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# Reactions of some triosmium clusters of the type $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9} \mathrm{Ar}\left(\mathrm{Ar}=\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}, \mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}, \mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right.$, or $\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}$ ) with phosphines and phosphites; X-ray crystal structure of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ 

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#### Abstract

Triosmium clusters with the formulation $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO}), \mathrm{Ar}\left[\mathrm{Ar}=\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}(1), \mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right.$ (2), $\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}$ (3), or $\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}$ (4)] can be chemically activated by reaction with $\mathrm{Me}_{3} \mathrm{NO} / \mathrm{MeCN}$ to produce the reactive species $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9-n}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{n} \mathrm{Ar}\left[n=1, \mathrm{Ar}=\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}(5), \mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}(6), \mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right.$ (7), or $\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}$ (8); $n=2, \mathrm{Ar}=\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}(9), \mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}(10), \mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}(11)$, or $\left.\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}(12)\right]$, which then react with phosphine or phosphite molecules to give substituted products $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9-n}\left(\mathrm{PR}_{3}\right)_{n} \mathrm{Ar}(n=1$, or $2, \mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Ph}, \mathrm{Et}$, or OMe ). These clusters have been characterised by spectroscopic techniques, and $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu$ $\mathrm{H}_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ (24) has been structurally characterised by an X-ray analysis. In this complex one of the phosphite ligand occupies an axial site on the osmium triangle while the second occupies a more conventional equatorial site. The $\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}$ ligand caps the triangle and is coordinated through the nitrogen and one carbon atom.


## Introduction

Osmium and ruthenium clusters containing the $\mu_{3}-o$-phenylene ligand, $\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}$, are readily obtained from the oxidative addition reaction of $\mathrm{M}_{3}(\mathrm{CO})_{12}(\mathrm{M}=\mathrm{Os}, \mathrm{Ru})$ with arylphosphines or arylarsines, or the thermolysis of clusters containing these ligands, via $\mathrm{P}-\mathrm{C}$ or As-C and $\mathrm{C}-\mathrm{H}$ bond cleavage and $\mathrm{M}-\mathrm{C}$ and $\mathrm{M}-\mathrm{H}$ bond formation [1-8]. The benzyne cluster $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)(1)$ has been prepared from the direct reaction of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mathrm{CO})_{12}$ with benzene in low yield [9], and can also be obtained from the photolysis of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\eta^{6}-\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)$ [10]. The activated cluster $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mathrm{CO})_{10}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2}$ reacts with a series of arenes to give clusters of the type of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{R}^{1} \mathrm{R}^{2}\right.$ ) [11]. The crystal structure of (1) (Fig. 1) [11] shows that the benzyne ligand lies over one face of the metal triangle, forming two $\sigma$-bonds and one $\pi$-bond to the osmium atoms, a bonding mode found for many alkyne and alkene complexes [12]. This bonding mode is adopted by most of the benzyne species reported, while some adopt a slightly different bonding mode $[5,7,13]$, where the benzyne ligand is bound asymmetrically to the bent chain of three osmium

atoms with one carbon atom linked to one metal atom and the adjacent atom bound to the other two metal atoms (Fig. 1).

We are interested in some analogues of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)(\mathbf{1})$, i.e. $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-$ $\mathrm{H}_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)$ (2) [14], $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ (3) [15] and $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-$ $\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}\right)(4)$ [16] because of their close structural relation to 1 in that they have very similar IR spectra in the CO stretching region and the organic ligands adopt the same bonding mode as in the benzyne complexes (Fig. 2).

Although the studies of fluxionality of benzyne and related species have been carried out [13,17-19], the chemistry of these clusters have not been studied in detail [20]. While the reaction of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)(1)$ with diphenylacetylene [21] and the Friedel-Crafts reactions on the organic moieties of clusters 1-4 [22] have been reported previously, here we wish to report the substitution reaction of complexes 1-4 with phosphine and phosphite ligands, and analyse the diversity of isomers found in the products.

