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
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Welcome

small sink, a couple of cupboards and one chopping board does not a family kitchen make. At least, not as far as Louise McCutcheon was concerned. 'The kitchen felt cramped and way out of proportion to the rest of the house, which feels very spacious,' she explains of the five-bedroom Surrey property which she shares with her husband and their three daughters.

'So we knocked through our utility room and playroom to create a much larger, open-plan kitchen-dining-living area,' continues Louise. 'Now it's about three times the size of the original kitchen with lots of space to accommodate family.

The challenge, however, was to work out how to make the most of the new room and to create a design with plenty of impact that wouldn't look lost in the super-sized space. Following up on a recommendation, the couple headed to Mowlem & Co to meet Senior Designer Rachel Gower.

We sat down and worked out very carefully what we would like within the layout,' explains Louise, which is why, from the

dining table to the TV to all of her favourite appliances, every detail was planned. While the large island provides the main preparation area (so much larger than the tiny chopping zone in the previous kitchen), it also includes space for four bar stools, which makes it an inviting place to sit for drinks and a chat or for a quick solitary coffee and a read in the morning.

'We wanted a room that would become the hub of our busy house, designed to suit our family life, and also somewhere that would work for entertaining,' says Louise. 'This layout works so well, because I can be cooking on one side of the island, and friends can sit opposite me, or move to the dining table, and that way I'm not cut out of the conversation.'

Louise and her husband had a very clear vision when it came to choosing the rich colours and interesting textures. 'We both felt that it was essential to find a classic design that wasn't going to date - after all, that's very important when you are investing in a new kitchen, she says. 'The warm colours make the room feel inviting, and the splash of gold adds just a little glamour, perfect for entertaining in the evenings. *eKBB*

What was your main design challenge? The space

planning required very careful thought. In a large open-plan room, it is important to create a natural flow, so you can move around the space easily - equally, you don't want to have to walk miles every time you want to make a cup of coffee or pour a drink. Here, the generous island unit 'bridges' the wall cupboards and appliances on one side, and the informal dining area opposite. We also included a soft seating area with TV, and planned carefully the access to the garden, utility room and stairs to the pool and gym on the lower ground

floor. The position of the built-in curved banquette seating links the different zones of the room.

Can you tell us about the design and colours of the cabinetry and surfaces?

To create the classiccontemporary look Louise wanted, we contrasted classic framed oak doors with sleek, handleless Parapan, which is a glossy solid acrylic. The Cappuccino colour of the Parapan is soft and warm, and works beautifully with the darker oak, which is finished with a warm grey stain to add a modern twist. We wrapped the island in

black granite to add definition, but its finish is textured to soften the overall look - polished black granite can look very hard. The finishing touch is a beautiful gold splashback, which adds a subtle touch just a touch - of glamour.

And the extractor?

Because a hood hanging above an island can look very dominant, we went for a ceiling model which gives a sleeker, more minimalist look. The ceiling panel creates a floating feature above the island, but actually serves a purpose - it conceals the ducting for the extractor.

Bespoke handmade, framed furniture in stained oak is finished with brushed steel handles, and designed with sections of handleless Parapan in Cappuccino for streamlined contrast. Flamed Nero Assoluto granite wraps the island, while a specially produced antiqued glass splashback with faux gold leaf and Cappuccino backing completes the sumptuous design.

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
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or interior designer and architect Mia Buzzi, creating her dream home was all about finding a private piece of nature in the middle of city life. 'Living in a place like Milan, which is so busy and hot in summer, I was yearning for peace amidst the hustle and bustle, she muses.

At first glance, the discovery of an abandoned concrete factory in the heart of the fashion quarter of Italy couldn't have been further from the dream 'city oasis' that she had been searching for, but Mia soon realised the potential in this dilapidated building. With its intact beams, steel girders and skylights, Mia had the idea to use the space to create a convivial home, not only for herself, her husband and their two cats, but also to include her extended family into the vision. Crucially the building also had a central courtyard around which Mia could design a communal hub for her work premises as well as achieve her heart's desire - her 'little piece of green' in the city.

From a design point of view, the greatest challenge for Mia was to preserve the industrial feel of the building while creating a space that was still homely and intimate. I wanted to keep the spirit of the factory but also to create a unity of space within that,' she says. 'I designed the space to have rooms that are all fluid, so there are no hallways or doors and minimal walls, but I've also made the house feel cocoon-like by using natural materials throughout.' So while there is a wonderful sense of light, space and flow to the open-plan kitchen, and to the house as a whole, the industrial heritage is balanced by details such as warm wooden floors, tactile rugs and furnishings as well as heavy curtains that can be pulled shut on a dark autumn evening.

'I wanted somewhere that'd be easy to live in and laid-back,' she says. Open and airy with nature on site, it was just this oasis of serenity and silence that I set out to achieve. eKBB

INTERIOR DESIGNER AND ARCHITECT



As an architect how would you describe your style? Did you enjoy designing your own kitchen and house?

