Golf Trophy Won by Tulane Professor

THE great efficiency of the New Orleans members of the Golf Committee is demonstrated by the fact that perfect weather greeted the golfers and some of the members availed themselves of the opportunity of playing the fine Metairie golf course every day that they were in New Orleans.

The golf tournament was very popular this year, there being a total of 26 entries in competition, besides a gallery of members. Nuchar Challenge Trophy Cup was won in hard competition by Prof. C. S. Williamson, head of the department of chemical engineering at Tulane University, New Orleans, with an 83 gross. He and L. B. Forbes of Little Rock, winner of last year, were halved going out and the match was not finally decided until the 18th hole. Prof. C. S. Williamson was also presented with the permanent gold medal by the Industrial Chemical Sales Co., Inc., of New York. Mr. Forbes received the handsome elk golf bag presented by the Colgate-Palmolive-Peet Company. Third low gross was won by J. N. Pless of Memphis with an 89. Barrow won the 6th prize consisting of a dozen Puritan golf balls presented by the Cudahy Packing Company. N. C. Hamner of Dallas won the 7th prize consisting of a driver, presented by L. C.
