About Biochemistry

BIOCHEMISTRY was founded by the American Chemical Society in 1962, in response to requests by members of the biochemical community. Its wide acceptance is indicated by the fact that after two years, the subscriptions to the journal are at the 4000 mark, and still increasing, and that the number of meritorious manuscripts received has necessitated an expansion from bimonthly to monthly publication, and from approximately 1200 pages in 1963 to an estimated 1800 pages in 1964.

It is the aim of BIOCHEMISTRY to publish results of original research in all recognized or developing areas of fundamental biochemistry. Authors need not be members of the American Chemical Society in order to publish in BIOCHEMISTRY. Manuscripts are independently reviewed by two referees chosen on the basis of their competence. Authors are encouraged to recommend referees whom they consider most qualified to judge the merit of their manuscript. If the editor believes that a manuscript has not received adequate review, or if the referees submit conflicting recommendations, the manuscript may be submitted to a member of the Board of Associate Editors for advice and independent judgment. This system of review, relying on a large number of specialists, has been used with success by several of the fundamental journals published by the American Chemical Society.

Every effort is being made to process manu-

scripts with dispatch. On the average, manuscripts are published three and a half months after acceptance. While BIOCHEMISTRY does not publish preliminary communications, the processing of shorter papers dealing with important and timely observations is being accelerated so that they may be published within two months or less after acceptance.

Like other fundamental journals published by the American Chemical Society, BIOCHEMISTRY levies a page charge (\$25 per page) to help defray its publication deficit. Payment of the page charge is not a condition for publication, as articles are accepted or rejected only on the basis of merit, and neither the editors nor the referees have any knowledge as to who will and who will not pay the charge. Billing is done only after the manuscript has been accepted. It is recognized that, in many instances, grants do not include explicit funds for the cost of publication, in terms of page charges. Authors working under such grants will not be expected to pay the charge. It is anticipated, however, that authors will include a request for page charge payments in new grant proposals.