I would say my personal design style as an interior designer is sort of 'rough and natural', but with some romantic touches, and I really loved the process of forming my own space. When you are designing for someone else it is obviously all about their taste and needs, but as a personal project I had only myself and family to consider.

How did you first approach the redesign project? The building had been abandoned

for more than fifty years when we bought it so it was completely dilapidated, but there were incredible beams, trusses, skylights and beautiful cast iron rods all intact. It was a beautiful blank canvas. When it came to designing the kitchen, I wanted it to be open-plan, and comfortable enough to be sociable and allow everybody to participate in the cooking.


How did you choose the materials and appliances?

I wanted a mix of rough and smooth, old and new - so there is recycled wood from old farms used in the units and worktops

and there is polished cement on the floor. The lighting was made bespoke by a Berlin design firm that specialises in porcelain (Stefanie Hering, hering-berlin.de). I chose sleek and modern Inox Smeg pieces in order to create a contrast with the more rustic look.


Tell us about the doors

I had them made in iron by a local blacksmith. They open completely up on to the courtyard and in summer we sit outside with cushions on the grass. In winter we draw the curtains and there is a lovely and cosy atmosphere in here.



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f there is one thing that Tina Sheldon enjoys doing, it's renovating houses. Which is just as well, given that this is the fourth time she moved since she and husband, Rupert, got married, and each home has been a major restoration project. 'We love buying wrecks and doing them up,' she says. 'When we first looked around here, I went up to the first floor and saw the light pouring through the windows, and loved it straightaway.'

Which is just as well, given that the Victorian house in Clapham, South West London, hadn't been touched for years and years, its aged state summed up neatly by son Tom, now 13. 'He looked shocked and asked, 'Is this going to be our home?" recalls Tina. Most recently, the five-storey house had belonged to an elderly lady, who had inherited the property from her father, who had lived there since it was first built.

'It was virtually untouched, so there was a lot of work to do,' explains Tina, a surveyor-turned-full time mum to Tom and daughter Emily, 14, 'but we could see it had the potential to become a wonderful home.'

'We love entertaining and often have friends and family over,' continues Tina. So one of the most major tasks in the house was to demolish the tiny scullery and outside toilet at the back of the house, adding an extension to create a large kitchen-dining space designed both for family life and for casual parties. Huge sliding glass doors across the entire width of the new room blur the boundaries between inside and out, and maximise the connection with the garden.

The next step was to consult with kitchen specialist Andrew Hall of Woodstock Furniture. 'We have worked with Andrew on two previous kitchens, both of which we have loved, so it was a natural move to go back to him a third time,' explains Tina. 'We had a strong vision of how the room would be and knew that Andrew would interpret it beautifully – we wanted clean lines and simple, quite chunky furniture in dark wood, to create a modern room but with plenty of homely warmth.' eKBB

Can you tell us about the style of cabinetry and

materials? As it was the third kitchen we had produced for Tina and Rupert, we had a kind of design shorthand together. I knew that they like clean and contemporary lines, so the furniture is simple, streamlined and handleless - except for the appliance housing which needs handles to make opening heavier doors easier. The white glossy acrylic reflects natural light, which floods the room from the skylight and glazed doors, while the sections of

walnut introduce warmth and definition. The walnut is especially finished with a grey tint to introduce a contemporary note.


And the layout? Tina wanted interaction with family and friends when she is cooking, so the hob on the island is perfect for this, allowing her to chat with those on the bar stools or at the dining table beyond. The streamlined run of furniture on the wall behind the island means that everything is in easy reach, from the sink and

dishwashers to the tall cabinets housing the ovens and integrated fridge and fridge-freezer, as well as larder storage.

And the desk area? It is often very useful to include somewhere to catch up on emails and household paperwork in the kitchen, so here we designed a simple desk in the same walnut finish. Some shallow built-in shelves conceal a structural pillar behind, and provide spaces to store recipe books and files.





design? The challenge was to retain the character of a Victorian terrace but open up the back room to suit contemporary living, with as much natural light as possible. I also wanted to link the new kitchen-diner with the

How did you approach the

the new kitchen-diner with the rest of the floor and the house. Using the same timber flooring throughout the ground floor helped unite the living room at the front with the newly designed space at the back.

How did you choose the cabinetry? The bulthaup b1 units struck just the right note: minimal and linear, with recessed

grips so that nothing interferes with the flow. A neutral backdrop helped make the room feel more spacious and light, so white was a good choice for the units. Integrated appliances keep the look clean-cut, while a separate utility room keeps the kitchen clear of laundry and clutter.

What role does glass play in the new space? Both of us are real light-seekers, so the glazing over the island was essential. It also makes the prep area the focal hub, so you're at the centre of things while you cook. You get a view of the kitchen, the garden and sky and out towards the

Victorian bay window at the front of the house.

