Program Announced for NFA'S Atlanta Meeting

Senator Richard Russell (D.-Ga.) will be one of the principal speakers at the National Fertilizer Association's 27th annual southern convention in Atlanta, Ga., next month. The meeting will take place Nov. 16 to 18 in the Atlanta-Biltmore Hotel. Tentative title of Sen. Russell's talk is "What's Ahead for the American Farmer?"

The NFA meeting opens on Nov. 16 with meetings of its executive committee and board of directors. The general meeting will start on the following day at 10:00 A.M. with a discussion on "Broadening the Base of the Fertilizer Market" by W. R. Allstetter, vice president of NFA. Also to speak on Nov. 17 are Raymond Rosson, county agent of Jonesboro, Tenn., and C. M. Ferguson, director of the extension service for USDA. Mr. Rosson will speak on fertilizer as a cornerstone for community development. Mr. Ferguson will discuss the place of proper fertilizer use in improving agricultural efficiency.

Sen. Russell will speak on the morning of Nov. 18. A talk on salesmanship by some leading industry figure outside of the fertilizer industry is also scheduled for the same day. Louis Ware, president of International Minerals & Chemical and chairman of the NFA board of directors, will preside at all of the sessions.

The annual fall banquet will be held on the evening of Nov. 17.

Agronomists to Meet in November in Dallas

Seventeen divisions of the American Society of Agronomy will meet with the Soil Science Society of America in Dallas, Tex., Nov. 16 to 20. The National Joint Committee on Grassland Farming will also meet with ASA during the meeting. Sessions will take place in the Hotels Baker and Adophus.

In addition to a full program of scientific papers planned for the divisions, there will also be field trips, exhibits,

and conferences on forage crop improvement, oats, and sorghum improvement. Other special events will be a panel discussion on the farm press and the educational program of the extension agronomist.

Some of the special symposia arranged for the meeting are: undergraduate training and employment opportunities for agronomy majors, soil conditioners, soil structure and aeration, soil tests as a basis for fertilizer recommendations, and effect of surfactants on soil properties.