## Results and discussion

Clusters $1-4$ are readily activated by reaction with $\mathrm{Me}_{3} \mathrm{NO} / \mathrm{MeCN}$ to yield mono- and bis-acetonitrile derivatives 5-12 (Scheme 1), which display similar IR spectra to (Table 1). These complexes are highly reactive and air-sensitive, and have

not been isolated. The acetonitrile ligand(s) in these clusters are easily displaced by phosphine and phosphite ligands.
(i) Reactions of $\mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}(\mathrm{MeCN})\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)$ (5) and $\mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)$ (9) with $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(R=\mathrm{Ph}, \mathrm{OMe})$

Clusters 5 and 9 react with $\mathrm{PPh}_{3}$ or $\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}$, in $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$, at room temperature to form $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}\left(\mathrm{PR}_{3}\right)\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)[\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Ph}(13) ; \mathrm{OMe}(14)]$ and $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7^{-}}$ $\left(\mathrm{PR}_{3}\right)_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)[\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Ph}$ (15); OMe (16)], respectively. Clusters $13-15$ have also been synthesised from the photolysis of the face capping benzene clusters $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mathrm{CO})_{9-n}\left(\mathrm{PR}_{3}\right)_{n}\left(\mu_{3}-\eta^{2}: \eta^{2}: \eta^{2}-\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)[10](\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Ph}, n=1$, or $2 ; \mathrm{R}=\mathrm{OMe}, n=1)$ (Scheme 2).

Clusters 13 and 14 have been studied exhaustively by NMR [10] and have been shown to have two isomeric forms. Possible structures for the isomers are shown in Fig. 3.

In the case of $\mathrm{PPh}_{3}$ substitution, the $\mathrm{PPh}_{3}$ ligand in the major isomer appears to occupy an axial site, while for $\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}$ substitution the ligand in the major isomer occupies an equatorial site. This feature may reflect the difference in steric requirements of the two types of phosphorus donor ligands since the steric repulsion between $\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}$ moiety and the bulky $\mathrm{PPh}_{3}$ ligand could be minimised with the $\mathrm{PPh}_{3}$ occupying the axial position.

While the bis-triphenylphosphine substituted cluster $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left(\mathrm{PPh}_{3}\right)_{2^{-}}$ $\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)(15)$ has only one isomer, which might adopt the structure shown in Fig. 4 which is consistent with ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H}$ NMR studies [22], the trimethylphosphite analogue

$\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)(16)$ has two isomers. The ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H}$ NMR spectrum of 16 at room temperature shows broad resonances, while in that at 190 K the resonances for two isomers are observed. The major isomer (16a) has two apparent doublets ( $\delta 7.76,7.62$ ) and two apparent triplets $(\delta 6.78,6.58)$ for the $\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}$ group, implying that the molecule is asymmetric. The ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H}$ NMR data indicates that one

hydride ligand is trans to one phosphite ligand $(J(\mathrm{PH})=44 \mathrm{~Hz})$ and cis to the other $(J(\mathrm{PH})=9.3 \mathrm{~Hz})$. The second hydride is cis to only one of the phosphite ligands $(J(\mathrm{PH})=14.8 \mathrm{~Hz})$. Thus, the possible structures of the major isomer are postulated as in Fig. 5a. For the minor isomer, only $\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}$ and the hydride

resonances are identified, while the benzene signals are not resolved. Both hydride ligands appear as doublets $\left(J(\mathrm{PH})=15.0\right.$ and 14.9 Hz , respectively) in the ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H}$ NMR spectrum suggesting both coupling to only one phosphite ligand in a cis-position (Fig. 5b).
(ii) Reactions of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}(\mathrm{MeCN})\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)$
(6) and $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2^{-}}$ $\left(C_{9} H_{6}\right)(10)$ with $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(R=E t$, or OMe )

Clusters 6 and 10 react smoothly with phosphine and phosphite ligands in dichloromethane at room temperature or under reflux to give substituted products 17-20 (Scheme 3). Better yields are obtained under refluxing condition.