And the materials? I added textures of wood, ceramic, bamboo, wicker, linen, and brushed metal, to work with the purity of the bulthaup b1 lines. The space feels clean but never cold, and is a fully functioning family space.

Why does this design work?

I've added natural touches, but in the future it could have a different look with a more contemporary edge. It's a long-term kitchen: thoughtthrough and designed to last.

RELAXED FEEL


The area overlooking the garden is a laid-back space to sit. As a way to draw in maximum liqht, Silvia took the glass around the corners, rather than settling for flat-fronted glazing. 'I don't like abrupt cuts and angles, so this softens the feel as well as having a practical purpose,' she says

Sophisticated simplicity



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INTERIOR DESIGNER Kitchen

Pippa Paton plans a perfect escape to the country, combining natural tones, colours and textures with crisp and contemporary linear design

nterior designer Pippa Paton enjoys a challenge. Or so it seems, given that she has a reputation for sympathetically and stylishly introducing modern living to listed buildings. This was just the case in this three-storey Grade II listed house, built of honey-coloured Cotswold stone in the 1850s and in need of complete renovation by her clients, a London family moving out to the Cotswolds.

One of the rooms requiring the most attention was the kitchen. With three children on the cusp of teenager-dom, Pippa's clients wanted to create a relaxed kitchen with a spacious dining area and room enough to welcome guests. So, instead of the usual island, Pippa designed a large dining table, complete with an extension so that it can seat up to 16. 'We felt

it was better to make a beautiful feature of the table and light above, rather than clog up the room by trying to squeeze in an island as well, she explains.

Faced with four sets of original sash windows, some complete with their shutters, but each of varying heights and levels, Pippa chose to introduce handleless cabinetry and a combination of soft, natural tones. 'By keeping the furniture simple and using colours from one earthy palette, the mood is relaxing and serene.'

While the AGA provides the nod to country-style, the streamlined cabinetry introduces a modern element. 'Its design adds to the crisp edge, which is softened by the earthy, warm colour of the grey stain we used on the oak, she explains. It's a luxe but comfortable mix of London and country.' eKBB

How did you create the layout? Once we had decided to feature a large dining table and

forgo an island, the rest fell into place quite naturally. We built the AGA into the original chimney breast, opening it up a little further to create the necessary height. Then, as the room isn't very wide, we designed two simple, streamlined runs of cabinetry: one with the sink underneath the window, the other on the opposite wall with the main preparation area. This has some wall cabinets above to house the microwave and coffee machine.

Can you tell us about the design of the cabinetry? The handleless design creates a simple and modern look, but the crisp

shape is carefully softened by the warm grey stain that we used to finish the oak and is in a similar colour as the quartz worktops. The combination of drawers and cupboards provides plenty of storage, with everything needed often, including milk in an under-counter fridge, in easy reach. Bulky items, such as the large fridge-freezer and pantry, are all housed in a walk-in larder through the door by the AGA.

And the colours and materials? The earthy colour palette is natural and designed to reflect the old stone of the building. Texture and different hues add depth, while wood and earthy tones introduce warmth. The large Andy Warhol Campbell's Soup print on the wall adds interest – often, one big piece is all you need to lift a scheme and finish the room.

ost of us would agree that dishwashers are an indispensable fixture, but that doesn't mean that the kitchen sink is now a redundant afterthought. Our sinks are still used on a daily basis, not simply for washing up, but somewhere to fill saucepans, rinse vegetables, hand wash delicate glassware and clean hands.

As the dishwasher's popularity continues to soar, the sink has had to up its game and evolve into a multi-functional workcentre, that not only looks the part but offers a whole host of plus points. There are hygienic, antibacterial coatings for instance, as well as hardwearing ceramics and granites that are giving the ever-popular stainless steel a run for its money. If you want colour, this can be catered for too with the new generation of composites – although beware, while the drama of a canary yellow sink might catch your design eye in the showroom, you might be safer sticking with black, white or a neutral hue that will stand the test of time.

Whether you choose one, two or three bowls depends on your work habits, available space and budget. The one-and-a-half bowl with drainer layout is still popular as it utilises more than one function in the wet zone, such as soaking bulky pots and pans, rinsing food, washing hands or fitting in a waste disposal unit. Demand for a large capacity, single sink is on the up however as they can take an enormous amount of crockery, pots and pans, which is ideal for smaller kitchens or large families without dishwashers, and often have a smaller footprint than other configurations. Some clever models allow the sink's dimensions to be halved using a removable wall divider or bowl insert, so this way the sink can be adapted to your needs and water usage can be cut at the same time. Circular sinks look striking but do not make the best use of available space, and are perhaps best kept as a secondary prep sink on an island unit. You can also look out for sinks with lids and telescopic taps that push down when not in use - great for the smaller kitchen which is clamouring for more worktop space.

