Of the two Honorable Mention research papers for 1994, one was inadvertently committed to an edited volume well prior to the

In May 1994, the AAFS Psychiatry & Behavioral Science Section successfully petitioned the American Board of Forensic Psychiatry, Inc. to allocate 25% of the ABFP's residual funds to the Forensic Sciences Foundation, Inc. These funds will be invested by the FSF and the accumulated interest will support "Acorn Grants" for research in forensic psychiatry.
