clipboard and ILBM, while for the 24-bit buffer the selection expands to Alias, BMP, Clipboard, ILBM, PBM, jpeg, Rendition, Sculpt, Targa, Tiff, and VMEM.

Aside from the quick option the final ubiquitous gadget leads to the excellent Prefs screen which like IMP is a high point of the package. Although Prefs screens don't tend to lead to unbridled excitement this is a real exception.

On entry you're presented with a huge range of customising features, the most

notable of which has to be the excellent virtual memory option which allows you to assign a drawer on hard disk as a temporary storage medium which will then masquerade as RAM.

This is nothing short of a masterstroke on the part of GVP. ADPro and to a lesser extent Image Master are notorious for their ravenous appetite for RAM which often means a massive investment in additional hardware or a major re-think of the project in hand.

As you might expect, VRam is noticeably slower than the real thing but thanks to intelligent design you can define when the option is to be applied.

For example, you can specify that VRam should be used only when required, either with or without a warning message or alternatively that it should always be used or perhaps ignored altogether.

Other Prefs highlights include the option to define the Preview and Render options, which in the case of preview include Amiga, HAM-E, and IV24 as either greyscale, colour,

Flexible scanning

Supported scanners and grabbers include the Epson ES300C, the Sharp X100, Framegrabber and the IV24's iVFG. Alas there's no option for the latest Epson A4 scanners such as the ES-600C and ES-800C or the excellent Vlab frame-grabber.

Having said that, with the majority of ImageFX functions scanners and grabbers are simple plug-in modules in the style of ADPro loaders which means in theory new releases only require a suitable module to join in on the act.

As you'd expect, all the necessary scanner setup options avoid including landscape and portrait, the essential mono preview, image cropping via definable boxes, DPI settings, separate colour or full RGB scans and of course greyscales - in short, everything that the scanners own software can provide plus instant access to the image processing power of the main program.

Printing

As is almost essential within any serious image processing package, printing is taken seriously. In the case of ImageFX the present options include 24-bit printing via preference and perhaps more importantly full PostScript support.

If you select the PostScript option you're presented with two choices, either to save your creation as a full PostScript page or alternatively as an EPS - Encapsulated PostScript - which can then be imported directly into any DTP package as either an Ascii or binary PostScript file.

Although PostScript support is fully implemented, it must be said that it's by no means as comprehensive as either Image Mr or ADPro.

Nevertheless all the basic essentials are there allowing page and image sizing, image centralisation plus the option to either ignore or retain aspect ratio.

As you'd expect with EPS support, GVP have included the ability to save the PostScript image direct to disk rather than printer-out output. In short, a basic but effective system.



IMP, perhaps the one of the systems strongest selling points

dithered colour, or HAM - but no HAM8 I'm afraid. Rendering output fares a little better with Amiga 1.3/2/3, DCTV, EGS,

Sage, IV24 and HAM-E, but unbelievably enough there's still no sign of HAM8.

GVP are promising a HAM8 update to the package but as yet it's still unclear how it is to be implemented and even worse whether the revision will be free or not.

This particular sin is compounded by the fact that the program is more than happy with all other screen modes via WB 3.0. As a result, a super hires 256-dithered render is a piece of cake, so why no HAM8? Infuriating.

The remaining options deal primarily with customisation including a complete selection of definable paths for every input/output feature of the package plus the required presets for any scanners, frame-grabbers or printers attached to your system.

The only remaining generic option is the zoom controls which consist of three gadgets, two of which increase and retard the levels of zoom while the third allows instant screen refresh back to the default image size.

The verdict

If you read the preview of ImageFX way back in our September issue you may recall that the program won the title as potentially the best all-rounder. Now it's finally arrived that verdict remains pretty much the same.

Although the GVP marketing machine

would argue otherwise, ImageFX certainly doesn't blow either Image Mr or ADPro out of the water when it comes to pure image processing power. However, where ImageFX really scores highly is its excellent intuitive design, ease of use, flexibility and overall value for money.

If you class yourself as a general purpose user ImageFX is probably the one to go for. With ARexx, free arm generation, ball scanning station, special effects, composition, morphing and printing, it's perhaps close as the Amiga has yet come to an artistic jack of all trades.

The scenario is simple. You have quite happily swapped disks with friends, bought and used a selection of PD disks or, in some rare cases, booted from a magazine CoverDisk (not this one, I assure you), when calamity strikes. The Amiga starts to do strange things and your software suddenly stops working.

Chances are, we old matey, that you've been infected with a common or garden computer virus, and as if this isn't enough, it's also more than a little likely that it's your own silly fault.

Precautions are the name of the game when swapping disks every bit as much as when swapping sexual partners, and the user who exposes his or her machine to the ravages of Saddam or Lamer is usually guilty of negligence.

Computer viruses, once the subject of popular myth and superstition, have over the past two years been tamed by the majority of careful owners due, in no small part, to the efforts of a small band of dedicated shareware virus killer authors.

However, for those green users still wet

Digital diseases

behind the ears, the virus remains probably the most deadly threat to trouble-free Amiga use, and it is for those new owners that this article is repeated every year.

Having said that, treating the threat of viruses with contempt – usually brought about by the mistaken belief that today's virus killer will work tomorrow – is often the downfall of more experienced users, so we might all benefit from a refresher course.

There are two stages to virus security – prevention and cure. The first is immeasurably easier than the second and more effective, but it is surprising, judging from the number of readers' letters on the subject, just how many people either don't know

the basic rules or never apply them.

Follow the guidelines laid out in this article and you should never suffer the agonising and strangely humiliating experience of viral infection. Fail to stick to a strict regimen of precautions, and heartache will – eventually – follow as surely as day follows night. Let's identify

the enemy. A computer virus is a small piece of code whose primary purpose in life is to copy itself from one disk to another.

Secondary considerations depend upon the virus, but range from simple repeated duplication, damaging enough in itself, to deliberate criminal damage of data and program files.

I say criminal, because it is illegal to knowingly spread a virus, let alone invent one of your own, and if any of our readers can ever prove that someone has carried out such a sad and pathetic act I would hope they'd do the decent thing and call the police immediately.

Boot block viruses

The majority of Amiga viruses are known as boot block viruses, because they hide in the tiny amount of space kept to one side for the boot block on a disk.

Without a boot block, no disk will auto-boot, and without a special custom boot block, few protected commercial games will work, so even the most primitive boot block viruses, sometimes irresponsibly described as "harmless", can be fatal.

A second and less numerous type is the file virus, so called because it exists on a

Some basic safeguards to avoid infection

To avoid virus infection, the easiest precaution is to keep all disks write-protected unless data is to be saved to them. Despite scare-mongering reports a couple of years ago, it is impossible for a write-protected disk to become infected.

Step two is to find a good virus checker. Unlike some supposedly expert advisors, we won't attempt to list the various checkers in order of effectiveness, as the only useful checker is the best checker.

For example, a recent article in another Amiga magazine rated VirusZ at number five in a list of ten best checkers.

Though good in its day, VirusZ development has for long been abandoned by its author, Steve Tibbet, who made no bones about the fact that the program's design made updating it for all new viruses a tiresome and ultimately pointless task.

Since the middle of 1991, VirusX has been obsolete and, though still touted by most PD libraries (and the odd foolish magazine), should be avoided at all costs.

Similarly, some supposedly good virus killers have proved, after prolonged use, to be either inaccurate or inefficient. Master Virus Killer is buggy in many of its versions and

refuses to work as a background 24-hour checker, limiting its otherwise comprehensive virus detecting ability. Nuke, which many now mistakenly believe to be the best checker, has an annoying knack of "finding" Saddam on a clean disk, even when the disk-validator has been copied from a fresh disk.

Such popularly promoted checkers, though worthy programming feats in their own right, should only be purchased from PD pundits as second-line defences and used in conjunction with a tried and tested checker until their effectiveness under fire can be gauged.

Step three is simply to apply the rules we have been urged to adopt for sexual relations – minimise your partnerships and always use a condom.

Translated to computer virus speak, this means don't swap and change disks with others whose virus defences may be nil, and when a new disk is introduced to your system, make sure that it has been thoroughly virus checked.

By applying the three golden rules, no user need fear his or her disks. Ignore them and it won't be long before uncle Saddam or cousin Travelling Jack pops by to say hello.

Until recently S-VHS hardware has been way out of reach for the average videophile. Fortunately prices are tumbling and the time could be right to take the next step up.

We'll start our adventure with G-Lock the very latest offering from CVP, a unit which leads the field in the battle against inflated pricing by retailing at literally half that of its Hama counterpart. The question is, does the cash saving mean missing features?

The unit itself is a fairly bland black beastie offering RGB input from the Amiga via a 23-pin flexi connector plus the genlocking essential of an RGB pass-through which connects directly to either a monitor or at worst a modulator.

In addition to the RGB options sits a rather curious joystick connection which serves a dual purpose as both a power supply and means of input for the unit's secondary role as a colour splitter – ideal for both Vidi and Digiview.

Along the side await the essential I/O connections which for input consist of two CVBS/RCA phono and a single S-VHS/Hi-8 mini-DIN. On the other side of the I/O coin await a single RCA phono out and of course the essential S-VHS mini DIN.

Pleasant

The final and rather surprising I/O option concerns sound. Again connected via a selection of phono's boasting two separate audio ins and a single/mono audio out.

Right to a pleasant addition I must admit it's not exactly the ultimate audio/video answer primarily due to its mono only output.

To accommodate the feature software sliders allow adjustment of both bass and treble plus the overall volume. In addition a selection gadgets allow you to toggle between input channels or alternatively mix both signals into a single combined output.

Unfortunately there's no way to adjust the input gain of the audio signals. As a result, the relative mix between the two sources is defined purely by the strength of the incoming signals.

As a consequence you may still require an external mixer to achieve the desired effect, thereby cancelling out the advantage of the internal mixing options. Not perhaps the definitive answer to audio/video but nevertheless a worthy addition.

Once the software and hardware are safely installed, it's time to boot-up – a pro-

S-specialists



cess which involves first activating the unit and then reboot to run the attendant software.

When active you're presented with the basic video control panel which can be toggled to reveal alternate audio panel. As the audio options have already been mentioned we'll stick to video control which consists of a signal indicator, a selection of sliders controlling colour, contrast, saturation and brightness – all of which relate to the outgoing video signal.

Following these come the three input gadgets which toggle between the two CVBS inputs and of course the single S-VHS/Hi-8. Switching between them is instantaneous and can be achieved either via the

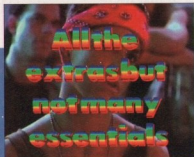

control panel, a hot key combination or ARexx.

Alas G-Lock can only process a single video input at a time so there's no way to cross-fade between sources. In addition the connection of both CVBS and S-VHS simultaneously – although possible – is not recommended as signal interference between the two formats can cause real problems.

Although cross-fading is out of the question the unit does offer basic input switching via ARexx, illustrated by an accompanying script which fades one composite source to black, swaps inputs and returns with the second. Due to CVBS/S-VHS incompatibility this can only be achieved between the two CVBS signals.

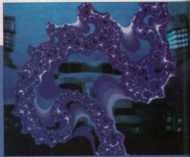

essentials of modern Amiga genlocking in the form of an external option which simply operates as a pass-through for the incoming video signal.

This is followed by the Amiga option which in effect is the reverse of the above showing only the Amiga's output completely bypassing the incoming video signal.

Next comes overlay, the bread and butter of any self-respecting genlock, providing the classic combination of Amiga graphics above the incoming video signal.

Lastly we arrive at the reverse option which simply reverses the effect of the aforementioned overlay making colour zero opaque while transforming all other colours of the overlaid graphic transparent to the incoming signal.

Below the keying options await the three definable setup gadgets which allow you to specify a complete keying and signal processing environment – including audio options – which can then be saved or toggled as and when required.

In addition to the basic audio and video controls another four control panels await – all of which are devoted almost entirely to G-Lock's primary strength of signal processor.

Extensive

As you can see from the control panel screenshots, the support for signal processing is very extensive and reveals G-Lock's real niche as a professional signal processing tool.

From the fourth advanced panel you can take advantage of the chromakey functions built into the AGA allowing you to specify a selection of colours as the keying channel. In addition you can also select any of the 8-bit channels as a keying medium in the style of the EGS.

As the more astute readers may have already spotted there's been virtually no mention of wipes, fades or indeed dissolves, and with good reason, as there are virtually none on offer, with the only exception being the aforementioned input switching.

Above all else this is the hardware's most damning indictment. Apart for the basic keying quality of a genlock – which admittedly is excellent – fades and dissolves are perhaps the most important feature of any general purpose genlock.

Without the ability to subtly move between keying states a genlock becomes almost useless to the average punter. Not only does G-Lock refrain from keying transformation either via AReks, hot keys or hardware but it also offers no means of adjusting the amount of static effect applied in any of the keying modes.

The end result of this "all or nothing"

Getting connected

Towards the rear of the Hama unit await the essential input/output options including composite and of course S-VHS. Alas there's only a single set for each format and alas just like the G-Lock there's no way to crossfade between them.

Having said that the unit does boast automatic single switching when either source is detected meaning that unlike the G-Lock the Hama is perfectly happy with both VHS and S-VHS recorders connected simultaneously.

Alongside the selection of video ports comes a CVBS digitiser out and a joystick connection which works in conjunction with both Dig-View Gold and De-Lux-View to automatically generate colour separations which are then sent sequentially to the aforementioned hardware.

The only other notable feature is the power rocker switch which curiously enough doesn't actually play a part when using the unit in conjunction with the Amiga.

This option has been added purely because of the Hama's secondary role as an RGB-to-Pal or Y/C encoder. When used solely for this purpose the unit need not be connected to the Amiga and because it is then deprived of its primary power source a 12V DC PSU is required.

The only remaining connection is that of the RGB signal from the Amiga which slots into the rear of the unit and re-emerges in the form of the essential RGB pass-through, which like G-Lock connects to an attendant monitor or modulator.

approach means that G-Lock will almost certainly have a very limited appeal to the mass market. Unless you're the proud owner of an AS real editing system, a separate video mixer and God knows what else, attempting to employ G-Lock with any degree of subtlety would be at best a difficult proposition.

For the average user with an Amiga, a titler and suitable video hardware it's safe to say G-Lock isn't the ideal choice, unless of course your artistic aspirations stretch no further than long standard overlays and inversions with no intro.

Having suffered a severe slap in the face as far as punter appeal is concerned, it must be said G-Lock will have a degree of appeal to professionals, primarily thanks to its unrivalled signal processing and transcoding talents which leave all other Amiga friendly S-VHS units far dead.

Used with Scala or other such multimedia

applications as a multimedia tool, G-Lock could nevertheless be useful for, say, corporate applications, where some of its options would not be required anyway.

Still, even with this on its side I can only envisage a select few who would be willing to invest such a sizeable sum for a signal processor which happens to boast basic genlocking as almost an afterthought.

It's possible you may have read a rather conflicting review of G-Lock in another surprisingly popular Amiga magazine. If that's the case it only goes to prove the old adage that you can't always believe what you read, especially if it doesn't appear in AC...

Hama

Although the Hama editorial is dwarfed by the G-Lock section, it's by no means a reflection on the product. The situation comes about simply due to the relative simplicity of what is a straightforward quality product with all the essentials plus a reasonable spattering of extras.

The most noticeable feature of the Hama is its overall look which basically screams quality from the moment it emerges from its packaging.

The most dominant feature must be the twin ladders on the right of the unit, both of which are dampened to allow smooth and accurate transition between the Amiga and video signals.

To the left of the aforesaid sliders lurk the six video processing controls, the upper row of which allow variation of the RGB mix by a factor of plus or minus 30 percent, resulting in bizarre colourisation effects beneath the overlaid or inverted Amiga graphics.

Below the RGB controls await the chroma – alias colour, contrast and finally luminance, otherwise known as brightness. As you might imagine these final three are primarily concerned with getting the very best from the available source.

Having said that, even here a few tricks can be applied. For example a simple effect such as overlaying colour Amiga graphics on top of an initially black and white video source will then gradually transforms to full colour. Simple but nevertheless effective.

Beneath the signal controls sit keying toggled buttons which like the G-Lock's software alternatives consist of a bypass, Genlock/Amiga and finally invert all of which operate in exactly the same manner as their G-Lock counterparts.

As you've probably guessed the Hama is essentially a simply product which easily wins an award as one of the simplest plug-in and go products on the market.

The actual keying quality in all states is nothing short of breathtaking especially when working with a S-VHS source. As for ease of use, again the Hama scores high with key mode switching and signal processing beginning a simple matter of tapping the odd button and twiddling the occasional



knob. The only slight problem concerning changes on the fly appears when switching between key modes while the effect is fully applied, as occasionally screen glitches necessitate a fade out prior to application.

Although almost all of the above is basically a glowing testament to Hama's talents there is one area in which it does suffer. If you've happened to glance at the product box there's a chance it's already been spotted – the jaw-dropping price of the unit.

Although excellent I must admit I'd like to see a few more whistles and bells for the £740 asking price. Such enhancements could include audio support and crossfades between – an increased number of available inputs. Still having had my almost inevitable moan the Hama still remains the ideal choice for any would-be professional. If you can afford it, buy it. If you can't, start saving...

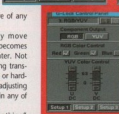

I am an Amiga user who currently owns an unexpanded A1500. I wish to expand my machine, but want to be able to upgrade to Commodore's new mid-range computer when it becomes available (probably the A2200, or A2400).

If I buy a Commodore 1960 multi-sync monitor, will I be able to use it without a flicker fixer? I have heard that some of these monitors suffer from various problems (pin-cushioning etc.). Is there a test that I can make in the shop to see if the monitor suffers from this problem before I buy it?

Can you suggest a hard disk drive (around 52Mb) which is suitable for an Amiga (ie auto-parking and auto-booting), is reasonable cheap and would be most likely to have hardware compatibility with any new Amigas?

Also, Power Computing are selling a rewritable optical disk drive. Can this device be booted from under Workbench 2 and how reliable are they?

Workbench screen and see if the left and right sides of the screen curve in or out.

As for which hard drive to buy, choice would have to be a Quantum 52Mb with either a CVP or a hard controller.

Unfortunately Quantums are slow compared to the new range of hard controllers and the new Amiga 1200/2200/2400 machines all come with IDE controllers on-board which are extremely slow compared to SCSI controllers.

Some companies are planning to produce controllers for the new range of Amigas, though - including Commodore themselves.

The optical disk drive you mentioned is quite a good product and can be booted from either Workbench 1.3, 2 or 3. When I tried the Floptical it handled very well indeed.

PCM cards

I hope that you can provide me with a definitive answer regarding the new card slot of my CDTV.

The article in the December issue of your magazine regarding the future of the CDTV proclaimed that the peripherals now becoming available for the A600 would be compatible with CDTV via its standard PCMCIA card slot.

It was therefore with great enthusiasm that I reached for the phone

Does the AA chipset outperform a 386?

As the owner of an almost obsolete Amiga A1500, I was wondering what would be the next logical upgrade step now that Commodore have scrapped the promised A2200 model.

I already have a 16MHz 68020 accelerator with 32-bit fast RAM and 52Mb hard drive. I use my A1500 for just about everything fun but which isn't actually useful - programming, MIDI sequencing, games, writing the occasional letter, artwork (well I think it's art, anyway) and ray-tracing.

Can the AA chipset be fitted in the A3000, and do Commodore have any plans to sell future A3000s with the AA chipset as standard?

And the 64-thousand dollar question - what about the cost? I have thought many times about smashing my piggy-bank and getting an SVGA-PC/386. Only the AA chipset would convince me not to. Time is running out, Commodore!

Just how fast can that monster processor access chip memory? A megabyte of fast memory never seems to go very far these days! By the way, how much does it cost for full-speed expansion RAM?

Is it really zero-wait-state at 25MHz when you disable the caches? Is a 68881/68882 an optional extra? I haven't yet aspired to a maths processor on my current system, although I enjoy a bit of ray-tracing.

I also want to play games as well as use serious applications. How compatible are games with the 68030? My

68020 has been very poor in this area. The only games I have which take advantage of it are Stunt Car Racer and Formula 1 Grand Prix. Most games don't even load.

I swear that Archer Maclean is trying to play a tune with the disk drive stepper motor on the A1500. What worries me is that even fairly recent games such as Jimmy White's Whirlwind Snooker don't run on my 68020.

To write in small print on a sticker on the box "no compatibility with the Amiga A3000 and some 68030 chips" is just not on - any PC owner would have a fit if a game didn't run on his 80386 PC but worked fine on his friend's 8086 PC.

Now I've got that mini-editorial off my chest, thank you for taking the time to read this letter. My apologies for asking so many questions!

