## MONOGRAPHS ON HEAT AND MASS TRANSFER

THE EDITORS and Publisher of the *International Journal of Heat and Mass Transfer* propose to initiate a series of Monographs. This is intended to provide a vehicle for the publication of works which are too long for inclusion in the *Journal* in the ordinary way but unsuitable for publication as a book—either because they are too short or because speedy publication is particularly desirable. The format of the Monographs will closely resemble that of the *Journal*. The cover will resemble but be distinguishable from the cover of the *Journal*.

Monographs will be sold at prices to be fixed by the Publisher in each case. Regular subscribers to the *Journal* will be permitted to buy copies at specially favourable rates. Monographs will be included in the list of Pergamon Press Publications on Heat and Mass Transfer covered by the standing order arrangements.

The author of a Monograph will receive twelve free copies; additional copies can be bought by him from the Publisher at cost price. He will also receive a royalty on sales. Further information can be obtained from the Publisher.

When a Monograph is issued a description will be published in the next issue of the *Journal*. The Publisher's announcement will appear at the same time. Monographs will be sent by the Publisher to major bibliographical and abstracting services.

A work will be regarded as possessing *prima facie* suitability for publication as a Monograph if

- 1. it is likely to occupy between 50 and 150 printed pages (25 000-75 000 words);
- 2. it covers one subject with exceptional comprehensiveness. For example, if a theoretical method is concerned it should be worked out fully and applied to a wide range of examples. If a comparison between theory and experiment is involved, the author should attempt to survey all relevant published experimental data. If a review of the current status of some subject is involved this should not be restricted to the work of the author and his colleagues, but should give due prominence to all relevant work regardless of its origin;
- 3. it seems likely, by reason of the usefulness, clarity of presentation and so on of the material contained in it, to be widely used as a work of reference.

Monographs submitted will be judged by high standards, normally by editors from at least two countries, who will take the advice of referees.