Today's new generation of wet-zones or prep centres transform the sink into an efficient area for preparing food and washing up, and are packed with useful accessories – drainer baskets, colanders and chopping boards to name but a few – with a super-stylish, hardworking tap to match. A hardwood or glass chopping board for example allows the sink to double up as an extra workspace. Not only that but there are also heatable draining boards and electronic sink solutions from the likes of Dornbracht and Teka that go towards making today's sinks as tech-savvy as our cookers and hobs.

There are more sink materials available than ever before, used in ever-more creative ways – how about a deep stainless steel Belfast sink or a velvet-smooth teak trough for instance? However, think carefully about the overall look of your kitchen and how much it is going to be used before making a final decision. *ekbb*

What's the most popular sink material today and why? Stainless steel, simply because it goes with any worktop colour and material, from laminate to composites. There is a 'utility chic' about stainless steel which gives it long-lasting design appeal.

What sink and tap combination works well in a small kitchen? Undermount sinks with drainer grooves into solid surface or quartz are a good choice because they give clean lines and maximise functionality. Another good option is a corner sink where two bowls and a drainer can be popped into what is a normally dead space.

What sinks would you recommend fitting with limestone worktops?

Any style of sink. But do be aware that, by nature, limestone is a porous sink, so take care to ensure that it is properly treated to prevent water penetration. For this reason, an inset sink with an integral draining board might be a good choice instead, as it prevents water sitting on the worktop.

As far as taps go, can you go wrong with a straightforward hot and cold pillar tap? Not at all, but there are many taps that integrate additional features which can be well worth the investment. Some have nozzle sprays and/or dispense filtered water as well as provide instant boiling water. A boiling water tap can speed up a wide range of kitchen tasks such as getting pasta on the boil. While it's a premium purchase, it's the sort of thing you might wonder how you ever did without.

What's on-trend right now for sinks and taps? What's the discerning customer looking for? Coloured granite is having a revival, with dark grey being a popular seller. Our new Oyster shade was introduced following international market research into future trends - it's a relaxed neutral colour that suits today's love of organic hues and easy-living modern woodgrains. In taps, chrome is everyone's favourite, but, for the discerning customer, solid stainless steel is a growing choice.



NSET SINKS are probably the most common method of installation. They are fixed into any worktop (laminate, composite or wood) with the lip of the sink overlapping a few mm and sealed with a waterproof edge. Look out for the new low-profile, stainless steel versions that have the appearance of a flushmounted sink, sitting just 1.8mm on the worktop, but easier to install.

MATERIAL GAINS

STAINLESS STEEL still leads the pack when it comes to sink materials as it is tough, hygienic, resists rust and corrosion and can withstand sudden temperature changes. It is the professional chef's choice with a timeless appeal that suits both contemporary kitchens and traditional schemes. There is a stainless steel sink to suit all budgets too, from entry-level, value sinks formed from a single sheet to top-end designs made from separate pieces, welded and polished, creating sharp, well-defined corners and deeper bowls. Choose a high quality 18/10 grade stainless steel: the 18 per cent chrome relates to the sink's lustre and 10 per cent nickel for hardness and strength. The thicker the gauge, the quieter and sturdier the sink: an 18 gauge steel is perfect for domestic use. A highly polished finish is more likely to show up scratches than brushed, satin or textured versions, but over time these will blend together for an all-over attractive patina.

CERAMIC sinks like traditional Belfast and Farmhouse designs sit into the worktop with the front edge on display. Handcrafted from fireclay, these big, beautiful sinks have been around for years and suit classic brassware and timber kitchens. However a new generation of modern, super-tough ceramics in contemporary shapes are becoming popular, generally in pure white but also in dramatic jet black.

COMPOSITE sinks are made from a mix of ingredients to create a man-made material that is durable, warm to the touch and resistant to stains, high temperatures, scratches, dents and chips. Composite sinks are becoming more popular due to their good looks, strength, design possibilities and huge selection of block colours, metallics and granite-effects that suit every style of kitchen. Acrylic-based composite sinks, from the likes of Corian and Hi-Macs, can also be seamlessly integrated into worktops for a one-piece wet area with carved out drainer grooves; the colour runs through the material so any scratches can be sanded out. Engineered stones are extremely tough and use a high percentage of natural stone particles such as quartz and granite to create an incredibly tough, easy-to-clean sink. Look out for brand names such as Caple's Geotech, Astracast's Rok and Schock's Cristadur.

CAST-IRON sinks have thick layers of porcelain enamel fused on top to retain a lustrous finish and sparkle for years. The smooth, non-porous surface is resistant to chips, stains, scratches and food acids while the inherent strength of cast-iron allows sinks to be made larger and deeper without flexing.

WOOD sinks are warm, luxurious and tactile. They are qenerally made from teak which is naturally anti-bacterial.

COPPER offers a warm, rustic alternative to stainless steel with a beaten, handcrafted look and rich patina. Copper sinks are naturally anti-bacterial and easy to keep clean. If you go with this material you need to avoid scourers and abrasives.