Unfortunately it's hard to suggest which machine you should consider next, mainly because you use your machine for quite a number of applications.

Face it, is it compatibility you want or a better machine than your present one? If it's a better machine you want then go for the A4000.

OK, it costs around £2,000 plus VAT for a 52Mb hard drive, 2Mb chip memory and 4Mb fast memory machine, but it's definitely worth it.

Also Commodore have still got plans to produce

the A2200 and possibly the A2400, which will have the new AA chipset and probably a 68020 or 68030 and some internal expansion slots.

It's not clear if they will come with the maths processor on board already or if it's a factor upgrade. It is unlikely that Commodore will produce an A3000 with the AA chipset in, as the A3000 used to be at the top of the range Amiga and now the A4000 has definitely stolen that position.

As for how much memory costs, it's about £50 per Mb. The A4000 uses 72-pin SIMMs and yes, it is now wait-state access.

As I mentioned earlier, it's hard to upgrade to new machine with more advanced chips fitted in without running into compatibility problems.

Commodore have gone some way to try to rectify this problem by including a hefty hardware downgrade option which is triggered by holding down both mouse buttons while rebooting the machine.

This presents you with a menu asking you what graphics mode you wish to boot up in, and if you wish to use CPU caching - although it must be said that it doesn't work with everything.

You're quite right - software houses should produce more attention not only to testing their software on all machines, but also clearly marking their products for compatibility.

enter one of the 4Mb memory cards recently being advertised for the A600. To my dismay I was informed that the CDTV credit card slot only supports the small and extremely expensive personal memory cards.

Undeterred, I contacted the dealer from whom I had originally purchased the CDTV, who stated that, yes indeed, the CDTV memory card slot is a standard PCMCIA but unfortunately they could not supply me with a 4Mb card. Several other phone calls resulted in a roughly equal split of affirmative and negative responses regarding the nature of the CDTV slot.

I therefore determined to seek the opinion of the perpetrator of this confusion, the mighty Commodore itself. After all, if anyone should know then they would.

Unfortunately I was solidly refused access to any part of the organisation other than the telephone switchboard and referred back to my dealer.

It must be said that with an attitude such as this Commodore do not deserve the loyalty which I and many others have shown in the past.

Any gripes aside, please could you resolve my problem, since £200 is a lot to spend on an ill-informed experiment.

The answer to your question is yes, the PCM slot is identical on both the A600 and the CDTV, so the memory upgrades should work, but some software and hardware options which take advantage of the PCM slot might not.

This is because the CDTV is running under Workbench 1.3 and the A600 is under Workbench 2.0 machine, so you would have to check software available on PCM cards for compatibility with Workbench 1.3 machines.

One of the main problems with CDTV is the lack of memory. The CD drive needs quite a lot just to operate, and it

may be worthwhile investing in a chip memory upgrade which will give you 2Mb of chip memory.

There are quiet a few companies offering this upgrade, called Mega-Chip. Try Alternative Image on 0533 440041.

If you're having trouble getting hold of PCM memory cards try getting in touch with either Silica on 081-309 1111 or Power Computing on 0234 843388.

Games compatibility

I have an old Amiga 500 with 1Mb of memory which I bought five years ago purely to play games on. I now have a massive collection of games - I especially enjoy role-playing adventures which I have collected quite a lot.

My machine is currently being repaired, having a new internal drive fitted, as I am told the I/O errors and crashing that kept happening when trying to resurrect characters was due to a faulty drive.

What I would like to know is, when my machine finally conks out, which computer I should be setting my sights on for games only? It must be compatible with as many of my existing games as possible.

Unfortunately you're in the same boat as a lot of people with existing software collections who want to upgrade to a better machine.

It isn't possible to move up to a new machine like the A600 or A1200 and still be able to use all of your existing software. In our tests the A600 is definitely more compatible, with around 90 per cent of existing software working fine.

The A1200, on the other hand, is only about 50 per cent compatible, but once software houses start writing games specifically for this machine it will be definitely the best upgrade choice.

Citizen 224 printer. I started to answer correspondence using KindWords 3 which has up to now been very good. Recently though, as I type, odd letters have been appearing in the text - "j" and "p" were the most common.

I slowed my typing speed down to ensure that I made no mistakes, but these odd insertions kept occurring.

Have you any ideas as to what the problem is? I thought maybe it was KindWords so I changed to Scribble but the same thing still happens!

It sounds as though you have a problem with your hardware and not your software. What I would do is open up a CLI window and then start typing.

If the problem still occurs then check your keypad is set correctly in your startup-sequence. If this doesn't work, get your Amiga checked out by a reputable dealer.

Make a disk

Is the quality of your CoverDisks slipping? Or has my A500 started to go senile? On the November disk, loading Cybernetix caused the machine to crash with a guru message.

This also happened to a friend with a 1.3 machine. I expected an update to rectify this in the December issue, but as there wasn't one. Is it an isolated fault?

Also, on the December disk loading Home Accounts to the Make a Disk icon results in a message "disk is write protected", even when it isn't. Any helps?

Well, first things first. Cybernetix won't run on a Plus machine unless it has fast memory as well as chip memory, but you can use a small program called Degradar which is on our CoverDisk this month to rectify the problem.

As for your second problem with Home Accounts, I'm afraid your not alone. The problem lies with Workbench 2. When you click on the Make a Disk icon, your Amiga then copies all the necessary files to RAM, then instructs you to insert the disk which is to be initialised.

This is where the problem begins. Because you booted up with the CoverDisk write-protected your Amiga doesn't bother to check the drive again so it just presumes the disk is write-protected.

All you have to do is boot up with the CoverDisk write-enabled and all your problems should be over. But remember to make a back-up of the CoverDisk first.

PC compatibility

I own an A500 v1.2, and was on the verge of upgrading to either an A1500/2000, or whatever might be arriving in the next month or so.

Unfortunately, I have now reached the point where I need to be able to take work home and, you guessed it, holding DrawPerfect on the PC is the order of the day.

Lacking a bottomless wallet, the time has come where I am going to have to choose between a new Amiga and buying a PC compatible. I'm afraid that my computing knowledge is minimal, and the idea of fighting with a bridgeboard without help is not appealing.

With that in mind, do you have any reasonable suggestions as to how I can stay with the Amiga, a machine for which I have had a great respect having seen the PC in action, and yet be able to actually go home at night?

I can see why you might consider buying a PC but it's not needed. If you buy say an A1200, which is able to read and write PC disks directly, then invest in WordPerfect 2, you will be able to bring home documents written on a PC using WordPerfect, work on them then take them back to work. The PC at work will be able to read it back in with no problem at all.

As for importing pictures from the PC, again this is quite a simple task. Simply save your pictures on the PC in almost any format and then use a graphics converter on the Amiga.

You can get a graphics converter from most good PD libraries or if you find they don't convert as well as you want, AdPro 2 definitely will. AdPro 2 will convert virtually all formats of graphics into any graphics format you require.

The new AGA graphics chip set brings a vivid new range of colour to the Amiga line.

Denny Atkin reports

True colours

Around the beginning of 1986 a group of Amiga enthusiasts met at my local computer shop and crowded around the screen of an Amiga 1000 displaying one of the first digitised 4096-colour HAM pictures.

"Amazing," one of them said, "it looks just like a TV picture." I don't know where that guy is now, but the poor fellow would have probably fainted dead on the spot if I could have shown him an AGA-mode picture that day.

Commodore's new A1200 and A4000 computers include the first truly enhanced chip set since the Amiga's introduction. The original chip set (OCS) was revolutionary for its time, with 32 and 4096-colour graphics and what was, at the time, unparalleled graphics speed.

The Enhanced Chip Set released a couple of years ago was nowhere near as innovative – it expanded the amount of memory available for graphics and let users run both PAL and NTSC software, but the new reso-

lutions it added slowed down the machine considerably and offered a paltry four colours from a palette of 64. Amiga users were disappointed.

I've heard very few complaints about the newest Amiga chip set, though. With a range of 16 million colours, 256 or 700,000+ colours available on-screen at once, and a four-times graphics speedup, who could gripe?

Oh, sure, you say, but with those improvements it's got to break most of my

software, right? Wrong! Perhaps the most amazing thing about the AGA chip set is that it's almost completely compatible with programs written for the earlier OCS and ECS chips.

The AGA chip set started life in the summer of 1990 as a project code-named Pandora. Commodore's Bob Raible was in charge of the project and designed the Lia chip, which replaced Denise; Bill Thomas was in charge of Alice, which replaced Agnus. By the time the chipset reached pro-

TOTYPE form it had been renamed AA (for Advanced Amiga), and was the heart of a prototype enhanced Amiga called the A3000+.

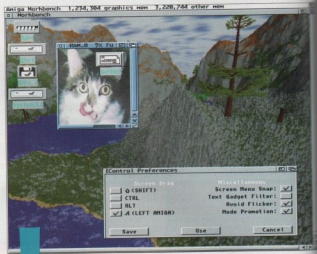
Although the A3000+ never made it past the prototype stage (about 50 machines were built for use for software and hardware development), the AA chip set was approved for a new Amiga, originally named the A3400. Designed by Dave Haynie and Greg Berlin, this system eventually evolved into the Amiga 4000 released late last year.

By the time the chip set was released in the A4000, the name was changed again, to Advanced Graphics Architecture, or AGA (there seems to be a sort of unofficial campaign going on amongst Amiga software companies and magazines to keep the AA name, but AGA is the official Commodore moniker).

Older Amigas

This chip set is standard in the new A1200 and A4000, but can't be plugged into older Amigas. One of the big advantages of AGA is its enhanced speed – in most operations it's four times faster than ECS. Unfortunately, the latter chip architecture requires much faster access to the computer's chip RAM, and there was no way to get a performance boost with AGA and remain compatible with older Amigas.

If you've got an older Amiga and want access to the new AGA mode, it's time to buy a new computer. Although it's feasible to create a replacement motherboard for the A500 and other classic Amigas with the AGA chips on it, such a board would prob-

AGA Amigas don't have de-interlacing circuitry built in like the chip in the Amiga 3000. There's no need for one, since non-interlaced equivalents of all the original resolutions exist now that colour depths have been increased in the hi-res, non-interlaced modes.

For instance, instead of opening a 640 x 512 16-colour interlaced screen, you can have the operating system open a 640 x 512 16-colour non-interlaced screen that doesn't flicker. This wasn't possible on ECS Amigas because the non-interlaced resolutions with 256 vertical lines were limited to four colours.

AGA supports two methods for opening such screens. Programs designed with AGA in mind can use the new ASL screen mode requester to allow you to select which resolution you want to run in.

If you have a monitor that will handle VGA scan rates (more on this soon), you can choose a high-res, non-interlaced mode, but if you're using a standard 1084-style monitor you might choose 640 x 256 to avoid interface flicker.

But what about those older programs that don't know about AGA? If they open by default in annoying flickering modes, how do you tell them about the new AGA equivalents?

In the IControl preferences program there's a button marked Mode Promotion. If you toggle this gadget on, most older programs that request an interlaced screen resolution will instead open on a non-interlaced screen of equivalent resolution.

So programs like PageStream, for instance, can now be opened on a 640 x 512 x 16 non-interlaced screen.

One of the other advantages of installing a de-interlacer on classic Amigas was that it got rid of those annoying scan lines between rows of pixels. If you have mode-promotion turned on, even lo-res, non-interlaced 320 x 200 screens will open on VGA scan-rate screens, free of ugly scan-lines.

A few programs, such as DeluxePaint IV and Art Department Professional, explicitly specify interlaced screens using AmigaDOS 2 calls. Such programs aren't affected by mode-promotion and will come up in flickering interlace mode even with promotion turned on, due to compatibility considerations.

However, there are a number of hacks available in the public domain, such as Steve Tibbett's DoubleX, that will force all screens to be promoted regardless of how they open their screens.

My cost almost as much as an A1200 to create.

So just how big an improvement is AGA? It's about as big a jump over the original Amiga graphics capabilities as those were over IBM's four-colour CGA graphics.

The original Amiga chips had a total palette of 4,096 colours, which translates to 16 levels of each primary colour. AGA increases squares the number of colours available, offering 256 levels of each primary colour for a grand total of 16 million colours available to choose from.

And you can now get more of those colours on-screen at once as well. While the original Amiga graphics chips were limited to displaying 32 colours (not counting tricks like HalfBrite and HAM) on lo-res screens and 16 colours on hi-res screens, the AGA chips can display up to 256 colours in all resolutions.

Modifying

The real fun comes in HAM mode, though. Now that HAM has eight bitplanes to play with (thus the name HAM8 for the new mode), it can display over 262,000 colours on-screen at once. The original HAM mode created new colours by modifying 16 base colours; the new mode has 64 base colours to choose from.

This not only means you can get more colours on the screen, but it also virtually eliminates the colour fringing evident on original HAM files. Although Commodore advertises HAM8 as a 262,000 colour mode, that's not a real limitation.

With careful picking of the 64 base colours, you can actually get up to 700,000 colours in the highest resolution graphics modes!

The AGA graphics chips don't provide higher resolutions than were available with ECS, though. In fact, the available resolutions are exactly the same as on an A600 running Workbench 2.1 – 320 x 256, 640 x 256, 1,280 x 256, 800 x 300, 640 x 480, and the interlaced versions of those modes, which have double the vertical resolution.

But there's a big difference – while some of those modes were limited to 16 or even four colours with ECS, they can all display 256 colours or even HAM8 with AGA.

One thing to keep in mind, and this applies to ECS as well as AGA, is that the

Amiga chip sets no longer have fixed built-in resolutions – they're completely programmable.

An example benefit of this programmability is the 800 x 300/600 mode added in Workbench 2.1 – Commodore added a completely new graphics mode without requiring any upgraded hardware. This means that industrious programmers will be able to create new custom screen modes.

The colour palette isn't the only thing that was improved in the AGA chip set. The sprite system has also been completely revamped. Sprites can now be up to 64 pixels wide, which means the entire screen can be covered with sprites.

Blocky

Under OCS and ECS, sprites were always built from lo-res pixels, which made them a look rather blocky, especially on a hi-res screen. With the AGA chips sprites can now be lo-res, hi-res, or even super hi-res, no matter what resolution the screen is currently in. With hi-res sprites you can finally make that blocky arrow pointer look a lot less clunky.

Sprites can now be placed with much more precision. With previous chip sets, they only moved in lo-res pixel increments, which meant there were only 320 horizontal positions possible for a sprite.

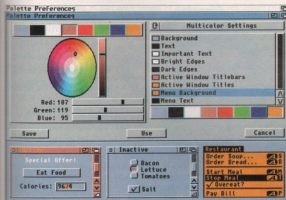
This made precise editing on hi-res paint program screens a bit challenging sometimes. Under AGA the sprite now moves in Super hi-res pixel increments, meaning you can place the pointer with precision in any screen mode.

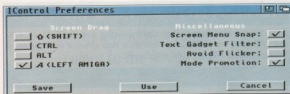
As mentioned earlier, the new graphics chips are much faster than the original Amiga chips. Previous chip sets talked to Chip RAM 16 bits at a time – even on the

otherwise 32-bit Amiga 3000.

The AGA chip set gets a two-time speed increase automatically because it has a 32-bit read/write path to chip RAM, allowing it to move twice as much data every time it accesses graphics memory.

However, that's not all! Newer RAM technology lets the AGA chips do two fetches from Chip RAM in a single memory cycle. This gives you the performance of a 64-bit chip set – four times that of the original Amiga chips.

If you've ever tried to run your Workbench screen in 16-colour mode, especially with overscan, you've seen a fully-saturated chip set.

Your entire Amiga system slows down because the custom chips and processor are fighting for access to your Amiga's RAM. With AGA's 4x bandwidth the chips work so much faster that you can run in hi-res, 256-colour mode without impacting processor speed at all.

Bandwidth

Running a hi-res, 16-colour Workbench screen on an AGA Amiga actually uses up the same amount of bandwidth as a lo-res, two-colour screen does on a classic Amiga.

The new chips are so fast that, when you use the new Initiation double-buffering routines in your programs, you can actually create 60-frames-per-second animations in even the highest-resolution mode, without taking over the machine!

The blitter in the AGA chips is actually the same as the ECS blitter – it's no faster at actually performing blits, however, blitter-intensive graphics can still be much faster

under AGA. Since the blitter has to share the RAM bus with the CPU and video display, it operates faster now since the graphics chips take up less of the bus time.

The AGA chips are amazingly compatible with the original Amiga chips. When running programs that only support 12-bit colour values (four bits each of red, green, and blue), such as early versions of DeluxePaint, the operating system simply copies those bits into both the upper and lower 12 bits of a register, maintaining the appearance of 12-bit colour.

No problems

The vast majority of productivity programs that I've tried to run on the Amiga 4000 and 1200 have no problems with the new AGA chips or with mode promotion.

Games and especially demos are another matter, though, and many tend to flake out (non-graphic intensive games such as Sierra adventures and Maxis' Sim series work fine, though, even supporting mode promotion).

There's a solution for those programs that don't like the AGA chips. The chips can be told to turn off all the features that didn't exist in earlier versions of the chip set, thus increasing compatibility dramatically.

Simply hold down both mouse buttons when booting the computer to reach the boot menu. Click the Display Options button and you'll be given a choice not only of NTSC or PAL displays, but also of which chips you want the system to think it has – Original, Enhanced, or AGA.

Simply picking Enhanced fixes most programs (you may also want to click Boot Options and turn off the processor cache as well to increase compatibility further).

Booting a game with a custom boot block automatically selects ECS mode – you have to run the 3.0 version of SetPatch in your Startup-Sequence to activate the new AGA chip set features.

Most of the programs that require you to deactivate the AGA features have problems because they break Commodore's guidelines and attack the Amiga's hardware directly, bypassing the operating system.

If these game and demo programmers want to start creating stuff that supports AGA, they're going to have to break down and finally read the manuals and learn how to do things the right way. Commodore doesn't guarantee that the next generation of Amiga graphics chips (code-named AAA) is going to be register-compatible with the AGA chips.

This means that any hackers who hit the AGA hardware directly now are going to find that their programs break on the next-generation Amigas. To keep this from happening, Commodore isn't going to document how to directly program the video hardware – we want programmers to go through the operating system.

The speedy AGA chips and the faster processors found in AGA Amigas, combined with things like Intuition double-buffered graphics support, should provide programmers with all the power they need to create fast-action simulations or dazzling demos without breaking all the rules.

Commodore's official word is that anyone who bangs the AGA hardware is going to break in the future. This means we should see a lot more games that run from the Workbench in the future, and that you should probably not get too attached to

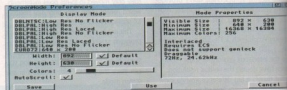

AGA-supporting games that don't work from the Workbench.

AGA is an incredible improvement over the original Amiga chips, and the new colour depth and Super VGA-like resolution support once again puts the Amiga ahead of PC clones graphically.

But Commodore's not stopping there. They've announced publicly that they're already working on future chip sets that will enhance sound (one area untouched in the AGA chips), provide true 24-bit graphics, and speed the Amiga's graphics by yet another magnitude.

Thinking of something more impressive than AGA is mind-boggling, though. If you've got to your dealer to sneak a peek at the new A1200's AGA graphics, you'd better leave your credit cards at home, or you may find yourself having to explain why your Amiga 500 has suddenly been replaced.



Choosing the right monitor

The AGA chip set gains its resolution flexibility because it has programmable scan rates. However, to take advantage of the chip set's flexibility, you'll need a flexible monitor.

Unfortunately, you'll actually need a monitor more flexible than the vast majority of those on the market. The original Amiga chip set output at a horizontal scan rate of 15.75kHz, and this is the rate supported by the original Amiga monitors such as the 1084.

This scan rate supports resolutions up to 640 x 256 non-interlaced, and 640 x 512 interlaced (more with overscan). The new hi-res, non-interlaced modes added with ECS require a monitor that scans at the VGA scan rate of 31.5kHz.

The Amiga 3000's deinterlacer circuitry and add-on flicker fixers also require a 31.5kHz monitor.

You have three monitor choices with an AGA Amiga – a 1084-style 15.75kHz monitor, a VGA 31.5kHz monitor, or a multiscan monitor that supports horizontal scan rates ranging from 15.75kHz to 31.5kHz (A1200 users

can also use a composite monitor or TV set). If you want to be able to use all the AGA screen modes, you really only have one choice – the multiscan.

If you choose to hang on to your old 1084 when upgrading to an AGA Amiga, you'll have access to all of the new colour modes including HAM8, but none of the new hi-res, non-interlaced resolutions.

You'll still be much better off with AGA, since you'll get the faster screen updates and the new colour modes (television sets and composite monitors offer the same modes as a 1084-style monitor, albeit in a much blurrier form. Still, the colour PAL composite output is much sharper than on an ASDG-equipped AS500).

