A report from Ambassador Guggenheim at Habana, Cuba, states that a decree signed March 10 and published March 17, 1932, provides that residues, the products of the refining of cottonseed oil, containing not more than 60 per cent of fatty acids, when imported from the United States, shall pay a duty of \$0.50 per 100 kilos.
