Pfizer Sets Up New Foreign Sales Division

Chas. Pfizer & Co. has announced formation of a sales division to handle world-wide distribution of its fine chemicals and pharmaceuticals in bulk and antibiotics for feed supplement and veterinary use. John O. Teeter, who heads the new division, said demand for terramycin animal feed supplements, vitamins, and other products had prompted the company to establish a separate organization to handle sales abroad.

Shell Ltd. Opens Venezuelan Agricultural Service

The Shell agricultural service, sponsored by the Venezuelan subsidiary of Shell Ltd., formally opened its new head-quarters building near the town of Cagua early in April. The Shell agricultural service, to aid the development of agriculture in Venezuela by a system of combined research and technical aid, was originally set up in 1952.

The agricultural service has established a farm of about 120 acres in the center of one of the chief agricultural regions of the country. Both the farm and the service headquarters are within 10 miles of Maracay, the location of the Venezuelan National Agricultural Institute and the School of Agronomy of the University of Venezuela.

The Shell agricultural service is divided into four sections: agronomy, entomology, phytopathology, and agricultural engineering. The experts from the service carry out experimental work on the Cagua farm or on the properties of nearby farmers.


