## Like Clockwork

A handful of spokes, jump rings, and chain is all it takes to create this fashionable steampunk design, a true nod to the mixed-metals trend.

## MATERIALS

6 brass 19 mm open spokes ( $\$ 2.50$ )
5 brass 19 mm spoke gears ( $\$ 2.70$ )
1 silver-plated 33mm hammered ring (\$0.92)
1 antiqued silver $9 \times 15 \mathrm{~mm}$ lobster clasp ( $\$ 0.60$ ) 48 antiqued copper 7 mm jump rings (\$3.84) 14 antiqued brass 14 mm jump rings ( $\$ 2.80$ ) 12 " of antiqued silver $5 \times 11 \mathrm{~mm}$ textured oval chain ( $\$ 3.60$ )

## TOOLS

2 pairs of chain- or flat-nose pliers
FINISHED SIZE: $181 / 2^{1 "}$


#### Abstract

む Tip: When joining the 14 mm jump rings, gears, and spokes to one another, refer to the photo for the correct placement of the 7 mm jump rings.


1 ] Attach the lobster clasp to one end of the chain by opening and closing the link as you would a jump ring. Attach one 14 mm jump ring to the free end of the chain. 2 ] Use one 7 mm jump ring to attach one 14mm jump ring to the previous jump ring; repeat twice. Use one 7 mm jump ring to attach the previous jump ring to the silverplated ring.
3 ] Repeat Step 2, reversing the stringing sequence. Note: This completes the top row of the focal piece. Lay the necklace so it is horizontal on your work surface.
4 ] Place a second row of three 14 mm jump rings below the top row and offset them so they lay between the 4 jump rings on the left side of the necklace. Use 7 mm jump rings to attach the row of three 14 mm jump rings to each other and to the top row of jump rings, according to the photo. Repeat entire step on the right side of the necklace. 5] Align 1 open spoke, 1 spoke gear, 1 open spoke, 1 spoke gear, and 1 open spoke so they are situated along the bottom curvature of the silver-plated ring. Use 7 mm
 jump rings, to each other, and to the bottom of the silver-plated ring.
6 ] Align 1 spoke gear, 1 open spoke, 1 spoke gear, 1 open spoke, and 1 spoke gear so they are situated along the bottom of the row formed in Step 5. Use 7mm jump rings to attach the gears and spokes to the bottom of the previous row and to each other.

7 ] Use one 7 mm jump ring to attach the final open spoke to the bottom center spoke gear added in Step 6. ©

## Q\&A

## Q: What was the inspiration for your Fabulous Facets video?

A: I love rough-cut faceted gemstones. I wanted to replicate the shape in a wide array of colors to complement my line of Simple Truths pendants and components.

Q: Who or what first piqued your interest in beading?

A: I vividly recall reading a magazine early on and finding the work of Heather Powers of Humblebeads. Her polymer clay beads fascinated me, as did her design aesthetic. Over time we came to know each other, and I am proud to say that she is truly my best friend! Her celebration of art beads opened up a whole new beading world to me, and now I feature art beads in almost everything I make. I have always said that if I had to give up all art beads save one, I would have to stick with Humblebeads.

Q: Do you have a favorite quotation about beading or creativity?
A: I have two...
"There is a way to do it better. Find it." -Thomas A. Edison
"The doors of opportunity are opening around us all the time. You have to have the vision to see what is on the other side and the courage to walk through them. You never know what opportunities for greatness are waiting for you on the other side."-Erin Prais-Hintz

## Q: What recent fashion trend or new product do you love?

A: I am in love with leather! I have amassed quite a collection of leather and need to find the time to play with it and see how I could add it to my designs.

Q: What is your greatest beading accomplishment(s) to date?

A: Being asked to film four how-to videos for CraftDaily.com, an upcoming teaching opportunity at the 2015 Bead \& Button Show, and winning first place in the "Under \$25" category in the 2010 Bead Star competition with a necklace that my then nine-year-old daughter and I made together!

## Q: How do you get yourself out of a "beading block"?

A: I take a break. I look out the window. I listen to music. I go to a hardware store. I page through a home interiors catalog. I believe that inspiration is everywhere, and sometimes we are so caught up in the moment of creating that we don't stop to see the inspiration right in front of us or from the unlikeliest of places.

## The Many Facets of Orchid

Check out Erin's Fabulous Facets video (see details on previous page) to learn how to create these gorgeous polymer clay beads that mimic the look of rough-cut gemstones. Then use them to create this chic, sparkly necklace!


MATERIALS
72 purple $6 \times 3 \mathrm{~mm}$ imperial jasper rondelles
5 ombré orchid $15 \times 12 \mathrm{~mm}$ polymer clay rough-faceted nuggets
6 silver-plated 15 mm hexagonal rings
1 antiqued silver 30 mm toggle clasp with rhinestone inlay
30" of lavender 4-ply Irish waxed linen cord Jewelry cement (optional)

## TOOL

Scissors
FINISHED SIZE: 18½"
1 ] Cut the waxed linen cord into one $10 "$ piece and one 20 " piece. Use one end of both cords to tie an overhand knot around the loop on the ring half of the clasp. Tie a second overhand knot. If desired, dab the knots with glue.
2 ] Lay the cords vertically on your work surface and use 1 cord to string the left side of 1 hexagonal ring from top to bottom. Use the other cord to string the left side of the same hexagonal ring, this time from bottom to top. Use both cords to tie an overhand knot.
3 ] Use both cords to string 1 polymer clay nugget; tie an overhand knot. Note: When stringing the polymer clay nuggets, arrange them in an ombré sequence, from dark purple to light pink.
4 ] Repeat Steps 2 and 3 four times. Repeat Step 2.
5 ] Tie an overhand knot and dab with glue if desired. Trim the shortest tail.
6 ] Use the remaining tail to string all of the imperial jasper rondelles; tie an overhand knot. String the loop on the bar half of the clasp and tie 2 overhand knots. If desired, dab the knots with glue.
Trim the excess cord. ©

