### 1943 FALL CONVENTION

With an attendance record for all time, the Seventeenth Fall Convention of the American Oil Chemists Society passed into history. About four hundred and twenty-five fat, oil and soap chemists had enjoyed a most interesting and useful program of papers when the convention drew to a close on Friday afternoon, October 8. The three-day meeting was held at the Palmer House in Chicago.

The sessions opened Wednesday morning, October 6, with a full day's program devoted to soap and glycerin. This section was presided over by Foster Dee Snell, vice-president of the Society who had been very active in arranging this portion of the program. Nine papers covering various theoretical and practical aspects of soap and glycerin chemistry and technology composed the program.

An innovation so far as American Oil Chemists' Society programs are concerned was presented Thursday morning, October 7, when a symposium on the subject of drying oils was held. Five experts in this field presented as many papers on several subjects, giving a complete and adequate review of the situation on drying oils. Mr. S. O. Sorensen, who arranged the symposium, presided.

Thursday afternoon saw the opening of a series of fat and oil papers with President Lamar Kishlar presiding. This series extended through the Friday sessions presided over by J. K. Gunther and H. C. Black, bringing to a close a well-rounded scientific program.





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

## N. S. P. A. ADOPTS NEW OIL TRADING RULES

New trading rules for crude soybean oil were adopted by the National Soybean Processors Association at their annual meeting of September 15, 1943. These new trading rules evaluate the crude oil on the basis of refining loss and bleach color providing a schedule of discounts and premiums for refining loss and a schedule of discounts for excessive red bleach color.
