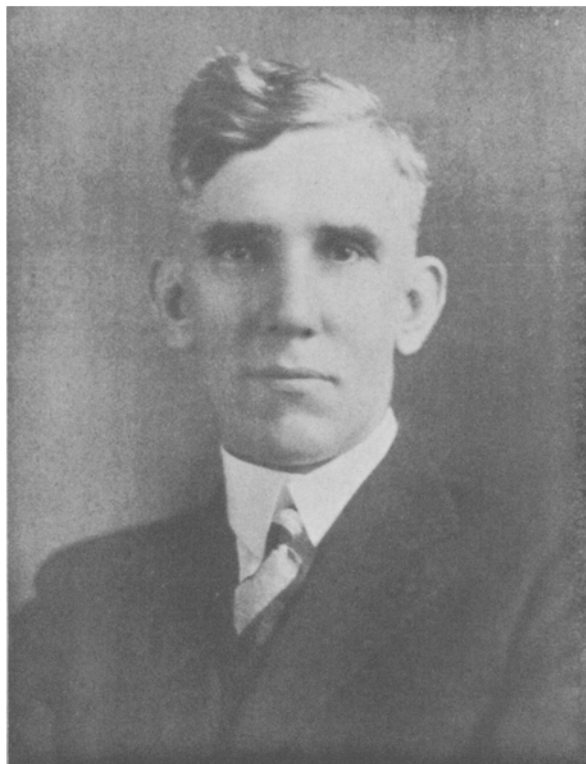
The scientific program is listed, but is not yet complete. President Hamner announces that interesting papers are still coming in, the titles of which do not appear on this program.

### Sights of New Orleans

In the April issue there appeared an article by Mr. Warren Marshall Reid describing New Orleans as you will see it. He outlined all the particularly interesting historical and beauty spots in this wondrous city.

In order that you might quickly reach any of these spots and easily find your way about the commercial district of New Orleans, we have shown a map of the commercial and old section with an alphabetical key, on pages 84 and 85.

You should not fail to see the historical places referred to and if you wish to reach any particular place you can readily do so by referring to the map and key. Your hotel is located as 31 found on the map at the junction F-5. The most interesting of restaurants such as Gala-



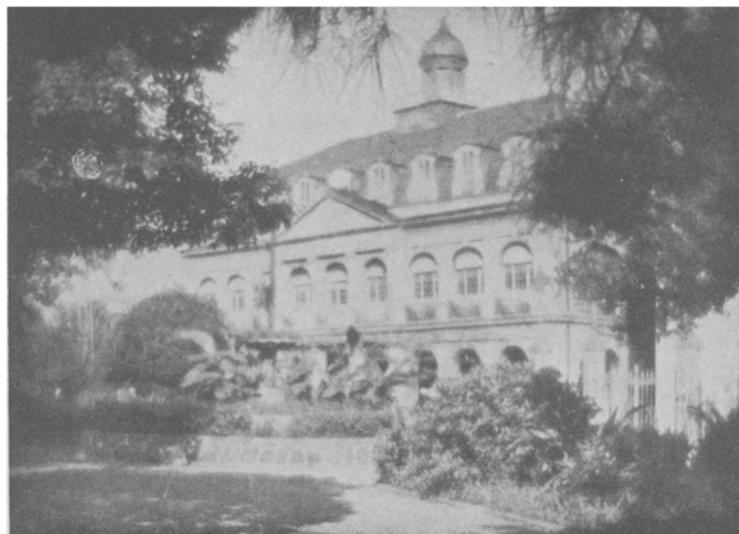

torie's is number 103 located at F-6, the Cabildo, which is the Louisiana State Museum and illustrated below, will be found at 91 at the junction E-7. One of the most interesting of the modern sights is the unloading of bananas of the United Fruit Company landing which is shown at 77 at the junction of A-4. Of the historically interesting places to visit the Old Absenthe House and the St. Louis Cathedral stand out as most typical of the old city.

There are some very interesting places connected with the New South. You should see the Liberty Monument at the foot of Canal Street. This monument marks the spot where "carpetbagging" days ended with a battle between the Metropolitan police and a small body of citizens. It was erected in memory of fourteen Orleanians who were killed there.

The Mint Building, 84-D9, at Esplanade Avenue and Chartres Street, is the oldest Mint Building in the United States. It is built on the ramparts of Fort General Jackson from which point Andrew Jackson reviewed his troops in the War of 1812. An equestrian statue has been erected in the Place d'Armes in honor of General Jackson. It was erected in 1856 and was the work of the well-known sculptor, Clark Mills.

There is the "Haunted house" which was built for Napoleon. This famous house became the old New Orleans theatre.