Using a VGA-only monitor is going to cause most users problems. These monitors don't support the standard old Amiga resolutions, just the double-scanned 31.5kHz modes. If you run mostly Workbench-launchable programs, such as wordprocessors, paint programs, and desktop publishing software, you'll be OK because you can turn on mod-promotion and have all those

screens run in 31.5kHz mode. However, any disks that must be booted from, such as games, will come up in 15.75kHz mode, which will just look like a scrambled mess on a VGA-only monitor.

Also, the Guru and Boot Mode screens come up in 15.75kHz mode, so you won't be able to view these on a VGA-only monitor. Only consider one of these monitors if you never play games and if you don't need access to the Boot Mode screens.

The best choice is a multiscan monitor that support horizontal scan rates between 15.75kHz and 31.5kHz. Unfortunately, such monitors are somewhat more expensive than the other two choices.

Be careful, as many modern multiscan monitors won't sync as low as 15.75kHz and will only be as useful as a VGA-only monitor when used with an AGA Amiga.

One of the best choices is Commodore's 1940, which of course supports all the Amiga scan rates. With a wide-range multiscan you can access every mode the AGA Amiga offers.

HAM has always been a troublesome medium in which to work. Though capable of impressive effects and colourful static graphics, it was always a non-starter for games purposes, and less than useful even for most animations.

Graphics produced in Hold And Modify mode suffered from much larger file sizes than their 32-colour or Halfbrite (64-colour) cousins, and in addition there was the dreaded HAM 'fringing'.

This effect, which crops up when HAM pictures are being created by hand or edited, rather than rendered direct from a ray tracing package, is the inevitable result of the compromise which lies at the heart of HAM.

Of the 6-bits which make up every HAM pixel, only four are used for colour data. The other two are used to calculate screen colours by modifying one colour in respect to the others around it.

In arithmetical terms, four bits give 16 true colours, but the extra two bits lead to this figure being multiplied by 16 twice (because the older chips are 16-bit chips), and 16 x 16 x 16 is 4,096.

Subsequent faffing about on-screen can often lead to rather inappropriate colours being selected, and when screen values are disturbed, such as when the user cuts and pastes a brush, so much messing about with colours goes on that the poor old 6-bit HAM standard can't cope. Fringing is the result, and a messy result it is too.

With the new HAM, or 8-bit HAM, many users might be bewildered as to how so many extra colours can come from just two extra bits.

The answer is that the colour data is now made up of six bits with the usual two added for screen colour calculations, and as the graphics chips are now 32-bit, each of the two moddy bits can modify a pixel 32 times over.

True 6-bit colour leads to 256 colours, and if you multiply this figure twice by 32, you get 256 x 32 x 32 = 262,144 colours in

HAMB. Fringing is still a problem with HAMB, but as there are now so many more colours, and as the mode can be displayed in much higher resolutions, the fringing which does develop is much less obvious than with HAM6.

In addition, the AGA Lisa and Alice chips (best thought of as replacements for Denise and Agnus respectively) do their best to minimise the damage. Result?

The first AGA-capable paint package is at last available in the shape of an updated DPaint 4.1. Stevie Kennedy samples its wares

Stunning, near-24-bit quality static graphics, ample testament to which you can find in the screenshots on these pages.

Problem? We're still dealing with HAM, even if in a much improved set of clothes. Early reports from excited developers working on the new machines indicated that HAMB suffered from no fringing and all sorts of wild

claims were made as to the A4000's animation capabilities.

Until the release of DPaint 4 AGA, however, there was no way to judge how accurate such claims were, as no paint package or animation creator existed which made use of the new chips. We now have a new world benchmark with which to put the AGA protigles through their paces.

DPaint 4 AGA is new in only a few respects. Virtually nothing has been changed over v4.1, and more or less the only new features are related to support for Kickstart 3.0 and the AGA chip set, but this in itself is enough to warrant a very close inspection.

When run, the package immediately shows its Kickstart 3.0 origins by offering the user a number of display modes - 30 in total - ranging from oldie worlde lo-res, hi-res, and hi-res interlace, to AA HAM, Productivity, and Super hi-res.

Workbench 3.0's attention to detail means that advanced information on pixel speeds, scan rates, and so on is available for each mode before the user makes his or her choice, enabling selection of the best mode for any particular setup.

Those using standard medium resolution monitors will be restricted in their choices, as will those using cheap, single scan rate VGA monitors.

The former will not be able to use modes which scan at frequencies of more than 15.5KHz, and the latter will

more than likely be stuck with VGA mode. Ideally, good multiscan monitors, such as the better PC models (I've used an AOC 14in with no trouble) or the Commodore 1950/60 range should be used with AGA machines if the best display results are required.

Though on the whole silent on this matter, Commodore will sooner or later have to admit that improved machines require improved and more advanced peripherals, and the 10845/Philips 8833 monitors so prevalent in today's Amiga market are not up to scratch as far as the A1200/A4000 range is concerned.

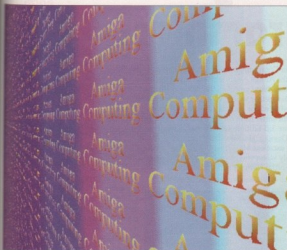
Once a display mode is chosen, the familiar DPaint 4 interface pops up and

exploration of the colour capabilities of the new Amigas can begin. Let's start with static graphics.

Apart from AA Halfbrite mode, which offers the usual 64 colours, though from a palette of 16.7 million, all modes offer at least 256 colours.

Productivity modes (referred to as Multiscan in accordance with Workbench 3.0 monitor drivers), handles up to 256 colours, and AA-HAM+ offers 262,144 from a palette of the same size.

PAL mode, the only display mode to directly support genlocking, has a similar spread of colour and resolution options, from lo-res HAM8 to Super hi-res (1280 x 512) in 256 colours.

Excellent

Static screen images generated in PAL hi-res laced 256 colours are of excellent quality, and for many purposes far more useful than HAM8. They don't suffer from fringing, animate faster, and can be used directly with a genlock.

However, for static computer art, HAM8, especially in Productivity mode, is hard to beat. In this mode, a respectable 640 x 480 screen resolution results in almost square pixels, and HAM8 makes full screen gradient fills possible without noticeable stepping. For presentation graphics, art-

work, and IFF export to other packages, this flicker-free mode will probably be the AGA user's favourite so long, of course, as that user also has a VGA monitor capable of displaying it.

The only blot on HAM8's copy book is fringing, a problem which becomes acute once a lot of detail is present on-screen. For example, it is virtually impossible to type text across a HAM8 screen, never mind a HAM8 screen which has been treated to a gradient fill. Fringing in these circumstances destroys image quality.

Though a problem associated with the HAM8 compromise rather than DPaint 4 AGA, the extent of fringing was a disappointment to everyone in the office, a sentiment which will surely be echoed by many future AGA users.

Not all is gloom, as there are ways to partially avoid fringing, but initial impressions are that HAM8 will remain, as HAM6, a mode most usefully employed by packages which render directly to it, such as ray tracers.

To give fringing a body swerve, I tried a text logo over a very gradual fading background from green to blue. The logo, utilising a red to yellow fill, could not be stamped down on the background without slight fringes developing, but it was at least a major improvement on direct typing to

screen. With a black background to the logo itself, the situation improved dramatically.

By progressively reducing the logo's black background until it was no more than a keyline, I found it possible to produce perfectly good presentation graphics with fewer HAM8 headaches, but the problem never quite goes away unless the text is surrounded by a straight-edged solid box.

Rounded outlines, such as are unavoidable with most fonts, cause greater fringing than straight edges.

Laborious

DPaint's spare page comes in very handy for such work, as it enables the user to create and cut out text in a clean environment before swapping over to the main graphic for final positioning. The process is a painfully slow and sometimes laborious one, but is capable of good results.

Animated graphics using the new AGA screen modes have caused probably the most intense speculation since the A4000 was launched. Initial reports from the Pasadena show of a full colour Sentinel animation running at 60 frames per second in NTSC interface caused heightened expectations of full screen, full motion 24-bit movie work on a standard machine.

While I wouldn't like to completely deflate these expectations, I have to at least put a dent in them, if only as far as DPaint's animation capabilities are concerned.

In anything other than lo-res Productivity mode (320 x 480), large animations are either too slow or not of sufficient quality to be used in professional video productions.

Beautiful

In hi-res PAL interface using overscan, which is the standard video mode (remember that VGA and Productivity do not support genlocking), DPaint 4 AA can churn out beautiful images, but can only animate them in a jerky and less than useful fashion.

Having seen Scala run DPaint-produced HAM8 animations smoother and quicker, the suspicion that it is the software which

is at fault rather than the hardware is a hard one to avoid.

Smaller animations in 256-colour full video spec (hi-res overscan) are possible, and animate smoothly on the A4000, but try to use half screen or larger animations and smoothness quickly falls off.

Against a black background, larger text logo animations, scrolls, and so on are excellent, so DPaint 4 AGA should suffice for high quality video titling, but video quality computer movies are, as many cynics suspected, out of the question without the use of single frame video recorders.

What can be achieved with this package far outdoes any previously available paint/animate program, though to be fair to manufacturers currently developing competition for DPaint 4 AGA, the new chips and video modes are a major factor in this.

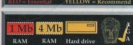
Full screen 256 animations, superb HAM8 titling complete with colour graduated text, and static images only the better 24-bit boards can better make painting and animating in AGA supremely pleasurable.

However, given an A1200 rather than an A4000, less than about 4Mb RAM, and a hard drive of less than 40Mb in capacity, much of this potential will never be realised.

A1200 owners who have read the inflated claims made by some companies and the odd press report should be prepared for disappointment if they are not ready, or cannot afford, to purchase the power peripherals to go with their power Amigas.

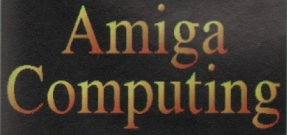

The Mac-like features, but they're rather slow

I've always liked the idea of digitisers. It is so rewarding when you eventually grab a brilliant image and spend hours fiddling with it, and it's always nice to know you have the equipment that will do the job with the least hassle.

VIDI Amiga is one such piece of equipment. It's relatively simple to use and it won't cost you an arm and a leg.

To look at, it's a bit of an uninteresting piece of kit. In the box you get the disks, a phono-to-phono cable and an anonymous

minor hassle, but I was surprised not to find one in the box, though Rombo will supply the cables on request and they are a doddle to construct at home.

The next task was the software. Usually I would recommend that large commercial packages like this be installed onto the hard drive if you have one, but in this case it doesn't seem to matter.

There is only the one disk supplied in the package so you don't have to do any disk swapping, thus it's not essential to install it to

hard disk. On booting up the program you are faced with a main screen where you can set the preferences of the grabbing and the viewing of the image and another menu which lets you enter the editing carousel and grab options.

The grabbing screen is a relatively friendly environment. The top half of the screen is taken up by the image window. In the window you see the image which the video source is producing. Colour grabs are taken in about a second, and mono grabs in real time. Along the bottom of the screen are the grab options.

These range from HAM and HAM-E to mono images. It also supports the 256-colour format which will please the prospective A1200 buyers out there.

If you grab an image the machine will tell you what you have grabbed by ticking the RGB and MONO boxes and the respective separations.

Viewing

To view the images you just click on view but the machine must first mix the RGB together. How fast it will do this depends on the processor in your machine - in the 4000 it took only a couple of seconds because of the 040 processor but even when I tried it on the A500 it still wasn't that slow - 30 seconds at most for a complicated image.

So you have your image saved and you're pleased with it - now what can you do? Flip back to the main screen along with the preferences and you'll find an editing option.

When selected this screen opens out into a full editing screen which lets you run the

image through filters. There are various options, some of which let you really ring the changes, such as the psychedelic filters.

To be fair, the filters are very well done and don't detract from the image's original clarity unless you are selecting a soft filter to put over your image.

Improvements

I was impressed most by the negative filter which gives a really clean negative image. The editing booth also has image improvement options like fine edges, image blur and image sharpen. On top of the usual filters you can flip the image on its X and Y axes and cut and paste sections of the image.

If you have plenty of memory you can use the Carousel option which allows you to show all of the pictures that you have stored up during your grabbing session.

It's also possible to grab several frames from the video image, store them into memory, mess about with them by pulling them off the carousel then playing them back as an animation.

You would need a pretty awesome amount of memory to do this with full size colour or mono images, but the end result would be well worthwhile.

I liked VIDI Amiga 12 because of its simplicity. Setting the equipment up in the first place is always a bit of a struggle but once it's there you can forget about it. I found that it didn't interfere with any other programs I was using, and was overall a very well behaved piece of equipment.

little box that plugs into your parallel port.

The first thing to do was to set the thing up. I'm not an expert with complicated wiring jobs. The machine I used was an A4000 so I could get the most out of the software to begin with.

The box plugged straight into the parallel port and the lead that comes out of the box goes into the floppy disk port.

It's a bit ungainly, the box, so you should make sure you have a lot of room at the back of your machine before you start fiddling.

I then took the phono-to-phono lead and plugged it into the Video Out slot on the video. When using digitisers I always find it helpful to have another monitor set up to see what the image will look like on-screen before you actually take a grab. However, unlike most other digitisers, VIDI Amiga 12 doesn't require a second monitor, and displays all its images on one screen.

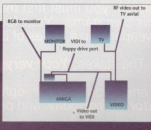
For maximum flexibility, though, I plugged another monitor into the back of the video as you would for usual domestic use - this way I had the Amiga Workbench showing and the direct signal from the video going into the TV. If you're a bit confused, refer to the diagram.

I must stress now that the VIDI's physical shape makes using it with A1500/2000 machines impossible unless a ribbon cable is used to connect the digitiser casing to the parallel port. This is little more than a

Rainbow

The PowerScan mono scanner, reviewed in AC several months ago, set a new standard in affordable mono hand scanning that most other manufacturers have been chasing ever since.

With PowerScan Professional v3, the ante has, as they say, been upped, and upped right into the colour spectrum to the tune of 4,096 wonderful hues.

Consisting of a standard scanning head, connecting cable, and interface with the usual disk-based software, ColourScan looks like nothing other than a straightforward 64-greyscale mono scanner of the type so many budget DTP enthusiasts have grown to know and love.

Give ColourScan one run over a colour image, however, and the user's old faithful mono matey will find itself permanently re-housed on the dustiest and least accessible shelf. The image quality one can wrest from Power's latest release is stunning.

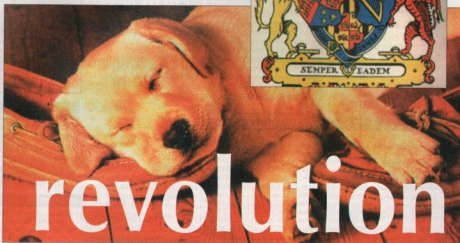
Unshaking

ColourScan works in the same way as all hand scanners in that the user must employ an unshaking hand to drag the scanning head over the target picture at a steady rate.

The image is imported using a fairly normal-looking 105mm scanning head, but instead of being stored as a 64-colour image it is internally buffered by the ColourScan software as 12-bit data in 4,096 true colours.

As opposed to HAM (hold and modify), 12-bit true colour does not suffer from fringing, nor does it do strange things when scaled or ported to another screen resolution. This enables ColourScan's software to convert and save an image as a 24-bit IFF, TIFF, or 256-colour GIF.

Before saving, however, the by now standard array of editing options can be applied. PowerScan Professional has a wide

range of polygon and freehand drawing tools with which users can touch up or enhance the scanned image, and though these are tricky to use on a rough HAM representation such as displayed after a scan, they add to the package's flexibility.

Much more useful are the image processing tools, including flip, rotate, scale, and crop, the latter two of which will be essential for floppy drive systems. Images scanned in colour can result in IFF file sizes of over 1Mb, especially if saved as 24-bit files.

Again, cropping is a vital tool for scanned images, most of which will contain data which is not required. Most users will find it impossible to set up the scanning area so that only the required image is scanned, but with the crop tool any extraneous data can be thrown away, saving time and disk space.

Other more advanced tools include skew, capable of pseudo-perspective effects, lighten and darken, which can be

particularly handy for murky or over-exposed scans, and clean up, which is unfortunately almost useless on colour scans as it tends to turn them into impressionist paintings rather than sharper images.

In total, PowerScan's image retouching skills match those of most other scanning packages, but the ambitious user will, as usual, require AdPro or ImageFX to really zap up those imported artworks.

In hardware terms, the scanner will be familiar to anyone used to the older mono units, with selection sliders for dot sizes and resolutions giving a possible spread of between 50 and 400dpi in mono mode, or 50 to 200dpi in full colour.

Reflections

In addition, a handy brightness thumb control makes it possible to have a stab at photographs with less than ideal exposure, though at the highest levels there is a tendency for the surface reflections from glossy photos to white out the picture detail rather than enhance it.

In shape and size, the scanning unit is just the right side of comfortable, and heavy enough that it feels substantial in use. Smooth scans are facilitated by the design of the unit's underside which,

unlike some hand scanners I've seen, is clear of obstructions.

The roller, so important for good results, seems well mounted and doesn't protrude too far from the surface. On some scanners, badly designed rollers which either don't roll smoothly enough or stick out too far can lead to see-saw scanning, but ColourScan suffers from none of this.

Overall, there is little on which to fault ColourScan. The software could be faster and the A2000 Zorro card interface a little more robust, but other than these minor niggles, the only thing one can say about Power's new colour baby is that it does the job, gets results, and the results are excellent.



The competition

There isn't any. This is the first product of its kind on the Amiga, and the next step up is the 18-bit semi-flatbed Sharp JX100, costing £600 or more.

This scanner produces better results than ColourScan, but although in 18-bit rather than 12-bit, JX100 scans are taken in the same 200dpi resolution. The result is that when scanning colour line art, or any colour illustration which is not full colour, the user would be hard pressed to spot the difference.

When full colour photographs are scanned, the JX100 shows its superiority, but again the differences are not as obvious as one would expect from a scanner costing more than twice as much.

WorkStation

2 SUPPORT

As more readers begin to sample the delights of WorkStation 2, we examine more of its capabilities and sort out a minor problem

WorkStation 2 was designed with the A500 Plus in mind to take advantage of Kickstart 2.04 and the more advanced Workbench interface it offered. However, since the original design of the disk, Commodore have released the A600 and A1200, and this has brought on one small problem.

The A600 has no internal battery backed-up clock, which means that when a WorkStation 2 disk boots up, the start-up sequence fails at the command:

```
SETCLOCK LOAD
```

in trying to load the time from a non-existent clock (on unexpanded machines), an error code of 20 is returned and everything grinds to a halt.

The solution is a simple matter of editing the start-up sequence using QED and inserting the line:

```
FAILAT 21
```

before the Setclock command.

This effectively tells the Amiga not to bother with commands which fail for simple reasons. When the revised start-up sequence runs on boot-up, the user will see the message:

```
BATTERY BACKED-UP CLOCK NOT FOUND
```

and startup will continue as normal.

My thanks to Mr T Gigg of Bristol for writing in with this enquiry. All future WorkStation 2 disks will be dispatched with this bug fixed, but any users of unexpanded A600 machines with first issue disks can either carry out the modification outlined above or return their disks to Jumpstart Direct for a replacement.

Keep those letters rolling in, folks. As you can see, they are all examined for possible problems or support issues and any bugs or suggestions passed on through this column.

On with the support column. Mr T French of Anglesey was confused by FixDisk. He managed to operate it to check his WorkStation 2 disk, but writes:

"There are so many buttons, I'm beginning to wonder what happens when I press the wrong one!"

FixDisk is a disk retrieval system designed to cure some of the many problems which crop up on floppy disks, including read/write errors, corrupted files, and the odd validation problem. As the latter will be more common, we'll look first at how FixDisk can be used to remedy it.

Validation errors crop up when the "bitmap" is corrupt. Basically, a bitmap is a digital map of the disk's contents and where on the disk they can be found. Any disparity between the bitmap and the structure found by AmigaDOS when it examines a disk will cause the Amiga to look for the disk-validator file.

Disk-validator, built in to the Kickstart 2/3 ROM, can correct minor problems, but will give up on major messes. FixDisk,

however, will not. To fix an unvalidated disk, load FixDisk, then click on the Directory gadget at the top of its window. There's no need to scan the whole disk for bitmap errors, as FixDisk need merely ascertain where everything is located.

Faulty

Next, click on the drive containing the faulty disk and click Disk Inserted when prompted. FixDisk will now slog its way through the directory structure, checking every file's exact location, then compare this to the bitmap. If the bitmap is incorrect, FixDisk says so and asks for permission to re-write it.

Once the go ahead is given, the program takes only a few seconds to rectify the fault and the disk will be back to normal. For more serious faults, such as read/write errors, the complete disk scan will be needed.