77 matte gray $4-5 \times 3-6 \mathrm{~mm}$ drawn glass barrels (C) 2 pale aqua $5 \times 3 \mathrm{~mm}$ fire-polished rondelles (D)
2 chartreuse Picasso $5 \times 8 \mathrm{~mm}$ bicones (E)
2 chartreuse $5 \times 14 \mathrm{~mm}$ pressed-glass feathers (F)
4 pale blue $8 \times 6 \mathrm{~mm}$ pressed-glass diamonds (G)
2 black $9 \times 3 \mathrm{~mm}$ pressed-glass discs (H)
2 lime green-and-yellow 10×8mm pressed-glass diamonds (J)
2 pale blue Picasso 12 mm fire-polished flower coins (K)
1 chartreuse Picasso 14 mm fire-polished flower coin (L)
4 fuchsia $6 \times 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ dyed jade rondelles (M)
2 pyrite $8 \times 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ rondelles ( N )
4 pink $3 \times 8 \mathrm{~mm}$ ceramic heishi ( 0 )
1 lime green-and-bronze $10 \times 30 \mathrm{~mm}$ ceramic tube
1 chartreuse $23 \times 30 \mathrm{~mm}$ ceramic house with owl decal
1 antiqued copper-plated $8 \times 12 \mathrm{~mm}$ ice pick clasp
2 antiqued copper-plated $26 \times 8 \mathrm{~mm}$ leaf toggle bars
1 antiqued copper-plated $15 \times 19 \mathrm{~mm}$ toggle ring
1 antiqued copper-plated 10 mm jump ring
1 antiqued copper 16 mm ring
2 antiqued bronze $10 \times 13 \mathrm{~mm}$ lever-back ear wires
$20^{\prime \prime}$ of antiqued copper-plated $3 \times 6 \mathrm{~mm}$ unsoldered chain
30" of denim 4-ply Irish waxed linen cord
7" of antiqued copper 20-gauge craft wire
Jewelry cement
TOOLS
Round-nose pliers
Chain-nose pliers
Wire cutters
Scissors
FINISHED SIZE: 23/4" (earrings); 71⁄4" (short bracelet); 151⁄2" (short necklace); 4½" (detachable pendant)

## Earrings:

1 ] Use one 2" piece of craft wire to string 1F; form a wrapped loop. String 1O, 1B (center hole), 1D, and 1E; form a wrapped loop that attaches to one end of one $7 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ piece of chain. Attach the free end of the chain to 1 ear wire by opening and closing the link as you would a jump ring. Repeat entire step to form a second earring.

## Short bracelet:

1 ] Use one end of one 11" piece of waxed linen cord to tie a lark's head knot on the loop of the toggle ring, leaving a short tail. Tie an overhand knot using both tails and trim the shortest tail. Use the long tail to string $1 \mathrm{~A}, 2 \mathrm{C}, 1 \mathrm{G}, 1 \mathrm{M}, 1 \mathrm{~J}, 1 \mathrm{H}, 1 \mathrm{~K}, 1 \mathrm{O}$, the L , $1 \mathrm{O}, 1 \mathrm{~K}, 1 \mathrm{H}, 1 \mathrm{~J}, 1 \mathrm{M}, 1 \mathrm{G}, 10 \mathrm{C}$, and 1A. String the loop of 1 toggle bar and tie an overhand knot. Trim the tail. Dab both knots with jewelry cement and let dry.

## Short necklace/wrap bracelet:

1 ] Use one end of one 19" piece of waxed linen cord to tie a lark's head knot on the loop of the 16 mm ring, leaving a short tail. Tie an overhand knot using both tails and trim the shortest tail. Use the long tail to string 1A, 18C, 1G, 1M, 1N, the ceramic tube, 1N, 1M, 1G, 47C, and 1A. String the loop of 1 toggle bar and tie an overhand knot. Trim the tail. Dab both knots with jewelry cement and let dry.
2 ] Use one 3" piece of craft wire to form a wrapped loop on the loop of the ice pick clasp. String the ceramic house pendant (top to bottom) and form a wrapped loop that attaches to the 10 mm jump ring. 3 ] Cut the remaining chain into 6 pieces: two $2^{1 ⁄ 2 "} 2^{\prime \prime}$, two $2^{\prime \prime}$, two $13 / 4^{\prime \prime}$. String one end of each chain onto the previous jump ring, arranging them so that the longest are in the center and the shortest on each end. Hook the ice pick clasp to the 16 mm ring on the end of the short necklace if desired. ©

4 fuchsia 10 mm faceted-glass rounds
4 lime green 10 mm faceted-glass rounds
4 lime green Picasso $14 \times 5 \mathrm{~mm}$ table-cut flowers
4 light blue Picasso $14 \times 5 \mathrm{~mm}$ table-cut flowers
1 hot pink $8 \times 10 \mathrm{~mm}$ lampwork teardrop
6 charcoal gray $10 \times 11 \mathrm{~mm}$ golden mica hearts
14 antiqued brass 3 mm corrugated melon spacers
4 copper 4 mm corrugated melon spacers
1 oxidized copper $85 \times 30 \mathrm{~mm}$ resin bird-and-leaf connector pendant
3 antiqued brass $9 \times 14 \mathrm{~mm}$ lobster clasps
2 antiqued brass 22-gauge 2 " head pins
3 antiqued brass 5 mm jump rings
5 antiqued brass 7 mm jump rings
4 antiqued brass 2 mm crimp tubes
4 antiqued copper 4 mm crimp covers 20 " of metallic copper .014 beading wire TOOLS
2 pairs of chain- or flat-nose pliers
Wire cutters
Crimping pliers
FINISHED SIZE: 21" (necklace);
8" (bracelets)
む̊양ip: This may be worn as a necklace, two separate bracelets, or a wrap bracelet. You will begin by forming the two bracelets.