Clusters 17-20 were also characterised spectroscopically, and again, the hydride region of their ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H}$ NMR spectra is very useful for the elucidation of their structures. The complex $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}\left(\mathrm{PEt}_{3}\right)\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)$ (17) has been shown to have two isomers in the ratio of $2: 1$ and in both cases the phosphine ligand is probably cis to one hydride ligand $(J(\mathrm{PH})=12 \mathrm{~Hz})$ and trans to the other $(J(\mathrm{PH})=18 \mathrm{~Hz})($ Fig. 6 ).

In both isomers 17a and 17 b , the $\mathrm{PEt}_{3}$ ligand occupies an equatorial position, which is different from that observed for the benzyne clusters 13 and 14. In the latter case, phosphine or phosphite ligand occupies an equatorial site to give an asymmetrical isomer or takes an axial position to give a symmetrical isomer (Fig. 3), while in the case of (17), the occupation of different equatorial sites by $\mathrm{PEt}_{3}$ ligand results in two isomers due to the asymmetry of the molecule.

The phosphite analogue, $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)$ (18) also exists in different isomeric forms as evidenced by the H NMR spectrum. The major isomer probably adopts a similar structure to that of 17 , but the minor isomer is almost undetectable because its proton resonances are very weak and unresolved. For both the complexes $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left(\mathrm{PEt}_{3}\right)_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)$ (19) and $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}-$ $\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)(20)$ the hydride signals are not well-resolved, and it is therefore difficult to propose their structures.
(iii) Reactions of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}(\mathrm{MeCN})\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ (7) and $\left.\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2} \mathrm{CO}\right)_{7}$ $(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)(11)$ with $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}$, or OMe$)$

The reaction of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}(\mathrm{MeCN})\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ (7) with $\mathrm{PEt}_{3}$ in $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ at room temperature gives $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}\left(\mathrm{PEt}_{3}\right)\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right.$ ) (21) which from the ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H}$

NMR data gives only one isomer, while the reaction with $\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}$ leads to two isomers of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ (22a and 22b). The data for 21 are consistent with the $\mathrm{PEt}_{3}$ ligand occupying an equatorial site where it is cis to one hydride $(J(\mathrm{PH})=12.3 \mathrm{~Hz})$ and trans to the other $(J(\mathrm{PH})=22.0 \mathrm{~Hz})$ (Fig. 7a). The major isomer of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)(22 \mathrm{a})$ has a very large trans ${ }^{31} \mathrm{P}_{-}^{1} \mathrm{H}$ coupling (ca. 51 Hz ) and a cis ${ }^{31} \mathrm{P}_{-}{ }^{1} \mathrm{H}$ coupling ( 13.3 Hz ). It is therefore likely to have a structure similar to that of 21 , while the $\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}$ ligand in the minor isomer might be in the axial position to give cis coupling to both hydride ligands (Fig. 7b).

The reaction of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)(11)$ with $\mathrm{PEt}_{3}$ and $\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}$ gives only one isomer in each case, and the ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H}$ NMR spectra of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu$ $\mathrm{H}_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left(\mathrm{PEt}_{3}\right)_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)(23)$ and $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)(24)$ suggest structures in which either both phosphine or phosphite ligands occupy axial positions, or that one is in an axial position while the other is in an equatorial site to give one doublet and one triplet in the hydride region with cis ${ }^{31} \mathrm{P}_{-}^{1} \mathrm{H}$ coupling (Fig. 8).