If, for example, the Amiga complains that a disk has a read error or a write error on block so-and-so, you will find that under normal circumstances the disk is rendered useless. Using FixDisk, however, some of the damage can be repaired.

Repeat the procedure for the bitmap error, but this time click on the All button, which prompts FixDisk to trawl through the disk examining each and every file in turn until it finds a corrupt or damaged part of the disk. When this happens, a number of options will be available.

Many of these are best presented to coders and system experts, but most of us can expect at least to be able to attempt a save.

Let's say the program tells you that there is a read error on block 1605, which happens to be cylinder 72, head 1, sector

10. The error is a bad sector checksum (BadSecSum), which means that FixDisk cannot match the corrupt contents of the block to the "checksum" which is used as a method for making sure none of the data has been messed up.

At this point, the temptation would be to scream in confusion and despair, but the canny user will click Retry, the Ignore if the fault recurs, then wait until the scan is complete. The next step is vital.

In the window to the left will be a list of the disk's contents complete with the disk block where the file header is located. To attempt to rescue data from a damaged block, select the file containing the damaged block, then click on Selected below the Check Files option.

When the error is encountered, you can attempt to save the damaged part to another disk or the RAM disk, write over the block and destroy the original data, or keep on trying. While it may sometimes be possible to save the damaged data, some errors are too serious to remedy.

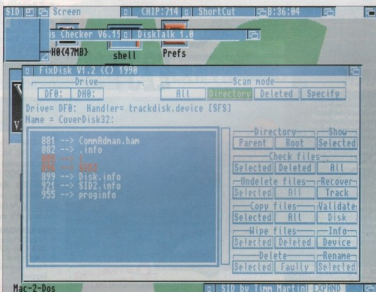
Crippling

In this case, writing over the block may be the only option which, though erasing some of the data and possibly crippling a program file for good, will at least allow the rest of the disk to operate without those annoying read/write errors.

If a damaged file is a data file, you may be able to save at least part of it, which is a lot better than nothing at all.

For now, that's all we'll cover on FixDisk. If enough enquiries come in from WorkStation 2 readers, we'll attempt to cover the more complex aspects of the program and look in more depth at its operation, but until then your manual should contain enough information to allow you to usefully employ its talents.

Power of the press

Become a word-crunching pro in the second part of our Protex v4.3 tutorial guide

Last month we gave away Protex v4.3 from Amnor on our cover. We also included a brief beginners' guide on how to create documents, move them around, and save them. Well now you have had time to familiarise yourself with Protex's layout, it's time to look at some of the more powerful features this version of Protex has to offer.

One of the most important tasks before printing a document is to spell check it. Spell checking is very quick with Protex and well worth doing even if you are generally good at spelling, as many typing mistakes can also be picked up in this way.

Checking while typing is most convenient when used with a hard disk, or when the dictionaries are loaded into a RAM disk so that they may be accessed almost instantly. This option may be toggled on and off using the Typing Check option in the Option menu, whenever you want.

If this option is turned on, every time you type an unrecognised word Protex beeps to indicate the fact, allowing you to backspace and correct the word.

The other spelling check options are available through the Spell menu which also has options to carry out maintenance on dictionaries and to use special commands to search for words in dictionaries, find anagrams and so on.

Apart from checking while typing, Protex provides four other ways to check spelling. Individual words may be checked

by positioning the cursor on a word (or immediately after the word) and selecting the Single Word option.

If the word is recognised, a message saying so is briefly displayed, otherwise a dialogue box appears. Type in "teh" now, position the cursor over it and select the Single Word option.

The dialogue box which appears when a word is not recognised contains a number of boxes which may be clicked on, or selected by pressing the highlighted letter in the box.

The Store box stores the word in the dictionary so that it will always be recognised at any time in the future. The Ignore

box causes the word to be ignored for the remainder of the time that document is being edited.

The Skip box ignores that word for the current mode only. Change returns you to edit mode to make whatever change is necessary to correct the spelling.

If you don't know what the correct spelling is, Protex may be able to help you by displaying one or more words which it thinks you intended to use. This is done by selecting the Lookup option.

Select the Lookup option and almost instantly a window will appear containing a list of words. Select the word you want by double clicking on it and it will replace the miss-spelled word in the text.

If there are more words than will fit into the window, arrows at top and bottom may be clicked on to allow you to see earlier or later suggestions. The word CANCEL lets you return to editing without selecting an alternative word.

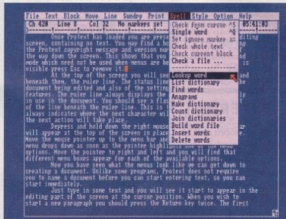
While Single Word is useful for just checking an occasional word, it would be tedious if you had to check every word this way, so Protex has the facility to check the document on four ways.

The Check From Cursor option is particularly useful for checking a section of text of text from the current cursor position to the end of the text.

When an unrecognised word is found, the same dialogue box is displayed as described for Single word. Once the correction has been made, the check can be recommenced by selecting Check from cursor once more.

Both the above options are particularly convenient for checking text when you have made alterations, but if you want to spell check a whole document, Protex has a quicker method.

Select the Check Whole Text option now. Once the spell check starts, the screen clears and is replaced by a new display. Across the top of the screen is the menu of available options and beneath it is the area in which unknown words are listed. Once all unknown words have been displayed, each word is offered in turn. The Store option is the same as

Working with more than one document

Protex allows you to load and edit many different documents (subject to available memory), switch between files and split the screen so that more than one file may be viewed at the same time.

To do this, load a document then select the Swap menu. At the bottom of the menu will be the name of the file you just loaded and beneath that an entry New File.

Click on the New File option and the existing document will disappear, leaving you with an empty document. Select the Load File option again and select another file for loading.

If you now open the Swap menu again you will find that the name of the second file you loaded has been added to the list of files being edited. Repeat the process again to load a third file. Up to 36 different files may be loaded at a time, sub-

ject to available memory.

Click on the name of the file you first loaded and it will be re-displayed. If you watch the status lines you will see that all the details change to reflect whichever file is the current file and that when you switch files, Protex remembers all details of the various settings and cursor positions for each file.

You can swap between files at will just by selecting the required file from the Swap menu. If you select New File and create a new document instead of loading an existing file, its name will change to Unnamed until such time as you give it a name by saving it, or by using the Name file option in the File menu.

Blocks of text may be copied from the alternate file to the current file at any time. Mark a block in the current file, then select another file. The file you have marked the block

in has now become the alternate file.

Position the cursor where you want to copy the block to, then select the Copy Other Block option in the Block menu and the block will be copied into the current document.

Swap back to the file in which you originally marked the block and it will still be present. You can then delete the block if you no longer require it, or just de-select the block.

Delete the block for now and then swap back to the file into which you copied the block. Mark a block in this file, then swap back to the other file and use Copy other block again.

As you will see, blocks can be copied in either direction as the alternate file is always the one you were editing before you swapped to a new current file.

Laying out a document

One of the most useful features of a wordprocessor is the ease with which the appearance of a document can be changed. We shall start by looking at Ruler lines.

These determine where the left and right margins will be and can also contain tab markers. Protext has three types of tab markers - Normal, Decimal and Centre - indicated by **1**, **2** and **C** symbols in the ruler line.

You may have as many ruler lines as you want in a document and Protext stores these in the text. When the document is printed, the ruler line is recognised and the text printed according to the settings of the ruler, without the ruler line being printed.

Tab markers are useful for a number of purposes, particularly for ensuring that columns of figures or text are aligned neatly and the different types of tab marker have different effects.

The normal tab marker (**1**) has the effect of aligning all text with its left edge aligned. The decimal tab marker (**2**) aligns numbers so that the decimal points all line up, or, if no decimal point, the number lines up with other numbers before the decimal point.

The decimal tab marker may also be used for right aligning text. The centre tab marker (**C**)

causes text to be positioned equally either side of the marker. As many of these markers may be used in a line as you want and the different types may be mixed.

The active ruler is always 'the most recent ruler earlier in the document than the cursor', or, if there is no earlier ruler, the default ruler set with CONFIG and is displayed beneath the status lines when in Document mode.

If you scroll up and down through a document containing a number of rulers you will see that the displayed ruler line beneath the status lines always changes to reflect the currently active ruler.

The left and right margins may also be altered by dragging them to the required positions on the displayed ruler line. Note that this is not possible on the ruler line in the document, but ruler lines can be changed by editing them as normal text anyway.

One thing you will notice while experimenting with rulers is that certain things, such as moving a tab marker to a different column, have an immediate effect, while others appear to change nothing. An example of the latter is when you move the left and right margins.

By default, Protext has the Auto Reformat

option selected in the Option menu, but it is important to understand the way that auto reformatting works. Protext reformat the paragraph when you perform some action which causes the cursor to move.

This is preferable to reformatting as each character is typed which would cause the words to keep shuffling around as you edit to maintain the formatting.

If you move through an existing document, having changed the ruler widths, no changes will be made to the format unless you edit the paragraphs, in which case they will be reformat to the new margins, or specifically make use of the various reformatting commands.

A document, or part of it, may be re-format when required using either the Format Text option in the Text menu, Format Block in the Block menu, or you can use the Format Paragraph or Format To End Of Para options in the Sundry menu.

All of these perform the same task, but on different parts of the document. The complete text within the relevant areas is reformat, so that it appears with all the currently set effects and margins.

before, as also is ignore, but the Change option is slightly different in that it just allows you to edit the offered word. Once completed, the word is re-checked and the next word offered.

The Lookup option is similar to that already described, but the correct word is selected by pressing the appropriate number alongside each offered word.

The View option allows you to see the unrecognised word in context by displaying a number of lines from the document, with the unknown word highlighted so that you can see what action you wish to take. The Back option is also extra and allows you to go back to the previous word if you want. The Check current block option performs the same type of spell check, but only on a marked

block of text.

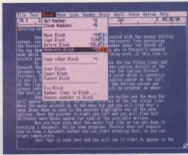
As already mentioned, this method of spell checking is the fastest, but if there is insufficient free memory Protext will be unable to check in this way. The solution is to save the document and then select the Check a File option.

You are then presented with the file selector to select the file you want to check. The checking process functions in the same way as just described, but with large files the document may be checked in several sections, requiring you to correct any unrecognised words before continuing with the next section of the file. If there is still insufficient memory the Check from cursor option should be used as described above.

On completion, you are informed if

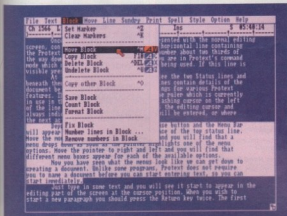
any of the changes you have made affect the formatting of the text and are asked whether you wish to re-load the

document. If you wish to continue editing the document, you should elect to reload it at this point.

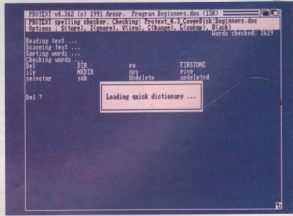

Canon Studio v1.1

PD Soft, by Wolf Faust

This is a utility written to provide support for all Amiga users who have Canon printer drivers. Basically it prints IFF graphics to a very high standard, but it's in its ease of use and flexibility that it proves its worth.

Printing is done straight from disk, which means that there's no call for a truckload of extra RAM every time you wish to print something more complex than a simple line drawing. Indeed, all you need is 300K spare, so it will run quite happily on an unexpanded machine.

It supports most IFF-ILBM formats, which means that you should find little difficulty with compatibility of graphics files and this program.

But its main claim to fame is surely the power it puts in your hands as regards the quality of the printouts. Suddenly you can print graphics with up to eight greyscales on any black and white Canon printer, including the whole BubbleJet range.

Should you be lucky enough to own one of their colour models, such as the BJ800, you will be absolutely astounded by the 24-bit-quality printing capabilities that this program lends your printouts.

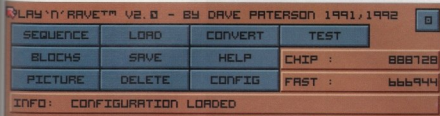

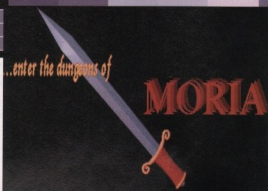

Robert Leiper's Slimmings (17 Bit, 2284) has our fave suicidal chums playing baseball. It's nicely animated stuff complete with action replays, and there's beer humour there too (right lads?).

The style is original, and for this alone - and the rather strange closing sequence - this demo, rough around the edges and all, deserves a look in.

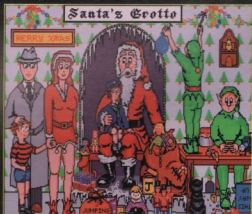
This video contains far and away the most impressive animation I have ever

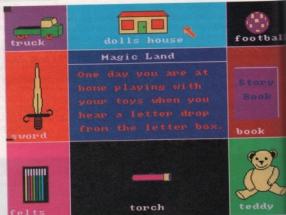

NIGEL MANSSELL'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

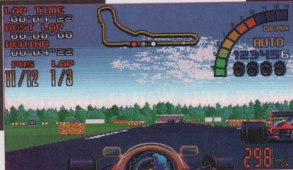
Elsewhere in this stupendous issue of *Gamer* you will find me singing in a loud voice the praises of Gremlin's other release, *Premier Manager*, and vowing to collar either Biff or Ben into reviewing *Mansell* so I can spend as much time as possible with my beloved *Wycombe Wanderers*.

Have you ever noticed how much of a miserable sod Nigel Mansell is? It's unbelievable - the guy lives in a three million pound house in a tax haven, and gets an eight figure salary for doing the thing he loves most, yet the only time we see any noticeable twitch of his moustache is when Ayrton Senna spins out off the track in a horrifying accident.

In order to supplement his meagre income, Nige has lent his name to the latest go-very-fast-around-a-track-'em-up from those Lotus-like fiends from Sheffield.

Ben had a good look at the game for his review in ST User Gamer, and was far from impressed, which worried me greatly as I didn't want to believe that the game I had been looking forward to so much was a small but pungent heap of Tibetan llama droppings. Nervously, I investigated...

On loading you are presented with

a generous options screen that as well as offering you the standard gear and control method choices, also enquires politely as to whether you would like to "improve with Mansell" or take lessons in "driving school" before launching yourself into the full race season.

Well I'm no nance, and was raring for a bit of real racing action, but, dedicated chap that I am, thought it only fair to explore all the avenues, so to speak.

Driving school was my first stop, and the concept is very simple. Choose any track on which to practice - no other cars are present, and the maximum speed of your car is restricted, the idea being that this will enable you to learn how to control the car. Come on, please - I'm sure we can cope with moving the joystick from side to side and pressing the Fire button occasionally. One visit to driv-

ing school and you'll never return - it's daft.

Improve With Mansell allows us to zoom around the track to the accompaniment of a running commentary from the man himself. This is a much better idea than the Driving School - the racing line is indicated, and in theory the comments from Nigel-babes should teach us the best techniques to use.

In practice, however, whenever I tried looking up from the track at the snippets offered ("stay on the track", "avoid hitting things"), the result was invariably my car wrapped around some advertising hording or other. It's a nice touch, but not much help at all, I'm afraid.

After dispensing with all the frills and inconsequentialities it was time to get me some action. Every track from the 1992 Grand Prix circuit is here in all its macadamised glory - you can choose to race a single circuit, in which case you take your pick, or pack some clean clothes and a couple of new engines and opt for the full GP season.

The full season begins in South Africa and culminates in Australia and does the real thing. A handy intro screen gives some indication as to which bits on your car you should tamper with by outlining the nature of the track - bends, straights and so on.

You can if you wish get straight into a race, in which case you will find yourself at the back of the 12-car grid. Qualifying is a better idea - two laps round the track with just a couple of other cars provides an excellent (and a little too easy) chance of beginning the race on the front row.

As far as the gameplay goes, NMWC is good, but not great. The tracks are well laid out but the screen updates are just a bit too slow to simulate a Formula One racing car traveling at nigh on 200 miles per hour.

The miniturised track in the top corner of the screen succeeds where "Improve With Mansell" fails in providing you with as much in-race information as you need.

All it does is tell you where the cars are on the track, but then you're not really interested in the price of milk Brazilian cheddar when your cheeks are wobbling with G-force, are you?

One element of the game which suppose is realistic, but annoying nonetheless, is the sheer difficulty of overtaking other drivers. The only time I won any races was when I started in pole position.

Points are awarded as per the usual Grand Prix rules, and a place in the top three in any race earns an animated sequence which takes a while to load and would be better left out.

As you would expect from Gremlin, Mansell is a polished game, not without its faults, but which should appeal to race fans due to the options it sports and the full GP season.

Ahem, well anyway, it was – and jolly good fun it was too – whizzing around various fictional parts of America on a fast bike, avoiding the police and knocking off anyone who got in my way. Top entertainment. At the time.

And now here we are in Amigoland 18 months later, busy reviewing all the first goodies of the New Year, when who should pop up for perusal but my old mate. Great – I couldn't wait for a quick shuffly.

Road Rash on the Megadrive was accompanied by a stirring tale of competition and confrontation between two mean riders over a girl – they ended up facing each other on a treacherous highway for a no holds barred race without rules.

The girl swooned over the winner, the race was brilliant etc etc, and it was decided that it should be held every year to find the best "tusher", or some such gubbins.

Well we've all grown up a bit since then, and EA suffice with telling Amiga's owners that "nice guys come last", and lose it at that.

As with any racing game, the aim is obviously to win races, and since we've been informed that middle-aged coppers such as ourselves generally come a good way down the field, it's necessary to enter into a little toughness.

We have two basic moves with which to temporarily immobilise our leather-clad competitors, and on which the game was really sold to Megadrive owners.

Depending on which joystick control method is chosen – there are two – either a dab on the Fire button or a quick push upwards on the stick will see your rider punch anyone within arm's reach.

Similarly, by pushing down on the stick you are able to kick anyone who rides too close for comfort. A particularly well placed punch or kick can see an adversary knocked

off his or her bike, but that doesn't mean that they're out of the race – you'll notice them in your rear view mirrors as they scurry back towards their bikes and re-mount.

Bikes are the ultimate status symbol for types like yourself – you begin the whole shenanigans on a Shuriken 400, the motorcycling equivalent of the XR2, in that it looks quite nice and sounds OK, but is about as likely to take you to the front of the pack as a Sainsbury's trolley with a wonky wheel.

You will therefore be wanting to win some money in order to invest in a better bike, and the only way to do it is by winning races.

There are five tracks in all, and despite boasting such varied names as Grass Valley and Palm Desert, they are disappointingly alike in terms of layout.

Beginning always as last in the line of 15 competitors, you must fight your way through to at least fourth place on each circuit before qualifying for the second stage.

Each time you take a fall or if, say, you're careless enough to let another rider knock you off, the energy bar on your handlebars reduces accordingly. Your trusty cycle also has its own bar – if this reaches the bottom you'll find yourself out of the race and likely as

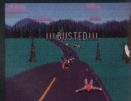

not in the knocking shop for some costly repairs.

Everything I remember playing on the Megadrive version is here – the tunes have been watered down a bit, but the colourful and fast-moving multi-parallax backgrounds are if anything enhanced.

What about the bike speed then? Well... there's really no skirting around the fact that it's not very fast at all – this is quite a major problem and detracts from the game in a big way.

You see, it's great fun riding around the five tracks punching and kicking as many people as you can, and it's nice to choose a new bike when you've won enough money.

The policemen and women who constantly patrol are a nice addition, and the occasional cow on the road adds a touch of humour. But what we really need from a racing game is speed – if there's no speed it just doesn't feel like a race. And frankly Road Rash doesn't.

I'm still a fan of the game, but I'm not blind to its faults. Couple all the polished elements with the lack of speed and the fact that the later stages are nothing but more laps around the same

Do you remember – oh, about two years ago – Britain was in the relatively early stages of a deep depression, repossessions were on the up, unemployment was spiralling once again, and to top it all England were knocked out of the World Cup thanks to a pathetic Chris Waddle penalty. Remember? It's all coming back, isn't it?

Pygnosis – a fine upstanding software house from the city that gave us the Beatles and car theft – took a good look at the sorry faces of the people around them, and were saddened.

What was once a great and happy land was awash with gloom – the population needed something to make life worth living once more.

So they created Lemmings – a 459,000-level cartoony puzzle frenzy that was so original, so funny and so damned addictive that the economic and social problems of the British Empire were solved overnight.

OK, so it didn't have quite that much impact – but the vast majority of Amiga and ST owners who played Lemmings found themselves spirited away to a distant plane where the existential problems of humanity became much less important than saving the big-nosed beasts. Yes, it went down a treat.