1 ] Use 10 " of beading wire to string 1 crimp tube and 1 lobster clasp; pass back through the tube and crimp. Cover with 1 crimp cover. String 1 copper corrugated melon spacer. String $\{1$ mica heart and 1 antiqued brass melon spacer\} three times.
$2]$ String $\{1$ fuchsia round and 1 antiqued brass melon spacer\} four times. String \{1 lime green table-cut flower and 2 daggers\} three times.
3 ] String 1 lime green table-cut flower, 1 copper corrugated melon spacer, 1 crimp tube, and one 7 mm jump ring. Pass back through the tube; crimp and cover.
4 ] Repeat Step 1, replacing the lobster clasp with one 7 mm jump ring. Repeat

2 pale aqua $10 \times 20 \mathrm{~mm}$ resin rectangles ( H )

4 ] Attach 1 gunmetal jump ring to 1 L . Use one 8" piece of beading wire to string 1 crimp tube and the previous jump ring; pass back through the tube and crimp. String $\{1 K, 1 G, 1 K$, and $1 B\}$ four times. String 1K, 1F, 1K, 1B, 1K, 1F, 1K, 1 crimp tube, and 1 gunmetal jump ring; pass back through the tube and crimp. Attach the previous jump ring to 1 button.
5 ] Attach 1 gunmetal jump ring to 1 L . Use one 8" piece of beading wire to string 1 crimp tube and the previous jump ring; pass back through the tube and crimp. String 1 A . String $\{1 \mathrm{G}, 2 \mathrm{~A}, 1 \mathrm{~K}$, and 2 A$\}$ three times. String $\{1 \mathrm{E}$ and 5 A$\}$ five times, omitting the last 3 A . String 1 crimp tube and 1 gunmetal jump ring; pass back through the tube and crimp. Attach the previous jump ring to 1 button.
6 ] Use 1 brass jump ring to attach 1 short eye pin to 1 L . String 1A, 1F, and 1A; form a simple loop. Use 1 brass jump ring to attach 1 long eye pin to the previous simple loop.

String $1 \mathrm{~A}, 1 \mathrm{H}$, and 1 A ; form a simple loop. Use 1 brass jump ring to attach 1 short eye pin to the previous simple loop. String 1A, $1 F$, and 1A; form a simple loop that attaches to 1 brass jump ring.
7 ] Attach 1 long eye pin to the previous jump ring. String 1 A , the J , and 1 A ; form a simple loop that attaches to 1 brass jump ring. Repeat Step 6, reversing the stringing sequence and substituting 1 button for the L. $\odot$

Find the center of the fuchsia cotton floss and use it to tie an overhand knot on the chain between the first and second link. Note: Start knotting the floss on the same end of the chain as the ballchain connector. Use both floss ends to tie a macramé square knot between the second and third chain links by passing the left tail over the chain. Lay the left cord over the front of the chain, forming a loop. Bring the right tail up so that it is lying on top of the left tail; pass the right tail under the chain and through the loop (back to front) formed by the left tail. Pull both cords to tighten the knot. Lay the right cord over the front of the chain and bring the left tail up so that it is lying on top of the right tail; pass the left tail under the chain and through the loop (back to front) formed by the right tail. Pull both cords to tighten.
2] Continue knotting in this manner between each chain link for the first 3" of chain. Place the big-eye needle onto one floss tail. Place a light pink or fuchsia button on top of the chain and pass the needle up through one button hole and down through the other; repeat by placing the needle onto the other tail. Continue knotting for the next 2-3 chain links, then attach a second button in the same manner; repeat to attach a third button. 3 ] Continue knotting in the same manner for the remainder of the chain, stopping 2 chain links from the end. Create a tassel using the remaining floss by placing two fingers below the chain and holding the chain with your thumb. Wrap the floss tails around the chain and both fingers. Pinch the loop of floss next to the chain and use one 2" piece of wire to wrap tightly around the floss just below the chain. Use scissors to cut the loops of the floss opposite the chain.
4 ] Use 1 jump ring to attach 1 acorn charm to the chain, 1 chain link to the left of the tassel.
$5]$ Repeat Steps 1-4 four times, matching the button colors to the corresponding floss colors, for a total of 5 bracelets. 2 ] To create the chain strand: Use one 3" piece of craft wire to form a wrapped loop that attaches to the large clasp. String 1 chartreuse barrel and form a wrapped loop that attaches to one end of the chain. Use one 3" piece of craft wire to form a wrapped loop that attaches to the large
clasp in the same spot as before. String 1 chartreuse barrel and form a wrapped loop that attaches to 1 small clasp. Hook the small lobster clasp onto the free end of the chain.
3 ] To create the dangles: Attach 1 jump ring to the leaf pendant. Attach 1 jump ring to the key. Use one 3" piece of craft wire to form a wrapped loop that attaches to the key charm; string the blue snakeskin round and form a wrapped loop that attaches to 1 jump ring.
4 ] To wear, simply wear the chain with any combination of charm dangles by hooking the jump rings onto the large clasp. Or attach the beaded strand to the loop of the large clasp, on either side of the chartreuse barrels. The beaded strand could also be worn on its own. ©

