Announcements have been received regarding the joint meeting of the International Commission for the Study of Fats and the German Society for Fat Research. These meetings are to be held in Berlin, Germany from September 10 to 16.

This announcement will be interesting to those fat and oil chemists who are planning to be in Germany at that time.

GLENN H. PICKARD

A well-known specialist in the field of oils, paints, varnish, pigments, etc. was called from the sphere of activity with the death of Glenn H. Pickard on July 21, 1939. Mr. Pickard was 59 years old.

He was born in Wilson, New York in 1879 and received his early education at Central High School, Cleveland, Ohio. He attended Western Reserve and Case Universities and received his Degree of Bachelor of Science in Chemistry from Columbia University in 1904.

From 1905 to 1916 he held a number of positions including the following: Assistant Professor of Industrial Chemistry, Columbia University; Chemist and Superintendent of Refineries for Spencer-Kellogg and Sons, Inc., Buffalo; Chemist and Superintendent for George D. Wetherill & Company, Philadelphia; Chemist and Manager of the South Chicago Plant and Manager Special Oils Department, American Linseed Company, Chicago, Illinois.

Since 1916 until the date of his death, Mr. Pickard conducted his own business as consulting chemist and chemical engineer in the oil, paint and varnish field.

His loss is mourned by many friends in the oil and fat industry.