A year or so later, as discontent began to reassert itself and the nobs at Pygnosis became bored with the Porsches and Versac suits that were the fruits of Lemmings, a humble programmer presented Bernard Pygnosis with his next meat ticket – Oh No! More Lemmings, the data disk.

Once again the gaming public went wild, and even the office cleaners brought the Lambourghini showrooms in between trips to Monte Carlo.

But the clock keeps turning friends, and it's almost a year since we were blessed for the second time with the gormless death-dodging tomfoolery.

Pygnosis – who in the meantime have employed an entirely new staff, since the "Lemming generation" have long since retired to luxury villas on the Algarve and Costa Brava – realised that the time was again right for the green-haired sheep clones to grace our TVs and monitors, and have duly obliged. The result is a full sequel, and sports the moniker Lemmings 2.

Of course there will be those sad few

who don't know what Lemmings is all about, so I'll briefly explain. The basic idea is to ensure that X amount of Lemmings make their way safely from one end of a level to the other.

A major obstacle that stands in your way is the unshakeable fact that Lemmings are thick. They're stupid. They just haven't got a bloody clue mate – over cliffs, off tall blocks, they just cannot grasp the concept of death.

You must therefore steer the empty-headed rarely-seen mammals in the direction of safety, all the time making cunning use of what few talents they actually do possess, such as the abilities to jump and dig. There – now you know.

Anyway, Lemmings 2 is here, and whereas the prequels had us saving lemmings just for the sheer nobility of it all, we now have a plot.

The lemmings want to leave their island home, and must build a big vessel for the purpose. However, they can't leave without the fabled magic talisman, and as with most games nowadays it seems, the talisman is broken and the parts spread around the various levels just waiting to be collected.

Pygnosis have given their pets loads more skills this time, and depending on the situation the lems can jump, dig, float upwards on a balloon and even skil.

Although the sprites are the same size as ever, you'll see Beach Lemmings, Polar Lemmings, Space Lemmings and others, performing against even better backdrops than before.

Complete with the harder puzzles and funky tunes, Lemmings 2 seems set to be a massive hit on its release in the early New Year – and of course, the full and unexpurgated review will appear in all its glory in these very pages for your consumption.

The items Thomas must collect are diamonds, which have carelessly been scattered throughout tons of levels by a person or persons unknown. They're all over the blooming show – in trees, under bridges, and the more you collect, the more points you earn. Riveting stuff this, innit?

I'm a sarcastic old so and so, and to be fair Tearaway Thomas is actually quite a nifty little game. The fun begins in the woods near Thomas's home, with most of the all-important diamonds at first nestling tantalisingly in the branches of trees.

Strange and improbable though it may seem, bears inhabit the woods of this pic-

turesque German forest, nasty big bears that will eat small bulldogs whole given half a chance.

Well no – the truth is, the bears are of the variety that you might find in a child's bed, and the only nastiness they exude is the knack of making Thomas flash brightly and lose energy points should he encounter one of them.

The rest of the game is very much in the same vein, with cute creatures aplenty adorning brightly coloured cheerful backgrounds.

Tearaway Thomas might very well find itself in the large bunch of also-rans if it wasn't for one specific feature that lifts it above many – its speed. The sprite is one of the fastest moving I've seen, making the game far more enjoyable to play.

The cuteness of it all means that few gamers above the age of about ten or twelve will be impressed, but for the youngsters among you, Tearaway Thomas is a fun game along the lines of Doodle Bug.

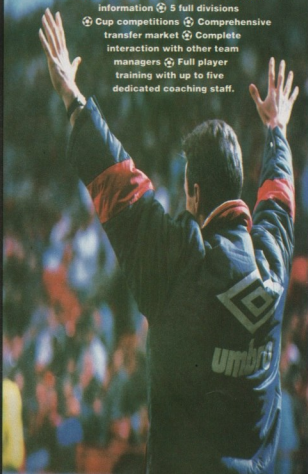

Old James is a bit knackered after doing this spy lark, so he decides to go get a bit of relaxation in. But there will be none of this ramby-pamby lying around on a beach rubbish. Old James wants some good wholesome exercise – sad but true. So where better to get the exercise he's after than at the Aquatic Games?

For some reason you don't play James in all of these events. It isn't stressed who you are but it's not really that important – all I know is that all of the competitors are supposed to be friends of James.

The first event is just a sprint, which entails the usual obscene wagging of the joystick, but you are not running on a track – that's much too easy.

For the most part of the race you are running on water so if you slow down you will sink. You are racing against a frog who is pretty speedy.

Event two – Feeding time. You play a tubby character standing on a bridge, and you have to fill up your bucket and feed the fish that poke their head out of the water.

Next up is the Grass Race. A friend of old Jimmy's is a unicycling shark – everybody should have a unicycling shark for a friend, but alas we don't.

You have to pedal his unicycle along the course and jump over all the different obstacles that stand in your way. The course runs from left to right, like the sprint but it has lots of hills and things that you've got to pedal up.

I found the control method on this a bit tricky. It's like trying to rub your stomach while patting your head. You have to pull

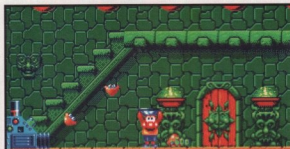

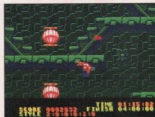

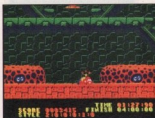

the joystick round in a clockwise fashion that's fine until you have to jump over an obstacle, when it's a bit tricky too keep the momentum going.

Reading the list of the various events will make you think that they're pretty weird, you'd be right. After the Grass Race you have Kipper Watching which is almost as bizarre as it sounds. You are in charge of six swimmers who are having a kip (a nap) on our southern friends).

The rowdy beach people keep throwing beach balls at our comatose friends so to stop them waking you have to jump up and deflect the balls away with your head in the seal style.

Along with the 100-metre splash there are a couple of adaptations to normal events like Leapfrog which is just a version of the 110-metre hurdle.

There is also a trampoline (sea sponge) section of the games, the first I have ever seen. You have to go through all the pieces like a proper trampolinist. Once you have done the set moves in the time given you extra somersaults you do give you extra points.

By far the trickiest game in the tournament is the shell shooting section. Odd-looking crabs come at you from either side of the screen, and you score points by flipping and catching them, flipping them into vats of hot oil or shopping them to burst the overhead balloons. I always seem to get electrocuted by the electric eel-type things.

I liked the Aquatic Games a lot – graphically they're sound and the FX are quite amusing in places. It's a nice change from run-of-the-mill sports games.

I also thought that the practice options were a hell of a lot better than normal. Instead of the usual one practice mode there are three on different levels, so if you're a real show like me you can go on the thick level first. Well thought out and good fun.

How many of you readers out there aged between 17 and 18 collected Star Wars figures in your youth? Quite a few I would expect, and if you really saved up your pocket money you could get the Millennium Falcon or a Scout Walker.

If you are either too old or too young to have had Star Wars figures then you are bound to have seen Return of the Jedi, the last instalment of the Star Wars trilogy. On this film appeared Scout Walkers, large ungainly machines which walked on two legs and took a two-man crew.

This Scout Walker and the subject of Psygnosis's new game have rather an uncanny resemblance. But Biffa and I are not bothered what the game looks like in relation to other things.

On screen, Walker is a lateral scrolling shoot-'em-up stroke strategy game, a simple, get-to-the-end-of-the-level-and-kill-the-big-guy sort of thing.

You, being the single-man crew, have to get to the end by guiding your machine with a simple left to right movement and using the mouse to aim your gun.

It's a bit of a tricky control method at first but it's challenging instead of irritating. Also it quite fun having one person on the controls and one

on the guns - a bit less challenging but you can enjoy the carnage more.

Walker is also another poke in the eye for the myth that says you must have good graphics for a good game. While being graphically sound as far as the background and the Walker

itself go, the graphics are a fair and smooth representation of the programmer's idea. The enemy troop, however, are nothing more than badly-drawn lemmings, if that. But they are well animated, and they certainly do the job of doing you in.

They run at you with admirable stupidity and chuck grenades in your general direction.

Some of them fly helicopters, some of them even climb up the back of your machine and plant bombs. Not satisfied with grenades they fly helicopters, drive lorries, bombers and various other mechanical armaments.

Graphically the animation on the helicopters and the other ground vehicles is pretty but I was really impressed with the sound. When your guns overheat there is wonderful sample of predator when one of the soldiers is firing an empty gun (you smart sod - Ed).

The other really impressive bit of sound is when the helicopters fly on - you get the sampled sound of a helicopter and some really dodgy funk music banging away in the background.

On the finished version of Walker you'll be able to view out of the cockpit of the Walker while it is moving, as well as the side view.

I'm not sure what the point of this will be - seeing as the head is swinging around all the time it might be a bit of problem looking at what you are doing but, let's wait and see.

When the full version of Walker hits the streets it should be a stonker and it shouldn't be too far off.

The king Goble [let's just dispense with the silly spelling for now, eh?] has had his son kidnapped by the nasty and evil Amoniak, who's still snarled off over being defeated in a battle by the king some 50 years earlier.

To complete the king's humiliation, Amoniak has made the king's son his jester, and although new to the job the now Prince Buffoon is said to be already challenging such comic legends as Shane Ritchie and Andrew O'Connor for the title of funniest man in the world.

about four million ferocious beasts protecting himself and the prince at all times.

Of course the only people stupid enough to attempt the unlikely rescue are a couple of dedicated Goblins, Winkle and Fingus.

Winkle fancies himself as something of a card – he's a cheeky young fella and tends to get a good drubbing at some point from just about everybody he encounters.

Fingus is the gentleman of the two – a kind of Sid Little to Winkle's Eddie Large if you like, the difference being Fingus doesn't attempt to play a guitar only to be disturbed by Winkle's comedy banter, as was the ilk the with aforementioned duo. But

enough of these comedic allegories, and onto the game.

Those who have played the original will be familiar with the gameplay, but will probably be thankful that this sequel sports one less sprite, and is therefore less fiddly to control.

Since the whole point is to rescue the dippy prince, who as mentioned is under extremely heavy guard, most of the game involves overcoming various guardians in finding your way to his captor.

The goblins must work together to solve the puzzles – in a specific order in some cases – and although frustrating at times, there are loads of humorous asides that take away some of that "Aargghh!" element that quite often causes serious malfunctions in machinery due to its being repeatedly

bludgeoned by a variation of heavy hold implements.

Despite their being two characters to manipulate, the point-and-click controls are very user friendly. A nice touch I found was the Notepad option which allows you to record any pieces of pertinent information.

An irksome feature that occurs in a good many games of this nature is that some of the puzzles are quite bizarre and not at all logical, and Goblins 2 is no exception.

Thankfully the superb cartoon graphics and funny FX (not the music mind – turn off for God's sake) more than compensate.

Hardened adventurers are unlikely to sustain major brain damage in attempting to complete the game, though the jollity it all will more than satisfy.

In short, Goblins 2 is a hilarious adventure that will provide a good few hours of chuckles and hair-pulls for just about any game fan.

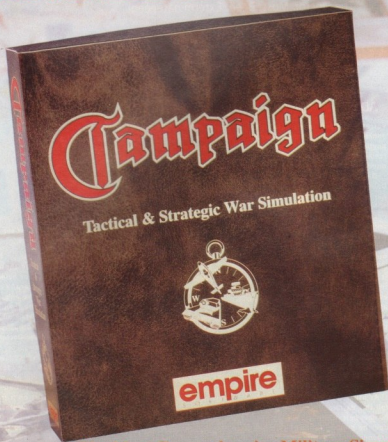

Unless you tune in to Radio One between three and six on weekdays you could be forgiven for believing that the cheap but cheerful adversaries of Doctor Who had dropped off the face of the planet.

Call it sentimentality, call it a cheap way of filling air time, but all things Who-like are going through something of a comeback at the moment.

Re-runs of the old Doctor Who series are popping up not only on UK Gold, which will readily show any old pap, but also on the rather more credible terrestrial outlet, BBC2.

And now, to top it all, Admiral software - little brother of education and budget specialists Alternative - are releasing for our delectation the game of the favourite foe, Dalek Attack.

I remember when I was about four or five years old and Jon Pertwee was our erstwhile do-gooder from the planet Gallifrey. We got a coloured television around this time.

It took my mum about three weeks to peel me from the living room ceiling after I discovered for the first time that the monsters weren't all black and white after all. Potty training was set back months, I'm telling you.

Like all Doctor Who fans, I was enthralled by the scary and futuristic-looking Daleks (this was around 1974 remember), but even at this tender age was a little confused as to how these robotic wash tubs could navigate a terrain full of potholes and contours on wheels the size of ha'pennies. Despite their dodgy synthesised

voices and point blank refusal to adhere to even the simplest laws of physics though, the Daleks were, and remain the favourite and most recognized of all the Doctor's adversaries.

Davros, the Dalek leader and part-time kebab shop proprietor, has wheeled himself out of retirement once again for yet more outer-planetary evil. Well actually it's more like inner-planetary evil, because he's attempting to destroy the earth's ozone layer with the help of his evil minions. Somebody should have told him that the job's already been taken - most of the population are undertaking it on a voluntary part-time basis - but anyway, that's what he's doing, and he's happy, bless him.

As usual, it's up to the Doctor to foil this dastardly plan, doing what he does best, which is... er, just what does he do exactly, apart from run around forbidding landscapes with an assortment of hapless assistants, that is? Well anyway, let's just say the Doctor must foil his plans, and leave it at that.

Dalek Attack is a five-level multi-scrolling shoot-em-up. Oops - no, stop right there - it isn't a shoot-em-up at all, because if memory serves me correctly, Doctor Who is a pacifist. It's a sonic screwdriver-em-up, this

implement being the trusty tool that the Doctor is never without. Having said that, one blast from his screwdriver and the baddies certainly look dead to me - maybe they're just

mildly concussed and suffer no serious after effects. Oh who cares?

As I was saying before I so rudely interrupted myself, the game is set over five levels - beginning in London, we

travel through Paris, Tokyo and New York before finally arriving on Skaro, home planet of Davros.

Each level is very large, and the whole game is quite a challenge from the start. Nothing much new to report in the gameplay area - dispose of the nasties (a large proportion of which are obviously Daleks) in traditional fashion, picking up bonuses and other useful items as you go.

The Doctor himself is a very versatile chap - jumping from buildings, hanging off ledges and scaling walls - poor old Sylvester McCoy would turn in the grave his career was buried in if faced with challenges such as these.

Speaking of Sly, he's one of the three Doctors you can choose to be - the others being Tom Baker (complete with daft scarf) and Patrick Troughton. In two-player mode you even have a choice of which assistant you want to take, although thankfully Bonnie Langford isn't included. Good God - it'll be Lionel Blair as the

Doctor next.

There will be those who criticise the graphics for being flat. It's true that a few parallax backgrounds could only have enhanced the game, but I was more than impressed with the level of detail, and the realism of the city backdrops, particularly the part where the Doctor gets flattened by a New York yellow cab.

It's not often we mention price tags in a review, the idea being that a game either will or won't stand up on its own merits. Dalek Attack is an original twist on a tried and tested formula - at seventeen quid it's outstanding value for money, an absolute must for all Doctor Who fans.

One grip - more firepower would have been nice.

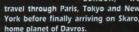

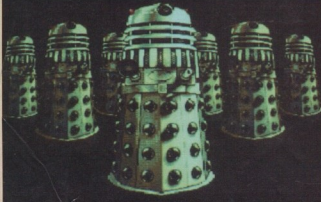

Just when you thought that the old war ghosts had laid down and died, along comes another dodgy war game to dredge them all up again. Not only that but it's got one of the most ridiculous copy protections ever.

It's a flight simulation in which you can fly in famous battles, so if you like the old war games then this one is for you. Looking at the manual you would think this is history lesson rather than a game.

It goes into great detail about all of the planes used in the great battles of the Second World War. But it doesn't stop at the manual – it goes right through all the game.

First you have to choose which plane you are going to fly. There's a pretty awesome collection, and not just the English and American planes – there are a couple of Japanese ones too. Then choose the mission, whether it be dive bombing or torpedoing, and tally ho.

One of the best aspects of this game is the mouse control of the plane. Usually the mouse is way too responsive for the plane but Kixx seem to have got it right on the head. The rest of the controls are good too – not too many for the game to get ridiculous and not too few for it to lose depth. The screen updates quite fast too which was a nice surprise, even though the graphics aren't particularly stunning. For war game fans exclusively.



This is one game that gives other computer owners a swift sharp poke in the eye with a pointy stick. Graphically Prince of Persia is brilliant, with extremely smooth scrolling.

So it's Persia, the Sultan has done a bunk and is fighting some war somewhere and the Grand Vizier Jaffar has taken over and is exploiting the people to an enormous degree.

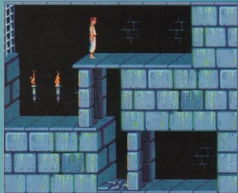
So enough about where I work, what about the game? You have to rescue the princess from where she is imprisoned, destined to marry Jaffar.

It's a very platform-oriented game but don't let that put you off if you aren't really a fan of platform games. You begin your quest in the middle of the castle. You are unarmed so the first thing to do is find a sword. For the most part it's a case of running around and jumping. But you have to be really careful because there are a lot of unsafe floor tiles – some of them open up new rooms to explore and some of them will dump you on huge spikes.

So let's say you've got the sword. Now you can start chopping little bits off people. Most of the baddies you encounter are pretty easy to dispatch when you've got the sword and there are only a couple of moves to master. Prince of Persia would be a pretty nondescript game if it weren't for the graphics, which make it a good buy.

But well done to everybody, especially Paul Roundell – and his mum! – boomed our compere jovially. All was not lost – at least I'd won the sweets.

"And now ladies and gentlemen, please give a big round of applause to our infants for last week's smashing play," he continued, whereupon a dozen or so five-year-olds trooped towards the front to be dutifully furnished with Spangles and Texan Chew Bars.

Scandal! The sweets were for the kiddies and I would go home empty handed for

there was... No... Second... Prize.

Video games have come a long way since the days of Pong – now renamed the Sega Master System – and Thalion are taking a bit of a risk in thrusting yet another racing game into a market already overcrowded with mediocre offerings.

If No Second Prize is to have a hope in hell of raking in a decent chunk of the Christmas loot it will have to provide us with substantially more entertainment than the vast majority of its predecessors.

It does – in fact I think it's safe to say that it's one of the very best racing sims around, and it even has a story. The most completely fabulous one-of-a-kind biketastic dreamcycle in the world is up for grabs – the owner is unknown but has offered his machine as a prize to whoever proves themselves as the best motorcycle racer in the cosmos.

Competition has been narrowed down to just six riders – two women and four chaps – who must now race head to head for ultimate supremacy.

You can choose whichever rider you want to be after checking their individual strengths and weaknesses. Some are particularly good on bends, or may be very fast, while others have a high hit point count, meaning they can sustain all manner of damage and continue racing unabashed.

After making this momentous decision you will then need to decide how to set up your bike. Basically this involves choosing a sensitivity setting for the mouse – no joystick option at all, which is a bit of a shame – and locking the gears onto either manual or automatic. Having done this, you're ready to race. There are 20 tracks in all, and you

must chug bravely round them all for points – coming last actually results in a deduction from your overall score.

Chug really wasn't the right word to use at all, as the game is incredibly fast. Viewed from a 3D driver's eye perspective, it will have you and anyone watching swaying from side to side as you swing around bends, under bridges and into surprised bystanders.

Changing gear manually involves toggling a couple of the keys, and is a bit tricky at first considering control is by mouse. The game has a replay mode, and you can watch your hopelessness from four separate angles including from a chopper – I enjoyed playing the replay backwards as it gave me the impression that I was actually overtaking someone.

Graphics and sound are pretty much what you would expect from this kind of game, which is not meant as a criticism – how could I complain when it's as fast as this? Since my last encounter with a real motorbike resulted in treatment for abrasions in a Greek hospital, I might not be the best person to advise you about the difficulty, but it does seem very hard.

In the races I did manage to finish I came sixth out of six every single time – there's nothing at all wrong with the control, once

mastered – it's just hard.

Hard it may be – but I played it solid five couple hours without becoming even slightly frustrated and I'm dying for another go right now. Well done Thalion on producing one of the best racers I've seen.

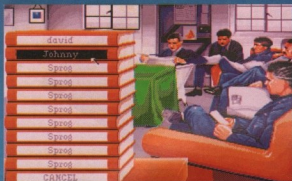

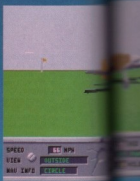

So, let's don our flying jackets, grab our yokes and take to the skies. Or, instead I could just boot up the ST and play Reach for the Skies.