Set aside. 2 ] Disassemble the oval chain into three 83/4" pieces. Attach one end of all 3 chains and 1 hook to 1 jump ring; repeat. Use the cotton pearl floss to tie an overhand knot on
one of the previous jump rings. String 82 cornerless cubes. Snug the beads and tie an overhand knot on the other jump ring used in this step. Set aside.
3 ] Attach 1 hook to 1 jump ring. Use 12" of beading wire to string 1 crimp tube and the previous jump ring; pass back through the tube and crimp. Use 20 " of beading wire to string 1 crimp tube and the previous jump ring; pass back through the tube and crimp. Lay both beading wires so that they are horizontal. Use both wires to string 6 cornerless cubes and 3 antiqued brass rondelles; slide the rondelles so that they cover the cornerless cubes. Use both wires to string 1 blue coral round and 1 rustic tribal glass bead. 4 ] Use the top beading wire to string 1 brass saucer, 4 blue coral rounds, and 1 brass saucer; place a bead stop on the wire. Use the bottom beading wire to string 1 cornerless cube, 1 brass saucer, 5 blue coral rounds, 1 brass saucer, and 1 cornerless cube. Remove the bead stop and use both wires to string 3 cornerless cubes and 1 antiqued brass rondelle; slide the rondelle so that it covers the cornerless cubes.
5 ] Place a bead stop on the bottom wire. Use the top beading wire to string 1 brass
saucer, 8 blue coral rounds, and 1 brass saucer; place a bead stop on the wire. Remove the bead stop from the bottom wire and string 1 cornerless cube, 1 brass saucer, 11 blue coral rounds, 1 brass saucer, and 1 cornerless cube.
6 ] Repeat Step 4, reversing the stringing sequence. Repeat Step 3, reversing the stringing sequence.
7 ] To wear, attach the hook ends of any or all of the beaded strands to the ends of the matte black chain. $\odot$

Use 1 oval jump ring to attach the previous gear to the remaining gear, directly across from the first jump ring. 3 ] Use the head pin to string 1 rose jasper round, the glass flower (top to bottom), and the 35 mm metal flower (top to bottom). String the free simple loop on both acrylic leaves, the 55 mm metal flower (top to bottom), 1 rose jasper round, and the center hole of the center gear. Form a tight spiral using the tail of the head pin to secure the stacked components.

4 ] Fold the silk cord in half. Use one 2" piece of craft wire to form a simple loop around the center of the doubled-up silk cord. String 1 cone and form a wrapped loop. Use the 5 mm jump ring to attach the wrapped loop to the hook clasp.
5 ] Use one $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece of craft wire to wrap around the free ends of the silk cord, securing them to one another. Use the tail of the wire to string 1 cone and form a wrapped loop. Use 1 oval jump ring to attach the wrapped loop to one end of the 3-gear component.
6 ] String the other end of the 3-gear component to the center of the beading wire. Use both tails of the beading wire to string 1 crimp bead. Use the chain- or flat-nose pliers to flatten the crimp bead. Use both tails of the wire to string 1 copper round. *Use one tail of the wire to string 1 resin rondelle, passing through the hole from the top of the bead to the bottom; use the other tail to string the same resin rondelle, passing through the hole from the bottom of the bead to the top. Use both tails of the wire to string 1 copper round.** Repeat from * to ** using the remaining resin rondelle. Repeat from * to ** three times using the acrylic large-hole rondelles.
7 ] Use both tails of the wire to string 1 crimp bead and the figure-eight link; pass back through the crimp bead and the previous copper round and flatten the crimp bead. ©

String 3 citrine chips and form a simple loop. Use one 4 mm jump ring to attach the previous simple loop to one 4 mm jump ring. 5 ] Repeat Step 2 from * to **. Attach 1 eye pin to the previous wrapped loop and string 1 carnelian rondelle; form a simple loop. 6 ] Use the 3" head pin to string the shell ring from outside to inside. String 1 peach pearl, 1 carnelian rondelle, the fluted bead cap (narrow end first), 1 red aventurine rondelle, and 1 peach magnesite rondelle. Use the head pin to pierce a hole through the center of one 1" piece of ribbon and snug the ribbon up against the previous rondelle. String the tulip bead cap (wide end fist) and the other hole of the shell ring. Form a wrapped loop that attaches to all of the dangles created in Steps 1-5. 7 ] Use one 13" piece of ribbon to form a lark's head knot on the top of the shell ring. Place one end of the ribbon into 1 foldover cord end and use chain-nose pliers to squeeze shut; repeat using the other end of the ribbon. Use one 2 " piece of 24 -gauge wire to wrap around each foldover cord end. 8 ] Attach one 6 mm jump ring to one of the foldover cord ends. Use one 4 mm jump ring to attach the previous jump ring to one end of one $3 / 4$ " piece of cable chain. 9] Attach 1 eye pin to the free end of the chain; string 1 light pink pearl and form a simple loop that attaches to one end of one $5 / 8$ " piece of cable chain. Repeat entire step five times.
10] Attach 1 eye pin to the free end of the chain; string 1 light pink pearl and form a simple loop that attaches to one end of the dragonfly charm. Attach 1 eye pin to the other end of the dragonfly charm; string 1 light pink pearl and form a simple loop that attaches to one $5 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ piece of cable chain. Attach 1 eye pin to the free end of the chain; string 1 light pink pearl and form a simple loop that attaches to one end of one $3 / 4$ " piece of cable chain. Attach one 4 mm jump ring to the free end of the chain. Use one 6 mm jump ring to attach the previous jump ring to the free foldover cord end. 11 ] Use one 2" piece of 24-gauge wire to form a wrapped loop on the previous 6 mm jump ring. String 1 red aventurine rondelle, 1 peach magnesite rondelle, and 1 carnelian rondelle; form a wrapped loop that attaches to one 6 mm jump ring. Repeat entire step three times, replacing the final 6 mm jump ring with one 4 mm jump ring.
12 ] Use one $11 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ head pin to string
1 carnelian rondelle and the shell donut
from inside to outside; form a wrapped loop that attaches to the previous 4mm jump ring.
13 ] Repeat Step 11 on the other half of the necklace. Attach one 4 mm jump ring to the previous 4 mm jump ring. Use one 4 mm jump ring to attach the previous 4 mm jump ring to the toggle bar. ©

String 2A;

String 1 glass pearl, 1 crimp tube, 17 Delica beads, and the 6 mm jump ring; pass back through the tube and crimp, forming a loop as before. 5 ] Use round-nose pliers to form a spiral on one end of the craft wire. String 2 glass pearls, the 6 mm jump ring from Step 4, and 2 glass pearls. Snug the beads tight and form a spiral on the free end of the craft wire. ©

