A MEMORY.

THE 78th Annual Meeting of the American Pharmaceutical Association, held in Baltimore during the week of May 5th, stands out as one of the most successful conventions in the history of the Association and, in point of attendance, the largest. There were 860 registrants and this number also speaks of the cooperation of Maryland pharmacists to honor one of their number who presided over the Association's deliberations, a desire to extend the hospitalities of Maryland and of the Convention City, and gave expression to the growing interest in professional pharmacy.

Every effort was made to arrange the programs, both of business and of entertainments, to expedite business and give the visitors enjoyment and recreation, and the opportunity of deriving the benefits to be had from association meetings.

The Governor of Maryland, the Mayor of Baltimore, the departments of the City government, the Baltimore Association of Commerce, the management of the headquarters hotel and, so there may be no omission of acknowledgments, all who were invited to assist exhibited the spirit of hospitality. Using a general expression of the visitors, the warm welcome was typified by the temperature prevailing during convention week. The members of the Local Committees, under the direction of Chairman Samuel Y. Harris, successfully carried through a most interesting program.

President Christensen was duly installed and will preside at the 79th Annual Meeting to be held in Miami, Florida, in 1931. Other cities entered the contest for place, but Florida was recognized as leading in the vote before this was announced. The next opportunity for presenting claims will be in 1932, when the AMERICAN PHARMACEUTICAL ASSOCIATION meets in Canada.