Right the game has loaded. Hmm, it offers a choice of air forces. I could become a low-down, dirty Luftwaffe pilot or I could become a brave and heroic Brit and join the Royal Air Force. The choice is mine. Hmm, a bit of a toughie. Right, proud British fighter pilot it is. Time to jump into

the old Spitfire and give those Jerries a right thrashing and be back in Blighty in time for tea and cakes. Chocks away, chaps.

Almost all of the game is spent in the air in your plane - or I should say planes, because you actually control a squadron. This enables you to hop from plane to plane during battle - very handy if you're about to get blown up.

The 3D is quite impressive, especially when you fly the plane over land. There are plenty of external 3D views, all with the option to zoom in and out.

The controls in Reach for the Skies are really simple. Pull back on the stick to gain altitude, push down on

the stick to lose altitude and left to go left and right to go, err right. Oh, and you push the Fire button to, umm, fire. See, simple.

There are plenty of dials and meters to confuse you and the control panel looks authentic enough.

There is only one little problem with Reach for the Skies, and that is that when you take off it takes you ages before you finally get into battle with the enemy.

You can accelerate time, but it's not very realistic. Fortunately there is an option to start off in the air, so you're much closer to the enemy.

The game is quite difficult and chasing the enemy over land and sea is tough. The enemy always seems to be that one step ahead of you and it is really tough to shoot it down. It wouldn't be much of a challenge if you could shoot them down really easily, though.

Once your flight has been completed you have the great chance to watch it all again by using the video option. OK, so camcorders weren't exactly available back then, but the video option is a very nice touch. You could even send your finished comedy dogfights into Jeremy Beadle and win loads of money.

Despite the little problem, Reach for the Skies is an excellent flight simulator. The presentation is very nice and everything down to the tiniest little detail has been researched, which makes the game that little bit more

Hey, who said Gamer wasn't full of informative ideas? [me, get on with it you prat - Ed]. One thing that I definitely

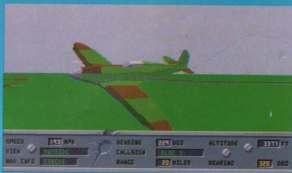
would recommend, even though it's not essential, is that you play the game on an accelerated machine. This makes it mega fast and you will fall in love with it instantly.

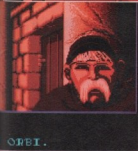

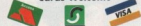

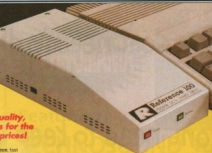

The arrival of Amos Professional has caused quite a few ripples among Amiga programmers, and those of you that have been reading about it will have noticed how much attention is given to the ARexx interface - and rightly so.

The problem with Amos for many programmers was that ARexx was a bit too alien to the Amiga environment. Adding an ARexx interface goes a long way towards making it a truer Amiga environment, while at the same time allowing it to live up to its name as an alternative Amiga Operating System.

The thing with Amos is that it makes so many things so easy - it can almost be viewed as an application generator (like CanDo for instance) rather than a language.

For instance, it offers split screens that are not available under Intuition, it has automatic double-buffering that makes the Intuition alternative look like a nightmare, not to mention all the sprite and animation stuff. With a little thought, it can be used to design excellent interfaces.

Possibilities

Linking all this presentation power with existing Amiga applications opens the door to a lot of possibilities. Most modern Amiga programs support ARexx these days, and it is nice to know that all this software can now be linked to Amos Pro.

After all, there are almost no Amiga application generators without an ARexx port. So I was more than a little curious to see what Amos Pro had to offer.

First of all, if you are using Amos Pro directly from its boot disk, then you will have to load up ARexx separately, using the "rexcmast" command, but if you have been following this series you probably already know that! If you are working from Workbench 2.0, then, of course, ARexx should already be running.

Amos Pro has a special command for running other Amiga programs in the background, called "Exec" - don't confuse this with any other port

The ARexx Library

Calling all ARexx programmers...

If you've recently written an ARexx masterpiece and want the world to know about it, send it in to AC. Continuing to support ARexx is a high priority and as a result we are opening the AC ARexx Library.

With Amos Pro and ARexx, you can get your programs communicating with an unprecedented degree of ease. Alex Gian discusses a minor revolution

of the Amiga's operating system! Any program that could be launched from the CLI can also be launched from within Amos, eg:

```
Exec "d:\logdir\logprogram"
```

Rexcmast can be started like this if necessary. The "Exec" command can also take an optional argument, to determine where the output of the command should go.

The default is NIL. This option was not working on my version of Amos, but a small bug like this is inevitable in these early days. I am sure it will be fixed soon.

If you want to redirect the output of your "Exec" command to a file or window, you can still do so by using the standard DOS redirection operator >, eg:

```
Exec >tempfile "d:\logprog"
```

But since this article is about the ARexx interface, why am I concerning myself so much with the CLI interface? You will see in a minute.

The following Amos instructions and functions are provided for direct support of ARexx:

ARexx Open - Open a special ARexx port.
ARexx Close - Close the ARexx port.
ARexx Exist - Check if a port is really there.
ARexx Wait - Wait patiently for an ARexx message at the special port.
-ARexx - Return the status of any messages at the port.
-ARexxS(n) - Return the nth ARexx argument string.
ARexx Answer n - Reply to an ARexx message, and set the return code.

As you can see they are useful for opening an ARexx port and receiving ARexx messages. They correspond roughly to the equivalent functions of the rexxsupport.library, which we have already seen, but are even simpler, since only the specially opened port is checked.

These commands are meant to be used inside a loop which constantly checks if any new messages have arrived, and processes them as they come in. The technique has been fully described in the Oct '92 issue.

"But hold on a minute!" you may say, "that's all fine for receiving ARexx commands, but what

loud and clear

If I want to send an ARexx message?"

A good question! After all, since we are likely to be using Amos as a front end, it is probably more important to send commands out, than to receive them. That is, you are more likely to want to use Amos to control other programs, than the other way round.

Interestingly, there is no direct way to send ARexx messages out. There is no equivalent of the ARexx instruction "ADDRESS", or any other means of accessing external host ports.

As a result you are left with an ARexx interface that is well implemented, but only half there. I am almost led to suspect that the designers of the ARexx interface were not fully aware of the possibilities of ARexx.

For the time being, if you want to send out ARexx messages you will have to resort to the "Exec" command which we have already mentioned.

Instead of sending out an ARexx command directly from Amos, you write an ARexx script that does the job, and launch it from Amos. If your script is called sendcommand.rexx, then this will do the trick:

```
Exec "rx sendcommand"
```

Your ARexx script must be saved in the rexx: directory, otherwise you must specify the full path. Small command sequences can also be sent directly as strings, but you must remember to embed the quotation mark, eg:

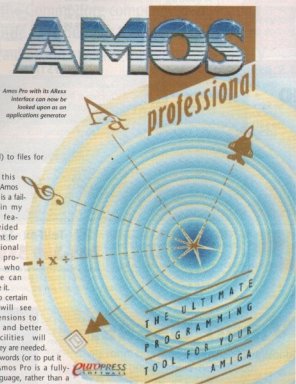
```
Exec "rx <chr(34)>address 'PORT_1' '30_17'"
```

As you can imagine, the above process is not the most elegant, and also slows down the ARexx messages, since they have to go through the DOS layer.

If you want your ARexx scripts to run asynchronously, you can launch them using the:

```
Exec "run rx <SCRIPTNAME>
```

combination. Script outputs can be redirected



Programming interfaces

There is good news for those that would like to program their own interfaces - Amos Pro supports assembly code at two levels.

Firstly, you can open any Amiga library, stuff the processor registers, and call any function, simply by specifying its offset. Special facilities are provided (using an Amos bank), which will automatically give you the EQUates of all the Amiga system structures and all LVO's of all functions. Even structure fields are handled intelligently. This is a brilliant touch.

Unfortunately the automatic system (the SET EQUATE BANK instruction) was not working when I tested it, so I had to get all the values from the include files, but I trust that this will be fixed soon too.

These features are a great way to program the heart of the system interactively, whether you are designing custom ports, or anything else.

Secondly, you can run assembled machine code directly from your Amos programs. Obviously, with this feature any addition can be made to the language.

An apology

In a previous article (Oct '92), I described the ARexx interface of Gold Disk's HyperBook.

At the time I said that despite having one of the best ARexx interfaces I have ever seen, there were minor problems with Workbench 2.0. I am pleased to say that Gold Disk have in fact corrected this.

While it does not have the advanced graphics abilities of a CanDo or Amos, HyperBook still remains one of the most charmingly simple presentation packages to use.

Its excellent ARexx interface also allows it to be hooked up to all sorts of things. My apologies to anyone who may have been put off. Rest assured that HyperBook now works just fine with Workbench 2.0.

DTV for beginners

Have you been putting your close friends and family through festive camcorder torture, endless shots of uncle Frank yodelling into the great white telephone, little Johnnie doing unspeakable things with the Christmas pud, and countless other memorable cinematic moments?

The question is, how do you add a little style to the proceedings? Well, as you've probably guessed, here's where the Amiga comes in.

Although Santa may have only delivered the basics in the form of a standard machine, you're still well on your way to a masterpiece without the need for any additional add-ons.

But before you dive for the record button it's well worth spending some time with the software exploring the massive potential of what has become the ultimate DTV workhorse.

There are a few points you should keep in mind. First, video signals are made up of interlaced signals and as a result you should ensure that the Amiga is using interlace prior to any recording.

Secondly, a standard Amiga display in any resolution is by default smaller than full-screen video. As a result, use of overscan is essential if you want to avoid annoying borders around the edge of your artwork when they appear on-screen.

Saturation limits

The final essential is to ensure that the colours used within the image do not exceed the saturation limits required by a composite signal. To do this before committing any images to tape, first go to the palette requester and select each used colour in turn.

As you do this, the various RGB saturation levels will show as a figure between 0 and 15.5. As you cycle through the colours ensure that saturation levels do not exceed 12 in any of the three colour fields.

This is an essential to avoid the dreaded colour bleeding often associated with Composite/VHS video. This prerequisite applies to any project bound for videotape. As a consequence, always stick firmly to this figure.

Within certain packages the 0 to 15.5 levels are replaced by a 0 to 255 system for increased accu-

racy. Within such packages the maximum levels should not exceed 192 to avoid excessive blood-letting.

Aside for the essential interlace, optional but advisable interlace and of course adherence to suitable saturation levels, the rest is pretty much up to your imagination.

However, there are a few pointers which make life much easier and your creations even more impressive. For example when using brightly coloured text on equally colourful backdrops it's always a good idea to use a dark keyline around the text.

This is yet another ploy in the battle against bleeding. Even when composite saturation levels are met, second or third generation copies can still bleed badly without the intervention of the aforementioned keyline.

Yet again good old DPaint comes to the rescue with an automatic keyline feature entitled Edge which can be found lurking within the brush menu. To employ the feature, simply cut your text out as a brush and then highlight and release the edge feature.

It may need several applications to arrive at the desired keyline, but once complete you instantly solve the problem of second generation bleeding and in addition make your creations far more eye-catching in the process.

Apart from basic colour precautions the only other essential aspect of quality control is to invest in quality RCA/phono connections. Whenever possible always use well insulated connections and try avoid excessive cable length.

If both of the above are ignored, image quality will invariably suffer due to the sometimes frightening amounts of interference generated by assorted household appliances.

As far as design is concerned, a touch of animation is always a real crowd-pleaser. Again DPaint comes to the rescue with arguably the best anim control and system of any Amiga paint

package. If you're still not in a fit state to begin wading through the DPaint manual, a little experimentation can soon fill in for actual study time. First create the number of frames you require then design a logo or opening title.

Next cut out the graphic as a brush and then stamp it down with the right mouse button in the desired position. Now select the move requester from the anim pull-down menu and simply type a few random figures into the distance and angle windows.

Experimentation

In the case of the angles it's usually a good idea to stick with 45 degree increments in order to keep things tidy.

Now before you do anything else, under no circumstances hit the draw button as it's here where the experimentation begins. On the other side of the requester you'll find the Preview option which allows unlimited dry runs prior to actually drawing, which on complex or large anims can take an age, especially on standard machines.

When you're happy with the effect, simply click on the draw button and make yourself a well-earned coffee while the software automatically renders the anim.

Once complete you can add additional frames by simply moving to the end of the anim and appending as many frames as you need. As long as you don't go mad, even a standard machine will be more than capable of generating an impressive anim/title sequence.

Once your creation is complete, simply connect the Modulator Out to the Video In on your VCR and record your masterpiece onto the desired section of tape using the RF out on the video - connected to a TV - as a guide to placement.

If possible make a copy of your master prior to recording as once the button is hit there's no way back. Happy tittling...

Built for the job

Due to the basic design of the Amiga, DTV comes as second nature. Apart from the machine's unrivalled graphic power, other essentials include a video-standard 15Hz signal, overscan and interlaced output and in the case of the A600/1200 a built-in modulator which makes the DTV connection almost embarrassingly simple.

Aside from the essential hardware in the form of an Amiga and a suitable VCR/camcorder, the only other prerequisite is good old DPaint which almost everyone gets as part of the Commodore bundles.

Using libraries

A third-generation language like Basic or Cobol can be coded quickly, but the program runs slowly – the source code is people friendly.

A second-generation language like assembler is coded slowly and painfully, but the program runs quickly – the source code is computer friendly.

The C language is somewhere in-between – it is reasonably quick to write, and can be compiled into fairly efficient machine code.

C is becoming standardised. This makes it very portable. Source code can be written and tested on one type of computer, then compiled into object code, tested and run.

The source code can then be copied to a completely different type of computer (or network), and should compile and run successfully.

C does not have input and output facilities of its own – these are added from a library or set of related routines that can be linked with the object code. Each compiler comes with a set of standard C library high level input and output functions.

Lower level

In addition there are several Amiga libraries, each containing lower level routines for use in your programs. These functions are often called by higher level C library functions.

These programming pages will concentrate on the Amiga library routines rather than the C syntax, unless I have a storm of protest from my readers.

The C language can be extended almost indefinitely, by adding routines and creating a custom library, or by including third-party libraries.

Let's look at C Libraries. The main compiler header directory contains some header files (they have .h as a suffix) in addition to its sub-directories.

These header files contain the ANSI-compatible prototypes of the standard input and output functions, and other definitions.

To use one of these functions, the appropriate header file should be included with the source code. This command tells the compiler to add the header file at compile time, but not clutter the source code with it.

This source code will be more portable than the source code using Amiga Library routines, but not

Library routines can help both assembler and C programmers. Margaret Stanger does some borrowing

as versatile or efficient. The program source code listing (olib.c) is on the CoverDisk. When the object program (olib) is run, the program displays a message using the built-in formatted print "printf" command, and then another message by using the standard library "printf" command to write to the current output file or console.

The main Amiga libraries used are Exec, DOS, graphics and Intuition. Exec library routines handle the multitasking and the lowest level of interaction between the hardware and the software.

DOS library routines handle input and output control. Associated with each library is a special file with the extension ".ld", these files are usually found on the Extras disk in their own directory.

An .ld file contains a list of the routines in the library, together with the input parameters that each routine takes. The more recent ANSI-compatible compilers have a proto directory included with the compiler headers.

Prototype

This directory has a header file for each library, containing the prototype for each command. If you open an Amiga library at run time, all its routines become available. The linker knows where to find the routines, and can link them to the rest of the object code.

The OpenLibrary routine is found in the Exec library, all the Exec library routines are always available.

Assembler programmers can now have sprites designed using a program like DPaint. The height, colours and pixel data can be saved on disk and read into an assembler program when required.

Each sprite has a data list of data word pairs. The first two words of each sprite's data are control words to initialise the sprite.

Bits 15 to 8 of the first control word contain the vertical position of the first line of the sprite, bits 7 to 0 contain the sprite's horizontal start position.

Bits 15 to 8 of the second control word contain the line after the last vertical line of the sprite. Bits 2 to 0 of the second control word contain the most significant bits of the first line, last line and horizontal position respectively.

The last two data words always contain zero. The intervening data

words contain the pixel data. The first two sprites use colours 16 to 19, the next two 20 to 23, the next two 24 to 27 and the last two 28 to 31.

The sprite data is copied into chip memory. The Copper list can be set up to copy the address of the start of each sprite's data into the appropriate SPRPT registers. The colour instructions can also be included in the Copper list.

The DPaint utility was used to save two sprites as separate "brushes", producing a short IFF file for each brush. I designed the sprites to be 16 pixels wide, I used four colours, the first being transparent.

The file reader module "readsprite.a" can read and interpret this file, or a similar file produced by another artist program.

The routine "readfile" is similar to the IFF sprite file in last month's Amiga Computing, a simplified picture file reader without a routine to unscramble compressed data.

The routine can return the height of the sprite to the calling program. The routine is:

```
spriteheight = readfile(sprite, sprite, colourlist)
(0, 0, 0, 0)
```

The inputs are:

name – the pointer to the name of the file containing the data

sprite – a pointer to the memory array to hold the sprite

bitplane data (the address of the third word of the sprite)

colourlist – a pointer to the memory storing the colours for the sprite (the colourlist address plus an offset for colour 16, 20, 24 or 28)

The output in Register 'd0' is:

spriteheight – the height of the sprite contained in the file

The routine will look for the usual chunkheaders in an IFF file. The BMAP chunk will be decoded to give the sprite height – the other data is either known (width and depth) or irrelevant (data from the screen the brush was saved on).

The CMAP chunk contains the colours used when the sprite was designed. These colours will be copied into the correct place in the colourlist.

The BODY chunk contains the bitplane data – the routine copies it into chosen area in memory. All other chunks are read, and their data ignored. The routine could easily be extended to process these chunks.

The sprite height is returned so that the position of the last line of the sprite can be calculated and put in the second sprite control word. The main program will then have all the necessary sprite and colour information for the Copper list.

Demo routines

The short demo program amilib on the CoverDisk uses five library routines. From the Exec library, OpenLibrary(libName, version) opens a chosen library. A pointer to the library base is returned. CloseLibrary(library) closes a library.

From the Dos Library, Delay(timeout) waits for a given time-out. Output() finds the file handle for writing text in the current window. A pointer to the current filehandle is returned.

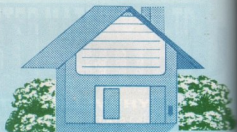
Write(filehandle, buffer, length) will write to a file or a window. The complete program source code listing (amilib.c) is on the CoverDisk.

When the object program (amilib) is run, the program opens the DOS library. If the library opens successfully, the program displays a short message, delays for a few seconds, closes the library and exits.

Sound essentials

Whether you're a dedicated muso or just an interested bystander with a shiny new machine waiting at your fingertips, getting into Amiga music can be much cheaper and simpler than you might imagine.

To start we'll look at the market from the bystanders position, highlighting the cheap and cheerful products which for as little as £2 allow an absolute beginner to create music on a par with anything found on commercial games software.

As you've probably guessed, we're talking PD and more precisely Med – a program that's been the premier PD soundtracker clone for longer than most Amiga musos would care to remember.

Due to its prolific success and countless updates – courtesy of its creator Teigo Kinnunen – the PD libraries are literally fit to burst with countless revisions of the aforesaid Med.

However, if you're after the very latest offering Amiganuts United is undoubtedly the first place to look, primarily because they've managed to obtain exclusive rights to distribute the licenceware eight channel version which when complete with manual comes in at a less than PD price tag of £30.

Commodore 64

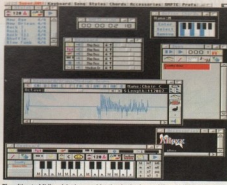
Although eight channels may sound more attractive than the four track shareware alternative the additional tracks do not play samples but merely sequence Commodore 64-style synth sounds.

For the beginner these additional tracks aren't essential. As a result, the four track is perhaps the ideal beginners choice for testing the water prior to the larger investment in the licenceware alternative.

As mentioned above, almost all the major libraries – with the exception of Amiganuts – carry the four track version for around £2. When ordering be sure it's the latest, namely v3.20.

Like all the soundtracker clones, Med employs standard 8-bit samples as its primary sound source. These can be either created yourself – see this month's sampler roundup – or alternatively there are a wide selection of pre-recorded effects and instruments that can be bought direct either on disk or CD from PD libraries or dedicated sample suppliers.

If you're happier with pre-recorded sounds, quality commercial sources include the Zero-G Datafiles which carry both CD and disk-based col-

lections. They're available direct from:

Although of excellent quality, the vast majority of the Zero-G samples are heavily dance-oriented with assorted scratches and popular hook lines.

For any would-be DJs or rave fans the collection is ideal. However if you're planning to build original tracks from the ground up the next collection, namely the Sample Series, is probably a more attractive proposition.

