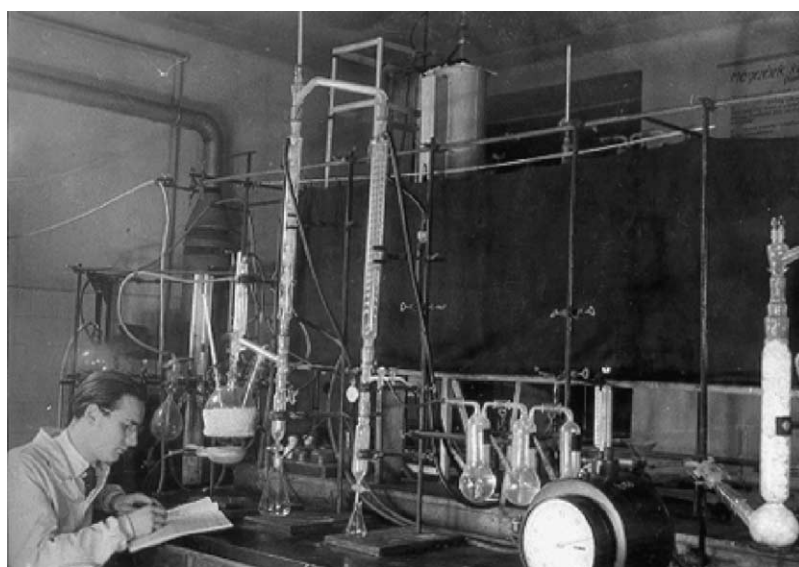


Fig. 1. Csaba at his first job at the Technical University of Budapest in the early 1950s (From the collection of Csaba Horváth).

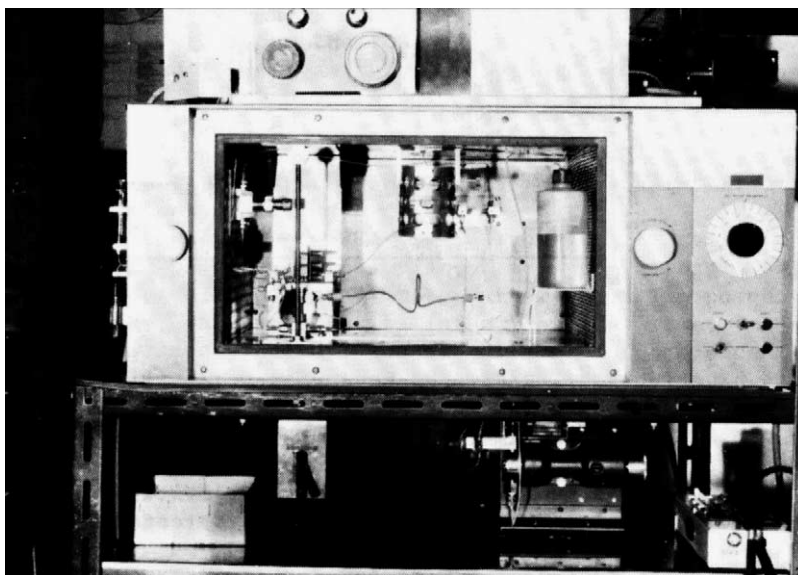


Fig. 4. The first HPLC instrument Professor Horváth built (From the collection of Csaba Horváth).

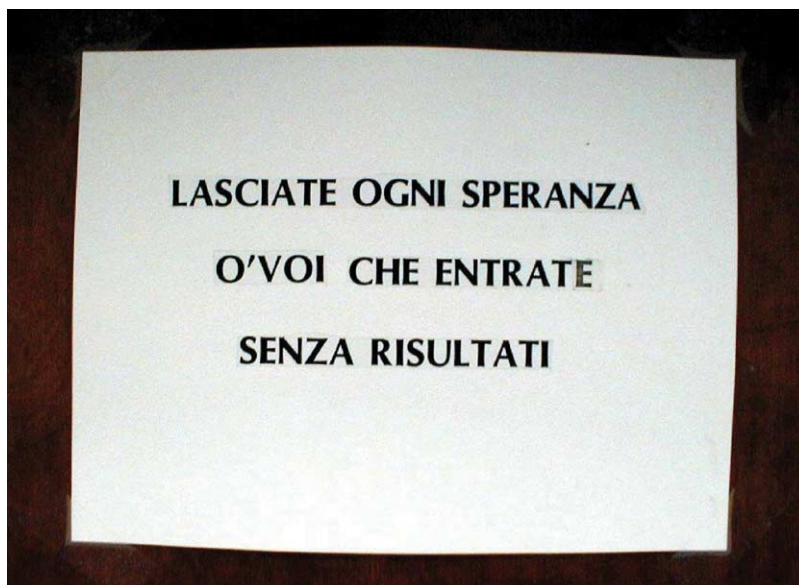


Fig. 6. The reminder for students on his office door at Yale (abandon all hope, you who enter here without results).