It is quite interesting that from the reaction of 11 and $\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}$, a compound formulated as $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ (25) is isolated. Although its molecular ion is not observed in the mass spectrum, ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H}$ NMR spectrum shows unambiguously the resonance for one $\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}$ ligand at $\delta 3.69(\mathrm{~d}, J(\mathrm{PH})=$ 12.0 Hz ), and that for an acetonitrile group, a singlet at $\delta 2.52$. The phosphite ligand has a two-bond cis-coupling $(J(\mathrm{PH})=12.0 \mathrm{~Hz})$ with one hydride and a

three-bond coupling $(J(\mathrm{PH})=3.0 \mathrm{~Hz})$ with the other. It is difficult to formulate the structure of 25 since the phosphite ligand and the acetonitrile ligand could have different positions with respect to each other.
(iv) Crystal structure determination of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ (24)

In order to confirm the spectroscopic assignments and to establish the positions of the phosphite ligands an X-ray diffraction study of 24 was undertaken since the suitable crystals were available. Yellow platelets of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]_{2^{-}}$ $\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)(24)$ were grown from $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ /hexane solution at $-5^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$. The molecular structure of 24 is shown in Fig. 9, with bond lengths listed in Table 2 and bond angles in Table 3.

The crystal structure of 24 consists of discrete molecules of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu$ $\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ separated by normal Van der Waals's distances. The metal framework in 24 is best described as an irregular triangle of Os atoms. The pyrrole, $\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{~N}$ ring is planar and lies perpendicular to the $\mathrm{Os}_{3}$ plane (dihedral angle $\left.90.5(5)^{\circ}\right)$. The pyrrole nitrogen, $\mathrm{N}(1)$, is bound to $\mathrm{Os}(3)$ while $\mathrm{C}(7)$ bridges the $\mathrm{Os}(1)-\mathrm{Os}(2)$ edge, in a manner similar to that observed in the parent complex, $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ [23]. An attempt was also made to refine the structure with the positions of $\mathrm{N}(1)$ and $\mathrm{C}(7)$ reversed, but this lead to a larger $R$ factor, larger thermal parameters on nitrogen and a contraction of those for carbon, as would be expected if the nitrogen and carbon positions were interchanged. One phosphite group occupies an axial site on $\mathrm{Os}(1)$ pseudo-trans to $\mathrm{C}(7)[\mathrm{P}(1)-\mathrm{Os}(1)-$ $\left.\mathrm{C}(7), 171.1(4)^{\circ}\right]$ while the second phosphite takes up a more conventional equatorial site on Os(3). The seven carbonyl ligands are essentially linear and occupy terminal sites on the osmium framework; $\mathrm{Os}(1)$ has two carbonyls, both equatorial, and $\mathrm{Os}(2)$ has three, one axial and two equatorial, and $\mathrm{Os}(3)$ has two, one axial and one equatorial. The two bridging hydrides were not located directly but potential energy

calculations [24] indicate that they bridge the $\mathrm{Os}(1)-\mathrm{Os}(2)$ and $\mathrm{Os}(1)-\mathrm{Os}(3)$ edges, in a configuration similar to that found in $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ [23].

The Os-Os distances in the Os triangle of 24 lie within the normal range [11] for such interactions and follow the same trends as observed in the related cluster $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ [23]. The presence of the edge-bridging hydrides causes the lengthening of the $\mathrm{Os}-\mathrm{Os}$ edges while the capping $\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}$ ligand has an edge shortening influence, particularly on the dibridged $\mathrm{Os}(1)-\mathrm{Os}(2)$ edge.

The $\mathrm{Os}(3)-\mathrm{N}(1)$, the $\mathrm{Os}(1)-\mathrm{C}(7)$, and the $\mathrm{Os}(2)-\mathrm{C}(7)$ distances in 24 are similar to those found in $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ [23], while the same slight asymmetry in the Os-C distances, the $\mathrm{N}-\mathrm{C}$ and $\mathrm{C}-\mathrm{C}$ bond lengths within the ring also follow the same trends as in the unsubstituted cluster, with the short $\mathrm{N}(1)-\mathrm{C}(10)[1.319(19) \AA]$ and $C(8)-C(9)[1.313(22) \AA$ A $]$ indicating multiple bond character. However, the $N(1)-C(7)$ and $C(7)-C(8)$ lengths of $1.401(17)$ and $1.435(20) \AA$, respectively, involv-

ing the spiro-carbon, $\mathrm{C}(7)$, may indicate some residual $\pi$-bonding to this atom suggesting that some aromatic character is retained by the ring in this bonding mode.