Fold the ribbon tail back onto itself, creating a $1 \frac{1}{4}$ " $^{\prime}$ loop, or large enough for the puffed diamond to fit through. Use 3" of brass wire to wrap around the tail to secure, making sure to thread the wire through the end link of the chain.
5 ] Use the 7.25 mm jump ring to attach the leaf pendant to the chain, about 5 " from the ceramic puffed diamond. Use the jump ring from Step 1 to attach the polymer clay pendant to the chain, 1 link to the left of the leaf pendant.
6 ] Use the 4 mm jump ring to attach the bee charm to the end chain link closest to the ceramic puffed diamond. ©

2 ] Use one end of the ribbon to tie an overhand knot on one end of one $53 / 4$ " piece of chain. Dab jewelry cement on the back side of the knot and let dry; trim the ribbon tail. Repeat entire step using the other end of the ribbon and the remaining $53 / 4$ " piece of chain.
3 ] Use 1 eye pin to string the curved tube; form a simple loop snug against the other end of the tube. Use one 6 mm jump ring from Step 1 to attach one end of the curved tube link to the free end of one $53 / 4$ " piece of chain; repeat. String the pressed-glass leaf to the center of the rose gold wire. Coil the wire tails around the curved tube link and tuck the ends of the wire into the link.
4 ] Use one 6 mm jump ring from Step 1 to attach one end of the brass/ribbon flower connector to the center of the curved tube link. Use one 6 mm jump ring to attach the 10 mm jump ring from Step 1 to the other end of the connector.
5 ] Attach the remaining eye pin to the 10 mm round link on the $11 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece of chain. Use 1 head pin to attach the pearl teardrop to the eye of the eye pin. Use 1 head pin to string 1 dark blush bicone and form a wrapped loop that attaches to the beak of the bird charm; attach the 4 mm jump ring to the tail of the bird charm. Use one 6 mm jump ring from Step 1 to attach the previous 4 mm jump ring to the eye of the eye pin.
6 ] Use 1 head pin to string the blush bicone; use 1 head pin to string the remaining dark blush bicone. Use both head pins to string the pressed-glass flower (wide end first) and form a simple loop around the eye
of the eye pin from Step 5. Use the eye pin to string the bead cap (wide end first) and the antiqued gold rose bead; form a wrapped loop that attaches to the 10 mm jump ring from Step 4. ©

FINISHED SIZE: ADJUSTABLE

1 ] String the 5-loop bead tube to the center of one 40 " piece of chocolate lace and one $40 "$ piece of saddle tan lace. Use one 1" piece of craft wire to wrap around both pieces of lace on one side of the 5-loop tube; repeat on the other side of the tube. Note: These wraps should hold the 5-loop tube in place.
2 ] String 1 bead tube to the center of one $41 / 2 "$ piece of craft wire. *Use round-nose pliers to make a loop on one end of the wire, snug against the tube, and continue to wrap the wire tail tightly around both pieces of lace, about $3 / 4$ " above the wire wrap in
Step 1. Repeat from * on the other side of the necklace.
3 ] Repeat Step 2, using the remaining tube and wrapping the wire about $1 / 2$ " above the wire wraps in Step 2.
4 ] Cut the chocolate lace into four
7 " pieces. Cut the saddle tan lace into five 7 " pieces. Lay 3 pieces of saddle tan lace and 2 pieces of chocolate lace horizontally. Gather the pieces of lace at the center and use one end of one 2" piece of wire to wrap two to three times around the center of the lace. Use the wire tail to string the bead cone (wide end first); form a wrapped loop that attaches to the center loop of the 5-loop tube.
5 ] Use one $11 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece of wire to string the arrow charm; wrap the wire tails around the bottom half of one of the fringes in the tassel formed in Step 4. Repeat to attach the feather charm to the top half of a second fringe.
6 ] String one 7" piece of chocolate lace through the far left loop of the 5-loop tube so that one tail is longer than the other.
Use one 1" piece of wire to wrap around the lace just below the loop to secure it. Repeat entire step three times using the remaining pieces of lace and the open loops of the 5-loop tube. Note: Stagger the pieces of lace so they do not all lay at the same length.
7 ] String the mint alabaster crystal to the center of one $1 \frac{1}{2}$ " piece of wire; wrap the wire tails around one of the chocolate lace fringes on the far left side of the necklace. Repeat to attach the olivine crystal to the lace fringe on the next loop to the right. Repeat again to attach the Indian sapphire crystal to one of the fringes on the far right side of the necklace.
8 ] Use one 2" piece of wire to string the crystal astral pink pendant; wrap one wire tail around the bottom half of one lace fringe to the right of the tassel. Use the other wire tail to form a wrapped bail on the pendant.
9 ] String 1 dark red crystal to the center of one 3 " piece of wire; attach the crystal to the fringe in Step 8 by wrapping one wire tail twice around the lace, below the crystal and about $1 \frac{1}{2} 2^{\prime \prime}$ above the pendant. Use the other wire tail to wrap twice around the lace

above the crystal. Use the wire tail above the crystal to string 1 dark red crystal and wrap the wire around the lace; repeat using the wire tail below the first crystal.
10 ] To wear, tie an overhand knot using all four ends of the lace so the necklace lays at the desired length. ○

1 ] Use one 6" piece of leather to string one 8 mm jump ring. Fold the last $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ of leather back onto itself and use one $3^{\prime \prime}$ piece of craft wire to wrap around the leather tail, securing the jump ring. Attach the jump ring to the far right loop of 1 connector. Repeat entire step, attaching the other end of the leather to the far left loop of the other connector.
2 ] Use the gold floss to tie a double-overhand knot around one 5 mm jump ring, leaving a $3 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ tail. Attach the previous jump ring to the second loop of the first connector used in Step 1. String all of the pink rondelles and all of the turquoise seed beads. Tie a double-overhand knot around one 5 mm jump ring, leaving a $3 / 4$ " tail. Attach the previous jump ring to the second loop of the second connector used in Step 1.
3 ] Use one 7 mm jump ring to attach a textured link on one end of the chain to the third loop of the first connector; repeat to attach the free end of the chain to the second connector.
4 ] Repeat Step 1, attaching the leather to the final loop on both connectors. 5 ] Use one 4 mm jump ring to attach the hook to the single loop on the first connector in Step 1; repeat, attaching the 15 mm jump ring to the other connector. ©

