Exposure of NSCLC cells to the protein kinase C inhibitors, staurosporine or PKC412, results in a hyperpolarization of the plasma membrane. As a consequence, the hyperpolarization-activated HCN2 channel opens and permits Ca^{2+} to enter the cell. Both plasma membrane hyperpolarization and the activation of HCN2 channel are inhibited by Cs^+ . The resulting Ca^{2+} elevation in the cytosol also translocates to the intermembrane space of the mitochondria and results in the activation of calpain as well as enhanced ROS formation.