The observation of a phosphite or phosphine ligand occupying an axial position on a metal triangle is rare since both the steric and electronic factors would favour this type of bulky, $\pi$-acceptor ligand occupying an equatorial site. There is less steric crowding in equatorial sites, also, a good $\pi$-acceptor, such as a phosphite, would be able to attract more electron density to itself when trans to a metal-metal edge rather than when in competition for metal electron density with another good $\pi$-acceptor such as a trans axial carbonyl group [25]. However, in 24 one phosphite occupies an axial site, but, notably, is trans to the $\mathrm{C}(7)$ atom of the pyrrole ring rather than trans to a carbonyl. The structurally related cluster, $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})(\mathrm{CO})_{9^{-}}$

$(\mathrm{SPh})\left(\mathrm{PEt}_{3}\right)$ [26], does show the presence of a phosphine in a pseudo-axial site. The presence of the axial phosphite in 24 adds weight to the spectroscopic assignment of axial phosphites and phosphines in complexes 13-20 alone.

[^0]and 45.5 Hz , respectively) and cis-coupling to the other $(J(\mathrm{PH})=11.3$ and 11.7 Hz , respectively), while the minor isomers 26 b and $\mathbf{2 7 b}$ have the $\mathrm{PR}_{3}$ ligand located mutually cis to two equivalent hydride ligands, in a manner similar to that in 14a (Fig. 10).

The reactions of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}\right)$ (12) with $\mathrm{PEt}_{3}$ and $\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}$ in $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ at room temperature produce the derivatives $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu$ $\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left(\mathrm{PEt}_{3}\right)_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}\right)(20)$ and $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}\right)$ (29). The ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H}$ NMR spectra of both 28 and 29 show the existence of three isomers in each case with the major one probably having a similar structure to those of 23 and 24, i.e. both ligands being cis to the hydrides.

The spectroscopic data of clusters $13-29$ are shown in Table 4 and Table 5.

## Experimental

The clusters $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)(1), \mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)(2), \mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-$ $\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)(3)$, and $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}\right)(4)$ were prepared in the published methods [11,14-16].
(i) Activation of clusters $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9} \mathrm{Ar}\left[\mathrm{Ar}=\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}(1) ; \mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}(2) ; \mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right.$ (3) and $\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}$ (4)] with $\mathrm{Me}_{3} \mathrm{NO} / \mathrm{MeCN}$
$\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{9} \mathrm{Ar}(15 \mathrm{mg})$ was dissolved in freshly distilled acetonitrile ( 10 ml ). To this solution was added dropwise an acetonitrile solution of $\mathrm{Me}_{3} \mathrm{NO}$ ( 1 mole equiv.). The reaction mixture was stirred at r.t., and the reaction was followed by IR spectroscopy. The reaction was stopped after ca. 0.5 h , when all the starting material
is consumed as shown by IR. The solvent was then removed in vacuo and $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}(\mathrm{MeCN}) \mathrm{Ar}\left[\mathrm{Ar}=\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}(5) ; \mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}(6) ; \mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right.$ (7) and $\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}$ (8)] thus obtained was used in situ for further reactions.