STONE sinks are luxurious particularly when set within the same stone worktop. Solid stone sinks are heavy though, so do make sure carcases can take the weight or are reinforced.

TAPPING INTO STYLE

Taps are one of the most hardworking, frequently-used elements of your kitchen. Choose a style and design that fits in with your kitchen and think about added-extras, such as pull-out sprays, options for filtered and boiling water or hands-free sensor taps for a luxurious touch.

ER TAPS take hot and cold water and integrate them into a single spout, allowing you to achieve a desired temperature. Single-lever versions control the flow and temperature with one easy-to-use lever and offer a modern, streamlined look. Pillar taps keep temperatures separate with two fittings, one for hot water and one for cold; a bridge mixer is joined to a central spout by a bar. Both look good with either sleek and modern kitchens or rustic country-style with large farmhouse sinks.

PULL-OUT SPRAY TAPS have an extendible hose that pulls out from the tip of the spout which can be used for rinsing pots, pans and dishes and washing surfaces around the sink. This can give a really upmarket and professional look.

ALL-MOUNTED TAPS free up space on the worktop and create a slick, designer-label finish. To keep disruption and mess to a minimum, install when you are having a new kitchen or sink area.

FILTER TAPS offer purified drinking water as well as standard hot and cold at the push of a lever. The plus points are many: the improved taste of water (stripping out elements such as chlorine and bleach), cost benefits compared with bottled water and reducing plastic waste. Look out for the option of sparkling filtered water, electronically controlled versions and taps that dispense boiling hot water so the kettle becomes a thing of the past.

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tough and hardwearing while mid-price taps are often made from recycled brass. Choose from an array of finishes including chrome (matt, brushed or highly-polished), pewter and nickel and a beautiful, rose-gold finish which, for the design cognoscenti, is on trend today. Inside, check that a tap has a quarter-turn action for smooth on-off operation and drip-free, ceramic disc technology.

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

PRODUCT DESIGNER PROFILE

Textile designer Tori chats to us about choosing colour palettes, working with pattern and how excited she is to launch new home collections

FEATURE EMMA FOALE

You've come from a fashion background. How did you get into interior design? I worked in the fashion industry for five years but went back to study as I wasn't happy in what I was doing. I went to the Royal College of Art and I had planned to specialise in textiles for womenswear but I switched to interiors on the first day as although I was influenced by fashion, I realised it was spaces and environments that were most important to me.

What or who inspires you? A good work and life balance is something that's very important to me and to see people who have built brilliant, full lives based on their own creativity is something I find really inspiring.

What sparks your imagination and why? I've always been drawn to imperfection, to quirks and to simple, repetitive pattern and when I see or touch any of these things, it genuinely triggers something in me. Beauty to me is the character of something, it's natural personality and I see this anywhere from a battered old piece of fabric or building, to colours and pattern in nature.

Can you describe your style in three words? Eclectic, creative and pared-back.

Fashion is very seasonal and trend-led. Do you apply this approach to your work? No, in my opinion a happy home is about creating a comfortable, safe and warm environment and I don't think that's a seasonal or trend-led process. It's created over time and it naturally becomes an extension of who we are. We of course need to have an awareness of trend and



seasons but if we were to be trend-led, then we would just be doing the same thing as everyone else. We are an independent homeware brand and this means to me that we do something with a point of difference.

How do you choose your colour palette across vour collections? As our use of pattern is normally quite bold, I try to keep colours simple. I'm drawn to the quietness of greys, taupes, beiges and creams but as with our new 'London Collection' I love a bright, surprising injection of colour occasionally.

What advice can you give to anyone who wants to introduce pattern into their home? Be brave and if you like it do it but try to keep it under control. Too much can be overwhelming, so if pattern is new to you, perhaps start by introducing easily removed items first to see how you live with it. Patterned crockery and soft furnishings are easy things to add in to an existing interior and you can slowly build on from that.

What has been your personal favourite collection to work on so far? My first collection will always be one of the most important as it's what started everything for me. Although my favourite is normally what I'm working on at the time as it's all new and the anticipation of how it's all going to come together is exciting for me.

Can you tell us how you work on ideas for vour new collections? An idea will have been milling about for a little while and if it keeps popping up then I know I need to do something with it. It's normally sketched out in rough, then moodboards are created and colours and materials are introduced. The moodboards get refined and we are left with the strongest designs and ideas and we go from there.

If you could collaborate with anyone in the world who would it be and why? Interior designer, Isle Crawford. I think she's got a brilliant take on product, colour and pattern and I really enjoy the feel of the environments she creates. They are understated and sophisticated with attention to detail and craftsmanship.


Any exciting plans for the end of 2014 and early 2015? We're launching our kitchen textiles range which is very exciting for us. It's a venture into a new area but it feels like a natural extension, there are many new products to come! We've also been working with Content by Conran as we are launching an upholstery fabric range. You can expect to see both of these launches later this year.