## FINISHED SIZE: 22"

1 ] Use the leather hole punch to punch a hole in the leather, $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ from one end; repeat on the other end of the leather. 2 ] Place 1 leather strap tip on one end of the leather, aligning the hole in the tip with the hole in the leather; place the post of 1 rivet set through the hole from top to bottom. Turn the leather over and place the cap of 1 rivet set over the post. Place the leather on the bench block. Place the end of the rivet setter over the back of the rivet. Holding the rivet setter still and perpendicular to the end of the rivet, strike the setter very deliberately with the hammer three times to set the rivet.
3 ] Repeat Step 2 on the other end of the leather.
4 ] Use the leather hole punch to punch a hole in the center of the leather; repeat to punch a hole $3 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ to the left and again $7 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ to the left of the hole just punched. Punch a hole $3 / 4$ " to the right of the center hole and again $7 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ to the right of the hole just punched.
5 ] Cut all 3 pieces of waxed linen in half and separate into 2 piles, each containing 1 cord of each color. String 1 washer to the center of 1 set of cords. Place the washer (faceup) over the top of the center hole in the leather; using the cord tails exiting through the bottom of the washer, pass down through the center hole in the leather. Note: You will now have one set of tails on top of the bracelet and one set of tails on the bottom of the bracelet.
6 ] Place 1 washer on top of the first hole to the left of the previous washer. Use the top cord tails from Step 5 to string down through the hole in the washer and the leather; use the bottom cord tails to string up through the hole in the leather and the washer.
7 ] Lay the top cord tails lengthwise across the top of the bracelet. Use the bottom cord tails to wrap around the top cord tails and the leather several times until you reach the far left hole in the leather. String the bottom cord tails up through the far left hole and use the top and bottom tails to tie an overhand knot that sits on top of the bracelet. Trim the tails to $1 / 22^{\prime \prime}$.
8 ] String the center of the second set of waxed linen cords through the hole in the center washer. Using this second set of

cords, repeat Steps 6 and 7 on the right side of the bracelet.
9 ] Use 1 jump ring to attach the birdhouse charm to the leather strap tip on the right side of the bracelet. Use 1 jump ring to attach one end of the chain to the previous leather strap tip. Use 1 jump ring to attach the lobster clasp to the free end of the chain. Use 1 jump ring to attach the flower charm to the previous jump ring. ©

1 ] Use one 2" piece of beading cord to wrap tightly around the center of the leather. Use a dab of adhesive on the back side of the leather to secure the ends of the cord. Repeat entire step about $31 / 2-4^{\prime \prime}$ to the left of the center wrap and again to the right of the center wrap.
2 ] String the big eye needle onto the beading cord, then string 1 brass square to the center of one 3" piece of beading cord; place the cord on top of the leather, midway between the center wrap and the wrap to the left of center formed in Step 1. *Wrap one end of the cord around the leather once, then string 1 brass square; repeat. Wrap this remaining tail around the leather, remove the needle, and secure with adhesive as before.** Repeat from * to ** using the other end of the same cord.

3 ] Repeat Step 2 twice, placing the 2 beadcord wraps so that they are evenly spaced between the second wrap formed in Step 1 and the end of the leather.
4] Repeat Steps 2 and 3 on the right side of the bracelet.
5 ] Place 2-3 drops of jewelry adhesive inside one half of the clasp; insert one end of the leather and let dry. Repeat on the other side of the bracelet. Note: When adding the clasp, make sure the top is facing the same direction as the brass squares. ©

If necessary, use a clothespin to hold it in place while the glue dries.
2 ] Use one 8" piece of flat leather lace to wrap around the folded portion of the braided suede. Secure with jewelry cement as before.
3 ] Dab the free end of the braided suede with jewelry cement and insert it into one half of the clasp.
4 ] Repeat Steps 1-3 for the other half of the necklace, making sure both halves of the clasp align correctly. ©

2 ] Use one 8 mm jump ring to attach 1 oval jump ring to one end of the leather via the punched hole; repeat.
3 ] Use the 6 mm jump ring to attach the lobster clasp to one of the previous oval chain links.
4 ] Use 1 head pin to string 1 copper serrated round, 1 wavy spacer, the red-orange briolette, and one $3 \times 1 \mathrm{~mm}$ spacer; form a wrapped loop that attaches to one copper 5 mm jump ring. Use the textured oval chain link to attach one copper 5 mm jump ring to the previous copper 5 mm jump ring. Use one 8 mm jump ring to attach the previous 5 mm jump ring to the flamed copper ring. 5 ] Use 1 head pin to string 1 copper serrated round, 1 wavy spacer, the dark brown briolette, and one $3 \times 1 \mathrm{~mm}$ spacer; form a wrapped loop. Use one 8 mm jump ring to attach the previous wrapped loop to the flamed copper ring, to the left of the briolette attached in Step 4.
6 ] Repeat Step 5 using the green-andorange briolette and attaching the wrapped loop to the flamed copper ring on the right side of the red-orange briolette.


## Bracelet:

1 ] Attach one brass 5 mm jump ring to one loop of the leather flower connector; repeat. 2 ] Use the beading wire to string 1 crimp tube and the ring half of the clasp; pass back through the tube and crimp. *String 1 brass textured round, 1 bead cap, 1 red ceramic round, and 1 bead cap; repeat twice using the orange round and the blue round.** String 1 brass textured round and pass through the jump ring on one side of the flower connector and the second jump ring on the opposite side of the flower connector.
3 ] Repeat from * to **, stringing the ceramic rounds in the following order: tan, red, gray. String 1 brass textured round, 1 crimp tube, and the other half of the clasp; pass back through the tube and crimp. ©

ะ Tips: Place the leather straps (with clasp fastened) over a hanger or dress form so that you can check the drape as you're working. This is especially important if you're substituting beads or creating your own pattern for each strand. Each strand is about $1^{\prime \prime}$ longer than the previous one.