The same procedure was applied except that 2 mole equiv. of $\mathrm{Me}_{3} \mathrm{NO}$ was used, and the bis-acetonitrile derivatives $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2} \mathrm{Ar}\left[\mathrm{Ar}=\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right.$ (9); $\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}$ (10); $\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}$ (11) and $\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{~h}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}$ (12)] were obtained. These were also used in situ for further reactions.
(ii) Reactions of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}(\mathrm{MeCN})\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)(5)$ with $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Ph}$, OMe )

Freshly made $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}(\mathrm{MeCN})\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)(5)(\mathrm{ca} .15 \mathrm{mg})$ was dissolved in $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}(10 \mathrm{ml})$, to which an excess of $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Ph}, \mathrm{OMe})$ was added. The reaction mixture was stirred at r.t. for $0.5 \mathrm{~h}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Ph})$ or $3 \mathrm{~h}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{OMe})$. The solvent was then removed under reduced pressure, and the residue was chromatographed with $40 \% \mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ in hexane. $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}\left(\mathrm{PPh}_{3}\right)\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)(13)$ was obtained in ca. $30 \%$ yield, together with two unidentified products ( $m / e=1662$, and 938 , respectively). In the reaction with $\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}, \mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}\left[\left(\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)\right.$ (14) (ca. $60 \%$ ) and $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)(16)(\mathrm{ca} .10 \%)$ were isolated.
(iii) Reactions of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)(9)$ with $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(R=\mathrm{Ph}, \mathrm{OMe})$

Freshly made $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)(9)(\mathrm{ca} 15 \mathrm{mg}$.$) was dissolved in$ $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}(10 \mathrm{ml})$, to which an excess of $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Ph}, \mathrm{OMe})$ was added. The reaction mixture was stirred at r.t. for $0.5 \mathrm{~h}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Ph})$ or $2 \mathrm{~h}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{OMe})$. The solvent was then removed under reduced pressure, and the residue was chromatographed with $50 \% \mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ in hexane. $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left(\mathrm{PR}_{3}\right)_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{6} \mathrm{H}_{4}\right)[\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Ph}(15)$; OMe (16)] is produced in $60-70 \%$ yield.
(iv) Reactions of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}(\mathrm{MeCN})\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)$ (6) with $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}$, OMe )

To a $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ solution ( 10 ml ) of freshly prepared $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}(\mathrm{MeCN})\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)$ (6) ( 15 mg ) was added an excess of $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}, \mathrm{OMe})$. The reaction mixture was stirred at r.t. for 24 h , and the solvent was then removed in vacuo. Work-up of the residue by TLC with $50 \% \mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ in hexane afforded $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}\left(\mathrm{PR}_{3}\right)\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)$ in good yield $[\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}(17), 75 \% ; \mathrm{R}=\mathrm{OMe}$ (18), 52\%]. When $\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{OMe}$, the disubstituted derivative, $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)(20)$ was also isolated in ca. $10 \%$ yield. The yield of 18 could be improved by reacting 6 with $\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}$ in refluxing $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ for 1.5 h .
(v) Reactions of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)$ (10) with $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}$, OMe)

To a $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ solution ( 10 ml ) of freshly prepared $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2^{-}}$ $\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)(10)(15 \mathrm{mg})$ was added an excess of $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}$, OMe). The reaction mixture was stirred as r.t. for $22 \mathrm{~h}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et})$ or $17.5 \mathrm{~h}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{OMe})$. The solvent was then evacuated, and the residue worked up by TLC using $50 \% \mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ in hexane as eluent. $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left(\mathrm{PR}_{3}\right)_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{9} \mathrm{H}_{6}\right)$ was obtained as major product $[\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}(19)$, $60 \% ; \mathrm{R}=\mathrm{OMe}(20), 68 \%$ ], together with small amount of mono-substituted product, 17 or 18 , respectively. When the reaction of 10 with $\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}$ was carried out in refluxing $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$, the same yield of 20 could be obtained with much shorter reaction time ( 1.5 h ).