If you weren't designing what would you be doing? I'm honestly not sure. I've found something that despite all the challenges and difficulties makes me happy and fulfilled. **CKBB** torimurphy.com



ESSENTIAL **flooring**

Vinyl

Vinyl comes in two types - cushioned vinyl in sheet form and luxury vinyl tiles or planks. Both mimic the look of natural materials such as wood or stone but without the price tag, maintenance and installation issues to match.

A good quality, thick cushioned vinyl can cost from £15 per sq. m while luxury vinyl will be more at £20 per sq. m plus, as it's extremely hardwearing and resistant to scuffing, slipping and dents. Cushioned vinyl isn't really the best choice for the kitchen as it will mark and dent easily, so it's a good idea to save it for the bathroom or children's playroom instead.

If you are considering installing underfloor heating, check with the manufacturer or supplier, as not all vinyl is compatible. 'The meticulous attention to detail and durability of luxury vinyl flooring offers the authenticity and elegance of wood or stone,' says David Bigland, Managing Director of Moduleo, 'and it's far more water-resistant.'

As with most flooring, you will need to avoid harsh abrasives. When cleaning, use a soft brush and damp, well-rung mop.

Concrete & resin

A poured floor creates a smooth, seamless surface and is ideal for ultra-contemporary interiors. Resin and concrete are both poured wet in situ and can take up to a week to install and set, so remember to factor this in when ordering a new kitchen.

Alex Dennis, Owner of Senso, a seamless floor supplier, has this advice, 'Always use a specialist in the specific floor finish,' he says, 'and always go to see the work or showroom of the installer or go on a recommendation from someone you trust. Watch out for websites full of computer generated images of surfaces that look too good to be true, and pick a company who will take full responsibility for the product and its installation. Above all, make sure they have a good track record of residential installation experience as seamless floors are inherently difficult to install to high standards. If you are paying less than £100 per sq. m, be very careful about who you choose.'

Alex also points out that any flooring based on concrete or cement technology will crack, and this is an intrinsic characteristic that you need to be certain you are comfortable with. 'Also, not all resins are the same,' he adds. 'Look for one that is designed for residential use – elastic and comfortable and one that does not give off fumes or emissions into the room – and insist on a FeRFA (Resin Flooring Association) member to do the work.'

MY FAVOURITE KITCHEN APPLIANCE

Romilla ARBER

Food writer Romilla Arber talks through her passion for preparing fresh, nutritious food and explains why she loves cooking with her La Cornue range cooker

FEATURE LUCY MACDONALD & HAYLEY STEED

Where does your passion for cooking come from? It's a recognition that to live a long and healthy life you have to eat well, and to eat well you have to learn to cook!

What is your must-have ingredient and why is it so useful? Olive oil is an essential ingredient in my kitchen. I use it for cooking and for dressing, and I prefer it as an everyday oil over and above sunflower and vegetable oil. I do also love rapeseed oil for dressing, and tend to use this if I want to have more of a robust flavour.

You own and run the Honesty Cookery School in Berkshire, what courses do you have there? We run courses on a wide range of topics including bread baking, Mediterranean cooking and classes especially geared to young people leaving home. All classes cater for all abilities.

You use a La Cornue range cooker, what is it that you love about cooking with it? Where do I start? Due to the seals and lack of conventional viewing window, it heats up quickly. The heat is evenly distributed throughout which means you get heat from above as well as below. It seems to cook most things very well. You can quickly control the heat so you get a good blast of heat at the beginning and then cook slowly so that joints of meat stay moist.

What handy features does your range cooker have that you particularly like? The oven is super for baking bread. You can get it to 250°C for the first five minutes of bread baking which gives you a lovely chewy crust. It means that you can brown meat really easily. Getting great crackling is a doddle. I have also found that the simmer plate is really useful as you can get the heat so low that stews cook well.

The proceeds from your two books go to The Food Education Trust, which you set up in 2008. Where did your interest in helping other people prepare healthy food start? My passion began from seeing how the health of the nation was deteriorating because of a dependence on processed food.

You advocate eating no more than four meat dishes a week. What else do you cook at home to avoid too many meat dishes? Both of my cookery books, 'What's for Dinner?' and 'What's for Dinner? Second Helpings', feature a wide range of recipes each week that comprise of meat, game when it is in season - fish and vegetable dishes. I do not think that we should eat meat on a daily basis. It's not good for the environment and it's not good for us. When you are not eating meat then turn to vegetables, pulses or eggs. In the summer it is easy to get by without too much meat as there is such an abundance of fresh vegetables around, salads take on a whole new meaning. Blitz a raw cauliflower in the food processor, add grated carrots, ground cumin and coriander and a tin of chickpeas. Dress with olive oil, serve with bread and you have a lovely meat-free meal.