This series comes from those loveable Mancunians at Gajts Music Software. Unlike the Zero-G collection, the Sample Series is comprised entirely of sounds borrowed from the latest synths. If you're interested in a more purist approach to plagiarism you can obtain the aforesaid collection from:

A step up the ladder

If you're still got a few pennies spare from Christmas, Blue Ribbon Soundworks offer an intermediate package which allows the user to employ

their own or pre-recorded samples as part of an automated six-part accompaniment.

The software, entitled Superjam, allows you to begin building a bridge between the internal sounds of the machine and the world of Midi. The package works by allowing you to assign any one of numerous styles which then form the framework within which your five automated musicians will literally jam along with.

All you need to do is add the chords of your choice and of course play your part as the lead soloist. No matter what chord progression you add, the other members will automatically play a suitable accompaniment.

For example, if you specify a rock style with a chord progression of say E minor, G and A, your automated bass player is almost certain to rip straight into Smoke on the Water!

OK, nobody said the package is perfect, but with a bit of practice you can easily generate perfectly acceptable lift music which can then be worked into a pseudo-original or used directly as backing music on various multimedia exploits.

Besides the fun and functionality of the package, the beauty is that it's equally at home with Midi information as it is with converted Amiga samples.

If you're looking for an affordable and interesting introduction to composition plus both an educational and speedy production tool, Superjam is perfect.

Easy affordable Midi

If you're looking to side-step the internal features of the Amiga altogether, there's a whole selection of budget-conscious sequencers waiting in the wings.

Although all of the programs listed are primarily aimed at Midi, they also all fully support the machines internal abilities with equal enthusiasm.

While this is not a particularly strong selling point in the eyes of serious users, it does mean that if Midi music is your goal but finances mean a wait for the necessary hardware, you can still come to terms with the software via standard Amiga samples and then apply your

new-found skills later on. Ideal choices for any potential investor include Sequencer One Plus, MusicX and Bars & Pipes Professional.

The first of the three is perhaps the ideal choice boasting an extremely user friendly editing system and intuitive design.

On the downside, the package isn't the cheapest as the now rather elderly but usable MusicX easily lays claim to that particular title.

MusicX itself was easily the hottest item on the Amiga music scene a few years back and still

remains a viable option especially if you're prepared to shop around. The final option is to throw caution to the wind and invest in Bars & Pipes Professional which although far from cheap offers a degree of expandability only equalled by KCS 3.5.

The reason for the Bars & Pipes Pro bias as opposed to KCS is simply that although the two are on a par for power, Bars & Pipes Pro is much easier to master for the outright beginner.

E-mail culture

I wonder how many people reading this have acquired a shiny new modem over the festive period? If you are one, do you know how to behave in the comms world? Do you know what to do and not do to make yourself welcome?

Like any other community activity, the golden rule is to consider others as well as yourself. In comms this basically means you should be aware of what your activities are costing others.

Although access to most BBSs is free (other than the cost of your phone bill), somebody has to pay for all the files and message areas made available to you.

A BBS is generally run on an amateur basis. The sysop is using his own equipment that he's bought with his own money. He's also paying at least rental for the phone line you dial in on.

One of the biggest attractions of a modem is the opportunity it gives you to grab software cheaply and easily. You find the file you want, download it, and bingo - the latest version, or patch, or demo has cost you just a few pence.

But how do these files become available to you in the first place? Where does the BBS get them from?

Cheapest

Well there are several ways for sysops to grab files for their lists. The simplest is for users like you to upload interesting programs to the BBS. This is also the cheapest for the sysop.

Another way is for the sysop to download new files from other boards, which costs him money. Yet a third way is for you to send the sysop files on disk - a lot cheaper than uploading if you have a slow modem.

Just check to make sure the sysop can handle your disk - many boards catering for Amiga users are actually run on PCs.

Most boards have an upload/download ratio policy. This simply means that you can only download a certain number of files before you must upload something to the board.

The snag with this is that you might not have any software that isn't already on the board. If

you feel like this, don't worry. You're not alone.

An alternative which many sysops are happy with is for you to become active in the message areas. The more interesting messages a board contains, the more attractive it is to other users of that board.

Yet another alternative is a download credit system. With this you literally buy credits, each credit allowing a certain number of bytes to be downloaded.

Some boards running this system even give download credits as prizes in competitions on the board.

Panic

When either uploading or downloading, try to check your own setup as far as you can before calling on the sysop for help. Take your time too.

It's very easy to panic while you're worrying about a phone bill, but it's well worth checking out any instructions. Menus and prompts are generally easy to use if you stop and think about what you're trying to do. Common sense is all you really need to work things out.

One of the most regular problems is setting

"protocols". These are methods of computers talking to each other - like Zmodem and so on - and need to be the same at both your end and the BBS end.

What it boils down to is that your local BBS is providing you with a free service. If you want to stay on good terms with the sysop you should try to put in as much as you get out of the board.

A very common complaint among sysops is the rudeness of callers who log in to their boards, trawl the file lists, download everything in sight, then simply log off again without so much as saying "Thanks".

It only takes a few seconds to leave a message for the sysop, and your feedback on a board's services will always be welcome. That's not just a computer at the other end of the line. There's a human being there too!

Keep your sysop happy

● Always give your real name and phone number when you register. Think how you would feel if a stranger knocked on your door and gave you a false name.

● Take a few seconds to read any news, bulletins, instructions and so on - it'll save you far more time and money in the long run.

● Don't ring the sysop voice at night - the BBS may be running but the sysop is probably tucked up in bed. If you need help during unsocial hours, just leave a message then log on again another time.

● If a board states the hours it's on-line, respect the fact that the BBS probably shares the family phone line. Don't call outside the stated hours.

● Always log off the board using the option provided in the menu. If you don't you could leave the board thinking you're still there, and denying access to other users.

● If you must log off "illegally"

(dropped carrier for instance), try to let the sysop know what happened - it will help him sort out any problems your accident may have caused.

● When uploading files, try to compress them first - sysops don't have unlimited hard disk space. And try to use a common compression technique to make things simple for any other users.

● If the board's file areas are sorted

into sections, upload to the correct area. If not, upload to the sysop's general area. Either way, leave a description of the file too.

● If you want to download a file which will take longer than you have available, ask the sysop nicely and he'll probably upgrade your access temporarily.

● Don't pester the sysop for privileged access to the board. When he trusts you, and knows what you want and need, he'll probably upgrade you permanently anyway.

The right tracks

It seems that every program on the Amiga written with Amos has some lovely piece of music to go with it. Don't you wish that you could make music like that? Well you can.

It's tempting to steal other people's music off of bulletin boards, demos and so on. But wait, don't touch that dial.

The tracker programs you need to make beautiful music are all public domain, with the exception of certain versions of MED which are what they call "licenceware".

These disks costs a bit more than PD disks, but the author of the program gets a royalty every time the program is sold. They almost always feature what we call in the trade a "pattern editor" like you find on most modern drum machines and certain Midi sequencers.

The sounds in trackers are always samples, like the kind you can make with your own sound sampler, with the exception again of MED which also uses the sound chip in the Amiga to create synthesized sounds, what we call "chip music".

Most trackers come with disks of sounds for you to get started. The way they work is that you assemble patterns, short sequences of music lasting for 64 beats.

Make a chain

Then when you've made a pattern for your verse, chorus and other fill-ins etc, you chain them all together to make a complete piece of music.

You specify which pattern you'd like to play and in what order, and the program plays each pattern in turn to make meaningful music. Sometimes.

So for example you could have an intro on pattern 1, a verse on pattern 2, a chorus on pattern 3 and a fill-in on pattern 4.

The real kick of a pattern-based sequencer is that you only have to input your patterns once and then they can be played and arranged as many times as you like, rather than a more linear system which would mean you'd have to type the tune in every time.

Creating pleasant music with a tracker is easy, as

Pro users take note

Lucky users of Amos Professional will know that, of course, Amos Pro is able to use files from MED and Noisetacker (and its various clones) directly using libraries and features built in to the program.

If you are using Amos Pro you don't need to use a converter or any of the programs mentioned. You do however need a copy of MED or Noisetacker to make the music in the first place.

I should also say that the most up to date version of MED isn't in the public domain, but is available as licenceware, where the author gets a fee each time the program is bought.

you can have four tracks (in some cases even eight with programs like OctaMED Professional) and you can put the notes in one at a time in what we call "step time", or play along with the other tracks live on the keyboard in what is termed "real time".

Step time is easier for learners as you can fiddle about with each track of the pattern until it sounds right, like typing words into a wordprocessor and editing them until the spelling and syntax is perfect.

Once a piece of tracker music has been made, or produced, you can convert it to Amos ABK for-

mat and load it into a program or into a bank in Direct mode. The Amos disks contain many different converters to serve most of the different kinds of tracker such as Noisetacker, Soundtracker, StarTrekker, Protracker, Games Music Creator, Sonix and so on.

All you do is run these very clever little Amos programs and they read in a tracker file and spit out a ABK file onto disk ready to be loaded.

Some of these programs work fine, but the problem is that so many of the tracker programs (being in the PD for some time now) have all been revamped and re-written so that they are very different in format from the originals.

Some tracker tunes will not play properly once they've been converted. Usually the reason is that the samples are too long or the system has changed.

Either the tracker has a pattern length which is variable and not fixed at 64, or it stores its samples in a different way. Luckily, there are ways around this - see the programs documented in the box on this page for some ideas.

Do try to cultivate the use of tracker programs. You'll find they are not as hard to use as you might think, and the results will be all your own work, rather than just a steal from someone else.

Musical tools

A recent addition to the Deja Vu licenceware library is Music Engine by Paul Townsend (aka Technical Fred Software).

This program lets you use tracker music without having to convert it. What this program provides is an interface between Amos and the Shell.

You can use this to play many different music file formats, and this is done by running an appropriate "player program" which means you can hear the music without having to convert it.

Once you've bought the Music Engine program from Deja Vu, you are free to use the source code, if it's for public domain, shareware or licenceware use, providing of course you acknowledge the source of your source. If you



want to use the routines in a piece of commercial software, however, then you have to contact the programmers to arrange a suitable fee.

Music Engine is a very powerful tool, and not just for driving music programs. The trick is a very good one, and although it's handy for music, it's powerful enough to run any program from the Workbench, effectively making your Amos system multitask with other programs.

Another fine program disk from the Amos PD Library is the MED Utils disk, containing a copy of MED v2.13 and some convert utilities to make the SoundTracker modules from MED more palatable to the ST-to-ABK converters. The disk number is APD155.



Clips ahoy!

One thing that can really slow down the desktop publishing process is when you have to stop and draw a graphic to illustrate something, especially if you are not too good at pixel painting.

I tend to draw things on paper and then scan them, finding this a much quicker way to achieve what I want than trying to do it with Deluxe Paint or whatever.

But it still takes time, and it would speed things along no end if I had a massive clip art library into which I could dip and pull out an appropriate graphic.

Good Amiga clip art has been hard to find. Many PD libraries have disks full of the stuff, but in my experience 99 per cent of it is unusable, either because it has been poorly drawn in the first place or because the images are so small or of such a low resolution that you can hardly see what they are.

It's encouraging, then, to see more and more dedicated Amiga clip art companies advertising their wares. We're going to look at two collections in this article, both of bitmapped (IFF-ILBM) clip art.

Volumes

The Artworks clip art collection contains more than 1,400 images in total, spread over eight volumes, each disk containing between 115 and 270 images.

Each volume covers a specific theme. Currently these are: Pets; Castles; Cottages & Churches; Trees; Signs & Symbols; Wild Animals; Prehistoric Life; Signs & Symbols II and Weddings & Family Occasions.

Everything is in straight black-and-white, perfect for the mono desktop publisher. The individual images are collected together on a number of pages. To use an image you must load the page into a paint package, cut out the image you require, and save it as a brush. Then you can import it into your DTP package.

All the images have been expertly drawn on a computer – no roughly scanned stuff here. Some are incredibly intricate, like the skeletons on the Prehistoric Life disk and the bouquets of flowers on

Weddings & Family Occasions. Others are simpler, like most of the incredibly useful Signs & Symbols.

If you were to buy the whole collection at once, it works out to an average of less than 4p per image – buy a single disk and they work out at between 3p and 6p each, depending on which disk you buy.

Jaggies

If I have one criticism it is that on the whole the individual images tend to be too small. Most have to be published at quite a small size in order to get rid of the bitmap jaggies – scale them up large and, like all low resolution bitmaps, they look awful.

But most of the time you don't tend to use this kind of clip art large, so I guess it's the old swings and roundabouts scenario again – if the images were larger you wouldn't get so many on a disk, and consequently they would end up costing more each.

Unlike a lot of clip art collections I have seen, 99 per cent of Artworks' stuff is extremely high quality with respect to perspective, scale and detail.

Perhaps the only area where there is room for improvement is with the few images that feature people's faces, which don't contain much character.

But I'm picking nits. This collec-

tion is certainly very good value for money, and is highly recommended.

The Magic Clip-Art Company has come up with an idea to try to reduce the bitmap jaggies. Although all the images in its collection are basically black-and-white, they have all been subtly blended with greyscales around the black outlines (called "anti-aliasing") so that when they are printed the jaggies are not so evident.

There are 23 disks currently available, grouped into seven subjects. Because these are 16 colour pictures, each disk contains only between 18 and 26 images, but each image has been saved individually so you don't have to bother loading them into a painting package to cut out brushes.

Whimsical Animals, 94 images on four disks, are cute cartoons of animals, usually with a large white space left free where some text can be added.

This kind of stuff is of limited use and tends to get used quickly when use a lot, but on the plus side the images are quite large, and are very well drawn.

Well drawn

Three disks of Funny Attention Getters (76 images) are along the same lines as the Whimsical Animals – well drawn cartoon images with white spaces for text.

The 86-image Sports collection comes on four disks and features action snapshots from most popular sporting activities, and a few that aren't so popular.

These real-life images aren't so expertly drawn as the aforementioned cartoons, and a few of the athletes look positively unattractive.

But if you are producing a sportsy newsletter, you'll find them useful enough. The Recreation collection is really an extension of Sports, another 79 images on four disks.

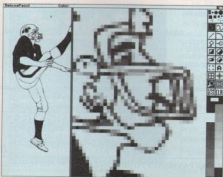
Finally there's Silhouettes, 70 on three disks. Subject matter varies greatly here, from sport to animals to shopping to weddings.

The anti-aliasing does indeed help to reduce the apparent jaggedness of the images when printed large, although if printed very large everything tends to have a fuzzy look around the edges. Printed small they look fine.

Cost per image averages out at about 25p each, making them a tad expensive compared to the Artworks collection. But then these are larger images, so you are able to publish them larger without the jaggies getting too bad.

Developing CDTV

Since multimedia became a buzzword some years back, much play has been made of the huge investment needed before development can even begin.

Yet on the Amiga CD-ROM development is surprisingly easy and relatively cheap. Indeed I know of at least one developer who, refreshingly and contrary to traditional marketing wisdom, is quite proud to explain how their development is carried out in a bedroom!

CDTV software development consists of several distinct phases. Firstly any graphics (moving or still frame) and sound must be "captured" and stored in digital form, enabling them to be manipulated and stored by the Amiga/CDTV.

Secondly, the actual software is written - digital data and software are closely integrated to the extent that until the format and nature of the files that hold the graphics is known, software development is limited.

These two stages are typically done on standard Amiga systems, albeit are accelerated and equipped with some serious capacity hard drives. The software is written and tested as normal Amiga software until it is finished.

Third-party

The next stage is the movement of the software and images to CD-ROM. This is done by a third-party company who return a single master CD.

With this master, final testing is done. Believe it or not, until this stage, the application will never have been loaded or used on a CD-ROM! Typically this master CD-ROM will contain some errors and the software will need to be tweaked and a new master created.

Once this testing is complete, the master is sent to Commodore US for approval. Having finally passed all the testing, it is sent off for duplication. Then it finds its way to the shops for selling.

Just now I explained that the images and sound are "captured". This makes it sound a lot simpler than it really is. Image capture and sound capture are a specialist area in their own right.

In its most basic form you could use a standard Amiga sound sampler for audio data, a video digi-

tiser to grab still frames from a moving picture source and a flatbed scanner (Sharp, Datel etc) for printed matter.

Strangely - and purely as a sideline - it is actually a lot simpler and cheaper to capture images for use in a computer than it is to digitally reproduce an image or photograph for commercial printing. The reason for this is that printing resolutions are currently a lot higher than typical screen resolutions.

A point of caution to wanna-be CDTV developers - when considering which pictures and sounds to use in your application play careful attention to copyrights.

Several large American computer companies, realising the importance that classic works of art will have in the future of multimedia and their value as such, have already started buying (in bulk) the copyrights of original classics!

This is also the reason why companies like Sony, with their huge libraries of commercial films and records, are so valuable as developers of multimedia applications.

Next month I'll take a detailed look at the actual software that is available for development purposes. But to round this month off, here's a quick taster.

For actual software development there are a great number of programming languages available which can be used. For the fastest programs you can't beat assembler (which is the "native language" of the CDTV and Amiga).

Cryptic

Unfortunately writing programs in this native language is not easy, with commands being cryptic and far more work being required to write assembler programs than other languages. But if you're a perfectionist and want the fastest programs, you can't beat it.

For the more light-hearted, there are a growing number of software tools which allow you to write applications using English-like instructions. One of the most popular development tools of this kind is Amos. This program allows Amiga software to be written easily and simply.

Another easy development package is Scala, which is brilliant if you can't program but want to create multimedia applications.

It's older brother

Scala MM is considerably more powerful but has limitations in that you can't produce standalone applications that can be given away.

These four programs are my firm favourites for multimedia development, but there are also a lot more (some better, some not) and next month I'll be taking a look at these.

For those wishing to start development, it's probably first worth looking at some of the many CDTV titles now available, testing them and generally playing around with them - alternatively you could always read the review of CDTV software in this very issue.

In this way, you can find out the mistakes, errors and also the good points that other developers have made, and in doing so save yourself making the same errors, or incorporate the nice features you've found in your own programs.

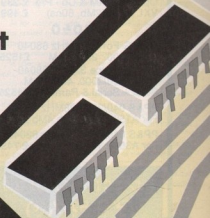

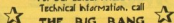

From the evidence of our recent mail order survey, far too many readers have suffered the ultimate mail order rip-off when, having paid in advance for goods, the items fail to materialise.

Surprisingly, your answers also indicate that few of our regular readers take the matter up with the authorities, presumably either because they resign themselves to the situation, or they are unsure about their rights.

Consumer protections can be broken down into two broad categories - those dealing with the advertiser's duties, and those concerned with the customer's rights. The two often overlap, but it is always best to simplify such a complex subject.

Advertisers have a duty according to the Advertising Standards Authority guidelines to ensure that their advertisements are legal, decent, honest, and truthful.

In other words, if they specify a delivery date, the goods must be delivered within the specified time. If a product is advertised as having certain properties, it must match the claims made for it.

Additionally, any special conditions stated, such as money back offers, delivery options (courier, same day dispatch, and so on) or "guaranteed satisfaction" claims must be adhered to.

Few Amiga owners seem to realise that if a company fails to deliver within their own deadline or a reasonable period of time (28 days is the normally accepted period), the customer can write to the company stating that the goods are no longer wanted and that a refund is required.

The company has a legal duty to return the money as it will have failed to meet normal trading standards. If the money is not returned, the consumer has several options.

First, writing to the company concerned by registered post, detailing the date of the advertisement, the goods ordered, price, and date when the order was posted or telephoned, the customer should make the strongest possible complaint about the company's poor service. There is little point in pussy-footing around when a company fails to deliver.

If this approach fails to elicit a satisfactory response, such as a firm promise to deliver the goods within a certain time, the customer should take the matter further. Far too many people seem determined to waste their own time and energy in protracted postal arguments with companies who have already shown themselves to be untrustworthy.

Remember, though, that if an alternative offer is made and the customer accepts it, all bets are off and you must wait until the agreed time elapses.

Step two is to consult a consumer advisor, either at the

local Citizens' Advice Bureau or Trading Standards office. Experts at these offices will be happy to offer advice on the best way to proceed in your particular case, and a letter from such an organisation to the guilty party might be enough to prompt some action.

Depending on whether the guilty company or publication in which the advertisement appeared is a member of certain trade organisations, a recognised scheme of compensation may be available.

For example, the Periodical Publishers' Association runs its own mail order protection scheme according to which the monthly magazine compensates its readers; then claims the money from the defuncting company.

The scheme is expensive and it is not used by many monthly magazines as it relies on the ability or honesty of the directors of companies to meet the personal promises they make to the publishers.

Other protection schemes include MOPS (Mail Order Protection Scheme) run by many national daily papers, and the code of practice insisted upon by the Mail Order Traders' Association.