To a $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ solution ( 10 ml ) of freshly prepared $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}(\mathrm{MeCN})$ -
$\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ (7) ( 15 mg ) was added an excess of $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}, \mathrm{OMe})$. The reaction mixture was stirred at r.t. for 3 h . The solvent was removed in vacuo, and the residue was worked up by TLC using $50 \% \mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ in hexane as eluent. The yellow compound $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}\left(\mathrm{PR}_{3}\right)\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)[\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}(21)$, OMe (22)] was obtained in ca. $50 \%$ yield.
(vii) Reactions of $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)$ (11) with $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}, \mathrm{OMe})$

To a $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ solution ( 10 ml ) of freshly prepared $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2^{-}}$ $\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{3} \mathrm{~N}\right)(11)(15 \mathrm{mg})$ was added an excess of $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}, \mathrm{OMe})$. The reaction mixture was stirred at r.t. for $1 \mathrm{~h}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et})$ or $3 \mathrm{~h}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{OMe})$. The solvent was removed in vacuo, and the residue was worked up by TLC using $50 \% \mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ in hexane as eluent. Freshly made $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{8}(\mathrm{MeCN})\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}\right)(8)(\mathrm{ca} .15 \mathrm{mg})$ was dissolved in $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}(10 \mathrm{ml})$, to which an excess of $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}$, OMe$)$ was added. The reaction mixture was stirred at r.t. for $1 \mathrm{~h}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et})$ or $4 \mathrm{~h}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{OMe})$. Freshly prepared $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}(\mathrm{MeCN})_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}\right)$ (12) (ca. 15 mg ) was dissolved in $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}(10 \mathrm{ml})$, to which an excess of $\mathrm{PR}_{3}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et}, \mathrm{OMe})$ was added. The reaction mixture was stirred at r.t. for $2.5 \mathrm{~h}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{Et})$ or $2 \mathrm{~h}(\mathrm{R}=\mathrm{OMe})$. The solvent was then removed in vacuo, and the residue taken-up by $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ was subjected to TLC using $50 \% \mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}$ in hexane as eluent. Apart from the small amount of unreacted starting material (12) recovered, the yellow compounds $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu$ $\mathrm{H}_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left(\mathrm{PEt}_{3}\right)_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{NMe}\right)(28)$ and $\mathrm{Os}_{3}(\mu-\mathrm{H})_{2}(\mathrm{CO})_{7}\left[\mathrm{P}(\mathrm{OMe})_{3}\right]_{2}\left(\mathrm{C}_{4} \mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{Me}\right)(29)$ were obtained in 25 and $35 \%$ yield, respectively.

Data collection and processing. Nicolet R3mV four-circle diffractometer, graphite monochromated Mo- $K_{\alpha}$ radiation, 96 step $\omega-2 \theta$ scans, scan range $1.40^{\circ}$ plus $K_{\alpha}$-separation, scan speed $3.0-29.3^{\circ} \mathrm{mm}^{-1} ; 3942$ reflections measured ( $5<2 \theta<$ $\left.45^{\circ},+h, \pm k, \pm l\right)$, 3562 unique [merging $R=0.014$ on 380 equivalent reflections
after empirical absorption correction (max., min. transmission factors $=0.675$, $0.156)$ ], giving 3194 reflections with $F>4 \sigma(F)$. No significant variation in intensities of three standard reflections.

Structure analysis and refinement. Direct methods (Shelxtl-plus: tref) for Os atoms, followed by Fourier difference techniques for remaining non-hydrogen atoms. Full-matrix least-squares with all non-hydrogen atoms anisotropic. Methyl and aromatic H -atoms were placed in idealised positions and allowed to ride on the relevant C atom ( $\mathrm{C}-\mathrm{H} 0.96 \AA$ ); each type of H -atom was assigned a common isotropic thermal parameter which was refined. The hydrides were not located directly. The weighting scheme $w^{-1}=\sigma^{2}(F)+0.002 F^{2}$, with $\sigma(F)$ from counting statistics gave reasonable agreement analyses. Final, converged $R$ and $R_{w}$ values

[^1]are both 0.051 . A final Fourier difference map showed ripples of ca. $2.0 \mathrm{e}_{\AA^{-3}}$ close to the Os atom positions but no other regions of significant electron density. Final atomic coordinates are listed in Table 6. Copies of thermal parameter and structure factor tables may be obtained from the authors. Programs and computers used are given in reference 27.