For a better impression, slightly dampen the leather straps before stamping on them.

1 ] Cut the leather strap into two 11 " pieces. Use the leather hole punch to punch a hole in 1 strap, $3 / 16^{4}$ from one end; repeat using the other strap.
2 ] Place 1 leather strap tip on 1 leather strap, aligning the hole in the tip with the hole in the leather; place the post of 1 rivet set through the hole from bottom to top. Place the cap of 1 rivet set over the post and place the leather on the bench block. Place the end of the rivet setter over the cap of the rivet. Holding the rivet setter still and perpendicular to the end of the rivet, strike the setter very deliberately with the hammer three times to set the rivet. Repeat entire step using the other leather strap.
3 ] Use the leather hole punch to punch a hole in the free end of 1 leather strap, $1 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ from the end. Punch 6 more holes, each about $3 / 8$ " from the previous hole. Repeat entire step using the other leather strap. 4 ] Lay both leather straps vertically about 6" apart with the leather strap tips at the top and the 7 punched holes at the bottom. 5 ] Attach 1 jump ring to the top hole (punched in Step 3) of the left leather strap so that the jump ring is facing the right-side of the strap (or the interior of the necklace); repeat to attach 1 jump ring to each of the remaining holes on the strap. Repeat entire step using the other leather strap, making sure the jump rings are facing the left-side of the strap (or the interior of the necklace). 6 ] Use one 8" piece of beading wire to string 1 crimp tube and the top jump ring on the left leather strap; pass back through the tube and crimp. String $\{1 F, 1 G, 1 F$, and 1A\} nine times. String 1F, 1G, 1F, 1 crimp tube, and the top jump ring on the right leather strap; pass back through the tube and crimp.
7 ] Attach one end of one 7" piece of copper flat chain to the second jump ring on the left leather strap; repeat to attach the free end of the chain to the right leather strap.
8 ] Use one 11 " piece of beading wire to string 1 crimp tube and the third jump ring on the left leather strap; pass back through the tube and crimp. String \{1G, 1C, 1G, and $1 B\}$ seventeen times. String $1 \mathrm{G}, 1 \mathrm{C}, 1 \mathrm{G}$, 1 crimp tube, and the third jump ring on the right leather strap; pass back through the tube and crimp.

9] Repeat Step 7 using one 11" piece of copper flat chain and attaching it to the fourth pair of jump rings.
10 ] Attach one end of the beaded chain to the fifth jump ring on the left leather strap via the beaded chain's simple loop. Repeat to attach the other end of the beaded chain to the right leather strap. 11] Repeat Step 7 using one 13" piece of copper flat chain and attaching it to the sixth pair of jump rings.
12 ] Arrange all of the smoky quartz barrels in graduated order so that the largest is in the center and the smallest are on each end. Use one 16 " piece of beading wire to string 1 crimp tube and the seventh jump ring on the left leather strap; pass back through the tube and crimp. String \{1G, 1D, 1G, and 1E $\}$ twelve times, making sure the largest smoky quartz barrel is in the center of the beading wire. String 1G, 1D, 1G, 1 crimp tube, and the seventh jump ring on the right leather strap; pass back through the tube and crimp.
13 ] Use 1 jump ring to attach the lobster clasp to 1 leather strap tip. Use 1 jump ring to attach one 4" piece of copper flat chain to the other leather strap tip. Use the head pin to string 1D and 1G; form a wrapped loop that attaches to the free end of the copper chain.
14 ] Use the metal stamps to stamp the following words onto the leather straps as desired by placing each strap on the bench block, holding each stamp perfectly perpendicular to the strap, and striking each stamp once very deliberately with the hammer: Brave, Clever, Tough, Wise, Strong, Kind, and Fierce. ©

Use 1 head pin to string the 3 mm copper round and the garnet nugget; form a wrapped loop. Use 1 head pin to string the pearl and form a wrapped loop. Use the craft wire to form a wrapped-loop bail on the peach moonstone teardrop; attach one 5 mm jump ring to the wrapped loop.
2 ] Use 1 head pin to string 1A, 1D, and 1E; form a simple loop that attaches to one 8 mm jump ring. Use one 8 mm jump ring to attach the previous jump ring to one 8 mm jump ring. Use one 5 mm jump ring to attach one 5 mm jump ring to the previous 8 mm jump ring. Use one 5 mm jump ring to attach one 3 mm jump ring to the previous 5 mm
jump ring. Use 18" of beading wire to string 1 crimp tube and the previous 3 mm jump ring. Pass back through the tube and crimp. *String 3C, 2A, 1C, and 2A.**
3 ] String $1 B$. String $\{2 A$ and $1 C\}$ five times. String 2A. Repeat entire step eight times. String 1B. Repeat from * to **, reversing the stringing sequence.
4 ] String 1 crimp tube and one 3 mm jump ring; pass back through the tube and crimp. Use one 5 mm jump ring to attach one 5 mm jump ring to the previous 3 mm jump ring. Use one 5 mm jump ring to attach one 5 mm jump ring to the previous 5 mm jump ring. Attach the lobster clasp to the previous jump ring.
5 ] Use one 5 mm jump ring to attach one 3 mm jump ring to the first 5 mm jump ring used in Step 2. Use 18" of beading wire to string 1 crimp tube and the previous 3 mm jump ring; pass back through the tube and crimp. String $\{3 \mathrm{E}, 1$ seed bead, $1 \mathrm{~A}, 1$ seed bead, 3E, 1D, 1F, and 1D\} nine times. String 3E, 1 crimp tube, and one 3 mm jump ring; pass back through the tube and crimp. Use one 5 mm jump ring to attach the previous 3 mm jump ring to the third jump ring used in Step 4.
6 ] String the sun pendant to the center of one 17 " piece of leather cord; tie an overhand knot.
7 ] Place one end of the 17 " piece of leather cord and one end of one $15^{\prime \prime}$ piece of leather cord into 1 foldover cord end. Use chain-nose pliers to squeeze shut.
8 ] String all of the dangles formed in Step 1 to the center of the $15^{\prime \prime}$ piece of leather cord. Repeat Step 7 using the free ends of both leather cords.
9 ] Use one 5 mm jump ring to attach 1 foldover cord end to the first 5 mm jump ring used in Step 2. Use one 5 mm jump ring to attach the remaining foldover cord end to the third jump ring used in Step 4. ©

FINISHED SIZE: 33" (with $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ focal)
む. Tip: Adjust the length of the necklace by adding or subtracting leather links before you sew the final link together.

