• MUSEUM OF SCIENCE AND INDUS-TRY... Housed in the Fine Arts building of the Columbian Exposition, here are graphically presented many of the important discoveries of science and their application to modern industry, including an operating replica of a coal mine and many of the science exhibits of A Century of Progress.

FALL MEETING

The Fall Convention of the American Oil Chemists' Society will be held at the Congress Hotel in Chicago on October 8 and 9.

There will be three technical sessions —on Thursday morning, on Friday morning, and on Friday afternoon. The dinner and entertainment are scheduled for Friday, leaving the Bowling Tournament for Thursday evening.

The Program Committee reports that an unusually interesting technical and scientific program already appears likely at this early date. Among those who will probably appear on the program with papers in their respective fields are: Dr. J. B. Brown, Assoc. Prof. of Physiological Chemistry and Pharmacology, Ohio State University; Dr. A. J. Carlson, Department of Physiology, University of Chicago; Prof. W. E. Anderson, Yale University, and Prof. H. R. Kraybill of Purdue University.

J. P. Harris and A. E. MacGee report that fifteen of a total of seventeen available exhibition booths have been leased to advertisers. The exhibitors are planning more elaborate displays than those presented heretofore. The early reservation of exhibit space is reassuring. It emphasizes the confidence of exhibitors in the success of American Oil Chemists' Society conventions, and indicates that the Society has something substantial to offer its advertisers.

Golf:

The Golf Committee reports that arrangements have been made with the Ridge Country Club for the Tournament this fall. Play has been scheduled for Saturday morning, October 10. However, it has been decided to defer final decision on whether the play shall be held as a tournament until the time of registration. If sixteen or more registrations are received arrangements will be made to conduct the affair as a tournament with prizes offered.

Bowling:

A. E. King reports that plans for the Bowling Tournament are progressing. The matches will be held in alleys adjacent to the Congress Hotel.
