Resources Conference Set for December

Dec. 2 to 4 has been set as the date for the Mid-Century Conference on Resources for the Future. Chairman of the conference, which is to take place in Washington, D. C., will be Lewis W. Douglas, board chairman of the Mutual Life Insurance Co. of New York and former ambassador to the United Kingdom

The conference sponsors point out that the conference will be exploratory in nature, take no formal votes, pass no resolutions, nor seek to advance any particular program of action. Instead, the conference will endeavor to provide a forum for all viewpoints, seek to identify and clarify urgent problems, and to set forth the positions of all responsible groups. The focus of the conference will be generally on domestic problems, although it will recognize that few problems are purely domestic.

As plans now stand, the conference will organize into 10 or 12 sections dealing with different phases of the resources field. Among the proposed sections are: utilization of land resources, competing demands for use of land, water resources problems, and common problems in resources research.

Confectioners to Hold Annual Session, Exhibit in New York

The National Confectioners' Association will hold its 70th annual convention in New York from June 14 to 18. Convention Headquarters will be at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel.

The Confectionery Industries Exposition will also be held in the Waldorf. It will open on June 16 and last until 5:00 р.м. on June 18.

Special sessions of the meeting will include those on production, merchandising, advertising, and packaging. Irvin C. Shaffer, Just Born, Inc., New York, will be general chairman of the meeting.

tive secretary of the association, the NACA membership has grown to the point where the Essex and Sussex can no longer accommodate all of the attending members. Consequently plans are being made to accommodate some members at the Monmouth Hotel. Last year, over 500 persons attended the meeting and an even larger number are expected for the next meeting.

Fertilizer Conference at Washington State College

A regional fertilizer conference will be held at Washington State College, Pullman, from June 30 through July 2. The conference will be held in WSC's new Wilson Compton Union Building.

The first day and a half will be devoted to soil fertility and the economics of fertilizer usage in the region. On the second afternoon, attendants will hear about the geology, soils, engineering aspects, and soil research of the newly developed Columbia Basin Project, which is bringing nearly 1 million acres under irrigation. There will also be a tour of the project.

Other special events will be tours of development farms, inspection of special engineering structures, Grand Coulee Dam, and the Washington Tree Fruit Experiment Station at Wenatchee.

Research scientists are invited to attend a preconference meeting on June 29 to discuss soil testing, foliar analysis, and interpretation.