Have you got any exciting news coming up? I'm opening a bar and restaurant with rooms in September. It is called the Crown & Garter and is based in Inkpen, in Berkshire. I have completely refurbished the property which will be open again to the public from the 8th September. **CKBB**



hese days there are even more factors to consider when it comes to choosing appliances for your kitchen. With energy bills on the rise and the cost of running a home increasing all of the time, you not only want them to be stylish and economical but it's also becoming even more important that they are eco-friendly. A recent report from charity Global Action Plan said that the amount of electrical appliances in our homes has trebled since the 1970s, so it makes sense to upgrade our main kitchen appliances to more energy-efficient models to save both our bank balances and the environment. The greatest energy and cost savings tend to come from replacing old models, and according to trade association AMDEA, freezers and fridges can be the worst offenders, and replacing an older model could cut £100 a year from your electricity bill. Looking at the energy label on appliances is the easiest way to compare the level of efficiency. Any new models coming onto the market will have a rating of at least A+, so anything over A++ is going to be a top performing model.

BUILT-IN OVENS

Energy efficiency in ovens is becoming more of a priority and when you consider that they are one of the most-used appliances, replacing your current oven with an up-to-date model will mean that you are well on your way to a greener household. Some brands such as Neff and Smeg have even released models that have eco functions designed to heat up the oven as quickly and efficiently as possible. This reduces the need for pre-heating ovens, and lowers excess energy usage. **CKBB**

DISHWASHERS

While using a dishwasher saves more water than washing by hand, they can still cost on average around £40 a year to run, according to figures from the Energy Saving Trust. So it makes sense to invest in an energy-efficient dishwasher with functions that are going to help save you energy and money in the long term, and prevent you from spending too much time scrubbing pans at the sink.

Full-sized machines now have increased capacities and make better use of the internal space with the addition of adjustable racks and cutlery trays. Waiting to put a load on until the machine is full to the brim is an easy way to start saving energy and water. However, if you do need to wash the dishes more regularly then look out for dishwashers that come with functions that allow you to select either the upper or lower basket, which is a great option if you like to clean smaller loads more often. When it comes to the amount of water being used, there's a good selection of models that use less than 10 litres of water per cycle. Have a look at the likes of Maytag or Miele that have machines that only use about six litres, saving you water every time you wash.



Interior designer Pippa Paton teams natural tones and luxury fittings to create two serene and beautiful bathroom schemes

isted building status need not hinder imagination, as interior designer Pippa Paton proves in these luxurious en suites. Once bedrooms in this 1850s-built house, Pippa and her team re-modelled them, keeping their original sash windows and introducing a high standard of finish to be enjoyed for years to come.

In the master en suite it is a Bateau bath with a polished nickel exterior and tin finish interior that catches the eye, set below three original windows that frame beautiful views of the 300 year-old Cedar tree in the garden. 'We thought of the room as three areas - the bath as a place to relax and enjoy the view, the shower zone, and the basin and WC area,' she

explains. Each area in the space is defined by the use of subtle changes in materials - the gently sparkling shells of the wallpaper in the bathing zone, changing to honed limestone and Moss Green slate.

'I enjoy combining a range of textures in the same colour palette so that they all work together,' says Pippa. 'Here, the tones are very natural, but their finishes add just the right level of luxury.'

In the guest en suite, Pippa chose a palette of slate colours, reflecting the tones of the adjacent bedroom, which is spacious and inviting. Here, the different slates feature natural figuring which creates a sense of movement and texture, while nickel finishes to the brassware creates a modern contrast. **CKBB**

How did you create the layout in the guest bathroom? The room is square in shape, so I didn't want to put furniture all around the

walls, leaving a yawning gap in the middle. My clients also particularly wanted to include a bath in the room, as well as a shower. So we positioned a freestanding bath in the centre, making it the focal point, but chose a smaller model, so that it doesn't overpower the room. Behind the bath is the shower, which can be entered from both ends of the bath.

How did you create the sense of space?

We positioned a large mirror on the back wall and another above the basin vanity unit. Not only do they reflect light around the room, but they also make the space feel much larger than it actually is – I'd say they double the

perceived size of the room. Good lighting is also very important. In both bathrooms, we used a combination of downlights in the ceiling and lights in the wall niches, set on different circuits, so it is easy to adjust the level of lighting according to mood.

Can you tell us more about how you chose the colour scheme for the master bathroom?