1 ] Use the scissors to cut one 3" piece of deertan lace. Fold the piece of deertan lace in half and trim each corner so all the corners are slightly rounded. Use the leather hand punch to punch a hole through each cut end of the folded leather, about $1 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ in diameter and about $1 / 4 "$ from the cut ends (alternately, use the awl to pierce holes in the leather, then use scissors to make the holes $1 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ in diameter). Repeat entire step nineteen times for a total of 20 leather links. 2 ] With 1 leather link folded in half, open up a second leather link and thread one end through both holes of the first leather link. Fold the second leather link in half, then thread one end of a third leather link through both holes of the second link. Continue in this manner until you have joined 10 leather links together; this forms one "strap" of the necklace. Note: When stringing the leather links, make sure the right side of the leather is facing out.

3 ] Repeat Step 2 to form a second "strap." Cut the split suede lace into four $1 \frac{1}{4}$ " pieces. 4 ] String one $11 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece of chain through the folded end of one of the leather straps. *Use one $11 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece of wire to wrap around one end of 1 piece of split suede lace, form a simple loop that attaches to one end of the previous chain, then continue wrapping the wire around the same end of the split suede lace.** Repeat from * to ** to attach the other end of the split suede lace to one $23 / 4$ " piece of chain. Repeat entire step in reverse order to attach the other end of the $23 / 4$ " piece of chain to a new piece of split suede lace, then to the other leather strap. 5 ] Repeat from * to **, attaching a third piece of split suede lace to the free end of the $11 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece of chain on the left leather strap, then repeat again to attach a fourth piece of split suede lace to the free end of the $11 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece of chain on the right leather strap.
6 ] Use one $11 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece of wire to wrap around the free end of the split suede lace on the left side of the necklace; form a simple loop that attaches to the $23 / 4$ " piece of chain added in Step 4, 3 links from the left end. Continue wrapping the wire around the same end of the split suede lace. Repeat entire step on the right side of the necklace. 7 ] Use one 15 " piece of wire to wrap around your index finger six or seven times, forming a ring, and leaving a tail that is at least 2 " long. Wrap the tail around the wire ring several times to secure it.
8 ] Cut one 2" piece of deertan lace and fold one end over the center of the $23 / 4$ " piece of chain from Step 4. String the other end of the deertan lace through the wire ring and fold it back over the first fold made. Use one 3" piece of wire to wrap tightly around the center of the deertan lace, securing the tails.
9 ] Use one 12 " piece of wire to string the turquoise teardrop; form a wrapped-loop bail that attaches to the bottom of the wire ring created in Step 7. Use round-nose pliers to form a small loop on one end of one 12" piece of wire; string the baroque pearl and form a wrapped-loop bail that attaches to the bottom of the wire ring.
10 ] Using the remaining $31 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece of deertan lace, thread one end through the holes in the leather link on one end of the necklace from top to bottom; repeat using the leather link on the other end of the necklace. Fold one lace tail over the other and use the needle and waxed linen cord to sew 2-3 stitches through all of the layers of the deertan lace; tie a knot on the underside of the necklace. Note: You may find it helpful to pierce a hole through the layers of deertan lace before sewing the stitches. Trim the tails. ©

1 ] Use all 3 pieces of suede lace to form a lark's head knot on the rusted iron pendant. 2 ] Braid 1 strand of each color together for $101 / 2^{\prime \prime}$. String one 14 mm jump ring and fold the tails back onto themselves. Use one 8 " piece of craft wire to wrap tightly around the tails next to the jump ring. Attach one 14 mm jump ring to the previous jump ring. Repeat entire step on the other half of the necklace, replacing the final jump ring with the lobster clasp.
3 ] Attach one 14 mm jump ring to the center of the rusted iron pendant, directly across from the lark's head knot. Use one 3" piece of waxed Irish linen to form a lark's head knot on the previous jump ring. Form a dou-ble-overhand knot snug against the jump ring. Use one tail to string 1 flower, then form an overhand knot near the end of the tail; repeat.

4 ] String the face pendant to the center of one 3" piece of waxed Irish linen cord. Use both tails to string the 4 mm corrugated round and the jump ring from Step 3. Use both tails to tie an overhand knot around the cord, directly below the jump ring. 5 ] *Attach three 10 mm jump rings to the rusted iron pendant on the left side of the face pendant.** Use one 14 mm jump ring to attach the beach stone link to the rusted iron pendant, to the left of the previous jump rings. String the free hole of the beach stone link to the center of the hemp cord; tie an overhand knot. Use both tails to string 1 lentil; tie an overhand knot. String 1 lentil and tie an overhand knot. Attach three 10 mm jump rings to the rusted iron pendant, to the left of the beach stone link. 6 ] Repeat from * to ** on the right side of the face pendant. Use one 14 mm jump ring to attach the 9.5 mm jump ring to the rusted iron pendant, to the right of the previous jump rings. Use the 15 mm jump ring to string 4 brass cubes, the leaf pendant, 1 brass cube, the lampwork rondelle, 2 brass cubes, and the previous 9.5 mm jump ring. Attach three 10 mm jump rings to the rusted iron pendant, to the right of the ceramic leaf dangle just formed. ©