If a company is a member of MOTA, any complaints about a company's bad faith should be addressed to the organisation, which will investigate alleged breaches of the code.

Companies sporting MOTA's symbol will normally be of the more reputable variety and less likely to rip off their customers, but the more safety nets there are, the better. A simi-

lar code of practice is enforced by the Association of Mail Order Publishers (AMOP), but as this organisation consists mostly of book and record clubs, it doesn't figure greatly in the Amiga market.

As for customer rights, there are several. Apart from the rights created by the duties imposed upon trading companies, customers have the little-publicised right to a full refund if the goods are returned within seven days of delivery.

In other words, if a hard drive was advertised as "lightning quick" - a nondescript claim which it would be difficult to either prove or refute - and the customer found it to be less than so in his or her opinion, a full refund could be claimed regardless of any other considerations.

This is a statutory right and one which no company can overturn. In addition, the customer can insist on a delivery date when a product is ordered.

If the company agrees to this, the customer can refuse to pay for goods if they arrive late, regardless of the company's usual delivery times.

Forcing the full extent of the law and consumer rights on mail order companies is the only way to force the unreliable outfits to get their houses in order.

Home Music Kit

Picture this scenario. You are a bit of a music buff. You're sat down at home on a Sunday, twiddling your thumbs. Harry Secombe is screaming his head off on Highway and you are bored with a capital "B".

What you need is something to occupy yourself with. What could be better than escaping off to your Amiga and laying down some music tracks?

Alas, you have no music package. You are also a bit of a beginner when it comes to the actual making of music.

What you really need is a sampler to be really cheeky and nix loads of samples from other top pop/rock/rave musicians. A sequencer and a sound processor would come in handy as well.

Unfortunately you'd need some really expensive kit to make the kind of sounds you want, so what are you going to do about it? Well, a package that might suit your needs is the Home Music Kit by Power Computing.

There are two main parts to the Home Music Kit. Real Time Sound Processor 2 is one and Digital Sound 3 is the other. Real Time Sound Processor allows you to add special effects to your music while the digital sound studio lets you create your own music by putting together various parts of different songs, and remaking them to your own needs.

Apart from the software there is also the hardware. This is the stereo sound digitiser which fits snuggly into the parallel port of your Amiga and is only slightly larger than your average bar of soap.

Before you start to create the tunes you want, you can to change the sounds by adding special effects to them - but only if you want to. You can sample whatever you want, but by adding the special effects you can add your own personal touch to the music.

The screen of Real Time Sound Processor consists of three windows. The first is the adjustment window which allows you to change the parameters relative to the current effect. Each parameter has a slider which allows you to change the values.

The next window is the logic window. This represents the

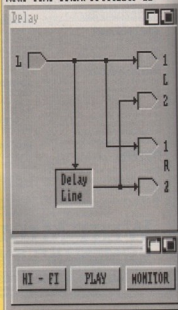

parameters graphically in a logic diagram window. This will allow you to see at which moment the parameters will start influencing the sound. It's not entirely useful, but is very educational.

The last window is the control window. This allows you to listen to the sound transformed by the special effect, and you do this by clicking on the Play button.

There are another two buttons in the window. One is the Monitor button, the other the Hi-Fi button. Monitor allows you to listen to the sound directly without any effects - very handy if you keep on flicking between the Play and Monitor

buttons to hear exactly how the sound has changed.

The Hi-Fi button lets you activate or de-activate the audio filter of the Amiga.

There are 32 special effects to choose from. These range from simple echoing effects to a stereo phaser to choruses to flanges to just about any effect you can think of.

If you have enough memory you can have up to 10 effects loaded in the memory simultaneously. Another helpful option

Video Master

It is usually a foregone conclusion that when different pieces of hardware are combined into a single package it's going to be a load of rubbish. Video Master is the exception to the rule. It is, in short, probably the best piece of hardware for the A500 that I have seen this year.

Video Master is described as an integrated multimedia video and audio sampler which is a bit of a mouthful, but it is what it says and it does one hell of a job.

The hardware itself is just a box that you plug into the side of your 500. This is where you plug your audio and video sources in. Setting it up is a doddle - just slot in the box and off you go.

Plug your video source directly into the box - you don't need an extra TV screen to monitor the video source because the software copies very well, but I'll explain about that later.

When the software is booted up you can choose the sampler, the digitiser or the sequencer. Firstly I had a play with the digitiser.

The source monitor is a 3in by 5in box in the top left-hand corner of the screen, and with this you can

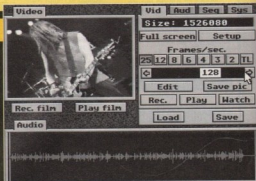
watch the video image and get it to where you want to grab from.

When your video image is where you want it, you just click on the record button and off you go. The length of the film you grab depends on the amount of memory, but don't let that put you off.

I was using a bog standard A500 1Mb and I was getting a good 10 to 15 seconds of film at 25 frames per second. If you want you can grab at a slower frame rate to get more film time.

You can put the film rates to a practical use. For example if you take a ten-second sample at 12 frames/sec then play it at 25 frames/sec it will obviously become faster on the playback.

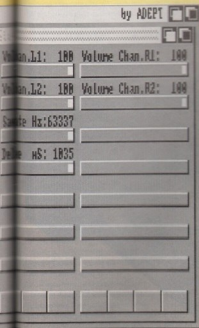
Nothing can describe the playback you get after you have grabbed the video image. It's absolutely wonderful. The image is crisp and the frames run as smooth as silk. You must bear in mind that the



images are greyscale but that really doesn't matter - I was completely gobsmacked.

After you have grabbed the film you can do all manner of strangeleries to it. If you click on the screen control button Tint you can grab the film in any one of six colour shades. Alternatively you can colour individual frames.

The aspect of the video section I was most



is the facility to link the program to a Midi instrument.

This way you can modify the sounds coming out of your Midi instrument, so one of your pre-set sounds can be altered in 32 different ways.

If making music starts getting a bit boring and you feel like a break, then why not try hooking up a microphone to the sound processor? You can now sound like a Dalek or as if you're in a concert hall. Try to keep a straight face while shouting "exterminate" I can guarantee you'll collapse in a fit

of giggles. Not very proper I know, but fun is one of the main reasons for making music! So, you've had your fun, now back to the business of making music using the Digital Studio.

You can either load up an altered sample or record a brand new one without any effects on it. Before you record a sample you must first set the frequency (rate) and size of it.

The rate range is in hertz – the higher the hertz the better quality sample, the lower the worst. The size allows you to set how long the sample will be in seconds. You can also set the autostart on or off. This tells the program to wait for a sound signal before it records.

Once you've recorded the sample, you will need to edit it. You can now delete, cut, copy, paste, add, invert and swap the sample. There are a few more options, but there isn't room to explain them all in detail.

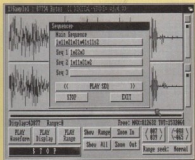
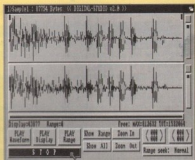
Probably the most important part for making actual music is the sequencer. This allows you to sequence your samples in a certain order to create a piece of music.

Depending on memory allowances you can carry up to ten samples at any one time. Now when making your tune, these samples won't go very far, so the best idea is to find music that will loop easily, so it's a lot easier to sample some rave/techno band than one of Jimi Hendrix's solos.

Even though the sequencer is the most important part of the package, it is not like normal sequencers. You have to actually type in some execution commands to tell the computer which sample to use during and so forth. It is very strange at first, but after a while you'll soon get used to it.

The Home Music Kit does have its faults, like the strange sequencer and the fact that sometimes the effects don't sound right with certain types of music, but it does have its plus points. The package is extremely friendly and fun to use.

You will need to spend a couple of weeks on it before you get really competent, and you might want to buy a separate sampler and sequencer to make your music that way instead, but if you want an all-in-one package then the Home Music Kit could well be worth taking a look at.

impressed with was the grabber. The quality of the images were better than the image grabber we use here at AC towers!

As per usual you can view the image in any of the usual modes – interlaced, non-lace and hi-res. The grabs may only be greyscales but the clarity is brilliant. All images save as standard IFFs or ANIMs for use in other packages.

Next I looked at the sampler. I thanked my lucky stars, it's actually easy to use. All the other samplers I have looked at in the last six months require a degree in sound engineering to use. With Video Master you have simple record, play, and listen buttons for basic work, on top of which there are fader controls, reverses and invert options which let you fiddle with the original sound.

Because the film and sound are both competing for the memory you only have a limited amount of space, so the sampler has a squash option that lets you squeeze the sample to half its original size.

This action does mean the sample loses half of its clarity but the sample quality is a pretty high in the first place. To make the sample smaller from the start you can reduce the sample rate. The highest rate possible is 16kHz which gives pretty good results, but the lower

you put the sample rate the lower the quality.

The sequencer is one of the most advanced I've seen but that is still a damn sight easier to use than any other sequencer I've used, including the Home Music Kit.

It has all the basic trick ele-



ments for the film and audio section like film loopers so that a relatively short piece of film will seem like a very long one.

Last but not least is the system card. This is a fantastic idea that I have never seen on any of the other sampler or digitiser packages. It allows you to configure how much memory you wish to use on the sampler and the digitiser respectively.

You change the values by using a simple + and - sign. So if you are dealing with very simple images on the digitiser it leaves you more memory to play with on the sampler.

I can't really say everything about Video Master in this small review, but if you are into images and sound sampling I recommend that you check out Video Master for yourself.

Canon BJ-200

Canon's bubblejet printers have proved to be extremely popular with Amiga owners, particularly the BJ-10 and BJ-20 models.

There are three obvious reasons why they are liked so much – they produce high quality results, they are inexpensive compared to other high quality inkjet printers, and there are specific Amiga printer drivers for them.

But these low-end bubblejets are a bit slow, printing text at about 80 characters per second (cps) in high quality (HQ) mode, about 100 cps in high speed (HS) mode.

Graphics printouts also sometimes have a banded appearance – dark horizontal lines every quarter of an inch or so, caused by every pass of the print head overlapping the previous one slightly. The extent of the banding depends on exactly what it is you are printing, but these are faults you can forgive, considering the low cost of the printers.

But wouldn't it be nice if text printed faster and if there was no banding?

The BJ-200 is the latest in Canon's mono bubblejet range.

Designed for desktop use, it weighs just over 6lb and measures a compact 13.7in wide, 7.6in deep and 6.8in high.

Sticking up at the rear of the printer is a cut sheet feeder that can take about 80 sheets. Ordinary A4 paper is fine, but the feeder is wide enough to take anything up to 9.5in wide, so envelopes can be fed through it as well. The feeder works with paper from 64 to 90 gms, manually-fed individual sheets can be up to 105 gms.

Overhead projector transparencies can also be used, but you need to feed sheets of this through one at a time.

The BJ-200 is the first of Canon's bubblejets to feature the new 16-bit processor and a control that actively seeks the next print position. The print head, which is part of the disposable ink cartridge, has also been redesigned.

These new features have resulted in much faster text printing and greater accuracy with graphics dumps.

In HS or draft mode the BJ-200 can whizz along at 248 cps – in HQ mode it can do 173 cps. In real terms these figures mean that a page of 10 cps (pics) text printed in HS will come out of



the printer in about 20 seconds – or three pages a minute to put it another way. The same page in HQ mode will take about 30 seconds to print.

Something else that's new to the BJ-

200 is SHQ mode – Super High Quality. This slows down the text output to 124 cps (about 40 seconds per page) and uses more ink, but the results are superb.

In HS and HQ modes graphics dumps are still slightly banded, although nowhere near as much as with earlier bubblejets. In SHQ mode, however, graphics banding is a thing of the past, even on ordinary bond or photocopier paper.

The results on proper inkjet paper are stunning – every bit as good as a laser printer, and in some cases arguably better.

The BJ-200 has two emulations – BJ-10 and Epson LQ. In BJ-10 mode there are two typefaces available, Prestige and Courier; in Epson mode there are eight – Roman, Sans Serif, Courier, Prestige, Script, Orator, Orator-5 and Draft.

BJ-10 mode is better for graphics printouts, Epson mode gives you more text flexibility.

A small control panel on the top of the printer enables you to select between HS, HQ and SHQ printing modes, as well as the normal Power, Online and L/FFF switches.

Typefaces and character sets are selected via dip switches which are positioned under a small cover to the left of the control panel.

On the front of the printer is a cover which pulls forward to

allow you access to the ink cartridge. Embossed on the inside of this cover is guide to dip switch settings for both BJ-10 and Epson modes.

Without going anywhere near the manual I was able to set the switches various ways to get various results. It isn't difficult to do.

Although the BJ-200's recommended retail price is more than £400, I'm sure you'll see it selling for just over £300. The trick is to shop around.

Keep in mind that printers are not computer-specific, so it will be well worth investing in a PC magazine to find a greater range of dealers.

MultiFaceCard

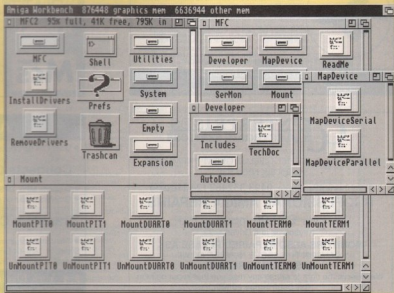
If you are into expanding your Amiga with stuff like printers, scanners, modems, digitisers and samplers, then you very quickly learn that the Amiga doesn't have enough holes in it to take them all at once.

Most of these kind of peripherals plug into either the serial or the parallel port – a common combination of kit is a printer and a hand scanner, or a printer and a sampler, or a printer and a hand scanner and a sampler.

Chopping and changing between peripherals can be a real pain because you have to power down the computer, swap kit, and power up again. Only fools and rich kids plug things into the serial and parallel ports while the Amiga is switched on.

The answer of course is more holes, and that's what the MultiFaceCard gives you – two more parallel ports and two more serial ports.

The model currently available is a half-length card that fits into one of the Zorro II slots in the Amiga 1500, 2000, 3000



Despite its apparent technical complexity, the MultiFaceCard is easy to set up and the software is simple to use.

or 4000. An Amiga 500 and 500 Plus model is planned, which will fit into the expansion port (with a through port), but it has not yet been built.

The ports themselves are on the end of four cables that connect to two standard brackets that screw into the holes provided at the rear of the computer. Each bracket has one serial and one parallel port on it. To save space the serial con-

nectors are of the 9-pin type, which is the standard in the IBM world – serial cables with 9-pin connectors are readily available, but if you fancy making your own the manual details the pin-outs for 9-pin to 9-pin and 9-pin to 25-pin.

It also tells you how to wire a null modem cable in order to connect two Amigas for data transfer.

The parallel ports are standard Amiga, with +5V on pin 14 as normal so that samplers, for example, can draw their power from the Amiga.

The software is simple to set up. The manual describes the procedure clearly, although beginners might be a bit frightened by all the talk of devices and mountlists.

But it's quite painless, and the whole system can be set up to auto-configure upon booting, or you can leave everything switched off and click on icons to turn various ports on and off when you require them.

Should you prefer using the CLI, then there's a MapDevice command that can turn any or all of the four extra ports on and off.

The software is fully multitasking, so it's perfectly possible, for example, to be printing something and scanning something and sampling something all at the same time, although you'll appreciate that this takes memory and will obviously slow down each process by a certain amount.

The question to ask yourself is if not having to keep powering down to swap kit is worth £149. It certainly is to me.

Prodata is a little less friendly than it could be and has no support for graphics or sound within records, but it is an excellent workhorse and will suffice for most jobs. Users who prefer wysiwyg packages, or who insist on user-friendliness, would be advised to skip this one.

Superbase Professional 4

This package does everything, end of story. Superbase Pro 4 (SB4) is a monster of a program with a huge manual and its own built-in programming language. The latest version, due for release soon, will even enable users to produce standalone databases for use at customer information points and so on in exactly the same way as dBase and other high-end PC packages.

SB4 already has its Database Management Language (DML) similar to the SQLs found in PC packages, so the expert user can produce extremely complex reports full of calculations, cross referencing, and so on.

In addition, the package is stuffed with class touches and is easily the most visually awe-inspiring business package available for the Amiga.

Graphics and sound can be incorporated in a record to be played or displayed at the click of a user-defined button, palettes and displays can be customised to the heart's content, and there are VCR-style controls, menus, and a host of clear requesters to aid user friendliness.

If you're going to start anywhere, why not with one of the best? As is usually the case with GVP hardware their HD+ series is both fast, reliable, flexible and thanks to a recent slash in price a lot more affordable than you might imagine.

If quality counts you can't go far wrong with a drive that's not only one of the fastest on the market but also boasts the option of an additional 8Mb of fast RAM, a SCSI port and a game switch which unlike some doesn't disable the on-board RAM.

As with almost all hard disks there's a whole range of sizes available starting from 40Mb stretching right up to 213. If you're interested in the basic version it will set you back a very reasonable £349 – which is literally a full £100 cheaper than the figure asked on the units initial release.

A530 Turbo

As a logical progression to the HD+, the A530 Turbo is a obvious choice. Although physically identical to the afore-said HD+ the A530 is a different kettle of fish altogether.

Although not strictly just a hard disk it's nevertheless well worth a mention especially for those who take their computing seriously. Like its predecessor the A530 has an identical selection of disk sizes – minus the 40Mb option, a SCSI port plus the option for up to 8Mb of 32-bit RAM.

As you may have guessed thanks to the reference to 32-bit RAM, the unit also boasts the power of a 40MHz 68030 which can be fitted with an optional 68882 co-processor.

When the combination of hard disk, accelerator, FPU and RAM are put together you're dealing with a powerful beast which on pure speed will easily out-gun a standard Amiga 3000.

On top of all of this, both the HD+ and A530 will accept the services of a plug-in Vertex 286 PC emulator which somehow manages to squeeze in among the ever growing band of components.

Rössmoller Hard Disk

Or to give it its full title, the Rössmoller 52Mb Quantum. Although the word Quantum is synonymous with quality it must be said that the hardware around it doesn't quite

match up. Unlike the majority of drives mentioned, the Rössmoller doesn't have the option of adding any additional RAM. In addition power is provided solely by the Amiga and as a result excessive drain on the machine can be a real problem.

Another minor irritation is that although the drive is a SCSI there's no way of daisy-chaining additional drives to your existing Quantum. Still on the other side of the coin the unit does offer a DMA pass-through which allows you to exploit the services of any other peripherals that take advantage of the side slot.

However it's worth baring in mind this could cause even more power problems if they are to be powered solely by the machine.

The drive arrives pre-formatted, so all you have to do is simply add the software of your choice. If you don't want whistles and bells and can live without LEDs the Rössmoller is a respectable bargain basement investment.

AVS Trumpcard 500AT

Just like the HD+, the AT comes in a very pleasing Amiga-esque moulded plastic case complete with power and access lights.

Like the Rössmoller the AT also arrives minus a PSU, but unlike the aforementioned drive it doesn't appear to suffer from any of the Rössmoller's power problems, even when equipped with a full complement of 8Mb of RAM.

Both the drive and RAM are extremely economic concerning power but even so an option for an external PSU has been added. The reason for this seemingly unnecessary

option is the drive's DMA through port.

Like the Rössmoller, the option allows the connection of CD-ROMs and other slot peripherals without the need to remove your drive – a problem which haunts a lot of the opposition.

With a reasonably quick 52Mb Quantum, up to 8Mb of RAM, DMA pass-through and arguably the best and certainly the easiest installation software on the market, the AT is one of the most attractive options around.

The only problem with a 52Mb AT interface as opposed to the equally spacious SCSI drives offered by the opposition is that of speed and expandability.

Although about average for speed transferring 530k per second, its main downfall is its inability to daisy-chain extra drives – à la SCSI.

If however you think one drive will be more than enough and find DMA access essential the AT is a very attractive option.

Ashcom ADDHard 45Mb

Last but not least we arrive at a real punter product in the form of Ashcom's ADDHard 45Mb. Not perhaps the most inspiring title even to adorn a drive but if it's value you're after, who cares what it's called?

The drive itself is the ultimate in simplicity – no SCSI port, no RAM expansion, no PSU, just a bargain basement price tag which suits the basic do-the-job design of the drive.

It's small and rather unassuming in comparison to the style of the GVP and AT drives, but still retains a modicum of minimalist dignity.

As you might expect, speed isn't the drives strong point, especially in relation to the dynamic duo of the AT and HD+. Still having said that if you're making your first move from a floppy-based system it's nothing short of blistering.

Like the Rössmoller, the drive comes completely formatted with either Workbench 1.3 or 2 so installation is a simple case of plug-in and you're off.

If you're after a cheap and cheerful introduction to hard disk use without any of the frills offered by the opposition, the Ashcom is just about ideal, especially if you're on a tight budget.