We wanted the view of the Cedar tree outside the windows to be the main focal point of the room, so we chose a colour scheme that wouldn't detract from that. The colours are a soft mix of grey-beige, with different textures layered to create something that is both sumptuous and luxurious. The polished nickel of the bath and the pearlescence of the shell wallpaper are balanced out by the matt lacquered furniture, and I love the way that the Pietra Serena limestone echoes the grey-green colours of the Cedar tree outside.

hile it is always important that the bathroom products you choose are practical, it is also possible to fit your bathroom out beautifully and specify products that all feature water-saving and eco-friendly features. We all know the obvious tips about not leaving taps running unnecessarily, installing dual-flush WCs if given the option, and not lingering too long in the shower - none of which need impact on the pleasure and enjoyment of an eco bathroom. As far as taps are concerned, eight litres per minute, which features on Roca's L90 basin mixer, and eight litres per minute for showers are good figures to look out for. A smaller, compact bath such as Ideal Standard's eco bath has a maximum capacity of 149 litres, whereas the standard capacity is 195 litres, meaning that it's an on-going economical measure which helps every single time the bath is filled. Electronic bathroom mixer taps have a super-fast 'run-on' time of one to one-and-a-half seconds before shutting off after hands are removed from the water flow, so they can offer excellent potential savings, especially if there are youngsters in the house who may be less than careful about switching taps

off properly. As far as WCs are concerned, it's the flush that makes the difference. While nine litres has been the standard capacity, Azzura now offer models with a 2.7 litre minimal flush. Consider choosing dual-flush models so you have the option for a full or reduced flush. Without going into too many details, manufacturers tend to assume that a 'full' flush is only needed for one in four flushes. For showering, have a look at digital models that can monitor and control

flow and temperature for some useful savings.

Sara Johnston, Marketing Communications Manager for Geberit, says, 'Living a 'greener' lifestyle can be as simple as making a few changes to your bathroom sanitaryware; it can make a huge difference to household consumption, without anyone noticing any difference in terms of performance. The majority of water wastage comes from flushing the toilet so opting for a dual-flush WC can help make significant savings. A dual-flush cistern offers an effective way of reducing the amount of water consumed by a household on a daily basis, without compromising on the overall performance of the WC, and can reduce water consumption by as much as 60 per cent compared to a traditional nine-litre full-flush cistern'. **CKBB**

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





Best known for her pretty floral and polka dot mugs, ceramics designer Emma Bridgewater tells us all about her range of wallpapers for Sanderson

INTERVIEW SUSAN SPRINGATE

Pottery designer Emma Bridgewater started her ceramics company almost 30 years ago. Her early designs were inspired by her mother's kitchen dresser, laden with mugs and plates of mismatched patterns and she is best known for her polka dot and pink heart mugs. Earlier this year she published 'Toast and Marmalade and Other Stories' about her life and the company, and she has just recently launched a range of fabrics and wallpapers with Sanderson.

Having studied English at university, she works with her husband, artist and illustrator, Matthew Rice, a founding partner of David Linley's furniture brand. The couple have four children and live at Bampton Castle Farm, set in 30 acres in Oxfordshire, which dates back to 1320, which they are in the process of restoring.

Why the brand extension into fabrics and wallpapers? It's something we've been longing to do for ages - patterns are what we do, so fabrics and wallpapers were a natural step. And we thought it would be fun to move out of the kitchen, and see how our patterns work all over the house.

Tell us about the inspiration behind the designs? They're mostly original designs from our pottery - we had a lot of fun mining our pattern book, finding old favourites and looking at them with fresh eyes. Some of them, like Coral and Figs, are very early designs, and others, like Pomegranate, are more recent. We've also produced a new pattern, Dresser, for the Sanderson range. We've put the patterns into collections that work together, just as we do with our pottery, and each story comes in different colourways. On the whole, we chose our more restrained, grown-up designs, because some patterns that work beautifully on pottery would be too much on a wallpaper or curtains. They're still quite bold - there's nothing boring and beigey - but they don't dominate. Wallpapers and fabrics are

expensive, so we wanted liveable designs and colours that you'd never tire of.

Who or what inspired you to start your business in the first place? I was looking for a really special cup and saucer for my mum, Charlotte, but everything was either too formal or too clunky. That was my eureka moment. I realised there was a gap in the market for pottery that was beautiful and practical - pottery for a relaxed, colourful, mismatched life.

Tell us about some of the stories behind some of your best known designs.

We're very much a family business, and a lot of our ideas come from our everyday life - our Marmalade pattern, for example, was inspired by a family tradition of stocking the cupboards with homemade marmalade every February, and we made our lovely deep pasta bowls after I couldn't find any that were big enough for the portions I like to serve at home.

What is the central feature of your kitchen? The dresser has always been the visual focus in our kitchen. A mixture of best loved mugs and plates, reports, children's pictures, photos, pin-ups and a bunch of flowers. It's like a patchwork of life and it changes all the time.

Where do you source your furniture? Both Matt and I have always been shoppers, mainly in charity shops or at auction but occasionally we are tempted by a lovely chair or table. Witney, our local town, has some marvellous antique shops.

What is your most prized item that has been handed down to you? Definitely the giant pestle and mortar which was the centrepiece of my mother's kitchen.

What is your greatest piece of advice for decorating the home? Only use the things that you like and love and make sure it is jolly. **CKBB** emmabridgewater.co.uk







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
